

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## Cy Killian Signs Yankees Contract

Robert (Cy) Killian, outstanding sophomore basketball and baseball player at Providence College, has signed a contract with the New York Yankees. He is scheduled to report to the Yankees' Newark farm club at the conclusion of the present school term, but will not be eligible to play baseball with the Friars this season.

Killian recently completed his second season with the Friar basketball team and was being counted on for a berth on the Providence College baseball team, either behind the bat or in the outfield. He played the outfield last season and contributed some timely hitting, especially against Boston College.

It is somewhat of a surprise that Killian landed with the Yankees, for the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Boston Braves were believed to have had the inside track. It was known that Killian intended to join some baseball outfit but it was reported that he would put off the signing until the close of the present scholastic year at least. He intends to continue his schooling at P.C., however.

Killian was an outstanding school-boy athlete at St. Raphael Academy before entering Providence. He attracted attention of several baseball men through his work with the Uxbridge team in the Blackstone Valley League, where he played last summer along with other collegians. Although on the slim side, Killian is a long hitter, while others forsee considerable promise in his catching ability.

Tom Whalen, Lynn High School principal and scout for the Yankees, signed Killian to an agreement recently and is believed to have clinched the deal with a bonus offer. Killian made a big impression on Whalen at a baseball school the Yankees conducted at Mansfield, Mass., last summer. He arranged for Killian to make a trip to Plattsburgh, N.Y., to workout under George Selkirk, the former Yankee outfielder who now operates in conjunction with the farm system under George Weiss and Gene Martin.

Commenting on Killian's signing, the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., moderator of athletics at Providence College, said: "We certainly are going to miss him. We had hoped he would play this season with our team, but that's out now."

Killian, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick J. Killian, of 502 Walcott Street, Pawtucket, was the Providence Journal's Honor Roll student-athlete in 1944. He made all-state in both baseball and basketball at St. Raphael and served 22 months in the Navy, mostly in the Pacific. He still hadn't reached his peak in college sports and a brilliant sports future was predicted. He will finish the present term and join the Newark ball club early in June.

## P.C. Baseball Coach Hopeful Despite Gaps

Martin Expects Better Than Average Hurling: Few Veterans on Squad

The skies had just started to weep copiously yesterday, forcing the cancellation of practice, but Coach Hal Martin of the Providence College baseball team refused to make it unanimous. With a rough schedule in the offing and a lot of question marks where veterans played last year, the PC pilot refused to do any crying.

"We might do all right," he said, "and, of course, we might not. We have had some heavy losses and we don't have too many coming up, since freshmen played last year. Last spring we had our best available talent on the squad so our situation now is that we have only what is left from last year." .

There are several veterans around, however, notably Red O'Halloran, regular pitcher; Capt. Bill Angelone, first base; Jim Sullivan, shortstop; Ralph Mattera, center fielder and last year's catchers, Art Weinstock and Herb Ferriter. Of the lot, only

Mattera can be depended upon to hit a long ball. Sullivan, Angelone, and Ferriter look like the best hitters among the other hopefuls but none

of them is a power blaster.

Cy Killian's decision to play pro ball removed the Friars' other longball hitter from the roster and also took away the top catcher. Because of an injury, Killian didn't catch last season, moving to the outfield, but he had been slated for heavy duty behind the plate this spring.

O'Halloran, a fast baller, is the

only veteran hurler although the return of Tom Keenan of Hartford to the mound corps could help tremendously. Keenan, a classy left-hander, was not in shape last spring but he started working early in the winter this year, slenderized himself substantially and has been training hard ever since Martin called out his squad some time ago. Should Keenan regain his top form physically and pitch in the fashion he did two seasons ago the situation would be greatly relieved for the Friars.

Dick Maloney, a part time performer last spring, and Ray St. George, injured last spring, are waging a torrid fight for the second base. job and Walt Lozoski, Hal Fagan and Red Kelley are battling for the third base berth, a job opened up when the regular incumbent of the last two seasons, Ted Smith, was graduated.

With Killian and John Barchi, outfield regulars, gone there are several hopefuls striving to replace them. Mattera is a fixture in center, as are Sullivan at short and Angelone at first, but otherwise the battles are

Jack McBurnie, small, fast but possessed of an excellent arm, is a leading candidate for an outfield job and also is first base insurance. Ferd Sowa, basketball captain, Dick Flynn, Ted Mazejewski, Stan Spont and Ross McKanna are the others still very much in the running for outfield jobs.

#### Compact Schedule

Fred Foley of Fall River, Jin Fox of Providence, Rae Edwards of Milford and Art Parsons of Chicopee Falls are mound candidates and since the Friars will play a very compact schedule a flock of pitchers will be very handy. At one stretch the Friars will play six games in a many days, including exhibitions with the Providence Chiefs and Pawtucket Slaters.

