
Loras and St. Francis (Pa.) open the four night tourney at 7:45 tomorrow night with host Siena taking the floor at 9:15 to oppose Providence College.



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# Siena and Loras Win **Indians** Set **Two Records** In Armor

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Siena College, host team in the National Catholic Invitation Basketball Tournament, swamped Providence College, S6 to 49, and Loras of Dubuque, Iowa, nosed out St. Francis of Loretto, Pa., 59 to 58, in first round games in the Albany Armory last night as Ed. Lange of the Indians copped individual honors.

With one of the finest scoring exhibitions ever seen in the armory, Lange, a former Cathedral Academy player, paced the Lou-donville Indians to two scoring records. The 86 points represented a new high for the school, and for the tournament, eclipsing Loyola of Baltimore's total of 75 set last year in Denver.

Lange accounted for 25 of the points, just one short of the Siena record, getting 20 in the last half and 12 in the final four minutes as his mates fed him the ball.

# Siena Romps, 86-49;

Siena, Loras Take Openers

ALBANY, N. Y., March 29 (P)-Siena and Loras of Dubuque, Iowa, will meet in the semi-finals of the National Catholic Intercollegiate Basketball Tournament.

They scored first-round victories last night as the second annual tourney got underway.

tourney got underway. Two other opening round games will be played tonight. Creighton University of Omaha, Neb., topseeded in the eight-team event, meets St. Francis of Brooklyn and second-seeded Iona of New Rochelle, N. Y., is pitted against St. Michaels of Burlington, Vt.

Siena, steered by the 25-point performance of Ed Lange, swamped Providence College, 86-49. Loras edged St. Francis of Loretto, Pa., 59-58, in the opener.

Fourth-seeded Loras was paced by Jim McCabe, who netted 23 points. George Banchansky had 11 for St. Francis.

The Pennsylvanians took an early lead and maintained a 37-31 halftime advantage. During the second period, the score was knotted at 51, 53 and 55.

In racking up 86 points, thirdseeded Siena, the host team, cracked two scoring records. The Indians eclipsed their own team scoring mark of 79 and the previous tourney high. Loyola of Baltimore held the tournament record, 75 points, scored last year at Denver.

Winners of tonight's game will meet in the first semi-final tomorrow night. Siena and Loras are scheduled for the afterpiece. The final will be Saturday night. The eight teams in the National Catholic Basketball Tournament were feted yesterday at the Ten Eyck by the tournament committee at a luncheon at which Albany's mayor, Erastus Corning II, was a guest speaker.

The mayor extended the heartiest welcome to the teams and wished them the best of luck in Albany's new civic move.

"Although Siena is only 12 years old," said the mayor, "we Albanians are Siena grads. The school has found a place in the Capital District residents' hearts and minds and we feel proud that they will act as host team to the second annual NCIT.

We hope to see the tourney in Albany again and again and in years to follow."

The Rev. Father Mark Kennedy, OFM, president of Siena College, also extended a welcome to the visitors from Iona, New Rochelle, Creighton of Omaha, Loras of Dubuque, St. Francis of Pennsylvania, St. Francis of Brooklyn, Providence of Rhode Island and St. Michael's of Vermont.

The main speaker at the event was Walter Kennedy, National Basketball Association public relations manager, who commented on the national publicity the city was receiving for its work in presenting the tourney.

Tommy Thomas, who is promoting the NCIT, praised the people of Albany for their "kindness and aid in helping to put over the tournament."

"The big test is to see if Albany and the Capital District are basketball minded," he said. "If the fans turn out to see out-of-city teams play," Thomas added, "we will know that this city is the place for the annual affair."

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## Friars End Season With Tourney Loss

The Providence College Friars were knocked out of the National Catholic Intercollegiate Basketball tournament by the Sienna Indians in the quarter finals, at Albany, N. Y., 86-49. After convincingly defeating the Friars, Siena went on to win both its semi-final and final games, thus annexing the tourney championship.

It was the P. C.'ers misfortune to run into Siena on its hottest night of the season, a night on which most observers felt it could have given any team in the country a good game. Providence led for the first period, and managed to stay with the Indians until the final three minutes of the half, when they opened up a, 33-24, lead.

At the start of the second half the Indians, paced by Ed Lange and Wally Harrell, hit on four of their first five outside sets, and, in so doing, seemed to knock the zip out of the Friars. Thereafter, Sienna better known for its defense could do little wrong offensively and rolled 86 points, 53 in the second half, both season highs for them. Meanwhile, the Providence offense and defense wilted before the terrific pace set by the victors.

Jim Schlimm was high man for P. C. for the night with 15 points, making his season record 357 in 23 tilts. However, game scoring honors went to Siena's Ed Lange, whose 25 markers brought his four-year total to within 16 of the 1000 mark.

In two intra-squad games over the week-end, the team displayed speed, defensive alertness, and an ability to hit, as a team composed primarly of veterans scored a 9-2 win over a lineup sprinkled with sophomores on Saturday and as the sophs came back to reverse the tables on the vets, 10-1, on Sunday afternoon.

Main headaches for Coach Hal Martin right now are his battery positions. Hank Downey, on whom Hal was planniing to use as a replacement for Art, has been hospitalized by the recurrance of a neck injury, and is expected to be unavailable for an indefinite period. It may turn out that Weinstock will be called on to perform iron-man duty during the course of the long, packed schedule.

The biggest question mark on the team is the pitching staff, which unquestionably will decide the Friars success or failure this season. Southpaw Frank Higgins, a junior, appears at the moment to be top man on the staff. During practice sessions, he has been very fast and has displayed a remarkable assortment of stuff. His only trouble is a tendency toward wildness. Southpaw portsiders Bill Fagan and Billy McKeon have also shown a lot, Fagan being especially impressive in his mound stint in the first intra-squad tilt, retiring the nine men he faced, and requiring but 29 pitches to do so. Johnny Grimes and Joe DeStefano appear to have the inside track on the openings for right handers, although Al Becker, Jim Fox, and Dick Blanchard may have something to say about that.

At the keystone sack veteran Dick Maloney, first sacker last season and a second baseman the campaign before that, is having to content with sophomore Buzz Barry, an all-state selection while at Warren High, for Maloney is a the opening berth. smooth, experienced player, who has shown up well in both intra-squad tilts. Barry's main assets are his speed and his ability with the bat.

Veteran Ed Mooney, a junior, is having a difficult job retaining his starting berth at third. However, sophomore Georgie Ducharme, who has been doing such a hustling job before baskeballer Mooney reported, suffered a recurrence of an old shoulder injury which, it is feared, may remove him from the picture. Over plate, indicating that he has no intention of being relegated to the role of benchwarmer.

