




### Egan Resigns as Coach of Friars

John J. Egan, Providence College baseball coach for the past three seasons, today handed in his resignation and Arth/ir Lincoln Quirk, member of the college faculty, was immediately named his successor by Rev. Robert G. Quinn, O. P., faculty director of athletics.

Egan, who has been scouting during the summer for the Boston Red Sox, will now take over that work as a full-time job, starting on a tour through the "ivory" country April 1.

Appointment of Quirk means that the Friars for the first time in their baseball history will be operating under a graduate coach, since the new mentor received his degree from the college in 1930. Quirk was pitcher under the late Jack Flynn, Egan's predecessor in the coaching chair.

Quirk is 30 years old, one of the youngest college coaches in the country. He graduated from Classical high in this city in 1926 after starring as a pitching there.

Following his graduation from Providence College Quirk was signed by the Boston Red Sox. The same day he received his Red Sox contract he was notified that he had been awarded a Knights of Columbus scholarship to Catholic University.

The Red Sox shipped him to Pittsfield in the Eastern League and when that team disbanded he went to the Cape Cod League.

Quirk entered Catholic University in the fall of 1930 and received degrees of master of science and doctor of philosophy during the course which he completed in 1934. He is at present head of the department of physics and associate professor of mathematics at Providence College.

Quirk is married to the former Miss Lucy Fogarty of this city and lives at 388 River avenue, this city. He has one son.

In addition to playing baseball at Providence College and at Classical, Quirk also starred in local sandlot baseball. He featured for the Mount Carmel team in the Independent Amateur League in 1926, winning 10 games and losing only two.

Egan, former pro league pitcher, major league umpire and successful minor league manager, was named to succeed Flynn on March 28, 1935, shortly after Flynn's untimely death.

His managerial career began in 1915 when he took over the reir of the Providence club. He handled the Providence team in the International League in 1916 and 1917, was head man at Milwaukee in the American Association from 1918 to 1921, piloted Oklahoma City in 1922, was in charge at Scranton from 1924 to 1926 and made his fadeout as a manager with Newark in 1927.

During his career as a manager Egan developed many fine players and sent them up to the big leagues. Among them were Joe Hauser, Oscar Melillo, Alex Gaston, Doug Mc-Weeny, Denny Gearin of this city and Cranston's Jimmy Cooney. His career at P. C., also was marked by success.

### Friar Baseball Candidates Have First Outdoor Workout

Providence College's first varsity paseball practice of 1938 blossomed under a mid-summer-like sun yesterday on Hendricken Field where 25 candidates went through the initial warm-up work under the direction of Coach Arthur L. Quirk, the Friars' new baseball mentor.

As might be expected on the first day, batterymen were in prepondance, there being 11 pitchers and four catchers among the 25 candidates. The other players, headed by Capt. John "Wink" Crowley, comprised seven infielders and three outfielders. One or two players are capable of holding more than one position and their futures will depend upon the way the squad develops between now and the first game on April 21.

A large number of men who will figure in the first string lineup or first-line reserve corps were absent yesterday, most of them being excused for week-ends with their fam-

Coach Quirk had his pitchers in action for the equivalent of several innings with the four catchers alternating in receiving. Bill Spinnler, the Friars' peppery little catcher, nicked his thumb on a foul tip in the practice, but is expected to be back on the job in a day or two.

Some of the pitchers in action yesterday were: Dan McKinnon, Pawtucket senior; Joe Kwasniewski, last year's Freshman hurling star from New Milford, Conn.; Jim Padden, former La Salle pitcher from Fall River and Jim Begley, a Freshman mainstay last year who comes from Brighton, Mass.

The catchers who worked were: Big Elt Deuse, Fall River senior and veteran backstop; Bill Spinnler of Paterson, N. J.; Hal Martin of Greenville, not so long ago an amateur league hitting star, and Howie Irish from last year's freshman squad.





### COLLEGE BASEBALL HEADS FAVOR SPEEDING UP GAME



#### New England Leaders Send List of Recommendations Along with Names Approved Officials

#### BY JOE NUTTER

The new list of baseball umpires for college games as approved by the Baseball Committee of the Association of New England Colleges for Conference on Athletics has been prepared and is being sent to the colleges. The committee, of which John E. Farrell, Graduate Manager of Providence College, is the head, has enlarged its list to include Class A and reserve groupings, and has listed a series of recommendations for the improvement of college baseball in New England, The recommendations have been made by the various umpires and officials as a result of a study of New England college base-

Most of the suggestions have to do with the delays that stretch many college games beyond all reasonable limits, and to that end should be worth careful study by not only the college officials, but the men who play the game as well. Graduate Manager Farrell's committee asks only that the athletic directors and baseball coaches consider the suggestions.

