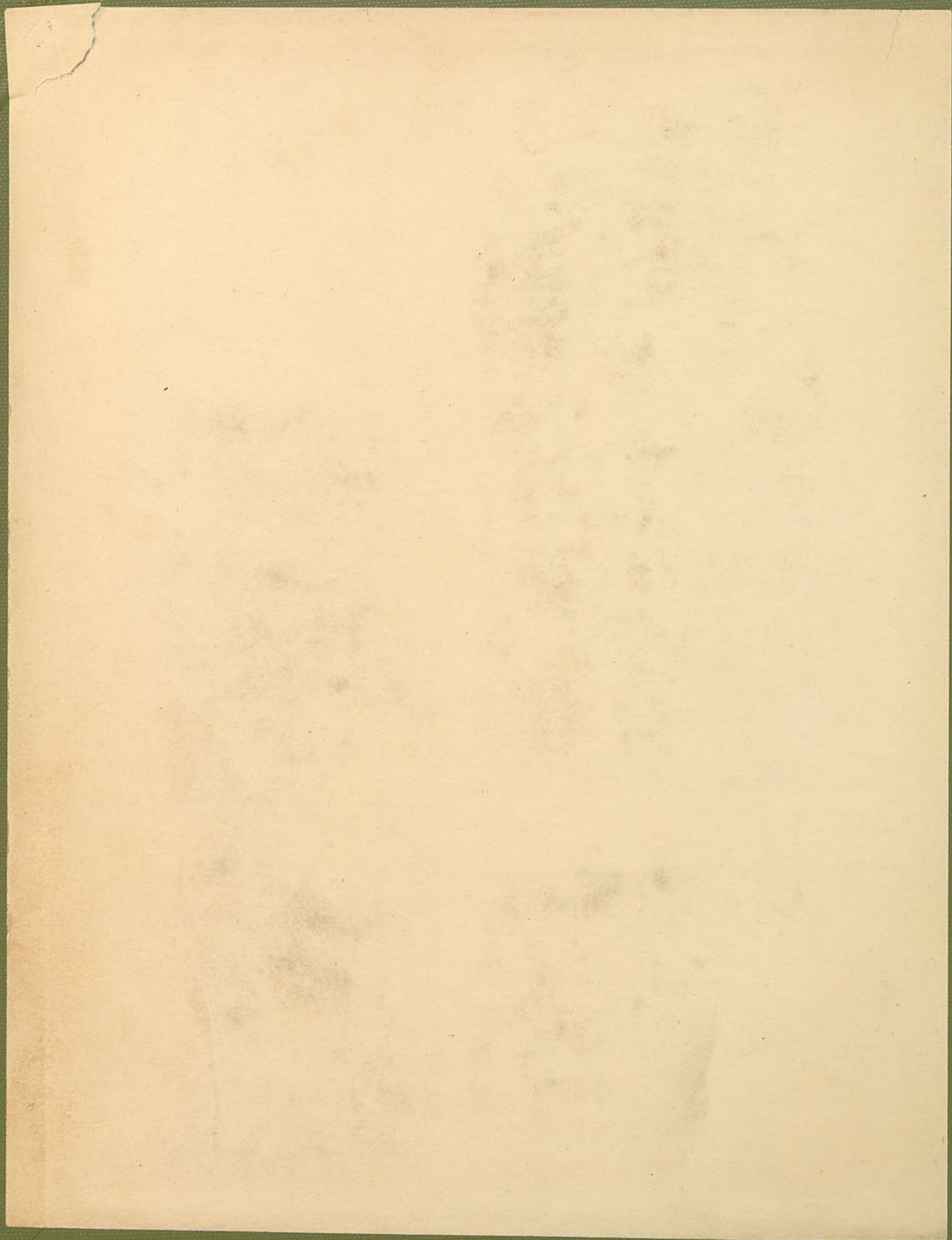

192 RACING TODAY FOR HARRIER TITLE

P.C.'s Johnson, State's Lister
and Brown's Molineaux
Among Favorites

Boston, Nov. 12—(AP)—Rhode Island State's iron grip on the New England ICAAA cross-country championship is expected to be broken tomorrow when 192 runners from 20 colleges compete in the 38th annual race at Franklin Park.

Fifteen of the member colleges also have entered 168 contestants in the freshman race which will start at 1 p.m. The varsity race will start immediately after the frosh run.

Connecticut's Bruno Giordano, fourth a year ago and first man home in last week's Connecticut Valley championships, is favored to win individual honors, now that Rhode Island State's Bob Black has been graduated.

Black won the last four years and paced his mates to a team title each time.

Since 1934, Rhode Island's Rams have won 11 team titles. Maine has captured a pair and Massachusetts Institute of Technology has been victor once.

Undefeated Vermont, Connecticut Valley champion, is one of seven

teams considered capable of winning this virtually unpredictable meet.

The others are Brown, Providence College, Springfield, Connecticut, Maine and Boston University.

Eight harriers from as many colleges are given a chance to beat out Giordano, only repeater from last year's first 10 finishers.

They are: Rhode Island's Ray Lister, Dick "Pop" Johnson of Providence, Dick Zeleny, Worcester Tech's only entrant; Brown's Walt Molineaux; Ross Mahoney of Vermont, who was runnerup to Giordano in the Connecticut Valley championships; Maine's Dick Dow, Dick Fitzgerald of BU and Bill Nicholson of M.I.T.

The record of 20 minutes, 38 4-5 seconds set by Bob Nichols of R.I. State in 1941, for the four and one quarter miles is considered "safe" by most observers.

Boston University's John Kelley is a hot favorite to win the freshman event over a three-and-a-quarter-mile course.

He formerly ran for Bulkeley High School of New London and won the national interscholastic mile title in 4:21.8 and was a New England schoolboy mile and cross-country champion. He won the Joe Nutter Memorial mile at the Brown Interscholastics last spring.

Dick Ollen of Northeastern, undefeated in dual competition and a former schoolboy 1000-yard champion from Cranston, R.I., is one of several who might defeat Kelley.

Any team and anyone is con- at various times this year, and ceded a chance to capture honors by margins substantial enough to prove he could repeat. in the New England intercollegiate cross-country championships at Franklin Park Monday. A record entry of 20 colleges will go after Rhode Island State's team crown, while 192 runners will be shooting for Bob Black's vacated throne.

Actually, the team victor will probably emerge from Brown, Providence College, Vermont, Springfield, Connecticut, Maine and Boston University, with Rhody a dim outside choice.

GIORDANO LONE FIRST-10 RETURNEE

Individually, only Bruno Giordano of Connecticut, who finished fourth last year, is back from the first 10 of 1949. Giordano will have to contend with Providence's Dick "Pop" Johnson, Rhode Island's Ray Lister, Dick Zeleny of Worcester Tech, and a handful of other swifties for individual laurels.

Providence College, developing rapidly under Coach Harry Coates, may surprise in the 4 1/4-mile varsity grind, and is co-favored with Northeastern in the 3 1/4-mile freshman run. The Friars' Johnson has beaten most of New England's best runners

Rhode Island, which has turned the New Englands into its personal property for the past decade, has four good men, headed by Lister, but lacks the fifth for a tea triumph.

Vermont, which never has contended strongly in the past, is rated the best in 22 years by Coach Archie Post. Vermont scored an impressive victory over Coast Guard, Springfield, Massachusetts and Connecticut in the Connecticut Valley championships last week.

Boston University, headed by Bob Foley and Dick Fitzgerald, has a balanced squad, but neither M. I. T. nor Tufts have team title aspirations. The Engineers have an individual favorite in Bill Nicholson, however.

The freshman race is equally unpredictable, with Johnny Kelley of Boston University, battling a starry field that includes Dick Olsen of Northeastern, Al Carlson of New Hampshire and Harry Aldrich of Massachusetts. Tufts, Providence, Brown and Rhode Island may surprise the team co-favorites here.

R.I. State Finishes Tenth; P.C. Frosh Tie for First

Harry Wood Fourth in Varsity

Test; Molineux Is Seventh;

Johnson of P.C. 13th

Boston, Nov. 13.—Brown University's cross-country representatives captured the first team championship in the school's history in today's 38th annual New England Intercollegiate at Franklin Park. In the freshman race, Providence College gained a tie with Boston University for first place at 98 points apiece.

The Bruins earned team laurels with 98 points while dethroning R.I. State, which had won the honor nine times in the last 10 years. The Rams finished 10th today with 256.

Bruno Giordano, 21-year-old University of Connecticut senior, finished first in the field of 114 runners, covering the 4¼-mile course in 21 minutes, 27 seconds. The triumph preserved the Uconn runner's unbeaten record this season and brought his string of successes to eight.

Giordano took the lead at the quarter-mile mark and thereafter his only serious challenges came from Rhode Island runners. For the next mile and a half Dick Johnson of Providence College and Dick Fitzgerald, the former Mount Pleasant High star now running for Boston University, stayed right at his heels. Then Ray Lister of R.I. State and Harry Wood of Brown began moving up.

The P.C. Freshmen, who had been heavily favored to take the team title, lost their chance when Chris Lohner, their No. 1 man, suffered stomach cramps and was forced to drop out about a half-mile from the finish. He was running about ninth when he was stricken.

Bill Newman paced the Friar yearlings by taking fourth. The other scorers were Bill Hennigan, ninth; Omer Thibodeau, 14th; Tom Farrell, 26th; and Gerardo Absi, 45th.

Brown Team First In N.E. Run; P.C. Frosh Tie for Top

Boston, Nov. 14.—Brown University's cross-country representatives captured the first team championship in the school's history in yesterday's 38th annual New England Intercollegiate at Franklin Park. In the freshman race, Providence College gained a tie with Boston University for first place at 98 points apiece.

The Bruins earned team laurels with 98 points while dethroning R.I. State, which had won the honor nine times in the last 10 years. The Rams finished 10th today with 256.

For the next mile and a half Dick Johnson of Providence College and Dick Fitzgerald, the former Mount Pleasant High star now running for Boston University, stayed right at his heels. Then Ray Lister of R.I. State and Harry Wood of Brown began moving up.

The P.C. Freshmen, who had been heavily favored to take the team title, lost their chance when Chris Lohner, their No. 1 man, suffered stomach cramps and was forced to drop out about a half-mile from the finish. He was running about ninth when he was stricken.

Bill Newman paced the Friar yearlings by taking fourth. The other scorers were Bill Hennigan, ninth; Omer Thibodeau, 14th; Tom Farrell, 26th; and Gerardo Absi, 45th.

Friar Freshman Harriers To Compete in N.Y. Today

The Friars have an all-veteran team this season and are favored to take the Greyhounds into camp in the opener. However, the Worcester collegians were fairly impressive in beating Fitchburg State Teachers, 80 to 71, and have several capable scorers.

In an effort to bring his club along faster, Coach Cuddy arranged scrimmages with Connecticut, Harvard and Tufts. Until the Tufts engagement this week the Friars hadn't shown too much against collegiate opposition. They did very well in their last outing against the Jumbos, passing and cutting with much more dexterity than they had shown previously.

On Their Way

Coach Cuddy was pleased with the team's play against Tufts, which had one of the best teams in New England last year and has much of the same personnel. The Friars' defense hasn't been what it should be, according to the P.C. coach, but the team has come a long way in the scoring department.

The Friars have three captains this season for the first time in their basketball history. They are Ray Garcia from Newport, Sam Nissel from St. Mary's, Pa., and Fran Pelligrino of Westerly. Garcia has been the most impressive player in the P.C. workouts. Shifted from forward to guard this season, Garcia seems to be more at ease and handling himself better than he did in the forecourt.

Providence's scoring revolves around Slim Jim Schlimm, the

southpaw bucket man who established a new Friar scoring record last season when he tallied 357 points in 23 games. He broke Ted McConnon's mark. Schlimm starts at forward but shifts with Pelligrino once the action gets underway. Jim has been hot and cold in the drills but he is one of the best shooters the Friars ever had and that covers a lot of territory and includes Gus Hagstrom, Ed Wineapple, Johnny Krieger and others.

Assumption, coached by George Sherry, who is starting his fifth season with the Greyhounds, includes Roland L'Etoile of Central Falls. L'Etoile, who played at Sacred Heart Academy, scored 19 points in the Assumption opener, while holdover Rene Viau tallied 21. Other starters include Don Lemenager, Roger Pontbriand and Marcel St. Saveur. Pontbriand's size is a big factor.

The Friars, who had a 14-and-9 record last season, including a bid to the National Catholic tourney, have more depth this season. They have lost Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock at the guards but have made up in speed in other positions. However, Lozoski was a heady team player and his guiding hand could help a club like this.

Ray Korbusieski pairs up Garcia at the guards, Schlimm at center and Pelly and Nissel at the forwards in the Friars' starting lineup. Jerry Lembo is much improved and will see considerable service at guard. Bob Pendergast, 6-foot-4 sophomore, is the big man the Friars have been looking for over several seasons.

Hopeful

Other members of the squad who'll break in from time to time include sophomore Johnny Power, who has good basketball sense; Ronnie Gagnon, Ed Mooney, Tom Bauer, Skip McGurkin, Al Becker, Oscar Ponton (6-foot-8 center replacement); Joe DeStefano and Hockey Power, Johnny's brother.

Coach Cuddy says, "I hope we can do as well this year as we did last. We play 11 games in Providence but only eight of them on our home court at Mount Pleasant High. Some of the teams will be tougher this year, but our kids are hustling and we'll win our share."

