

The Providence College basketball forces will finish preparations today for the opening game of the season tomorrow night in which they will oppose Assumption College of Worcester in Harkins Hall.

The Friars are in reasonably good condition although their practise sessions have been stymied to a certain extent by the necessity of sharing the college auditorium with thespians preparing for undergraduate theatricals.

Although Coach Ed Crotty has not decided upon his starting lineup it is probable that he will open with a team composed of Capt. Beryle Sacks and Sophomore Chet Zabek at guard; Vic Storey, a junior who was out of college last year, at centre, and Bob Lee, a senior, and Bob Reilly, a sophomore, in the front

As an alternative five Crotty has been working Bill Gustas and Ed Lee at the forwards, Sam Kusinitz centre and Tom Shannon and Horace Marone at the guards. Leo Leddy and Ray Zeborah guards, Ben Sudnik, a forward, and Joe Daniels, a centre, have been drilling with both





Employing a defense that was as tough to crack as an ancient biscuit and eventually hitting a hot scoring stride, the Providence College basketball forces defeated Bates, from Lewiston, Me., 45 to 22, at Harkins Hall last night. It was the Friars' second victory of the week.

Most of the scoring was accomplished in the second half after the first session had produced large measures of firing futility. At the rest period the Friars were leading, 12 to 7, but a few words of wisdom from Coach Ed Crotty over their intermission oranges stepped up their efficiency and they gave a classy exhibition thereafter.

Providence contributed a succession of well executed passing plays to the general entertainment while Bates's principal donation was a neat trick of stealing the ball every so often. The Friars, even during the first half, were manifestly superior although Long Don Webster caused them no end of trouble by his ability to retrieve rebounds during the opening half.

During the first half the ball simply refused to go through the hoop, but factions flipping shots from here and there, a vast percentage of them skidding around and coming out. The Friars built up their edge by throwing up more shots than the Bobcats although five and one-half minutes had expired before anyone tallied.

With Chet Zabek directing a short and snappy passing attack, and Bob Reilly, John Lee, Horace Marone and Sam Kusinitz co-operating thoroughly, the Friars rolled merrily along, pushing their total to 24 before the Bobcats, as represented by Ed King, broke into the scoring again.

Shortly thereafter the much improved Marone fouled out and a few minutes later, with the score reading 30 to 13, Zabek twisted his ankle capturing a rebound and also departed. With the Friars concentrating on teamwork and rarely shooting unless percentage was with them, the scoring was pretty well divided. Reilly and John Lee were the leaders with 11 points apiece while Ed Rafferty chipped in five for the Bobcats.

Providence added nine points on free throws, missing eight other chances. Bates scored six, also missing eight, a drastic form reversal from their perfect average against Boston University Thursday night.

That game was fast and at times especially well played, the Friars particularly showing to advantage as they staged several crisp passing attacks that kept the ball on the go at length and at high speed. Defensively the Dominicans did a thorough job. They rarely let the Bobcats get set and almost always kept them at a reasonably safe distance from the hoop.

Bates was in command of Wendell Mansfield, pinch hitting for Buck Spinks, recently called into Army service. Buck is a captain, Coach Ed Crotty will leave today for Danbury where Little Ed will be

The Providence College sports fortunes during the past year were not all that Friars and Friar followers would have liked but there was, even when defeats were piling up, a definite indication that the Dominicans were at the cross-roads and headed for better things.

Insofar as victories and defeats were concerned, the Friars did not have a successful year. In football they lost six games and won three; in baseball they won five and lost seven while in basketball there were five victories and nine reverses.

But in the matter of performance the Friars found much source of satisfaction. Their year was a success in performance if not in records.

Football students maintain that three years are required for the installation of a new football system and this past year was the third for the Friars under Coach Hughie Devore, although 1939, with its devastating illnesses and injuries retarded progress more than helped it.

In those games their attack clicked to a nicety and their defense also produced touchdowns — two against State and one against Springfield on pass interceptions. At Springfield the Friars worked a perfect play whick shook Ed Haponik loose for a 78-yard touchdown gallop in ankle deep mud.

Injuries to key men in the late stages of the season and a dash of carelessness were their principal drawbacks in the stretch.