#### KEEP CIVILIANS

OFF BENCH

Recommendations:

I. Allow only one man in civilian's clothes, other than coach, on the players' bench during a

2. Restrain pitchers from throwing more than three warm-

up balls each inning.

3. When a substitute catcher gives the pitcher a preliminary warm-up between innings, allowing five or six pitched balls, the regular catcher should not be allowed an additional time for five or six more pitches. This delays the game too much, and could easily be avoided.

4. Have the umpires rub the balls with dust before the game.

5. Have umpire throw new ball direct to the pitcher after each foul, and thus eliminate much tossing about of the ball.

6. Allow umpires to quiet substitutes on the bench who become too abusive of opponents and officials.

7. Start games on time!

8. Umpires hesitate to ask coaches to speed up a game for fear the suggestion may be misinterpreted that the umpire wishes to get away early.

9. Cut out the unnecessary conferences by players after an

error or a walk.

10. Coaches should encourage a spirit of hustle on the field . . . . have players run to and from positions instead of loafing and delaying as they do.

11. Have pitchers take their signals on the rubber, instead of standing five or six feet in back of the box.

12. Instruct pitchers on the balk rule . . . and don't allow them to take so much time between pitches.

13. Coaches should instruct players to pick out a bat in time, and to be ready to go to the plate when their turn comes. Too many boys dally about and delay the game. Have a circle for the next batter, as in professional baseball,

14. Try and have as few ground rules as possible . . . and have them typed and given to the visiting team prior to the start of the game, or else have them posted at the players' bench. This will eliminate many unnecessary mid-game discussions.

The enlarged list has been built up from the group of 46 men who were on the list a year ago. Men on either list are eligible for college games, the reserve listing merely indicating that those men did not handle as many college games as the Class A men a year ago. It is the hope of the committee that men from both lists will be used this spring, Class A for varsity games and Reserve List for freshman games.

### Joe Kwasniewski Yields Seven Hits In Varsity Bow


Dominicans Collect 17 Hits at Brooklyn; P. C. Scores Four Runs in First.

(Special to the Providence Journal) Brooklyn, April 21.—Exhibiting mid-season form although it was the opening game of the season for the invaders, Providence College maintained its jinx over St. John's University by whitewashing the Redmen here today, 8 to 0. Joe Kwasniewski, a sophomore right-hander, making his debut in varsity competition, stood up like a seasoned campaigner, having complete mastery over the Brooklyn combination. Although he was touched for seven hits, Joe kept the safeties well scattered, the Redmen only threatening in two frames.

While Kwasniewski was holding the Redmen at bay his mates combed the combined offerings of Frank Weynand, a southpaw, Eddie Shea and Irving Prince. right-handers, for 17 hits, all of which were singles save Leo Fischer's double. Weynand started the mound chores for St. John's and failed to survive the first inning when the Friars, making their first start under their new coach, Arthur Quirk, collected four hits and four runs. ### DOMINICANS GAIN 16 TO 11 VICTORY

Bobinski Paces P. C. Attack; Friars Push Across Seven Runs in Eighth Frame.

New York, N. Y., April 23. — A powerful Providence College nine tallied 10 runs in the final three innings at Lewisohn Stadium today and handed the City College team a 16-11 beating and thereby registered its second victory of the metropolitan invasion. The loss was the Beavers' sixth of the season.

Ed Bobinski, lanky Friar centre fielder, paced the attack with four hits which included a triple, double and two singles. Jim Padden, starting Providence hurler, was driven from the mound in the third after yielding four runs on five hits. Paul Ryan, winning pitcher, gave up the remaining seven runs.

Providence jumped on three City College pitchers for 19 hits, 14 of which were for extra bases. Bill Moge, Friar third baseman, was ejected from the game in the seventh for disputing Umpire Meehan's decision on a called strike.