Since heavy hitters are scarce, Martin is stressing speed in all drills. He figures that the defense will have to do a lot of work this season and that the pitchers will have to come through with consistently good performances to keep the Friars from a

succession of thumpings.

However, practice sessions have been very satisfactory. The squad as a whole is in good condition and full of hustle and although the Hendricken Field diamond is far from a billiard table at this early stage of the campaign, the infield play has been

encouraging.

So, generating speed and defensive work, expecting better than average pitching and consistent hitting from Angelone, Sullivan and Mattera, the Friar boss has decided that it might not be too bad after all, although he is convinced that any loafing on the part of his charges during the campaign just around the corner will be fatal.

### P.C. Appoints Drew Freshman Ball Coach

Larry Drew, coach of the Providence College basketball team, has been appointed freshman baseball coach, the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., athletic director, announced last night.

Drew, a former Friar basketball and football star as well as baseball pitcher and first baseman, will call his candidates soon. He has wide experience in playing the game and has handled several young teams around Providence during the past few years.

## Drew Working Hard With Freshmen Nine

With the weather befitting the football season, the freshmen diamond prospects commenced training last week. An estimated sixty aspirants take over Hendricken Field each afternoon at 4 o'clock when the charges of Hal Martin complete their workouts. The squad will undoubtedly be cut to one-third of its present size before Coach Larry Drew gets down to the real work of molding a worthy and successful contingent.

At first glance, it appears that the hitting is below par, but that is to be expected so early in the season. Also, the pitchers have had extra practice and are in better shape than the offensive end of the team. A hurling staff of some capabilities should be formed from the eighteen

youths competing for a job on the mound. Left-handers and right-handers alike have been showing promise.

The infielders and outfielders are having trouble with the rough infield and bothersome winds, and these two factors, in no small measure, have slowed down their conditioning process. It is still too early to determine how good the defense and stickwork will turn out, but one never knows when or where another Babe Ruth, Honus Wagner, or Christy Matthew-

son is going to make an appearance.

A calendar is being compiled and contacts are being made by the athletic department so that the freshmen will have a season both interesting and fruitful.

## KEENAN TO START FOR FRIARS' NINE

Providence College Schedules
Home Opener at Hendricken
Field at 3 P.M.

Thwarted by the weatherman on Thursday, Providence College will make another attempt to inaugurate its 1948 baseball campaign when it entertains American International at Hendricken Field this afternoon in a 3 p.m. encounter.

Tom Keenan, 200-pound southpaw from Hartford, has been given the starting assignment by Coach Hal Martin who is hoping his Friars will duplicate their performance of a season ago when they downed the Quonset Flyers in their opening game and thereby get away to a successful start.

The postponement of Thursday's game with Assumption has given Martin another day of practice to look over his charges and he plans no changes in the lineup that was to have started that game. Dick Maloney will be at second base in place of Ray St. George while Ferde Sowa has taken over the outfield post formerly held by Joe McKanna.

Art Weinstock looms as Keenan's battery mate although Herb Ferriter also may see service behind the plate. The infield will have Bill Angelone at first, Maloney at second, Joe Sullivan at short and Walt Lozoski at third.

Ralph Mattera, heavy-hitting veteran from last year's club, will patrol center field with John McBurney flanking him on the left and Sowa on the right. McKanna and Ted Mazejewski are other gardeners who may get into the fray.

A.I.C. has a veteran-studded club that is somewhat older than average college teams. The Bay Staters have plenty of power at the plate and Keenan appears to have his work cut out for him. Harry Cramer, Bob Turtellot and Ed Moriarty are the big stickers in the visitor's lineup and American is counting on them to lead its attack.

## FRIAR NINE PLAYS ASSUMPTION CLUB

Coach Hal Martin Undecided on Starting Lineup for Inaugural Today

With several positions still in doubt and a pitching staff that continues to remain somewhat of a question mark, Providence College will embark on its 1948 baseball campaign at Worcester this afternoon when it encounters Assumption College in the first contest of a 16-game schedule

Hampered by wet grounds and cold weather that have interrupted practice sessions, the Friars are not as far advanced as they might be and, as a consequence, Coach Hal Martin is still uncertain as to who some of the starters will be.

Art Weinstock and Herb Ferriter are waging a close battle for the first string catching job now that Cy Killian has turned professional and it wouldn't be too surprising if they eventually shared the chore during the season. Martin has a similar problem in the outfield where Ferd Sowa and Ted Mazejewski are pressing Ralph Mattera, John McBurney and Joe McKenna who currently hold the inside track to the center field, right field an left field positions.


The latter trio will probably get the starting nod this afternoon along with Weinstock and an infield quartet that has Bill Angelone on first base, Ray St. George at second, Joe Sullivan at shortstop and Walt Lozoski at the hot corner. Angelone, Mattera and Sullivan were reguars a season ago and figure to retain their positions.

