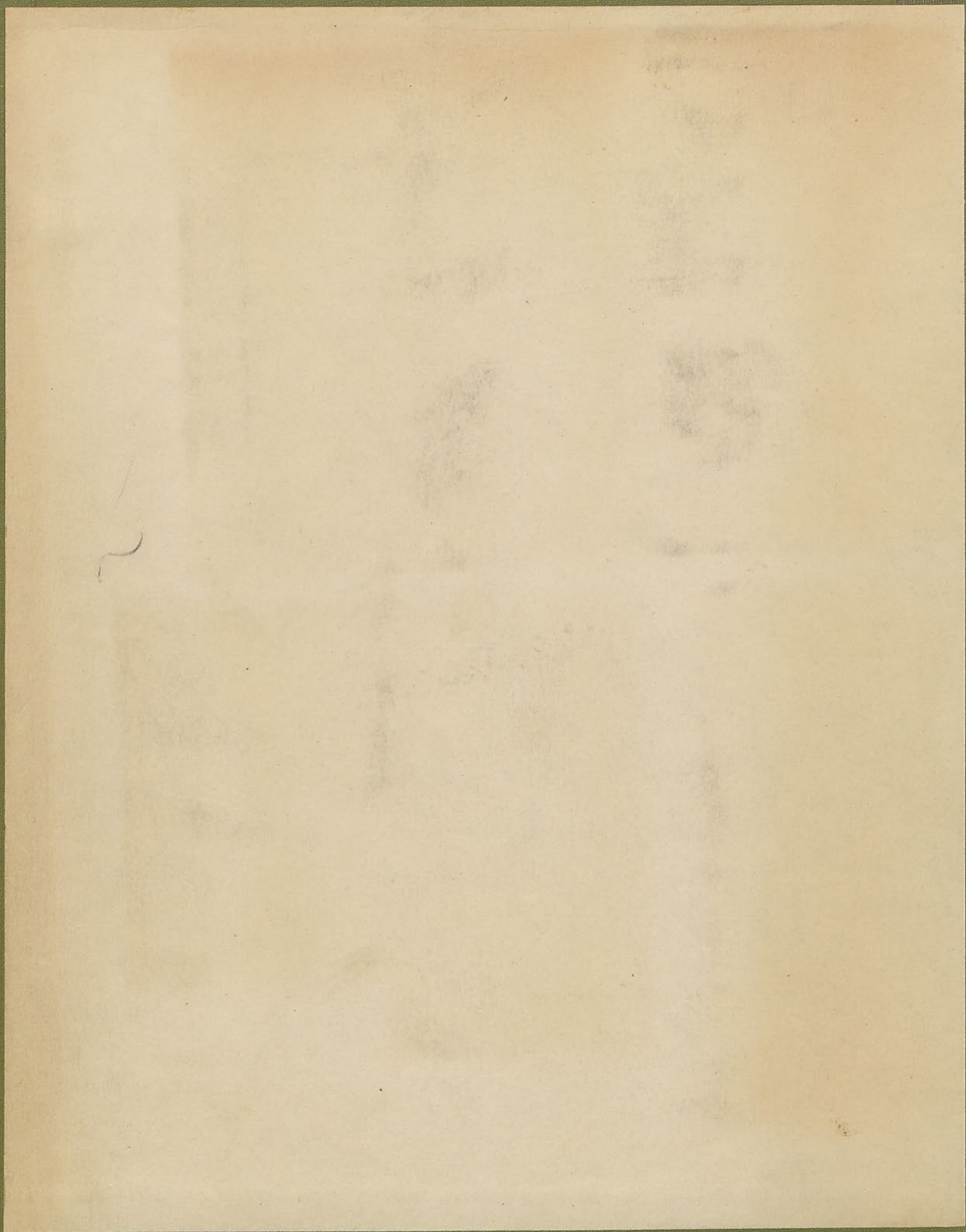

16 Baseball Games Are Booked by Friars

Season Will Start April 18
and Close June 5; Nine
Home Contests Booked.

Providence College, one of the East's outstanding college baseball teams last season, will undertake to maintain its lofty position this spring in a 16-game schedule that embraces games with several of the better baseball colleges.

The program, calling for nine home games and seven away, opens April 18 against St. John's at Brooklyn, and closes June 5 against Holy Cross at Hendricken Field. Home and home games are arranged with St. John's, Villanova, Seton Hall, Holy Cross and Boston College, as well as the annual home and home battles with Brown and Rhode Island State.

Seton Hall is the only newcomer to the home schedule, but, the South

Orange team has often been met on its home lot. The schedule is five games short of last season's program, the meetings with Tufts, Yale, St. Peter's, Dartmouth and Assumption being missing from the card.

The Friars inaugurate their campaign with a three-game road trip into as many States for, following the opener at St. John's, they play

at Villanova and Seton Hall. As a matter of fact the Friars won't show at Hendricken Field until the sixth game of the season, for the skirmishes with Holy Cross at Worcester and State at Kingston follow the road trip.

Lowell Textile will be the first home opponent, after which the Friars and Bruins open their series at Aldrich Field. The program is so arranged that it will offer a minimum of interference with the final exams and preparations therefor, since the Friars will play in Providence, with the exception of a visit to Boston College on May 15, from May 2 through the finale on June 5.

Only four of last year's 16 lettermen are missing, and adequate replacements are expected from the freshman team of a year back,

Brochu, regular third baseman last season, lost his eye as the result of being struck by a batted ball. Throughout that harrowing experience and the ensuing weeks in the hospital, the Warren boy never whimpered.

Yesterday the athletic office announced that Brochu intends to seek a regular position again, this time as an outfielder, so that he may continue in the sport he likes so well and plays so capably.

QUIRK ANTICIPATES DIAMOND SUCCESS

Will Rely on Pitching and
Fielding to Bring Friars
Through.

Strong pitching and fielding are the factors which Coach Artie Quirk of Providence College feels will put the Friars in the running this season. Six of his eight hurlers are veterans.

The main reliance of the group are Joe Kwasniewski of New Milford, Conn., Walt Morris, Steve Fallon, Ambie Reynolds, Charlie Doyle and Bill Sherry, with Lou Sibbio and Bernard Ward up from the Freshman team.

A trio of catchers will be available with Johnny Yockers in line to do much of the receiving. Dan McKinnon, formerly a pitcher, plans to try his hand at catching. Johnny Werbecki rounds out the threesome.

First base seems to be cinched by Jimmy Leo with the possibility that Ray Harrison may spell him and work in the outfield as spare man. Second base is a real problem. Jim Begley, Ed Keenan and Sam Toti are prospects for the berth.

Johnny Ayvasian, major league prospect, will hold forth at short-stop. Art Clarkin and Anthony Barbarito, the latter a better than .300 hitter, are the leaders for third base.

The outfield is the spot where a few more recruits can be used, Coach Quirk feels. He has Johnny Barnini, Vin Nugent, John Werbecki, Harrison, Donat Brochu and Ed O'Brien ready for duty.

Fred "Lefty" Collins, a leading contender for the "runs batted in" championship in the Eastern League with Binghamton, reports to Kansas City at Haines City, Fla., about the eighth. Lefty, P. C. captain in 1937 played first base against the New York Yankees in the first game which Lou Gehrig missed in many years of training, and reportedly was the last ball player Owner Jacob Ruppert discussed some days before his death.

Harold Martin, now teaching school in Esmond, will probably join the Gloversville, N. Y., team in the Canadian American League. Hal, a former Providence outfielder, played with both Utica and Gloversville last season. This past winter, Martin was in a very serious condition due to a severed artery in his arm as a result of a mixup in a hockey game.

Chief Marsella of Burrillville, the home run king of Hendricken Field under the late Jack Flynn, is reported with the Charlotte team in the Piedmont League this season. The hard-hitting P. C. alumnus played in Canada last summer with the understanding that he could return to the Spartansburg team, which had him under contract, and was purchased by Charlotte club in the fall.

John "Wink" Crowley of Valley Falls, as fine an outfielder as they come, according to Bib Falk, may play in the Provincial League, but just now is in the Cumberland school system and will not be available until later.

Al Blanche, the former P. C. pitcher, and Chief Rivers of Nasonville, will return to the Cape Breton Colliery League, where the pair hurled for the Sydney Mines team last season.

Of the catchers, there's George Tebbetts and Elton Deuse, the former Providence College backstops, who are in camp with the Detroit Tigers and the Boston Red Sox, respectively. Tebbetts reported last

Sunday to the Tigers camp at Lakeland, Florida, after spending the winter as manager of a winter sports playground at Grayling, Michigan. He's in fine shape after lots of walking and skating.

Deuse is now at Sarasota with the Red Sox. He spent the winter in Providence. Basketball took off any excess poundage. Elt knows he's a much better batter than his Rocky Mount average would indicate, but he offers no alibi.

Charley Gallagher, now teaching and coaching at Our Lady High, Newton, Mass., will join the Deland team in the Florida State League at the close of school. He's the former P. C. third baseman.



ELTON DEUSE WITH RED SOX

ELT DEUSE TO GET CHANCE AT SARASOTA WITH RED SOX

Manager Joe Cronin to Give Big Catcher Once Over in Spring Practice Sessions

Former Friar Will Be Moved
Up If He Shows Enough
Stuff.

"I'm taking Elton Deuse to Sarasota with the Red Sox because I want another look at the big Providence College catcher," says Joe Cronin.

Deuse reported to Fenwick Park last June, and at first it was suggested to Cronin by Billy Evans, head of the Sox farm system, that the collegian be sent to Canton, O., but Cronin, after working out with him, suggested that Rocky Mount in the Piedmont League was the better spot for him.

Deuse has all the physical qualifications for a catcher of the size of "a Bill Dickey or a Gabby Hartnett," the formula prescribed by Tom Yawkey in orders to Evans and his scouts.

Deuse is even taller than George Lacey, the Minneapolis catcher, who was bought, along with Pitchers Herb Hash and Bill Butland, for spring delivery. Lacey stands six feet, two and one-half inches, and Deuse rises an inch and a half higher. Both weigh 190 pounds. Dickey is far from being a midget at six feet, one and one-half inches, or half an inch taller than Hartnett.

Lacey has yet to prove himself capable of making bench warmers of Gene Desautels and Johnny Peacock, but he has had the benefit of experience in the American Association, and so holds priority over Deuse, whose professional career covers only 18 games as catcher and four other games as pinch hitter with Rocky Mount.