The Friars got to Schwartz in the opening frame and drove him to the showers. Jack Ayvazian, first batter up, doubled and scored on Jack Crowley's two-bagger. Bill Moge grounded out, but Hal Martin doubled, scoring Crowley and Leo Ploski singled, sending in Martin. Auerbach replaced Schwartz on the mound for City and walked Ed Bobinski. Fischer came through with the fourth two-bagger, driving in Ploski and Bobinski. Elton Deuse and Padden grounded out, ending the inning.

Mike Grieco, first Beaver batsman to face Padden, singled but the next three were easy outs. Providence went out in order in the second. The homesters got to Padden after two were out in the second and collected four runs. Friedman walked and scored on Monitto's double. Auerbach reached first on Ayvazian's bobble. Grieco socked his second single into centre scoring Monitto, and Auerbach scored when Ploski lost Weintraub's loft in the sun in short right, Grieco romped home on Janowitz's bingle.

Bobinski doubled in the third but was stranded. City drove Padden from the box in their half and took the lead with three runs. Meister walked and Ryan replaced Padden. After Clancy struck out, Friedman was passed and Monitto reached first on Ayvazian error filling the bases. Auerbach's double scored Meister and Friedman and Grieco's sacrifice bunt pushed Monitto across.

The Friars picked up a run in the fifth on successive doubles by Fischer and Deuse. The Beavers came back with two, on a walk to Monitto, Grieco's third hit, a pass to Weintraub filling the bases and Jano-

witz's single, making the score 9 to

6 in City's favor.

Providence tied it up in the seventh on Bobinski's single, Deuse's double and subsequent theft of home, and a pass to Ayvazian and Crowley's double. The Friars clinched the game in the eighth with a seven run barrage resulting from six hits.



## Friars Shell Three Bates Pitchers In Winning 16-3

Leo Ploski Leads 13-Hit Barrage as P. C. Nine Marks Up Third Straight.

Providence College scored so many runs in the early innings of its game with Bates at Hendricken Field yesterday that competition was halted after the visitors had batted in the seventh. In winning, 16 to 3, the Friars scored their third straight victory.

After Stan Bergeron had hit a tworun homer in the first, it appeared Providence had a battle on its hands, but the visitors lacked pitching strength. The Friars got back those two runs and four to spare their first time up, and there was no question as to the outcome thereafter.

Providence scored three runs in both the second and third innings, and two more in each the fifth and sixth for good measure. The Garnets tallied their third and last run in the seventh.

Sophomore Anthony Scavatto pitched a steady game for Providence in making his varsity debut, limiting the Garnets to four hits while coasting to victory. He was practically invincible from the second to the sixth innings.



### RIARS EDGE RAMS, 2 TO 1

### Friars Do Scoring In First Inning To Clinch Contest

Two Passes and Error Figure in Rams' Only Run Which Comes in Third.

Providence College's varsity base-ball team assumed first place in the intra-state college championship standing by shading R. I. State, 2-1, yesterday at Kingston before about 800 spectators. The victory, second for the Friars' ranking pitcher, Joe Kwasniewski, 19-year-old New Milford, Conn., sophomore, was the fourth for the unbeaten Providence

All the damage was done in the first inning when Providence scored twice. Johnny Ayvazian, Friar shortstop and first batter, lined a double into centre field. Capt. Johnny "Wink" Crowley, agile P. C. left fielder, was safe at first when Don Graham, State third baseman, delayed throwing the ball to Bill Butler on Crowley's roller, in an effort to keep Ayvazian on second.

Bill Moge, Friars' third sacker, grounded out to Chet Jaworski, sending Crowley to second. Butler immediately threw to Duranleau to keep Ayvazian on third and the Rams' catcher, judging he had a change to pick off the P. C. shortstop at third, rifled the ball, but Graham was not set. The throw went into left field. Ayvazian scampered home


and Crowley went to third.

Hal Martin, P. C. right fielder, dropped a sacrifice bunt, a slow roller to Hines. The Rams' pitcher, with his back to Crowley, tossed to Butler at first and the Friar captain crossed the plate at a trot standing up. Ploski struck out to end the

Graham, Jaworski and Hollings-worth flied out to the outfield in State's half of the first. In the Rams' half of the second Kwasniewski started well by fanning Fay, State clean-up man, Butler grounded out to Ploski. Duranleau singled for State's first hit, Moge making a short, hopping throw to Fischer that got away from the Friar first baseman and permitted Duranleau to go to second. However, Potter rolled out to Kwasniewski.