Sullivan, a good fielder with a rifle-like arm, is regarded as a great prospect and he could prove the backbone of the Friar's infield. Lozoski and St. George have performed well in practice but the latter has a strong rival for the second base spot in Dick Maloney, who saw some service a season ago. He'll probably be used in a reserve role this afternoon.

The mound staff is Martin's biggest problem and at the moment his main worry because of an arm injury that has been bothering Tom "Red" O'Halloran, the veteran righthanded fireballer. O'Halloran pulled a muscle in his throwing arm last summer and the flipper is still giving him trouble.

If the slender redhead is sidelined today, either Jim' Fox, Art Parsons or Fred Foley will toe the rubber All three were one the squad last year but they were used only sparingly and lack experience. Fox who attracted the attention of big league scouts while performing in local CYO pircles before the war, has pretty good speed and if he can improve on is control, he might prove the antwer to some of Martin's pitching roblems.

## (EENAN OF FRIARS TOSSES 5-HITTER

Strikes Out 10 as P.C. Nine Opens Season With 9-3

Verdict Over A.I.C.

Despite temperatures which would have even been a might chilly for football, Tom Keenan was something more than tepid on the Providence College mound yesterday afternoon at Hendricken Field as the Friars launched their baseball campaign with an impressive 9-3 victory over American International College of Springfield.

The junior southpaw hurler from Hartford who was unable to pare down to playing weight a year ago, tossed a five-hitter at the visitors, walked only four, and sent 10 of the Aces back to the bench via the strikeout route. Entering the sea-son's opener in excellent physical trim, Keenan's performance was cool and deliberate although his slants were very much on the flery side.

#### Little Trouble

Only in the ninth inning, when the Aces picked up their final run, did the Friar flinger find himself in serious trouble. That was the only frame in which the losers gathered more than one hit and in that instance, only two. In the third inning, Harry Cramer led off for the visitors with a single to right, went to third on a passed ball, and scored their first run on Dick Maloney's boot of Bob Tourtellotte's grounder down to second. Tourtellotte scored on a wild pitch but Keenan promptly struck out the side. In four other frames

Keenan faced only three batters.

Apart from Keenan's hurling mastery the Friars decisively proved their offensive superiority by collecting 11 bingles and working A.I.C. pitching for nine walks. In the hitting department, Jim Sullivan and aFox Ralph Mattera, with three and two respectively, were the heavy stickers. Lead-off batter Walt Lozoski and cleanup hitter Ted Mezejewski, proved adept at drawing walks, the A. former getting two and the latter two.

In fact, a pass to Lozoski in the opening inning set up the Friars' in

itial run. The Friars added two more in the second on Bill Angelone's single, a walk to John McBurney, a fielder's choice, Sullivan's single, and a subsequent error on that hit by catcher

Al Beaudoin. McBurney scored the first run but as he did, he collided with Beaudoin and caused the latter to muff the throw from the outfield, allowing Ferriter, who had reached on a fielder's choice, to score.

A brace of hits, a stolen base and a walk, accounted for two runs in the sixth. A walk to Lozoski, Maloney's sacrifice and Mattera's double produced a run in the seventh and the Friars closed their scoring in the eighth with three tallies built on three hits, two walks, a hit batsmen and a wild pitch.

Sullivan also provided the fielding feature in the seventh when he robbed Tourtellotte of an almost certain triple with a fine relay peg to Lozoski after taking Mattera's throw in center field. Walt Medlizewski was Johnny-on-the-spot in the sixth when he backed up Angelone on McBurney's wild peg to first when the latter threw wildly to first in an attempt to complete a double play.

Keenan, a rugged youngster whose surplus weight kept him out of baseball last year, was in mid-season form Saturday and he now looms as the top chucker on the P.C. staff by virtue of his neat five-hitter. O'Halloran could give him an argument but the fireballing redhead has been having arm trouble and he's somewhat of an unknown quantity at the moment.

The remainder of the Providence College lineup is expected to have Bill Angelone at first base, Dick Maloney at second, Jim Sullivan at short, Walt Lozoski at third, Ralph Mattera, Ted Mezejewski and John McBurney or Ferde Sousa in the outfield and Herb Ferriter, Art Weinstock or Walt Modlizewski behind the plate.





Dependable Holdovers

Manager Frank Archer of the Chiefs has some dependable hold-over players in Bill Cearley, Alex Nahigian, Phil Daley and Joe Pul-lano while such newcomers as shortstop Joe Bolack and second baseman Franny King, also have played good-ball. Archer will pitch Al Comotti, Don Bowman and Lefty Vic Desrosiers today against the Friars.

Providence College upset the St. John's team Friday, which would indicate that they are capable of playing a fairly explosive brand of ball on their "days." Coach Hal Martin of the Friars has to stretch his pitching staff over five tough games in a six-day period and has nominated Jimmy Fox (single-X) to face the Chiefs. P.C. has shown flashes of power-hitting, with Ted Mezejewski and Ralph Mattera, a Cranstonian, the most dangerous of the collegians.