Eagles Tough at Home

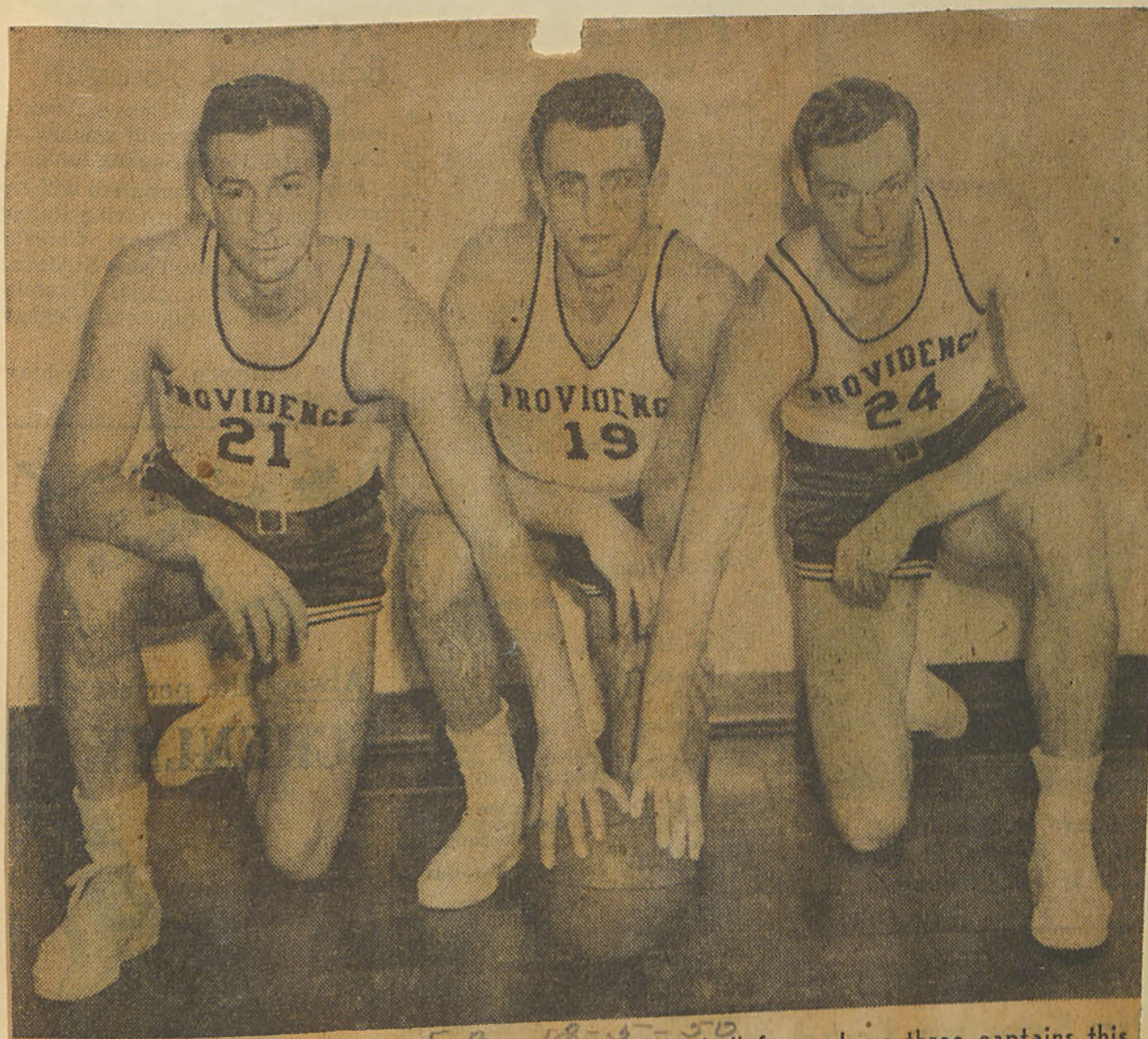

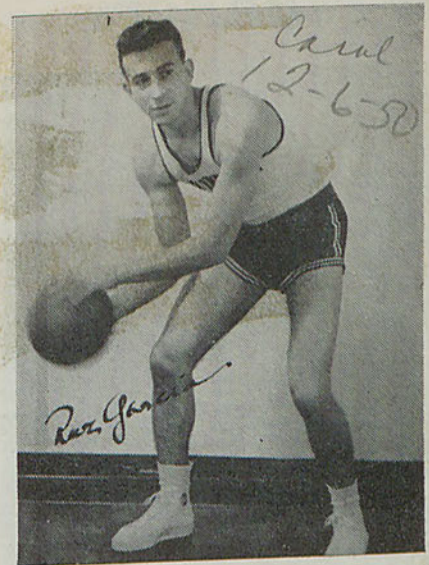
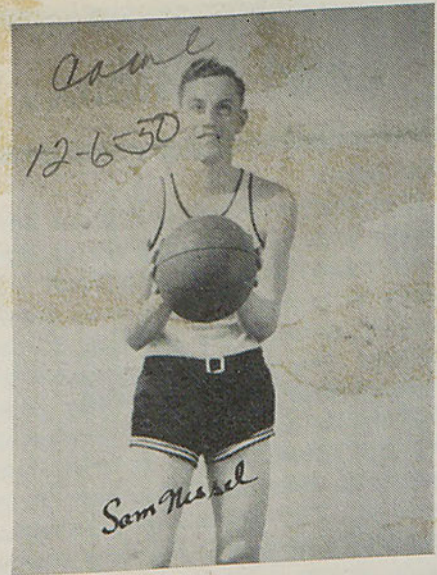
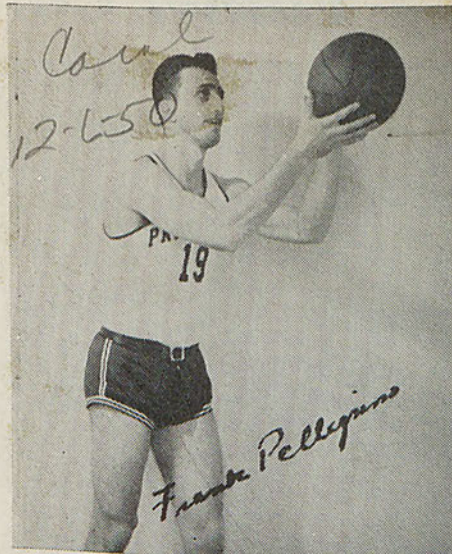
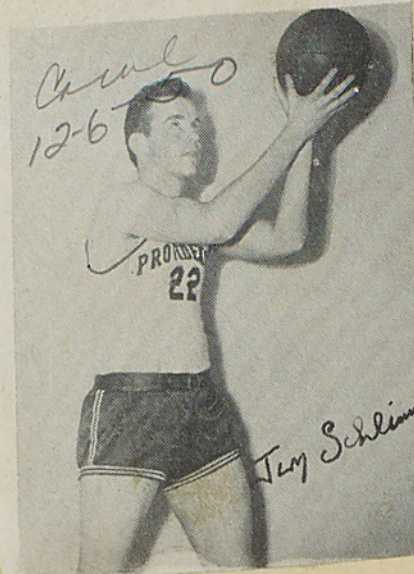
Providence's team is an all-veteran group, some of whom are playing their third season together. They have the experience on the Aces and perhaps the benefit of more preseason conditioning work.

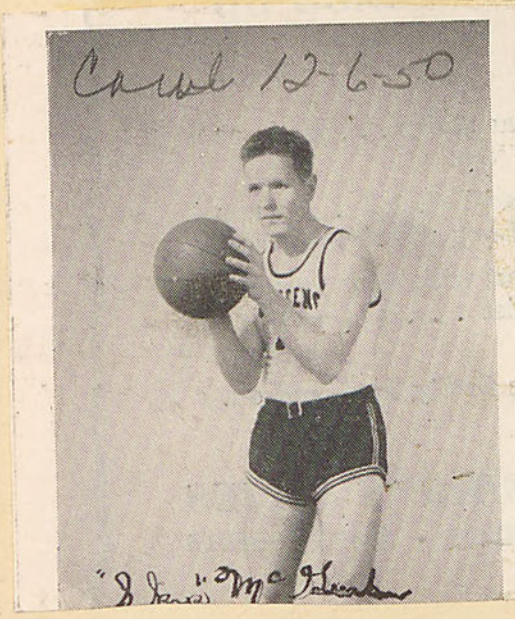
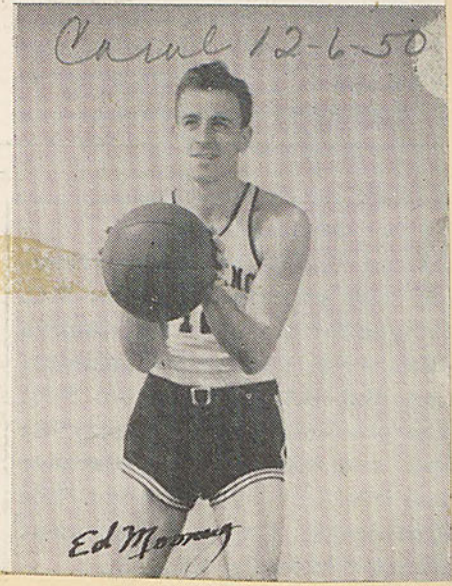
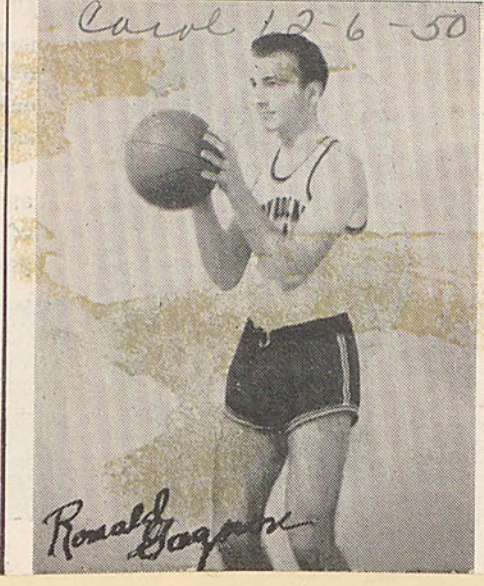
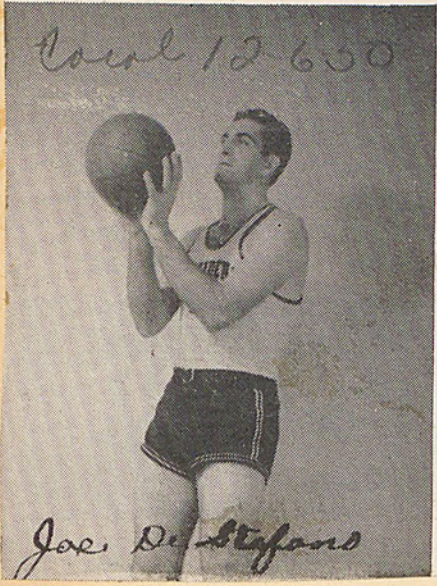
The PC Frosh, coached by Hal Martin, make their first competitive appearance in the opener. They have a well-rounded group and have outscored the varsity at times in the workouts.

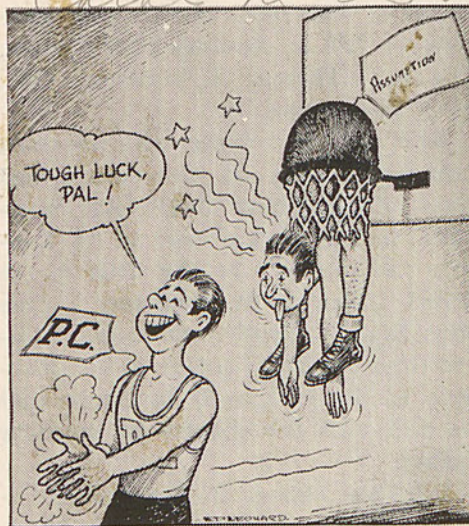
ALEX BECKER

After playing a fair first half, the Providence College quintet picked up steam, following intermission, and rolled on to an 80-53 victory over Assumption College in their season opener last Saturday night at Worcester.

Assumption whose offense boasted a 6'4" center named Roger Pontbriand and Rene Viau, a 6'3" guard, managed to hang fairly close to the Friar's tail during the first two quarters when the Black and White held five point leads of 15-10 and 32-27. In the third and fourth stanzas, the play was completely dominated by the visitors who were out front 54-39 at the end of chapter three and closed the show on Alex Becker's free toss for number 80.

The main trouble in the first half, which was quickly remedied after the rest period, was the failure of the Friars to capitalize on the large number of shots presented them. Added to this was the ability of Assumption's ball-handlers to feed the big fellow, Pontbriand, who was stationed in the bucket.

Bob Prendergast was mainly responsible for throwing the cloak on Pontbriand in the last half.

Frank Pelligrino did his usual fine job off the boards and was no slouch in the scoring department either with 11 points.

The Providence College offense, which is figured to be Vin Cuddy's ace-in-the-hole, was able to click more remarkably in the second half of the game, simply because the Friars now have depth. The reserves led by Bob (the Hook) Prendergast and Tri-Captain Ray Garcia, a great ballhandler throughout the game, scored 23 points in the last period.

The scoring was evenly divided among four of the starting five and Prendergast, who played most of the game. Schlimm and Pelligrino topped the scorers in the first half with 8 and 9, respectively. Schlimm maintained an even gait with 7 more in the second half, but the hottest boys in that half were Prendergast and Garcia who finished one and two points, respec-

tively, behind Schlimm's 15 point total. Nissel was best at the free throw line where he hit five out of six gift shots and added three baskets for his 11 points.

25-Point Burst in Span of 8 Minutes Sweeps Friars to 81-61 Victory

Turning in their best performance of the season, the Providence College Friars scored their third straight victory, 81-61, over Fairfield last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

The rangy visitors played the Friars even for the first 22 minutes, when the score was tied at 43 all. However, Providence came up with an outstanding rally, scored 25 points in a little more than eight minutes and won.

Ray Garcia, playing one of his best games, and Ray Korbusieski were the key men in the victory. Garcia dropped in several long shots during the first half and it was his driving with Korbusieski which started the Friars rolling in high gear during the second half.

Lapses

Although enjoying a 13-point lead at about the 14-minute mark in the first period, the Friars fell into defensive lapses and the Stags came up to within three points at half-time. Roger Blaine, a one-hand shooter, did the bulk of the scoring as Fairfield cut down Providence's margin and Frank Fitzpatrick sank a long shot from midcourt just before the halftime buzzer.

Starting the second half, Fairfield tied it up on Jim Homa's hoop from underneath and another basket by Stan Suchenski. Here the Friars put on their best scoring surge of the season with Korbusieski, Garcia, Jim Schlimm, Frank Pellegrino and Sam Nissell all figuring. In a little more than a minute and a half, the score went from 50-46 in Providence's favor to 58-46 and at the 10-minute mark,

the Friars enjoyed a 16-point lead, 62-46.

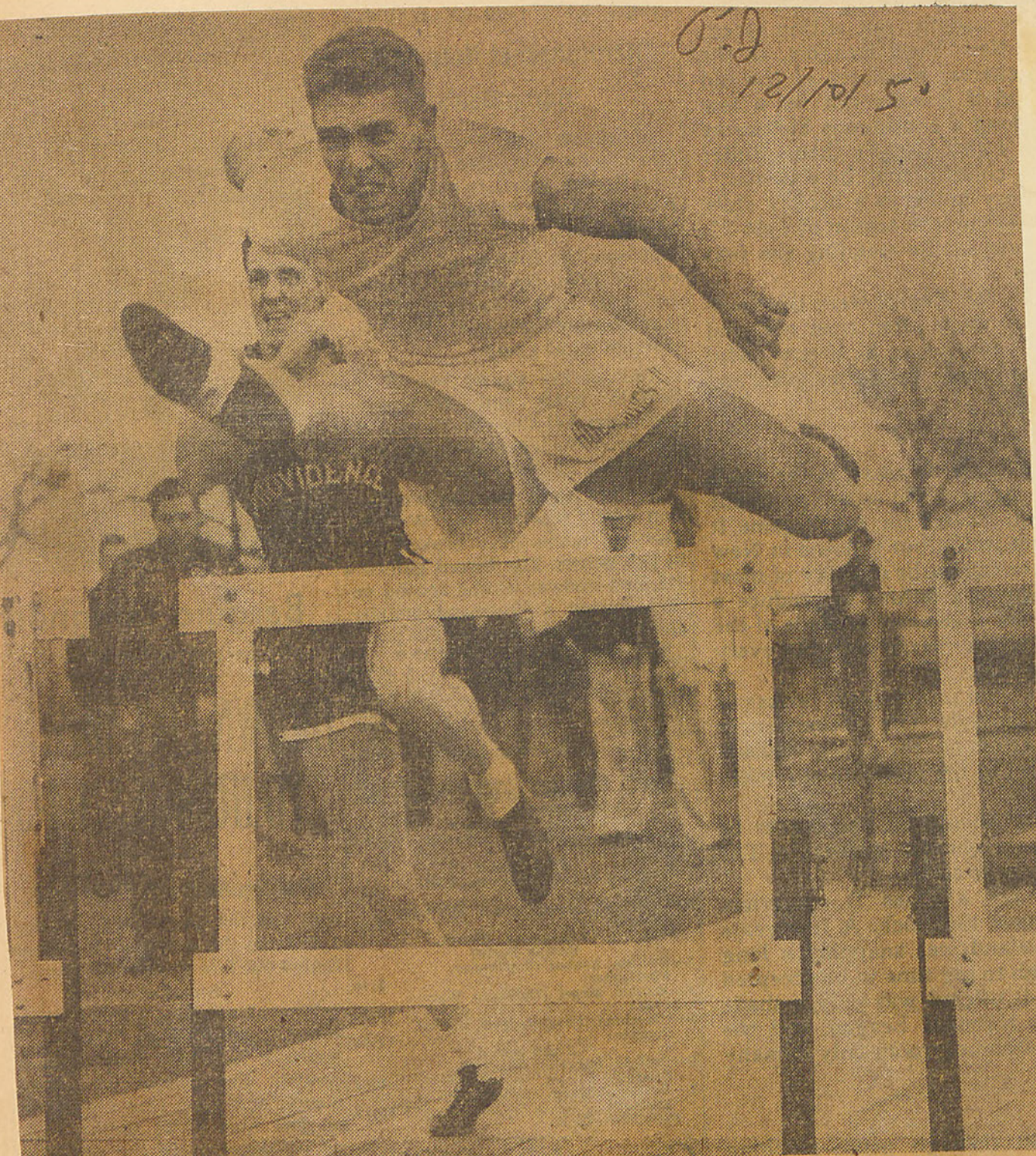

All in the Game

Stay Out, Friars . . .

If you had asked me a year ago if I thought Providence College would be returning to varsity football soon, I'd probably have countered with "Why not?"

Ask me today and I'm afraid I'd come back with "Why?"

From what I've seen of football over the last year, I'd say right now that any college which is getting along all right without it will do well to follow that course under the present circumstances.

Expenses of operating a football program never have been higher, the pressure never greater and the competition to get players never more keen. Add to this what television is doing to the small-college crowds, and to some of the gates at the larger colleges, and you have a situation that hardly can be called inviting.

Important Money . . .

You may say that football, after all, is only a game and that a college can run it for the fun the boys get out of it without all this high-pressure stuff. Why, you may continue, put all that emphasis on winning football when playing football is all that counts?

Now that is a nice way of looking at it and I only wish things could be that way. But, as I said above, it takes important money to run football today, even at a small college. Equipment is higher than ever and the two-platoon system, requiring larger squads, has increased the quantity of equipment needed. New techniques, in scouting and the filming of games, have been added, upping the budget more. Coaches of real merit can ask and get higher salaries.

You can't afford to cut any corners and send your boys out to play teams that have better equipment and superior training and coaching. So you got to the heavy expense to conduct a football program and just hope that you get some of it back at the gate. But you can't hope to get much of it back in that way unless you have a winning team. The customers won't pay just to see your boys out there having fun. They'll come to your games only if you're winning most of them.

Only Winners Wanted . . .