Fay rapped a sharp grounder to Ayvazian's right and, though the latter raced over and tossed to Ploski for an attempted force-out on Hollingsworth, he was too late. Graham scored on the play and the bases were still loaded. All were left stranded as Butler was called out on strikes.

Successive singles in the fourth put two Rams on base, but a scoring punch did not materialize. In the next four innings, State was retired in order. It had the stage set for what might have been the winning or at least tying score in the ninth.

Butler grounded out to Ploski in this frame. One of Kwasniewski's "hoppers" hit Duranleau in the shoulder and he took first, rubbing out the sting as he trotted. Coach Frank Keaney sent Cliff Pace to the plate to pinch hit for Potter and Pace rapped a single through short, sending Duranleau to second. Albanese, a dangerous hitter, then lined a sharp drive toward right field.


Ploski leaped, hauled the ball down and doubled Pace off first to end the

The Friars were in scoring position in the third, fourth and seventh. Kwasniewski's scratch single and a pass to Moge set the stage in the third, but produced nothing. In the fourth singles by Ploski and Bobinski availed no more as Butler killed off Ploski at the plate on a double play started by Hines on Fischer's roller to the box.

Deuse singled to left in the seventh but was forced out at second on Kwasniewski's grounder to Hines. Ayvazian lifted to Hollingsworth, but Crowley was safe on a loft to right as Albanese and Hollingsworth collided while trying to haul down the high riser. Kwasniewski went to second and advanced one more base, along with Crowley, when one of Hines's low ones eluded Duranleau. Moge struck out.

Although Fischer walked at the start of the ninth, the next three Friars were retired.

Kwasniewski turned in a fine performance in his first start against the Friars' keenest rivals. Cold weather with just a bit of sunshine during the earlier innings was not conducive to good pitching, and it took both pitchers a couple of innings before they hit their stride.



Hines allowed seven hits but was in trouble of his own making only in the fourth and then his mates killed that threat with a double play. The Friars' two runs came on a combination of heads-up play and two costly lapses by the Rams. Kwasniewski got himself into trouble in the third and ninth, hauled himself out of a tight situation in the third and was saved by Ploski in the final frame.

Fielding features by the Friars were turned in by Ayvazian on Jaworski's sharp grass-cutter in the eighth and by Ploski in the ninth-inning double killing. For the Rams, Jaworski sparkled in handling Martin's "hopper" in the fifth and Fay speared Bobinski's hot liner with one hand in the eighth, bringing applause from both stands.

As Joe Kwasniewski said to George Hines after the game, "It was a tough one to lose!" The teams meet again at Hendricken Field on Memorial Day.

T. Casey Moher, senior, pitching his first varsity game, realized the ambition of all Providence College pitchers at Hendricken Field yesterday when he twirled the Friars to a 10 to 3 victory over Holy Cross before 2500.

Drama was enacted as Moher, with one thrust, wiped out the bitter memories of two years of futile effort to get his name into a varsity box score.

As a Freshman he started one game, but he lasted only two innings. He sat on the bench ever since waiting for his day to arrive. Yesterday he achieved his crowning effort with as popular a victory a Friar pitcher has scored in years.

Jubilantly watching Moher uncork winning pitches was Coach Artie Quirk, who in his own college days travelled a road similar to that over which Moher struggled.

Eight years ago the late Jack Flynn called on Quirk, who previously had never started a game, to pitch against Holy Cross. Quirk stopped the Crusaders, just as the man he gambled on yesterday did.

Moher gave up nine hits, but with the exception of the fifth inning when the Crusaders scored all three of their runs, he kept the bingles fairly well scattered. Two sparkling double plays, both started by Third Baseman Bill Moge, were helpful in the fourth and fifth innings. Gameplayed:


If Devaney is unable to start, there is a possibility Coach Jack Kelleher may call on Sophomore Ray McCulloch, who twirled against Dartmouth Wednesday.

Brown's catcher also will not be determined until game time, the nomination lying between Floyd Hinckley and Bob Bush.

Coach Artie Quirk of the Friars will stand pat on the team which conquered Holy Cross. The Friars turned in as an efficient performance as any Rhode Island college nine has shown in years while upsetting the Crusaders, their infield, especially, functioning smoothly. Ploski and Ayvazian form an excellent keystone combination. Moge is playing the best game of his career, Sophomore Ayvazian already is being hailed as the best Friar shortstop of all time and Fischer is fielding with the class that recalls the feats of Oscar Perrin, member of the 1930 and '31 nines.

