Mr. FOGARTY, from the Committee on Appropriations, reported the following bill; which was committed to the Committee of the Whole House on the State of the Union and ordered to be printed

A BILL

Making appropriations for the Department of Labor, the Federal Security Agency, and related independent agencies, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1950, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any money
4 in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the Depart-
5 ment of Labor, the Federal Security Agency, and related
6 independent agencies, for the fiscal year ending June 30,
7 1950, namely:

1 TITLE I—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

2 OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

3 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for the
4 Office of the Secretary of Labor (hereafter in this title
5 referred to as the Secretary), including personal services in
6 the District of Columbia; health service program as author-
7 ized by law (5 U. S. C. 150); teletype news service; and
8 payment in advance when authorized by the Secretary for
9 dues or fees for library membership in organizations whose
10 publications are available to members only or to members
11 at a price lower than to the general public; \$1,074,000.

12 Salaries and expenses, Office of the Solicitor: For ex-
13 penses necessary for the Office of the Solicitor for the Depart-
14 ment of Labor, including personal services in the District of
15 Columbia, \$1,064,200.

16 Salaries and expenses, Bureau of Labor Standards: For
17 expenses necessary for the promotion of industrial safety,
18 employment stabilization, and amicable industrial relations
19 for labor and industry, and for the performance of the func-
20 tions vested in the Secretary by title I of the Labor-Man-
21 agement Relations Act, 1947 (29 U. S. C. 159 (f) and
22 (g)), including personal services in the District of
23 Columbia; purchase of reports and of material for informa-
24 tional exhibits; and expenses of attendance of cooperating
25 officials and consultants at conferences concerned with the

1 work of the Bureau of Labor Standards when called by
2 the Bureau with the written approval of the Secretary;
3 \$391,000.

4 Salaries and expenses, Bureau of Veterans' Reemploy-
5 ment Rights: For expenses necessary to render assistance
6 in connection with the exercise of reemployment rights of
7 veterans under section 8 of the Selective Training and Serv-
8 ice Act of 1940, as amended (50 U. S. C., App. 308), the
9 Service Extension Act of 1941, as amended, the Army Re-
10 serve and Retired Personnel Service Law of 1940, as
11 amended, and section 9 (h) of title I of the Selective Service
12 Act of 1948 (Public Law 759, approved June 24, 1948),
13 and, under the Act of June 23, 1943, as amended (50 U. S.
14 C., App. 1472), of persons who have performed service in
15 the Merchant Marine, including personal services in the Dis-
16 trict of Columbia, \$270,000.

17 **BUREAU OF APPRENTICESHIP**

18 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary to enable
19 the Secretary to conduct a program of encouraging appren-
20 tice training, as authorized by the Act of August 16, 1937
21 (29 U. S. C. 50), including personal services in the District
22 of Columbia, \$2,605,000.

23 **BUREAU OF LABOR STATISTICS**

24 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for the
25 work of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, including advances or

1 reimbursement to State, Federal, and local agencies and
2 their employees for services rendered; personal services in the
3 District of Columbia; and not to exceed \$15,000 for services
4 as authorized by section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946
5 (5 U. S. C. 55a) ; \$5,450,000.

6 WOMEN'S BUREAU

7 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for the
8 work of the Women's Bureau, as authorized by the Act of
9 June 5, 1920 (29 U. S. C. 11-16), including personal
10 services in the District of Columbia and purchase of reports
11 and material for informational exhibits; \$334,800.

12 WAGE AND HOUR DIVISION

13 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for per-
14 forming the duties imposed by the Fair Labor Standards Act
15 of 1938, as amended, and the Act to provide conditions for
16 the purchase of supplies and the making of contracts by the
17 United States, approved June 30, 1936 (41 U. S. C. 38),
18 and for the functions under the Fair Labor Standards Act
19 transferred by Reorganization Plan Numbered 2 of 1946,
20 including personal services in the District of Columbia; re-
21 imbursement to State, Federal, and local agencies and their
22 employees for inspection services rendered; and expenses
23 of attendance of cooperating officials and consultants at con-
24 ferences concerned with the work of the Wage and Hour

1 Division when called by the Division with the written ap-
2 proval of the Secretary; \$5,361,000.

3 GENERAL PROVISIONS

4 SEC. 102. Appropriations under this title available for
5 salaries and expenses shall be available for travel expenses
6 and, when specifically authorized by the Secretary, for ex-
7 penses of attendance at meetings concerned with the function
8 or activity for which any such appropriation is made.

9 SEC. 103. Appropriations under this title available for
10 salaries and expenses shall be available for stenographic
11 reporting services as authorized by section 15 of the Act of
12 August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a).

13 SEC. 104. Appropriations under this title available for
14 salaries and expenses shall be available for payment of claims
15 pursuant to section 403 of the Federal Tort Claims Act
16 (28 U. S. C. 2672).

17 SEC. 105. Appropriations under this title available for
18 salaries and expenses shall be available for printing and
19 binding.

20 SEC. 106. The Secretary, if he finds it necessary for the
21 practical and efficient operation of the Department, shall
22 have the authority to transfer funds from any appropriation
23 herein made available for salaries and expenses to any other
24 such appropriation, but no appropriation shall be either in-

1 creased or decreased more than 5 per centum by such trans-
2 fers: *Provided*, That any such transfers shall not be used for
3 the purpose of creating new functions within the
4 Department.

5 SEC. 107. This title may be cited as the "Department
6 of Labor Appropriation Act, 1950".

7 TITLE II—FEDERAL SECURITY AGENCY

8 AMERICAN PRINTING HOUSE FOR THE BLIND

9 Education of the blind: For carrying out the Act of
10 August 4, 1919, as amended (20 U. S. C. 101), \$115,000.

11 BUREAU OF EMPLOYEES' COMPENSATION

12 Salaries and expenses: For necessary administrative
13 expenses, including personal services in the District of Co-
14 lumbia; services as authorized by section 15 of the Act of
15 August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a); and not to exceed
16 \$41,000 for the Employees' Compensation Board of Ap-
17 peals; \$1,466,000, together with not to exceed \$115,000
18 to be derived from the War Claims Fund created by section
19 13 (a) of the War Claims Act of 1948 (Public Law 896,
20 approved July 3, 1948): *Provided*, That section 3709,
21 Revised Statutes, as amended, shall not apply to any purchase
22 or service outside continental United States when the aggre-
23 gate amount involved does not exceed \$500.

