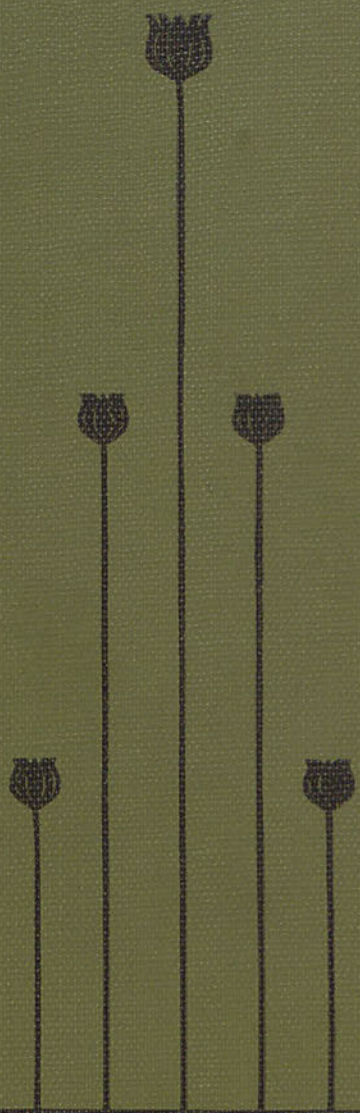
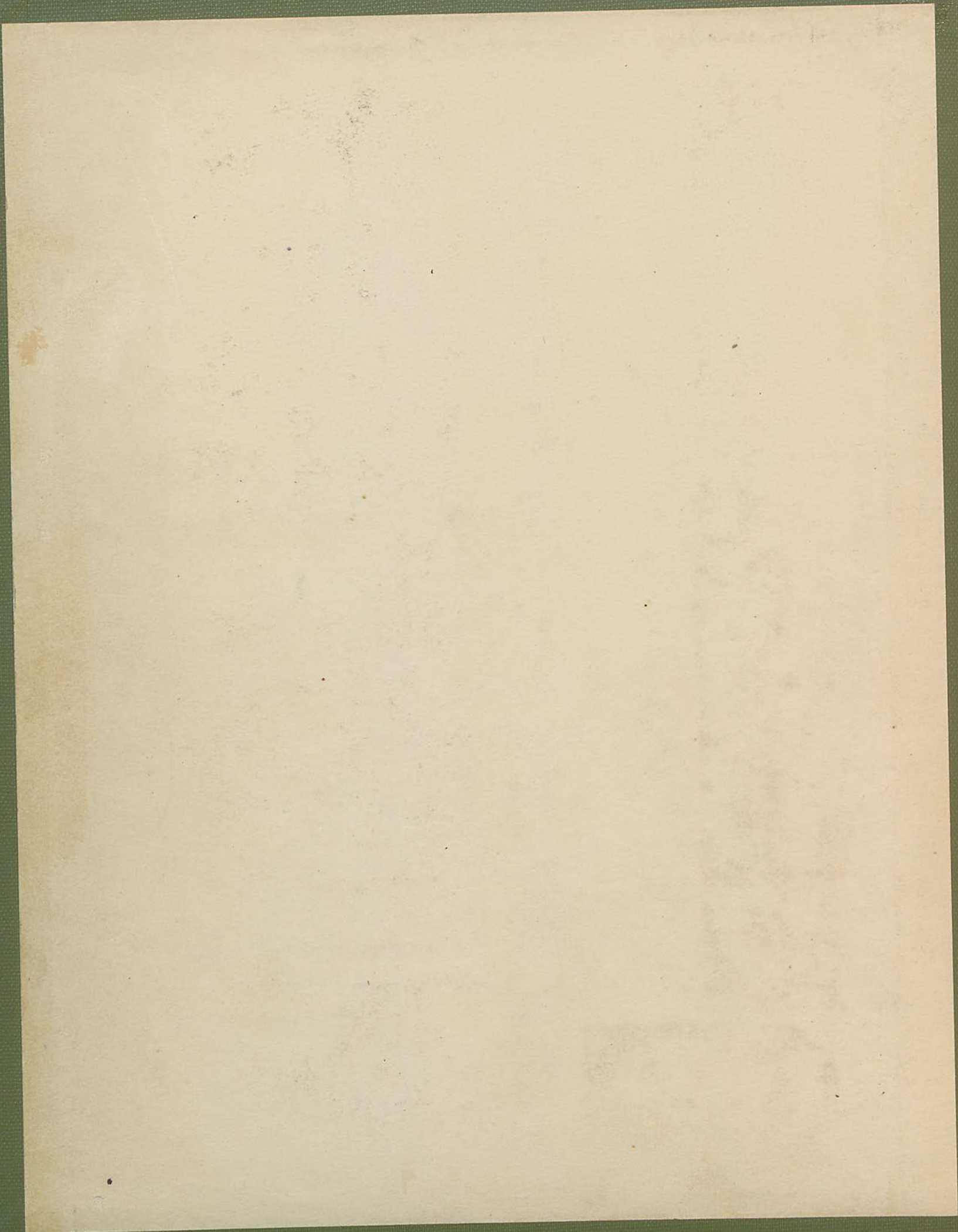

Making the most of all the opportunities that came their way, the Friar frosh won both their games and pulled their season average over the .500 mark. On Wednesday they outplayed the Holy Cross yearlings by the score of 6-3 at Fitton Field in Worcester. Friday afternoon found them gaining revenge for an early season defeat as they walloped the Rhode Island State Ramlets, 14-7, on Hendricken Field.

Down at Worcester, Lefties Bill Fagan and Bill McKeon combined to give one of the most amazing displays of clutch pitching shown around these parts in a long time.

as they left seventeen Crusader baserunners stranded. Although they were both very wild, they were, nevertheless, very effective when they had to be. Big blow of the game came in the three run third, when shortstop Steve Sulavik slammed out a round tripper.

Paced by second sacker Buzz Barry who banged out four hits, almost half the team total, the Friars took full advantage of the opposition's lapses as they parleyed ten hits into fourteen runs. State also collected ten hits, but alert fielding by the frosh and good relief pitching by Bill Grimes, prevented them from using their bingles to better advantage.

Scoring three runs in the second without the benefit of a hit, the frosh gave an indication of what was to come. In the third the Friars really went to town, combining three hits, a walk and three State errors to score four runs. They added two runs to their total in the fourth, and swelled their margin by six runs later in the game on three run sprees in both the sixth and seventh.

There are two games remaining on the schedule. Wednesday they travel to Aldrich Field for an encounter with the Brown yearling.

HOST TO BROWN THIS AFTERNOON HOLY CROSS AND STATE LAST FOES

Seeking to stretch their victory string to three straight, the Providence College nine will play host to Brown University on Hendricken Field this afternoon in the second game of their city series. A week ago Brown turned back the Friars in a close game by a 2-1 score.

Coach Hal Martin of the Friar nine will throw Don Foley at the invaders in an effort to get back in the race for the state championship which appears will not be decided until the P.C.-State contest here Memorial Day.

A year ago Foley faced the Bruins at Brown and was leading by a comfortable margin of 7-1 until he injured his arm in the seventh inning. P.C. eventually lost the game and also

Foley for the season. The slight right-hander pitched a good game against Springfield last Saturday despite the fact that he was behind when removed for a pinch-hitter. He came in, in a relief role, against Villanova Sunday and held the mainliners in check in the last inning. Of these two appearances it would appear that he is at his pitching peak at the moment.

The rest of the P.C. line-up will be the same as it has been in the last two games. That would have Larry DePalma, Sam Nissel, and Jim Sullivan in the outfield from left to right. Ed Mooney will be at third, Walt Lozoski at short, and Owen Beatty and Dick Maloney on the right side of the diamond, the former as second and the latter at first base.

Art Weinstock, who has been wielding a potent bat of late, will be behind the plate to hold the slants of Foley.

Brown and P.C. will be meeting on the diamond for the 49th time, when they clash today. To date the Friars have accumulated thirty victories and the Bruins from across town eighteen.

This season also marks the 25th anniversary of the famous 20-inning game played between these two teams in 1924. In fact that game was the longest contest in the history of collegiate baseball. The Friars won that contest 1-0.

After today's contest the Friars will be inactive until Memorial Day when they will play host to Rhode Island State at Hendricken Field. On June 4th, Holy Cross will be in to wind up the season for Providence College.

Today's contest will start at 3 o'clock.

Friars Pin Defeats On 2 Diamond Foes

The heretofore luckless Providence College baseball team rolled into high over the past weekend, and notched two exciting victories over Springfield and Villanova at Hendricken Field. Both games were thrillers as the Friars twice spotted their opponents 4 run leads and then relied on big eighth inning rallies to nip Springfield 5-4 and Villanova 8-7.

Don Foley started on the mound for P. C. against Springfield and except for a rocky first inning he did a creditable job in his eight inning stretch. In the first inning the Gymnasts stole four bases and combined this with two hits and errors by Mooney and Modliszewski to score three runs. Foley had no further trouble until the 5th inning when Neverdauski, the visitor's hurler, blasted a home run into left field.

Until the eighth the Friar bats were almost totally silent. In that big inning Mezejewski, pinch hitting for Mooney, led off with a walk. Modliszewski singled to centerfield. Weinstock, pinch hitting for Foley, singled to right scoring Mezejewski. Beatty advanced the runners to second and third with a sacrifice bunt. DePalma then singled to right-center scoring Modliszewski with the second run of the inning. With McGurkin the batter, DePalma stole second on the first pitch. McGurkin then grounded to third, scoring Weinstock and advancing DePalma to third. Then came the game's most exciting play. With fleet-footed Larry DePalma dancing around third base, Coach Hal Martin flashed the steal sign and DePalma got the jump on the pitcher and stole home in a cloud of dust for the winning run. Nissel, who walked, was caught attempting to steal second for the final out of the inning.

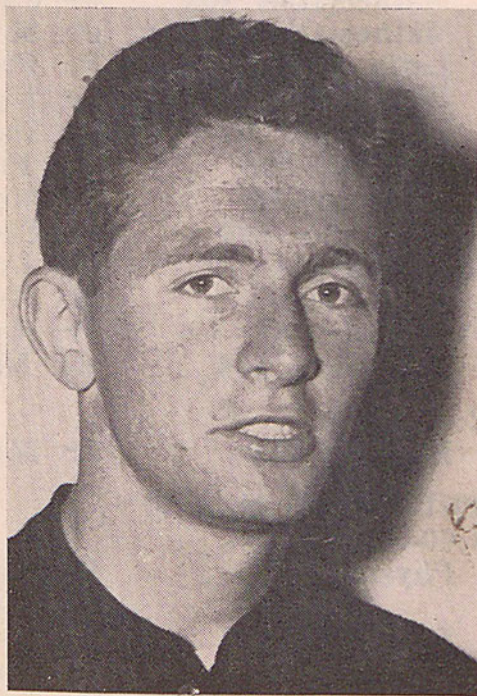
Frank Higgins pitched the final inning and put the visitors down in order. Due to the fact that the Friars were trailing when Foley was removed for a pinch hitter, Higgins gained credit for the win.

On Sunday the Friars won an equally thrilling 8-7 victory over the Villanova Wildcats. Tom Keenan started for P. C., but this just wasn't the big left hander's day. He allowed the visitor's two runs in the 4th due mainly to his wildness, and again in the fifth he got into trouble as Villanova filled the bases on a walk, a hit, and an error. Jameson then strode to the plate for the Wildcats and blasted a grand slam homer over the right field fence.

This gave Villanova a 6-2 lead.

P.C. scored once in the first, fourth, sixth and seventh innings, and came up to bat in the last of the eighth trailing 7-4. In this frame they combined two walks, two errors, and a double by DePalma for four runs. Owen Beatty became the game's hero when he duplicated DePalma's feat of the previous day by stealing home with the winning run.

Keenan was removed for a pinch hitter in the seventh. Foley came on in the eighth, was also removed for a pinch hitter in that frame, and Higgins finished up in the ninth. For the second straight day the latter gained credit for the victory.

McGurkin To Lead Runners Next Year

Gerald McGurkin, a Junior, has been elected captain of the 1949-50 Providence College track team, it was announced today by the Rev. Aloysius B. Begley, O.P., Athletic Director at the College.

McGurkin is a native of East Hartford, Connecticut, and graduated from East Hartford High School where he won letters in basketball and football. He had never participated in track until it was introduced at Providence College a year ago by Harry Coates, P.C.'s great coach of the cinder path and boards.

Actually, McGurkin has the honor of being the first P. C. man to be elected to a track captaincy, as this year's captains, Jack Powell and Frank DiIuglio, were picked by Coates, in this first year of the sport as an official part of the P. C. athletic program. A year ago it was held on an informal basis.

For one who had never previously run, McGurkin has come a long way under the tutelage of Coates. During the past track season he has been a member of the Varsity mile relay team, and he has been entered also in various other races.

For the big six foot "redhead", winning the captaincy post of next year's team is a personal triumph. No better selection of a man to represent Providence College in any field of endeavor could be made.

Not a natural born athlete by any means, work and hard work alone has been the story of the East Hartford youngster's rise to the goal of all athletes—captain of the particular sport participated in. When candidates reported for the first time to Harry Coates a year ago, very few of them looked like runners. McGurkin was one of the better examples of this condition. However, "the redhead" had the will and Coates had the knowledge. Combine the two and a year later a runner emerges who is considered good enough to be elected captain of the Providence College track team.

FRIARS TOP BRYANT 81-43 SHANLEY, SHERRY STANDOUTS

Bryant College became the second victim for the Friar track team. Monday, the Coatesmen engaged the Indians of Bryant and defeated them, 81-43. It was the first dual meet for P. C. since their loss to Holy Cross a little over a week ago. A large point total was built up by the Friars as they copped first places in eleven of the fourteen events.

Coach Harry Coates is rounding a well-balanced squad into condition. In the sprints, distance races, jumps, and weight throws the tracksters dominated the opposition. Five Providence athletes scored double victories. They were: Bill Sherry in the mile and half-mile, Tony Fratonuono in the discus and shotput, Ed Pourier in the 100-yard dash and the 220, and John Shanley in the pole vault and the high hurdles.

Bill Sherry captured the 880-yard run in the respectable time of 2 minutes, 7.7 seconds. He beat out Gerry McGurkin, captain of next year's track team, who won the 440 in 55.4 seconds. Sherry then proceeded to lead the pack home in the mile run in the time of 5 minutes and 4 seconds. The other double winner in the running events was Ed Pourier. He nosed out Bryant's top scorer, Smith in the 100-yard dash. His time was 10.3 seconds. In the 220 Pourier topped his teammate, John Shanley, in 23.3 seconds.

The field star for the Coatesmen, Tony Fratonuono, won his specialty, the discus, with a toss of 131 feet and 7 inches. He topped the shotputters, also, with a throw of 39 feet, 3 inches. Jerry Alexander, winner of the javelin throw in the New England Intercollegiate Championship Meet in Springfield Saturday, heaved the spear 180 feet, 10 inches to win that event at Bryant, also. John Shanley pole-vaulted 10 feet and 6 inches and ran the 70-yards high-hurdles in 10.9 seconds for his two victories. Bob Hanaway added the other first place triumph as he won the 2-mile run in 11 minutes and 20 seconds.

Other point scorers for Providence were: Art Kavanaugh, who placed second in the high jump; and Charles Jake Powell, who took second in the low hurdles and third in the high hurdles. With the arrival next season of the freshmen tracksters, a good sound club should be fielded by Coach Harry Coates. Take Powell and

Frank DiIuglio are graduating in June.

Providence Wins as Beatty Steals Home in 9th, 8-7

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 15 —A four-run rally in the eighth climaxed when Owen Beatty stole home gave Providence College an 8 to 7 win over Villanova at Hendricken Field today.

The Friars scored first, but went behind as the visitors scored two in the fourth and four in the fifth to lead, 6-2. Jack Jameson homered over the right field fence with the bases full in the fifth for Villanova.

