

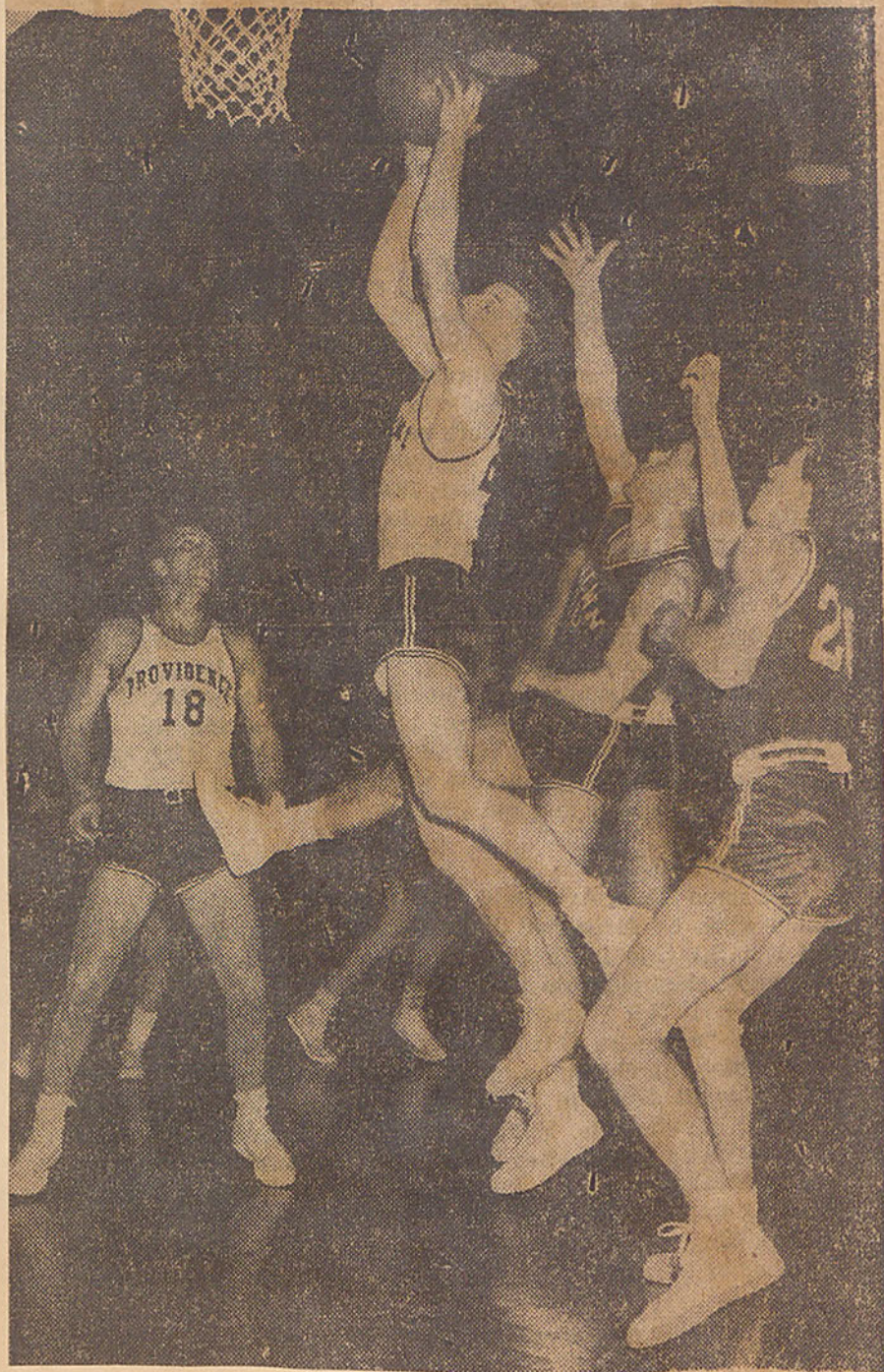

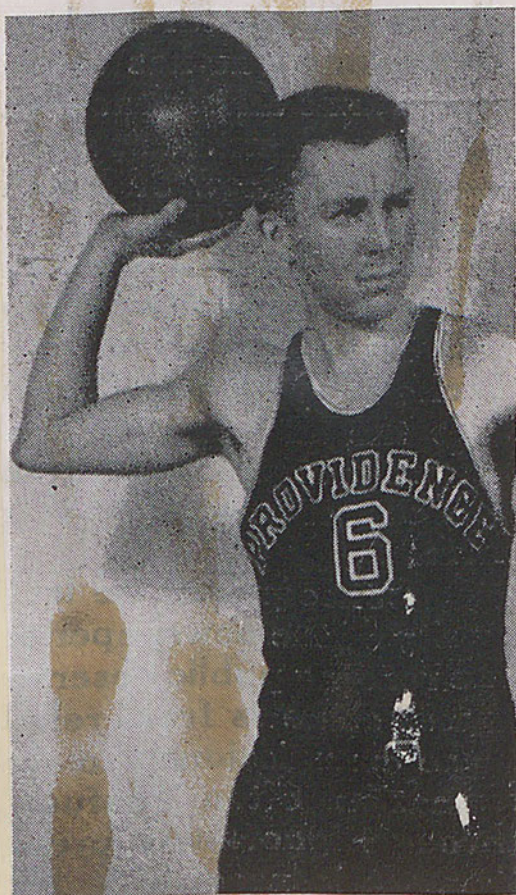

P. C. SEEKS FIRST WIN SINCE 1942 R. I. AUDITORIUM SCENE OF GAME

Arch rivals since 1920, Providence College and Rhode Island State will meet tonight at the Rhode Island Auditorium in the first clash of their annual two game series. The Blue and White from downstate and the Black and White from Providence will be meeting for the twenty-eighth time.

Rhode Island State will enter the fray a distinct favorite to whip the Friars and continue their domination over the Dominican Institution which now has extended over the last six years. The last Providence College basketball quintet to defeat

the Rams was the 1941-42 quintet which featured Larry Drew the present P. C. coach.

The long series between the two Colleges began in 1920 and 27 games have been played since that time. Rhode Island State is way out in front in the matter of victories having 21 to their credit, as against six for the Friars. A year ago the Rams from downstate won by the scores of 84 and 73-64.

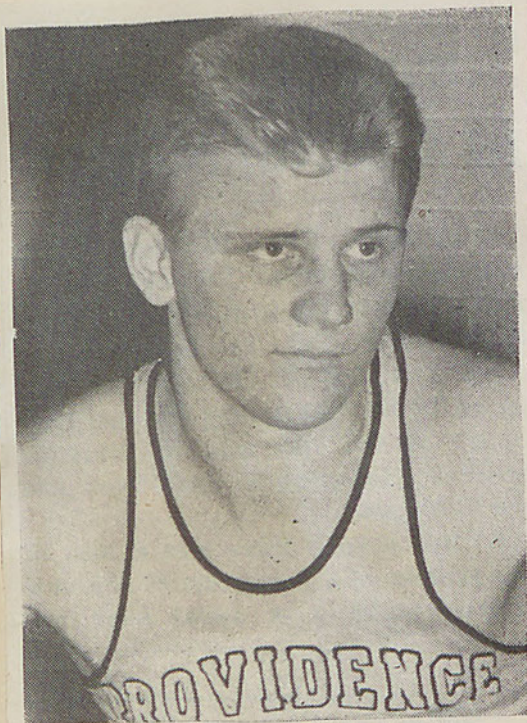
State after getting off to a very slow start this year has come along

fast in recent weeks and now looms as one of the most formidable clubs in New England as well as the East. On the other hand, the Friars have been having their troubles ever since the third week of the season. They have been very erratic, having played great ball at some stages and very poorly at others. All of which points to a Rhode Island State victory. However, nothing is taken for granted in this series and especially the Auditorium game. The Auditorium game played between these two rivals al-

ways provides plenty of fireworks and this year's contest will probably be no different.

No man on the Friar squad has ever tasted a basketball victory over State and as a result the players have the added incentive of collecting that first win. Captain Charlie Bresnahan, Larry DePalma, and Sam Nissel will open the State game on the front line for the Friars while Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock will be at the guard posts. Ray Garcia and Alex Becker will be ready for plenty of action also.

Rhode Island State will start Leon Golembiewski and Bruce Blount at forwards, Ken Goodwin at center, Sal Scalfani and John Mitchell will be at the guard positions.

Brown 59-51 Victor Over P. C. Saturday

In the twenty-sixth renewal of their intracity series, a fighting Providence College basketball team saw a seeming victory slip away to Brown University in the final five minutes of play at the Marvel Gymnasium last Saturday evening.

Playing before a capacity crowd, including a large group of those participating in the Carolan Club Weekend festivities, the Friars played well at times but were guilty of several lapses into periods of poorly executed passing and inaccurate shooting which eventually resulted in their downfall.

The game opened and immediately assumed the wide open offensive pattern that was to prevail throughout the entire contest. Brown jumped to a 10-5 lead at the five minute mark through the sharp-shooting of Fred Kozak and the alert pass intercepting of Frank Mahoney. During this period, and for several minutes thereafter, Frank Pelligrino was the only Providence player able to find the hoop.

The contest continued with Brown having much the better of it until mid-way in the period when Ray Garcia, Larry DePalma and Pelligrino commenced the uphill fight that brought the Friars within a basket of the lead at half-time. This drive saw Garcia assume control of the backboards and DePalma and Pelligrino doing some very fine shooting.

Soon after the opening of the second half, a foul shot by Pelligrino brought P. C. to even terms with the Bears for the first time. At this point the Providence cause began to look healthier as it also saw the departure, via five fouls, of the very capable Brown star, Frank Mahoney. Immediately thereafter the indomitable Pelligrino pushed P. C. ahead, 38-37, for the first time.

But Brown proved to be far from finished and proceeded to play some of their finest ball of the evening during the next few minutes. Paced by Kovachick and Kozak, and gaining complete control of the back-

boards, they again led 47-39 at the halfway mark in the period.

Once again the "big three" combination of Garcia, Pelligrino and the ever present DePalma caught fire, and with the aid of three timely foul shots by Art Weinstock, P. C. was back in the lead at 48-47 with five minutes to go.

However this lead was short-lived as Brown once again refused to stay

down. Patrick, Thurrot and Kovachick contributed baskets from the floor, coupled with several foul tosses, and with time fast running out the Friars were unable to make a comeback.

The wide open style of play that prevailed throughout the contest made it an interesting game for the spectator to watch, but it worked against the efforts of both teams in the fouls resulting from the rough play. In all, 61 fouls were called with Sam Nissel, Joe Blain and Walt Lososki being ejected from the Friar ranks, while Mahoney, Creswell, Corcoran, and Whelan were forced from the Bruin side.

In the preliminary the Providence College Yearlings, paced by Baeur, Korbusieski and Lembo, had an easy time downing the Brown Frosh, 78-39.

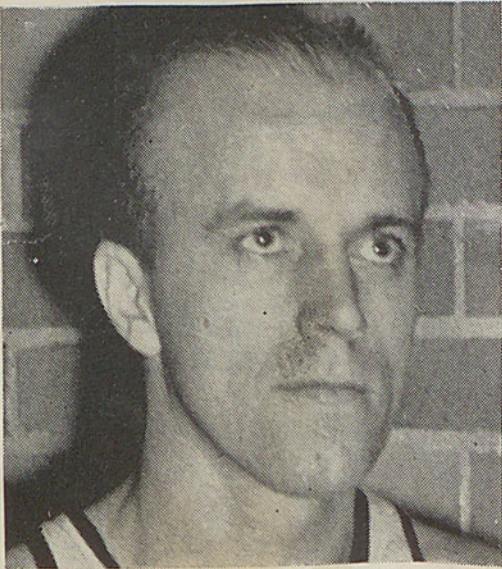
ROUGH GOING ... *Court 2-15-49*

In the preliminary game tonight the P. C. Frosh will attempt to make it three straight over the R. I. State Freshmen.

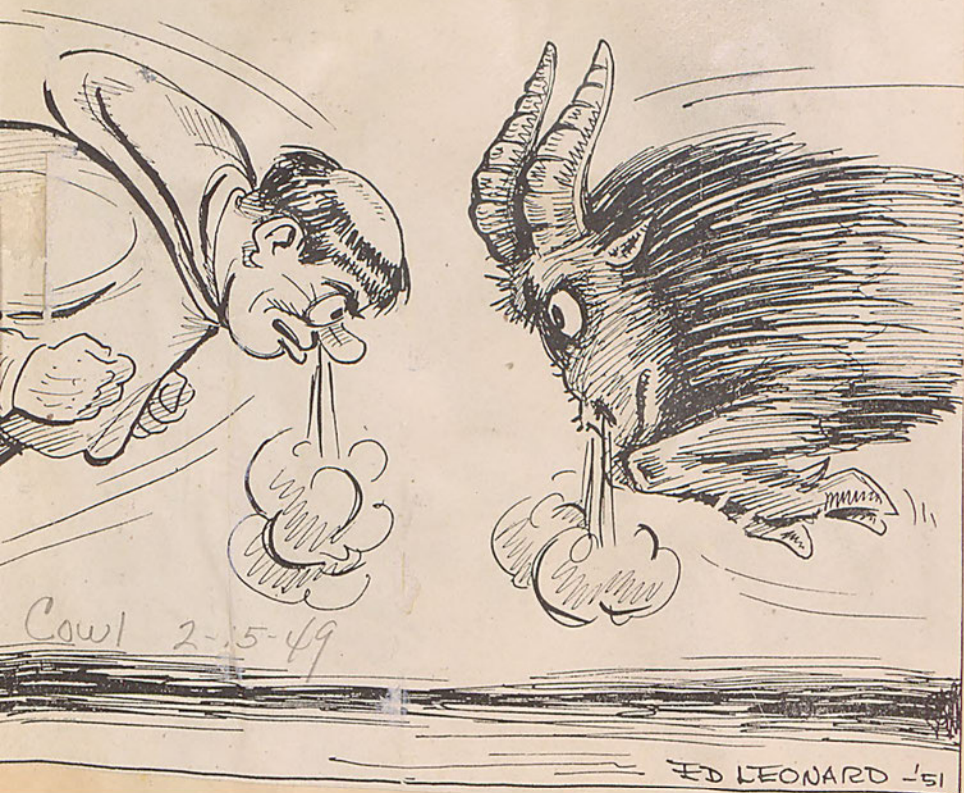
Last year the Friar yearlings won both games.

RUNNERS WILL TEST THIS WEEK; FROSH RELAY TEAM COMING FAST

With the new track already completed, the spike and shoe men are ready to take their laps on the new boards. Much experience will be gained by the Coatesmen for competition on the indoor track season the remainder of the winter. Not only is the track team practicing daily, but the entire student body is invited to give it a try. Coach Harry Coates declared that the new track is open for use to everyone. Especially so, to the case of the baseball candidates. Much poundage must be run off before April and the board track affords an opportunity to all who desire to deflate their waistlines.

It was announced also by the track department that weekly novice races will be scheduled in the near future. They will consist of all types of races for those interested in the exciting sport of track. Those who wish to display their wares are advised to get going and do some running. Now that the track is open and usable all day, there is no reason why any hopeful candidates cannot find time to do some serious running. The excuse of laboratories and classes cannot interfere with practice sessions. Coates advises that everyone give the sport a chance to show its advantages.

With the spring outdoor season but a few short weeks away, those aspirants who wish to try out for the sport should start their training program soon. Not too much time remains before practice meets with Brown University, Rhode Island State, and La Salle Academy will take place.

Providence College was well represented in the recent B.A.A. Games. The Freshmen relay team placed second in their mile event, and the Varsity team placed third in their respective event.

The Frosh of Boston University took first place from the Friars by the mere advantage of four feet.

Northeastern University was third. As the race began, Stan Walsh lost a couple of yards on his laps over the pines. However, Bill Keenan picked up the lost yardage. Diminutive Jim Cassedy shot into the lead and passed the baton to Adrich, who got a bad start and lost by the slim margin of four feet.

In the varsity run, the Friars were able to garner third place behind the speedsters of Boston College and Renssalaer. John Shanley led off for the Coatesmen and lost a few yards. Bill Sherry took the baton and held ground. Frank DiIuglio, who ran in third spot, ran a great race and picked up enough ground to come into striking distance of second place. Our anchor man, Jerry McGurkin ran a creditable race but was matched against Renssalaer's ace Bundshuh, who is capable of a 47.5 quarter-mile. He holds all dash records in R.P.I. It was a case of too much competition. Coates declared that McGurkin couldn't have caught him on a motorcycle. Boston College's great relay team pushed far out into the lead and won by a distinctive advantage. Wesleyan University placed fourth.

Coach Coates revealed that he was very pleased with the performances of both teams. At the Seton Hall relay last Spring, the Varsity crew ran a 4:04 mile, and in Boston recently they racked off a very much improved 3:25. With the combination of the two teams next season, Coach Harry Coates expects to have a relay team to top the best.

Friars And Rams Have Given Fans Many Thrills Through The Years

The Black and White of Providence College will assume the title of "Jack the Giant Killer" tonight when they tackle the Rams of Rhode Island State. Currently rated in the first five in New England, the Rams are favored to top the Friars. In the recent meetings of the two clubs, the Friars have usually entered the contest with a better than average seasonal record. This season, however, the Drewmen claim only a mediocre record to date and really must raise themselves to the occasion of topping the fast-moving Rams of Kingston.

Rivalry began between the two institutions 27 years ago after the establishment of Providence College. The Rams won the first contest in 1921 by the lopsided score of 85-39. In 1922 they duplicated the feat with a low-scoring, 35-19, encounter.

In 1936 the Friars turned the ta-



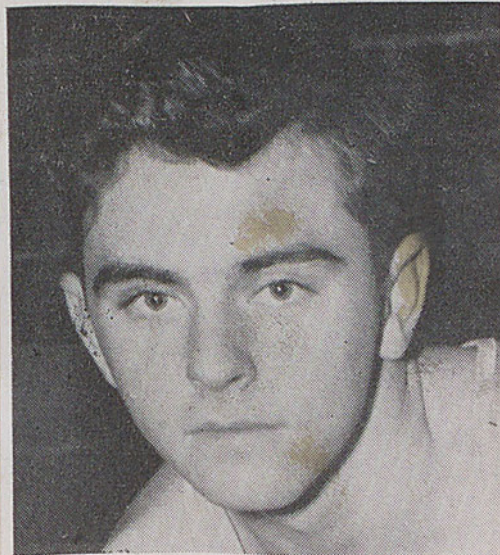

bles on their fellow Rhode Islanders twice by substantial scores. Rhody was led that year by the sensational John Martin, while P. C. boasted such standouts as Leo Davin, Ed Babinska, and Ben Smith. The following year, however, the Rams got back to winning ways by gaining a victory over the Friars by the score of 63-54. Later that season, Providence took revenge

and whipped State, 42-38, before the largest crowd to witness a basketball game in Rhode Island to that time. In scoring this return victory, P. C. prevented Rhode Island State from winning the New England Intercollegiate Basketball crown. As was the case in the previous season, Davin and Babinska were the main factors in the Providence victory. The following year, the 1937-1938 season, the Rams proved the superiority as they gained two victories over the

Friars by the scores of 52-41 and 85-59.

The next two seasons were very profitable for the Rams, as they swept the four scheduled games. In

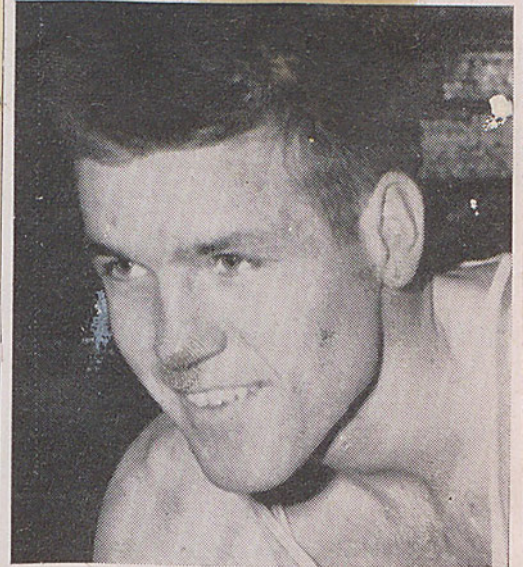

these contests the boys from Dominican Heights played a good brand of basketball, but the Rams were practically unbeatable. In the 1939-40 season, Rhody topped the Black and White by the scores of 49-30 and 75-62. The following season the Rams presented one of the strongest teams in their history. They reached new heights by subduing Providence 70-42 and 98-71. Chet Jaworski led the Ram attack in these two contests and went on to become one of the leading scorers in the nation.

The 1941-42 season brought a temporary halt to Rhode Island State supremacy as one of the greatest quin-

tets to represent Providence College scored a close 60-54 victory over the

Rams. Larry Drew, present P. C. mentor, Ted McConnon, head coach of basketball at St. Anselm's College, Za-

beck, Marone, and Ferd Sowa, captain of last year's club, were stars on that Providence squad. The game, extremely hard fought and close to the very end, was played before 5,000 thrilled fans in the Rhode Island Auditorium. This P. C. club was the most publicized squad in Providence College page history. They finished the season as the second highest scoring group in the nation. Rhode Island copped the second game, 68-54, in an equally close and thrilling contest.

Rhody again began to exert their superiority in the 1942-43 season. In the first game P. C. bowed 85-68 in a high-scoring contest. The ever-sensational Ernie Calverly led the Rams' onslaught with 29 points. Later in the season State again downed the Friars, 64-56, with Cal-

verly again topping the point-getters.

One game was scheduled for the following year. The Rams made things look habit-forming by slaughtering the Friars, 90-42, in a free-scoring affair. Dick Hole and Ernie Calverly

paced the winners' attack by netting 28 and 27 points, respectively. La Bos-sierre, P. C. captain, paced the losers with 12 points.

In the 1945-46 season Larry Drew returned from service and added his much-needed talents to the Friar cause. But his presence was not enough to upset the high-riding

Rams. At the end of the first half, Rhody led by the mere margin of 18-12. But in the second period their fast-breaking methods were faultless. They ran up the score to 82-60. In the second meeting of the two clubs that year the incomparable Calverly led the Rams to a 78-55 victory. Rhody went on to the National Invitation Tourney to be knocked off by the Kentucky Wil-cats in the final round. Ernie Cal-verly was selected the outstanding competitor of the tournament. The 1945-46 season marked the final year in the regime of P. C.'s coach, Ed Crotty.

Under the first-year coaching of Larry Drew, the Friars were defeated twice by the Keaneymen in the 1946-47 season. The affair at Rodman Hall, home court of the Rams, was a one-sided victory for the boys from King-ston. But the contest at the Auditor-ium was a thrilling and exciting spec-tacle. In the closing minutes P. C.'s leader, Walt Lozoski, fouled out and Rhode Island pulled ahead to cop the

The Keaneymen made it number nine and ten in a row last year by decisively defeating the Friars twice. The first game, at the Auditorium, was a thrilling game at half time as P. C. led 40-39. In the second period the lack of reserve strength of the Friars showed itself and the Rams built up an advantage steadily with their familiar fast-breaking tactics. Rhody's home game with the Drew-men was more like a marathon. The Rams, practically unbeatable on their home court, hit the century mark to top the Friars by 30 points.

This week, speaking of things intercollegiate, should be very productive along the New Eng-land scene. For instance, tonight Rhode Island State is expected to wrap up the state basketball crown in its session with Provi-dence College at the Auditori-um and on Saturday Holy Cross and Yale will have much to say about where the invitation to the NCAA tournament will be sent.

Tonight's game between the Friars and Rams is likely to be one of the more interesting of recent years. The Friars appear to have balance enough to keep things humming, especially after having given Brown such an argument on the Bruins' home boards last week.

The Providence College Friars, who meet Brown tomorrow night at Marvel Gym, dropped a close tussle to Bates, 67-65, last night at Lew-iston, Me. For the second night in a row, Joe Blain, the South Provi-dence sophomore from La Salle Academy, topped the Friar point-makers with 14. Joe has been show-ing considerable improvement in re-cent weeks, and has always been a tenacious guarder and plays with spirit.

Providence actually outscored the Bobcats by a wide margin from the floor with 25 field goals against 18. However, Bates scored 31 points from the foul line, while the two teams registered 46, which is pretty high and far surpasses the Boston Garden record for one game.

Walt Lozoski and Ray Garcia sparked the Friars into a 38-34 lead at the half as P.C. put on a scoring drive which netted 30 points against 17 for Bates. However, foul shots ruined the Friars in the second half, with Bates picking up 23 points via that medium.

Fran Pelligrino (10), Charlie Bres-nahan (8), Sam Nissell (6) and Larry De Palma (6) were other Friar scorers.

The Brown lineup will be revised for tomorrow night's game with P.C., with three new men scheduled to start. Fred Kozak, who has been

Rams Have Won Last 10 Hoop Tilts Between Schools

Not since Coach Larry Drew's playing days have the Providence College Friars beaten the Rhode Island State Rams and it will take a herculean effort on the part of the Friars to upset the Kingston quintet when they meet tonight at 8:30 o'clock at the R.I. Auditorium.

The freshmen teams meet at 7 o'clock with both first-year outfits among the best that have represented their respective schools in recent seasons. The Ramlets are a classy group, while the Friars, not as fancy but just as successful, have a strong team which dropped a 1-point decision to the Holy Cross yearlings and lost by six points to Boston College.

Rhode Island State, stripped of its sectional and national hopes, still looms much too strong for the Friars, who haven't won over a State basketball team since the 1941-42 season. That was the year that State's Stutz Modzelewski finished up a brilliant career. The Friars, led by Ted McConnon, Larry Drew, Chet Zabek and Bill Reilly, scored a 60-54 victory over a team which had won six of its first seven starts, losing only to Temple.

The next year the Rams had their revenge. The Friars, still under Ed Crotty's direction, won their first eight games, but the Rams took them into camp, 56-54, at the Auditorium. Later they swept the series at Kingston, although the Friars won 15 out of 20 games that season. Ernie Calverley broke in that year and the Friars haven't been able to win since, losing the last 10 games in the series.