The baseball team lacked the classy pitching of other years and for the first time in the Art Quirk era failed to win the State title. Even so P. C. managed a third share in the crown, beating State twice while losing as often to Brown. The Bruins completed the cycle by licking the Rams in both games.

A spring trip into New York, New

Jersey and Pennsylvania was ruined by rain and three other games were washed out, a condition that proved injurious to the pitching staff since the hurlers couldn't get adequate work to keep them sailing along.

Basketball improved as it went along, bringing three victories in the last four games, Connecticut and Brown, two of New England's best, being upset victims. The basketball team, too, was mastering the Notre Dame system as interpolated by Ed Crotty. As the new campaign started in December the Friars indicated that they were catching on, winning their three games and holding opponents very definitely in check. As a matter of record P. C. gave up only 62 points in those three outings.

The 1940 Freshman football team won two, lost one and tied one; the baseball team won five, lost one, and the basketball team won three and lost four. The new freshman quintet, in two December games, scored decisive victories.

Appreciating that there will be much running entailed when his charges mingle with Frank Keaney's Rams, Coach Ed Crotty transplanted practice to one of the spacious high school gyms yesterday and let the boys gallop.

What with State travelling at that 'two points a minute' clip, the Friars admit that all they need is a 'minus two points a minute defense' and everything will be lovely.

For the first time in recent years the Rams and Friars swing into their series undefeated. The Rams were expected to arrive at this game with a perfect record, but the Friar's proficiency has been surprising.

P. C. lost most of its 'name' players by graduation but large gobs of hard work have kept the team winning and Reilly and Zabek have added quite a scoring punch. Thus far the Friars have outscored their rivals just about two to one, which might

mean that they will do some collecting themselves tomorrow.

Brown adherents are hoping that tonight will be the night for the Bruins to find themselves. There is talent aplenty on the Brown squad, size in keeping and good condition so it won't surprise anyone if the Bears break out in a victory rash any time now.

One of the best measures of M. I. T.'s ability is the game with Harvard wherein the Engineers lost by a single point—and coming that close to the Harvards is no easy job this season.

Reports are current that Greasy Neale would like nothing better than to land Denny Myers of Brown as his line coach at Pittsburgh where the former Yale backfield tutor has taken over the Steelers of the National Professional League.

Brown's swimmers open their dual meet season tomorrow night at Springfield and several Maroon pool marks are expected to go by the boards.

Coach Leo Barry's squad is not so well balanced as usual this winter but the Brown boss probably will once again come up with enough stuff to continue the Bruins habit of winning the New England title.

Indications are that if none of the rivals lift the crown this year they will have quite a wait. The Bruins have a capable Cub crew on hand.

Rhode Island State's basketball hurricane will sweep through the Auditorium tonight at approximately 8:30 o'clock and Providence College's Friars, parties of the second part in the soiree, will do their utmost to prevent the hurricane from blowing them the way of State's six previous victims.

The Freshmen teams, both undefeated as are their varsity brethren, will tangle at 7:15 o'clock in an attraction that gives promise of considerable entertainment.

The Rams, hottest scoring aggregation extant, are sailing along at a 'two-points-a-minute' clip, while the Friars have been operating on a point a minute basis. That makes matters look simple for State.

But, the Rams have given up better than a point a minute to opponents whereas the Friars have limited their foes to half a point a minute. That makes matters look less simple for State.

Such figures tend toward confusion but, in cases involving Frank Keaney's swift and sharp shooting sensations, confusion is very much in order. Almost invariably the Rams throw rivals into utter confusion and then pour in the points with confusing continuity.

The Friars, on the other hand, have been extremely parsimonious in the matter of points for the opponents and in three games have yielded only 62. Statistically, State has a scoring average of 33.5 for six games, P. C. one of 45 for three games. Defensively State has a mark of 48.3 per game and P. C. 20.7.

In other words an "unstoppable" offense and an "impenetrable" defense will collide, but the calibre of opposition in prior games having been what it was, the Rams are favored, although not expected to maintain that "T-P-A-M" pace.



State is better fixed in man power, height and experience; Keaney has a wealth of reserves; Ed Crotty, Friar coach, has two reserves with some big time background. State undoubtedly will run and run and run, P. C. will stroll leisurely; State will go in for long passes and sudden breaks, P. C. for short passes and deliberate breaks.

