Mr. Fogarry introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce

A BILL

To provide for the vesting of primary responsibility for the protection of the public health and safety from radiation hazards in the Public Health Service of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SHORT TITLE
- 4 Section 1. This Act may be cited as the "Radiation
- 5 Hazards Act of 1959".
- 6 DECLARATION OF POLICY
- 7 SEC. 2. The Congress hereby affirms and declares that
- 8 the primary responsibility for the protection of the public
- 9 health and safety from the dangers of ionizing radiation

- 1 should reside in those Federal, State, and local agencies
- 2 which have primary responsibilities for the protection of the
- 3 public health. In recognition of the danger to the public
- 4 health and safety from such radiation it is the purpose of this
- 5 Act to vest in the Surgeon General of the Public Health
- 6 Service, under the supervision and direction of the Secretary
- 7 of Health, Education, and Welfare, the administration of this
- 8 Act with authority to undertake and provide support and aid
- 9 for research relating to the control of radiation hazards, to
- 10 make technical assistance available to States and localities,
- 11 to develop through research and studies, and in consultation
- 12 with Federal, State, and local agencies, uniform standards
- 13 of radiation protection, and to provide for the training of pro-
- 14 fessional and technical personnel in matters relating to radia-
- 15 tion hazard control.
- 16 DEFINITIONS
- SEC. 3. As used in this Act, the term—
- 18 (1) "Secretary" means the Secretary of Health, Educa-
- 19 tion, and Welfare;
- 20 (2) "Surgeon General" means the Surgeon General of
- 21 the Public Health Service;
- 22 (3) "State" means a State, the District of Columbia,
- 23 the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, or the Virgin Islands;
- 24 (4) "Radiation hazard" means a source of ionizing
- 25 radiation created or developed by man, including X-ray ma-

- 1 chines, nuclear reactors and their radioisotopic byproducts,
- 2 high-energy particle accelerators, concentrated forms of nat-
- 3 urally occurring radioactive materials, and the fallout con-
- 4 stituents of nuclear weapons, which alone or in conjunc-
- 5 tion with other sources endangers or may endanger the pub-
- 6 lic health.
- 7 UNIFORM STANDARDS OF RADIATION PROTECTION, COMPRE-
- 8 HENSIVE PROGRAM
- 9 SEC. 4. (a) The Surgeon General shall, through re-
- 10 search and studies, develop improved and uniform standards
- 11 of radiation protection. In the development of such stand-
- 12 ards the Surgeon General shall consult with Federal, State,
- 13 and local agencies exercising responsibilities in connection
- 14 with the control of radiation hazards.
- 15 (b) The Surgeon General shall, after study and investi-
- 16 gation, and after consultation with Federal, State, and local
- 17 agencies exercising responsibilities in connection with the
- 18 control of radiation hazards, develop in the interests of the
- 19 public health and safety a comprehensive program which
 - 0 vests in the Surgeon General primary responsibility for the
- 21 adequate control and regulation of such hazards. Such
- 22 program shall include, among other relevant matters, recom-
- 23 mendations for procedures to resolve any conflicts between
- 24 the Surgeon General arising out of the discharge of his
- 25 responsibilities under such program and other Federal

1	agencies in the exercise of their functions and responsibili-
2	ties. Such program shall further include recommendations
3	with respect to (1) the proper role of the States in matters
4	pertaining to radiation hazard control, (2) the financing
5	of Federal and State activities under such program, and
6	(3) the provision of assistance to the States in the develop-
7	ment of model and uniform laws relating to the control
8	of radiation hazards. Such program shall be set forth in
9	a report submitted to the Congress on or before February
10	28, 1960. Recommendations for legislation deemed neces-
11	sary by the Surgeon General to implement such program
12	shall be set forth in such report.
13	RESEARCH, STUDIES, TRAINING, AND INFORMATION
14	SEC. 5. (a) The Surgeon General shall conduct in the
15	Public Health Service research, studies, and investigations,
16	relating to the control of radiation hazards; shall encourage,
17	cooperate with, and render assistance to other appropriate
18	public and private agencies, institutions and individuals in
19	the conduct of such research, studies, and investigations; and
20	shall promote the coordination of such activities. In carrying
21	out the foregoing the Surgeon General is authorized to-
22	(1) collect and make available, through publications
23	and other appropriate means, the results of, and other

information concerning, research and studies relating to

the nature and extent of radiation hazards, and the con-

trol thereof, including appropriate recommendations in connection therewith;

- (2) make grants-in-aid to public or private agencies and institutions and to individuals for research and training projects, and provide for the conduct of research and training by contract with public or private agencies and institutions without regard to sections 3648 and 3709 of the Revised Statutes;
- (3) secure, from time to time and for such periods as he deems advisable, the assistance and advice of experts and consultants as authorized by section 15 of the Administrative Expenses Act of 1946; and
- (4) provide training in technical matters relating
 to the nature and control of radiation hazards to personnel of public agencies and other appropriate persons
 with suitable qualifications.
- 17 (b) The Surgeon General may, upon request of any 18 Federal, State, or local agency, conduct investigations and 19 research and make surveys concerning any specific problem 20 of radiation hazard control with a view to recommending 21 a solution of such problem.
- 22 (c) The Surgeon General shall cooperate in interna-23 tional research activities consistent with the purposes of 24 this Act.