The Chiefs will start a rookie outfielder named Josie McGovern in right. He's a potential slugger but needs seasoning. He played service

ball in Japan and the other afternoon at the Stadium, lost five balls over the fences in a half-dozen swings. Some of the drives were well out-of-bounds. He has a lot of power for a small guy. Here's to more P.C. victories. Here's hoping that we've seen the last of unsportsmanlike conduct wheth-



### Savold Knocks Out Pete Louthis in 5th



Those individuals receive scholarships as well as football players and very little criticism is noted.

Harry Stuldreher was a member of the famous four horsemen backfield at No're Dame and after his graduation went into the coaching field and has been there ever since. For the past 12 years he has been at Wisconsin where he has been drawing something like 18,000 dollars a year. A little criticism along with that shouldn't be too hard to take.

Sam Nissel, high scoring star of last year's great Frosh five, looks as good as ever. Nissel is expected to make a strong bid for a starting berth on the Varsity five. Also up from the Frosh five and in contention for Varsity berths are Ray Garcia, Larry DePalma, Ed Mooney and Frank Pelligrino.

Regardless of which five players eventually comprise the starting quintet, Larry Drew is sure of having plenty of reserves to back up his starting unit, a condition that has been sadly lacking for the past two years. Also, if Orr, looking as good as he does, continues to improve, he will give the Drewmen a big lift in the height department. Basketball, today, is a big man's game and the Friars have that big man in Orr.

### NEW SYSTEM FOR AWARDS PASSED; LETTERS FORBIDDEN ON CAMPUS



### A BASKETBALL LEGEND ...

A few colleges in the country have had athletes that have so far overshadowed all other participants in various sports that legends have grown about them, never to be crushed or blotted from the memory.

Notre Dame had George Gipp, Army, Cris Cagle, Illinois, Red Grange, to mention a few, all immortals at their colleges, men that never will be forgotten. These men are the subjects of conversation in drawing rooms, on trains, and even on the playing field when coaches need some psychological lift to drive a team forward.

All of which brings us to Providence College. Here on this campus just twenty years ago. Providence College had a basketball team that rated with the best in the United States. Providence College had on that team more good basketball players than Houdini has tricks. But even then, there was one lad, who was head and shoulders above the rest, the class of the group, the boy who was to the Friars what Gipp was to Notre Dame, what Cagle was to the Army, and Grange to Illinois, he was the greatest basketball player in the history of Providence College.

In the 1928-29 season this youngster from Salem, Massachusetts scored 278 points a remarkable total when it is remembered that 35 points a game was considered a tremendous score for an entire quintet. In one of the Holy Cross games that year the Friars scored 35 points, he accounted for 15 of them. Against St. John's it was 32 points for the Friars, 15 for him, against Northeastern Providence won the game with 42 points, he clicked for 24, against Army, P. C. scored 32 points the Salem boy registering 12, and so it went on through that memorable campaign.

Memorable because at the conclusion of that campaign when the All-American selectors got together and chose the five greatest players in the country one of the guard positions on that team went to the lad from little Providence College up in Rhode Island. The other four positions went to Charles Hyatt, from the great University of Pittsburg, Thomas Pickell sensational guard of the Arkansas University Razorbacks, Charles Murphy mighty Purdue's mighty center, and Joe Schaff colosal forward on Pennsylvania's tremendous team.

Providence College was on the basketball map of America. The students of the college gathered nightly to talk of the feats their team accomplished in winning 17 of twenty games that season, but most of all they gathered to talk of the feats one man on that team had accomplished with a basketball.

In the immediate years following the 28' season, P. C.'s All American guard was always mentioned when groups gathered to talk, but somehow down through the years he seems to have faded into the dim past, sentenced to oblivion in the files and records of Friar basketball. That's not right because his name should never be forgotten in the annals of Providence College basketball. He was the greatest we ever had. His is a basketball legend that should be revived—the legend of Eddie Wineapple.

### COATES PRAISES FRIAR HARRIERS

Coates gave praise to all, and especially singled out Frank Hanaway, who placed fourth. It seems that Frank should have finished third behind the Tobey boys, who tied for first place; but being unfamiliar with the course, Frank ran around an open gate instead of through it, thereby overrunning the course and finished fourth instead of third.

On the same day, the Friar Freshmen were licked by the Brown Freshmen, who won by a perfect score. Brown took the first five places to run up a score of 45-15.

Cross country is considered by Coach Coates to be a great conditioner, so he has his one and two mile relay teams running it to get in shape for the Knights of Columbus Meet on January 22, 1949. On that night the spiked shoe following at Providence College will be able to see or hear their team in a big time meet at the Boston Garden. This meet is broadcast all over New England and New York, so all should get a chance to at least listen to it.

It won't be long before the track squad gets its outdoor, wooden track; and upon erection of same in short left field on the baseball diamond, we predict a much larger audience for the track practices. The track, which is to be of Canadian Spruce, will be 160 yards in length; and it will be constructed in such a way that it can be disas-

sembled and stored in the spring. For the student who has trouble in mathematics, a miler will have to run eleven laps on the spruce track to cover one mile.