A great deal depends on what Deuse shows Cronin next month. He may go back to Rocky Mount, or he may be moved up to Louisville, which is partly owned by Yawkey.

The test with Rocky Mount was hardly a fair one to Deuse. Fresh from the college campus, he was tossed into night baseball. His catching did not suffer, but his batting did. Where he had battered college pitching for an average well over .300, Deuse found himself in a strange world.

As he perused the Piedmont League averages, Cronin found Deuse made only two hits, both singles, in 44 times at bat in 22 games for a mark of .045. He received two walks, but struck out 14 times.

"That doesn't sound like the husky fellow who drove half a dozen balls against the left field wall at Fenway Park and two or three over the screen in the workout he had with me," says Cronin. "Probably his debut under the lights at Rocky Mount shook his confidence. It will be up to us to restore his faith in himself at Sarasota. I know he has power, because he demonstrated it to me."

Deuse will be in the first squad of Red Sox, which leaves Boston for Sarasota on Feb. 28. Wilfrid Lefebvre of Pawtucket also will go along, although he is not scheduled to remain with the Sox. Cronin believes another season in the minors will be good for Lefebvre, who shares the manager's opinion. Present plans call for Lefebvre to pitch for San Francisco, which is sending Domenic DiMaggio to the Red Sox.

FRIARS BECOMING BASEBALL MINDED

Sp. 3-10-40

When and Where to Practice
Has Coach Art Quirk
Scratching His Head.

Baseball is in the air at Providence College these days and although Dr. Art Quirk, the Friar coach, is worrying about the dual problems of when and where to practice, the prospects of a good team again this season are not remote.

True Elt Deuse, perhaps the best catcher in eastern collegiate circles last spring, has gone, being currently in Florida with the Red Sox, and Hal Martin, a robust-hitter and classy fielder, has departed, but the remaining talent is considerable.

Coach Quirk will have 12 lettermen available this spring and a number of other veteran performers who just missed the letter ranks a year back. The pitching should be better than last season simply because all the 1939 fingers are back and should be the better for the added seasoning.

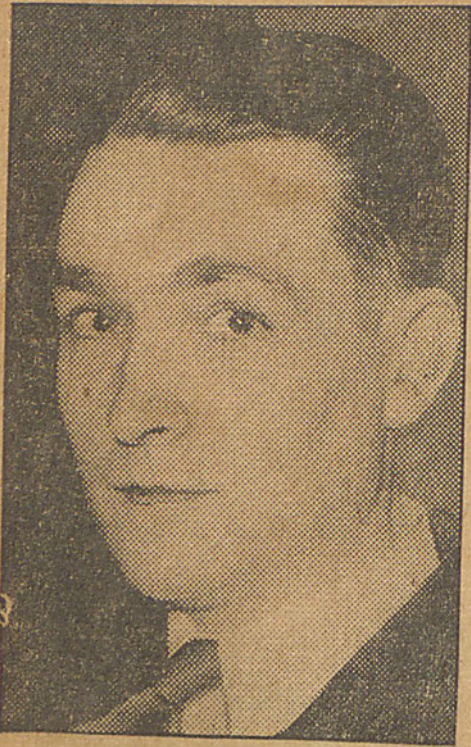
Big Joe Kwasniewski heads the pitching talent with Walter Morris, unbeaten last season, the classy Steve Fallon and speedy Amby Reynolds rounding out the veteran staff. Charley Doyle, Lou Sibbio, Jerry O'Brien and Vin Ward will be new pitching candidates.

In addition to the hurlers, returning lettermen are Jack Barnini, an outfielder or catcher, depending upon the needs of the moment; Johnny Ayvazian, shortstop; Jim Begley, second baseman; Art Clarkin, third baseman; Bob Harrison, outfielder and first baseman; Jack Keenan, infielder; Jimmy Leo, first baseman, and Donat Brochu, who lost the sight of an eye while playing third base last spring but is planning on trying for an outfield berth.

Vinny Nugent, Johnny Werbicki and Dan McKinnon are players of considerable experience who will report and undoubtedly see plenty of service. In addition such new men as Ed Barbarito, and Paul Rylander, infielders; Ed Bradley, Ray Roy, Jack Lee, and Russ Varnum, outfielders and Johnny Yockers, a catcher, are expected to give the veterans gobs competition.

Nugent, who plays either the infield or outfield, is likely varsity timber and Werbicki, McKinnon and Barnini—an outfielder last season—will fight it out with Yockers for the catching job. Yockers caught for the freshmen last spring and did a thoroughly satisfactory job and probably is the man to beat for the berth.

Long hitters are what Coach Art Quirk of Providence College is looking for and long hitters he'll have if the way the Friars batted the ball around in practice yesterday is an indication.

Three of the standouts at the plate were Gerry O'Brien, Warwick; Jim Begley, Brighton, Mass., and Johnny Barnini, Pittsfield, Mass. O'Brien hit them to the outfield with monotonous regularity. Coach Quirk feels he'll be a real asset once he pares off a few pounds.

Begley started poorly, but got the range later. His hitting may earn him a chance at second base where he's an adept fielder. Barnini, who seems assured of centre field, poled a number of clean hits well out to the fence.

Donat Brochu of Warren, who lost the sight of his right eye in a game a year ago, has done remarkably well. Always an outstanding infielder, he hopes to win an outfield berth.

He took a turn at bat yesterday. Curves bothered him, he said, but his attitude bespoke perseverance.

The infield had little to do during the batting drill since most of the balls went to the outfield. Quirk is seeking a third baseman. George Barbarito of New Haven, sophomore, handled the post fairly well yesterday. Tom Healey, Ray Kowalski, Paul Rylander and Jim Leo were spread around the base paths during the workout.

REYNOLDS GIVEN TURN ON MOUND

Friar Squad Shows Well in
Workouts; Catching Problem Bobs Up.

Two weeks remain for the Providence College baseball squad to round into shape, but the Friars, with only two days of outdoor work back of them, already show indications of becoming a strong outfit.

Another pitcher, of the quartet which is figured by Coach Art Quirk to carry the team along in winning fashion, had a turn on the mound yesterday. He's Ambrose "Fire Ball" Reynolds, six-footer from West Haven, Conn.

Speed is Reynolds's specialty. In the words of the bystanders, "He's half way home when he throws the ball." That just about tells the whole story. Along with Joe Kwasniewski, Senior, of New Milford, Conn.; Walter Morris of Cranston and Steve "Lefty" Fallon of Pawtucket, Reynolds provides just the right balance.

Catching has become an unexpected problem with the Friars. Johnny Yockers, chunky backstop, may fill the bill. In the coach's opinion he'll have to throw them down to second in steadier fashion. Walter Coyle of Attleboro and Johnny Barnini of Pittsfield are Yockers's opposition.

Barnini prefers the outfield. He covered centre field yesterday, with little to condemn in the way he did it. Any paring of the squad will come in the outfield. There Quirk has available Donat Brochu, Gallagher, Ray Roy, Vin Nugent, John Lee, John Werbecki, George Avery and Gerry O'Brien.

Brochu, Barnini and Gallagher worked together yesterday. The others will have their opportunity.

Friar Baseball, Football Squads Practice Outdoors

Coach Art Quirk Optimistic
About Diamond Prospects;
Devore Seeks Backs.

Favored by weather that suited both, the Providence College baseball and football squads turned out yesterday. Coach Art Quirk of the diamond squad was optimistic about the way his players performed and said that some of the problems that had looked impossible on paper were not as difficult as they seemed.

Coach Hugh Devore and his staff, Assistant Coaches Ed Crotty, Joe Dulkie, Gig Pariseau and Dan "Red" McKinnon had a full afternoon with a squad of some 40 huskies on the field. Devore is looking for halfback material. He plans to hold regular practice sessions through mid-May.

One of the problems that faded out of Coach Quirk's horizon was that of selecting outfielders. Two of the standouts there are Gerald O'Brien, who hits well and is a ball hawk, and Bob Harrison, who turned in a sparkling first day chasing flies.

Just who will win the other position is still a matter to be determined. Harrison also has prospects at first base, where veteran Jim Leo has first call. Harrison has had experience at covering the initial sack and the competition there should be keen.

Early birds on the field included Joe Kwasniewski, Leo, Johnny Ayzasian, Jim Begley, Joe Buckley and Donat Brochu. Three pitchers who went through their paces in the course of the workout were Kwasniewski, Vin Ward and Lou Sibbio. With copious material in the hurling corps, Coach Quirk feels he may have to make a cut there.

Ray Roy, outfield candidate, was not at practice as he had a tooth extracted. He is one of the players Quirk expects to be of real aid in forming another strong outfield trio.

Third base was covered yesterday in satisfactory style by Art Clarkin. The way he handled the position there is little cause to worry, the Providence coach feels. Back of the plate Johnny Yockers has the post clinched. He handled all of the pitching.

Quirk was pleased with the way Begley worked at second base. That was a problem he foresaw in looking over his material earlier but Begley came through yesterday with a brand of coverage that was A-1.

Despite a chill wind that provided an added hazard at the plate the

players laid into the ball lustily. Some of the long hitters noted were Werbecki, Kwasniewski, O'Brien, Harrison and Ayzasian.

Deuse Will Catch In Middle Atlantic



*Cronin to Send Ex-P. C.
Star to Canton Where
He Will Be Active in
100 Games.*

Sarasota, Fla., March 25.—Manager Joe Cronin of the Red Sox and Billy Evans, head of Tom Yawkey's farm system, went into a huddle this morning and out of it came the announcement that Elton Deuse, former Providence College catcher, would go to Canton in the Middle Atlantic League on option.

"We want Deuse to catch at least 100 games this year and by making him first-string backstop at Canton he will be sure to get that much work. If we sent him back to Rocky Mount in the Piedmont League, or to Scranton in the Eastern League, or maybe to Little Rock in the Southern Association, he would have to divide the catching chores with some other fellow," explained Cronin.

"All he needs is experience," continued Evans. "We can see now it was a mistake to throw him into Rocky Mount last June, fresh as he was from the college campus. Our first hunch was to have him play in Canton, but he showed such power with the bat in several workouts with Cronin at Fenway Park that we probably became over-enthusiastic.

"It may be he is what we know in

baseball as a 'night blinder,' but the fact of the matter is that he didn't hit at all under the lights at night for Rocky Mount. He received well, threw well, did everything else well—except bat well."

