20 BASKETBALL CANDIDATES ON HAND FOR FIRST P. C. PRACTICE

Basketball practice was the order of the day when 20 candidates reported to Coach Golembeski yesterday afternoon at the La Salle Academy gym to compete for posts on the newest athletic team to represent the Dominican College. Several of the football team were among the men who aspire for berths on the 'Varsity quintet and all reported in fine physical condition. Leading the latter outfit was Capt. Murphy, together with "Chief" Spring, Novakoski, Szydla, Bourdeau, Adair, Allen and Chuck Murphy.

Other clever basketeers who made their initial appearance included "Toadie" Wheeler, the Rogers High leader last winter, and twice a unanimous choice for the post of All-New-England centre, of scholastic ranks while playing at the Tufts tournament; Leo Bourdeau, another All-New-England performer from Fitchburg; McPartland, who cavorted with the Mass. Prep five last year, and Jimmie Victory, the La Salle ace a year ago.

Heck Allen, who aspires to clinch

a forward position, will receive plenty of opposition from some of the seedy performers who showed their wares at the academy gym yesterday, but there is one lad who is determined to give the Troy flash a hard battle. Strange to relate this youngster is Heck's roommate, a rugged lad named Charlie Murphy, who hails from Albany, N. Y. Allen and Murphy were all-interscholastic stars in their high school days in the New York State, and were opponents on several occasions but they are now confining their opposition to competition for a berth on the White and Black quintet.

Gerald Dillon, Leo Supple, Al Conte and "Chief" Spring were members of the stellar Freshman quintet, which enjoyed such a successful campaign last winter, and they are anxious to annex places on the 'Varsity five. The first game is slated for Saturday night at the Bridgewater Normal School, while Dartmouth will provide the opposition next Wednesday at Hanover N. H.

DOMINICAN FIVE HAS 17 CONTESTS ON BASKET CARD

Providence College made another important stride in the development of its athletic programme yesterday with the announcement of a 17-game basketball list by Thomas H. Bride, Jr., newly appointed manager of what will be the first Varsity court team to represent the Dominican institution.

Last winter the college was represented in basketball by a Freshman team, but this season the Dominicans decided to place a Varsity quintet on the floor, under the tutelage of Archie Golembeski, popular football mentor. This move meets with the approval of the student body, which has taken an active interest in winter sports and is anxious to develop basketball and hockey under the Black and White banners.

The schedule which has been drawn up calls for 17 games, two of which are pending. Due to the lack of a gymnasium at the Smith Hill institution, 14 of the contests are slated for foreign courts, with the remaining three tilts listed to be played at the La Salle Academy gym. The latter arena will be used for the practice sessions, which will commence some time next week.

With Golembeski as coach, the Black and White basketeers should make a creditable showing. As there are several clever players among the student body the mentor expects that the first court team of the locals will be able to more than hold its own with some of the best teams in this part of New England. "Spud" Murphy, captain of the football team, is a basketeer of no little ability and while at Torrington high was leader of the quintet which played at the Tufts tournament. Murphy was also chosen All-New England centre in his Senior year at high school.

Other players who are expected to assist the club are Clement Spring and Steve Nawrocki, giant tackles on the football team, and members of the Freshman team last winter, Alfred Conte, former Hope high flash; Gerald Dillon, guard on the yearling quintet a season ago; Dave Adair, a clever player from South County; Leo Bourdeau, flashy halfback on the football team and chosen All New England guard at the Tufts tournament two seasons ago, and Lawrence Wheeler, star Roger high centre, who was twice the recipient of All New England honors.

DOMINICANS WIN BASKET OPENER

Allen and Adair Lead in 31-19 Triumph Over Bridgewater Normal

Bridgewater, Mass., Dec. 4.—The 'Varsity quintet wearing the colors of Providence College proved to be too strong here to-night for the fast Bridgewater Normal five when the Rhode Island outfit annexed a 31 to 19 victory by its stellar playing.

The locals were unable to cope with the attack of the Providence hoopsters and although they made the game a hard-fought affair with the honors about even for the first period, they were unable to stand the pace of their stronger rivals and so lost their early lead and were never able to again threaten.

Allen and Adair proved to be two of the finest court stars to perform on the local floor in some time. Though playing a guard post Adair proved to be very adept at tossing baskets and before the game was very old the Normal guards realized that they had to watch all the Dominican players to ward off attacks on their territory.

Kiley and Shaw were the best bets for the Normal aggregation and in spite of their aggressiveness the Maroon clad athletes were unable to snatch the lead from the Dominicans after the first period. In the opening minutes of the game the Normal team took the lead as the result of two successful foul shots and for awhile it appeared as if the White and Black quintet would have to travel at a brilliant clip to turn in a triumph but as the game settled down the invaders soon swept into the lead, never to be headed.

The Providence outfit showed ability and should be able to cope with the best teams in this vicinity, but to-night they were unable to prove their strength because of the court here. Time and again when they attempted their passing attack they were stopped because of the smallness of the playing area.

After the opening period the Dominicans raced far ahead of Capt. Kiley's aggregation and when the half ended were leading by a 17 to 7 score. Both teams fought hard to score in the third and final periods with the visitors being successful to the extent of collecting 14 more points to swell their total to 31 while the Normal forwards added 12 markers to their column.

The Dominicans opened the scoring when Allen dropped a foul shot through the hoop in the opening minute of play, but after that were never able to cope with the flashy attack of the big Green quintet. At the half time whistle the Rhode Islanders were trailing by an 18 to 10 score.

The second half found the visitors without their rugged left guard, Dave Adair, who was removed from the fray because of personal fouls committed in his over-eagerness to stop the attack of Coach Wachter's cohorts. Without this strong hoopster, whose work featured the first part of the contest, the Black and White attack faltered. As a result, the Dominicans soon found themselves far in the rear and when Coach Wachter sent in his well-drilled substitute aggregation the Dartmouth score was rolled to the 40 mark.

The local quintets showed plenty of power and their brilliant team work completely routed the Black and White. The second five to take the floor proved to be the best outfit of the night. Austin and Vossler led the attack for this aggregation.

COLLEGIATE HOCKEY LEAGUE IS FORMED

Five New England Institutions
Represented at Organization
Meeting in Boston.

DOMINICANS IN CIRCUIT

Governing Body of New Loop Be-
lieves Brown Will Be Added to
List.—Farrell Appointed to
Board of Control

(From a Staff Correspondent of the
Providence Journal.)

Boston, Mass., Nov. 13.—One of the biggest amateur hockey undertakings ever started in New England got under way here this morning when representatives from five New England colleges, together with Charles G. Clapp, president of the Canadian-American Hockey League, and George V. Brown, athletic director of Boston University, met at the B. A. C. for the purpose of forming a New England Intercollegiate Hockey League. This project was started a week ago when eight colleges were invited to become members of a hockey body to promote the sport in New England, and the presence of representatives from five of those colleges here to-day indicates that the plan will be a success.

Mr. Raymond, hockey manager of Boston University; Mr. Whittings, representative of the M. I. T. governing board; Mr. Farrell, acting graduate manager of Providence College; Mr. Sullivan, hockey manager of Boston College, and Mr. Crump, representing Springfield College, form the new board of control of the newly formed league.

To facilitate the working of the league in its first year the board elected the three Boston representatives as officers. Mr. Raymond was President, Mr. Sullivan Vice President and Mr. Whittings Secretary-Treasurer. This arrangement will facilitate the meetings of the officers to decide matters concerning the conduct of the newly formed body.

Brown, the other Rhode Island college invited to join, was not represented, but it is thought the Bruins will favor the movement. Amherst will vote on the project this week, and as the student body there has indorsed the plan, the Sabrinas will probably take a place in the league. Massachusetts Agricultural College has not accepted the project as yet.

A committee was appointed to draw up a schedule. For Providence College and Springfield the schedule will commence about the first of January. Home-and-home arrangements will be effected, thus providing eight games for each team.

In adopting the Intercollegiate Hockey Rules to govern the games in the league the board decided to make the time periods 15 minutes each. An approved list of officials will be given to Mr. Clapp, who will appoint the officials for the contests of the newly formed association.

To stimulate competition it was decided that a suitable trophy should be awarded to the championship team of the league.

DOMINICAN TOSSERS SMOTHERED BY YALE

Beaten in New Haven Game By

New Haven, Dec. 14.—The Providence College basketball team suffered its second crushing defeat within a week here last night when a revamped Yale quintet smothered it under a shower of baskets to win 53 to 23.

The Dominicans put up a hard battle, but were outclassed. Coach Taylor's aggregation took the lead early in the opening period and soon rolled the score up and then Taylor sent his scrubs into action and they held the Dominicans in check. The blue shirted hoopsters were leading at the half time by a 31 to 8 score.

The first part of the second half was bitterly contested, but as the fray continued the Black and White athletes weakened under the Ell assault. In the final minutes of the half the Yale regulars took the floor again to increase the score on the Providence hoopsters.

For the Rhode Islanders, Allen and Bourdeau were the best bets, the former collecting eleven points while the latter was tower of strength on the defence.

The whole Yale aggregation showed power but the work of Billhardt, subbing for Carmody, was especially brilliant.

ALLEN, 3-SPORTS STAR, TO PILOT DOMINICAN FIVE

The election of Hector J. Allen of Troy, N. Y., star athlete at Providence College for the past three years, as captain of the Varsity basketball team for the present season, was confirmed by the Athletic Board to-day. Allen was elected by the team before the game with Yale at New Haven on Monday night, but announcement of the election was withheld until to-day pending the approval of the athletic authorities.

Allen has been one of the best athletes ever to wear the Black and White colors and his appointment meets with general approval. Allen has starred in football for the past three years and held down the third base position on the nine during the past two campaigns. In basketball he works at a forward post.

To-night Allen hopes to lead his quintet to victory over the Boston University team. After their two setbacks at the hands of Dartmouth and Yale the Dominicans are anxious to prove that they have the ability to swing into the winning groove and as result the Terriers are in for a hard tussle at their gym to-night.

Coach Golembeski is not satisfied with the work of all his cohorts and is endeavoring to polish up the outfit with which he hopes to bring the Dominican colors to the fore in the court game. Captain Allen and Chuck Murphy, will start at the forwards with Szydla and Fleurent in reserve. Jack Murphy still holds the edge over Wheeler at the centre post but the former Rogers captain has demonstrated in the past two games that he has the ability to be of the finest jumping centres in this vicinity. He is a fine defence man also.

The work of Bourdeau, the Fitchburg speedsters and Dave Adair at the guards has been fairly good in the few games played. Adair is the running type of player who is apt to be found anywhere and as a result is a hard man to guard in a game. His keen eye for the basket makes him a dangerous player once he gets within tossing distance. Bourdeau covers the back court in fine style and is quite capable of handling any attacks on his part of the territory.

PROVIDENCE College basketball players paid tribute to a great athlete when the mantle of leadership was thrown over the brawny shoulders of Heck Allen. This sterling athlete has played brilliantly on the diamond, gridiron and court since matriculating at the Smith Hill institution and takes rank with the best ever developed there.

Coach Golembeski has been having no end of trouble rounding up a quintet capable of playing on even terms on the schedule, but he is a tireless workman with a great fund of basketball knowledge and the Dominicans are bound to make strides under his direction.

DOMINICAN FIVE FALLS 30-28 IN GAME WITH B. U.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 16.—In one of the most hotly contested basketball tilts ever staged on the Heminway court, Boston University quintet last night nosed out the Providence College five in a contest which was not decided until the final whistle. Both teams played hard, fast basketball, and the spectators were in a constant uproar as the lead shifted from one side to the other.

The Dominicans showed a vast improvement over their play against Dartmouth and Yale. The pass work which has been stressed during the past few days by Coach Golembeski was very much in evidence, and the Terriers found early in the game they had a formidable aggregation to conquer.

John Murphy, rangy centre, and Dave Adair, guard, of the Dominicans, were the outstanding defensive players on the court. Both broke up many a Boston attack on the Black and White hoop. Moreover, Adair's fine offensive work gave the Rhode Islanders the opportunity to threaten the Terrier lead in the closing minutes of the fray. Capt. Allen played his usual fine game, handling the leather in brilliant style and collecting no less than 12 of the Dominicans' 28 points.

The veteran Boston outfit took an early lead when Louis Cohen, their flashy leader, who has a keen eye for the hoop, tossed a foul shot through the basket, but the advantage was soon wiped away when "Heck" Allen garnered the first of his five field goals. Thereafter the tilt was a see-saw race with both clubs alternating at winning the lead. As the end of the first half drew near the Terriers forged to the front and when the whistle blew they were leading by an 18 to 14 score.

In the second period the Dominicans opened with a strong attack and the see-saw battle continued until the Boston hoopsters made a sudden spurt to sweep into a 29 to 21 lead. Undaunted by this, the Golembeski-trained athletes battled their way through the strong offence formed by Coach Carlson's aces and slowly cut down the lead. With but five minutes to play, Adair collected three field goals, aided by fine passwork on the part of his mates, and Allen hooped a shot from the free throw line.

A moment later "Heck" made a brilliant basket from the side of the court, the ball dropping off the backboard through the hoop, but the referee ruled that the Dominican captain threw while one foot was off the court and no score was allowed. After Cohen had made good another free throw to boost his team's total to 30, the Terriers played a waiting game and the final whistle found them in possession of the ball in their own territory.

The stellar guard work of Bourdeau and Adair for the Dominicans and the flashy work of August and Cohen for the Terriers were the high lights of the tilt.

COLLEGES ABANDON CIRCUIT

N. E. Hockey League Will Operate Next Winter

The proposed New England Intercollegiate Hockey league has been abandoned. Inability to have outside teams join the circuit is the reason for the abandonment of the project. The Boston teams—Boston University, Boston College and Tech were ready to join although M. I. T. made certain reservations regarding the admission of a certain other college.

ORGANIZE NEXT YEAR

Brown and Providence College both felt that inasmuch as this was their first season in hockey they would hardly measure up to the standard of play furnished by more seasoned college teams here. It appeared as though Springfield College was all set to join but there was considerable doubt about Amherst.

George V. Brown, athletic director at Boston University, prime mover in the organization of the league, believes that the abandonment of the circuit this season was for the best general interests, but he also feels that since the colleges have started to steam up the league it will be an easy matter to get them all together next season.

Athletic Director Brown has soundly out a few of these colleges on the proposition of adopting professional playing rules, outlining the great advantages of this code. He has received favorable replies from two colleges.

LANDRY CUTS PROVIDENCE COLLEGE HOCKEY SQUAD

The first cut in the Providence College hockey squad was made after the drill yesterday afternoon at the arena, when Coach Landry selected 11 puck chasers from the group of aspirants to battle for the 'Varsity berths. The cut in the squad was necessary in order that the mentor might concentrate his attention on the players who will form the nucleus for the first sextet to represent the college.

The men selected for further grooming by Coach Landry are Bulger and McDonald, goalies; Maloney, J. Graham, Powers, McGarrighan and Willard, defence players; Frank McKenna, Newman, Martin and Ed Cunningham, wings, and McGarry with Frankie Moran as centres. From this group will probably be chosen the sextet to open the first 'Varsity hockey campaign ever attempted by the Smith Hillers.

Yesterday Landry sent the squad through a short session in passing the puck and then lined up two aggregations for a scrimmage. The latter was hotly contested and gave Dr. Landry a fine opportunity to decide what men he wished to retain on the 'Varsity team. Frank McKenna, the East Providence athlete, who is now a Senior at the Dominican College, shapes up as a fine puck chaser. He is light but aggressive and handles the puck with a facility that will give many a defence man trouble this winter. Jack Newman, who skated with the Dean Academy sextet last winter, is showing up as a fine running mate for his fellow townsman.

The defence candidates are Frank Maloney, a New Haven hockeyist of no little ability; Jack Graham, another Nutmeg State product; Powers of Fall River, McGarrighan of this city and Ralph Willard, the Lowell athlete, who served as a substitute halfback on the football team during the past campaign.

Fred McGarry, a rugged and clever puck chaser from New Haven, who is now a Senior in college, is giving Frankie Moran, the former La Salle star, a tussle for the centre assignment. McGarry has had a deal of experience with the New Haven high team.

McDonald seems to have the edge over Bulger at goal, as he has a keen eye for fast shots headed in his direction.

Failure of the New England Intercollegiate Hockey League to materialize because of the inability of some of the clubs to join the circuit this winter, has forced the Dominican athletic authorities to start work on an independent schedule which is now well under way. According to present plans the team will play its first game early in January, and if possible will play weekly after that time until March.

NORTHEASTERN FIVE TRIUMPHS

Obtain Early Lead on Dominicans to Win by 31-18 Count

Boston, Mass., Dec. 18.—The Northeastern University quintet, defeated by the M. I. T. five last week in a brilliant overtime game, and conquerors of the fast Clark University team last Wednesday, annexed its second straight win at the expense of the heavy Providence College aggregation here to-night before more than 1200 spectators who jammed the Johnson Memorial gymnasium to see the Red and Black collect 31 points to 18 for the Dominicans.

The game was fiercely contested and gave the local five the strongest opposition that it has struck this season. The Dominicans fought hard to overcome a long lead in the first period and although they did manage to cut down the winning margin somewhat in the closing minutes, they were unable to stem the tide of shots that sifted through their basket in the second half. In the latter part of the game the Red and Black aces proved their mettle by collecting 10 points while their visitors had to be content with a mere four markers to add to their total.

The northeastern quintet took an early lead when Kobera, their lanky centre, started looping the oval through the nets with uncanny accuracy, and when the halftime whistle sounded they were leading by a 21 to 14 count. The fine defensive work of the Dominicans in this period featured the play of the evening as Adair and Bourdeau proved to be strong guardians of the Rhode Island hoop. In the closing minutes of the same stanza the Providence five uncorked a spurt that carried them within fighting reach of their rivals, but they were never dangerous after that one attack.

The last half of the tilt was somewhat dull as both teams fought on even terms, and superior pas work in the closing minutes gave the Northeastern basket-eers a few extra points to add to their winning margin.

A revamped Providence College basketball quintet registered a 31 to 27 triumph over Middlebury at the La Salle Academy court last night in a hectic tussle. It was the first home appearance of the Providence College Varsity and a large crowd turned out to see Golembeski's hoopsters perform. The contest was never settled until the final whistle sounded with the Dominicans enjoying a four point lead.

Middlebury presented a strong combination which was very fast in spite of the fact that it had played two games this week prior to their tilt here last night. In Palmer, all-round athlete, the Vermonters uncovered a veritable dynamo who kept the Dominican defence, ever on the alert to check his fast dribbles and accurate tosses.

Coach Golembeski started Dave Adair the rugged six-footer from South County at a forward post last night and the former East Greenwich ace proved to be better at that assignment than at the guard post which he had previously filled. He collected seven points and combined with Heck Allen and Chuck Murphy. The other shift in the lineup put Peter Rzeznicki, the Ware hoopster at a guard post. Pete had a busy evening, but his efforts were commendable.

The star of the Black and White attack was Leo Bourdeau, rugged little guard, who was all over the court in his efforts to register a victory for the Smith Hillers. The former Fitchburg interscholastic star tallied 11 of the markers registered by his team and at the same time played a whirlwind game at guard, stopping the Middlebury attack on several occasions.

The tilt started with a speed that was a forerunner of the action that was to follow. Within the first minute Palmer collected his first field goal and shortly afterward Dave Adair evened the count with a clever shot from under the hoop. Both teams fought hard to pile up an early lead, but were unsuccessful.

With the count 10 to 9 in favor of the visitors, the battle started for the lead. First the Dominicans moved out in front as the result of Adair's two foul shots and then the Middleburyites regained the one-point margin by piling their score to 12. Bourdeau broke loose and with a fast dribble travelled down the floor to make the score 14 to 13 in favor of the visiting athletes. Two successful foul shots by the Fitchburg flash, followed by a successful toss from the free throw line by Sorenson, made the score 15 all as the half-time whistle blew.

In the later part of the final period the Black and White hoopsters started the attack which proved strong enough to collect the winning points. With Middlebury leading by one point, Chuck Murphy tossed a "long tom" from the side of the court to place the Dominicans ahead by a 23 to 22 score. Thereafter they were never headed, as Bourdeau boosted the score with a clever shot from under the hoop and then Wheeler, who played a fine game when he was sent in to handle the centre assignment, caged a pretty field goal from the side of the court to bring the total to 28.

Palmer made a desperate effort to overtake the Dominican lead and in the final minutes collected two sensational field goals, but his fine work was evened by a basket by Bourdeau and two accurate foul shots by Adair and C. Murphy.

PROVIDENCE COLLEGE PUCKSTERS FINALLY YIELD TO MIDDLEBURY

White and Black Forces Vermonters Into Extra Sessions, But Go Down in Fine Game at Auditorium by Score of 3 to 2

In a bristling hockey tilt that required three 15-minute periods and ten minutes' overtime before it was brought to a dramatic close the Middlebury College sextet opened the Providence College home hockey campaign by turning back the latter by a 3 to 2 count last night at the Auditorium.

It was the first appearance of the Smith Hill skaters in this city after their fine opening tilt with Springfield last week, and the fans who travelled to the North Main street rink last night were treated to a brilliant tilt that compared favorably with some of the torrid pro frays that have been waged there in the past three weeks.

The contest was cleanly played and the growing rivalry between the Vermont College and the Dominicans gave both sextets ample reason for desiring to clinch the tilt. It was only after 33 minutes of play that the invaders were able to collect a tally from the locals and although they boast a veteran outfit that has taken the measure of some of the best ice aggregations in the north country, the Vermonters had their hands full to trip up the White and Black stick wielders.

The Dominicans have a trio of forwards who are very light but possess plenty of speed, and it was not long before the crowd realized that in Willard, diminutive wingman, the Smith Hill sextet has one of the fastest skaters ever to perform in this city. Ralph completely baffled the visitors by his clever dribbling, and were he heavier, so that his drives at the goal would possess more power, he would be ready to step into a pro outfit. Shooting from either side the former Lowell star was all over the rink and into every play. McKenna and Newman, the other lightweight forwards, also played brilliantly both on the offence and defence.

