Dr. Quirk Resigns Post at Providence College

Very Rev. John J. Dillon, O. P., prestent of Providence College, to-day announced the resignation of Dr. Arthur L. Quirk, chairman of the department of physics at Providence College, who has accepted a position as chief of research and development at Harvey Radio Laboratories, Inc., Cambridge, Mass.

Dr. Quirk was appointed to the Providence College faculty in 1934 and served as baseball coach from 1937 until 1942, when it was dropped as a varsity sport. He was born in Nasonville, Jan. 24, 1908. A graduate of Classical high school, Providence, Dr. Quirk received his bachelor of science degree, cum laude, from Providence College in 1930. He did his graduate work at the Catholic University of America, Washington, on a Knights of Columbus fellowship, receiving his M. S. degree in 1932 and his Ph. D. in 1934. He is a member of the American Physical Society.

Rev. William A. Sullivan, O. P., succeeds him as chairman of the department.

The appointment to the department of physics of Raymond A. Degraff of Holyoke, Mass., was also announced today by Fr. Dillon. Mr. Degraff received his B. S. from Massachusetts State College in 1939, his M. S. from Rhode Island State College in 1940 and has done further graduate work at the University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo. After serv-

ing as a teaching assistant at R. I. State College in 1939-1940 and at the University of Missouri from 1940 to 1942, he has been engaged in research as a physical chemist by the Monsanto Chemical Company, Dayton, Ohio. At Providence College, he will teach courses in the basic engineering curriculum of the Army Specialized Training Program.

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
