

Providence College Nine

to Play 23-Game

Schedule This Spring

Brown to Make First Appearance at Hendricken Field, May 8

The Providence College baseball team will play 23 games this season, according to the schedule released today by John E. Farrell, graduate manager of athletics. Six opponents of last year will be missing on the 1937 list. The only newcomer will be Assumption College of Worcester, against whom the Friars will open their season at Hendricken Field on Saturday, April 10.

In the State series the Friars will play home and home games with Brown and Rhode Island State. Brown's appearance at Hendricken Field on May 8 in the first game will be its first since the colleges opened athletic relations. The second game will be played at Aldrich Field on May 15. Providence will meet Rhode Island at Kingston on May 1, and again at Hendricken Field on Memorial Day.

Efforts are being made by the Providence College Athletic Association

to bring one or more major league teams to Hendricken Field on a late May or early June date. Last year the Friars met the Boston Red Sox in an exhibition contest at Hen-dricken Field. As soon as major league open dates are known exhibition games will be sought with the Yankees, the Tigers or one of the Boston clubs.

A four-game tour following the Assumption game will feature the early part of the schedule, with four consecutive games carded against St. John's University, Stroudsburg State Teachers, Villanova and Long Island

Two games will be played with Holy Cross and three with Boston College, the latter team closing the Providence schedule here on June 10. Commencement Day. The first game with the Crusaders will be staged in Worcester and has been moved from April to the end of May. Two of the Boston College games will be played here.

Dartmouth will come to Providence this year, and the Springfield game will be staged in Springfield for the first time. Thirteen games will be played in Providence, and the season will wind up with five straight home appearances by the Friar nine. The teams that have been dropped from this year's list are Princeton, Army, New Hampshire and Lowell Textile.

FRIARS EXPECTED TO SHOW POWER

Coach Egan Pleased with Hitting Possibilities as Squad Holds Practice.

Prospects for a big increase in hitting power on the Providence College baseball team appeared brighter as Coach Jack Egan sent his Friar squad through batting practice yesterday at Hendricken Field. Egan expects a banner year for several of his regulars and is pleased with the showing of the newer crop of Friars.

In recent seasons the Friars have not shown the punch at the plate that was necessary to win some of their major clashes, but Egan believes that his 1937 squad, which is well endowed with pitching strength, will be stronger than ever in hitting. Egan hopes to call the squad back during the Easter recess to take advantage of the opportunity for three full days' work while the rest of the college is on vacation.

While any one of the Friars may become the team's heavy hitter, the showing in batting practice yesterday brought several of the players to the fore ahead of their mates. Bill Murphy, a sophomore from Danbury, Conn., who was out of action during most of the last Freshman season with an injury, shapes up as one of the leading hitters on the 'Varsity.

Another promising candidate from last year's Freshman squad is Harold Martin, heavy-hitting outfielder, who now aspires to win the regular catching assignment on the 'Varsity nine. Martin will receive plenty of competition from Joseph "El" Deuse, Fall River product, who has all the requisites of a first-rate catcher.

Among the regulars, those playing with at least a year of service on the 'Varsity squad, Tom Hazell, top man of the Friar heavy hitters last year, and Ralph Coleman, who turned in the best average for the season, are the standouts. Fred "Lefty" Collins, ace southpaw of the staff, is a batting expert, far above what is usually a pitcher's average.

Leo Fischer, Coleman's rival at first base; Leo Ploski, one of the most agile infielders the Friars have ever had; Charlie Gallagher, consistently good as a hitter and fielder, are others who turned in fine work during yesterday's practice. It won't be long before Egan will order practice games for his squad, and not till then will he make any definite selections for a team to start against Assumption College here on April 10.

Football spring practice yesterday drew 32 players to Coach Joe Mc-Gee's outdoor school, and the Friar mentor accomplished several important duties that he has set for his out-of-season program. The return of Dick Vitullo to the Providence College football scene last week assures the Friars of a powerful set of fullbacks for next fall.

McGee has compiled a list of players that is just a notch under the 50 mark, and hopes to have a squad above that number out in the fall. Yesterday the players were sent through plays with two backfields in action. In the first set were Chick Pomfret, Dick Vitullo, George Springthorpe and Ray Bedard, and in the second set were Dom Minicucci, Larry Shattuck, Bill Spinnler and John Quimby.

DOMINICAN MAE NEARLY SETTLED

Only Spots Still Open for Assumption Tilt Are First Base, Mound.

Outside of first base and pitcher's box the Providence College baseball team that will open the Friars schedule against Assumption College of Worcester at Hendricken Field tomorrow afternoon was settled at the

end of yesterday's practice.

Coach Jack Egan believes he has one of the strongest defensive outfields since he took charge at the college. John "Wink" Crowley, former Cumberland high star, will play left field. Egan rates Crowley a much improved player and, while Crowley was highly capable last season, he has shown a sharper Latting eye and greater speed this year.

Ed Bobinski, rangy New Haven product, will start in centre field. He, too, has shown improvement in hitting. Tom Hazell, of Brighton, Mass, hard-hitting star of last year's team, will hold forth in right field.

Right now there is no player on the club capable of removing Charlie Gallagher from third base. The Newton Senior has been a standout in practice, fielding in errorless style and getting his share of hits.

Bill Moge, Springfield junior, has fitted into the infield at shortstop after a year of capable work at third. The way Moge has handled his work in only two days of practice indicates that he is well able to hold the assignment.

At second base will be Leo Ploski, Albany Junior. First base is still a toss-up with Ralph Coleman and Leo Fischer destined to alternate for a while.


Behind the bat it looks like Big Elt Deuse of Fall River. Deuse possesses one of the best throwing arms since the reign of George Tebbetts and he hits well, making him about the best all-round candidate for the spot.

The pitching choice loomed as a more difficult one after yesterday's practice for Paul Ryan, Haverhill Junior, moved up to the first rank with a fine day on the mound. Ryan was hit freely, but managed to keep the blows scattered most of the time. With a bit more practice the rugged Haverhill twirler will be ready to face an early Friar opponent.

Backed by extremely tight fielding Marshall Brooks allowed only two hits yesterday as the "Whites" chalked up a 6-1 decision over the "Blacks." The "Whites" garnered 11

hits of Ryan.

The Friar aces, Capt. Fred Collins and Karl Sherry, left and right-handed twirlers, respectively, are top choices for tomorrow's opener, but Brooks and Ryan are given a chance to play the starting role.


The announcement of Collins's election to the Friar captaincy was made last night by Coach Jack Egan at the conclusion of the showing of "Heads Up Baseball," the latest baseball picture produced by the American League. "Cy" Perkins of the Detroit Tigers gave a short talk on the fine points of the picture prior to its showing.


Several hundred students witnessed the picture in Harkins Hall and saw American League luminaries in action in their training camps, many problem plays, instruc-tions in hitting and fielding and a short summary of the highlights of each of the last World Series games. Coach Jack Egan spoke briefly following the picture.