"Junie" Bride, stellar football player, received his baptism of college hockey last night, and although lacking the finesse of the other wingmen, promises to be a capable stick wielder with practice and training. The defence players, Graham and Maloney, kept the rubber well away from the home goal for the greater part of the evening and were responsible for the low score to which the classy northern aggregation was held.

The visitors also boasted a trio of clever stick men in Capt. Simmons, Whittemore, stellar end in football, and Finnegan, clever goalie. The latter was one of the individual stars of the melee, handling hard shots and close assaults on his net with an aggressiveness that completely stopped the Smith Hillers in their attempts to score. Whittemore was second to Willard in the matter of speed and in the course of the evening collected two of the goals registered by his team and was responsible for the other as the result of his accurate passing to his rugged team-mate, Kelley.

McDonald, guarding the Providence net, had a busy evening stopping the two dozen fierce drives headed his way and several times he brought the crowd to its feet by spectacular stops off the sticks of the strong Middleburyites. It was clever passwork coupled with a speedy attack on his lair that gave the invaders the winning markers and the failure of the Maine husky to check them in no way reflects on his stellar exhibition at the cage.

The invaders started off aggressively but they soon found that instead of opposing a weak newcomer to college hockey ranks, they had to battle what promises to be one of the finest college sextets in the East. The Dominicans presented an impregnable defence for the assaults of their rivals and the latter, who boast a win over the classy Hamilton College outfit, were completely checked in their rushes down the ice.

For two periods the two teams battled furiously with neither team able to tally, when suddenly Whittemore, rugged center, dashed in close to the Dominican net to drive a rebound shot past Goalie McDonald for the first Middlebury score. With the end of the final period drawing to a close Willard took a long shot at the goal from mid-ice and much to the surprise of Goalie Finnegan the puck rolled over his stick into the net. The whistle for the end of the period put an end to the hostilities.

In the first overtime of five minutes the Middlebury skaters scored twice, the first tally coming as the result of Whittemore's fine corner shot and the second on a pass from the same athlete to Kelley, who slipped the rubber past McDonald. With a little over two minutes left to play Fred McGarry dribbled his way through the Middlebury defence and sent the disc crashing into the net for the Dominican's second tally.

With the score 3 to 2 against them the White and Black-clad outfit fought gamely to knot the count and put themselves back in the running, but the Vermonters resisted fiercely as they realized that they held the winning marker well within their grasp. The final whistle sent the visitors into an uproar and the crowd shouted its approval of the fine exhibition of hockey as given by the two teams.

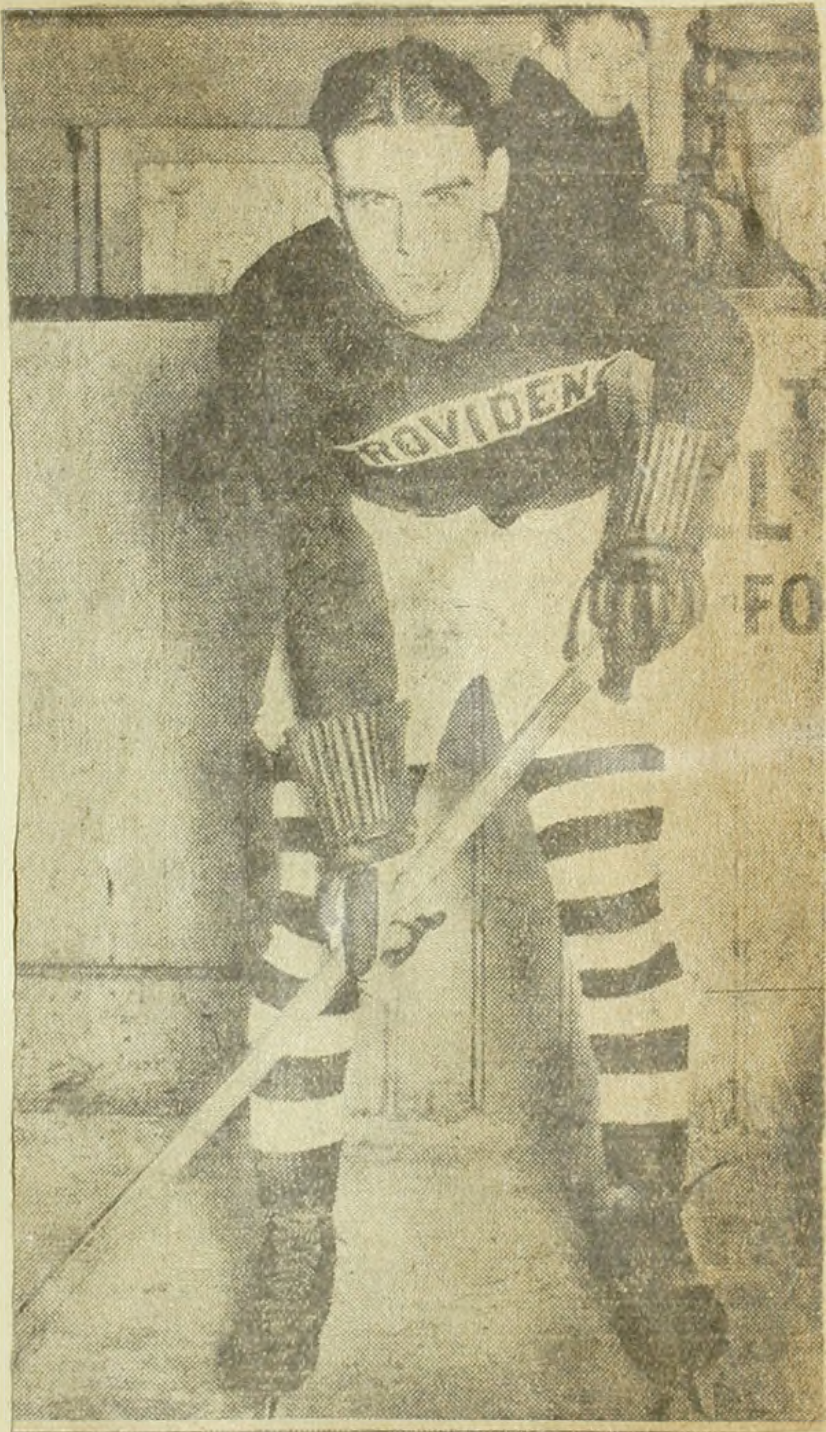
The Providence College team will stack up against another northern aggregation on the ice here next Friday when they will take on the fast Bowdoin College sextet.

Water on Ice Forces New Hampshire Prov. College Hockeyists to Postpone

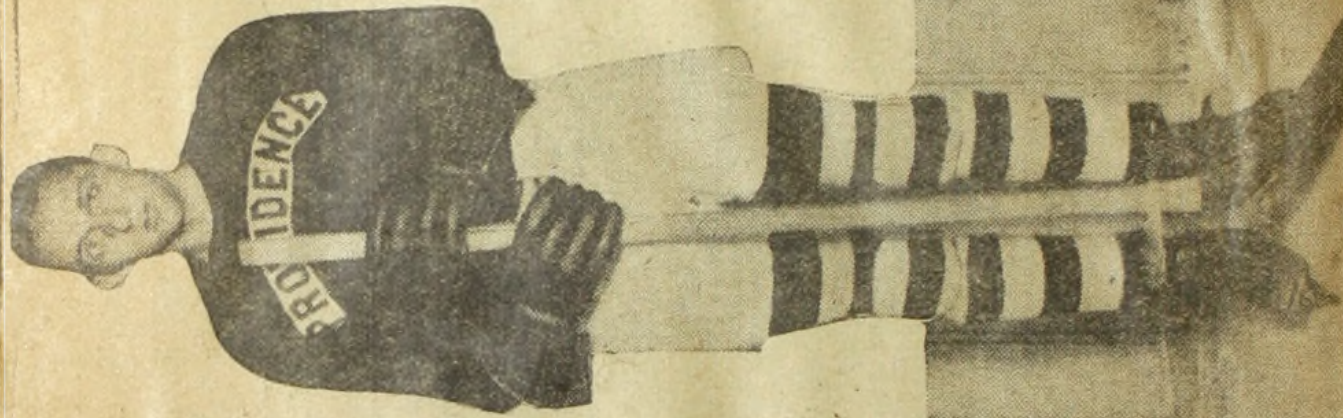

At least three of the four markers shot past him were not his fault, but rather are to be blamed on the defence men who were pulled out of position, giving the Springfield forwards clear shots at the net.

The first few moments the Gym Teachers uncorked a pretty passing game that netted them a score when McCabe pulled Graham out of position and then passed to Crowell, who flipped the rubber past Flynn. With nearly two thirds of the period gone, the visitors collected their second tally with Crowell again doing the honors, this time pushing the disc in after a rebound off Flynn's pads.

FIVE DOMINICANS RULED INELIGIBLE

Black and White Hoop and
Hockey Teams Suffer by
Faculty Edict.

BOTH LOSE REGULARS

Bourdeau, Spring, McDonald, Willard
and McGarrahan Comprise Ath-
letes Lost for This
This Semester

Another blow to the hopes of the Providence College basketball team was dealt yesterday when the faculty announced that Bourdeau, regular guard, and Spring, substitute guard, are ineligible for further participation in athletics this semester because of falling below par in their scholastic work.

Early in the week the team lost Dave Adair, forward, who left college to enter business, and his loss was followed by Chuck Murphy, forward, being stricken ill.

In addition to the basketball stars who were declared ineligible, three of the hockey squad, two of the regulars, were declared ineligible. They are McDonald, goalie; Willard, the fastest skater on the team, and McGarrahan, substitute defence player.

The loss of the basketball players will result in a complete shakeup of the hoop squad. Coach Golembeski must start again to develop a strong quintet to complete the remainder of the schedule. Tonight the basketeers tackle the New Bedford Textile aggregation at the Whaling City, and the Dominican mentor will put Larry Wheeler in at centre, shifting Jack Murphy to a guard post with Pete Rzeznicki, while Capt. Allen and Nap Fleurent will handle the forward assignments. As subs he will have only Leo Supple and Gerry Dillon, both members of the Freshman quintet last winter.

Next Tuesday the hoopsters will play Lowell Textile at Lowell. The hockey team will have but one drill next week and will tackle the New Hampshire outfit at the Auditorium on Saturday night.

PROVIDENCE COLLEGE HOOPSTERS NOSE OUT NEW BEDFORD TEXTILE

NEW HAMPSHIRE SEXTET

DEFEATS PROVIDENCE, 5 TO 1

Dominicans Hold Wildcats for a Period, But Yield to Superior Ice Work as Game Progresses. Graham Scores Feature Goal

The University of New Hampshire hockey team made it two straight wins in this city over the week-end when they walloped the Providence College sextet at the North Main street surface last night by a 5 to 1 score in a tilt that was harder fought than the tally sheet would indicate. The Dominicans played well in the opening stanza but were out-classed in the final two frames when the Wildcats opened up with a fierce attack which swept the local defence men out of play and left Goalie Bill Flynn alone to stop the flying drives towards his stronghold.

The first frame brought out some fast hockey with the locals making their highly touted visitors step at a fast clip. Crins, the former Tech high star, who furnished most of the fireworks in the tilt against Brown Friday night, was checked by the White and Black's defence men, Graham and Maloney. The former played the entire game, although he has not fully recovered from the severe body bruising received last week against Springfield.

Although the Wildcats scored four goals on fine pass work and individual plays, it remained for the Dominicans to furnish the real thrill of the evening. Soon after the start of the third period Capt. Graham of the locals took the rubber deep in his own territory and after breaking loose from the visitors' forward defence, weaved his way past Vatter and Chandler and lifted the rubber into the cage for the only Providence marker. It was the feature bit of work of the fray.

The Durham outfit netted one goal in the opening period, two in the second, and another pair in the final canto. The initial marker resulted from a clever dribble by Capt. Percival, who intercepted a pass at mid ice and carried the rubber through for a score.

In the second period Vatter, defence man of the New Hampshire team, took the disc down the side of the rink and after dodging Graham sent it flying past Flynn for the second score of the evening. The third marker was registered shortly after when Percival took Dear-

ington's pass in front of the net to tally.

In the final period Dearington added the fourth goal to the Granite Staters' cause when he dribbled through to tally, and after Capt. Graham of the White and Black, had made his sensational play, the Wildcats retaliated with their fifth score, which was credited to Vatter.

The locals, who have been handicapped by the recent loss of several of their stellar players, were again the victims of circumstances, as Jack Newman, star forward, was unable to play, while Frankie Moran, the other stellar wingman, was reported as ill, and so unable to be on hand.

The best players for the visiting sextet were Capt. Percival, Crins and Vatter, while Capt. Graham, Frankie McKenna and Jennie Bride were the best workers with the Smith Hill sextet.

The locals will rest now for two weeks before tackling the strong Boston University team at the local rink, and then will endeavor to trip up the Brown aggregation.

MENTOR BACK AFTER ONE YEAR'S ABSENCE

*Former Big Leaguer Will Attempt to Mould, Strong
Baseball Nine This Spring.—Lack of Outstanding
Material Makes Task Rather Difficult*

The appointment of Jack Flynn, former major league ball player and manager, as coach of the Providence College baseball team for the coming season by the Providence College Athletic Council was announced last night by Graduate Manager John E. Farrell. Flynn coached the ball club at the Dominican college in 1924 and 1925 and last spring served as manager of the New Haven club in the Eastern League.

Jack Flynn's success as a baseball coach is well known to the sporting public of this city. Prior to taking over the reins at Providence College in 1924 he handled professional league teams in this section. All his life he has been actively engaged in the national pastime, and his work in developing ball players and in turning out winning clubs has attracted widespread attention.

Flynn learned the rudiments of the game while at Classical high, where he starred at first base, winning the honor of captaincy in his Senior year. Following his graduation from the local high school he entered Holy Cross and for four years handled the first base assignment in brilliant fashion. He is rated as the hardest hitter and one of the finest players ever developed at the Worcester institution. In 1907, his Senior year, he was elected captain of the nine, which captured the Eastern college crown.

After receiving a degree from Georgetown Law School, Flynn broke into the professional baseball ranks, playing first with Toronto and later going with St. Paul in the American Association. In 1909 he was bought by Pittsburgh where he played for three years at first base and was rated one of the best players in the national circuit. After spending the 1912 season with the Washington Senators he joined the Indianapolis team for a year, and later, during the 1914 and 1915 seasons he played with Montreal in the International League.

He started his managerial career with Springfield in the then newly created Eastern League in 1916. The following campaigns saw him guiding Lawrence, New London, Waterbury and

then Springfield again for two years. In 1921 he abandoned baseball for his increasing law practice, but in the middle of the 1922 season he took over the reins at Worcester and made that aggregation into a pennant contender. He gave up baseball after that summer until he assumed the work at Providence College in 1924 where he turned out a fine team with but little material. The following year also saw him in charge of the Dominicans, whom he brought to the front rank of intercollegiate baseball. Last spring he turned to the pros again and managed the New Haven Eastern League team which was in the first division all season. Flynn gave up the post before the close of the season after the club was well organized.

Flynn's return to Providence College will be a welcome one to all the followers of the local college, as well as to the baseball fans of this city. Although he will not have any outstanding material with which to work, he can be counted upon to perform fine work with the youngsters wearing the Black and White colors.

During the two seasons he spent with the Smith Hill athletes, Flynn discovered and developed Charlie Reynolds, slim right-hander, and brought Halloran to the fore as one of the finest catchers ever to perform in college ranks. Other players whom he developed are Eddie Wholey, midget athlete, who blossomed into a sensational outfielder under the tutelage of Flynn Ray Doyle, captain of the 1927 team who was converted from a good catcher into a fine second baseman, which post he has held for the past three years; John Sullivan, first baseman of the 1925 team, who had but little experience in high school and did not compete for the college team until his Senior year, and Joe Whelan, now a Junior, who is one of the mainstays of the hurling corps.

This spring Flynn will not have some of the athletes who have made athletic history at the Dominican college and who have received degrees or have undertaken other work during the past year. Last June saw such clever ball players as Reynolds, Halloran, Maroney and Considine step out of the ranks.

SCORES ELEVEN GOALS IN FIRST TWO PERIODS

Vin Cummings Goalie Stops Scoring Rampage in Final Session.—Lawless, Terrier Centre Ice, Leads Attack by Netting Seven Counters

Unable to penetrate a five-man defence or stop a relentless attack, the Providence College hockey team was defeated by Boston University, 12 to 0, at the Rhode Island Auditorium, Inc., last night. The Terriers invaded the North Main street rink in search of revenge as a result of a defeat by Brown on the same surface last week, and, as a result, the Dominicans found their opponents in their tip-top shape of the season.

Despite the severe trouncing, the locals came through with a great finish to hold B. U. scoreless during the last 18 minutes. The Terriers only tallied one goal in the final period, and the main reason was Vin Cummings, former Cranston high star goal tender, who replaced Bill Flynn after the visitors had piled up 11 goals in the first two periods.

Starting their scoring rampage inside of the first four minutes, the Terriers led, 3 to 0, at the end of the first session. They tucked away a total of eight counters during the next 20 minutes, but then Cummings made his appearance, and the Bostonians could do no more than add a single goal to make it an "even dozen" in the last period.

The B. U. attack was led by John "Gyp" Lawless, star centre. Seven times he slapped the puck in the Dominican meshes, in addition to making another pair of goals possible with clean passes. His performance was the best displayed by any college skater at the North Main street rink this season, was sensational, and his stick-handling would have done justice to a "pro."

This little fellow was the complete undoing for Providence. He made the two opening scores inside of nine minutes, and his brilliant dashes down the rink were enough to take the heart out of any team. In the second period, he skated in, out and around the Dominicans' defence to contribute four more goals. He also made the last tally before Cummings commenced to stop everything coming his way.

During the first two periods, the Dominican forwards were caught continually flat-footed, and before they had a chance to change direction some Terrier, usually Lawless, would be on his way for another goal. On the other hand, B. U. was always back in defensive position when Providence tried to unleash a scoring punch.

But the final period, which really produced some thrilling action, was vastly different. The Dominicans no longer tried to send three men down the ice, and the defence was strengthened materially. The locals also showed much more aggressiveness, body-checking continually and stepping into everything, players and pucks.

Tom Bride and McKenna made the best showing for their team. The locals were handicapped by lack of substitutes and also played without Maloney, one of their star skaters. They make their next appearance against Brown at the North Main street rink Tuesday night.

BROWN HOCKEYISTS TRIUMPH OVER PROVIDENCE, 4-1

BRUINS DISPLAY EDGE IN SERIES OPENER

*Bulk of Action Crammed Into Second Period When
Four Goals Are Scored.—McKenna Saves Do-
minicans From Suffering Shutout*

Brown's faster skating and more aggressive hockey team opened a two-game city series by defeating Providence College, 4 to 1, at the Rhode Island Auditorium last night. The Dominicans showed two-fold improvement over their performance against Boston University last Friday, but, even so, they were not able to cope with the attack and the teamwork of the Hilltoppers.

The game was without question the best of the intercollegiate variety played on the local rink this season, and the enthusiastic crowd, although small, was kept at a high pitch throughout the 60 minutes. While the hockey did not compare favorably with the type displayed by Harvard and Yale, or other more experienced sextets, there was plenty of action and many thrills. Keen rivalry between the two combinations was evident from whistle to whistle.

Bill Peters, a substitute wing, gave Brown its first goal after 13 minutes of play in the opening period, and the Bruins maintained this margin of superiority from that point to the finish. All the rest of the scoring took place in the second period in which the rivals showed their best efforts. They practically played themselves out in this session, for the pace slackened during the remaining 20 minutes and neither team scored again.

Frank McKenna, the star for the Smith Hillers, saved his team from a shutout when he tallied the Dominicans' lone goal during the middle of the excitement in the second period. He took a pass from McGarry just inside the blue-line and skated down the right lane around the Brown defence to take a clean shot at the Bruin cage. The Hilltoppers led, 2 to 0, at the time.

At the outset the Dominicans showed a different style of hockey than they played against Boston University. Their forwards helped on the defence and, as a result, the Bruins had no easy task getting in close range of the Dominican cage. The Hilltoppers started to force the attack, but McKenna was the first to threaten with a goal on either team.

The Smith Hillers' star broke through Pete Perrine and Mason Gross of the Bruins and carried the puck up to the meshes. Before he could take a shot.

Capt. George Fessenden, in a characteristic save, dashed out of his position and smothered any attempt by McKenna. Aside from the actual goal which McKenna registered, this previous try was the closest call that Fessenden had to turn back.

Finding that his regulars were unable to score, Coach Jimmy Gardner tossed his second team front-flank into the contest at this stage. The trio of substitutes no sooner made their appearance when Vernon Chase combined with Bill Peters to give the victors their first counter.

Returning to the ice after a rest, Brown had another goal in 10 seconds when Pete Perrine, the fastest member of the Brown outfit, scaled a long shot from the blue line right through the whole opposing team. Perrine picked up the disc after the face-off and took a shot without attempting to get into Dominican territory.

From this time until "Bo" Partridge virtually sewed up the game for game with another tally in the middle of the period, the game was crammed with excitement. Al Gardiner tried a shot similar to Perrine's but his direction was slightly off and the disc bounded back in the playing surface after bouncing off the iron upright. McKenna's goal followed a few minutes later.

Both teams, in their aggressiveness, started to get rougher, and Al Gardiner was the first victim sent to the penalty box. But, before he returned, with only five men, the Bruins slapped away their third goal. Haskell Billings carried the disc down the ring all alone, but his shot failed. The puck bounded out in front of the cage and Partridge, who came in fast from the left side, swept it into the meshes before Vin Cummings, the Dominicans' goalie, could get back in position.

Four minutes later, the last tally of the game was registered by Peters, who skated all the way down the ice aside of Partridge and took a pass when the Dominican defence men went after the latter. He lifted the shot out of Cummings's reach. Before the period ended, Perrine made a couple of more nice runs down the rink, but his attempts were not successful.