The Friars picked up single runs again in the sixth and seventh, but the Villanova nine added another itself in the eighth to lead 7 to 4.

An error by shortstop Benny Moskal of Villanova put Sam Nissell on first at the start of the eighth. The next batter walked and both advanced as Dick Maloney grounded out.

Mac Wright, on the mound for the visitors, sent up two wild pitches which allowed Nissell and Walt Modliseszewski to score. After getting a walk, Ed Mooney scored for the Friars on Moskal's second error on Beatty's hopper. Beatty went to third on Larry DePalma's double and then stole home with what proved to be the winning run.

Alex Best In N.E.; Frosh Meet Rams

Coach Harry Coates brought his track team back from Springfield Friday night with an eleven point total for competition in the New England Intercollegiate Track and Field Championship.

It was considered a creditable showing for the young Friar team. A couple of bad breaks hindered the P. C. cause but their eleven points placed them close behind the best track squads in New England. Jerry Alexander threw the javelin 185 feet, 9½ inches to take first place in this event and give the Friars 5 points in this event. In the discus throw, Tony Fratonuono placed second to all three more points to the Friar total. The freshmen medley relay team supplied three points by placing second in the medley relay for college freshmen teams.

Only by the slim margin of 1½ yards did the Frosh team fail to win the coveted event. Worcester Tech. nosed out the fast-flying Friars by a step. Cassidy, Walsh, Penler and Keenan did a good job but, perhaps, they were trying too hard and became too excited as they lost a 30 yard lead and had to be satisfied with second place.

The other events in which Providence made a good showing were the pole vault and the half-mile.

Bill Sherry had some tough luck. As his heat was about to begin, the rains came. He had to run the 880 in a driving rain and a muddy track. However, he did well to take fifth place—one place out of the scoring. Pole vaulter, John Shanley received a blow from the weather also. Six competitors remained in the contest when the bar was raised from 11'10" to 12'. Five of the athletes cleared the 12-foot mark and when Shanley started to take his turn—precipitation. He failed to make the 12-foot jump in the soggy runway with a slippery vaulting pole. Coach Coates explained that these remarks are not excuses, but they did subtract, to some extent, from the efficiency of the athletes.

At the quadrangular freshmen meet in Boston, the Friars made a good point total although they didn't win the meet.

Tomorrow the freshmen squad will engage the Frosh of Rhode Island State at Kingston. Harry Coates has an optimistic view about winning this meet. He stated, however, that a good distance man is greatly needed on both freshmen and varsity teams. In a school of almost 2000 students a couple of good milers should be found. This is one phase of the track team which is very weak. That means that 10 points are given away every meet in the one-mile and two-mile runs. Nineteen men will make the trip tomorrow. They are Cassidy, Walsh, Penler, Keenan, Aldrich, McMullen, Kallman, Marra, Connolly and Braugh in the running events McMullen, Pallozzi, Glein, Shea, Schlimm, Bauer, Deegan, Dube, Quinn and DePelu.

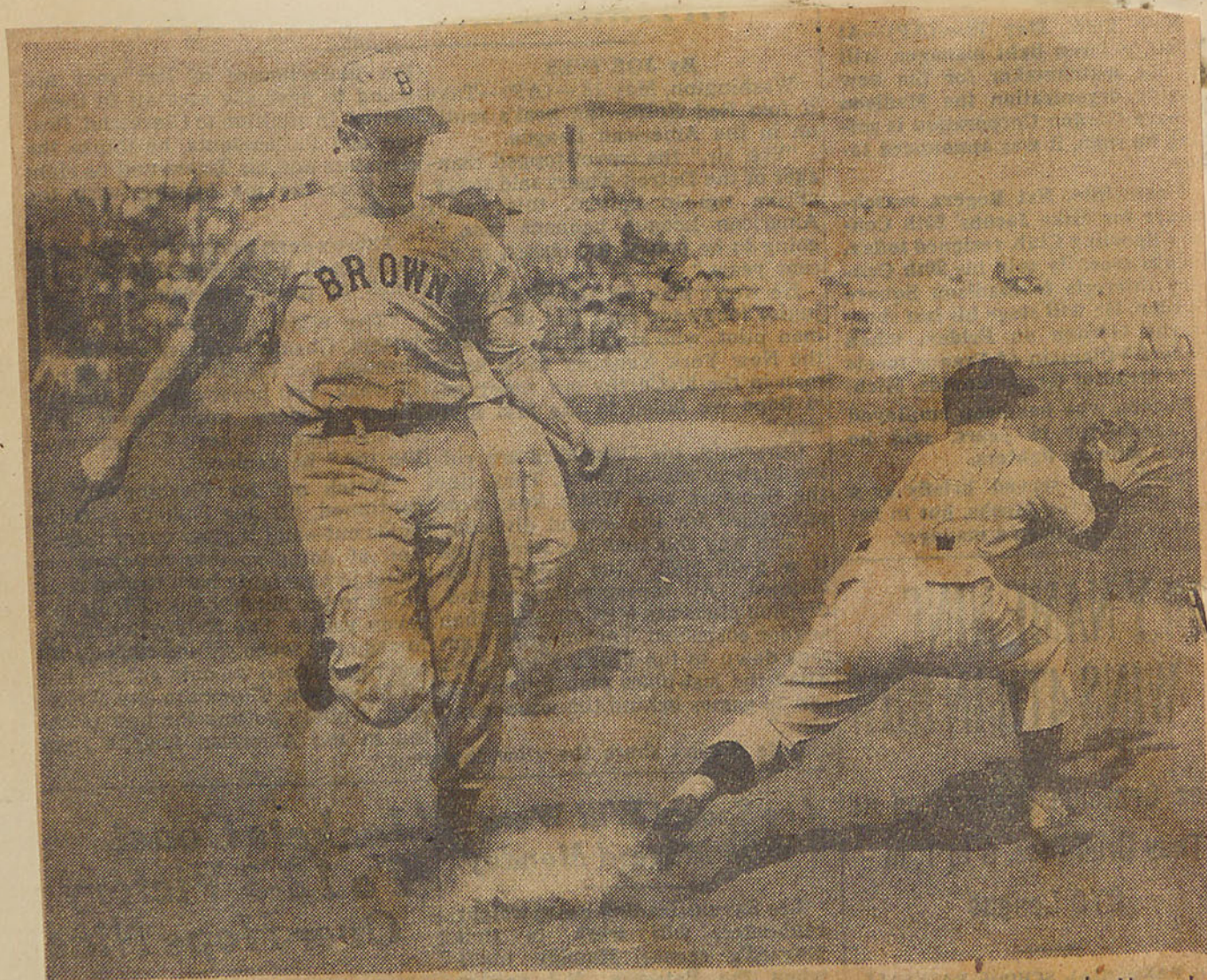
Friars Edge Villanova on Theft of Home, 8-7

WINNING TALLY CROSSES PLATE ON WILD THROW

Bruins Bow, 4-3; Keenan's Relief Work Sparkles;

Bendroth Stars

Alertness that backfired cost Brown a ball game at Providence College yesterday, the Friars scoring the winning run in the 4-3 duel when Giles Powell, after backing up third base on an overthrow, cut loose with a wild throw himself. All this happened in the last of the ninth.

Jim Sullivan had opened with a walk and after Dick Maloney had sacrificed, Art Weinstock, batting for Eddie Mooney, was passer' purposefully. Walt Modlizewski flied to center, deep enough for Sullivan to take third after the catch and, as Harvey Lapides tried to cut him down, his throw was over the third baseman's head.

Powell backed up but, in attempting to cut down Weinstock as he sped toward second, threw into center-field and the winning run scored.

It was a sad windup to a game that had been exciting and well played for the most part and which had featured the sparkling fielding of Norm Bendroth in right for the Bruins and the dazzling relief pitching of Tom Keenan of the Friars.

Keenan Effective

Keenan appeared in the eighth with the bases full and none out. Don Foley, the Friar starter, had yielded two sharp singles and given a walk in that inning, circumstances which prompted Coach Hal Martin to summon his ace lefthander. Keenan faced three successive pinch-hitters and disposed of the threat neatly.

He forced Powell to hit to him, for an easy forceout at the plate, fanned Ben Patrick and got Scott on a fly to right. Equally efficient in the ninth, he also retired the side in order.

Foley and Bobo Ebenstein, the starting pitchers, did good enough work, the former yielding eight hits, the latter five, but Bendroth's sparkling play saved the Bruin southpaw on two notable occasions. Errors, mainly high throws, helped in the scoring materially.

For instance, an overthrow by Maloney allowed the Brown's first run to score and set up the second in the second inning. The throw came after Lapides and Bendroth had gotten infield hits and was made in an attempt to get Lapides going into third. Bendroth scored as Flanders grounded out.

Successive singles by Burfeind and Chuck Nelson in the third and Menard's infield out produced Brown's third run.

Under Cover

Hectic heaving helped the Friars too, but not on their first run. That was scored by Sam Nissel in the second. He single and stole second, moved up on Maloney's infield hit and scored when Mooney lashed a drive to right. In the fourth the Friars caught up without benefit of a hit.

Sullivan and Maloney walked in succession and then pulled a double steal, Sullivan scoring and Maloney taking third when Menard threw into left field. Maloney tied the score as Mooney grounded out.

Bendroth had made a swell catch at Sullivan's expense in the second, but what he did to the Friars in general and Larry DePalma in particular in the third was robbery of purest ray serene. The catch was so good that Owen Beatty, who had opened the inning with a single, was doubled up, at least 195 feet off first base—he was on his way home when the throw came to first from the right-field fence.

It was probably the first catch ever made under a canopy. A canvas covers the wire fence, but the wind was so strong that it blew the canvas straight out, Bendroth racing under it and spearing DePalma's smash one-handed. Then he crashed against the fence, but picked himself up fast enough to make the double play.

Everyone except Bendroth took it for granted that the ball would clear the barrier.

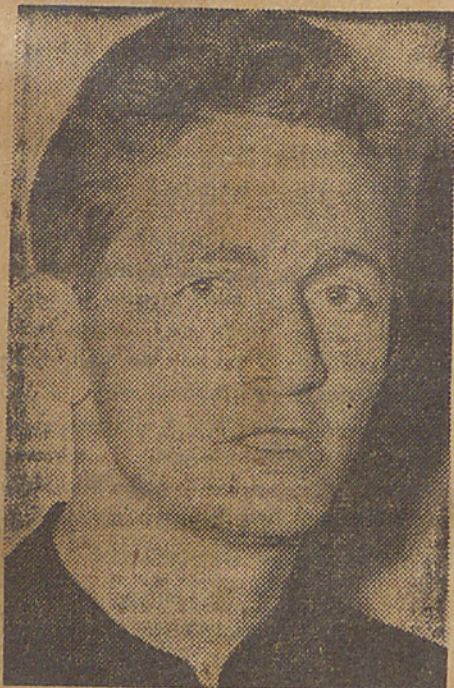

McGurkin is 24 years old and he is a veteran of the Army Air Forces.

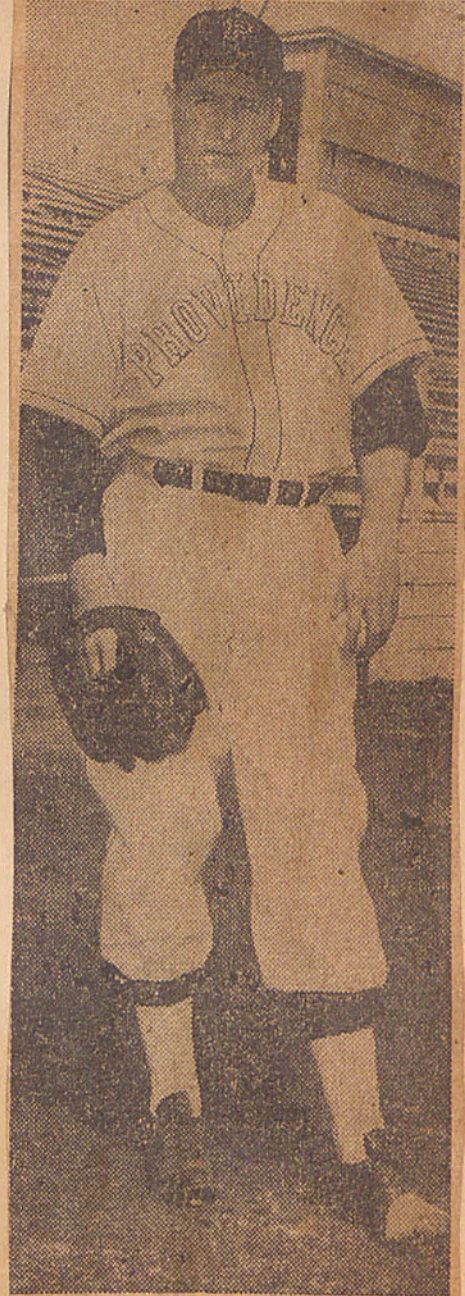
Providence Nine Wins On Wild Pitch, 5 To 4

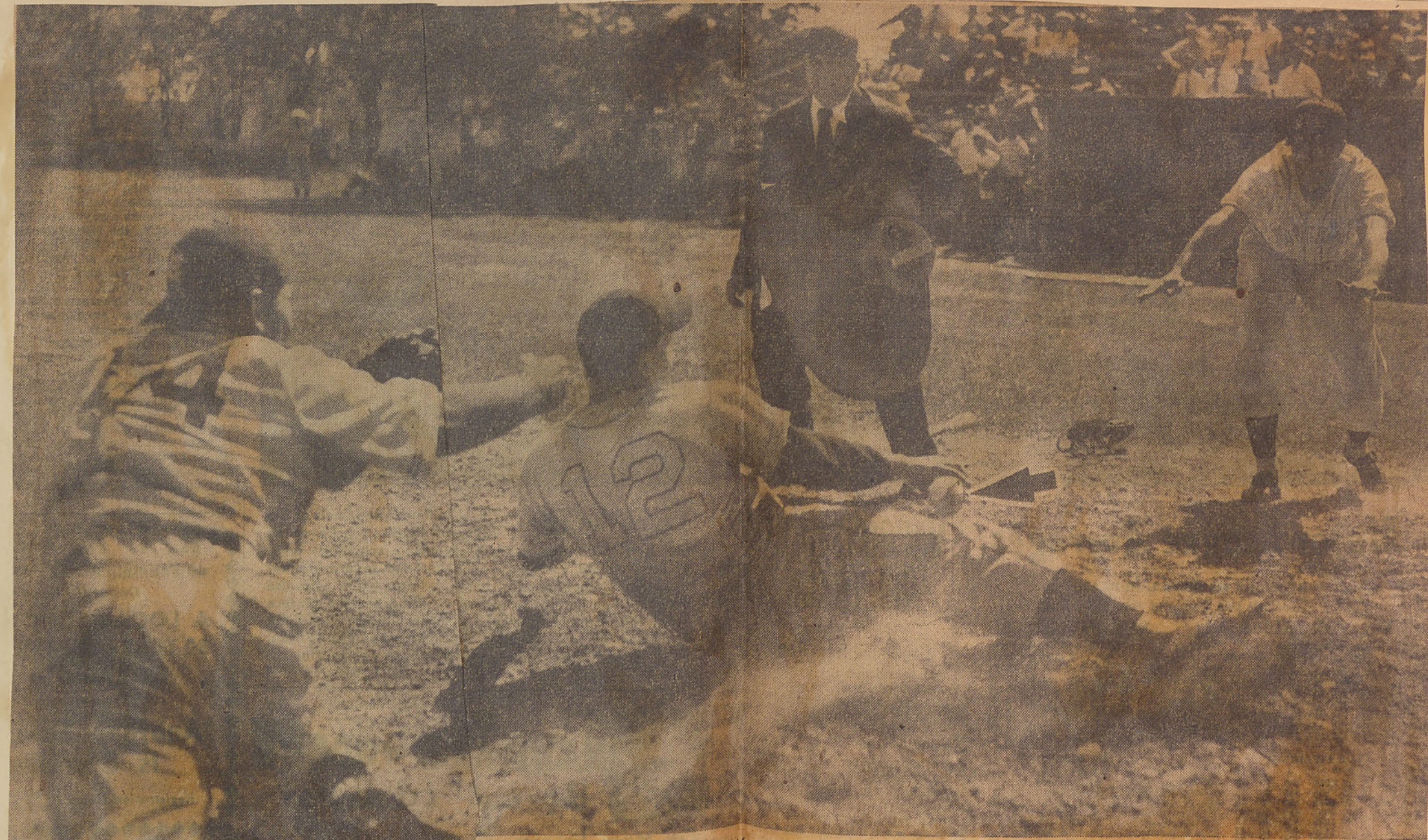


Tom Keenan

Keenan Carries Load

Providence College's baseball team handed Holy Cross' hopes for an NCAA tourney bid a severe setback yesterday afternoon at Hendricken Field, where the Friars nipped the Crusaders, 3-2, before several hundred homecoming P. C. alumni.

