

COACH FOR TEAM TO BE SELECTED

Already Schedule Lists Games With Brown. Crusaders, Eagles

Absent from intercollegiate baseball since the Summer of 1942. Providence College, long one of the outstanding powers in the sport in New England, will return to the game next Spring, it was announced yesterday by the Rev. A. B. Begley, O. P., director of athletics at the Dominican college.

Although no decision has been reached regarding a coach, the Friars expect to resume baseball with a strong team, one that will compare favorably with other P. C. nines, which frequently gained the Eastern championship.

Several members of the 1942 team already have returned to college and others are expected when the new semester opens next week. Considerable additional diamond talent is represented among the student body and indications are that the Friars will return to the sport with a talented team.

The Friars will play all their games away from home this Spring. Extensive improvements under way at Hendricken Field make it imperative that the team be a "road" outfit. The field will not be ready for competitive ball until the Spring season has come to an end.

Inactive since the summer of 1942 when the exigencies of war caused a temporary suspension of baseball at the College, the Friars are looking forward to attaining again the heights they reached under the capable guidance of the late Jack Flynn, Jack Egan, and Dr. Arthur Quirk. Unlege several times annexed the Eastern Intercollegiate Baseball Championship.

The 1942 squad spoiled an otherwise perfect collegiate record by losing their last game to Williams College by a 2-1 score in extra innings. Several members of that 1942 squad are already back in college and others expect to be out of service in time for the spring term.

According to reports, there is also considerable new material among the enrolled students and it appears that there will be several competing for every position when practice is called.

This spring the Friars will be playing more or less informally but by the 1947 season they expect to be once more in full

Because of extensive improvements being planned on Hendricken Field, all games this season will be played away from home. Several games have been scheduled already and it is hoped that the completed schedule will list many of the Friar's old time rivals.

Games with Brown University, Holy Cross and Boston College will highlight the season.


The 1946 Providence College baseball schedule lists games beginning with American International College, April 27, and closing with Brown University, June 1. Since Hendricken Field is not available this season the Friars are playing their entire schedule away from home.

This is Coach Dona Maynard's first season at Providence College and he is far from being pessimistic as he guides his squad through its practice sessions. Over 80 men reported to him at the beginning of the season but the squad now numbers slightly over 30. Coach Maynard has promised no further cuts until the first game.

Although out of intercollegiate baseball during the war years, the current Providence College squad contains several veterans from the 1942 team. Competition is still stiff for every position and although this pleases the new mentor no end, nevertheless he admits that on several positions it is going to be difficult to make decisions.

Friars' New Pilot Coached

Donat Maynard, a conspicuous success as coach of the Pawtucket Slaters during the last five years and pilot of the East Providence High School team that went to the finals in the Interscholastic League's championships last Spring, has been appointed baseball coach at Providence College.

The Rev. A. B. Begley, O. P., director of athletics at P. C., announced Maynard's selection last

The Friars' baseball teams have long been among the leaders in the East, but Maynard will start from the very beginning again, inasmuch as baseball was a wartime casualty at the Dominican college. The Friars will play a rugged schedule next Spring, and, adding to the team's problem is an all-road-game pro-

A teacher-coach at East Providence, Maynard resigned from his post with the Slaters early this year and accepted an offer to manage the Burlington, Vt., team in the Northern League during the Summer. The league's schedule opens June 15 and

A graduate of St. Raphael Academy, Pawtucket, in 1929, the Friars' new coach was regular catcher at Holy Cross during his college days and subsequently signed a Red Sox contract, Remaining several seasons in the Sox farm chain, he played for Reading, Hazelton and Galveston.

After his catching chores with Galveston, in the Texas League, Maynard became manager of the Federalsburg, Md., team in the Eastern Shore League, He took command of the Slaters in 1940 and consistently kept his team at or near the top of New England League competition.

Last Spring taking charge of the Townies, he developed a fast smart team that won divisional honors among the schoolboys but lost to Warren High School in general and Roger Higgins in particular in the title series.

A hustling ball player himself, Maynard has developed teams that hustled and because of that turned impending defeat into victory on many occasions. Under him, the Slaters were very successful in exhibitions against major league clubs.

He will report at Providence College shortly and plans to call his candidates for indoor work in preparations for the day when the squad may move outdoors. Material is something of a problem at P. C. this season, but there are several returned war veterans in college who saw service with the Friars before joining the colors. Because of them as well as the influx of recent scholastic stars, a representative team confidently is expected.

Donat G. Maynard has been appointed baseball coach at Providence College, according to an announcement today by the Rev. A. P. Begley, O. P., director of athletics at the college. Maynard's appointment comes with the resumption of intercollegiate baseball, in-


terrupted by the war.

While Maynard has not made definite plans for this year's Friar team, he is expected to call battery candidates to begin intensive indoor drills within the next few days. The Providence schedule, still in the making, will not list home games because Hendricken field is undergoing extensive repairs.

Maynard first began his baseball career at St. Raphael Academy, from which he was graduated in 1929. At Holy Cross he starred as varsity catcher under Jack Barry, famed Holy Cross coach.

After his graduation from Holy Cross in 1933, Maynard signed a Boston Red Sox contract and saw considerable action with team's farm system at Reading of the New York-Pennsylvania circuit, now the Eastern League, and later at Hazelton.

In 1935 and 1936 he played with Galveston in the Texas League and while with that club suffered an accident that threatened to ruin his baseball career. While catching, Maynard fractured several bones in his right hand. He did not return to organized ball, however, he did resume playing with Burlington in the Northern League in 1939. In 1941 Maynarad took over the



reins of the Pawtucket Slaters in the New England League and piloted them through five successful seasons.