Up on Smith Hill, the Providence College backers expect their team to break out as it did against Boston College. However, the Friars have lost their last four starts, although at times playing some fine ball but not for long enough periods to win.

There are two questionable starters, one on each team, and each is a key man. Sal Sclafani of State hurt his ankle against Holy Cross but it's reported o.k. at Kingston. The Friars sophomore center, Shanky Pelligrino from Westerly, reinjured his hand in

the Brown game when he whacked the backboard late in the contest as he went up for a rebound.

Pelligrino injured this same hand in the St. Francis game, knocking two fingers out of place. Against Brown, he played up to the game that has been expected of him. Sam Nissell, another Friar second-year man, got a painful mouth cut but is listed to start, along with Walt Lozoski, Charlie Bresnahan and Ray Garcia. Johnny Mitchell, one of the smallest college players in the country, will complete Coach Red Haire's starting five. Coach Haire has brought the team along well since three opening setbacks. He's hoping for a clean sweep this week over P.C., St. Joseph's and Coast Guard, although the Friars playing up to their top game, could do it.

Principals Dismiss Westerly's Protest

The Principals' Committee on Athletics last night dismissed Westerly's protest of the defeat by North Providence's quintet and based its action on Article 4, Section 3, of the committee manual, which reads:

"The committee reserves the right to refuse to accept a protest if the protesting team fails to notify the officials of the game at the time of the incident that they are finishing the contest under protest."

According to John L. Burke, committee chairman, Westerly authorities did not inform Charles E. Murray and Lloyd E. Grant, referees of the disputed overtime contest, that they were completing the game under protest.

The chairman added that "reports of the officials do not substantiate the grounds of the protest."

Westerly had filed its protest on the following three-count basis:

1—The three-minute overtime was played with straight running time instead of with a stopped clock on all dead balls, as legally required.

Westerly Gets Forfeit

2—Intermission between the fourth period and the overtime was only one minute, instead of two minutes, as legally required.

3—The teams changed baskets for the overtime instead of retaining the same hoops, as legally required.

While North Providence's unexpected 51-46 triumph, top surprise of the whole schoolboy cage season, was ordered to stand, the unplayed Mount St. Charles-Westerly game of the first round was forfeited to Westerly on the grounds that Mount St. Charles had failed to appear for the contest after arrangements had been made.

Discussion of possible necessity for special contests to undo ties for playoff positions next week before the start of the state tournament on Mar. 3, resulted in a vote to request Class A teams participating in contests with a possible bearing on the fourth divisional playoff position to move forward their final league

dates from Tuesday to Monday of next week.

Class A contests next week which may have some bearing on the fourth playoff location, as of this writing, are Hope-St. Raphael, and Pawtucket West-Mount Pleasant.

In the event extra engagements are necessary to decide playoff positions in B and C, as well as in A, neutral floors will be selected by Francis Mullen, playoffs director.

P.C. Plans Meet

Subsequent to the reading of a communication from the Basketball Officials' Association requesting that school authorities make particular efforts to keep basketball assemblies orderly, the committee discussed at length problems involved in crowd control and voted to continue the discussion at future meetings.

On request, Sacred Heart was moved from Class C to Class B in baseball, and another request by the Rhode Island Football Coaches for restoration of the old offside rule also was granted for the 1949 season.

Restoration of the old offside regulation will permit linemen to go across the neutral zone without being penalized, provided they return outside before the ball is snapped, except in the event of interference with the center.

The track meet to be sponsored by Providence College at the new outdoor board track at Hendricken Field was sanctioned for Mar. 12, when R.I. and Massachusetts schoolboys will be invited to participate, according to Harry Coates, P.C. track coach.

In other business, the R.I. Swimming Coaches' Association was recognized officially.

Colby Spills Providence By 79-62 Margin

Waterville, Feb. 9. — Colby's classy court Mules rushed a sluggish Providence College team off its feet in the first period tonight and went on to a 79-62 victory, setting a scoring mark for the new field house. The former standard was 68.

Lee Williams' Blue and Gray quintet sped to a 22-8 advantage after ten minutes of play and the Rhode Islanders could regain little of this ground, eventually falling three more points behind. Colby led 45-27 at the half and the closest Providence could get was a ten-point deficit in the second half.

Tubby Washburn blazed away for 16 Colby points in the first half and added ten more in the second session for tallying honors.

Newton, Mass., Feb. 23.—The Providence College Friars turned in one of their best games of the season here this afternoon only the Boston College Eagles were a mite better and squeezed out a 63-to-59 victory, reversing a previous setback at Providence.

It was a well-spent afternoon for those who crowded into B.C.'s small gymnasium for the Freshmen also put on a fine game, with the Friar Frosh scoring a 75-to-70 decision over the Boston College Eaglets. Both were spirited contests.

Fran "Shanky" Pelligrino scored 27 points for the Friars in the varsity game in which the outcome was in doubt right up until the finish.

Both Boston College and Providence were "up" for the game, which was aggressive and tightly-played over the route. It was a tough game for the Friars to lose for they played a topnotch brand of ball and were considerably improved over some of their previous contests.

Eagles Rally Ahead

Providence wasted little time or effort in its early scoring. Baskets by Al Becker, Pelligrino and Ray Garcia made it 6-0 before the Eagles counted on a free throw by Tom Deegan, who played an outstanding game on the boards. P.C. held a 13-to-4 lead before Mort Staggoff threw in Boston's first field goal about seven minutes along. But that started an Eagle rally and they scored 13 straight points for a 17-13 lead at the 10-minute mark.

The second 10 minutes were played at a fast pace, with the Eagles having a slight edge as Tom O'Brien featured. The Friars were only one point behind, 19-18, as Sam Nissell sank two free throws and it was, 24-20, with four minutes remaining. Garcia dropped in three foul shots and the Eagles left the court with a five-point lead, 28-23, at intermission.

Pelligrino, Westerly resident who really hit a hot pace yesterday, led a five-point rally early in the second half, bringing the Friars within a basket but later the Eagles shot their margin up to eight points at 41-33. This surge that Weinstock led, again put the Friars within a basket of the Eagles at 45-43. Hickey scored with 28 seconds left, making it 63-57. Garcia drove in for the Friars last basket and they couldn't get the ball back in the remaining 23 seconds.

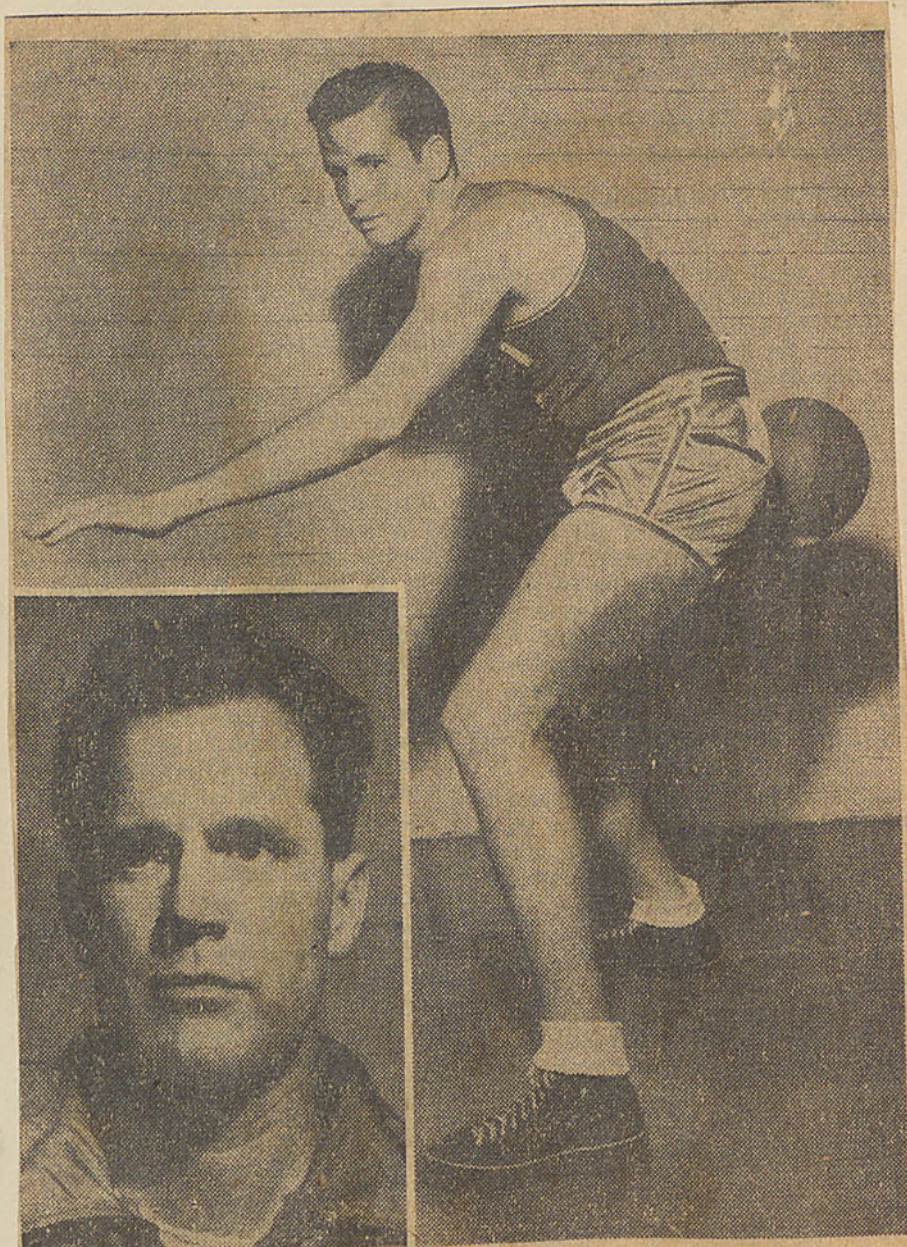

Coach Harry Coates says things are progressing nicely with his Providence College track forces and he's looking forward to the Friar's progress in the track world. He's staging a meet this afternoon up on Hendricken Field, long noted as a scene for football and baseball games, and will unveil his new board track to the public with an informal program put on by members of the Providence College Spike Shoe Club.

Harry is going along slowly, concentrating on his Freshmen relay team for the most part, but gradually building up in the other departments. The Frosh relay quartet of Bill Keenan, Dan Walsh, Bob Aldrich and John Cassidy recently ran a fine race in Newark, losing to a Seton Hall combine, anchored by Charlie Slade, by seven or eight feet in a mile event.

Prep for Penn Relays

Cassidy, from Jersey City, made up plenty of yardage on Slade but couldn't close the gap. Granted that Slade was probably coasting, Cassidy's 50.4 timing in flat shoes on a flat track is good going in Coates' book. The team did approximately 3:32.6 for the distance. He's going to prep them for the Penn Relays where his former Seton Hall team holds the record at 3:18.9 but knows the competition is stiff at Penn's big carnival.

The board track, which was built in less than a month, the entire top surface being put on in five days, will be 11 laps to the mile, the same as the Boston and New York Garden tracks. It can also be cut down to fit the Auditorium where Coates hopes to stage a meet next season. Right now it's located in front of the big football grandstand at Hendricken Field. He can have a 70-yard straight away and is anticipating a fine turnout for his invitation meet on March 12.

Field, Track Events

This afternoon there'll be competition in the 60, 300, 600, half mile, and sprint relay with each man running 160 yards. Gerry Alexander, winner of the New England javelin crown last summer, will give a demonstration in his event while Anthony Fratantuono will throw the discus. That is if the weather is suitable. John Shanley in the sprint and pole vault is another athlete of promise

points. Charlie Bresnahan's foul shot tied it up at 14-all and the score was knotted at 16 each after 10 minutes. The visitors forged ahead with three baskets by Zeno and two foul conversions by Bill Brower, and took a 26-20 lead with five minutes of the half remaining.

The Friars cut the gap down to four points, but hoops by Joe Cahill, Frank Murphy and Zeno on a break-away left R.P.I. seven points ahead, 33-27, at intermission.

Both teams covered closely in the first few minutes of the second half with Providence cutting down the Engineers' margin to two points. A pop shot by Bresnahan, a layup by Ray Garcia and two clever baskets by Larry De Palma boosted the Friars to 34-36 about five minutes along in the second half. They still trailed, 39-42, after eighth minutes, despite two fine scores by De Palma and Garcia.

Later down seven points at 46-39, the Friars came up to 45-46. Al Becker's two foul shots, a basket by Garcia and two free throws by De Palma left them one point short and Garcia, who played one of his best games, had the opportunity to tie the score but he missed a free throw.

This week, speaking of things intercollegiate, should be very productive along the New England scene. For instance, tonight Rhode Island State is expected to wrap up the state basketball crown in its session with Providence College at the Auditorium and on Saturday Holy Cross and Yale will have much to say about where the invitation to the NCAA tournament will be sent.

Visitors Grab Lead, Fight Of Stubborn Providence for 12th Victory

The rangy Rensselaer basketball team chalked up its 12th victory in 14 starts with a 60-to-55 decision over the Providence College Friars in a close, hard-fought tussle last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

Although the Engineers from Troy, N.Y., led practically all the way, their biggest lead was seven points and the outcome was in doubt right up until the final minutes.

R. P. I., in beating the Friars for the second straight year and by approximately the same margin, showed a fast-moving ball club, sparked by Ed Zeno, a rugged forward, and Richie Lassen, cocky and tricky small man who led the Engineers' final drive.

The teams never were very far apart in the point column, though Rensselaer had a 24-to-18 margin in field goals. The Friars made up some of this deficit by sinking 19 out of 26 free throws, though they had enough shots in the final minutes to close the gap, had the ball been dropping.

The Engineers led, 10-7, at the five-minute mark, with Fran Pelligrino accounting for five of the Providence

Mahoney, the Worcester magician, will face one of the finest basketball players in Eastern college circles.

Special interest is lent to this game since Bob Cousy, striving to exceed George Kaftan's all-time Holy Cross mark of 1177 points, has but three more games to overtake him. Cousy entered last night's Boston University contest with a total of 1104 points.

Brown's starting line-up also includes two Massachusetts boys, Ezra Creswell of Braintree and Fred Kozak of Fall River. Two other local boys almost sure to see much action are Bennett Patrick, 6:4 center from Worcester, and Alfred Gauthier of Middleboro.

The Providence-St. Anselm's likewise will lend special interest since their line-ups feature products of local high schools. The Friars have a stellar guard in Arthur Weinstock, formerly of Newton; Jimmy Powers, once with Mission high of Roxbury; and Bill Ahern, of East Boston. St. Anselm's, on the other hand, have Mike Hession, of Millville, Bobbie Lyons of Randolph; Paul Senior, Worcester and Tuss Bastin, of Chicopee. St. Anselm's has one of the highest scoring teams in the nation.

The Rhode Island State and Providence College basketball teams, currently possessing contrasting fortunes, will clash in a return game tonight at Rodman Hall, Kingston.

The Rams are coasting along with a six-game winning streak—their longest of the season—while the hapless Friars have dropped their last eight contests, probably the most prolonged losing streak in P.C. court history.

Since their loss to Holy Cross, the State hoopsters have disposed of P.C., St. Joseph's, Coast Guard, New Hampshire, Maine and Connecticut and have boosted their season's victory total to 13 as against six defeats.

The Friars have won only six out of 20 games, but turned in sound performances in their last two losing ventures against Boston College and Rensselaer. In their first meeting with State two weeks ago, the P.C. cagers put up stiff resistance until midway in the second half before dropping a 74-61 decision.

Goodwin the Ace

Big Ken Goodwin, who scored 27 points, was the big difference in that game, so it behooves the Friars to put a clamp on him tonight. But then again, it probably will take more than a tight rein on Goodwin to stop State, as some of the Rams' recent victims have discovered all too late.

At times when the big fellow has been bottled up, Bruce Blount, Sal Sclafani, or Leon Golembiewski have provided more than enough points to make up the difference. It appears the Rams will chalk up victory No. 14 tonight.

The State freshmen quintet which handed the Connecticut yearlings their first defeat of the season Saturday will oppose the P.C. freshmen in the preliminary at 6 o'clock. The Friar first-year club defeated the Ramlets handily in their first engagement.

Tonight's tussle at Kingston will launch the season's semi-final week of competition for the R.I. college fives, and a busy one it will be. Providence College has three other games scheduled, Brown two and State one.

P.C. in Tourney

The Friars will play St. Anselm's in the Boston Garden tomorrow

night in the second game of a double-header that also will match Brown against Holy Cross. On Wednesday and Thursday, P.C. will compete in the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball tournament at New Britain, Conn. Brown will entertain Dartmouth and State will visit Springfield on Saturday.

Last week saw Princeton bounce Yale out of the Ivy League's lead with a 47-45 victory, but the loss didn't impair the Elis' chances of becoming the District I representatives in the NCAA tourney. However, the setback handed St. Louis by the Oklahoma Aggies Saturday virtually clinched the Missouri Valley title for Hank Iba's cagers and put them on top for NCAA consideration. The Billikens undoubtedly will get a call from the National Invitation Tourney just the same.

Rams Have Won Last 10 Hoop Tilts Between Schools

Not since Coach Larry Drew's playing days have the Providence College Friars beaten the Rhode Island State Rams and it will take a herculean effort on the part of the Friars to upset the Kingston quintet when they meet tonight at 8:30 o'clock at the R.I. Auditorium.

The freshmen teams meet at 7 o'clock with both first-year outfits among the best that have represented their respective schools in recent seasons. The Ramlets are a classy group, while the Friars, not as fancy but just as successful, have a strong team which dropped a 1-point decision to the Holy Cross yearlings and lost by six points to Boston College.

Rhode Island State, stripped of its sectional and national hopes, still looms much too strong for the Friars, who haven't won over a State basketball team since the 1941-42 season. That was the year that State's Stutz Modzelewski finished up a brilliant career. The Friars, led by Ted McCannon, Larry Drew, Chet Zabek and Bill Reilly, scored a 60-54 victory over a team which had won six of its first seven starts, losing only to Temple.

The next year the Rams had their revenge. The Friars, still under Ed Crotty's direction, won their first eight games, but the Rams took them into camp, 56-54, at the Auditorium. Later they swept the series at Kingston, although the Friars won 15 out of 20 games that season. Ernie Calverley broke in that year and the Friars haven't been able to win since, losing the last 10 games in the series.

Up on Smith Hill, the Providence College backers expect their team to break out as it did against Boston College. However, the Friars have lost their last four starts, although at times playing some fine ball but not for long enough periods to win.

There are two questionable starters, one on each team, and each is a key man. Sal Sclafani of State hurt his ankle against Holy Cross but it's reported o.k. at Kingston. The Friars' sophomore center, Shanky Pelligrino from Westerly, reinjured his hand in

the Brown game when he whacked the backboard late in the contest as he went up for a rebound.

Pelligrino injured this same hand in the St. Francis game, knocking two fingers out of place. Against Brown, he played up to the game that has been expected of him. Sam Nissell, another Friar second-year man, got a painful mouth cut but is listed to start, along with Walt Lozowski, Charlie Bresnahan and Ray Garcia. Larry De Palma and Joe Blain rate with this combination, with De Palma showing his best work against Brown.

Kenny Goodwin and Leon Golembiewski should give the Friars the most trouble. Goodwin is having his best season with the Rams, while Golembiewski doesn't get the attention his play merits. He's a good rough man under the hoop and his rebounding frequently sets the State offense in motion. He's a former GI who spent considerable time in a German prison camp. He isn't a smooth player but certainly an effective one.

Bruce Blount hasn't been hitting too well of late, although Sclafani's set shooting has taken up some of the slack. Johnny Mitchell, one of the smallest college players in the country, will complete Coach Red Haire's starting five. Coach Haire has brought the team along well since three opening setbacks. He's hoping for a clean sweep this week over P.C., St. Joseph's and Coast Guard, although the Friars playing up to their top game, could do it.

The St. Louis U. Billikens were beaten 68-60 last night by Ohio State, with Ed Macauley scoring 19 points. Ohio scored field goals on 26 out of 58 shots, nearly a 50 per cent average. The Buckeyes forged ahead in the last minutes of the first half and led the rest of the way. It was St. Louis' second defeat and Ohio's second major upset, for they tipped over Minnesota earlier. Bob Donham and Dick Schnittker scored 46 of the Ohio points with 24 and 22 respectively.

While Rhode Island State has lost its grip on New England supremacy with Holy Cross and Yale coming to the front and the Connecticut Huskies ruling the Yankee Conference, the Rams are still the top team in their own domain and appear strong enough to sweep their series with Brown and Providence College.

They're already up on the Bears and tomorrow night they'll be favored to turn back the Friars at the Auditorium. The Friars haven't been too successful against Rhody teams in recent seasons, dropping their last 10 games with practically a third college generation yet to see the Black and White score a victory over the Boys in Blue from Kingston on the basketball court.

State has a big week, meeting the St. Joseph's Hawks from Philadelphia at the Auditorium on Thursday and the Coast Guard Academy at Rodman Hall on Saturday. The Friars travel to Springfield, hoping to square their series with the Gymnasts on Saturday, while Brown meets M.I.T. at Cambridge on Wednesday and faces Connecticut on Saturday at Marvel Gym.

Brown was the most successful of the R. I. teams last week, turning back the Friars, 59-51, on Saturday night with Freddy Kozak playing a leading role in the victory. However, Tech beat B.U. and Connecticut boasts a 16-3 record, one of the best in New England. Moe Mahoney, while adequate on the floor, isn't shooting up to his sophomore form, although Brown won the game Saturday without benefit of his services in the stretch.

Rhode Island flashed its old scoring game against a weak Bucknell team but couldn't fathom the Crusaders' slow-balling tactics. Kenny Goodwin and Leon Golembiewski have been carrying the State load for the most part, with Sal Sclafani offering some assistance with his set shooting. Golembiewski is quiet effective around the boards

and the Friars don't have the altitude to handle him.

The Friars have been in a slump of late, although Walt Lozoski, Larry De Palma and Fran Pelligrino were very good at times in the Brown game. Coach Larry Drew has depth but lacks the quality for a sustained and consistently effective game. Pelligrino was hot against Brown, playing his top game since he moved up to the varsity.

Holy Cross and Yale may settle the New England leadership when they meet Saturday night at New Haven, although the Crusaders play Georgetown and Columbia before that. Yale hasn't been beaten by a N.E. team as yet, winning 10 straight and having a 16-4 record. Dartmouth, the only N.E. team to beat the Cross, meets Yale on Wednesday. Joe Zabilski's Northeastern team has been doing well in its own league.

Improved and He Will Be

Ready for Full Duty

The basketball forces of Providence College and Rhode Island State will clash at the Auditorium tonight, with Coach Bob Haire's Rams rated strong favorites to pick up the marbles.

The preliminary starting at 7 o'clock will bring together the Freshman teams of both schools. Both first-year clubs have run up impressive strings of victories and appear to be fairly evenly matched.

The Rams have taken their bumps this season at the hands of some of the East's perennial court powers, but they still appear capable of ruling the roost as far as the R.I. college picture is concerned. They have won seven and lost six and turned in their best basketball in beating Rutgers, Springfield and Brown in successive games.

Sclafani Ready

It seems that as Ken Goodwin and Bruce Blount go, so go the Rams. On nights when this pair is clicking with their shots, the rest of the State offense seems to take care of itself. Goodwin operates best from the pivot and Blount can connect from both outside and inside. Big Leon Golembiewski, a vastly improved player, and Sal Sclafani are the work-horses who help out considerably with the backboard clearings and along with the other starter, little John Mitchell set the Rams' plays in motion.

Sclafani aggravated an old ankle sprain in the Holy Cross game last Friday, but he worked out with the squad yesterday and will be ready for full duty tonight.

Thus far State's reserves have seen very little action, with Don Shannon, Walt Basler and George Handler spelling the starting quintet only briefly.

By contrast, Coach Larry Drew invariably has used 10 or more operatives for considerable periods in most of P. C.'s 16 games. With nine sophomores on the roster, Drew, obviously with an eye on the future, has attempted to bring the second-year group along as a whole. Sometimes he has used them exclusively as a unit and on other occasions worked them in with the experienced members.

Brown and H.C., P.C. and Hawks On Garden Care

Providence College and Brown University will make a double-barreled invasion of the Boston Garden tonight to meet the basketball force of St. Anselm's and Holy Cross, respectively.

The Bruins and the Crusaders will hook up in the first game at 7:45 and the Friars will play their annual tilt with the Hawks at 9:30.

The in-and-out Brown cagers will be seeking their 11th victory in 18 games and will be out to avenge a 77-50 drubbing administered by the Crusaders at the Marvel Gym back in January. If Moe Mahoney and Co. can click as they did against Connecticut two weeks ago, then the Crusaders will be in for a busy evening.

The nightcap will bring together two former P.C. teammates, Larry Drew and Ted McConnon, who now direct the basketball activities at Providence and St. Anselm's, respectively. McConnon is in his third season at the Manchester school and has enjoyed his share of success but has yet to beat his old alma mater.

Last year the Friars beat the Hawks, 60-49, at the Boston Arena. The New Hampshire quintet is paced by several former Rhode Island schoolboy stars, among them Vin Martley of Pawtucket East, Chuck Tobin of St. Raphael, and Bud O'Connor of De La Salle.

IMPROVED CLUB

It will be Holy Cross vs. Brown and St. Anselm's vs. Providence.

Lew Shaw, the Brown publicist was on hand with the news that the youthful Bruins club has improved greatly and may give the Purple quite a tussle.

Rev. A. B. Begley representing Providence College pointed out that the Friars were having their worst season in collegiate history with eight straight losses and only six wins in 20 games (excluding last night's R. I. State game) but that St. Anselm's was an objective game and that the Friars would be up for this one.

