1. It is a reply by the War Department to the SMEAR article by Benjamin Fine of May 22 in New York Times.

The War Department wanted to prove that it had obtained the "deep admiration at the astonishing skill with which the Army has so quickly laid the foundation of a specialized training program which must command the respect of every competent professional educator".

THE SITUATION

- 1. The manner of selection is:

 ROTC units

 Military schools

 Army Specialized Training Units.
- 2. The Army intends to have at any one time 150,000 soldiers in Colleges and Universities.
- 3. On May 21 there were 21,068 or about 14%.
- 4. By the End of May 30,000
- 5. By the End of July 60,000 or 40% of the 150,000.
- 6. 60% are still to be "ADDEDED" as the War Department says.
- 7. 145 College and Universities will be contracted by end of July. THIS REPRESENTS ONLY 8% of the 1700 COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES WHICH SENT IN QUESTIONAIRES AND HOPED TO GET SOLDIERS.

CONCLUSIONS:

- 1. This picture above does not prove "The speed with which the the specialized program has moved into high gear.
- 2. Of the 8% of Colleges and Universities chosen, approved, and inspected, Providence College is one which is booked for 500 soldiers.
- 3. In the 7 vrst Corps area out of 19 colleges and remirersities affrond, 5 have been contracted— 4 for trainers and 1 for Star.

Of the 145 College and Universities chosen for contracts there are the following UNITS:

74 for medical instruction
23 for star
28 for Dental
10 for Vetenary
82 for Basic
25 for advanced Engineering
17 for foreign area and languages.
9 for advanced personnel psychology.
6 for professional traning.