Last Saturday's Colgate-Brown game was an example of that. In advance, Colgate had to be conceded a slight edge, but there seemed every possibility that it would turn into another of those close, high-scoring battles these rivals had waged in the past. It fitted that description exactly when Colgate won, 35-34, but fewer than 6000 fans were on hand to enjoy it.

The customers stayed away in droves from one of the most exciting games ever played here because Brown had lost three of the four previous ones and, on the Saturday before, had been whipped by Princeton, 34-0. It didn't matter that the Princeton game was an interesting one, despite the size of the score. Brown was having a losing season and everyone, except the hard core of loyal followers, looked elsewhere for entertainment last Saturday.

The public insists upon high-pressure, winning football and a college either must give it that or be prepared to carry on its football at a heavy loss. That is why I say Providence College is wise to be confining its activities to basketball, baseball and track—which can be carried on at less expense and under less pressure.

'Goodbye Bernie' . . .

Originally, it was believed that there would be a period of high football hysteria after the war and then it would level off to a normal state, or as far as it ever could be normal. But that hasn't happened. Never was there so much emphasis on winning, so much competition for material, so much ax-swinging at coaches' heads. Why, "Goodbye Bernie" signs even have appeared at Minnesota after all Bernie Bierman has done to bring Minnesota to the heights.

We were talking about that last Saturday at lunch before the Princeton-Cornell game. Someone was saying that coaching itself must be pleasant work, but in few other lines are you exposed to so much blasting from the public.

Elmer Lampe, the tall, serious guy who assists Tuss McLaughry at Dartmouth, summed up that angle of it nicely.

"Yes," he said, "it's just the way I heard someone describe it once. This guy said: 'Coaching's the hardest way I know of to make an easy living.'"

Friar Freshmen to Bid For IC4A Harrier Title; Johnson in Varsity Run

For the first time in its three-year track history, Providence College will attempt to gain a national championship in the Intercollegiate Amateur Athletic Association of America (IC4A) cross-country championships at Van Cortlandt Park, New York, on Monday afternoon.

The Friars will send their undefeated yearling squad after the Freshman team title. Dick "Pop" Johnson will be the only P.C. representative in the varsity race.

The opposition will be provided by the best harrier teams in the country, including Yale, Penn State, Manhattan, Syracuse, Michigan State and Army. An impressive showing by the Friar Frosh will be pretty indicative of Providence College's place in national competition for several years to come.

Last Monday at Franklin Park, Boston, they were tied by Boston University for the New England title. The inability of their top man, Chris Lohner to finish the race because of stomach cramps deprived the Friars of an undisputed championship. Lohner was in ninth place about a half mile from the finish line when he was forced to drop out.

Prior to the New England championship, the Frosh had scored seven dual-meet triumphs, which included a string of four consecutive perfect 15-point totals. The closest dual-meet competitor was La Salle whom they beat, 26-31, in the first meet of season.

Bill Newman, who finished 4th in the New England meet and first for P.C. was an All-State miler and All-Interscholastic harrier while at Hope. Bill Hennigan (La Salle) and Omer Thibodeau (Mt. Pleasant), who were ninth and 14th, respectively, in the Franklin Park race, were both All-State cross-country selections in high school. The other two Rhode Islanders, Gerry Absi (Classical) and Lou Tarsa (Aldrich), also received interscholastic track honors.

Tommy didn't reach the select five until he rode home in 26th position in the New England championship. He will be P.C.'s sleeper in the IC4A.

Friar Frosh Run at N.Y.

Providence College's talented freshman cross-country team will compete in the freshman run of the First Annual Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate Athletic Conference cross-country championships at Van Cortlandt Park, New York, tomorrow afternoon.

The team will consist of Chris Lohner, Bill Hennigan, Bill Newman, Tom Farrell, Omer Thibodeau and Gerry Absi.

Last Monday the Friar frosh, under the tutelage of Coach Harry Coates, placed second in team ratings in the yearling event of the I.C.A.A.A. meet at Van Cortlandt Park, upsetting such favorites as Manhattan, Penn State, St. John's and Yale. Syracuse's great first-year team led the team scoring with 52 points to P.C.'s 107.

Providence also shares N.E. college freshman honors with Boston University.

On the basis of these two showings and a good dual meet season, the Friars are in contention for team honors in the E.C.I.A.C. meet. Their leading opponents will probably be the "Terriers" of St. Francis College, Brooklyn, and the "Pirates" of Seton Hall University.

Dick "Pop" Johnson will be the lone P.C. representative in the varsity race.

Manhattan holds the metropolitan New York varsity crown and along with Philadelphia St. Joseph's, the Middle Atlantic champion, will be favored to press the Cadets most closely.

Other leading contenders include: R.I. State, Penn State, Syracuse, Michigan State, Georgetown, N.Y.U. and Seton Hall. Boston University, Brown, Connecticut, Dartmouth, Maine, M.I.T., Williams and Yale round out the New England contingent.

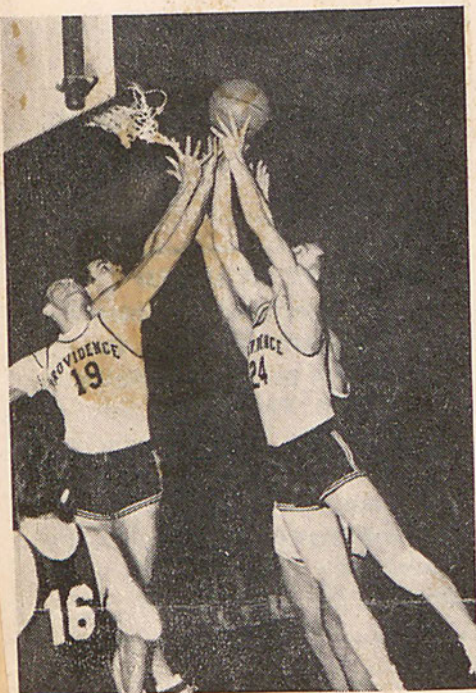
Cuddymen Triumph Over Fairfield U. In 81-61 Contest

Schlimm, who was guarded heavily, was held to eight points. The game pepped up considerably in the second half and although Colby was

never able to get the lead, the outcome was in doubt up until the final four minutes. Bauer and Garcia put in several key baskets when the pressure was on.

The P.C. reserve combination of Pendergast, Lembo, Skip McGurkin, Gagnon and Ed Mooney helped ease the pressure in the first half.

There were 44 fouls called but John Jabar of Colby was the only man to leave via personals.

Garcia with 12 points, Pendergast with 11 and Pellegrino with 10 were the Friars' leading scorers.

The unbeaten Providence College Freshmen, with Bob Moran scoring 26 points and Hank McQueeney accounting for 21, posted their fourth straight victory in the preliminary game with an 86-57 decision over R.I.C.E. Ray Lanoue of Pawtucket accounted for 23 points for the Ricemen, who trailed 40-35 at the half.

BASEBALL VET EGAN 75 P IS DEAD IN CRANSTON

Cranston, R. I., Dec. 23 (P)—John J. ("Jack") Egan, veteran baseball figure and former American League umpire, died late yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Arthur Gibson. He was in his 79th year.

Egan pitched for Washington and Providence in the 90's, umpired in the Eastern League, American Association and American League.

He was in the American League for nine seasons, working the 1913 World Series between Philadelphia and New York Giants. He later managed Milwaukee in the American Association, Oklahoma City in the Texas League, Providence in the Eastern, Scranton in the New York-Penn and Newark in the International League.

In recent years he scouted for the Boston Red Sox, signing Mickey Harris, now with Washington. Egan coached Providence College baseball in the 30's.

Jack Egan, Former P.C. Coach, 75P Grays' Pilot, Dies in 79th Year

Ex-Pitcher Also Umpired in
Majors; Dies in Cranston

Home of Daughter

John J. "Jack" Egan, veteran Rhode Island baseball figure, died yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Arthur Gibson, 67 Roberts Circle, Cranston. The former player, manager, umpire, coach and scout was in his 79th year. He had been connected actively with baseball in some phase for 55 years.

Although born in Media, Pa., Egan was a resident of Providence and vicinity the greater part of his life. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Gibson and Mrs. James F. Hennessey, both of Cranston; two brothers, Joseph Egan of New York City and Eugene Egan of Philadelphia; three sisters, Mrs. Agnes McCafferty and Mrs. Charles Lord of Camden, N.J., and Miss Margaret Egan of Philadelphia; and three grandchildren.

The funeral will be held at 9:45 a.m. Tuesday from the Frank P. Trainor Funeral Home, 859 Broad Street. A Mass will be held at Assumption Church at 10:30 a.m. Burial will be in St. Ann's Cemetery, Cranston.

Egan had been in ill health for the last six weeks, during which time he was a patient at St. Joseph's Hospital. The veteran scout had been in failing health since the death of his wife, Mrs. Eleanor F. (McGarahan) Egan, in November, 1948.

Started as Catcher

Although he started as a catcher and played well as a collegian at Swarthmore, Egan was a pitcher in professional baseball. He hurled for the Washington team in the Na-

tional League but achieved his greatest mound success with the Providence team, managed by the legendary Bill Murray. Egan performed in ironman fashion for the Eastern League champions.

When his arm went bad, Egan gave up pitching and took to umpiring, then a rather hazardous job. He worked in the Eastern League, then the American Association, and reached the majors in 1907 when the late Ban Johnson, who became

one of his friends, hired him for the American League. Egan worked the 1915 World Series between the New York Giants of John McGraw and the Philadelphia Athletics of Connie Mack.

After nine seasons of umpiring in the majors, Egan managed the Providence team for three years, finishing second twice. Later he handled the Milwaukee Brewers, Oklahoma City, Scranton and Newark. His Scranton team won the New York-Penn League pennant in 1926 and then defeated the Providence Grays, Eastern League champions, in a playoff series—one of his proudest feats.

Former P.C. Coach

He succeeded the late Jack Flynn as Providence College coach in 1935, tutoring the Friars for three seasons. His charges won 39, lost 28 and tied one, defeating some of the best teams in the East. His 1935 team downed Rhode Island State, undefeated in nine starts, and Holy Cross, unconquered in 14, within a three-day period.

Egan always insisted that Ty Cobb was the greatest player of them all, though he had a lot of respect and admiration for Walter Johnson, Tris Speaker, Honus Wagner Babe Ruth and Ed Delahanty. As a manager he had a hand in the development and management of such players as Joe Hauser, home-run king of the minors, Skee Mellillo, Jimmy Cooney, Denny Gearin, Eddie Eayrs, Alex Gaston, who went to the Red Sox, and Doug McWeeney, property of the Chicago White Sox.

Egan, who was tall and lean, was a mild-mannered man of late years. He scouted for the Boston Red Sox and the Pittsburgh Pirates. Maurice "Mickey" Harris, now of Washington, was his best discovery. Egan was a member of B.P.O.E. No. 14, Providence, and lived at the Elks Home after the death of his wife.

Jesse Van Zant and a drove of broken records were perhaps the most noteworthy items emerging from Ralph Colson's organized confusion at the Fargo Building yesterday, officially recognized as the sixth annual First Naval District's N. E. A. A. U. Open and Novice Interscholastic Development Track Meet at the U. S. Naval Receiving Station Recreation Hall.

Colson, meet director, estimated some 1000 contestants, ranging from a trio of peanut-sized dashmen, billed in the "Dead End Kids Special," to statuesque Ed "Smoky" Janiak, 30-year-old Boston fireman, who sizzled, then fizzled, in the open 440-yard run.

FIVE RECORDS ARE BETTERED

Three of the five new records fell to Boston Trade School runners. Another went to Providence College's Dick Johnson in the open 880, and the fifth, and most spectacular, was credited to Van Zant.

The black-browed BAA marathoner bolted on the final of 10 laps of the mile to by-pass Bill Newman of Providence College and B. U. 'S Johnny Kelley and come in in 4:28.7. The old mark was 4:40.4, set by Johnson last year.

Newman was a sizeable five yards behind at the tape, and the margin was growing fast. The time was provoking, considering the uncooperative track and the earliness of the season.

Ben Kreitzberg, a slim 23-year-old dash man and quarter-miler from Penn, who is now at Harvard Law School, created the early excitement.

Kreitzberg had the bulky open dash field gasping with a 6.5 performance in the semi-finals, but had a dandy time with Dick Tatum, ex-Trade star now with the Eagle A.C., before winning

the final in 6.6, inches in front of Tatum.

MYLES, O'NEIL, BRUCE TRADE STANDOUTS

Contemporary Trade runners to figure in the record-breaking business were Ed Myles, John O'Neil and Bernard Bruce. Myles outlasted 19 entries in the novice dash, then shot to a tremendously promising 6.6 win in the final, eclipsing the 6.9 record of Malden High's Joe Gaffey, set last year.

O'Neil won the novice mile in 4:48.2, bettering the 5:50.4 mark by Joe Pitts of Brighton in 1950. Pitts, in fact, won a mile heat in unannounced but record time, when he was declared ineligible because he had won last year.

Bruce hit 56.2 in the novice 440, slipping teammate Bill Smith's 57.8 record of 1950. Smith managed to break a record himself on his first try at the 880, but finished second to Providence College's Johnson, who came in with

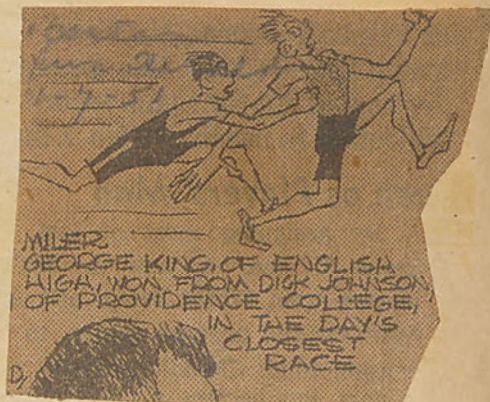
2:01. Smith finished in an unofficial 2:01.9, well below the 2:09.6 standard left by Ernie Mills of the BAA last year.

Tim O'Connell, B. C. forward, sprained his right ankle at the 16-minute mark of the first half and left the game.

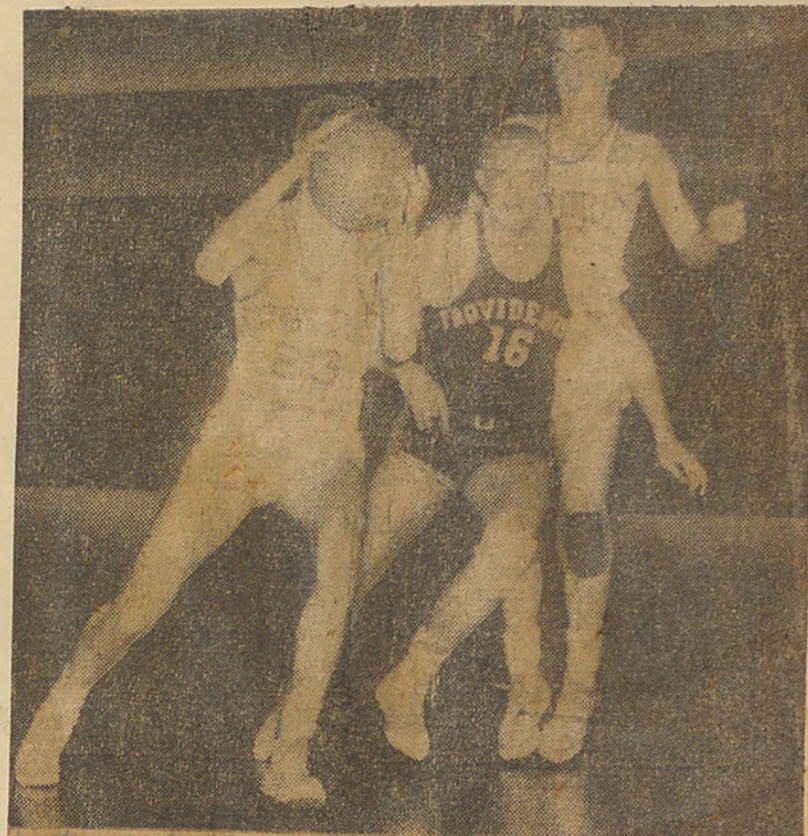
Hofstra surged to commanding leads three times only to have Bates stage comebacks. Leading Bates was Bob Carpenter, who dropped in 12 points.