Maynard has been active in the Pawtucket and East Providence school systems as a teacher and coach of athletics. He taught in Pawtucket schools for seven years and was assistant coach to Pard Pearce in football and baseball at East High from 1940 to 1942. He later took over the position of di-rector of athletics of the Pawtucket school system.

Maynard left Pawtucket schools in September, 1944, to go to East Providence where he has been teaching and serving as head coach in baseball and assistant coach in football and hockey. Under his guid-ance East Providence won the first Class A Baseball Championship in the school's history in 1945.

With his appointment to Providence College, Maynard will give way to Clem Fascitelli as baseball coach at East Providence, but will remain as assistant football and hockey coach. Fascitelli coached the Townies prior to entering the service.

The Providence College nine will play an exhibition game with the Pawtucket Staters at the Pawtucket Stadium this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Friars' new coach, Dona Maynard, hopes that this pre-season game will enable him to evaluate his players and facilitate the selection of a varsity.

Of the 30 men now vying for positions on the varsity, only a few are considered sure of their berths. Maynard apparently considers George O'Reilly, a right-handed hurler, as the gem of his pitching staff. O'Reilly was with the Friars in '42 before he went into the service. The mound staff is rounded off with George Hindle, "Red" O'Halloran, Tom Carberry, Brad McDermott, Tom Keenan and AI Dodd. The latter three toss from the port side.

Both manager Hugh Wise of the Slaters and Maynard said they plan to use all of the candidates for their respective squads in this afternoons' tussle, which will probably be 'extended beyond the 9-inning route. The Pawtucket club will use five pitchers against the Friars. Lou Forys a member of last years' club will start for the Slaters.

Both lineups are studded with war veterans. With the Friars are: Lou Savage and Shadow Shadoian, who toiled for St. Raphael and Classical respectively during their high school days and who were wounded seriously while fighting in Europe. The Slaters also have several Purple-Heart wearers on their club.

Varnum T. Barber, president of the Slaters, announced that the public is invited to watch the game this afternoon. The stadium gates will be open at 1:30 o'clock and no admission will be charged.

The Friars will open their college season against the American Internationals at Springfield a week from today.

Friars' Maynard Has New Kind Of Trouble; Whole Team Is Good

Dona Maynard, coach of the Providence College baseball team, suffers from an odd type of "coaching headache"—all of his candidates are good. Maynard recently cut his squad to 30 players and now he is having a difficult time trying to decide which 20 he will retain as the varsity squad.

"All of the boys are good players", said Maynard, "they all seem to be able to field and hit with dependability. I don't think that I will make any more official cuts, but because our schedule consists of road games only, I can't keep a team of 30 players. Therefore, I intend to select a varsity of about

20 and nurse the other boys for future seasons."

By this method of coaching Maynard probably hopes to keep his varsity "on the ball" since the reserve of 10 players will suffice to eliminate any lackadaisical exhibitions from the varsity.

Before the Friars open their season officially with the American International nine at Springfield on April 27, they will play an exhibition with the Pawtucket Slaters this Saturday. Although a few of his players are going home during the Spring vacation, Maynard hopes that this game will belp him select his varsity.

The field for the special distance race in Saturday's second annual Providence College Invitation Track Meet was considerably strengthened yesterday with the receipt of entries from George Wade of Yale and Phil Thigpen of Seton Hall.

Wade and Thigpen will join John Joe Barry of Ireland in a race which Harry Coates, the meet director, has set at three-quarters of a mile. Coates explained that he decided on this distance in order to give Thigpen, a 1000-yard specialist, an equal chance with milers Barry and Wade.

Fox in Special 320 Coates also announced that Frank Fox, the former Seton Hall 600-yard champion who won the P. C. special 550 last year, will compete again in the middle-distance special which will go 320 yards Saturday.

Other entries received yesterday include the crack Seton Hall mile relay team of Bob Carter, Charley Slade, Harry Bright and the fourth member who is either Stanfield or Thigpen; Don Evans, New Jersey schoolboy sprint champion last sea-son; Ed Scott of the Warrinanco A.C. of N.J., who was Scott's predecessor as king of New Jersey schoolboy dashmen; and Brown University's two Tobey Twins, Jonathan and Joshua.

Evans and Scott will compete in the open AAU handicap 60-yard dash, Jon Tobey will run the handicap 600 and Josh will be in the mile

handicap.

Wade who holds the mile record at Yale at 4:13.1, has run against Barry several times this season. The Eli star won the Boston K. of C. and the Heptagonal mile runs. The only time he crossed the tape ahead of the Irish champion, however, was at the Hub Casey meet.

The Rev. A. B. Begley, O. P., athetic moderator at Providence College, announced yesterday that the co-captains of this season's Friar nine are pitcher George O'Reilly of Centredale and catcher Marius Guatieri of Pawtucket. Both are seniors, war veterans and played with the Friar baseball team of 1942.

After having hustled his squad through intense practice sessions during the week in preparation for the opening game against American International this afternoon at Blunt Park in Springfield, the Friars' new coach, Dona Maynard, has selected the following men to make the trip: Marius Guatieri and Walt Modliszewski, catchers; Walt Angelone and Charley Shadoian, first basemen; Paul McCormack, second baseman; Johnny Barchi and Matt Campbell, shortstops; and Joe Parsons and Leo La Bossiere, third basemen. The probable starting outfield will be Joe Callahan in left, Bob Corey in center and Ralph Mattera, an all-State outfielder for Cranston, in right. Tom Burns and "Doc" Savage will make the trip as utility infielder and outfielder, respectively.

