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The recent news developments regarding Presidential candidates maker it increasingly evident that Harry S. Truman will head the Democratic ticket in the November election.

In view of this the most important action to be taken at the Democratic Convention next week will be the selection of a candidate for Vice President who will supplement the many qualities of President Truman and who in addition will have strong personal and geographic appeal.
