

(Special to the Providence Journal) Springfield, Mass., April 16.-Dick Mahoney had only one bad inning on the mound here this afternoon at Pynchon Park, but American International College capitalized on this lapse on the part of the Friar hurler to win, 4-2, in its opening baseball game of the season.

Four hits-half of the total the Aces obtained off Mahoney-an error and a base on balls, gave the home city nine three tallies in the opening frame, enough to offset single runs the Dominicans rushed across the plate in the seventh and eighth.

A brief but devastating eighthinning explosion at Hendricken Field yesterday produced two Providence College runs and a 4 to/3 victory over a classy Williams team in the Friars' home baseball opener.

The game probably will stand up as one of the finest of the entire collegiate season. It had thrills in abundance, sharp hitting, sparkling outfield play, accurate throwing, sound pitching, alert base-runningand a balk. Two errors were committed, both by the Purple, but only one did any damage.

With the game deadlocked, 2-2, Ned Crowley opened the Friar eighth by spanking a double along the left field foul line and Chet Za-

Outfielders helped both pitchers. . . In addition to Hayes's catch, Swain robbed Massa in the first with a one-handed stab. . . . Donahue gave Hayes a dose of his own medicine when he snared his drive in the sixth. . . . The wind held up well hit balls quite a bit. . . . In the sec-ond Jack Bridgewater sliced one down the right field line but Zabek. by fast fielding and a good throw, cut him down at second: . . . Lee, with a single, double, two runs and two walks, one intentional, was head man offensively. . . . Both hurlers worked well, especially when things looked bad.




Two Games Pending

DEFENSIVE BATTLE IS HIGHLIGHTED BY PITCHING PROWESS

Harrington of P. C., Giraud of

Providence College defeated the Quonset Naval Air Base team, 2 to 1, in a stirring 12-inning duel at Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon, but that wasn't the half of it.

Fielding features were abundant, close plays the rule rather than the exception—yet fielding lapses produced the runs.

The rival hurlers, Charles Harrington of the Friars and Leo Giraud of Quonset made the hitters generally look pretty sad, were almost always in command—yet contributed the runs themselves.

One Out in Twelfth

Giraud, as cagey as they come, pitched high so that Harrington couldn't bunt and that proved his undoing when Stan Ebert, the Quonset catcher, lost the pitch as he attempted to haul it down quickly and put the ball on the runner.

Otherwise the hurlers were head men, Giraud forcing the Friars to leave 17 base runners languishing, while Harrington snuffed out incipient rallies so often that 10 Sailors were left stranded. Meanwhile they throttled threat after threat. Giraud reaching his peak in the ninth when he filled the bases by purposely passing Donahue with two out, throwing three straight balls to Zabek—and then striking him out.

Harrington Fans Seven

Harrington fanned seven, walked two and hit one. Giraud struck out six and walked nine, but several of his passes came after he had missed the corners and preferred missing again to giving the hitters anything fat to wallop.

Quonset scored in the second when John Foley and Irv Fenton singled in succession and Harrington threw beyond Chet Massa trying to get Foley at third on Eddie Wisniewski's grounder. Then Dig Haggerty poled a liner to Nick Cariglia in centre and Nick threw Fenton out at the plate for a twin killing and Bob Reilly, forgetting—as did everyone else—that the side was retired, relayed to Massa at third and Wisniewski was also retired.

Passed Ball Helps

P. C. got the first run in the fifth when Harrington singled, went to second on Massa's single, third on an infield out and scored as a sharpbreaking Giraud curve got away from Ebert.

That's not unusual, perhaps, but Brother Jessup ran a country mile for four of them, being particularly larcenous on drives by Reilly. 


A trio of former Friar baseball luminaries will lead a talented Fort Devens nine against Providence College tomorrow afternoon at Hendricken Field.



Big Hurler Comes Through The big hurler promptly pasted one between right and centre and Ferguson scored easily. One other run, or perhaps two, could have scored had it been necessary.