Maynard is taking along a staff of four pitchers, George O'Reilly, Tom O'Halloran, George Hindel and a southpaw, Tom Keenan. O'Halloran is slated to start. He and the third baseman, Joe Parsons, hail, from Springfield and played on the Cathedral High School team.

"We'll probably make mistakes at Springfield," said Maynard, "but we're intent on correcting our faults. A few of my boys have some natural ability which makes them fundamentally good—but they are not polished ball players."



The New Orleans Pelicans conducted the first tryout camp of the season at Hendricken Field on Wednesday and Thursday and today and tomorrow they'll stage another camp at St. Ann's Park, Woonsocket, under the direction of Roy Dissinger. These camps always bring out ambitious boys eager for an opportunity in baseball but the chances were never better for such a boy than they are today.

Monday and Tuesday, the St. Louis Cardinals, with "Pop" Kelchner and Joe Cusiok in control, will conduct a 2-day camp at Pierce Memorial Field, East Providence. And later the Boston Braves and the Boston Post selection committee will be at Mc-Coy Stadium in Pawtucket.

And throughout the country it's the same story. In New England alone there is a great chance. The Brooklyn Dodgers move into Springfield, Mass., next week. Dissinger will conduct other camps in Connecticut. He's already been to Worcester, Mass. Metropolitan New York papers are seeking the best talent on the New York sandlots and there is also the Esquire All-America game. In each case boys get a chance to make that dream come a little closer—the dream of being a major league ball player.

Yesterday Roy was discussing boys' improvement in baseball and he Jackie Regan as an example. Jackie helped him at Cranston before the war and he improved, traveling from one camp to another as one of Roy's assistants. He played with Hamilton, Ont., and Allentown, Pa., in the St. Louis Cardinal chain. He never got to the majors because the war came along and he went off to sea with the U. S. Navy.


2-Day Baseball Tryout Camp Is Scheduled Here

Drew will have varsity and junior varsity teams and the Jayvees will make their debut Saturday, too, meeting La Salle.

The Friars will have 11 home games, playing nine of them in the City Gym. They will meet Rhode Island State in another home game at the Auditorium and will be hosts to Brown in the Brown Gym for their half of the home-and-home series with the Bruins.

The Friars have begun to smooth out ragged spots in their play and, as Drew explains, will have to depend upon speed to compensate for their lack of height. Only three of them are more than six feet tall, Sullivan, the biggest, going 6-4.

The St. Anselm engagement is likely to prove the testing ground and it will serve to help Drew in picking the men he will use on his top team. Because of the numerical smallness of his squad, Drew probably will have to use some of the Jayvees as replacements in varsity games.


Uconns Change Pair of Games; Seeking Hangar

Storrs, Conn., Dec. 5.—(AP)—The University of Connecticut today postponed two of its home basketball games until later in the season in the hope of obtaining an army surplus hangar which could be transformed into a basketball court accommodating many more spectators than the armory which is used currently.

George Van Bibber, athletic director, said university authorities were negotiating for a hangar and had high hopes of obtaining it before the season ends. If successful, he said, the entire student body could be accommodated at games, and it might be possible to sell tickets to outsiders.

The armory accommodations are so limited that the university has arranged a system permitting students to see every other game, but all outsiders and even the faculty have been denied admittance to any of the eight contests scheduled here. There are about 3000 students on the campus.

Under the schedule shifts announced tonight Connecticut will play Brown at Providence on Dec. 11 and here on Feb. 22 instead of vice versa. The Providence College game, scheduled here for Dec. 8, has been postponed to March 12.

It is becoming an accepted axiom in basketball circles nowadays that it pays to have a big man around and Providence College was thankful it had Capt. Jack Sullivan last night, for the big fellow personally guided the Friars to a handsome 67-59 opening victory over St. Anselm College of Manchester. N. H., at the City Gym.

It was a pity that more of basket-ball's local followers couldn't have witnessed last night's tussle than the 850 patrons who jammed the small confines of the City High School's gymnasium and were treated to some thrill-a-minute action, far above the expected opening-game variety.

Last night's rivals were coached by two former teammates at Providence College, Larry Drew, whose debut was a grand success, and Ted-McConnon, who had to be content with the consolation prize, although it can be said that he has a fine team and his Hawks impressed the assemblage even in defeat. Led by Chuck Tobin, former De La Salle brilliant, St. Anselm, like the Friars, featured the fast break and kept the ball moving all the time. Defensively, the Hawks harried the P. Cers no little with their close man-to-man guarding and their rather frequent ball stealing.

The issue actually was in doubt right up to the final minute, although the Friars led most of the way. The Hawks moved ahead early in the first half, prevailing 6-3 and 8-5 during the first six minutes. Two minutes later, however, the Providence College forces took the lead on a brace of foul shots by Sullivan and Walt Lozoski's basket

From this point on the Friars learned what it's like to pay the price of a winner against such a persistent foe as the Hawks proved themselves to be, for the locals were unable to widen the scoring gap by more than five points. Their margin at half-time was 33-30

The Hawks moved back in the ball game shortly after the start of the second half when John Rabbitt, fouled twice in succession, converted three successful foul shots and tied the count at 33-all. Sullivan then popped in the fourth of his seven foul shots and LaZoski followed with a long tom form the side and once again Larry Drew's charges were riding high. Their main concern at this stage was the temporary loss of Ferd Sowa, capable guard who had collected his fourth personal but the subsequent work of his substitute, Cy Killian, enabled all hands to revert to the first order of business—beating the Hawks.

For a long time Brown has adhered strictly to a policy of playing its home games in Marvel Gymnasium, even avoiding tempting offers made by the assorted gardens, which make possible vast attendances. But times change and customs do too, so this Winter Brown will meet Rhode Island State and Providence College on the polished boards at the R. I. Auditorium.

