# CROTTY CHOSEN HEAD

## COACH OF FRIARS

### IN BASKETBALL

#### Assistant Football Mentor Will Succeed McClellan

Latter's Resignation Tendered  
After 11 Years; Former  
Played Under Keogan.

Edward J. Crotty, assistant coach in football at Providence College, will be the head coach of basketball, it was disclosed last night by Rev. Robert G. Quinn, O. P., director of athletics at the college. He will continue as aid to Head Coach Hugh Devore in football and coach freshman basketball as well.

Almost simultaneous with that announcement came a report from Salem, Mass., that Albert (General) McClellan, for 11 years Friar court coach, had announced his resignation.

Crotty, a graduate of Notre Dame in 1937, played basketball and football for the Fighting Irish and had the additional advantage of coaching a full season under the direction of George Keogan, the celebrated mentor of Irish court teams, as well as taking a course in Keogan's coaching school.

Impressed by Crotty's aptitude for coaching, Keogan gave him charge of one of the Hall teams in the intramural league and the new Friar mentor directed them to the championship. Last season he divided his time between Danbury (Conn.) high school and the Danbury Teachers College, helping in basketball at both institutions, both of which had highly successful seasons.

Crotty has specialized in physical education and the superb condition of the Friars football players is largely attributable to his supervision and course in training. He is a close and shrewd student of sports, an excellent trainer and enjoys tremendous popularity at Providence College among faculty and student body alike.

At Notre Dame he was an end in football and a forward in basketball. Gid Roy, Danbury high coach, considers Crotty the best all-around athlete he ever developed there. Baseball was included among his athletic achievements and for four years he was Danbury's first baseman.

Negotiations for Crotty's service have been going on for several weeks or since Providence College authorities decided on a program that would enable them to maintain a coaching staff that would become more or less "permanent residents" of the campus.

The Friars will not play as pretentious a schedule this winter as they have been accustomed to, but will content themselves with 10 or 12 games. The college authorities are seeking better balance among the school's three major sports, football, basketball and baseball, and do not consider the time ripe for expansion just now.

McClellan, during his 11 years with the Friars, coached teams that won 140 out of 186 games. He said at Salem that he was dickering now with two other New England colleges for a position.

## CROTTY SUCCEEDS COACH M'CLELLAN ON FRIAR COURT

Salem, Mass., Oct. 21.—(P)—Albert (General) McClellan of Salem, basketball coach at Providence College for the past 11 years, yesterday said he had resigned because the college authorities had decided to emphasize football and curtail the basketball program.

McClellan said he would be forced to accept a 50 per cent salary reduction if he continued and predicted that he would be succeeded by one of Providence College's assistant football coaches.

"I have enjoyed the many contacts I made in Providence but, much as I would like to continue with the Friars, I am unable to do so for the salary reduction of half will not suffice for my needs, as I have had to commute every day from Salem to Providence," McClellan said.

## FRIARS IN FIRST HOOP WORKOUT

Twenty-two Respond to Call  
of New Coach Crotty; Fast  
Breaking Attack Planned.

First call for candidates for the 1938-39 edition of the Providence College varsity basketball team drew 22 athletes to the opening workout under the direction of Coach Ed Crotty, the new court mentor, yesterday in Harkins Hall.

Two other basketball aspirants drew equipment yesterday and eight more are expected to turn out before many more practice sessions have passed, so that Coach Crotty will have 30-odd candidates to look over during the next few drills, wherein individual performances will indicate how many of them are to be kept on the squad.

"We'll work on fundamentals for several days," Crotty stated yesterday after practice.

"I plan to use a fast-breaking attack, with the players cutting a bit faster than they have in the past. We'll work the ball into scoring range with short passes and then trust to speedy passing and running to shake a man loose where he can take a shot at the basket."

\* \* \*

Providence College athletic authorities plan to place less emphasis on basketball this season while the new type of play is on trial. But basketball will have its rightful place in the school's sports calendar when the court team shows that it merits it.

Undertaking a new era in basketball, as they did the past few months in football, the Friars will lean toward the conservative side until their basketball reputation is such that a more liberal attitude is indicated. That's why only 10 or a dozen games will be played this season.

The court schedule is still in the process of formation but two December games already have been clinched. Assumption College of Worcester will open the home schedule at Harkins Hall on Dec. 8 and the Friars will meet Dartmouth in their annual clash at Hanover on Dec. 12.

Becker College of Worcester, which plans to enter a full-fledged varsity team in intercollegiate competition this year, may appear as a December opponent but that game is still pending. Home and home games with R. I. State and Springfield and the annual windup with Brown are certain features of the Providence schedule.

Crotty will have to build a new team, since he has only one regular from last season's starting quintet back for this campaign. That's Joe Kwasniewski, New Milford, Conn., Junior, who is an all-round star who figures to hold his post. Joe played right guard last year but can perform well at any position. He was third high scorer with 101 points last season.

Elt Deuse, giant centre, is another dependable. Jim Begley, a junior who has had plenty of experience in reserve roles, is expected to be well up in the battle for positions. Ralph Paparella and Bernard White, first-ranking reserves last season, are back.

# Fallon Lost To Friar Five For Game With Assumption

Standout Sophomore Crashes  
Into Staging as P. C.  
Has Final Drill.

Steve "Lefty" Fallon, Providence College sophomore and one of the leading candidates for a regular position on the Friar basketball team, was forced out of action for an indefinite period when he suffered a painful injury to his face while playing in a practice game at Harkins Hall yesterday.

Fallon crashed into the stage at one end of the court and the left side of his face struck against the edge of the stage. He was cut about the mouth, one of the cuts requiring a stitch. Dr. Edwin B. O'Reilly, student clinic physician at Providence College, attended Fallon.

Coach Ed Crotty sent his Varsity squad through a thorough drill yesterday. In the practice game the "Reds" held an early edge but the "Whites" came back and looked like the better team offensively in the late stages.

The "Reds" lined up as follows: Fallon and Speckman, guards; Sweeney, centre; Kusnitz and Sacks, forwards. The "Whites" comprised Murphy and Barnini, guards; Deuse, centre; Kwasniewski and Levey, forwards.

The Friars will start their 1938-39 schedule tomorrow night when they meet Assumption College of Worcester in Harkins Hall.

Providence College, with a new coach and a squad that is mainly inexperienced, inaugurates its basketball season tonight with Assumption College of Worcester offering the opposition. The game will be played in Harkins Hall, at the college, starting at 8:15 o'clock.

Ed Crotty, assistant football coach, makes his debut as a varsity head coach and has his charges in excellent condition for the fray. The squad has been hard at work for two weeks and is gradually organizing itself. No great deeds are expected of the basketeers, for, as mentioned before, the material is quite green.

Assumption, on the other hand, has the benefit of a game under its belt. The Flying Frenchmen opened with their Alumni last Saturday and handed them a thorough drubbing, with Tillie Frichette, a lean speedster, setting the scoring pace with 17 points, although playing only 10 minutes.

Willie Cyr, at guard, is another of Assumption's standouts and Gaudreau at centre is likely to cause plenty of trouble. Normand Cyr and Pelletier round out the starting quintet.

The Friars will open with Jack Levey and Joe Kwasniewski, forwards, Elt Deuse, centre, and Bill Murphy and Slip Barnini, guards. A second unit will have Bill Sacks and Ralph Paparella, forwards; Paul Sweeney or Jimmy Leo, centre; Harry Speckman and Sam Kusnitz, guards.

Providence College inaugurated a new season and a new system under a new coach last night and the results were generally satisfactory, the Friars defeating Assumption College of Worcester, 36 to 26, in a close guarding basketball game at Harkins Hall.

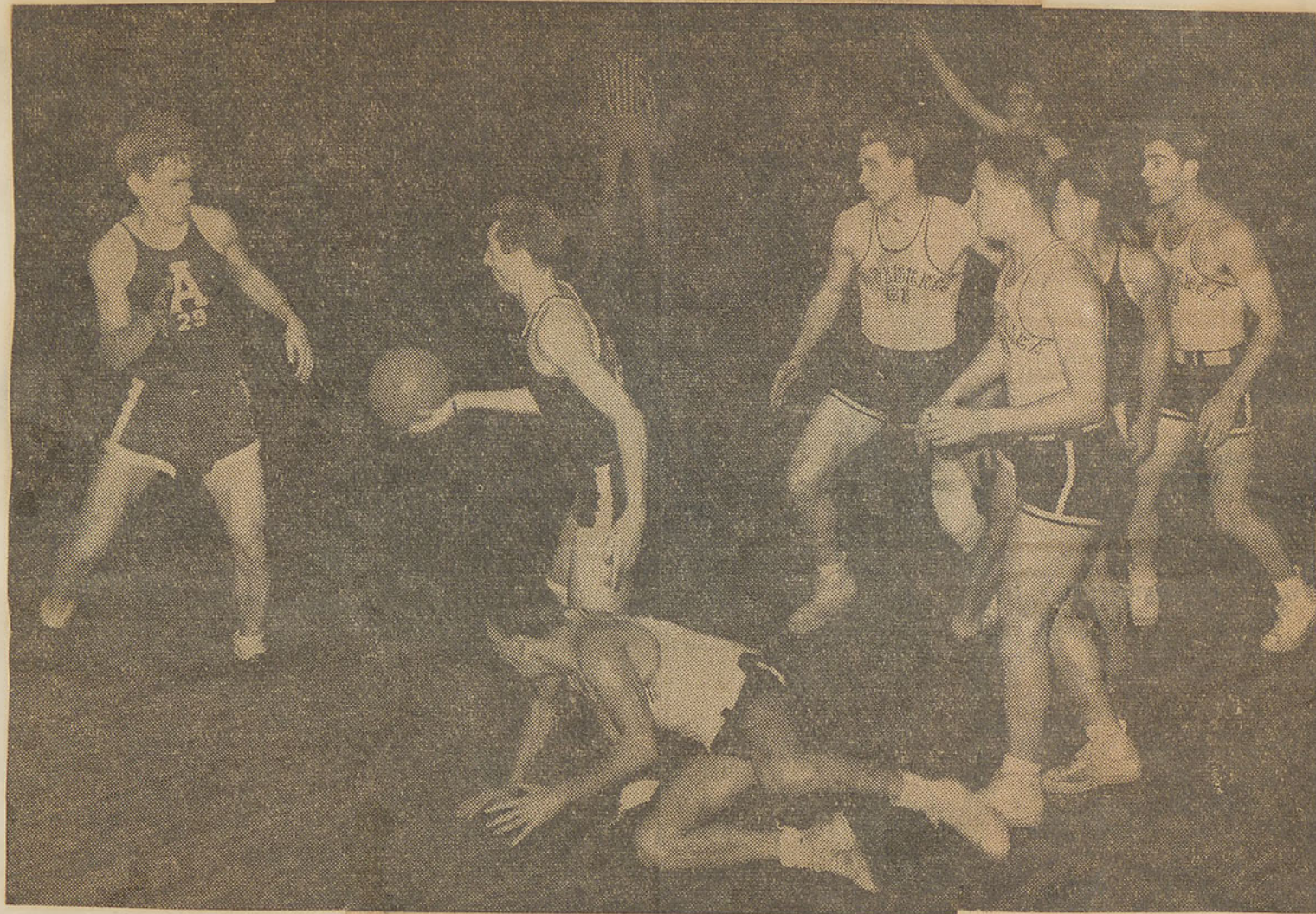
It was close all the way, the first half ending in an 18-18 deadlock, after the Friars had gained a 10-8 edge in the first period. Thereafter, however, the Friars' striving for team work paid dividends and throughout the last two periods they limited the speedy visitors to a pair of field goals. The Flying Frenchmen also added four free throws while Providence, intent upon polishing its co-operative efforts, picked up five field goals and six free flips.

Gaudreau of the visitors and Joe Kwasniewski of the Friars shared scoring honors with 10 apiece, Gaudreau getting three of his four field goals from 'way out yonder when the Friar defence refused to be split.

Kwasniewski, however, was having a bad night shooting from the floor, but from the charity stripe he clicked off eight in 10 attempts. Assumption didn't foul much, only eight being called, but, peculiarly enough, it was Kwasniewski of the dead eye who was the victim nearly every time. Only three other free throws were awarded the Friars and they converted on two.

The Friars were sailing along serenely during the second quarter, enjoying a six-point edge, when Gaudreau hit a hot streak, firing two in from the far pastures, and then dribbling through the whole of the home forces for a third. His three in a row brought about that 18-18 half-time deadlock.

Apparently Coach Ed Crotty pointed out the error of their ways to the Friars during the intermission, for when they returned they played much steadier ball, forcing the visitors to shoot from long range when they did shoot. Only Frichette and Gaudreau connected.

Meanwhile Elt Deuse scored twice, once when he tapped in a Barnini rebound; Barnini added two and Bill Murphy, the defensive star and playmaker, another on a long, set shot. Kwasniewski tallied one from the floor in addition to six from the free line.

Assumption had plenty of speed and fight, but the Friars were equal in those departments and had size in their favor, Murphy and Deuse being especially effective under the baskets. Jack Levey, whose shooting was off in the last half, tallied three nifties in the first that kept the Friars rolling along.

The game was fast all the way, with good floor work by both teams. They both showed the usual first game rough spots, but, even under opening night handicaps, Assumption turned in one of the best exhibitions of its brief intercollegiate career. The Friars, lacking the bright stars of former years, still gave evidence of potentialities particularly in view of their apparent yearning for teamwork.

Coach Crotty used every man on his squad, several of them for only a few minutes, but enough to let them get the feel of things under fire.

The freshmen entertained the early arrivals with an intra-squad game.

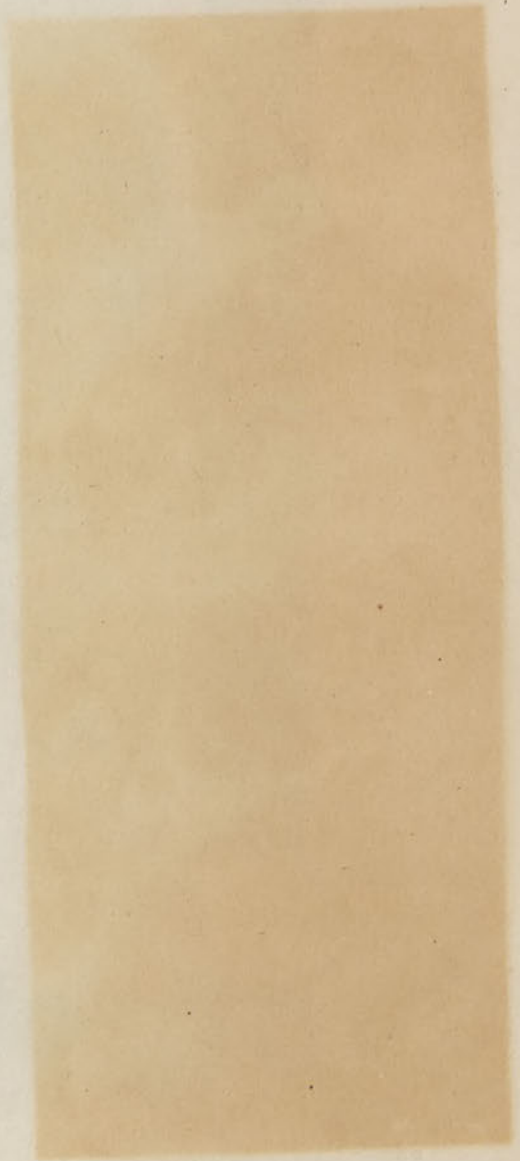
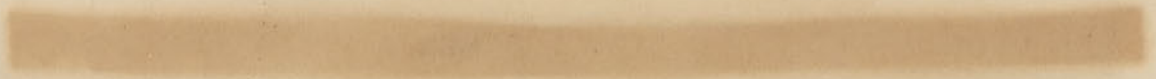

With several hours of intensive practice crowded into the short interval between their opening game with Assumption on last Thursday and tonight's clash with Dartmouth at Hanover, the Providence College basketball team should turn in a steadier performance against the Green.

Teamwork spelled victory over Assumption, and that point has been stressed by Coach Ed Crotty for the Dartmouth encounter. Dartmouth is well supplied with veterans, and has uncovered a sophomore star in "Swede" Broberg, who has put punch in the Green attack in the two games the Hanoverians have played.

Dartmouth opened with a 39-31 conquest of a highly-rated Springfield combine, and then lost out to Vermont's customarily strong team, 37-36. In both these games the Indians were without the services of Bob MacLeod, football star, and Joe Cottone, a leading member of last year's team.

If the expected degree of improvement over their first game materializes with the Friar team, it is capable of giving the Indians a keen tussle. Coach Crotty more than likely will start the same team that faced Assumption, Bill Murphy and Johnny Barnini at guards; Elt Deuse at centre and Joe Kwasniewski and Jack Levey at the forwards.



# FRIARS PIN DOWN DARTMOUTH STAR, BUT LOSE, 41-24

Kwasniewski Ties Up Broberg,  
But Dudis Breaks Lose  
to Lead Attack.

(Special to the Providence Journal)  
Hanover, N. H., Dec. 12.—Providence College basketball team held "Sweed" Broberg, Dartmouth's sophomore star, scoreless from the floor for the first time this season, but failed to stop the Indians' captain, Roger "Moose" Dudis, and the Friars were beaten, 41 to 24, before more than 1500 spectators here tonight.

The locals, smarting from a 37 to 36 defeat pinned on them by the University of Vermont last Saturday night in Burlington, opened a fast scoring attack from the opening whistle and held a substantial margin to the end of the game.

Broberg, a Torrington, Conn., lad, had made 22 points against Springfield and 12 against Vermont and he was rated as the "big man" of the Dartmouth offence this winter, but Providence stopped him "cold."

Joe Kwasniewski, of New Milford, Conn., Friar left guard, held Broberg better defensively than any guard has since the Connecticut boy entered Dartmouth last year. All Broberg could get was two foul goals.

Dudis, of Athol, Mass., got his "eye" for the first time this winter and in the first half put his side ahead by a large margin when he scored a barrage of floor goals. In all he made 19 points and, aided by his six feet, six inches, stopped several Providence backboard shots that might have been turned into floor goals.

Dartmouth, with Dudis leading the way, went into a 12 to 5 lead after 10 minutes of play, but Kwasniewski sparked a fine Providence attack and his team was soon ahead, 20 to 17. Elton Deuse, six foot, four inch Senior, although outjumped by the lanky Dudis, contributed two sparkling field goals in this rally, but several other opportunities were lost in this half and the second session by poor foul shooting. In all, the visitors counted two foul points, but lost many other possible points.

Early in the third period, the Green turned on the heat in a big way, with little Georgie Hanna showing up well. Near the end of the game, Coach Osborne Cowles replaced his regulars with a flock of substitutes and the play became ragged.

Bob McLeod, Dartmouth football star, who joined the team a few days ago, did not dress for the game as was expected.