1	NATIONAL ADVISORY COUNCIL ON RADIATION HAZARD
2	CONTROL
3	SEC. 6. (a) There is hereby established in the Public
4	Health Service a National Advisory Council on Radiation
5	Hazard Control, consisting of the Surgeon General, who
6	shall be Chairman, the Chairman of the Atomic Energy
7	Commission, the Secretary of Defense, and the Director
8	of the National Science Foundation, or their designees, and
9	eleven members appointed by the President. The appointed
10	members shall be selected from among representatives of
11	various State or local governmental agencies, and of other
12	public or private agencies, organizations, or groups with
13	demonstrated knowledge of, and an active interest in, the
14	field of radiation hazard control, as well as other individuals
15	who are expert in the field.
16	(b) The Council shall—
17	(1) advise and assist the Surgeon General in the
18	formulation of the programs authorized by this Act and
19	in the preparation of general regulations prescribed
20	thereunder;
21	(2) make such recommendations to the Surgeon
22	General with respect to the granting of assistance for
23	research or training under section 5 as it deems advis-
24	able: and

(3) make such recommendations to the Surgeon 1 General with respect to the development of the compre-2 hensive program for the control of radiation hazards, 3 4 which is to be prepared and submitted to the Congress under section 4(c), as it may deem advisable.

- (c) Appointed members of the Council, while attending meetings, conferences or meetings of the Council, or while otherwise serving at the request of the Secretary, shall be entitled to receive compensation at a rate to be fixed by the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, but not ex-10 11 ceeding \$50 per diem, including traveltime, and while away from their homes or regular places of business they may be 12 allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of sub-13 sistence, as authorized by law (5 U.S.C. 73b-2) for persons in the Government service employed intermittently.
- (d) (1) Any appointed member of the Council is 17 hereby exempted, with respect to such appointment, from 18 the operation of sections 281, 283, 284, and 1914 of title 18 of the United States Code, and section 190 of the Revised 20 Statutes (5 U.S.C. 99), except as otherwise specified in 21 paragraph (2) of this subsection.
- 22 (2) Such exemption shall not extend—
- 23 (A) to the receipt or payment of salary, in con-24 nection with the appointee's service as a member of the

1	Council, from any source other than the private em-
2	ployer of the appointee at the time of his appointment
3	or
4	(B) during the period of such appointment, and
5	the further period of two years after the termination
6	thereof, to the prosecution or participation in the prose-
7	cution, by any person so appointed, of any claim against
8	the Government involving any matter concerning which
9	the appointee had any responsibility arising out of his
10	appointment during the period of such appointment.
11	ADMINISTRATION
12	SEC. 7. (a) The Surgeon General may, with the ap-
13	proval of the Secretary, prescribe such regulations as are
14	necessary to carry out his functions under this Act. The
1 5	Surgeon General may delegate to any officer or employee of
16	
17	under this Act, except the making of regulations, as he
18	may deem necessary or expedient.
19	(b) The Secretary, with the consent of the head of any
20	other agency of the United States, may utilize such officers
21	and employees of such agency as may be found necessary to
22	
· Level	assist in carrying out the purposes of this Act.

SEC. 8. In addition to the report to be submitted by the Surgeon General to the President for submission to the Con-

- 1 gress under section 4(b), the Surgeon General shall submit
- 2 annual reports thereafter to the President for transmission to
- 3 the Congress, summarizing the activities under this Act
- 4 and making such recommendations as he may deem appro-
- 5 priate. Any such report shall include recommendations
- 6 made by the National Advisory Council on Radiation Haz-
- 7 ard Control and the action taken with respect thereto.
- 8 OTHER AUTHORITY NOT AFFECTED
- 9 SEC. 9. This Act shall not be construed as impairing or
- 10 limiting the authority conferred on any agency or officer of
- 11 the United States conferred by any other Act of Congress.
- 12 AUTHORIZATION FOR APPROPRIATIONS
- 13 SEC. 10. There are hereby authorized to be appropriated
- 12 to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare such
- 13 sums as may be necessary to enable it to carry out its func-
- 14 tions under this Act.