This winter the track will be used for a home and home arrangement of meets with Brown University.




### FFRIAR STUDENTS HOLD HOOP RALLY

But it takes more time than that to get a new plan into smooth operation.

Capt. Charlie Bresnahan, the team's only senior, and Art Weinstock, who has played brilliantly in the workouts, are the only holdovers listed to open tonight's game. They'll work at the forwards. Three sophomores, Alex Becker, Jim Power and Ed Mooney, will man the other posts. Junior Walt Lozoski is also being counted on for back court duty.

Much is expected from three players who starred with the freshmen last season. This group includes Larry DePalma, Ray Garcia and Sam Nissell, all six feet or better and promising basketball players. The Friars scrimmaged with a Navy unit from Newport this week and at times looked very good.

Assumption, coached by Raymond J. Marion, dropped its opener to Bradford-Durfee in a nip-and-tuck 53-51 contest. Capt. Butts Bonvouloir has paced the Greyhound scorers for the past two seasons since coming out of the Navy. He scored 11 points in the opener, while Lefty Brassard tossed in 15. Hawk Pellerin, a 6 ft. 2, 185-pound freshman also netted 11 markers against Durfee.

Friars Gain Control Late in 2nd Half of Tense Duel at Worcester

Worcester, Mass., Dec. 4.—As was the story just one year ago, the Assumption College Greyhounds gave the Providence College Friars a terrific battle before the Friars finally pulled out a 56-to-47 victory in their opening game of the season tonight at the Assumption College gymnasium before a highly enthusiastic alumni crowd.

However, both the score and the 13 men in the Friar lineup are deceptive for the hard trying Friars had all they could do to shake their speedy adversaries. Once they did get command of the game in the second half, however, they showed poise and smoothness.

### Play Is Rough

The Friar scoring was split up among nine players. Art Weinstock, who scored eight, was a veritable ball hawk in picking off Greyhound passes in the first half and was the top man in the P.C. lineup. Sophomores Ed Mooney and Sam Nissell also contributed some timely floor work. Nissell scored eight points, playing only 12 minutes, and was a steadying influence along with Walt Lozoski, Weinstock and Capt. Charlie Bresnahan.

Freshman Hawk Pellerin, Roy Pontbriand, and Lefty Brassard sparked the Greyhounds.

Assumption took the lead twice in the first minutes, but hoops by Alex Becker and Weinstock and a foul shot by Bresnahan put the Friars ahead, 5-4. They managed to hold the lead and at times control the ball but had trouble getting shots off because of Assumption's zone defense and the overhanging corners which narrowed the shooting area around the basket.

After holding a 15-13 edge, the Friars jumped it up to an eight-point lead on baskets by Tom Orr, Bresnahan and Jim Power. The Friars had a 10-point edge later and left the court with a nine-point lead, 28-19.

### Play Faster in Second Half

The play was much faster in the second half with the Friars breaking fast and having better scoring chances as a result. About five minutes along, the Friars had a ninepoint lead, 35-26, but the Greyhounds whittled it down to 35-31 on a long shot by Brassard and a basket and a foul by Stretch Pontbriand.

Power dropped one in that relieved the pressure somewhat and after a time out, Providence played an improved game. Up to this point, it looked like the Greyhounds might pull out their first victory in this long series, but that was the end of their threat. The Friars steadied, pecked away at the scoring column and were 12 points ahead, 45-33, and safely in the van at the 13-minute mark. Then they played it a little more confidently and while the Assumptions did cut down the margin, they couldn't appreciably close the gap.

Walt Lososki played a good floor game and acted as a steading influence throughout the contest.


Friars Confident

### CROSS' FIRST CLUB IS USED SPARINGLY IN CLASH AT ARENA

No. 1 Unit Plays Only 17 Minutes; Cousy, Kaftan . Again Set the Pace

The Providence College Friars tried to play the role of "Jack-the-Giant-Killer" last night at the Auditorium but the "giant" in this case was the vaunted Holy Cross Crusaders basketball team and when they got through with the Friars there was little doubt or room for argument.

The Crusaders, ranked among the East's better minters, started their second team but when the varsity took over after 11 minutes of play they turned the game upside down and went on to a convincing 75-to-34

victory before 2947 fans.

The Friars made a game of it in the early going but once the Crusaders trotted out the George Kafton-Bob Cousy combination it was just a question of how many points they'd get. In addition, the Friars got panicky in the process, which didn't help their own play either,

#### Rest for H. C. Aces

The Crusaders played well within themselves at times but at other times, they came up with brilliant passing and teamwork which made their opponents look like novices. The Friars didn't play their best game, but even if they had, they probably couldn't have kept pace with the Crusaders who played their top strength only 17 minutes.