The final period found Cummings duplicating his work of last Friday night. The Dominicans' attack had petered out, but the Bruins were equally unsuccessful when Cummings turned back everything that came his way. Haskell Billings gave him three hard stops and Peters also contributed a hard drive. Cummings, however, was down on his knees whenever the Bruins threatened, and he kept up his good work until the final whistle sounded.

Providence College Athlete
Winds Up Athletic Career
on La Salle Court.

OPPOSES LOWELL TEXTILE

Star Guard Expected to Be Strong
Factor in Basketball Contest.

Bride Ends His Campaign
Here Next Week

When the Providence College basketball quintet, which has won six of its last seven games, finishes its season with the Lowell Textile contest at the La Salle Academy court tonight, John F. Murphy, rugged guard, and one of the finest athletes ever to wear the Black and White of the Dominican college, will have completed his athletic career with the Smith Hillers.

Murphy entered Providence College in 1923 and soon established himself in athletics there by capturing a tackle post on the eleven, winning his Varsity insignia in his Freshman year. The following season saw him again handling a tackle assignment in fine style. When Golembeski took over the football reins at the Dominican college in 1925 he shifted the rugged Torrington product to an end post and there Murphy blossomed into a fine wingman.

In the opening game of the 1925 season he scored on the Fordham team by blocking a punt in the latter's territory, and in the tilt with Colgate won the honor of being the first to score against the powerful Maroon eleven on its own field that year when he took a pass from his classmate, "Junie" Bride, who is also manager of the basketball quintet. Bride is also engaged with the hockey team and will end his campaigning with the Brown game next week.

As captain of the 1926 football team Murphy gave the Dominicans one of the best campaigns they have ever experienced, his eleven tasting defeat but twice, and both times at the hands of much stronger elevens. Two games were tied and the remaining four frays ended in victory for the Black and White gridders.

After collecting his Varsity insignia in football for the fourth time, Murphy turned his attention to winning a post on the first Varsity hoop squad to represent the Smith Hillers. He captured the centre assignment from Larry Wheeler, clever Newport hoopster, and played the first nine games of the season at that post. Later he was shifted to guard to fill the gap left by the loss of Bourdeau, and Wheeler took over the pivot work.

In the 15 games played this campaign Murphy has been one of the main cogs in the machine and has scored 39 field goals and 16 foul shots for a grand total of 94 points, which is a little less than one-fourth of the team's total point record for the season. Playing from guard the husky Senior has stimulated the recent spurt of the Dominicans, and his all-around playing has featured every tilt. In the last four games, of which three were won by his team, he has garnered 28 markers.

Prior to the college tilt, which is slated to start at 8:15 and will be refereed by Lou Pieri, the Sophs and Freshmen will settle their arguments in what promises to be a torrid hoop tilt. With many former interscholastic stars in both lineups the latter contest should produce some good basketball.

WHEELER OF DOMINICANS ALMOST WINS BASKET TILT SINGLE-HANDED

Former Rogers High Star, Playing Centre, Collects as Many Points as Lowell Textile in Finale of Providence College Season.—Final Score Is 65 to 19

Had "Toadie" Wheeler, the former Rogers High leader, and now star centre in the Providence College basketball unit, collected one more point, to add to his total of 19 garnered in the game at the La Salle gym last night, he would have been able to boast the record of defeating the Lowell Textile aggregation of hoopsters single-handed, as the latter outfit collected but 19 markers to the high total of 65 rolled into the Dominican's score sheet.

It was the night of nights for the White and Black court aces, who ended their first season of 'varsity basketball in a blaze of glory. The victory marked the eighth win of the campaign and the sixth out of the last seven starts. As a result, the campaign which began so poorly, was turned into better than an even "break," as the major tilts, those with St. John's, Middlebury, Sub Base, and Lowell, were won.

Wheeler and his six-foot teammate, Murphy, were the men who led the Providence onslaught, and both were the highest scorers, the Newporter collecting 19 markers and Murphy garnering 16 points. The latter was playing his last contest for his Alma Mater and he certainly made it one of the best of his career. He was in on every play, held his opponent scoreless throughout the fray, and was relentless on the offence.

Aside from the fine playing of Joe Kenney, blond-haired guard with the invaders, the Lowell team was without any strong offence. Kenney collected four of the six field goals registered by his club and registered several sensational tosses from beyond the middle of the court. The Lowell team fought gamely to hold the Dominicans in check but Golembeski's proteges were bent on rolling up their highest score of the campaign, and their flawless passing and accurate heaving was too well done to deny them a brilliant climax to their campaign.

Capt. Allen was busy all evening, as usual, and his tally sheet showed five field goals, all of the back hand-sensational type which won the plaudits of the home crowd, and two successful foul shots. The Ware lads had a fine evening, Pete Rzezniki garnering two baskets, Szydla two, and Fleurent, who

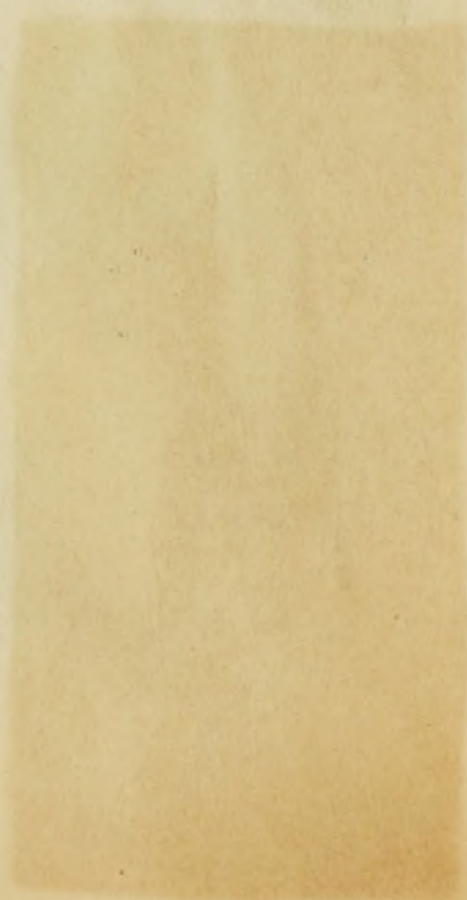
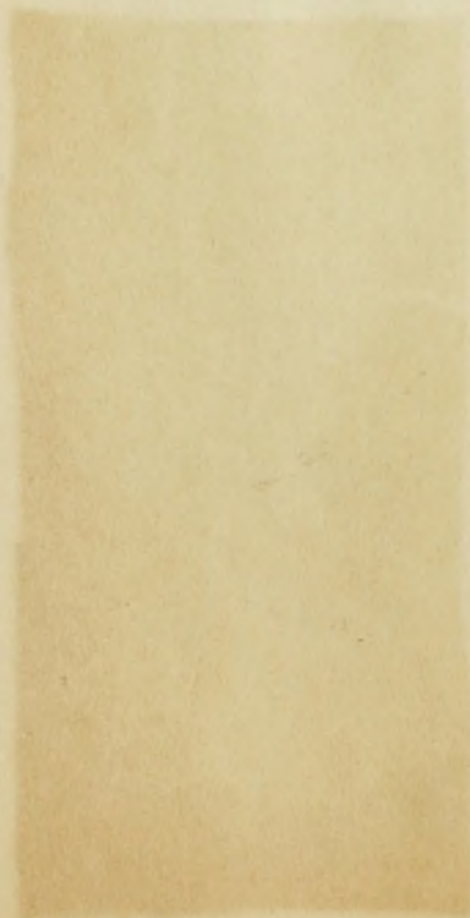

BROWN SCORES 3 TO 1 VICTORY OVER DOMINICANS

PERRINE BREAKS 1-1 TIE IN FINAL PERIOD

*Scores Twice to Win for Bruins After McGarry Evens
Count by Perfect Shot to Climax Rousing
Rally by Providence in Second Period*

Brown University last night won its second hockey game from Providence College at the North Main street arena by 3 to 1. The game was the final one for both sextets and was the last of a series of two games played between the two local institutions.

A crowd of 600 watched the game and beat time with their feet between the periods to the music by the two college bands. The game was full of thrills and the intense rivalry that exists between the two schools brought out a deal of roughness in the final period.

The Hilltoppers won the first of the two games on Tuesday night of last week by the score of 4 to 1 and the Dominicans entered the contest thirsting for revenge and anxious to even the count. Hockey is a new sport for both of the local colleges and although neither of the teams play the game with the finish of the leaders in collegiate circles, it has caused a great deal of interest in Providence, with last night's match topping the attendance records for a college contest here.

The final frame was marked by roughness on both sides, with several near fights. Referee Stewart was hard pushed to keep the contest a hockey match and not a fight. Perrine was the star of the period, scoring two unassisted goals for Brown on long shots that bounced over Cummings's stick. His first shot came 20 second after the face off that opened the play and his second came from a rebound 3 minutes and 10 seconds later, ending the scoring of the game.

Brown scored first, when Billings carried the puck unassisted down the centre of the ice and lifted a high shot that Goalie Vin Cummings knocked down directly in front of the net. Billings, following up, pushed it through the corner of the goal 12 minutes after the opening face off.

Throughout the remainder of the period Brown again and again threatened the Providence goal, but was unable to push the puck into the net. Billings was the outstanding player of the period time and again carrying the puck through the Dominicans' first line defence and keeping Cummings jumping from side to side in the goal. The Providence College forward line was unable to get its passing game going during this period and the fine work of Mason Gross and Pete Perrine, the Bruin defence men, broke up most of their rushes down the ice.

In the second period Providence College exhibited their best play. Fred McGarry led the onslaught on the Bruin goal and after 6 minutes and 50 second of play carried the puck unassisted down the left lane and shot a beautiful goal high up in the corner of the net which tied the score. Providence got its passing game underway and threatened the Brown goal on many occasions, but again Gross and Perrine prevented further scoring and the period ended with the score tied at 1-all.

For Providence College, Frank McGarry stood out last night as a clever skater, but the consistent work of Capt. Jack Graham, Bride and McKenna have rivalled his throughout the year. All four of these men are Seniors, and the Dominicans will be badly crippled by their loss.

Dominicans Face Diamond

Schedule of 25 Games

With Strong Teams

FORDHAM CONTEST ON MAY 6 FEATURE TILT OF HOME CARD

Frederick A. McDermott Appointed
Manager of 'Varsity Nine

A 25-game baseball schedule which will send the Providence College team into action against the leading nines of the East, including such aggregations as Villanova, Fordham, Manhattan, Brown, Harvard, Yale, Boston College and Tufts, was announced this morning by Graduate Manager John E. Farrell of the Dominican College.

The list is nearly as long as that played last year and for the most part is similar, as far as the list of opponents is concerned. Two-game series, besides the annual frays with the Brunonians, will be staged with Villanova, Boston College and the Providence Grays, Eastern League champions. The Brown games are slated for Aldrich Field for May 14 and 21, while the Villanova and Boston College appearances in this city are scheduled for May 3 and June 7, at Hendricken Field.

Fordham, conquerors of Holy Cross last season by an overwhelming score, will come here with a veteran team on May 6 for what promises to be the major tilt of the Dominicans' ambitious list. The Smith Hillers were trounced by Fordham last spring by a 9 to 1 score in New York, and will be on edge to avenge that setback when Jack Coffey's outfit invades Hendricken Field.

The opening fray is listed for Boston on April 9, where Northeastern, returning to the local's list after a year's absence, will be opposed. Then follow the clashes with Patsy Donovan's Eastern Leaguers at Kingsley Park, the first game being on April 12 and the second on the 16th. From present indications the Smith Hillers will have to battle their former leader, Charlie Reynolds, in the latter two frays, as the 1926 pilot leaves this week for the South with the Grays, and will probably draw the hurling assignment in the exhibition games with his Alma Mater here.

The third week in April will see Jack Flynn's proteges on the road, with five tilts to account for, the first being with Upsala, a newcomer to the list, at East Orange, N. J., and then on the following days games, with Cathedral College in New York, Seton Hall at South Orange, Villanova at Villanova, Pa., and finally the crack New York Athletic Club nine at Travers Island.

Harvard and Yale will be met this year, the latter retaining the Dominicans on a June date, while the Crimson will renew diamond relations with the locals after a two-year lapse. Last spring a game was tentatively settled with the Cambridge institution, pending the outcome of the Harvard-Princeton games, which resulted in a third tilt, necessitating the cancelling of the proposed game with the Black and White athletes.

The Commencement Day attraction will be Vanderbilt University of Nashville, Tenn., which is making an extended trip to New England for a period of two weeks.

Teams not returning to the local's schedule include St. John's of Brooklyn, which is confining its list to metropolitan colleges; Dartmouth, owing to inability to agree on dates for a game, and Middlebury, which is in this vicinity at the time when Ray Doyle's outfit will be opposing Harvard and Brown.

The appointment of Frederick A. McDermott of Rumford, a Junior classman in the school of philosophy, as student manager of the Varsity baseball team, was confirmed today. McDermott is a graduate of La Salle Academy and since entering Providence College has taken an active interest in all the student activities there. He served as an assistant manager of the baseball team last spring, and with the failure of Paul R. Cashman, Senior assistant manager, to return to college last fall, he receives the distinction of being the first Junior to serve as manager of a Varsity team.

60 ANSWER DIAMOND CALL AT PROVIDENCE

Coach Jack Flynn's Nucleus for 1927 Nine Includes Veteran Infield.—Filling Halloran's and Reynolds' Shoes In Battery Is Problem

The first call for baseball candidates at Providence College brought forth 60 ambitious ball tossers yesterday afternoon when Capt. Raymond Doyle met his 1927 squad for the first time. Of this number an even dozen are veterans from last year's squad which lost four men in Charlie Reynolds, twirler, Johnnie Halloran, backstop, and Tom Maroney, substitute backstop and outfielder, who were graduated, while Art Considine, outer gardener for two seasons entered the seminary at Rochester, N. Y., last fall to prepare for the priesthood.

The veterans around whom Coach Jack Flynn will have to build his 1927 machine include four slabsters, the entire infield, and a trio of experienced outfielders. The post of catcher is the big gap in the Dominican combination and one that will give the mentor plenty of worry as he has but limited material from which to pick another "Johnnie Halloran." The pitchers ready for active work include Joe Whelan, who enjoyed a fine season in 1926 when he turned in several fine victories, including a 2 to 1 triumph over Dartmouth; Henry Danis, Tim Kennedy, rugged Mt. Pleasant lad who should develop under Flynn's tutelage, and Leo J. Smith, southpaw from Westerly who has been a letterman for the past two years.

The veteran infield of Graham at first, Capt. Doyle at second, Ed McLaughlin at short, and Heck Allen at third, should be able to swing into action in short order. All members of this combination, however, will probably meet with stiff opposition from a host of youngsters who are anxious to don the Black and White diamond colors. The outfielders who answered the call yesterday include Vin Cummings, Cranston Sophomore, who broke into the regular lineup last year to hold down the centre field berth; Bill Flynn, substitute outfielder, and Frankie O'Brien, left fielder.

Several fine prospects from the junior Varsity team of last year include Hal Bradley, Lawrence product,

who has the makings of a good twirler; Charlie Smith, backstop from Fall River; Nap Lajole and Vin Ratz, who shared the first base work last year; Barth, a speedy infielder; Ray Coyle, Ed Litchenthaler and Frankie McKenna, outer gardeners.

Among the newcomers who aspire for twirling honors at the Smith Hill college are Frankie Moran, formerly of La Salle; Ed Durham of Woonsocket high; Artie Quirk, Classical high ace; Koreywo, Cambridge Latin product and a member of the football team at the Dominican college last fall, and Stan Szydla, all-around athlete from Ware.

The crop of catching aspirants who will seek to fill the shoes of Halloran and Maroney includes Chuck Murphy, Bill Norton of Fall River, former battery mate of Joe Whelan; Cy Brennan, Attleboro high mainstay for two years; Novakoski, who played at Meriden high and later at Tilton Seminary; Jim Zande, football player, and former Torrington high backstop; Joe Harraghy, captain of St. Mary's high of Taunton last spring, and Gerry Dillon.

Among the infield candidates are Larry Wheeler of Newport, Frank Lally of East Providence and Joe Duffy of Durfee high, Fall River, all first base aspirants; Bob Dwyer, interscholastic star from West Warwick, Harry Main of Pawtucket, Cappali of Classical and Jerry Romano of Colt high.

The veteran Dominican outfielders will have their territory invaded by such capable flychasers as Ray Coyle, Dan Norton of Valley Falls, Johnnie Dublenny, Durfee high product; Al Conte of Hope, Bill Lynch and Steve Achille, both former Tech high luminaries; Carey of Attleboro, Sullivan of East Providence and Chuck Connors, 1927 football captain.

According to present plans, the Dominican athletes will confine their activities to limited work indoors, and at the first opportunity will swing into action outdoors. The batterymen will start limbering up work this week under the direction of Capt. Doyle and Manager McDermott.

DOMINICANS OUTHIT BY NORTHEASTERN

*Weak Stickwork Undoing of Rhode Islanders, Who
Show Strength in Field.—Duffy Almost Saves
Day with Home Run in Ninth Inning*

Boston, April 9.—The Providence College baseball nine lost to the hard-hitting Northeastern University aggregation here today in one of the finest opening tilts played here in some time. The final score was 8 to 7. The Providence team staged a sensational ninth inning rally which netted five runs and threatened to reverse the verdict.

The Black and White outfit was outhit by the locals, but never outplayed in the field as their fine defensive work cut down many a Northeastern tally. Only six hits, one a crashing homer in the ninth inning, were collected off Ernie Stuckert, the clever right-hander of the Back Bay club, who boasts a fine college record.

It remained for Joe Duffy, classy first baseman of the Dominican team, to provide the feature thrill of the fray. With his club trailing by five runs in the ninth inning, with two men out, and the hassocks filled, the former Durfee High luminary caught hold of a fast shoot and sent it flying out of the park into the deepest centrefield territory to place his team within a run of knotting the score. The rally ended here, however, as Somerville, a lanky southpaw, was sent in and he forced McLaughlin to roll out, Perry Ranney to Freeland.

Joe Whelan, one of the stellar veterans of Jack Flynn's crew, started on the hillock in an effort to repeat his 2 to 0 victory over the Northeastern team on the same field two seasons ago. The rugged Fall River harrier was in control in the first four innings and with fine fielding of his mates held the local, in check, except for a screeching triple by P. Ranney in the third canto which later resulted in a run.

In the fifth frame the storm broke and the Rhode Island twirler had his offerings smashed about the lot as the locals opened fire with their heaviest siege guns. A home run, a walk and a clean single to centre caused Coach Flynn to call upon Hal Bradley, star of the junior Varsity team last spring, to take up the mound work. Bradley hit the first man to face him and then yielded a single, which netted two more markers.

The two newcomers to the Dominicans' lineup came through brilliantly in their first college tilt, as "Nap" Fleurent, diminutive centre gardener who starred at Ware high a year ago, collected two clean hits, laid down a pretty sacrifice bunt, scored two runs, and fielded his post in fine fashion, making a great catch of Capt. Pender's smash in the third frame. Joe Duffy, the other recruit, who worked at first base without a single miscue, drove in three runs with his four-ply smash in the final inning.

The Dominicans scored in the very first inning after two were out. Fleurent sent his first single to centre, stole second, and, when Larry Ranny misjudged Ray Doyle's high fly crossed the plate. In the third inning the second marker of the tilt was chalked up by the visiting aggregation, and had they uncorked a few hits during this canto the final verdict would probably have been different.

Whelan was safe when Richardson lost his riser. Allen walked, and then was staged a clever bit of baseball on the part of the Providence club. Taking a long lead off first Allen drew a throw to that hassock from Mahoney, Northeastern backstop. On the throw to first Whelan raced to third and the speedy Hector slid back to his base safely.

Little Frankie O'Brien slapped a single through third and Whelan tallied. Allen going to second. Fleurent laid down his bunt, advancing the two runners. Doyle, leader of the Dominicans, was deliberately walked as Stuckert did not take any chances with the rugged second sacker. With the sacks crowded, Duffy popped to Pender and McLaughlin filed to Richardson.

After Perry Ranney had tripled in the third and had crossed the platter on his brother's infield bounder, the locals did not dent the home station again until the sixth stanza. With one away in that inning, Mahoney collected his home run and the hit threw Whelan off his stride. Goodwin strolled and Stuckert got his second single. P. Ranney scored Goodwin on a single to right and then Bradley was sent to the mound. Pender was hit and while 'Smiler' Ranney was being tossed out at first Stuckert crossed the plate. Richardson singled, scoring both Perry Ranney and Pender, but while trying to stretch his hit to two bases was thrown out at second.

Two more markers were added to the Northeastern cause in the following canto on successive singles by Freeland, Dennis and Mahoney.

Trailing by six runs, the Dominicans uncorked a great rally in the closing inning and came within a run of tying the score. Graham, hitting for Flynn, smashed a hit through third. Bradley fled out and Allen went out via the strikeout route and it appeared as if the Rhode Islanders were completely subdued. O'Brien sent a hard grounder to short which Ranney booted. Fleurent, who had hit safely twice before, was walked filling the bags. Doyle was all set to empty the cushions, but Coach Bond signalled for another walk and Graham was forced across the platter with the Dominicans' third run. With the count two and two, Duffy sent a smashing drive between right and centre, circling the bases before the ball was returned to the infield. At this juncture Stuckert was yanked and Lefty Somerville rushed to the rescue. The latter forced McLaughlin to ground out, Ranney to Freeland, to end the fireworks.

Next Tuesday the Dominicans will meet the Providence Grays at Kinsley Park.

PROVIDENCE COLLEGE PLAYERS FAIL TO HOLD GRAYS IN CHECK

Eastern League Champions Pound Out 14 Hits and Take Advantage of Eight Errors by Dominicans to Pile Up a Score of

14 to 1.-

The Providence College ball club invaded Kinsley Park yesterday afternoon to battle Patsy Donovan's Eastern League outfit and for three innings gave the 1926 champions a hard tussle, but after that hectic canto which saw the Grays boost their run total to six, they ceased to battle, and merely remained as opposition, the Grays winning by 14 to 1.