The Friars spotted the visitors two runs in the third inning and while their pitcher, Lefty Tom Keenan, hurled blanks for the next six frames, they pulled out the decision with single runs in the sixth, seventh and eighth innings.

Prior to yesterday, the Crusaders had won 14 and lost two and had stood on even terms with Boston College in the matter of a bid to represent New England in the national collegiate tournament. Yesterday's defeat left the Worcester nine faced with the problem of beating B. C. in both ends of the home-and-home series tomorrow and Tuesday.

Keenan limited the Crusaders to seven hits, all singles, with four coming in H. C.'s two-run third inning. The Providence southpaw struck out four and issued only two walks. He was at his best with men on the bases.

Bases Loaded

Frank Galvin started the Crusaders' rally in the third when he beat out a slow roller between short and third. Bill Stetter was permitted to run for Galvin, who has a pulled leg tendon, and Stetter moved to third on John Coyle's attempted sacrifice bunt. Keenan fielded the ball, but threw wildly to the second baseman, Owen Beatty, who was covering first on the play.

Keenan fanned Frank Cavalieri but the bases were loaded after the P.C. infield allowed Bill Porter's fly back of the mound to drop safely, with all runners holding. The next batter, Bob Dittmeyer, was removed for a pinch hitter after he apparently missed a signal from the bench. Matt Formon took over Dittmeyer's count of two balls and one strike and promptly lined the next pitch to center field for a single, scoring Stetter and Coyle. On the hit, Porter was tagged out after he overslid third base. Polak then dropped a single to left but Keenan got out of the inning when Bob Lavery forced Formon on a grounder down to Ed Mooney at third.

After being held to two singles for the first five innings by Cavalieri, P.C. combined successive singles by Beatty, Larry DePalma and Art Weinstock for its first run in the sixth. Dick Maloney's double to left and Mooney's single produce another in the seventh and the Friars pushed across the winning tally in the eighth on DePalma's triple to left and Weinstock's double down the left-field foul line.

The Final Out

Weinstock was able to make third as the left fielder, Bill Keville, let the ball get past him and the Friar catcher tried to add an insurance run by scoring after his teammate, Sam Nissel, fied out to right. Weinstock made it home safely, but was called out for leaving third before the ball was caught.

Galvin, who paced the H.C. attack with three hits, singled in opening the ninth and Stetter again was allowed to replace him as a courtesy runner. The latter moved to second on Coyle's sacrifice, but Keenan fanned a pinch hitter, Joe Connors, and got Hovey Eordikian on a fly to right for the final out.

The game was the final one of the season for the Friars and the victory gave them a season's record of six triumphs in 14 games It also avenged an earlier setback by the Crusaders . . . Coach Jack Barry was saving his two top pitchers, Matt Formon and Tom Donovan for the crucial series with B.C. . . . The start was Cavalieri's first for the Crusaders. He is a sophomore and the nephew of Jim Cavalieri, one of H.C.'s famous Grand Opera Twins of the early 30's. His uncle and Tony Collucci formed one of the best end combinations in Holy Cross football history.

NEW COACH TO GREET CANDIDATES MANY VETERANS WILL TURN OUT

On next Monday afternoon, the initial practice session of the 1949-1950 Providence College basketball season will get underway. This meeting will also mark the debut of James V. Cuddy as chief strategist of the Friar court forces.

Cuddy will succeed Lawrence J. Drew, who will become director of intramural athletics and physical education at the college. Coach Cuddy, or "Vin," as he is popularly known, brings to his new assignment a fine record of past achievement which gives definite indication that his tenure here at the college will be a most successful one.

At this time, Coach Cuddy will be returning to the Rhode Island athletic scene on which he first appeared in 1938. This appearance was as a member of a state championship Naugatuck, Conn., High School team in its unsuccessful bid for New England championship honors at the Auditorium.

After graduating from Naugatuck High in 1939, Cuddy took up residence at the University of Connecticut where he proceeded to become a key member of its varsity football, basketball, and baseball squads during the next four years.

As a senior, he captained the basketball team, and became recognized as one of the most deadly shots in basketball during that campaign. Incidentally, Cuddy had one of his greatest nights against Rhode Island State.

Upon graduation, Cuddy immediately went on active duty with the Army and subsequently took part in the Normandy, Central European, and Ardennes campaigns. He served as a captain in the 82nd Airborne Division, and following the war his duties were that of coach of the division's football and basketball teams.

His basketball team, on which he also played, won the championship of the European Theatre and successfully outscored the United States in competition with the best teams available in league competition.

Following his discharge from the Army in 1946, Cuddy accepted the post of assistant director of physical education at Columbia. While at Co-

lumbia he also obtained his master's degree in 1947.

At this time he accepted the position of head coach of football, basketball, and baseball at the Fort Trunbull Branch of the University of Connecticut. His record at this school was very successful, and he established a reputation for getting excellent results from what could not always be considered the highest type of material.

During the past summer, Coach Cuddy has served as athletic officer at Fort Jay, Governors Island, and will complete his tour of duty on October 1st. Thus, with very little lost time, he will begin his duties here at the college.

Coach Cuddy will be greeted on next Monday afternoon by Co-Captains Walter Lososki and Arthur Wienstock and over 30 varsity and freshman squad members from last year's teams.

The varsity squad of last year will furnish many of the same group that carried the burden throughout last year's campaign. With the exception of the departed captain, Charlie Bresnahan, and the recently turned professional, Larry DePalma, this group will be made up of the following holdovers: Tom Orr, Paul Williams, Ray Gacia, Frank Pellegrino, Sam Nissel, Joe Blaine, Skip McGukin, Ed Mooney, Jim Power, Bill Higgins and Al Becker.

An added source of strength for the new mentor should be some very capable operatives from last year's highly successful freshman squad. This team enjoyed a record of 15 wins against 4 losses and had among its

Teams go into action today and tomorrow on Hendricken Field. Entries should be turned into the Athletic office as soon as possible so that the schedules may be comprised for the convenience of the students. There will be no separate dorm league this season.

with this healthful recreation. It is desired that the majority of the student body take opportunity of this opportunity.

Ex-UConn Player To Coach P.C. Five

James V. Cuddy, one of the best all-around athletes developed at the University of Connecticut in recent years, has been named head basketball coach at Providence College, it was announced last night at the college.

Cuddy, who succeeds Larry Drew, currently is serving as post athletic officer at Fort Jay, Governor's Island, but will complete his tour of duty there on Sept. 1 and be ready to report at the Dominican college when the fall term opens.

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During his college career, Cuddy was president of his sophomore class, vice president of the Sigma Nu fraternity, battalion commander of the ROTC unit and a member of the Newman Club. He was honored as the outstanding athlete and citizen in the class of 1943 by the Connecticut Varsity Club.

Cuddy was born in Waterbury in 1921 and was graduated from Naugatuck High School in 1939.

Drew, who succeeded Ed Crotty as P.C. coach, is at Columbia this summer working for his master's degree.

Cuddy to Greet P.C. Candidates For Hoop Team

Providence College will launch its plans for the 1949-50 basketball season tomorrow afternoon when its new coach, James "Vin" Cuddy, greets the candidates for the team at the first drill of the season. A large turnout is expected, as several veterans are returning and a number of promising sophomores from the team of last year will be on hand.

Only two men, Charlie Bresnahan and Larry De Palma, will be missing. Bresnahan was graduated and De Palma signed a pro baseball contract and is ineligible for collegiate competition.

Walt Lozoski of Hazelton, Pa., and Art Weinstock of Newton, Mass., both seniors, are co-captains of the team.

James C. Cuddy, former University of Connecticut star athlete, has been named head coach of basketball at Providence, R. I. Cuddy who has been serving as coach of football, basketball and baseball at the Fort Trumbull branch of the University of Connecticut, was a three sports star at Storrs and captained the basketball team in his senior year. He is a native of Waterbury and graduated from Naugatuck High school. At Connecticut from which he was graduated in 1943, he won the varsity club award as the outstanding athlete and citizen in his class. He later received his master's degree from Columbia University. Cuddy is a veteran of World War II, serving as a captain in the air borne forces in several overseas campaigns.

New Ticket System Introduced At P.C.

A new plan for student admissions to the home athletic events on the Providence College schedules for the 1949-50 season has been announced by the Rev. Aloysius B. Begley, O.P., Athletic Director at the College.

This year each student will be given a book of tickets with different tickets designated for the various contests. This book has tickets for every home contest scheduled by P.C. this year with the exception of the Rhode Island State game which will be played in the Rhode Island Auditorium.

Members of the Senior and Junior classes are to report at the Athletic Office tomorrow to pick up their books. Friday and Saturday has also been reserved as Senior and Junior days. Next Monday the Sophomores can secure their books and the Freshmen will be notified in this paper when their books will be ready.

Each student must present his bur-sar's card when requesting a book. No books will be given to a person unless he has this card.

The trade right now consists in mascotting for the basketball and track teams, which are preparing for their winter seasons. The Friars, as you know, have no football team. They will have, in due time, I gathered, with particular emphasis on the "due time." But of that, a bit more later.

At the moment, Providence College, is busy enough with basketball and track plans as the youthful court coach, Vin Cuddy, works with his squad in the Harkins Hall gym and veteran Harry Coates puts his pupils through their paces on the new board track that was set up last year on Hendricken Field.

Fundamentalist

Cuddy, a former University of Connecticut athlete, is a fundamentalist in basketball. He spent a long time yesterday drilling his young men on the back pivot. He wasn't entirely satisfied at the end, either, for he ordered a lengthy session of calisthenics afterward.

"This will get them in shape to do that pivot right," he said.

In his first year as Friar coach, Cuddy isn't moaning about his material. He has practically a veteran team from last year and some promising sophomores. But he points out: "We haven't that good, big skyscraper man yet for under the basket, someone like Frank Mahoney of Brown, for instance. We'll have to make up for it by doing what we can do as near to perfection as possible."

So the 30-odd youngsters twisted and turned and did pushups to get in shape for that back pivot. I know one watcher was glad he didn't have to do likewise. I think Father Begley felt the same way. And also the college president, the Very Rev. Robert J. Slavin, O. P., who was an interested spectator at the drill.

Father Slavin, however, was agile enough at avoiding any discussion about football. To the question: "Is it correct to say that they're not talking about football right now at Providence College, Father?" he replied, smilingly; "Why, the students are. The administration isn't."

So there's nothing official about any remarks here concerning Friar football. However, you get the impression that while football isn't a dead issue officially there, Providence College will be back on the gridiron only after it's certain that the return will be a solid success and will fit in with the institution's high scholastic standards.

Problems . . .

There are so many problems in a return to football now. Finances, of course, with coaching salaries and equipment what they are on a seller's market. Schedule-making, always a bugaboo with the Friars, who belong to no league or conference. Locker space, even, since facilities now are hardly big enough for the track and basketball teams.

Possibly, football will await the building of the new gymnasium. The lack of a gymnasium, right now, is the big problem with the basketball team, which will use Mount Pleasant High School's gymnasium for its "home" games, as it has in the past. Actually, it amounts to an all-away schedule when you play none of your games on the floor on which you practice. However, Father Begley has arranged for the Friars to stage some of their practices at Mount Pleasant.

As it is, the Friars have an active enough athletic program right now, with Cuddy's basketball, Coates' track, Hal Martin's baseball in the spring and the intramural sports under the direction of big, soft-spoken Larry Drew, the former basketball coach and one of the college's brightest stars in his own playing days. Football, of course, gets the headlines, but I think no one could accuse the followers of St. Thomas Aquinas of being headline-hunters.

Matter of Timing . . .

As a matter of fact, Coates' track team someday may soon be getting its share of headlines. That invitation meet the Friars put on last winter certainly drew major attention. And Coates is planning another just possibly at the R.I. Auditorium.

Harry, of course, always is on the lookout for track talent among the 1900-odd boys enrolled at the college and from his search this year there resulted a little story which might do as a windup for this column. Encountering a husky, six-foot-four Southerner on the campus, Coates asked him to come and try out for the weight events. The boy agreed and worked out for one day, then gave up. He told Harry he was afraid it would spoil his timing.

"Timing?" queried Coates, thinking he might have been trying to make a weight man of a hurdler, a golfer or, perhaps, a boxer. "Why, what's your event?"

"Sir, I'm a horse-trainer," drawled the lad, as he walked away. Seems he was, too, as his father owns a stable of horses, but the timing angle still is a puzzler.

If Vin Cuddy, new basketball mentor at the College, doesn't have enough to worry about already, what with introducing a new basketball system and sundry other items that go with a new coaching position, he certainly has cause for concern with the release today of the Providence College 22 game slate for the 1949-50 season.

The schedule, released by the Rev. Aloysius B. Begley, O.P., Athletic Director at the College, is highlighted by games with traditional rivals, Brown and Rhode Island State, powerful Brooklyn College and Holy Cross, the perennial classy fives from Boston College and Springfield College, and one of the dark horses of eastern circles this year, Iona.

Holy Cross will be met once, the game this year scheduled for Worcester on January 17th.

The Friars will travel to New York State twice during the coming season playing Brooklyn College at Brooklyn on January 20th, and Iona the next night at New Rochelle. Rensselaer will be met in Troy, N. Y. on Feb. 25th.

Beginning next week, the Varsity will be moving to Mount Pleasant for most of their practice sessions and the Athletic Office has issued a notice that no spectators will be allowed to watch practice there.

This was one of the stipulations set forth by the Mount Pleasant authorities when they granted the use of the gym to the P. C. Team.