Bob Cousy took scoring honors for the night with 14 points while Kaftan featured with his floorwork under the boards. The Crusaders top quintet of Kaftan, Cousy, Dermie O'Connell, Bob MacMullen and Frank Offring played long enough to put the game on ice, which was nine minutes in the first half and

eight in the second.

P. C. Gets Lead

The Friars were paired up with the Cross' second string quintet at the outset and this combine built up a 7-0 lead, before Ray Garcia dropped in a Providence basket at 3:45 of the first half. Both teams were playing a deliberate type of game at the time and the Friars took the lead at 10-9 after about seven minutes of play. Art Weinstock, Sam Nissell and Charlie Bresnahan sparked this surge by the Friars, with Bresnahan dropping in a pretty long shot that put the Friars ahead.

Then sophomore Walter Baird, outstanding player on the Holy Cross Freshmen last season, tallied six straight points, including a difficult side shot, and the Cross enjoyed a 15-10 advantage. Here Coach Buster Sheary inserted his top men and that proved the end of Providence's chances of scoring one of the

season's upsets.

The Cross scored right off the bat on a spectacular combination play with Cousy dropping in the shot after a pass from Kaftan. Then Cousy added a pair of foul shots and MacMullen scored on a flip pass from Cousy, with the Crusaders playing some of the type of basketball the fans had come to see. The Friars couldn't cope with the change of pace and when the Cross wasn't scoring they were controlling the play and picking off the rebounds on any Friar opportunities.

#### 33-11 at Half

The Providence team went scoreless for nine minutes before Nissell made a foul shot and went about 14 minutes in a stretch late in the first half and starting the second without registering from the floor. The Cross had a 33-11 lead at the half, with the Friars having only

three field goals.

After the intermission, the Cross went right out after points and in 3½ minutes they had a 30-point lead at 44-17 and it was just a question of playing out the string. The Crusaders, looking the part of a polished basketball unit, turned on their power and thrilled the fans with their sparkling play. Cousy put in a pair of nifty shots while Kaftan, O'Connell, MacMullen and Charlie Bollinger bottled up the rebounds so that the Friars couldn't

Nissell, Art Weinstock and Tom Orr played the best of the Friers, while Bresnahan did some effective ball-stealing early. The Cross wed 14 men (all that dressed) with 12 of them breaking into the scoring column. While the top team was in



NAMES TO REMEMBER . . .

Cassedy, Kallman, Aldrich and Keenan who answer to the lirst names of John, Jerry, Bob and Bill respectively are names well worth remembering, because they are going to be n print many times during the next four years. Last Saturday afternoon Harry Coates took a few men and paid a little visit

over at Brown University. The ourpose was a few relay races between the two Colleges, so that the Friars might become accustomed to running on a board brack. All of which reminds me of another visit to Brown a few months ago.

At that time Coates took most of these same men over to Brown for a couple of practice cross-country runs. It was a gloomy day with rain falling continually. Now P.C. had a cross-country team for one purpose that to get the runners in condition for the winter meets. There wasn't an honest to goodness long distance runner in the bunch. Harry Coates is the first to admit that. However, the long runs in the fall did help to condition the runners. That afternoon the Frosh and Varsity cross-country teams of P. C. were both defeated badly, but that wasn't what I remember about the afternoon.

During the running of the Frosh race there is a half-way point where spectators and coaches can gather to watch the runners come by. The spot is right at the top of a gruelling hill. As the runners approached the top of that steep incline two Brown men were in the lead. Following closely behind was a little bundle of dynamite named Cassedy of P. C. He was pocketed between two Brown men who actually were crosscountry runners. Just at that time some one of the standbys yelled at the Brown men, "Kill him off". It wasn't so much what was said because that is good track lingo, but it was the manner in which it was said. Well they did kill off the little guy that day, they killed off a quarter miler gamely trying to run 21/2 miles. But the determined little Freshman remembered. In fact after the race I remember hearing him say, "We'll do a little killing ourselves before long."

Well to get back to Saturday there wasn't any shooting over at Brown but there was a lot of killing. The Frosh mile relay teams lined up and who was there to start the Friars away but the guy who had been left for dead by those Brown killers a few months before. This was the type race that he had been waiting for. He and three other young Frosh behind him. They knew their coach was worried. They understood the many mem-

orable days that he had enjoyed when he was known as the Knute Rockne of the track world. They also knew about the odds that were stacked against their coach and them. They realized that his heart was set on getting P. C. off to a start in the track world, a start that will eventually bolt the College into the track limelight. 