The college aggregation, which is being moulded by Jack Flynn, former New Haven pilot, started off auspiciously, even though the Grays had sent one of their best bats to the rubber, in Ken Douglas, rangy southpaw and after they crashed through with a run in the opening frame, crumpled up and failed to gather more than two hits for the remainder of the fray.

The Grays started with their full strength and once they obtained a lead over the Dominicans they stretched it at every opportunity. Leo Smith, veteran southpaw, with the collegians, was nicked for seven bingles in the first four innings, and in the fifth frame gave way to Henry Danis, slim right hander, whose fast shoots were very much to the liking of the Eastern champs. With poor support in the field behind him, Danis found himself in trouble in every inning, and was never able to keep the locals from denting the platter.

When Jack Flynn saw the game slipping far in the rear with his athletes unable to hold the hit-thirsty charge of Donovan in check, he shot his reserves into the fray in order to find out how they would work under fire. The result was certainly disappointing, as the subs only added to the disaster and errors were frequent and costly. Fourteen members of the White and Black squad saw action and plenty of it.

Patsy Donovan also took the opportunity to test some of his newcomers and Millsaps was given a turn in right field, Reckstull took over Demoe's assignment at second in the sixth, while Michigan and McCarthy shared the mound work in the final three innings. The Grays looked like an improved club over the aggregation which bowed to Brown last Saturday.

The Dominicans drew first blood with a flashy opening attack. After Allen had fanned for the first time, little Frankie O'Brien, midget outfielder crashed out a triple, sending a line drive over first and the ball rolling to the right field bleachers. Fleurent, recruit outer gardener, then dropped a Texas leaguer in back of second to score O'Brien, with the only marker of the collegians.

The Grays filled the sacks in their half of the first, but Smith forced Storme to ground out, Doyle to Duffy. In the second inning, however, they opened up in force. Menard reached first when Duffy lost his riser in back of first. Smith made a quick peg to first from the mound a few minutes later to catch his namesake off that bag, and the toss went in right field, Menard racing home from second while Joe Smith rested at third. After Douglas strolled, Harris grounded out, Smith to Duffy, and then Eddie Eayrs lifted a high sacrifice fly to left.

The Dominicans started the third frame well when Allen doubled to the corner of right field and a moment later took third on a passed ball. O'Brien walked, but Fleurent fanned the breezes. Doyle hit to Douglas who threw to Demoe to force O'Brien at second. Duffy's infield tap was nalled by Douglas and tossed to Rodriguez.

A triple by Joe Rodriguez, the longest of his five hits, resulted in a run in the third inning when Storme followed with a single to left. Three runs were chalked up in the fourth canto, on a walk, two singles and a double, while another tally was added in the fifth, the first off Danis, when Menard doubled and later crossed the plate on Harris' sacrifice fly which O'Brien gathered in after a long run to the fence. Incidental-

ly, O'Brien was the best bet on the field, the diminutive Dominican left fielder making a couple of sensational catches that would do credit to any big leaguer. He also collected two of his team's four hits.

With two out in the sixth, two runs were shoved across the plate as the result of a walk, a passed ball and a brace of singles. The following frame saw five runs trickle over the pan due to two singles, two errors and a pair of crashing doubles.

Jack Flynn has a promising ball club and with a little more work the Dominicans should make trouble for plenty of Eastern college teams. In Duffy, Doyle, Norton and Allen, the veteran mentor has an infield quartet which has everything in its favor to make a success. O'Brien and Cummings are nice outfielders, but Lally and Fleurent appear to lack experience. With Whelan, Smith and Danis right he won't need to worry about the hurlers. All in all he has a fair ball club and one which, in a couple of weeks, would not be beaten 14-1 by any team in this section.

JACK FLYNN'S DOMINICANS TURN TABLES ON THE GRAYS, 4 TO 2

Hal Bradley Holds Leaguers to Five Scattered Blows, Two of 'Em of Rodriguez.—Harris Clouts First Pitch Over Fence

Hal Bradley, a Providence College Sophomore, hailing from Taunton, Mass., toyed with Pat Donovan's Providence Grays of the Eastern League at Kinsley Park yesterday afternoon, allowing the professionals only five hits, and tossing such a brilliant article of ball that the Smith Hill collegians had a 4 to 2 bulge on the home guard at the finish of play.

Bradley did not look so good at the start when Sheriff Dave Harris clouted the first ball pitched high and dry over the left field barrier for the round trip, but as the game progressed, Hal from Taunton, increased in effectiveness and from the end of the fourth until two were away in the ninth, the Grays were unable to find him for a single hit. Joe Rodriguez broke the Bradley spell in the ninth by smashing a liner to safe territory.

The right hander pitched a smart ball game. He was invariably ahead of the hitter, and very seldom in the "hole." Only four Providence players were stranded on the base paths, and only 33 hitters faced the Dominican slab artist.

REVENGE FOR FLYNN.

The victory was a pleasant, as well as welcome surprise to Coach Jack Flynn and demonstrated to him that his youthful charges have the fighting spirit. They arose Phoenix-like from the ashes of a 14 to 1 setback administered by the Grays on last Tuesday afternoon, and returned the compliment 4 to 2 yesterday. The Grays figured to win, and impressively, but the stellar pitching of Bradley, backed up by gilt edged support in all but one instance, surprised the Leaguers in no uncertain manner.

The mighty home run of Harris was the only untainted tally of the day and the second Providence run would never have been scored but for a poor throw to first base with two away by Shortstop McLaughlin, while the quartet of Providence College tallies filtered through aided by errors on the part of the Donovan-managed crew.

Gene Berry, who worked eight rounds on the pitching peak for the Grays helped dig his own grave in the fourth, when he passed two men, both of whom later on scored.

Pete Stack's muff of a foul fly on McLaughlin gave Red a life and allowed him the privilege of taking another cut at Berry's delivery, with the result that a single to centre field scored two men, the duo that had embled previously, and knotted proceedings. Had Stack squeezed onto the foul it would have been the third out of the inning with no runs scored.

In the eighth, a three-base error by Shortstop Menard, placed Ray Doyle of the Dominicans on the hot corner, from which base he brought in the run that really won for the Smith Hill collegians, riding home on a safe slap by Joe Duffy, the P. C. first baseman. In the ninth with Touchstone pitching, the pupils of John Flynn cinched the verdict by scoring another run. Touchstone himself contributed a wild throw to second base and walked a man in his one inning of toil.

Inability to hit safely and the insertion of errors into the box score at inopportune moments, sums up the defeat from a Providence Grays' standpoint. Ability to hit, when men were on the cushions, waiting to score, backed up by fine defensive work with Bradley's pitching standing out, sums up the rather sweet triumph from a Providence College view of the afternoon' proceedings.

It was the first win in three starts for Jack Flynn's club and no doubt will stir the athletes to greater effort. The season has hardly started as yet, and the mere fact that the Smith Hill youngsters could come back on high in four days time after that 14 to 1 setback shows that they have latent possibilities as a ball club. The Providence College season is pointed naturally enough towards the two game series with Brown. Until yesterday, the Brunonian stock was selling high, while the P. C. stock found few takers, but now it is rather a toss-up.

EVEN SPLIT FOR COLLEGIANS

Both Brown and Providence College split even in two tussles apiece with the Grays, and the Dominican triumph of yesterday was a well worth while one, as the Grays were a week further advanced than they were the cold afternoon that Brown tipped 'em over. Yesterday's weather conditions were ideal for the battle.

There was very little... and the warmth in the... made overcoats burdensome, and... is pretty fair, atmospherically speaking, for New England in April.

Duffy, Harraghey and McLaughlin each contributed a pair of hits to the Dominican cause, and all three played fine baseball, afield. Joe Rodriguez was the only Providence player to find Bradley's service for more than one hit, the gentleman from Havana pumping a pair of scorching base knocks into the middle pasture. Dave Harris had a home run and might have contributed a couple more extra base blows to the box-score had not Vin Cummings, the Providence College centre fielder, been paging the Sheriff's skyscrapers way out near the centre field flagpole in the sixth and eighth stanzas.

"Heck" Allen gave Sheriff Harris a chance to make a nice catch of a vicious liner to deep left right off the reel. "Cuban" O'Brien pelted a double into left center, Harris making a gallant try but losing the ball after a hard run. Fleurette and Doyle were ease. Harris, the first hitter for the Grays, kissed Bradley's initial pitch high over the left field fence for a home run. It was a mighty thrust from the North Carolinian's bludgeon and passed from wily wdy down near the left field foul line.

Harraghy, the Dominican's catcher singled with one way in the second, but was doubled with McLaughlin on the latter's grounder to Menard. Rodriguez punched a single to center in the Grays' half, but Gill's torrid rap to Allen was converted into a two-ply demise. Stack hit safely in the Providence third and Berry sacrificed. Harris grounded out McLaughlin to Duffy, Stack taking third. Pete tallied when McLaughlin's peg of Demoe's rap drew Duffy several fet off the first bag.

McLAUGHLIN'S TIMELY HIT.

The 2 to 0 lead of the Grays was quickly erased in the Providence College fourth. Berry began the frame auspiciously enough by fanning O'Brien but he walked Fleurant. Gene then struck out Doyle and there appeared to be no immediate danger. But Duffy was patient and walked. Harraghy saluted a fast one between third and short that Knothe knocked down with his gloved hand, but could not field in time to throw anybody out. It was a good stop on Knothe's part. The sacks were now filled with Providence College athletes. Red McLaughlin lifted a high foul which Stack camped under near the grandstand, and then dropped. A fatal error, as McLaughlin soon afterward swung a hit into center field and Fleurant and Duffy ran in. Cummings grounded out to the box to end the rally.

Eayrs walked in the last half of the fourth, but was caught napping off first base. Eddie did not think he was out, but Empire Foley said "yes?" and Foley had the say in the matter. Knothe propelled a double into right centre but neither Rodriguez or Gill had a hit in their bats.

It looked dark for Mr. Berry in the P. C. fifth, but the chunky lad got away Allen. O'Brien's bunt towards third was scathed. Bradley singled and so did ferried to that base by Berry, forcing Bradley and Gill caught the soaring flies of both Fleurant and Doyle.

Duffy smashed a hit into safe territory to initiate the sixth canto. He was pushed along a base by Harraghy's sacrifice but remained at the keystone hassock as McLaughlin popped to Menard and Cummings churned the balmy April air. A pass to Eayrs after two were out in the Providence sixth availed nothing as Knothe skied to Fleurant in right field.

DOMINICANS FORGE AHEAD.

The Dominicans untied the knot in the eighth by scoring one run. Fleurant passed out, Menard to Rodriguez, and it looked as though Doyle was going to die the same way, but Menard threw the apple far to Joe Rodriguez's right, so far in fact that Doyle made three bases on the error. Duffy was the hero of the occasion with a safe rap to right Doyle scoring, and joy reigned supreme on the Providence College bench.

Stack was grazed by a Bradley pitch in the last half of the eighth, but Pepper Peplowski, batting for Berry, was erased on a puny rap towards third, which Bradley pounced upon and srot to Duffy for the out. Harris tried to hit the ball to the centre field flagpole and almost succeeded, but Cummings was out there to make the catch. Meanwhile, Stack, for some reason best known to himself, failed to make third after the out. It mattered little, however, as Demoe expired, Bradley to Duffy.

Clay Touchstone was on the mound for the Grays in the ninth and he finished up in rather shaky fashion. "Touchie" tried to tease Red McLaughlin with a floater but the sorrel top whizzed a one baser into centre field. Cummings dumped a bunt towards Knothe, and the Providence third baseman tried unsuccessfully to force McLaughlin at second. In an attempt to catch "Mac" off second, Touchstone threw poorly to Menard, the collegians advancing a base each. Bradley hit to Knothe and McLaughlin was out at home. Allen walked on four successive wide ones, filling the sacks and a moment later Cummings brought in his run, while, Menard, Demoe and Rodriguez were trying to complete a double play on O'Brien's punch towards short-stop. A peg, Menard to Demoe, snuffed out Allen, but O'Brien refused to be doubled at first base.

RODRIGUEZ'S BINGLE WASTED.

Rodriguez made a single with two away in the Donovan half of the ninth, but Gill's clout to McLaughlin forced Joe the Cubanola at second for the last curtain signal.

DOMINICANS ON FIVE-DAY TRIP

Will Oppose Upsala, Cathedral, Seton Hall, Villanova and N. Y. A. C. Nines

With their tilt with the Grays tucked away on the right side of the ledger, the Providence College balltossers will undertake an ambitious five-game trip this week which will test them to the utmost. The road campaign will carry them into three States where they will meet rugged opposition.

The opening college fray of the trip will be played Wednesday at East Orange, N. J., against the Upsala College nine, a newcomer to the Dominicans' long list. Upsala opened last week with an impressive win over Muhlenberg University and is ready to give the Rhode Islanders a trouncing.

Thursday Coach Flynn will send his cohorts into action against the Cathedral College aggregation, which boasts an enviable record among the smaller metropolitan colleges. A week ago Cathedral went down to defeat before Manhattan. Against the locals the New Yorkers will use their best bet, Tom Keogh, a rugged right hander, who is rated one of the best small college hurlers in New York city.

Seton Hall College, defeated last Thursday by C. C. N. Y., by a 4 to 2 count, will turn its guns against the Smith Hillers in the hope of avenging a 14 to 3 setback hung on them last year on their own lot. The Setonians will have either Outwater, star hurler for the past three years, who gave the locals such close battles up on Hendriken Field, or Henaby, who worked the game last week, ready for mound duty.

Then will come the game of games when the crack Villanova nine will be met on their own lot just outside Philadelphia, in a tilt which will have no little bearing on the collegiate title. The Pennsylvanian's have a brilliant 8 to 0 victory over the champion Fordham nine already tacked to their belt and will endeavor to trip up the Dominicans. A return game with the same club is carded for May 3 on Hendriken Field.

The final joust of the journey away from home will be staged at the Travers Island field of the New York Athletic Club, when the latter organization will send its nine composed of ex-college aces, into competition. The clubmen open their season Saturday at Easton, Pa., against the Lafayette nine.

The first home tilt for the locals is set for April 28, with the Colby College nine providing the opposition. Two days later the Smith Hillers will again leave their native haunts to tackle the Worcester Polytech aggregation on the latter's field. Then follow home games with Villanova, Fordham and City College of New York.

Henry Danis, one of the veteran hurlers on the team, is the only ball tosser not ready for active work for the next few days. Danis was operated upon yesterday for the removal of his tonsils and so will not do any active work until Wednesday or Thursday. He will probably draw the twirling assignment in one of the games late in the week.

WHELAN OR SMITH TO PITCH

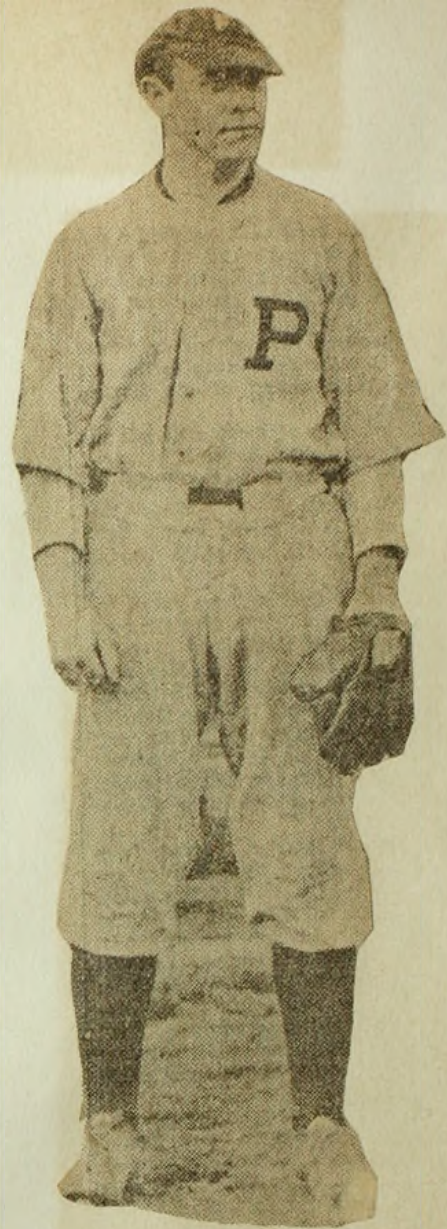
Fifteen Players Comprise Party on

Shutout Victory Registered By Providence College Nine

Bradley Pitches Visitors to 8-0 Triumph Over Upsala at
South Orange.—Dominicans Stage Nice
Hitting and Fielding Exhibition

South Orange, N. J., April 20.—The Providence College baseball team opened its ambitious road trip here today by taking the measure of the Upsala College nine by an 8 to 0 score in a slow game which was featured by fine mound work of Bradley of the Rhode Islanders.

Playing flawless ball behind their new pitching star, who has two victories to his credit in the past five days, the Dominicans were complete masters of the tilt at all times. The Upsala collegians on the other hand were guilty of no less than five errors, which helped towards their downfall. Not one Upsala player reached third, while but two reached second safely. Bradley fanned five and was the pivot man in two of the speedy double plays staged by the invaders when the Jersey aggregation threatened to make trouble.

Dominicans Hit Ball Hard to Net Second Road Game

Drive Keogh, Cathedral's Star Twirler, Off Slab on Way to 16-7 Victory.

New York, N. Y., April 21.—The Cathedral College nine, which held Manhattan to a 5 to 0 score here a week ago, when Tom Keogh fanned 13 men, proved no match for the Providence College aggregation at the Protectory Oval this afternoon, the Dominicans from Rhode Island rolling up a 16 to 7 victory.

Joe Whelan held Cathedral well in check and was never in danger, yielding but three hits in the six frames he worked before giving way to Artie Quirk, former Providence Classical high slabster. During these six innings but two runs were collected by the New York outfit, the result of a smashing drive over the left-field wall by Tom Keogh, ace of the local's lineup.

Quirk took over the mound work at the start of the seventh canto and had no little difficulty in locating the plate. Inasmuch as it was his college debut, the youthful Dominican was slightly nervous in his first round on the hillock, and as a result issued free tickets to four men. Three clean hits, the only ones garnered off his delivery, coupled with the many walks, resulted in the five markers chalked up by the locals in that inning. In the eighth, however, Quirk got his bearing and fanned the first two men to face him, and then in the ninth added two more strikeouts to his record.

At the outset of the game the Dominican went on a batting rampage, and the highly touted Keogh, who was expected to hold them in check, was driven off the hillock. In the first two innings six hits netted seven runs and Keogh gave way to Fleming, a husky right-hander, who had his hands full during the three frames he toiled. In the sixth, Keogh, who had shifted to first, returned to the mound and managed to stop the New Englanders during the final three cantos.

Frankie O'Brien, midget outfielder, with four hits out of five trips to the platter, Heck Allen with three hits, one a terrific clout that cleared the left field fence in the eighth, scoring two men ahead of him, and Joe Harraghy, with two hard smashes to the outfield at opportune times, led the attack of the visitors.

In the second frame the Dominicans batted around. McLaughlin was safe on Tormey's second error of the game. Cummings skied out and Whelan grounded out, McLaughlin going to second on the latter play. Allen collected his first bingle, a liner to centre, to score his shortstop, and O'Brien sent another drive to the same field, which enabled Allen to tally from second, which he had pilfered a moment before. After the hectic inning that Quirk enjoyed in the seventh, which gave the locals five markers, the Rhode Islanders came back in the eighth to increase their total to 16. The latter rally resulted from Allen's homer after Norton had walked and Bradley had singled.

Today the Dominicans will tackle Seton Hall College at South Orange, and Leo Smith, rangy southpaw, will be Coach Flynn's selection to toe the rubber against Outwater, veteran leader of the Jerseyites, who lost a close game to C. C. N. Y. last Saturday.

*Winners Assist Steady Pitching With Flashy Work In
Field and Timely Hitting. — Third Victory
In Week for Bradley*

(Special to the Providence Journal.)

Villanova, Pa., April 23.—Playing brilliantly behind the steady hurling of Hal Bradley, who was working his second game within three days, Providence College baseball team conquered the Villanova nine, defeated only by Princeton this year, by a 5 to 2 score, here today.

Bradley gave a remarkable performance in view of the fact that it was the third game that he has won in the past week. Just a week ago he conquered the Providence Grays, while last Wednesday he opened th Dominican's road trip with an 8 to 0 triumph over the Upsala College nine.

The victory today was not wholly the work of the new phenom wearing the Black and White colors, as his teammates gave major league exhibition both in the field and at bat. As far as base hits are concerned the teams broke even with 12 blows apiece, but the rape from the willows of the Rhode Islanders came at opportune times, while the ones garnered by the locals were kept scattered by the Dominican hurler. Joe Duffy, rangy first baseman, proved the hero of the tilt with three hits, including a triple in five trips to the plate. Vin Cummings and Chuck Murphy ran him close for the hitting honors, however, as both added two safe blows to their records.

A large Junior Week crowd was on hand when the locals stepped out on the field to battle their New England opponents. Jack Flynn, mentor of the latter aggregation, sent his athletes into the fray with a pep and enthusiasm that showed they were bent on taking their redoubtable foes.

Both clubs had an easy first inning with the players being retired in order, but the Dominicans showed a flash of their power in the second when Murphy singled to centre and a moment later McLaughlin sent a drive to the same place. On the latter play Murphy was thrown out at third.

In the homesters' half of the same frame, Moynihan, well known Haverhill athlete, poled a long drive over O'Brien's head into deep left. Ozy raced after the pellet, recovered it and then by a fast relay to McLaughlin to Allen to Murphy, the second sacker of the locals was nipped at the plate. It was a brilliant bit of work on the part of the Rhode Islanders but it did not stop the attack of the Pennsylvanians. A moment later Melanson walked and then Flannagan singled. Cummings lifted a Texas leaguer in back of short which McLaughlin dropped while on the dead run. On this play Melanson crossed the plate.