Both the Bears and the Friars pack their heaviest offensive punch in years, and some extra base hitting may be in order today. The Friars boast of a team hitting average above .375.

In view of the excellent records each has compiled and the interest they have aroused in college baseball, one of the largest crowds to watch them perform in years is expected.

# HIGH-FLYING FRIARS MAKE BROWN 6TH VICTIM, 7 TO 1; Kwasniewski Shuts Bears

Kwasniewski Shuts Bears Off with Five Safe Hits

Mowry's Relief Pitching Lone
Bright Spot for Bruin
Nine.

Providence College solidified its position atop the Eastern college baseball heap by defeating Brown, 7 to 1, before 2500 at Aldrich Field yesterday. The victory was the sixth for the unbeaten Friars, who also moved a step nearer the city and State championships.

The Friars, gaining prestige with every game, turned in another efficient all-round performance while their ace Sophomore pitcher, Joe Kwasniewski, twirled a five-hit game to score his third triumph.

Kwasniewski's hurling far overshadowed all other developments. The one run the Bears scored off him in the sixth was unearned, and only on one other occasion did he allow a Bruin to reach third base.

It was rough going for the Bears from the start, and after they missed capitalizing their best scoring opportunity in the second, when they placed two on base, there was no doubt as to the outcome.

The one bright spot in their defeat was the pitching of Sophomore Emerson Mowry, who succeeded Don Eccleston with two out in the sixth and held the opposition hitless and scoreless the three and one-third innings he worked.

Mowry took the mound with the bases loaded, but forced Ed Bobinski, batting for the second time in this inning, to hit a weak grounder to Shortstop Bob Brokaw, who forced out Leo Plo ki at second.

The Friars collected nine hits, including a triple by Kwasniewski and a double by Pobinski, off Eccleston, who pitched far below the standard he flashed against Holy Cross last Saturday.

Providence did its most effective hitting in the sixth, collecting four, including its two extra base clouts, to score the four runs which definite-

ly clinched the verdict.

Ten Friars batted in this inning, the drive starting with Bobinski's double. Leo Fischer followed with a single, and after Elt Deuse fanned, Kwasniewski banged a line drive to left field for a triple, scoring Bobinski and Fischer. Kwasniewski tallied the third run on Johnny Ayvazian's fly to centre field. Crowley, who walked, and Brochu, who singled, started a double steal, and Catcher Floyd Hinckley, in an attempt to catch Crowley, threw wild to third, enabling Crowley to score and Brochu to take third.

Eccleston walked Harold Martin and Leo Ploski (this was the third straight walk Polski drew) to fill the bases. Mowry replaced Eccleston at this point, stopping the scoring parade.

The Friars scored in three of the first four innings. The Bruin defence, none too steady through the entire game, wavered at the outset when Third Baseman Ed Pietrusza made a two-base error on Ayvazian's grounder, throwing over First Baseman Ken Wright's head. Ayvazian, however, was put out trying to make third on the play, Wright to Pietrusza. Crowley then singled, raced to second on Don Brochu's sacrifice and scored on Harold Martin's single.

Brooklyn Gains 11-Run Margin Before Providence Club Starts Scoring.



St. John's University of Brook-lyn, a team Providence College's baseball warriors had conquered, 8-0, earlier in the season, ended the Friars' victory string yesterday, 14-10, in a seven-inning game before 1500 at Hendricken Field. The triumph gives the Redmen a record of nine victories, three losses and one tie, the latter a 17-inning, 2-2, affair with N. Y. U. Providence has won six of seven games.

Where St. John's players were apparently keyed up by their 5-4 victory over Harvard on Saturday, Providence just as apparently let down after their 7-1 victory over Brown. It was a spiritless Providence team meeting a confident St. John's team, and confidence won. Of course, there were other factors, as

might be guessed.

Pitcher Paul Ryan of the Friars was charged with 10 hits in 31-3 innings. He left the game at that point and Jim Padden went the rest of the way, giving six hits. Half the 10 hits made off Ryan might have been turned into outs by alert fielding, but the Friars did not hit the smooth stride afield that has marked their other contests, until late in the game. Ryan's hard work availed little at times.



The Redmen enjoyed a lead of 11-0 going into the last of the fifth. Then Providence, held to two scratch hits in the first four innings by Larry Shea, 'ved the Redmen's starting hurle or five hits, one of them an infield bingle by Capt. "Wink" Crowley and another a double by Padden. The Friars made five runs in that frame.