24 Employees' compensation fund: For the payment of
25 compensation and other benefits and expenses (except

1 administrative expenses) authorized by law and accruing
2 during the current or any prior fiscal year, including pay-
3 ments to other Federal agencies for medical and hospital
4 services pursuant to agreement approved by the Bureau of
5 Employees' Compensation; continuation of payment of bene-
6 fits as provided for under the head "Civilian War Benefits"
7 in the Federal Security Agency Appropriation Act, 1947;
8 the advancement of costs for enforcement of recoveries in
9 third-party cases; the furnishing of medical and hospital serv-
10 ices and supplies, treatment, and funeral and burial expenses,
11 including transportation and other expenses incidental to such
12 services, treatment, and burial, for such enrollees of the Civil-
13 ian Conservation Corps as were certified by the Director of
14 such Corps as receiving hospital services and treatment at
15 Government expense on June 30, 1943, and who are not
16 otherwise entitled thereto as civilian employees of the United
17 States, and the limitations and authority of the Act of Sep-
18 tember 7, 1916, as amended (5 U. S. C. 796), shall apply
19 in providing such services, treatment, and expenses in such
20 cases; \$13,000,000, together with not to exceed \$10,000,000
21 to be derived from the War Claims Fund created by section
22 13 (a) of the War Claims Act of 1948 (Public Law 896)
23 and to be available for payments pursuant to sections 4 (c)
24 and 5 (f) of such Act, which amounts may be accounted
25 for as one fund.

1 COLUMBIA INSTITUTION FOR THE DEAF

2 Salaries and expenses: For the partial support of Colum-
3 bia Institution for the Deaf, including personal services and
4 miscellaneous expenses, and repairs and improvements,
5 \$315,300.

6 FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION

7 Salaries and expenses: For necessary expenses for
8 carrying out the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, as
9 amended (21 U. S. C. 301-392); the Tea Importation Act,
10 as amended (21 U. S. C. 41-50); the Import Milk Act
11 (21 U. S. C. 141-149); the Federal Caustic Poison Act
12 (15 U. S. C. 401-411); and the Filled Milk Act, as
13 amended (21 U. S. C. 61-64); including personal services
14 in the District of Columbia; purchase of not to exceed
15 twenty-five passenger motor vehicles for replacement only;
16 services as authorized by section 15 of the Act of August
17 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a); reporting and illustrating the
18 results of investigations; purchase of chemicals, apparatus,
19 and scientific equipment; not to exceed \$2,000 for payment
20 in advance for special tests and analyses by contract without
21 regard to section 3709 of the Revised Statutes; and not to
22 exceed \$1,000 for payment of fees, travel, and per diem in
23 connection with studies of new developments pertinent to
24 food and drug enforcement operations; \$4,802,500.

25 Salaries and expenses, certification and inspection serv-

1 ices: For expenses necessary for the certification or inspec-
2 tion of certain products in accordance with sections 406, 504,
3 506, 507, 604, 702A, and 706 of the Federal Food, Drug,
4 and Cosmetic Act, as amended (21 U. S. C. 346, 354, 356,
5 357, 364, 372a, and 376), the aggregate of the advance
6 deposits during the current fiscal year to cover payment
7 of fees by applicants for certification or inspection of such
8 products, to remain available until expended. The total
9 amount herein appropriated shall be available for personal
10 services in the District of Columbia; purchase of not to
11 exceed five passenger motor vehicles; services as authorized
12 by section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C.
13 55a) ; purchase of chemicals, apparatus, and scientific equip-
14 ment; and the refund of advance deposits for which no
15 service has been rendered.

16 **FREEDMEN'S HOSPITAL**

17 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for opera-
18 tion and maintenance, including repairs; furnishing, repair-
19 ing, and cleaning of wearing apparel used by employees
20 in the performance of their official duties; transfer of funds
21 to the appropriation "Salaries and expenses, Howard Uni-
22 versity" for salaries of technical and professional personnel
23 detailed to the hospital; payments to the appropriation of
24 Howard University for instruction of nurses and actual cost

1 of heat, light, and power furnished by such university;
2 \$2,443,000: *Provided*, That no intern or resident physician
3 receiving compensation from this appropriation on a full-
4 time basis shall receive compensation in the form of wages
5 or salary from any other appropriation in this Act.

6 HOWARD UNIVERSITY

7 Salaries and expenses: For the partial support of Howard
8 University, including personal services and miscellaneous
9 expenses and repairs to buildings and grounds, \$2,335,000.

10 Plans and specifications: For the preparation of prelim-
11 inary plans and specifications for construction, under the
12 supervision of the Public Buildings Administration, on the
13 grounds of Howard University of a preclinical medical build-
14 ing, including engineering and architectural services, print-
15 ing and binding, advertising, and travel, \$60,000, which
16 amount, except such part as may be necessary for the inci-
17 dental expenses of the University, may be transferred to the
18 Public Buildings Administration, Federal Works Agency,
19 for the above purposes, to remain available until expended.

20 Construction of buildings: For construction of buildings
21 on the grounds of Howard University, under the supervision
22 of the Public Buildings Administration, Federal Works
23 Agency, to remain available until expended, as follows:

24 For beginning construction of a law school building, an
25 administration building, a biology building and greenhouse,

1 and men's dormitory units, together with alterations and in-
2 stallations in connection with such construction, including
3 engineering and architectural services, printing and binding,
4 and travel, \$1,000,000, which amount, except such part as
5 may be necessary for the incidental expenses of the Univer-
6 sity, may be transferred to the Public Buildings Administra-
7 tion, Federal Works Agency, for the purposes of this
8 appropriation; and in addition the Public Buildings Admin-
9 istration is authorized to enter into contracts for construction
10 of such buildings, which shall provide for completion at a
11 total cost to the Federal Government not in excess of
12 \$1,950,000 for the law school building, \$1,625,000 for the
13 administration building, \$1,872,000 for the biology building
14 and greenhouse; and \$1,837,000 for the men's dormitory
15 units: *Provided*, That the limitations on contract authority
16 and total cost may be exceeded or shall be reduced by an
17 amount equal to the percentage increase or decrease, if
18 any, in construction costs generally, dating from July 1,
19 1948, as determined by the Federal Works Administrator;

20 For payment of obligations incurred under authority
21 provided under this head in the Federal Security Agency
22 Appropriation Act, 1948, and the Federal Security Agency
23 Appropriation Act, 1949, to enter into contracts for con-
24 struction of a dental school building and an auditorium
25 building, \$2,953,425;

1 For payment of obligations incurred under authority
2 provided under this head in the First Deficiency Appropria-
3 tion Act, 1948, to enter into contracts for construction of
4 an engineering building and women's dormitory units,
5 \$1,706,000.

