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Pawtucket and Warren Boys Honored by Providence College Footballers

Charles Avedisian of Pawtucket and Casimir of Warren, tackle and end respectively, have been elected co-captains of the 1940 Brovidence College football team, it was announced yesterday by Rev. Edward H. Schmidt, O. P., acting director of athletics.

Avedisian, a brilliant performer during the past two seasons, proved himself one of the best linemen in Friar history during the past season, playing especially well on defence. He waston the Friars' left tackle and, consequently, bore the brunt of opponents' attacks, most teams running into the right side of their forward wall.

As a sophomore Avedisian alternated between tackle and fullback.

Potera, a member of the end squad for two seasons, was surprisingly effective for one so small. Cas, considerably lighter than most college ends, compensated for his lack of poundage by the fury of his charges and was used freely in crucial spots where his speed and aggressiveness were vital factors.

Avedisian was football and track captain at Pawtucket High and Potera prepared for college at La Salle Academy.

Hugh J. Devore, of West Orange, N. J., this week was reappointed to the position of head coach of football at Providence College, it was announced after a meeting of the Athletic Council. Devore, who came to Providence from Fordham where he was assistant coach, operated on a two year contract basis with an option for renewal by college authorities.

Also retained for the 1940 football season were his assistants: Edward J. Crotty of Danbury, Conn., Joseph A. Dulkie of Lowell, Mass., and freshman coach Anthony G. Pariseau of Attleboro, Mass. The board stated that Rev. Henry E. Schmidt, O. P. would continue as acting athletic director during the recuperation of Rev. Robert G. Quinn, O. P., director of athletics, who was released from the hospital only last Wednesday following an attack of typhoid fever.

CROTTY PLANNING ON FAST BREAKS

Alters Style of Game for His Basketball Hopes at Providence College

In fitting his attack to his material Coach Ed Crotty of Providence College will have his basketball players use the fast break just as often as the opportunity for this speedy manoeuvre is presented in the Fighting Friars' games this year.

Last year the Providence squad was groomed mainly in a slowbreaking game, as the Friar courtmen of the year before employed the large and small "figure eight" formations. The latter style of play calls for comparatively slow advancement of the ball into the opposition's half of the floor.

Now that a modified Notre Dame style of play has become part and parcel of Providence College basketball, Coach Crotty is interested principally in speeding up the attack.

The Frair squad has been cut to 16 men, who will form the playing unit for the 1939-40 schedule of 16 games. Those players who did not make the grade with the varsity will play on their class teams in intermural games, part of the physical education program which Crotty has established at Providence College.

Top team for the Friars at the moment is a combination of five lettermen who have come through in the keen battle for first team berths because of their ability to keep the attack moving at a fast pace and their trigger eyes for the basket.

The Friars' six-foot co-captains, Johnny Barnini of Pittsfield, Mass., and Joe Kwasniewski of New Milford, Conn., hold down the guard posts on the first team. Barnini, spark-plug of the football team, has taken over that role with the courtmen. His dribbling, fancy though it may appear from the stands, has become a very effective asset as the Friar leader demonstrated yesterday as he set up play after play in a practice game. Kwasniewski, who has operated at centre and forward, as well as at guard, is a coach's "dream" player. He has been playing his guard berth with skill and coming up to finish off scoring plays with the same finesse he showed last season.

Jimmy Leo of Fitchburg, present first-string centre, was a bearcat on defence in yesterday's practice game. He is having plenty of competition from Bill Murphy of Danbury, Conn. Murphy possesses a faster turn of speed than his heftier teammate and is a top-ranking utility player.

The forward posts have been allotted to Steve "Lefty" Fallon of Pawtucket and Beryle Sacks of Newport on the basis of their performances since they joined the squad. Fallon was the high scorer on the squad last year. Sacks was down in the sub-ranks as a sophomore, but managed to stay with the varsity because of his aggressiveness. He played in four games at the wind-up of last season's schedule, and has turned in such improved play so far this season that he is rated definitely of top-team calibre.

Coach Crotty has put off naming a top team as such, for the remainder of the squad has several keen contenders who may break into the starting lineup before Jan. 6 rolls around. The Friars open their season on that date in a Harkins Hall engagement with Assumption College's Greyhounds from Worcester. The college Christmas vacation, Dec. 20 to Jan. 4 will break up the training routine, but the Friar mentor will call his squad back on Jan. 3 to start the final brush-up for the opener.

