Moore Silver Collection Seen At Salve

An exhibition of early American silver from the collection of Cornelius C. Moore, a local attorney, attracted a large number to Salve Regina College yesterday. It was under the auspices of the College Alumnae Association.

The display included pieces from famed Newport silversmiths, Tankards, porringers,

tea services, spoons, coffee pots, sugar bowls, salvers, creamers, casters, snuff boxes, mugs, cups, sauce boats, punch strainers, sugar tongs, ladles and tea caddies were among the items.

Moore gave a talk on the Colonial silversmiths and commented on various pieces in his collection, considered among the most valuable in private hands.

Newport silversmiths represented were Isaac Anthony, John Tanner, Jonathan Otis, Samuel Vernon, Thomas Arnold, Benjamin Brenton, John Coddington, Arnold Collins, Daniel Russell, Thomas Coverly, Daniel Roger and Jonathan Clarke.

Among other silversmiths whose creations were on display were Paul Revere, John Edwards, Jacob Hurd, Samuel Edwards, Joseph Edwards Jr., John Potine, John Coburn, and Zachariah Bridgen of Boston; Mood Russell of Barnstable, Mass.; Philip Syng Jr., and Daniel Van Voorhis of Philadelphia; Samuel Casey of South Kingstown; Joe Sayre, Hugh Wisbart, John Vernon, Peter Van Dyke and Myer Myers of New York; Samuel Avery of Preston, Conn., and Walter Cornell of Providence.

Mrs. Robert Reall, Alumnae Association president, conducted the meeting which was followed by tea. Sister Mary Augustine, association moderator, assisted in arranging the display.

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