6 OFFICE OF EDUCATION

7 Further development of vocational education: For
8 carrying out section 3 of the Vocational Educational Act
9 of 1946 (20 U. S. C. 15h), \$19,842,760: *Provided*, That
10 the apportionment to the States shall be computed on the
11 basis of not to exceed \$19,842,760 for the current fiscal
12 year.

13 Promotion of vocational education in Hawaii: For
14 carrying out section 4 of the Act of March 10, 1924 (20
15 U. S. C. 29), \$30,000.

16 Promotion of vocational education in Puerto Rico: For
17 carrying out section 1 of the Act of March 3, 1931 (20
18 U. S. C. 30), \$105,000.

19 Further endowment of colleges of agriculture and the
20 mechanic arts: For carrying out section 22 of the Act of
21 June 29, 1935 (7 U. S. C. 329), \$2,480,000.

22 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for the
23 Office of Education, including surveys, studies, investigations,
24 and reports regarding libraries; fostering coordination of pub-
25 lic and school library service; coordination of library service

1 on the national level with other forms of adult education; de-
2 veloping library participation in Federal projects; fostering
3 Nation-wide coordination of research materials among libra-
4 ries, interstate library coordination and the development of
5 library service throughout the country; personal services in
6 the District of Columbia; services as authorized by section 15
7 of the Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a); purchase,
8 distribution, and exchange of educational documents, motion-
9 picture films, and lantern slides; collection, exchange, and
10 cataloging of educational apparatus and appliances, articles
11 of school furniture and models of school buildings illustrative
12 of foreign and domestic systems and methods of education,
13 and repairing the same; \$1,860,000, of which not less than
14 \$522,300 shall be available for the Division of Vocational
15 Education as authorized: *Provided*, That all receipts from
16 non-Federal agencies representing reimbursement for ex-
17 penses of travel of employees of the Office of Education
18 performing advisory functions to said agencies shall be de-
19 posited in the Treasury of the United States to the credit of
20 this appropriation.

21 OFFICE OF VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION

22 Payments to States (including Alaska, Hawaii, and
23 Puerto Rico): For payments to States (including Alaska,
24 Hawaii, and Puerto Rico) in accordance with the Voca-
25 tional Rehabilitation Act, as amended (29 U. S. C. ch. 4),

1 including payments, in accordance with regulations of the
2 Administrator, for one-half of necessary expenditures for the
3 acquisition of vending stands or other equipment in accord-
4 ance with section 3 (a) (3) (C) of said Act for the use of
5 blind persons, such stands or other equipment to be con-
6 trolled by the State agency, \$20,500,000, of which not
7 to exceed \$225,000 shall be available to the Federal Se-
8 curity Administrator for providing rehabilitation services
9 to disabled residents of the District of Columbia, as auth-
10 orized by section 6 of said Act, which latter amount shall
11 be available for administrative expenses in connection with
12 providing such services in the District of Columbia, printing
13 and binding, including the purchase of reprints, and travel:
14 *Provided*, That not to exceed 15 per centum of the appro-
15 priation shall be used for administrative purposes: *And pro-*
16 *vided further*, That section 3709 of the Revised Statutes,
17 as amended, shall not apply to any purchase made or service
18 rendered when the aggregate amount involved does not
19 exceed \$400.

20 Payments to States (including Alaska, Hawaii, and
21 Puerto Rico), next succeeding fiscal year: For making,
22 after May 31 of the current fiscal year, payments to States
23 in accordance with the Vocational Rehabilitation Act, as
24 amended (including the objects specified in the preceding
25 paragraph), for the first quarter of the next succeeding fiscal

1 year such sums as may be necessary, the obligations incurred
2 and the expenditures made thereunder to be charged to the
3 appropriation therefor for that fiscal year: *Provided*, That
4 the payments made pursuant to this paragraph shall not
5 exceed the amount paid to the States for the first quarter
6 of the current fiscal year.

7 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary in carry-
8 ing out the provisions of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act,
9 as amended, and of the Act approved June 20, 1936
10 (20 U. S. C., ch. 6A), including personal services in the
11 District of Columbia; services as authorized by section 15 of
12 the Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a); exchange of
13 books; and not to exceed \$3,000 for production, purchase,
14 and distribution of educational films; \$685,000.

15 PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE

16 For necessary expenses in carrying out the Public Health
17 Service Act, as amended (42 U. S. C. ch. 6A) (hereinafter
18 referred to as the Act), and other Acts, including (with
19 the exception of the appropriation "Pay, and so forth, com-
20 missioned officers, Public Health Service") personal services
21 in the District of Columbia; purchase of reports, documents,
22 and other material for publication; services as authorized by
23 section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a);
24 preparation and display of posters and exhibits by contract
25 or otherwise; packing, unpacking, crating, uncrating, dray-

1 age, and transportation of personal effects of commissioned
2 officers and transportation of their dependents on change of
3 station; and increased allowances to Reserve Officers for
4 foreign service; as follows:

5 Venereal diseases: To carry out the purposes of sections
6 314 (a) and 363 of the Act with respect to venereal dis-
7 eases, including the operation and maintenance of centers for
8 the diagnosis, treatment, support, and clothing of persons
9 afflicted with venereal diseases; transportation and subsist-
10 ence of such persons and their attendants to and from the
11 place of treatment or allowance in lieu thereof; diagnosis and
12 treatment (including emergency treatment for other ill-
13 nesses) of such persons through contracts with physicians
14 and hospitals and other appropriate institutions without
15 regard to section 3709 of the Revised Statutes, as amended;
16 fees for case finding and referral to such centers of voluntary
17 patients; reasonable expenses of preparing remains or burial
18 of deceased patients; recreational supplies and equipment;
19 leasing of facilities and repair and alteration of leased facili-
20 ties; the purchase of not to exceed sixty passenger
21 motor vehicles for replacement only, and for grants of money,
22 services, supplies, equipment, and use of facilities to States,
23 as defined in the Act, and with the approval of the respective
24 State health authorities, to counties, health districts, and
25 other political subdivisions of the States, for the foregoing

1 purposes, in such amounts and upon such terms and condi-
2 tions as the Surgeon General may determine; \$16,000,000.