Providence College resumes basketball activity tonight with Becker Business College of Worcester, a newcomer to the intercollegiate wars, offering the opposition. The teams will clash at Harkins Hall at 8:15 o'clock.

The Friars reported in fine condition after the Christmas holidays and are ready to travel at a fast clip. It is probably just as well, as the Businessmen, coached by Jack Shea, former Holy Cross athlete, are almost strictly an attacking aggregation.

In their two games the Becker forces have rolled up big scores, piling up 75 as they drubbed their alumni and defeating Hyannis Teachers, 69 to 38. In the Hyannis encounter Ziggy Strzlecki, the left forward, tossed in 14 field goals and Michalowski, his running mate, collected 16 points.

Those two and Goumey Frew, a guard, are among the outstanding Worcester scholastic products of recent years.

Coach Ed Crotty of the Friars, still concentrating on installing the Notre Dame style of play, has been stressing team work in practice since resuming activities and his charges are

starting to show the effects of their hard work. Their passing is becoming smoother and their defensive manoeuvres more effective.

Crotty, after switching Joe Kwasniewski to guard for the Dartmouth game—played before the holidays—has returned him to his usual post at forward, where he will team with Steve (Lefty) Fallon, who rejoined the squad Tuesday. Fallon missed the first two games because of an injury sustained in practice.

Elt Deuse, who apparently is hitting the stride expected of him, will open at centre and Bill Murphy and Slip Barnini will take charge of the back court at the outset. Coach Crotty hopes to be able to use his entire squad inasmuch as he is concentrating more on building for the future than on developing his team for current purposes. The Friars are playing a limited schedule this winter and that gives Crotty the opportunity to build the foundation for coming teams.

Becker believes in scoring, working on the theory that a good attack is the best defence, and for that reason it is probable that there will be plenty of action tonight.

As a preliminary attraction the freshman squad will split into two teams for a game.

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# FRIARS NOSE OUT

## BECKER, 50 TO 49

### Sweeney Plays Hero Role, Sinking Winning Basket

Harkins Hall Crowd Goes Wild  
as Overtime Battle  
Comes to End.

In a rousing scrap which produced 10 changes in leadership after the first half; threw the crowd into a frenzy when the Friars deadlocked the count as the whistle ended regulation play; brought Paul Sweeney from the obscurity of the bench to the hero's role in the final 15 seconds of an overtime period, Providence College defeated Becker College of Worcester last night, 50 to 49, at Harkins Hall.

The invaders, paced by a spectacular sharpshooter named Ziggy Strzlecki, were two points ahead four seconds from the end of the fourth quarter. Then the Friars got the ball out of bounds and after a long shot by Lefty Fallon missed its mark and careened toward the corner, Elt Deuse grabbed it and fired in the same motion, swishing home the basket that deadlocked the score at 46-all and threw the thrilling battle into overtime, the ball sailing through the air as the windup whistle shrilled.

The crowd, in an uproar all the way as the rugged, aggressive skirmish unravelled itself, went completely haywire at this turn of events and, when after a brief but friendly argument over the relation of Deuse's shot to the whistle, the five-minute extra period was launched, roared approval anew.

Ed Frew put the visitors ahead on a free flip, but Bill Murphy fired from afar and the Friars led again, 48 to 47. Mullins was fouled in the act of shooting and converted both tries, giving the Businessmen a 49-48 edge, with only seconds remaining. Deuse, who had fouled Mullins, departed immediately thereafter for he had oversubscribed the foul quota and Sweeney replaced him.

A furious battle for possession raged near the Becker basket in that last half minute, and with 15 seconds to go Sweeney grabbed a pass, calmly settled himself and whisked in the deciding basket. He alone seemed cool and collected in a veritable madhouse.

The battle was tight all the way. Providence led 14 to 11 at the end of the first quarter, but the half ended all square at 24. The Friars were out front, 33 to 32, at the three-quarter mark, and at no time did either team's advantage exceed five points.

The fleet and scrappy Strzlecki, with 18 points, set the pace, a majority of his shots being spectacular. Fallon, with 14, paced the Friars. It was a well played game, with every Friar performing much better than in the last home appearance against Assumption. Becker was far better than expected, handled the ball beautifully and fought everlastingly.

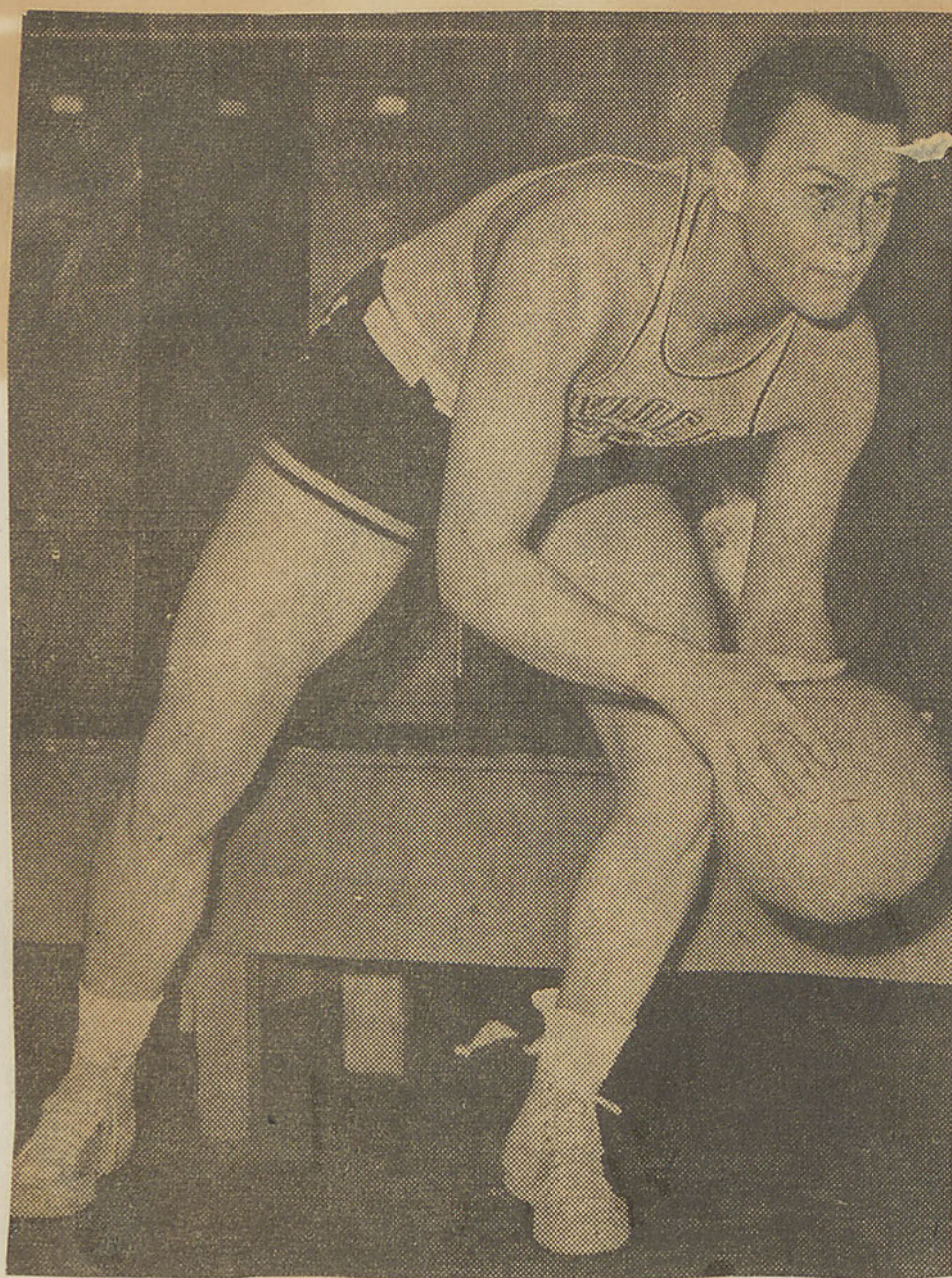
Providence also lost Kwasniewski via the foul route, and Becker's Balsavich was the other early departure.

The second of the highly important and entertaining intra-State basketball battles, pitting the Fighting Friars and the Rollicking Rams against each other is the highlight attraction of the week in Rhode Island intercollegiate circles.

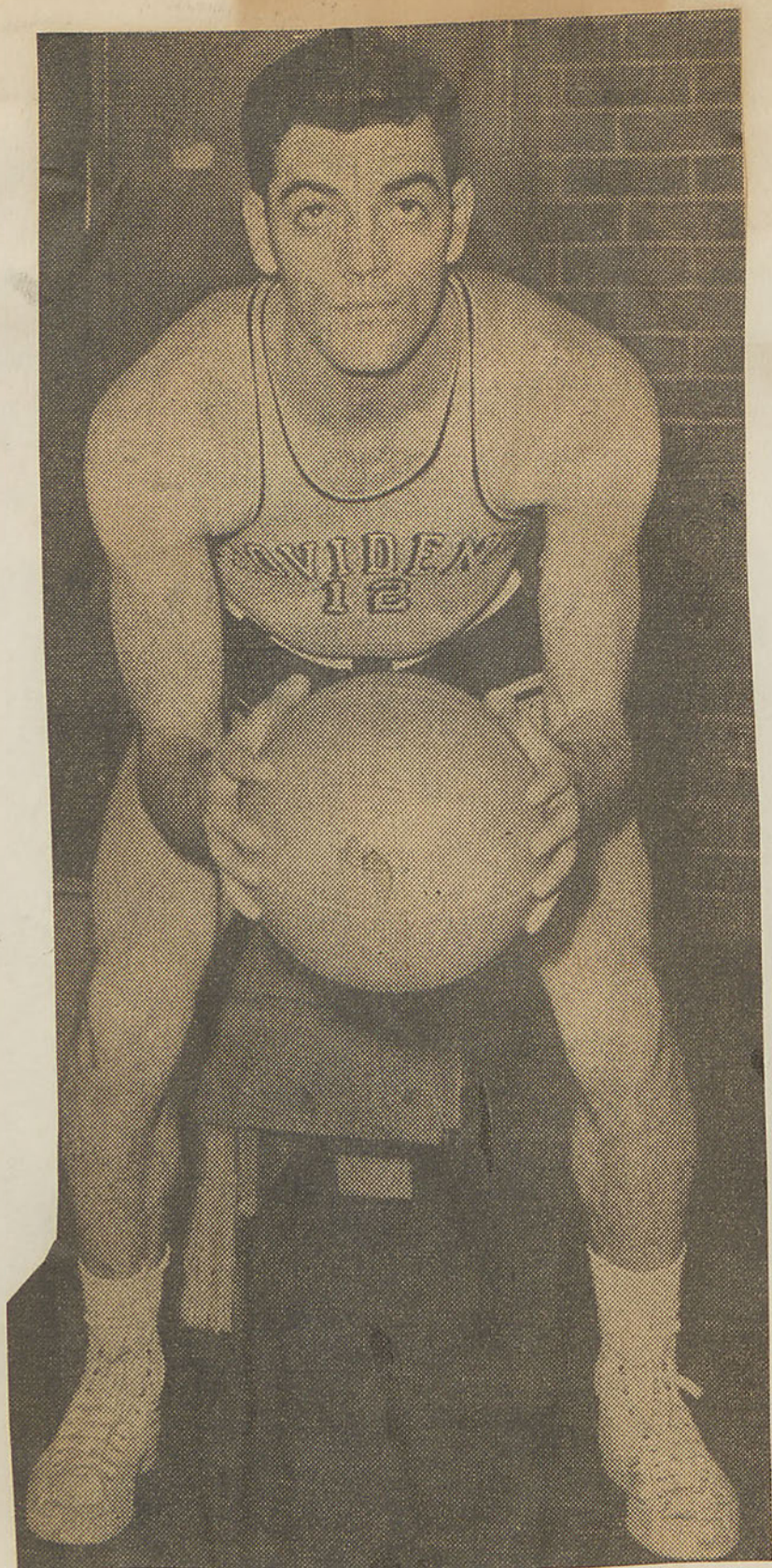
The largest crowd of the season thus far is expected to turn out for that fray Saturday night at the Auditorium, and although R. I. State is a prohibitive favorite at the moment there is every reason to believe that the Friars will offer plenty of opposition.

It will be a battle of contrasting systems, for State, that point-hungry brigade from Kingston, delights in fast breaks and revels in running a foe ragged. Providence, on the other hand, leans toward slower forming offensive measures, short passing and concentration of defence.

It will be a battle between a veteran team with a well established system and a comparatively green outfit employing a brand new type of ball. Both teams are noted for their excellent physical condition and, as the saying goes, a good time should be had by all.

Providence has been moderately successful under its new coach, Ed Crotty, having won from Assumption and Becker of Worcester and lost to a strong Dartmouth quintet. State has been rolling along in characteristic fashion, piling up points with customary facility and baffling opponents with speed and dexterity.

The Friars, well aware of the Chet Jaworski menace, got a little advance dope on the Worcester boy Friday night when they ran up against his immediate successor at Worcester Commerce, Ziggy Strzlecki. Strzlecki, playing with Becker College now, took over the offensive burden for Commerce upon Jaworski's departure, and carried on in the accepted Jaworski style.

As a matter of fact Ziggy set scoring records himself in Worcester, and in that Friday affair gave the Friars a pretty good idea of what to expect from Jaworski. He tossed in eight field goals and a brace of fouls. Ziggy is faster than Chet, but breaks and shoots pretty much as Chet does.

Providence is improving steadily, being a far stronger quintet against Becker than in the pre-holiday outings. The team has reasonably good balance, wastes few shots, and is gradually mastering the plays outlined by Coach Crotty. It plays interesting ball, is aggressive in spots but misses some opportunities under the backboards, although better work in that department was apparent Friday night.

These Friars have speed and size, and all that remains is for a couple of them to hit their real stride and the team can go to town. The big fellows, Elt Deuse and Joe Kwasniewski, are coming along slowly, and are due for a hot streak any time.

Crotty's reserves are showing increasingly better form, and those he sent into action against Becker carried the load nicely. Joe Paparella, in action briefly, caged a basket in a crucial moment and Paul Sweeney, who rode the bench throughout the regulation game, entered during the overtime and calmly dropped in the shot that settled the issue.

Deuse it was who tied things up on a quick flip from the corner, thus climaxing his best game of the season.

On the basis of form State should be favored Saturday night, but with the Friars co-ordinating their attack and defence more efficiently than in previous weeks, they loom as a distinct threat. It should be well worth watching and the expected huge crowd should be well repaid for its trouble.

## Crotty's Squad Puts Dash Into Practice and Promises Real Battle.

The Fighting Friars of Providence College, girding for their encounter tomorrow night with Rhode Island State at the Auditorium, went through a torrid workout yesterday afternoon, and when the session was over Coach Ed Crotty was undecided on his starting team for the fray with the Rams.

The Friars, generally regarded as none too strong a foe for the Rams, have become nettled by the slight consideration accorded their chances, and have drilled this week with a new spirit. They are determined to make a real battle out of tomorrow's game and are confident that the decision will be in doubt right down to the finish.

So spirited was their workout yesterday that big Joe Kwasniewski was knocked out in a scramble for the ball under the basket; Vic Story and Jack Levey virtually won starting berths, and their defensive play was better than at any time this season.

Story, a stringy sophomore with a good eye and a lot of scrap under the hoop, alternated with Elt Deuse as the first team centre and Levey successively and successfully replaced Kwasniewski and Lefty Fallon in the front court. The lanky sophomore is a real ball hawk and a good play maker, and his aggressiveness may force Coach Crotty to start him against the Rams, and Levey is a quick and accurate shot.

The first stringers outclassed the reserves in a brief, speedy scrimmage, but it wasn't until Levey entered the fray that they really began to click.

Kwasniewski spent most of the afternoon on defence for he has his work cut out for him for tomorrow night, having fallen heir to the task of guarding Chet Jaworski, State's brilliant star. The big fellow has had similar chores before, notably at Dartmouth, where he performed in exemplary fashion, and P. C. followers are counting upon him to check Jaworski just as effectively.

Unless Coach Crotty decides on a change, Fallon and Kwasniewski will open in the front court. Deuse will play centre and Bill Murphy and

Slip Barnini in the backcourt. Although they have stressed defensive tactics to a great extent, the Friars have not overlooked their attack, and spent much time on perfecting formations they hope to employ against State. Yesterday their shooting was sharper than usual, and with Fallon in top condition again they were a much more unified outfit than that which opposed Becker last week. Lefty is likely to be the chief source of trouble for the Rams for he shoots from all angles and does so without an appreciable waste of effort.