It is, in brief, a battle of opposites, a tried and true offense against a promising defense; speed against deliberation. It is a battle of rare possibilities; one that virtually gives a promissory note of thrills galore.

A large crowd is almost a foregone conclusion, if advance sales mean anything, advance sales and the ancient and exciting rivalry that exists between the Rams and the Friars.



Rhode Island State's "two-points-aminute" hoop hurricane blew with characteristic fury at the Auditorium last night for the edification of approximately 4000 enthusiastics, but the Providence College Friars, through tremendous second half improvement, managed to join the small but select circle of those who hold the TPAMs below their average. The Friar Freshmen nipped the Ramlets, 49 to 48, in the opening

When the Rams launched one of their patented onslaughts in the first half, and went out for the mid-game oranges in proud possession of a 41 to 19 advantage, the thrilled throng fully expected that the TPAMs would improve upon their lofty average.

But the Friars were a much better club in the second half, and with Capt. Berl Sacks and Sam Kusinitz playing a fine defensive game, held the high flying Rams to their second lowest total of the campaign.

True enough, the verdict was sealed by that time, but the Rams were rolling, which made the task much harder for their seventh straight victims.

Bud Conley, quiet, unobtrusive, and blond, not to mention photegenic, was the hero of the piece. What Conley did to P. C.'s attack was a caution, and what he did to his own was considerable. In addition to performing in accepted style as play maker, Conley snared Friar passes with increasing frequency and stole the ball with embarrassing regularity.

Meanwhile Stutz Modzelewski was making merry, playing a well-rounded game that was topped by his scoring feats—22 points, 18 of them from the floor. 





Zabek, Marone Star for Providence in Fast Finish;
Score, 44-40.

Putting on a whirlwind finish after practically eliminating themselves in the first half by indecisive action, the Providence College Friars defeated Springfield College, 44 to 40, in an overtime duel at Harkins Hall last night.

Alertness and superior shooting had given the Maroons a 29 to 18 margin in the first half, but with Horace Marone and John Lee topping off well organized team manoeuvres with accurate shots, the Friars moved ahead in the waning moments of regulation time only to have Wydro heave in a neat shot from the side and follow it almost immediately with a free throw that tied the score at 38-38.

The Friars, improving steadily as the game wore on, were at their best in the overtime, controlling the ball most of the time, working their way downcourt with deliberation, and shooting with precision whenever they did elect to fire. The added period was scarcely under way when Chet Zabek, defensive star and playmaker, was fouled under the hoop and made good on both free throws.

Then Marone, whose all around play was his best of the season, shovelled in a sensational one-hander, which gave the Friars what loomed as a comfortable margin.

The visitors were far from through, however, and Boberg fired a shot from the side and deep that brought a roar of approval from both factions in the stands, but then, with the Maroons working at top speed in an effort to tie, Zabek intercepted a pass by anticipating it, raced down the floor and passed to Bob Reilly, who flipped in the basket that put the verdict out of Springfield's reach.

It was a fast game and an exciting one. Taller, more efficient, under the backboards and shooting with vastly better success than the Friars. the Maroons pulled away early and at one point in the first half led 20 to 10, at another 24 to 12. Becker and Panatier scored the first field goals, and it wasn't until the middle of the period that John Lee produced the first Friar flip from the floor.

MacVean, Schmidt, Becker and Panatier led the Springfield attack in the first half, and when intermission came it seemed that they not only had the situation well in hand, but were virtually in a position to really roll it up.

Then it was that the Friars began to click and, as in the game with State, they performed better when they should have been growing

weary-and probably were.

Marone's three field goals in the early stages of the second half, and three subsequent baskets by John Lee changed the complexion of things materially. In keeping with their improved shooting, the Friars grew much more efficient on defense, their passing worked better and they shed the carelessness that had caused several of their passes to be intercepted by the agile MacVean and Kistner in the first half.

Lee was falling backward when he fired the shot that brought P. C. within six points of Springfield at 33-27 midway through the last half and Zabek, timing a Springfield pass better than the Maroons themselves, stepped in, grabbed, and was away

for an easy shot.

Lee leaped high in a scramble, and got the next one. He repeated the performance in the next minute, but Schmidt's shot kept the visitors two points ahead.