The new Providence College baseball captain is a letterman in basketball and baseball and recently withdrew from the court game to give all his attention to baseball. At New Milford High he played baseball for four years and basketball for three seasons. He was a member of the New Milford nine which annexed the Housatonic Valley League title several years in a row.

During his Freshman year Collins won three of the four games he started and was a member of the undefeated basketball team. As a Sophomore he enjoyed a fine season in baseball, winning eight of 11 games. Illness hampered his pitching last season, but he turned in five victories in eight games. Collins is a capable hitter and also a good outfielder

Providence College's Friars tomorrow inaugurate their 1937 varsity baseball campaign at Hendricken Field against Assumption College of Worcester. The game also will mark Assumption's initial start of the season.

Rated on the hitting and pitching strength apparent in their pre-season drills, the Friars are top-heavy favorites to win over the invaders, who have but recently moved up to intercollegiate competition.

Two posts on the Friar starting array remained in doubt as Coach Jack Egan sought to name his strongest contingent for the season's opener. The Friar mentor's definite decision on the starter at first base and in the pitching box probably will not be made uption.

Ralph Coleman of Providence and Leo Fischer of Springfield, O., have maintained a neck-and-neck race for the first base job throughout the early drills, Captain Fred "Lefty" Collins, southpaw ace of the Dominican mound corps, and Karl Sherry, veteran right hander, head


the list of probable mound starters. Collins, because he is the leader of

the Friar pine, doubtless will get the assignment, albeit Coach Egan would not announce a definite choice.

When the Friars move on to the Hendricken Field diamond to open against Assumption they will be starting a 23-game schedule. This game also marks the start of Coach Egan's third season as head mentor of baseball on Smith Hill.

Tomorrow's contest opens the second season of inter-collegiate baseball for the Worcesterites who are coached by Ed Skelly, former diamond star at Holy Cross. A year ago the Greyhounds won seven games in a 10-game schedule. The club boasts a veteran infield, a veteran catcher in Gene Berube and a veteran centre fielder in Tillie Frechette.

Auchin, right fielder, is a sophomore and Pelletier, left fielder, is a freshman. Skelly named three possible starters on the mound, Cadorette, Lampron and Boyer.

riars Trounce Assumption 13 to 0 in Season's Opener

Capt. Collins Limits Worcester
Club to Five Hits and Fans
12 in Seven Innings

The Providence College baseball team pounded out a 13 to 0 victory over Assumption College of Worcester in the opening game for both colleges at Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. The game was cut to seven innings by agreement of the coaches because of the cold weather.

Capt. Fred Collins, Friars' southpaw ace, had the opposition in check throughout the game. He struck out 12 of the 27 men who faced him and allowed only five hits. In the sixth inning, when the visitors bunched three singles to threaten, the Friar defence tightened and cut off the rally.

Providence made at least two hits in each inning. Lenny Cadorette, southpaw who started for the visitors, went to the showers in the fourth inning with the score 7-0 against him. The Friars made eight hits off his offerings. Leon Lampron, right-handed hurler, replaced Cadorette and had three runs scored against him before he retired the side in the fourth. The Friars belted Lampron's pitching for six hits and six runs.

Heading the Friars' hit parade were Leo Fischer, Charlie Gallagher, Leo Ploski and Ed Bobinski, each with a double. Capt. "Lefty" Collins had the best hitting average for the day with .667, for two out of three. The .500 hitters were Leo Ploski, Leo Fischer, and Elt Deuse, each with two out of four.

John "Wink" Crowley opened the scoring in the first inning. He singled to left, stole second and romped home on Fischer's two-bagger into deep right. Providence filled the bases in the third as Ploski singled. Gallagher doubled and Fischer was given an intentional walk

The decision to walk Fischer placed Cadorette in a difficult spot. Moge grounded sharply to the box and Cadorette caught Ploski at home plate, but the Assumption hurler was unable to bear down and issued three walks to send in three runs.

In the fourth inning Cadorette strained his ankle in making a delivery and hobbled off the field after the Friars had put over three more runs with none out. Lampron issued a walk and a single and three more Friar runs crossed the plate before the side was retired.

Deuse's single, passes to Crowley and Ploski and a fumble by Gene Berube, Assumption catcher, resulted in three runs for the Friars in the sixth. Collins, who started auspiciously by striking out the first three men to face him, struck out Roland Achin, pinch hitter, to end the game.

The Assumption players who turned in the best defensive work for the visitors were Tillie Frechette in centre field and Norman Pelletiere

in left. The entire Friar cast turned in steady play in the field and each of the nine starters contributed at least one hit to the total.

About 300 brave fans huddled in the stands to witness the contest. Many of them left in the fourth inning after the Friars had taken a 10-0 lead.

It was worth the price of admission to see Capt. Fred "Lefty" Collins, in top pitching form, mow down the first four men to face him. Collins was bothered by illness last year, at this time, but now is apparently ready for a banner season.

The Friars used only nine men. This team will bear much of the burden during the season and practice sessions have been all too few in the opinion of Coach Jack Egan. In spite of the one-sided score he kept them in there for the experience.



P. C., Outhit, Two to One, Groups Blows. Fields Well

Sherry Chased in Fourth.

Collins Fares but Little

Better.

Dexter Park, Brooklyn, N. Y.,
April 14—The Providence College
'varsity nine opened its four-game
road trip here today by scoring a
7 to 6 victory over the strong St.
John's University team, conqueror
of Princeton and undefeated in its
four previous starts this spring. The
Friars were outhit two to one, but
managed to bunch their seven blows
and to play fine defensive ball.
Fred Collins, captain of the Friars,
had to come to the rescue of Karl
Sherry, starting pitcher, in the
fourth inning. Collins fared little
better, however, giving up eight hits
and five passes.

Bill Moge and Leo Ploski shared the hitting honors for the Friars, the former getting two safe hits in four trips, while Ploski put Providence out in front in the third inning with an exceptionally long home run drive over the right field fence 340 feet from home plate. Sherry, who had singled, was on first at the time.

Unable to spot Larry Shea's fast ball at the beginning of the game, no less than six of the first eight Providence batters were retired on strikes. Sherry came through with the first hit and then Ploski made the circuit.

In the fourth Fischer was hit in the leg, moved to second on Moge's first single and to third when Shea juggled Hazell's roller. Then after Bobinski flied to short centre, Deuse was walked, forcing in Fischer.

A single by Zenir, followed by Polzer's long double which Crowley trapped in deep left, set the stage for the St. John's rally in the fourth and paved the way for Sherry's withdrawal. With two out, Salerno pushed a scratch hit through the box and both runners counted. Hagen singled to left, and Coach Egan called for Collins

Crowley opened the fifth by tripling to left and Ploski drew a walk. Shea tried to pick him off first and the throw was wild. Crowley scored and Ploski moved to third from where he tallied when Fischer skied to centre.

St. John's came right back in its half of the inning to add two runs. Collins walked Tallon, Sheehan singled and Zenir drew a pass. A fast double play, Moge to Fischer, relieved some pressure. Although a run scored on the play. A moment later Amoroso poked a roller to Ploski's left and Sheehan came home from third.