3 Tuberculosis: To carry out the purposes of section 314
4 (b) of the Act, including the purchase of not to exceed
5 three passenger motor vehicles for replacement only,
6 \$9,550,000.

7 Assistance to States, general: To carry out the purposes
8 of section 314 (c) of the Act; to provide consultative serv-
9 ices to States pursuant to section 311 of the Act; and to make
10 field investigations and demonstrations pursuant to section
11 301 of the Act, including the purchase of not to exceed
12 twenty-four passenger motor vehicles for replacement only,
13 \$13,600,000.

14 Communicable diseases: To carry out those provisions
15 of sections 301, 311, 361, and 704 of the Act relating to the
16 prevention and suppression of communicable diseases, the
17 interstate transmission and spread thereof, and the enforce-
18 ment of any applicable quarantine laws, including the pur-
19 chase of not to exceed thirty passenger motor vehicles for
20 replacement only; and purchase (not to exceed two) and
21 hire, maintenance, and operation of aircraft; \$7,350,000.

22 Disease and sanitation investigations and control, Terri-
23 tory of Alaska: To enable the Surgeon General to conduct,
24 in the Service, and to cooperate with and assist the Territory

1 of Alaska in the conduct of, activities necessary in the investi-
2 gation, prevention, treatment, and control of diseases, and
3 the establishment and maintenance of health and sanitation
4 services pursuant to and for the purposes specified in sec-
5 tions 301, 311, 314 (without regard to the provisions of sub-
6 sections (d), (f), (h), and (j) and the limitations set
7 forth in subsection (c) of such section), 361, 363, and 704
8 of the Public Health Service Act, as amended, including
9 the purchase of not to exceed six passenger motor vehicles,
10 and hire, operation, and maintenance of aircraft, \$1,300,000:
11 *Provided*, That property of the Public Health Service located
12 in Alaska and used in carrying out the activities herein
13 authorized may be transferred, without reimbursement, to
14 the Territory of Alaska at the discretion of the Surgeon
15 General.

16 Grants for hospital construction: For liquidation of con-
17 tractual obligations authorized by the Congress to be incurred
18 during the fiscal year 1948 or any subsequent fiscal year for
19 construction grants under part C, title VI, of the Act, as
20 amended, \$15,000,000, to remain available until expended.
21 Allotments under such part C to the several States for the
22 current fiscal year shall be made on the basis of \$75,000,-
23 000, a part of the sum authorized to be appropriated for that
24 fiscal year. Whenever the Surgeon General shall have ap-
25 proved an application for a construction project in accordance

1 with section 625 of the Act, subject to the amount of the
2 allotments available to the States for such purposes, the Fed-
3 eral share of the cost of such project, as provided by the Act,
4 shall constitute a contractual obligation of the Federal
5 Government.

6 Administrative expenses, assistance for hospital con-
7 struction: For administrative expenses incident to carrying
8 out title VI of the Act, as amended, including the purchase
9 of not to exceed three passenger motor vehicles for replace-
10 ment only, \$1,000,000.

11 Hospitals and medical care: For carrying out the pur-
12 poses of sections 321, 322, 324, 326, 331, 332, 502, and
13 710 of the Act, including purchase and exchange of farm
14 products and livestock, \$24,500,000.

15 Mental health activities: For expenses necessary for
16 carrying out the provisions of sections 301, 302, 311, 312,
17 314 (c), and 321 of the Public Health Service Act, as
18 amended, with respect to mental diseases; sections 322, 324,
19 326, 504, and 710 of such Act with respect to treatment at
20 the Public Health Service hospitals, Fort Worth, Texas, and
21 Lexington, Kentucky, of persons suffering from psychiatric
22 disorders; and sections 303, 341, 343, and 344 of such Act,
23 and Executive Order 9079, dated February 26, 1942;
24 purchase of not to exceed one passenger motor vehicle for
25 replacement only; firearms and ammunition; reimbursement

1 to the working-capital fund for articles or services furnished
2 by the industrial activities; \$11,387,000, of which \$2,-
3 663,000 shall be for the operation (exclusive of research
4 and training) of the Public Health Service hospitals, Fort
5 Worth, Texas, and Lexington, Kentucky, and of which not
6 less than \$750,000 shall be available exclusively for pay-
7 ment of obligations for research and training grants incurred
8 under authority heretofore granted under this head; and, in
9 addition to the amount appropriated herein, the Surgeon
10 General is authorized, upon the recommendations of the
11 National Advisory Mental Health Council, to approve appli-
12 cations for research and training grants, not to exceed a
13 total of \$2,150,000, for periods beyond the current fiscal
14 year, and such grants shall, if approved during the current
15 fiscal year, constitute a contractual obligation of the Federal
16 Government.

17 Foreign quarantine service: For carrying out the pur-
18 poses of sections 361 to 369 of the Act, relating to pre-
19 venting the introduction of communicable diseases from
20 foreign countries, the medical examination of aliens in
21 accordance with section 325 of the Act, and the care and
22 treatment of quarantine detainees pursuant to section 322
23 (e) of the Act in private or other public hospitals when
24 facilities of the Public Health Service are not available,
25 including insurance of official motor vehicles in foreign

1 countries when required by law of such countries; and the
2 purchase of not to exceed twelve passenger motor vehicles
3 for replacement only, \$3,085,000.

