## *Collegiate Certificate Program*

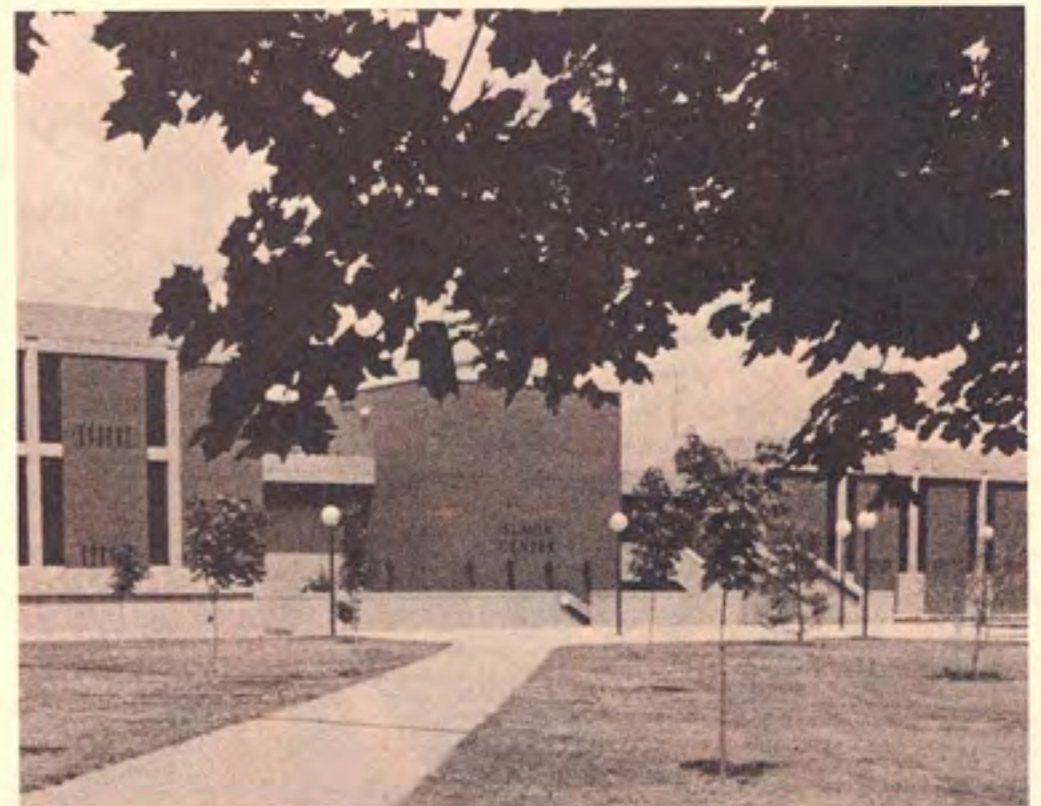

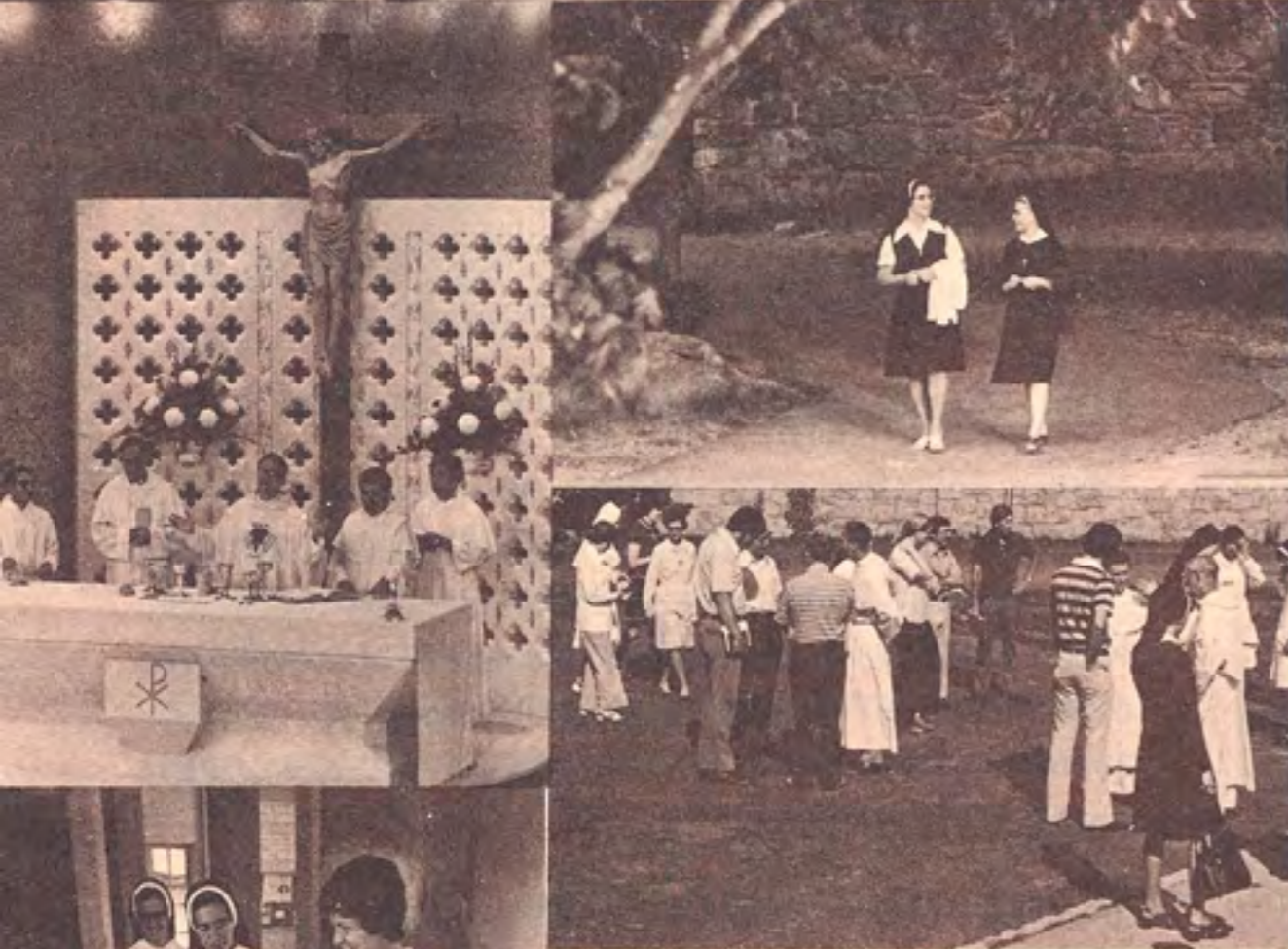

*The Master of Arts in Biblical Studies* is a program designed to assist in the professional formation of those who wish to enter the field of Biblical Studies as teachers, principally at the collegiate or secondary school level, as writers, as spiritual or religious formation directors, etc. Proficiency in the field of Biblical Studies is achieved through seminars, papers and examinations in a curriculum that treats the principal areas of Sacred Scripture.

## The Institute of Christian Theology

This new certificate program, while immensely useful for future graduate work, is designed as a self-contained educative experience. Its aim is to open up the growth of theological thought in its broader historical perspectives. It will trace the development of certain themes regarding Man and his Self-revealing God, from early biblical times to the present. Content-oriented, this program begins with Old and New Testament theology in a concentrated first summer that will lay the scriptural foundations for the next two. In the succeeding summers the program of the Institute will emphasize certain dogmatic themes regarding Man in relation to the God he images (second summer) and then certain moral themes which flow from these dogmatic perspectives (third summer).

In bridging the changing eras between biblical times and the present, the program will rely heavily on the classic theologies of Augustine, Aquinas and the Reformers, stressing both change and continuity in this unfolding pattern of theological thought. Supporting this historico-dogmatic approach certain key courses will be added that will explore the main issues of modern Christology, Ecclesiology and Spiritual Theology. (18 credit hours awarded, plus a certificate of proficiency.)

# ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

## GRADUATE PROGRAMS

1. Bachelor's degree from a recognized college, attested by transcript.
2. 24 credits in philosophy and theology or in liberal studies (beyond core requirements) which are preparation for theological study.