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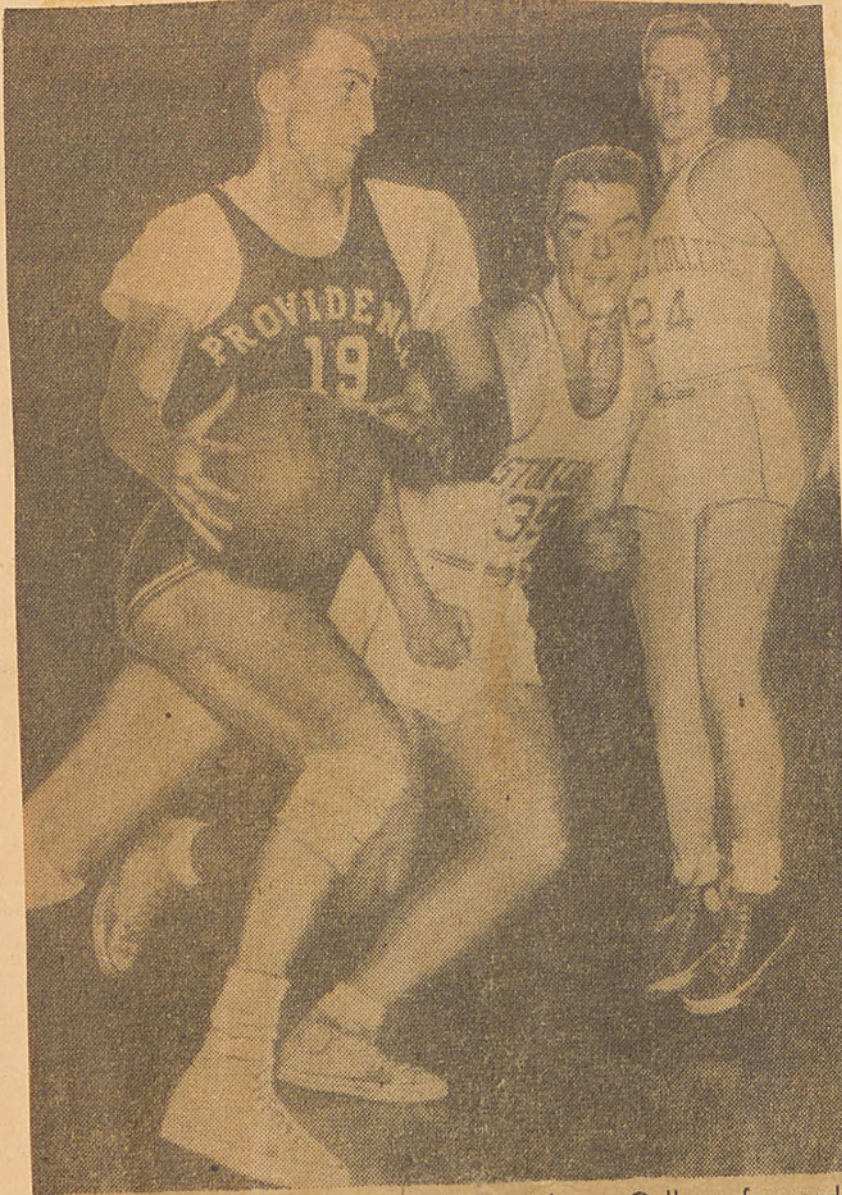

The Providence College varsity basketball team will engage in the most intensive part of its schedule within the next week. Having played only five games to date (the last one being against Boston College last night), the Friars will be at a slight disadvantage, at least in their next two games against St. Anselm's at Manchester on Thursday and Springfield here on Saturday.

Both St. Anselm's and Springfield must rate slight favorites on the basis of their season's experience to date. The Hawks from Manchester, who will play host to the Friars tomorrow night, have played seven games, of which six have resulted in victories for the New Hampshire club. Their only loss was to Wheaton College of Illinois at the Boston Garden.

Springfield has an even more impressive slate as far as games played are concerned. Going into Saturday's contest with P. C. at Mt. Pleasant gym, the Maroons will have passed their thirteen game mark of the season. As this story goes to press, Springfield has played 11 games with a won and loss record of 5-6. Tonight they face Clark at Springfield and on Friday evening they go against Rhode Island State at Kingston.

The appearance of their poor record

can be deceiving to those who believe the Maroons will be an easy mark for the Friars. Springfield has been one of those traveling clubs who go to the toughest section and play the best teams. Most of their games were played in the Midwest where they faced such teams as Kansas State and the University of Kansas, both high in national ratings.

St. Anselm's will probably prove the toughest on the basis of its season's won-lost record, the Hawks have one of the strongest teams in years manned by several tall boys of proven ability. Mainstay of the Manchester crew is Captain Bill O'Connor, a 6' 3" boy who has been the club's steadiest player as well as best scorer. Also on hand will be two other "big" men, guards Charles "Chuck" Duffley and Gus D'Orazio, 6' 5" and 6' 3" respectively. With height, experience and a fine record, St. Anselm's should definitely be among the best opponents facing P. C. this year. Last year Providence College beat the Hawks 63-61 and then 91-81.

Springfield also has a scrappy bunch with Captain John Burke, a 6' 2" guard, and a sophomore, Alan Schutts, showing the way for the Maroons. Schutts has been something of a sophomore sensation this year. The 6' 4" sharp-shooter, Schutts, led the Frosh club in scoring last year and it's reported he can shoot equally well with either hand from the pivot post. In two contests last season, Providence College dunked the Maroons 70-48 and 62-59.

Friars Drop 2nd Straight Game, Losing to Sharp St. Anselm, 81-64

Bill O'Connor of Newport Is Key Performer for Hawks Who Cop 8th in 9

Manchester, N.H., Jan. 11.—The speedy St. Anselm's Hawks handed the Providence College Friars their second setback of the week, 81 to 64, in a hard-fought game here tonight at the Sweeney Post court.

Bill O'Connor, a Newporter who played his schoolboy basketball at De La Salle Academy, was a key man in the Hawks' victory. However, he had considerable help from his rangy Hawk teammates who have dropped one game in nine starts this season.

It was a terrific game for the 1300 cheering spectators for both teams played fast basketball. The Hawks turned in a good all around job, proving stronger than expected. The Friars, although far improved over their showing against Boston College, made a fairly good game of it but lacked the punch to take over when the chances were there.

Fisticuffs

Although the thrills were many on the small court, a session of fisticuffs broke out between Fran Pelligrino of the Friars and Bob Williams of the home club. At the time the Friars were closing in and the departure of Pelligrino, who was expelled for the fighting, hurt the Friars.

Jim Schlimm, who had his best scoring night of the season with 22 points, came in to replace Pelligrino. He was sitting out momentarily with four fouls and drew his fifth foul on the following tap. So the Friars lost much of their strength with a reasonable chance of closing the eight-point gap at 57-49.

However, despite the jamming,

the Hawks probably would have taken the decision. They handled themselves well and justly deserved the victory. Tonight's victory was only the fourth for St. Anselm's in a series which has run 21 games.

The Friars looked as though they were going to come back and win at the start of the second half. They left the court trailing, 42-31, in an exciting first half.

Cut to 4 Points

They cut the Hawks' lead down to four points as Ray Garcia, Ray Korbusieski, Schlimm and Pelligrino hit the pace which they had shown in the pre-holiday games. It didn't last but they were playing a fighting game and were still in the ball game. Later when Pelligrino went out and Schlimm followed, the Friars were done for all practical purposes.

O'Connor led the Hawk scorers with 23 points while Charlie Duffley with 15 and Bart Laving with 12 also did well for the Manchester team.

Lavin's left hand dribbling had a big nuisance value and served to set up scoring chances.

O'Connor, who leads the Hawks in scoring with 165 points, did a fine job, posting his second highest total of the season.

The Friars still lack the drive of their early games although St. Anselm is a better team than rated. They hustled in the first half when they got the advantage and kept the pressure on. The Hawks led, 19-13, at the 10-minute mark, 30-25 at the 15-minute point and 42-31 at intermission.

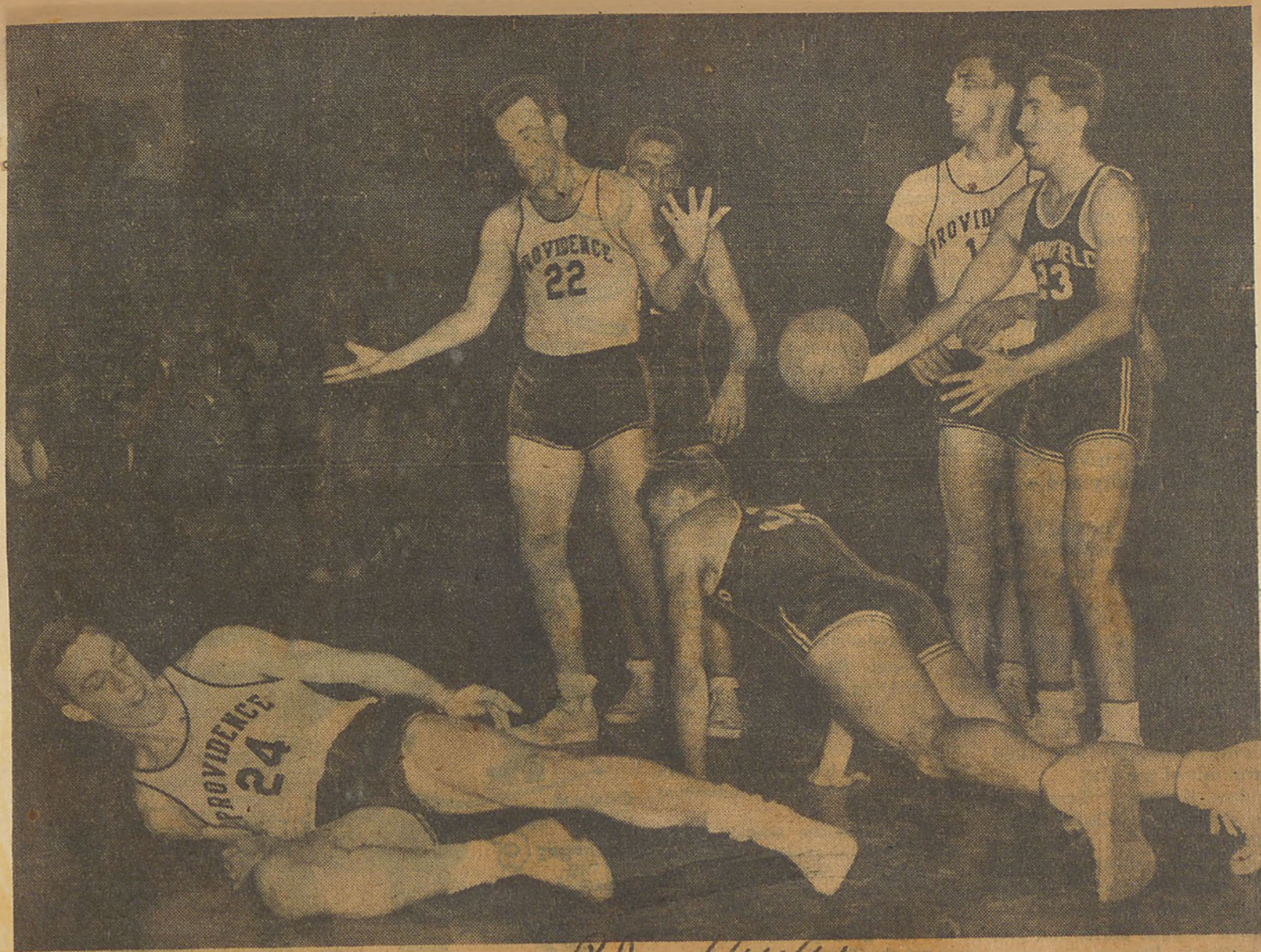

Bounding back to their pre-holiday form, the Providence College Friars scored an impressive 77-to-60 victory over the Springfield College Maroons before a capacity crowd last night at the Mount Pleasant High School gym.

The Friars, playing with a drive and spirit that was lacking in their two previous starts this week, turned in one of their best performances of the season. They started poorly, trailing, 18-9, but came on with a rush for one of their better victories.

The combination, Frank Pellegrino, Ray Garcia and Ray Korbusieski turned in a brilliant job in the first half. Springfield did some fine shooting starting out and had a nine-point lead about the four-minute mark. Then the Friars started a drive of their own and for the rest of the half, scored 35 points against 19 for the rangy visitors. While Pellegrino, Garcia and Korbusieski were doing the driving and setting up the plays, slim Jim Schlimm was back in his old shooting form.

The St. Mary's Pa., junior, who scored 22 points, turned in several remarkable shots, while the pass-work and fast breaking of the Friars was far superior to anything they showed against either Boston College or St. Anselm's.

The Friars led, 44-37, at the half.

Capt. John Burke of the Maroons scored 18 points in the first half and was the visitors' outstanding player although sophomore Allen Schmitts accounted for 20 and was the Maroon's top scorer.

Although the pace was slower in the second half, some of the Friar baskets were of the spectacular variety. For instance, Korbusieski dribbled the length of the court through the Springfield team for

one, Schlimm put in a hook shot while on the run and Pellegrino turned in several fancy jump shots.

The Springfield Frosh held a 22-21 lead at the half but the unbeaten Providence Frosh came through with a terrific second half, winning, 55 to 49. Frank Korbut of the Maroons' scored 24 points. Bob Moran, Hank McQueeney, Jim Walsh, Ed Ryder and Phil Lynch were key men in the Friar's second-half surge with the teams seldom more than a basket apart until the late minutes.

The Rhode Island State Rams, who registered one of the biggest upsets of the New England basketball season in whipping strong Connecticut Saturday night, don't have long to rest on their laurels. Three games are on their agenda for the second straight week.

Tomorrow they run smack into an old jinx, Holy Cross, at the Boston Garden and on Thursday they leave their Kingston habitat again for their annual battle with Providence College at the Auditorium. On Saturday Coach Red Haire's charges will be at home to New Hampshire in a Yankee Conference encounter.

The Providence College Friars, who snapped out of their two-game losing streak by downing Springfield, will launch the week's action tonight in meeting American International College in a return game at Springfield.

The Brown cagers will be idle during midyear examinations and subsequent vacation period and won't resume action until Feb. 3. The Bruins closed out a successful week with an easy conquest of M.I.T. after having upset State at Kingston on Wednesday.

Coach Vin Cuddy's Friars will be favored to repeat their earlier victory over A.I.C., but the latter has a big club that could prove harder to beat on its own court. The P.C. hoopsters recaptured their scoring touch against Springfield with Jim Schlimm and Frank Pelligrino leading the pack with 22 and 18, respectively.

The Rams will be the underdogs against the Crusaders tomorrow, but if they can put forth the same

speed and spirit they showed against Connecticut, it should be an interesting game. Last year they gave Holy Cross a rugged time in both games before bowing, 74-69, in Boston and, 70-62, in overtime at the Auditorium.

It would be hard to establish a favorite for the State-P.C. contest Thursday because both clubs have exhibited a wide range between their best and poorest performances this season. It boils down to this. The club that's hitting will take it.

On the national scale, St. John's victory over previously undefeated Bradley was the big news of the last week. Other casualties in the undefeated ranks include Princeton, Wyoming, Duquesne, Washington, Hamline and Washington & Jefferson. The list of major undefeated teams was narrowed to Oklahoma A. & M., Long Island, Columbia and St. Bonaventure.

Boston College hit the big time with a bang with its defeat of CCNY, but then lost out to Canisius in a close one Saturday. The defeat was the Eagles' second of the season.

In track, Brown's Tom DiLuglio set a record in the Washington Star games in tying for first in the high jump at 6-7. He will compete in this Saturday's Knights of Columbus games in the Boston Garden, along with many other trackmen from Brown, Providence College and R.I. State. Of his performance in the nation's capital, DiLuglio appears to be a worthy successor to Dick Phillips, who hung up many a record for Brown during the last four years.

Friar, State Fives Continue on Busy Hoop Schedules

Ray Garcia—Guard No. 21—Oldest set an all-time Providence Collegiar with the fans and teammates of the Providence College Tri-Captains at 23, Garcia is one of the five Rhode Islanders on the squad, making his home in Newport. A graduate of Rogers High School in Newport, Ray spent two years in the Navy before coming to P. C. In his past two varsity seasons, Ray played both forward and guard and was high among the scorers on the team. This year, he has been an individual standout in all departments for the Friars. Besides averaging almost 12 points per game Ga-Ga has also been the chief playmaker and an excellent rebound man. Also known as Gabby by his teammates, Ray is one of the most quiet and reserved men on the court.

Frank Pelligrino—Forward No. 19—Nicknamed "Shanks" by his friends, Frank also maintains a one-third share in the captaincy of P. C. quintet. Pelly comes from Westerly, Rhode Island, where he learned his basketball under Jim Federico at Westerly High School. The 6' 3" senior, playing his third year of varsity competition, is rated one of the best rebound men to play at the Dominican institution. In addition to his tremendous ball-hawking ability, Pelly possesses a one-hand shot from the outside which has enabled him to be one of the top scorers on the team.

Sam Nissel—Forward No. 24—Third of the Friar Tri-Captains and the only out-of-state representative of the three, Sam makes his home in St. Mary's, Pennsylvania, and is a graduate of St. Mary's high. Nissel is 6' 1" and one of the more consistent scorers on the squad. Like Pelligrino, Nissel also has a fine one-hand shot which he is capable of shooting from any position on the court. Last year Sam was forced to miss a half dozen games due to injuries, but still was able to finish third among the team scorers with 180 points. Although starting slow this year, Nissel has the potentialities of hitting 20 or more markers any evening.