## Keaney Refuses to Predict Victory Over Providence College Quintet.

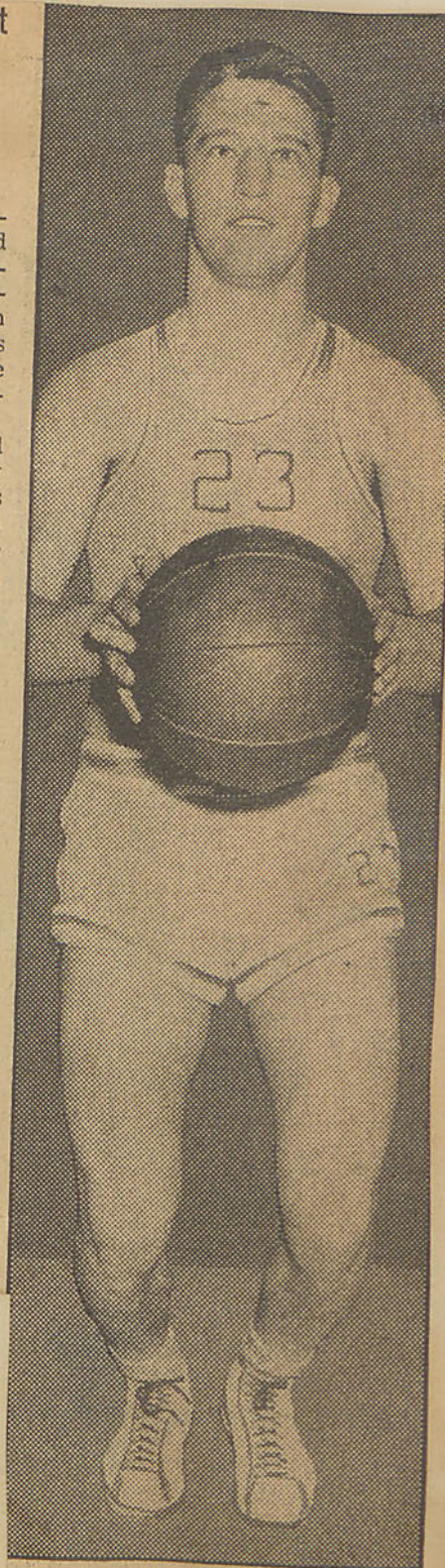

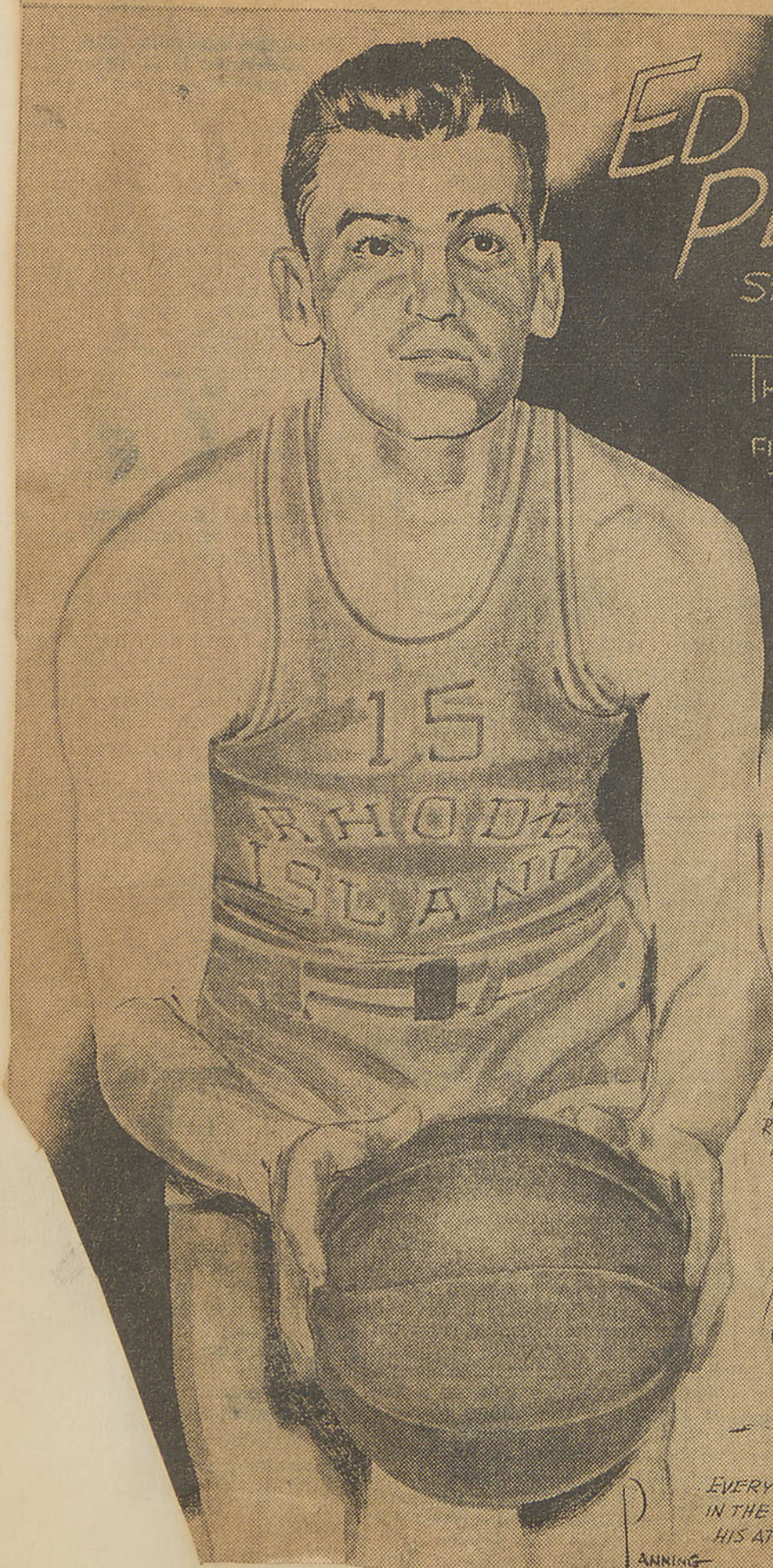

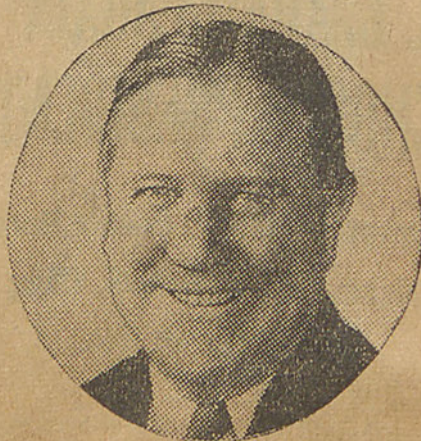
Already rolling along at approximately a 74-point-a-game clip and just getting into their mid-season stride, the Rams are confident that they will move a step nearer Rhode

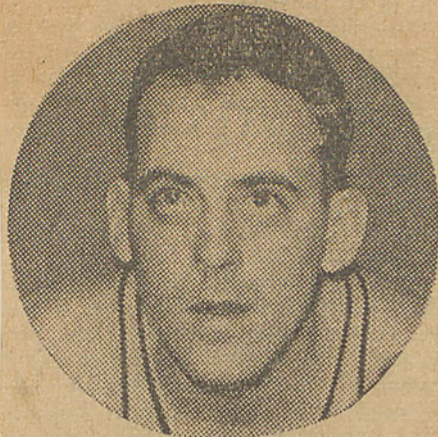

perfect a defence for the high-powered antics of Chet Jaworski and his brethren in baby blue and have labored long on attacking formations that they expect will bring them a large share of points.

On the basis of past performances the Rams are heavy favorites. They have waltzed through an exacting early season schedule and their excellent physical condition at the end of those games has made observers

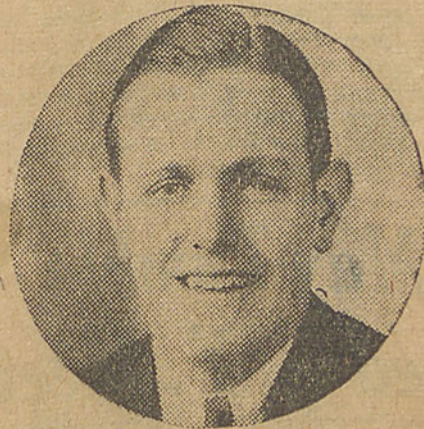


Friars' Bill Murphy

Petro and Caprelian in the back court and Warner Keaney, son of State Coach Frank Keaney, and Conley up front can and do cut loose without much warning and when all five get into high gear the results are devastating generally.

The Friars remember that their football team went into action against the Rams in a similar role of underdog and emerged triumphant and they argue that they can do the same thing. There certainly is no feeling in their camp that the worst is about to happen and, although essentially a defensive unit, they plan to attack from the outset, hoping to establish a lead in the early stages.

Such a program in view of State's speed and sharp-shooting is ambitious to say the least, but the charges of Ed Crotty are an ambitious bunch. They have diligently worked to perfect the system of play he teaches and have made rapid progress, but, of course, are far from their peak yet. They really are an inexperienced outfit but, despite the apparent superiority of the Rams, they figure that tonight's engagement is far from chalked up to State's credit. Eventually it probably will be, but not without a struggle.

In a preliminary the State Freshmen will oppose Providence's first year team and the promise of adequate entertainment for the early arrivals is abundant.

# RAMS COME FROM BEHIND TO CONQUER

## FRIARS, 57-45

### P.C. Players Rise to Heights In Early Stages of Battle

Loss of Key Players on Fouls  
Handicaps Friars; Ninth Vic-  
tory for Unbeaten Rams.

After trailing a surprisingly effective Providence College quintet for three-quarters of the game, the undefeated Rhode Island Rams cut loose against Friar reserves in the closing minutes and scored their ninth victory of the season, 57 to 45, before 3445 howling fans at the Auditorium last night.

Although the Rams kept their season's record unsmirched, their prestige suffered appreciably for the Friars, before three of their starters were ejected on fouls, had outplayed them decisively.

Providence was out front, 31 to 27, at the half and midway through the second period held a 37 to 27 margin, but at that point, Jack Barnini, who had been brilliant at guard, traveled the four foul route and the Rams then and there launched the bristling drive that brought them victory.

Even though the play had been taken from them up to that point, an opportunity now presented itself, and without wasting any time, Rhode Island started its winning offensive. In that slashing surge Chet Jaworski, Caprelian and Keaney scored three field goals apiece, Conley and Petro one each and five points were added from the free throw line.

Minus their stars, Joe Kwasniewski, Elt Deuse and Barnini, the Friars were unable to check that drive and the Rams, fighting with their characteristic fervor, swept ahead relentlessly.

Free throws played a vital part in the fray for it was conversions from the foul line that kept the Rams in the running in several stretches of the thrilling fray. They picked up 15 points that way as against five for the Friars.

Shortly after the halfway mark in the opening period Deuse, who played the finest game of his career, fouled out, a contingency that hurt the Friars tremendously for the lanky Deuse had scored 10 points at the time and was almost invariably in command of situations under either basket. Shortly thereafter Kwasniewski followed him and the Friars didn't like the fourth foul on him at all.

It happened an on out-of-bounds play and he was taxed for charging while awaiting a pass. His third foul had come a minute before when he and Warner Keaney nearly came to blows over a mixup that occurred while Kwasniewski had the ball. Kwasniewski had been waging a merry duel with Jaworski, State's sparkling captain, and had considerably the better of the argument.

When he departed he left behind him a record of six field goals and three free throws as compared with Chet's four field goals and four free throws and beyond that he had scintillated in all-around play. Jaworski, as always the classy, well-rounded performer, went on to high gun honors with 20 points, adding three floor goals and two fouls in the last half as well as engineering State's withering, winning onslaught.

The Friars, far more capable than they were expected to be, actually outplayed their vaunted foes most of the way but their reserves were unequal to the task of withholding the resurgent Rams at the end.

Apart from Jaworski, Keaney the younger was State's hero. The big fellow, making excellent use of his tremendous frame and demonstrating exceptional agility for one so huge, scored only nine points but he got them at crucial moments, being, in fact, the sharpshooter who put the Rams ahead at 41-39 late in the last half.

His play under the baskets and in the bucket sparkled and his defensive work was of a parity. Coach Keaney, although he likes to use as many of his boys as possible, necessarily limited himself to six. Conley, Jaworski and his son, Warner, play-

ing the full distance, while Face spelled both Petro and Caprelian, and every one of them lived up to his glowing reputation.

Murphy and Fallon went the route for the Friars, the former being among the game's outstanding stars. Vic Storey, in his first game, did splendidly.

It was a grand game to watch, rough enough in spots but occasionally slowed down by the whistle. The large crowd, best of the local season, was treated to a brilliant show and to a tremendous surprise, for the Friars, regarded as decided underdogs, gave a far better exhibition than even their most ardent supporters dared hope for. And State, with its undefeated record in jeopardy, closed with a rush that kept the Auditorium in an uproar.

The new court was a big improvement over that used a year back, but evidently the boards had last been used for a dance and were very slippery, many well-intentioned plays ending in inelegant skids.

In a preliminary the State Freshmen, with Stutz Modzelewski running wild and scoring 34 points, drubbed the Providence Freshmen, 74 to 37.

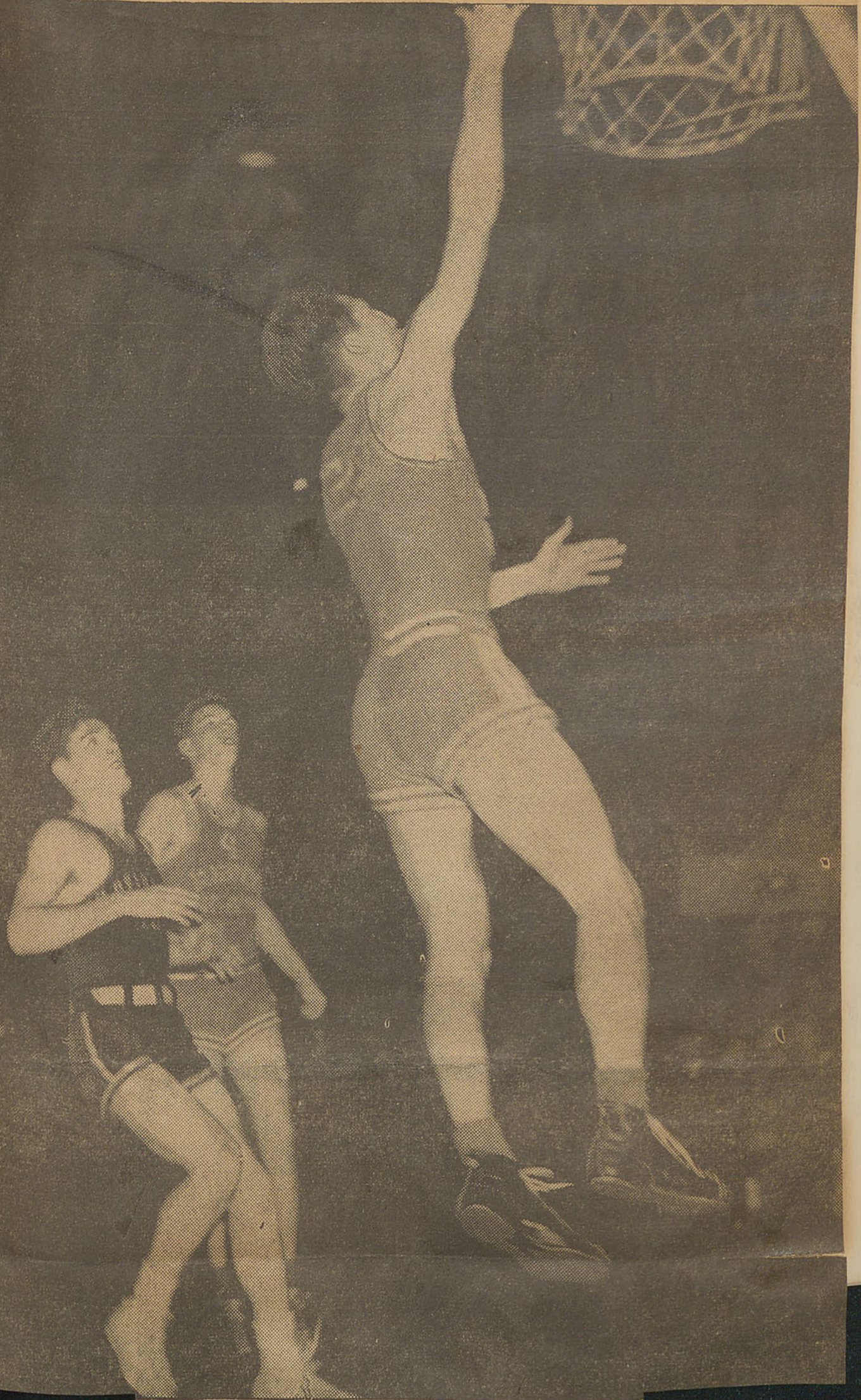

The Fighting Friars of Providence College, who haven't played a basketball game since their spirited encounter with Rhode Island State a week ago last night, will return to the court next Saturday, meeting the Worcester Tech quintet at Worcester.

The Engineers, sailing along serenely, have lost only to Boston University on a night when the Terriers collected nine points in the last couple of minutes for a one-point decision, are rated among New England's best. They boast a team that averages well over six feet in height and, in Capt. Al Raslavsky, a leader who is one of the greatest all-around athletes and students ever to attend the exacting Worcester institute.

Raslavsky, a perennial high scorer, has been captain in baseball as well as holding his current court captaincy, is senior class president, student council president and member of the athletic council—as well as being an honor student. Vic Storey, a sophomore, has come along nicely and will soon be ready to spell Elt Deuse without impairing the team's play very much. Deuse, incidentally, turned in his finest performance against the Rams, and in practice since has handled himself in the same capable manner.

Joe Kwasniewski and Lefty Fallon in the forecourt, Deuse at centre and the brilliant guards, Slip Barnini and Bill Murphy, probably will start for the Friars and, on the basis of their recent form, they should give the big, swift Engineers an extremely busy night.



# WORCESTER TECH CONQUERS FRIARS

Engineers Triumph, 68-54;  
Murphy's Shooting Thrills  
Capacity Audience.

Worcester, Mass., Jan. 28. — Five Worcester Tech iron men, playing 40 minutes without substitution, tonight defeated a Providence College basketball quintet, 68-54, before a capacity audience. Captain Al Raslavsky led the assault on the Friars with 18 points, only one above Dave McEwan, the other forward, as Tech scored its first victory over Providence in a series that started in 1929.

Steve "Lefty" Fallon was high man for Providence with 16 points as Joe Kwasniewski fell off and scored only three field goals during the contest although his point total was 14. During the game the Friars caged 14 out of their 16 chances at the foul line whereas Tech headed in only 10 out of 22 opportunities.

Will Be Required of All

**CLASSES REOPEN TODAY**

Edward Crotty, Basketball Coach,  
Will Have Charge of Com-  
pulsory Course in Sports

Details of a new physical education program to be started immediately at Providence College were announced yesterday by Rev. Arthur H. Chandler, O. P., dean, as freshmen, sophomores and juniors returned to classes for the second semester. Seniors report for lectures this morning.

The physical education program will affect all freshmen and transfer students from other colleges this year. A compulsory physical education course without credit will be given and in the future this course will be necessary for rating as a senior.

The course will form part of the student health program, according to Fr. Chandler. In addition to the examinations of the college health department all freshmen in the future will have to take the subject.

Edward Crotty, Friar basketball coach and director of the intramural sports program, will be in charge of the classes. They will meet afternoons from Monday to Friday in separate divisions.

As outlined by Mr. Crotty, the program will include indoor sports such as volley ball, push ball, badminton, and during the autumn and spring, outdoor sports. New locker and shower facilities are being installed at the college in conjunction with the program.

"Our physical education program will be part of our education of the whole man," Fr. Chandler said. "We seek to develop the students intellectually and physically and this physical education course together with the intramural sports program already installed will be part of the necessary training for any student."

The three underclasses attended mass yesterday morning in Harkins Hall. Rev. Charles H. McKenna, O. P., college chaplain, was the celebrant. Following the mass they received instructions from Fr. Chandler and Rev. Frederick C. Foley, O. P., assistant dean.

This morning seniors will assist at a mass celebrated by Rev. John V. Fitzgerald, O. P. Fr. Chandler and Fr. Foley will address them and they will start lectures for the second semester at 10:30.

Providence College fortunes took a couple of about faces yesterday as the Friars advanced their preparations for Saturday night's engagement with Springfield College in Harkins Hall.