"Yes, and he still has the heavy punch at the plate," interrupted Cronin. With the exception of Jimmy Foxx, nobody in training camp hit the ball harder in practice than Deuse—not even Ted Williams—and this has gone on all spring. I still cannot understand how it happened that he made only two hits in 22 games at Rocky Mount.

"But say—what an arm that kid's got! Right now, I'd say he is the best thrower in America and I don't except Bill Dickey or Gabby Hartnett, and you know they are tops with me. Of course, the difference between Deuse and Dickey and Hartnett is that they make their best throws under fire. The kid is a little green yet. He lacks only experience and unless we are all wrong on him he'll be back with us. He is definitely a prospect for the future."

Deuse was pleased when he was told of his transfer to Canton. "I don't care where I go, as long as they let me do plenty of catching. I think I learned a lot while I was down here. Coach Tommy Daly showed me a few new wrinkles. At least, they were new to me, and Moe Berg also helped. In fact, everybody was kind to me. Of course, I'll miss my buddy, Ted Williams, but it won't be for long. I'll be back with the Red Sox."

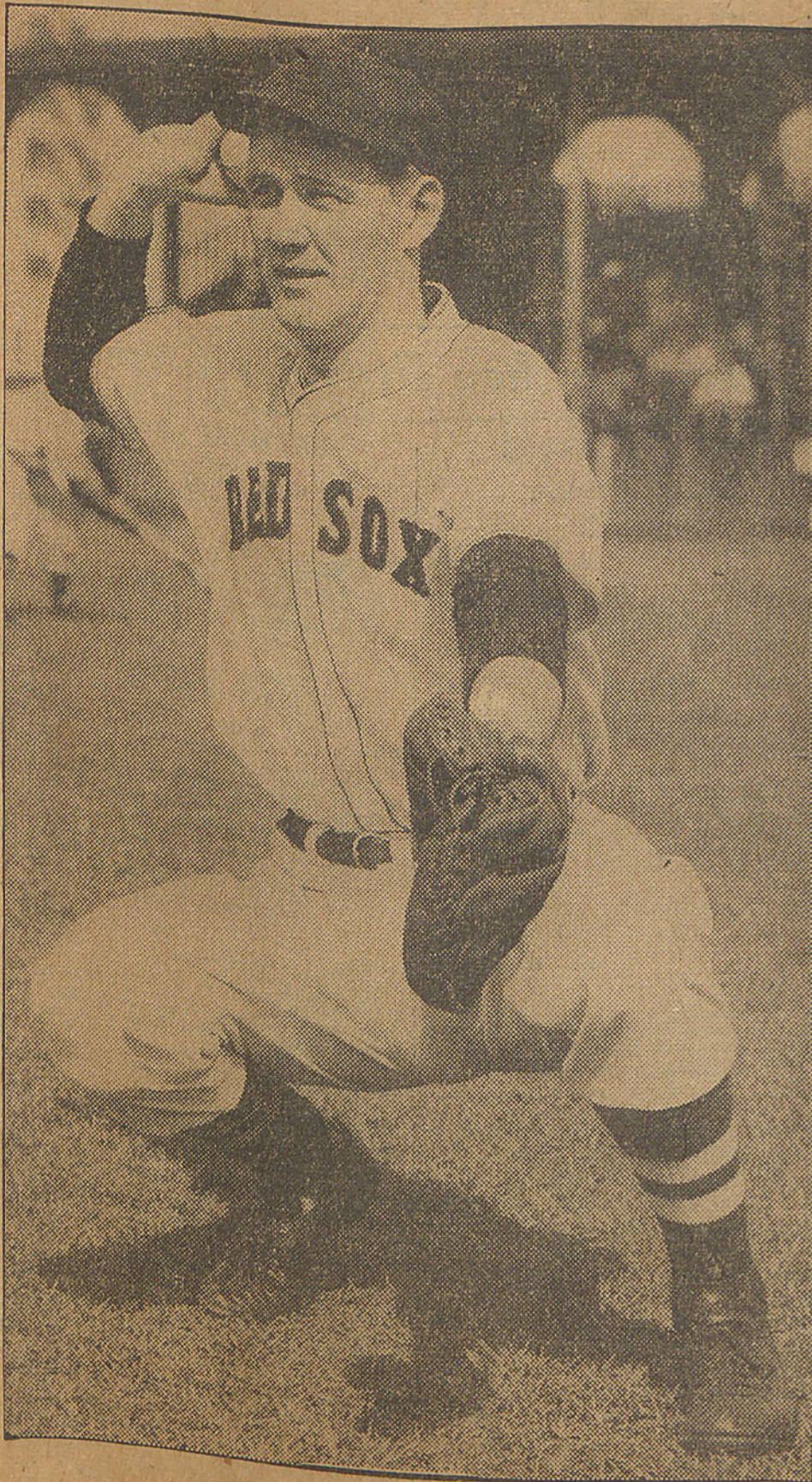
Others cut from the Red Sox squad were Pitchers Jim Heflin, Ralph Waite, Earl Johnson, Frankie Dasso, Bill Sayles, Alpha Brazle and Infielder Tommy Irwin.

Heflin was returned to Scranton, where he will be joined by Waite, an 18-game winner last year with Canton. Johnson, a collegian from St. Mary's in California, will be making his start as a professional.

Dasso, who twirled a no-hit game for Little Rock last April and finished the season with Scranton, goes to San Francisco to join Wilfrid Lefebvre, Pawtucket boy, as part of the deal for Dominic DiMaggio. Both Lefebvre and Dasso are on option and may be recalled. Sayles won eight and lost that many for Little Rock before he was recalled late in the summer by the Bosox. He has been hampered this spring by a lame arm.

Irwin played for Louisville last season and batted .274. It was originally planned to sell him to New Orleans without bringing him to Florida for training, but Commissioner Landis recommended that the Sox take another look at him. They did—and now have released him outright to Little Rock. It isn't likely he'll ever be seen in a Red Sox uniform again.

Coach Arthur Quirk Sees Fair Sailing for Friars

Plenty of Pitching Power and
Good Hitting Being Shown
at Hendricken Field.

Although the schedule does not open for five more days, Coach Art Quirk of the Providence College Friars, forced to call a halt yesterday by the heavy rain, exuded confidence as he discussed the prospects of his charges for next Thursday and days thereafter.

The former Friar hurler has gotten in a series of chilly workouts, had a chance to look his boys over out of doors, to see his pitchers work at length and his defence test itself under reasonably good conditions. His conclusion is that everything is going to be all right. It might be explained, however, that Coach Quirk is a born optimist.

Last year's classy mound corps of Big Joe Kwasniewski, Steve Fallon, Walter Morris and Amby Reynolds is intact, and scattered about the Hendricken Field premises are a preponderance of veterans. In fact it is doubtful if any newcomers, with the exception of Catcher Johnny Yockers, will break into the starting lineup.

Although he readily admits that he can't make definite decisions until he sees the boys in action, Coach Quirk's tentative first stringers are Yockers and Johnny Werbicki, catchers; Jimmy Leo, first base; Jim Begley or Carl Toti, second base; Johnny Ayvazian, shortstop; Art Clarkin, third base; Donat Brochu or Ray Roy, left field; Slip Barnini, centre field and Ray Harrison or Jerry O'Brien, right field.

Brochu, robbed of the sight of his right eye when struck by a batted ball last season when he was the regular third baseman, is in line for the left field job. His fielding has been good and his hitting satisfactory.

"He is the most courageous lad I have ever seen," Coach Quirk said yesterday. "He stands right up there without flinching, no matter how much speed is turned on. His hitting has been good even though a curve fools him now and then. He has the heart and the head and certainly is still in the running for a regular berth."

Yockers, a fine catcher and hitter, has been the source of bad news and good news the past few days. Struck on the thumb, it was first feared that he had sustained a broken bone, but an X-ray yesterday dispelled that worry. However, the finger is still far from its usual self and it is doubtful if Johnny will see much service in next week's three-game road trip.

Werbicki relieved the tension Yockers's injury created by going behind the bat and turning in a fine performance.

Leo, a long hitter and a clever fielder, appears a fixture at first and Clarkin enjoys a similar distinction and feeling of security at third. Begley, second baseman through much of the last campaign, is playing better ball than ever this spring and his hitting has sharpened considerably.

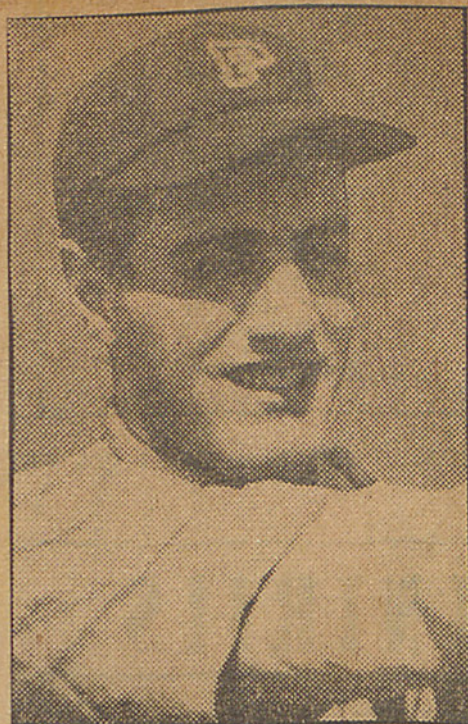
Toti, a sophomore, is showing plenty of promise and, although a step behind Begley right now, is virtually a certainty to be the regular second baseman next year and the year after.

His pitchers are far ahead of the hitters and Reynolds's reversal of form is very encouraging. Reynolds has undergone a delivery shift, made possible by the change in pitching rules, and he is faster and has better control as a result. In addition he has developed a good curve and should be ready for a regular turn.

FRIARS TROUNCE RAMS, 8-0-

Reynolds Holds Keaneymen To Three Hits and Fans Six

Other Major Changes Pay Dividends; Two Splurges by Friars Ice Game.

A surprise move which saw big Amby Reynolds on the hill and other major changes in the lineup, paid dividends for the Providence College Friars yesterday afternoon, when they blanked the Rhode Island State College Rams, 8-0, in the first of their annual two-game series at Kingston.

Reynolds, nominated in place of the expected Joe Kwasniewski, turned in a brilliant effort in setting the State batters down with three scattered hits, while his mates cut loose in two splurges to sew up the ball game.