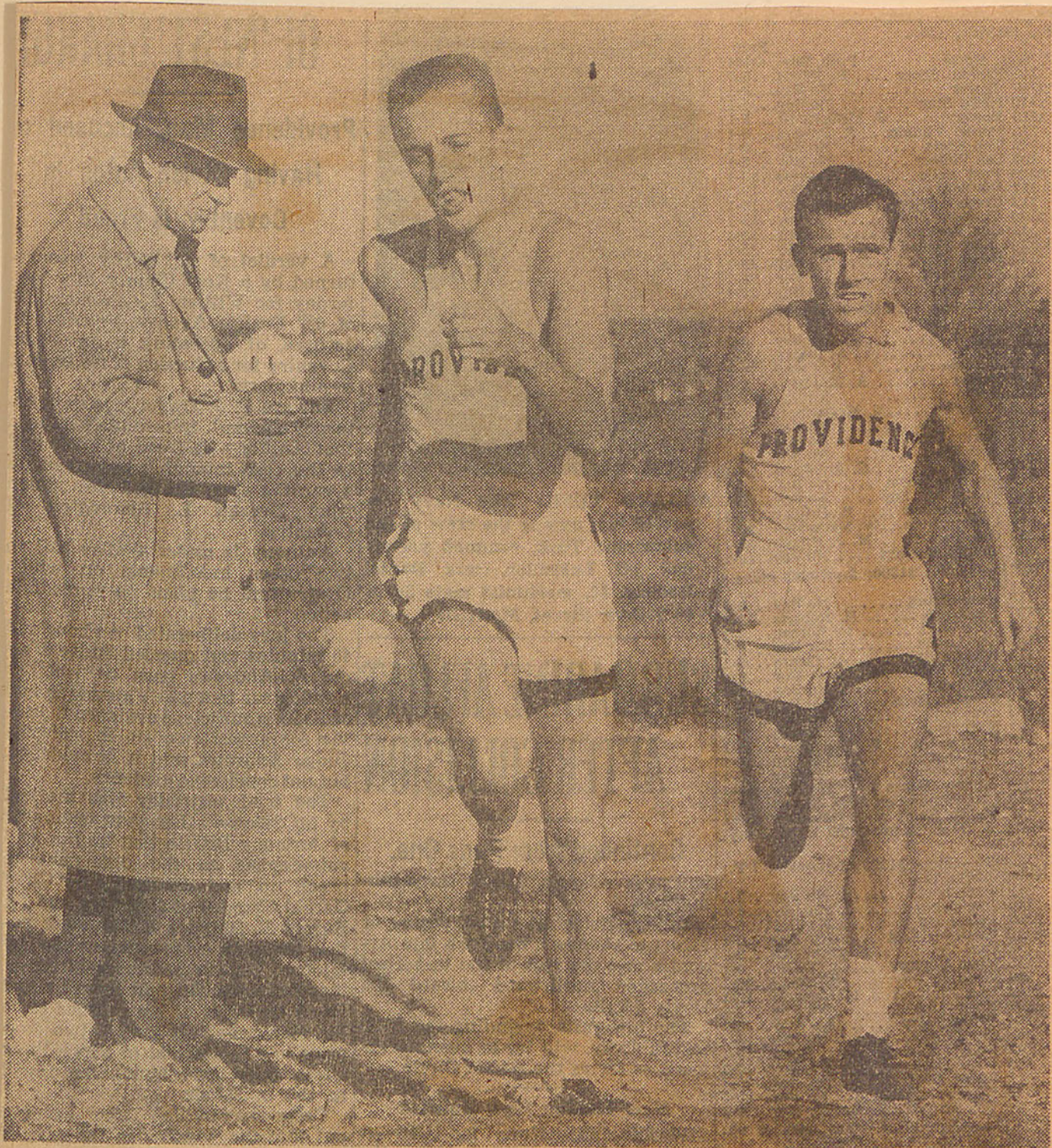

Brown Harriers Win Varsity, Frosh Races

The Providence College Varsity Cross Country team brought to a close a disastrous initial season as they dropped their third and final meet to Brown last Thursday at Hendricken Field. The Bruin harriers easily swept to an 18-44 decision over the hapless Friars. De Maris, of Brown, was the individual winner over the 3 mile course in 16:57. John McMullen was the first P. C. runner to finish, placing 3rd. The Tobey twins did not compete.

The real thrill of the afternoon came in the Freshman race. Brown scored a routine 22-35 triumph, but Malinaux of Brown and Johnson of P. C. waged a dog fight for first place the like of which is seldom seen. The two speedsters entered Hendricken Field together for the last lap to complete their 3 mile run.

At about half way around the field, Malinaux put on a terrific burst of speed in an attempt to pull away from Johnson, but the latter met Malinaux's burst with one of his own and the two boys sped at a quarter mile clip for the remainder of the race.

Coming down the final stretch Malinaux pulled ahead slightly and won by about 4 yards. The time was 16:49, considerably faster than that of the varsity contest.

Coach Harry Coates may not have very many fond memories as he looks back upon this cross country season, but he cannot help but be pleased with the performances turned in by John McMullen. Along with most of Providence's varsity, this was McMullen's first year at running cross country. Pitted against men who had previous experience in college and high school, McMullen never failed to give a creditable performance. What he lacked in experience and natural ability he more than made up for with pure out and out courage. It is not too much to say that he is the one bright light of the Varsity Cross Country season.

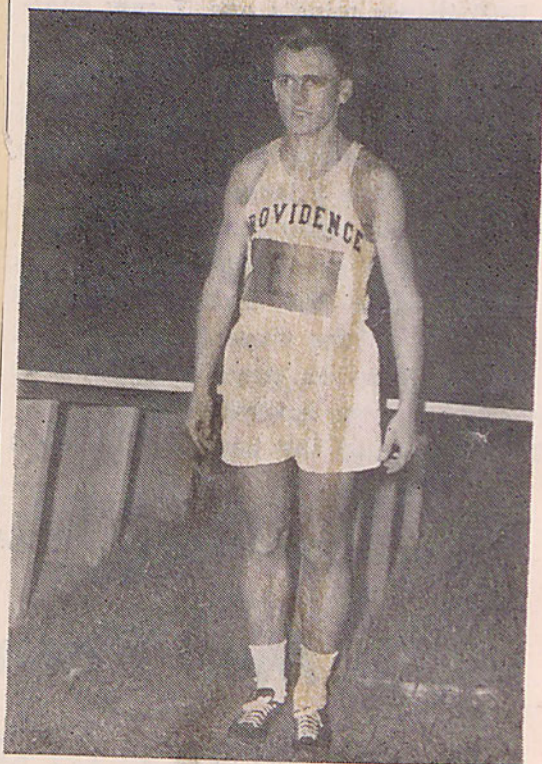

Although the season doesn't open until Dec. 3, when the Friars face Assumption, the P. C. athletes have already had several serious injuries but most of the boys will be ready for the opening whistle. Ray Garcia, the Newporter from whom much is expected, had to take things easy yesterday. He's recovering from a neck injury that was first diagnosed as a fractured neck but later found to be some trouble in the voice box.

Billy Higgins definitely won't see any action for a long time after his recent appendectomy. Sam Nissell had a knee injury that's now coming around while Westerly's Shanky Pelligrino injured his foot. A couple of days ago Tom Bauer broke his nose in a scrimmage. And Coach Cuddy thinks that's quite a list for this time of year.

Speed Expected

The Friars are going through their drills with spirit and enthusiasm, with essentially much of the same playing cast which worked last season under Larry Drew. Cuddy seems to think that with the added experience they will have a fairly fast team with ability to move the ball.

The P.C. quintet will use a basically fast break offense, with a man to man defense, Cuddy says, with play patterns if they don't have the fast break. Yesterday he was working on ball handling and shooting. He does much of his real scrimmage work over at Mount Pleasant High, where the Friars will play most of their home games as he tries to condition the team to play on a large court, rather than in Harkins Hall auditorium, something of a band box

as basketball surfaces go these days.

There are 21 players on the squad, with the last eight men scheduled to play a junior varsity slate which is now being drawn up. Of the vets, center Alex Becker, as slim as ever but improved in his play, really has been impressive, while co-captains Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock, called "my quarterbacks" by Cuddy, are also looking pretty good.

Top Men

The top men now appear to be Becker, Pelligrino, Lozoski, Weinstock, Nissell, Garcia, Ray Korbusieski, Jim Power, Bauer, Jim Schlimm and possibly Tom Orr. Orr is the biggest at 6-4 and weighs 210. He could be a tremendous help, Cuddy says, if he continues to work.

The key offensive threats seem to be Nissell, Pelligrino and Garcia (in good shape, that is) while Weinstock and Lozoski will lead the defense. Both the co-captains have been showing up well in the workouts. "Why Walt (Lozoski) is outrunning the kids and hustling. If they all had his zip," Cuddy says.

Garcia was the sharpest thing on the P.C. court until he was injured in the scrimmage with Connecticut, but he still doesn't know just when or how he got his injury. Cuddy calls the workout against the Huskies a good work scrimmage, something

Cuddy played his collegiate basketball at Connecticut under Don White, Purdue star now coaching Rutgers, and has worked with Hugh Greer, the present Huskie mentor. As a collegian he recalls a 63-62 thriller he played in against R.I. State as a sophomore. They (the Huskies) had a 14-2 record, losing to Villanova and State later. He never played against the Friars but made his first athletic venture into the state as a member of the Naugatuck High team which played in the New England at the Marvel Gym in the late 30's.

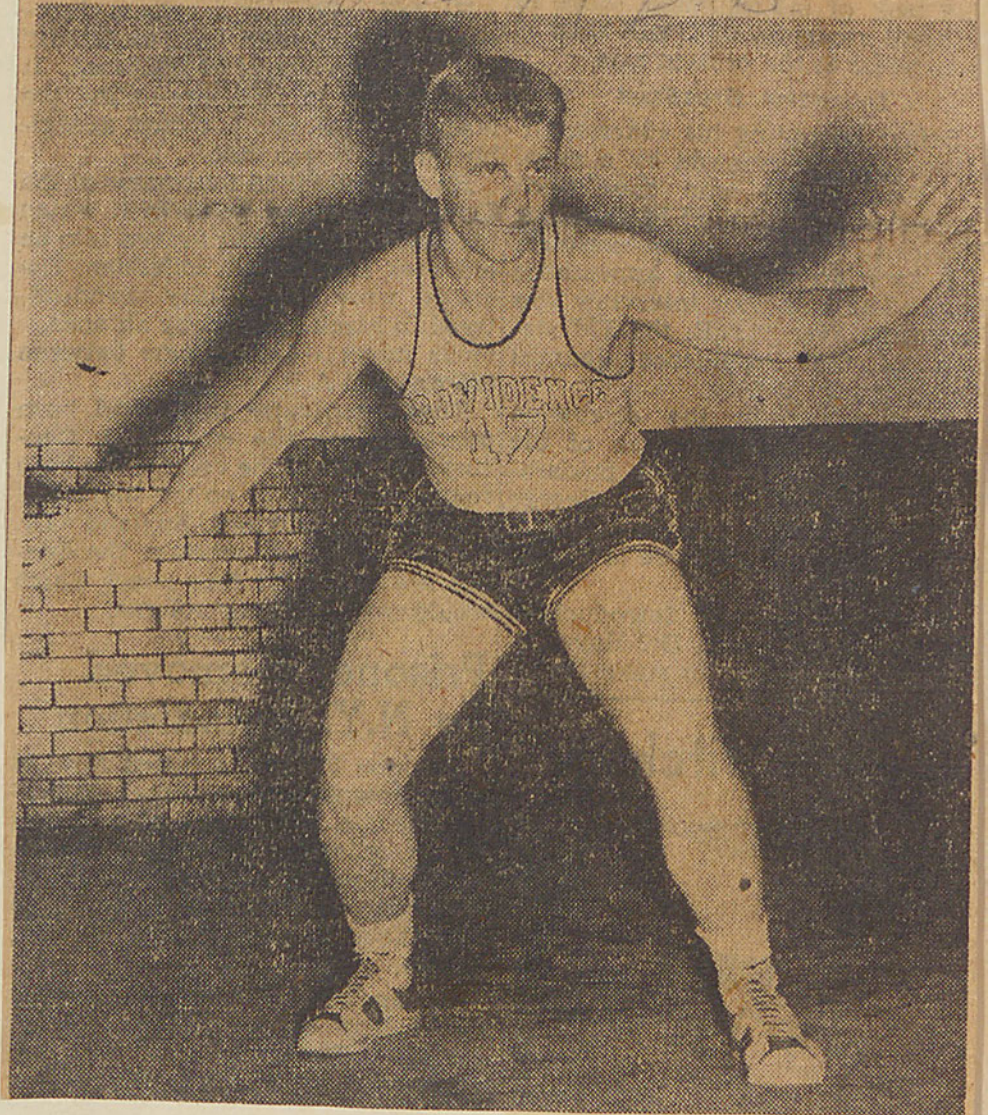
Despite a desperate sprint by Bob Conde on the last four laps of the fourth leg, he could not overtake the Hope anchor man.

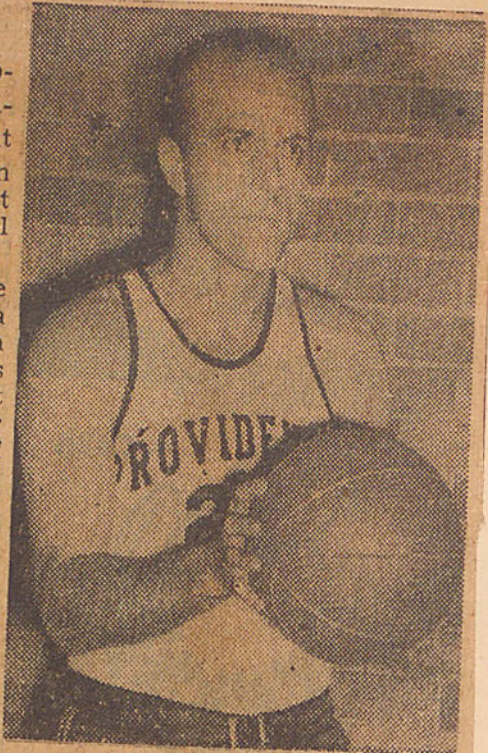

Snyder went on to say that he also believes the government should cut spending "in every possible way", but he did not offer any detailed suggestions.

He expressed these views to a Senate-House economic subcommittee studying the government's financial policies to see whether they contribute to the nation's economic stability.

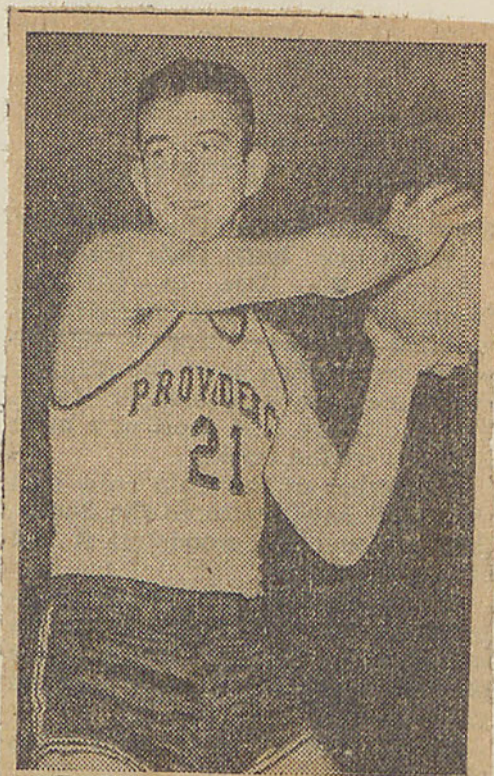

The basketball season shifts into high gear this week on all fronts. Locally, six games are in the works, with the top attraction scheduled for Thursday between the R.I. Rams and Providence at the auditorium.

Action in New England begins tomorrow evening when Harvard meets Boston College and Dartmouth takes on Holy Cross at Boston Garden.

Full Week

seven in a row and have averaged 80 points per game in doing so.

Providence, which has edged by three opponents in a row, gets its stiffest test of the campaign against the Rams on Thursday. This game, always a good one, is the first in the intra-state series. The Friars took American International by a count of 54-51 on Saturday.

Bates Again

On Friday, Brown meets Arnold at Marvel Gymnasium and on Saturday Bates comes to the state for the second time to meet Providence and Vermont squares off against R. I. at Kingston.

Nationally, the picture among the powerhouses should be in sharper focus after the week's activities. As things stand now, the view is rather clouded, with several clubs off to impressive starts.

Among last year's leaders, Kentucky and Oklahoma A. & M., will go on display this week in New York—and the results should indicate how much strength they have retained.

The Wildcats, minus Ralph Beard, Alex Groza and "Wah Wah" Jones from last season's NCAA champs, bring with them a 2-0 record and St. John's will be the opposition on Thursday. The Aggies, No. 2 club in AP poll last year, play Long Island University tomorrow night.