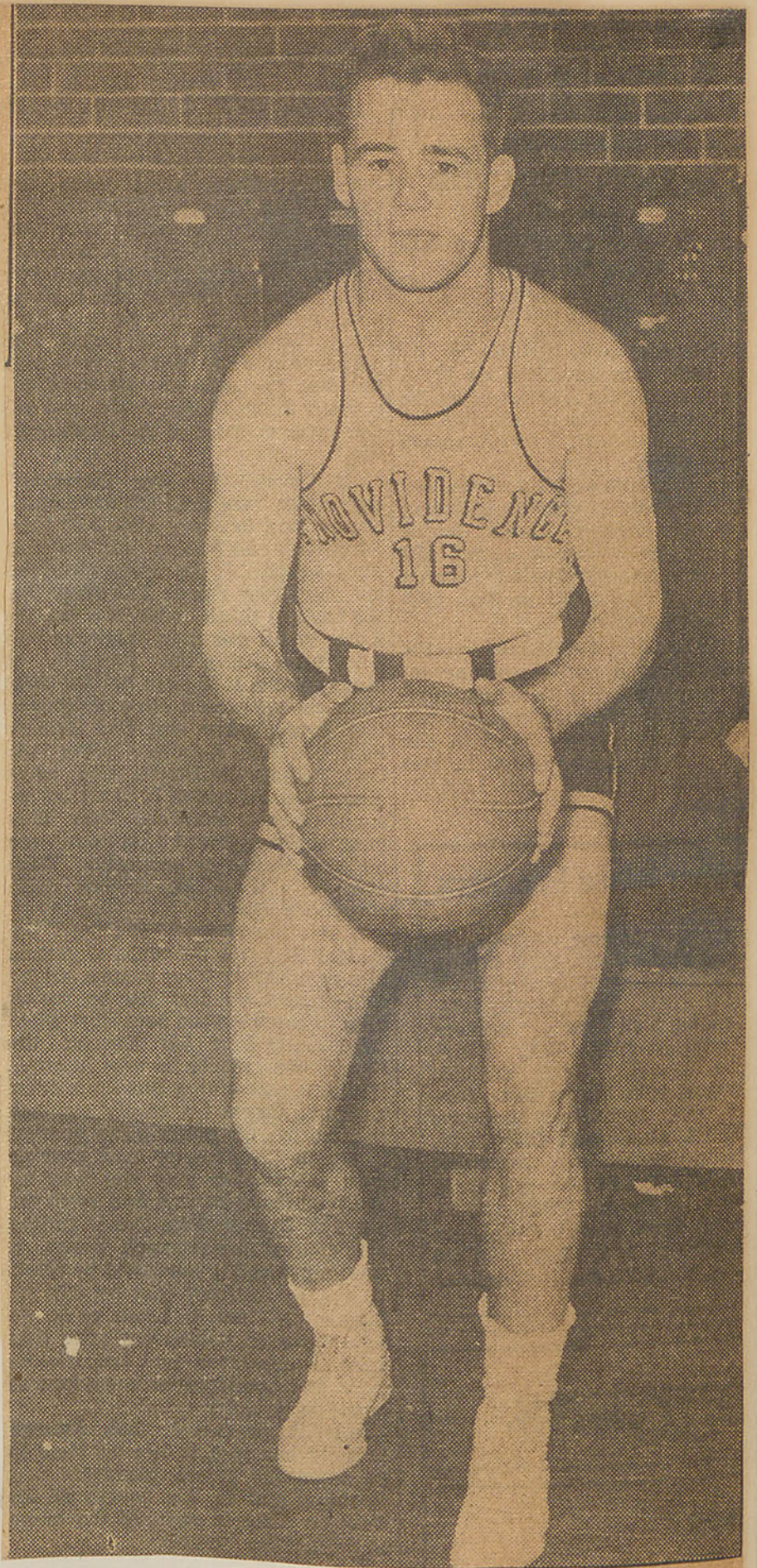

## Scrappy Springfield Five Gives Friars Busy Night

Barnini, Murphy, Sweeney

Keep Maroon Attack in  
Check; P. C. Cubs Lose.

Providence College returned to the basketball wars last night after a long layoff and, although their teamwork suffered a decline since their last outing, they managed to outlast a scrappy Springfield College quintet, 40 to 33, at Harkins Hall.

It was a close guarding game all the way and the Friar back court performers, Paul Sweeney, the ailing Jack Barnini and Bill Murphy, who shared the principal chores, held the Maroon forwards well in check and slowed down an attack that threatened to get under full steam any time.

The first half ended with the Friars leading, 17 to 15, after having moved out front in the waning moments of the period. Up to that time the Indians held the advantage, although their margin never was more than three points. However, Lefty Fallon, who had been incapacitated for two weeks with a foot infection, entered the game and flipped two quick ones into the netting that enabled the Friars to step ahead.

Thereafter they ran a front race most of the way, for, as the second half opened, Barnini flipped in a free throw and Sachs, who alternated at left forward with Levy, broke fast and scored from the floor. That put the Friars five points up, but the fighting invaders, on field goals by Schmidt and Hettler and a free throw by McVean, knotted the count.

The vigorousness of the play led to three successive fouls against Springfield and Fallon, Deuse and Murphy converted before Schmidt notched one for the Indians. Deuse, on a spectacular overhead shot, when hemmed in a corner, and Murphy's basket, after receiving a bounce pass from Fallon, put the locals six points up again with nine minutes to go.

Springfield, however, was far from through and a brace of baskets by Mortensen, sunk on the business end of fast-breaking plays that caught the Friars napping, made it 27-25. Murphy then took matters into his own hands, dropped one basket after some clever manoeuvring and another from midcourt. Deuse leaped out of a jumble of players for his fourth field goal and Sachs added a foul and a field goal, putting the game well out of reach.

Three successive successful free throws by Redding cut into the margin, but Fallon got one from the charity stripe and Sachs broke through the Indians for a neat field goal before Schmidt scored from in close. Sachs matched that one and the game ended with a trio of free throws by Mortensen and Clark.

The game was spotty but fast, many opportunities were wasted by both quintets, and passes frequently wound up among the spectators or in hostile hands. There was plenty of aggressiveness but nothing especially rough, although 14 fouls were called against Providence and 17 against Springfield, the Friars cashing in 10 times from the line of least resistance and the Indians 11 times.

Providence lost the services of Elt Deuse via the four foul route and Werner, a standout for Springfield, likewise departed when he oversubscribed his foul quota. Although those 31 fouls were called, the game was not held up to any extent, Crosby Towner and Sid MacKay running it off in fine style.

In a fast and furious preliminary encounter, the Springfield junior varsity outlasted the Providence freshmen, 51 to 43, after reaching the halfway point all even at 21-21.

# FRIARS DOWNED 48 TO 41

## Springfield Evens Series In Closely Played Game

35 Fouls Called in Contest;  
Sweeney Forced Out; Fal-  
lon Takes Scoring Honors.

Springfield, Mass., Feb. 22.—Leaving the court at the end of the first half, trailing by two points, after both teams had juggled with the lead, a Springfield College basketball team that would not be beat staged a rally that sparked it to a 48-41 victory over Providence College here this afternoon. An overflow crowd of 1400 witnessed the struggle at the Tech high gym.

The Maroon triumph, registered in a game that was fast but repeatedly stopped for infractions of rules by the players, evened the annual series between the rivals. Besides time outs the contest was stopped 35 times for fouls but despite these numerous interruptions the struggle proved an interesting one to the fans.

It was touch and go for just 20 minutes, but in bottling up Steve Fallon, a peppery youngster with a deadly one hand shot, who scored 13 points in the first half, and taking over an eight point margin in the first two minutes of play of the final period, the local team just about sewed up the game.

During the course of the Maroon drive that netted the team a lead it never relinquished, the Friars lost one of their regulars, Paul Sweeney, a guard, on four personal fouls. With Sweeney out of competition and Bill Murphy, the other Providence back-court player, having his effectiveness cut by a leg injury toward the end of the first half, the Friars were in a crippled condition to withstand the assault of the Maroon quintet's attack, which was spearheaded by Al Werner with seven baskets.



Providence never stopped trying even though the odds were against it, and as the tilt drew to a close moved to within one point of the Maroons, 39-38, but at this point the charges of Coach E. J. Hickox put on the pressure again and with Werner, Dick Redding, Smoky Mortenson and Johnny Wydro coming through in the pinch hustle, their margin to 10 points, 48-38, with three minutes left on the stop watch.

Individual star of the fray was Fallon, who collected 18 points in eight scrimmage counts and two gift tosses. Beryle Sacks was the only other visiting player to reach double figures on three baskets and four from the penalty station.

In a preliminary the Springfield Frosh nosed out the Providence Frosh, 22-20.

# BECKER TROUNCES FRIAR FIVE, 66-42

Gets Sweet Revenge for  
Earlier One-Point Defeat;  
Balsavich Stars.

Worcester, Mass., March 1.—Becker's booming basket bombers tonight uncovered their most impressive performance of the season and thrilled a packed High School of Commerce gymnasium audience by pulverizing Providence College, 66-42.

It was the end of the season for the Businessmen, and it was a very sweet ending, for they reaped revenge from the Friars, who had previously defeated them by one point.

Becker suffered only two defeats in 16 games, and its only other conquerer, Bay Path Institute, was also defeated in a return tilt.

Although John (Peanuts) Balsavich led the bombardment of Providence with 25 points, the big crowd roared a farewell to Capt. Zieggy Strzelecki, who played his final game in the blue and white togs of Becker.

Closely guarded most of the time, it took some four minutes before Captain Zieggy could score a point. But he started to roll, and finally registered 18 points, to conclude a season with 327 tallies to his credit.

Becker took a 20-12 lead with eight minutes to go of the first half, and then Joe Kwasniewski came off the Providence bench. Joe, who has been injured, clicked with two long shots and passed to Paul Sweney for another, and with five minutes left, the Friars had surged to within 18-20 of Becker.

It was the Friars' last explosion. Becker came back in the next five minutes to score 11 points, while the Friars scored only two, so that the teams wound up the first half with the Businessmen leading 31-20.

The first six minutes of the second half was a near massacre, and with 14 minutes left to play Becker led, 45-22, and Providence was sunk.

# Rams Rule Slight Choice Over Friars at Kingston

Visitors Are Regarded as  
Dangerous; Jaworski Aims  
at Luisetti's Mark.

With each club eager to return to the victory trail after suffering stunning setbacks in their most recent appearances, the Rhode Island State College Rams and the Fighting Friars from Providence College will meet tonight in what should be a torrid battle at Kingston. In a preliminary game, starting at 7 o'clock, freshman teams of the two institutions will battle it out for supremacy.

By virtue of their 57-45 victory in the first meeting of the two teams in Providence, the Rams will rule slight favorites to chalk up their 17th triumph of the campaign, but the Friars are always dangerous and in this series, where past performances mean little, the outcome is unpredictable.

Needing the victory if they are to remain in contention for a spot in either the Madison Square Garden tournament or the national intercol-

legiate affair at Philadelphia, the Rams will send their high-scoring captain, Chet Jaworski, and his mates out for an early margin. Jaworski, who has tallied 435 points in 19 games for an average of 22.84 points per game, needs 31 points in his remaining two encounters to eclipse the mark set up by Hank Luisetti of Stanford in 1938.

Closer to full strength than they have been in almost a month, the Friars will use Lefty Fallon and Beryl Sacks as forwards with Ed Deuse at centre and Paul Sweeney and Bill Murphy at the guards. In relief roles, and expected to see a major portion of the action, will be Johnny Barnini and Joe Kwasniewski, who have practically recovered from their injuries.



## JAWORSKI LEADS STATE'S ATTACK

Scores 28 Points in 30 Min-  
utes in Red-Hot Court  
Battle at Kingston.

A victim of disqualification via the four-foul route with more than 10 minutes remaining in the game, Capt. Chester Jaworski of the Rhode Island State College Rams saw his chances of breaking Hank Luisetti's one-year record of 465 points momentarily halted last night as the Rams decisively whipped the Fighting Friars from Providence College, 86-60, at Kingston.

Jaworski, who tallied 28 points in the 30 minutes he played, boosted his season's mark to 463 points and with one more scheduled game remaining before he closes his collegiate career, his prospects for hanging up a new mark are exceedingly bright. On Tuesday night, he will ring down the curtain in Rhode Island colors when the Rams entertain Worcester Tech at Kingston.

While the thunder of the show was stolen by Jaworski's great performance, the contest was one that was bitterly contested from start to finish. The Friars, always at their tops when playing their Kingston rivals, gave everything they had in an effort to check the Rams.

For a while it looked as though they might succeed, but Jaworski and his mates shook off the mediocre play that marked their game with Brown Wednesday, and went into high gear to win going away.

The action-crammed contest never had a dull moment and from the time Elton Deuse, rangy Providence centre, took a pass from Joe Kwasniewski and dropped the initial tally until Sam Kusnitz dropped a long one as the gun sounded ending the fray, the battle was fought at top speed.

In the opening minutes, the game had a decidedly Friar tinge. After Deuse had hung up the first field goal and Bud Conley had missed a chance to tie the count by getting but one of his two free throws, the Friars went to town in large numbers. Lefty Fallon provided the fireworks for the moment by sending three successive shots through the rim to give his club a 9-1 lead before Ed Petro finally broke through for State's first score from the floor.

\* \* \*

Unable to get their attack functioning smoothly, the Rams called time out and the minute's rest worked wonders with the club. Under the steady guidance of Jaworski, the Rams made their long passes click for scores.

Despite repeated rallies on the part of the Friars, State slowly but surely wiped out their deficit. Finally, after Jaworski had come through with three field goals and Warner Keaney and Duke Abbruzzi, who had relieved Petro for the Rams, had added one apiece, the Rams found themselves but one point behind.

Fouled in the act of shooting, Keaney put the Rams ahead for the first time in the contest when his two free throws slipped through the rim to give State a 23-22 advantage. Jaworski followed with a field goal but the Friars rallied to again take the lead on a pair of goals by Joe Kwasniewski and Jimmy Leo.

That was the last time that the visitors held the advantage as Petro, Jaworski and Keaney hit their marks with shots and State was on its way.

The two teams battled furiously throughout the remaining minutes of

the half and at the rest period, the Rams were out front, 40-28.

Any doubt as to the outcome was expelled with the start of the second half as Jaworski continued to set the blistering pace he established in the opening 20 minutes. Three times in the course of two minutes, his shots rang true and from that point on, it was a question of whether the Friars could accomplish the almost impossible task of wiping out State's lead.

Their chances took a sudden rise, when, in the course of a very few minutes, State lost three of their star performers on fouls. Leon Caprielian and Petro, both of whom had performed heroic tasks in cutting down the Friar attack, went out within a minute's time and Jaworski soon followed them to the sidelines. The Friars had their troubles also as Slip Barnini, Johnny Murphy and Deuse were banished for infractions.

In all 40 fouls were called by Referees Don Bennett and Gus Winters, 21 against Providence and 19 against State. But despite the figure, the game was cleanly fought and the miscues were the result of over-anxiousness rather than deliberate.

\* \* \*

While the honors for the evening went unquestionably to Jaworski, the point-getting of Conley and Keaney, who tallied 21 and 18 points respectively, and the back court play of Petro, Caprielian and Abbruzzi, had much to do with State's success in returning to the winning side of the ledger.

Deuse was Providence's star performer and his 23 points kept his team in constant contention while Kwasniewski, Fallon, Murphy and Barnini gave their all in a futile effort to gain victory.

In the preliminary game, the Rhode Island freshmen made it a clean sweep for the night when they scored an easy 69-30 victory over the Friar frosh. With Stutz Modzelewski and Billy Rutledge setting the pace, the Ramlets took an early lead and held to the end. Modzelewski accounted for 26 of his team's points while Rutledge dropped in 22.