The Friars counted their winning margin in the eighth when they forced Shea to retire. Moge singled to centre and Hazell moved him up. Bobinski drove a line drive into left and Moge tallied. Bobinski moved up to third on the throw-in. Deuse hit to Shea, and Bobinski was run down between the bases, but Deuse reached second. He brought in the winning run when Collins laced a single to right.

Collins's unsteady pitching filled the bases in both the sixth and seventh innings, but he escaped without damage. In the sixth Ploski retired the side on a fine pickup of Zenir's grounder, and in the seventh the Friar captain broke up the attack by striking out Shea. However, in the eighth, singles by Tallon and Sheehan, followed by Zenir's infield

out, and then Polzer's third hit of the game, accounted for two more St. John's runs.

Tomorrow, the Friars meet the State Teachers' College at Stroudsburg, Pa., and then move to Villanova on Friday.

Coach Egan plans to use Marshall Brooks against the Teachers, and Paul Ryan against Villanova.

STROUDSBURG TEACHERS TRIM FRIARS

P. C. BEATEN, 2-1; PIESTRAK YIELDS BUT FIVE BINGLES

Brooks Walks Six; Paves Way for Winning Run in Seventh.

East Stroudsburg, Pa., April 15.—
Henry Piestrak, sophomore right
hander from Wilkesbarre, held the
touring Providence College nine
completely in check here this afternoon to give the State Teachers College a 2-1 victory, the second triumph
the locals have registered over the
Friars in eight years.

The teams meet again a week from Saturday at Providence.

The game was eight innings by agreement, and although the rainstorm drove the players from the field for a minutes at the end of the sixth inning, nothing seemed to bother Piestrak. He yielded but five hits, four of which went to Moge and Brooks, and his fine change of pace and varied assortment of slow curves kept him out of trouble throughout.

Marshall Brooks, starting pitcher for the Friars, was unsteady, and although not hit hard he aided his own downfall by his liberal distribution of passes. Six men drew walks, the last one eventually scoring.

With the score tied in the seventh, and time running out due to a pregame agreement to halt the game at 5:30. Jack Egan sent Elt Deuse in to catch in place of Martin to forestall any base stealing on the part of the locals. However, Brooks walked Gregoria, the first batter to face him. 



Rams Win Seventh In Row; Take Lead in State Race

The pitching mastery that is Georgie Hires's stock in baseball trade was exerted to good advantage at Kingston yesterday and the R. I. State Rams rode to a 2 to 0 triumph over Providence College mainly on the strength of the three-hit pitching of their ace right hander. The crowd numbered 1500.

Victory for the Rams left them undefeated in seven starts this season and put them two up on the Friars and the Brown Bears in the race for the State intercollegiate baseball crown. It marked Hines's sixth triumph of the campaign.

Limited to three singles, one of them scratch, in as many innings, the Friars got but six men on first base and only one as far as second.

The Ram batters fared much better at the expense of Karl Sherry, Providence right hander who twirled seven innings. The Keaneymen collected eight hits, including a triple by Chet Jaworski, off Sherry and fashioned both of their runs while the bespectacled right hander was on the mound. Captain Fred "Lefty" Collins finished out the game and set the Rams down in order in the one inning he worked.

Hines's three-hit, six-strikeout and two-pass hurling performance left little room in the hero department yet two of his mates, Ed Fay, shortstop, and Jaworski, second sacker, managed to squeeze in for a share of

the game's honors.

Jaworski's triple to right field in the first inning was unproductive, for Fay grounded to short and Hammond threw to Gus Hagstrom to nip Jaworski at the plate. It was a brilliant play, but it cost the Friars the services of Hagstrom who went out of the game with three spike cuts in his right leg as the result of his collision with Jaworski.

Friars at Home to Bruins For First Time in Series

May 8, 1937

32nd Game of 14-Year-Old Struggle Slated for Hend ricken Field Today.

The 32nd game of a 14-year-old baseball series is on tap this afternoon at Hendricken Field, where the Providence College Friars entertain the Brown Bears in the opening game of their 1937 State and city series. Play is scheduled to start at 3:15 o'clock.

For the first time in the history of the intra-city rivalry which was inaugurated on old Andrews Field on May 2, 1923, the Friars will be playing Brown on Providence's home field. On that distant date the Bruins won, 4 to 0, but the first game of the 1924 two-game series went to the Dominicans, 1 to 0, on the strength of Charlie Reynolds's remarkable 20-inning pitching exhibition. To date 31 contests have been played, with the Friars having a 21 to 10 margin in victories.

The first of the Friar triumphs, by that 1 to 0 count, set the pattern for close scores. Of the 31 games played in the series 10 have been decided by a single run, six by two runs and four by three runs.

Except in the total of victories over the entire stretch closeness has marked the series. Pre-game favoritism has meant little in a majority of the games. Tight, keen battles have predominated with victory going to the underdog on numerous occasions. This afternoon Karl Sherry, Senior on Smith Hill, has been selected to carry the pitching burden. Facing him for the Bruins will be a College Hill Senior and another right hander. Bob Kurlansky.

The remainder of the lineups on both sides will be much the same used in earlier tilts this season by the respective mentors, Jack Egan of Providence and Jack Kelleher of Brown. There's still a question as to which of his first baseman Egan will start, Leo Fischer or Ralph Coleman. They are on a par in so tar as ability is concerned and have divided the first base work fairly evenly this spring. Coleman is the probable starter.

The inclusion of Cad Arrendell at right field in the Bruin lineup in place of Bob Pitocchelli is the lone change contemplated by Kelleher. He plans to use Bob Brush back of the plate and is hopeful that the arm injury Brush sustained in the R. I. State game on Tuesday will have healed sufficiently to permit him to get into action. If Brush is forced out Irving "Shine" Hall, Bruin ath-letic star who has been kept busy with spring football drills, probably will be pressed into service. Brown's catching problem is fairly acute with Brush on the doubtful list because Floyd Hinckley, first string catcher, also is definitely on the side-lines with a knee injury.



SHERRY HURLS FRIARS TO VICTORY

Johnny Crowley's Homer Figures in 7 to 2 Victory

It was a repeat performance for the Friars at Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon, but this time Karl Sherry, star right-hander, managed to play the leading role through to a finish, scattering nine hits over eight innings and striking out eight Redmen. Two thousand saw the

During the next four innings Ananicz and his mates checked the Friars' run-making, but a small uprising in the seventh netted the Dominicans another run, and a more spirited drive in the eighth added two more tallies. Gus Hagstrom, who hit three clean singles in four trips, figured in there of the Friar runs in the course of the contest.

After the first inning St. John's proceeded to get a hit an inning until the eighth when they managed to couple a pair of bingles. But Sherry's smart hurling tactics spiked the Redmen's scoring guns with the result that only two visitors scored while 11 were left on base, six of them in scoring position.

Sherry's capable performance also included two "pick-offs" to Fischer at first base.