Most on the way it was a grand duel between Mahoney and Gemma, the former Kitty League star, who held Brown to a solitary scratch single a week back. He was lifted for a pinch hitter in the seventh. The Sailors scored first, notching a run in the second on a single by Wilcox and a lusty double by Benvenuti, which Donahue badly misjudged. Mahoney then fanned Flannigan for the third out, his third strikeout of the frame and the fourth in two innings. Before Wilcox singled Mahoney struck out Nesselrode (property of Pittsburgh), who had hit four homers Saturday against Quonset, and Huffman.

Friars Go Ahead

Providence went ahead in the same inning on Reilly's hit to left, Brownell's bunt that went for a single, Mahoney's sacrifice and the first of Chet Massa's brace of two-baggers, which was badly misjudged by Wilcox in left, eventually falling safely off Wilcox's upstretched glove.

Williams's single, a walk to Woolf and Enos's (Browns and Toledo) single gave Newport a run in the fifth and Huffman's smash on the first pitch of the sixth inning put the Sailors ahead, 3-2.


Chet Zabek opened the 10th for the Friars by walking and Bradley promptly replaced Rurak for the in-



Pariseau is a native of Attleboro. having been graduated from Attleboro high school where he was outstanding in all branches of athletics. He received his degree from Providence College with the class of 1939 after a spectacular gridiron career for the Friars.

He coached PC Freshman football in 1939, 1940 and 1941 and probably would have remained on the staff except for the fact that gridiron activities have been abandoned for the duration. He also played professionally with the Providence Steam Roller eleven in 1939 and 1940.

The new coach succeeds Fella Gintoff who enlisted earlier this week in the United States Navy. Coach Gintoff served only one year at St. Raphael, but attained considerable success both in football and baseball instruction. He was appointed a year ago as successor to James P. Mc-Geough who left St. Raphael to take a coaching post at Pawtucket West high school.

St. Raphael's coaching staff has been completely wiped out recently for Lefty Steve Fallon, who headed the basketball program last winter, also has joined the armed forces. He is in the Army now. A successor for Fallon will not be named for awhile, Brother Thomas said today.


Providence has a mid-July decision over the Soldier-team, 10-9 in 10 innings, and will rule a slight favorite to repeat that decision today.



RURAK HALTS FRIARS

COAST ARTILLERY FINDS MAHONEY FOR 14 BINGLES P. C. Pitcher, Who Joins Army Wednesday, Receives Purse from Teammates.

A one-hit pitching performance by Carl Rurak halted Providence College in general and Dick Mahoney in particular, as the 10th Coastal Artillery nine of Fort Adams blanked the Friars, 3-0, yesterday afternoon at Hendricken Field. The victors thus evened matters with the Quirkmen, having dropped a 10-9 decision to them two weeks ago.

Mahoney was making his last appearance in a Friar uniform before his induction into the Army Wednesday. He was presented a purse of money by Capt. Bob Reilly on behalf of the rest of his teammates, as both teams gathered around home plate prior to the start of the contest. Once the game got under way, however, the soldiers made Mahoney's departure anything but pleasant as they collected 14 solid hits-one a homer over the right field fence by Leslie Horne-and placed at least one man on base in every inning. Alert defensive play on the part of his mates kept the winners' scoring at a minimum. Especially proficient in this department were Chet Massa, who handled 10 chances with only one miscue at third, and Nick Cariglia, who made a fine recovery play on Lou Russo's liner to left centre, and nailed the latter with a rifle peg to Ed Lee at second base.

Rurak Faces Only 34

Rurak pitched a steady, arm-saving game that had the Friars hitting routine flies and harmless grounders, and was head man all the way. Only 34 batters faced him, and not a base runner advanced further than second base. The only Providence hit, Donahue's double, came with two out in the sixth inning. Rurak fanned three and issued four walks.

The Artillerymen scored all of their runs in the second frame. Horne's bat gave impetus to the attack by driving a homer over the right-field fence. After Moran fanned, Wiaderek was walked, and advanced to third on Cloutier's single to centre. The latter stole second and both men scored on Rurak's single. The next two men up, Quinn and Scalotti, grounded out, ending the inning.

Horne and Russo paced the winners' attack, between them accounting for half of their team's hits. Horne had four for five, while Russo collected three for five.