With two out on strikeouts in the sixth, a pass to Ayvazian, Crowley's second infield hit and Brochu's single to left provided another Friar run. That made the count 11 to 6 in St. John's favor. Providence was beginning to hit for runs and St. John's had been held scoreless in the sixth.

But the Redmen gained their share of the plunder in the "lucky seventh". A single and a walk put De Stefano and Zenir on base and Ferrara scored De Stefano with a sharp single to right. Martin threw the ball to Ploski and the latter whipped it home in a late effort to cut off the first run. Ferrara started down to second and Deuse pegged to Ayva-zian covering that base, but Ferrara was safe. Zenir had moved off third in a double steal with Ferrara. Zenir scored. Ayvazian's throw back to Deuse was unavailing and the latter misjudged the ball, allowing Ferrara to gain third. Then Ferrara started off third at the beginning of Padden's wind-up and topped the Redmen's rally by stealing home for their third run of the inning.

Providence was hitting for runs now. Ploski, Fischer and Bobinski cracked singles in order in the seventh and all scored on Deuse's three-base drive to the left centre fence. Larry Shea gave way to Tom Ananicz, St. John's lanky southpaw, with Deuse on third, three runs in and none out. Padden and Ayvazian leaned into two pitches, but grounded out, and Crowley lifted to the second baseman to end the game, the 6 o'clock Sunday law taking effect then and there.

St. John's staged a four-run marathon in the second with five singles and the aid of two walks and a passed ball. It treated itself handsomely in the fourth with a five-run parade on five hits (one of them Bill Conlon's one-run triple), a sacrifice and two errors. In the fifth, it had three men on base through two passes and a single and Polzer doubled to deep centre to score two runs. An Ayvazian to Ploski to Fischer double play stopped that rally.

A sad note during the game was the passing of John P. Dooley of Providence, a well-known employe of the Outlet Company, who was stricken fatally just after the end of the sixth inning. Several minutes of complete silence was the crowd's

tribute to the deceased.





## Leo Fischer's Home Run Clinches Game for Friars

Victory Is Second of Season

Over Bruins and Eighth in

10 Starts for P. C.

Providence College hit the victory trail again by blanking Brown, 4 to 0, at Hendricken Field yesterday in a game featured by Leo Fischer's three-run homer over the right field fence. In beating the Bears a second time for their eighth victory in 10 starts, the Friars clinched the city college championship and assured themselves of at least a tie for the State title.

Neither team had scored until Fischer made his circuit hit with two strikes on him in the fourth. Fischer had cleared the fence on the previous pitch, but the ball sailed in foul territory. His homer, in itself, was sufficient to win in view of the subsequent proceedings, but the Friars tallied another run in the fifth for good measure.

Providence's unbeaten Sophomore righthander, Joe Kwasniewski, turned in another brilliant performance in scoring his fourth victory, two of which have been registered over the Bears. He allowed only one Bruin to reach base in the first four innings and only once was he in serious trouble.

The Bears nicked him for two successive hits in the fifth, but two were out and he succeeded in quelling this threat without yielding a run. He allowed six hits in all, fanned a similar number and walked one. In the four games he has twirled, Kwasniewski has allowed only 22 hits.

With the exception of giving Fischer too good a pitch in the fourth, Vin Devaney, twirling his first full game since he defeated Holy Cross on April 19, pitched a steady game. He allowed only six hits and fanned four. Providence's run in the fifth was unearned.

The Friars, whose defence crumbled in their previous two games, played errorless ball. Brown's make-shift infield was erratic at times, but in the main, its play was as satisfactory as could be expected under the conditions.

Devaney had a winning pitch each time the Friars threatened in the first three innings. Providence had the bases loaded with two out in the first, but the Bruin right-hander fanned Ed Bobinski to nip the threat. Again in the third, the Friars had a man on with one out, but Devaney easily retired the next two batters.

An error by Danny Hicks, playing third base for the first time, on Ploski's grounder started Providence on its three-run drive in the fourth. Bobinski walked and Fischer then hit his homer. Johnny Ayvazian singled after the previous two batters had flied out, but an accurate peg by Catcher Floyd Hinckley caught him attempting to steal second, preventing any further Friar scoring.