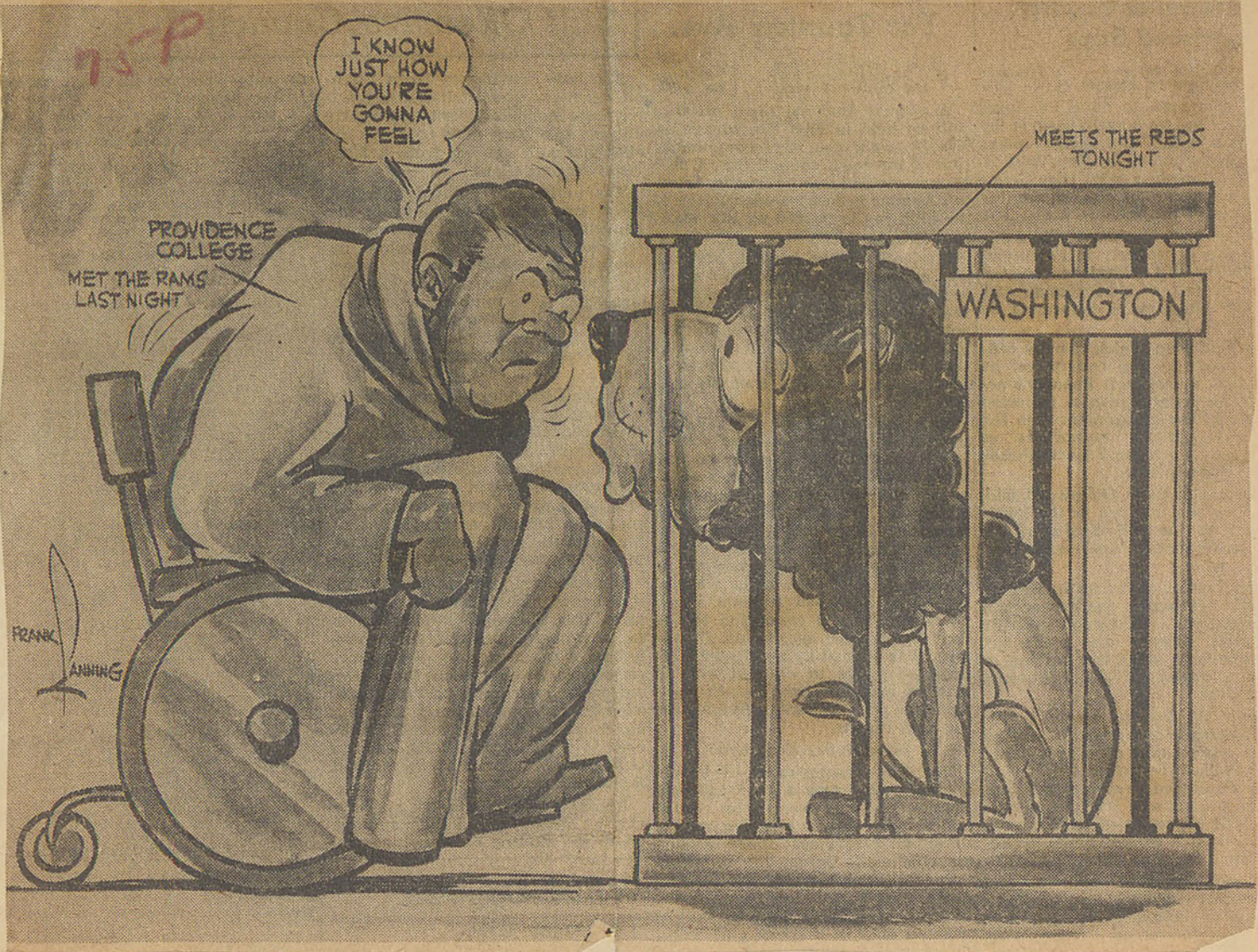

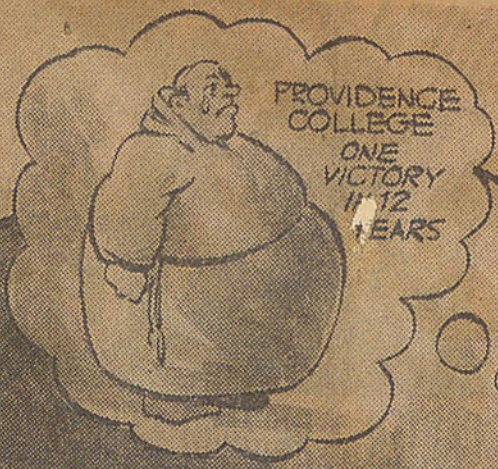

Rams Cuff Friars, 74-61; Bears Play MIT Tonight

While you have to score points to win basketball games and Rhode Island State scored 74 while the Providence College Friars were collecting 61, a tactical maneuver by Coach Bob "Red" Haire of the Rams had as much to do with stopping the Friars as anything else last night at the Auditorium.

However, the Rams also were loose and confident, two elements that were lacking when they faced Holy Cross last Friday. And at times they zipped the ball around as if they were scrimmaging down in Rodman Hall.

When the Rams were running up their big scores with the fast break, several teams cut down their point

Well, Coach Haire, in order to gain more benefit from the extra height possessed by Ken Goodwin and Leon Golembiewski, reversed this order and played two men at mid-court when the Friars were shooting their fouls. The Friars had to cover them or take the consequences and this cut down PC's rebound percentage on misses considerably.

Goodwin starred in the rebound department, while Golembiewski and Sal Sclafani also helped out. The Friars were missing in close and losing possession for the most part with the tall Rams recovering. And

State used the fast break with success just enough to keep the Friars anxious and back.

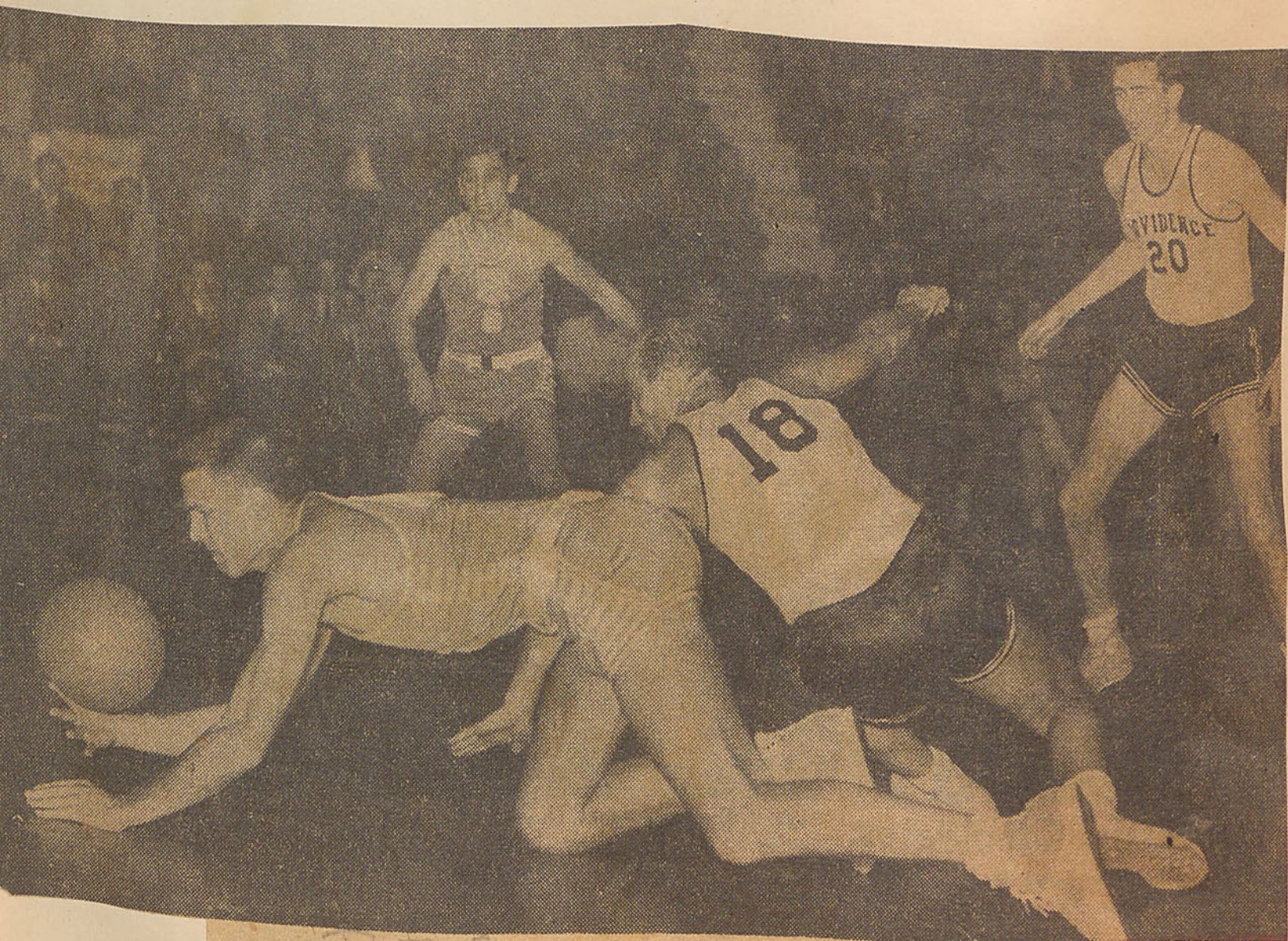
Providence played an aggressive, fighting game but they couldn't overtake the Rams. The Friars played them fairly even at some stages, but the Rams were more alert and equal to their opportunities than they had been against Holy Cross. It was one of Rhody's best games and on a par with their mid-season victories over Rutgers, Springfield and Brown.

State led 12-9 at the five-minute mark and 24-14 after 12 minutes. They had a 16-point lead, 34-18, before the Friars counter-rallied to cut the margin down to 37-28 at the half. Right after the rest, Rhody scored seven straight points for another 16-point lead at 44-28. The Friars were within seven points, at 55-48, but each time the closed the gap at all, Rhode Island would come back strong and regain control of the play.

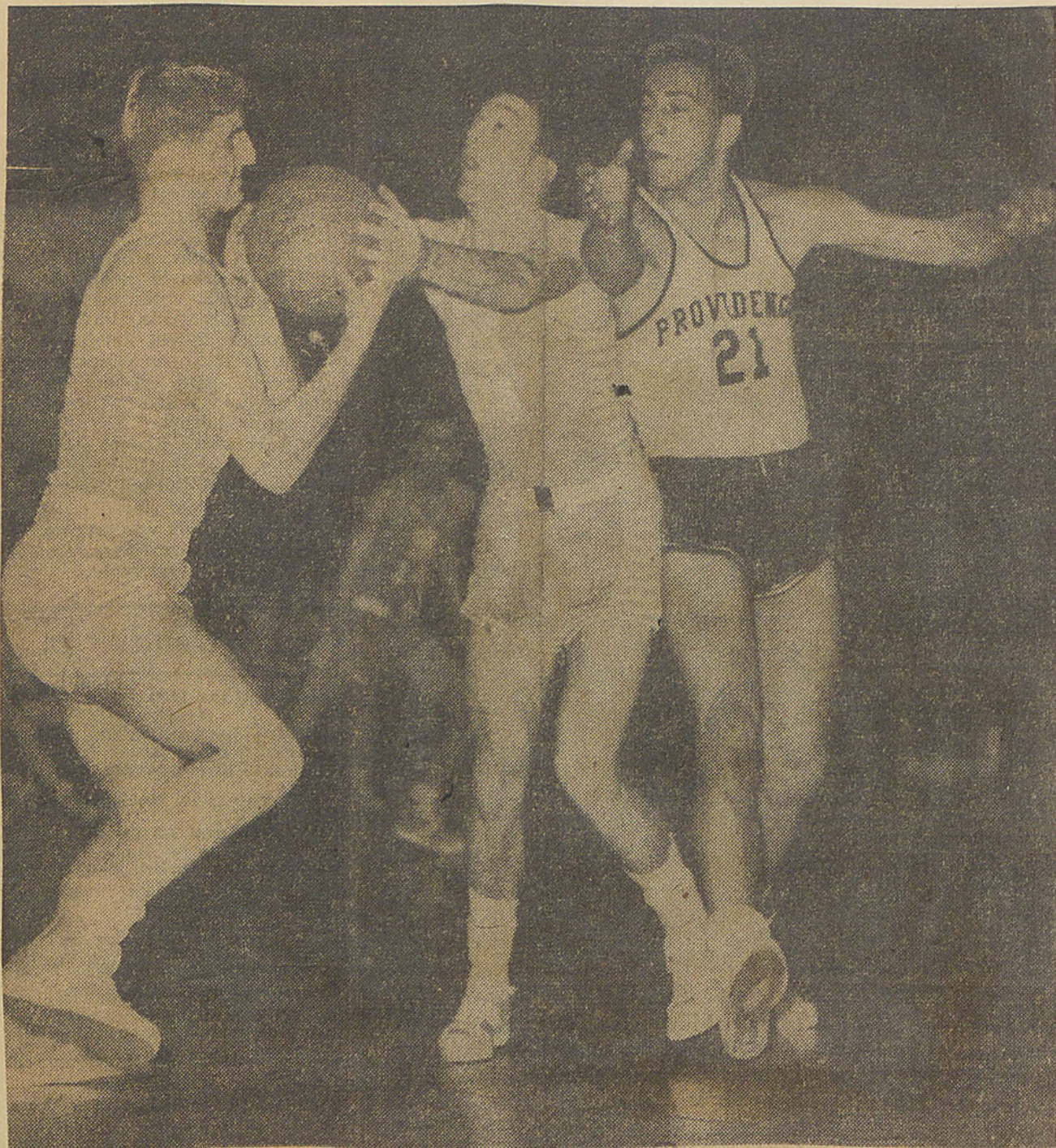

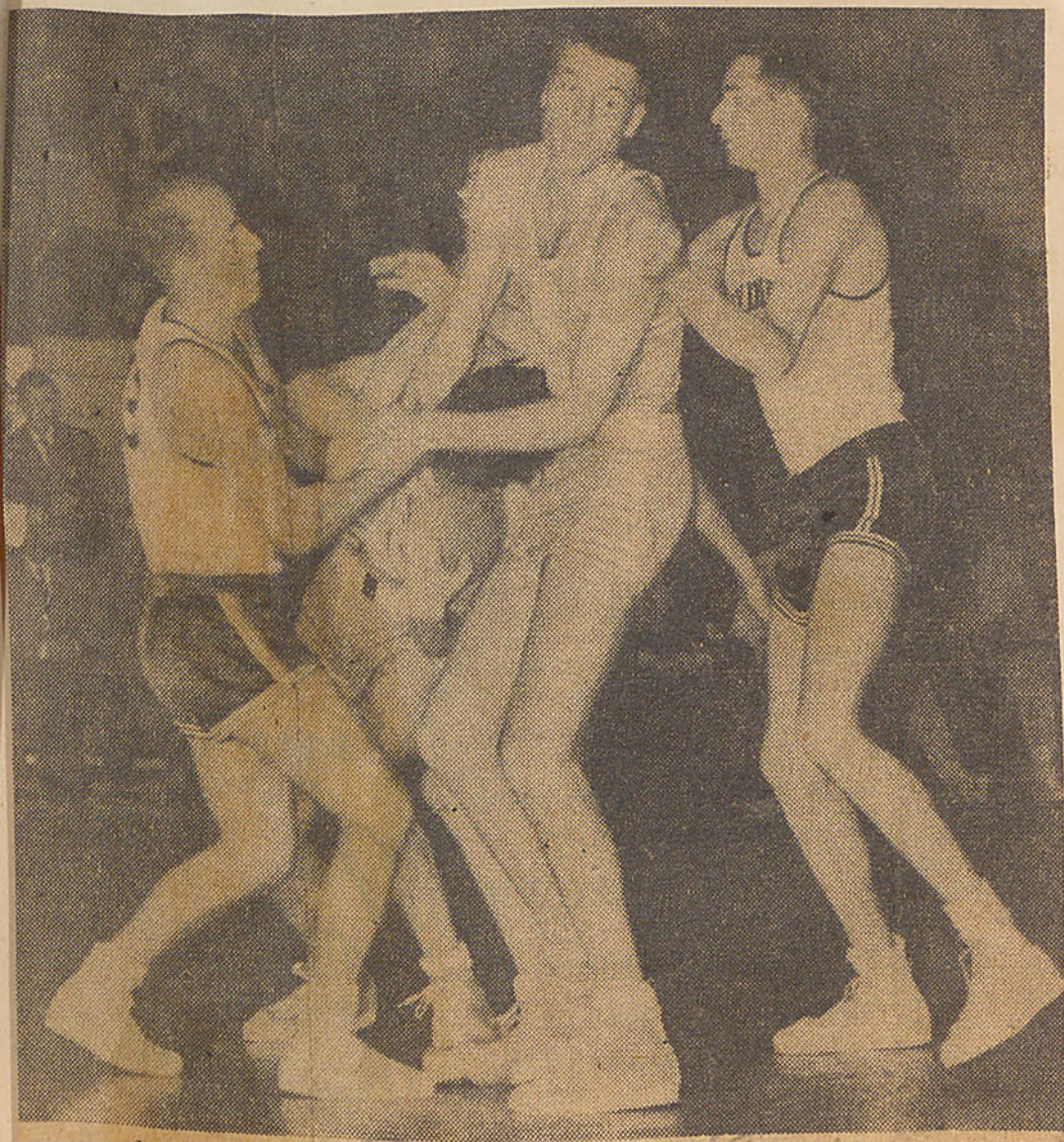

RAMS LEAD, 51-29, AT INTERMISSION; TRY FOR CENTURY

Co-Capts. Goodwin, Sclafani
Play Feature Roles
in Home Finale

The Providence College Friars found no refuge in Kingston's Rodman Hall from last night's northeast blizzard as the Rhode Island State Rams snowed them under with a shower of baskets which added up to a 99-53 setback.

It was a close game for the first six minutes with the Friars going ahead once briefly and the score being tied up three times. From there on, however, the Rams began to roll and, with P. C. scores becoming more infrequent, pulled away to a 51-29 lead at halftime.

The Friars battled desperately to close the gap in the second half but no matter what combination Coach Larry Drew used, State's margin mounted steadily.

State's reserves saw a good bit of action in both periods but Coach Red Haire allowed Co-Captains Ken Goodwin and Sal Sclafani to stay in there most of the time since the game marked their last appearance on the Rams' home court.

Goodwin Sinks 35

Goodwin showed his appreciation by scoring 35 points, far and away the best individual effort of the night. The big fellow dumped in 11 baskets and sank 13 out of 13 foul shots. In addition, he completely dominated both backboards throughout the fracas. Sclafani was runner-up in the Ram scoring with 14.

When Haire finally lifted Goodwin for the last time two minutes from the end, the campus rooters were still reluctant to part with his services and loudly demonstrated their feelings with the battle cry, "We want Goodwin."

With the element of a contest eliminated during the final 10 minutes, the Ram reserves set their sights on breaking the 100-point mark for the first time this season. The Friars were just as determined to spoil their fun and barely succeeded. Bill Shannon closed the scoring as the gun sounded with a spectacular basket practically pulled out of his hip pocket.

Rams' 14th Victory

The victory was the Rams' 14th in 20 games and their seventh in a row. It was P.C.'s 15th setback in 21 games and its ninth straight reverse.

State sank 38 field goals in 99 attempts and 23 free throws out of 38. The Friars caged 21 baskets in 78 shots and 11 of 25 from the charity stripe. Twenty-one personal fouls were called against P.C. and 18 against State.

Ray Garcia, who was the only player banished with five personals, paced the Friars' point production with 17. Larry DePalma aggravated an old ankle injury late in the first half and was unable to return to the game. He is not expected to be available for tonight's game with St. Anselm in Boston.

In a preliminary game the R.I. State freshmen evened the score with the Friar yearlings by capturing a 72-67 victory. The P.C. freshmen won the first game at the Auditorium two weeks ago.

GOODWIN GUIDES KINGSTON CAGERS WITH 27 POINTS

Blount and Sclafani Prove Big Help; 61 Fouls Are Called in Game

The Rhode Island State Rams, true to their role of favorites, scored a 74-61 victory over Providence College last night before a slender 1500 crowd at the R.I. Auditorium.

The underdog Friars put up a spirited battle all the way but their adversaries spiced their determination with artistry in shooting that the P.C. forces didn't possess last night. Furthermore, with big Ken Goodwin of State controlling the backboards most of the way, the Friars generally discovered that it was miss and out when their shots went awry, which was all too often to kindle P.C.'s victory hopes.

The natural rivalry existing between the two schools generated terrific tension right from the start and contributed largely to the staggering total of 61 personal fouls. The Friars were charged with 34 and State 27. Each team lost three players via the five-foul route, Leon Golembiewski, Sal Sclafani and John Mitchell were State's early departees while Capt. Charlie Bresnahan, Larry DePalma and Ray Garcia were banished from the P.C. roster ahead of schedule.

Rams Get 25 or 60

Faulty marksmanship hurt the Friars considerably, especially in the first half when they were trying to catch the Rams before the game got beyond control. In general the P.C. cagers moved the ball well and set their shooters up with several close shots but they couldn't sink them in the clutch. Over the route the Friars made only 22 baskets in 81 attempts while the Rams fired in 25 out of 60.

Leading State's scoring parade was Goodwin who registered 11 baskets and five foul shots for 27 points. Most of his goals from the floor came on pivot shots or tap-ins on rebounds as P. C. didn't have a man big enough to give him an argument on that score. He hit on 11 out of 15. Bruce Blount scored 13, made several contributions on other State scores and was a big help to Goodwin with backboard clearings. Sclafani was the only other Ram to hit double figures with 12 and he played a good defensive game as well.

The Friars' best marksmen were Bresnahan and Fran Pellegrino, each of whom made seven baskets. Bresnahan wound up with 17 points and Pellegrino 15.

Eighth for State

It was State's eighth victory of the season in 14 games and the Rams' 22nd victory in the P.C. series. The Friars dropped their 12th decision of the campaign against five triumphs. They have only captured six in the series with the Rams.

State jumped into the lead 30 seconds after the opening tap-off on Goodwin's basket but the Friars pulled up to a 2-2 tie at the one-minute mark on DePalma's two-pointer. The deadlock was short-lived as Blount bagged a pair of lay-ups in the next 45 seconds.

The Friars got two points back on Pellegrino's one-hand set from the side and stayed within two points of the Rams until four minutes along when State started to pull away. Scores by Sclafani, Goodwin, and Golembiewski boosted State's margin to 17-9 at the six-minute mark.

P. C. Freshmen Win

That gap prevailed until 15 minutes along when the Rams went ahead by 16 points at 34-18. A rally paced by Walt Lozoski, DePalma and Pellegrino enabled the Friars to narrow State's lead to 37-28 at half-time.

Twice in the second half the Ram's lead soared to 16 points, first at 44-28 then at 48-32 but then the Friars got rolling with Bresnahan, Sam Nissell, Ed Mooney, Garcia and Pellegrino producing the points and closed the gap to 48-55. Later they trailed by 54-62 but each time they got that close Goodwin, Blount or Mitchell had the answer with a couple of quick scores that put the Rams a safe distance away again.

The Providence College Freshman team salvaged some consolation for the Friar adherents by trouncing the State yearlings, 77-56, in a preliminary. The P. C. first-year club has lost only two games this season and last night's defeat was only the third of the season for the Ramlets.

The streaks of greased lightning known as the Rhode Island Rams came within one point Monday night of hitting the century mark against the Friars of Providence College. The Rams fast-broke themselves to a 99-53 victory for their fourteenth win of the season.

For the first four or five minutes of the game the Drewmen were able to keep pace with the swift-moving Hairemen, but the Rams began to click with their usual accuracy in the confines of Rodman Hall. Ken Goodwin and Sal Scalfani, co-captains of the team, led the onslaught with 35 and 14 points respectively. It was one of Goodwin's best nights of the season as he netted 13 straight foul shots.

The field events, the discus and javelin throw, were performed on Hendricken Field while the track events were run off on the board track.

Jerry Alexander, sophomore javelin thrower, Anthony Fratontuono, discus hurler, and Bill Sherry, winner of the half-mile run, stood out in victory.

Alexander, a La Salle grad and a trackman of some repute while at that institution, tossed the spear 198 feet and 11 inches to win that event in a walkaway. This tremendous throw was the best effort of his career. A distance of 198 feet is good enough to take most collegiate javelin throwers in the entire country. In his chosen event, Tony Fratontuono threw the discus 147 feet and 4 inches, which is also a very acceptable distance for intercollegiate competition. Tony came to P.C. from Classical High in Providence and specializes also in the shot-put.

Sophomore dashman, Bill Sherry, won the 880-yard run and turned in the fast time of 2:03.4. John Cassedy, anchor-man of the Freshman relay team, copped the 300-yard dash in the time of 34.1 seconds. Providence Bows, 72 to 63;

St. Anselm Defeats
Colby, 76-58

New Britain, Conn., Mar. 2.—The New Britain Teachers and the St. Anselm Hawks qualified to fight it out for the New England bid to the NAIB Tourney at Kansas City by conquering the P.C. Friars and Colby College, respectively, here tonight.

The Teachers, winning their ninth straight game, handed Providence College a 72-to-63 setback in the finale tonight, after St. Anselm, coached by Ted McConnon of Pawtucket, turned back Colby, 76 to 58, in the opener.

The Friars started slowly, but once they warmed up, gave the Teachers a game of it, though New Britain controlled the boards by means of height of Hank Massa and Burr Carlson. The Friars came up to within three points in the second half, but just as they appeared to be coming on, the Teachers got hot again and pulled away.

Alex Becker and Skip McGurkin paced the Rhode Islanders with 13 and 11 points, respectively. McGurkin did some fine set shooting and the team as a whole played spirited ball.

The Teachers jumped into a 17-to-4 lead in the first half, but the Friars whittled the lead down with Bill Higgins and Ed Mooney chipping in some of the points that closed the gap. The Friars were five points behind, 27-22, at one point and trailed, 30-24, at intermission.

New Britain jumped its lead to 12 points at the start of the second half, but then Providence put on its best drive in several recent games. Walt Lozoski, who received a tremendous hand when he fouled out late in the game, did some clever passing in the spurt, with Joe Blain, Mooney and Ed Pelligrino pitching in with baskets.

This surge, which cut down the Teachers' lead to three points at 41-38, nearly changed the complexion of the contest for the Friars were clicking and the Teachers were missing. However, Providence couldn't keep up its brilliant pace and the Teachers again took control.