ENCORES

Capt. Fred "Lefty" Collins of the Friars spent most of the game warming up. He had to relieve Sherry when the teams met in Brooklyn, but yesterday his services were not necessary. The energy was not wasted, however, as the Friars have an important meeting with Boston College on Wednesday at Boston and the Friar captain will be ready for the Eagles.

Crowley's home run blow was a hard hit. Charlie Wolf, Redmen's left fielder, came in fast expecting the usual bounce but the ball skipped past him and he staged a losing race after it for Crowley was well around third when Wolf had retrieved the sphere.

In the fifth the Redmen threatened seriously. After scoring one run they had men on second and third and only one out. Crowley made a fast return of a fly to left to hold the Redmen on base and Sherry struck out the next batter to solve the problem.

Kelly was effective during the rest of the afternoon.



Avenges Early Season Setback; Friars Crowd Scoring Into Three Innings.







FRIARS WHIP CRUSADERS. 6-3 Karl Sherry Proves Real Puzzle to Purple Hitters

Fitton Field, Worcester, Mass... May 22.—Karl Sherry today again proved a "jinx" to the Holy Cross baseball team when Providence College turned back the unbeaten Crusaders, 6 to 3, before a crowd of 3000. The Friar victory snapped a string of nine triumphs by the Holy Cross team.

In a way, the victory was nothing new to the Friars or to Karl Sherry, ace right-handed pitcher for the Dominicans. For it was the third time he has successfully outguessed the Crusaders' heavy hitters, once in Providence, and twice on this field in successive seasons.

Back in 1935, when Sherry was a sophomore, he pitched the Friars to a 4-1 triumph over the Cross at Hendricken Field. The next year he turned the same trick, by the same score, here in Worcester. Sherry's feat equalled a Fitton Field record set by Ray McNamara, New York University pitcher, a few years ago. McNamarra also hurled his club to two victories over Holy Cross here and scored another one in the N. Y. U. ball park.

The Friars did all their scoring off the pitching of Roy Bruninghaus, senior speed-ball hurler, who started in place of Al Jarlett, Coach Jack Barry's earlier choice. In all they made only five hits off the big Millbury, Mass., twirler but every blow figured in the Providence team's scoring.

Sherry did his full share from the mound, using change of pace, curves and his "fast one" to good advantage. Back of him was as tight a defence as the Friar fielders have put up all season. Two double plays and a half dozen or so brilliant individual manoeuvres spiked the Crusader guns at crucial moments.

Charles Gallagher, who more than once has been the deciding factor in Providence basketball victories, played that role in baseball today, smashing a home run into deep centre in the third inning. Crowley and Hazell were on base at the time. This drive started the Friars off to their noteworthy victory. With Friar runmaking given this boost, the visitors scored single runs in the next three innings to take a lead that was not seriously threatened until the very

While his mates were hitting in timely fashion, Sherry offered the Crusaders little in the way of scoring blows. For seven innings, he shut out the home club, allowing singles in the first, third and sixth. Not until the Crusaders saw the end of the game approaching did they connect for extra bases.

Coach Jack Barry sent Bracken in to pinch-hit for Ouellette in the eighth, and with a 3-2 count against him Bracken walloped a triple to right. Dowd scored Bracken with a single over second base. Brucato walked, but two were out and Tom Hazell made a sensational running. one-hand catch of Kelley's drive to right to end the threat.

In the ninth, the Crusader power was on in full force and the home crowd, which called louder and louder for Purple hits as the innings winged by, was doing its share to rattle Sherry. Karl was nicked for three hits in the last inning but the anxious Crusaders hit "high ones" and the game was brought to a close with putouts being made on fly balls.

Barry, who replaced Catcher Ryan in the eighth after a foul tip had injured Ryan's throwing hand, rapped a single into centre to open the Crusader ninth. Conway skied to Hazell. Piurek dropped a single into left and "Red" Durand, former R. I. schoolboy luminary, scored Barry and Piurek with a lusty triple to right field.

Bracken again came to bat but popped out to Gallagher, behind third. Durand was still at third. Al Jarlett, who replaced Bruninghaus in the sixth and effectively silenced the Friar bats thereafter, lined what appeared to be an extra-base hit to left but Johnny Crowley. Friar left fielder, leaped into the air and hauled down the ball to end the game.

This play was a breath-taking one, but it was a fitting finale to an afternoon of spectacular work afield by the Friars. The Friar trio of Ploski, Belliveau and Fischer executed double plays in the third and fourth innings to put a tight lid on the Cruader attack at that stage of the con-

In the sixth, Ploski leaped into the air and made a one-hand stop of Keley's line drive to nip another Purple hreat. Then Hazell made a grand play on Kelley's crack to right field

in the eighth grabbing the ball in one hand and making a complete somersault. Crowley's putout in the ninth capped the acrobatics.

Although Bruninghaus was nicked for the hits that spelled victory for Providence he turned in a capable performance. He struck out seven Friars and contributed one of the Crusader hits that might have figured in a score if the Friar defence had been at all shaky.

Al Jarlett, Bruninghaus's successor, was the Friars' nemesis. After he took over, there were no more Friar hits. He struck out five batters and only two of the other seven batsmen to face him got the ball out of the infield. Five grounded out and two

flied out.

Well-wishers of the rival pitchers presented watches to their "boys". When Sherry went to bat in the third, time was called while friends from Albion, R. I., led by Nelson Pelletier, gave him a timepiece in recognition of the fine work he has done for the Friars in baseball.

When Bruninghaus came to the plate for his first "licks" in the third he was presented a watch by friends from Millbury, Mass. Another watch was given to Chet Shaw, Crusader first baseman, by the Millbury dele-

The Friars who figured in the runmaking in addition to Gallagher were Ed Bobinski, who doubled in the fourth and scored on Belliveau's line-out to far right, and Leo Fischer, whose triple in the sixth sent Bobin-

Karl Sherry did it again!

Providence College's bespectacled right-hander became the first college pitcher in modern times to defeat Holy Cross baseball teams three years running as he steered the fancy-fielding and hard-hitting Friars to a 6-3 victory ovr the Crusaders in a sparkling battle at Fitton Field yesterday afternoon.

The cunning soft-ball curver, who pitches more with his head than his arm, blasted the Purple pounders from the ranks of the unbeaten after they had scored nine triumphs this Spring, just as he also snapped their 14-game winning streak at Providence two years ago and exploded their 13-game victory skein here last season.

No other enemy pitcher has even come close to wreaking such havoc with Holy Cross baseball records.

Gallagher Homers
Sherry, although complete master of the Crusaders for seven and one-third innings, didn't exactly whip them alone yesterday. Big Charlie Gallagher staked him to a three-run lead with a tremendous home run smash in the third inning. And other long-range belts by Ed Bobinski, this same Gallagher and Leo Fischer gave the Friars single counters in each of the next three frames before Roy Bruninghaus finally quit the peak with six earned runs charged against him on five hits and three passes.