Sophomore Dave Redford, starting his first varsity game, was the only Bruin to reach base in the first four innings. He singled to right in the second, reached second on Capt. Paul Welch's sacrifice, but was left stranded there.

In the fifth, however, Ken Wright and Hinckley singled with two out and Devaney walked to fill the bases, but the Bruin scoring bid was halted when Devaney was forced out at second, Leo Ploski to Ayvazian, on Brokaw's grounder. Brokaw connected solidly, and it appeared his drive would be good for at least a single, but the ball bounced into the hands of the speeding Ploski and his throw easily beat Devaney.

Hicks' wild throw to first on Bill Moge's grounder, giving the Friar two bases, paved the way for Providence's fourth run. Moge scored on Ploski's scratch double to left field. Brokaw made a brave attempt to make a running catch of Ploski's hit, but he juggled the ball and finally dropped it. It appeared Left Fielder Welch had a better chance to make the catch but Welch halted his attempt after seeing Brokaw racing for the ball.



### Cross Blanks Friars, 3-0, To Even Annual Series

"Lefty" Lefebvre, Pawtucket, Hurls Three-Hit, 10 Strikeout Ball for Winners.

Worcester, Mass., May 21.—Holy Cross upheld the tradition of the last eight annual Friar-Crusader homeand-home baseball series by defeating Providence College, 3-0, at Fitton Field today to gain an even division of the honors. Since 1930 the teams have divided their regularly-scheduled double-meeting, and the 3000 fans who sat in at today's encounter saw a fast and oftentimes exciting contest.

It took a Rhode Island boy, Wilfred "Lefty" Lefebvre of Pawtucket, at his best, to stop the Friars—and did he stop them! His "best" was a three-hit, 10-strikeout contribution. In most instances the Friars either whiffed at his curves or "golfed" them high into the air. It was the nearest thing to a hit-drought they have suffered this season. Only six Friars reached base.

Yet Casey Moher, conqueror of the Crusaders in Providence early in the month, allowed only six hits. Five bases on balls, three errors and inability to put over any strikeouts tell the story of his failure to repeat his first conquest.


Lefebvre enjoys the same status on the Holy Cross hurling staff as undefeated Joe Kwasniewski, Friar sophomore pitcher. The Pawtucket boy has won six, saved one in a relief role and is unbeaten. He has now hurled 53 innings, and allowed only four earned runs.

In the first three innings Lefebvre struck out half of the 10 men who faced him. Only Bill Moge hit safely, a single in the opening stanza. In the third Lefebvre mowed down each of the three players who came to bat, Deuse, Moher and Ayvazian. In six of the nine innings Providence was retired in order.

For five innings only 16 Friars managed to gain a turn at bat—that's one more than the minimum! In the sixth the Friars filled the bases with the aid of an intentional walk to Moge.

With two away and Ayvazian on first on a fielder's choice whereby Moher, who had singled, was forced at second, Capt. Johnny Crowley lined a double into left centre. Coach Arthur Quirk sent Bob "Red" Gendron, reserve outfielder, in as a pinch hitter for Martin. Lefebvre had two strikes on Gendron and then the batter proceeded to foul off five pitches and in between Lefebvre tossed three balls to manufacture the count of 3-2. Then Lefebvre curved a perfect strike over the plate and Gendron went down swinging.

Holy Cross went down in order in the first, second and eighth. Capt. Crowley raced into the sun to pull down Brucato's high lift for the third out in the first inning. He was the busiest outfielder of the game, with four putouts, all well handled.

In the third Ouellette walked and went to second when Moher tossed Tassinari's sacrifice roller into short centre, trying to force out Ouellette. Then Lefebvre laid down a sacrifice bunt toward third base, and Moher threw out Ouellette to Moge. 

# FRIARS CONQUER RAMS, 14 TO 6, IN LOOSE TILT

Kwasniewski Outhurls Hines;
P. C. Freshmen Win

Providence College proved beyond all doubt its right to the State college baseball championship when it conquered Rhode Island State, 14 to 6, before 2500 at Hendricken Field yesterday.

The victory gave the Friars, who had clinched the title before yesterday's battle, an unblemished record in the title series and a season's record of 11 victories in 14 starts.

Their play afield wasn't up to par, but they packed a batting punch, nicking George Hines for 13 hits, two of which were three-run homers over the right field fence by Harold Martin and Elt Deuse. The latter also banged a double and Johnny Ayvazian hit a triple.