#### FOUR SOPHOMORES GUIDE PROVIDENC TO MAJOR VICTOR

Williams Steers Youngsters to the First Triumph in **Current Series**

Keyed up by a group of hard-driveing sophomores, Providence College's Friars scored their first major victory of the season with a 63-to-58 decision over the Boston College Eagles in a thrill-packed game last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

For the first half, though the Friars practically kept even with the smooth ball handling of the Boston quintet, it appeared that the P.C. forces were going down before Gen. Al McLellan's charges. However, coming out for the second half. Coach Larry Drew started a team of four sophomores and Paul Williams, Pawtucket West grad and the balance wheel of the combination. This group of Larry DePalma, Al Becker, Gerry McGurkin and Ray Garcia, with Sam Nissell, who came in later, revolutionized the Providence attack. They started a rally . which threw the Eagles off stride and the Friars won the ball game, their first over the Eagles since the series was resumed in 1941.

McGurkin cut the B.C. lead to 32-29 in about 45 seconds and then a pop shot and a rebound by Becker put the Friars out front for the first time since the 10th minute of the first half. 33-32. Becker, who played brilliantly, made his third consecutive hoop for the Friars' eighth straight point. B.C. tied it up at 35-all and the lead changed hands four times on practically every point until P.C. made

The Eagles still kept in the ball game, but the Friars managed to hold onto their lead, though several times it fluctuated from six points to one and then back to seven as the tide changed. B.C. cut it down to 54-51 as Ray Carr and Tom Deegan scored baskets and later to 57-55, with Carr and Danny Bricker converting on two clean shots.

Leading by only two points, the Friars boosted it up to six, with Mc-Gurkin scoring on a closeup and Charlie Bresnahan passing into Jim Power and then taking his return for another hoop at 61-55. For the last three and one-half minutes, the Eagles put on the pressure but a wild pass or an alert interception by the Friars, who figured they had the victory, kept the scoring balance about the same.

The Friars played a much sounder game against the Eagles than they have displayed previously. Becker was far better scoring 13 points, than he has been in other games, while Williams' steadiness paid off, also. The sophomores gave the Friars the lift they needed and had the shooting eyes to match their

spirit and determination.

In the first half, the game was fairly even, though B.C. had the edge. Boston controlled the ball consistently, with Tom O'Brien guiding the club. He was the Eagles' top man and scored 10 points before he fouled out early in the second half. Bricker, a hook-shot specialist, scored 16 points, but the Eagles missed connections several times in the last minutes of the game when a basket or two might have straightened them out.

The lead changed nine times in the first half, with the Eagles forging ahead after being down, 15-12. Two one-handers by Bricker and a foul shot by O'Brien made it 17-15 and later they went nine points ahead 27-18. Underdog Providence By Soar's Passes, T

(This is another in a series of articles written by Journal-Bul-letin sports writers. Joe Mc-Henry, who covers football, baseball and basketball for these papers, here reviews one of the football games that thrilled him

#### By JOE MCHENRY

Ever try going back over football's memory lane and nailing down just one game? A lot of things come to mind. . . . the day that Notre Dame and Army battled to a scoreless tie and a fellow named Arnold Tucker outshone some fellows named Davis and Blanchard and Lujack. . . or the time Boston College was signed and upstart Holy Cross team buried them, 55 to 12.

Or even that 21-21 tie between Army and Navy less than five weeks ago. Or how about Rhode Island State deadlocking Springfield, 21-21, in a real thriller this past season, and Hugh Devore's St. Bonaventure club outplaying Boston College but settling for a 7-7 score? They all had their drama and the pomp and circumstance had little to do with the game as it was actually played.

But there's still another game, perhaps forgotten by many and only obscurely remembered by others, and that's the time the Providence College Friars beat Boston College. Oh yes, some of you teen-agers don't remember those days, but the Friars had their day in the football world too, and maybe some day they'll reach those lofty heights again. At least, I'm hoping.

#### Sleeping Giant

They used to say the Eagles were a sleeping giant in those days, something like Boston University today. True they had some fine football teams, but they hadn't yet come under the direction of Frank Leahy, who was to lead them to the top of the gridiron world. But the Eagles never were a really poor football

The Friars, if they had a team today, would be short enders if they went up against B.C. and that's the way it was back in 1934. The Friars were good in their own league. They had been beaten by Holy Cross but it had been no walkover. They were on the way to a victory against Springfield, a few yards short of a touchdown, when the time ran out. And they had whipped City College, then under the tutelage of Benny

Friedman.

The Eagles were having one of those seasons. They'd played well against Fordham but lost, 6-0, and they had bowed to Western Maryland, powered by Bill Sheppard, then and later a player of note. Coming up to the P.C. game, the Eagles were confident of victory and didn't expect too much trouble from their Dominican neighbors.

#### First Year for Coach

Five might have got you 20, if you were willing to lay a bob or two on the Friars, but actually it didn't look like much of a run for your money

that day at B.C.'s Alumni Field in Newton.

Coach Joe McGee was in his first sealed for the Sugar Bowl and an season as boss of the Friars and 'Hank" Soar was then just a potentially good player, a sophomore who was starting to develop. Today anybody will tell you that Soar was a natural but even naturals need seasoning. But Soar bloomed into stardom with this game and such fellows as Omer Landry, now coach at Central Falls High, and Bill Kutneski, mentor at Central, did their bits to keep the Friars rolling.