Hottest battle of all is being waged for the shortstop slot vacated by Walt Lozoski, whose teacher training schedule has made it impossible for him to report for the team. Skippy McGurkin, Lozoski's sub last year, is again out for the club, but is going to have his hands full attempting to win the starting berth from two up and coming sophomores who have their sights trained on the opening spot. Steve Sulavic, a star of last year's frosh nine, has been all over the field in the practice contests, on one occasion robbing Ed Mooney of a hit on a ball which seemed labeled for centerfield, on on aother occasion taking what seemed to be a sure-fire bingle from Dick Duignan. If Sulavic can maintain this pace, he stands an excellent chance of displacing Mc-Gurkin. The other soph who is in the thick of the fight for the position is Howie McGuiness, another former all-R. I. choice while at La Salle. Mc-Guiness' hitting has been especially resounding, and his fielding has been more than adequate. The choice between these three boys is really to be

a difficult one for Coach Martin to make.

The outfield is a wide open scramble, with three veterans and four sophomores all in the fight for the three openings. Best showing thus far has been made by Soph Dick Duignan, who is gunning for the center field post. Duignan has a couple of hits over the weekend, but the highlight of his play was his throwing, which was little short of spectacular. Jom Costello and Jim Sullivan, holdovers from last season's nine, are making strong bids for starting berths. Both have been hitting the ball solidly in batting sessions thus far Glen Russell and George Carroll, both members of last year's yearling squad have also looked good. Norm Dube, the left-handed slugger who is a first base candidate, may break into the outer garden if he fails to make the grade at first.

### National Cage Event for Albany Is a Good Thing

THE National Catholic Intercollegiate Invitation basketball tournament coming to Washington avenue armory a week from Tuesday may well become an annual affair for Albany, provided it gets proper support.

As I understand it, Tommy Thomas, Denver, Colo., newspaper man who originated the tourney idea, would be happy to make Algany its permanent home if the fans come out in large enough numbers to make it a financial success. I believe, the fans will de just that.

A national tournament would be a good thing for Albany, or any other city. It would bring in some of the finest basketball teams in the country, thus providing the fans with topnotch basketball at the fag end of the season. It also would mean much to Albany from a publicity standpoint, since results and stories on the event would be carried in most of the nation's newspapers.

THIS DEPARTMENT hopes ways and means can be found to keep it here. I know Siena officials, Rev. Maurus Fitzgerald, OFM, athletic director, and Coach Dan Cunha, are also desirous of making the tourney an annual event in Albany.

FATHER MAUBUS sees the day when Albany will have a municipal auditorium seatng upwards of 8,-000, and will be a stopover for doubleheader programs in addition to being a tournament site.

The Catholic tournament originated in Thomas' mind when he was overseas during the war as a Seabee. At the conclusion of the war, Thomas started to query colleges throughout the country, and the response was astounding. It seems that everyone wanted the tourney.

So last year when Thomas lined up his Denver meet, he wound up with 16 teams, but could have had 32, if he wanted.

FROM THIS corner, the coming tourney stacks up as a well rounded affair. True, there are some weak clubs, but then again, there are plenty of strong ones.

According to a member of one of the nation's top sports publications, Loras of Dubuque, Iowa, is rated the dark horse. Another expert likes Creighton, and still another picks Iowa. Area folk will back Siena. Probably the aforementioned quartet will be top seeded in the four-day affair.

### Schools to Compete In 8 Track Events At P.C. Saturday

High school events are the 60yard dash, 60-yard low hurdles, 300-yard run, 600-yard run, 1000yard run, and one, two and fourlap relays.





After a rather disastrous road trip, the Providence College varsity nine will open its home season against Upsala at Hendricken Field tomorrow afternoon. Frank Higgins, ace left hander of Coach Hal Martins riddled mound corps, will open the game for the Friars. Upsula is expected to counter with Roy Hunt, a right-hander who held the P. C.'ers to seven hits on the road trip. Saturday afternoon the Martinmen will play M.I.T. in their second home game of the year. Lefty Bill Fagan is scheduled to be the Friars' starting hurler.

Despite the three straight losses suffered on the trip, the team acquitted itself well, when it is taken into consideration that they had had little good weather for getting into condition, and that their opponents all had at least seven games under their belts before taking on the Friars. Coach Hal Martin is expected to stick to the same nine which started the three road tilts, with one exception. The lone lineup change will be at shortstop if Howie McGuiness' ailing arm has improved enough to enable him to play. Skip McGurkin who did very well at short while McGuiness was injured, is expected to move out to the left field post. Either Jim Costello or left-hander Norm Dube will open in right field depending on whether a right or left-hander starts on the mound for the invaders. The

Main weaknesses displayed while in New Jersey and Connecticut were exactly as had been expected before the campaign opened. They were lack of experience and a definite shortage of pitchers. In the opening game at Seton Hall, the Friars proved their own worst enemies as they committed nine errors allowing the winners to score seven unearned runs in their 10-5 triumph. Jim Schlimm, a surprise addition to the mound staff pitched fairly creditable ball over the last four innings.

Despite playing their best game of the trip the Friars dropped a 7-1 division to Upsala. Showing considerable all-around improvement, the Friar's inability to hit in the clutcn cost them the decision. They left thirteen runners stranded. The third game resulted in a 14-4 loss to Yale. In this tilt, the lack of experienced pitchers really hurt the P. C.'ers. While the defensive play and the pitching left much to be desired, the hitters held up their end, doing well in each game except the one with Yale. It is interesting to note that each team rated the Friars highly enough to toss their ace moundsmen against them. Skip McGurkin, Dick Maloney, Jim Costello, and Sam Nissel, all did well in the hitting department, while Jim Sullivan did well in handling the catching chores, an entirely new position to him.



In the annals of institutions of higher learning, there usually stands out above all others, a figure or character, who, throughout the years holds the reverence and honor of everyone concerned with the college. He may be an All-American football star, he may be a baseball player who made the big leagues, he may be a politician, he may be an organizer of some kind, he may be an athletic trainer.

The short history of Providence College has been a colorful one. And it has been long enough to provide us with a gentleman who exemplifies all the integrity and goodness imaginable. This gentleman has overwhelmingly captured the hearts of all connected with Providence College. This gentleman was a member of the Class of 1933, athletic trainer of all sports from 1933-1939—Malcolm Hollis Brown.

In the spring of 1939 the graduating class began to pack their luggage and bid farewell to Providence College, cherishing the memories of their school days. Among them was Mal Brown. Mal didn't go home, for P. C. was his home. He was hired by the athletic association to be the athletic trainer for all sports. Mal Brown was an outstanding halfback on Coach Archie Golembeski's football te a m and had experience with the tape and bandages.

While at Providence, Mal was the most popular man on the campus and undoubtedly one of the most hard-working. He paid his school expenses with part-time work. He became an inspiration to all who came to him for his friendly advice. As an undergraduate Mal was converted to Catholicism, and was an example of good conduct and righteousness to everyone.