High spot of the week could be the Rhode Island State-Providence College game Thursday night at the Auditorium. . . . Neither of these teams is a throwback to the great Ram or Friar teams of Auditorium games in years gone by, but there's a possibility that this clash may prove an interesting contest. . . . State takes on the favorite's role, even though Red Haire's squad, handicapped chiefly by lack of height, has lost two of its three games, while the Friars have won three in a row. . . . State's losses were to Boston College and St. John's, both certainly of much higher basketball caliber than the three Friar victims—Assumption, Fairfield and American International. . . . The Friars' margin of victory in all three cases was close, and the games may have been just what Vin Cuddy, the earnest young man who has taken over the Friar coaching reins, wanted in the way of competition to get his system working.

R.I. Ram Here Again Sees P. C. Defeated

One of the strangest things in the Rhode Island sports scene is how the students at Providence College allow themselves to be convinced each year that their Friar quintet actually has a good chance of beating the Rhody State Rams. Believe it or not, they are at it again this year at the Dominican institution. Once more the prevalent cry is that this is the year P.C. will down State. The funniest thing of all is that the Friar supporters are holding up their unbeaten record as evidence of the fact that Providence is stronger than State.

Let us analyze this great undefeated record. P.C. has actually met and barely defeated three of the weakest college teams in New England. Anyone who can get elated over defeating Assumption by 9 points, Fairfield by 1 point, and A.I.C. by 3 points is certainly very easily pleased. To top it off, Providence looked far from good in squeezing out victories in these games, and if a club can't look good against that kind of opposition I hesitate to imagine how they will look against the first legitimate college team they face.

Also being held up as evidence that State is in for a licking is the fact that they have already dropped two games this year. However, it must be considered that they lost to two of the strongest teams in this section of the country. The Boston College squad that downed Rhode Island last week is reputed to be one of the strongest in New England, and thus far they have lived up to all expectations. Losing to St. John's in the Garden last Saturday can hardly be considered a black mark against any team. St. John's is supposedly the class of the New York area this season, and therefore perhaps on a par with any team in the nation.

Let's not forget that State knocked off strong St. Joseph's of Philadel-

eph's is in a class far above that of P.C. What this comparison of records amounts to is the fact that State has been playing in the major leagues while P.C. has been struggling along in a low class minor league.

In the question of height, State will not hold as great an advantage as it has in the past. However, they still have 6'3" Golembiewski and 6'3" Bruce Blount. Golembiewski is a far better

board man than anyone P.C. has had since Cy Killian became ineligible. Aided by Blount, he should effectively control the boards for State. These two men will be ably assisted by such players as Shannon, Hole, Mitchell, and Stewart. All of these boys are fine ball handlers and have proven their superiority to P.C. men in the past. Such Providence players as Pelligrino, Nissel, Schlimn, Korbusieski, Garcia, and Lozoski are admittedly fairly good, but fairly good is not good enough when playing a team of State's caliber.

I am afraid that it will be the same old story of recent years. Fans who go out to the Auditorium, Thursday evening, expecting a Friar triumph are in for a rude surprise. I predict that State will not only win but that they will win with such ease that it will be enough to convince even the most ardent P.C. fan that this Friar quintet is still a far cry from the powerful Providence teams of the past.

Once again, the locker room of Harkins Hall is a beehive of activity, and Coach Pete Louthis is conducting daily workouts with his intramural boxing hopefuls. About 25 fellows have signed up for the program thus far, including Oscar Peters, P. C.'s only winner in last year's bouts with Dartmouth, Bill McCaughey, and Frank Killbride, both of whom fought last year. The majority of the fellows who have signed up thus far are freshmen. Coach Pete Louthis would like to have more candidates, especially upperclassmen. Although this year's turnout is more encouraging than last year's, Louthis needs more fellows if he is to carry through the elaborate plans which he has for intramural boxing shows.

He has again stated that experience is not necessary, for the fighters will be matched according to weight and experience. It is essential that the fellows report for the practice sessions immediately, in order that they get shape for their bouts.

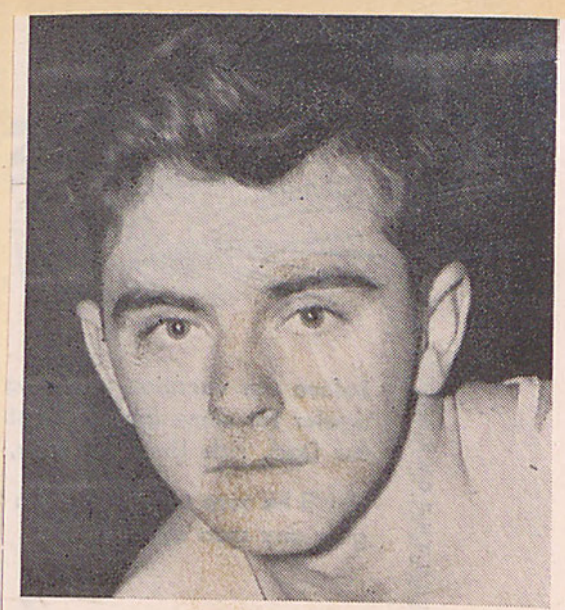

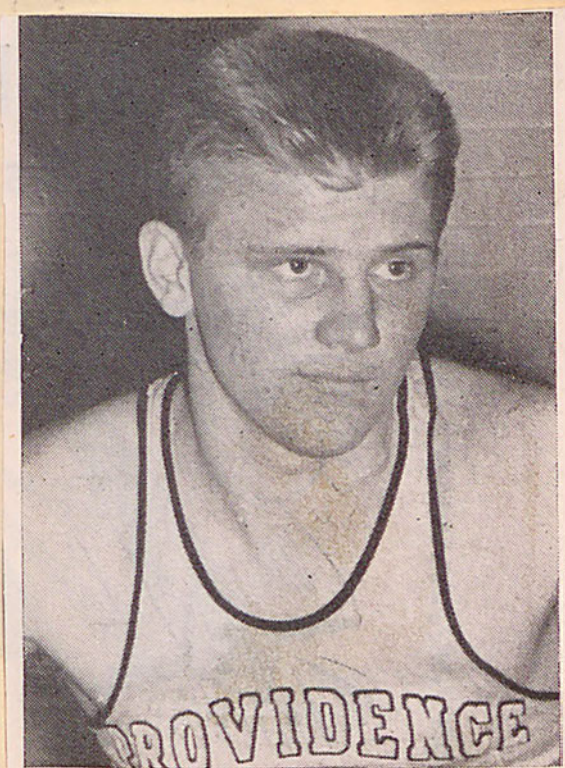

Many Thrills During R. I. State-P. C. Series

Tomorrow night at the R. I. Auditorium, an underdog Providence College quintet will take on the Rams of Rhode Island State in the 30th renewal of the interstate rivalry. In attempting to preserve their undefeated slate, the Friars will be trying to do what their predecessors have been able to do but once in the last twenty games of the series. Indeed, the Black and White representing P. C. have been able to defeat the fast-breaking Rams only once in the last thirteen years. The last time the Friars entered the game with an unmarred record, they emerged victorious. Maybe history will repeat itself, for Coach Vin Cuddy has his boys primed for this contest, their first against State since he has taken over the reins.

The rivalry between the two institutions began back in 1921, shortly after Providence College was founded. The first contest ever played in the series found the Rams the victors by a lopsided 87-25 score. The following season, 1922, saw the Staters humble the Friars again, this time by sixteen points, 35-19.

After these two defeats, there were no games played between the two colleges for twelve years. The series was resumed in the 1934-35 season. Providence College coached by Al McLellan, scored an upset win over a good State team by the overwhelming score of 53-28. Captain Bill Kutneski, Joe Carew, and Ben Smith paced the Friars to this startling victory over the Rams who were led by the sensational Jack Martin. In the spring of 1935 the P. C.'ers proved that this win was not a fluke by defeating the Staters 47-43 on their home court at Kingston.

The following season, that of 1935-36, found the boys from Smith Hill once again taking the measure of the Rams in both contests. In the first game, P. C., unleashing a whirlwind second half offense, snapped a six-game R. I. win streak, 53-47. The

Friars' Leo Davin took high-scoring honors in this contest with 19 points. Other Black and White mainstays in this triumph were Ed Babinski and Ben Smith. The P. C.'ers followed this up with a 65-42 win at Kingston in one of the roughest and most hectic tilts ever played between the two fives. In pacing the Friars to this victory, Leo Davin scored 23 points and put on one of the most brilliant all-around court displays ever given by a player wearing the Black and White of Providence College.

In 1936 State registered its first decision over a P. C. quintet in 16 years, as it chalked up a 63-54 triumph at the Rhode Island Auditorium. But, in the return match at Kingston, the Friar five pulled one of the biggest upsets of the long series. Scoring four foul shots in the waning moments of the game, the boys from the Hill pulled out a 42-38 win, thus stopping a State victory string at 13 straight, and dropping them from the top spot in the New England court picture. Once again, Leo Davin, along with Paul Angelica, paced the Friars in their win. The Rams were led that year by Ed Tashjian and Chet Jaworski, who was to go on to be one of the all-time high scorers in State history. After this game, the Friars

were regarded by most experts as the top team in New England.

State started on its win parade in the 1937-38 season, registering two convincing victories, 52-41 and 85-59. The following year the Rams again took both games, this time by scores of 57-45 and 77-60. In these contests the boys from Smith Hill played good, hustling basketball, but were unable to top the fast-breaking Rams.

In the 1939-40 campaign the Friars were subdued in both tilts by the Rhodyites, 49-30 and 75-62. The following year, with the Rams presenting one of their best quintets ever, the Black and White again succumbed in both contests, 70-42 and 98-71. The high-scoring Chet Jaworski again led the Staters in these victories.

After eight successive losses, one of the greatest quintets ever put on a basketball floor by Providence College, the 1941-42 combine, scored a hair-raising 60-54 triumph over the Rams. Larry Drew, erstwhile P. C. court mentor, and presently Director of Intramural Athletics here at the college, Ted McConnon former head coach of basketball at St. Anselm's. Zabeck, Marone, and Ferd Sowa, captain of the 1947-48 P. C. quintet, were the stars of one of P. C.'s most satisfying court victories. This five, one of the most publicized in the history of the Dominican institution finished the year as the second highest scoring team in the nation. This game was played before 5800 fans (at the Rhode Island Auditorium,) the largest crowd ever to see a game in the state up until that time. Coach Ed Crotty's club was beaten by the Rams, 68-54, in the second game of the season, this one being played at Kingston.

The Keaneymen again embarked on their winning ways in the 1942-43 campaign. Sparked by one of the greatest players ever to come out of Rhode Island, Ernie Calverly, the Rams outscored the P. C.'ers in both tilts that year. With Calverly registering 29 points, the Rhodyites pasted the Friars, 85-68, in a high-scoring game. State took the other contest by a 64-56 margin.

The two squads did not meet the following season, but in the 1944-45 campaign, they took up right where they left off, walloping the Black and White, 90-42. Dick Hole and the irrepressible Ernie Calverly paced the Keaneymen's attack with 28 and 27 points respectively. High man for the losers with 12 markers was LaBosiere, P. C. captain.

One of the stars of the 1941-42 season, Larry Drew, returned from the service in time for the next campaign, but even his much needed talents were not enough to enable the Smith Hillers to halt the Rhody parade. In this, P. C.'s final year under Coach Ed Crotty, the Rams, a team which was to go onto the finals of the National Invitation Tournament before bowing to Kentucky, topped the Friars in both tilts, 82-60 and 78-55. Again, the play of the incomparable Calverly featured the two games.

With a former star player, Larry Drew, taking over at the helm, the Friars dropped both contests the following season. They made a tussle of it in the first tilt, finally succumbing 72-63. But, they were no match for the Rams on their home court, and suffered a humiliating 101 to 55 defeat. The 1947-48 campaign found the Friars giving the Rams quite a scare in the game at the Auditorium, by leading 40-39 at halftime, but they were handicapped by a lack of reserve strength and finally dropped the tilt by a 73-64 score. State registered the highest total of the series, 108, as they beat the Black and White by 24 points in the second contest played at Kingston.

Last year, the Rams, under a new coach, "Red" Haire, scored their 11th and 12th successive wins over P. C. They had a difficult time in winning the first game, but prevailed 74-61. In the tilt played on their home court, giant center Ken Goodwin dropped in 35 points to pace State to an easy 99-53 win.

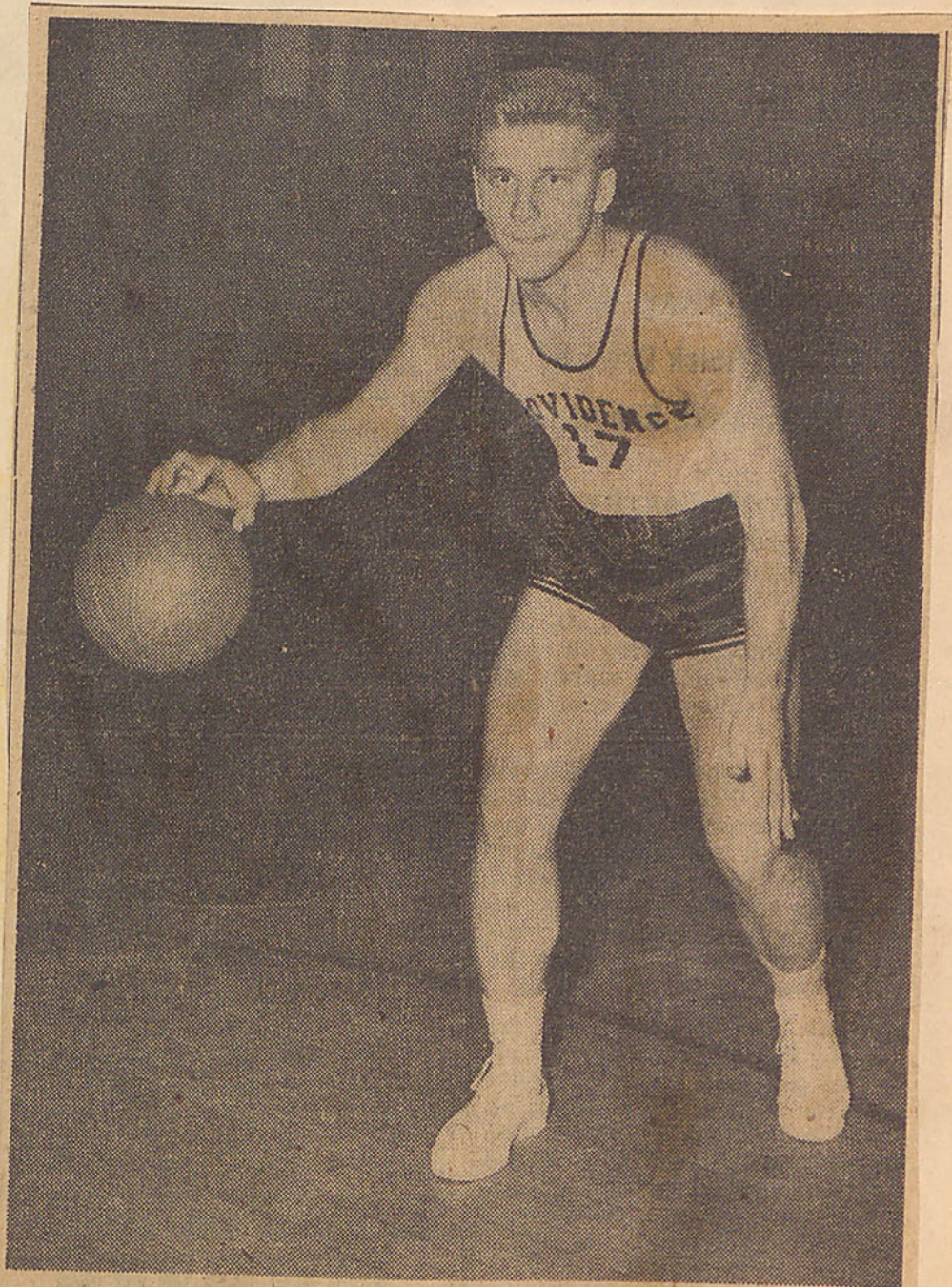
The next game for Hal Martin's crew will be with the Rhode Island State freshmen at the R. I. Auditorium tomorrow night. This should be one of the better games of the year.