The other change that worked to an advantage for the Friars was the initial appearance of Slip Barnini as catcher. Barnini, who played the position in high school, had been an outfielder with Providence up to this season, but from the way he performed yesterday, his remaining days will be behind the plate.

Held in check for three innings by Garner Keaney, State's ace, the Friars took advantage of some erratic pitching and fielding in the fourth to pile up five big runs, and added three more in the seventh with a salvo that saw the finish of Keaney. Bill Rutledge finished up for the Rams and escaped unscathed. While the honors for the day were unquestionably the property of Reynolds, several fielding plays that ordered on the spectacular were earned in by the rival clubs. Louis "Luke" Abbruzzi, back at his first job—first base—pulled a gem when he raced into foul territory in front of the Rhode Island dugout to snatch

Ray Roy's low foul in the seventh, while Art Clarkin made the best play for the Friars with a back-hand stop of Cliff Pace's bid for a hit in the fifth.

Both clubs made threatening gestures in the first, but neither was able to break into the scoring column. The Friars got Johnny Ayvasian and Jimmy Leo on the base paths through an error and walk, but the runners died when Beauchamp threw out Harrison for the third out. A walk and a hit batsman put two on the sacks for the Rams in their half of the first, but a fast double play, Clarkin to Leo and then back to the former, erased the threat without damage.

After Leo had grounded out to open the fourth, Harrison started the Friars on their way with a line single to right. Slip Barnini and Roy both worked Keaney for walks to crowd the bases. Keaney's control continued to be erratic, and a curve that failed to break, struck Capt. Donat Brochu in the back to force in the first run.

The one run proved to be enough to win, but Reynolds stepped in to strike a blow for his cause, when he drove a single into left. The ball got away from the outfielders and three runs crossed the plate. The Friar hurler pulled up at third. He crossed the plate a moment later after Ayvasian fled to Cranston in deep right centre.

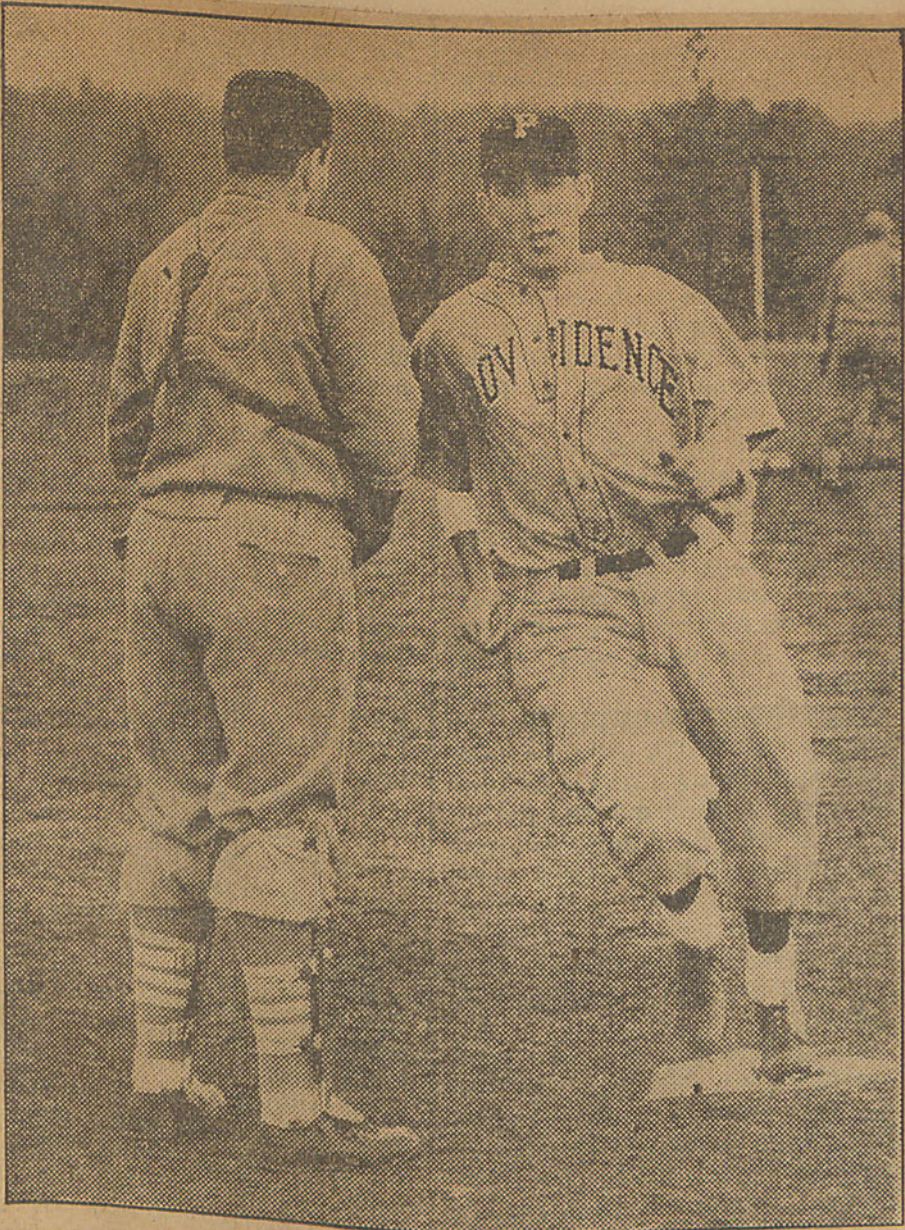

The Cubs did most of their damage early—Nissley's triple, after two men had reached on errors, producing two runs. Myer drove in the final Bruin run in the ninth.

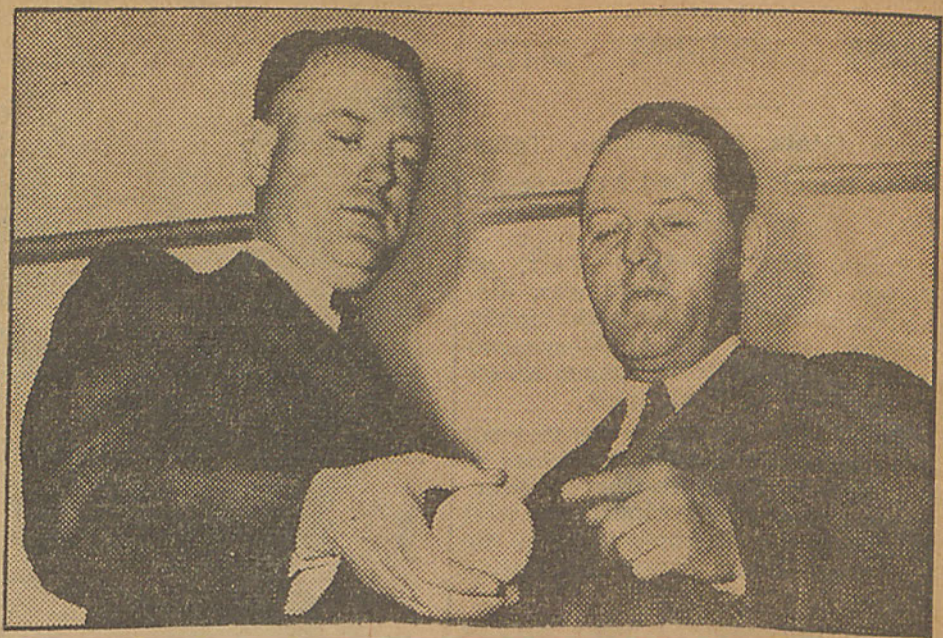

Heroes of 20-Inning Duel To See Successors Today

Duggan, Reynolds, Hurlers in 1924 Classic, Will Watch Bruins, Friars Today.

Sixteen years ago, Elmer Duggan, short, sturdy, black-haired portsider and Charley Reynolds, slim, sorrel-topped, right-hander, trudged wearily out to the pitching mound from rival dugouts at old Andrews Field for 20 long innings, as Brown and Providence College fought in one of the most thrill-jammed classics in the history of college baseball. For 19 innings, which consumed five hours of playing time, the two hurlers pitched shut-out ball, but in the first half of the 20th, Billy Beck of Providence College smashed one of Duggan's fire-balls to left field, scoring Ray Doyle and the Friars triumphed 1-0.

This afternoon the two twirlers of that 1924 marathon battle will sit side by side in the stands at Aldrich Field to watch the 1940 editions of their alma maters clash in the first game of the 20th annual Brown-Provi-

dence College intra-city series. Good friends, even back in the days of their diamond rivalry, Reynolds and Duggan have never missed an opportunity to discuss that five-hour duel of 16 years ago, but today will mark the first time that they have ever attended a Brown-Providence College game together. The assembly of this afternoon has not been prompted by any particular occasion, other than that they happened to meet in the city a few days back and decided to take in the game.

In that 1924 contest, both performed memorable feats, some of which are probably all-time college baseball marks. Duggan struck out 29 Friar batsmen, allowed five hits and walked five men. Reynolds fanned 11, and was nicked for eight hits.

Beck, who produced the winning bingle, had previously fanned five times, and in answer to what he threw the Friar on that fatal pitch, Duggan declares, "It was a fast ball with a hop, with which I had been fooling him all afternoon, but he fooled me on that one and the game was over."