Carlson, a 6-foot, 6-inch center, played a fine game for the Teachers, which the Friars couldn't match around the boards, though they did play a better brand of ball than shown in their last three outings.

The Teachers showed a flashy offensive at times, but they also were hitting with their shots when it did the most good. Tomorrow night Providence will play Colby in the opening game at 7:30 o'clock.

Although St. Anselm had an 18-point margin at the finish, the game was closer than that with the Hawks pulling away in the final minutes. They had only a 34-30 margin at halftime.

Russ Washburn of Colby was the game's top scorer with 24 points. Chuck Tobin, from De La Salle Academy in Newport, dropped in 18, as did Russ Bastin, the Hawks' tall center.

Thigpen and Joyce to Race at P.C.

2 Stars Who Ran to Dead Heat in 1947 Matched for 880 in Meet Saturday

Harry Coates, Providence College track coach, will give anyone in the country a stiff argument as to his right to the title of this week's busiest man. That is, of there's any time to argue.

The veteran mentor has assumed the role of matchmaker in lining up the Providence College outdoor relay carnival to be conducted Saturday afternoon on the Friars' brand-new board track, which has been laid out in front of the grandstand on Hendricken Field. The event, first of its kind ever held in Rhode Island, is being sponsored by the P. C. Alumni Association and is expected to draw several of the leading performers of the indoor circuit.

Competition is scheduled for college, high school, amateur and CYO athletes and will get under way at 1:30 p.m.

While relay races will dominate the carnival, Coates has succeeded in arranging several special events and announced last night that Phil Thigpen of Seton Hall College and Carl Joyce of Seton Hall Prep will hook up in a special half-mile duel. Coates, who has been coaching track for more than a quarter of a century, reports that the Thigpen-Joyce clash will mark the first time in American track history that a collegiate and schoolboy champion have been matched in the same race.

Ran to Deadlock

It's not the first time the two have met, however. They first came to grips in the Brown Invitation Interscholastics on Memorial Day, 1947, but that race over the half-mile distance failed to produce a winner. The race was declared a dead heat when Thigpen, running for Seton Hall Prep, and Joyce, then competing for Boston Commerce, hit the tape together after a grueling battle. Their collective time was 1:56.8, five-tenths of a second off the national schoolboy record.

Since then, both have displayed the form expected of them in the major college and amateur meets. Joyce consistently has placed in this winter's indoor meets, both in the mile and half mile. Thigpen is fresh from his victory over Marcel Hansenne of France Saturday night in the 1000-yard run at the Knights of Columbus meet in Madison Square Garden.

La Salle to Compete

Maurice Matteodo and Kazar Apkarian, former Hope athletes, and Ed Bagdanovich, former La Salle star, will head the entries in the AAU-

sanctioned 12-pound shot put. The 35-pound weight and the discus throws also will be staged with AAU approval and the entry of any athlete will be welcomed for these events.

Colleges already entered include P.C., Boston University, Boston College, Seton Hall, Fairfield and Bryant, with a few more likely. La Salle Academy will forego the opportunity to defend its title in the annual Bowdoin College Interscholastics to compete in the P.C. Invitation. Most of the leading R.I. schoolboy track teams also are expected to enter. In addition, a pair of relays have been arranged for CYO teams.

Bobcats Edge Providence 67-65 In Rough Court Duel

Bates College resumed its basketball campaign with a close 67-65 verdict over an aggressive Providence College quintet at Alumni Gym last night before a small crowd of paying customers. The Garnet has been idle since Jan. 20 because of mid-year examinations.

The winners had to come from behind after blowing an early lead in the rough contest that saw officials calling a total of 62 personal fouls, 39 on the Friars and 23 on the home club. The Petro charges cashed in on accurate foul shooting to win the contest as they converted 31 out of 40 attempts from the free throw line. Providence outscored Bates 25-18 on fielders and made 15 out of 23 shots good from the foul line.

SIMPSON FOULS OUT

The Bates triumph was definitely in the upset class and all the more surprising because the Cats lost scoring ace Bill Simpson midway in the second half with the score tied at 54-54. Bill, although not up to his usual form, took scoring honors with 16 points in his limited stay on four fielders and eight free throws. He was closely guarded under the basket and three of his two-pointers were long shots.

The visitors were paced by Fran Pallagrino and Joe Blain who tallied 12 points each and presented an aggressive man-to-man defense with the front two men pressing all the time. Both fouled out late in the contest.

The Friars used nine players in the contest and in addition to losing the above on fouls, six players wound up with four personals and the last had three fouls on him. Bates also lost Ace Bailey on fouls just before the final whistle.

The contest started as a dull affair as neither club could find the range in the first three minutes. The home team connected first when Slim Somerville fed Bailey under the basket. Bob Carpenter followed with two fielders and the Cats were out front. Pellagrino narrowed the margin as his hook shot started clicking and the teams exchanged points with Bates taking a nine-point 17-12 lead midway in the first half.

Providence with Blain setting the pace, pecked away at the margin and caught the Bobcats three minutes before intermission. The visitors went out front before intermission 38-34 on two floor goals by Blain.

Bates went all the way with one substitution in the first half while Providence shifted personnel continuously.

Fouls Tell Story

The losers started the second half st and with Captain Charley Bresnahan setting the pace took a 42-35 lead but not for long as the Bobcats narrowed the gap with free shots until the count was knotted 44-44.

The lead see-sawed back and forth with the score tied five times as Garnet gift tosses equalized Providence two-pointers until Bailey

broke the string at 61-59 to put his team out front to stay with four minutes remaining before the final gun.

The Bobcats went into a stall which failed to work against the aggressive Friars but Bob Carpenter came through with two fielders from the corner to salt the verdict with the visitors still pressing.

BACKBOARD BANTER

Dick Scott took honors from the free throw line with nine conversions in 12 attempts.

The Bates Jayvees routed the Farmington State Teachers College Jayvees 81-34 in the opener. The game itself was insignificant but the fact that Dick Cronon played a full ten minutes at top speed bodes trouble for future Bates foes.

Waldo Tibbetts was in uniform

but failed to see action in the rough going.

Colby coach Lee Williams was in front row seat along with Mule leader Bill Mitchell and Whitey Michelson. The Mule mentor was in low spirits because freshman hoop ace Paul Aumond flunked out at midyears. The Walpole, N. H., ace had averaged 19.6 points per game in eight contests.

Fouls in the first half were 12 for Providence and seven for Bates.

Slim Somerville got nine out of his ten points in the first half. Blain tallied ten of his 12 markers in the same session. Simpson got eight points in each half.

Officiating was passable but "inconsistent." "Sheriff" Fortunato took a "lacing" from the crowd, some of it deserved and some not.

At one point in the game with 12 minutes left eight players had four fouls each against them.

Nothing definite but the Bates Jayvees will probably play the Colby Freshmen in the prelim Saturday night before the Mules and Bobcats meet in the important State Series encounter.

Saturday's duel promises to be "interesting" with Lee Williams set to protest the basketball used by the Bates team.

Providence was working the ball better than Bates and doing a better job on rebound but wasn't quite as accurate in the shooting department. The Friar squad is all Sophomore with the exception of Bresnahan.

Walt Lososki kept the losers in the running with some fine set shooting from the outside.

The 'Cats, although ragged at times, turned in one of their best games. The teamwork and passing was improved. Providence had a big edge in height but Bates defenders equalized matters with plenty of scrap.

Campagnolo and Murao Spark Maroon Triumph

Local Cagers Gain 12th Victory of Season and Second Over Friars in 77-41 Fashion Before 2500 On 'Homecoming Day'; Jayvees Win, 59-54

The Springfield College Maroons left little doubt as to their basketball superiority over the visiting Friars from Providence College here at the Memorial Field House yesterday afternoon and proceeded to hand the Rhode Island charges a sound 77-41 cage licking as some 2500 Alumni Homecoming Day fans sat in on the program. The fast-breaking Springfield attack took command at the opening whistle, sped to a comfortable margin and never once was in danger as Ted Campagnolo and Shig Murao parted the strings with 19 and 18 markers respectively. The jayvee tussle brought a double victory for the locals when the Providence cagers fell before a 59-54 margin.

Head Throughout

In racking up their 12th victory of the campaign as against nine setbacks the charges of Coach John Bunn also realized their second decision over the Friars but by a much healthier margin. The previous tussle at Providence went to the Maroons by the scant margin of 54-51 and that came about only as the result of a late minute spurt. However, the Maroons held the upper hand throughout on this occasion, so much so that the Providence attack was completely stymied.

The Springfield tossers went about their work in business-like fashion, building an early 7-0 advantage before the Friars finally registered on Charley Bresnahan's set from outside. They were out front by 27-13 at the 10-minute mark and it was 44-27 at the intermission. On the resumption of play, the Maroons continued to pepper away at the strings while holding a close check on the Friars with the result that the visitors notched but one basket, that by Sam Nissel and a free toss by Bresnahan in the first 10-minutes of the session.

Coach Bunn removed his starting five at that point and cleared the bench of reserves but Providence still failed to find the key to success against the tight man-for-man defensive tactics of the locals. Bresnahan managed to find the Springfield nets for 12 points to lead the Providence cause but he and his mates soon found that they were to be hopelessly outclassed in this visit to the City of Homes.

Maroon Jayvees Win

While Campagnolo gave the nets a workout with his accurate set tosses, Murao focused his scoring activities through the middle for the most part and on the passing end was Johnny "Tiff" Barker. The latter youngster proved to be the playmaker for the Maroons and also gave a worthwhile exhibition off the defensive backboard. Both teams failed from the line of least resistance, Springfield drop-

ping but 17 of 30 attempts and Providence notched but 11 of 29. Capt. Joe Kubachka of the Maroons and Capt. Bresnahan of the visiting array both departed from the fray in the second half via the personal foul route.

The preliminary tussle was by far the best exhibition and although the Maroon jayvees were in front most of the route, the advantage was never at the comforting stage. The locals were out front, 34-32 at the intermission and retained their advantage throughout with the help of a timely spurt in the final minutes. Last week's most significant development on the New England college basketball horizon was the 60-52 defeat handed Holy Cross by a red-hot Yale quintet that has won its last 12 games.

It's been a long and rugged season for the Crusaders who have met most of the nation's premier college fives but until Saturday night Buster Sheary's boys stood high among the candidates for one of the two post-season tournaments. The defeat, second administered by a N.E. foe, just about erased H.C. from NCAA consideration, leaving only an outside chance of a bid from the National Invitation carnival.

The H.C. cagers, who built up their reputation on the basis of fundamental team play, made the mistake of thinking that if they stopped the Elis' famed Tony Lavelli, they'd take the Yales into camp. They shackled Tony all right but it required a heavy concentration of manpower, sometimes three men. In the meantime, Lavelli's mates made the most of their freedom and scored enough points to wrap up the decision, and

with it, the mythical N.E. championship.

It was a profitable week for two of R.I.'s three major college quintets. State's Rams paced the pack with three victories in as many games, Brown won two for two, whereas the hapless Providence College cagers dropped two.

Brown's convincing victory over Connecticut avenged an earlier loss to the Uconns and also made a prophet out of State's coach, Bob Haire. Since the Rams also dropped one to the Huskies this season, Haire had plenty of sympathy for the Bruins' head man, Bob Morris, and whether out of sentiment or not, the State mentor predicted a Brown victory in a brief interview before the R.I.-Coast Guard tilt at Kingston, Saturday night.

The least Morris can do now is forecast a State triumph over the Huskies this Saturday. Who knows, but maybe a little endorsement from a Rhode Island colleague is all Rhody teams need to end the spell the Uconns have held over the Bears and Rams the past two seasons.

While the Rams are definitely pointing for the Connecticut contest Saturday at Kingston, they must dispose of a couple of other problems before they can entertain the Uconns in the proper frame of mind. Tonight they oppose New Hampshire at Durham and tomorrow night they play Maine at Orono. The Rams walloped both teams earlier in the campaign at Kingston and will be heavy favorites to repeat.

Both of Brown's games will be on the road this week with a trip to Columbia Wednesday and one to Worcester Poly Tech Saturday on the Bruins' slate. The Bruins figure to break even, with the Lions the logical choice Wednesday, but don't be surprised of Frank Mahoney and Co. spring an upset.

The Friars are likely to feel the wrath of a foe whom they humbled last month when they visit Boston College Wednesday afternoon. The Eagles enjoyed a favorable pre-season rating and the loss to the Friars practically forced them into bankruptcy. Saturday P.C. will be at home at Rensselaer Poly Tech at the Mount Pleasant High gym.

Three other Brown winter sport teams will get into action this week. The hockey team plays at M.I.T. today and will entertain Boston University tomorrow night at the Auditorium. The wrestlers will face Harvard Wednesday and Coast Guard Saturday, both at Marvel Gym. The swimming team will meet Dartmouth here today, Connecticut at Storrs Wednesday, and Columbia here Saturday.

Providence College tackles Boston College Eagles on Wednesday afternoon in the Hub, with the Bees expected to reverse their previous setback. The Friars played their best game against the Eagles, who tonight will have to contend with Holy Cross at Boston Arena, Rensselaer from Troy, which scored a victory over P.C. last season and has won 11 of its 13 games this year. Providence will oppose the Friars Saturday night at Mount Pleasant.

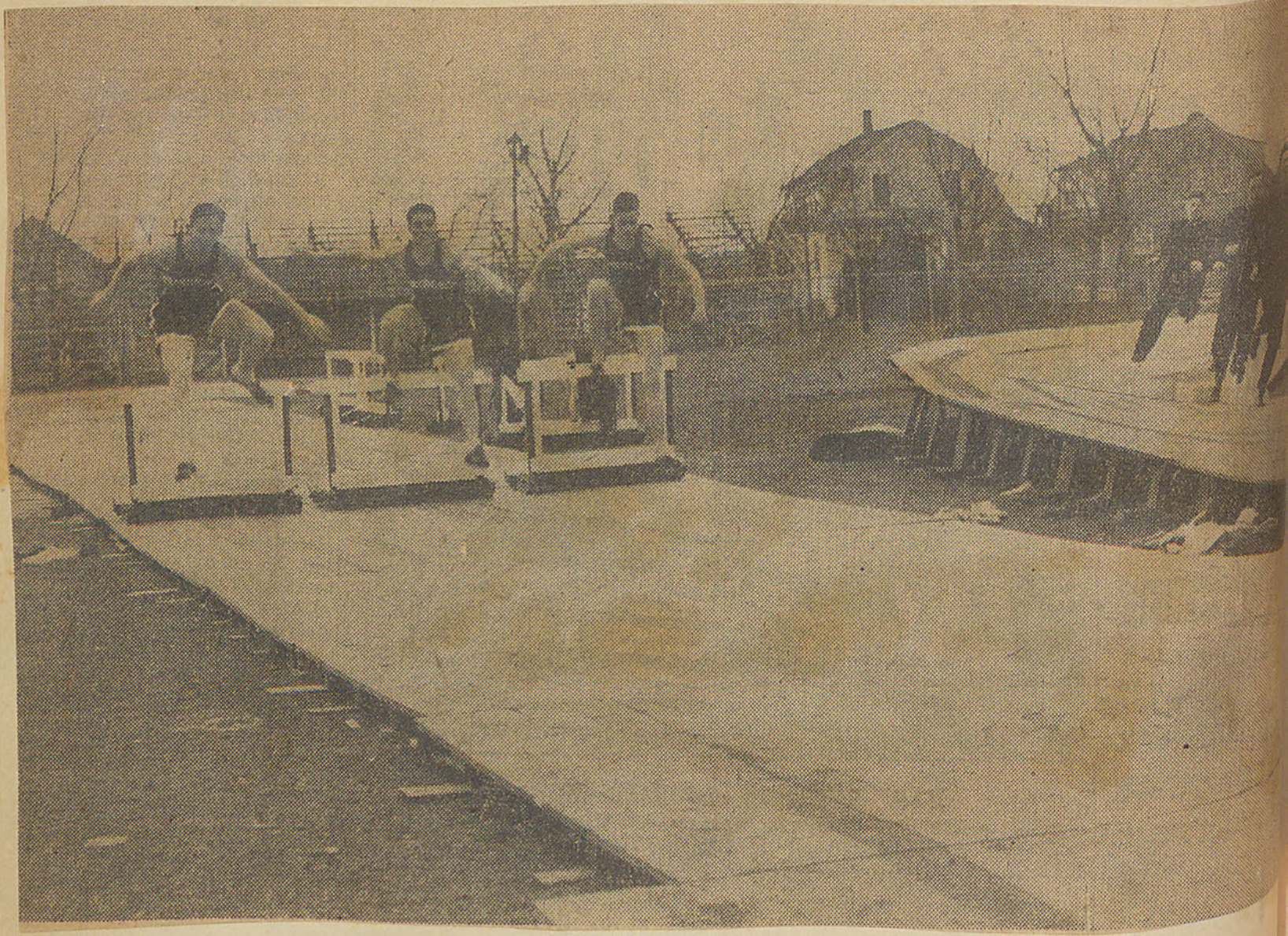

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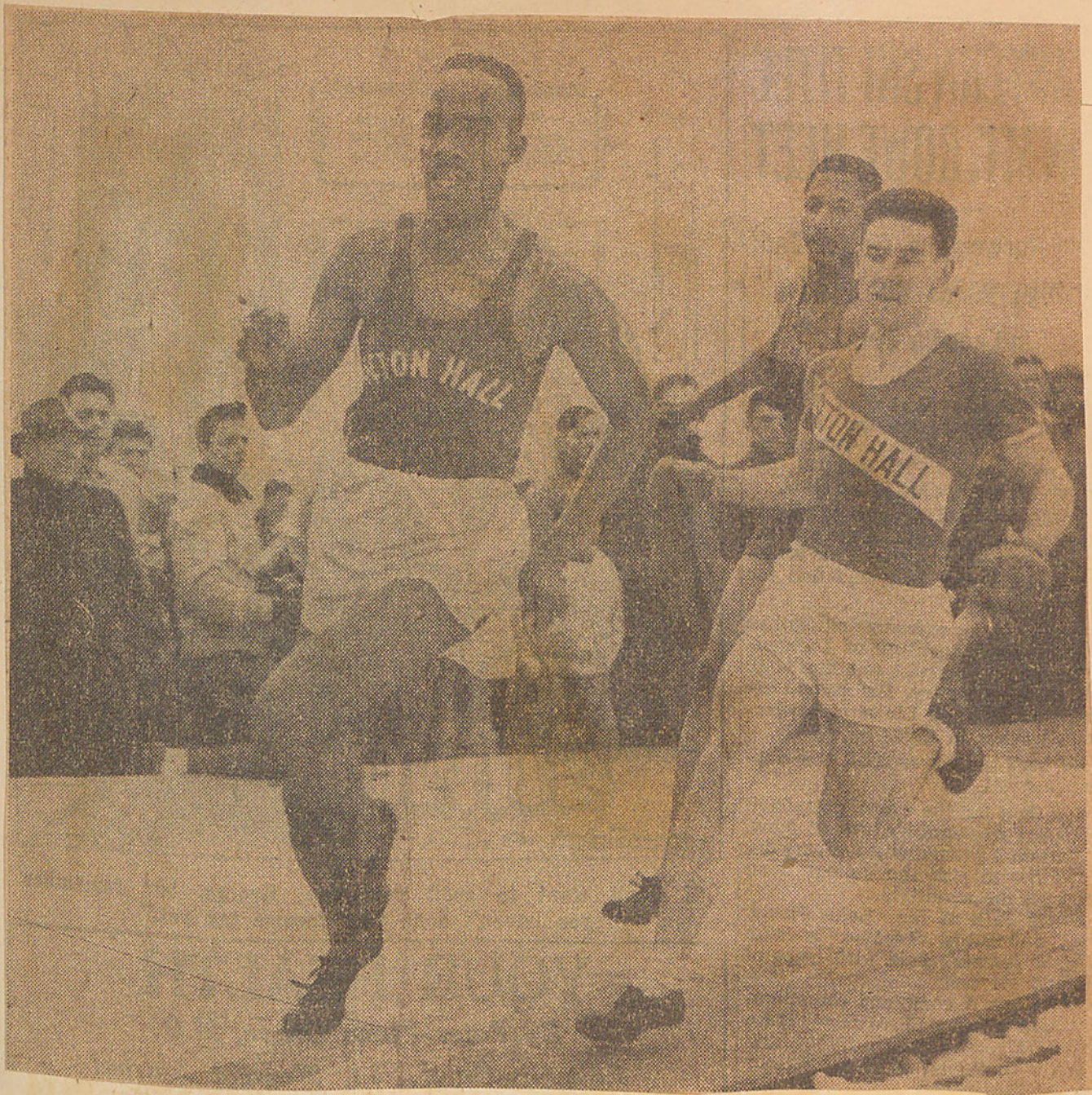

Track Jamboree at Providence College Lists 62 Events; Draws Over 300 Entries

Brown-M.I.T. Will Stage Dual Meet at Friar Boards; Program Starts 1:30

More than 300 athletes competing in 62 events will toe the line this afternoon in Providence College's first outdoor board track invitation which will get under way at 1:30 o'clock at Hendricken Field.

The program calls for college and high school relays, a dual meet between M.I.T. and Brown, novice events for high schools, AAU-sanctioned weight events, CYO relays, and several special invitation events.

The latter have attracted many of the country's outstanding runners including Herb McKenley, Jamaican Olympic ace who holds the world record for the 440; Billy Dwyer of Providence, winner of four major indoor sprint titles this winter; Frank Fox of Seton Hall, who turned in the fastest 600 of the season last week in New York; Phil Thigpen, conqueror of Marcel Hansenne of France at the N.Y. Knights of Columbus meet; Andy Stansfield of Seton, IC4A sprint champ; Charles Slade, Seton Hall freshman, and Carl Joyce of Seton Hall Prep, both former national schoolboy title-holders.

Special Events

McKenley, Slade and Fox will hook up in a special 550-yard run; Thigpen and Joyce will meet in the 880; Stansfield and Dwyer will go against a strong dash field that also includes Jim Fielding, national prep school champion, and Basil McKenzie, who was second to Dwyer in the NAAU meet.

In the AAU events Sam Felton, former Harvard star and member of the U.S. Olympic team, will compete against Hank Dreyer, former R.I. State ace, in the hammer and 35-pound weight, and a group of former R.I. schoolboy weight stars will vie for honors in the shot and discus.

Dick Phillips' attempt to break the world's indoor high jump record of 6 feet, 9¼ inches will be the chief attraction of the Bruins-Engineers dual clash. The high jump will be held in Harkin's Hall. Phillips had a leap of 6 feet, 8 inches last week in Boston.

Schoolboys Entered

The college entry list includes P.C., Boston University, Fairfield, Bryant and Seton Hall. The Seton Hall varsity one-mile relay team, which turned in the fast time of three minutes, 20.9 seconds recently in Madison Square Garden, will race against their freshman team.

The crack La Salle Academy team, which will pass up its chance to defend its crown today in the Bowdoin College Interscholastics, heads the R.I. schoolboy entry that comprises Cranston, Classical, Barrington, East Providence and Hope. The last two will compete in novice events only.

In basketball tonight Brown and Providence College will clash at Marvel Gym in the final game of the season for both schools. The Bruins have won 12 and lost eight while the Friars have won only seven out of 25. Brown won the first game with the Friars last month, 59-51.

Co-captains Al Kovachik and Jim Cooney will be playing their last basketball game for Brown and Capt. Charlie Bresnahan will be making his last start for the Friars.

Featuring a world's record holder, three national A.A.U. champions and three IC4A titlists, the Providence College Friars will hold their first invitation track meet tomorrow afternoon on Hendricken Field, starting at 1:30 o'clock.

Coach Harry Coates of the Friars has lined up some of the best track and field men in America to stage his first meet over P.C.'s new 11-lap board track. There are 51 events on the program, including special competitions for the stars and a dual meet between Brown's N.E.A.A.U. track champions and the M.I.T. Engineers.

Herb McKinley, Jamaican Olympic ace who was beaten in the 400 meters in a close race at London although finishing ahead of Mal Whitfield, 800 champion, heads the field. He'll run in a 550-yard special against Charlie Slade and Frank Fox from Seton Hall. McKenley, who ran the 400 meters in 45.9 last year, had the best mark in the world at his distance. That's the world standard but he also holds the 440 record in both world and college competition and is one of the best men ever to run his specialty.

Dwyer in Sprint

McKenley, who attended both Boston College and Illinois, recently returned from Australia. He was beaten by a fellow Jamaican, Arthur Wint in the Olympic 400 and was fourth in a blanket finish in the 200, with winner Mel Patton and the next four men finishing less than a stride apart in a thrilling race. He lost the 400 in the stretch, although he has turned in faster times on American tracks.

He's recognized as one of the greatest track performers of the present day and is now competing for the Shore A.C. and living in the New York area. Fox, who had the sixth fastest 400 in the world in '48, less than a second behind McKenley, is also IC4A indoor champion and ran the fastest 600 of the season in beating George Guida of Villanova last Saturday at New York.

Billy Dwyer in the sprint, Sam Felton in the 35-pound weight and Dick Phillips of Brown are other national champions in the competition, while Phil Thigpen is IC4A champion at the 1000 and recently whipped Marcel Hansenne, French miler.

Dwyer, leading sprinter of the indoor season, will run against Andy Stanfield of Seton Hall, recent winner of the IC4A title at 6.2, the same figure that Dwyer turned in to gain the N.A.A.U. sprint crown. Dwyer is having his best season by far, although Stanfield and Jim Fielding, national prep school champion, can extend him and could end his winning string. Jim Pennler and Dan Walsh, promising P.C. frosh, and Basil McKenzie, Seton Hall ace, are also listed for this competition.

Felton in Field

Felton, who with Bob Bennett of Warwick and Hank Dreyer, ex-

Rhode Island State star, made up the United States Olympic hammer throwing team, will compete against Dreyer in a special event. Felton is the former Harvard and intercollegiate star. Bennett has withdrawn from the competition as he hasn't been doing any serious training this winter.