FRIARS REGISTER THIRD VICTORY BY EDGE OF 54 TO 51

Providence Club Pulls Away
After Aces Knot Count
at 27-27 Tally

Springfield, Dec. 10.—Providence College scored a 54-to-51 victory over the American International College's basketball team here tonight.

The victory was the third straight for Coach Vin Cuddy's team, which showed considerable improvement tonight over previous performances.

The game was close throughout, but the Friars, with their men sharing the scoring duties well, managed to reach the intermission with a 23-to-19 advantage.

Ray Korbieski and Jim Schlim, a pair of sophomores, set the scoring pace for the Friars, with 12 and 10 points, respectively.

Coach Cuddy of P.C. used 16 men in all and of them 10 took part in the scoring. Providence built up its margin by superiority in shooting from the floor, sinking 19 goals to the Aces' 14. AIC however, flipped in 23 free tries to 16 for the Friars.

The Friars started slowly and trailed, 10-9, and 12-11, in the middle reaches of the first half, but catching up at 13-13, the Friars broke ahead and never were headed until well into the second half, when Don Yvon knotted the count at 27-27.

Providence then got hot again, surged ahead and never was seriously threatened.

Although the Providence College Friars are undefeated in three starts, Rhode Island State's Rams will be favored when these two teams get together tonight at the R.I. Auditorium. The freshmen quintets meet at 7 o'clock, with the varsity clash listed for 8:30 o'clock.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars says his boys will have to play real good ball to knock over the Kingston crew tonight.

"We haven't played as well as we expected," he remarked. "We've been off and on, 10 minutes of really great ball, and 10 minutes of the other kind. I thought we played more consistently against Fairfield, but our kids are ready to go.

"The Rams are rough," he continued. "They always have been, even when I was at Connecticut. We beat them comfortably at Storrs one year, with Walt Drobo getting about 30, and then they tripped us at Kingston. In some spots they did a good job against B. C. and I understand they were much better in New York against St. John's."

The Friars have beaten Assumption, Fairfield and A. I. C. Two sophomores, Ray Korbieski and Jerry Lembo, played particularly well against A. I. C. while spelling Co-Capt. Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock. The sophomore players could give the Friars the lift. Cuddy says the difference between the clubs rests on whether the Friars can cash in on their scoring opportunities.

"If we're missing the easy ones, they're going to get 'em, but it will be a very good game, if we're hitting," he says.

The Friars haven't taken the Rams since the 1941-42 season and have dropped 12 straight games since then. This series has had all kinds of surprises and all types of games, but the Rams have dominated it pretty conclusively through the 40's.

Coach Bob Haire of State told his players that he was well satisfied with their showing against St. John's in Madison Square Garden. Playing at an equivalent pace, the Rams probably would win by a fair margin. P. C. is a bit more spirited this season and some of the Friars would like to win one from the Rams before they graduate and this might be as good a time as any.

The Rams will line up with Bruce Blount and John Mitchell as forwards, Leon Golembiewski at center and Don Shannon and Chuck Stewart as guards. For the Friars, the starters will be Fran Pelligrino at center, Sam Nissel and Ray Garcia, forwards, and Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock as guards.

The Rams hold a 23-5 margin in the series. This is only the second time in Friar court annals that they go into this game undefeated. And the last time, the Rams edged out a strong Providence College team, tutored by Ed Crotty, in a tight ball game, also at the Auditorium.

Rams and Friars to Clash At R.I. Auditorium Tonight

The Rhode Island State Rams, who were the highest scoring team in the country last season, come to town tonight to open their annual series with the Providence College Friars at the R.I. Auditorium. The Rams met more opposition than expected last night in scoring an 86-to-69 victory over Bates at Kingston but are favored to turn back the Friars tonight.

The Friars are unbeaten in three starts but have been hot and cold in scoring over Assumption, Fairfield and A. I. C. Meanwhile the Rams have beaten St. Joseph's and Bates and lost to Boston College and St. John's. Certainly the Rams' record to date is the more impressive of the two for they played a fairly good ball game against St. John's, ranking New York combination.

Petro Ram Grad

You're going to hear a lot about Leon Golembiewski and Bruce Blount in talk about the Rhode Island combination this season, for they are the team's key players. Neither is an Ernie Calverley but they are hard working team players. Last night they led the drive which

pulling the Rams through against Bates.

Ed Petro, the Bates coach, is pretty familiar with the Rhody pattern, as he played there as an undergraduate and he had his team primed for an upset last night. The Bobcats beat Colby, Maine's champions, last Saturday and played a fine game against the Rams. They were definitely in contention until the last six or seven minutes.

With 10 minutes left, the Rams were two points to the good at 60-58 after leading by five, 43-38 at the half. Then the Rams put on pressure and pulled away. Golembiewski and Blount, each of whom scored 21 points, were the pace makers, with Chuck Stewart (13), Donnie Shannon (14) and Johnny Mitchell (10) assisting. Golembiewski's rebounding was an important second half factor. Ralph Perry (20), Len Collins (16) and Larry Quimby (15) were the Bates leaders.

Kozak Pace Setter

Fred Kozak, Moe Mahoney and Ed

Corcoran led the Brown team to a one-sided 74-36 victory over Worcester Tech for their third straight victory. The Bruins didn't have much trouble with the Engineers, with Fall River Freddy dropping in 17 points in leading the Bruins, while Mahoney played a good floor game and scored nine. Corcoran netted 11.

Brown had leads of 25-9, 36-18 and 54-24 and coasted once they assumed control. Arnold meets the Bruins tomorrow night and may prove a little tough for they are reported to have a strong club this season. Coach Bob Morris of the Bruins used 15 players all but three of whom broke into the scoring column. Dick Howard (9) and Bill Mehalick (9) were Tech's top hands.

While Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars isn't publicly predicting a victory for his charges tonight, he looks for a good ball game. PC has played some fine ball in its three games and State's attack shouldn't prove too baffling as the Friars twice scrimmaged Connecticut.

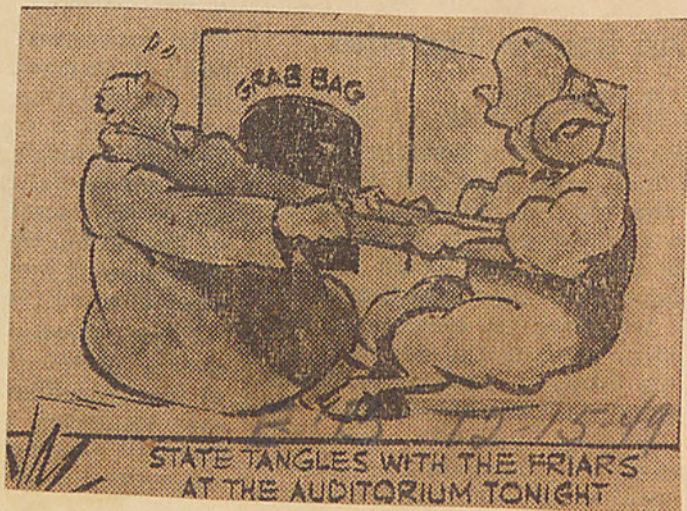
Rhody Series Leader

The Friars haven't been able to find the winning combination against the Rams since the early '40's when one of Ed Crotty's team tipped them over. They have played the Rams 12 times since without a victory. Rhody holds a 23-5 margin in the series, with only Gen McLellan's teams of the mid-30's able to hold their own with RI on a year-to-year basis.

The Rams will start the same team which opened against Bates last night. Chuck Stewart has taken over Walt Dalby's spot as the latter has withdrawn from college. Blount, Golembiewski, Shannon and Mitchell complete Coach Red Haire's starters.

The Friars have been getting some of their drive from their sophomores, although all the starters played last season. This team includes Walt Lozski and Art Weinstock at the guards, Fran Pelligrino at center and Sam Nissell and Ray Garcia at forwards. Garcia is one of the Friars' best players but he's been slow coming around after his neck and throat injury.

The Rhode Island State Frosh beat Marianapolis, 61 to 58, with Bill Baird scoring 16 while the Brown Frosh won over the Worcester Tech Freshmen, 51 to 32. John Solio and Lee Benson led the Bruin Cubs.

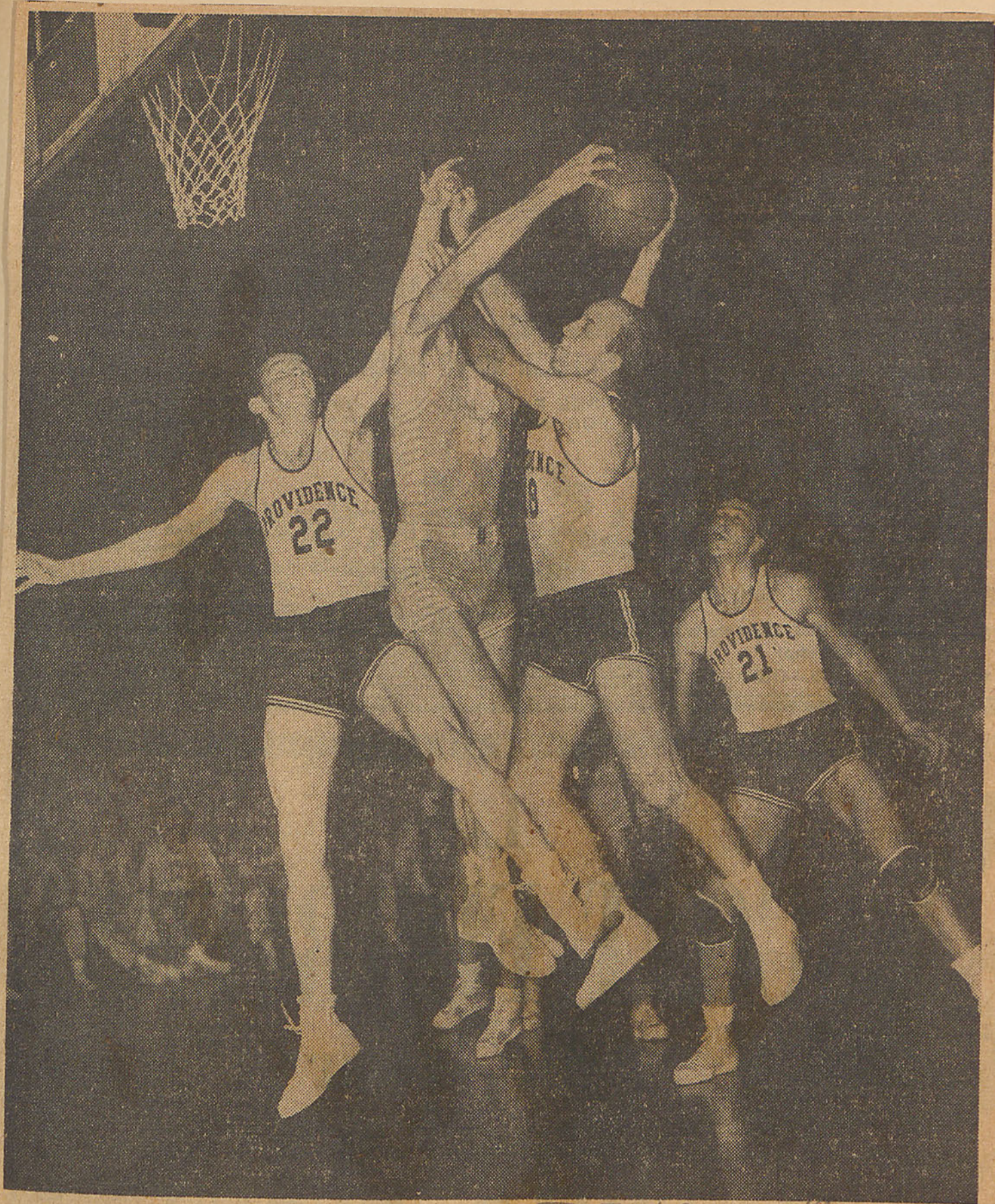

For Cuddy, this will be more than just another game for besides being the traditional foe of the Friars in basketball, Rhode Island State has not been defeated by a Friar quintet since 1941. 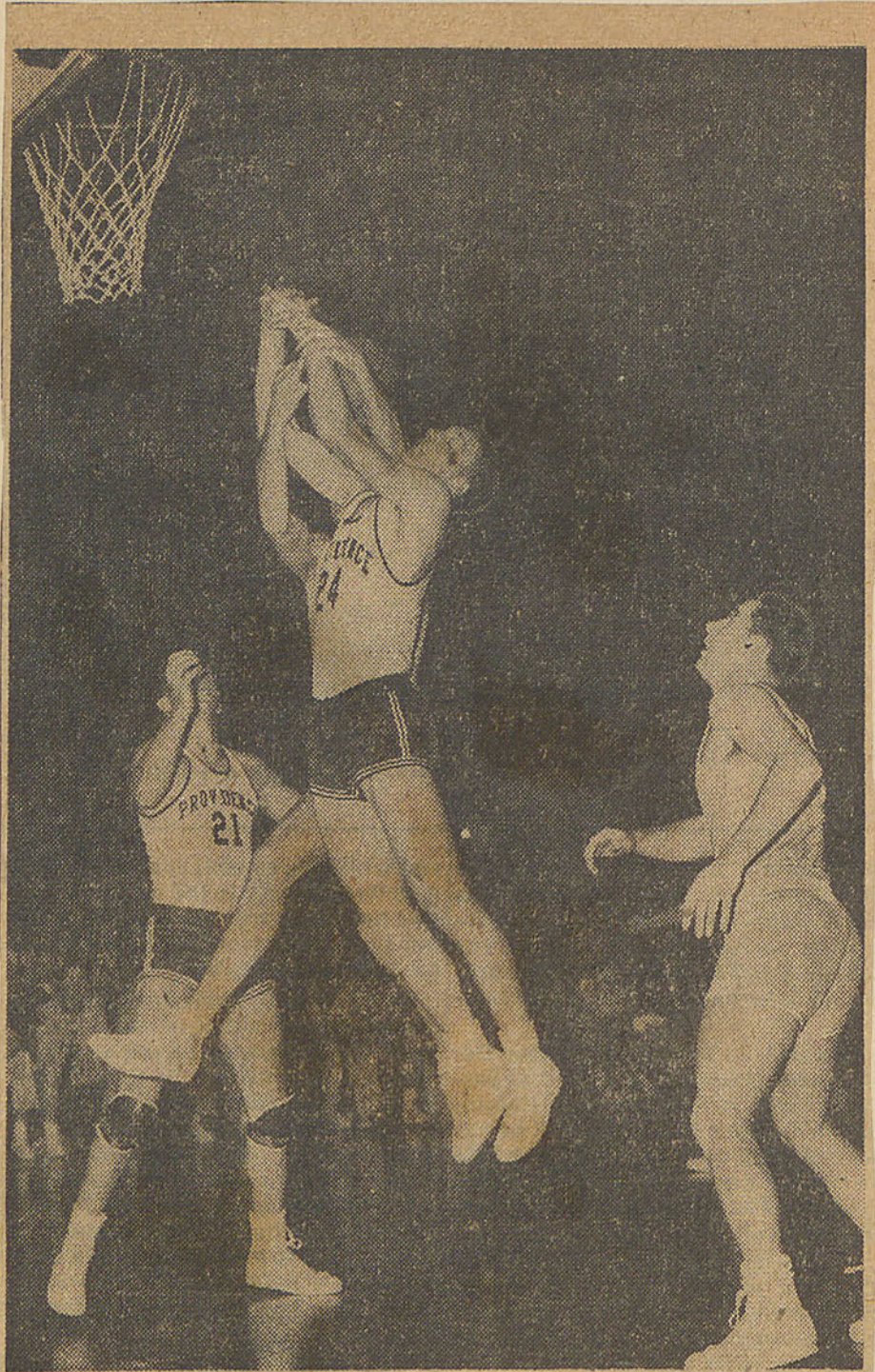

FRIARS VICTORY OVER STATE

LOZOSKI'S 20-FOOTER GIVES

20-Footer By Lozoski Wins Game

The Providence College Friars took their first step back towards the basketball heights with a thrilling 59-to-57 victory over the Rhode Island State Rams last night at the Auditorium.