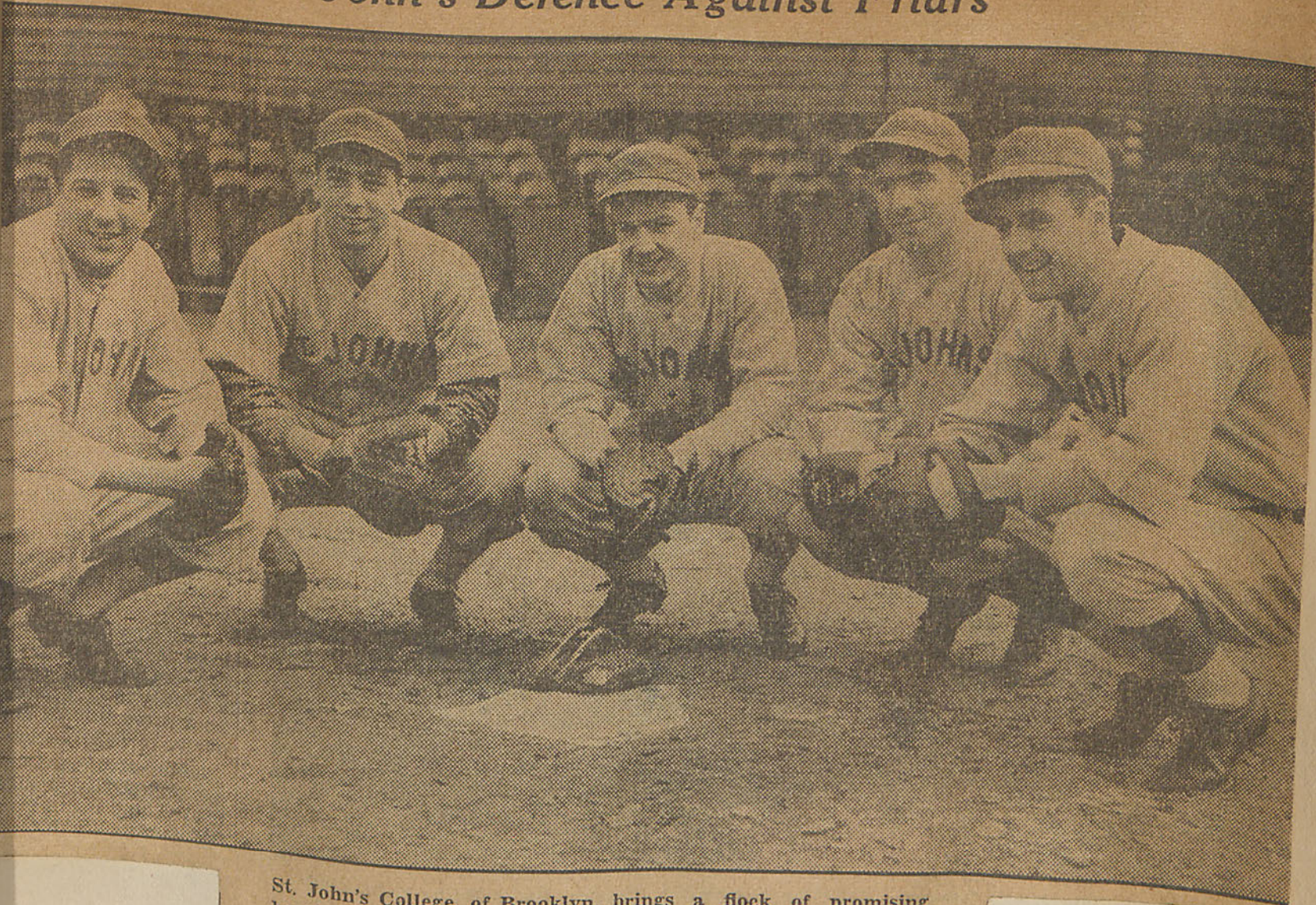

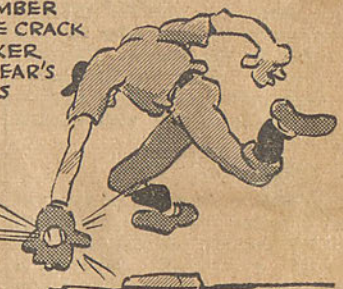

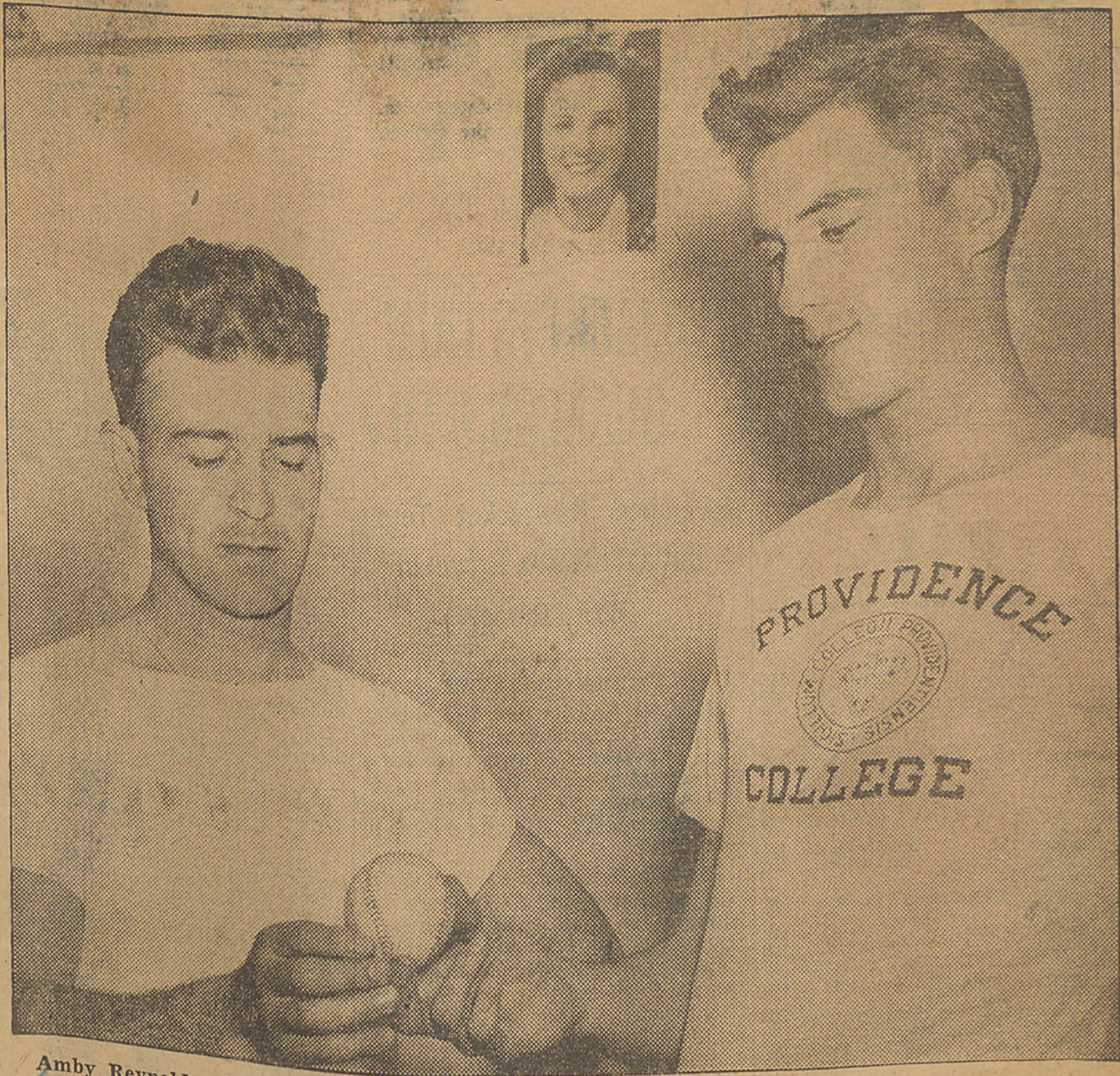

In six of those eight innings he retired the side in order and, after Morris had opened the third with a single, Juszczyk really took charge, setting down the next 18 batters with ease and des-

Brown scored in the fourth with one out, after Morris had permitted only 10 men to face him in three innings. Johnny Marsolini walked, Slip Barnini's throw went into the dirt and scored on Ray McCulloch's single over second.

The Bruins threatened in the eighth and had men on second and third with one out but Morris forced McCulloch to pop to Leo and then Donat Brochu relieved the tension with the second of his fine running catches. Steve Fallon, playing centre field, turned in two comparable fielding gems.

But in the ninth the Bruins collected the run that eventually saved the day for them. Bob Ochomurka, the Bruins new third baseman, got a life when Jimmy Leo dropped George Barbarito's throw, stole second and scored when Johnny Ayvazian let Pie Pietrusza's roller go through his legs.

The Friars, inept at the plate all afternoon, still had plenty of fight left. Ayvazian drilled a hit through Bill Sheehan at short and advanced on a balk. Juszczyk then fanned Al Harrison and was saved from considerable difficulty when Hank Gossler made a spectacular stop of Jim Bagley's smash and threw the Friar out at first. Jimmy Leo's sharp single scored Ayvazian and Juszczyk then lost his touch, passing Barnini and Fallon in succession.

Then it was that he rode home on his gameness, recovering sufficiently to fan Yockers and send the Bruin adherents home happy.