Jim Schlim—Center No. 22—The No. 1 scoring threat on the team, the 6' 3" junior also from St. Mary's, Pa.,

set an all-time Providence Collegiar with the fans and teammates alike. scoring record last year when he led the Friars with 357 points, breaking the record formerly held by Ted McCannon in 1941-42 season. While not specializing in any one particular shot, Slim Jim has a good hook and can hit the basket with uncanny accuracy from almost any position around the hoop. After having the worst night of his career in the Boston College game of this year when he was limited to five points, Schlimm has rebounded with 20 markers in his last few contests.

Ray Korbusieski—Guard No. 16—Known as "Korby" by the players, Ray is the only other Junior on the starting five. He is 6' and comes from Waterbury, Conn., and is the "hollerguy" on the team. A stand-out ball-handler and playmaker, Korby is the driving and hustling type of player who never lets up regardless of the score or the pressure. Like a 60-minute player in football, Korby is an iron man among the Friar cagers and he is an asset defensively as well as on the offensive.

Bob Prendergast—Center No. 23—A 6' 5" sophomore from Hartford, Conn., Prendergast is next in height to Oscar Ponton, another sophomore who stands 6' 9". Bob has a smooth and very accurate hook shot with which he used in leading the freshman scorers last season. Coach Vin Cuddy considers him a great prospect and has used the youngster in every game this year. Prendergast has not disappointed his coach, either. In addition to adding to the P. C. point total in each contest, Bob also led the Friars' scorers in a couple of the early games.

Jerry Lembo—Guard No. 10—Perhaps the most colorful player on the team, Jerry is also the smallest, standing only 5' 8". A Junior from New Haven, Conn., Jerry is spending his second year on the varsity and is one of the key reserves of the Friars. Jerry combines his speed and shiftiness on the court with an excellent display of ball-handling and playmaking. Known as "Mr. Stump" by the

William Baird. No. 14. Forward. A promising sophomore from Union City, N. J., Baird registered 196 points on 82 field goals and 32 foul shots to be the leading scorer as a freshman. He stands close to six feet and weighs 170 lbs. An All-New Jersey and All-Hudson County selection while a member of Union Hill High School, Baird is majoring in Physical Education.

Fred Congleton. No. 9. Center. An outstanding member of the freshman team during the 1948-49 season, Fred ran into scholastic trouble and withdrew from school. A 6-3, 185 pounder, he played high school ball at Hackensack, N. J. He is majoring in business administration.

Fred Lennon. No. 23. Forward. A former all-stater from Pawtucket East, Lennon is making a serious bid for one of the open slots on the team this season. A good playmaker and an excellent rebounder, Lennon scored 101 points in freshman competition last year. He is 6-3, and weighs 176 pounds. To those Providence College fans who are looking forward to their team's second victory in two years over Rhode Island State, I am sorry to say that they will be sadly disappointed tomorrow night at the R. I. Auditorium. The high-scoring Rams, with a better-than 70 point scoring average, will once again prove superior to the Friars.

At the time of writing, State has won only three of ten contests, while the Friars have won six of eight encounters. However, the caliber of the respective teams met has been quite different. While P.C. has been playing Colby, Fairfield, American International, etc., hardly college powers, Rhody has faced the likes of Seton Hall, St. Joseph's, Penn State, Wake Forest, Tulane, and North Carolina. The one common opponent has been Boston College, which defeated the Rams in double overtime, 79-76, whereas P.C. was all but run out of Boston Garden by a 84-54 count. Although the State game was played at Kingston's small court, this certainly would not account for the tremendous difference in scores.

Led by Captain Johnny Mitchell and leading scorer Chuck Stewart,

The fifth starting position is shared by senior George Handler and sophomore Fred Lennon. Both men are 6'3" tall and who have excelled in spots.

Rhody State Leads Providence 24-7 In The Series Dating Back To 1920

When the Friars of Providence College and the Rams of Rhode Island State College enter the Auditorium tomorrow evening, a rivalry extending back to 1920 will be renewed. Of the 31 games played to date the mighty Ram has come out on top 24 times and the Boys of Providence have been successful but seven times.

As all sports fans realize, when the starting buzzer sounds all past season records are thrown out the window, but let us look at the history of this series so that we may gather some of the highlights and thrills that have occurred in the wild and woolly contests.

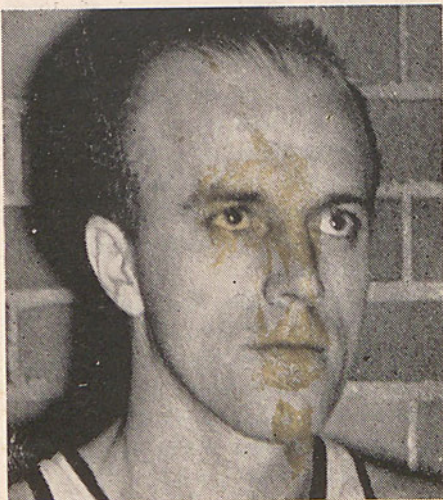
In 1920, shortly after the founding of Providence College, the Friar and the Ram met for the first time. Rhody took the battle 85-35. The following season R. I. State also triumphed by the score of 35-19.

The rivalry was not renewed again till the basketball season of 1934-35. A Providence College club coached by Gen. Al McClellan, now of Boston College, topped the Rams, 53-28. In the second game that year in Kingston the Friars duplicated the feat, outscoring them 47-43. The following season, 1935-36, Providence College duplicated the feat of the previous year. Snapping a Rhode Island six-game win streak, they won by a 53-47 score. Leo Davin scored 23 points in their second meeting of the season pacing the Friars to another win, 65-42. Davin's performance was considered to be the most outstanding in the P. C.-R. I. series.

In 1936, the Rams sought revenge and they found it at Rhode Island Auditorium. There they topped the P. C.'ers 63-54. In the return match at Kingston, the Friars pulled the upset of the series by toppling the Kingstoners and breaking a 13 game win streak for them. The Rams, led by Chet Jaworski, were the scoring leaders in the country that season. After this encounter, the Friars were regarded by most sports as the top team in New Eng-

State started a long domination of the P. C. hoopsters in the 1937-38 season. All-American Chet Jaworski, perhaps the best ballplayer to come out

of Rhode Island State led the Rams to victory twice that season. In 1941, after eight successive losses Providence came into its own. Perhaps the greatest game in the series, from the Friar viewpoint, Providence vanquished the Rams of Rhody by a 60-54 score

Principals in the Friar victory were Larry Drew, director of intramurals at the College, Ted McConnon, former St. Anselm's basketball mentor, whose scoring record Jim Schlimm broke last year, Zabeck, Marone, and Sowa. This Providence College team finished second in the country that season in team scoring. The second game that season was played at Kingston and the Rams won, 68-54.

Rhody performers like Ernie Calverly, Stutz Modliszewski, Dick Hole, Jackie Allen, Sal Scalfani, and Ken Goodwin held the Friars at bay in the next twelve contests. It was not until last season, Dec. 15, 1949 to be exact, that the Fighting Friars, coach-

ed by Vin Cuddy, were able to overcome the domination of the Keaneymen of Rhode Island State.

The present day Providence College basketball fan will never be able to forget that contest. The undefeated but underdog Friars rose to the occasion and nipped the

Rhodyites by the slim margin of 59-57. After being 18 points down at several different times in the game, the Cuddymen caught fire and tied the score with two minutes to go in the game when Jerry Lembo converted two foul shots to make the score 55-55. P. C. worked the ball down the right side of the floor and with seconds to go, Walt Lozoski dropped in a 20-foot game-winning set-shot and the contest belonged to the Friars, their captain, Walt Lozoski, and their coach, Vin Cuddy. In the second meeting of the two clubs last season, the Rams were able to squeeze out a 60-58 victory. Since the boys from Kingston were playing on their home court, Rodman Hall, they were considered favored although the Friars had beaten them earlier in the season. After a spirited attempt by the Friar reserves in the closing minutes, the Rams became triumphant. P. C. lost the game but gained something else. They gained the confidence of their fans, and most

of all they acquired the respect of Rhode Island State.

When these two clubs meet tomorrow evening they will be substantially the same two clubs that met last season. Do you think you would like to see that contest tomorrow? I know I do.

RUNNERS CONTINUE VICTORIOUS, RELAY TEAM AND LOHNER WINNERS

It will be one year ago minus one day on Saturday that the Providence College track team scored its first major victory in big time track circles. On that day, the 21st of January, 1950, in the Massachusetts Knights of Columbus indoor meet at Boston Garden, the 1-mile relay team of Jim Penler, Gerry McGurkin, Jerry Kallman and Jack Cassidy scored a smashing triumph in their race with R. I. State, Springfield and Tufts. By that victory, Coach Harry Coates made it known to New England that P. C. would become one of the section's leading track powers. Since then, the Friars have shown that someday they will share in the national lime-light in their sport. They proved this by several relay victories and some fine individual performances in dual, sectional and national meets. This fall, the Freshman and Varsity cross-country teams made an impressive debut in the college's first officially scheduled season in the rugged hill-and-dale sport.

Performances of the Friars as a team unit, up to last Saturday, in unofficial practice meets with Holy Cross, R. I. State and Boston University on the Hendricken Field

boards, were indicative of what P. C. would accomplish in the coming scheduled indoor track season.

A week ago Saturday, the Coatesmen made a good showing in their first meeting of the season against sectional competition in the Boston Naval games. Then last Saturday, the team split up with one unit entered in the Washington Evening Star Games at the nation's capitol, and the other in the Boston Y. M. C. A. games.

In the Star games, the country's meet of the week, wearers of the Black and White met some of the leading colleges and universities in the country. The Providence quartet of Jim Penler, Bill Keenan, Frank Lussier and Pop Johnson placed first in their 1-mile relay against Catholic University and La Salle (Philadelphia) with a time of 3 minutes 31 seconds. Maryland nipped the Friar combine of Captain Bill Sherry, Keenan, Lussier and Johnson, by a foot in the 2-mile relay. Virginia Tech placed third.

At Boston, in the 35th Annual Boston YMCA Track Meet, Chris Lohner paced the P. C. entries with a victory in the 1,000-yard run. Lohner's time of 2 minutes, 20.5 seconds was the

best clocking of that event in the meet. Jim Gannon and John McMullen placed second and third respectively behind Ernie Mills of the B. A. A. in the 600-yard run. The winning time of that event was 1 minute, 18 seconds. Dan Walsh came in third in the 45-yard dash. The B. A. A.'s former Penn star, Ben Kretizberg, won the race.

On Saturday evening, the Providence College track team will make its third appearance in the Massachusetts Knights of Columbus annual indoor track meet in the Boston Garden. Coach Coates has entered a freshman 1-mile relay team, and varsity 1-mile and 2-mile relay teams in the college relays. Dan Walsh and Bob Dugas will compete in the special A.A.U. 50-yard dash. John McMullen will take part in the 45-yard high hurdles and Tony Vetri in the pole vault. This is the first local meet of national and international importance as the big names of the sport will compete in it.

Providence College, State To Clash Tonight at Arena

32nd Tilt Between Intra-State

Rivals Rated as Tossup;
Frosh Fives Play

Rhode Island State College and Providence College play basketball tonight at the Auditorium and the game is rated as one of those even-up, take-your-pick contests.

This one, the 32nd meeting between the intrastate rivals, starts at 8:30 o'clock. The preliminary game between the schools' freshman team begins at 7 o'clock.

Normally, the Rams have held a substantial edge going into these games (they have won 24 of the 31 games), but this season the clubs are fairly equal in personnel and performances. State has played a more high-calibered schedule than the Friars, winning five and losing eight. Providence has won six and lost two.

But the equalizer, starting last season, is the Friars' ability to come up with their "big game" against the Rams.

Comeback

The first contest between the two last season is the prime example. The Friars were down 18 points at one stage of that game, but a last-minute rush gave them a 59-57 victory, their first over the Rams since the 1941-42 season. Later, at Kingston, State won, 60-58.

As for this season, each team has had its high and low moments. Providence College started out by winning four straight games, then dropped two in a row. Since then, they have won two more, the last a 67-66 victory in overtime against

American International College last Monday.

State broke even in its first two games, then gave Boston College, one of New England's best, a great battle before losing in the second overtime. After a good showing in the consolation round of the Dixie Tourney, the Rams played their best one last Saturday in downing Connecticut. Almost as good was their showing against Holy Cross at the Boston Garden Tuesday. They came within a hair of upturning the Crusaders.

Similar Performances

So there's no telling what can happen tonight. State, at some times in some games, has looked like the racey Rams of old. But, again, they have had their dull moments, when they couldn't purchase a point, especially from the foul line. Providence College has turned up the same.

Each club has its standard cast ready. The Friars will go with Sam Nissel and Frank Pelligrino at forwards, Jim Schlimm, who has recovered his old scoring touch, at center; and Ray Garcia and Ray Korbusieski at guards. First-line subs are Jim Prendergast and Jerry Lembo, the little man who delivered the two foul shots that tied up that first State-P.C. game with 23 seconds left last year.

The Rams have Bill Baird and Ed Hole set as forwards, Fred Congleton at center and Chuck Stewart

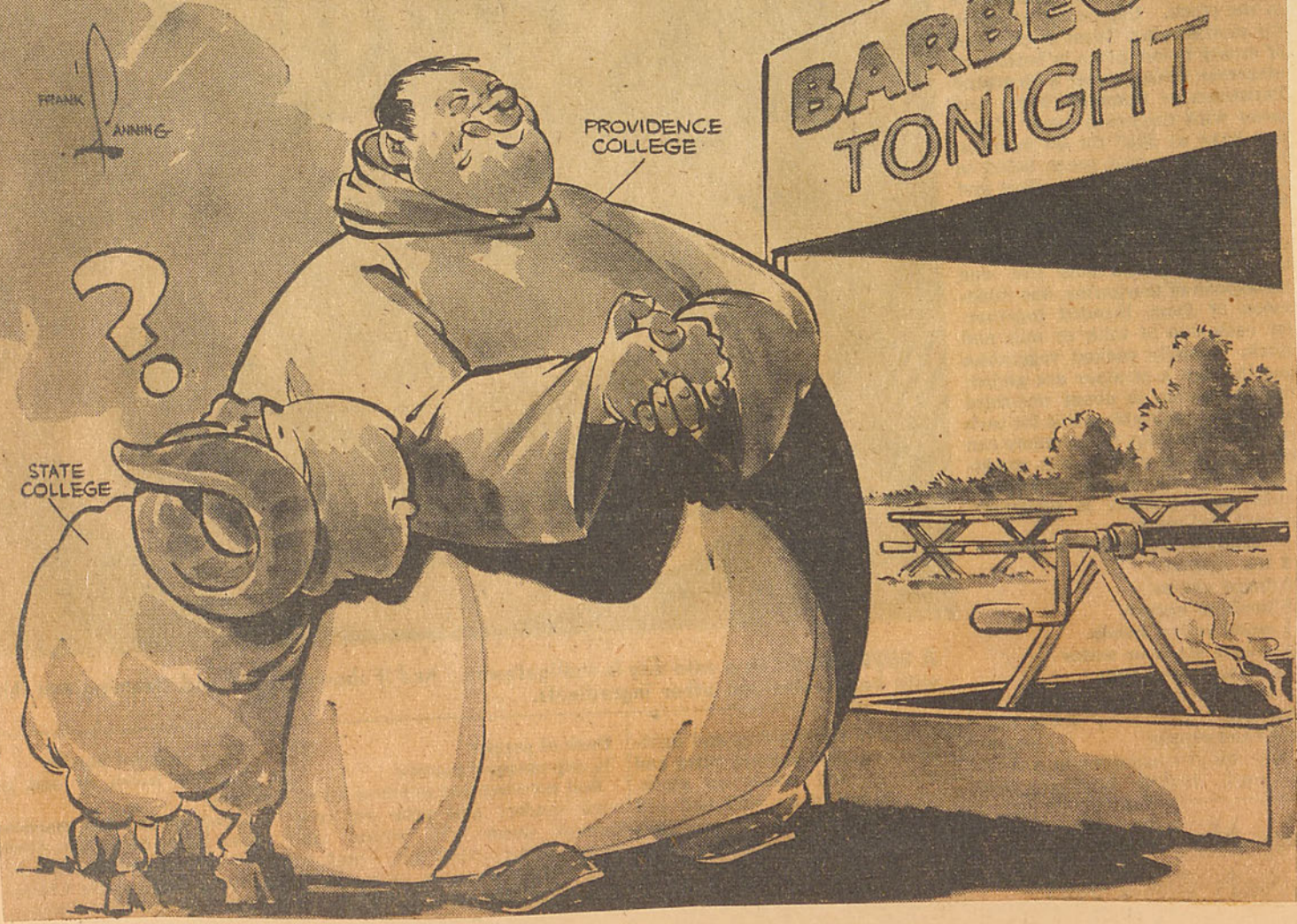

The Rhode Island State Rams and the Providence College Friars meet tonight at the R.I. Auditorium at 8:30 o'clock, with the game rated a toss-up. There's no home court advantage in this one and the teams' records are such that the decision could go either way. It figures to be a good contest regardless of the outcome.