Sam Kusinitz dropped in a free throw and Marone, on the business end of a fast passing play in which all the Friars handled, put P. C. ahead and Reilly boosted the total. Wydro then cut loose and tied it up and they went into overtime.

Springfield lost Kistner, a clever floor worker, in the first half on fouls and Schmidt went the same route in the extra session. All told 17 fouls were called on the visitors, 10 on the hosts. Springfield got eight points in 13 tries, Providence 12 in 19, Zabek sinking six out of eight.

Thirteen college basketball games are on this week's slate for the Rhode Island college teams, and 11 games of the listing will be played in Rhode Island. The offering is one of the best of the new season for the local following.

The hoop activity opens tomorrow night with two double bills. Rhode Island State College will meet Northeastern in varsity and freshman games at Kingston, and Providence College will meet Springfield in two

games at P. C.

On Wednesday, Tufts will visit Brown with varsity and freshman teams, and the Bridgewater Teachers will visit the Rhode Island College of Education for a single game. The Brown varsity swimming team will meet a test while facing Harvard at Cambridge in varsity and freshman competition.

Friday finds the Rhode Island College of Education meeting Hyannis at Hyannis, and Saturday brings Brown, Rhode Island and Providence College into action. Brown visits West Point to meet Army, undefeated Connecticut comes to Kingston with two teams for a New England Conference battle with Rhode Island, and Providence College entertains Holy Cross in Providence in varsity competition while the Junior College of Commerce meets the P. C. freshman team.

Rhode Island State moved further up the ladder last week by taking Maine and Providence College and now it would be difficult to find a warmer basketball sector in the entire country than at Kingston. State College adherents are currently making plans to invade New York for the Madison Square Garden game with St. Francis on Jan. 29. But each Kingston game further adds to the growing enthusiasm for the fine team that Frank Keaney has mustered.

Brown won over M. I. T. in its only start of the week, and Providence College was turned out of the undefeated class by Rhode Island State.

Dartmouth is rising in stature week by week in the Intercollegiate League race. The Indian triumph over Harvard, 34 to 31, on Friday, was a real achievement. Harvard has won five of six games and may still be the team that will have much to say about the final honors in this section.

Dartmouth plays Pennsylvania and Cornell this week, and probably will encounter real opposition on both games. Penn hasn't met any rugged opposition yet, but Cornell must be accorded new respect because of the manner in which it walked over a reputed fine Yale team Friday in New Haven.

Boston University, undefeated after four games until it met Clark Saturday, had two stars missing and lost its first game to the battling Clark contingent. Massachusetts State, able to win only one game all last season, edged Amherst and St. Anselm, with General Al McClellan as the new coach, sprang an upset by taking St. Michael's. New Hampsire and Northeastern both showed that they are improving.

Outside of New England, Ohio State, Indiana and Minnesota stand out in the Big Ten, Nebraska is leading the pack in the Big Six, Florida is ahead in the Southeastern area, North Carolina and Richmond are leading in the Southern, Arkansas in the Southwest, and Southern California, Stanford, Washington and Oregon State are setting the pace on the Pacific Coast.

Villanova and Duquesne are rated high among the Eastern independent teams, Creighton and Oklahoma A. & M. are tops in the Missouri Valley, and Seton Hall is a power among the Atlantic seaboard teams.

While the battle between undefeated Rhode Island State and Connecticut is the headliner for this section this week, there are other games in the East which bring undefeated teams against strong opponents. Villanova, winner of 10 straight games this season, meets Seton Hall, winner of 34 in succession since last being beaten in 1939. Duquesne is on a dangerous invasion of the Middle West, and its big test will come Saturday when it meets Ohio State. W. & J. and Baltimore are undefeated in the East, and Long Island, La Salle, New York University, Georgetown and Syracuse have lost only one game.

The Crusader track men and basketball players didn't leave with the rest, but remained at the college and continued their training. The cagers make their next start tomorrow night when they meet Providence College here.



A huge party for the departing Elmer Layden will be held March 10 at South Bend, the day the business of spring football under Frank Leahy will start.





(Special to the Providence Journal) Albany, N. Y., March 8 .- Providence College concluded its two-game road trip with a thrilling, 57 to 50, victory over Siena here tonight in a game wherein nearly every basket brought about a change in leadership or produced another deadlock in the score.

