 "DEFINITIONS "SEC. 802. As used in this title—

7 "(1) The term 'Council' means the National Advisory
8 Council on Education for Health Professions established by
9 section 803.

10 "(2) The term 'nonprofit', as applied to a school, means 11 a school owned and operated by one or more nonprofit 12 corporations or associations no part of the net earnings of 13 which inures, or may lawfully inure, to the benefit of any 14 private shareholder or individual. 15 "(3) The term 'medical school' means a school (A) 16 which provides training leading to the degree of doctor of 17 medicine or osteopathy, or the first two years of such train-18 ing, and (B) which is approved or accredited by a recog-19 nized body or bodies approved by the Surgeon General 20 after he has obtained the advice and recommendation of the Council, except that a new school which (by reason of no, 21 22 or an insufficient, period of operation) is not, at the time of 23application for a grant under this title, eligible for accredita-24 tion by such a recognized body or bodies, shall be deemed 25accredited for purposes of this title if the Surgeon General

finds, after consultation with the appropriate accreditation
 body or bodies, that the school will meet the accreditation
 standards of such body or bodies.

"(4) The term 'dental school' means a school (A) 4 which provides training leading to the degree of doctor of 5 dental surgery or an equivalent degree, and (B) which is 6 approved or accredited by a recognized body or bodies ap-7 proved by the Surgeon General after he has obtained the 8 9 advice and recommendation of the Council, except that a new school which (by reason of no, or an insufficient, period 10 of operation) is not, at the time of application for a grant 11 12 under this title, eligible for accreditation by such a recognized body or bodies, shall be deemed accredited for purposes 13 of this title if the Surgeon General finds, after consultation 14 with the appropriate accreditation body or bodies, that the 15 school will meet the accreditation standards of such body or 16 bodies. 17

3 "SEC. 803. (a) There is hereby established in the 4 Public Health Service a National Council on Education for 5 Health Professions, consisting of the Surgeon General of the 6 Public Health Service, who shall be Chairman and the Com-7 missioner of Education, who shall be ex officio members, and 8 ten members appointed without regard to the civil service 9 laws by the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare. 10 The ten appointed members shall be leaders in the fields of 11 health sciences, education, or public affairs, and four of the 12 ten shall be persons active in the fields of professional health 13 education.

14 "(b) The Council shall advise, assist and make recom-15 mendations to the Surgeon General in the preparation of 16 general regulations and with respect to policy matters aris-17 ing in the administration of this title.

18 "(c) The Surgeon General may, with the approval of
19 the Secretary, appoint such special advisory and technical
20 committees as may be useful in carrying out his and the
21 Council's functions under this title.

11 and dentistry, to maintain and increase their enrollments
12 of students, there is hereby authorized to be appropriated

14 sums as may be necessary to make the payments provided
15 in this section. Payments to schools from appropriations
16 under this section may be used to meet the costs (herein
17 referred to as 'cost of instruction') of establishing, main18 taining, and enlarging their staffs and of maintaining and
19 operating their facilities (including the acquisition of
20 equipment).
21 "(b) Payments to schools for any fiscal year shall be
22 in the form of block grants plus an additional amount based

23 on the number of students enrolled therein for such fiscal
24 year, as follows:

"(1) to each school of medicine or dentistry which
 provides training leading to a medical or dental degree,
 \$100,000 a year, or to a school providing only one, two,
 or three years of such training, \$25,000, \$50,000, or
 \$75,000, respectively;
 "(2) to each school of medicine or dentistry which

8 \$500 for each student enrolled for such training, and,
9 subject to the limitation in subsection (c), an additional
10 \$500 for each student so enrolled in excess of its aver11 age past enrollment.

12 The total payment to any school pursuant to this section for 13 any fiscal year shall not exceed 50 per centum of the amount 14 determined by the Surgeon General to be costs of instruc-15 tion in such school for such year (excluding from such costs, 16 the cost of special training projects which are outside the 17 school's regular curriculum and are financed through public 18 or private grants made specifically for such projects, the 19 cost of operation of any hospital, and the cost of research 20 projects).

4 "(2) The average past enrollment in any year class 5 shall be computed for each year for which a grant applica-6 tion is made. It shall be the average of enrollments in such 7 class for the period consisting of the past three fiscal years. 8 For grants for fiscal year 1963, the average shall be based 9 on the enrollment of the three fiscal years ending June 30, 10 1960, June 30, 1961, and June 30, 1962, except that if 11 training in a year class was not provided by a school during 12 one or two of the fiscal years in such period, such fiscal year 13 or years shall be excluded in determining the average past 14 enrollment in such class.

15 "(3) If training in a year class was not provided by a 16 school during any of the past three fiscal years but is pro-17 vided by the school during any fiscal year for which pay-18 ments are made from appropriations under section 804 all 19 students enrolled for training in such a class shall be counted 20 as enrolled in excess of average past enrollment' for pur-21 poses of subsection (b), during the first three years in which 22 such training is provided.

23 "(d) For purposes of this section, the number of
24 students enrolled for training in a school, or in a particular
25 year class in a school, for a fiscal year means the number

1 enrolled full time in such school or class for such training, as 2 determined by the Surgeon General in accordance with regu-3 lations, for the first semester or other school term which 4 commences after the beginning of such fiscal year, except that in the case of any school which during a fiscal year 5 provides periods of training less than or in excess of the 6 periods of training customarily provided in schools of the 7 same class, regulations shall provide for the determination 8 9 of enrollments in such school for such fiscal year in such manner as to take reasonable account of the difference in the 10 11 rate at which students are thus trained.

12 "(e) No school shall be eligible for payments from 13 appropriations under this section unless it is a public or 14 nonprofit institution, located within the United States, ex-15 empt from Federal income taxation.

16 "CONDITIONS FOR GRANTS

17 "SEC. 805. (a) No payments from appropriations pursuant to section 804 for any fiscal year may be made to any 18 school unless such school has filed an application therefor 19 20 for such year which contains adequate assurance, as deter-21 mined by the Surgeon General, that-22 "(1) such school provides and will provide reason-23 able opportunity for the admission of out-of-State 24 regulations under this part, the Surgeon Gen; stanbuts, otily 22 25 "(2) such school will, during the period in which it

1 receives such payments, make every reasonable effort to 2 maintain its income for operating expenses from sources ³ other than the Federal Government at a level equal to 4 that which it was receiving before such payments began 5 (or, in the case of a new school, at the highest possible 6 level); and 7 (3) such school will submit from time to time such 8 reports as the Surgeon General may reasonably require 9 to carry out the purposes of this part. 10 "PAYMENTS AND WITHHOLDING OF PAYMENTS 11 "SEC. 806. (a) The Surgeon General, in accordance 12 with regulations, shall determine from time to time the 13 amount to be paid to each school from appropriations under 14 section 803 and shall certify to the Secretary of the Treasury the amounts so determined. Upon receipt of any such cer-15 16 tification, the Secretary of the Treasury shall, prior to audit 17 or settlement by the General Accounting Office, pay in ac-18 cordance with such certification. 19 "(b) Whenever the Surgeon General, after reasona-20 ble notice and opportunity for hearing to a school, finds 21 with respect to payments from appropriations under section 804 that there is a failure to carry out any assur-22 23 ance given pursuant to section 804 or to comply with 24 regulations under this part, the Surgeon General shall notify 25 such school that further payments will not be made to it

from appropriations under such section until he is satisfied that there is no longer any such failure. Until he is so satisfied the Surgeon General shall make no further certification for payments to such school from appropriations under such section."