Dr. Walter H. Snell, in announcing this drastic departure from policy, explained that the home court of the Bruins, seating upwards of 2000 persons, is inadequate for the throngs that will assemble for the Bruins' battles with the Rams and Friars. State and PC, too, are feeling the same effects, both being confronted by the impossible problem of seating two students where only one seat

BROWN UNIVERSITY has decided to play two of her bigger basketball games of the season at the Rhode Island Auditorium, and that is a break for Providence and surrounding plantations. Brown will meet Rhode Island State in the North Main Street arena on Feb. 25 and Providence College there on March 11. Both games were originally scheduled for Brown's Marvel Gymnasium, where about 2000 can be seated against 7000 (for basketball) in the Auditorium.

The shift is welcomed not only by the followers of Brown basketball but also by the followers of the game as played by State and Providence College-most of whom will be following their favorites by proxy this

year.

There will be no public sale of tickets for home games at either State or Providence College this year. State romps in Rodman Hall, into which maybe 1100 spectators can be crowded, and 1800 season tickets have already been issued to students. Alumni, and clearly the public at large, are simply out of luck until such time as a larger gymnasium is built down in Kingston.

At Providence and Brown ...

The situation at Providence College is just as acute. The Friars are playing their home games in the City Gymnasium, which should be called by some other name out of respect to the population of this fair municipality. Maybe 850 could be squeezed into the antiquated structure, if there were not many heavyweights in the crowd.

It can be seen that Rhode Island is going to follow the Rams and the Friars mostly by reading about them in the newspapers or hearing

about them over the radio.

The situation at Brown is better, but slightly so. Five hundred tickets for each game will be set aside for public sale, and these will be supplemented by any not picked up by students before a specified deadline. It can be guessed that Brown will play most of her home games before a full house, but there is at least a chance for Gus Phan to buy his way into Marvel Gymnasium. But except for the games Brown has shifted to the Auditorium, State and Providence College will not be exposed to the public gaze in Rhode Island.

In the Gardens ...

Anybody who cannot wait until Feb. 25 to see the Rams in action. might catch them in Madison Square Garden Jan. 4, or in Boston Garden on Jan. 21. It would be a good idea to get in ticket applications early-especially for the New York game which is a lead-pipe cinch to be a sellout what with the horde of enthusiastic friends the Rams made by their showing in the national tournament there last Spring. State will be playing St. John's in the New York Garden, Bucknell in Boston.

The transfer of the two games to the Auditorium marks a departure from Brown policy. Although the Bruins have played in Mr. Pieri's arena to help raise money for a service fund and for the student union that is going to be built at State, they have been reluctant up until now about playing regularly scheduled games in large, rented halls.

The way for a departure from established policy was paved when Brown consented to meet Boston College in the Boston Arena. This game is to be played Jan, 7. If Brown could do it in Boston, Brown

could do it in Providence.

The reasons for the original reluctance to play outside of Marves Gymnasium are more or less obvious and need not be studied at great length. For one point, some promoters have been overly commercial in their attempts to exploit college basketball.

Changing Times ...

But times have changed. Greatly increased student enrollments and the mounting popularity of basketball have combined to make many college gymnasiums too small for the purposes for which they were originally designed. Last year Harvard broke from tradition and played some of her games in the Boston Arena. This year Harvard will play Princeton in the Boston Garden.

Rhode Island will have her only real chances of watching her own when Brown moves into the Auditorium to play State on Feb. 25 and Providence College on March 11. The sobering thought is that there will still be some good people left on the outside if all three of these colleges have a good basketball season in point of games won.

Boston College, featuring the tallest basketball player in collegiate ranks, will oppose Providence College tonight in the City Gym at 8:45 o'clock, after the Friar Jayvees and Marianapolis have opened the pro-

gram at 7:15 o'clock.

Coach Al (General) McClellan, former, Providence College and St. Anselm coach, is directing the Eagles, who have dropped two of their first three games to classy opposition. LaSalle of Philadelphia and Georgetown tripped the Eagles, 76-41 and 70-56, but BC defeated Siena 46 to 37.

This BC squad is one of the biggest extant, Elmore Morganthaler, from Amarillo, Texas, being the biggest of all in collegiate ranks. He stretches 7 feet, 1 inch above the floor and is a consistently high scorer. Last year he racked up 595 points while pastiming for the New Mexico School of Mines. He is a Freshman at BC.

Seating Exceeds 5000

Although the greatest floor space in the 4-floor building will necessarily be apportioned to basketball, the area is sufficiently large to be converted into three courts for intramural games, as is Brown's, and will be able to accommodate more than 5000 spectators at varsity games. The permanent balcony seats, on the top floor, and the folding bleachers abutting the court itself will be so arranged that games can be seen equally well from all parts of the audito-

Careful plans for varsity sports are included in the intentions, but the emphasis will be on the physical education program outlined and instituted at P. C. by Ed Crotty during his coaching and physical education direction days there.

A full program has been arranged, one that must await the construction of the gymnasium for its execution but one that is so well set up that it will be able to begin functioning immediately after the plant is completed.

Physical education offices, locker and shower rooms, drying rooms, instructors' offices, wrestling, boxing, fencing and similar quarters will be installed on the main floor, surrounding the large basketball court.

No Crowding

By installing individual lockers, there will be space for more than 1400 students and the dressing and shower rooms will be sufficiently large to insure no crowding.