The Indians, playing their best game of the campaign, waged a desperate fight for victory, but in the end were forced to succumb to the Friars' sparkling team play, superior condition and the individual excellence of Chet Zabek and Sam Kusi-

Zabek, an Adams, Mass., boy, came back to his own stamping-grounds tonight and gave a dazzling exhibition, scored 18 points-16 of them on field goals-and played a vital part in the Friars' nicely co-ordinated at-tack. Meanwhile Kusinitz, again giving an exhibition of clever guarding, limited the usually high scoring Tucker ot seven points, only four of them on field goals. Prior to tonight's game Tucker had an average of 16 points a game.

P. C. Leads at Half

After gaining a 26 to 24 lead in the first half, the Friars started the second with a rush that soon had them ahead 32 to 25 but Coach Hank Bunoski sent in his first substitutes, O'Brien, Sullivan and Crummey and they stepped up the Siena pace to such a point that they deadlocked the count at 40-all within three minutes.

John Lee put Providence ahead again but Vic Bednarkiewicz, Siena high scorer with 14 points, tied the score and Bill Wolven put the home forces ahead with a set shot. Horace Marone, Friar playmaker, tied it promptly and with seven minutes left Lee, on a field goal, and Marone, on a free throw, gave the Friars a three-point edge.

Sullivan dropped in a long shot, but Marone quickly climaxed two fast plays with field goals and gave the Friars a lead they never relinquished. With a minute to play and the Friars leading 55-50, Capt. Beryl Sacks, who gave the Friars control of the backboards, was fouled and P. C. elected to take the ball out of bounds rather than shoot the free

## COLLEGE Sport Stants

The officiating in the recent R. I. State-Brown basketball game was criticised by both sides, though there were many who believed the officials did a competent job.

The officials called them close, but here the fault is with the code governing the game rather than with the officials. The officials acted just as the book dictates. The rules need revision and clear interpretation.

There have been squabbles over the officiating all season long. Many unfortunate incidents have arisen, and more, probably of a serious nature, will follow unless the rules are clarified and made more elastic.

The whistle plays too active a part in the game. The rules call for a foul on nearly every body contact, accidental or otherwise.

A player may accidentally and harmlessly bump an opponent's arm or shoulder, and there goes the whistle. This not only breaks up the sequence of play, but frequently arouses the fans, as well as the team penalized.

There is another viewpoint, however. The rules were tightened to avoid roughhouse tactics. This is a sane objective. Yet the rules should be left elastic enough to allow officials to differentiate between deliberate and accidental fouling.

Football faced the same problem, and solved it to the satisfaction of all by allowing bodily contact and leaving it to the discretion of the officials as to whether to call interference on forward pass plays when there is bumping or any contact.

Eck Allen, Brown basketball coach, who will conclude three seasons at the Brown helm tomorrow night with the Brown-Providence College game, has some ideas of his own on basketball rule changes.

Allen declares that basketball is the only game in which it pays to foul, meaning, of course, that to foul a man about to shoot unother way of preventing the shot.

To discourage this popular practice, Allen would not only give the man fouled two free shots, but also possession of the ball outside after the free throws. This, in Allen's opinion, would not only help stop these deliberate fouls, but also eliminate the resultant scrambles after a missed free throw under the basket. Allen believes that scrimmages, subsequent to free throws, are made to order for tall players, and do not give shorter players an even break.

Siena College of Albany, recent basketball foe of Providence College, will have its first graduating class in June. The Franciscan School is completing its fourth year, and yet has nearly a 1000 students and a good basketball team to boot.

Fr. Anselm Kreiger, who was Johnny Kreiger of All-American basketball fame, when a student at Providence College, is a member of the faculty. He is the tennis coach.



The Bruin co-Captains, Jack Paden and B. George den and Frank Wilson and George Fisher were the dominant factors in the Rmi the Bruin success. Wilson set the Bruin scoring pace with 19 points, Padden contains and Fisher 16. Padden contributed 18 and Fisher 16. Padden contributed 18 and Fisher during the Fisher scored 10 apiece during that blistering second half and used their height advantage so well that their height advantage so well that they were equally as efficient on defense as on attack. Meanwhile, the Friars, playing

smart, alert ball and offsetting their physical disadvantages by clever floor work and a demonstration of uncanny shooting by John Lee concluded their season brilliantly, even if in defeat. Last night's game climaxed a steady rise of the Friars this winter from an extremely dubious outlook back in December to a point where they were able to play the Bruins point for point right down to the finish.