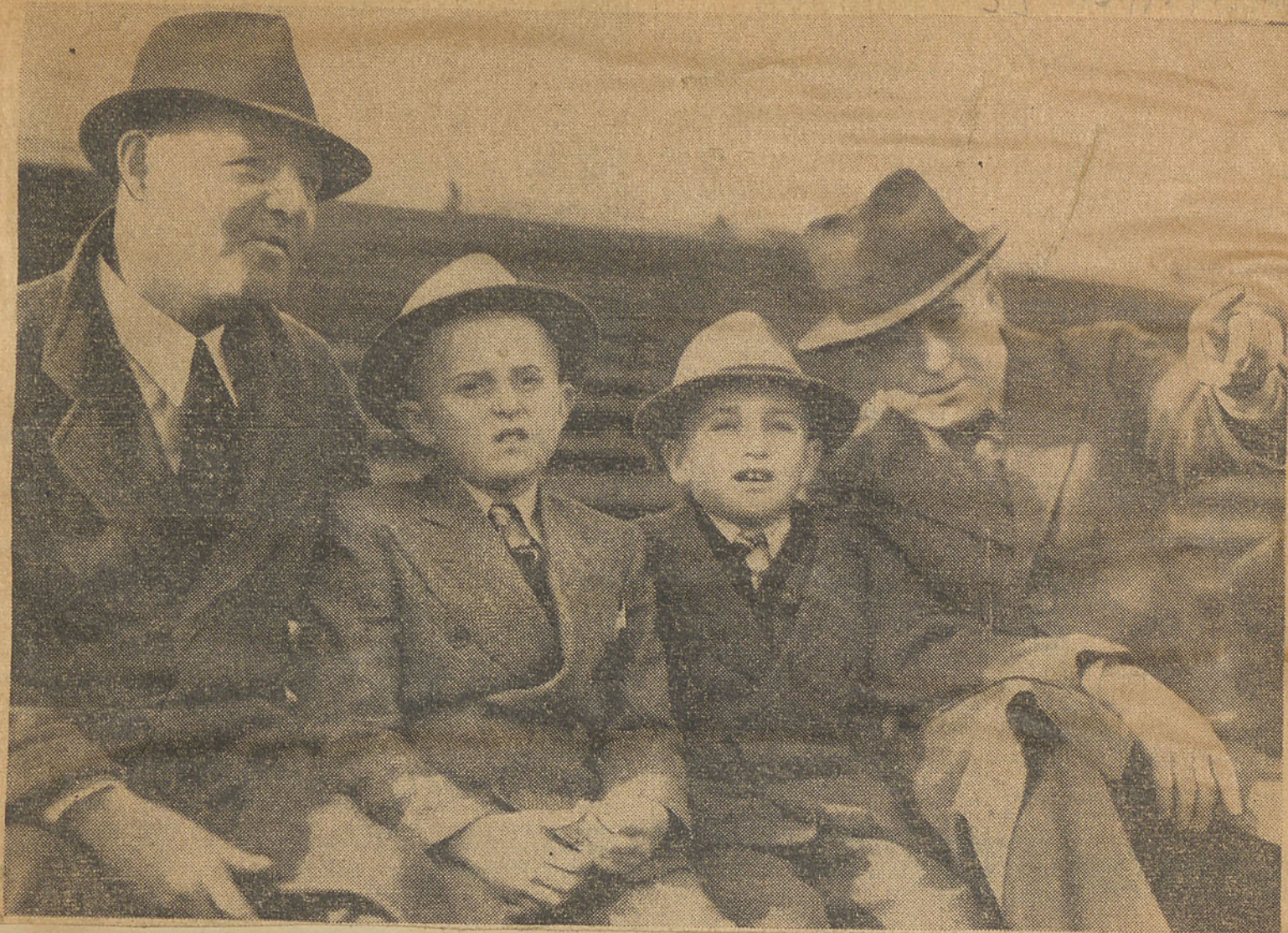

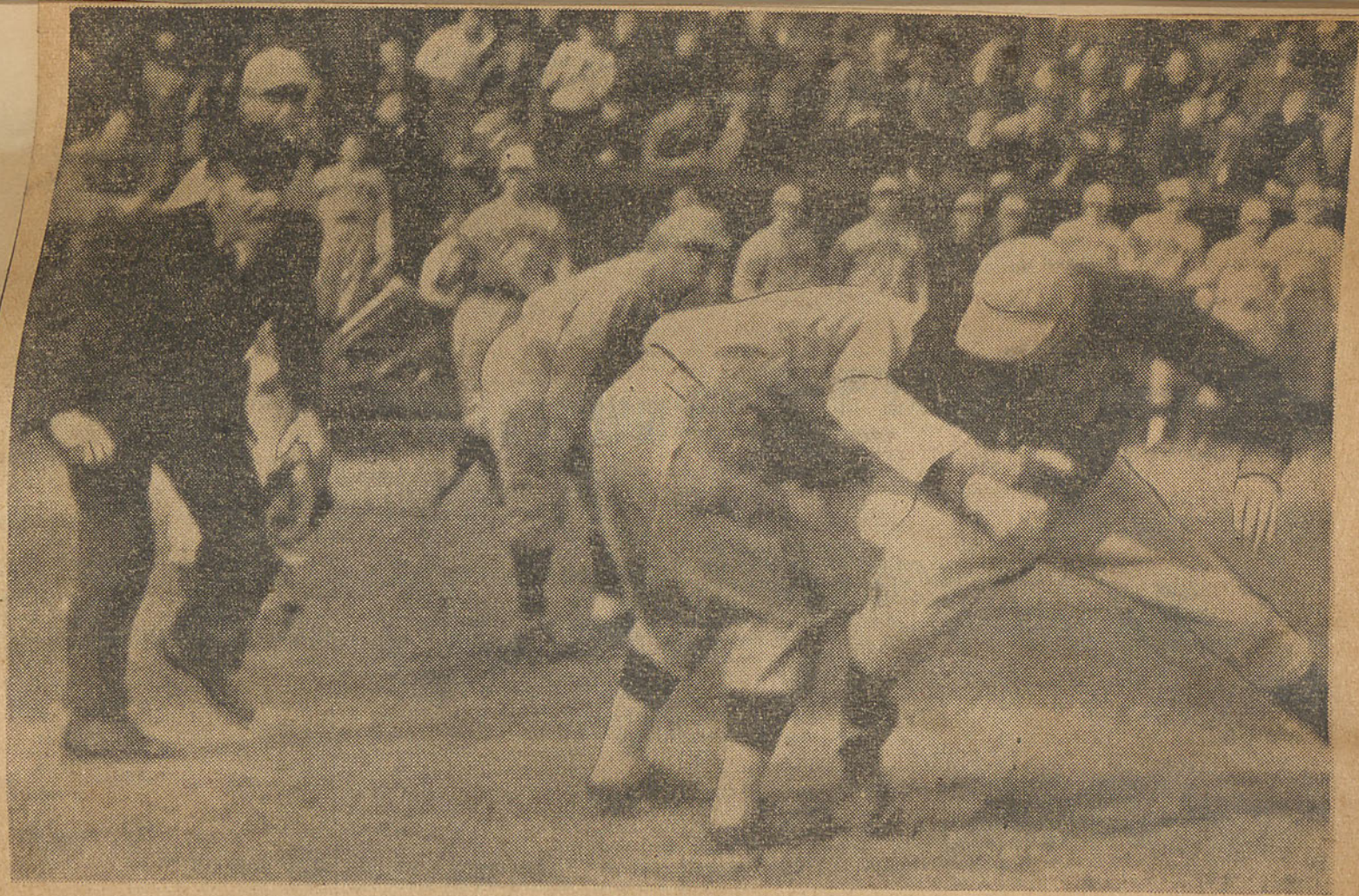

VILLANOVA TRIUMPHS OVER FRIARS, 8 TO 6

Three Hurt, Four Home Runs Feature Ding Dong Battle

Reynolds Splits Finger; Barnini Suffers Dislocated Shoulder in Crash.

Four home runs, a succession of brilliant fielding plays, a twisted neck, dislocated shoulder and split finger were crammed into nine of the most exciting innings played at Hendriken Field in years, as Villanova outlasted Providence College, 8 to 6, yesterday afternoon before 1500 fans.

The Wildcats, gaining their seventh straight victory, pounded the combined offerings of Joe Kwasniewski and Amby Reynolds for 13 hits, two of which were homers, two triples and one a double. Meanwhile an aroused Friar team, playing its finest ball of the campaign, collected only eight hits, but by including two circuit smashes and a double in their consolidated attack, managed to fashion six runs.

The three injuries came in the eighth. First, George Flood, who tripled two runs across, snapped his neck sliding into third and needed first aid before he could arise and needed a courtesy runner if he was to return to his catching post in the Friars' half of the inning.

Nick Basca, the Wildcats' All-America back, was chosen to run for the ailing catcher, and almost immediately became involved in the crash that sent Slip Barnini to the hospital with a dislocated shoulder. Cliff Choquette, the Villanova pitcher, flied to Donat Brochu in left and after the catch Brochu fired a perfect strike to Barnini at home. As Barnini set himself to tag out Basca, Nick lowered his head and charged into Slip, knocking him flat and injuring his left shoulder. Slip, however, hung onto the ball, completing the double play.

In the Friars' half of the inning Reynolds hit to Choquette but Cliff booted the ball, recovered and, in trying to throw out Amby at first,

hit him with the ball on the index finger of his pitching hand, splitting the back of the finger. Reynolds finished the game, giving up a triple and a single, good for the eighth run, in the ninth.

Providence started well, scoring twice in the first on a walk to Johnny Ayzasian, Al Harrington's infield single—an attempted sacrifice converted into a hit by Harrison's fleetness, and a slashing single to centre by Jimmy Leo.

The Wildcats got one back in the second, Lloyd Rice singling and Joe Yednock getting a scratch hit when Ayzasian stumbled going after his lazy grounder before Flood singled sharply, scoring Rice. Yednock tried to follow suit, but was picked off going back to third when Kwasniewski intercepted Brochu's fine return and threw to George Barbarito.

In the third Woody Reitmeier blasted the first homer of the day over the right field fence, but the Friars went ahead again as Jim Bagley and Barnini homered in their half, Bagley poling a towering fly over the right centrefield fence and Barnini a liner over the wire in right.

Villanova tied it in the fifth on a double by Choquette and singles by Reitmeier and Mike Lazorchak, the basketball star. The visitors moved ahead in the sixth, when Bob Pash pasted a homer over the fence in right and almost did more damage, but Harrison ended the inning, making a dazzling gloved hand catch on Reitmeier's smash into deep right centre.

The Eagles made only two hits

while scoring their first seven runs, one of which was a homer by Catcher Bob Sliney. The circuit hit climaxed the uprising, Ambrose going to work at this point and retiring the next three batters in order. Four errors and a passed ball figured in this parade.

Singles by Johnny Ayayzian and Yockers, a base on balls and an error gave the Friars two runs in the first and they collected three more in the fourth on Nugent's homer, Donat Brochu's single, a walk and an error.

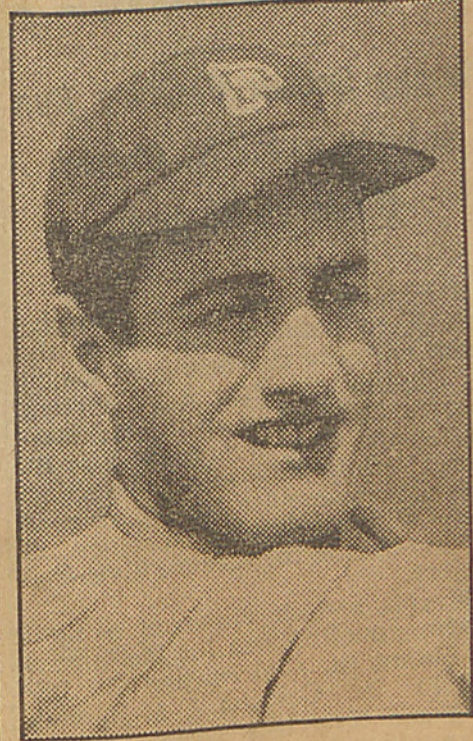
Harvard tuned up for today's encounter by defeating Northeastern yesterday, taking full advantage of the New England Conference champions' miscues.

Providence went ahead in the seventh when Ray Harrison chipped in with his third straight single and scored on Johnny Yockers' triple—a ball slashed so hard at Ed Beauchamp at second that it caromed off him into deep right field.

Jones, hitting for Beauchamp, opened the eighth with a single, advanced on a sacrifice and infield out and scored on Frank Zammarchi's single to centre.