·A "correction room," a hall of mirrors wherein posture and minor deformities may be corrected, is included in the plans. Such a room has produced great good at Yale and PC hopes to attain the same results. A general exercise room, accommodating 75 students at one time, also is planned so that the P. E. program may continue uninterrupted even when varsity sports are in progress in the main basketball court, where, under ordinary conditions, the physiical education classes will be conducted.

Handball courts and a game room will be on the ground floor, large enough to give recreation and moderate exercise to scores of students during their free time.

Eliminate Confusion

With a theme of hygiene and health promotion underlying the entire program, the plans are such that those aims can readily be furthered. The varsity quarters, on the ground floor, will be entered by a private ramp from out-of-doors and lead to a cycle that will tend to eliminate confusion, keep soiled clothing grouped and proceded through drying rooms, where uniforms just shed will be left, to shower, drying, rubbing and dressing rooms so that the athlete enters in uniform and emerges in street clothes without lingering in any one part of the quar-

This arrangement for expediting dressing under the most hygienic conditions also will prevail in the physical education section.

A modern laundry, coaches rooms, physicians and officials offices as well as faculty rooms are included as are varsity and visitors dormitories, complete with study halls and lounges.

NThe college, eager to erect this needed addition to its physical makeup, is not rushing headlong into construction but is biding its time until building supplies are more easily obtainable. As one official explained, a few years are negligible in the life of a college when long-range plans are being outlined for the greater good of many generations of students.

Grimshaw has three more games to boost his present 4-year scoring record total of 917. Woody will wind up his brilliant career against



CAPACITY CROWD SEES FRIARS GAIN HANDY VICTORY

Grimshaw Gets 19, Zuber 15 for Bruins; Sullivan Paces

Using its fast break to the fullest advantage, the Providence College basketball team scored a surprising but nonetheless well-earned 68-58 triumph over Brown before a capacity throng of 2100 last night at Marvel Gym.

The victory put the Friars ahead in the race for the City title and left them tied with the Rams in the State series, the latter having also defeated Brown, Wednesday,

The Friars made some mistakes last night but the beauty of it was they made them early and with Coach Larry Drew making frequent and strategic substitutions, they corrected them without undue delay and galloped to their first notable victory of the season.

The Bruins had their moments, too, but theirs was a situation of coming too early with too little and arriving too late with the type of play that could have cinched the ball game.

Bears Inaccurate

During the first half the Bears moved the ball well despite the tenacious guarding of the Friars and had an abundance of shots at the hoop but tossed these golden opportunities to the four winds through inaccurate marksmanship.

While the Friars were having their troubles with the aforementioned miscues during the opening minutes the Bears enjoyed leads of 4-2, 6-5 and 8-5, but after Charley Bresnahan's basket and Walt Lozoski's foul shot tied the score at 8-all, Larry Drew's charges moved ahead, 10-8, on Art Weinstock's 1-hander from the side at the 5-minute mark.

At this point the competitive tempo was stepped up appreciably and produced exciting though erratic play, causing both teams to miss easy shots and pass poorly until Capt. Woody Grimshaw called a time-out when the clock had reached eight minutes, with P. C. leading, 13-12.

A few seconds after play resumed, Hal Miller pierced the halo with a long set shot, sending Brown ahead, 14-13. A minute later Sullivan scored on a tap-in from under the basket and the Friars remained in the driver's seat until the final whistle.

At half-time they led, 31-25, and kept running away from the Bruins during the final session, reaching the 16-minute station with a 66-46 lead. Then followed Brown's best scoring spree of the game but it couldn't possibly hope to erase the Friars' healthy margin. With the Zuber brothers accounting for nine points, the Bruins outscored the visitors, 12-2 during the last four minutes.



P. C. Roars Back





The Saint Raphael Jayvees beat the Slater Junior High team, 34-31, in the opener.







Surprising Friars Make Holy Cross Earn 14th Straight

Basketball Victory

The Holy Cross Crusaders, one of the East's ranking basketball powers, met a stubborn foe in Providence College last night at the City Gymnasium, but the confident Crusaders turned back the surprising Friars, 59 to 50, running their current winning string to 14 straight games.

The game had all the aspects of a championship struggle, with more aggressive play than usual, as the Friars played their best game of the season in an effort to topple the capable Holy Cross contingent.

"They all give us a battle these days," Coach "Doggie" Julian said after the rugged game, but the combination of a cocky Cross team and a hard fighting Providence outfit were some of the ingredients that brought out an exciting, if not a refined contest.

At times Holy Cross was the unbeatable combination that you would expect from a team that has won 18 out of 21 games from some of the country's better teams, but at other times they were not so smooth, and the Friars' scrambling type of guarding and rough contact threw them off stride.

It was far from the easy game that some fans expected, with Providence exhibiting more effective play than anybody thought them capable of showing against a top-flight team. The contact was heavy on both sides, with 38 fouls called, but only one man left the floor because of five fouls.

The Cross played a better brand of ball in the first half. At times they scored baskets with ease and finesse, while the Friars had to struggle for theirs. George Kaftan played a fine game for the Crusaders, taking scoring honors with 22 points, while Bob Curran, Dermott O'Connell and Bob Cousy contributed some sparkling play. The pass work of Joe Mullaney and Ken Haggerty often set up the scores, although sloppy ball handling sometimes nullified down floor effectiveness.

Jack Sullivan, Robert "Cy" Killian and Walt Lozoski sparked the Providence surge, with Sullivan playing one of the best games of his college career. Killian, a good backboard man, accounted for 20 points, while Sullivan scored 18 Lozoski set up plays and came through with defensive maneuvers offsetting the Cross' busy pass work.