In the third the Villanovans tailed the second and final marker. Lolos singled to centre, Burnes sent a hot liner through third and then Moynihan collected his second hit, a single to centre which scored Lolos. The rally was killed when McLaughlin took Melanson's grounder and tossed to Doyle for a forceout.

The Dominicans opened up with their siege guns in the fourth inning to knot the count. With two out, Joe Duffy crashed a triple into right centre and when Donahue let one of Kuczo's fast shots get past him a moment later, the Fall River first sacker rambled across the plate. Murphy was walked and Kuczo also issued a free ticket to Norton, who was sent in for McLaughlin. Cummings came through with a one base smash to centre to score Murphy. Bradley grounded out to end the rally.

Game played: April 23, 1927

The following frame the Rhode Islanders put the game away when they collected their third and fourth tallies. Allen caught Cummings flat-footed with a pretty bunt along third, and O'Brien sacrificed him to second. Fleurent hit to Burnes who threw wild to first, Allen going to third and Fleurent to second. Doyle was deliberately walked. With the hassocks filled, Joe Duffy came through with a hard smash to centre, scoring two runs. With the bases still full the Dominicans lost a few more markers when Norton fanned and Cummings grounded out to the infield.

After this scoring the game settled down to a hard battle with both clubs trying to flash rallies. In the seventh the Rhode Islanders filled the bases and Kuczo was removed in favor of Henzick. The latter brought the Villanovans through unscathed when he forced Norton and Cummings to bound grounders to third.

A walk to Allen, a pretty bunt by O'Brien which went for a hit, a sacrifice by Fleurent, and a hard drive to short by Doyle resulted in the fifth run annexed by the classy Providence nine. In the ninth, Henzil, who tamed Boston College Thursday, took over the mound work and was greeted by Norton with a clean single to centre, but that was as far as that rally went.

This afternoon the Dominicans will tackle the New York A. C. at Travers Island. The clubmen swamped Lafayette yesterday under a 12 to 1 score. Leo Smith, rangy suothpaw who has not worked yet, is slated to get the mound assignment by Providence College.

Dominicans Wind Up Road Trip, Beating N. Y. A. C., 7-3

Leo Smith Proves Effective on Mound While Team-mates Are Indulging in Heavy-Hitting.—Fleurent and Doyle Stars of Contest

Travers Island, N. Y., April 24.—The Providence College baseball team registered its fifth successive victory here today by taking the measure of the New York Athletic Club by a 7 to 3 score. The Dominicans flashed the same power and aggressiveness that has marked their play all week and in spite of the fact that they were competing against a team composed of former college players, they kept their heads up behind the pitching of Leo Smith to carry off the verdict.

With Jack Norton, former Fordham star; Bill Alexander, Annapolis football and baseball luminary; Hal Frisch, brother of Frankie Frisch; Quin, Georgetown infielder, and Vaux, former Bowdoin backstop, in their lineup, the clubmen presented a formidable aggregation to test the mettle of the Rhode Islanders.

Smith pitted his ability against that of Al Leonardi, a clever southpaw from a Southern college, and backed by exceptionally fine fielding on the part of his mates carried away the verdict. Both hurlers uncovered plenty of curves and speed in the opening frames but the club twirler weakened in the fifth and the Dominicans drove him from the mound. The Providence heaver, on the other hand, although nicked for eight blows, kept them fairly well scattered and excepting a couple of times when he eased up because of a long lead held his opponents well in check.

Providence flashed a smooth-working infield which handled the hard drives of the slugging wing-footed athletes with the ability of leaguers. Capt. Doyle at second was especially alert, cornering four hard drives besides making a brilliant running catch to stave off a run in the third inning. McLaughlin, at short, handled all but two smashes directed his way in fine style, making good pegs to first for outs. Allen also contributed several sparkling plays.

Fleurent, midget outer gardener from Ware, was the hitting star of the fray, collecting two hits, one a double over the left field fence. The blow would be good for a homer on any other field, but was restricted here to two bases. Joe Harraghy, peppy backstop of the invaders, also proved the right man up in the fourth frame when he singled to drive over the first run of the game.

After three scoreless innings the invaders from the Rhode Island city opened up their attack and by clever baseball garnered a tally. Fleurent walked and Doyle dropped a pretty bunt along third which advanced Fleurent to second. Duffy grounded out but Harraghy came through with a one-base smash to left field to score Fleurent. In the fifth inning the big blowoff was staged which resulted in the removal of Leonardi in favor of Brown, a former Brown University man, who has been ineligible during the past two years.

To start the fireworks, Leonardi walked McLaughlin. Cummings faked a swing and then dropped a pretty bunt along the third base line which caught Quinn napping. By the time the latter fielded the ball Cummings was on first and when he made a slow heave toward that base McLaughlin raced to third, which had been left unprotected. Vaux lost the next ball pitched and Cummings raced to second. With two strikes on him, Leo Smith dumped a Texas leaguer in left field which sent McLaughlin across the plate and Cummings to third.

Allen continued the assault with a single to left to score Cummings and sent Smith to second. O'Brien pumped a roller along third and when Quinn threw wild to first, Smith scored and Allen took third. Fleurent connected for his terrific walloper over the fence for two bases, and Allen and O'Brien scored. Doyle walked and Duffy sacrificed both runners. At this juncture, Brown was sent into the fray and he hit Harraghy to fill the sacks. McLaughlin ended the rally with a grounder to third which was converted into a forceout at the plate.

The Dominicans collected their seventh and last marker in the sixth frame. Cummings was walked and was

sacrificed to second by Smith. The speedy outer gardener from Cranston then proceeded to pilfer third and when Starke overthrew the base in attempting to cut him down he continued to the plate.

The club men tallied their first two runs in the sixth, when Alexander singled, Hal Frisch doubled to centre, and Starke lifted a Texas leaguer into left. The locals' final tally came in the eighth canto on a single by Frisch, followed by a triple by Quinn. The latter failed to touch first base and was called out.

The Dominicans will return home tomorrow morning and will start work for their opening home game Thursday with Colby College.

SIXTH STRAIGHT FOR DOMINICANS

Danis Twirls Well and Gets Good Support in 7-4 Win Over Colby Aggregation

Registering its sixth successive triumph, the Providence College baseball team handed the Colby College nine a 7 to 4 setback in the opening game of the season on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon.

Henry Danis twirled a heady game and although nicked for ten hits was able to keep them well scattered so that the Colby outfit was unable to roll its run total over four. The Dominicans clicked ten hits off Anderson.

Joe Duffy, the Fall River athlete, who is now handling the first base work, proved to be the hero of the fray, collecting a brace of singles and fielding around first like a major leaguer. One of his stops brought the fans to their feet as he had to make a flying catch to spear Heals' smash over first in the seventh frame.

Duffy tallied the first run in the second inning, he was on base when hit by a pitched ball. Doyle, who preceded him, had been trapped off second base. Murphy fanned, but McLaughlin proved the right man in the emergency with a three-base smash. Cummings continued the bombardment with a single to left to score McLaughlin, and Danis added a Texas Leaguer to the same locality. Allen strolled, crowding the hassocks, but the best O'Brien could do was to churn the breezes.

Another Providence run was shoved across in the fourth when Cummings reached first on a fielder's choice, was sacrificed to second and raced home on Allen's smash to center. The fourth marker was collected in the fifth stanza when Doyle made first on a fielder's choice, went to second on Duffy's single, and scored when Murphy's roller bounded through McDonald's legs.

The Smith Hill collegians put the game on ice in the sixth with three more tallies. Danis singled, Allen reached first on Smart's error of his easy tap, and then O'Brien crowded the sacks when he beat out Smart's poor throw of his bunt along third. Anderson lost control at this point and pitched wildly, the ball rolling to the backstop and while Danis and Allen tallied O'Brien went to third.

Fleurent's second hit accounted for the third run, O'Brien dashing in from third. The Colby nine scored one run in the fourth on a double off Smart's bat, an error by Doyle, and a single by Niziolek, while another run was posted up in the fifth as the result of Allen's wild heave to first followed by a single in the left field by Smart.

In the eighth frame Smart opened with a single to left, his third of the afternoon, and after Shannahan and Baldwin had filed out, Arbor caught hold of fast ball and crashed it over the left fielder's head, the ball rolling under the fence and allowing two runs to be added to the Maine collegians' total.

Rally Wins For Dominicans Over Worcester Tech, 5 to 2

Closest Struggle of Season for Providence College
Results in Seventh Straight Victory—Fleurent's Triple Decides Game

Worcester, April 30.—The Providence College baseball nine registered its seventh straight victory here this afternoon when it hung up a 5 to 2 victory over Worcester Polytech in the closest tilt of the season for the Rhode Islanders. A ninth inning rally which was climaxed by a smashing triple into deep centre field by "Nap" Fleurent of the invaders, netted three runs and broke up a pitching duel between Robinson, ace of the locals, and Joe Whelan of the Dominicans.

After the seventh inning, when Whelan was nicked for two hits which did no damage whatsoever, Coach Flynn of the Providence team sent his hurling ace, Hal Bradley, to the rubber to hold the Worcesterites in check until the Black and White aggregation could collect a few markers. Bradley set the locals down without a hit in the two frames he worked, and when his mates drove across a trio of markers he received credit for his fourth victory.

Worcester collected a brace of runs in the opening frame and in the second inning the Dominicans retaliated with two markers. The Rhode Islanders had no less than 11 men left on the paths.

Allen and McLaughlin of the Providence team showed up well in the infield and handled everything in good fashion. The Dominican shortfielder was especially alert, handling four chances flawlessly and assisting in a sparkling double killing which broke up a budding Tech rally. The latter play came in the sixth inning. Capt. Brackett of the locals singled to centre and Harris drove a grounder at Whelan who fielded it and made an accurate peg to McLaughlin, who completed the play with a fast heave to Duffy.

The Worcester aggregation opened its attack in the very first frame when it converted two free passes into runs. Brackett was walked to start the inning, and Harris promptly sacrificed him to second. Then Whelan walked Leamy. Jack McCarthy crashed a single into right field and sent Brackett home and Leamy to third. The latter tallied the second and final Tech run, when he dashed across the plate while Allen was throwing Guidi out at first.

The Providence collegians came back strong in the second canto to even the score. Harraghy singled and after McLaughlin had flied out was advanced a base by Cummings on a Texas leaguer. Whelan walked, filling the bases, and then Allen lifted a long sacrifice fly to left field which enabled Harraghy to tally and the other runners to move up a peg.

O'Brien slammed a hard drive at Robinson which the latter partly knocked down, and Cummings raced in with the second run. Fleurent grounded out, Tawter to Leamy.

The following innings, until the ninth, were scoreless, with both clubs playing a remarkable defensive game.

As the tilt appeared slated for overtime, Coach Flynn rushed Bardley into the fray to insure a stronger defence against the aggressive Techsters, and the Providence star flashed plenty before the locals. In the eighth he struck out two and walked one player, who was later snuffed out while trying to steal second. In the ninth he forced the locals to send up three pop flies for his fielders to gather in.

Bradley started the ninth by skying out to Guidi, but Allen worked Robinson for a walk. While trying to hold Allen close to first, Robinson hit O'Brien. Then Fleurent came to bat, and, with the count three and two, smashed out the longest hit of the day, a triple into deep centre which assured the Dominicans of the victory. Doyle was deliberately walked and Duffy lifted a single into centre to score Fleurent. Harraghy fanned and McLaughlin fouled out to Guidi to end the rally.

Villanova Pins 10-4 Defeat on Providence College Nine

Pennsylvanians Nick Hal Bradley for 10 Hits While
Seven Errors By Locals Help to Boost
Score for Invading Club

The winning streak of the Providence College nine of seven consecutive victories was broken yesterday afternoon on Hendricken Field by Villanova College, which scored a 10 to 4 victory and handed Hal Bradley, Dominican ace, his first setback of the season. In a previous game Providence defeated Villanova 5 to 2.

Seven errors by Providence spoiled what otherwise would have been a fine ball game. Capt. Doyle, with two errors on easy grounders, and Hal Bradley, with two wild heaves to first base, were the principal offenders for the Smith Hill aggregation, although McLaughlin, Norton and Duffy chipped in with miscues at inopportune times.

The Villanovans came here determined to avenge the defeat sustained earlier in the season, and before the game was very old it was apparent that they would not have a hard task. Bradley was nicked for 10 hits which stretched over a period of eight innings, and in three instances the blows were bunched sufficiently to clinch the decision for the Main Liners.

The Dominicans reached Al Kuczo for eight safe hits, but unfortunately were unable to come through in the pinches, leaving 10 runners stranded on the bases. Heck Allen had his best day of the season, getting three hits out of four trips to the plate, while Bernie Norton, relief infielder, surprised everyone by slugging out a single and a double in his three times up.

Several fine fielding features redeemed the otherwise ragged work to some extent. "Nap" Fleurent's running backhand catch of Gillespie's terrific drive in the fourth frame, Moynihan's double play in the opening stanza to kill a Providence rally and O'Brien's sparkling running catches in left field gave the large crowd reason to become excited.

The fray started with a rush with the Villanovans taking a three-run lead. Bradley started poorly by hitting Lolos in the arm. Then Burns banged out a double to left field which sent Lolos in the arm. Then Burns banded hill product, succumbed to the curves of Bradley, and Gillespie made it two out, much to the delight of the crowd. Melanson proved the right man in the pinch, however, smashing a clean single to left to score Lolos and Burns. The Villanova centre gardener stole second a moment later and then dashed safely to third when Chuck Murphy let a fast curve bound away from him. Flannagan singled to right to score Melanson, but Bradley ended the rally at this juncture by picking the Villanovan off first on an accurate peg to Duffy.

The Dominicans came back in their half of the same frame and nearly knotted the count. Allen opened with a hard single to left. O'Brien worked Kuczo for a pass and Fleurent dropped a sacrifice bunt which Kuczo hurled wildly to first, allowing the Ware athlete to reach there safely, while the other runners moved up a peg. Doyle was hit in the ribs with a fast shoot and Allen tallied the first run. Duffy hopped a grounder at Moynihan, who converted it into a double killing, forcing Doyle at second. O'Brien scored on the play. Murphy's riser ended the rally.

After two scoreless frames the Main Liners broke out again to collect two more markers. With two out, Flannagan dropped a bunt in front of Bradley who heaved the pellet in right field instead of first, and the runner continued around to third. Curtin bounded a single into right and Cummings landed a cheap hit when McLaughlin held his roller too long to get any one out. Kuczo rolled to McLaughlin who booted it and Curtin romped in with the fifth Villanova marker.

Providence retaliated with a run in the fourth and then with a tally in the fifth. The former came when Duffy strolled, went to second on a passed ball, continued to third when Bernie Norton, who had replaced McLaughlin at short, dropped a Texas leaguer into centre, and then crossed the plate on Cummings long fly to Lolos. The run made in the following stanza came as the result of Allen's double to left and Fleurent's single to centre a moment later. This ended the Black and White scoring for the afternoon.

Moynihan's single, Doyle's error of Gillespie's roller with an easy double play in sight, and Melanson's long triple over O'Brien's head resulted in the sixth and seventh Villanova markers, in the fifth. The following frame an error by Duffy, who failed to touch first after receiving a perfect peg from Norton, Bradley's wild heave of Cummings bunt, and a long fly from Lolos' bat contributed the eighth tally for the visitors.

DOMINICANS BOW TO FORDHAM IN 10 INNINGS, 3-0

Maroon Rally in Overtime Breaks Up Tense Battle

Black and White Counter-Attack in Its Half Finds Neces- sary Punch Lacking.

The initial visit of Fordham baseball team to Providence yesterday afternoon was one which will linger long in the minds of Providence College partisans and non-partisans who saw the crack New Yorkers triumph over the Dominicans, 3 to 0, in a bitterly fought 10-inning game at Hendriken Field yesterday afternoon. For nine innings the teams held each other scoreless. In the first half of the 10th, Fordham unleashed a savage batting rally which netted it three runs, and then went on the defensive in the last half of the stanza to safeguard its lead by holding the Dominicans in check.

For nine innings Smith of Providence and Hanlon of Fordham battled with the honors about even. Smith fanned six of the New York sluggers, while Hanlon sent nine of the Dominicans back to the bench via the three-strikes route. However, because of poor support the Fordham twirler had trouble in keeping the base paths clear of Providence runners, as Coach Flynn managed to get at least one of his charges on the sacks in all but three innings. Five errors on the part of the visiting club made Hanlon's task harder, but the locals garnered only four scattered hits off his delivery.

The Dominicans played errorless ball behind Smith.

Game played: May 6, 1927

Inability to hit cost the Dominicans the game. While they were able to land men on the hassocks frequently, and got several runners to third, none crossed the home plate. "Nap" Fleurent, diminutive Ware outfielder, the leading stickler of the outfit, proved to be the only one capable of solving Hanlon's deceptive slants, collecting two clean hits, but, like many others, he died on the bases.

Bernie Norton, utility infielder for the past two years and who has alternated in several of the games this spring with McLaughlin, broke into the starting lineup for the first time in his collegiate career yesterday, and showed well in his debut. In the fourth frame he made a sensational running catch of Feaster's bid for a hit while White was on second waiting to score.

Early in the game it became apparent that the tilt was to be a pitchers' duel as both hurlers worked with a machine like precision, mowing down the opposition without trouble for three innings. In the second Smith gave the fans a treat by fanning Bill Feaster and Johnny Dwyer, the latter captain of the Fordham nine.

In the fourth the first hit of the fray was chalked up to the credit of Johnny White, who dropped a liner into short left. The Dominicans shared the honor in the same canto when Capt. Ray Doyle smashed the hardest drive of the day into centre field. Porter's double in the following inning and Clancy's single in the eighth were the only other safe bingles garnered off Lefty Smith until the fatal 10th inning.

The rally of the Fordhamites comprised several healthy blows which completely upset the Dominican twirler. To start the fireworks in the overtime frame, Porter slapped a single into right field after Byrne had grounded out, Norton to Duffy. Then Smith tried to ease out of his difficulty and Ryan crossed him up by lifting a drive over O'Brien into deep left field, which was good for three bases, scoring Porter. Hanlon lifted a Texas leaguer to left which "Oby" nearly snared after a hard run. The Fordham hurler made second easily, as Ryan tallied. Clancy sent the third run across the plate with a clean single to right to score Hanlon. Liebl forced Clancy at second, and then himself pilfered that post and a moment later stole third. Graham grounded out to end the rally.