(Special to the Providence Journal) Villanova, Pa., Feb. 2.—Providence College, idle for two weeks, appeared rusty when it resumed its basketball schedule tonight, bowing to Villanova, 49-18, before 1200 fans.

(Special to the Providence Journal) Worcester, Jan. 10 .- Johnny Lee, substitute Providence College forward, led a second half surge that brought the Friars a hard earned 41-37 victory over Becker College here tonight. The game was fast and roughly contested throughout.

The victory, their second of the season, left the Friars undefeated going into their important home-State clash with high-scoring Rhode Island State at the Auditorium in Providence Saturday night. Lee, who took over after Provi-


Meanwhile State and Brown, eager to get back into stride, will indulge Nugent.

Ray Bates from Putnam, Conn., is the team's leading scorer, and the second leading point maker among the Worcester teams to date.

Auditorium Battle Marks Opening of State Series

Kingston Squad Beaten Once in Eight Games; Sets 78.5 Points Per Game Pace.

The dynamic offensive strength of Rhode Island State and the conservatism of Providence College will clash tonight at the Auditorium as the spirited rivals from Kingston and Smith Hill inaugurate their annual basketball series in a game that is virtually certain to provide a full measure of thrills.

The rollicking Rams, skipping blithely along at a 78.5 points per game pace, are emphatic favorites to further their court mastery over the Friars. Providence's hopefuls have played only two games, winning both but in neither displaying the penchant for scoring that State boasts. Rivalling this encounter in prospective fireworks if not in importance is the Freshman game, which opens the festivities at 7:30 o'clock. The Varsities meet at 8:45.

A large crowd is almost a certainty for this, the opening set-to in the State championship series, the contending quintets are ready for a rousing engagement and the Auditorium court has been given the necessary treatment to afford an ideal playing surface. The boards have been sanded and coated with the special preparation used in Madison Square Garden, leaving the battle-field primed for spirited action.

The Rams, defeated only once in eight games, are so generally selected to win that their followers are confidently predicting a 15 to 20point margin. Meanwhile the Friar partisans feel that here is a grand opportunity for Friar re-entry to the select New England circles, and have a measure of confidence that Coach Ed Crotty's charges can do the trick. Their job is anything but easy, for the Rams have collected 628 points in eight games and that kind of scoring will cause any team trouble aplenty. As a matter of fact the Rams are up there with the nation's best in mass point production, and they have such a variety of sharpshooters that muffling one of their big guns generally means little more than making room for another.

Stutz Modzelewski, Bud Conley and Bill Rutledge have been tossing baskets merrily, boasting 183, 138 and 82 points respectively, and Warner Keaney, son of State's coach, has scored 63 points, although confining himseif mainly to defensive play and work under the backboards.


Consequently it is apparent that handcuffing Modzelewski, for instance, would only open flood gates elsewhere, so it behooves the Friars to stop five brilliant snipers simultaneously if they are to win, and that isn't a particularly soft assignment.

Coach Keaney will start Conley and Rutledge in the front court, Modzelewski at centre and Keaney and Capt. Petro or Greene in the back court. Capt. Petro is favoring a sprained ankle, and will not be used extensively. Greene has been filling in for the captain with eminently satisfactory performances.

Coach Crotty plans to open with Steve Fallon and Bill Lee in the front court, Joe Kwasniewski at centre and Slip Barnini and Bill Murphy in the back court. Lee, a junior in his first year with the varsity, earned a starting berth by his excellent work against Becker Wednesday night.

Friar Coach Believes Team Can Stop High-Flying Rams

Has Been Working for Some Time on Defence Devised

Tomorrow night, at the Auditorium, the Providence College basketball forces hope, plan and intend to do something that would help them forget a couple of embarrassing experiences they had last winter.

Inasmuch as the Rhode Island State Rams contributed heavily to that chagrin, the Friars welcome this opportunity to square matters, throttle the Rams' penchant for prolific scoring and re-establish themselves among the mighty in New England circles.

On each of those ill-fated evenings a year back the Friars, passing crisply and cleanly, defending with agility of foot and head, and maintaining a calm demeanor established a snug early lead and apparently laid the groundwork for surprising victories.


But, in each instance, the Rams refused to stay throttled and the Friars failed to remain calm, so the inevitable happened. It is pretty well established around New England that if you let the Rams get you on the run, it is going to be just too bad, and that's what happened.