With Capt. Beryl Sacks and Sam Kusinitz excelling in defensive play, Chet Zabek the offensive pivot, and Lee, Horace Marone and Bob Reilly heading the attack, the Friars drove into a 37 to 30 halftime advantage and ultimately succumbed only after the score had been tied eight times and the lead gained by one or the other nine times.

The game was clean all the way, fast virtually all the time except during one second half stretch when the Bruins went into a zone defense and the Friars took their sweet time about trying to penetrate it. That zone defense, in the final analysis, was the turning point, for Brown, with Padden, Fisher, Bob McGowan and Ward Sheffe making full use of their height, kept the Friars outside and almost invariably recovered the rebounds after misses by either team.

#### Action Resumes

Brown followers for George had been superb under the backboards. leaping high for rebounds despite a leg copiously taped to offset the pain of a charley horse.


#### Wilson Scores Clincher

College basketball in Providence as played by Brown and Providence College came to an end for this season last night as Brown defeated Providence, 63 to 59, and 73 to 52 in varsity and freshman encounters at Marvel Gymnasium before 1500 persons

George E. "Eck" Allen and Earl M. Brown, the Erown varsity and freshman coaches, bowed out with these concluding games. Allen leaves today for Orono Maine, where he will take charge of the University of Maine football organization, and Brown is shaping his plans to move to Cambridge where he will join the Harvard staff.

Even as Brown and Providence College were closing their seasons, a rising tide of enthusiasm was brewing in South County and State College students were figuring on the problem "to go or not to go." Meaning, of course, that all of Kingston was giving considerable thought on the advisability of another mass

hegira to Madison Square Garden next week to back the great Ram five in its first bid in the National Intercollegiate basketball tourney.

The State College undergraduates have a more intricate problem this time. For Frank W. Keaney and his storied Ram team intend to make an extended stay in Gotham. This is no one night stand against Seton Hall, holder of the 42-game record, for Keaney and his men intend to remain in the running right to the end. Plans to see the Ram through to the end will be a more severe tax on student budgets than the one game trip to New York six weeks ago. No Ram undergraduate wants to retire from the Gotham sports emporium until he has seen his team all the way through this unprece-dented chapter in State basketball

The college Administrative Council, comprising heads of the colleges in State College, pondered the weighty problem of a mass hegira in a 105-minute conference on Monday. The one conclusion announced after

that session was the tossing of the problem into the lap of the entire faculty. The faculty is meeting late today. Meanwhile, some professors have polled their classes to get a cross-section of student opinion. The more affluent students are merely biding their time until a decision comes from the administration of the college. The less affluent are giving some thought to ways of raising ready cash for an extended sojourn in Gotham.

This year's unprecedented brush with fame by the cross country and basketball teams has kept State College spirit on a high note. By the time the basketball season is finally completed, the college bell will have established a new record for counting out moments of great elation in a single year.

Last night's activity at Brown left Rhode Island State in first place in the intra-State series, Brown is second and Providence College is third.

The game was a fitting climax to the great careers of Frank Wilson. Jack Padden and George Fisher, seniors who bowed out of varsity basketball. It was the final collegiate basketball effort for Sachs, Kusinitz, Lee and Bill Gustas, and all flashed to advantage.

Brown was down seven points at half time and 12 points at one stage of the game, so the victory was the result of a sterling up-hill battle against a Providence team that played some of its best basketball of the season. Wilson set the Bruin pace with 19 points. Padden and Fisher added 18 and 16, respectively. John Lee of P. C. was high man of

the game with 25 points, Marone got 14 and Kusinitz 10. Providence led 39 to 30 at the half.

Brown scored 27 field goals to the Friars' 26. and the Bruin collected nine points on foul throws to seven for the Providence team.

The heaviest gunner of the night, however, was the flashy Roy Swingler of the Bear Cubs who scored 31 points. Ed McConnon of the P. C. freshmen rang up 23.





Marone, a much improved player, operated at guard, centre and forward during the past two seasons, and last winter developed into one of the leading scorers.