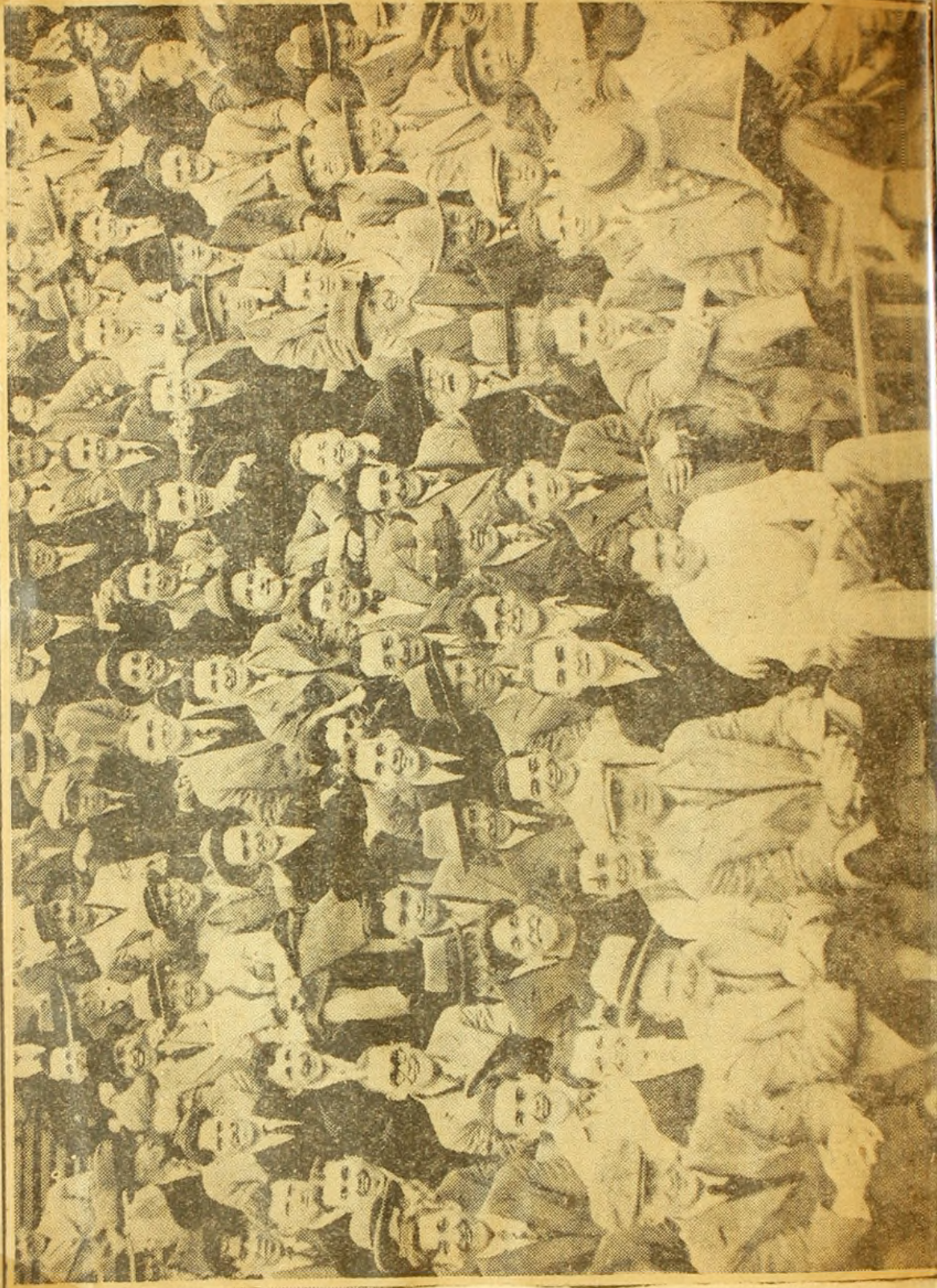

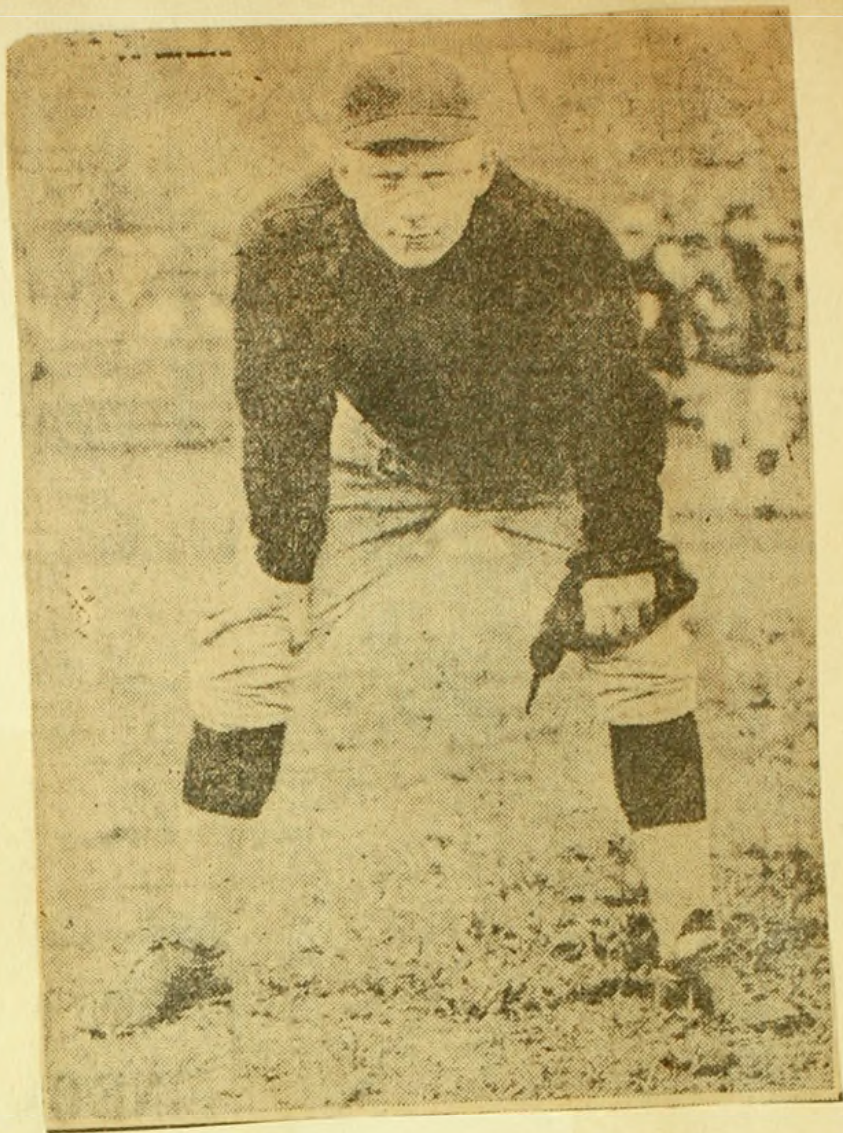

The Dominicans slammed the offerings of Florenza for a dozen safe blows, but were not able to effectively bunch their hits.

With the exception of Fleurent and O'Brien in the outfield, and Bernie Norton, at short, the Dominicans presented a weak attack and the defence cracked wide open at times. No less than six miscues were chalked up against the Smith Hillers, with Capt. Ray Doyle the leading offender.

Danis started on the slab, but before the tilt was half over the slim right-hander had met the same fate as was meted out to him last Saturday. A barrage of hits filled the bases in the fifth and accounted for a brace of runs when he was yanked in favor of Frankie Moran. BROWN TOPPLES DOMINICANS IN NINTH, 3 TO 2

BROWN DRAWS FIRST BLOOD IN SERIES WITH THE DOMINICANS

Losers Knot Score in Ninth Only to Have Brunon-
ians Come Back With Tally That Decides
3-2 Thriller at Aldrich Field

Ever since the two teams first locked horns several years ago, Providence College-Brown games have been replete with thrills, and yesterday when the nines met for their first engagement of the year was no exception. Five thousand cheering spectators, including a colorful Brown Junior Week delegation, saw the battalions from College Hill raise their banners over the Smith Hill contingent by a score of 3 to 2.

Brown won, to be sure, and that is sufficient for the victors, but all the glory is not theirs. The losing side kept close on their heels, and the game was not over until the last half of the ninth, when the Bears broke a tie that had been created by the Dominicans in their last turn at bat. The second game of the series will be played next Saturday, also at Aldrich Field.

BILLINGS FANS TEN.

The honors between Haskell Billings, Bruin hurler, and Hal Bradley, on the firing line for the White and Black, were about even. The Bears clawed Bradley's delivery for nine safe hits, while the Smith Hill bludgeons spoiled Billings's offerings eight times. But Billings fanned 10, three of the victims going down in succession in the fourth. That instance provided the hurling highlight of the day. After Providence had pushed men around to third and second by the aid of an error, a single and a passed ball, and with none out, Billings tossed 12 balls with which he retired the side on strike-outs.

Game played: May 14, 1927

Billings was partly responsible for the two Providence tallies, despite his excellent pitching. In the sixth, when the Dominicans first broke into the run column, Billings hit Fleurant, the first man at bat, while in the ninth Fleurant drew a pass. On both occasions the Dominican right fielder scored.

TWELVE LOSERS LEFT ON BASES.

In the last analysis the ability of the Brunonians to bunch their blows told the story. Providence sent men enough on to the paths to win a couple of games, but couldn't come through with the necessary round trip tickets. Twelve of the Dominicans were left on the pillows all dressed up with no place to go.

Brown opened the scoring in the second and got another run in the fourth. Providence broke the ice in the sixth, making the score 2 to 1. Then came the red hot ninth stanza.

HECTIC NINTH INNING.

Providence went into its last one run behind and promptly tied it up. For a while it looked as if the spectators might as well start for the exits, as the first two Dominicans went out. Then Fleurant outguessed Billings and got a free ticket. Doyle hit to Wright at short, who tried to force Fleurant at second and instead threw the ball into right field, allowing the runners to populate second and third. Joe Duffy had his second chance of the day to become a hero, and this time he did it. With the old-fashioned crucial moment upon him, two down, ninth inning, count 3 and 2, and the runners on the sacks, the crowd held its breath as Billings curved the sixth ball over, and Joe gave it a ride to centre field. Fleurant scored and Doyle was on his way to win the ball game when Curley Edes sent a bullet peg to Gurney that caught Doyle at the platter.

And then Brown came up. Gurney went out on an infield blow, but Billings waited for a good one and socked it to right field. "Red" Randall stepped up and just for variety deposited the horseshoe on the left side of the pasture. Wright came up for another chance at hero stuff, and he more than made up for his bad peg that tied the score by shooting a neat single right over second base that brought Billings home with the winning run.

Gurney opened the scoring for Brown in the second frame, starting his trip with a ringing double. Billings was safe when Norton bobbed his bid for a hit, and Gurney went to third. Randall smoked a line drive along the third base line that sent the Brown catcher over the platter.

In the fourth inning, with one out, Randall singled to right field, and was all set for a three-base sprint when Wright sent the globe for a two base ride to the right pasture.

Billings gave the White and Black a chance in the sixth when he hit Fleurant. Doyle singled and Fleurant moved up. Billings threw Doyle out at second on Duffy's roller, and the first Providence run was waiting on third. Murphy supplied the needed hit and the White and Black count commenced.

There was no further scoring until the ninth, but several times during the game there was tulle in the making that petered out, particularly on behalf of the losers. Billings tightened up several times, and despite some poor support, managed to retire the Dominicans at critical moments.

THOSE WHO STARRED.

Buckle Wright and Red Randall each collected three hits out of the Brunonian total of nine, and Joe Duffy equalled their record for the losers. O'Brien patrolling left field for the losers cancelled at least three Brown blows with nifty glove work, Duffy took excellent care of the first basecock, Doyle made a nifty play in the seventh that spoiled a Brown rally, Lally turned in four good catches in centre and Parker retired the Dominicans in the sixth when he reached to the bleachers to catch a foul fly. 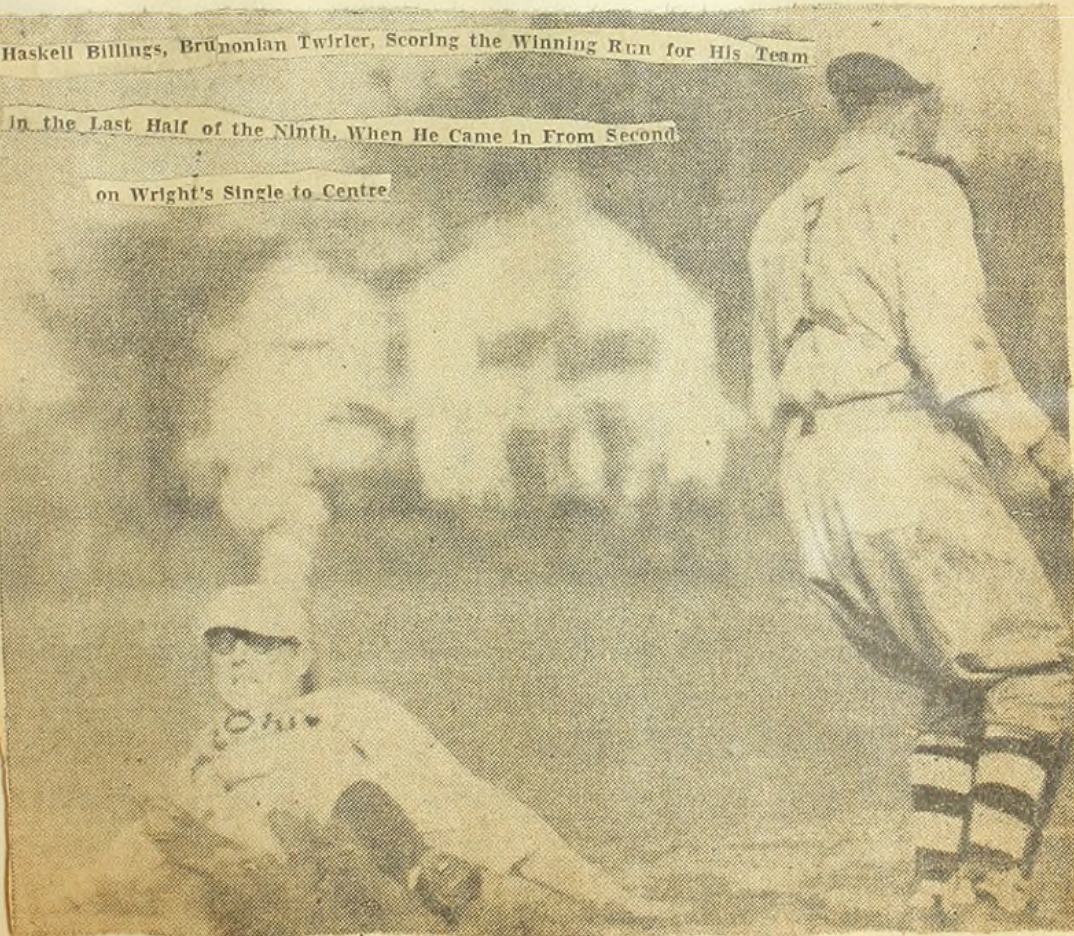


Roy Randall Scoring Brown's Second Run in the Fourth Inning

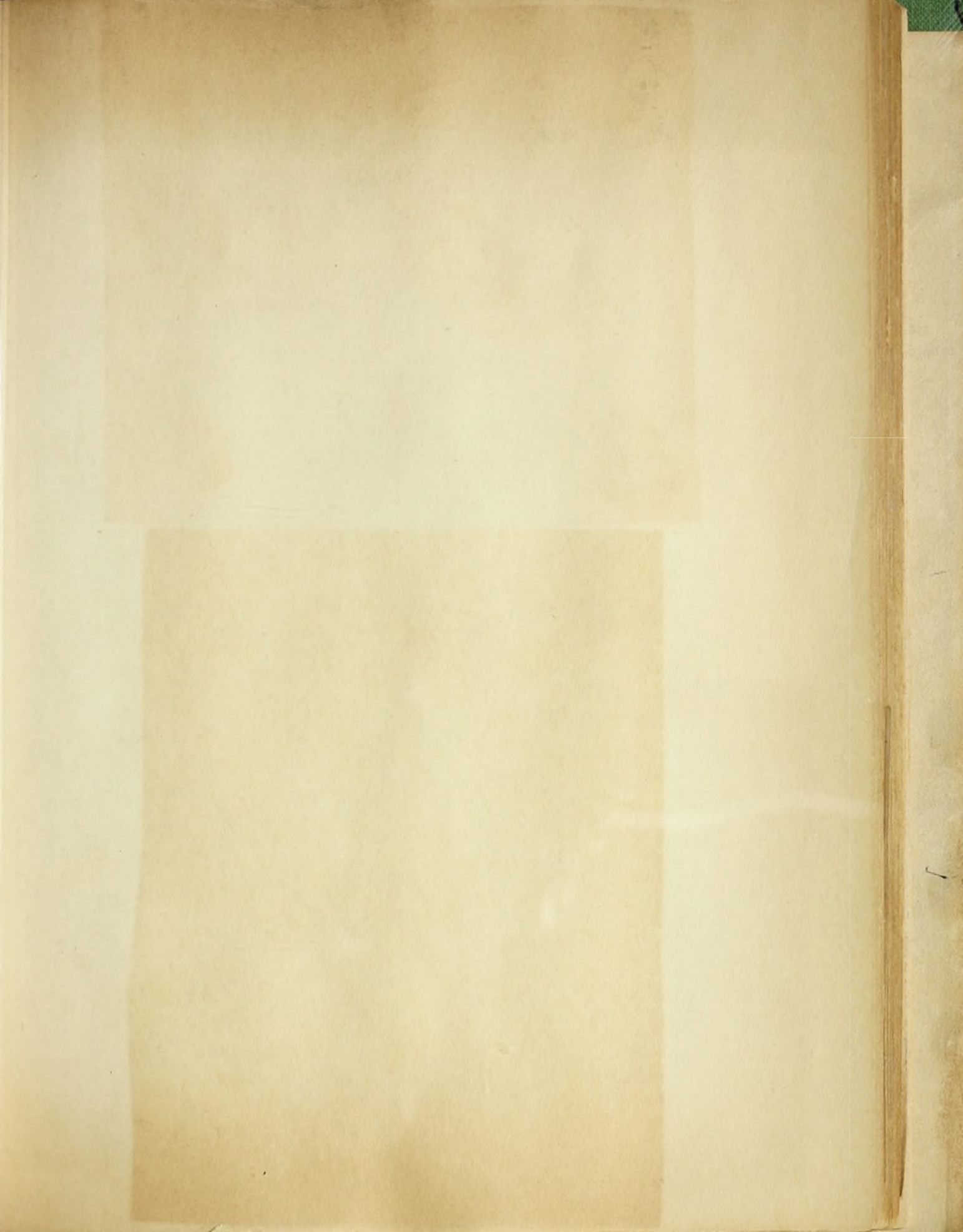

JOE DUFFY'S SINGLE GIVES DOMINICANS

1-0 VICTORY

Clout Ends Duel Between Moran and Don Macdonald

Rival Hurlers Allow Only Three
Hits Apiece.—Local Flinger
Fans Ten.

A crashing single to right field by Joe Duffy with the bases loaded in the ninth inning gave the Providence College nine a 1-0 victory over Boston University at Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. The hit ended a brilliant pitching duel between Frankie Moran, product of La Salle, and Don Macdonald, ace of the Terriers' squad, boosted the Dominicans' stock considerably for their game with Harvard tomorrow.

Moran, making his first start in college baseball, was pitted against a hurler who has beaten Brown and Boston College this season. Moran hurled brilliant ball, striking out 10 men and walking but one. Macdonald sent five back to the bench via the strikeout route and issued four free tickets, but nevertheless turned in a remarkable bit of work in holding the locals hitless until the seventh inning.

Each club collected three blows, with the Dominicans bunching two of their hits in the last frame to clinch the decision. Moran was nicked for one hit in the third, fourth and fifth innings, but at all other times held the Terriers in check. Duffy, whose hit won the game, broke up Macdonald's flawless exhibition in the seventh frame when he lifted a Texas leaguer into centre.

The Dominicans' rally was similar to that staged in their thrilling game with the Bruins last Saturday. Heck Allen, first man up, worked Macdonald for a free ticket and O'Brien, always hard to pitch to on account of his size, also strolled to first. Nap Fleurent popped to Lawless, but Doyle whizzed a grass cutter towards second and Arkin, making a brilliant back hand stop over second base, prevented Allen from scoring although all three runners were safe. Duffy, elongated first sacker, capped the performance by crashing a hard liner into right field to score Allen with the winning marker.

The tilt was featured by several classy fielding performances with the honors about even. The Dominicans staged a fast double killing in the sixth when Norton took Jack O'Brien's grounder, tossed to Doyle to force Arkin at second, and the Black and White leader completed the play with an accurate peg to Duffy. Fleurent's catch against the right field fence of Norman George's fly in the fourth, Kincaide's running catch of Doyle's bid for a homer in the first, with Fleurent perched on first, and Norton's clever stop of Capt. Ken Macdonald's bid for a hit over second in the fourth, were the other sparking plays of the tilt.

During the first six frames Macdonald held the Dominicans at his mercy, permitting only two to reach second base. Fleurent raced to third in the first stanza when Lawless made a wild heave to first after picking up his grounder, and Allen reached the keystone sack on a steal after drawing a pass.

Moran was equally effective, setting the Back Bay athletes down in order in all but three innings. During the entire fray only one Terrier saw third. In the ninth Frankie started trouble for himself when he walked Arkin, lead-off man for the invaders, but the following three batters were set down in order, with George, clean-up hitter, churning the breezes for the final out. This was the closest attack that Chipple Gaw's outfit could present.

HARVARD DOWNS PROVIDENCE 5-4 IN 10 INNINGS

Timely Single By Zarakov Breaks Up Pitching Duel

Smith Invincible Until Eighth.
Bradley's Hit Ties Up
Game in Ninth.

Cambridge, May 19.—Staging a thrilling ninth-inning rally to knot the score at four all, the Providence College baseball team carried Harvard to 10 innings, only to lose out when Capt. Izzy Zarakov crashed a single over third to send Burns across the plate with the winning marker.

The game was a pitching duel for the greater part between Leo Smith of the Dominicans and Jack Barbee. The Providence twirler had a wide margin on his local rival, allowing but five hits and striking out seven. Barbee was nicked for seven hits during his stay on the mound, which lasted for eight innings. When the Black and White aggregation swept through in the eighth to collect two runs, Barbee was retired in favor of Cutts, who was nicked freely in the ninth.

To start the scoring for the Crimson Burns walked. Harraghy tried to catch the runner off first but threw the ball over Duffy's head into right field and the runner went to second. Chase laid down a sacrifice bunt to send Burns to third. With two strikes on the batter Burns started for the plate as Smith began his windup. The pitched ball cut the heart of the plate and Harraghy turned to tag the runner as he slid into home, as the umpire had reserved a decision on the pitched ball. Burns was apparently nipped a foot from the platter, but the run was counted.

In the eighth Burns dropped a bunt on his third strike which caught both Harraghy and Smith napping. Burns then stole second and scored when Chase singled to left. Norton made a fine stop of Zarakov's grounder and then made a poor heave to first, Chase going to third and the local captain holding the initial hassock. Tobin fanned, but Deuchin crashed a long triple into deep centre to score both runners. Ullman ended the rally with a riser to Fleurent.

The Dominicans retaliated with a brace of markers in the same stanza. Lally was hit in the arm. Smith got his second hit, a single to centre, and Allen was hit in the right foot, filling the sacks. O'Brien's best was a bunt which Deuchin picked up to force out Lally at the plate, and then threw to first for a double killing. With Smith on third and Allen at second, Nap Fleurent came through with a double along the left field line to score the first two Providence runs. Duffy skied to Zarakov to end the rally.

With the count 4 to 2 against them, the Dominicans went into their half of the ninth with plenty of pep and determination. Coach Flynn opened up with all the tricks in his kit and as a result managed to even the count. Graham went to bat for Harraghy, but the best he could do was give Chase a long run into deep left for his riser. Norton made the second out when he grounded out. Lally got his third safe hit, a single to left. Cummings went in to bat for Smith and slammed a drive into centre to push Lally to second. Cutts walked Allen to fill the bases, and Coach Flynn rushed Bradley to the plate for O'Brien. The Black and White hurling ace sent the Providence rooters into an uproar when he smashed a single through the box to send the tying runs across the plate. Fleurent forced Bradley at second when he grounded to Sullivan.

Harvard went out in order before Danis in their half of the ninth, but in the 10th Burns worked a pass to first, stole second when Zande made a low peg to that post, went to third on Chase's sacrifice bunt, scoring when Zarakov sent a grass cutter over third base with the count two and two on him.

BURNS HERO IN CRIMSON VICTORY, 5-4

The daring and brilliant base-running of Howard Burns, Harvard's fleet little centre fielder, gave the Crimson a 10-inning 5 to 4 victory over Providence College yesterday in the most hectic and hotly-contested diamond battle that has been waged on Soldiers Field this year.

PITCHERS EFFECTIVE

Providence gave Harvard Hall Columbia for the greater part of the game, and if it had not been for the work of Burns, the game would not even have been close. Leo Smith, left-handed Providence Junior from Westerville, held Harvard hitless until the sixth, and permitted only one lonesome single up to the eighth. Meanwhile Jack Barbee, the tall Harvard moundsman, mowed down the Dominicans with ease and consistency.