The carefully conceived Providence plan cracked just a trifle and the Rams were off for the races. They won both games, by substantial margins, and sent the Friars home sadder but wiser. For some time now, Coach Ed Crotty of the Friars has been drilling his charges with State in mind and he feels confident that if the boys don't forget themselves tomorrow night the high-flying Rams will be stopped. Last year State's long passing game, upset the Friars midway through the battle causing the disintegration of the Providence defence and simplitying matters no little. Just give the Rams a little shooting room and the score will climb fast.

State, sailing serenely along, tossing in baskets with gay abandon and giving a thoroughly satisfactory performance in almost every outing, approaches this contest in the favorite's role. The Kingston boys have lost none of the scoring ability of other years and although the spectacular Chet Jaworski has gone the way of graduation his successor at Worcester, Stutz Modzelewski, is proving a capable successor at State.

Providence, meanwhile, has been playing and winning two games, defeating Assumption and Becker, both of Worcester. The former was a relatively easy conquest but the Becker five is far from the soft touch that many might suspect. Providence could stop State, but it would be necessary to adhere strictly to the defensive schemes outlined, necessary to maintain calmness all the way for, as experience has taught the Friars, any signs of carelessness or erratic play and the sharp-shooters from Kingston would go to town.

The Freshman quintets will meet in a preliminary game that probably will be virtually as thrilling as the feature skirmish, for the young Friars and Rams waste little time in absorbing the fever that long rivalry has engendered in these meetings.





FRIARS WILL OPEN WITH ASSUMPTION

Coach Ed Crotty's Veteran Crew Hopes to Start with Victory Tonight.

One of the last of the New England colleges to inaugurate their basketball campaign, the Providence College hopefuls tangle with Assumption College of Worcester tonight, confidently expecting to launch their season with victory.

Although the Friars are untested the fray, starting at 8:15 o'clock in Harkins Hall at the college, should get them away to a flying start. Coach Ed Crotty has a veteran first team available, as well as talented reserves, whereas Coach Ed Skelley of the Greyhounds is rebuilding after the riddling his ranks received last June.

Up to now the Greyhounds have found the sledding tough, two of their reverses being decidedly substantial. Rhode Island State thumped Assumption, 99 to 34, and Tufts repeated the performance, 60 to 21. Skelley has driven his squad hard since, and hopes that tonight will find the Frenchmen performing to better advantage.

Crotty, opening his second season as Providence coach, will start five veterans, but three of them will be in new positions. His search for greater smoothness has resulted in switching Bill Murphy from guard to forward, Joe Kwasniewski from forward to guard and Jimmy Leo from forward to centre.

Lefty Fallon will share front court duties with Murphy at the opening whistle tonight, while Slip Barnini will be Kwasniewski's running mate in the back court. This unit has worked well together, and Crotty expects fine results.

With better reserve strength than he had last year, Crotty believes his squad will surpass last winter's record. Berly Sacks, Sam Kusnitz and Paul Sweeney, veterans, are slated for considerable duty and John Lee, an Attleboro junior, has come along so fast that he is threatening the starters now. The Friars will have four sophomores in uniform, and all are likely to get in there for lengthy workouts. Joe Juges, Johnny Yockers, Horace Marone and Bill Gustas, all with the Freshman team a year back, have made the varsity grade, and give Crotty considerable strength onto which he might fall back if need be. In the preliminary game the Freshmen will play an intra-squad game.


Textile made a comeback in the second half of its game with Providence College here tonight and nipped the Friars, 35 to 32.

The storm turned Providence College, a seat of learning, into a hostelry and threatened to keep business in that department good for some time.

The storm did more than that. It produced a new occupant of the president's office, increased the resident student body by 25 stranded day hawks, seven Woonsocket basketball-playing orphans of the storm, assorted friends of the college and two basketball officials, who aren't friends of any college from mid-December, until late March.

The gentleman who made the

grade from steam engineer to president in one hop is William S. McIntyre from Milton, Mass., at the college for the purpose of repairing the water pump on the boiler, little suspecting that before midnight he would be ensconced in the president's office. At last report he was sleeping peacefully.

The storm increased cafeteria business to a maximum. In fact, when Sid MacKay and Charlie Schurman, the officials appointed for the game which wasn't, ceased to be orphans of the storm and reached the Athletic Office, shortly after 10 o'clock, a manager fled after coffee, but was informed that the demand had exceeded the supply and that the cafeteria staff was currently fighting its way homeward.

