THE WAR. AT A TIME WHEN THE SAVINGS BANKS, AS WE KNOW THEM,
WERE NOT AVAILABLE, THE RESIDENTS OF OUR COLONIAL TOWNS OFTEN
ACQUIRED TANKARDS, CANS AND CUPS NOT ONLY TO BE USED AS DRINKING
VESSELS BUT AS A MEANS OF PRESERVING SOME OF THEIR WEALTH.
