Their discussions with me coupled with a speech by His Excellency Archbishop Richard J. Cushing of Boston, which I had read several years ago, caused me to explore the possibility of inaugurating federal assistance for these "exceptional children" as Archbishop Cushing has called them. It is certainly heartwarming to know that this federal action provided the spark which ignited the blaze of interest and action presently found throughout the country in this vital field.