The Providence Freshmen, who dropped their first game last night to Stonehill, 58-57, meet the Ramlets at 7 o'clock.

A year ago the Friars won the Auditorium game and the Rams took the Kingston clash. Each were decided by a two-point margin in tightly played and aggressive contests.

Rhody has just come through two tough games with Connecticut and Holy Cross and examinations started today at Kingston. While the Rams are about at peak form, the rigors of rugged schedule coming on at exam time, could react against them. In fact the Rams are leaving Kingston late because four of the boys will be taking examinations up to about 5 o'clock.

Blames Scorer

Coach Red Haire of the Rams looks for an aggressive game but hopes the officials will call them tight. He rates the Friars a competent group and says it should be close either way. He's watched Providence in action but points out that his team won't have as much trouble as far as height is concerned as they have had in some of their other games.

Red liked the fight and drive his team showed in the second half of the Holy Cross game but couldn't account for their poor marksmanship from the foul line. "Sometimes, if a boy misses the first one, he tightens up on his next one. Or if he gets his first free throw, there's nothing to it," he said.

The Rhode Island mentor placed the blame for the "sixth time out incident" on the official scorer. "When we last checked, he said we had three. Then they didn't tell us after the fifth and he tried to pass the buck when we took what turned out to be our sixth. Just incompetence, I'd say."

The Friars, who have a 6-and-2

record but no big scalps to their credit, are confident. Coach Vin Cuddy says his club is ready. Providence has two good drills and beat A.I.C. with a second half drive on Monday night. "If we're hitting, we'll beat them," is the way Coach Cuddy phrases it, although the Rams are a hot shooting team of late themselves.

Regular Line-up

Providence played its only real poor game against Boston College, a team that the Rams carried to a pair of overtime periods at Kingston. Yet the Friars have shown some brilliant spurts and are much ahead of their game of last season. The driving tactics of Ray Garcia and Ray Korbusieski has speeded up the offense although sometimes they miss the steady work of Walt Lozoski.

Ed Hole, brother of Dick Hole, one of State's top all-time scorers, has won a place in the Rams' starting team with his play against Connecticut and Holy Cross. Ed turned in a fine job against the UConns and he'll take his place with Johnny Mitchell, Chuck Stew-

art, Fred Congleton and Bill Baird at the opening tap.

The Friars will start the same group that has opened all the other games, including Frank Pelligrino, Jim Schlimm, Sam Nissel, Garcia and Korbusieski. Pelly has been rebounding and shooting well, while Schlimm has regained his scoring effectiveness, pacing the Friars in their last three games.

PELLIGRINO GOAL SENDS STRUGGLE INTO OVERTIME

Regulation Score 62-All; P.C. 'Freezes' Successfully in Last 2 Minutes

Providence College recovered its knack in basketball just in time last night and defeated Rhode Island State College on Ray Garcia's foul shot in overtime, 68-67, at the Auditorium.

The determined Friars, misfiring badly for three-fourths of the second period after an excellent first half, pounded away at the Rams' 10-point lead and finally tied the score, 62-62, with just 90 seconds left in regulation play.

Frank Pelligrino, whose earlier contribution had been a brilliant job of collecting rebounds, brought on the tie with a 20-foot hook shot from the side.

Winner

Then, at the three-minute mark of the turbulent overtime period, Garcia dropped in his winning foul shot. Thereafter, the Friars maintained a successful "freeze" that weathered State's hectic efforts to get the ball. As they pulled and hauled, the Rams committed seven fouls, each of which the Friars waived in favor of retaining possession.

When the final horn sounded, Friar partisans among the 2304 spectators present rushed onto the floor and first mauled, then hoisted the victorious players to their shoulders. In this respect the finish was virtually a duplicate of last year's State-PC game, which the Friars won 59-57.

Garcia, of course, was the Friars'

man of distinction after that winning shot, but he had a lot of competition for the honor. Pelligrino's rebounding was of great comfort to his club, as was Jim Schlimm's 21 points scored. Ray Korbusieski and Pelligrino scored 11 each.

Congleton Good

For the Rams, Fred Congleton was immense in getting rebounds and led the team's scorers with 19 points. Bill Baird, who went out on fouls at eight minutes of the second half, collected 14. Fred Lennon kept the Ram going in the overtime by getting all five of their points. These tied the score twice—the 11th and 12th ties of the game—but never built them a lead.

At that, the Rams did not lose easily. In the first half, they tied the count at 19-19, at the halfway point, then battled even for the next five minutes.

Then the Friars outplayed the Rams at their own hard-running game and built a 37-30 lead at the half, with Schlimm and Pelligrino taking the lead in the scoring.

Terrific Drive

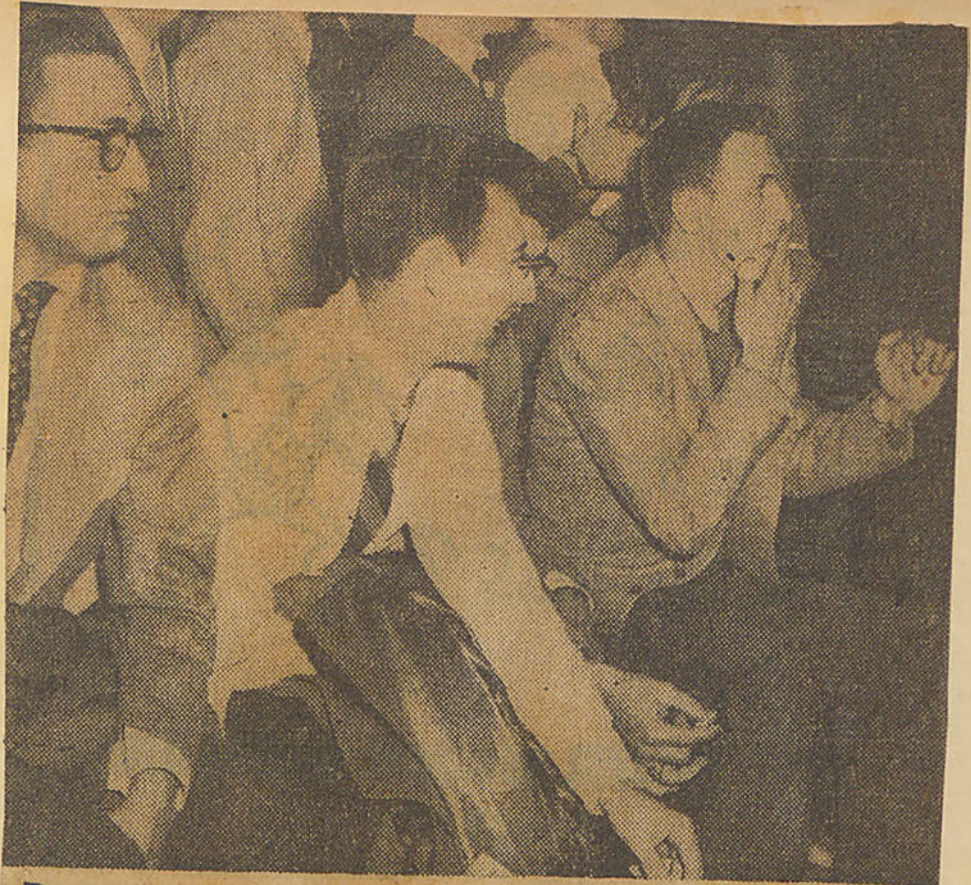
But the Rams came on with a terrific drive in the second half as Providence College completely lost its touch. In less than eight minutes, State, had scored 21 points to the Friars' eight and led, 51-43. Then they ran it up to 60-50 as P.C. got only two baskets in 12 minutes. Foul shooting by Schlimm was just about all that kept them going.

The last six minutes, however, were better for the Friars. They pecked away at that big lead, and finally tied it up on a set shot by Korbusieski, two touts by Ed Mooney and Pelligrino's clincher. Then they went to work in the overtime.

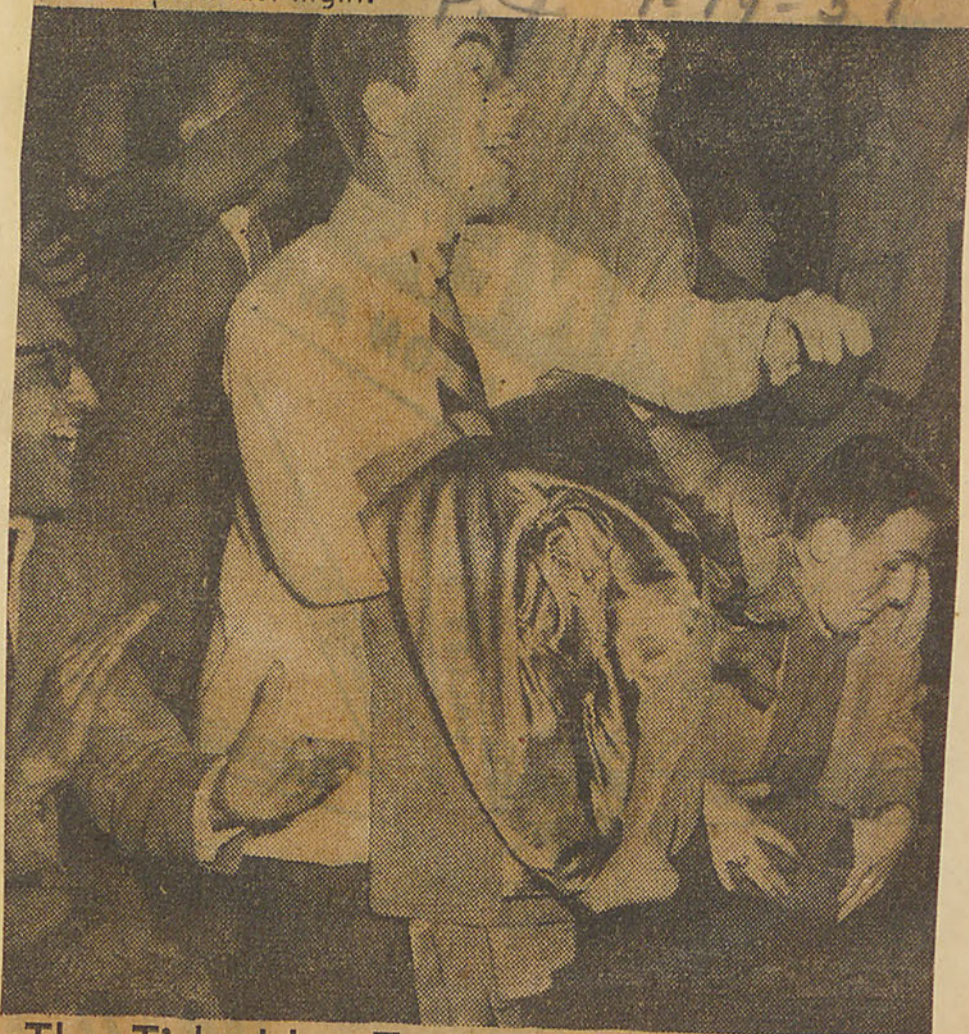
The Friars victory was their seventh against two defeats. State now has lost nine and won five.

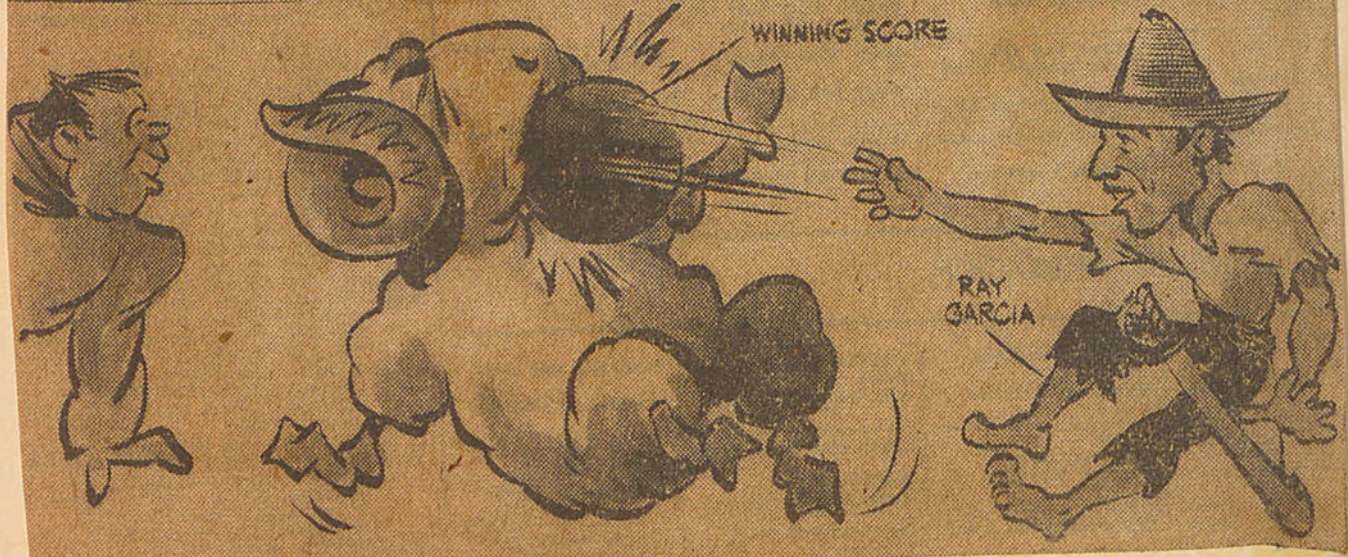
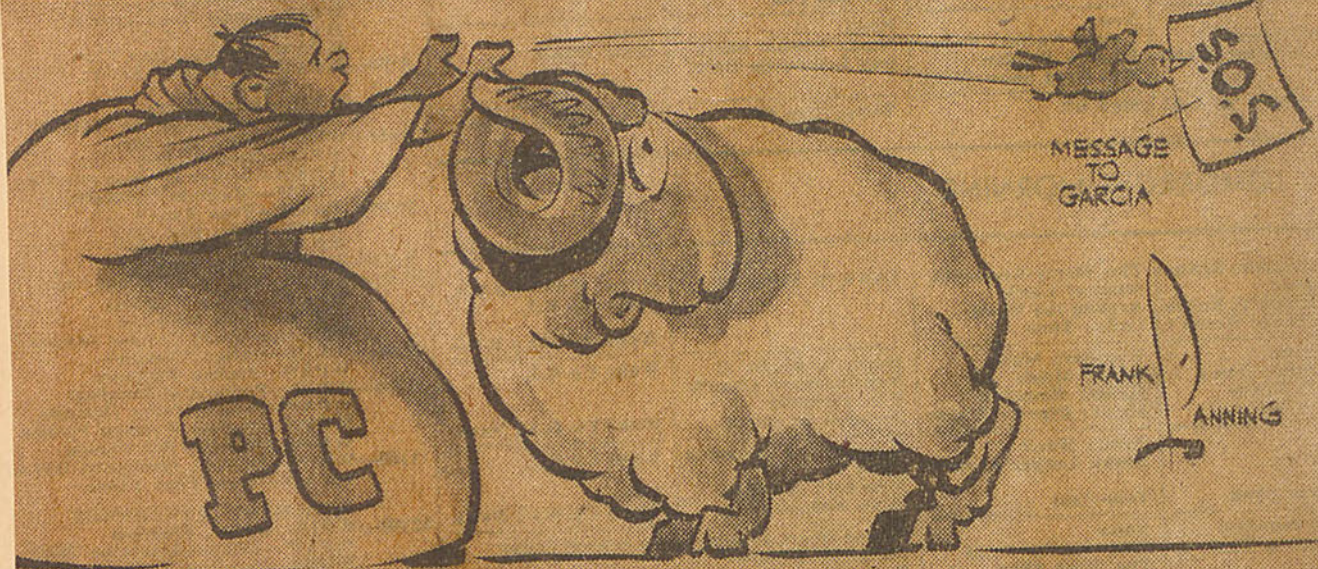
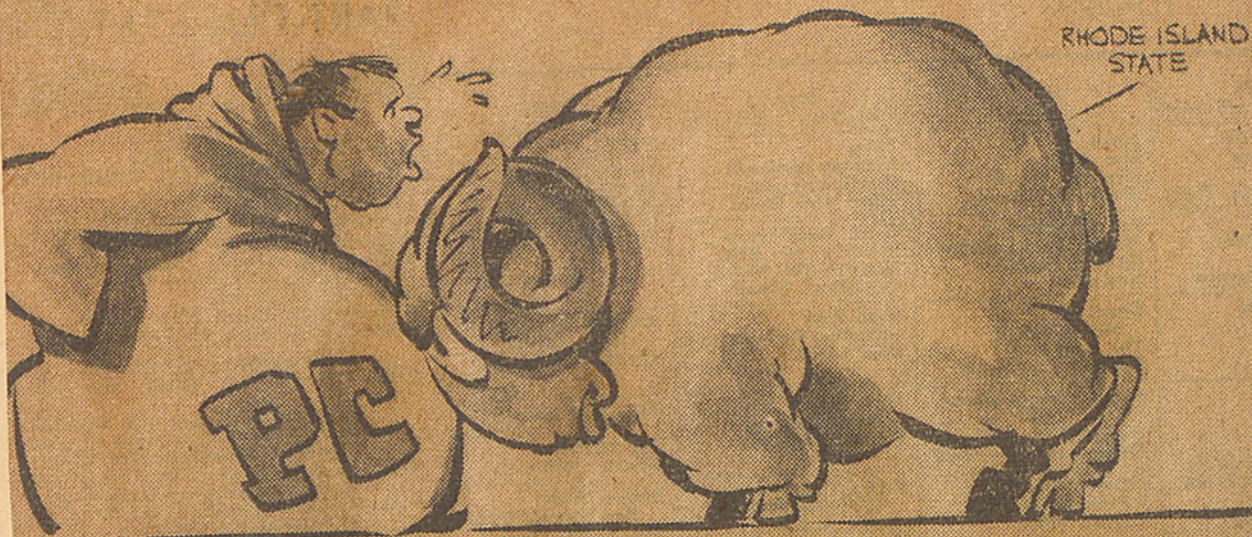

Friars Shade Rams On Surge, Freeze

Unpredictable as college basketball is, the Providence College Friars and the Rhode Island State Rams made it more so.