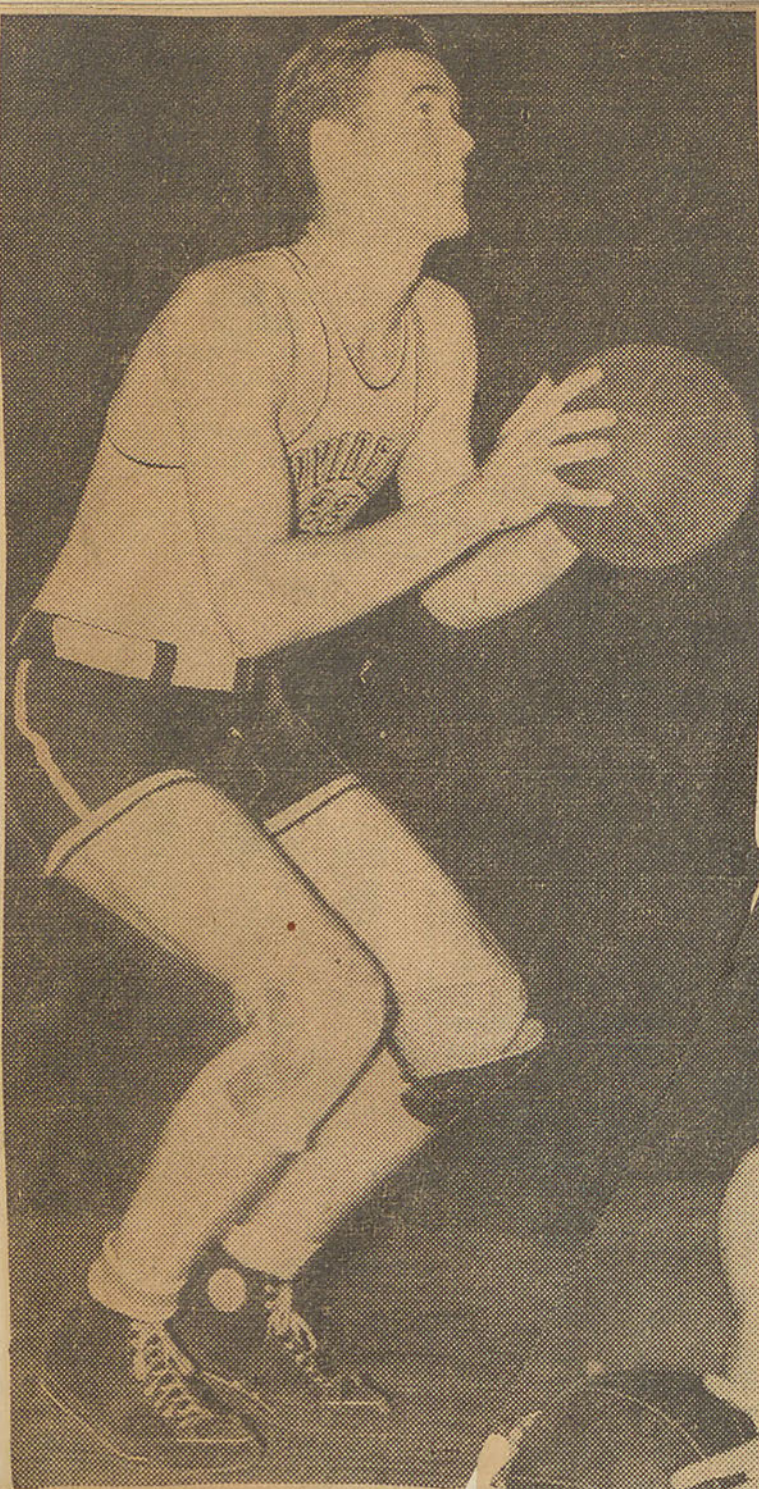

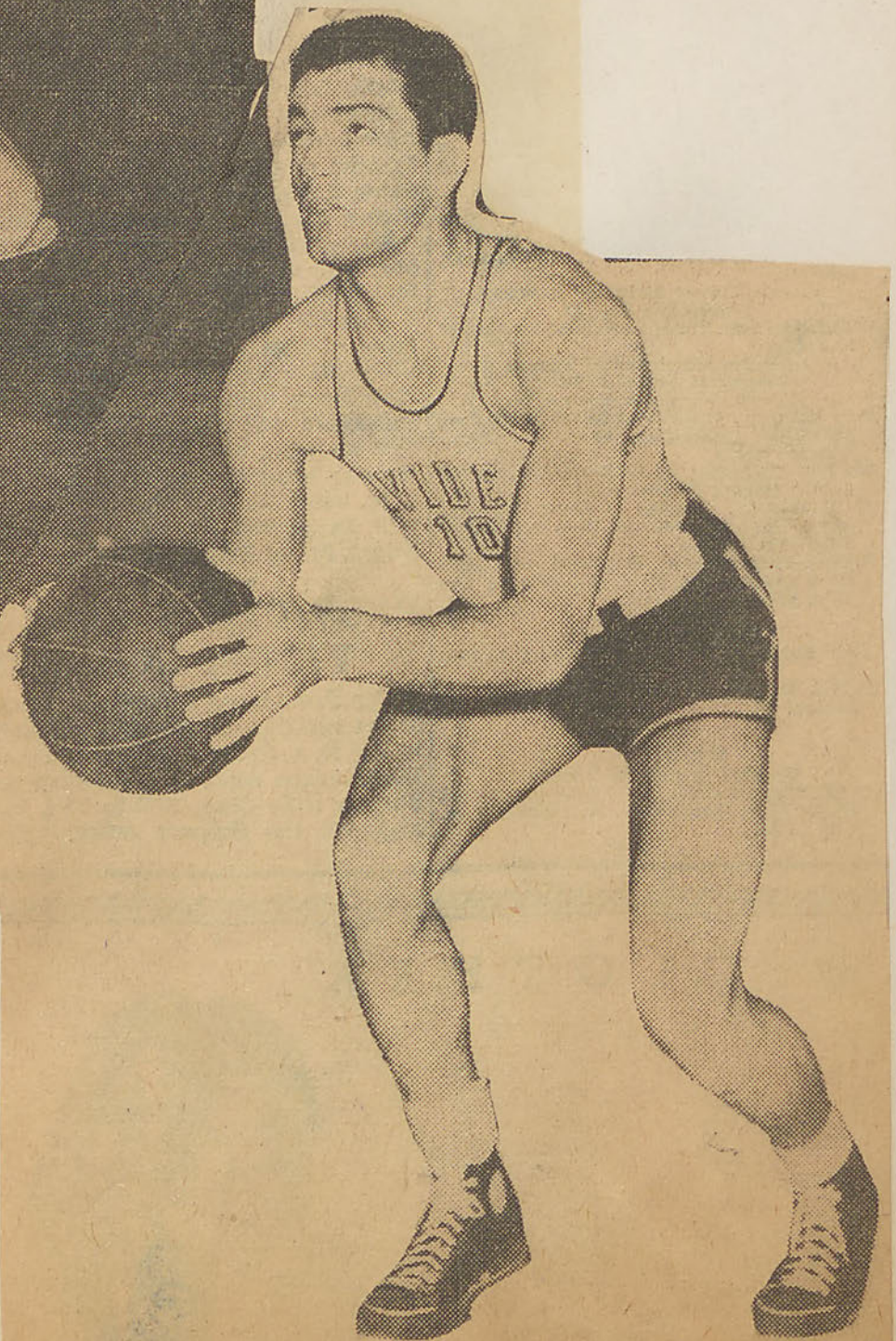

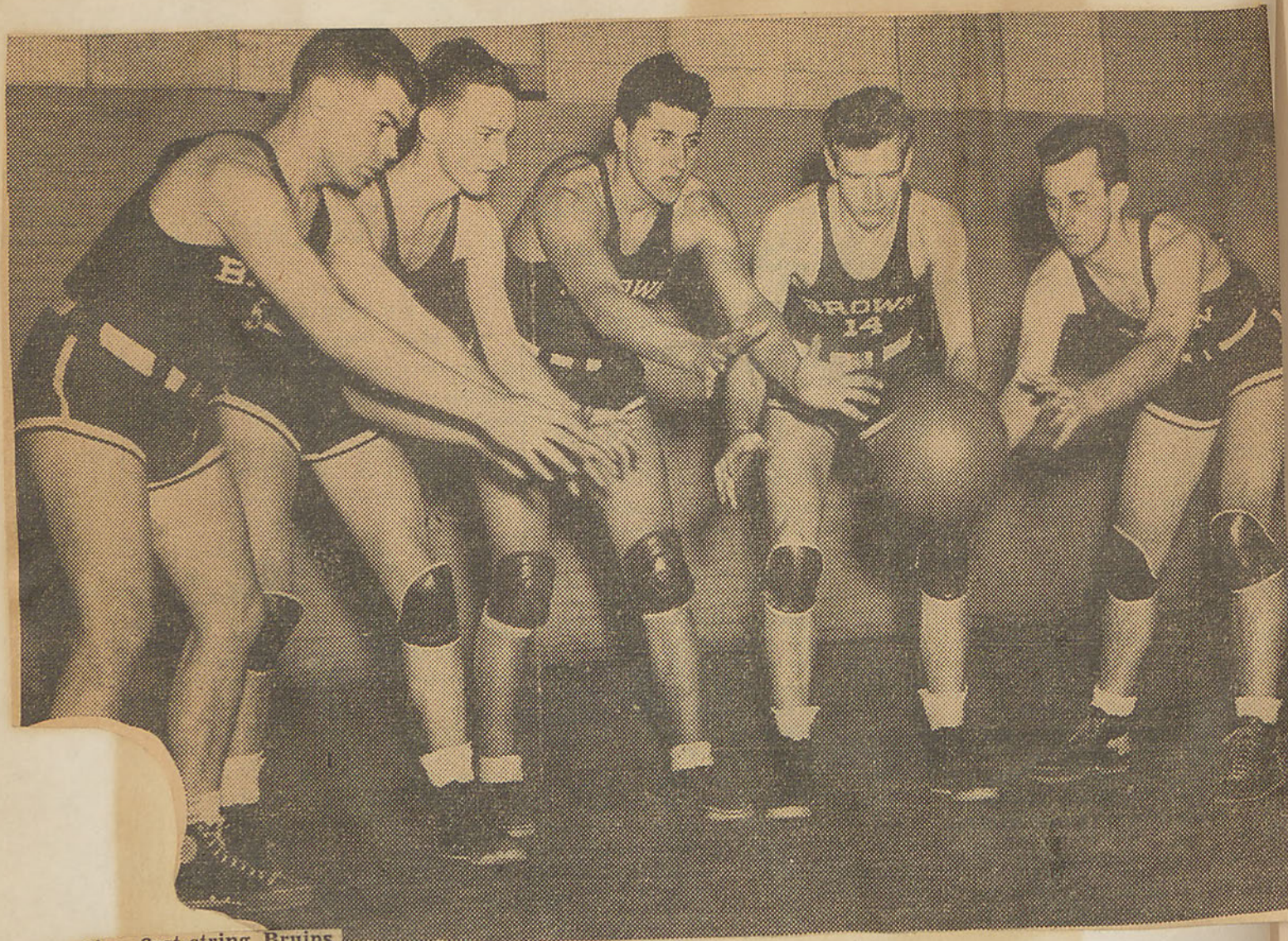

### BROWN HAS TOPPED FRIARS ONLY ONCE

To say that Coach George E. "Eck" Allen is worried over the prospect of this game would be putting it mildly. Not that the game has any bearing on Brown's right to represent New England in the national college tournament, but because Brown needs the game to further strengthen its record in the claim to honors in this section. Providence College has always been at her best against Brown, and the history of the series is a long chain of Friar conquests. The count on the series won and lost is Brown one, Providence College 11, and Brown's prestige isn't heightened in this series by the fact that the one conquest was registered against an informal Friar team when the college was in its infancy. Brown ruled a heavy favorite last year, but Providence College won in the final moments of play, 57 to 55.

Providence College is one of the most improved teams in New England, Allen feels, and he wants to add this game to his teams' conquests to further strengthen the morale against next week's invasion of Philadelphia.

Allen ordered very light work yesterday and only a tuneup today, and all practice will be called off on Monday to bring the men into line in fine condition for the N. C. A. A. games. It is probable that a squad of 10 men will go to Philadelphia, and Coach Allen will require some close figuring for the final three men. Seven players have carried the brunt of most of the play this season, including Capt. George Truman, Harry Platt, Leonard Campbell, Bob Person, John Padden, George Wilson and Francis Wilson.

Allen will start a team of Padden and either Campbell or Wilson, forwards; Platt, centre, and Person and Truman, guards, against Providence College. Denny Myers' freshman team of Shea and Graham, forwards; Sheffe, centre; and High and Savignano, guards, will work for the freshman game which is listed as a preliminary encounter due to open at 7:30 o'clock.

Information is still a trifle scarce on the National Collegiate tournament. Brown and Villanova are two of the selections for the Philadelphia elimination tournament, and it is supposed that the teams from District 3 and 4 will also be there. District 3 embraces the South and District 4 includes the Big Ten territory as far as Minnesota and excluding University of Iowa. The Missouri Valley, Southwest, Rocky Mountain and Pacific Coast sections are the four other districts and will play their elimination games at San Francisco. The finalists will then move back to Evanston in the Northwestern University emporium. Colorado, "Whizzer" White's Alma Mater, is one of the West Coast tournament teams already named.

The National Collegiate A. A., a vast, unwieldy organization that embraces the membership of practically all of the collegiate institutions in the land, is making its venture in basketball participation for the first time. It has a track meet, wrestling and swimming meets, and boxing and tennis tournaments.

Brown was host to the National Collegiate wrestling championship meet in the spring of 1931, and Dick Cole, the present Brown varsity mat coach, was gained as a result of that tournament. He was one of the champions crowned in the Elmgrove avenue gymnasium which bears Dr. Marvel's name, and Dr. Marvel was thoroughly impressed with the qualities that Cole demonstrated in that tourney. Brown has appeared in N. C. A. A. swimming and wrestling meets, but has not had the material to warrant competition in the track offerings, that meet usually being in the Middle West in mid-June.

The parallel of Brown's participation in the first Rose Bowl games in football and in this first National Collegiate Basketball tournament was drawn yesterday, and while a bit farfetched it nevertheless indicates the prestige that Brown carried at the time these two epoch-making events were inaugurated.

It is a safe prediction that this N. C. A. A. basketball tournament is going to be a ten-strike right from its early years, and is a certainty to grow in stature. It was a real achievement for Brown to get in this year, and now the plan is to prepare well enough to stay in and advance to the Evanston tournament. Meanwhile Providence College lurks dangerously ahead as Brown bids a farewell to the home court for this season. This is the greatest hoop team Brown ever had, and it has the wherewithal to move along in tournament competition.

## FRIARS, 44 TO 25;

## WILSON SETS PACE

### BROWN GUARD

### PILES UP TOTAL OF 18 POINTS

Plays Strong Defensive Game

Also; Sweeney Holds

Platt in Check.

With Frank Wilson contributing 18 points to the cause and proving the most powerful defensive factor, the best basketball team in Brown's history brought its campaign to a close last night by ending the long domination of Providence College, 44 to 25.

Upwards of 2000 fans watched the Bruins do what no Brown team has been able to do since 1922—defeat the Friars on the court—and it was Wilson who made the triumph an easy achievement.

Alert, astute and aggressive, Wilson scored from the deep reaches of the court, from in close on clever plays, and added to the Friars' woes by tossing in three baskets on sleepers. Meanwhile his mates were throwing up such a tight defence that Providence was limited to nine field goals, three in the first half.

The Friars got the jump, but midway through the first half Brown went ahead, 11 to 6, as Wilson scored twice from the field and once from the free throw line in less than a minute. That one surge, made possible by Brown's adroit passwork, turned the complexion of the game entirely and generated the head of steam the Bruins needed to send them winging away.

Wilson's 10 points, seven by Harry Platt and five by Jack Padden, in addition to Capt. George Truman's free flip, enabled Brown to lead, 23 to 9, at the intermission.

Upon resumption of hostilities, the Bruins dominated the situation so completely that they boosted their total of 36 before the Friars were able to score. Their defence was in keeping with their attack, and it wasn't until the eighth minute of the period that Providence tallied.

Then the Friars took charge of things for five minutes, Jimmy Leo carrying the brunt of the attack that brought them up to 15, while holding the Bruins scoreless. Leo and Bill Murphy did virtually all the Providence scoring thereafter, while Brown, with Wilson continuing his excellent marksmanship and forwards, used in relays, each notching a basket, matching their efforts.

It wasn't until Leo's arrival in the second half that the Friars were able to penetrate the Brown defence and Jimmy, covering plenty of court and generally deporting himself well, tossed in 10 points, eight of them on field goals. Murphy's two field goals came on long heaves.

Brown, with the eastern eliminations at Philadelphia just ahead, looked better than at any time during the past two weeks. The teamwork was sound, passing crisp and accurate and with Wilson hot, the Bruins fed him—and he did the rest. Frank was the standout to be sure, but the excellent all around performances of his mates made the substantial victory margin possible.

\* \* \*

The Friars rarely were able to work under the hoop, and their overhead passing was wasted as the Bears made good use of their advantage in height. They ruled the backboards a good part of the time, but Paul Sweeney of the Friars saw to it that his team got a share of the rebounds, even though he had a full time job on his hands outjumping such Bruins as Padden, Truman and Person.

Between the halves the Brown and Providence reserves staged a game of their own, with seven men on a side. They both shot for the same basket and the action was pretty fast.

Capt. George Truman of the Bears received a tremendous ovation as he left the floor. Hope High's State champions were on hand, guests of Brown, and they were cheering loudly for Capt. Truman, Hope alumnus and only Providence man on the Brown squad.

Paul Sweeney did a thorough job of guarding Harry Platt, limiting him to nine points—two in the second half. Harry, however, sparkled on defence and did good work in play-making, but Sweeney gave him few chances to shoot.

The Friar Freshmen salvaged some of the night's glory when they defeated the Bruin Cubs, 36 to 34, in overtime. Marone was the hero of the Freshman game, collecting 14 points, while Juges was holding Peterson, the Cubs' scoring star, to six points.

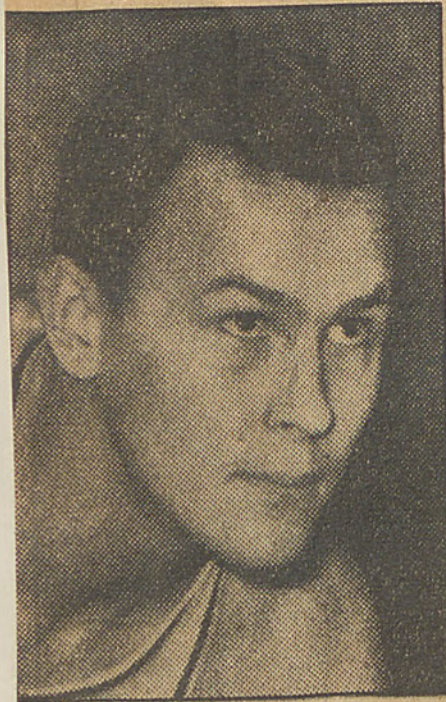

A 21-game schedule, embracing contests with several of the East's principal baseball powers, will be played this spring by Providence College.

The program, which includes games with teams from five States, was arranged by Coach Artie Quirk. It is a compact schedule, opening April 13 with St. John's at Brooklyn and concluding with Tufts, here June 2. Fourteen of the contests will be played at Hendricken Field.

Karl Sherry, one of the Friars' outstanding pitchers, who was graduated in 1937, will assist Coach Quirk, having charge of the Freshman team.

Sherry scored many triumphs for the Friars and had the Indian sign on Holy Cross during his varsity years. He is president of the Blackstone Valley Alumni Club and has been employed in Pawtucket since graduation. His material is an unknown quantity, but since the Freshman schedule doesn't open until May 1 he will have a good chance to look his squad over before the firing starts.

The Friars played only a 14-game schedule last season, winning 11 and losing three, but this spring they are taking in considerably more territory. Brown and Rhode Island State will be met twice each as the State teams wage their annual championship round robin series and such well known baseball colleges as Holy Cross, Boston College, Villanova, St. John's and Seton Hall will be opposed in home and home series.

Coach Quirk won't have much time to prepare his team for the opening games, unless he gets unprecedented help from the weather man, but he has a number of upperclassmen who gained some experience in previous

years available and some promising sophomores. He seems to be particularly well fortified in pitching and catching, and there will be a mixture of lettermen and 1938 reserves striving for the infield and outfield berths.

Joe Kwasniewski, ace of last year's mound staff, is on hand again, along with Walter Morris, Dan McKinnon and Paul Sweeney, who were with the team a year back. Ambrose Reynolds and Lefty Fallon look like the most promising sophomores, and others who have gained considerable experience and who will be seeking jobs are Sherry, Davies, Doyle, Carter, Griffin, Gray and Padden.

Capt. Elt Deuse, one of the best catchers in college ranks, looms as a fixture behind the plate, with Jack Levy his chief rival. For first base Coach Quirk has Jimmy Leo, Harrison, Doyle and Kusnitz. Second base aspirants are Jim Begley, Vinny Nugent, Milt Bleiden, Danahy and Bielen. Donat Brochu, who shared the job with Bill Moge last season, is leading third base candidate, with Clarkin, product of the 1938 Freshman team, his principal threat.

Hal Martin, a veteran, Jack Barnini, Bill Murphy, Jack Werbicki, Jimmy Pettine and Lee are among the outfield prospects. Barnini was a catcher last year.

The Freshman schedule is a six-game affair now, but will be expanded, the dates with Rhode Island Freshmen not being settled yet.

# Potential Battery Strength Encourages Coach of Friars

Wide Open Battles Likely for  
Several of the Infield and  
Outfield Positions.

Dr. Arthur Quirk, Professor of Physics, who took over the baseball problems at Providence College last season, and did a thorough job, is looking toward the new campaign with considerable optimism, largely because of potential battery strength.

