Rare Early American Silver Small Salver,  
square wavy sides scalloped at the corners,  
on 4 feet, crest in center: Lion rampant,  
or. Unmarked. Likely attribution to  
Jacob Hurd, Boston 1702-1758 to whose  
family the crest may pertain by utilizing  
as crest the feature of its coat of arms,  
the lion rampant, or.\* Handed down via  
descendants of Thomas Jefferson Lillie  
family of Old South Church and Tea Party  
connections. \*Comparison also suggested to  
John Coney's engraving of the lion in the  
Colman monteith bowl.
