Father Doyle Given Life Membership In AMVETS Group

The Rev. Edward P. Doyle, O.P., Professor of Theology at the College, has been awarded life membership in the Amvets, according to a letter received here from Marshall E. Miller, National Commander of the Amvets. This group is a fraternal organization for World War II and Korean veterans.

Father Doyle, who was graduated from this college in 1914, has been an Amvets member for five years, and has served as Chaplain of its Rhode Island Department during that time. He is a native of Fall River, Mass.

During the last war he spent three years in the Army Chaplains Corps, and was attached to the 104th "Timberwolves" Infantry Regiment. Father Doyle entered the service as a First Lieutenant and was discharged with the rank of Major.

He accompanied the 104th on its tour through France, Holland, Belgium and Germany, and was with it at its famous meeting with the Russians at the Elbe. Father also spent one year with the 14th Armored Division in Germany. For his wartime services, Father Doyle was decorated with the Bronze Star, the European Theater Campaign Star, and the World War II Victory Medal.

The war's end found him in California waiting to go to the Pacific Theater.

Father McKenna asserted that for a marriage to be a success there must be compatibility between the parties. If they find that this is impossible and they are incompatible, he said, then there is only one thing to do.

The period of engagement will prove to be the most dangerous, Father McKenna stated. This is because of the "frequent occasions when they are alone for a long period planning the future and the increased intimacy that comes as the day for the wedding gets closer."