Walt Lozoski, called "Pop" by his more youthful Friar contemporaries, scored the winning basket on a 20-footer from the side with just 16 seconds left to play and touched off one of the wildest mob scenes ever witnessed at the Auditorium court.

The spirit in the stands and on the court was among the best the Friars have shown in a long, long time. Not since the night another PC group picked up Hughie Devore and lugged him around Cranston Stadium after his Friars had beaten State, have Providence supporters so publicly demonstrated their affection for their coach, in this case, Vin Cuddy, in his first season at the Friar helm.

Not since the early 40's have the Friars been able to beat the Rams and if ever a team did it the hard way, this one ranks with the top comebacks in all PC basketball history. The Friars were 18 points down in the first half and the way the Rams were racking off their shots, the Smith Hillers didn't have the proverbial ghost of a chance.

Uphill Battle

For the first 15 minutes, PC was so definitely outclassed that it seemed to be only a question of that score. But then the Friars began to hit, picked up a bit in the morale department with their success, which cut the Rams' lead down to 10 points at the half, and then pulled the game out of the fire in the last seconds of the second half.

Lozoski, who got one of his biggest sports thrills in once being robbed of an extra base hit on a flashy catch by Joe DiMaggio, was the Friars' top hero with his winning basket. But even the peppy co-captain couldn't have done it without help and when you talk of the Friars, Jim Schlimm, Frank Pellegrino, Ray Garcia, Sam Nissell, Ray Korbusieski, Art Weinstock and Jerry Lembo all had a hand in the victory.

Except for a momentary lead in the first minute, the Rams led all the way right up to the finish. They played brilliant ball in the first half, with Don Shannon, Bruce Blount and Leon Golembiswsky setting the pace and held a 39-29 edge at intermission.

The Friars had started to come in the last four minutes of the first half when they whittled the Rams' lead down from 18 to 10 points but in the first two minutes of the second half, the Rams had it back to 12 again.

Lembo Clicks

But that was the turning point for the Friars started to click again and by 7:02 of the second half were within two points at 43-41. The game was kind of rough under the hoop and the Rams' accuracy from the foul line kept them in the lead, although they were being outplayed by the surging Friars. It was 49-43 with nine minutes left.

Here Schlimm and Korbusieski featured, with Schlimm scoring twice, but Blount's free throw made it 50-47. Garcia's foul shot, followed by a pop from the corner by Pellegrino made it 50-all. Later the Rams were ahead 54-50 and 55-53. Lembo's only hoop tied it up at 55-all but Blount sunk one with 30 seconds left and it was 57-55 in the Rams' favor.

Lembo, who started the year with the PC jayvees, counted two free throws under pressure after he was fouled going in. That tied the score again. PC later worked the ball down the right side and Lozoski dropped in the clincher with 16 seconds left to play. The wild enthusiasm that followed, with PC adherents swarming on the court, was one of the best demonstrations by the Friars in years.

Blount played a great game for the losing Rams. The Rhody quintet went scoreless from the floor for

nearly 14 minutes at one stretch in the second half. But the tongue-in-cheek predictions of Pete Louthis, Aram Slom and Steve Marcuccie of the Friars' staff went right in spite of all form to the contrary.

Ram String Ends

It was the Friars' first victory over State since the 1941-42 season under Ed Crotty and the Rams had won 12 in a row since then. The game will take its place among PC's top sports achievement, like the Friars' football victory over Boston College.

And when Coach Vin Cuddy called Lozoski one of his top quarterbacks, he apparently had the Merriwell boys in mind, for that's the kind of a windup the Friars produced in the clutch.

The R.I. State Frosh scored a 67-51 victory over the Friars in the first game, with Bill Baird, Ed Kubisky and Ray Rossi leading the Ramlets.

P.C. Grabs 59-57 Triumph On Goal in Last 16 Seconds

Pair of Free Throws by Lembo

Deadlocks Thriller Only

23 Seconds From End

The Providence College Friars came from behind with a brilliant display of aggressive basketball, scored a 59-to-57 victory over Rhode Island State College last night and touched off one of the most enthusiastic and spontaneous outbursts ever seen at an Auditorium basketball game.

After trailing by as much as 18 points at one stage, the Friars tied up the game at 57-all on a pair of free throws by Jerry Lembo, a sophomore, with 23 seconds left to play.

After a time out, the Friars took the ball out of bounds, worked it along toward their right side and Walt Lozoski dropped in a 20-foot shot from the side which gave the Friars their hard-won victory. There were only 16 seconds left to play when the Friars' balding co-captain made his game-winning shot and sent the Friars home winners over the Rams for the first time since the 1941-42 season.

Mob Scene

Then the Providence College rooters among the 1500 fans who witnessed one of the best games in this long series swarmed onto the court in a scene the like of which the Auditorium hasn't seen in a long time. They picked up Coach Vin Cuddy and carried him aloft. Another group grabbed Lozoski and a third had Ray "Ga Ga" Garcia, while the Rams straggled and struggled off the floor the best they could. It was that kind of a game.

In the wake of Providence's comeback, the fine early play of the Rams was forgotten. It was the Friars' night, though those who might have left midway in the first half hardly could have pictured the turnabout that was to follow.

The victory was the Friars' fourth straight, but their first over a major opponent and snapped a record of 12 successive series triumphs by Rhode Island. The last P.C. team which defeated the Rams also did it at the Auditorium, by a 60-54 margin, during Ed Crotty's regime, when Larry Drew, Ted McConnon & Co. were shooting for the Friars against Stutz Modlezewski, Bill Rutledge and Earl Shannon.

10 Points Down

Although the Friars have had other fighting teams down through the years, last night's stirring victory will take its place among the biggest and best.

The Rams played their best ball in the first half. The Friars started the second half 10 points down, 39-29, and it was only a spurt in the last few minutes of the first half that had enabled them to be that close. Rhode led, 33-15, along about the 15-minute mark of the first half. From there the Friars outscored them, 14 to 6, in the closing minutes and added a big lift to what had been mainly routine basketball, though the Rams were shooting in exceptional fashion.

In the first two minutes of the second half, the Rams went up to 43-31. There the Friars took over. With Frank Pelligrino, Art Weinstock and Sam Nissell doing some good work and Lozoski contributing a smart pass here and there, they cut the lead to 43-40 about seven minutes along. Lozoski scored that hoop on a combination with Pelligrino and later his foul shot cut the gap to two points.

Two Minute Mark

The Rams, strictly on their foul shooting, went up to 49-43 with less than nine minutes left. Jim Schlimm, first on an alley pass from Ray Korbusieski and then on a lefthand hook shot, again brought the Friars within a basket. Later, it was 54-50, as Chuck Stewart and Bruce Blount counted for the Rams. Here Lozoski dropped in a long set shot. After Weinstock's free throw, the Friars were down, 53-54, with about two minutes to go.

Donnie Shannon made it 55 for Rhody on a foul conversion and Lembo pitched in his only basket, tying the score.

Blount, who along with Leon Golmbiewski, did a fine job for the Rams, especially on rebounds, sank a basket with 30 seconds left. Lembo was fouled going in for what might have been the tying hoop and he drew two free throws.

Two In

A steady-nerved fellow and the smallest of the Friars, Lembo put in his two shots, tying the score at 55-all. That put it up to Lozoski, whose long shot not only broke up the game, but broke the Rams' hearts as well.

The Friars had many heroes, but perhaps Blount in defeat was as outstanding as any of them. Providence went scoreless from the floor for about six minutes in the first half and the Rams failed to score a two-

Friar Cagers On Walt Loz

An underdog Providence College quintet, not disheartened at trailing Rhode Island State's Rams by 10 points at halftime, came back to outscore the Kingston club 38-18 in the final portion and gain a 59-57 decision last night at the R. I. Auditorium. The winning points came 16 seconds from the end on Walt Lozoski's set shot from the corner.

With the Rams leading, 54-52, at the automatic, Art Weinstock, co-captain of the Friars, put in a foul shot to separate the rivals by one point. Don Shannon, one of Pawtucket's contributions to to State, was also fouled and converted to get back the two points and give the Rams a 55-53 edge with little over a minute left.

Coach Bob Haire's boys started to put on an effective "freeze" and the Friars, desperate to get possession of the ball, began fouling. Because of the new rule, this was an unwise thing to do at this stage of the game. After State had the opportunity to cash in from the foul line, it still took control of the ball at midcourt.

It seemed the only way Providence College could get the ball was to intercept or get a jump on the taller Rams under the boards. This they did, with Jerry Lembo, smallest man on the PC squad, leaping up and gathering in a rebound. He then made good a jump shot, making it 55-all.

With 25 seconds to play, Bruce Blount, who led the Rams' point-total with 17, contributed an all-important layup to give the Hairemen the jump again, however, Blount fouled Lembo in the act of shooting, and Jerry calmly flipped in two free tosses to make it 57-57. That paved the way for Lozoski's stunning clincher.

20-FOOT CLINCHER

Only 16 seconds remained when Lozoski let go with his toss. He took it on a pass and from 20 feet out uncorked a high set shot that whistled in without touching the rim.

That payoff pitch by Lozoski brought to a climax the gallant uphill fight the Friars had been waging all night. Providence players are usually up and pointed for any occasion they get a chance to clash with State. Perhaps last night, the incentive to win was even greater.

One reason was to keep an undefeated string of three wins intact. Another was to give Coach Vin Cuddy his initial victory over the Rams in his first year as coach of the Friars. A third was to break a 12-game losing streak that the Friars have absorbed at the hands of the Rams. P. C. accomplished all of this. That Lozoski sank the

winning two points was even more fitting. Now in his fourth year, Lozski had participated in six games with State and had seen the Rams take all of them. When Cuddy declared before the game, "It'll be a good game if we're hitting," he wasn't joking. Although

the previous three games were with mediocre clubs, the Friars had had their off and on moments. Last night they were the same—rocky for the first half and amazingly confident in the second period. Rhode Island, on the other hand, was bubbling in the first half and tapered off in the final set.

For awhile, the game appeared to be a routine affair. All five of State's starting cagers—Bruce Blount, Don Shannon, Chuck Stewart, Leon Golembiewski and Johnny Mitchell—figured in the scoring as the Rams built up a good margin midway through the first half.

Shannon and Stewart, with their long set shots from the outer reaches, and Golembiewski and Blount immense from underneath, were the prominent figures in the R. I. attack—the last basket before P. C. took a time out coming on a three-man pass from Blount to Golembiewski and finally to Shannon, who made good on a set shot for an 18-8 advantage.

STATE LEADS, 33-15

At the 15-minute mark, State had widened the gap to 33-15, but the Friars chewed the lead down to 39-29 when the gun for the half sounded.

Mainly through the efforts of Frank Pelligrino and Sam Nissel, Pelligrino being a junior from Westerly High, Providence College crept nearer in the early stages of the last half. Seven points separated the teams at the six-minute point, State leading 43-36. Pelligrino did a spectacular job in the rebound department getting State shots after they had missed the target and setting up scoring plays.

So completely did Providence dominate the play during this brief skirmish, State was unable to score from the floor for fully three minutes. The Friars in the meantime had closed in, and trailed by only two points, 43-41.

Five straight foul attempts were converted by State to put them up front 49-43. Then Jim Schlimm and Pelligrino started to connect and deadlocked the issue at 50-50, the first time the teams were tied. It came at the 15-minute mark. Blount and Stewart put in four points to help dispel the pressure, but then the Black and White started their offensive which finally paid off and enabled them to emerge undefeated—the first time in the series between the two rivals.

ZIPPING 'EM IN: When the final gun went off, there was silence for a split second . . . then the PC rooters went hysterical . . . More than 1000 swarmed down on the arena court and slapped their darlings on the back . . . Lozski was mobbed . . . Both he and Cuddy were hoisted up on the shoulders of the fans and escorted to the Friars dressing room . . . Nothing need be said on how the Ram players felt . . . it was a tough one to take . . . Two former East High players helped spark the Rhode Island State freshmen to a 67-51 win over the Providence College yearlings . . . Ray Rossi and Fred Lennon were main cogs, collecting 10 and 8 points, respectively . . . Dick Buba also played well for the State frosh . . . Other former Blackstone Valley stars that ap

peared on the floor included Oscar Ponton, five points for the Friar freshmen, a graduate of Sacred Heart Academy.

The Providence College Friars, who startled New England college basketball circles with their recent upset victory over Rhode Island State, will be seeking their fifth consecutive victory when they meet the Bates Bobcats tonight at the Mount Pleasant High gymnasium.

The Providence Frosh take on the R.I. College of Education quintet at 7 o'clock, with the varsity game listed for 8:30 o'clock.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars, much pleased with his team's success over the Rams, will start the same combination that has opened all four previous games. This group includes Walt Lozoski, hero of the R.I. State victory, and Art Weinstock at the guards, Frank Pelligrino at center and Ray Garcia and Sam Nissel at forwards.

Bates could prove a tough nut for the Friars as they are playing a fairly good brand of ball this season under the direction of Ed Petro, a Ram brilliant during Coach Frank Keaney's regime. Bates gave the Rams a tussle on Wednesday and knocked off favored Colby, Maine champion, before starting their present trip.

The Friars, on the other hand, should get a tremendous lift from their victory over Rhode Island.

Bates has a lanky and effective center in Larry Quimby, a 6-foot-5 sophomore, who played well against Colby and the Rams. Forward Glen Collins and Guard Ralph Perry are other key men in the Bobcat offense.

Providence College, formerly a collegiate court power, is on its way back to the basketball heights again. And Jerry Lembo of this city played an important part in the initial resurgence of the Friars during an uphill 59-57 triumph over Rhode Island State last Thursday night.

The team of Coach Vin Cuddy from Naugatuck trailed by 18 points at one stage of the first half but cut the margin to ten points at the intermission mark. Shortly after the second half began Rhode Island again was sporting a 12-point advantage but the Friars began whittling away at the lead and finally knotted the count at 50-50.

Then the Rhody Rams went to the front again at 54-50 and 55-53 in the waning moments of play before the diminutive Lembo swept into action with a mild scoring rampage.

The star guard and playmaker of Hillhouse High's New England championship quintet of a few season's back stalemated the contest for the second time by splitting the cords with a two-pointer.

With only 30 seconds left to play Bruce Blount of Rhode Island gave his team a seemingly clinching 57-55 lead by sinking a shot from the floor. But Lembo, who started the season with the Providence jayvees, saved the day by contributing a pair of free throws under pressure when he was fouled going in for a basket attempt.

The feat of the New Haven sophomore in again tying the score provided Providence with the victory spark. Sixteen seconds were left to play when Walt Lozoski came through with the Friar clincher, a 20-foot effort from side court.

Needless to say pandemonium reigned in the spacious Providence Auditorium when time elapsed with the Friars retaining that narrow two-point advantage. It was the first time in years that Providence had defeated a Rhode Island State quintet.

It was an auspicious victory for Cuddy in his initial season as coach of the Friars. Vin starred at Naugatuck High where he participated in three sports before matriculating at the University of Connecticut. While at Storrs, Cuddy was honored by the Connecticut Varsity Club as the outstanding athlete and citizen in the Class of 1943.

While in the service, he coached the football and basketball teams of the 82nd Division. One of the youngest collegiate court coaches, Cuddy came to Providence this year from the Fort Trumbull branch of the University of Connecticut where he directed the destinies of the basketball, baseball and football teams.