Mal Brown was born in Amherst, Mass., in 1905. He was the greatest athlete in the history of the local high school. He matriculated at Connecticut State University in 1925 and spent two years there as a four sport athlete. When he came to Providence in 1927 he starred on the football team.

From 1927 till 1939 when he died, Mal Brown was Mr. Providence College. Wherever and whenever P. C. athletics were mentioned, the name of trainer Mal Brown inevitably came into the discussion. His was a name that never made the headlines, he was but the athletic trainer; it is the athletes who write the sport columns. But, however, no one could underestimate his importance as a member of the athletic association. His very presence in the locker room, his jovial laughter, his big black derby were all his trademarks.

His rubbing table was a conditioner in more ways than one. In addition to getting rid of their physical pains through him, the players found Mal in whom they could confide, a ready and sympathetic listener to all sorts of troubles dealing with love affairs, family squabbles, difficulties in the class room or athletes. There were several cases in his eight years of service where his few words of advice and encouragement prevented many an athlete from quitting under pressure to spur them on to greater achievement. Numerous athletes can tell the story that it was Mal whom they sought whenever their spirits were broken down. It was under this role that Mal accomplished the most good. It made him indirectly responsible for the success attained by Providence teams and those of several individual stars.

At the beginning of the football season in 1939, a typhoid epidemic

came complicated with an attack of bronchial pneumonia. He was moved to St. Joseph's Hospital for further diagnosis. The headlines in the COWL that day read: "Mal Brown Misses First Football Game in Ten Years." The entire student body was praying for his recovery. Coach Hughie Devore told his boys to win the Niagara University game (the following Saturday) for Mal Brown. And they did!

But the Almighty works in mysterious ways, and Mal Brown died. Despite the fact that four students were chosen to give blood for transfusions, Mal's day had come. The turnout to donate blood was tremendous, so one person from each of the four classes was accepted to serve. The sad headlines read: "Mal Brown, P.C. trainer, Succumbs to Fever". Hugh Devore asked his team to win another for Mal Brown-the A. I. C. game the following Saturday. The Friars won that contest by the largest score they racked up in four years, 27-0.

In one of the most impressive funerals ever seen in the city of Providence, Mal Brown was laid to rest. Friends came from near and far to view the body and to say a prayer for Mal, their friend. The procession from Harkins Hall to St. Pius Church was magnificent.

Hundreds upon hundreds of Mal Brown's friends were there to pay their last respects. The Very Rev. John J. Dillon, O.P., President of Providence College, sang the solemn high Mass. Spiritual bouquets were sent from everywhere. Many of Mal's distinguished friends throughout Rhode Island and elsewhere came to bid farewell to the popular athletic trainer. Among them were George "Birdie" Tebbetts, a school buddy of Brown's; John E. Farrell, former graduate manager of athletics; Dr. Daniel J. O'Neill, secretary-treasurer of the alumni asso ciation; Hank Soar of the New York Giants football team and now an American League umpire; and Rev. Paul J. Redmond, recent director of the Holy Name Journal.

Mal Brown had passed away but his beloved memory has lived on throughout the intervening years. Never have the "old timers" in the College forgotten his deeds and his influence on the life of Providence College. His life at P. C. began in 1927 as a lowly freshman, and after his graduation he was the athletic trainer. During the summer months he worked around the school, and especially on Hendricken Field where it was his task to convert the baseball diamond to a football gridiron each year. He toiled with the superintendent of maintenance, John Donnelly grooming and shaping up the beautiful campus that we have here today.

Today we look back eleven years in admiration to an institution at P. C. -the undying memory of Malcolm Hollis Brown. Our chaplain, the Rev. Charles McKenna, O.P., very aptly sums up Mal Brown's contribution .0 the college. He declares that Mal Brown was a fixture in school life. He was a "link" between student and faculty, between old alumni and new, and between alumni and the College. His memory will never pass from those who knew and loved him.



While browsing through some back issues of the COWL, we came across an interesting article in the Alumni News (The COWL, Friday, October 11, 1940.) The story was in a letter form written by George "Birdie" Tebbetts. On these dreary days when baseball is taking second place to the weather conditions, we feel that this account will somewhat liven up the interest in baseball here at the college.

While a student at P. C. George Tebbetts was the sports editor of the Alembic. In 1934 the Alembic was also the college newspaper as the Cowl was not founded till 1935. In 1940 when "Birdie" was the backstop for the Detroit Tigers, he turned literary again for his alumni friends at Providence College. The text of the letter is as follows:

#### Dear Fellow-Alumni:

No doubt you'll think I'm pretty nervy asking for the space allotted in the COWL for alumni news. However, it is the best possible way for me to contact all of you and express my sincere thanks for all the many inspirational and congratulatory telegrams sent me during the past week.

#### Recalls P. C. Days

Realizing full well that I'm lucky enough to be the first graduate of Providence College ever to play in a World Series I can't begin to tell you how happy I was to be in such a position. During the past six years I've "made most of the stops" as they say in baseball but let me inform you that I will never have more pleasant days than those spent in Providence as a member of the Class of 1934. My thoughts on innumerable occasions retrospect on those days as an undergraduate when the late Jack Flynn's word was law on the baseball team and Al "Gen." ("was that a foul, Ref.") McClellan was the charmer of the basketball tossers. Although I never went out for football due to baseball contracts I always admired Joe McGee and respected his football teams. Then, too, there was Johnny Farrell to whom I will always be indebted for the inspiration and guidance he afforded. Brown University's track team captured 12 firsts and swept all scoring places in five events in handing Providence College a 94½-to-39½ defeat in a dual meet yesterday afternoon at Brown Field. The victory was the Bruins' second in four meets.

The Brown freshmen made it a sweep by downing the Friar yearlings, 92-43.

Ray Leeth, Josh Tobey, and Gil Borjeson came up with double victories for the Bruins, Leeth winning the high and low hurdles, Josh the mile and two-mile, and Borjeson the shot and hammer.

The Bruins picked up the biggest part of their point margin in the field events wherein they outscored the Friars, 50½-to-11½. Brown's edge in the running events was 44-28.

The clean sweeps by Brown occurred in the hammer, broad jump, shot put, discus and two-mile. The Friars managed to gain three firstplaces, Jim Penler winning the 220, Bill Sherry the 880 and John Shanley the pole vault.

Sherry's triumph was one of the best of the day as he beat the Bruins' ace, Jon Tobey in the half-mile. Jon set the pace and stayed in front for a lap and a half. Sherry was running a close second and began to move up as they hit the 130-yard stretch run to the tape. He pulled even with Tobey with 100 yards to go but the Brown runner spurted and the two ran practically even for the next 60 yards.

Sherry finally overtook him 40 yards from home and crossed the finish line about two yards to the good. He was clocked in 1 minute, 59.2 seconds.