Coach Ed Crotty of the Friars, who only three days ago bemoaned his extravagance at purchasing ski boots, what with the snow all gone, got his money's worth, for the new boots ferried him from Cole avenue to the college in slightly less than two hours.

That was the first time Tech ever bested Providence on the basketball court and Tech figures to repeat because the Providence record is scarcely alarming.






Villanova to Play Brown at Marvel Gymnasium Tomorrow




The second quarter saw the teams in even play. In the closing minutes of the quarter baskets by Reilly and Dugas gave the Friars the lead, 27-23, at half-time.

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
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

Finale Keeps Spectators on Edge at-Marvel Gym; Leo Is Star of Hectic Battle.

Keeping themselves under better control during the five final and frantic minutes of their furious with Brown last night, the Fighting Friars of Providence College closed out a hitherto indifferent campaign with a 48 to 39 triumph over the Bruins before 1500 roaring spectators in Marvel Gymmasium.

The tempo of the game, leisurely through the first half, increased with such rapidity in the second session that in the stretch it soared to fever proportions. But, through it all, the Friars, at best expected to give the B-uins a battle, remained cool, took full advantage of the Bruin lapses engendered by anxiety and won going away.

Wild confusion attended the finish, Bruin adherents swarming onto the court and loudly voicing their dissatisfaction with the officiating, the aftermath of a disputed decision two minutes and 45 seconds before the end. -With the Friars leading, 37 to 35, they got an out of bounds deep in Brown territory and quickly scored another field goal, the starring Jimmy Leo being on the business end of the play.

Brown, protested to Referee Samborski that he hadn't touched the ball before it was put in play and the debate became so heated that play was delayed some .ninutes. Upon resumption the Bruins, fighting courageously to stem the tide, sent three men downcourt in an attempt to stall the Providence attack or intercept a pass, but as they did Slip Barnini broke away and put the Friars ahead, 41 to 35. The officials ruled that he was fouled while shooting and awarded him a free throw, which Capt. Harry Platt of Brown protested so vigorously that a technical was called on him. Barnini's conversion of one throw made it 42-35—and only a minute and 45 seconds remained.

FRIARS SURPRISE BROW

Providence's defence being so alert, the Bruins elected to shoot from outside and Tank Wilson, a brilliant figure in a losing cause, dropped in one, but the Friars came back wiht two more, both caged by Jimmy Leo, the Friars' outstanding performer. After Ernie Savignano had broken through for -Brown's final basket Steve Fallon boosted the Friar total to 48 just before the gun.

Similarity of systems—both employing slow-breaking tactics, kept the score down in the first half, Brown leading 17 to 15 at the rest period largely through the shooting prowess of Jack Padden, who played one of his finest games. In that stretch Joe Kwasniewski kept the Friar chances alive by four set shots from the corners.

Upon resuming play Providence was first to change tactics, increasing its speed sharply and driving deep into Bruin territory consistently. For almost 15 minutes the fortunes of battle flowed fast, the count being tied six times, Brown holding an edge of one or two points four times and the Providence star being in ascendency five times.

Then the Friars broke the deadlock and thereafter remained in the van.

Leo, entering his final basketball game for Providence as a sub, quickly became the dominant factor but it was in that hectic second half that he really reached the greatest heights of his career, scoring 14 points and boosting his night's contribution to 18, tops for the game. His defensive play was of a piece with his attacking strength.

Kwasniewski was next for the Friars with 14 points, one less than Padden scored in pacing the Brown attack.

It was a splendidly played game, virile and vigorous in its final minutes, and exciting throughout. Providence's triumph, despite the individual achievements of Leo and Kwasniewski, was a team accomplishment. Steve Fallon, Beryl Sacks, Jack Barnini and Bill Murphy combined with their scoring leaders in a unified effort that produced one of the season's major surprises.

* * *

Employing a shifting zone defence for the most part, the Friars impeded Brown's ordinarily smooth progress and limited Captain Platt, concluding his brilliant career as a Brown hoopster, to six points. Ernie Svginano matched that total when he cut loose for individual forays in the last half and Ed Sheffe collected five and Tank Wilson four.

The defence, however, wasn't adequate to stop Padde nwho sparkled throughout, scoring eight points in the first half and seven in the second.

Eleven personal fouls and one technical were levied against the Friars and seven personal and two technicals against the Bruins.







P. C. TO BE HOST FOR COACHES' CLINIC



The Hartwick and Siena games are in the tentative stage, but undoubtedly will be played.




Three walks and a boot gave the winners another marker in the eighth.