BATES BOBCATS FIND SPEED TOO MUCH FOR THEM

Victory Marred by Injury to
Sam Nissell in Fall; Lad
in Hospital

Providence College's Friars turned in their best scoring job of the season and handed the Bates Bobcats a 93-to-67 setback last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

The victory was the Friars' fifth consecutive and easily their best offensive performance, completing the first leg of their schedule with a spotless record.

However, the sparkling play of the Friars was marred by the untimely accident which felled Sam Nissell, Providence College's brilliant left forward, in the late minutes of the second half.

Nissell was either bumped or fell as the players came away from the hoop after a Providence basket. He landed hard and was knocked out when the back of his head hit the floor. He didn't regain consciousness until he was carried to the locker room.

He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in an ambulance after the game.

A spokesman at the hospital said that Nissell was all right, but that he would remain at the hospital overnight for observation for a possible concussion.

Nissell, a 20-year-old junior from St. Mary's, Pa., who is playing his second year with the Friars, had turned in his best game of the year before he was hurt. The rangy Friar, who is one of the most popular boys at P.C., scored 20 points and was the key man in the Friars' attack, which hit its highest peak of the season.

10-Minute Delay

With about seven minutes left to play, Jim Schlimm scored on a pretty combination play and as the players scooted up court, Nissell fell. The game was held up for about 10 minutes before he was removed from the court on a stretcher.

Referees Matty Kearns and Sid MacKay agreed that Nissell had bumped somebody with his chin under the hoop and fell backward, apparently getting most of the force of the fall on the back of his head.

The Bobcats, completing a three-game trip stuck with the Friars in the early going, but the Providence

team showed more speed and finesse than usual in the second half and won comfortably as Bates faded. The Friars' passwork was of a high caliber in the second half and they were finishing off their plays.

The Friars led, 22-18, at the 10-minute mark and held a four-point lead, 34-30, with four minutes to go in the first half. Providence, with Coach Vin Cuddy spreading his talent around to wear down the Bobcats, led, 40 to 32, at the half.

Pressure Again

The Bobcats trailed, 58-53, with 10 minutes left, but then the Friars put on their pressure again and led, 65-53, with about nine minutes to go. They kept lengthening the gap for the most part and had a 15-point margin when Nissell was hurt.

Sophomore Glenn Collins played an outstanding game for the Bobcats, scoring 23 points, and several of his shots were of the sensational variety.

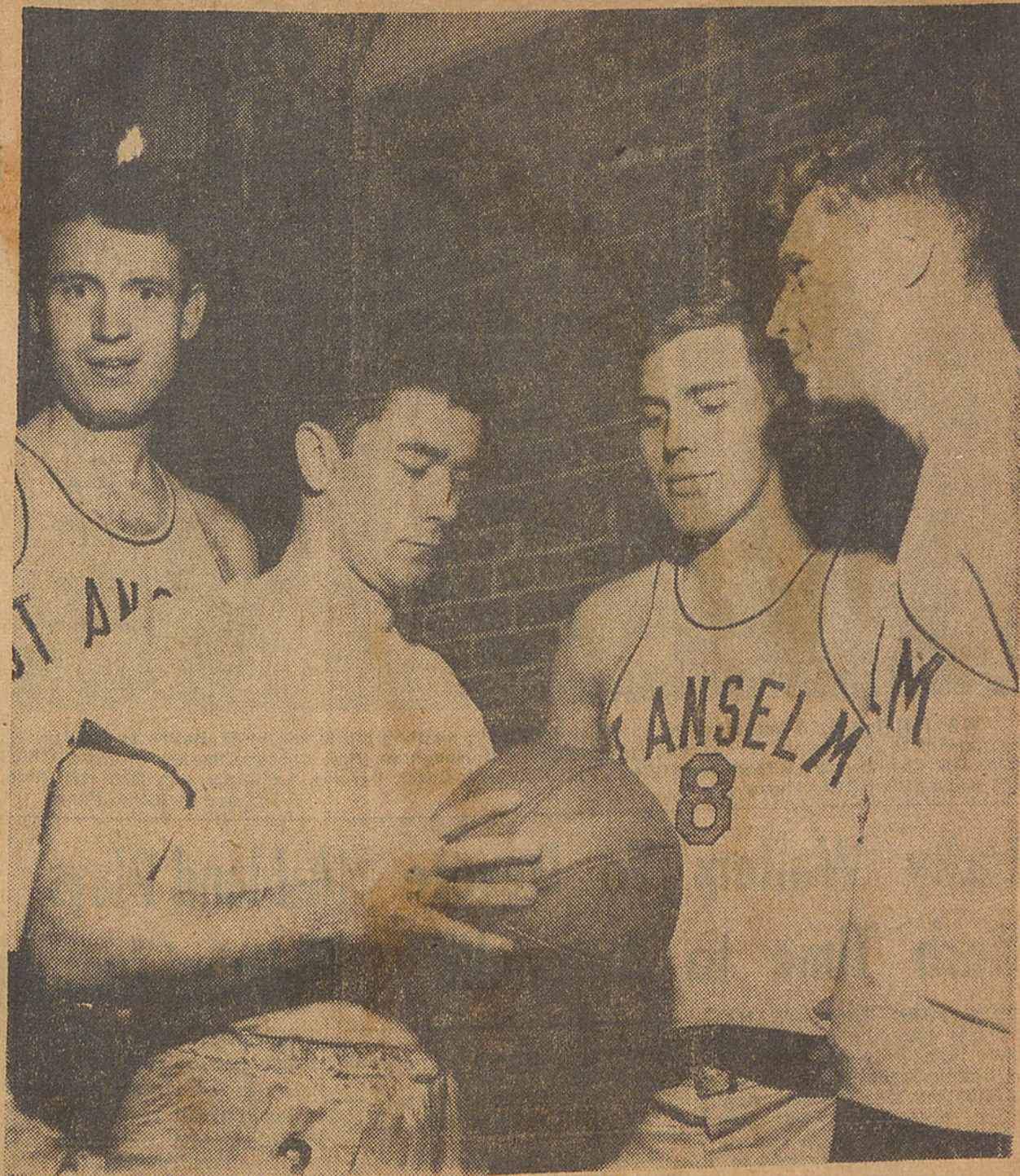
championship team of a few years back and Lembo is a former New Haven Hillhouse High ace and also played for Collegiate Prep.

Freshmen Battle Laconia Team in Second Contest

The Providence College Friars, hoping to keep alive their undefeated record, will be seeking their sixth straight win this afternoon when they invade the State Armory on Canal street to play the St. Anselm College Hawks in the main contest of a double bill. The main game is slated to start at 3 o'clock with the St. A's freshmen facing the Laconia Business College quintet in the opener at 1:30 o'clock.

The spacious floor of the armory is made to order for the Hawks who really like to run and will provide plenty of room for their rapid action fast-break brand of basketball. The Hawks will have plenty of company in this respect because the Providence Friars, who also employ the fast break, likewise enjoy galloping on the hardwood. From all indications this afternoon's varsity attraction should be a wild and woolly contest with plenty of action and a lot of scoring.

Coach Vin Cuddy will start an all-veteran team against the Hawk entry but bolstering his first club is a second team of sophomores that have won the plaudits of their coach for superlative relief work. The Friar starting team will include co-captains Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock, guards, Sam Nissel and Ray Garcia, forwards, and Frank Pelligrino, center. Among the sophomores are such stalwarts as Jim Schlimm, Ray Korbusieski and Jerry Lembo. For their relief performances this season, this trio of sophomores have been called the key to the success of the Friars to date.

Coach Cuddy, a former University of Connecticut basketball star, has done wonders with his charges in his first year at the Friar helm and heading the list of his achievements is the Friars' recent win over Rhode Island State, the

first Providence victory over the potent Rhody combine in seven years. Providence fans insist that this is the year for which they have all been waiting, and the Cuddymen have lived up to such expectations thus far. They hope to further their unbeaten string this afternoon by notching their 16th win over the Hawks. The series history shows that the Friars have taken 15 of the 18 games the two teams have played.

Over on the Hilltop this week, Coach Al Grenert and his St. A's squad have been pointing to today's game as one of their objective contests of the season. In seven games played this season, the Hawks have lost only to Dartmouth and Boston College. The Providence game is one of the most important of their remaining schedule and they hope to make their current win streak four straight by taking the Friars into camp.

Offensively, Coach Grenert will rely heavily upon his consistent scorers, Nick Bastin and Bill O'Connor, both of whom rank well up in national scoring according to official basketball statistics just released by the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball. O'Connor, in seven games, has scored 47 of his attempted 91 field goals for an average of .516, while Bastin has sunk 41 of his 77 attempts to achieve an average of .532. Prior to last week's game with Fairfield, O'Connor was rated second in the country while Bastin was listed in fifth place. In the matter of team scoring, St. A's was ranked 26th in the country with an average of 68 points per game. They boosted their average against Fairfield and now sport an average of 70.5 points per game.

Another important cog in the Hawk machine is veteran "Chuck" Tobin, aggressive forward, who not only has tallied well for his team but has been responsible for setting up a number of scoring plays. These three will make up St. A's starting line with Bastin at center, Tobin and O'Connor in the forward positions. Rounding out the Hill-toppers' combine will be Gene Wecal and Mike Hession, both of whom are due to break out in a rash of scoring. Both Hession and Wecal are clever set shots and once they get the range they can break up any ball game with their deadly accuracy.

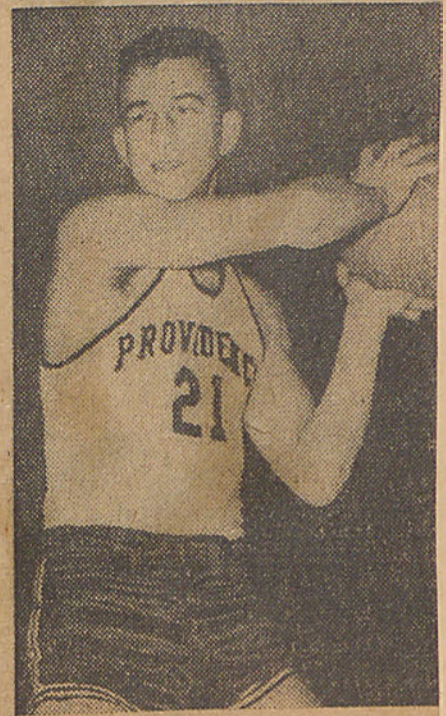
The Providence College Friars re-

Six new records went into the books as 465 track enthusiasts, ranging from junior high school competitive level to college and beyond, took part in the fifth annual NEAAAU Development track meet at the U. S. Naval Receiving Station yesterday.

CASSIDY REDUCES OPEN 440 RECORD

On the broken record side, three open and three novice high school marks were erased. Hugh Huleatt of Braintree High clipped the scholastic 880-yard record from 2:15.5 to 2:08, Bill Smith of Boston Trade put a new 440 yard time of 58.4 seconds into the registry and little Joe Pitts, the Brighton High marathon aspirant, clicked off a 4:50.4 mile for new time for that distance.

In the open events, John Cassidy of Providence College lowered the 440-yard record from 58.0 to 54.6 seconds. Teammate Dick Johnson paced off a 4:40.4 mile to deprive the second and third place Woburn Fowle twins, Robert and Richard, of new marks. Lastly, Ernie Mills of the BAA shortened his own 880-yard mark with a 2:11.4 performance.

At random, Bob McAllister of Boston College, son and namesake of the "Flying Cop" of Olympic fame, won the open 60-yard dash with a 6.6 effort. Joe Gaffey of Malden High did likewise in the high school event, but three seconds slower. New Idol Forced On Red Satellites

Moscow's latest scheme to hold its disgruntled satellites in line is to make them "love" Stalin and all that he represents.

Enforced endearment got fully under way during the celebrations of Stalin's 70th birthday on Dec. 21. World Communism not only deluged him with extravagant greetings, its haughty princelings abased themselves like ancient pagans transforming a mortal ruler into a god.

This sickening deification is further proof that Iron Curtain countries are throbbing with unrest.

Purges still are the order of the day. But "Titoism" survives dungeons, torture chambers and execution walls. Terror has not been abandoned. But the Kremlin is trying to bank on planned affection as a sounder base for an alliance than chains alone.

Russian God And Culture

By every subtle trick the Soviet Politburo is attempting to influence the public into worshipping its self-styled omnipotent, omniscient flesh-and-blood deity and into accepting abject obedience as the supreme virtue of the new piety.

Fresh measures also are being introduced to completely Russianize each subject state, through Russian books, culture and language along with Russian material goods.

Washington eyes this adoration campaign with deep concern. Diplomats suspect that the hidden purpose is to incorporate Poland, Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania into the Soviet Union.

Instead of bloody overnight seizure — as was the case in Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia — the plot is slow absorption, until one morning a Pole, say, will wake up to find that his nation has become another republic in the USSR.

No Limit To Praises

The first move was the paens of slobbering adulation showered on Stalin on his birthday. This was clever. It compelled Togliatti, Tchervenkov, Pieck and other potential "Titos" to go on public record as the devout worshippers of the Red idol.

A few quotations from the heads of so-called independent states reveal their servility. "Mothers have taught their children to love Stalin, the great heart," reported French boss Thorez. "Never before has the history of mankind known such a leader," said Hungarian Bakosi. "He alone has..."

Mother Russia who liberated them. An extensive drive is on to make puppet peoples adopt Russian culture. Georgian dance teams are teaching Warsaw factory workers the Caucasian steps. Romania for the first time has translated books by Engels, Lenin and Stalin and is distributing them among the neo-

Hank Soar Should Do as Big League Umpire; Has Ample Confidence

Now that Red Jones has decided to promote beer instead of rhubarb, the American League is again looking to a New Englander to fill the void. Hank Soar cannot tell Southern dialect stories with Jones, but he has a brisk Pawtucket drawl, a superb athletic background, and enough self-assurance to sell dogsleds in Singapore.

"The first time I ever umpired was in a semipro game," said Soar, at the Braves-Red Sox matinee yesterday. "I didn't want to do it, but they talked me into it."

"How did you make out?"

"Okay. I didn't know anything about the rules, but neither did they."

Soar, unlike Red Jones, is not a warrior. He has taken so many knocks during an illustrious athletic career that he is now prepared to take on the American League and its 10,000,000 wolves, saying, "You may know where you are today in sports, but you don't know where you'll be tomorrow."

For example: Soar was assistant coach of football at Rhode Island State for three years. Now he is not assistant coach of football at Rhode Island State. Why?

"Because we had such a good season—0 and eight," said Soar. "I quit."

Pro Umpire for Only 4 Years

He spent his yesterdays starring in various sports for Pawtucket High, Providence College, the Boston Shamrocks, the New York Giants, and the New England League, but, if Tommy Connolly of Natick is right, Soar will spend his tomorrows umpiring in the American League.

"We've bought him on option, but he'll stay if he makes the grade this Spring," said the boss of umpires. "From what I've heard of Soar, and what I saw of him four days in Toledo last Summer, he'll make the grade."

Soar has umpired professionally only three years—1947, 1948, and part of 1949 in the New England League; from May 17, 1949, in the American Association.

His first game behind the plate in the Association found Maurice McDermott, Sox southpaw, pitching against Oddie Clark, former Sox righthander. McDermott won, 1-0, and Clark got fined \$50 for pushing the umpire.

"That was quite a game," reflected Soar. "McDermott throwing peas, Clark throwing balloons. I thought they were using different sized balls."

'Born 15 Years Too Soon'

Soar excelled as a back at Providence. He might have been All-America for a larger college.

"I was born 15 years too soon," he complained. "I missed the gravy, in college and as a pro. We'd get \$100 to \$200 a game. Now they get \$18,000 a season."

He most admires Tuffy Leemans, his old roommate, and Johnny Dell Isola, who as a center used to pass the ball with one hand while knocking down his opponent with the other.

Soar weighed 190 in college, 245 on leaving the Army, but now is down to 220 from "refereeing basket ball games eight nights a week." There is too much running now in basket ball, he says, speaking for himself.