> And whenever the band strikes up "For Boston" I almost invariably think of this particular game, perhaps the Friars' finest triumph of all time, at least that was the late Joe Nutter's opinion.

> The Eagles had four scoring chances in the first half alone and one of Tom Brennan's punts was downed by Dave Couhig, the B.C. captain and brother of the then Friars' line coach, Phil Couhig, on the one yard line. It was definitely Soar's day. He kicked the ball from the end zone out to the P.C. 48 though pressure was terrific with that big Eagle line trying to block the kick and take the heart out of the Friars with one and the same blow!

#### Held Them Off

But the Friars held them off in the first half and even drove to the Eagles' 12, with a 38-yard punt return by Landry, a long pass gainer from Soar again to Landry and a belt through the line by Warren's Rick Vitullo, later a star with the Jersey City Giants, featuring the march.

Coming out for the second half, the Eagles, then coached by Joe McKen-ney, were keyed up but the Friars took the play away and moved 60 yards for the game's first touchdown Ray Belleveau recovered a fumble on the Friar 40. Vitullo, a hard-hitting, straight-away runner, did most of the gaining on the drvie, although

## Springfield Curbs Rally By Friars, Wins, 54-51

Lozoski Leads Surge That Almost Makes It; Control of Rebounds the Difference

The Springfield College Gymnasts staved off an exciting second-half rally by Providence College and handed the Friars a 54-to-51 basketball setback last night at Mount Pleasant High School. The victory was the second in two nights for the Gymnasts, who played a smarter brand of ball and had enough left to fight off the Friar's drive.

Despite the loss, the Friars had the outstanding man on the floor in Walt Lozoski, 160-pound junior from

West Hazleton, Pa. Lozoski did some sensational set shooting from the outside in addition to playing a clever floor game. He pulled the Friars together in the second half and went the route with one of the best performances turned in by a Friar basketball player in some time.

#### The Friars' Bid

They matched points through the first 15-minutes with Springfield holding a 21-18 edge. However, the Friars trailed at 20-21 and 22-24 before Springfield spurted into a 6-point lead at the half. Two baskets by Ted Campagnola and a one-handed pop by Al Sell put the visitors ahead in the last two minutes of the half.

The Friars started fast in the second half, but after two minutes Springfield had increased its lead to nine points, 34-25. Here Lozoski threw in three set shots, but Campagnola scored twice for the Gymnasts and P. C. still was down seven points, 38-31. Then the Gymnasts spurted ahead by 11 and then 14 and 15 points, and led, 48-33 at 10:10 of the second half.

The Friars made their bid at this point and almost closed the gap, they lost their drive and Springfield took over.

Charlie Bresnahan put in a jump shot and baskets by Sam Nissell and Lozoski, and then Nissell again left P. C. 10 points down at 51-41 with seven minutes remaining. Nissell scored on a tap-in and then converted a court-length pass from Lozoski on a sleeper and brought the Friars up to 45-51. A team of Lozoski, Bresnahan, Al Becker, Tom Orr and Nissell was working at this time.

#### Long and Clean

Lozoski stole the ball from a Springfield man and then put in a long shot, clean and from an angle after the Friars had worked it around a bit. And then with less than three minutes left, Bresnahan picked off a pass, was knocked off his feet, passed while on the floor, got up and raced down for another pass and scored. This made it 51-49 with P. C. very definitely coming on and Springfield fading.

But the Friars couldn't make it. Shig Murao, a West Coaster from Oregon, put in a foul shot for Springfield with 65 seconds remaining. He later teamed up with Campagnola on a clever maneuver for the basket which put Springfield out of reach with less than 25 seconds remaining.

Big Joe Kubachka, Bob Barrett and Tiff Barker played fine defensive ball for the visitors, with Campagnola taking scoring honors with 16 points. Lozoski led the Friars with 17 points, while Nissell had 13. Larry DePalma also played well.

From the foul line the Mules also did pretty well, making 23 out of 35 while Providence had 10 out of 23. The overall total for the Mules from the floor was 67 with Providence having 80.

Providence, never having lost to a Colby club until last night, had taken four in a row since the series started back in 1939. The club was never in the game from the opening whistle as the Mules easily sunk their first two counters and were on their way-on their way to a mark that might not be equaled for some time.

For the first five minutes the Mules led, 14 to 3, for the first 10 it was 22 to 8 and for the first 15 it was 33 to 18. And at the half, 45 to 27. Going into the last half at the 10 minute mark it was 59 to 44 and with five minutes left in the tussle it was 64 to 54.

Artie Blain, a sub who filled in for Walt Lozoski, tallied 12 points while not far behind him was Larry DePalma with 10. Every man on both clubs with the exception of one, scored two or more points.

Saturday night at Lewiston the Mules will go after the state series title, playing the Bobcats of Bates in what may turn out to be another high scoring tidbit.

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
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


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