3. Written recommendations sent to the Dean, Graduate School, from at least two persons well acquainted with the academic ability and aptitude of the applicant.
4. Transcript of credits of undergraduate and previous graduate work.

Applications may be obtained upon request and should be returned together with \$5.00 to the Dean, Graduate School. Personal interviews, where needed, will be arranged by appointment.

## DATES OF SESSION

### *Summer 1977 Session*

Classes will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Monday, June 27 and close in the afternoon of August 5. Course registration may be completed on Sunday afternoon, June 26 from 1:30 until 5:00 p.m. Individual academic counselling will be available at registration. Students may occupy rooms beginning Saturday, June 25 at 10:00 a.m.

## DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

### M.A. IN RELIGIOUS STUDIES

1. At least thirty credits of graduate class work. A "B" grade average must be maintained.
2. A research paper to be approved by a committee of the Department of Religious Studies.
3. A three hour comprehensive written examination and a one hour oral examination successfully completed.
4. A maximum of six graduate credits may be transferred on approval.



## M.A. IN BIBLICAL STUDIES

The requirements set forth for the M.A. in Religious Studies apply also to the degree in Biblical Studies with this difference: a reading proficiency in Biblical Hebrew and Greek must be demonstrated. Those who come unprepared in the Biblical languages may take courses in these languages at Providence College.

## M.A. IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

1. At least thirty credits of graduate work in the following configuration:
  - a) Twelve credits shall be pursued in Religious Education courses,\*
  - b) Eighteen credits comprising six courses appropriately distributed among the areas of The Mystery and Mission of the Church, the Sacraments and Worship, the Revealed and Incarnate Word of God and the problems of Contemporary Moral Theology.
2. A research paper to be approved by a committee of the Department of Religious Studies.
3. A three hour comprehensive written examination and a one hour oral examination successfully completed.
4. A maximum of six graduate credits may be transferred on approval.