4 Employee health service programs: For carrying out
5 the functions of the Public Health Service under the Act of
6 August 8, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 150), \$167,000: *Provided,*
7 That when the Public Health Service, at the request of any
8 department or agency of the Government, establishes or
9 operates a health service program for such department or
10 agency such amount as may be necessary may be consoli-
11 dated with this appropriation by transfer from the applicable
12 appropriation or appropriations of such department or
13 agency.

14 National Institutes of Health, operating expenses: For
15 the activities of the National Institutes of Health, not other-
16 wise provided for, including research fellowships and grants
17 for research projects pursuant to section 301 of the Act; the
18 regulation and preparation of biologic products; the pur-
19 chase of not to exceed ten passenger motor vehicles for
20 replacement only; and erection of temporary structures for
21 storage of equipment and supplies and housing of animals,
22 \$11,800,000; and, in addition, the Surgeon General is au-
23 thorized, upon the recommendations of the National Advisory
24 Health Council, to approve applications for research grants,
25 not to exceed a total of \$1,925,000, for periods beyond the

1 current fiscal year, and such grants shall, if approved during
2 the current fiscal year, constitute a contractual obligation of
3 the Federal Government.

4 National Cancer Institute: To enable the Surgeon Gen-
5 eral, upon the recommendations of the National Advisory
6 Cancer Council, to make grants-in-aid for research and train-
7 ing projects relating to cancer, including grants for drawing
8 plans, erection of buildings and acquisition of land therefor;
9 to cooperate with State health agencies, and other public
10 and private nonprofit institutions, in the prevention, control,
11 and eradication of cancer by providing consultative services,
12 demonstrations, and grants-in-aid; and to otherwise carry
13 out the provisions of title IV, Part A, of the Act, \$16,400,-
14 000, of which not less than \$3,000,000 shall be available
15 exclusively for payment of obligations for research and train-
16 ing grants incurred under authority heretofore granted under
17 this head; and, in addition to the amount appropriated herein,
18 the Surgeon General is authorized, upon the recommenda-
19 tions of the National Advisory Cancer Council, to approve
20 applications for research and training grants, including
21 grants for drawing plans, erection of buildings, and acquisi-
22 tion of land therefor, not to exceed a total of \$5,000,000
23 for periods beyond the current fiscal year, and such grants
24 shall, if approved during the current fiscal year, constitute a
25 contractual obligation of the Federal Government.

1 National Heart Institute: For expenses necessary to
2 carry out the purposes of the National Heart Act, includ-
3 ing grants-in-aid for drawing plans, erection of buildings,
4 and acquisition of land therefor and the purchase of not
5 to exceed three passenger motor vehicles, of which one shall
6 be for replacement only, \$7,725,000; and, in addition to
7 the amount appropriated herein, the Surgeon General is
8 authorized, upon the recommendations of the National
9 Advisory Heart Council, to approve applications for re-
10 search and training grants, including grants for drawing
11 plans, erection of buildings, and acquisition of land therefor,
12 not to exceed a total of \$3,850,000, for periods beyond
13 the current fiscal year, and such grants shall, if approved
14 during the current fiscal year, constitute a contractual obli-
15 gation of the Federal Government.

16 Dental health activities: For expenses not otherwise
17 provided for, necessary to enable the Surgeon General to
18 carry out the purposes of the Act with respect to dental
19 diseases and conditions, including the purchase of one
20 passenger motor vehicle, \$1,780,000.

21 Construction of research facilities: For construction of
22 research facilities, to be transferred (except such part as may
23 be necessary for incidental expenses of the Public Health
24 Service) to the Public Buildings Administration, Federal

1 Works Agency, and to remain available until expended,
2 as follows:

3 For payment of obligations incurred under authority
4 heretofore granted to enter into contracts for construction of
5 a combined hospital and research building, as authorized
6 under this head in the Federal Security Agency Appropria-
7 tion Act, 1949, \$13,100,000; and, in addition, contracts
8 may be entered into in an amount not to exceed \$8,200,000
9 for continuing such construction.

10 For construction of auxiliary service area structures to
11 provide for supply, storage, animal breeding and housing,
12 incinerator, maintenance and fabrication shops, laundry and
13 dry cleaning, underground storage for chemicals and other
14 combustibles, including necessary distribution facilities and
15 roads and walks, and for procurement and installation of a
16 linear accelerator and cage sterilizing equipment, \$3,900,000;
17 and, in addition, contracts may be entered into in an amount
18 not to exceed \$4,700,000 toward completion of such con-
19 struction and procurement at a cost not to exceed \$8,600,-
20 000: *Provided*, That the limitations on contract authority
21 and total cost may be exceeded or shall be reduced by an
22 amount equal to the total percentage increase or decrease, if
23 any, in construction costs generally dating from August 1,
24 1948, as determined by the Federal Works Administrator.

25 Commissioned officers, pay, and so forth: For pay,

1 uniforms and subsistence allowances, increased allowances
2 for foreign service and commutation of quarters for not to
3 exceed one thousand four hundred and fifty-six regular active
4 commissioned officers; for medals, decorations, and retired
5 pay of regular and reserve commissioned officers; and for
6 six months' death gratuity pay and burial payments for
7 regular commissioned officers; \$1,500,000, and the Surgeon
8 General is authorized to advance to this appropriation from
9 appropriations made available to the Public Health Service
10 for the current fiscal year such additional amounts as may
11 be necessary for pay and allowances of the officers herein
12 authorized.

13 Salaries and expenses: For the divisions and offices of
14 the Office of the Surgeon General and for miscellaneous ex-
15 penses of the Public Health Service not appropriated for
16 elsewhere, including the supervision of sanitary engineering,
17 nursing, and dental operations of the Public Health Service:
18 maintenance and operation of the water and sanitary inves-
19 tigation station at Cincinnati, Ohio; collecting and com-
20 piling mortality, morbidity, and vital statistics, including
21 procurement, by contract without regard to section 3709 of
22 the Revised Statutes, as amended, of transcripts of State,
23 municipal, and other records, and studies and investigations
24 related thereto; preparing information, articles, and pub-

1 lications related to public health; conducting studies and
2 demonstrations in public health methods; and purchase of
3 not to exceed two passenger motor vehicles of which one
4 shall be for replacement only; \$4,400,000.