Phillips, winner of the heptagonal high jump crown at 6 feet 8, and the N.A.A.U. title at 6 feet 7, will compete in his event which will be held in the Harkins Hall Auditorium as part of the Brown-M.I.T. dual engagement. The highest anybody jumped anywhere in the world last year was 6 feet 8 3/4 inches, while the Olympics winner cleared 6 feet 6.

Carl Joyce, former Boston schoolboy champion, is matched with Thigpen in a special 880. This pair ran a spectacular dead heat in that event in the Brown Interscholastics two years ago, while Charlie Slade nipped Joe Hall here last year just after the Ram star had won the IC4A crown. Joyce, one of the more promising New England boys, ran third in the Millrose 880.

Bruins, Friars Meet

Maurice Matteodo, N.E. A.A.U. shot putting titleholder, heads the field in that event, which also includes Kazar Apkarian and Ed Bagdanovich. Tony Fratantuono, ex-Classical star, heads the discus field along with Bob Sweeney, La Salle athlete. Gerry Alexander, Friar student, will throw the javelin.

There will be sprint, distance and medley relays involving Seton Hall, Providence College, Fairfield, Bryant and Boston University in the college field and La Salle, Cranston, Hope, Barrington and Classical among the schoolboys. There will be amateur and CYO relays and novice competition in the 60, 300, 600 and mile.

The Providence College Friars will make their second trip over to Marvel Gym tomorrow night, seeking to upset Brown's heavily favored Bruins on the basketball court. The Friars won a 46-45 decision over Clark on Wednesday, while Brown was losing to State. However the Bears have been a fairly consistent and effective combination of late and should sweep the series.

Providence could wind up its hoop season on a high note by beating the Bruins but all signs favor Brown, with Moe Mahoney, Fred Kozak and company a 10-point choice even at the minimum. The Brown lineup will include Mahoney, Kozak, co-captains Jim Cooney and Al Kovachick and Zeke Creswell. Larry De Palma, Ray Garcia, Jim Power, Capt Charlie Bresnahan and Fran Peligrino make up the Friars' probable opening lineup.

Friar Track Forces Set for Major Meet

McKenley to Point For 880 This Year

Herb McKenley, the fastest man in the world at a quarter-mile, wasn't too surprised when Seton Hall's Frank Fox beat him in a special "500" Saturday at Providence College's first invitation track meet. A bit disappointed perhaps, although it didn't show, he had a very logical explanation which was in no way an alibi.

"Sure, Fox is a good man but he does his best on boards while I'm better on cinders. He has been training right along for the board season and has done very well. I've just come back from Australia, where I ran outdoors on cinders. When I got back I decided it was better for me to try to hold my outdoor form with the indoor season pretty nearly over than to change my training for the boards.

"I'd say I won about 17 out of 20 races in Australia and some of the times were pretty good. I'm thinking of moving up to the half this year and I've done around 1:51 but I know I can do much better by concentrating on that distance.

Better Outside

"Indoor running is different from outdoors in the start. When I'm running at the Garden, I get a feeling I'm being crowded and I have to get out front to run my best race. Outside I don't have that trouble. I once did 9.4 for the 100 with a favoring wind and 21 seconds flat for the 220.

"My best race, I think, was in Sweden last summer after the Olympics when I ran the 300 meters in 29.6, going all out. I wasn't pressed and might have gone faster, although that's under the world's record. The Olympics were my biggest disappointment. I can beat Art Wint, oh maybe none out of 10 races, and I've done it. It was just that he ran his race that day and when he got ahead, I couldn't catch him.

"I'm going to keep running and maybe someday go into coaching. They want me to go back to Australia and New Zealand as a coach but I'm letting that ride, right now. I hear they were a little worried when I was late today, but McKenley always shows up when he gives his word. And Fox ran a nice race."

Hank Dreyer, who many thought had set a world's record for the 35-pound weight throw, was in top form when he won his event, although the weight was lighter than regulation. Hank said he hadn't competed up this way for about 15 years, back when he was throwing the hammer for R.I. State. He felt good, loose and free in his throwing and some of his

early tosses were effortless, leading Bob Bennett, his Olympic teammate, to speculate that he could have broken the record with a 35-pounder.

Dreyer Tutors

Dreyer, who now lives in Pelham, N.Y., took time out from his competition with Bennett and Sam Felton, the other Olympic hammer thrower now attending Harvard Business School, to give a lesson to Hillard Torgan, Classical High student.

Dreyer now used the "heel method", which he demonstrated to Torgan under Coach Al Marro's urging, although Fred Tootell, State's coach, first taught him the "toe method".

There was much running around trying to weigh the weight with which Dreyer did his best throwing. The Olympic trio agreed that the 35-pound mark would be higher with more competition. "Felton will be the best in the world before he gets through with the hammer," Bennett said.

Coach Harry Coates of the Friars was being congratulated on all sides for the success of the meet despite the frigid temperature and the Hendricken Field breezes. Brown's Dick Phillips undoubtedly would have jumped higher if the officials hadn't cooled him off when they erroneously thought he had set a record. Seton Hall's Basil Mackenzie's overzealous starting finally ruled him out of the special 60 after he had led Billy Dwyer home in a semi-final heat, but those at the starting line were 100 per cent in favor of starter Jack Sinclair.

Dwyer's double in the dash and hurdles, Phil Thigpen's victory over Carl Joyce at 880, the thrilling relay finish between the Friar Frosh and the B. U. Frosh, La Salle's fine all-around performance, and Brown's victory over M. I. T. were other highlights.

Setonians Hot In New England

Fox and Thigpen Victors in 500 and 440 at Providence Track

PROVIDENCE, R. I. — Two of Seton Hall College's trio of IC4A champions registered victories yesterday in the Providence College track meet at Hendrickson Field. Frank Fox and Phil Thigpen won the 500-meter and half-mile runs respectively, while Andy Stanfield was runnerup to National AAU champion Bill Dwyer in the 50-yard dash.

Shooting for the 500-meter world record, Fox won by six yards over Herb McKenley of the Jamaica Olympic Team and Seton Hall Freshman Charlie Slade in 1:07.1. A stiff wind, which hampered the runners in every event but the sprints, prevented Fox from setting a record.

Running a match race against Carl Joyce of Seton Hall Prep, Thigpen just managed to hold off his younger rival's finishing kick in the 880 to stop the watches in a slow 2:02 time. Both runners alternated the pace, Joyce leading the quarter in 64 seconds flat.

One Foot Margin

Dwyer beat out Stanfield and Jim Fielding of Seton Hall Prep in the 50-yard dash by a foot. The former Brown University star was clocked in 5.2 seconds but no consideration could be given the time due to strong following winds which blasted the sprinters along.

Dwyer also took the 50-yard low hurdles in 5.8 over Stanfield and Charley Slade, also of Seton Hall.

In the 35-pound weight, Hank Dreyer of the New York Athletic Club got off a throw of 60 feet 10½ inches but the mark couldn't qualify for a world record because the weight used was found to weigh only 33¼ pounds.

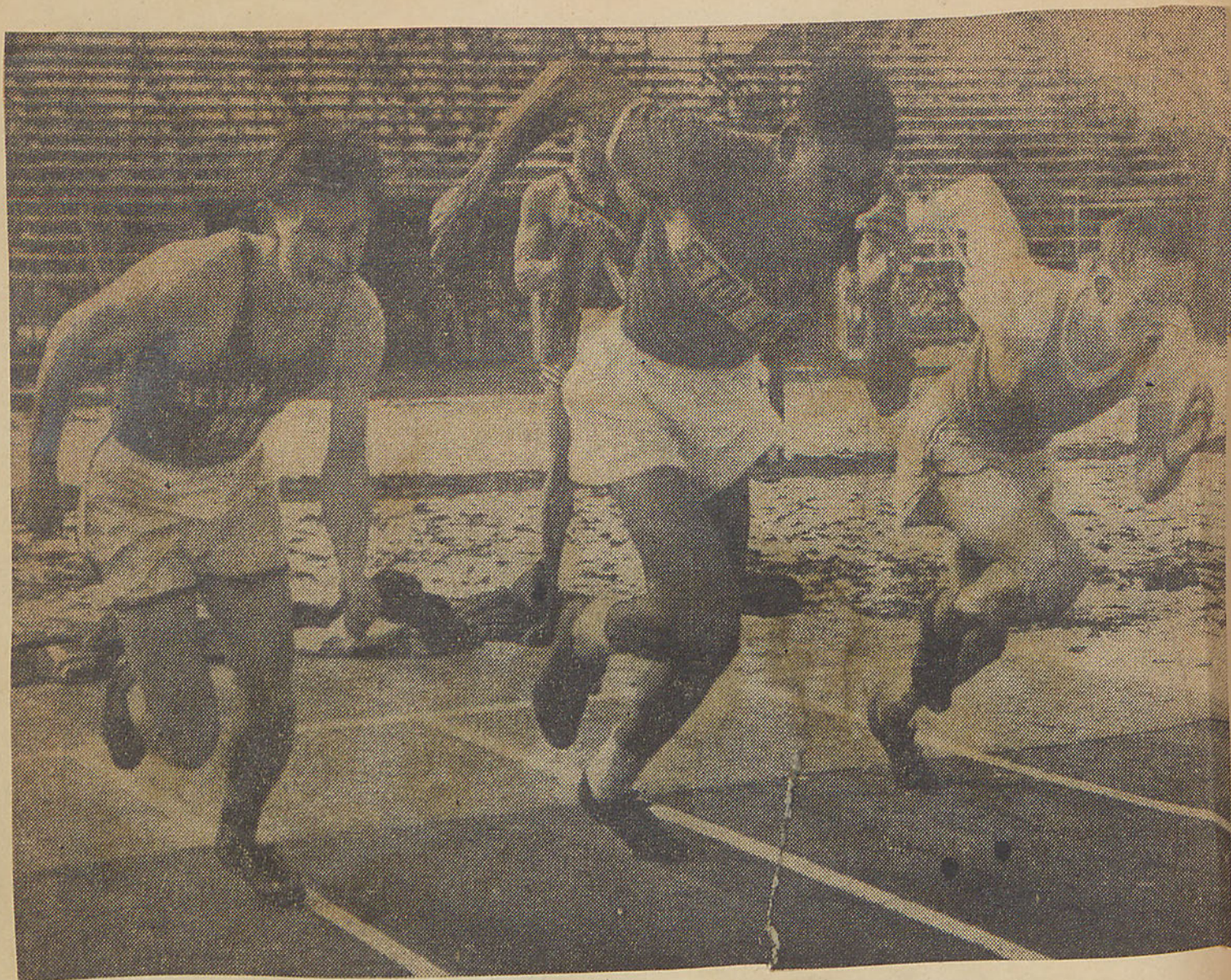
Dick Phillips of Brown, competing in the Brown-MIT dual meet which was also staged here, won the high jump with a leap of 6 feet, 6½ inches.

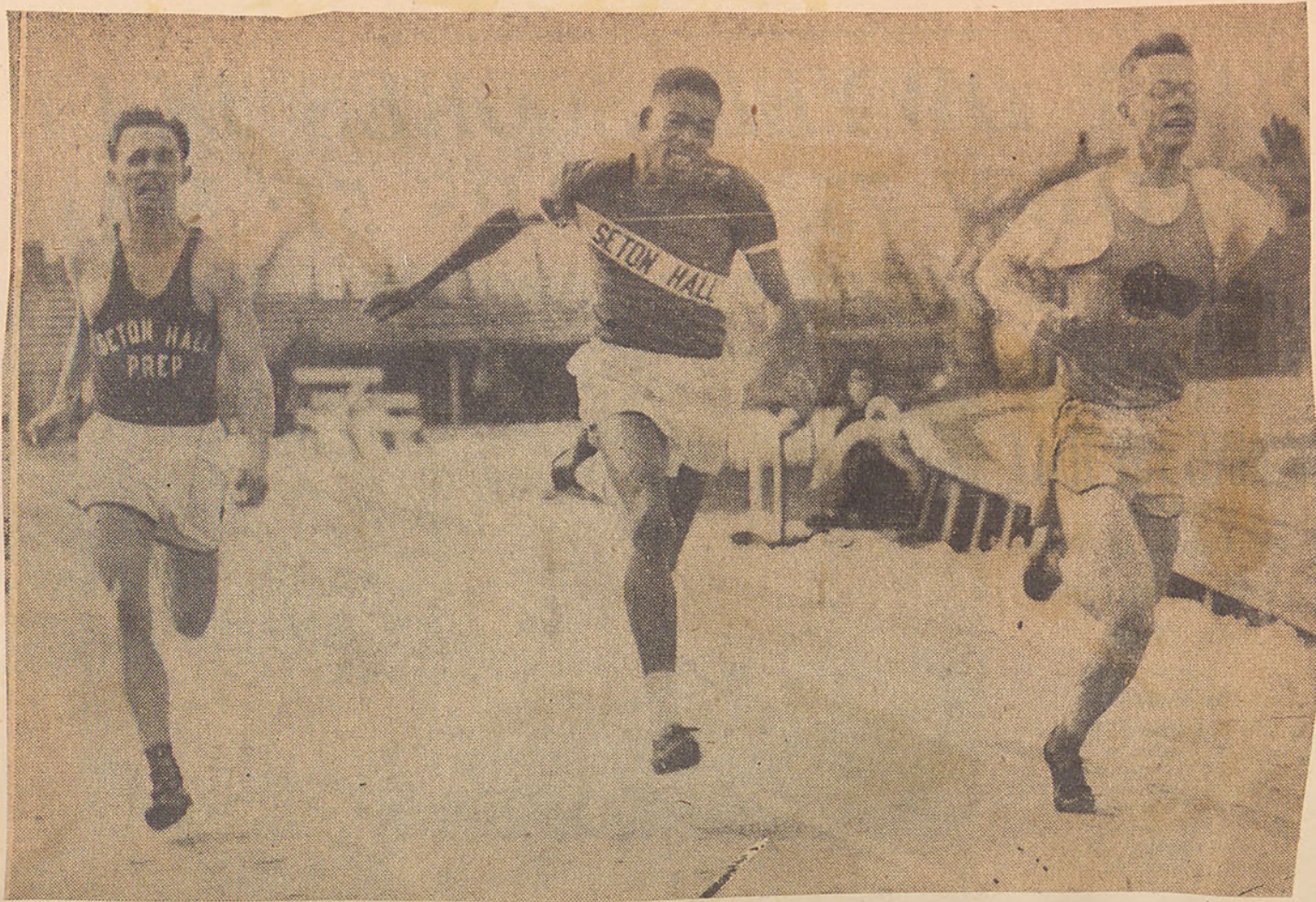

PERSONAL VICTORY FOR COATES

The tremendous success of Providence College's Outdoor Board Track Meet was due almost entirely to one man, Harry Coates. After weeks of careful planning and arranging, the weatherman delt Coates a blow last weekend that would have felled a man of less fighting spirit. When Coates awoke Saturday morning he already had two strikes on him. The track, field, and stands were covered with a blanket of snow made the staging of the meet seem almost impossible.

Those that thought the meet would be cancelled simply did not know Harry Coates nor the feeling of loyalty and cooperation he has already inspired in the student body. Coates had stated the evening before that the only thing that would halt him would be a five-foot blizzard, and he intended to keep his word. By 8:30 a. m. volunteers had already started to arrive to clear off the track and stands. By 10 a. m. Coates had a giant snow sweeper, belonging to the city of Providence, at work clearing off the outfield for the weight events. Within a few hours track, field and stands were ready for use.

Even the bitterly, cold weather could not keep the fans away from the meet Harry Coates had arranged. The caliber of the competition gathered for this event was full proof that Coates believes in doing things in a big way. Gathered at Hendricken Field were no less than three members of the U. S. Olympic team, two members of the Jamaican Olympic Team, three world's record holders, an IC4A champion, an N.A.A.U. champion, two National Intercollegiate Champions, three National Prep School Champions, 2 N.E.A.A.U. Champions) and two National Interscholastic Champions. There are very few meets held at Madison Square Garden, Franklin Field, or any place else that present more title holders.

As yet track hasn't gained recognition as a major sport here at the college, but it is very evident

that the day of its recognition isn't far off. When an overflowing crowd will converge on Hendricken Field for a track meet on a day like Saturday, it is hard to visualize to what extent Harry Coates could attract the public given a good day. No other Providence College athletic event since the war has come close to attracting the interest both on and off campus that was generated by the track carnival.

It appears that track is becoming not only A major sport, but THE major sport at P. C. When you consider the progress that Coach Harry Coates has made in only one year's time it is not hard to understand why.

P. C. TRACK MEET TREMENDOUS

RECORD SET IN WEIGHT THROW; RELAY TEAMS GAIN VICTORIES

Over three thousand fans braved the cold and packed Hendricken Field last Saturday to witness what was perhaps the most outstanding athletic event ever to be held at Providence College. The meet saw the establishment of one new world's record and but for the inclement weather would perhaps have seen more. Henry Dreyer, member of the U. S. Olympic

Team and in this meet representing the N. Y. A. C., hurled the 15-kilo's weight 60' 10." Application to the N.A.A.U. will be made for recognition as a new record.

In the other outstanding attractions, Billy Dwyer, N.A.A.U. 60-yard champ, raced to victories in the 60-yard low hurdles and the 50-yard dash; Frank Fox, Seton Hall, beat Herb McKinley, 440-yard world record holder, and Charles Slade, Seton Hall, in the 500-meter run; Phil Thigpen, 880-yard Intercollegiate champion from Seton Hall, edged Carl Joyce, 880-yard Prep School Indoor World Record Holder from Seton Hall Prep, in a thrilling 880-yard race that saw the winner barely stave off a furious last second spurt by Joyce; Providence College's Tony Fratanuono scored a stunning upset over Olympians Sam Felton and Henry Dreyer in the discus event with a throw of 140' 9"; and Dick Phillips of Brown soared over the high jump bar at 6' 6" to easily take that event in Brown's dual meet with M.I.T.

Pandemonium broke loose when it was announced that Phillips had cleared 6' 10" for a new world's record, but a closer check showed that the bar had sagged a few inches and the height was not official.

Providence College's Varsity and Freshman relay teams turned in very satisfactory performances. The Varsity one and two mile and medley relay squads easily whipped Fairfield over these routes. The Frosh downed the Boston University and Fairfield Freshment in the one mile relay, whipped B. U., Fairfield, and Bryant in the Spring Medley Relay, and missed a clean sweep as B. U. trimmed them in the Distance Medley Relay. In what was expected to be a close battle, the Seton Hall Varsity Medley Relay team easily beat the Seton Hall Freshman as one of the

latter took a bad spill, ruining his team's chances. Due to the cold weather Jerry Alexande, N.E.A.U. javelin champ from P.C., gave no javelin exhibition as the risk to his arm would have been too great.

In order not to offer competition in another part of the city, Brown University ran its dual meet with M.I.T. in conjunction with the P. C. Board Track Meet. The Brown Varsity beat the M.I.T. Varsity 49 1-3 to 40 2-3, and the Brown Frosh downed the M.I.T. yearlings 45-36. In addition to the collegiate and A. A. U.

events, scholastic and CYO competition was held. La Salle Academy dominated the scholastic events, while the Holy Name and Blessed Sacrament runners were outstanding among the C.Y.O. units.

Brown University put the finishing touches to P. C.'s disastrous basketball campaign last Saturday evening, as they soundly trounced the hapless Friars, 75-51. Big Frank Mahoney showed that he richly deserved the "Woody" Grimshaw trophy, designating him as Brown's outstanding basketball player, which was presented in a pre-game ceremony, as he turned in an excellent floor game and paced the Bruins with 23 points.

The sound basketball that P. C. has shown on rare occasions this season was rarer than ever Saturday as they couldn't seem to do anything right. Brown won with such ease that the outcome was evident from the start. The Bruins

leaped to a 15-1 lead in four minutes, increased it to 31-8 after eleven minutes and left the floor at halftime resting comfortably on a 47-25 margin.

Providence played somewhat better in the second half but the game was beyond their grasp by that time. Pellegrino led the Friar scorers with 18 points and turned in a creditable performance. Ray Garcia and Charlie Bresnahan played good ball at times but they were unable to turn the tide. It was the last game for Captain Bresnahan in his collegiate career at Providence.

Fred Kozak proved to be just as much of a problem to the Friars as he was in their last meeting, playing his usual aggressive game and rifling the nets for 13 points. Zeke Creswell also greatly aided the Brown cause as he contributed 15 points. The Bruins in turning in one of their best performances of the year reached their highest point total of the season.

The Providence Frosh averted a complete shutout as they trimmed the Brown Freshmen 74-60. Schlinn, Bauer and Gagnon paced the yearling's attack.

Friars Edge Clark In Closing Seconds

For the first time in twelve games the Friars have come out on top. Last Wednesday evening at the Mount Pleasant gym, Providence College overcame a 14 point halftime deficit to edge the Scarlets of Clark University by a single point, 45-44.

It seemed that there were two completely different teams which represented P. C.—the team of the first half and the team of the second twenty minutes. The first half team was a disgrace to the good name of basketball as they passed erratically, shot with no accuracy at all, and played defense like a bunch of wooden Indians. The second half team was a complete contradiction of this group as the Friars really found themselves. The passing improved, the pick plays were working, the ball was dropping through the nets with consistency—the tide was turning. But it wasn't until there were forty seconds of the game remaining that the Drewmen were able to take the lead and hold it till the final whistle.

Ten minutes went by in the first period before the Friars scored a field goal. The score at that time was 15-1. Charlie Bresnahan broke the ice with a one-hander from the foul line. As the game progressed it was doubtful whether P. C. would reach double figures in the first half. However, Walt Lozoski intercepted a dribble and converted a lay-up shot to give the Friars 11 points for the half. The score at intermission was 25-11.

As the second period started the Drewmen began to close the gap. With eight minutes left in the encounter, the boys from Worcester led 38-29. From this point Ray Garcia, with unequalled spirit and fight, sparked his teammates to a Frank Merriwell finish. The combo of Garcia, Fran Pellegrino, Larry DePalma, Hocky Power, and Capt. Charlie Bresnahan thrilled the fans with their exceptional play. Garcia flipped in three quick baskets with drive in shots and Charlie Bresnahan sank two long shots to tie up

the game with about one minute to go.

Providence regained control of the ball but a foul was called on Bresnahan for charging. Clark converted and led 45-44. With less than 20 seconds remaining the ball was passed to Pelly who threw a long pass to Hocky Power who was cutting swiftly for the basket on a sleeper play. The ball and Power arrived under the nets at the same time but Hocky somehow twisted his body and threw in the winning points resembling a contortionist wrapped up in a knot. With five seconds remaining, Clark threw a long pass which went out of bounds, and that was the ball game.

This affair was, perhaps, the most dramatic game the Friars have played this season. Dramatic because of the closeness of the game and the

high grade of competition exhibited by the Drewmen, but primarily dramatic because of the fact that a second team substitute, used sparingly the entire season, was given his chance and he capitalized by becoming the hero of the game—P. C.'s first triumph in twelve games.

In the preliminary contest the Friar fledglings trounced the Frosh of Clark University. It was a lopsided game as P. C. scored 96 points to 53 for the losers. NATIONAL CHAMP TRIUMPHS IN DASH AND LOW HURDLES

Crowd of 3500 Braves Chill
Winds, Watches Dreyer
Win Weight Throw

By PETE McCARTHY

The first annual invitation outdoor board track meet sponsored by the Providence College Alumni Association attracted 3500 spectators who saw an array of outstanding performances highlighted by Providence's own Billy Dwyer's double victory in the dash and low hurdles yesterday afternoon at Hendricken field.

Rigid temperatures and high winds made it uncomfortable for the contestants and customers alike and though such conditions safeguarded the world's records, the keenness of the competition sustained the gallery's interest throughout the meet.

Every one of the announced stars showed up and each put forth his best efforts, though it was pretty apparent that Dwyer's pair of triumphs was the most popular with the crowd. It was Billy's first appearance before the home-town folk this winter since his sweeping victories in the Millrose A. A., New York A. C., National AAU and the New York K. C. meets.

Wins by 2 Yards

The former Brown sprinter, now training for the R.I. Track & Field Officials took both events by safe margins. In the 50-yard low hurdles he held a two-yard advantage over Andy Stanfield, IC4A champion from Seton Hall College, and his winning time was 5.8 seconds. Dwyer's victory in the 50-yard dash was delayed somewhat by three false starts on the part of Basil McKenzie, also of Seton Hall. But after the latter's disqualification, Dwyer got away to a fine start and beat out Stanfield and Jim Fielding of Seton Hall Prep. Again his margin was pretty close to two yards.

Another performer with a Rhode Island background caused quite a stir among the patrons when Hank Dreyer, former R.I. State luminary now competing for the New York Athletic Club, tossed the 35-pound weight 60 feet, 10½ inches. That mark was considerably better than the accepted world mark of 57-7½, but after the discovery that the iron ball used weighed only 33¼ pounds, it was obvious that no claim for a world record could be made.

Record to Be Sought

Dreyer pointed out, however, that his distance still is greater than the mark established for the 15-kilogram weight that is used in all European meets. The European weight is equal to 33 pounds and Dreyer reported that the recognized standard is slightly better than 58 feet. The R.I. Track Officials Association, which handled the meet yesterday, plans to forward a request to the AAU that the mark be accepted.

Sam Felton, former Harvard weightman, now of the New York A.C., also tossed the weight 60 feet and won the hammer throw with a heave of 181 feet, 7½ inches, an excellent throw for this time of year.

Phil Thigpen of Seton Hall and Carl Joyce of Seton Hall Prep practically duplicated their memorable race of two years ago in the Brown Interscholastics when they hooked up in the special half-mile. Thigpen took over the lead at the quarter and held it to the finish, but he was forced to fight off a strong challenge by Joyce all the way around the last lap. Joyce's desperate lunge at the tape almost produced another dead heat. Thigpen's time was 2 minutes, 2.6 seconds.

Fox Takes Special

The special 500-meter run was another competitive gem. Frank Fox, also of Seton Hall, who owns the fastest time for the 600 this season, won this one. Running against Herb McKenley, the Jamaican Olympian who holds the world mark for the quarter-mile, and Slade, former national prep-school champion, Fox beat the former to the tape by about eight yards. His time was 1 minute, 7.8 seconds, 3.1 seconds slower than the world record.