With Capt. Elt Deuse on hand for catching duties and Joe Kwasniewski, who was undefeated last season as a sophomore, heading the mound staff, the Friar outlook is far from dark. Moreover, there are a number of very likely pitching candidates to help Kwasniewski along, such flingers as Walter Morris, of Providence; Steve Fallon of Pawtucket and Amby Reynolds of West Haven all sophomores, giving indication that they will go places. In addition Paul Sweeney, John Doyle, Dan McKinnon, John Daley, Jim Griffin and Bill Sherry have marked possibilities.

\* \* \*

Kwasniewski won six starting assignments last season, going the route in every game, and appears to be even faster this season. Morris, with the Freshmen a year ago, is one of the outstanding prospects to appear at Providence College in several years. Although relatively small, Morris is very fast and has an excellent curve. Reynolds, has blazing speed and because of his height—he is six feet, three inches tall—his fast one causes plenty of trouble as it dips down at the hitter.

Deuse, one of the really classy catchers in collegiate circles last season, is largely a Quirk product. As a sophomore he was awkward and nervous, but under Quirk he developed into a cool and capable performer. His hitting is good and his throwing exceptional.

Having had his batterymen out for two weeks, Coach Quirk has been able to bring them along well and yesterday said that they were ready for hard work. No sore arms have developed, and the staff seems ripe right now to step into competition. Deuse is in fine shape and Jack Levey, a Sophomore, is a likely replacement. Then, should anything arise to put both those boys out of action, the Friars have the irreplaceable Jack Barnini available. Jack was a reserve catcher last season, but will probably be used as an outfielder this spring, unless circumstances demand that he resume his place behind the bat.

\* \* \*

Apart from pitching and catching, wide open battles will be waged for positions, with at least two strong candidates for every berth. At first base Noel Doyle, Jimmy Leo and Ray Harrison are the leading hopes. Leo is a terrific hitter, but isn't as nifty around the bag as Harrison, who fields the position with the ease and grace of last year's star, Fisher.

\* \* \*

Milt Bleiden, a fine all around ball player; Vinny Nugent and Jim Bagley are the second base candidates and the fight for that berth is apt to be torrid. Johnny Ayvazian, regular shortstop a year back, will have his hands full retaining the position against the challenge of Jack Keenan, up from the Freshman team, and a similar struggle looms at third base.

Right now Donat Brochu, who replaced Bill Moge during the late stages of the 1938 campaign and hit around .300 in six games, is the leading third base aspirant, but in Art Clarkin of Providence, who held down that berth with the Freshmen, he has a serious threat. Both hit and field well and Coach Quirk isn't likely to have an easy time picking the starter.

\* \* \*

In the outfield there is only one veteran, Hal Martin, but several promising gardeners are on hand. With Bill Murphy, Norman Urban, Barnini and Jim Padden, a converted pitcher in the race, the outlook is not too bad.

\* \* \*

Coach Quirk has been able to get in two brief outdoor sessions, and although he is far behind in his training program, he isn't worrying out loud. He has plenty of problems for he doesn't know, among other things, whether the Friars will hit. But since his pitching and catching shows exceptional promise, he is living in hopes. He feels that his sophomore candidates demonstrated enough stuff last spring with the Freshmen to insure their holding up this spring—even though he won't be able to decide on his lineup for a week or more. It may be longer, if the weather doesn't warm up a bit, but confidence in his players has left him confident. They worked perfectly for him a year ago and he expects a continuation this spring, for his squad is a hustling outfit.

The Friars lost three infielders by graduation, Fisher, Ploski and Moge; two fine outfielders, Crowley and Bobinski and two pitchers, Ryan and Lynch, but the idea persists that the sophomores will come along well enough to combine with the five experienced veterans, Deuse, Kwasniewski, Ayvazian, Brochu and Martin in the making of another strong ball club.

# FRIARS IN OPENER WITH ST. JOHN'S IN BROOKLYN TODAY

Game Is First of Three for  
Providence College on  
Baseball Road Trip.

Minus many of last year's stars, but still a squad that gives promise of maintaining the high standard of Providence College baseball, the Friars launch their new campaign this afternoon against St. John's College at Brooklyn in the first of a three-game series that will take them into New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Dr. Arthur Quirk named a 15-man squad for the trip yesterday and also announced that Big Joe Kwasniewski, undefeated last year as a sophomore, would pitch the opener this afternoon. In addition Dr. Quirk will have Walter Morris, Steve Fallon and Amby Reynolds available, Morris and Fallon being the likely starters for tomorrow's and Saturday's games against Villanova and Seton Hall.

The squad, accompanied by Student Manager Joe Martellino, Coach Quirk and Rev. Robert G. Quinn, O. P., director of athletics, left at 8 o'clock last night by boat for New York, where they will make their headquarters at the McAlpin Hotel.

The Friars will be dressed in new uniforms as they open the season, the regimentals being a departure from the usual black and white, or black and gray of P. C. teams. The new uniforms are gray with gold and blue binding, blue letters and blue stockings with gold bands.

In addition to Kwasniewski, today's starting lineup will have Johnny Ayvazian at short, Donat Brochu at third, Hal Martin right field, Capt. Elt Deuse catch, Jim Padden left field, Jimmy Leo first base, Jim Bagley second base and either Norm Urban or Jack Barnini centre field.

Ayvazian is a veteran, having made the grade last spring as a sophomore. Martin is the only survivor of last year's starting outfield and Brochu finished the season at third after Bill Moge's arm went lame.

However, Dr. Quirk is confident that this team will click despite the presence of five comparatively inexperienced men in the starting lineup.

The struggle for positions is far from settled, torrid battles being in progress for the first and second base jobs as well as for outfield assignments.

At the moment Leo and Bagley are leading Bob Harrison and Vinny Nugent on the strength of their sharper hitting. Harrison is a particularly nifty first baseman but lacks Leo's slashing power at the plate and Bagley is ahead of Nugent for the same reason.

Barnini, in addition to his outfield chores, is a catcher and can step in as a replacement for Captain Deuse if need be. Padden, in left, is a converted pitcher who has come along amazingly fast in the past week or so and looms as the best defensive gardener on the squad.

Harrison and Nugent left with the squad and it is probable that they will take part in the opening encounters, especially if Leo and Bagley fall down in their batting.

Coach Quirk is hopeful that his pitching will hold up, especially after the good form the hurlers have displayed during recent workouts. Kwasniewski already has worked two full games in practice without showing any signs of weariness and Fallon, Morris and Reynolds have been increasing their length of service gradually until they now are ready to go the route.

The Friars will have their hands full with St. John's, Villanova and Seton Hall, particularly in view of the greater progress made in training by teams in that section. But there is a lot of natural ability on this P. C. squad and Coach Quirk is confident that their hustling tactics and aggressiveness will offset the advantages somewhat warmer climate has given their opening opponents.

## JOE KWASNIEWSKI GIVES SEVEN HITS, TWO EARNED RUNS

Martin and Deuse Set Pace  
with Three Blows Apiece;

Brooklyn, April 13—Behind the seven-hit pitching of Big Joe Kwasniewski, the Providence College baseball team launched its 1939 campaign with a 10 to 4 victory over St. John's College here today. Cold weather hampered the teams greatly, St. John's making 10 errors on hard hit balls and the Friars four.

Kwasniewski's performance, in view of the frigid weather, was remarkable. He scattered the seven hits well, permitted scores in only two innings, the fifth and ninth, three errors contributing to the St. John's runs in the fifth. In addition he fanned five and yielded no passes.

Meanwhile Hal Martin and Capt. Eli Deuse were leading the Friar attack with three hits apiece, Martin getting two singles and a double in three trips, while Deuse collected three singles in six trips. Jimmy Leo played good ball at first in addition to pounding out a brace of singles.

The Friars opened the scoring in the first on two hits and an error by Catcher Ferrara at the plate. One hit and a sacrifice coupled with six St. John's errors produced four runs in the third and in the fifth another was added on a pass to Martin, single by Deuse, Martin's theft of third and a wild pitch.

Two walks and hits by Martin, Deuse and Leo, scored two runs in the eighth and the Friars wound up with another pair in the ninth. Ayvazian doubled and Martin singled him home after which Padden walked and Harrison's single sent Martin across with the 10th run.

St. John's earned runs came in the ninth when Kwasniewski let up, permitting three successive hits, good for two runs. The first pair were manufactured on a single, three errors and a wild pitch.

The Friars looked good although the weather was anything but suitable for baseball. Their hitting was sharp and well-bunched and they took full advantage of their hosts' 10 boots.

Kwasniewski, in winning today, ran his string to seven straight as a Friar. Last season he won his six starting assignments, going the distance in every game.

Sophomore Monaco, who also is a football luminary, was defensively shakey at the outset, but he soon settled down and his play was a bright spot. Monaco led the Crusader offensive with a triple and single in three attempts, the three-bagger being the spearhead of his team's three-run, third inning uprising.

Still another Rhode Island youth, Red Durand of Georgiaville, played a good game for the Crusaders. Durand, Holy Cross captain, didn't show much of a batting punch, but he excelled afield, providing the pivotal manoeuvre in the Crusader double-killing that nipped a seventh-inning Providence threat.

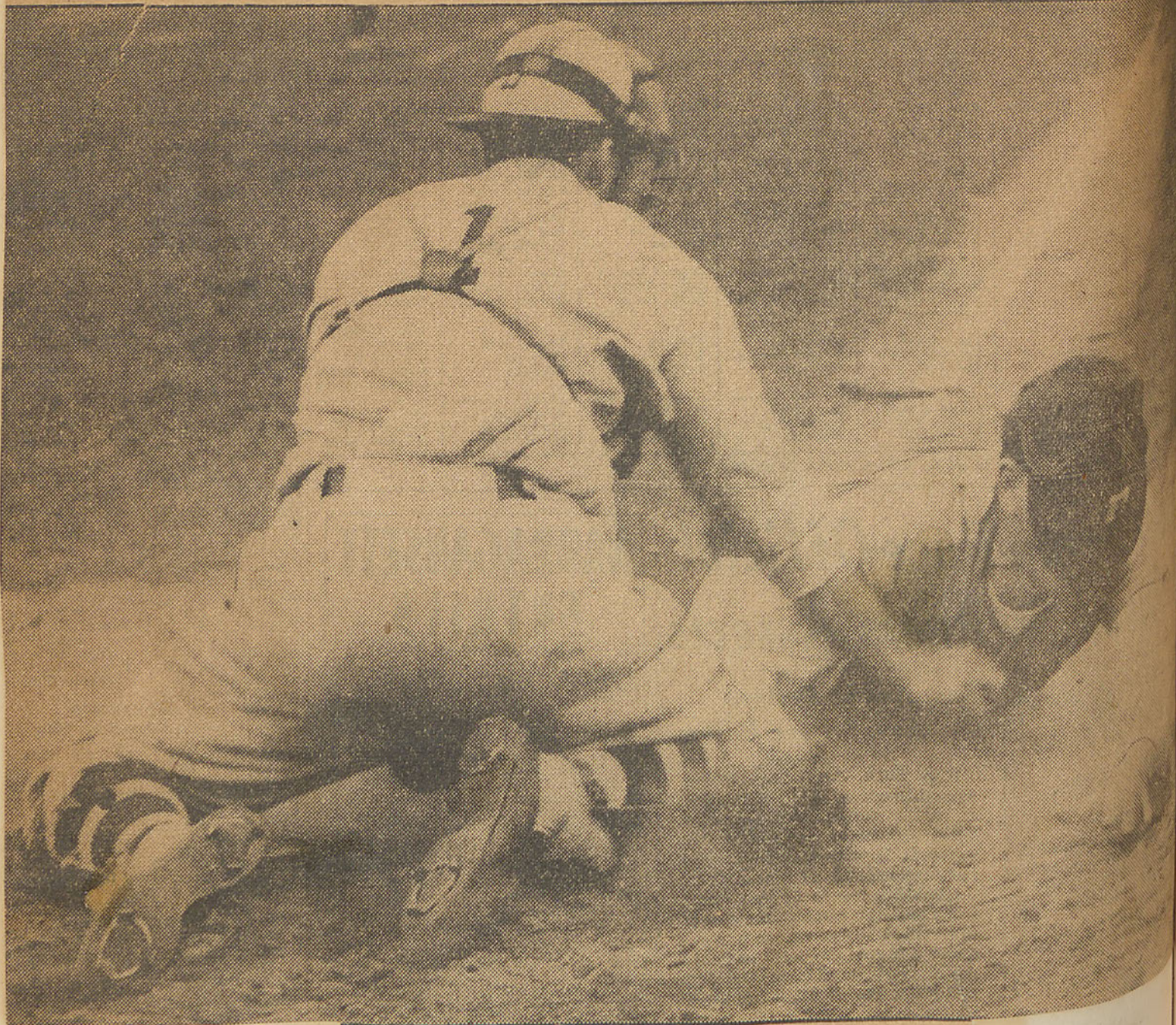

# Elton Deuse, Friars' Captain, Appears Headed For Career as Professional Baseball Player

## College Foes Find Catcher None Too Lenient When It Comes to Stealing Bases.

Capt. Elton Deuse of the Providence College baseball team and one of the outstanding catchers in collegiate circles, is definitely headed for a professional career.

The big fellow—he is a mere six feet, four inches—has received several attractive offers to try his luck at big time baseball and although scouts from an assortment of teams have talked turkey with him, he is still unsigned and will remain that way until after he receives his diploma next month.

Although he fully intends to take a fling at the professional game, Deuse is non-committal on which club he will affiliate with. Apart from admitting his intentions, Deuse's only reference to professional ball is a fervent hope that whatever club he signs with will farm him to some outfit far removed from the tall timbers. He has a fondness for the Red Sox, however.

Deuse doesn't believe he's ready for major league ball and would prefer a term in the minors to a decorative position on some big league bench. A term in the minors might be just what he needs to polish him up to major league calibre for he has the makings. There's little doubt about that.

During the past two seasons he has improved rapidly in every department, especially in hitting. Previously a dead left field hitter whose towering smashes became routine outs, Deuse, aided and abetted by his coach, Dr. Arthur Quirk, has become a very handy guy at slapping the ball into right field and a good percentage of his hits in recent games have been into right—with the opposition ganging up on the other side of the field for him.

A good target, clever handler of pitchers and an industrious performer, Deuse is held in high regard by opposing base runners. He can rifle the ball, make no mistake about that. As a matter of record, only one base has been stolen on him this season, Orr of Dartmouth perpetrating the theft. Numerous others have ventured down to second on him, with dire results, for his throws to Johnny Ayzavian and Jim Bagley have snuffed such am-

bitious runners in short order.

He has a penchant for picking men off bases and although he has fired very frequently this spring he was off line only once—against Springfield at a time when the verdict was signed and sealed and ready to be delivered.

Deuse is the Friars' leading hitter with a mark of .401 for 15 games. He has been to bat 57 times, collecting 19 hits, three doubles, four triples and one home run. His homer, incidentally, was belted over the right field fence, quite a trick for a right handed hitter.

He leads the Friars in all attacking departments but two, those being under the command of Jimmy Leo, the ample but agile first

baseman. Leo, who is hitting .333, has hit two homers this year to Deuse's one and has driven in 23 runs, to 14 for Elt, Deuse himself generally being aboard when Leo's bat propelled runs across the plate.

There are many tricks of the trade that Deuse still has to master, but his improvement has been so rapid and steady that hopes for a bright future are high. One of his principal assets is his refusal to hit at bad balls, a condition that has brought him passes with increasing frequency this season and kept that batting mark up in that elite circle—among the .400 hitters.

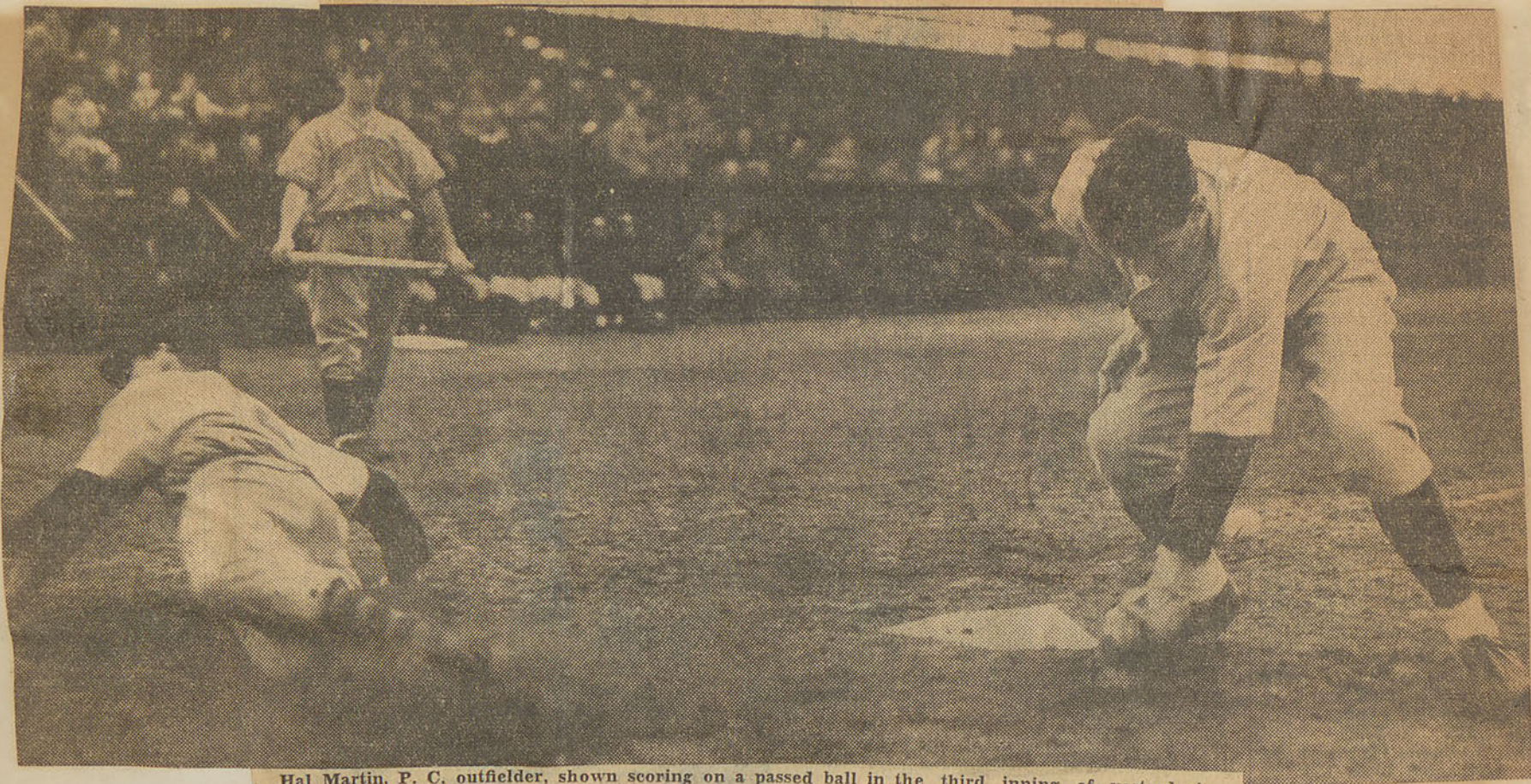

Fallon worked the first six innings, retiring with the score two-all, not because of vanishing effectiveness, but because Coach Art Quirk didn't want him to go the route because of the cold. Fallon gave six hits, four passes and struck out seven.