5 Office of International Health Relations: For expenses
6 necessary in connection with international health work, in-
7 cluding not to exceed \$1,000 for entertainment of officials
8 of other countries when specifically authorized by the
9 Surgeon General, \$130,000.

10 Water pollution control, salaries and expenses: For
11 expenses necessary for carrying out the functions of the
12 Surgeon General under the Water Pollution Control Act,
13 approved June 30, 1948 (Public Law 845), including the
14 purchase of not to exceed fifteen passenger motor vehicles,
15 \$1,000,000.

16 Grants, water pollution control: For grants to carry
17 out section 8 (a) of the Water Pollution Control Act,
18 approved June 30, 1948 (Public Law 845), \$1,000,000,
19 to remain available until expended.

20 SAINT ELIZABETHS HOSPITAL

21 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for the
22 maintenance and operation of the hospital, including clothing
23 for patients and cooperation with organizations or individuals
24 in scientific research into the nature, causes, prevention, and
25 treatment of mental illness, \$1,750,000.

1 Construction and equipment, storeroom, and so forth:
2 For payment of obligations incurred under authority pro-
3 vided in the Federal Security Agency Appropriation Act,
4 1949, for completion of construction and equipment for
5 building for storeroom and so forth, Saint Elizabeths Hos-
6 pital, \$1,044,000, to remain available until expended: *Pro-*
7 *vided*, That any part of this amount may be transferred, upon
8 the request of the Federal Security Administrator, to the
9 Public Buildings Administration, Federal Works Agency.

10 Construction and equipment, building for the housing,
11 care, and treatment of mentally sick patients: For payment
12 of obligations incurred under authority provided in the Fed-
13 eral Security Agency Appropriation Act, 1949, for comple-
14 tion of a building for the housing, care, and treatment of
15 mentally sick patients, Saint Elizabeths Hospital, \$1,800,000,
16 to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That any part
17 of this amount may be transferred, upon the request of the
18 Federal Security Administrator, to the Public Buildings
19 Administration, Federal Works Agency.

20 Major repairs and preservation of buildings and grounds:
21 For miscellaneous construction, alterations, repairs, and
22 equipment, on the grounds of the hospital, including exten-
23 sion of street lighting facilities, renovation, conversion and
24 extension of the electric power and distribution system, and
25 preparation of plans and specifications, advertising, and

1 supervision of construction, \$624,000, to remain available
2 until expended: *Provided*, That any part of this amount
3 may be transferred, upon the request of the Federal Security
4 Administrator, to the Public Buildings Administration,
5 Federal Works Agency.

6 Construction planning: For the preparation of plans
7 and specifications, including administrative expenses, for
8 two treatment buildings, and demolition and removal of those
9 buildings designated as Oaks and Toner Buildings with their
10 appurtenances and attachments, within the grounds of Saint
11 Elizabeths Hospital, \$150,000, to remain available until
12 expended: *Provided*, That any part of this amount may be
13 transferred, upon the request of the Federal Security Ad-
14 ministrator, to the Public Buildings Administration, Federal
15 Works Agency.

16 SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION

17 Grants to States for unemployment compensation and
18 employment service administration: For grants to the sev-
19 eral States (including Alaska and Hawaii) in accordance
20 with the provisions of the Act of June 6, 1933, as amended
21 (29 U. S. C. 49-491), for carrying into effect section 602
22 of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, and for
23 grants to the States as authorized in title III of the Social
24 Security Act, as amended (42 U. S. C. 501-503), including,
25 upon the request of any State, the payment of rental for

1 space made available to such State in lieu of grants for
2 such purpose, \$135,000,000, of which not to exceed
3 \$675,000 shall be available to the Federal Security
4 Administrator for necessary expenses in connection with the
5 operation of employment office facilities and services in
6 the District of Columbia and for use in carrying into effect
7 section 602 of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944
8 in Puerto Rico: *Provided*, That during the period ending
9 March 31, 1950, this appropriation may be apportioned and
10 obligated at an annual rate not in excess of \$150,000,000
11 and, to the extent that the Federal Security Administrator,
12 with the approval of the Director of the Budget, finds neces-
13 sary to meet increased costs of administration resulting from
14 change in a State law or increases in the numbers of claims
15 filed and claims paid or salary costs over those upon which
16 the original State's grant was based, such annual rate may be
17 increased to not in excess of \$157,500,000: *Provided further*,
18 That no State shall be required to make any appropriation
19 as provided in section 5 (a) of said Act of June 6, 1933,
20 prior to July 1, 1951: *Provided further*, That, notwithstand-
21 ing any provision to the contrary in section 5 (a) or section
22 6 of the Act of June 6, 1933, or in section 302 (a) of the
23 Social Security Act, as amended, the Federal Security Ad-
24 ministrator shall from time to time certify to the Secretary of
25 the Treasury for payment to each State found to be in compli-

1 ance with the requirements of the Act of June 6, 1933, and
2 with the provisions of section 303 of the Social Security Act,
3 as amended, such amounts as he determines to be necessary
4 for the proper and efficient administration of its unemploy-
5 ment compensation law and of its public employment offices:
6 *Provided further,* That such amounts as may be agreed upon
7 by the Federal Security Agency and the Post Office Depart-
8 ment shall be used for the payment, in such manner as said
9 parties may jointly determine, of postage for the transmis-
10 sion of official mail matter in connection with the administra-
11 tion of unemployment compensation systems and employ-
12 ment services by States receiving grants herefrom.

13 In carrying out the provisions of said Act of June 6,
14 1933, the provisions of section 303 (a) (1) of the Social
15 Security Act, as amended, relating to the establishment and
16 maintenance of personnel standards on a merit basis, shall
17 apply.

18 Salaries and expenses, Bureau of Employment Secu-
19 rity: For expenses necessary for the general administration
20 of the employment service and unemployment compensa-
21 tion programs, including personal services in the District
22 of Columbia, \$4,450,000, of which \$1,350,000 shall be for
23 carrying into effect the provisions of title IV (except sec-
24 tion 602) of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944.