Although Holy Cross was never headed after taking a 4-0 lead, the Friars were fairly close in the first half, trailing 13-8 at the 6:30 mark, and 16-10 about 10 minutes along. Kaftan, netting 11 points in the first 15 minutes, was the main scorer as the Crusaders took an 8-point edge, 25-17. However, Coach Julian put in fresh players and the Crusaders, with Frank Laska dropping in five successive points, held a 31-19 edge at halftime.

The Cross lengthened its lead to 35-21 and 48-29 in the first 10 minutes of the second half, but the Friars fought back and gradually whittled down the Worcester margin. With five minutes left, Holy Cross still led, 54-39, but P. C. sharp shooting and smart floor work cut it down to nine points at the finish.

The Friars outscored the Cross in the second half, 31 to 28. The Cross sunk 15 foul shots out of 21 tries, while P. C. dropped in 10 out of 22. The tenseness and spirited play almost led to blows late in the game.

Ray St. George scored 22 points as the P. C. Junior Varsity rallied in the second half after leading by one point, 23-22, at half time, and defeated Nichols Junior College, 55 to 38.



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

Of the 14 games to date, the Rams have won the 10 tilts played at Kingston and three of their four tests on foreign courts. Four of State's regulars are grouped close together not far behind Allen, indi-cating a fairly even distribution of talent among this year's players. It is also interesting to note that every member of the 23-man squad has taken part in the scoring.

Reports from the State camp reveal that the Rams are quite concerned over the Friars especially in view of the so-so performance the Keaneymen turned in in their last outing against Coast Guard coupled with the Friars' impressive play in

the Holy Cross contest.

It is expected that Coach Keaney will again make use of his abundant reserve strength in an attempt to wear down the Friars and will probably start with Allen at center, Al Palmieri and Sal Sclafani at the guards and Bob Ulles and Bruce Blount at the forwards.

RAMS HAVE TROUBLE CLAMPING 73-64 SETBACK ON FRIARS

Ken Goodwin Leads Drive That Clinches State Victory

5084 See Rivals in Clash Like Tight Struggles of Prewar Days

In a game that kept 5084 patrons tottering on the verge of hysteria the Rhode Island State Rams fought tooth and nail with an inspired Providence College aggregation and finally subdued the Fighting Friars, 73-64 last night at the R. I. Auditorium.

Underlying the pandemonium was the determined stand the underdog Friars took from the opening whistle and which they maintained until the waning minutes when State's superior forces asserted themselves with gusto and gained the eventual victory.

The score was deadlocked seven times, P. C. led eight times and State prevailed on seven occasions before taking their eighth and final lead with seven minutes remaining. At this point the Rams went ahead, 60-59 on Bob Ulles lay-up shot and increased their margin to 62-59 when Don Shannon converted a nifty pass from Jack Allen.

Friars Draw Up

Foul shots by Art Weinstock and Walt Lozoski enabled the Friars to draw up, 61-62, with a little more than five minutes to go. This was the last real stand for the tiring Drewmen, however, as the Rams dominated the play down the stretch and moved into a 69-63 advantage during the next two minutes as Big Ken Goodwin dumped in six of the Keaneymen's next seven points.

He registered his first basket on a pivot shot, promptly sank a brace of fouls after being fouled by Ferd Sowa and then climaxed a beautiful stolen-ball play by Allen by depositing a simple lay-up toss. Ulles tallied the seventh point during this critical drive on a foul conversion.

The Rams then elected to put on the familiar Rhody freeze and showed they certainly have the operatives to do it thoroughly. They prevented the Friars from tallying a basket during the final three minutes while adding four more points to their total.

During the excitement, two Friars were fouled in the act of shooting but only one conversion resulted as the second shot was waived both times in favor of taking the ball out of bounds. On both occasions, however, the Friars lost possession of the ball to alert State defenders before getting a shot away.

The Friars gave early warning that the game would be anything but a rout for the favored Rams, After Jim Littlefield looped in a 1-hander from the corner 40 seconds from the opening tap-off, Allen converted a brace of fouls tying the score at 2-all. Providence then galloped with gay abandon and moved into an 18-10 lead at the 9-minute mark.

At this point Harry Donabedian was sent in for Capt, Al Nichols and he provided the spark which sent the Keaneymen off on a merry scoring spree. He sank four baskets during the drive that enabled State to overtake the Friars and reach the intermission with a 40-35 lead.

To be sure, the game had its stars but, with a few minor exceptions, every player competing played championship ball considering the tense atmosphere that prevailed throughout.

Jack Allen played the entire game for State and did an excellent job as playmaker. Big Ken Goodwin made a whale of a difference to the Rams in the second half for in addition to his scoring he grabbed a major share of the rebounds.

For the Friars; Lozoski's court acumen, Killian's consistent work in the rebound department and McCormack's accurate sniping were the highlights of an inspired performance.

The game was never rough, although the ever-increasing tension caused 52 fouls to be called, 28 against Providence and 24 against the Rams. The Friars lost Killian and Lozoski and the Keaneymen lost Palmieri on fouls in the closing minutes.

Fighting Friars, 73-64, 5084 Fans Roar Approval; Lead Shifts Many Times

Speed And Stamina Of Rams Important Factors In Late Drive To Victory; Killian And Shannon Play Well

Providence College's basketball team, playing the role of underdog, rose up in a mighty surge at the R. I. Auditorium last night and subjected the Rhode Island State Rams to some hectic moments, but in the end the speed and stamina of the Gingston crew were telling factors and the Friars went down to a 73-64 defeat amid the roars of 5084 customers.