It was Steve's first varsity start and he did well, Bates's first run being no particular fault of his. True, he walked O'Sullivan with one out in the third, and yielded a hit to Hasty Thompson after retiring another batter, but with Hasty on first and O'Sullivan on third, Bates pulled a double steal and Deuse threw out Hasty from here to there, only to have the usually reliable Ayyazian drop the peg and O'Sullivan scamper across.

## *A Run in the Book Is Worth Two on the Bases*

The Friars came from behind to triumph, for, after taking a four-run lead in the third inning, they dropped behind, 5 to 4, in the sixth, but reached level terms again in the seventh.

State loomed threateningly in the third when it placed two on after two were out, but Kwasniewski fanned Keaney to escape danger. He was less fortunate, however, in the fourth inning, for the Rams bounced back with three runs.

The law of averages prevailed in this inning for Conley got back the two bases his team had lost on Graham's error when his clout to centre, that under ordinary conditions, would have been an easy out, was misjudged by Martin. Providence College teed off merrily against a pair of St. Peter's pitchers for 14 hits, including three triples and a home run, yesterday at Hendricken Field and drubbed the Jersey City collegians, 17 to 7, in a contest wisely curtailed after six and a half innings.

The visitors had come by boat, with little satisfaction. Not being old hands at the sea-faring game, the Jerseyites weren't quite themselves and they felt considerably worse after the Friars got through treating them to a second stormy passage.

Johnny Ayvazian and Donat Brochu tripled in succession in the first, setting the tempo for a Friar attack that was good for 23 bases. Moreover, the home heroes made excellent use of seven bases on balls, a hit batsman and nine St. Peter's errors.

Lefty Fallon was the P. C. starting pitcher and the way the Jerseyites greeted him gave the locals' adherents reason to suspect that disastrous business was about to be transacted. Fallon, however, warmed to his task after giving up three runs in the first two innings and breezed along nicely for the next three, retiring after the fifth with a 15 to 3 advantage.

The ball slid under the fence, otherwise Elt might have made the circuit. Barnini was hit by a pitched ball and Leo went out on a terrific smash at First Baseman Cochrane, who made a brilliant play, but had no chance to stop Deuse from scoring.

Providence was blanked in the third but in the fourth—the deluge! Barnini singled and kept going as the right fielder juggled the ball and Leo reached when his easy roller was maltreated by Murphy and Keenan walked, a feat he performed four times. ## WALTER MORRIS LIMITS BRUINS TO SEVEN HITS

Friars Chase Walter Juszczyk

Walter Morris's seven-hit pitching, ably supported by robust hitting, gave Providence College a 10 to 2 victory over Brown yesterday at Hendricken Field and gave the Friars a flying start toward the State intercollegiate championship.

Walter Juszczyk, Brown's brilliant sophomore hurler, was the victim, retiring in the seventh after he had been clubbed for eight hits and nine runs. In that stretch—he gave way to Cheever with one down in the seventh—he fanned six but gave as many passes and uncorked a first-inning wild pitch that sent the Friars' first two runs scurrying across.

Morris, meanwhile, was working easily and effectively, but not until Hal Martin opened the sixth with a tremendous smash over the right-centrefield fence, touching off a five-run uprising, was he completely in command. Brown errors contributed heavily to the Providence total, one in the first setting the stage for the two runs and another in the sixth permitting two more to cross.

The Cranston sophomore only fanned two men but was so effective he forced 15 of the Bruins to fly out, eight others being thrown out at first. He issued two passes, to Pietrusza in the fourth and Hicks in the sixth, and, strangely enough, they were the two who scored. Redford, Arrendell and Marsolini were his chief tormentors, each getting two hits, one of Redford's being a well-hit two-bagger.

Ayvazian, Martin and Leo collected two apiece for the Friars.

Morris gave up hits to Redford and Arrendell in the second, but they died a-languishing as Morris got Platt and Sigloch handily. Arrendell singled again, but Morris ended the suspense by handling Platt's high foul fly himself.

Juszcyk, meanwhile, was doing nicely. He issued a pass in the second, third and fourth, but bore down efficiently and escaped unscathed and appeared to be headed for greater glory when he retired the Friars in order in the fifth.

Martin, however, greeted him in the sixth with a drive that cleared the fence by about 20 feet. Deuse, who walked three times, singled and was sacrifice along by Barnini. Leo singled off Marsolini's glove, Deuse taking third and Bagley was purposely walked, filling the bases. Then came one for the book. Urban

lofted a fly to short left which was chased, it seemed, by everyone. Pietrusza barely got his glove on it and lost it, Marsolini retrieving.

## Friars Cut Loose In Sixth Inning With Five Run Rally

Kwasniewski Hurls Good Ball  
as Teammates Feature at  
Bat and in Field.

Baffled for five innings by the speed and curves of big Tom Ananicz, the Providence College hitters burst loose in the sixth with their most devastating show of power of the campaign, belted five runs across and ultimately whipped St. John's of Brooklyn, 8-1 yesterday at Hendriken Field.

Ananicz, a classy southpaw, and Joe Kwasniewski of the Friars had tangled in a brilliant mound duel through that stretch and as they extended their mastery over the batters inning after inning the lone run that Capt. Elt Deuse's smash off Al Pecora's glove, Al's wild throw and Jimmy Leo's slashing single had produced in the second loomed proportionally large.

But in the sixth they shelled Ananicz with such a furious barrage, after two were out, that they removed all doubt from the picture. Kwasniewski, meanwhile, maintained his brilliant pace and his sup-

porting cast handled every chance with agility and effectiveness.

Johnny Ayvazian opened the sixth with a sharp single but after Donat Brochu had sacrificed him along Hal Martin, batting hero of the Brown game, was thrown out at first and the fury seemed to have abated. Ananicz worked so carefully on Deuse, however, that he passed the Friar catcher, a dangerous hitter, and Jack Barnini redeemed himself for two previous strikeouts by clouting a double against the right centrefield fence, scoring both. Leo came next and lashed a line drive over the fence for a homer, boosting the total to five. Bagley reached on an error and scored when Norman Urban dumped a double into left.

A second onslaught followed in the eighth, which Deuse opened with a tremendous homer over the right field wall. Barnini forthwith pounded his second double, went to third on Bagley's single and scored on Kwasniewski's long fly to centre.

The Redmen picked up their lone tally in the seventh as Kwasniewski walked Rosenbaum and DeStefano in succession, got the former and Sheehan on a double play, but gave up a single to Ananicz which sent DeStefano across.

That was St. John's only threatening gesture for Kwasniewski, although giving six passes, had the visitors hitting into the dirt most of the time. Only six balls were hit out of the infield, Leo at first having 15 putouts and Kwasniewski himself six assists. Ayvazian at short had five assists, Brochu at third four and Bagley at second three. He started the Friars' two double plays.

Leo almost made an error in the second, but alert play prevented it. Jimmy deflected Pecora's bouncer to Bagley, but got back to the bag quickly enough to handle Jim's snap throw.

Fielding was generally crisp, DeStefano's handling of Avvazian's slow roller in the third being one of the best bits.

Yesterday's cannonading brought the Friars' total to 46 hits in four games. Their total bases yesterday were 20.

During the sixth inning uprising Bagley fell rounding first and quick repairs on his pants were necessary. The Friars went into a huddle during the seventh at their bench, forming a human dressing room while Jim made a quick change.

Leo's drive over the wall went like a brassie shot and Doug Sheehan, in trying to stop short, slid under the fence and stuck there.

# FRIARS BEAT BEARS, 7-1, TO COP STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

## WALTER MORRIS MUZZLES BEARS

Given Sparkling Support as  
Dominicans Register 10th  
Victory in 11 Starts.

Providence College's alert baseball team, turning in an excellent all-around performance, gained its second victory over Brown in eight days yesterday, defeating the Bruins 7 to 1 and parading to the State collegiate championship.

Walter Morris, who turned the Bruins back a week ago with seven hits, was even more effective yesterday, yielding five and when disconcerting circumstances arose the Cranston sophomore either pitched his way out of difficulty or his support came up with sparkling plays.

Then there was the matter of the Friars' attack—an 11-hit onslaught that included a double and triple by Capt. Elt Deuse and a double by Johnny Ayvazian. Donat Brochu, sticking strictly to singles, collected three and Morris himself checked in with two, belting the first Providence run across in the second.

\* \* \*

The Friars drove Ed Lally to cover with none out in third and Ray McCulloch relieved him, being in action for only one play during which he was knocked out by a thrown ball. The Friars had the bags loaded when McCulloch entered, being confronted by none other than the elongated Deuse, which was bad news.

Deuse clouted a long fly to Harkins in centre, scoring Ayvazian, and McCulloch, handling the throw in, was struck over the eye and knocked out when the ball took a vicious hop.

The Browns, full of battle, hopped on Morris gleefully in the first but a lightning double play, Brochu to Deuse to Leo halted the uprising. Charlie Harkins had walked and singles by Pietrusza and Cad Arrendell sent him across. Smead Redford's sacrifice moved them along and Morris walked Marsolini, but Platt's smash was converted into a double killing.

Brown got Dave Sigloch to third with none out in the second on a pass and a passed ball, but Morris started curving and Sheehan, Lally and Harkins went down on flies to the infield. Thereafter the Bears made only one really threatening gesture and it took some fast fielding to prevent at least one run.

Arrendell and Marsolini were given passes in the sixth and, with one out, Capt. Danny Hicks was sent to bat for Platt. Danny promptly pisted a drive into left field but Jack Barnini played it perfectly and fired a beautiful shot to Deuse at the plate and Arrendell was nailed.

A pass to Jimmy Leo at the start of the second launched the P. C. offensive. Bagley sacrificed and Urban was safe when Marsolini overran his easy tap. Then came Morris with a sharp single that scored Leo but Urban was retired at third on Harkins' perfect peg from centre. Ayvazian clouted a double over Pietrusza's head in left and Morris scampered across.

Martin opened the third by walking and Deuse, ordinarily a left field hitter, slashed a triple down the right field foul line, pickling a slow ball. Barnini walked and stole and Leo's single scored both. Pietrusza retired Urban, making a nice catch of his smash into deep left and Urban lined to Marsolini.

A bit of confusion launched the fourth, precipitating the rally that led to Lally's departure and McCulloch's brief tenure. Ayvazian hit to Platt far from the bag and Lally was slow covering resulting in a hurried—and wide—throw by Platt

which enabled Johnny to reach. Brochu and Martin singled, filling the bags and ending Lally's term of office. Deuse's long fly and the accident which cost Brown McCulloch's services followed fast.

Cheever came in and thereafter slow-balled the Friars' attack down to a walk. He got Barnini on a pop fly and Leo on a grounder, leaving two men stranded.

For the next three innings only Deuse reached, doubling in the sixth. Providence got an unearned run in the eighth and went down without a murmur in the ninth. Morris had opened with his second hit and gone to third on Brochu's high bounding single, which Cheever deflected. Martin forced Brochu and then tried a delayed double steal. The Bears were running down Martin when Morris streaked for the plate and Marsolini, switched to first after Platt's departure, threw far over Sigloch's head.

Cheever's tantalizing slow ball, mixed with an infrequent half speed pitch, limited the slugging Friars to three hits in 5 2-3 innings, but the horse had been stolen by that time for the Friars had tucked away their 10th victory in 11 starts.

# KWASNIEWSKI HERO AS FRIARS CONQUER VILLANOVA, 1 TO 0

## PITCHER TALLIES ONLY RUN, TURNS IN 5-HIT GAME

Scores in 8th on Wild Pitch  
by Desmond, Who Also  
Hurls Good Ball.

The speed in Big Joe Kwasniewski's good right arm, in his thinking apparatus and in his legs enabled Providence College to score a 1 to 0 victory over Villanova yesterday afternoon at Hendricken Field in a beautifully played ball game that was replete with sparkling fielding feats.

Seven and one-half innings of scoreless ball had been played when Kwasniewski went to bat in the eighth, with one out. The pitcher singled to deep short and Mike Lozorchak, whose performance up to that point had been spectacular, threw low in an attempt to beat Joe, but the ball bounded, struck Joe on the shoe and caromed into right field, Kwasniewski capitalizing on the break and streaking to third.

Johnny Ayvazian came to bat and the squeeze play was put on, Kwasniewski getting a flying start and Pitcher Joe Desmond, trying to hurry his delivery, uncorked a wild pitch, Kwasniewski scoring without difficulty. It was probable that Joe would have stolen home, even on a perfect throw, for he had gotten a tremendous lead. He most certainly would have made it had Ayvazian bunted fairly.

\* \* \*

It was ironical that such a brilliantly waged duel should be determined by a miscue, for up to that both teams had performed in expert fashion, sparkling fielding plays following in rapid succession whenever the hitters did manage to solve the speed and curves of Kwasniewski and Desmond.

The Friar flinger gave up five hits, as did his opponent, and issued three walks to one, but with men on the bases he was superb, striking out 10 men to Desmond's six. Only once did the Wildcats threaten, but in that fifth inning, after Vigilante had tripled down the left field line with one out, Big Joe bore down and fanned Morris and Desmond.

In the eighth Crawley singled—his third hit—and Lazorchak walked with two out, but Kwasniewski got Donoghue on a routine fly to centre. That was the only time that Villanova got more than one man on in any inning, and in the ninth, after Band forced Wanamaker, who had walked, Ayvazian snagged Basca's liner and doubled Bond off first.

Desmond was virtually as effective as Kwasniewski and for three innings he held the Friars hitless, Kwasniewski being the only man to reach base, walking with two out in the third. No more than four Friars went to bat in any inning up to the fateful eighth as Desmond muffled their power.

Lozorchak and Bond, at first, gave Desmond grand support, the former handling six chances, four of them verging on the spectacular and the latter making some sparkling pickups of throws in the dirt. In the very first inning Lazorchak threw out the three hitters, two of his assists coming on long throws after he had snared drives to deep short.

Jim Bagley, the Friars' second baseman, made two amazing one-handed catches of liners, robbing Bond in the second and Basca in the fourth of what seemed certain hits.

Two of the Wildcats verified for themselves the report that bases aren't stolen on Capt. Elt Deuse of the Friars. He snuffed out Bond in

the fourth and Lozorchak in the sixth with rifle shots to Ayvazian.

It was strictly the pitchers' day. Each team managed to hit only two balls out of the infield when they had men on bases and each was an easy out.

Villanova had two men on bases once, Providence never matching that feat, but they did get two aboard in the eighth, singly, Ayvazian hitting after Kwasniewski had scored.

It was the Friars' ninth straight victory and 11th in 12 games. For Villanova it was the third loss in 10 starts, C. C. N. Y. and Penn State being the other conquerors of the Wildcats.

Deuse singled in the sixth, stole, took third on another heave into centre and tallied on Leo's single, his third blow.

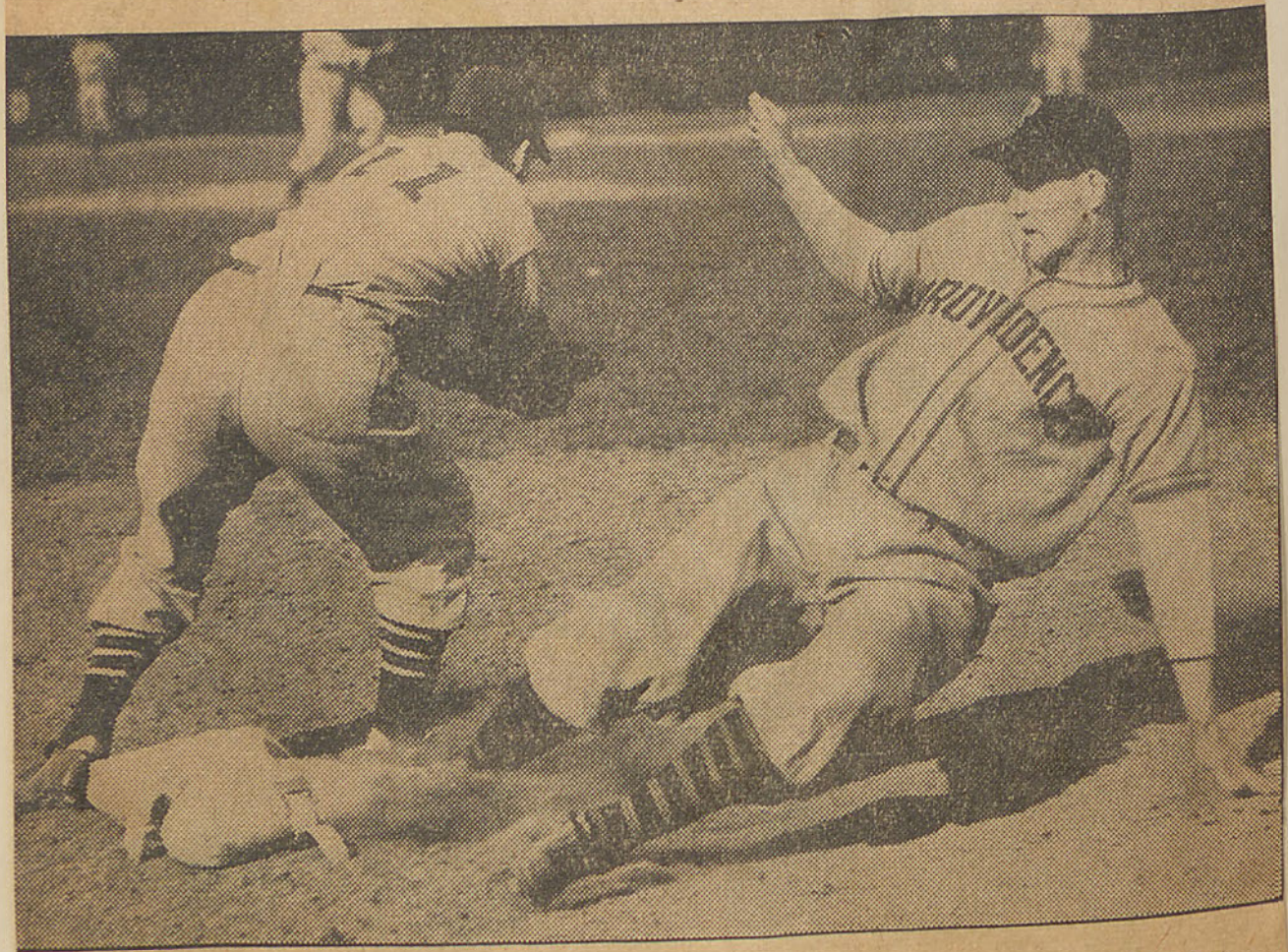

# FRIARS DROP GAME TO EAGLES, 3-2, AS BROCHU IS INJURED

## Providence College Player Hit in Eye By Line Smash

George Fallon, Boston College  
Hurler, Holds Visitors  
to One Hit.