The only run before the eighth, and the run that for a while seemed likely to win the game came in the first when Burns worked Smith for a pass, went to second when the catcher threw wild in an attempt to hold him to the base, was sacrificed to third, and scored on a daring and superbly executed steal of home.

Meanwhile, Harvard was helpless before the slants of Lefty Smith, and in the sixth inning, Coach Mitchell of Harvard took Jones, Chauncey and Lord, all left-handed hitters, out of the game and moved Donaghy way out to right field in order to put in second-string talent with right-handed hitting habits against the pitching of Smith. Duchin went in to catch, Sullivan shortstopped, and Tobin played first base.

The shift met with ill luck at the start when, in the first of the eighth, Providence overcame Harvard's one run lead, and took a 2 to 1 lead, Napier Fleurent knocking in the two big counters with a double.

With one down in the last of the eighth, little Howard Burns startled everyone in general and the Providence players in particular by laying down a beautiful bunt on a third strike, and beating it out. Howie stole second, and scored the tying run on Zarakov's infield single.

Then, with Chase and Zarakov on base, Ralph Duchin, substitute catcher, tripled and put Harvard two runs ahead. But Providence tied it up at 4-all in the ninth on singles by Lally, Cummings, and Bradley.

Came the last of the 10th. Again the form of Howard Burns loomed in the path of the Dominicans. Little Howie again worked the enemy pitcher for a walk. Again he stole second. Then he went to third on Johnny Chase's bunt, and raced across the platter with the winning run when Captain Izzy Zarakov came through with a fierce single to left.

Jean Dubuc's Brown University nine won the collegiate baseball championship of this city, if nothing else, at Brown Field yesterday afternoon, flattening Jack Flynn's Providence College outfit for the second Saturday in succession. The final score was 7 to 1 and the Bruins were never in danger.

About 6,000 fans saw the debacle, and debacle it was, insofar as the Dominicans from Smith Hill were concerned. At no time was Providence College able to make the Bears "like it" and after the sixth round, the battle was a monotonous, as well as sleepy affair, with Haskell Billings, the bespectacled Brown Sophomore from Somerville, Mass., the lord of all he surveyed from the centre of the picture.

Brown's popular moundsman was just wild enough to be effective. He had the Providence College hitters on his hip, and several of Jack Flynn's young men were swinging with one foot free. Very few base knocks are ever corraled when the batters simply wave at the whizzing apple. Billings had plenty of zip on his fast one, and time and again, the horsehide had plunked into Dick Guerney's big mit before the Providence lads finished their futile swings.

THREE HITS FOR LOSERS.

"Specs" was knicked for only three hits, the first of which was delivered by Pinch Clubber Graham in the last half of the sixth canto. Capt. Ray Doyle caught hold of one solidly in the eighth and rode it to left centre for two bags, and "Red" McLaughlin, swinging for Shortstop Norton in the ninth, belted a one timer past first base.

Billings struck out 11 of the Dominicans, Leadoff Man "Heck" Allen taking the "gas" four times out of five. Allen was practically helpless before the cunning of the Brunonian "ace," although in his second appearance he cuffed one to left which Russ Scribner caught while on the run.

Hal Bradley, the Providence College pitching selection, and the young man that furnished Billings a real battle last Saturday, failed to repeat yesterday. The Bruins gaffed him for 10 hits and seven runs in six frames, and when the seventh rolled around, Frankie Moran, a local lad, and former La Salle Academy pitcher, was on the hillock for the White and Black. Moran held the Bears scoreless for the remainder of the melee.

In justice to Bradley it must be recorded that his support was hardly the best, and slow fielding behind him helped the Brown cause along. This was especially noticeable in the fifth, the big Brown inning of the sunny afternoon, the Bears uncorking bursts of speed that fairly outsparkled any previous Bruin performance this season.

BEARS PERFORM WELL

Summing up the carnage briefly it might be said that Providence College bumped into Brown on the best baseball afternoon the Bears have enjoyed this season barring possibly the Holy Cross game a few weeks ago. The Dominicans were slow, they could not hit Billings and any time a team is stacking up against superior box work they are just bound to look a little off color. Any deep stuff that Coach Flynn might have been saving for a tight situation failed to materialize yesterday for the very sufficient reason that Brown was so far ahead half way through the ball game that it was simply a case of hit straight away in the hope that the agate would fall safe so far as the Providence attack was concerned. No team can try fancy stuff when they are several runs in arrears.

After splitting the series with Brown in half for the past three years, Providence College lost in straight heats this Spring. All in all, Brown has beaten the Dominicans six out of nine contests since the competition started in 1923.

RANDALL SHOWS SPEED

There was no question about Brown having the best ball club by far yesterday. They cut loose a barrage of 12 base knocks, two of which were doubles and outstayed the Smith Hillites in the field and on the bases. "Red" Randall, who will captain Brown's football eleven in the Fall, gave the folks in the grandstand the big thrill in the fifth when he scored from the midway while Shuster was laying down a safe bunt towards the hot corner. Allen made the play on Schuster to no avail at first base, and Duffy tried the nip the Mercury-footed Randall at home, but Roy and Red was safely under the wire.

The big splurge in the field as a sensational stop and throw by "Bucky" Wright, the Brunonian shortstop in the third on Hal Bradley. The P. C. pitcher shot a grounder through the pitcher's box and the pellet had passed second base when Wright cut across, scooped up the apple in his gloved hand, and without straightening up, whipped the ball on a true peg to Parker for the putout. As Bradley was the first batter of the inning, the wonder play helped pull Billings out of a possible hole.

Every player on the Brown team managed to get at least one base hit. Jack Heffernan, Randall and Buck Wright came through with two safe shots apiece.

Yesterday's conflict was regarded as a home game by Providence College, the Bears being first at bat. Bradley disposed of Scribner on a hopper to Capt. Doyle, Edes passed out, Allen to Duffy and Parker filed to Lally in centre field.

Billings had bounding speed at the start and struck out both Allen and "Cuban" O'Brien. Flanagan managed to hit the ball, but only to Randall, Heffernan, who peeps at the ball through eye glasses, fled to O'Brien in the second, and Bradley gave the Providence College supporters something to cheer about when he subjuggated the Brown battery, Gurney and Edings, on strokes. Doyle and Duffy were easy in the second half but Murphy received a life when Schuster threw badly to Parker, after stopping Murphy's grounder. Newton walked, Lally ran into a force play, Schuster uncommitted.

THE FUN BEGINS

Randall raised a foul fly which Allen grabbed, in the Brown tied. Then the fun began. Wright crashed a hit to right, the first real blow of the game. Schuster was the second out, flying to O'Brien. Schuster singled to left, and Wright, off with the pitch, was pulling into third when O'Brien's throw arrived at that base. Allen tried to block Wright and catch the ball at the same time, but the chuck was a little wide and sailed serenely into the Providence College dugout. Bradley retrieved it and smacked Scribner in the head, the ball bouncing off to one side and Scribner followed Wright across the pan. The two runs came in galling gun succession while the Providence boys were heaving the onion about the orchard in promiscuous fashion, but Scribner was sent back to third base. Umpire Jack Stafford declaring the ball "dead" after it had gone into the Providence College dugout.

Bradley was cheated of a legitimate hit in the third and Scribner perpetrated larceny on Allen's drive to left. O'Brien dribbled a puny roller to the slab for the exit out. Although Heffernan singled in the Brown fourth no damage resulted, he being caught red handed while trying to pilfer third, after Gurney's out had given the Brunonian right elder the freedom of the midway.

conced a pass out of Billings with one down in the fourth, but Remond was knocked off at second when Duffy hit a bouncer to Parker. Duffy then stole second and a hit would have knotted proceedings, but Murphy chucked the May breeze and Brown came in for the fifth "whacks" all set to sew up the afternoon's entertainment.

THE BIG INNING.

Things did not look so promising when Billings fanned but Randall drew himself to a left field single. Wright hit to Bradley and Randall was out at second and Doyle held the staff. It was not the best peg in the world, but Bradley's throw had Randall beaten and Umpire Talbot waved Red out, but had to revoke the verdict when Doyle muffed the ball. Possibly the error had Ray off balance and the subsequent jolt from Randall caused the error.

Schuster bunted towards third, and beat Allen's throw to first base. Randall, who started from second kept on coming, and slid home ahead of Duffy's attempt to head him off the platter. Scripner hit to Doyle but Ray's late throw failed catch the speeding Wright. Schuster was overambitious and tried to steal third, but Murphy's peg to Allen nipped him. "Curly" Edes then chimed in with a single to left and Scribner registered all the way from second. Parker continued the fusillade of base knocks, by slamming the ball out into left field, and Edes who had already stolen second came in standing up with the fourth Brown run of the inning to give Dubuc's pupils a 5 to 0 lead.

A low throw by Schuster put Lally on first base in the Dominican fifth, but Bradley and Allen followed with strikeouts. Dick Gurney's two-bagger to right in the sixth started another Brown rally. Billings also kissed one to right and pulled up at second, but Guerny only made third, as he figured Fleurent might catch the ball. The wind carried the ball out of Fleurent's reach, by the way. Allen made a fine stop on Randall and three Red out at first, but Gurney scored on Duffy's return throw, which was not such a good one. Wright hit to left, and Billings walked in. "Bucky" stole second, continued on to third when Murphy heaved the pill to centre field but Heffernan obligingly struck out.

GRAHAM BREAKS SPELL.

All this time, Billings had been going along in no-hit fashion, but Graham, pinch clubbing for O'Brien, waffled the no-hit idea into oblivion by dropping a Texas League type of base knock into the left garden. Vin Cummings scurried over to first to run for Graham and romped on to second on Fleurent's out. Billings to Parker. Randall fumbled Doyle's grounder. Duffy hit to Wright who started what looked like a double play in motion, but Randall dropped the ball, quickly recovering, however, for a force out on Doyle. While Doyle was going out, Cummings scored the single, solitary Providence College run of the afternoon.

Frankie Moran started nicely in the seventh by fanning Parker on a sweeping curve ball. Heffernan then hit one past third. Gurney fled to Cummings in left and Billings forced. "Heft" at second. Randall's single to centre in the eighth was wasted as Wright hit to Shortstop Norton, who stepped on second and then shot the ball to Duffy for a double killing.

A peculiar play cropped out in the Providence College half of the eighth. Cummings hit to Randall and it looked like an easy out when Red picked the ball up and tossed perfectly to Parker. Billings came dashing over from the pitcher's box and bumped into Cummings, tossing the latter to one side.

Umpire Stafford ruled Cummings safe. Fleurent popped to Randall, but Doyle laced a double to left centre. Duffy and Murphy fled out to Randall and Scripner respectively, ending a fairly promising Providence College scoring opportunity. Moran hit Parker in the ninth after two Bears had gone out. Heffernan lined to Duffy for the third man down.

McLAUGHLIN CONNECTS.

The loyal Providence College rooters lingered in the hopes that their favorites might unleash a desperate rally. Red McLaughlin, hitting for Norton, pushed a single to right field, but Lally missed a third strike by at least a foot, and Moran forced McLaughlin at second. The exit march immediately followed in the wake of Allen's fourth strikeout, "Hee" expiring with the war club hugging his right shoulder.

Allen Scores Winning Run on Sacrifice By Fleurent

Dominicans Come from Behind to Win After Bradley is Knocked Out of Box.

Coming from behind after six runs had been scored against them, the Providence College ball tossers won a 9 to 8 decision over the Temple University nine of Philadelphia yesterday afternoon on Henricken field after 10 innings of hectic baseball.

Hal Bradley, who has handled some of the major tilts of the Dominicans' list, started on the mound for the locals, but after four hits and five runs had been garnered from his offerings before a single man had been retired in the second inning he was benched for Joe Smith, who handled the overtime assignment against Harvard. Smith held the invaders to five hits during the frames he worked and featured his pitching by fanning the three batters to face him in the fourth.

Temple opened with a sizzling attack which was aided by two costly errors on the part of Bradley and Duffy. The former tossed the ball wild to first after fielding a sacrifice bunt, while Duffy hit Kunes on a play to the plate.

The locals started very poorly and for a while failed to show any class at all. Within three innings, however, they opened up with an aggressive attack that cut into the long lead of the Pennsylvanians. Errors were many, with the Dominicans collecting high honors with seven boots and the red-stockinged visitors chipping in five miscues.

Smith had complete charge of the situation after he had finished up the second inning when he entered the box with men on bases and none out. As it was he wouldn't have been scored on in that canto had Vin Cummings made sure of a long fly which he dropped to allow Welham race over the plate.

Coach Flynn shifted his batting order for the tilt yesterday, sending Norton into second place and dropping O'Brien to the end of the list. Bradley moved up a peg in the lineup, but the other regulars held the same posts. Norton justified his mentor's change by crashing out a long double in the tenth inning which was instrumental in scoring the winning marker.

The tilt marked the third overtime contest the locals have engaged in this campaign and incidentally the task of handling each of the extra inning frays has fallen to Joe Smith. Fordham clinched a ten inning game and Harvard duplicated the performance over the Westerly hurler a week ago.

After the Pennsylvanians had evened the count at 8 all in the seventh frame, the tilt was anyone's game with both clubs fighting hard to annex a run to net the triumph. In the last of the tenth Allen started the trouble when he worked Wearshing for a free ticket to first, went to third on Bernie Norton's ringing double which centerfielder Harron almost garnered while on the dead run, and romped across with the winning tally when Fleurent lifted a long sacrifice fly to deep left.

DOMINICANS EKE OUT VICTORY OVER ST. MICHAELS

BARNEY NORTON SLAMS PAIR OF HOME RUNS AS DOMINICANS WIN

Joe Duffy Also Connects for Circuit in Free-Swinging Pastime
With St. Michael's Nine.—Flynn Employs Four Moundsmen
Before Victory Is Achieved, 11 to 10

Four home runs, a triple play, and two double plays, interspersed in nine innings of hectic baseball, featured the torrid tilt between Providence College and St. Michael's College of Vermont yesterday afternoon on Hendicken Field, which was finally won by the Dominicans by an 11 to 10 score.

Jack Flynn sent four of his mound aces into action before he was finally able to snatch the decision from the hitting demons from the rugged slopes of northern Vermont. First Moran undertook the task, but in the fifth he was retired in favor of Lefty Smith. The Westerly junior was nicked for a single and a homer in the sixth and so was benched for a pinch hitter in the same frame, Davis taking up the slab assignment at the start of the seventh. The latter went well until the final canto when Norton's error started a rally which brought Bradley into the game.

A sparkling triple play, engineered by Boucher of the Green Mountain aggregation, in the initial inning, was the fielding gem of the day. Connally was wild at the start of the game and issued free tickets to both Allen and Norton. Then Fleurent crashed a liner through the box, Boucher racing to second to make a brilliant one-hand stab to force Allen at second, then making a fast and accurate peg to first to nip Norton for the third out.

The home run honors went to little Barney Norton, Valley Falls senior, who crashed out two long distance hits, the first going into deep centre and rolling against the fence, and the second clearing the left fielder's head and bounding far beyond in open territory. Joe Duffy collected his second homer of the season when he lifted a drive over Captain Joe Wood's head in the sixth frame. Connally, rugged hurler of the visiting outfit, garnered the other four base blow with a long drive off Smith in the sixth inning.

The St. Michael's team took an early lead, pushing a run across the platter in the second inning, on a Texas leaguer in back of second, a sacrifice and a single to centre. Two more were added in the fourth on two walks, two errors and a brace of singles. Ray Doyle ended this rally when he snatched down a line drive and completed a double killing by an accurate toss to Duffy. The following inning the Vermonters added another pair of markers to their rapidly increasing total by a walk, a single, a sacrifice and a double. At this juncture Smith was sent to the mound.

The Dominicans collected two runs in the third, when Moran singled, O'Brien sacrificed and Norton drove out a home run. Another tally was pushed across in the fifth on a walk to Norton, Fleurent's single and Ray Doyle's sacrifice riser to deep centre.

In the seventh the White and Black diamond artists slammed the offerings of Connally to all corners of the lot, and so succeeded in putting the game away. In this canto Cummings doubled, Graham and McLaughlin, pinch-hitting, clubbed out singles, Allen crashed safely to centre, Norton lifted his second homer out of the lot, Doyle beat out a hit to second, and Duffy walloped the pellet over Wood's head for the second circuit blow of the inning.

After Connally's homer in the sixth the invaders did no more scoring until the ninth, when they took to the offerings of Henry Danis, who had re-

placed Smith in the seventh and smashed out three clean hits which, coupled with two errors, netted four runs. With the tying run on third Hal Bradley forced Connors to bound weakly to Allen for the third out.

DOMINICANS WHIP BOSTON COLLEGE, 3-2, 11 INNINGS

McLaughlin's Double Paves Way for Uphill Victory

Game played: June 7, 1927

Bunt by Murphy and Cummings's Single Completes Upset.—Game Finely Played.

A crashing double into right field by Ed McLaughlin, followed by a clever bunt along third by Chuck Murphy and then a hard single over third by Vin Cummings spelled defeat for the Boston College nine, claimants of the Eastern collegiate baseball title, yesterday afternoon on Hendricken Field when Jack Flynn's Providence College outfit came from behind to win a thrilling eleven inning tilt by a 3 to 2 score.

The contest was by far the finest played on the Smith Hill diamond in over a year. Hal Bradley, right handed star of the Dominicans was in his best form of the season to annex his initial victory on the local's home lot. He was master of the situation whenever the Eagles threatened to get underway on the batting spree which have made them one of the most feared college nines in the country.

No less effective was "Lefty" Shea, rugged southpaw heaver for Jack Slatery's combination. Shea had plenty on the ball and was able to hold the Dominicans in check for the greater part of the tilt, but he was unable to stem the Black and White attacks in two of the innings and as a result tasted defeat for the first time this campaign.

With a record of ten straight victories which date back to last April, the Eagles entered the tilt the heavy favorites because of their impressive win over the Dominicans at Boston over two weeks ago when Leo Smith and Frankie Moran were unable to stop them. But soon after the start of the fray it was apparent that the nine which boasts wins over Colgate, Cornell and Holy Cross among many others, was in for one of the hardest battles of the season.

Ed McLaughlin, playing his first game in left field for the locals was the big gun in their attack in the eleventh inning when he smashed a hard drive into right field and by fast base running travelled to second. He scored the winning run a moment later when he dashed across the platter on Cummings hit to left.

The tilt started with plenty of action when the Eagles started a rally in their half of the opening frame. With two away Joe McKenney walked and stole second, but Heck Allen made a fine stop of a hard drive off Al Weston's bat and forced McKenney at third for the final out.

The Dominicans nearly dented the rubber in the first inning. Allen singled sharply to left, Norton moved him to second with a bunt along first base line, and then Fleurent lifted a Texas leaguer which McKenney just missed. Allen was forced to hold his base on the play to prevent a possible double killing. Doyle walked, filling the sacks, but Duffy flied out, and McLaughlin rolled weakly to second.

Then the fray settled into a pitchers' battle with both clubs topping their best previous performances. Although nicked for an infrequent hit, both hurlers managed to make the game a nip and tuck affair until the fifth when the first Boston marker rolled in.

In that inning Fitzgerald crashed a single into centre, Shea followed with a hit to left, and then McNamara, speedy leader of the invaders, pushed the runners along with a sacrifice bunt. Clinton grounded out to Doyle, but Fitzgerald crossed the plate on the play. McKenney fanned to end the rally.

In the sixth the second and last Boston marker was hung up as the result of some poor work on the part of the locals. Weston reached first base after Allen had mused a slow grounder headed towards short which the third baseman tried to field and stole second. Then, after O'Brien flied out and O'Day fanned, Moncewicz lifted a Texas leaguer into right field. When Doyle ran back for the ball Fleurent, right fielder, called for the chance to field it, but he failed to judge the strong wind which carried it out of his reach for a hit.

The Providence outfit came into its own in the lucky seventh when they combined an error and two clean hits to tie the count. Bradley, first man up, fanned, but Allen started the fireworks with a single to centre, and then pilfered second. Norton made it two out when he grounded to Clinton. Fleurent drove a hard bouncer at O'Day who fielded the ball brilliantly and then made a wild peg to Weston at first. Allen scored and Fleurent reached first safely. The diminutive Ware youngster dashed down to second a moment later and so was in easy position to score on Capt. Ray Doyle's wallop into deep centre which was good for two bases.

The Dominicans went out in order in the eighth, ninth and 10th, but the Eagles provided stronger opposition. In the ninth McNamara of the latter outfit, singled with two out and then stole second. He started to steal third a few minutes later, but his efforts were in vain as Clinton churned the breezes on the play for the third out.

In the tenth McKenney, first batter up, singled sharply to center, and Weston dropped a pretty sacrifice bunt which Allen fielded to make a fast play at first. O'Brien and O'Day popped out to end the budding rally. In the eleventh the invaders started more trouble for Bradley when Moncewicz, hard hitting shortfielder, opened with a single to left. He took second on Fitzgerald's sacrifice bunt and then attempted to pilfer third, but Chuck Murphy was on the alert, making a fast and accurate peg to Allen who tagged the Eagle runner sliding into the hot corner. Shea fanned for the third out.

The latter half of the eleventh stanza, brought memories of the victory two years ago over the Eagles while Charlie Reynolds was wearing the Black and White of the college nine. Red McLaughlin opened with a well placed double into deep right field and by fast running reached second. Murphy, left handed batter, faked a hit and run play and then dropped a pretty bunt along the third base line which caught O'Day off guard. The latter rushed in too late to make a play at first and so tossed to Moncewicz who covered third. But McLaughlin slid safely under the latter player and all hands were safe with none out. Cummings then proceeded to end the performance with a hard grounder which whizzed past third base and allowed McLaughlin to bring home the bacon.

Bradley fanned nine of the visitors and walked but two, while Shea sent six back to the bench via the strike-out route and issued two free tickets to first.