The Rams had a 9-point lead over the Friars with five minutes left to play last night at the Auditorium and the Friars won the game, 68 to 67, in overtime. Even the die-hard Providence rooters had counted State in and PC out, but that wasn't the way it finished up.

The setting and circumstances of the Friars' victory last season and this were quite similar, only this time the Rams were forewarned.

The Friar rooters swarmed on the court at the finish, raising the Providence players on their shoulders and showing some of that college spirit that's frequently lacking in this blase era.

Although it had some flashy activity and was a thrilling game, it wasn't always the best brand of basketball. Yet Coach Vin Cuddy said later, "It's a nice one to win, what can you say? I should kick. It could have gone either way. Both teams fought hard and I was hoping and hoping that we could hold the ball for that last 90 seconds or so when we got the lead."

Benches Help

There were outstanding players on both sides. Coach Red Haire of the Rams, Ernie Calverley, the former State star, and Cuddy all agreed that Fred Congleton did a fine job for Rhody. Frank Pelligrino, Ray Garcia, Ray Korbusieski and Jim Schlimm were the Friars' top performers. However, Earl Shannon, ex-State star, extolled the play of Schlimm. However, the bench kept both clubs in the fight when things were tight.

Down 62-53 after 15 minutes of the second half, the Friars picked up five points on baskets by Sam Nissel and Schlimm and a foul shot by Korbusieski. Then with 2:30 remaining, Eddie Mooney, former Coyle High athlete who did some fine spot work, dropped in two free throws, making it 62-60. Later, on a tap-off, Mooney got the ball and started the setup from which Pelligrino put in a one-hander from the side which tied the score with 90 seconds remaining.

In the overtime three points by Korby and close-up shot by Mooney from out of a scramble gave the Friars a 67-64 lead. Then Fred Lennon of Pawtucket made three for the Rams, shooting his foul shot under considerable noisy pressure from the Providence fans. That tied the score. Garcia, playing exceptionally well this season, broke the tie with a foul shot, apparently after being fouled by Johnny Schell, although the foul was attributed against Chuck Stewart.

That one point of Garcia's wasn't too big at the time but the Friars made it stand up. Providence waived seven free throws in the last two minutes as they held the ball. Rhody got it momentarily once and later with one second left, but it was too late.

As they did against Holy Cross, the Rams outshot the Friars from the floor, 25 to 23, but made only 17 points in 33 tries from the foul line. The foul shooting hurt them a lot while it kept the Friars in the game in the second half. Providence couldn't get more than a basket at a time for minutes but their free throws kept them close enough for their final spurt.

The Friars had Rhody on the run in the first half as they piled up a 37-30 lead. Korbusieski's driving and Pelly's shooting and rebounding were factors. However, the Rams were the Kingston Kids of old coming out after intermission and had they kept running, perhaps this would be a sad day on Bradley Hill and a happy one in South County.

Slowdown Hurts

Rhody, seven points down at the half, went 10 points ahead in the second half, but they called off their fast game and in their deliberate ball handling, the Friars found their second wind. Coach Haire's club has played a rugged schedule. Meeting such teams as Brown, Connecticut, Holy Cross and the Friars, all capable and perhaps keyed up as well, appeared too big a task for the Rams within an 8-day period.

Schlimm was the top scorer with 21 points while Congleton had 19, Pelligrino and Korbusieski each had 11 while Bill Baird and Stewart accounted for 14 each for the Rams. Johnny Mitchell, Lennon, Bobby Mitchell, Ed Hole and Ray Rossi all had their moments for the Rams.

While Providence's top strength carried the load, Skip McGurkin, Mooney, Jerry Lembo, Ronnie Gagnon and Bob Prendergast all contributed something to the victory

the Friars' seven losses against two losses. The Rams meet New Hampshire tomorrow night at Rodman Hall while the Friars don't play until next week when they meet St. Anselm's.

The Providence College Frosh won their sixth game with a 93-to-64 victory over the Rhode Island Freshmen. Frank McQueeney with 26 points, Jack Durkin with 22, and Bob Moran with 21 paced the Friars, one of New England's most promising first-year groups. John McMullen in the hurdles, Dan Walsh in the 50 yard dash and Tony Vetri in the pole vault did not gain the finals in their respective events.

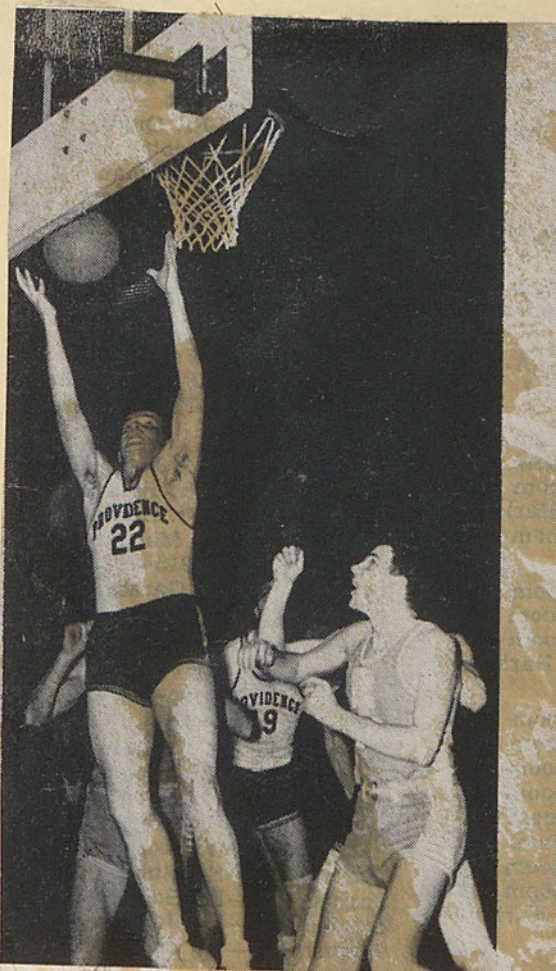

O'Connor is a first rate college basketball player in the opinion of Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars, said

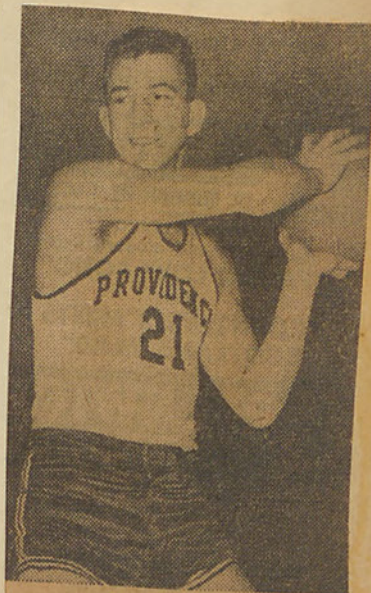

The Friars were experiencing something of a letdown when the Hawks beat them, following the Boston College setback. This doesn't mean the Hawks aren't capable of repeating for Coach Al Grenert has moulded a strong team around O'Connor, Bernard D'Orazio and Charley Duffley, all fairly big men.

The game at Manchester was a highly interesting contest to the spectators. Both teams play wide open basketball, placing the emphasis more on scoring than defense. The last three meetings have all been interesting, with the Friars sweeping the series last year and holding a wide margin down through the years.

Jim Schlimm, the Friars' top scorer last season, started to hit his real stride against the Hawks at Manchester, scoring 22 points, and he's been continuing at a steady pace in the victories over Springfield, A.I.C. and the Rams. The loss of Schlimm and Frank Pelligrino hurt the Friars in the first game. They went out almost simultaneously, Pelly for fighting and Schlimm on fouls.

Ray Garcia and Ray Korbusieski, the Friars' driving guards, will open in the backcourt, with Schlimm and Sam Nissel at the forwards and Pelligrino at center. Pelly's board work has been helpful in recent contests.

VICTORY AVENGES EARLIER SETBACK BY HAWK CAGERS

Schlimm, Prendergast Spark
Friars' Attack; P.C. Frosh
Defeat Billard

The Providence College Friars avenged one of their two setbacks, scoring a 72-to-62 victory over the St. Anselm's Hawks before a capacity crowd last night at the Mount Pleasant High School gymnasium.

The Friars turned in one of their better games in the opinion of their coach, Vin Cuddy, although the outcome was in doubt until the last few minutes. The Friars, who enjoyed a 15-point lead at two different stages found their second wind in time to hold off the Hawks in the final four minutes.

Newport's Bill O'Connor, one of the leading scorers in New England, accounted for 20 points for the visitors. The fast-breaking style of the Hawks, coupled with their height, kept the Friars hustling and it was an interesting, spirited contest.

8th for P.C.

The victory was the Friars' eighth and the second successive defeat for St. Anselm's, which has an 11-3 record. The Hawks closed the gap to five points, 63-58, with four minutes to go but here the Friars came on and spurred to a 10-point victory.

Jim Schlimm, scoring 20 points, and Bob Prendergast, with 15, paced the Friars, although the driving of Ray Korbusieski, the rebounding of Frank Pelligrino, and the hustle of Ray Garcia were big factors in the victory.

Schlimm, one of the cleverest shooters among the Friars of recent years, put in several unusual shots and did a fine all-around job. Prendergast played by far his best college game and his guarding and timely shooting enabled Providence to handle the Hawks' bigger men

in better fashion that they did at Manchester, when they lost by a 17-point margin.

Essentially it was a team achievement for the Providence group. The Friars sank 20 out of 27 free throws and held only a 26-24 edge in field goals.

Hawks Rally

St. Anselm's bogged down at times in the first half and trailed 35-23 at intermission. The Hawks came up to 43-35 about five minutes along in the second half. Then the Friars got hot and went 15 points ahead, 52-37 and later 57-42 about the nine-minute mark. The Hawks scored three baskets by Bob Williams, Gus D'Arazio and O'Connor in less than 40 seconds. Then it became a question whether or not the Hawks could catch the Friars.

The Hawks did an outstanding job of ball handling and fast maneuvering, closing in at 58-63 on a layup by O'Connor. Prendergast collaborated with Korby and Schlimm and made it 65 for PC with three minutes left. Then foul shots by Schlimm and Pelly and a basket by Schlimm relieved the pressure and sewed up the decision.

Tom Duffley, D'Orazio and Williams, together with O'Connor, did a good job for the Hawks.

The Providence College Frosh, led by Hank McQueeney, defeated Admiral Billard Academy, 66 to 39, in the prelim. McQueeney scored 16 points in the Providence Frosh's ninth victory. The young Friars led, 35-18, at the half.

Bob Prendergast Leads P.C. Cagers To 72-62 Victory

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars has been looking for a good big man ever since he came to Providence College and maybe last night he found him. Bob Prendergast, Hartford sophomore, turned in his best college game as the Friars scored a 72-62 victory over a competent St. Anselm's College quintet for their eighth victory.

Prendergast picked a good spot to come up with an outstanding game for the rangy Hawks are much underrated so far as New England basketball is concerned. McConnon said the Hawks probably missed Bart Lavin, their left hand dribbler who sat out with water on the knee. He played a fine game against the Friars at Manchester. However, McConnon pointed out, "You have to beat the Friars. They won't just give up, and they really hustle for a college team."

Bill O'Connor, a Newporter, scored 20 points for the Hawks and yet he wasn't having his best night. McConnon, who coached him as a sophomore, says O'Connor has developed a lot in the last two years. "He has plenty of patience when he gets the ball around the hoop. He'll fake in two or three different directions if he has to and he's not over-eager like a lot of college and high school players."

Effective

O'Connor, on his play against the Friars, is a heavy duty operative. "He doesn't impress you like a Bob Cousy, but he's effective and he's

scored with men hanging all over him," McConnon said. "With another year I think he'd be a great college player but he's as good as anybody around now."

Perhaps O'Connor was pressing a bit last night with his mother and dad watching and hoping he'd have a big night. Coach Cuddy of the Friars is another who likes the big Newporter's play. "I'm glad I've seen the last of him," Cuddy said. "He's a real ball player. Why, on the Cross or BC, he'd be terrific. He kills you."

The Friars had their troubles with the Hawks, who were intent on sweeping the series after their 17-point victory at Manchester. The Friars played better ball in this one. While the presence of Lavin on the bench cut down the Hawks somewhat, O'Connor, Charlie Duffley, Gus D'Orazio, Bob Williams and Zyg Leocha all did fine jobs in spots.

St. Anselm's came up within five points in the second half after trailing by as much as 15 but the Hawks were always dangerous and the capacity crowd of more than 800

witnessed an interesting contest. The Friars apparently have worked out the kinks or the slump that overtook them about two weeks ago.

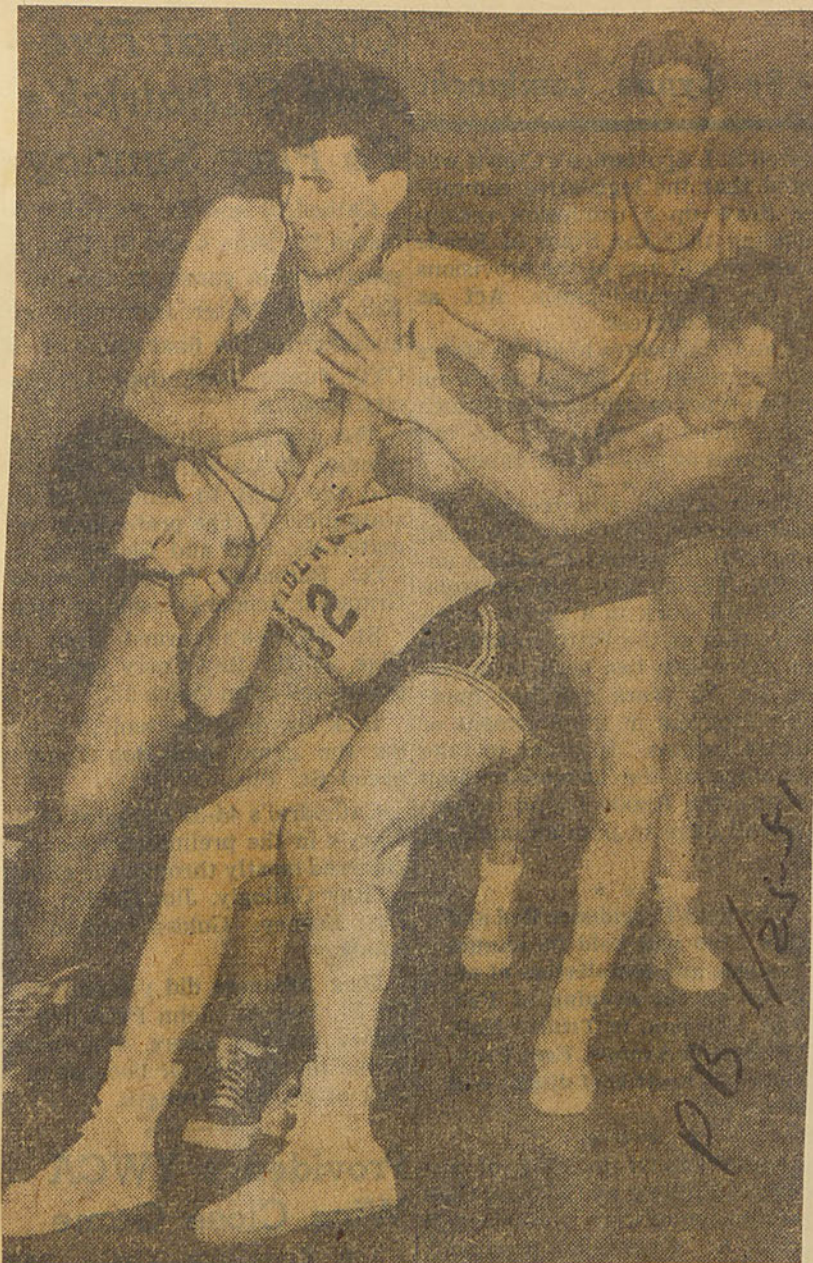
Schlimm Top Scorer

FRIARS COME FAST TO PIN 77-60 LOSS ON MAROON SQUAD

Friar Schlimm Gets Shot Away With Greatest Speed

Sitting over a cup of coffee and talking basketball with the Friars' Vin Cuddy, you hit on many subjects, mostly basketball.