Newton, Mass., May 17.—Their batting attack all but silenced by George Fallon's one-hit pitching, the Providence College baseball team tasted defeat for the second time this season in 14 games when they bowed to Boston College, 3 to 2, on Alumni Field this afternoon.

More serious than the loss of the game, however, was the loss of their star third baseman, Donat Brochu of Warren, who was taken to St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Brighton after he had been struck in the right eye by a line smash in the first inning.

Knocked to the ground when the lusty wallop by Third Baseman Palumbo caromed off the heel of his gloved hand and struck him in the eye, Brochu suffered a severe gash across his eyelid and a slight laceration under his right eye.

Preliminary examination at the hospital by Dr. Edward Burns disclosed that the injury was not as serious as it was first thought to be.

Vision was not impaired but hospital officials decided to keep Brochu there overnight for X-ray pictures and further observation.

Steve "Lefty" Fallon, who started for the Friars, got himself into trouble in the very first inning when he walked the first two batters to face him and then, after one of them had been forced at second, walked the next man to load the bases. Palumbo then sent a line smash toward left that was deflected by Brochu and Buckley crossed home plate with the first Boston College run.

Fallon steadied at this point and, after Brochu had been given first aid and escorted from the field, the Friar left-hander forced Pilote to foul out to Deuse and struck out Flynn. He continued to pitch more effective ball in the second frame when he registered two strikeouts and forced George Fallon to ground out, Bagley to Leo.

In the third the Eagles nicked Fallon for three hits and put over two runs, forcing Fallon to relinquish the pitching duties to Walter Morris. Sawyer smashed a single to right to open the frame, moved to second on Martin's sacrifice bunt and to third on a wild pitch by Fallon. Palumbo walked and both Sawyer and Palumbo came home when Pilote drove a two-bagger into left field that Johnny Barnini made a fine effort to catch but could not hold on to the ball following a fast dash to the left field foul line.

Flynn reached first on a hard-hit grounder down to first which was too hot for Jimmy Leo to handle and when Cromwell drew a walk from Fallon, Coach Arthur Quirk of the Friars called his southpaw out of the game. Morris went in with the bases loaded and struck out George Fallon to end the inning.

From that point forward the Friars kept the Eagles under control, making several fine plays in doing so. No more than four players faced Morris in any of the remaining innings, only three coming to bat in three of the five full frames the former Cranston star hurled.

But the Friars were having a time with George Fallon's hurling. Fallon wasn't the steadiest of pitchers, walking eight all told, but he baffled the Providence club to such an extent that they could get only one solid hit, that a single by Johnny Ayvasian in the seventh that accounted for one of the Friars' runs.

Providence broke into the scoring column in the third frame when Steve Fallon reached first as Pilote juggled his grounder and threw too late to catch Fallon at first. Sawyer gummed up Ayvasian's attempted sacrifice and both Fallon and the Friar shortstop were safe. Keenan sent a hot grounder down to Pilote at short and he muffed it, Fallon scoring. Martin grounded out but Deuse walked to fill the bases. But Barnini and Leo fanned to end the inning.

\* \* \*

With one out in the seventh Morris gained second base when Flynn dropped an easy fly to left field. Morris scored as Ayvasian lined a single to centre. Keenan walked, Martin fanned and Deuse walked to load the bases, but Barnini forced Keenan at third to end the chance.

Leo and Bagley were passed at the start of the eighth and it looked like the Friars might open up at this point. Urban advanced both his mates with a neat sacrifice bunt. Then luck played a favor to the Eagles and Pilote hauled down Morris's line drive and caught Bagley off second for an unassisted double play. The Friars went out in order in the ninth.

## Friar Baseball Star Seriously Injured in Boston College Game

*Donat Brochu of Warren, Struck in Eye by Batted Ball, Suffers Cerebral Concussion and Intraocular Hemorrhage; Extent of Injury Undetermined*

Donat Brochu of Warren, Providence College third baseman, is in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Brighton, his right eye seriously injured and its ultimate fate a question, Dr. Edward J. O'Brien, Jr., who attended him after he was struck by a batted ball in the game with Boston College Wednesday, said late last night.

"Brochu suffered a cerebral concussion and intraocular hemorrhage with damage to the cornea of his right eye," Dr. O'Brien explained, adding that it will be several days before the extent of the damage will be determined.

"Dr. John Burns, an eye specialist, was called into consultation this morning," Dr. O'Brien said, "and it was found that the eye is seriously damaged. He was struck a direct blow by the ball, causing considerable injury."

Dr. O'Brien declined to say whether he thought Brochu's vision would be impaired, explaining that only time can determine.

It was originally thought that a severe cut over the eye was the extent of Brochu's injuries—the cut requiring several stitches, but the more severe aspects of the case came to light yesterday morning.

Brochu was hurt during the first inning of the Boston College game, at Chestnut Hill. The bases were full at the time and the Friar infield was playing in on the grass in an attempt to cut off a run when Third Baseman Palumbo of the Eagles hit a terrific line drive straight at Brochu but a little over his head.

Brochu leaped for the ball, which struck the heel of his glove, caromed off and hit him on the eye. He fell to the ground, a severe gash above the right eye and a slight laceration under it. He was taken immediately to Cardinal O'Connell House at St. Elizabeth's.

X-ray pictures disclosed no fracture, which gave rise to the belief that the injury was not serious, but yesterday's developments created great concern for the eventual strength of the eye.

Providence College lost the ball game, 3 to 2, the reverse being their second defeat in 14 games this spring. Brochu had been an important factor in many of the victories because of his brilliant fielding and consistent hitting. He is a junior.

### Special Mass Planned For Friars' Brochu

The Providence College baseball team is going to do the only thing in its power for Donat Brochu this morning—pray. While their injured mate lay in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Brighton, his right eye badly injured and some danger of impaired vision existing, his fellow Friars will attend a special mass for him at 8 o'clock and receive Holy Communion in a body.

Encouraging reports of Brochu were received at the college yesterday, it being revealed that experiments had disclosed that the star third baseman could distinguish between light and dark.

### Donat Brochu to Lose Eye; Operation Planned

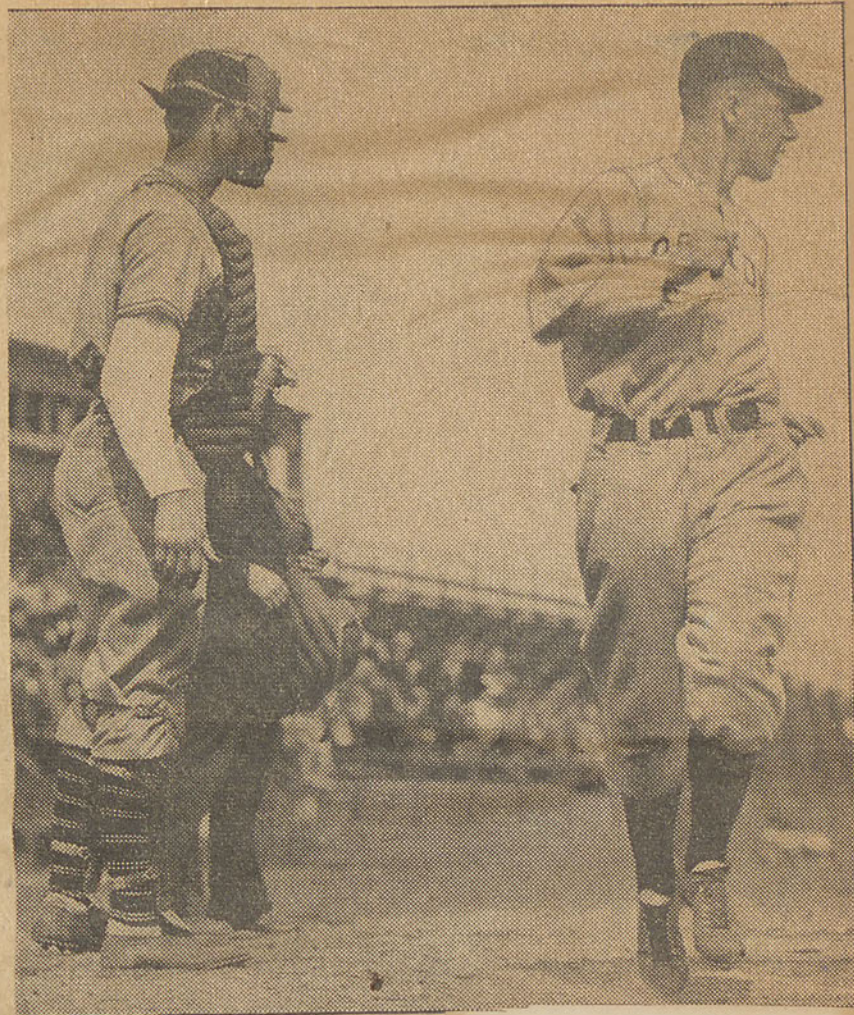
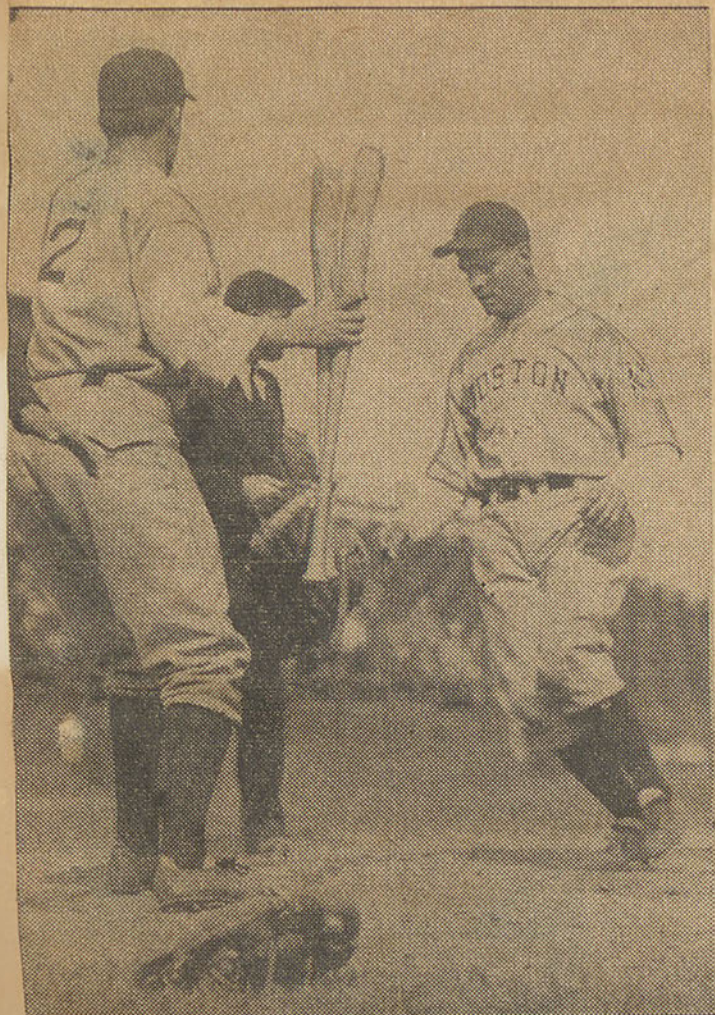

George Fallon repeated his mastery of Providence College yesterday, turning back the Friars, 4 to 2, for his and Boston College's second victory over them in four days. On Wednesday he beat them with one hit, yesterday he did it with two.

Although Fallon baffled the Friars in the pinches, it was largely the locals' listlessness and penchant for hitting at bad balls that simplified matters for George. Providence received 11 bases on balls and got another man aboard on an error, but Fallon was boss with men aboard and 11 languished on the paths.

The Friars had taken the lead in the first on Ayvazian's walk and Deuse's double, but the Eagles went to town in the second. Palumbo reached on Nugent's error, Pilote singled and Flynn sacrificed, Kwasniewski slipping as he attempted to make a play at third, but recovering

in time to retire Flynn. Cromwell then walked and Fallon, with two strikes and no balls on him, singled to centre, sending two across and Buckley followed with a hit that drove in the third run.

Kwasniewski retired the Eagles in order from that point to the sixth, when Pilote singled with two out, but got no farther than first.

In the seventh, Sawyer's triple and Burn's single produced the fourth run.

The Friars wasted a number of opportunities. They left men stranded in the first, third, fourth, sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth.

They made their one real threat, apart from the ninth, when Ayvazian walked and Barnini singled with one out in the third, but Martin popped to the infield and Leo went out on a lusty smash to deep left centre which Flynn gathered in after a long run.

Providence had two aboard with one out in the sixth, got the first man aboard in the seventh and eighth, but Fallon refused to get excited and generally made the Friars hit at bad balls, and the rest was easy for the Eagles.

Sawyer, Boston first baseman, turned in one of the best catches of the season when he took Martin's long foul fly on the dead run in the fifth. He made the catch far out in right field foul territory.

Vinny Nugent came up with a nifty play in the ninth after Cromwell had singled. He handled Fallon's hard hit ball, picked Cromwell off as he went past and threw to Leo for the twin killing.

# Friars Spot Rams Four Runs In First, Then Win, 13 to 4

Morris Combed in Initial Canto,

Rhode Island State combed Walter Morris for four hits and as many runs in the first inning yesterday at Hendriken Field, but Morris settled down quickly and contributed heavily to a subsequent 15-hit Friar barrage that crushed the Rams, 13 to 4, before 1500 fans.

In the first game of the twin bill, the Ram Freshman team drubbed the Friar Freshmen, 12 to 3.

Morris did an abrupt and complete about face, yielding only one hit after that first inning onslaught, and permitting only two others to reach first. He fanned Fitch, State's starting pitcher, in the second, but his curve broke so sharply that it got away from Capt. Elt Deuse; in the fifth he walked Graham and in the eighth Irv Fay got the hit, driving the ball between Morris's feet. Other than that the Rams went down in order.

In the first Graham walked and LaCastro sacrificed. Then Fay and Keaney singled in succession and Conley tripled, after which Butler singled. Meanwhile, Barnini threw to the wrong base on one hit and Martin threw to the stands on another, all of which added up to four runs and almost caused Morris's departure. He suggested that he felt all right, so he remained—and proved it.

Providence showed its first sign of life in two weeks in the third, Urban opening with a double. Morris singled, but LaCastro's fast fielding held Urban on third. Ayvazian, however, singled, scoring both.

Having found the range now, the Friars really went to work on Bill Fitch in the third. Barnini opened the uprising by beating out a bunt, but a remarkable running catch by LaCastro of Leo's long drive to left caused a momentary halt. # Friars Close Home Season By Defeating Tufts, 9 to 3

Providence College Batters

Pounding the offerings of two Tufts College pitchers for 14 hits the Providence College baseball team closed its home season yesterday at Hendricken Field with a 9-3 triumph over the Jumbos, their 14th in 17 starts. Joe Kwasniewski scattered six hits over as many innings and the big Providence junior was only in trouble when he walked a man.

Two of the four men Kwasniewski passed scored, one was nipped at home plate on a perfect throw from right field by Hal Martin and the other reached third base. At the end of six innings Coach Artie Quirk sent Steve Fallon in to pitch for Providence with the victory practically assured, the Friars leading, 9-2.

During the three innings he hurled Fallon gave his bench plenty of jitters, but mixed in some good pitching with the bad and allowed no hits. Tufts scored one run off him when he walked Raphael in the seventh with the bases loaded. Fallon fanned six, the same number Kwasniewski mowed down in six frames.

For three and one-half innings the game was nip and tuck and the tally stood at two runs apiece at that stage. Then the Friars came to life at the plate and four singles rattled off their bats. When that burst of hitting was over Providence had put over three runs and led, 5-2.

The hits continued to pile up in Providence's half of the fifth and they drove Pitcher Joe Gaieski to cover with another four-hit barrage in that stanza. Two singles and a double were hit by the Friars with none out and Gaieski was called out of the game when he walked the fourth man to face him in this particular inning.

Hughes replaced Gaieski and allowed a single which sent two more Friars home, the single being a smash to centre by Jim Bagley. In the fourth inning Barnini, Leo, Bagley and Urban hit singles to account for three runs. In the fifth it was a single by Clarkin, Martin's double to far right field and Deuse's single to right centre that ended Gaieski's reign.

Deuse's single and Leo's double produced the first Friar run in the second. Ayvaziah's single, an error by the Tufts left fielder in handling the ball and a single by Martin netted the Friars their second run in the third. Ayvazian, Martin, Deuse, Leo, and Bagley were the Friars who made two hits apiece. Clarkin, Barnini, Urban and Fallon contributed one each.

Lee walked to open the first inning for Tufts and went to second on an infield out. He streaked for home when Budrunas singled to right but Hal Martin made a perfect throw to Capt. New Haven, Conn., June 10.— Providence College today closed a successful baseball campaign with an 8-5 victory over Yale, whose nine errors presented the visitors with a majority of their runs.

The game, the longest in two years here, was brightened by three fast double plays. Begley's batting featured the visitors' attack.

A total of 17 passes was issued. Ambrose Reynolds, who was generally effective, yielding eight. First Baseman Bill Loveday wrenched his knee and retired, causing a general field shakeup. Henry Holt's catch of Capt. Deuse's fly in the sixth, and his throw nipping Urban at the home plate, was a fielding feature. Yale was unable to hit Relief Pitcher Joe Kwasniewski safely in three innings.

Several wrangles arose over close decisions and Capt. Eddie Collins, Jr., of Yale rebuked First Baseman Leo of the visitors for over-zealous arguing. Leo walked to the Yale bench and expressed his opinion caustically of Collins, who later expressed regret at his original remark, and extended his hand, which Leo grasped.

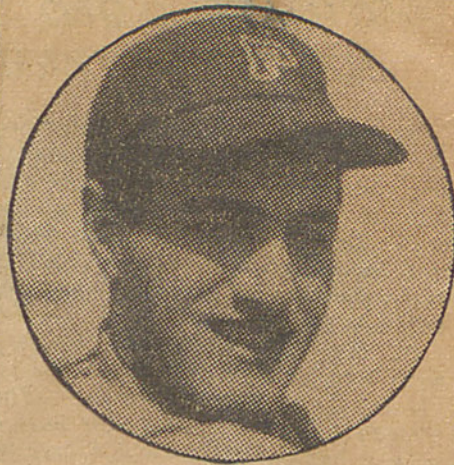
## Injured Brochu and Ayvazian Chosen Co-Captains By Friars