DOMINICANS HAND TUFTS FOURTH SETBACK OF YEAR

Invaders' Rally in Ninth Inning Falls Short, 8-7

Providence College Sluggers Knock Robinson Out of Box First Time.

Frankie Moran, former La Salle Academy star, humbled the Tufts College nine on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon in one of the closest encounters of the season, the Dominicans coming through with an 8 to 7 triumph in spite of a thrilling ninth inning rally by the visitors. The defeat marked the fourth setback received by Ken Nash's proteges, and the first time this spring that their star hurler, Stan Robinson, has been driven off the mound.

The expected pitching duel between the rival left handed pitching stars failed to materialize, as both aces were unable to maintain the pace of previous showings. Lefty Smith of the Dominicans succumbing to a Tufts attack in the fifth, while Robinson headed the call to the bench in the seventh when Ray Doyle started a hitting attack which netted three runs and tied the score, 6-6.

Frankie Moran took over the reins when Smith retired in the fifth and held the hard-hitting Jumbos to two scattered singles for the remainder of the tilt. Frankie capped his performance by collecting the longest hit of the pastime in the eighth inning, a drive which cleared the left fielder's head and rolled to the fence for an easy home run. Incidentally, this marker proved to be the winning margin.

Red McLaughlin was guilty of two miscues in left field, where he had been shifted by Coach Flynn to bolster the hitting of the Black and White nine, runs resulting, but more than evened the count with his stick work. In four trips to the plate he collected three hits, one a double, all of which aided the Dominicans' scoring.

Capt. Ray Doyle at second, and Joe Duffy at first, were the other individual stars for the local nine. Doyle played well in the field and started the rally in the seventh which put his team in the running while Duffy handled the first base work flawlessly and enjoyed a perfect day at bat, walking twice, and collecting two singles, both of which sent runs across the platter.

Fleurant put the Providence outfit in wrong at the very start when he misjudged Ellis's liner, the ball bounding off his glove and allowing the Jumbo speedster to reach second. Then Leonard crashed a single into centre to give the visitors their first marker. Smith stopped the rally without further damage.

The Dominicans took the lead in the second when Duffy walked. McLaughlin doubled, driving past third into left field, and Harraghy singled to centre to send both runners across the plate. When Dorenbaum threw wildly to Robinson, Harraghy raced to third, but was snuffed out a moment later trying to pilfer the home station. Both clubs annexed a run in the third inning.

Tufts had a big inning in the fifth. McLaughlin misjudged Kennedy's high riser, the ball bounding out of his glove and being good for two bases. Fitzgerald singled sharply to left and again McLaughlin miscued, allowing the ball to bound through his legs. Kennedy scored and Fitzgerald beat the throw to the plate for the second counter of the inning. Strathdee doubled into deep centre and after Phillips had fanned, Dorenbaum lifted the pellet over left field for a home run. At this juncture Moran entered the fray and retired the side without further trouble.

With Moran holding the Jumbos well in hand, the locals took a new lease of life in the seventh and opened up with their siege guns. Norton walked to start the trouble for Robinson. Fleurant flied out. Then Doyle, a left-handed hitter, sent a liner down the left field line which was good for three bases, scoring his classmate from first.

Game played: June 11, 1927

Duffy dumped a single into centre to send his captain across with the sixth Providence tally. McLaughlin bounded through short and Duffy raced to third, beating the throw from left field by inches, while McLaughlin slid into second on the play. Robinson was benched in favor of Stanley, a rangy righthander. Harraghy grounded to second, Duffy scoring on the play. Cummings ended the rally by flying to centre. In the eighth the Dominicans added another marker through the efforts of Moran, who lifted a long drive over Herrman's head, making the circuit before the ball was returned to the infield.

Then the Jumbos staged a garrison finish which fell one run shy of knotting the score. Kennedy sent a fast grounder into deep short on which Norton was unable to make a play to first. Fitzgerald fled to Norton, and then Strathdee lifted a high foul near the third-base stands. Allen made a brilliant catch of this riser, but Kennedy scampered to second on the out, and when Harraghy, who had received the ball from Allen, threw wildly to that station, the Jumbo athlete continued to third. Herrman was walked and Bernie Norton caused more trouble when he mused up Dorenbaum's easy roller in his eagerness to make the final out, the batter going to second and Herrman to third on the miscue, while Kennedy scored. With the tying and winning markers on the paths, Moran tightened and struck out Kelley on three pitched balls to end the fray.

DOMINICANS ELECT SMITH AS CAPTAIN

Westerly Southpaw Gets Call
for Next Year's Berth
Over Ed McLaughlin.

At a meeting of the lettermen immediately after their tilt with Vanderbilt University on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon, Leo J. (Joe) Smith of Westerly, R. I., left handed pitcher on the team, was elected captain of the 1928 Providence College nine. Smith won the honor over Ed McLaughlin, who has been a member of the nine for the past three years.

Smith has been a Varsity letterman in football and baseball for the past three years and is one of the most popular athletes at the Dominican college. In football he handles an end assignment and has the unique record of having played every football game since he matriculated at college in the fall of 1924. Last fall he was a candidate for the post of captain of the gridiron aggregation, losing out in the election to Chuck Connors, aggressive centre.

In baseball Smith has had what might be termed a hard luck experience. In his Freshman year under the tutelage of Jack Flynn he broke into the lineup on three occasions, winning all three games. Last spring, in his first start of the year, a tilt with Norwich here, he tripped over first base while running out a hit to the infield, and broke his right ankle, forcing him out of the game for the season.

During the past week, after pitching fine ball, a sore pitching arm has troubled the Westerly southpaw, with the result that he was unable to hold the Tufts or the Vanderbilt aggregations in check.

With two stars apiece on the sixth annual SUNDAY NEWS all-collegiate baseball team, Harvard, Yale and Penn lead the other eastern colleges. Lafayette, Boston College, Providence, Fordham and N. Y. U. are the other institutions represented on the all-star combination.

The local players who gained places on the team are Johnny White, Fordham's brilliant short-stop, and Skee Watson, stellar outfielder of the N. Y. U. nine. These two men not only went to college in the Metropolitan district, but also grew up here.

Joins Reds.

White prepared for college at Evander Childs High school, where he gained quite a reputation as a ball-player. However, he made his most rapid development during his career at Fordham. Last year his playing at short was little short of sensational and his hitting exceptional. This season his fielding again was brilliant, but his batting fell 100 points lower than it was a year ago, when he hit over .450. White is now with the Cincinnati Reds, with whom Howard Carter of last year's Fordham team, went at the conclusion of his career.

Watson gained his secondary school education at George Washington high school. He was considered one of the greatest baseball players ever in P. S. A. L. ranks and fully lived up to expectations at N. Y. U. For the last two years his hitting and fielding have been important factors in the Violet's success on the diamond. This year he hit exactly .400.

Two More Locals.

Overton Tremper, captain and star outfielder of the championship Penn nine, is another product of the local high schools on the all-Eastern team. The Quaker fly-chaser, now with the Brooklyn Robins, was probably the hardest hitter in intercollegiate ranks this season and also an exceptionally fine fielder. His batting average was in the neighborhood of .450.

Two other representatives of local colleges won places on the second team. These were Art Smith, captain-elect of next year's Columbia combination, and Bob Cooney of Fordham. Although Smith pitched consistently good ball, he managed to win only three games all season. Cooney accounted for the major share of Fordham's victories.

Good infielders were rather scarce this season, but a fair group nevertheless was to be found. The first team inner defense is made up of Weston of Boston college, Capt. Doyle of Providence, White of Fordham, and Capt. Zarakov of Harvard.

While no pitcher stood out

markedly this season, a number of considerable ability were to be found on the college diamonds. George Foster Sanford jr. of Penn. Jack Barbee of Harvard, and Jeff Sawyer, Yale sophomore, made the best records and are accorded places on the first team.

President of Providence College is Forced to Retire Because of Ill Health

DR. L. C. MCCARTHY ELECTED HEAD OF DOMINICAN SCHOOL

R. I. Man, 38, Succeeds Rev.
W. D. Noon as Providence
College President.

COMMENCEMENT IS HELD

Retiring Educator, Ill for Some Time,
Must Take Long Rest.—Successor
is One of Youngest
Leaders in Country

Rev. Lorenzo C. McCarthy, O. P., a native of this city, has been elected President of Providence College and treasurer of the corporation, succeeding Rev. William D. Noon, retiring, who has headed the institution for the past six years. Rt. Rev. William A. Hickey, bishop of Providence and President of the college corporation, made official announcement of the change following a meeting which was held yesterday morning, after the fifth Commencement exercises of the college.

The continued illness of Dr. Noon, Bishop Hickey said, made the change necessary. Because of ill health, Dr. Noon was unable to attend the Commencement exercises, and before his term expires in October it is expected that he will go to the Dominican mission in Kentucky or some other mission of the order for a long rest. Dr. Noon has been ill for some time.

The corporation also discussed the erection of a new gymnasium at the college. A committee including Bishop Hickey, Very Rev. Raymond Meagher, O. P., Provincial of the Dominican Order, and President McCarthy was appointed to consider the matter further.

The following officers of the corporation were elected:

Rt. Rev. William A. Hickey, D. D., President; Rev. Lorenzo C. McCarthy, O. P., treasurer; Patrick P. Curran, secretary. The officers constitute the executive committee of the corporation.

84 GET DIPLOMAS

Eighty-four Seniors were graduated yesterday morning, receiving their diplomas from Bishop Hickey.

In addition 22 pre-medical students received certificates at the end of two years' work and 26 recent graduates of the institution who have earned advanced degrees elsewhere were awarded honorary degrees of Master of Arts.

Fr. McCarthy, who will succeed Fr. Noon, is a native of this city and the son of James M. McCarthy, banker, merchant and former Police Commissioner of Woonsocket. Fr. McCarthy observes his 38th birthday Sunday and will rank among the youngest college Presidents in the country.

Recognized as one of the leading scholars in the Dominican Order, Fr. McCarthy is widely known as a lecturer and authority on Thomistic philosophy, a system that has engaged his study since undergraduate days at Holy Cross. He holds degrees from Louvain University, Columbia University, Catholic University and the Worcester institution. For the past year he has been dean of the department of philosophy of the Dominican House of Studies in Chicago.

Born in Providence, June 19, 1889, Fr. McCarthy moved to Woonsocket when an infant. He attended the public schools there and La Salle Academy, from which he was graduated in 1905. Upon graduation from Holy Cross in 1909, he taught in Harrisville schools for a year. Entering the Dominican novitiate in the summer of 1910, he went the following year to the House of Studies at the Catholic University, Washington, where he was awarded an M. A. degree.

ORDAINED IN 1916

Upon completion of his theological studies preparatory to the priesthood, Fr. McCarthy was ordained by the late Cardinal Gibbons in Baltimore in June, 1916. The following year he spent at Columbia University and was awarded a Master of Science degree. The next two years he was an instructor of novices of the order at Somerset, O., and came to Providence College in 1919, where he remained until 1924, being head of the philosophy department during the last two years of his stay.

In the fall of 1924, Fr. McCarthy entered Louvain University, where he continued his philosophical and theological studies, and was awarded a Doctor of Philosophy degree, July 11, 1926. Returning to this country after an extended tour of Europe and the Near East, Fr. McCarthy went to the House of Studies in Chicago.

Besides his father, Fr. McCarthy has three brothers and five sisters, all residents of Woonsocket. They are Mrs. Rose Sharkey, Mrs. Ralph L. Daignault, Mrs. Edward T. Mee, Mrs. Joseph O'Donnell, Miss Genevieve McCarthy, William A., Dr. James M., Jr., and Charles E. McCarthy. The new President's mother died several years ago. The family home is at 274 Harris avenue, Woonsocket.

Dennis J. McCarthy of 46 Pitman street is an uncle of Fr. McCarthy. Mr. McCarthy was license commissioner in Providence before the present Police Commission system of licensing came into effect.

The Commencement address was delivered by Dr. Frederick J. Kinsman of Bryant Park, Me., a prominent Catholic layman, and formerly Episcopal bishop of Delaware.

CITES IDEALS OF WILLIAMS

He spoke of the ideals of liberty and education which the State of Rhode Island has held before it during its long history and said that they were exemplified not only in Brown University, but also in Providence College. "Rhode Island was at its foundation," he began, "devoted to ideals of liberty. Roger Williams stood especially for freedom of conscience and denial of the State right to teach or interfere with religion. He tried to realize his ideals by private judgment and anarchy, which failed to accomplish his end, but raised a lofty standard which has been upheld.

"Samuel Gorton suggested the important truth that liberty is guaranteed by law.

"The State has also had ideals of education, illustrated by Governor Stephen Hopkins' foundation of the Providence Public Library. Brown University has always stood for devotion to freedom in religion and education. The Catholic Church, though denying private judgment as the mode of arriving at truths in religion, upholds the same ideals, notably in the great Dominican Order."

Declaring that Providence College has grown territorially and that it must grow in "bricks and stone," Rt. Rev. William A. Hickey, bishop of Providence, responding to a call from Dean Galliker for a message to the graduating class, paid a tribute to the late Bishop Harkins as founder of the college, and said the institution is destined and able to fulfil its mission.

He cited the growth of the institution since its first class of 70 students took up their studies and pointed out that today there are nearly 600 studying there, contending that the demand for increased facilities must be met. "Time will tell how we will grow," he said, "and I hope the time will be short."

He spoke of the erection of a new gymnasium and the need of housing facilities for the faculty, more classrooms to allow for segregation of classes, and a college library

2000 AT EXERCISES

Two thousand people attended the exercises on the shaded east campus. The academic procession headed by the American flag and the Providence College banner opened the ceremonies promptly at 10 o'clock.

Among those on the platform, which was decorated with the State and national flags, were Bishop Hickey, Rev. Daniel M. Galliker, dean; Lieutenant Governor Norman S. Case, Mayor James E. Dunne, Rev. William Doran, D. D., and Dr. Kinsman.

The first speaker of the day was William E. McCabe, one of the three Seniors to graduate magna cum laude, who spoke on "Philosophy and Government."

Addresses on "Philosophy and Science," and on "Philosophy and Religion," were delivered by Anacleto Berrillo and Thomas H. Bride, Jr., respectively, the other magna cum laude graduates.

The college awarded the first earned Master of Arts degree in its history to Daniel J. O'Neill of Pawtucket, who graduated with highest honors in the class of 1924, and has since been working for the degree while teaching at the college and at La Salle Academy.

The academic procession which marched from the main college building to the campus to music by the college orchestra, was headed by the junior marshals and students of the pre-medical school.

They were followed in order by students of the schools of philosophy, science and arts, the alumni classes of 1923, 1924, 1925 and 1926, the faculty, visiting clergy and faculty guests, and members of the Providence College corporation.

Among the recipients of honorary master's degrees were six newly ordained priests, members of the pioneer class of 1923, who have been pursuing theological studies at various seminaries.

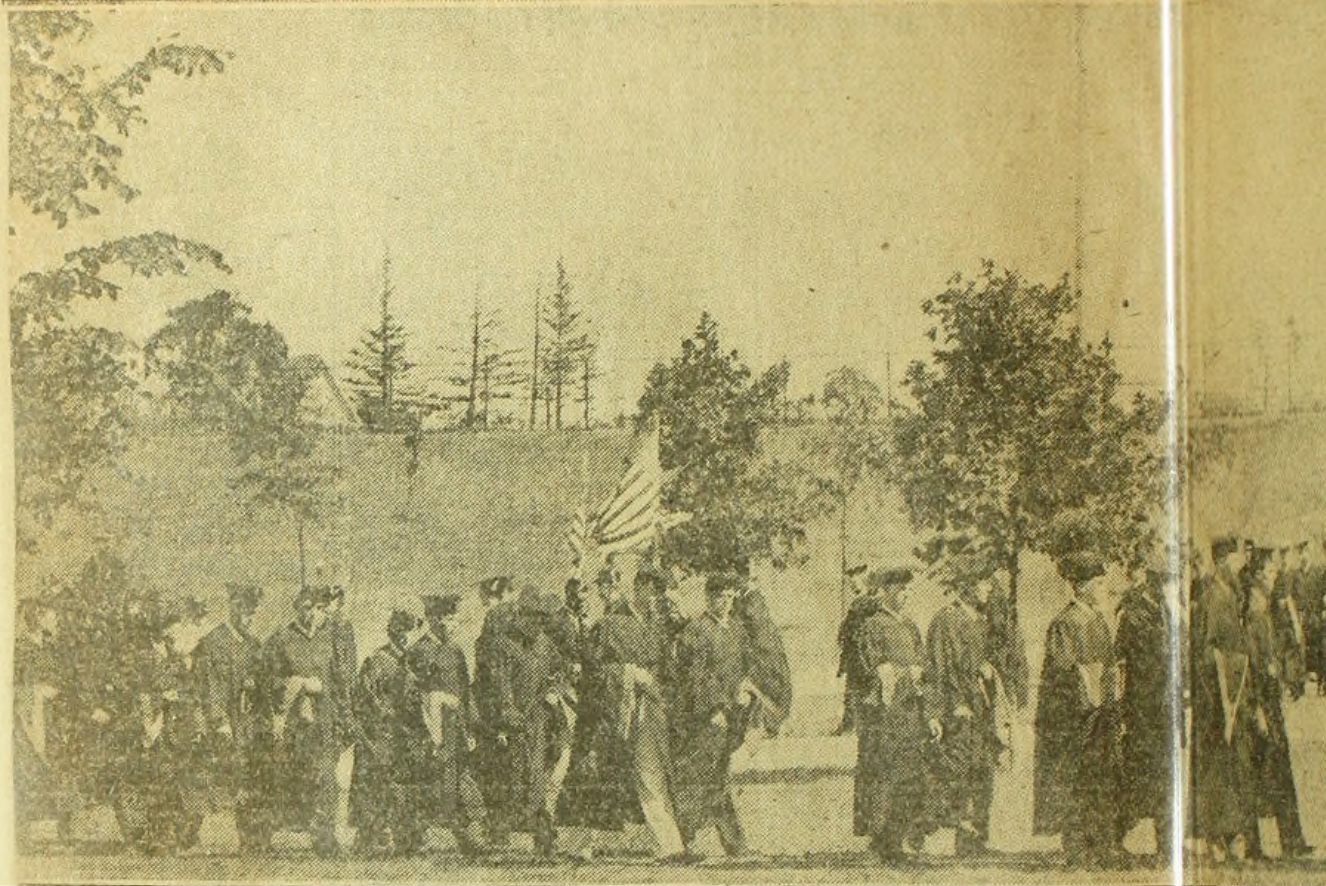

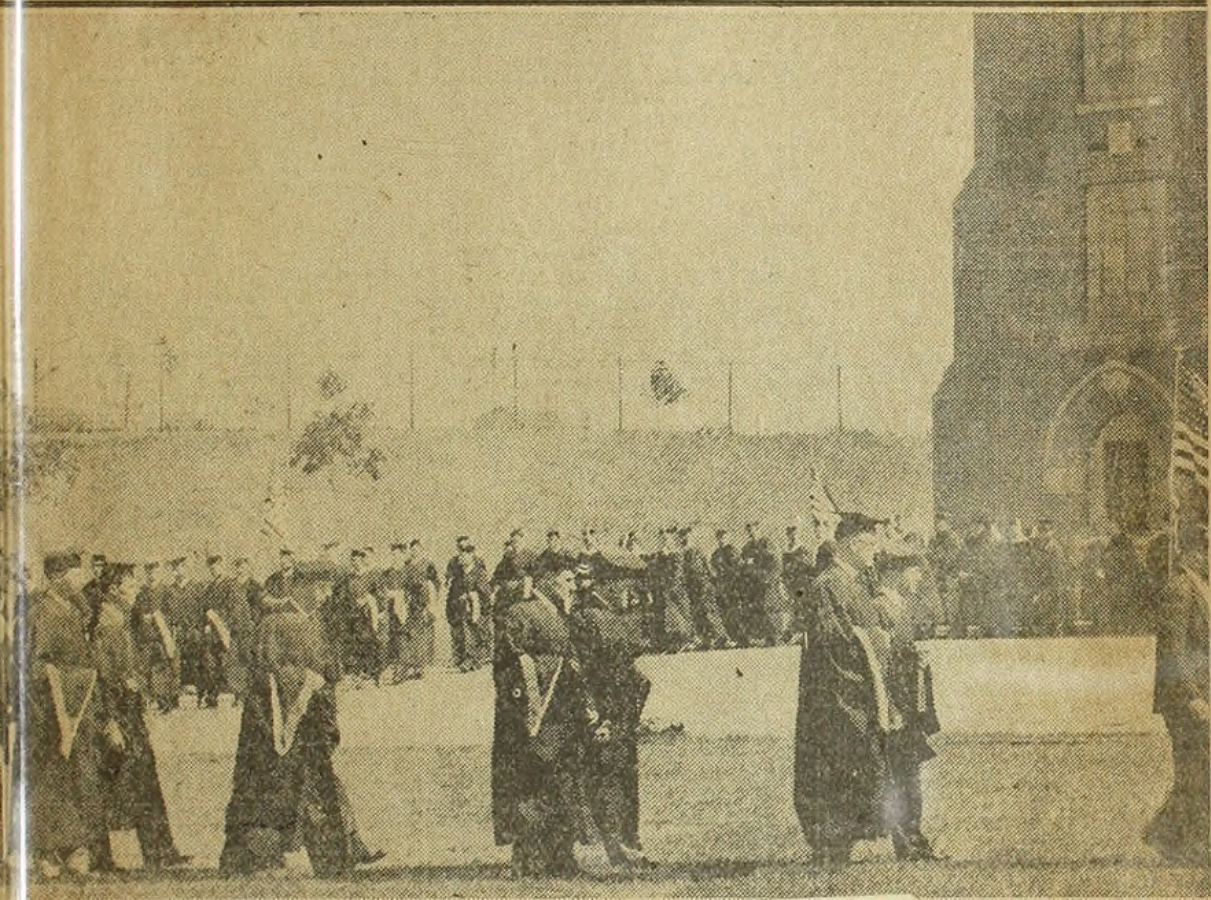