Josh Tobey had no trouble at all in chalking up his mile-two-mile double, winning both by at least 120 yards. In the mile, however, he really put out in an attempt to break the Brown Field record of 4:19.4 set 12 years ago. With the small crowd urging him on, Josh turned on a great sprint at the finish but the stop watch caught him in 4:20.8.



college baseball is, as they say around the race tracks, "on the improve." It was more heavily hit by the war than any of the other college sports, but it almost has recovered, they said. Organ-

ized baseball has been gobbling up the high school talent before it reaches the colleges, but now the rosters of the minor leagues are getting filled up and the colleges are beginning to get some of the stars, they pointed out.

"If you could get a big crowd of fans out once to see college baseball, most of them would be back, "Lefty said. "You hear people talking about how slow college baseball is played, how the games drag out. Well, I've got figures to prove that our games last season averaged only two hours, 10 minutes, which would be pretty good for a big league team these days."

"And you hear them talking about all the errors in college baseball," Martin chimed in. "But they go to a big league game and sometimes they see the same kind of errors, but they don't give up on the game because of that. Right now, I'm telling you, college baseball is pretty fair baseball to watch and it's going to be better."

#### No-Hitter ...

Oh yeah, I thought. What could you expect these guys to say? After all, they're not exactly disinterested observers, so far as college baseball is concerned. Still, maybe it wouldn't be a bad idea to step up to Hendricken Field and see just what kind of baseball the teams coached by Messrs. Lefebvre and Martin are putting out this year. So up I went yesterday, more or less fearing that I was in for a pretty dull afternoon in which the collegians would boot the ball around for some three hours while the rest of us dozed in the May sunlight.

So what happened? Well Brother Lefebvre came up with a sophomore pitcher named Fred Kopf who, at the end of the afternoon, had a no-hit game to his credit. Brown beat Providence College, 10-3, through Kopf's pitching and with the help of an infield that doesn't have to give anything to any of the Brown infields in the days when the game was at its peak. As for Providence College, it's largely a sophomore team, but none of the old Friars of baseball in the days of the college's diamond glory needs be ashamed of the way Coach Martin has it operating. If Martin had a top-flight pitcher on hand, that game yesterday might have turned into a really close battle. He has, I might add, some very promising pitchers on his Freshman team. No wonder he says college baseball is "going to be better."

#### "In Any League"...

In all, the handful of us at Hendricken Field yesterday saw some mighty interesting baseball, even if it hadn't been for the no-hit angle, in a game that was played in a commendable two hours and 15 minutes. Sure, there were boots, but there wasn't anything you really could call sloppy play. If Lefebvre and Martin had been of the wrestling fraternity, you would have thought they had staged the whole thing to back up their statements of the day before.

It was a game that had everything, including plenty of the old college try. Best of the tryers was Jimmy Sullivan, an infielder filling in at catch in a Friar shortage of backstoppers. Twice in one inning Sullivan crashed to the ground going after high twisting fouls in that Hendricken Field wind that does zany things to fouls. He snagged a third of the same variety in the same inning and got a hand that equaled the one Kopf received at game's end. While we were watching the Friars and Brown perform, portable radios in the stands were giving out with the disconcerting news that the best team in the American League wasn't having exactly a perfect afternoon.

In the Providence College locker room after the game, the radio still was carrying the news of Red Sox double woe. Beside it sat a usually cheerful young man, suddenly grown old and disillusioned. Dave Connors, the Friar publicity man and No. 1 Red Sox fan, was taking it hard.

Father Begley, the athletic director, Coach Martin, Pete Louthis, the trainer, and Larry Drew, the intramural sports head, joined your scribe in this work of mercy. After all, someone pointed out to Connors, he might do well to consider Vin Cuddy, the basketball coach. Cuddy had a heavy blow when the Yankees had to give up on Frank Shea, Cuddy's Naugatuck, Conn., neighbor, because Shea's arm wouldn't come back to shape. Then Walter Dropo, Vin's fellow alumnus from the University of Connecticut, had come up to the Red Sox and was doing well. So Cuddy went up to yesterday's doubleheader filled with a new interest in life. And now hadn't the radio just carried the news that Dropo had made an error? Yes, Connors might do well to think of Cuddy there in the stands and thus feel alone in his sorrow.

Just then, however, the voice on the radio was saying something about how the only thing to be said for these games, from the Red Sox standpoint, was that the Sox got a lot of bad baseball out of their systems.

Kindly men all, we still couldn't help pointing out to young Mr. Connors that it was a bad time to pick to get the bad baseball out of your system when you were playing two games with the team that loomed as your main opposition for the championship.

Accident Happens in Crash With Duignan of P.C. on Steal Attempt

Rhode Island State's baseball team outlucked Providence College in a ragged 10-inning game at Kingston yesterday, but in the process of gaining a 9-8 triumph, the Rams lost the services of third baseman Joe Mc-Elroy, one of the club's most consistent hitters.

McElroy suffered a fracture of the left forearm in the fourth inning when Dick Duignan, P.C. left fielder, crashed into him on an attempted steal of third base. McElroy was treated at the field by Dr. S. J. P. Turco, State College physician, who then ordered him removed to the South County Hospital. The State third sacker will play no more baseball for the Rams this season. Joe Gulizio replaced him at third.

The Rams finally wrapped up the game with one out in the 10th when Ray Mansolillo dropped a perfect sacrifice bunt with the bases loaded, scoring Ira Murphy from third base with the clincher. State had filled the sacks when relief pitcher Steve Sulavik of the Friars walked two men and hit another.

## **'Birdie'** Can't Recall Top Baseball Thrill

He's the last of the 1936 Tigers but he almost seems ageless. Birdie Tebbetts who was honored before the first

game of Sunday's double-header tried to remember some of the biggest thrills he has received in his 14 years in the majors, but finally gave up saying, "there weren't any, I guess. I've played a lot of games and had thrills in all of them so I couldn't honestly say which gave me my biggest thrill."


From the time that he was fuzz cheeked 21-year-old Kid recalled from Beaumont by the Tigers, Tebbetts has caught 1000 games in the majors. Sunday was the start towards the second thousand —his 1001th game. The one par-ticular game that stands out so clearly in his mind was one in which he did not play, but ore which was the turning point of his career.

It was in 1940 and the site was the Yankee Stadium when he sat hunched on the dugout steps. Bump Hadley was pitching for the Yankees and Mickey Cochrane was the batter. The count ran to three and one (Hadley remembers too.) and Cochrane leaned far over the plate, trying to work Hadley for the fourth ball. Hadley wound up, threw and Cochrane was hit on the right temple, he went down and was almost killed by the impact.