And then as Sherry tired and faltered badly in the last two innigs—when the rallying Crusaders struck five of tehir eight aits, scored all their runs and mustered two mighty challenges—the Providence defense which had functioned so brilliantly all afternoon rushed to his rescue with a pair of beautiful plays which blotted out Holy Cross' last bold threats.

Drama In Late Innings

The partisan crowd of nearly four thousand spectators found most of the day's heavy drama and their biggest thrills in these exciting closing innings. It was then that the pendulum of a game which had belonged almost entirely to the crafty Sherry and the slugging Gallagher suddenly swung to Relief Pitcher Al Jarlett and the stretch-fighting Purple.

The seemingly inspired Friars had taken full command earlier, with Sherry stifling the Crusader clubs and with Gallagher rocking the game from under Bruninghaus with his monumental four-master in the third. Gallagher hit that three-run smash—a long, low drive which roared over Ouellette's head in deepest center—with two out and after Bruninghaus had passed Tom Hazell and Johnny Crowley.

Providence had added another run in the fourth when Bobinski led off with a double down the right field line, moved to third on an infield out and home after Ray Belliveau's long hoist to Conway in right. Gallagher's second long drive-a triple far down the left field line-scored Gus Hagstrom, who had walked to start the fifth. And the Friars counted their sixth and last run against Bruninghaus in the sixth when Fischer tripled up the right field bank to push home Boblinski, who had beaten out a high bounder to the box

Jarlett Pitches Perfectly

Jarlett, the cocky Watertown, Conn., blonde who seems the best of all the fine Holy Cross pitchers, rushed out to rescue the fallen Bruninghaus here and promptly proceeded to squelch the enemy clubbers with one of the greatest exhibitions of relief pitching ever unfolded anywhere.

Fischer was on third and none was out when Jarlet appeared. And Al came in practically cold, for he had had time for only a few warm-up pitches. Surely he was in a spot. And, although the breezy right-hander was plainly nervous for the first time during his colorful career on Mount St. James, he quickly curve-balled the Friars into humble submission.

He forced Belliveau to tap weakly to the box, threw him cut at first and then hooked beautiful third strikes past the swinging bats of Hazell and Hagstrom, leaving Fischcher to die on third. That isn't all Jarlett did. He set the Dominicans down in order in each of the next three innings, retiring 12 men in rapid succession and never permitting a single one to get his wood solidly against the marvelous curves he was throwing. Five of them whiffed

The manner in which Jarlett cooloff those red hot Providence batters caused the fans to marvel in
admiration of his brilliant toiling.
But it didn't materially help the
Crusaders' chances. For Sherry,
the great Holy Cross nemesis, was
merely breezing. His spot pitches
and his slok stuff had handcuffed
the Purple with three singles going
into the eighth. He hadn't permitted a single Crusader to move
past first base, and he was getting
grand support.

Bracken Hits Pinch Triple

Walter Bracken broke his charm in the eighth, However. With one out, Bracken batted for Henry Ouellette and blasted a towering triple up the right field banking. He scored while Jarlett was groundout to Ploski at shortstop. And then Sherry suddenly lost command.

Worcester's Pete Dowd laced a a single over center and Sherry, encountering trouble with his control for the first time, passed Charley Brucato. This brought up the dangerous Capt. Joe Kelley, who twice before had been robbed on well-hit drives. Bobinski had sacked his long liner into center in the fourth and Polski had leaped high into the air to make a gloved-hand catch of his smash in the sixth.

Hazell Makes Great Catch

But these bits of thievery were petty compared to the larceny Tom Hazell perpetrated on the Holy Cross captain in this eighth inning. For Kelley pushed a long fly down the right field line. It seemed certain to push home two runs and to be at least a two-bagger. But just as the ball was about to plunk the earth, the madly sprinting Hazell dived frantically. clutched has shoe tops, somersaulted came up with the catch.

That spectacular circus clutch just about saved the day for Sherry. For if the ball had gotten away from Hazell the Crusaders would have at least two more runs. And Sherry showed in the ninth that he no longer was any mystery to the homesters.

They teed off against him for three solid smacks in the last frame with Dave Barry and Whitey Piurek striking singles and both racing home ahead of Red Durand's long triple into the deep right field sector. But Bracken, who had given the Purple its start in the eighth popped out and although Jarlett slammed one of the best-hit drives of the day, it went straight at Crowley, who leaped high for the catch and the final putout. A yard or two to either side and Jarlett might have had a home!



Sherry had that sort of support all afternoon. Twice his infield came up with snappy double plays on hard hit balls in the early innings and frequently the Crusaders' fiercest smashes went straight at fielders. The Purple also fielded flawlessly with Kelley's play on Gallagher's smash to deep short in the first and Jarlett's handling of Crowley's bunt in the seventh being the best of their putouts.

Diamond Dust

Sherry has now whipped Holy Cross three times in as many years . . . and he has permitted the Crusaders only six runs and 18 hits in 27 innings. . . . Also he has snapped their three long winning streaks. . . . No other college pitcher has whipped the Purple three times running . . . at least no one can remember any such a feat previously. . . . Bob McNamara of New York U, came the closest. . . . He shut out the Purple twice . . . and the third year he beat them with a home run, but he was playing the outfield and not pitching that day.

"Sherry doesn't throw them hard enough to hit," said one disgusted Holy Cross batter... More truthful is: He doesn't throw them good enough... His control and his curve make him a master at pitching to batter's weaknesses... He will have a chance to make even more history next Saturday, for Coach Jack Egan plans to send him back against Holy Cross in the return game at Providence.

Gallagher got plenty of wood against his homer and triple off Bruninghaus... who really didn't have his usual stuff... It may be that he was jinxed by the presentation which Millbury fans made to him and Chet Shaw in the third inning... Collins went out at the end of the sixth after he had suffered a leg injury when he collided with Bob Welch at first base. The Friar southpaw had pitched four-hit, six-strikeout ball up to that point, had issued four passes and moved out with the score deadlocked at two-all. Karl Sherry took command then with a three-hit, one-run achievement for the final three frames and was credited with the victory.

Dye limited the Friars to six hits and two runs up to his unfortunate eighth inning. Gallagher opened the eighth by flying out to Cad Arrendell in right field. Ploski drew the fifth and last pass Dye issued during the afternoon and scored ahead of Bobinski who drove a four-ply wallop to the left centre field fence. Sherry grounded out but Leo Fischer, Ray Bellievau and Tom Hazell made successive singles to fill the bases and usher Dye out of the ball game. Devaney got out of trouble when Deuse ended the uprising with a looping drive to Hicks.

While the top action of the game and the blow-off came in that second half of the eighth there was a lot of good baseball contained in the earlier innings. 

CRUSADERS TRIP FRIARS

Eight-Run Rally in Ninth Gives Purple 11-3 Victory

An eight-run uprising in the ninth inning that shattered a three-all deadlock gave the Holy Cross Crusaders an 11 to 3 triumph over the Providence College Friars before close to 3500 spectators yesterday at Hendricken Field.