It was certainly a bad night for those Rhody fans who trekked to the Arena to see their Rams "waltz" to victory over a Providence quinter that was supposed to be a pushover. Rhode Island did not waltz at all, in fact at times the Rams seemed to be on the verge of staggering under the terrific rush of the ever-fichting Private. rific rush of the ever-fighting Friars, who were close to a major basketball upset throughout the speedy

Five times during the action, the deadly rivals were all tied, the scores being 23-23, 25-25, 49-49, 50-50 and 52-52. Providence College, grabbing the lead at the outset, held on for almost 13 minutes in the opening half and then relipthe opening half and then relinquished the "front-seat." Turee times in the second half, the Friars held the lead, but it was always a case of the Ram butting ahead

STATE'S SHOOTING OFF State had its hard times because it did not shoot well, with Jackie Allen, one of the team's most consistent scorers, having one of his few bad nights in the scoring department, although he did some fine passing. The lion's share of the scoring and glory went to elongated Ken Goodwin, State's new "splinter," who poured in 21 points and just about carried his team to victory. The Rams, composed to a great extent of freshmen, did not quit under fire and it was mainly through their persistent scrap and

drive that they won.

Naturally, the losers came in for the big share of the plaudits because of their fine showing against a team that was rated in pre-game figures as a 10 to 15-point favorite. Pawtucket's Cy Killian, grabbing rebounds as if they were precious doilar bills, was defensively great. Walt Lozoski, a balding cageer whose all-around brilliance was the Friars' chief peer, but these two stalwarts, like the rest of the Smith Hillers, lacked the stamina to carry on all the way and the well-conditioned Rhode Island State gang capitalized on

Jim Littlefield caged the game's first two points, but Allen knotted the count with two foul conversions. During the early moments of the first half, P. C. led, 7-4, 9-6, 12-9 and 18-10. Working the ball slowly, the Friars dashed in for close shots time and again. The Keaneymen, on the other hand, were tossing from hither and you in their anxiety.

main scoring mates along with
Ferdie Sowa as Providence continued to lead. McCormack wound up with 12 points and Sowa had 11. As the big clock passed the 12 minute mark, State began to move faster and P. C. began to slow down. At 13 minutes State went ahead for the first time on two foul conversions by Goodwin. Now it was Harry Donabedian's turn to steal the thunder.

Donabedian, grabbed off the bench by Keaney in a first half that saw the Rams use 11 different combinations, provided the needed spark. The Friars had the count knotted at 25-25 on big Jim Sullivan's nifty rebound with six minutes to go, but Donabedian sparked a nine-point outburst and

State went ahead, 34-25. That rally supplied the winners with the impetus to lead at the intermission,

Rested and ready when the sec-ond half opened, Providence jumped back into the lead. Killian, who had not tallied a single field goal, left his defensive post for a moment, pushed in a layup and P. C. was ahead again, 45-44. As time wore on, the pace quickened. McCormack boosted the lead to 47-44 on a spectacular jump-shot but then State came flying back with unerring accuracy from the foul line. Five foul conversions by State and two by Lozoski and the tussel was tied at 49-all.

During the next three minutes, the lead changed hands more often than a Canadian dime. With eight minutes left in the titanic struggle, Killian scored after taking a pass from Lozoski. That gave P. C. a 59-58 lead. Then Don Shannon, little Pawtucket cager, came in for

the Rams. Big Bobby Ulles caged a "sucker" shot and it was Shannon, fighting madly who grabbed a rebound from at least six players taller than himself and tossed it to Ulles for the score. Don then pushed in a layup and State led 62-59. Art Weinstock converted a foul and opportunist Lozoski added another free throw to cut the margin to one point again. Five and one-half minutes remained.

Then came the spurt that gave Rhody the victory. Goodwin, really playing great ball, caged six points. Ulles got two and at the automatic time out, P. C. trailed, 69-61. From this point to the end, State put on a "freeze" and in doing so, forced its way in for two easy layups and in addition, was presented numerous foul shots as P. C. attempted to break up the stalling tactics.

Foul conversions were important in the Rams' victory as they sank 23 out of 31. In the final half both teams scored 10 baskets from the floor, but State made 13 of 17 foul shots while P. C. made nine of 14. During the game, the Friars made 16 out of 27 foul shots. Fifty fouls were called during the fast action, 26 against P. C. and 24 on Rhode Island.

State's JV team won the preliminary, 74-44 as Walt Bassler, former East Providence player, got 24 points.

WILLIAMS SPARKS FRIARS TO VICTORY

P. C. Upsets Springfield, 61-59, on Field Goal in Final Minute of Game

Springfield, Mass., Feb. 22.—With Paul Williams in the hero's role Providence College sprang an upset here today when the Friars defeated Springfield College's basketball team, 61 to 59, in a thrilling game that renewed a holiday series be-tween the court rivals. Previously Springfield had won at Providence.

When Springfield went ahead midway in the third period, mainly through the sensational shooting of Wilbur Renken, it appeared that the Friars were in for another licking. But Coach Larry Drew made some clever player moves, chief of which was the insertion of Williams into the fray, and the shooting of this dusky star spelled the difference between victory and defeat.

Williams made the winning basket with a minute left to play and tossed in four other doubledeckers in Providence's comeback fight.

Providence went off to a 4-1 lead but Springfield soon got going and led until the final minutes of the first half, although by no more than several points. Then John Sullivan, 6foot, 4-inch guard for the Friars, went into action and tossed two floor soals that tied the count at 18-18. Before the half was up the lead changed hands twice more, but the rivals were tied at the half, 24-24.

Early in the second half Renken took personal charge and his brilliant shooting paced the Maroons as they built up a 10-point margin, 42-32. It was at this point that Williams asserted himself. He tied the count at 51 at 51-all. Renken sent Springfield into the van again but Bresnahan's goal tied it at 53-53.