Tebbetts replaced Cochrane and since that time he has been a regular. The same year the Tigers went on to win the A. L. pennant. Despite the fact that he has been around the major leagues for 14 years, it was the only champion-ship team on which he played.

After he had taken his batting practice, Tebbets slouched in the dugout and reflected the fellows who were around the American League when he first joined the Tigers. There was Hank Green-berg, Charlie Gehringer; Marvin Owen, Elden Auker, Tommy Bridges, Schoolboy Row, et al. None are still left in the majors. 

Art Weinstock, basketball co-captain and leader of the baseball team this season, has another enviable record in P. C. sports in his collegiate









#### ATHLETIC COUNCIL ...

The newly organized Providence College Athletic Council held its first meeting of the 1950-51 season on October 8 for the purpose of discussing and completing the propositions and amendments of the recently completed constitution. In general, the object of the Athletic Council is to promote and regulate general athletic interests of the students with advisory powers on athletic policies, budgets, awards, and eligibility.

As was brought to the attention of the student body last spring, the Council consists of three alumni members, one of whom shall represent a territorial chapter, one student member, a Faculty representative, the Director of Athletics, and the President of the College who shall be an ex-officio member of the Council.

The Rev. Aloysius B. Begley, who is permanent chairman of the Council, released the following statements which should be valuable to the student body in athletic and health affairs at the College.

It is well to remember that the Council is consulted on problems of policy which pertain to the general athletic welfare of the student body, together with all matters affecting the athletic relations of the College. The Council has jurisdiction over any sport in which intercollegiate relationships are established and maintained and may formulate the rules under which it may be conducted.


Another important note that is being called to the attention of the student is the fact that no individual or organization may represent Providence College or any class thereof or use the name "Providence" or the nickname "Friars" in athletic competition unless authorized by the Council. Such authority may be withdrawn from the Council at any time.

The rules of eligibility shall be those of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Eastern College Athletic Conference. The above matters are the important ones as seen from the eyes of the student. Pertaining to the medical attention program of the College, these two factors should be kept in mind. Regulations governing injuries to members of athletic teams pertain also to injuries received in the intramural sport program. Secondly, the College will not assume responsibility for injuries received by students in non-supervised sports.

#### ODDS 'N ENDS . . .

Friday afternoon the varsity crosscountry team travels to Kingston for a dual meet with the Rams of Rhody. The newly organized varsity sport of cross-country has been given full recognition as an independent sport at the College by the Athletic Department and the Athletic Council. The climax of the current season will come on November 25 when the Friars will compete in the Eastern Catholic Conference Meet to be held on the Van Courtland Park course in New York.

Vin Cuddy has his hoopsters going in full swing. Soon the Friars will take their practice sessions at Mount Pleasant Gym where the home games are played. Coach Cuddy tries to get as much practice time on this court so that the players will be thoroughly familiar with its surroundings.

### No One Ever Taught Harry Coates To Lose

Every athlete and coach seeks good records, for good records usualy mean big opportunities for lucrative offers whether he seeks a job or scholarship. Harry Coates, whose track team record from Bloomfield High, New Jersey, in 1913 to Seton Hall Prep and College in 1945 would fill a pocket size sport encyclopedia, has apparently pulled off the converse of this statement.

Usually accustomed to find material and facilities awaiting him at the various institutions of his coaching career, Harry found a student body waiting to hear a pep talk and a field with fond football memories at Providence College. Appropriately enough, the Coates opening exhortation occurred on St. Patrick's day in 1948. Since then most of that multitude has been converted to the Coates enthusiasm and on those hollowed grounds where existed that gridiron spectre, there was erected an outdoor board

track to aid in spreading his doctrine.

The situation at Providence College presented a huge challenge to the integrity and ability of Coates.

However, Harry is one of those men whose zeal for their profession is strong enough to carry them against any type of adversity and difficulties where their ability for greatness can be tested to the fullest. Bill Veeck and Branch Rickey, baseball magnates, were the same type in their field. Their achievements at Cleveland and Brooklyn, respectively, proved they had a touch of business genius.

Harry sprinkled his ingenuity over the past half century at such places as St. Benedict's Prep, Mercersburg Academy, New York University, Villanova, as well as Seton Hall. At all these schools, he had an American championship either with a relay team or complete squad. Like most coaches, with varied travels, Harry has a soft spot in his heart for a particular locale. This appears to be Seton Hall Prep and College, site of some of his greatest accomplishments.

Harry Coates is an old-timer as far as coaching is concerned, having run on and coached a Seton team back in 1903 and he still has the youthful spark for victory. This latter fact he intends to inculcate at the College and from the increasing amount of pros-

pects flocking to the campus each year, it is felt that the time is not far off when the Friars will come up with a major triumph.

### Hoopster Mentor Faces Infamous Soph Jinx

The Yankees once had a rookie pitcher from Naugatuck, Conn., who helped the New Yorkers to win a pennant and a world series. Through this feat Frank Shea became known as the Naugatuck "Nugget." Until a better moniker can be discovered, we'll have to coin the same about basketball coach Vin Cuddy, who has become something of a 24-karat sparkler in his handling of the Friar cagers so far.

Cuddy although born in Waterbury came from Naugatuck by virtue of his school days at Naugatuck High where he was a three sport star. Like neighbor Shea, who did such a fine job in his first year of pro ball, Vin is credited as being a freshman gem through his yeoman coaching work with the '49 P. C. team which had a record of 146.

Cuddy now views this year's prospects with a conservative and confident attitude. New material has been added and the understanding between coach and team has been strengthened. All of which sets to prove that Vin has no doubts or fears about the mythical "sophomore jinx". A malady which is said to have upset Shea's playing career with the Yankees.

Another indication that Vin gives no heed to the so-called up-and-down seasons is the fact that he has been the winning type both as player and coach throughout his athletic career.

His four years as student and athlete at the University of Connecticut saw James "Vin" Cuddy become one of the few sportsmen in the UConn. history to earn nine varsity letters in three sports, football, basketball and baseball. He was also honored as being the outstanding athlete and citizen inthe class of '43 by the Connecticut Varsity Club.

His coaching record, since he entered that profession with the 82nd Airborne service team in Europe during the 45-46 season continues his tale of success. The 82nd was the Berlin champion with a record of 15-1. The only defeat was administered on their return to the states at the hands of a West Point squad with such luminaries

as Glen Davis and Hank Foldberg participating for the Army. After a stopoff at Columbia University for his master degree, Fort Trumbull was Cuddy's next assignment, a branch of the University of Connecticut. With a charge of a group of Freshmen and Sophomores, Vin turned in slates of 15-5 and 16-6 from 1947 to 1949.

Providence College has become his third base of operations and its hoped

that Harkins Hall will be no mere whistle stop in Cuddy's coaching sojourn. Some of his first season accomplishments, in addition to the excellent squad record, consisted in victories over Boston College and Rhode Island State. The 59-57 success against State was the first over the Rams in an eight year period. He climaxed the year with an invitation to the National Catholic Invitation Tourney at Albany.