The victory broke two precedents and upheld another. It was the first setback of the season for the Dominicans on their home field and the first defeat Karl Sherry, bespectacled right-handed hurler, ever sustained at the hands and bats of a Crusader nine. Sherry started the game and pitched creditably until driven from the mound in the wild ninth.

Holy Cross's triumph upheld the series tradition between these two Catholic College rivals which has yet to see either sweep an annual series. Providence won from the Purple at Worcester a week ago. Yesterday's victory squared this year's homeand-home series and sent the Crusaders into a 9-8 lead in the modern series that was inaugurated in 1930.

The eight-run splurge in the ninth broke open an otherwise even game that was tied up in the last of the seventh by the captain of the home forces, Fred "Lefty" Collins, who led

off the inning in the role of a pinch hitter for Catcher Gus Hagstrom and poled a homer over the right field fence.

The Crusaders were first to score and built up a 3-0 lead going into the last half of the sixth by virtue of single runs in the third, fifth and sixth cantos. The Friars cracked through with two runs in their half of the sixth and then Collins knotted the score with his four-ply wallop in the seventh.



Gallagher's bobble on Brucato's grounder, with one away in the third, paved the way for Holy Cross' initial tally, Brucato scoring on Ryan's double to centre. Kelley of the Crusaders walked to open the fourth, advanced when Ryan was hit by one of Sherry's slants and scored on Conway's single to centre.

Al Jarlett, pitching for the Purple, who turned in a six-hit performance, led off the sixth with a single to left. He went to second on Dowd's sacrifice bunt and scored on Brucato's single which Ploski stopped back of second base, after a head-

first dive.

* * * Limited to one single up to the sixth, the Friars collected two more and combined them with a base on balls and an infield out to garner their first two runs. Gallagher led off with a single to right. Ploski walked and Gallagher scored from second on Bobinski's sharp single to centre. Fischer advanced both runners with a sacrifice bunt, and Ploski. scored from third on Brucato's throw to first on Belliveau's grounder.

After Collins had knocked his homer over the right field fence to open the Friar seventh the score was knotted. Sherry singled and advanced on Crowley's sacrifice but was left stranded when Gallagher

and Bobinski fanned.

The nightmarish ninth opened with Sherry dealing out a pass to Kelley. Ryan singled over second and Kelley dashed to third, drawing a throw from Ploski that enabled Ryan to reach second. Conway's single to centre scored Kelley and pushed Ryan around to third. Piurek followed with a single to left to score Ryan.

Camille Durand, of Georgiaville, regular third sacker with the Crusaders, attempted a sacrifice bunt which Sherry fielded and threw to Gallagher at third in a vain effort to force Conway. All hands were safe and the bases loaded. Brachen's grounder got away from Fischer and Conway crossed the plate leaving the

bases still choked.

Marshall Brooks relieved Sherry and was greeted by a single by Jarlett which sent Piurek and Durand across the plate. Dowd then singled to right and Brachen and Jarlett both scored when Hazell let the ball go through his legs. Dowd reached second on the hit and error, and went to third when Deuse, who had replaced Gus Hagstrom behind the plate in the eighth, threw wild to second. They garnered five hits for four runs, got two more for another run in the seventh and then finished with three hits and two runs in the eighth.



A LIVELY EXPERIMENT

PROVIDENCE College, with assistance from Long Island University, will conduct a lively experiment tomorrow night by staging the first night baseball game to be put on by colleges in New England, or, for that matter, in the East, as far as we can make out.

There will be no more danger of the collegians getting hit on the head by fly balls under the floodlights than there is of their receiving such whacks during the day time, the firm that rents out the lights has assured Johnny Farrell, Friar graduate manager of athletics. of course, there is always danger of collegians getting hit on the head by fly balls, night or day.

At any rate, Walter Hapgood, the veteran baseball man, who is the big gun with the floodlight company, after looking over Hendricken Field, assured Farrell that the job of turning night into day for baseball purposes there can be done with considerable success. The company is the same outfit which supplied the lighting effects for the Friar-Rhode Island State football game last fall. The lights of course, will have to be ranged higher for baseball than for football.

If the lights are really top-grade, neither spectators nor fielders will have trouble following the flight of the ball, those who have watched night baseball tell us. The odds are against the batters, though, they also tell us, for there's a shadow around the waist line of the hitter, when he's at the plate, that can't be eliminated by any of the lighting systems now in use. It is unlikely that any of the young men of Providence College or Long Island University will fatten their batting averages tomorrow evening.

BLACKBIRDERS COLORFUL

THE FRIARS have made a wise move in choosing Long Island University's visit as the occasion for staging the night game. In the past few years, L. I. U. has moved into an important spot in the Eastern collegiate world by building up long winning streaks in basketball and baseball. The current Blackbirders aren't undefeated, but when they beat Columbus Council, K. of C., by 9-3 Saturday, it was their 19th win in 22 starts.

In basketball L. I. U. has been litle short of sensational. A year ago the Blackbirders cleaned up about everything that came their way. They passed up a chance to compete for a place in the Olympics that year, not having any desire to be connected with anything that was linked up in any way with a man named Hitler.

An energetic operator, who rejoices in the somewhat unusual name of Clair Bee, is responsible in a good part for L. I. U.'s sport prominence. Dr. Bee, who holds a couple of collegiate degrees and is shooting at another, also finds time to coach the Blackbirders in basketball and baseball. He has had plenty of success in digging up athletic talent and bringing it to Long Island. On his present baseball squad he has but 14 players, but they are all good.

The Blackbirders hold one decision over the Friars this year. It was registered by the score of 6-4 during the Dominicans' early spring road trip through New York and Pennsylvania, when the Blackbirders scoured Lefty Collins' offerings for four runs in the first inning. In may be, though, that while the lights are turning night into day tomorrow night Providence College will be able to turn past defeat into present victory.

State's First Night Game Is Attended By 3000 Fans

Blackbirds Garner 13 Hits Off Brooks and Sherry; Six P. C.

Errors Aid Victors.

Long Island University's baseball team, perfectly at home under artificial lighting, defeated the Providence College nine, 11 to 6, last night at Hendricken Field before over 3000 fans. The victory was the 21st for the Blackbirders in 24 contests. It was the first night baseball game in Rhode Island.

The heavy-hitting visitors garnered 13 hits off Pitchers Marshall Brooks and Karl Sherry of Providence College, two of them home runs by Abramowitz and Fonte. The Friars made six errors, all of them figuring in their opponents' scoring.

figuring in their opponents' scoring. Larry Burger, big L. I. U. southpaw, gave up eight hits but was in serious trouble on only one occasion, in the fourth, when the Friars made four bingles and scored their first two runs. Up to the fourth the game was close, but L. I. U. loaded the bases in the fifth and Rockelein doubled to the right field fence, clearing the sacks.

A single run in the sixth on an error and two infield outs and four runs in the seventh when the Blackbirds sent Brooks to the showers gave the visitors a lead that was never threatened seriously. Sherry went into action in place of Brooks, but gave up two hits, one of them a double good for two runs.