Only two errors were made, the rival shortstops being guilty, but both boots set up double plays. In the sixth Ayvazian threw to the stands after making a brilliant stop of Zammarchi's grounder, Frank reaching second. Bud Conley flied deep to Viny Nugent in centre and Nugent's throw to third was so good that Ayvazian cut it off and nailed Zammarchi far from the bag.

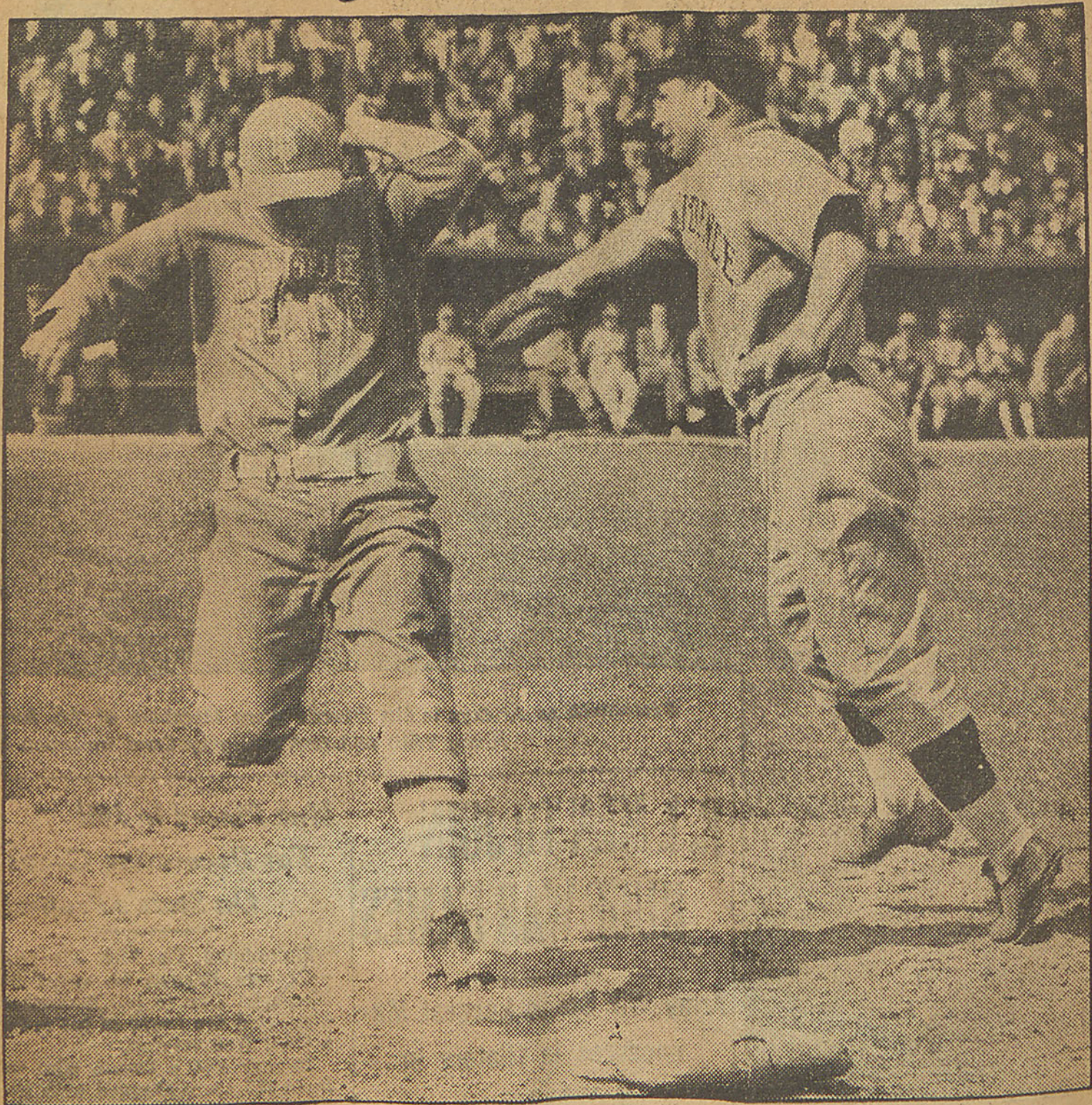

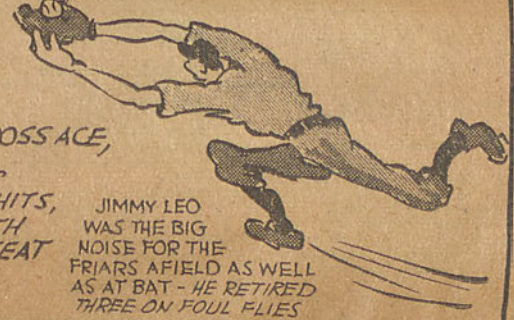

As a consequence the State title race ended just where it began with the Bruins, Friars and Rhode Island State tied at two victories and two defeats apiece. The Bruins won both games from Providence, the Friars took two from the Rams and State, in turn whipped Brown in both starts.

For seven innings yesterday the rival hurlers were in complete command, Johnny Ayvazian's brilliant running catch off Pietrusza representing the sole bit of unusual assistance that Big Joe needed and Bill Sheehan coming up with a lightning double play at the expense of Clarkin and Jim Begley in Walt's only troublesome moment.

True each had uneasy moments in the first through no particular fault of theirs. Clarkin, second man up for the Friars, walked and went to second on a passed ball but died a-languishing. Then, in Brown's half, Pietrusza got a two-base life when Clarkin threw over Jimmy Leo's head after taking Pie's easy hopper but the Bruin lead-off man was erased at the plate, Clarkin to Johnny Yockers, as he attempted to score as Clarkin overran Bill Sheehan's sacrifice bunt.

Then came the eighth and trouble. Yockers, first man up, reached

second as Hank Gossler threw badly after handling his grounder and scored on Ayvazian's single. Ayvazian took second on a wild pitch but Juszcyk struck out Clarkin.

In Brown's half Pietrusza singled and stole second, scoring on Sheehan's single, Bill taking second on the throw in and third on a wild pitch. He scored as Lou Sigloch was safe at first as Ayvazian attempted to complete a double play.

Capt. Dave Redford got two of Brown's hits, both being close plays at first after dazzling work by Ayvazian. Ayvazian made another great stop at Pietrusza singled in the eighth, snagging the hard hit grounder and probably preventing a two-bagger.

Marsolini hit the hardest drive of the day, a smash that almost took Clarkin's glove off as he leaped for the ball in the sixth.

In the first of the sixth Yockers somersaulted over the wall of the stand chasing Sigloch's foul fly.

Sheehan, as has been his custom most of the season, came up with several fine plays at short and Ray McCulloch prevented some embarrassment in the seventh when he outguessed Leo and snared his line smash into left.

The Bruins stole three bases on Yockers and Sigloch, the only one Johnny had beaten, was safe when the ball went into the dirt.

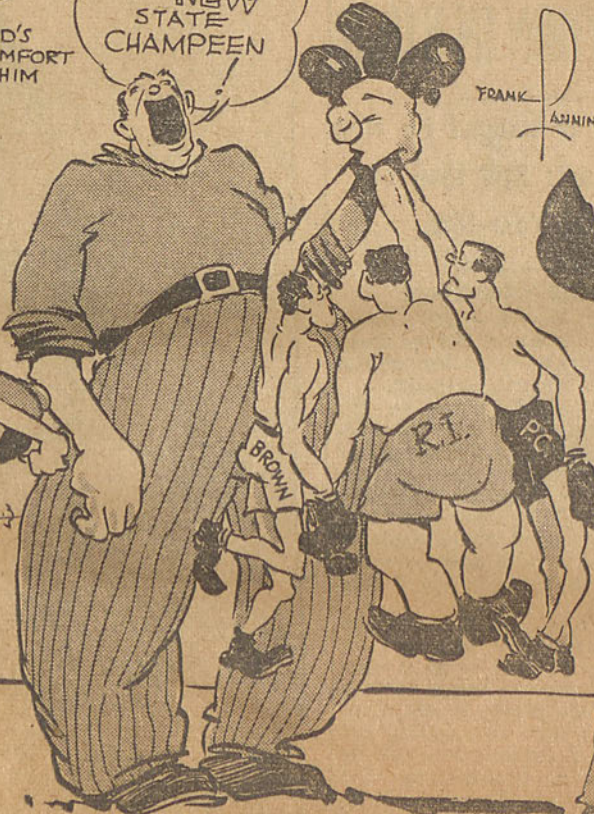

Clarkin's batting this spring was timely, and he became known as one of the Friar's most dependable batters when men were on base.