## 46 Freshmen At First P.C. Hoop Practice


The Providence College freshman basketball squad reported yesterday to Coach Hal Martin for its initial practice. Forty-six answered the call.

Boston Red Sox wouldn't thank anyone who kept Birdie Tebbetts out too late on the night before the last game of the season with the New York Yankees.

So it would not be a late party, the old Friars agreed, but it would be a lively party when town and gown joined in honoring Birdie. He means a lot to baseball in New England in general and Providence in particular, does this Tebbetts, an old pro now hut still as full of the old college try as when he was catching for Jack Flynn's teams at Providence College in the early 30's.

#### 'Nice Going'

No they wouldn't have any difficulty getting a crowd together in Providence to say "nice going" to Birdie Tebbetts, the committee members knew. And now that they had their plans all set for the testimonial, there was a bit of time left for the old Friars to sit around and swap memories about Birdie's days on Hendricken Field. And about other days there, for there was plenty to talk about in that line in a gathering that included such old Friars as Joe McGee, Charley Reynolds, Ed McLaughlin, Eddle Cunton, Henry "Clinks" Dalton and Hal Martin.

"Just think of the material around Birdie's time," someone was saying. "Imagine two catchers like Ollie Roberge and Tebbetts on the same squad. Why, a lot of people thought at the time that Roberge might turn out to be better than Birdie."

"Yeah, Jack always seemed to be able to come up with a good catcher, starting with Johnny Halloran," said McGee, putting a plug in for the backstop of his own era, the guy who had caught Reynolds in the record 20-inning game with Brown.

"They seemed to be good every place in those days," Martin said. And there was a hungry note in his voice as the present Providence College coach thought back to the material that turned out on Hendricken Field in the old days.

Yes, the gathering agreed, that was so. And the thoughts of the group turned to pitchers like Eddie Wineapple and Lefty Collins, a first baseman like Joe Duffy, a third baseman of the late Heck Allen's stamp and the other stars that had performed for Jack Flynn.

### Doubling in Brass . . .

"You know," someone said, "a guy who was a pretty fair college pitcher just left the room. Eddie Quinton, I mean. You remember he had that orchestra while he was in college. Well, he'd come out to the field with his eyes half closed from staying up to all hours playing the saxaphone. And he'd go out on the mound and pitch a swell game. Seemed to save some of his best ones, too, for Aldrich Field when we were playing Brown,"

"Hey, don't forget he was quite a hitter for a pitcher, too." big Joe McAndrew broke in. "I saw him hit one of the longest homers ever hit on Aldrich Field. Right over the lacrosse field, it went. I don't know whether it was longer, though, then the one Chief Marsella hit the time he beat Brown. That one was a dandy, too.

"But, say, about Lefty Collins. Joe McHenry tells me Collins now is coaching for Toronto. That is, he came there as a coach, but he has been filling in at first base and in the outfield. I didn't know Lefty was with Toronto, but I'm not surprised to hear it. Toronto's in the Phillies chain. Well, almost everytime I've seen Eddie Sawyer in the past he's told me what a swell guy Lefty Collins is. So now Lefty's with a Philly affiliate. I wouldn't be surprised someday to see Collins up there with Sawyer in Philadelphia. Then we'd have two of them in the big show, Collins and Birdie."

#### What He'd Like . . .

That, fittingly enough, brought the talk around to Tebbetts again as the gathering broke up. So they were talking about the skill and the hustle Birdie showed from the first time he stepped onto Hendricken Field as a kid from Nashua. And they were talking about the reputation he has made for himself in the big leagues, both as a competitor and a handler of pitchers. But it was a remark made earlier in the evening that really showed why this group of old Friars wanted to make this testimonial to Birdie Tebbetts something that would be remembered for a long time. The remark came when they were discussing a gift to be presented to Tebbetts at the dinner.

"Oh, sure," Charley Reynolds said, "we're going to follow custom and give Birdie a present, the best we can afford. But knowing the guy, you know what would please him most. Just a long piece of paper and on it the signatures of everyone in the gang that was there."

## What a Question

"That would be the signal for the Gen to put on one of his best shows. 'Can he play football?' he would ask as if there was not need to bring up such a question. 'Why, you should see this boy on the football field.'

"And then we'd see them, in the fall. For the first few days, Gen's basketball players would be passing and catching passes like a bunch of Friedmans and Oosterbaans. They'd give you marvelous exhibitions, that is, until the first scrimmage. Then the little Class C guards would begin knocking the basketball players around. Of course, once in a while you did get a work-horse like big Leo Davin, who was a tough \* man in both sports, but most of the time the basketball players were strictly basketball players. So they'd have a rough time, getting bounced around, and the General would have some worried moments on the sidelines. But then you'd have to cut them from the squad and the General would breath a sigh of relief. His material was safe and he could start building another of those crack basketball teams of his."


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## Friars Card 22 Contests In Basketball

Although Dick Johnson led the pack to the finish, the Providence College varsity was defeated by an improved Rhode Island State College team in a cross-country run at Kingston last Friday afternoon, 23-32.

The P. C. freshmen more than evened matters by solidly trouncing the Ramlets with a perfect score of 15 to 40. This was probably the first time in the known history of track at R. I. that a yearling squad was beaten, without placing one man in the first five finishers, by another college freshman team in cross-country.

The Friar contingent was led by members of last year's freshman team, namely: Johnson, Jim Gannon, Herb Waters. Johnson's winning time over the four mile course was 21 minutes and 9 seconds—a time good enough to give him a better than 20 yard lead at the finish.

The very fact that the Rams got in the "firstest with the mostest" in the name of Ray Lister, Rocco Negris, Al Ash and Larry McLay proved too much for the Friars.

P.C.'s fourth and fifth men were Bill Sherry and John McMullen who placed eighth and tenth respectively.

All is not dark and dismal however. It must be remembered that this is the first real intercollegiate competition for the Providence varsity, that the meet was run in foreign country and that this team shows a very decided improvement over last year's efforts.

It was an entirely different matter with the freshmen who made it three victories in a row as they crushed the State yearlings, 15 to 40.

Bill Newman, Omer Thibodeau, Chris Lohner, Bill Hennigan and Gerry Absi all placed first as they linked hands at the finish.

The Ramlet's leader, Micherony, must have been somewhat frustrated when only a week before, he had led his team to victory over the freshmen of Harvard and Holy Cross at Franklin Park, Boston, as he was the first individual across the finish line and now beaten on his home course by five men. This team showed even greater possibilities in that it now has a fifth man in Absi and is coming up with another prospect in the person of Tom Farrell.

The 2¼ mile freshman race was won by the Friar five in the good time of 12 minutes and 45 seconds.