25 Salaries and expenses, Bureau of Federal Credit Unions:

1 For expenses necessary for the supervision of Federal credit
2 unions, including personal services in the District of Colum-
3 bia, \$200,000, together with not to exceed \$418,500 from
4 certificate, supervision, and examination fees collected from
5 Federal credit unions as authorized by law.

6 Salaries and expenses, Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors
7 Insurance: For necessary expenses, including personal serv-
8 ices in the District of Columbia and elsewhere; purchase of
9 one passenger motor vehicle for replacement only; services
10 as authorized by section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946
11 (5 U. S. C. 55a); not more than \$42,425,800 may be
12 expended from the Federal old-age and survivors insurance
13 trust fund: *Provided*, That of the amount herein made avail-
14 able for expenditure, not more than \$50,000 may be
15 expended without regard to section 322 of the Act of June
16 30, 1932, as amended (40 U. S. C. 278a), for alterations,
17 repairs, and improvements to the Candler Building in Balti-
18 more, Maryland, which amount, except such part as may be
19 necessary for incidental expenses of the Bureau of Old-Age
20 and Survivors Insurance, may be transferred to the Public
21 Buildings Administration, Federal Works Agency, for such
22 purposes: *Provided further*, That any sums received by the
23 Administrator as payment for services performed for any
24 department or agency of the Government by persons whose
25 salaries are paid from the amount made available under this

1 paragraph shall be deposited to the credit of this appropria-
2 tion for the fiscal year in which such sums are received, and
3 shall be available for the same purposes.

4 Reimbursement to Federal old-age and survivors in-
5 surance trust fund: For reimbursement to the Federal old-
6 age and survivors insurance trust fund for benefits paid dur-
7 ing the fiscal year 1948 to the survivors of veterans of
8 World War II eligible for benefits as provided under section
9 210 of the Social Security Act, as amended (42 U. S. C.
10 410), \$3,604,000.

11 Grants to States for public assistance: For grants to
12 States for old-age assistance, aid to dependent children, and
13 aid to the blind as authorized in titles I, IV, and X of the
14 Social Security Act, as amended (42 U. S. C., ch. 7, subch.
15 I, IV, and X), \$1,058,000,000, of which such amount
16 as may be necessary shall be available for grants for any
17 period in the prior fiscal year subsequent to March 31 of
18 that year.

19 Salaries and expenses, Bureau of Public Assistance: For
20 expenses necessary for the Bureau of Public Assistance, in-
21 cluding personal services in the District of Columbia and
22 services as authorized by section 15 of the Act of August 2,
23 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a) ; \$1,350,000.

24 Salaries and expenses, Children's Bureau: For necessary
25 expenses in carrying out the Act of April 9, 1912, as

1 amended (29 U. S. C. 18a), and title V of the Social Secu-
2 rity Act, as amended (42 U. S. C., ch. 7, subch. V), includ-
3 ing personal services in the District of Columbia; services
4 as authorized by section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946
5 (5 U. S. C. 55a); and purchase of reports and material for
6 the publications of the Children's Bureau and of reprints
7 for distribution; \$1,466,000: *Provided*, That no part
8 of any appropriation contained in this title shall be used
9 to promulgate or carry out any instruction, order, or regula-
10 tion relating to the care of obstetrical cases which discrim-
11 inate between persons licensed under State law to practice
12 obstetrics: *Provided further*, That the foregoing proviso shall
13 not be so construed as to prevent any patient from having
14 the services of any practitioner of her own choice, paid for
15 out of this fund, so long as State laws are complied with:
16 *Provided further*, That any State plan which provides
17 standards for professional obstetrical services in accordance
18 with the laws of the State shall be approved.

19 Salaries and expenses, Conference on Children and
20 Youth: For expenses necessary in preparation for a 1950
21 Conference on Children and Youth, including personal serv-
22 ices in the District of Columbia; services as authorized by
23 section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a);
24 purchase of reports and material for reports; and expenses
25 of cooperating officials and consultants in attending meetings;

1 \$75,000, to remain available until June 30, 1951, and to
2 be the final appropriation for such conference.

3 Grants to States for maternal and child welfare: For
4 grants to States for maternal and child-health services, serv-
5 ices for crippled children, and child-welfare services as au-
6 thorized in title V, parts 1, 2, and 3, of the Social Security
7 Act, as amended (42 U. S. C., ch. 7, subch. V),
8 \$22,000,000: *Provided*, That any allotment to a State
9 pursuant to section 502 (b) or 512 (b) of such Act shall
10 not be included in computing for the purposes of subsec-
11 tions (a) and (b) of sections 504 and 514 of such Act
12 an amount expended or estimated to be expended by the
13 State.

14 Salaries and expenses, Office of the Commissioner: For
15 expenses necessary for the Office of the Commissioner for
16 Social Security, including personal services in the District of
17 Columbia and services as authorized by section 15 of the
18 Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a); \$257,800, to-
19 gether with not to exceed \$78,700 to be transferred from
20 the Federal old-age and survivors insurance trust fund.

21 Grants to States, next succeeding fiscal year: For mak-
22 ing, after May 31 of the current fiscal year payments to
23 States under titles I, III, IV, V, and X, respectively, of the
24 Social Security Act, as amended, and under the Act of June
25 6, 1933, as amended, for the first quarter of the next succeed-

1 ing fiscal year, such sums as may be necessary, the obliga-
2 tions incurred and the expenditures made thereunder for
3 payments under each of such titles and under such Act of
4 June 6, 1933, to be charged to the appropriation therefor
5 for that fiscal year.

6 In the administration of titles I, IV, V, and X, respec-
7 tively, of the Social Security Act, as amended, payments to a
8 State under any of such titles for any quarter in the period
9 beginning April 1 of the prior year, and ending June 30
10 of the current year, may be made with respect to a State
11 plan approved under such title prior to or during such
12 period, but no such payment shall be made with respect to
13 any plan for any quarter prior to the quarter in which such
14 plan was submitted for approval.

15 OFFICE OF THE ADMINISTRATOR

16 Salaries, Office of the Administrator: Salaries, Office of
17 the Administrator, including personal services in the District
18 of Columbia and services as authorized by section 15 of the
19 Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a), \$2,292,000,
20 together with not to exceed \$300,000 to be transferred from
21 the Federal old-age and survivors insurance trust fund.