The Rams collected 12 hits off Joe Kwasniewski, more than any other team has made off him this season, but the unbeaten Friar sophomore ace had the situation pretty well in hand after a rocky start.


In beating the Rams a second time, Kwasniewski ended his first varsity campaign with six victories.

The game had many rough spots from the technical viewpoint, but it also had its bits of action—real action that included a fist fight between Bill Moge of the Friars and Bob Albanese, that nearly developed into a free-for-all, and a bitter protest by the Rams over Deuse's home run clout, which they maintained sailed in foul territory.

The Freshman game, first of the twin-bill and won by Providence College, 1 to 0, was better played. This contest developed into a pitchers' duel between Ambrose Reynolds and Warner Keaney, each allowing six hits. It will be Capt. Elt Deuse when the Providence College baseball team opens activities next season.

The Fall River catcher and junior, a popular man in his home city and on the Friar campus, was elected to lead the 1939 P. C. team by lettermen last week and yesterday was approved by the faculty athletic council.

His full name is Joseph Elton Deuse but all six feet, four inches of him insists that we call him Elt Deuse in baseball matters. He usually dwarfs both batter and umpire at the plate. Despite the fact that pitchers have more leeway with a batter of his height he turned in a .333 average the past season.

He worked in 13 full games for the Friars during the campaign recently completed and part of the Bates contest which the Friars won, 16-3. Much of the success of the team depended upon him and he came through with the necessary heads-up play. His fielding average was .945. Time and again he cut off attempted steals with rifle pegs that beat the runner by the oft-mentioned "mile."

During the rest of the baseball season the new Friar captain plans to play with Sherbrooke in a Canadian amateur league. He was with the Burlington Cardinals of Vermont in the Northern League last year and was selected along with Mike Garbark of Villanova on several all-star teams named by newsmen.

Deuse made his first impression in the sport world when he was an athlete at Durfee high in Fall River. During the vacation periods he played amateur league ball there and showed all the promise of becoming a first class catcher. He has shown improvement with every season at Providence College and appears headed for a career in his favorite sport.

I State, 14 to 6, and wrote into the records a list of 11 victories in 14 games.

Providence won the State and City collegiate crowns with straight victories over R. I. State and Brown

in home and home games.

The Friais are n' claiming any New England record this year but once again they are proud of their work. In 11 games with New England rivals they have defeated nine of them and bowed to two. Victories have been registered over Holy Cross. R. I. State twice, Brown twice, Yale, Boston College, New Hamp-shire and Bates while losses have beer suffered at the hands of Dartmouth, 10-8, and Holy Cross, 3-0.

A Providence College team that boasted senior material in six positions, junior material in one and strong sophomore material in the others, came through close to form and that is more than lecent P. C. teams have been able to do. We're not censuring past teams, just singing the praiser of the 1938 aggrega-

At the start of the season the Providence team faced a schedule of 18 games. Rain forced cancellation of

games. Rain forced cancellation of four contests, two with Villanova, one with Lowell Textile and one with Boston College.

One of the outstanding developments of the season was the undefeated string turned in by Pitcher Joe Kwasniewski, New Milford, Conn.; sophomore, who won all six of the games he started. In 54 innings he allowed 43 hits, effected 28 strikeouts, walked 15, had three wild. strikeouts, walked 15, had three wild

pitches and hit three.

Another feature was the vast improvement of Leo Ploski, Albany, N. Y., senior, who was moved from shortstop to second base. Ploski topped the 14-game performers with a batting average of .346 and had a better fielding average 11 ar many expected, a figure of .900. His form ear ago indicated no such result. Bobinski, centre fielder, was

another player who had his best season for the Friars in his final college year. He compiled a batting average of .340 and had only one er-He compiled a batting ror in 28 chances. Ranking close to the above two for improvement was Elt Deuse, regular catcher. Deuse turned in an average at bat of 333 and a much improved fielding figure of .945. He was a junior this year and should be at his collegiate peak a year hence.

Providence had six player: better than .300 averages and the regular pitcher also topped the .300 mark. Ranking next to Kwasniewski was Anthony Scavotto, Thompsonville, Conn., sophomore, who won three games and turned in a capable relief stint against Holy Cross, These two Connecticut boys, juniors next year, will be the backbone of the Friar pitching staff and it looks as if another Nutmegger, Ambie Reynolds of the Friar Freshmen will be up with the leaders in 1939.