The attempt by Dick Phillips of Brown to better the world record in the high jump, caused about 1000 fans to jam the auditorium of Harkins Hall, where the event was held late in the afternoon. The Bruin star cleared the bar at what he thought was a height very close to

the world mark of 6 feet, 9¼ inches, but an exact measurement of the lowest point of the crosspiece revealed it to be only 6 feet, 6¼ inches.

Brown Teams Win

Operation measurement required at least 10 minutes and after the sac news was proclaimed, Phillips cooled off and missed on his next three tries at 6-7½. The Brown star had cleared all previous heights with such little effort that he possibly could have gone higher had it not been for the interruption.

Phillips was competing in the Brown-M.I.T. dual meet which the Bruins won, 49½ to 40½. Jon Tobey and Ray Leeth paced the Bears' triumph with a pair of double victories. Leeth captured the 50-yard high and low hurdles and Tobey won the 600 and 1000-yard runs. Gerry Del Isola the only double victor for the Engineers, took firsts in the dash and 300

The Brown freshmen defeated the M.I.T. yearlings, 45-36, on the strength of a clean sweep in the shot put.

Harry Coates, meet director and track coach at Providence College, was able to share in the laurels of the day, as his teams scored five victories in six events. The P.C. varsity unit won the sprint-medley, the mile and the two-mile relays. The Friar freshmen won the sprint-medley and the mile relays and ran second to Boston University freshmen in the distance medley.

La Salle Triumphs

Tony Fratantuono of P.C. captured the AAU discus event with a toss of 140 feet, 7 inches. Feiton was second.

The Seton Hall varsity and freshman teams were matched in a special medley relay of 1000 yards. The varsity unit of Fox, Ed Brogan, Slade and McKenzie won in 2 minutes and 2 seconds, three seconds off the record.

Coach Dan O'Grady's La Salle track forces, which passed up a chance to defend the title in the Bowdoin Interscholastics yesterday, were amply rewarded. The Maroons won all three high-school relays and captured the first leg on the Providence College Interscholastic Novice Award. Victories in five of the six novice events gave La Salle team honors.

Holy Name School in the grammar and Blessed Sacrament in the junior-high division won team prizes in the special CYO relay events.

The meet, consisting of 67 heats, was well handled by the R.I. Track and Field Officials Association and was completed on schedule at 5:50 p.m.

Tommy Duffy and Johnny McKitchen, formerly of St. Raphael; Ned Hayes and John Tobin, ex-De La Salle stars, and Gene Wecal, Woonsocket High grad, were other Rhode Islanders in the Hawks' lineup. In fact, St. Anselm's had more players from Rhode Island than did Providence College.

St. Anselm's lost little time in moving out in front, taking a 14 to 7 lead in the first seven minutes. Providence came back on the strength of some good play by Frank Pelligrino and Sam Nissel, tied the score at 14-all, then took a 16 to 14 lead.

But that was as far as the Friars could go. The Hawks rallied on their own part to assume complete command and post a 33 to 25 lead at the end of the half. At the 11-minute mark of the second half St. Anselm's had boosted its margin to 56 to 40 and had all but sealed the fate of the Friars.

Russ Bastin of St. Anselm's was high man for both teams, tossing in a game total of 19 points. Charlie Bresnahan was Providence's best, racking up 13 points.

Thursday night a consolation engagement between the preliminary round losers will precede the final at the Teachers College court.

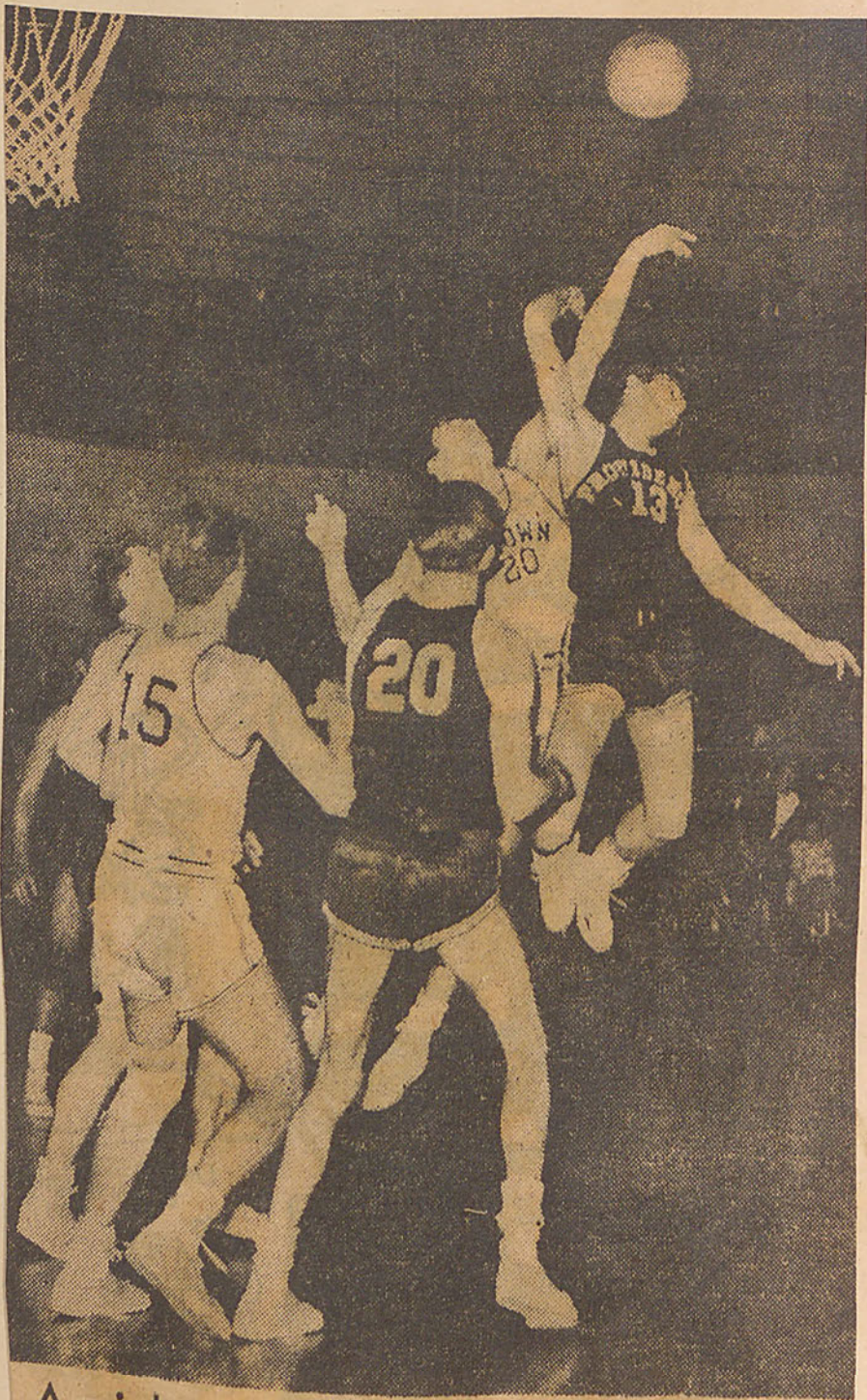
P.C. Future Brighter

BRUINS CHALK UP 47-25 ADVANTAGE DURING 1ST HALF

Mahoney Cages 23 Points;
P.C. Freshmen Beat Bruin
Cubs, 74-60

They honored Frank "Moe" Mahoney with a trophy as Brown's outstanding player last night and then the Brooklyn junior went out and proved his right to the award by leading the Bruins to a decisive 75-to-51 victory over the Providence College Friars before 1000 at Marvel Gym.

It was one of Brown's best all-around performances of the season. They were free of the jitters that got them against Rhode Island and clicking to perfection in the first half. They were having a night when they could do little wrong while the Friars took the first half to get straightened out.

Mahoney, playing 13 minutes in the second half and approximately 15 in the first, scored 23 points but was a major factor in getting the Brown attack into motion with his passing and pass interceptions.

The Friars, who had made a good second-half stand in beating Clark, couldn't untrack themselves for any great length of time. Fran Pelligrino, Westerly sophomore, scored 18 points but the Friars as a group played sound ball only infrequently.

However, it was Brown's night, no matter how you look at it. They got away to a fast start, leading 10 to 1 after three minutes and 15 to 1 after four. Mahoney, Fred Kozak, Zeke Creswell, Jim Cooney and Al Kovachik opened for Brown and did the bulk of the work which sewed up the contest by the 10-minute mark.

Brown had a 31-8 lead after 11 minutes and 10 seconds and it was clear to most of the spectators that it was just a question of playing it out. Brown, which had 42 per cent in its first-half shooting, would bring the ball up court and score, sometimes easily on a combination or on a set, while P.C. would press and finally lose the ball without scoring.

Cooney, playing his last game, was very aggressive and alert for the Bruins while sophomore Creswell scored 15 points in the first half, mainly teaming up with Mahoney and Kozak. At the widest point in the first half, Brown led by a 35 to 10 margin and later 40-15 with five minutes remaining. At half-time it was 47-25.

Although the game was out of their grasp, the Friars played much better in the second half but never were closer than 19 points. It was 56-33 five minutes along in the second half and 61-39 at the 10-minute point.

It was Brown's top point total of the year and one of their most impressive victories in the Providence series. Only twice before has Brown had a wider margin over the Friars while it's the highest score either team has run up in the 27-year-old series.

Mahoney was the recipient of the "Woody" Grimshaw trophy in a pre-game ceremony. Dave Marcello of Lambda Chi Alpha made the presentation after being introduced by Paul Mackesey, Brown's athletic director. Mahoney wound up the year with an outstanding game, although his cleverest basket of the night was disallowed. His 23 points equalled his previous high of the year against Arnold and gave him 296 for the season.

Kozak and Creswell had 13 and 15 points for the Bruins. Charlie Bresnahan, Sam Nissell and Ray Garcia played improved ball for the Friars in the second half.

Jim Schlimm, Tom Bauer and Ronnie Gagnon paced the Providence College Frosh to a 74-to-60 victory over the Bruin Cubs in the preliminary, with Martin Badoian and Joe Munroe leading the Cubs.

Clark Cagers Bow, 46-45, in Last 4 Seconds

Providence College Wipes Out 16-Point Deficit in 2nd Half

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Thursday—A last-ditch basket by Jimmie Power gave Providence College a 46-45 upset victory over a plagued Clark University quintet of Worcester, Mass., here last night before a crowd of 400 in the Mt. Pleasant High School gym.

Providence matched baskets with the Scarlet for the first eight minutes of the second half before breaking lose with its rally. Then, with Clark out front, 37-22, captain Charlie Bresnahan and Ray Garcia began to connect.

Bresnahan sank a long set shot and Garcia dropped in a pair of layups to start the fireworks. Vasil hooked in two points for Clark, but Garcia broke through for three more quick baskets and Providence trailed, 39-34. Vasil snapped this spell with a charity shot, but Garcia and Bresnahan came through with two more baskets to make the score 40-38.

Bresnahan Ties Score

Another hook shot by Vasil gave Clark a four-point lead with three minutes remaining. Then Garcia came through again and dropped a set shot before Bresnahan tied the game at 42-all with a layup.

Bresnahan gave Providence its first lead of the game seconds later with a one-handed push from the side. But a corner set by Steve (Moose) Kaufman and a free throw by Dik pushed Clark ahead 45-44 with 45 seconds left. Then Power broke away for the winning basket.

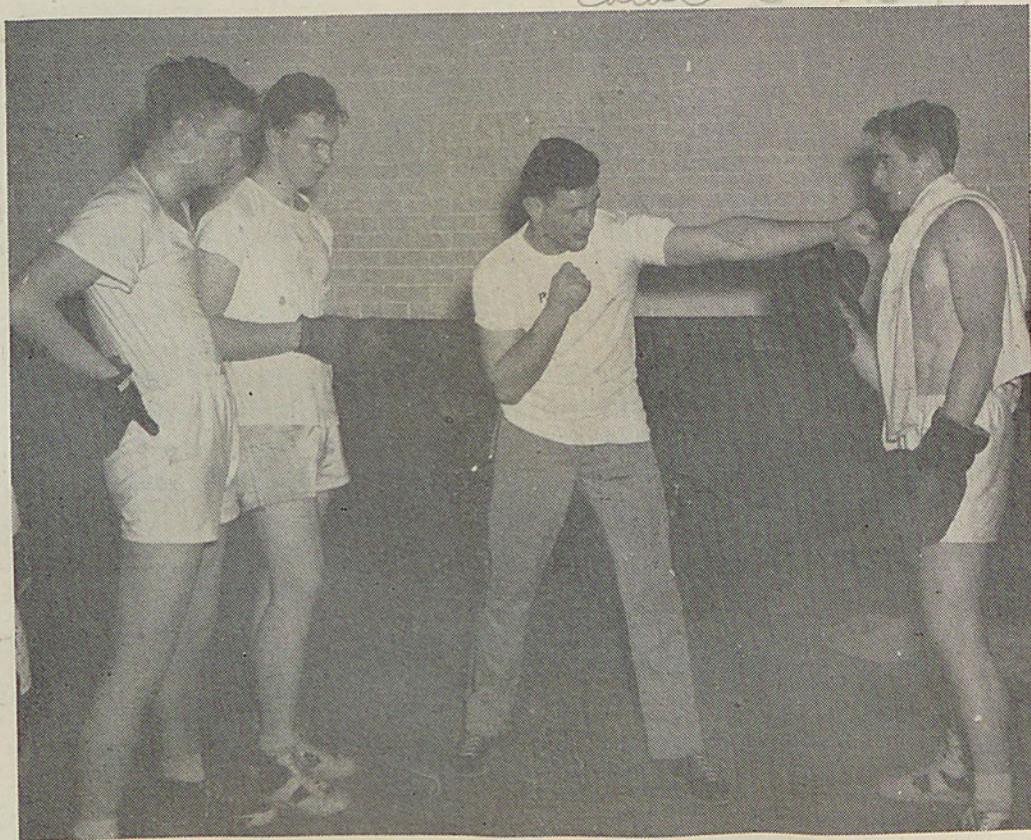

Sam Nissel Top Scorer With 185 Pts. For Season

When the Friars of Providence College were defeated by Brown University to end their basketball campaign; they completed, also, not only a poor seasonal record but the worst record of any edition of P.C. basketball. A very bad mid-season slump hit the Drewmen and they were never quite able to recover from it. It started with the Yale game in New Haven and ended in the small colleges tournament in New Britain, Conn. Only the Fairfield game, a hard fought victory for the Friars, interrupted a potential string of 16 straight defeats. When the smoke had risen, the seasonal record was 7 wins and 19 losses.

The quality of the opposition of the Friars was, without a doubt of the highest grade. Such teams as Yale, Holy Cross, Brown, Seton Hall, Rhode Island State, and New Britain Teachers were compared with the best in the nation. The planning of the schedule may have somewhat affected the ability of the team. For instance, at one particular time the Drewmen played seven ball games in eight days. That is a rapid pace for any team to uphold.

However, a great percentage of P.C.'s losses cannot be excused or explained away. In most instances it was either a case of a "bad" night or the opposition was just too strong. On the whole, the play was much inferior to what was expected in pre-season ratings, but no one can say that the fighting Friars ever lost enthusiasm or declined to play as hard as possible.

In the statistics department, the athletic office has recently released the comprehensive figures for the 1948-49 season. According to the report, only two Friar hoopsters participated in every scheduled game. They are Capt. Charlie Bresnahan and sophomore Alex Becker. Sam Nissel nosed out Ray Garcia for individual scoring honors by netting 185 points (69 field goals and 49 foul shots). Garcia, who played in one more game than Nissel brought his total to 182 with 65 field goals and 52 foul shots. The tallest man on the club, Fran Pellagrino, was third with 162 markers for 19

games. His 8.5 average per game topped his teammates in that department.

As far as individual game records are concerned, Sam Nissel and Fran Pellegrino each scored 27 points in one game to be tops in that respect. Against Brooklyn College, Nissel hooped 27; and Pelly scored his 27 in the second Boston College game. Against Brown, Larry DePalma converted 7 foul shots to be the leader in that department. Sam Nissel, however, had the most opportunities with 11 chances.

The individual game team record is not outstanding, but it is interesting. The Friars hit their high-point total against Brooklyn College when they netted 80 points. Their low mark for the year was 34 against Holy Cross. The seasonal average per game was 54.9 points. Only against Holy Cross did the Drewmen fail to garner at least 40 points for a single game.

In the foul shooting department, the Drewmen showed a definite weakness. They were able to convert only 336 shots out of 607 attempts. This 55.3 per cent is not too good. Alex Becker had the best personal record as he made 30 out of 46 for a 65.5 percentage. Personal fouls were another weakness of the Friars. Their average per game was 25. Against Bates and St. Francis College the whistle blew 36 times against the Drewmen.

Thus another basketball season comes to a close. It was not a successful season but it may have been helpful to learn the weaknesses of the Friars and prepare them for a good 1949-50 basketball season.

Trackmen Prepare For Outdoor Season

Having concluded the indoor season on a high note, the Friar trackmen began practicing this week for the outdoor season. Although the turnout has been encouraging, Coach Harry Coates is still looking for more candidates for he feels that the squad lacks the depth necessary to win in big time competition.

The P.C. trackmen will be kept busy this spring with a full program of meets. The schedule calls for the Friars to appear in two major meets—the Seton Hall Relays and the Penn Relays—plus dual meets with Rhode Island, Brown University, and Fairfield University.

Among those working out for these meets in the running events—where P.C. has its greatest strength—are Captain John Powell, Jr. in the low hurdles, Frank DiIuglio in the quarter mile and the one eight mile, Gerald McGurkin in the quarter mile and the two twenty yard dash, Edward Porrier in the sprints, William Morris in the quarter mile and the eight eighty yard dash, Raymond MaMore in the eight eighty yard dash, Frank Hann in the one mile and the two mile, and Robert Phyre in the sprints.

The field events posse Coach Coates biggest problem. Outside of a few talented men such as Gerald Alexander, javelin; Robert Walsh, hammer; Anthony Fratantona, discus and hammer; and Thomas Shanley, pole vault; there is little in sight.

Coach Harry Coates, again, invites anyone who is interested in track to report to him any day on the ball field for practice. Candidates for the field events are especially needed, though men interested in running are also welcomed.

Friday evening the auditorium of Harkins Hall will be the scene of the always popular annual boxing show. A unique added attraction to this program will be an attempt by Dick Phillips of Brown to break the world indoor high jump record. This added attraction is expected to draw the attention of the Rhode Island sporting world and a capacity crowd is expected.

Two weeks ago at the Providence College Invitation Track Meet, Phillips came very near breaking the existing standard and welcomed the invitation of Coach Harry Coates to jump again in Harkins Hall. The chances of a record breaking performance are considered very good by Rhode Island track authorities as the board floor of Harkins Hall has been found to be ideally suited for jumping purposes.

This event will be judged by appointed officials of the Rhode Island Track Association and satisfy all the requirements for being accepted as a world record if Phillips is successful. The jumping will be run off at 7:30 which is one half hour before the main show gets underway.

At eight o'clock sharp the boxing program will open with the first of its nine scheduled bouts. These fights will come as a climax to eight hard weeks of training by the fighters under the tutelage of Boxing Coach Peter Louthis.

Yesterday Coach Louthis stated that all of his charges are now in excellent condition for combat and that each and every bout promises to be an aggressive and determined battle.

Feature battlers of the card will be Pete Razza, a Newport lightweight; Ray Forgays, 146 pounder from Mt. Vernon, N. Y.; Ed Strack, a 180lb Pawtucket boy; Kevin McMahon, light-heavyweight from Dover, N. H.; and Dennis Finn a 210lb heavyweight from Hartford, Connecticut. These boys are tried and true veterans of last year's show and appear greatly improved as a result of training received from Coach Louthis.

These officials appointed for the boxing program by the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., Director of the Provi-

dence Athletic Association, are: judges—Mr. Robert DeCelles a veteran Rhode Island fight manager and Coach Harold T. Martin; referee—Coach Peter Louthis; and announcers—Jim Cahill and Jack Shea.

The price of admission for students is 35 cents and 60 cents for non-students. With the large crowd expected from outside the college, coupled with the limited seating capacity of Harkins Hall it would appear wise to

come early and assure yourself of a good seat.

High-Jump Record Attempt Features Smoker at P.C.

Dick Phillips of Brown Will Try for National Mark; Nine Bouts Listed

Dick Phillips of Brown, national high-jump champion, will attempt to break the world indoor record in his event tonight at Harkins Hall at the Providence College Monogram Club's smoker. The program also includes a nine-bout card of boxing.

After clearing 6 feet, 6½ inches in winning the jump during the Brown-M.I.T. dual meet held in conjunction with Providence College's Invitation Meet several weeks ago, Phillips declared that the boards at Harkins Hall were the best he had encountered and expressed the desire to jump there again. The Friars, who had an 8-and-5 record last season, will play home-and-home series with Rhode Island State, Brown, Boston College, Seton Hall, Villanova, Springfield and Holy Cross and singles games with the M.I.T. Engineers and Yale.

For the past two seasons, since the Friars resumed baseball first under Donat Maynard and last season under Martin, the P.C. nine has been able to take the measure of the Holy Cross Crusaders in the only two games played between these rivals. The Cross will meet the Friars on Providence's Alumni Day program on June 4 at Hendricken Field.

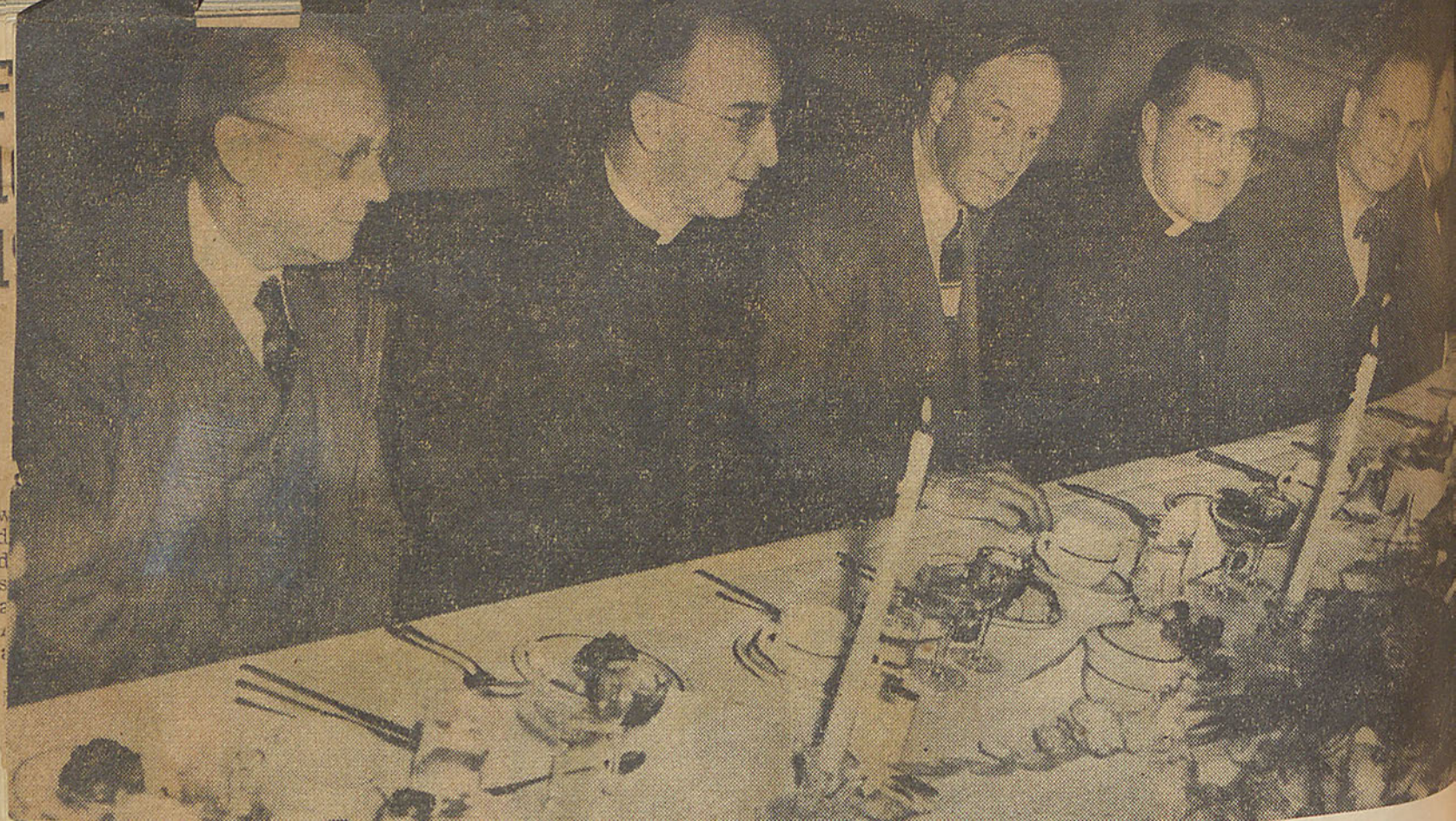
Each has been a member of the Providence varsity squad for three seasons, while Weinstock is also a leading candidate for catcher with the Friar baseball squad.

WINNERS FACE DARTMOUTH APRIL 8 PHILIPS FAILS TO BREAK RECORD

Before a capacity audience last Friday evening the auditorium of Harkins Hall was the scene of the All-College Smoker which is sponsored annually by the Monogram Club. This show proved to be another successful stop on the Providence College Sport Parade and had the good fortune of having each and every event result in performances that far exceeded the most enthusiastic expectations.

It was a night of ample thrills and high tension. The program opened with the spectacular added attraction of an attempt by Dick Philips of Brown to break the world indoor high jump record. While this attempt by Philips failed to attain its desired goal, there was not a person present who did not come away with a feeling of admiration for the high degree of skill possessed by this young man from Brown.