Next event for the yearlings will be with Pawtucket East High, October 30. at Hendricken Field.

# Hendricken Field Stands In Silent Athletic Tribute

Dedicated And First Used On Armistice Day 1922 Caral 10-31-50

Just what makes an athletic field? What gives it a meaning or significance over and above the fact that it is a name given to a plot of earth surrounded by an iron fence containing football stands, a baseball backstop, a flagpole and a pile of lumber neatly packed beneath the stands.

Any Notre Dame grad or Army alumnus would, without fluttering an eyelash, talk about the glorious gridiron history of their respective stadiums at South Bend and West Point, emblazioned as they are with the names ano feats of Gipp, Rockne, Four Horsemen, Sagle, Blaik, Blanchard, Davis, etc.

The answer, then, to our initial question would probably be found in the past, or what is commonly called tradition. Tradition bursting with color and spirit of great personnel, with oddities, with bits of dramatics, and with those funny twists of fate that have turned a hopeless cause into a surprising success or seeming victory into a heart-breaking defeat. Best reponse seems to come from those inlividuals who either as spectators or participants formed a part of that tradition as it unfolded on the field.

It has been precisely in this way, though modest as it may seem to some, that Hendricken Field has served the athletic history of Providence College for the past 28 years. In 11 days, Armistice Day exactly, we will close in on that 28th anniversary. There are no athletic events or ceremonies planned to celebrate that event, as was the case on that first Saturday when the field was officially dedicated to the late Bishop Thomas Hendricken, first leader of the Providence Diocese and followed by the Boston University-Providence College football game.

Mickey "Black Mike" Cochrane, baseball catching immortal, was the first of those premier players. Halfback Hike was a Terrier terror against P. C. that opening day when he led his mates to a 7-0 conquest.

The 1922 season was P. C.'s first varsity football year, but about this time, baseball also had come to be a regular part of the school's sports activities. Events have proved since that the latter sport has provided Hendricken with as large a share of color and personalities as has been seen on any college athletic field.

13-7, and took, as well, its one and only state collegiate football crown. One of the men instrumental in the home forces success was Hank Soar who scored all thirteen points for Providence College.

Incidentally, this State game which took place on November 16th, also marks the dedication of the new Hendricken Field following the construction of especially made steel stands and a scoreboard.

Names linked with dramatics also formed an integral part of the field's history when ever such fellows as Brown and Connors are mentioned.

Perhaps the most beloved figure ever to trod over Hendricken's ground was Malcolm Hollis Brown, player and trainer between 1927 and '39. His sudden illness and death in '39 from pneumonia, caused the P. C. gridders of that season to repeat the famous "one for the Gipper" game of Knute Rockne at Notre Dame, about a dozen years before. Providence College made it two for Brown with inspired victories over a strong Niagara team and American International College. Maybe that incentive to win can also be attributed to the fact that the Fiar coach of that year was Huge Devore. Hughie, a former captain and all-America end for the "Fighting Irish," had once played under Rockne and had transmitted much of the same

spirit forstered by the "Rock" into the "Fighting Friars."

A similar occurrence had taken place in 1928 when death claimed the previous year's varsity captain, Chuck Connors, a 145 lb. center with a calling card of "dynamite." During the halves of the Manhattan College game a bronze placque was dedicated in Chuck's honor at the flagpole on Hendricken. P. C. followed this up with a surprise win over the Jaspers, climaxing their tribute in the ideal college spirit.

Football, in its short twenty year existence at the college, without a doubt had played an outstanding role adding stature and color to Hendricken. Many students today look forlornly at Hendricken with the dream that some day the gridiron corpe will be revived. But, Hendricken had never been completely suitable for varsity football play as can be seen by the fact that the major part of the team's schedule was played at Cranston Stadium or La Salle Field. Regardless of this, the men who dug their cleats in Hendricken performed with a brilliance and spirit that can be found in any major college tradition. All-time greats such as Charlie Join, Charlie Burdge, Bill Kutneski, Joe Wright, Mickey Forster, Charlie O'Keefe and Joe McGee, along with Gig Pariseau, Soar, Jack Triggs and scores of others spread over those two decades a lasting impression in the history of Hendricken regardless of whether football is resumed at the College.

The late Jack Flynn, baseball coach from the middle twenties to the middle thirties, deserves prime mention as an immortal of P. C. baseball in the breath that Rockne is known to Notre Dame football. Flynn brought P. C. to the rank of a national baseball power with Eastern Intercollegiate champions in '28, '31 and '32. Following him were in personality as well

Names make news and personalities make stories. In this respect, Hendricken turf has been carpeted with a rich mixture of both. For instance, Joe McGee was a fairly big name as first captain of the Friar gridders in 1922, but he became a key figure and personality 13 years later when, on the same field, he scored another first, In 1935, his second year as head coach, the same McGee sent one of the greatest group of football players ever to represent P. C. out on the field to meet a highly touted R. I. State eleven, fresh from a sensational victory over Brown. The Friars defeated Frank Keaney's Rams,

as the tradition he initiated Jack Egan and Arthur Quirk.


All the players who performed for these men though diverse in ability and quality were equal in the competitive and cooperate spirit so necessary on the diamond. Men such as Charlee Burdge, Charlie Reynolds, "Chief" Marsella, Lee Marion, "Lefty" Collins, "Birdie" Tebbits, "Slip" Bannini, Mike Keenan, Larry DePalma, Cy Killian, and Al Roberge, like their football brethren, form but a small part in P. C. baseball past.

A couple of notable events took place on Hendricken when the Fiars played pre-season exhibition games with the Boston Red Sox. One year Jimmy Foxx, playing on the Bosox squad, walloped a couple of homers over the leftfield fence that carried more than 420 feet. Another time, after Shano Collins, manager of the Sox, had left the field early seeing be extinguished.

his team holding a commanding lead over P. C., the Friars came up with a ninth inning rally to beat the Sox. Lee Marion on another occasion hit two homers and missed a third off Joe Mulligan, one of Boston's better pitchers.

One of the finest personalities in the spike shoe coaching profession, Harry Coates has been the central figure of the college's track success at the present. That pile of lumber under the stands knitted together on Hendricken has beome the site for greatness.

Proof can also be found that not merely athletics have contributed to glory of Hendricken, but the part played by the student body as well In 1935, when the new field was dedicated, a group from the college known as the Friars Club bought the football scoreboard through money raised by selling programs. With spirit like that, sports on Hendricken will never be extinguished.



With Dick "Pop" Johnson showing his heels all the way, as has been his custom in all of the Friars' dual meets this season, the Providence College cross-country team upset the Brown University harriers, 21-37, yesterday afternoon over the P.C. course.