Brooks's downfall came in the seventh, when Fonte hit a fly over the lights in midfield and circled the bases as the throw back to the infield struck one of the light standards and bounded out to centre field. FRIARS DEFEAT EAGLES

Hagstrom Leads Assault Against Eagles' Pitchers

Ably Seconded by Belliveau as

Dominicans Trounce Bos-

ton College, 8 to 5.

Providence College's Friars yesterday gave Coach Jack Egan his first chance to look at a Friar nine winning over Boston College's Eagles The Friars coupled a slugging attack with a keen, seven-hit pitching exhibition by Karl Sherry to outscore the Eagles, 8 to 5, at Hendricken Field.

The victory, first that the Friars have scored over the Eagles in the three-season baseball regime of Egan on Smith Hill, deadlocked the current series. The two teams are to play again on the Friars' Commencement Day, next Thursday afternoon.

Leader of a Friar slugging attack that made 12 hits good for 18 bases was chunky Gus Hagstrom with a batting mark of 1.000 for the afternoon. He banged out two doubles and two singles out of four trips to the plate and drove in four of the Providence club's runs. Ray Belliveau, Friar second baseman, collected a brace of doubles, walked once, counted three runs himself and drove in another.

Leo Ploski added his bit to the Friar attack with a triple that accounted for the Friars' sixth run and put them out ahead in the sixth frame. The Dominican shortstop was but a stride short of stretching his three-ply wallop into a homer, a three-man relay from deep left just nipping him at the plate. Ploski was the home club's defensive giant with a record of seven assists and two putouts to his credit, as he turned in a perfect day afield.

A base on balls to Fallon followed by Cummings's triple to right centre, put the Eagles in front in the first of the second. Fischer then led off a Friar attack in the second half of the second that brought two markers. The Friar first baseman singled to centre, advanced on a pass to Belliveau and reached third as Hazell beat out a bunt down the first base line. Hagstrom's single to deep centre drove in Fischer and Belliveau and sent Hazell to third. Sherry grounded out to the box, and Crowley fanned, but the bases were choked again when Gallagher drew a pass. That threat faded when Ploski fouled out to Fallon back of the plate.

The Eagles went ahead again in their half of the fifth with a two-run splurge, but again their lead was short-lived, the Friars counting three times in their half. Somy led off the Boston fifth with a single to deep short. Ferdenzi walked and both runners advanced when Umpire Cleary called a balk on Sherry as he pitched to O'Flaherty. The latter eventually flied out to Bobinski, with Somy after the catch and Ferdenzi going to third, from whence he scored on Ploski's fielder's choice play on Goode's grounder to short. The runner beat the throw home by a stride.

Providence made short shift of moving out ahead again. Ploski and Bobinski walked and advanced on Fischer's sacrifice bunt. 

Boston College Defeats Friars, 9-6, in Series Final

Dominicans' Inability to Hit in Pinches Negates Several Scoring Opportunities.

Ability to shunt runners off the tracks and send them across home plate was, in the main, responsible for a 9 to 6 triumph chalked up by the Boston College Eagles over the Providence College Friars yesterday at Hendricken Field. Only a handful of fans was on hand for the "rubber" game of the B. C.-P. C. series, the Commencement Day sports feature on Smith Hill.

The Eagles used hits and Frian errors to clear the sacks of runners. In the final analysis it was a fourbase miscue that gave the Eagles their three-run margin of victory. Karl Sherry, usually an unerring gunner on throws to the bases, got off a wild heave to Charlie Gallagher at third in the fifth frame and three runs counted when the ball rolled back of the third base stands.

Beyond a tendency to err on the part of the Friar fielders there was a heavy-hitting Eagle crew to contend with. The invaders, triumphant over the Friars 8 to 2 at Newton earlier this season and then humbled by the Dominicans 8 to 5 at Hendricken Field last week-end, collected 11 hits off of three Friar hurlers yesterday. And those hits counted even more heavily than did the Friar miscues.

The Eagle attack started rolling in the first frame with one run being scored. Another came in the second, clusters of three in the fourth and fifth and another singleton in the sixth. The Friars collected single markers in the first and fourth and rallied with two-run spurts in the seventh and eighth.

They garnered eight hits off O'Hara, capable southpaw hurler, in seven and two-thirds innings but were handcuffed the rest of the way by Georgie Fallon, cousin of the Eagle captain and catcher, Charlie Fallon. O'Hara's pitching performance was featured by eight strikeouts and was the leader of a threerun attack in the fourth after two were out.

Boston left six men stranded but the Friars left 10, their inability to push runners along contributing heavily to their downfall. In both the seventh and eighth frames the bases were choked when the final outs were made. Game played:

The Eagles' victory enabled them to keep intact a four-year record of not losing a series to the Dominicans. Providence's last series win over the Eagles came in 1933 when Al Blanche pitched two straight triumphs.

The Eagles counted in the opening frame when Ash walked, advanced on Palumbo's sacrifice and scored on Charlie Fallon's single to centre. The second B. C. tally came in the second when Gavin romped home from third on a fielder's choice play on Palumbo's slow grounder to Gallagher. It was a squeeze with two out and when Pilote attempted to score from second on the play he was caught at the plate.

O'Hara singled with two out in the fourth starting Boston's first threerun splurge. Ash and Palumbo drew walks from Brooks and all three runners scored on Goode's triple to right centre. O'Flaherty and Gavin singled in the fifth and both runners. as well as Laronde, scored when Sherry threw wildly past Gallagher after fielding Laronde's sacrifice bunt. A pass to Goode, followed by Charlie Fallon's triple, brought Boston's ninth and last run in the sixth.

Providence broke into the scoring in their half of the first, Crowley getting a walk and scoring on Gallagher's triple to left. The Providence third baseman was thrown out at the plate on a three-man relay when he tried to stretch his hit into a homer. The second of the Friar tallies came in the fourth when Belliveau tripled to centre, after two were out, and scored on Tom Hazell's single.

The Friars filled the bases at the start of the seventh. Belliveau singled, Hazell walked and Deuse was hit by a pitched ball. O'Hara then came close to duplicating his fifth inning performance of three straight strikeouts. He fanned Gus Hagstrom, pinch-hitting for Karl Sherry, who had relieved Marshall Brooks. the starting Providence hurler, in the fifth frame. Then he threw a called third strike past Wink Crowley.

Gallagher, however, spoiled the performance when he was safe on Pilote's fumbler of his sharp grounder to short, Belliveau scoring on the play. Hazell followed him home when Leo Ploski singled but Bobinski grounded out, ending the rally In the eighth a single by Hazell, an error by O'Flaherty on Deuse's grounder and a single to right by Lefty Collins brough the Friars another run. If Brown triumphs, the State collegiate baseball championship will be shared with Providence and R. I. State. A victory for the Friars, who are now ahead in the race for the State title, will give them clear possession of the title.