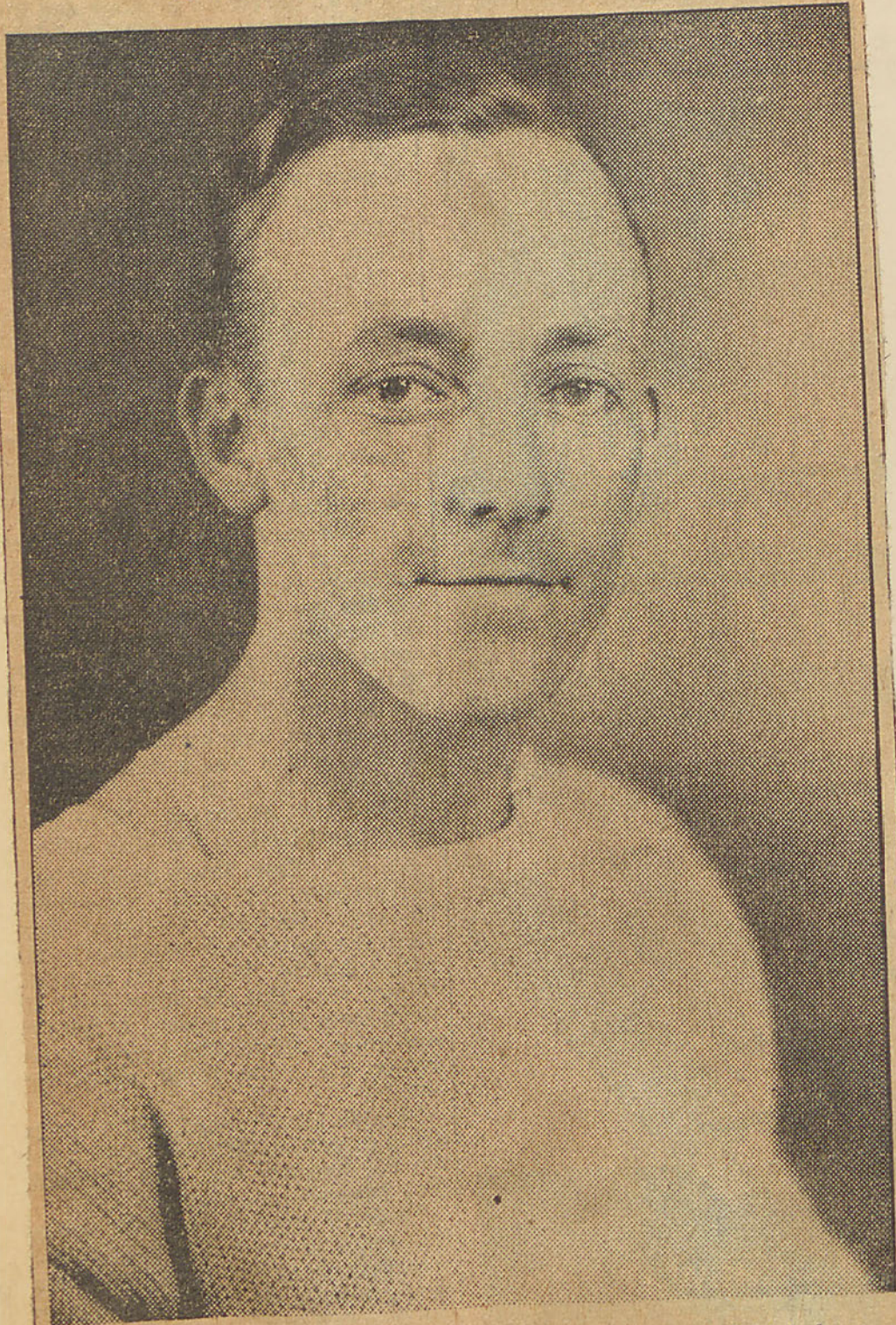

Leo, in the opinion of the selecting committee, comprising all P. C. coaches, two newspapermen, the faculty athletic director and Mr. Conaty, was singularly qualified for the award. In addition to his fine athletic performances, Leo has been a good student, an extremely personable young man and an enthusiastic contributor to numerous campus productions.

Mr. Conaty, in presenting the award, said that fortunately this year's class contained a man who, it was felt, would have received the high approval of Mal Brown himself, and the rousing reception accorded the award indicated that Leo's own classmates concurred fully.

Leo, although an excellent performer in football and basketball, was perhaps best known for his baseball talents. Elevated to the varsity as a junior because of his robust hitting, the big Fitchburg, Mass., boy startled New England circles by his brilliance and agility around first base. The Malcolm Hollis Brown Award, a trophy to be presented annually to the Providence College senior who has done the most for the college in athletics during his collegiate career, was awarded for the first time last night at Parents' Night, and the recipient, James J. Leo of Fitchburg, Mass., received rousing acclaim as he accepted the award from its donor, Edward P. Conaty, '33.

Coaches of all Providence College sports, two newspapermen, the faculty director of athletics and Mr. Conaty comprised the committee selecting the outstanding senior athlete, and in choosing Leo selected a three sports star whose achievements have been many and notable since he matriculated four years ago.

Leo has been a dominant performer in football, basketball and baseball, a fine team player and one whose outstanding work was done when the opposition was strongest.

Eight times the big Fitchburg boy

has been awarded Varsity letters, three in football, three in basketball and two in baseball. In addition he earned Freshman insignia in those three sports, participated in several campus activities, and reached his theatrical heights as a 'chorus girl' during junior year, starring in the production, "Friar Away."

POPULAR RECIPIENT OF AWARD

Leo is a particularly popular recipient of the Mal Brown Memorial, for he and Brown were intimate friends, and frequently combined their talents of wit and humor to dispell the gloom that followed defeats in sports and revive a team's morale.

As a Freshman Leo was an end in football, a centre in basketball and a first baseman in baseball. He continued to play end during the next three years with the exception of his junior year when a dearth of tackles led to his temporary transfer to that squad and once again he performed creditably.

As a sophomore, playing Varsity basketball for the first time, he did excellent work at forward, showing to such advantage that he remained at forward during his next two seasons, with the exception of a few games when injuries or illness made it imperative that he be switched to centre or guard. In those circumstances his versatility stood him in good stead and his play was on the same high plane.

PLAYS BRILLIANTLY AGAINST BROWN

He climaxed his basketball career with a brilliant performance against Brown in his last game, setting such a terrific pace that the Friars upset their highly favored opponents and brought a triumphant finish to a season that had been of doubtful quality.

As a football player Leo was steady and sturdy. He was in virtually every game during his three varsity years and proved himself a power on attack and defence.

Leo didn't play baseball as a sophomore, but in Junior and Senior years he was outstanding. Last year he batted for .328 and had a fielding average of .975, collecting the most hits and driving in the most runs.

ONCE AGAIN PROVES STAR CLUTCH HITTER

This spring he continued his spectacular fielding, finishing with a mark of .982, and batted for .289. Once again he was the best of the Friars' clutch hitters, driving in the most runs and collecting the most hits. In 14 trips to the plate this spring when runners were aboard Leo produced hits that brought one or more across.

He brought his Hendricken Field career to a close by hitting a home run off George (Pinky) Woods of Holy Cross in the final inning of the final home game.

In making the award last night Mr. Conaty said in conclusion:

"Fortunately there is in this year's class a man whom we feel sure that Mal would have approved highly. He combined in three years of inter-collegiate activity sportsmanship, honor and courage to a marked degree, with the ability to be respected by both his teammates and opponents. In every way he is worthy of the award. It is a real pleasure to present the Mal Brown award for the first year to James J. Leo."

Kwasniewski, Ayvazian to
Play Pro Baseball with
Canton Team. 6/15

Big Joe Kwasniewski and Johnny Ayvazian, Providence College pitcher and shortstop for the past three seasons, launched upon a professional baseball career yesterday, affiliating with the Red Sox farm system and signing with the Canton club of the Middle Atlantic League.

Kwasniewski, one of the outstanding pitchers in Friar history, suffered only one reverse during Sophomore and Junior years but this year, following an early season illness, he was unable to round into top form until late in the campaign. He lost his last start, against Brown, but hurled excellent ball all the way, limiting the Bruins to five hits, three of them infield balls snared by Ayvazian.

In addition to his pitching prowess—Big Joe is fast, has good control and boasts a sharp curve—Kwasniewski is a lusty hitter and an exceptionally classy fielder.

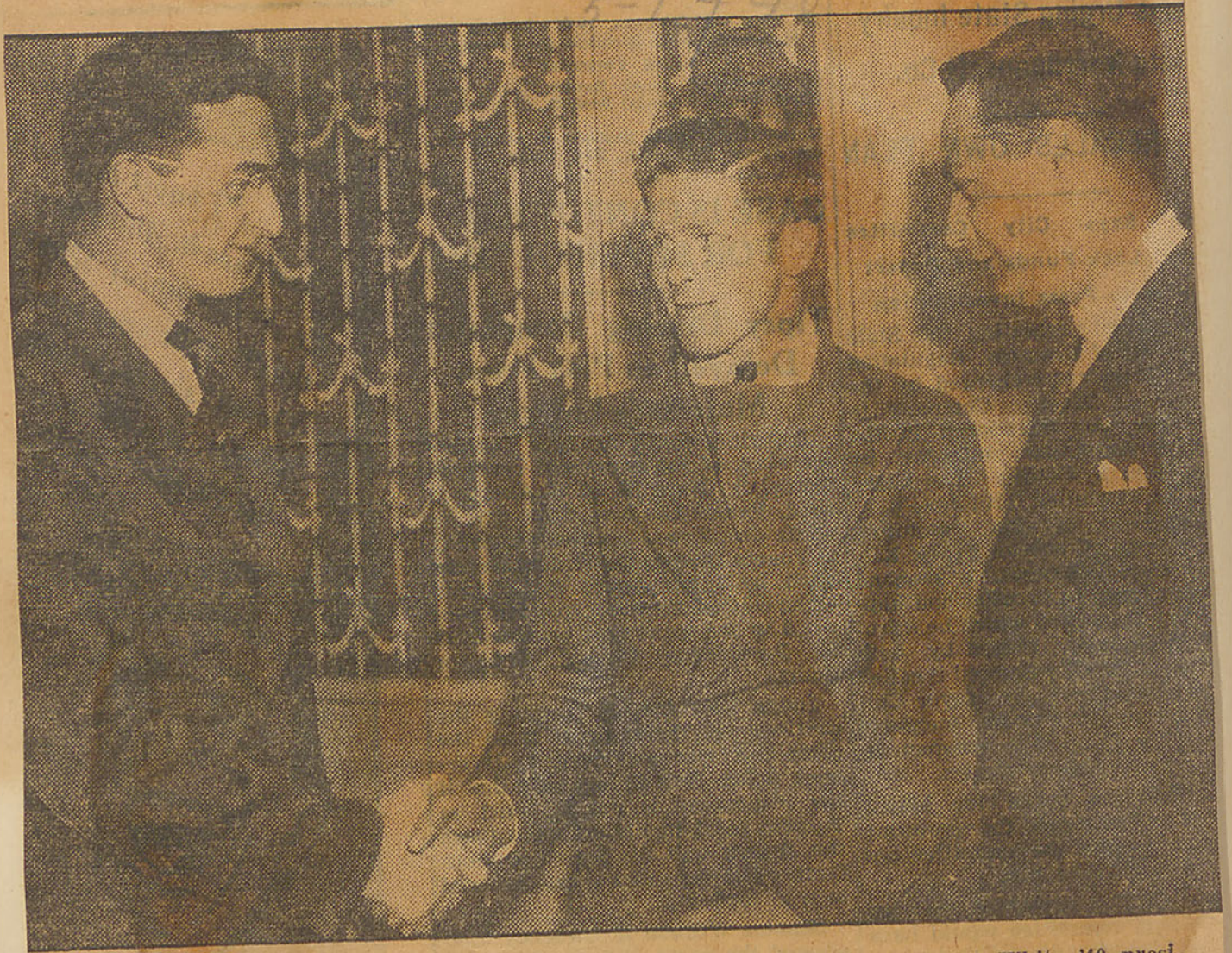