Johnson covered the 4.3-mile course in 22 minutes, 55 seconds in leading the Bruins' ace, Walt Molineux, across the finish line by about 100 yards. The former La Salle Academy runner's triumph thus avenged the four-yard setback Molineux had pinned on him in their freshman duel a year ago.

The victory was the Friars' first over a Rhode Island collegiate opponent and the second overall since Coach Harry Coates organized the sport at P.C. three years ago. The meet closed out the Friars' dual season with two victories and three defeats.

Johnson sprinted into the lead at the start and opened up a lead of about 20 yards after one turn around Hendricken Field. Molineux began moving up from the middle of the pack and drew up 20 yards behind Johnson shortly before the mile mark. The P.C. runner, who has not lost a race this season, stretched his lead to 60 yards at the end of the first leg and to 100 going into the finale.

Molineux tried to move up on the. last leg, but the easily running Johnson never altered his stride and maintained his comfortable margin to the finish.

Bill Sherry took third place and John McMullen fourth, but driving finishes by Jim Gannon and Herb Waters, who were sixth and seventh, respectively, actually clinched the victory for the Friars. Gannon and Waters turned in their best performances of the season and proved to be the "sleepers" that deprived the Bruins of vital points. Brown was weakened somewhat by the absence of Harry Wood, one of the team's top runners, who was occupied by a laboratory class. Coach Ivan Fuqua declared that

"ON PAPER," Harry Coates said, "we don't stand a chance. Of course, we don't run them on paper. We run them on sand and gravel, on weeds and grass, on macadam. Sometimes we run them on cement, the way it happened at Worcester after I had trained the squad on that nice grass in Roger Williams

Park, thinking that's what the Holy Cross course would be like. But anyway today it'll be a near miracle if we win."

The Providence College track coach was talking about the varsity cross country meet with Brown, not the freshman meet. It was generally conceded the Friar first-year men would win their end of the double. They were undefeated and had specialized in perfect scores, shoving five men over the finish line before the opposition could get a place. With those freshmen coming up to the varsity next

year, everyone was saying, Pop Johnson, the present varsity ace and still only a sophomore, would be getting some real help. A big year in cross-country for the Friars, it would be, in 1951.

"That Johnson," Coates said, as he taked about his little prize package, "some boy, isn't he? I think he'll make it five straight today, all right, but after him, what? I don't know. Maybe some of these other kids will give a little bit more today. I've tried to get them up for it. But then maybe I'm just butting my head against a stone wall. You can't get kids to give all that cross-country demands if they haven't the temperament for it.

### "What Next, Coach?"

"Yes, like marathon running, you need the temperament. You heard of that marathon champ I coached, Frank Zuna. I'll give you an idea what his temperament was like. We go to a meet and he runs the two-mile and wins it. Then he says to me: 'What next, coach?' I tell him: 'Over the mountains.' That means a 20-mile road run. So he wins that and when he comes back what do you think he says? Just: 'What next, coach?' Gus Desch, the Notre Dame track and football star, was with us and he nearly fainted when he heard that.... Well, anyway, let's go and get this meet started."

He started it himself, lining up the Brown and P.C. freshmen in one corner of Hendricken Field and sending them off for a two-lap trek over the Friar course, one lap of which is roughly a mile and a third. First time he said: "Go," he followed it immediately with "Come back here!" One of his own runners had beaten the gun, or to be exact, the word. The second time they were away nicely.

The finish was just about as expected. Six of the lads in black jerseys with the white "Providence" on the chest came jogging in through the River Avenue gate and over the finish line before a Brown runner made it. The six Friar placers in order were Chris Lohner, Bill Newman, Bill Hennigan, Omer Thibodeau, Geraldo Absi and Tom Farrell. Lohner finished so fresh he was able to stand by and shout out advice as the others came in. The score, 15-49, and another perfect meet for the P.C. class of 1954.

### Compact Little Man . . .

Now came the three-lap varsity race in which, as Coates had said, it would be a near miracle if the Friars won. On weeds, on grass, on gravel or macadam—and there's all of that on the Friar course—this is a good team Ivan Fuqua has built at Brown. It had lost only to Yale and had scored a one-point victory over Rhode Island State, the first for Brown over the Rams in 20 years. The Friars had won only one in four starts. So there wasn't much speculation about the outcome of the meet, but much about the individual battle between Johnson and Brown's ace, Walt Molineux. Would the lanky Molineux be able to break the winning string stretched out by the compact little Friar with the upper structure of a featherweight, the thighs and lower legs of a welterweight, the heart of a champion?

Well, Molineux couldn't make it and Johnson, for the fifth meet of the season, was the first man across the line. Johnson ran a pretty race. I know, because I followed him around the course. I hasten to add that the following was done by automobile, courtesy of Jake Powell, first captain of track at P.C. and now dividing his time between teaching at La Salle and assisting Coates with the Friar coaching.

Johnson ran well within himself all the way, never breaking stride, never seeming to change his pace, even when they told him Molineux was making a spurt from 80 yards back as they hit Eaton Street for the third time. The hill on River Avenue killed off the Brown runner's spurt, however, and Johnson won by the length of the old gridiron on Hendricken Field. He was sitting down and taking off the mittens he wears running when Molineux crossed the line.

### "That Little Bit More" ....

So Johnson had the day's individual honors, and now it remained to see how much of a margin Brown would have in the team tally. Then the upset began to happen. Third man in wasn't wearing a Brown jersey. Surprisingly, it was the Friars' Bill Sherry. Then came John McMullen, also a Friar. Fifth was Brown's Charley Standish. And then, wonder of wonders, Jim Gannon in the black of P.C. crossed the line. Gannon had seemed beat up and about ready to fold early in the third lap. Friar Herb Waters came next and that was it. Johnson had won as expected, but the rest of the team had given Coates that little bit more which made the near miracle happen. Providence College had beaten Brown, 21-37, in cross-country, an achievement equal to that which Vin Cuddy's basketball Friars pulled early last season when they upset Rhode Island State.

"Talk about the roof falling in," Fuqua said, as he shook his head.

He had been positive of winning. He had, in fact, left Harry Wood, one of his best runners, over at Brown to make up time on classes he had been missing. But Wood's presence, while it might have affected the score, wouldn't have changed the outcome, he said. It was the Friars' day.

It was Harry Coates' day, too. He has had many of them, of course, in his long years of coaching on the national scene, at Seton Hall and elsewhere. So the grey-haired, ruddy-complexioned gent, who can quote you Shakespeare and track records with equal facility, was able to take this one with an outward show of calm as he walked off with Fuqua to console him in his hour of upset. Yes, Coates has had many an hour of triumph, but he knows about defeat, too, particularly of late, while trying to get track established on a solid basis at P.C. And now, though he wasn't making much of a fuss about this victory, you knew that one of the most rewarding experiences in Harry Coates' long years in track came on Hendricken Field the day the "kids gave him a little bit more."