The jumping exhibition got under way with George Kelsey of Moses Brown, Tom DiLuglio of Classical, Ken Reis of Hope, and Philips all clearing the bar which was set at the initial height of 5'6 1/2". The pace soon became too fast for the high school boys and only Reis was left in the competition as the bar reached 6' 1/2".

At this time Philips saw fit to remove his warm-up suit for the first time. As he did this he found himself competing alone for despite a brilliant try Reis missed a third attempt and was forced to drop out. Philips continued in easy fashion to successfully conquer the bar at heights of 6' 2 1/2" and 6' 4 5/8".

Now with the mounting tension very noticeable the bar was placed at 6' 6 1/2". However the degree of difficulty increased to such an extent that Philips exhausted his three attempts permitted under A.A.U. rules success. Because of the fact that each of these attempts failed by only the smallest margin, Philips requested that he be given another attempt. Marshaling all his strength and ability the Brown Ace cleared this height with inches to spare.

The applause had hardly died away when the crowd's attention was called to the opening remarks of the very professional type announcing of Jim

Cahill, who, with Jack Shea, provided the program with a steady flow of humour. Cahill gave the usual introductions to the celebrities and officials present at the ringside including Doctors Edwin B. O'Reilly and Frederick J. Burns, college physicians; judges: Hal Martin and Bob DeCelles; timekeeper: Ted Mezejewski; counting for the knock downs at the bell; Walt Lososki; and referee: Pete Louthis.

Following this came the first of eight championship bouts which proved to be exhibitory examples of the ability of Boxing Coach Peter Louthis to excellently train and match fighting men.

The opening encounter saw Pete Razza, (136) from Newport, win a convincing decision over Don Neddy, (141) of Milton, Mass. Razza again exhibited the fine type of boxing ability that has enabled him to be a two time winner at these annual bouts.

The second bout proved to be a fairly equal contest of lightweight boxing by Pat O'Brien, (138) of Providence, and Ray Chaisson, (141) of New Bedford until O'Brien uncorked a tremendous right cross to put Chaisson down for the count at 1:06 of the second round.

The third bout was probably the nearest one on the card to being a case of over matching. In this fight, Oscar Peters, (16) of Taunton, was found to be definitely superior to Bill Magee, (151) of Boston, and gained a unanimous decision.

Encounter number four saw a wild and wooly slugfest in which either man looked as though he would go down at any minute. Once again however the lethal fists of Ray Forgays, (145) from Mt. Vernon, N. Y. were able to smash through to triumph as Jack Dunn, (144) of Mansfield, Mass. took the count at 1:36 of the second heat.

After a short intermission, the heavier end of the program got underway with Bill Bromson, (154) of Providence, showering a steady rain of punches on game Art Murphy, (149) of Floral Park, Long Island, and he appeared a certain winner. However Murphy rallied in the third round, and this coupled with the loss of the second round, on a foul by Bromson, gave Murphy a unanimous decision.

The sixth bout was more an exhibition of boxing than the previous slugfest, as neither Frank Kilbride, (177) of New Haven, nor Kevin McMahon, (176) of Dover, N. H. did any appreciable damage to each other. As a result this bout brought a very close point decision for Kilbride.

The semi-final found two very aggressive gentlemen, in the persons of Ed Strack, (179) of Pawtucket and Leo McCarty, (182) of Chicago, trying to score quick knockouts on each other. A solid punch to the mouth caused McCarty to bleed severely and forced referee Louthis to stop the contest at 1:00 of the second round awarding the victory to a very improved Strack.

The final contest saw the two most capable men of the evening oppose each other in a feature attraction. Bill McCaughey, (168) of Pawtucket jumped to an early lead due to the very baffling southpaw attack that he employed and Bob Connelly, (162) of New Haven was never able to really get started. McCaughey's terrific punching power soon had Connelly in a weakened condition and Referee Louthis wisely stepped in and stopped it at 1:31 of the second round. Opening Games on P.C. Slate

Despite the presence of several lettermen from last year's baseball team, Coach Hal Martin of Providence College has certain misgivings about the prospects for his Friar nine this season.

The P.C. mentor expects some improvement from last year's regulars. To be sure, and he is hopeful that a few members of Coach Larry Drew's freshman team of a year ago will plug some of the gaps. But his optimism ends right there.

His chief problem will be his pitching staff. Lefty Tom Keenan of New Haven, the mainstay of the Friar flinging corps the past two seasons, is still around and even though he could make just about any college ball club in the East, he can't be expected to carry the full load. He's going to need plenty of help, especially since the P.C. schedule as constituted calls for at least three starting pitchers.

The Friars open against Yale at New Haven on Apr. 20 and then play Villanova and Seton Hall away during the ensuing three days. Before returning home they plan to play the Stamford club of the Class B, Colonial League. Successive games with R.I. State, Holy Cross and Boston College follow, which support Martin's theory that as the pitching goes, so goes the entire team.

Higgins Best Prospect

Tom "Red" O'Halloran, who pitched a no-hit, no-run game against M.I.T. last year, graduated in June but Don Foley and Jim Fox, both members of the '47 and '48 teams, are back again. Foley showed real promise as a sophomore but was bothered by a sore arm most of last season. Fox served mostly in relief roles.

Martin's best prospect for the No. 2 hurling assignment at the moment appears to be Frank Higgins, a left-hander with the freshman nine last year. Another strong contender is Matt McDermott, a senior, who didn't come out last year.

The other half of the battery doesn't present much of a problem as Art Weinstock and Walt Modleszewski, regular catchers for the past two seasons, are available. Bill Downey, freshman receiver last year, also may make the grade.

First base is wide open as a result of the graduation of last season's captain, Bill Angelone. Walt Dempsey, up from the freshman team, Rae Edwards and Ted Mezejewski are after the job. Edwards was on the pitching staff last year and Mezejewski was the regular left fielder.

Battle At Shortstop

Dick Maloney is expected to hold sway at second where he did most of last season, although Francis "Skippy" McGurkin has looked good in the intra-squad games held during the past week. Jim Sullivan and Walt Lozoski are battling it out for shortstop. Sullivan started out as the regular short fielder last year, but an injury sidelined him about halfway through the season and Lozoski moved over to short from his third-

base post. Sullivan possesses the strongest arm among the infielders but Lozoski appeared to have an edge in the fielding end until a spike injury forced him to withdraw from practice last Tuesday. He is expected back this week.

Sophomore Ed Mooney shapes up as the best of the lot for the third-base berth. He was one of the most consistent hitters on the freshman nine last year. Owen Beatty, another candidate for the hot corner job, has also been showing up well and may be kept on as a utility infielder.

Ralph Mattera will be back at the center field post he has held the past two years. Sophomores Larry DePalma and Sam Nissel, a couple of basketball players, are leading the fight for left and right field, respectively. If Mezejewski doesn't figure in Martin's first-base plans he will no doubt return to left field and DePalma may get the nod in right.

The Friars' collective hitting strength can't be gauged accurately until the season gets under way, but Martin doesn't appear to be worried about that department. If the pitchers come through, even to a modest degree, the P.C. coach is confident the other phases of play will fall in line quite naturally.

Fran Pelligrino of the Providence College Friars and Fred Kozak and Chuck Whelan of Brown received scattered votes and were given honorable mention, as were Bill O'Connor of Newport and St. Anselm's and Tom Duffy, St. Raphael alumnus from Pawtucket who now plays for St. Anselm's.

WESTERLY, April 1.—The Providence Friars, the Cinderella kids of the annual Moore gold medal basketball tournament, scored one of the most popular victory in the history of the event, topping the Westerly Flyers, 68 to 60, before a packed house in Moore hall tonight.

From the start of the tournament, when the Friars ousted the LaCasa Rams, another of the pre-tourney favorites, they had the crowd with them and their blazing finish against the Flyers, after lagging at the end of the first half, won them a host of additional supporters.

Sparking the Friars to their victory were Jim Schlimm, the unanimous choice as the outstanding player in the tournament, Tommy Bauer and Ray Korbusiewski. Schlimm, in addition to tallying 20 points to lead all the scorers, ruled both boards and played a strong defensive game while Gauer and Korbusiewski also chipped in with key plays which enabled the Friars to come from behind to take the title.

The Providence Cagers took a 17-14 lead in the first period but then saw the Flyers slow the game down and overtake them at the half when they trailed 31-27.

The Flyers, however, still had way through the third period, 39-32 but here Schlimm and company staged a counter rally and sent the Friars ahead, 46-42, at the three-quarter mark.

The Flyers, however, still had something left and three minutes along in the final period moved out in front, 47-46. From then in, however, they were unable to match the blazing finish of the Providence club as it won going away.

In the preliminary, which produced some more good basketball, the Calabrese club of Westerly took third place with a 62 to 55 victory over the Westcott AA of West Warwick. The game was close all the way, with the score tied nine times during the first half and once again

in the second but the Clubmen turned it on in the late stages and after that the West Warwick quintet was never able to catch up.

Named to the all-tournament team were Schlimm and Tom Bauer of the Friars, Bob Shea of the Westerly Flyers, Angelo Saintilli of Westcott and Ken Goodwin of the LaCasa Diners.

Second team choices were Bud Clemens and Bob Chamberlain of the Flyers, Owen Haggerty of the Wickford Lions, Tom Henderson of the Calabrese club and Sam Nissell of the Friars.

Schlimm was the tourney's high scorer with 68 points while Goodwin of LaCasa tallied 35 for the high single game mark.

The Newport Club, P. C. intramural champs, fell before the Edwards-Hopkins House, Brown Champs, 66-40, in a game played for the city college intramural title. The Ray Garcia-coached club made a close tussle of it in the first quarter, but they couldn't keep pace with the phenomenal shooting of the Hopkins quintet. Actually, the game was much closer than the score would indicate.

Getting off to a fast start, the Brown team built up a quick 6-0 lead before the P. C.ers could get rolling. Then, with Joe Beatrice and Fran MacKinnon leading the way, they cut the deficit to 8-7. Beatrice scored six of the first seven Newport points, one of his baskets coming on a beautiful breakaway, while MacKinnon did an excellent job of clearing the boards during this rally. At this point in the game, the advantages of superior weight and of playing on their own home court began to swing the game for Brown. The P. C. champs, unaccustomed to playing on such a large court, tired quickly, and were no match under the boards for the big Bruin team, which had three men in the starting lineup who were bigger than the tallest Newporter.

Leading 16-10 at the end of the first quarter, the taller Bruins, Thompson and McConnell, and speedy Paul Wasseth, put on a brilliant shooting display, as they built up a 35-22 half-time bulge. Beatrice paced the team in scoring, as he garnered 13 points, the same amount as scored by the leading Bruin, Wasseth. MacKinnon played his best ball of the season, doing a good job of rebounding and setting up numerous plays from the center position. In the latter, he completely baffled the Hopkins defense passing off deceptively for layups several times. Earl Lynch also played well in spots, and scored on two nice one-handers.

The Newporters started off fast in the second half, but try as they

did, they couldn't cut the margin. During the third quarter the height of the Bruin team kept the Newporters from closing the gap. The P.C.ers worked several good plays to score, while the Brown team did most of its scoring on rebound tap-ins by Thompson, 6'4" end on the varsity football team. "Dobbie" Dobson played well for the Clubsters in this period. The score at the three-quarter mark was 48-30.

The fourth period was much the same as the third, with the Newporters unable to rally their forces to cut the deficit. Coach Ray Garcia substituted freely in the last two periods in a vain effort to hit upon a combination which could stop the Hopkins team. Paul Wasseth put on a brilliant display to help build up their lead. The final score was 66-40, as they rolled it up in the last two minutes.

It was indeed the misfortune of the Newporters to meet a club, which, even at the admission of the Brown rooters, was playing its best game of the year. In the meantime Newport was doing just the reverse, playing its worst game as a team. Wasseth of Brown paced the scorers for the Brown team, whose shooting average was phenomenal, with 19 points Beatrice was the leading P.C. scorer with 17, despite the fact that he only played about 12 minutes in the second half. Dobson and Lynch each scored 6 for the Friar team.

The Dartmouth College vs. Providence College boxing bouts scheduled for Harkins Hall, Friday night, will be free to the P.C. students. The students will have to present their student tickets at the door. Outsiders will be charged 60 cents.

Track Team At State Tuesday For Outdoor Go

What good are rules for boxing, when the boxers lives are endangered by low-down, dirty deals like this one? At least, let's live up to our school motto.

THE ANSWER. . .

Mr. V. J. F.:

Usually I don't like to answer letters that have only initials attached to them. If a man is firm in his convictions he usually will sign his letters with his name.

However, I have taken it upon myself to conduct a small investigation, amateur though it may be. In the first place I had to assume from your letter that you were referring to the last bout on the Monogram Club Smoker program a few weeks ago. Secondly, I have never heard of an overweight bout. Is that some new weight division in boxing such as a heavyweight, lightweight, or middleweight? I think what you are trying to say is an over-the-weight match. That often happens when a fighter does not weigh in at an official weighing, within the limit prescribed for that division. The bout is then called an over-the-weight match but never an overweight bout.

Now on the afternoon of the fights, Peter Louthis, who by the way, has been congratulated almost unanimously for his skill in matching the fighters on the program, had a problem. When he weighed each contestant, he found that McCaughey weighed 168 pounds. Connelly weighed 162 pounds.

Another man, Bill Bromson, whom Louthis was considering matching with Connelly, weighed in at 154 pounds. There was a six pound difference between the first two and an eight pound difference between the second and third man. Now as far as weights were concerned the right thing to do was match the first two men. Louthis did that. Louthis also knew from the records and also observation during the training period that both Connelly and McCaughey had previous ring experience in the service. Bromson hadn't. Thus it was only right that the first two should meet.

Finally, you say that you have it from competent sources that McCaughey weighed from 10 to 15 pounds more than the 168 lbs. announced. Just before writing this article I watched Louthis weigh McCaughey, who is training for the Dartmouth bouts. This was his first day of training since the night of the Monogram fights. McCaughey weighed 170 pounds. After his workout I weighed him myself and he was 168 pounds exactly.

WRONG AGAIN? . . .

A little less than two weeks from now and the baseball season officially opens, when the 16 major league ball teams start the long 154 game schedule in their respective leagues. Having selected the Boston Red Sox to win the American League bunting and the Brooklyn Dodgers the National League flag a year ago, for a batting average of .000, this corner will select the same two again. Can't be wrong all the time.

Drew Looks Over Frosh Candidates

Freshman baseball coach Larry Drew has had his pitching candidates working out for about a week now and yesterday called out candidates for the other positions. The Friar yearlings open their schedule against Brown's first year men the 27th of April. Two days later they face the Fosh nine of Rhode Island State here at Hendricken Field.

Games are also scheduled with Marianapolis on May 3rd and Nichols Junior College on May 7th. On May 13th the P.C. Frosh will play State again and on the 18th of May Brown will be the opponent for the second time. The first year men of Holy Cross will also be met in a home and home series. The first game will be played at Worcester on May 11th and the second one here at Hendricken Field May 20th.

Drew plans to give his candidates plenty of batting practice this week and by the end of the week he will probably engage the Varsity squad in a few intra-mural games.

Forgays, Bromson, Murphy Withdrawn Five Bouts Listed For Evening's Program

On Friday evening at eight o'clock, the student body will have the opportunity of witnessing another first for the rapidly expanding athletic program of the College. At this time the auditorium of Harkins Hall will become the scene of the first informal inter-collegiate boxing contest in the history of Providence College athletics.

For this inaugural occasion, the recently crowned intramural boxing champions of the College will pit their fistic skill against representatives of Dartmouth College from Hanover, N. H. This event should serve as an excellent counterpart to the recently successful home meet staged by the Track Team, and be an excellent opportunity for the present classes at the College to see another opening performance by a team in sport that is destined for future greatness here at P. C.

This morning the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., College Athletic Director, after making the announcement that the bouts would definitely be held, went on to explain some of the rules that will govern these bouts as contrasted with those that have been used at the Monogram Bouts. He stated that the primary difference would center around the factor that the type of fighting exhibited would, in keeping with inter-collegiate rules, necessitate greater emphasis on boxing skill, than on the free swinging style employed by champions and contenders alike at the show two weeks ago. C. audience) would be the fact that the audience is not permitted to cheer or applaud while a round is in progress. As the contest will be conducted under the direct supervision of impartial judges appointed by the Rhode Island Boxing Officials Association, any violation of this rule will automatically take the decision from the home team.

In another corner Boxing Coach Peter Louthis was found to be in disheartened condition that is peculiar to all successful present-day coaches. However, it seems that the reason for this state of mind was definitely warranted, for any coach would feel a

bit down if he knew that three of his key men would not be able to perform.

Coach Louthis said that the College Health Department has positively stated that it would be inadvisable for Ray Forgays, Art Murphy, or Bill Bromson to enter the ring at this time as they would possibly aggravate their present condition. It seems that the injuries suffered by Forgays and Murphy, in the Monogram bouts, have not responded sufficiently to treatment at this time and Bromson is suffering from a severe chest cold.

However, Coach Louthis did say that despite this loss, he would field two hits Saturday and looked good in the field, Whitey Weinstock has also looked good at the plate in addition to turning in some creditable receiving chores.

Ted Mezejewski, has entered into the first base competition and it now looks like the final choice will be made between Dempsey and him. Skip McGurkin and Dick Maloney are still battling it out for second base. Walt Lozoski has been temporarily forced to retire from shortstop competition with Sullivan as he suffered a bad spike wound last week. Ed Mooney and Owen Beatty are waging a terrific fight to clinch the third base slot. As yet there doesn't seem to be much to choose from as they are both excellent fielders and fair hitters. De Dalma, Costello, Nissel, Callahan, Alexander, Razza and Matera are competing for the outfield spots.

Don Foley has been favoring a strained back of late, but his pass record would indicate that he will play a positive role in the P.C. pitching plans.

Self-evident from the forementioned success of the hurlers is the fact that there has been very little noteworthy hitting demonstrated. It is hoped that the absence of base hits cut on Hendriken Field is only indicative of the batter's slowness in rounding into shape and not an example of what can be expected from Friar bats later in the season. Callahan, right field candidate, and one of two left handed batters out for the team, is one of the few who have been meeting the ball solidly. He collected

a team of five men who would acquit themselves in a manner that would be a credit to the school in every respect. It is his opinion that the men scheduled to fight are all capable of demonstrating the clever type of boxing required of inter-collegiate boxers.

The card, as it now stands, is made up of the following men: Pat O'Brien (135) of Providence; Oscar Peters (145) of Taunton, Mass.; Bill McCaughey (165) of Pawtucket; Kevin McMahon (170) of Dover, N. H.; and Frank Kilbride (175) from New Haven, Conn. These men will be handled by Thomas Boning, '50, and Richard Boning, '50, who are very experienced in this field. The fact that students will be employed in this respect is another direct stipulation of the rules governing inter-collegiate boxing.

P.C. Makes Ring Debut Here Tomorrow Night

The Providence College boxing team will make its intercollegiate debut tomorrow night against the Dartmouth Indians at Harkins Hall on the P.C. campus, with the first bout scheduled for 8 o'clock.

The Friar boxers are coached by Pete Louthis, a former Providence College grinner during Hugh Devore's coaching regime. Louthis boxed as a professional heavyweight.

The members of the P.C. team were determined for the most part in a series of intra-mural bouts held recently in Harkins Hall. The Friars' lineup will include Pat O'Brien (135), Oscar Peters (145), Bill McCaughey (165), Kevin McMahon (170), and Frank Kilbride (175). There also will be competition in the 155-pound class.

The Dartmouth squad was picked after a series of eliminations, although little is known of their relative ring strength.

Ben Maculan will referee the card, with Martin Taber and Bob Decelles judging. The bouts are open to the public.

Phillips of Brown Misses Record At P.C. Smoker

Dick Phillips of Brown failed in his bid to break the world indoor high jump record last night at Harkins Hall where the Monogram Club of Providence College held its annual smoker.

The Bruin jumper, whose best leap this season was 6 feet, 8 inches, was aiming to exceed the height of 6-9½ which was set by Edward Burke of Marquette in 1937. Competing against Ken Reis of Hope and Tom DiLuglio and George Kelsey of Classical, Phillips cleared 6-4½ without a failure but missed three straight tries at 6-6½, the same height he attained at the P.C. Invitation meet two weeks ago.

The crowd of about 750 gave the Brown star a big hand as he cleared the latter height on his fourth attempt but A.A.U. rules permit only three failures. Harry Devoe, Ed Haire, Bill Dwyer and John Davis of the Rhode Island Track and Field Officials Association were in charge of the event. Reis finished second at 5-9½.

TOP OUTFIELDER BANNED FOR PLAY IN NORTHERN LOOP

Friar A.A. Announces Move in
Keeping With Code
of E.C.A.C.

Ralph Mattera, hard hitting Providence College outfielder, has been declared ineligible for further Friar baseball activity as a result of playing in the Northern League last season, according to an announcement yesterday by the Providence College Athletic Association.

The loss of a player of Mattera's caliber is a big blow to the Providence club for the former Cranston High athlete was one of the best fielding and hitting outfielders the Friars have had in recent seasons.

The Providence College A.A. held a meeting Wednesday in Harkins Hall and decided that Mattera was not eligible for the season according to the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference code which they follow.

Hard to Replace

Near the close of the college season last year, Asa Bushnell, commissioner of the E.C.A.C., which is a division of the N.C.A.A., expressly put the Northern League under a ban for college players, with a few minor exceptions. However, article three of section three of the code forbids active participation in the Northern League.

The Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., director of athletics for the Friars, said he was very sorry to lose Mattera as "Ralph is the best hitter we have and we don't have anybody who can fill his shoes." And Coach Hal Martin expressed similar sentiments.

Mattera, reached at his home at 251 Flint Street, Cranston, yesterday, said that he had heard the decision of the P.C.A.A. He said that originally he was ignorant to what extent the E.C.A.C. code went but later it was too late to get out of the league.

Ralph is a product of Cranston High, where he also played some basketball in addition to baseball under Coach Eddie Stebbins. He played with the Green Thunderbolts for three years, and was All-Class A and All-State outfielder. The Thunderbolts, with Mattera hitting well, won the state championship in 1943, beating Colt Memorial in the playoffs.

The Northern League is "taboo" with the big moguls of the ECAC, because its college member baseball players may receive a few dollars for summer living while playing baseball, and not working.

From appearances of this first banning, and others that are expected to come in the next few weeks, it seems that the ECAC put its watchdog on the Northern League last summer and did some scouting to see who was playing summer ball up here.

Officials of the Rutland Royals Club, when told of the banning of Mattera, said that "it was a shame that college students, who plan to go on in baseball, cannot get a summer of playing ball with no more income than living expenses for pay, without being banned from collegiate sports."

Another commented that the ECAC had better clean up its own house first, as told by the NCAA last week.

Another comment was that the major leagues should contract the likely looking high school graduates, pay their way through college, and send them to the Northern League for coaching and experience in the summer months. This would take the good players away and perhaps help the ECAC to open its eyes to its selfishness.

This field includes the best teams in the East and Coach Coates has nominated Dan Walsh, John McMullen, Gerald Kallman and Jim Penler to carry the Providence colors in this contest.

The winning places in both of these races will be awarded on the basis of the fastest times run and the particular position of a team in an individual race will be of no consideration.

Coach Coates also stated that he

The race was won by Villavona in 3:25.4, with Manhattan in second place.

Nine Plays State at Kingston Today Holy Cross and Boston College Next

STILL THE BEST . . .

Some seventeen years have passed since he graduated from Providence College and embarked on a professional baseball career, and many good catchers have appeared and just as suddenly disappeared but George 'Birdie' Tebbetts is still just about the best mask and mitt man in the business.

The Nashua, New Hampshire, resident is crowding the forty-year mark, an age when most players retire to the coaching lines or just retire, but to see him on the field one would never think that he was ready for the inactive list.

When Tebbetts left Providence College he joined the Detroit Tigers organization and was promptly farmed out to Beaumont in the Texas League. At that time, Detroit's catcher was one of the great catchers of modern baseball history, Gordon 'Mickey' Cochrane. Although Cochrane was getting along in years, he still had a lot of baseball left in his system. He led the Tigers to American League championships in '34 and '35 and the World's Series title in the latter year. However, shortly after that he was skulled by a pitch and he was through. Tebbetts was called up to take over one of the toughest assignments in history. It was not easy to step into the shoes of Black Mike as Cochrane was known. The fact that the old P.C. grad is still catching in the big show attests to his success in filling those shoes.

Perhaps the worst deal the Detroit team ever made was in trading Tebbetts to Boston for Hal Wagner in the middle of the 1947 season. Wagner is now the third string catcher on the Phillies and Tebbetts is just about the best in baseball. For the last six or seven years Detroit has had what has been generally conceded the best pitching staff on paper in either league. For quite a few of those years they also

looked it on the field. Since Tebbetts left the Tiger fold, only Hal Newhouser has been what you would call a great pitcher, Hutchinson, Trout, and Trucks, the other members of the once great staff, have only been run of the mill throwers. Tebbetts must have been an influencing factor on that staff.

If the Red Sox win the pennant this year, it has been hinted that Joe McCarthy might step down from the managerial reins. He has not been in the best of health for these past three years. Another pennant and there wouldn't be much left for McCarthy. If and when McCarthy steps down what would be a more natural thing than the selection of Tebbetts to succeed him. It is pretty well known that McCarthy is a great admirer of the P.C. boy. Added to that Tebbetts is a native New Englander and would be a popular choice from a fan's standpoint. So don't be too surprised to see a P.C. boy managing in the big leagues in the not too distant future.

Bob DeCoursey, six foot, five-inch

basketball reserve, will hurl for the Elis with Bob James doing the catching.

The Friars, who won eight games last season and lost four in an abbreviated schedule, are well-stocked with New Haven talent. In addition to Higgins, two more Hillhouse graduates are on the team.

Former Hillhouse Stars

Although it is the opening game for the Friars, Larry DePalma, former Academic basketball and baseball star, has impressed in pre-season practice and is ticketed for a regular outfield post. Jim Dempsey, who starred in both baseball and football at the York Square institution before the war and who later represented St. Mary's High is battling for the first base position. Like DePalma and Higgins he starred on the 1948 Friar frosh.