At present the Friars hold the lead with victories over Brown and State and one defeat at the hands of the Rams. The Kingstonians have scored victories over Brown and Providence, and have also lost one game to each rival. The Bruins have defeated State and lost to the Friars and Rams.

Coach Jack Kelleher has two pitching possibilities on his Bruin squad. He may elect to start Bob Dye, who held the Friars in check for seven innings of their first meeting. If Dye does not start, Vin Devaney, who has come back to first-class form after being out of action most of the season with an injured hand, will face the Friars. Devaney pitched 1-3 inning against the Friars on May 26.

Devaney's claim to the top ranking spot on the Brown pitching staff is based on fine performances against Holy Cross and Harvard. Devaney played a prominent role in the Holy Cross game which went to the Crusaders by a 2-0 score. He turned back the Harvard nine with only three hits as Brown won, 4-2.

Coach Jack Egan also has two choices for his starting pitcher, Capt. Fred Collins, southpaw, and Karl Sherry, ace of the Friar staff. Collins allowed four hits in six innings in the first game, and gave way to Sherry after injuring his ankle in a collision at first base. Sherry allowed three hits in the remaining three innings.

Devaney Pitches Brown To Victory Over Friars

Bears Win 3 to 2 as Collins's

Brown's Bears of the baseball diamond projected themselves into the State and city collegiate baseball title picture yesterday at Aldrich Field with a 3 to 2 triumph over the Providence College Friars. Backed by Vincent Devaney's two-hit pitching performance and aided by the wildness of Capt. Fred Collins, starting mound performer for the Friars, the Bruins counted all three of their runs in the first two frames and then coasted to victory.


Through their triumph the Bruins forced a three-way deadlock for the State championship. All three of the contending teams, Brown, State and Providence completed the series with two victories and two defeats apiece. The Bruin win also forced a tie in the intracity championship. Yesterday's game was the second in the city se-

ries, Providence having won the first 4 to 3 at Hendricken Field.

The victory also enabled the Bears to shorten the gap between themselves and the Friars in their all-time series. Yesterday's game was the 33rd in that series and gave Brown its 11th victory as against 22 for the Friars.

Collins's wildness, more than any one other thing, was responsible for Brown's scoring. The Friar captain walked three batters in the opening frame and those walks, combined with two errors, gave the Bruins two runs. An error, a single and a walk filled the bases in the second and the Bears got their third run when Collins hit Clements with a pitched ball, forcing in a counter.

He Shall Not Pass!—Gus Hagstrom



After clouting a lusty triple to right centre in the fifth inning of the Brown-Providence College baseball game at Aldrich Field yesterday afternoon, Capt. Paul Clements attempted to score on Jim Swallow's grounder to Karl Sherry, Friar pitcher. Sherry feinted to first, turned and whip ped the ball to Catcher Gus Hagstrom who was waiting for Clements as he slid for the plate. There was no opening for Clements and he was out, Plate Umpire Walsh calling the play. The Bruins won, 3-2, to tie up the State and City series at .500 all a round.

Karl Sherry, right-handed ace of the Friar mound staff, pitched the rest of the distance and all but handcuffed the Bruin batters. He was nicked for four hits, including a triple by Clements in the fifth, but held the home side scoreless. He fanned six batters and issued no walks.

Both hits registered off his delivery were made by Leo Fischer, lead-off man, who collected a single and double.

The Bears got away to a good start after one was out in the opening frame, when Wright, Welch and Hicks drew successive passes. Wright scored when Clements hit to Belliveau at second and Ploski dropped the Friar second sacker's toss to the keystone cushion that would have forced Hicks. Atwell rolled a slow grounder to Fischer and Welch counted when the Friar first baseman's throw to Hagstrom drew the latter off the plate. The rally ended when Swallow fanned and Brush forced Atwell at second.

Brokaw walked with one out in the second, but was caught at second on an attempted steal. Belliveau then let Wright's grounder get past him and the runner went all the way to third when Welch singled to centre. Hicks walked, filling the bases, and Wright was forced across the plate when Collins hit Clements with a pitched ball. Sherry came in at that point and retired the side, Atwell flying out to Ploski.

The Friar right-hander was in trouble only twice in the remaining innings. Clements opened the third with a triple to right centre, but was caught at the plate when he attempted to score on Swallow's roller to Sherry. A double play, Belliveau to Ploski to Fischer, halted another Bruin rally in the eighth after Atwell and Swallow had opened the inning with successive singles.

Providence picked up its first run in the sixth, Fischer opened the inning with a double down the first base line that Wright touched but couldn't stop. Gallagher and Ploski grounded out but Bobinski was passed and Sherry hit on the knee by one of Devaney's slants, filling the bases. Devany then passed Belliveau, forcing Fischer in with a run.

Ploski and Bobinski drew passes to open the eighth and advanced on Sherry's sacrifice bunt. Ploski scored from third after Swallow's catch of Belliveau's long fly to left but Bobinski was left stranded with the tying run when Hazell grounded out.

The game was the last of the season for the Friars who completed their campaign with a mark of 13 victories and 10 defeats in 23 games. The Bears play one more game, against Indiana University at Aldrich Field on Tuesday. Yesterday's victory was their seventh of the season. They lost eight and tied one.





FRIAR FRESHMEN WIN OPENER, 11-7







CONFERENCE NAMES GROUP OF 46 APPROVED OFFICIALS



Five Rhode Islanders Included. — Athletic Directors and Coaches Aid New Plan

For the first time in the history of college baseball in New England, and that embraces a period of almost 80 years, the colleges will work under officials who have been selected from an approved list. Thus baseball follows the path carved out by basketball as the colleges seek greater proficiency in officiating.

A list of 46 officials, five of whom are Rhode Islanders, has gone out to the members of the New England College Conference. The athletic directors of those institutions will have this list at their disposal in seeking officials for their games. While use of the list is not mandatory, it is expected that practically all of the New England nines will operate their games under officials from the list.

WORK STARTED DURING '36 SEASON

The assembling of a list for the forthcoming baseball season brings to a conclusion the efforts of the Baseball Committee of the Association of New England Colleges for Conference on Athletics. That committee comprises John E. Farrell of Providence College, chairman; A. W. Marsh of Amherst and Dr. Frederick W. Marvel of Brown. The committee has worked through a period of years to bring the idea to its present status.

During the 1936 season, a temporary set-up was established so that the committee would have data on which to work this year. A tentative list was made out, and colleges were asked to make a report on the proficiency of the work of the officials. Many of the colleges co-operated and now the committee has taken that data and used it as a basis for making out the present approved list.

OFFICIALS TO BE GRADED

Farrell, the prime mover for this approved list, will check on the work of the officials. His post, assumed voluntarily, is under appointment of the Association of New England Colleges. Farrell will send out a block of cards to each athletic director, and those cards in turn will be returned to him with data for compilation in extending the list.

Officials will be graded on a 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1 basis, according to whether their work was excellent, good, fair, unsatisfactory, or incompetent. The designation of the place the official worked will be made, his rating given, and that card signed by the coach and athletic director.