22 Salaries and expenses, Division of Service Operations:
23 For expenses necessary for the Office of the Administrator,
24 including personal services in the District of Columbia for the
25 Division of Service Operations, \$944,800, together with

1 not to exceed \$164,000 to be transferred from the Federal
2 old-age and survivors insurance trust fund: *Provided*, That
3 the Administrator may reimburse, in advance of obliga-
4 tions incurred, this appropriation from appropriations of
5 constituent organizations of the Federal Security Agency
6 in such sums as may be necessary to cover the charges for
7 services, supplies, equipment and materials furnished.

8 Salaries, Office of the General Counsel: Salaries, Office
9 of the General Counsel, including personal services in the
10 District of Columbia, \$527,500, together with not to exceed
11 \$22,150 to be transferred from the appropriation "Salaries
12 and expenses, certification and inspection services", and not
13 to exceed \$297,500 to be transferred from the Federal old-
14 age and survivors insurance trust fund.

15 GENERAL PROVISIONS

16 SEC. 202. Appropriations under this title available for
17 salaries and expenses shall be available for travel expenses
18 and, when specifically authorized by the Federal Security
19 Administrator, for expenses of attendance at meetings con-
20 cerned with the function or activity for which any such
21 appropriation is made.

22 SEC. 203. Appropriations under this title available for
23 salaries and expenses shall be available for payment of claims
24 pursuant to section 403 of the Federal Tort Claims Act (28
25 U. S. C. 2672).

1 SEC. 204. Appropriations under this title available for
2 salaries and expenses shall be available for examination of
3 estimates of appropriations in the field, for exchange of books,
4 and for payment in advance when authorized by the Federal
5 Security Administrator for dues or fees for library member-
6 ship in organizations whose publications are available to
7 members only or to members at a price lower than to the
8 general public.

9 SEC. 205. Appropriations under this title available for
10 salaries and expenses shall be available for health service
11 programs as authorized by law (5 U. S. C. 150), and
12 such amounts as may be necessary may be transferred to
13 the appropriations of the organizational units operating such
14 programs.

15 SEC. 206. Appropriations under this title available for
16 salaries and expenses shall be available for printing and
17 binding, including the purchase of reprints.

18 SEC. 207. None of the funds appropriated by this title to
19 the Social Security Administration for grants-in-aid of State
20 agencies to cover, in whole or in part, the cost of operation
21 of said agencies, including the salaries and expenses of officers
22 and employees of said agencies, shall be withheld from the
23 said agencies of any States which have established by legisla-
24 tive enactment and have in operation a merit system and
25 classification and compensation plan covering the selection,

1 tenure in office, and compensation of their employees, because
2 of any disapproval of their personnel or the manner of their
3 selection by the agencies of the said States, or the rates of
4 pay of said officers or employees.

5 SEC. 208. This title may be cited as the "Federal Se-
6 curity Agency Appropriation Act, 1950".

7 TITLE III—NATIONAL MEDIATION BOARD

8 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for the
9 National Mediation Board, including personal services in
10 the District of Columbia, printing and binding, and steno-
11 graphic reporting services as authorized by section 15 of
12 the Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a), \$360,400.

13 Arbitration and emergency boards: For expenses neces-
14 sary for arbitration boards established under section 7 of the
15 Railway Labor Act, as amended (45 U. S. C. 157), and
16 emergency boards appointed by the President pursuant to
17 section 10 of said Act (45 U. S. C. 160), including print-
18 ing and binding, and stenographic reporting services as
19 authorized by section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946
20 (5 U. S. C. 55a), \$100,000.

21 NATIONAL RAILROAD ADJUSTMENT BOARD

22 Salaries and expenses: For expenses necessary for the
23 National Railroad Adjustment Board, including printing
24 and binding, and stenographic reporting services as author-
25 ized by section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C.

1 55a), \$468,100, of which not less than \$93,800 shall be
2 available for compensation (at rates not in excess of \$50
3 per diem) and expenses of referees appointed pursuant to
4 section 3 of the Railway Labor Act, as amended.

5 This title may be cited as the "National Mediation Board
6 Appropriation Act, 1950".

7 TITLE IV—RAILROAD RETIREMENT BOARD

8 Salaries and expenses, Railroad Retirement Board (trust
9 fund) : For expenses necessary for the Railroad Retirement
10 Board, including personal services in the District of Co-
11 lumbia; not to exceed \$1,000 for expenses of attendance at
12 meetings concerned with the work of the Board when speci-
13 fically authorized by the Board; printing and binding; steno-
14 graphic reporting services as authorized by section 15 of the
15 Act of August 2, 1946 (5 U. S. C. 55a) ; payment of claims
16 pursuant to section 403 of the Federal Tort Claims Act
17 (28 U. S. C. 2672) ; a health service program as authorized
18 by law (5 U. S. C. 150) ; and payment in advance, when
19 authorized by the Board, for library memberships in organi-
20 zations which issue publications to members only or to mem-
21 bers at a lower price than to the general public; \$5,104,000,
22 to be derived from the railroad retirement account.

23 Railroad retirement account: For an amount sufficient
24 as an annual premium for the payments required under the
25 Railroad Retirement Acts of August 29, 1935, and June 24,

1 1937, and authorized to be appropriated to the railroad re-
2 tirement account established under section 15 (a) of the
3 latter Act, \$715,889,000, of which \$61,889,000 shall be
4 immediately available: *Provided*, That such total amount
5 shall be available until expended for making payments re-
6 quired under said retirement Acts, and the amount not
7 required for current payments shall be invested by the Sec-
8 retary of the Treasury in accordance with the provisions of
9 said Railroad Retirement Act of June 24, 1937.

10 This title may be cited as the "Railroad Retirement

13 SEC. 501. No part of any appropriation contained in
14 this Act shall be used to pay the salary or wages of any
15 person who engages in a strike against the Government of
16 the United States or who is a member of an organization
17 of Government employees that asserts the right to strike
18 against the Government of the United States, or who advo-
19 cates, or is a member of an organization that advocates, the
20 overthrow of the Government of the United States by force