Co-Captained by Keenan and Ralph Mattered, an outfielder, Providence has eight veterans on the squad who saw considerable service last year.

Either Kennan or Higgins is expected to get the mound assignment against the Elis with Art Weinstock or Walt Modliszewski behind the bat.

Last year, Keenan hurled creditably against the Blue until the fifth inning, when Providence misplays projected him into difficulty. He failed to last the inning, and the

close contest turned into a shambles with Yale eventually emerging the victor by a lop-sided 22-4 count.

To illustrate the vagaries of college baseball, the Friars in the succeeding game upset Holy Cross, 7-4, and the Crusaders then travelled to Yale Field and subdued the Elis.

A walk to Sam Nissell prompted Palladino to lift Melkonian and Blount immediately put out the fire by forcing Dick Maloney to hit back to the box.

The Rams got men on second base in both the seventh and eighth frames with only one out and yet failed to score as Keenan bore down and depleted Rhody's bats to mere splinters.

Although the Friars protested vehemently to Umpire Jim Brennan that they had tagged catcher Ed Becker during the double steal worked with Johnson in the second, Brennan's biggest bo^{the} came in the ninth

when the Friars added another run for good measure. The Rams scored both their runs in the second frame on squeeze plays.

Keenan started this frame by fanning. De Palma blasted a wicked single down the left field line, however, and then was declared safe at second by Mr. Brennan when the latter apparently closed his eyes on the play. The gate was left wide open for the Friars and they promptly took advantage of the opportunity when Vento booted Sullivan's grounder. The fleet-footed De Palma legged it all the way home from second when the ball was deflected by Vento part way between himself and Kelley for the clinching run.

Blount got out of the inning without any further trouble but the damage had already been done. The lean righthander gave up only one hit in 2 1-3 innings, walked one and hit one batter.

Holy Cross Surge in Eighth Turns Back Friars, 9 to 6

Double Play in 9th Puts End to P.C. Hopes; DePalma Smashes Homer

Worcester, Apr. 30.—A four-run uprising in the eighth inning simplified matters for Holy Cross today as the Crusaders defeated Providence College, 9-6, at Fitton Field.

That burst put the Crusaders ahead, 9-4, and a crisp double play relieved the pressure when the Friars threatened seriously in the ninth. That play, started by Jack Coyle on a vicious smash by Walt Lozowski, came after Art Weinstock had singled, Larry DePalma had homered and Jim Costello had singled. Weinstock and Costello did their hitting in pinch roles.

The Crusaders got the jump with three runs in the first—on one hit—out the Friars, scoring once in the first, went ahead, 4-3, in the fourth on successive singles by Owen Beatty and Ed Mooney, a double by Walt Modlizevski and a monumental flyout by DePalma. That, however, ended them until the ninth.

An error, two walks, a sacrifice

and Bob Heon's double had produced the Crusaders' early runs and they tied the score on a fluke in the sixth when Sam Nissel lost Bob Dermeyer's easy fly in the seventh. Frequently, Ed Polak scored him with a single.

Nissel previously had been the fielding sensation with four good catches, one of them a beautiful somersault job at the expense of Porter. The sun didn't smile on him, however, and as the seventh opened, he lost Neon's smash in deep center the same way and it went for a double. A sacrifice and wild throw by McDermott in a pickoff attempt allowed Neon to score the tie-breaking run.

Then came the eighth. Porter walked and Dittmeyer sacrificed Galvin singled and Polak drove in a run with a long fly to center. In quick succession Doc Lavery, Neon and Joe Frechette singled. That ended McDermott and brought Tom Keenan onto the scene.

Keenan, the Friars' ace, walked two men, filling the bases, but struck out Porter for the final out.

Frank Higgins, the Friars' starter, had a rocky time in the first inning but then settled down and escaped unscathed in the next two. His luck ran out with Frechette at bat in the third, for that worthy drilled one right back at Higgins, striking him on the pitching hand and finishing him for the day. Lozowski recovered the ball on a brilliant play and threw out Frechette.

Each team hit well. The Crusaders collected 12 hits and the Friars 10, including DePalma's line smash to the right-centerfield fence. Neon led all the hitters with two singles and two doubles. He drove in three runs, as did DePalma.

TRACK BECOMES MAJOR SPORT

RECOGNITION COMES IN ONE YEAR TEAMS DO WELL AT PENN RELAYS

With the opening of the academic year of 1949-1950, the track team of Providence College will be accorded the full status of a major sport and henceforth be entitled to all the rights and privileges which accompany this classification. Thus, at this time, a member of the varsity track team will be eligible to win a monogram, and it is also the intention of the College to award monograms to any eligible Senior member of the present squad.

These were the opening sentences of an announcement made to the COWL this morning by the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., College Athletic Director. Father Begley continued his announcement by praising the tireless efforts of Coach Harry A. Coates and his small squad, indicating that the splendid job done by these few men and their coach had virtually forced the recognition of track as a major sport at this early stage in its development.

However Father Begley added that while the administration and athletic department were very pleased to date with the progress made toward establishing of this sport here at the College, it could not help feeling rather disappointed with the manner in which the student body was taking advantage of this opportunity.

At the present less than one fourth of one per cent of the student body is taking advantage of the opportunity to participate in this competitive sport. This is a far cry from the number that expressed a desire for the College to make additions to its varsity athletic program. It is hoped in the future the student body will get behind the track team and give Coach Coates the type of support that he deserves.

This announcement comes as a fitting climax to the successful completion of one full year of track at the College. It was only a little over a year ago that the College authorities decided to inaugurate this program.

When the decision to have a track team was reached it was the good fortune of the College to be able to obtain the services of the best track coach in the country. Since the first arrival of Mr. Harry Coates the student body felt the in-

creasing effect of his ability and personality on the life of the campus.

In looking back to the rather lean days of early spring a year ago one cannot help but appreciate the great progress that has been made in the course of a year.

Te begin with the school had the experience of having a track coach and no track. When a temporary field was layed out behind Donnelly Hall it then became obvious that the College had a track without runners to compete on it. But through the efforts of Coates this latter situation was soon remedied. Every man who reported for track was given every bit of encouragement possible by the headman. Without measure he gave uncounted hours of his personal time to a lad who desired individual attention.

During the latter part of 1948 and the early stages of the present year, a board track was built on Hendricken Field. Only a couple of months ago Providence College was host to one of the greatest gathering of track stars ever assembled on the same outdoor track. That day over three thousand people were in attendance. It was a cold blustery day. The field was covered with snow. But Harry Coates was the magnetic drawing power. Not one runner advertised among the contestants failed to put in an appearance. Harry Coates had achieved what most would say was impossible.

At the Penn Relays last week end another bit of advancement came when the P. C. Frosh Relay team gained fourth place honors in the mile relay. They competed against the best Frosh teams in the United States at this meet.

FOLEY GOES AGAINST M.I.T. TODAY B.C. NINE HERE SUNDAY FOR GAME

The Providence College nine won one and lost two in their baseball encounters during the past week. Last Wednesday the Friars won a thrilling 4-2 decision over the R. I. State Rams at Kingston. This hour of triumph was quickly darkened over the week-end as the Crusaders of Holy Cross ended their three year jinx by downing P.C. 9-6. On Sunday the Martinmen journeyed to Boston where they suffered a 3-0 loss at the hands of B.C.

The victory over the Rams was quite pleasing to Providence, as the Friars have gone quite a few years without defeating State in any sport. Tom Keenan went all the way for P. C., giving up only 5 hits and walking four for his initial triumph of the season. P.C. got off to a 1-0 lead in the 3rd inning as Owone Beatty singled, stole second, advanced to third on a wild pitch, and scored on a long fly by De Palma.

For the second time in the history of the school, Boston College will play a Sabbath baseball game, playing host to Providence College's Friars at Alumni Field this afternoon. Right-handed senior Bob Quirk of Manchester, N. H., is expected to hurl for the Eagles, who are in the midst of a five-game grind in six days.

Last year B. C. played Villanova in a Sunday tilt. Today's game is the first of a home-and-home series with the R. I. nine, which twice was defeated by the Eagles last season.

Quirk will be getting his initial starting assignment of the season. Coach Freddie Maguire expects a lot of him this year, especially with Steve Stuka hospitalized and out for the remainder of the campaign.

The N. H. twirler has an outstanding college record. He's lost about one game in 13 collegiate appearances. As a freshman, Quirk was debited with a loss in a relief stint of four innings. Following that he racked up 11 straight.

HIT BY HARD LUCK

Misfortune hit Quirk last year. In a practice session he stepped on a loose ball and broke his ankle, an injury which kept him out of all but one game. He defeated Tech toward the end of the season for his lone victory in 1949.

If their first few games are any criterion, the Eagles are one of New England's leading contenders for a bid to the N. C. A. A. tournament at Wichita, Kansas in June. Particularly impressive was their 4-1 victory over Dartmouth, Pentagonal League champion in 1948.

The Heightsmen compiled a 16-4 record last year, and felt that a round-robin should have been played to determine a N. C. A. A. representative. They were surprised, however, when Yale, which had been inferior to B. C. and Dartmouth, was chosen for the N. C. A. A. competition.

Following Providence, the Eagles will meet intra-city rival Boston University, a formidable foe at Alumni Field tomorrow afternoon, then journey to Ayer to play Devens College, a game originally planned for B. C. but shifted at the last minute.

If Quirk comes through today, Coach Freddie Maguire will have at least three, possibly four, top notch hurlers, far more than is had by the average college nine. Southpaw Ed Walsh of Dorchester has been impressive, especially in a five-inning relief stint against Harvard. Gerry Levinson, right-handed senior from Bourne, leads the team with two victories, over American International and Dartmouth.

Levinson has been a pleasant surprise. He's been on the squad for three seasons, but never has

been too impressive, working most in relief spots. After his performances in his two assignments, he'll be ticketed for more and more duty this year.

Against A. I. C., Levinson worked seven innings, gave up but two hits over that stretch and fanned eight batters. He twirled a masterful one-hitter in the Dartmouth game, a single to left the lone blow off him. In 16 innings, Levinson has given up but three hits, better than par for the course.

The capability of Levinson and

Walsh is known. Quirk has looked good in practice games, and if he can come through too, the Eagles will have few pitching worries.

Pre-season predictions of the B. C. team listed them as "good hit, no pitch." So far, it's been just the opposite. The pitchers have been coming through in grand style, while the hitters haven't hit their stride yet.

The Eagles are a good hitting team. They proved that last season, and the same players are back. However, the batters have been a little behind the pitchers in the first few games.

Only three extra-base blows were registered in the first three games. Frannie Harrington, sophomore outfielder sensation, pashed a double against Harvard, first baseman Ed Collins whacked a 400-foot triple in the A. I. C. game, and Ed Clasby hit a home run against Dartmouth. The rest been singles.

The remainder of the B. C. hits have been singles.

Two of the team's best stickers, catcher Jim Fitzgibbons of West Roxbury and outfielder Bob Fitzgerald of Newton, haven't hit their stride yet. Fitzgibbons is the lean-up batter; Fitzgerald follows him. Both have been hitting

the ball hard, but the drives haven't been falling safely. They're due for a change in luck soon. Fitzgerald is a left-handed batter and the best power hitter on the squad.

Ted Quinn, Ed Walsh and newcomer Paul Aylward, a lanky sophomore from Jamaica Plain, are slated for mound duty against B. U. and Devens. Aylward, a right-hander, has impressed Coach Maguire in practice. He'll be brought along slowly until he gets the necessary experience.

More than 1200 fans, the largest crowd of the season for a collegiate game, saw the old rivals pound out 23 hits, which included three doubles and a home run.

It was a closely-contested game through the first seven innings with Holy Cross holding a 5-4 edge. But in the last of the eighth, the Crusaders sent 10 men to the plate and scored four runs to sew up the verdict.

The Friars rapped the tiring Matty Formon for two consolation runs in the ninth, but the big righthander had enough left to post his third victory of the season as against one defeat.

Formon Spells Donovan

Tom Donovan started for Holy Cross, but the side-arming righthander was clipped for a single run in the first and three in the fourth. Formon took over in the fifth and allowed only one hit until the ninth.

The Providence three-run fourth wiped out a 3-1 Holy Cross lead, but the Crusaders tied the score 4-all in the sixth and moved ahead with another singleton in the stretch frame.

The winning runs came at the expense of Providence's second pitcher, Brad McDermott, a stocky lefthander. Frank Higgins, another lefthander, who started for the Friars, was struck on the pitching hand by a hard line drive off the bat of Joe Frechette in the third and was forced to leave the game.

Drops Fly in Sun

The uncertain fielding visitors virtually threw Holy Cross the tying run in the sixth. Center fielder Sam N... apparently troubled by the... dropped Bob Dittmeyer's fly ball. Frank Galvin walked, but catcher Walt Modlezewski, forgetting the count, threw the ball to uncovered second base.

This allowed Dittmeyer to move to third. He scored on Ed Polak's single.

Nissell also had a hand in Holy Cross' seventh inning run. He completely lost Bob Heon's fly to left to give the Crusaders' third baseman a double. Joe Frechette sacrificed Heon to third.

With Jack Coyle at bat, the Purple tried a squeeze play. Coyle fouled away the first pitch. Then McDermott tried to nip Heon off third, but he threw the ball in the dirt past third and Heon scampered across.

Real Hitting in Eighth

However, there was no luck connected with the Crusaders' four-run outburst in the eighth. A walk, and hits by Galvin, Doc Lavery, Heon and Frechette produced the Holy Cross tallies.

Providence's runs in the ninth came on a home run by DePalma to the 420-foot mark in center after Art Weinstock had singled.

DePalma also played a big role in the first Providence run. He opened the game with a single, stole second, moved to third on an infield out and came across on a double steal.

Two errors, a walk, a wild pitch and a single by Heon wiped out the Providence lead and moved the Crusaders in front 3-1 at the end of the first.

The Friars found the range on Donovan in the fourth and quickly collected a trio of runs on singles by Owen Beatty, Ed Mooney, a double by Modlezewski and an outfield fly.

Then, he came back later to win the half mile by approximately six yards in the excellent time of 2:04.3.

Provider of two of the best finishes of the meet was little Jack Cassidy, who won the 440 and finished second to Keenan in the 880. In the quarter, Cassidy put on a terrific burst of speed in the last eighty yards to pass teammate Bob Aldrich and a fellow from Brown, and win in the good time of 52.1 seconds. The Friars worked a man around to third in both the first and second innings. One was erased at the plate on an attempted delayed double-steal on a Ben Patrick to Joe Kern to Patrick maneuver and in the second inning the Friars had three consecutive batsmen called out on strikes.

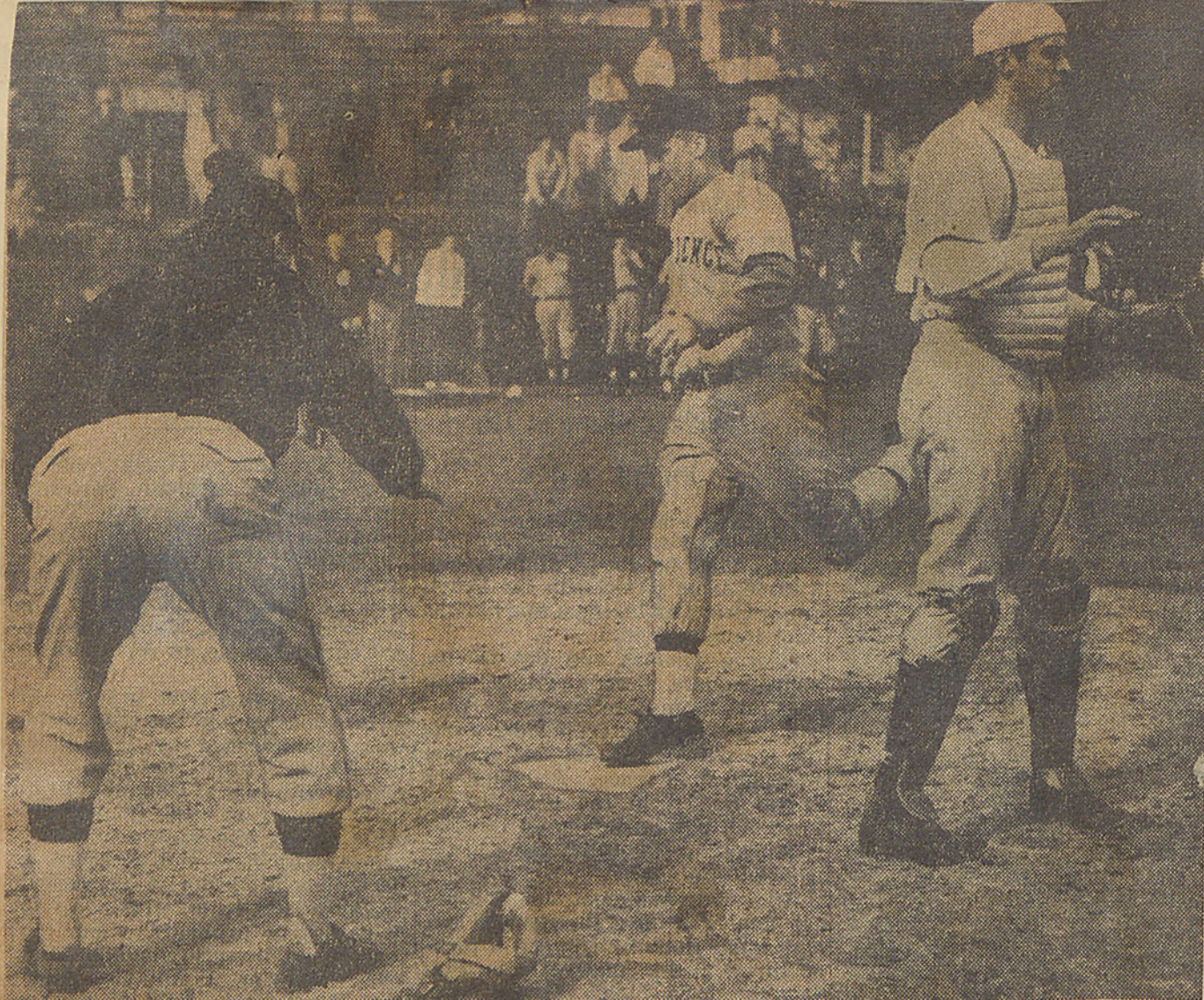
Beatty got an infield hit in the first and a line single in the sixth for two of the Friars' four bingles while Sam Nissell singled in the second. These were the only other hits until Weinstock came up in the ninth.

He relayed it to another Bruin still in the outfield as Weinstock made the circuit. Newton, Mass., May 2.—Frank Shellenback, son of the former coach of the Boston Red Sox, starved the Providence College batters with a five-hit diet here yesterday as unbeaten Boston College scored its fifth straight victory of the season in defeating the Friars, 3-0.

Shellenback's mound opponent, Tom Keenan of the Friars, proved to be a worthy foe, as he gave up six hits, only two of which figured in the Eagles' run-making. However, the Friars' No. 1 hurler had the misfortune of seeing two of the three men he walked and another hit batsmen score the only runs of the game with the aid of timely singles and alert base-running.

Furthermore, while Keenan's mates backed him up superbly in the field, they failed to deliver at the plate on two occasions when they were confronted with a bases-loaded situation, the second time with only one out.

A wild pitch by relief pitcher Roland Gleason with the bases loaded in the ninth inning enabled Providence College to defeat the Springfield College baseball team, 5-4, yesterday afternoon at Hendricken Field.

Going into the last of the eighth the Friars appeared headed for certain defeat. They trailed, 4-0, and had been held to two hits by Frank Neverdauski. But the P.C. forces came up in the eighth loaded for bear.

Ted Mezejewski, batting for Ed Mooney, drew a base on balls, moved to second on Walt Modliszewski's Texas League single to center, and scored on pinch-hitter Art Weinstock's solid single to right. Modliszewski held up at second but both runners were advanced on Owen Beatty's sacrifice. Larry DePalma then delivered a single to right field, scoring Modliszewski, but a snappy relay forced Weinstock to hold up at third.

Maloney Starts Action

DePalma stole second and Weinstock then scored the third P.C. run while Fran McGurkin was being thrown out by third baseman Ed Juszcyk. DePalma moved to third on the play and then stole home with the tying run. Sam Nissel was subsequently walked but was thrown out trying to steal second.

The Gymnasts were retired in or-

der in the ninth and Dick Maloney started the P.C. fireworks when he opened the inning with a walk. Jim Sullivan sacrificed him to second. Mezejewski drew another walk and that was all for Neverdauski. Gleason moved to his relief and was ordered to walk Modliszewski intentionally and try for a double play.

Tom Keenan, the Friars' No. 1 hurler, was sent in to bat for relief pitcher Frank Higgins. Keenan had a count of 2 and 2 on him when Gleason uncorked a wild heave that enabled Maloney to cross the plate with the winning run.

Three Runs in 1st

Springfield scored three runs in the first inning on two hits, two walks, two stolen bases and an error. Neverdauski helped his own cause in the fourth by belting a home run down the left field line. The ball rolled through the left field gate.

Don Foley, P.C.'s starting pitcher, hurled five-hit ball for eight innings before giving way to a pinch hitter in the eighth. Two of the Gymnasts' runs were unearned. Frank Higgins, Foley's relief, retired the three men who faced him in the ninth on infield plays. Neverdauski, a sophomore, was charged with the setback because he put the winning run on the bases. It was his first loss in three starts.

The victory was the Friars' third in 10 games and the setback was the third in 10 starts for Springfield.

Although he didn't officially bat when sent up as a pinch hitter in the ninth, Keenan was probably the most overworked man on the field. He coached on third for eight innings and warmed up in the bull pen while Higgins was pitching in the ninth.

P.C.'s top flinger will get his chance today, however, as Coach Hal Martin has nominated him to pitch against Villanova. The Friars and the Wildcats will clash at Hendricken Field at 3 o'clock.

The Springfield team had a definite Rhode Island tinge. Coached by Archie Allen, former Colt Memorial mentor, the Gymnasts' roster included Juszcyk, West Warwick, Bob D'Agostino, East Providence, Matt Maetozo, Hope, and Frank Murgo, Colt.

Friars Subdue Villanova On 4-Run Rally in Eighth

Owen Beatty Steals Home for
Winning Tally as P.C.
Cops Its Fourth

A daring theft of home by Owen Beatty climaxed a four-run, eighth-inning uprising by Providence College and gave the Friars an 8-7 triumph over Villanova's baseball team in a hectic battle at Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon.

In notching their fourth triumph of the campaign, the Friars took an early lead, fell behind, 6-2, as Jack Jameson clouted a grand-slam homer in Villanova's fifth, but then rallied for the triumph in the eighth after picking up single tallies in the sixth and seventh innings.

An error at shortstop by Benny Moskal on a grounder by the leadoff batter, Sam Nissell, opened the door for Providence College in the sixth and the Friars made the most of their break. Walt Modliszewski, pinch-hitting for Jim Sullivan, walked and both base runners moved up as Dick Maloney grounded out.

DePalma Nailed

Two wild pitches by Jim "Mac" Wright, the former schoolboy star at Cumberland, permitted Nissell and Modliszewski to score and then Ed Mooney, who was at bat at the time, kept the rally rolling by working Wright for a base on balls. Ted Mezejewski, swinging for the pitcher, Frank Higgins, rolled out to short after Mooney had stolen second, and the latter came across with the tying run when Moskal committed his second miscue of the inning on Beatty's hopper.

Larry DePalma slammed a double down the left-field foul line, sending Beatty to third, and with Walt Lozoski at the plate, Beatty made his successful dash for home. DePalma tried to duplicate the feat on the very next pitch, but he was nailed by Jameson.

Higgins, who took over the P. C. mound chore in the eighth after Tom Keenan had been lifted for a pinch-hitter in the previous inning, received credit for the triumph, his second in as many days. Don Foley pitched the ninth and preserved Higgins' victory, though Villanova got a man aboard when Wright walked with one down.

Over the Fence

The Friars scored in the first on singles by DePalma and Lozoski and Art Weinstock's outfield fly, but the Main Liners went ahead in the fourth when Keenan walked two batters and both registered on Moskal's two-out single.

Wright, who came on in the third when John Maroney, the starting hurler for Villanova, was lifted, also had trouble with his control and two free tickets and Ed Mooney's base knock gave the Friars the tying run in their half of the inning.

Keenan was in trouble again in the following inning when Mickey Frinzi and Norm Kline reached safely with one out. He appeared to be out of danger when he got Charlie Comerford on strikes, but a walk to Wright loaded the bases and Jameson then unloaded his drive over the right-field fence close to the foul line.

It looked bad for the Friars at that stage, but they continued to peck away at the opposition's lead and finally made the grade with their rally in the eighth. Villanova added its final run at Higgins' expense in the seventh, when it reached the slim southpaw for three hits.

Winning 11 events, Providence College's track team defeated Bryant College, 81 to 43, at Old Hope Field yesterday. The victory was the first of the season for the Friars.

The meet produced five double winners, John Shanley, Anthony Fratantuono, Ed Poirer and Bill Sherry, all of Providence College, and John Smith of Bryant.

Shanley won the pole vault at 10 feet, 6 inches and the high hurdles in 10.9 seconds. He finished second to Smith in the low hurdles and second to Poirer in the furlong.

Fratantuono, the field star of the Friars, won his specialty, the discus, with a toss of 131 feet, 7 inches, took first in the shot with a heave 39 feet, 2 3/4 inches and placed third in the javelin. Jerry Alexander won the latter event with a heave of 180 feet, 10 inches.

Poirer won the 100, edging Smith of Bryant, in 10.3. The Friar star then won the 220 in 23.3 seconds.

Sherry of Providence registered the hardest double of a track meet by winning both the mile and 880. In the mile, Sherry won handily over Charlie O'Connell of Bryant in 5 minutes, 4.9 seconds. In the 880, Sherry defeated his teammate, Skippy McGurkin, in 2 minutes, 7.7 seconds. McGurkin earlier had won the 440 in 55.4 seconds.

Smith registered the lone double for Bryant by winning the broad jump with a leap of 20 feet, 6 inches and the low hurdles in 14.9 seconds. The Bryant star also placed second in both the 100 and discus.