P.C. Puts Up Real Struggle After Falling Behind, 15 to 1

Crusaders Create Record for Season While Registering 19th Straight Victory

Worcester, March 3.—The classy Crusaders of Holy Cross, operating in the 2-platoon system until the late stages when Coach Doggy Julian put the rest of his squad on display, defeated Providence College in the South High gym tonight, 93 to 66.

It was an evening of unprecedented efforts, for not only did the Crusaders hit their peak in point production, eclipsing their previous record of 90 made against Boston College recently, but the Friars, in scoring 66 points, did a better job on the H. C. defense than any other team the Crusaders met this season.

19th Straight

In gaining their 19th consecutive victory, the Crusaders spurted into a 15-1 lead in the first five minutes as a new starting combination of George Kaftan, Dermott O'Connell, Frank Oftring, Jim Riley and Bob Cousy thrilled the 1400 fans who jammed the gym to overflowing with as deft, a display of team work as even the most exacting could desire.

That quintet, picket to start because they showed up for practice yesterday, really gave a dazzling show, not only in ball handling but in shooting. The purple clad snipers hit on every one of their first five shots from the floor.

During that opening blast the Friars were utterly unable to make any progress. They worked into scoring position repeatedly but missed with a consistency that must have been disheartening.

Rebounds Scarce

They couldn't get a rebound, the Crusaders' Oftring and Kaftan ruling the roost in that department with a thoroughness that made it imperative that the Friars sink their first shots for the disconcerting reason that they rarely got a chance for a follow up.

TIRED FRIARS DEFEATED

PROVIDENCE CLUB IS SMOTHERED IN STORRS CONTEST

Moss and Dropo Set Pace as
Huskies Close Successful
Campaign, 88-46

Storrs, Conn., March 8.—Paced by four ex-GI's the University of Connecticut wound up its most successful basketball season in history tonight, scoring an 88-46 victory over the Providence College Friars before 1200 fans at the Hawley Armory.

Bob Moss, Walt Dropo, Charlie Muzikevic and Stu Johnson, were the chief scorers for the Huskies, who completed their season with a run of 12 straight victories. It was a most successful night for Coach Hugh Greer for his varsity and jayvees both scored one-sided victories which gave the teams a record of 25 victories in 26 games under his coaching regime at Connecticut this season.

The Friars were overmatched for the third straight time this week, with Connecticut, although not playing at top speed at all times, turning in a convincing victory.

Moss and Dropo, both rangy scorers, were the top point makers with 19 apiece. Moss was a standout in the first half while Dropo, after receiving a nose cut in the first half, came back and played fine ball in the second. Muzikevic, a Purple Heart veteran from Iwo Jima, played his best game of the season and was driving all the way.

The Friars were a tired team after facing Holy Cross and Rhode Island although their poor shooting hurt them more than their physical condition. Paul Williams, Fred Sowa and Art Weinstock were the Friars' top operatives with Williams and Walt Lozoski doing the most creditable work around the boards.

Early in the game, the Friars started out as if they were going to make it a contest, taking a brief lead at 4-2 on baskets by McCormick and Williams. Then Connecticut got its shooting eye, unleashed its fast-breaking attack and rolled up a 16-4 margin. At the 10-minute mark the score was 19-10 in favor of the Huskies. They pulled away in the final six minutes of the period, leading by 18 points at one stage, at 31-13, and at half-time the Friars trailed 35-18.

Connecticut, although playing sound basketball and a fast-moving game in spots, was not up to the form it showed a week'ago in turning back Rhode Island State. Connecticut built up a 53-21 lead early in the second half and led, 64-30, with about 10 minutes remaining. 

Boston College to Play Bruin Five Here Tonight





After "Lefty" Angelone led off-with a single, the satiors committed three successive errors on infield grounders, handing P. C. a trio of tallies. The Friars added to their advantage in the next inning on a walk to Jack McBurney, Ralph Matter's scratch hit to third and a bad throw by Smith that came after a wild pitch by Charlie Baker. McBurney streaked for home on the wild pitch and when Smith threw the ball past Baker trying to cut down the runner Mattera also came around and registered.



Other entries received yesterday include the crack Seton Hall mile relay team of Bob Carter, Charley Slade, Harry Bright and the fourth member who is either Stanfield or Thigpen; Don Evans, New Jersey schoolboy sprint champion last season; Ed Scott of the Warrinanco A.C. of N.J., who was Scott's predecessor as king of New Jersey schoolboy dashmen; and Brown University's two Tobey Twins, Jonathan and Joshua.

Evans and Scott will compete in the open AAU handicap 60-yard dash, Jon Tobey will run the handicap 600 and Josh will be in the mile handicap.

Wade who holds the mile record at Yals at 4:13.1, has run against Barry several times this season. The Eli star won the Boston K. of C. and the Heptagonal mile runs. The only time he crossed the tape ahead of the Irish champion, however, was at the Hub Casey meet.

Thigpen won the Milirose 880, the Boston K. of C., the IC4A and the Chicago 1000-yard runs and placed second in the BAA meet. He beat out Carl Joyce, then of Seton Hall Prep. in last year's P. C. 880.

Rhode Island State College's undefeated basketball team downed Brown, 96-71, at Kingston last night before a packed gathering of the Ram faithful, while Providence College bowed to undefeated Seton Hall at South Orange, N. J., 70-44, before some 3200 persons. While Rhode Island gathered all of the team honors, Woody Grimshaw carried away major individual honors by amassing 33 points.

Rhode Island won the game in the first half, or at least made sure of the conquest in that 20 minutes. 
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
