Other Rhode Island pieces (spoons) which may include a few of interest with original owning family identified, coming from the same source as the Casey Creamer, are the following:

Pair Table Spoons, rat-tail, 1728 by Jonathan Clarke
1705-1770 Mark I: CLARKE, engraved G
S P (Greene). \$150.00


Small Teaspoon 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ " , rat-tail, by Isaac Anthony, 1690-1773
"SB" (Gabriel Bernon). Repair in handle. 30.00

1 Teaspoon, handle broken, mark illegible, upturning
tipt form c.1740-50. Engraved with Greene crest. 7.50

From another source we have information of two dessert spoons, rat-tails, by Daniel Russell. The dessert spoon size, or "pap" spoon, is a special rarity compared to the other larger and smaller spoons by Colonial makers. Probably these were two children's spoons as they are engraved respectively N G to R G, and N G to A G. These are not here but procurable around \$60.00 each, possibly less for pair.

In my letter of December 11, 1948 I described other early Rhode Island spoons already in our collection.