You always get around to Jim Schlimm, the Friars' ace point-maker. Recently the Rams' Red Haire said that he never saw anybody that got off a shot any faster than Schlimm and that's a point that has been made by Ted McConnon, George Duffy and Ernie Calverley, among others, although not in just those terms.

Cuddy says Schlimm has the fastest shot he has ever seen and he can get the ball away almost as quick as you can snap your fingers. "You can't compare Schlimm with Calverley or Cousy or any of those fellows, but he gets the ball away frequently before his man even gets his hands up and he has a feather touch. The ball is soft and sometimes almost without locomotion when it hits.

"Jim is an unusual shooter and completely unorthodox. Lately he has been using an underhand shot, but his flicking hook shot is as effective as any in the East. Barney Madden tells me that Buster Sheary had quite a shot when he was playing for the Cross, but I've never seen anyone in the colleges or the pros that gets the ball away any quicker."

No Defense

It's no secret that the game is practically without defense today. Cuddy says this is due to the mental makeup of the boys, more than the coaching.

"It wasn't so long ago the players would eye one another when the game started and a fellow would say to himself, Brother, if you're scoring, you're going to earn it, and they played that way.

"Today, the attitude is, well, you get one and I'll get two later. Or they shrug their shoulders and grin when a fellow dribbles around them. I used to be sort of ashamed and humiliated when a guy made me look bad.

"Defense is 60 per cent in the head. A fellow can make himself a good defensive player. He can't necessarily make himself a shooter but he can improve. But on defense, you know what to do and then you apply it. But boys love to shoot baskets. Just watch the kids in any backyard. It's all shooting.

Good Shooting

"We've been quite fortunate with our foul shooting lately, we got approximately 80 per cent or better in our last three games and we put in nine of our first 11 shots from the floor against Fairfield. It's tough for any team to win on the road—the lighting sometimes affects the shooting, the travel, the crowd or the playing surface are also factors. That State schedule is murderous and Red has done a fine job. They'll have a terrific team next year, national emergency permitting."

Next season, the Friars, in normal times, would have a team that would be a throwback to the other great teams of the Johnny Krieger-Bill McCue, Ben Smith-Leo Davin, Bill Kutneski-Dick Bracken eras in the days of Gen. McClellan. Or not forgetting that PC team of 40's of Larry Drew-Ted McConnon-Bob Reilly and company, coached by Ed Crotty.

With Ray Korbusieski, Schlimm and Bob Prendergast to work with such Frosh brilliants of this season as Hank McQueeney (he's a protege of Charlie Gallagher), Bob Moran, Jack Durkin, Ed Ryder, Phil Lynch, Jim Walsh and John Reynolds, the Friars normally would have one of their strongest squads in years.

HC and BC

Cuddy doesn't see anybody replacing Holy Cross or BC as the ranking New England teams. He says his boys played their best game a year ago in beating the Eagles, who were just as strong then as they are now. He says Villanova was out to put it on the Eagles after last season's upset and the BC morale was low with two

deaths among the parents of the players. You couldn't expect anything different.

The Friar mentor says the improved play of Ray Korbusieski and Frank Pelligrino has given his club a big lift, "especially Pelly's rebounding." Sam Nissel and Ray Garcia have also helped. He rates St. Michael's and St. Anselm's the most underrated teams in New England, looks for the Brown series to be a close affair, and points out that Springfield's one-two punch of Jack Burke and Alan Schutts frequently can get them 35 or 40 points per game.

Cuddy is intensely interested in coaching but realizes the hazards that go along with the job.

"Do you think the 'Gen.' or Clair Bee any better coach this year because they have winning teams or Nat Holman is any poorer because he's not winning them all?" is his rhetorical question and he answers it. "They were always good coaches."

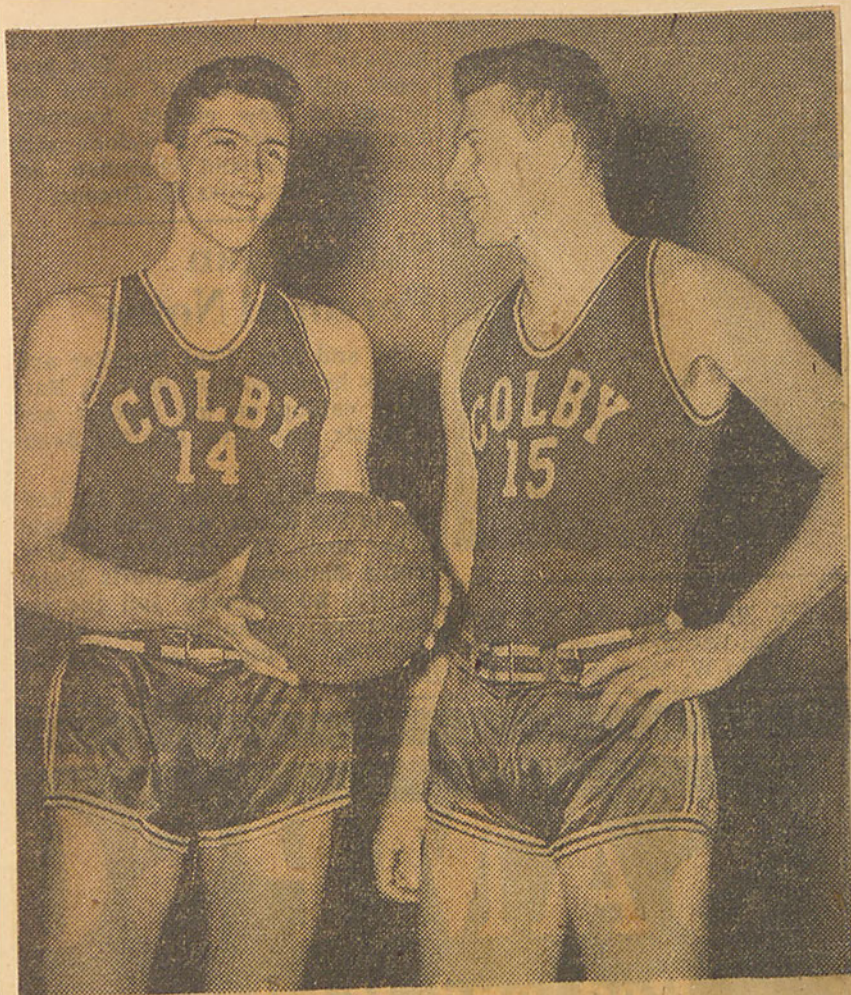

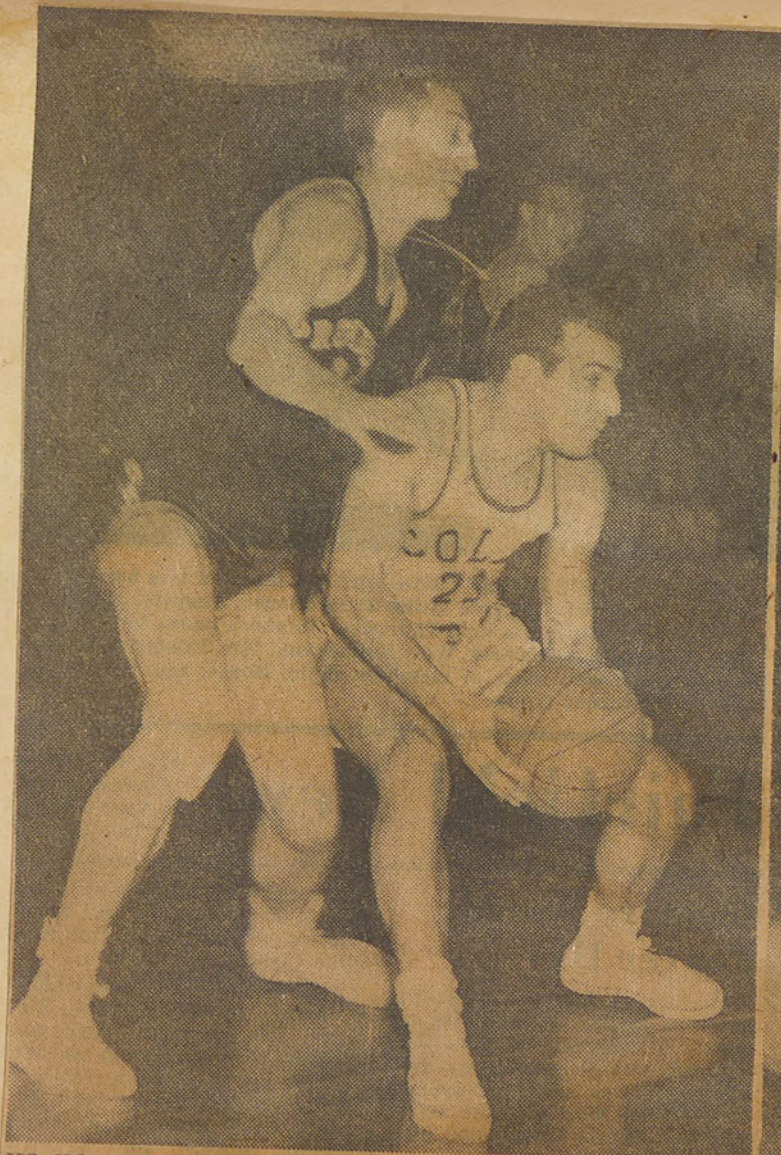

Victory Over Providence

Shiro Scores 1,000th Point

On one of the hottest winning streaks in New England Colby's high scoring Mules defeated a strong Providence College last night in the fieldhouse, 77 to 64 before a crowd estimated at more than 2,500.

The win ran the victory streak to nine in a row for the boys on the Hill and made their Number Seven berth in the New England rating far more secure and a chance to get into the college tournament coming off next month, a lot easier.

Before going into the affair with the Friars the Mules had been dropped from sixth, a spot they have held for two weeks, as Yale had taken over.

One of the highlights of the contest was Teddy Shiro, former All-New England schoolboy star for the Purple Panthers of Waterville high, registering with his 1,000th point.

The game was actually stopped when Teddy cut the strings for over the grand figure. As a matter of fact he made his 1001 point, picking up a two pointer at 16.37 of the second half to put the Mules in a lead by some 10 points.

It was through the courtesy of Vin Cuddy Providence coach that the game was able to be halted while pictures were snapped of Shiro and the two mentors.

The kid was given one of the greatest ovations that any Colby athlete has ever been given. Going into the game he had 985 and with the 25 he whipped in last night it gives him the grand total of 1010.

The 25 points also gave him a total of 350 for this season and within 50 of tying Tubby Washburn for the individual mark for the Mules, who holds the record with 400. And the Mules have eight games to go.

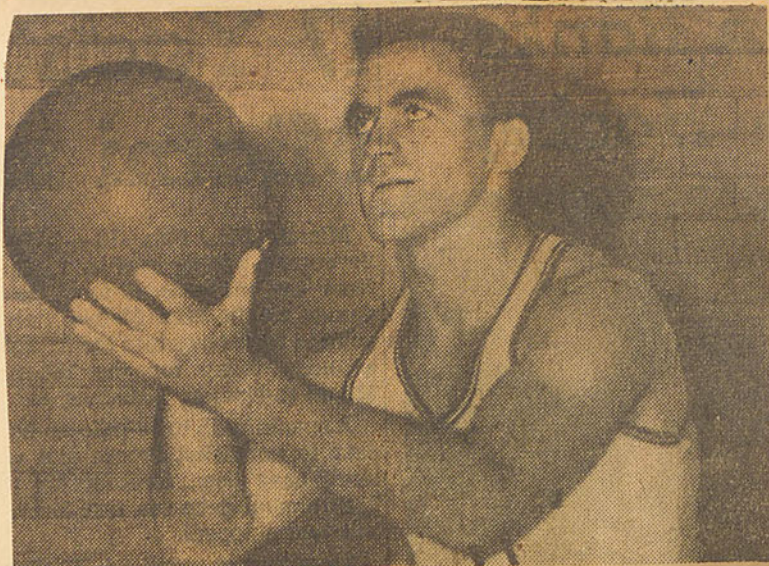

Friars Have Height

Providence College will have an advantage in height, though Brown has performed well against one or two "skyscraping teams," and will be starting virtually the same team that played against the Bruins last season.

Those men are Ray Korbusieski, Ray Garcia, Frank Pelligrino, Jim Schlimm and Sam Nissel. Each one

stands more than six feet tall, with Schlimm the highest of the group at 6-3.

Brown will go with its usual combination of Fred Kozak, Zeke Creswell, Joe Christopher, Al Gauthier and Chuck Whelan.

Kozak and Creswell have been the leaders of the Bruins offense this season, running around 15 or 16 points each per game. Schlimm and Pelligrino are the scoring aces for the Friars.

As for the coaches, they are chary about calling it. Vin Cuddy of the Rams has said that the Bruins are a "sound, scrappy club," one that never gives up. Brown's Bob Morris sums up the Friars in three words: "They are good."

Each is correct, so it should be a good night of basketball.

Coach Vin Cuddy and the Providence College basketball team will be out to break a jinx tonight as the Friars journey cross-town to meet Brown University at Marvel Gym.

It was three years and five games ago that the Friars last outscored the Bruins. That was in February of '48 and the score was 44-35. Since then the hall at Marvel Gym has held nothing but sorrow and disappointment for the Smith Hillers whether they were favored or not.

This is definitely the "big game" in Cuddy's book. Last season, his freshman year as coach of the Black and White, Vin's charges were humbled twice by the Bruins, 60-48 and 66-54. The ignominy of these defeats lies in the fact that the Dominicans were considered the better team on both occasion.

Just what caused the Friars to fade before the Bruins, when the former five obviously had the better club, has been a matter of conjecture for more than one of the team followers. Although the Brown home court might appear to be a distinctive disadvantage, P. C. should feel pretty comfortable there since the roominess of Marvel Gym is very similar to their own court at Mt. Pleasant.

It bears no resemblance to the band box type of gym encountered by the Friars at Manchester where they lost to St. Anselm's or Rodman Hall in Kingston on which P. C. will play later this month.

Last year, Brown had the "Great Moe" (Francis Mahoney), but little more. Providence had Schlimm who was on his way to a new college scoring record and a well-balanced team of Pelligrino, Garcia, Whitey Weinstock and Lozoski, the latter two having graduated.

Reviving the family ghosts probably won't help to boost the Friar morale for the coming game, but it will aid to caution us in any crystal balling we do concerning this year's prospects.

Providence enters Marvel Gym tonight with a 9-3 record and will probably be ruled the favorite on basis of Brown's 5-7 mark.

In its seven losses, Brown was tagged by some good clubs including Army, Connecticut, Colby, Navy and Holy Cross with the former three edging the Bears by very close margins.

Whereas the Bruins may have played in a schoolboyish fashion in some of their defeats, the Eastsiders have also displayed a brilliancy in their several victories, particularly in the last couple of weeks.

The hot and cold Bears first achieved distinction when they hung a 59-57 upset on R. I. State at Kingston. It was the first time in 13 years that the Rams had been defeated by Brown in Rodman Hall.

Two outings ago, the Bears pulled another stunning surprise by whipping Connecticut University, in their second game, at Storrs. This last victory was by far the Bruins best show-

Cassedy Star In NEAAU Meet, Teams Show Improvement

Despite Jack Cassedy's great effort, P. C. again barely missed capturing the 1-mile relay title in the New England A.A.U. indoor track meet last Wednesday night at the Cranston Street Armory.

In last year's meet, a mishap prevented the relayers from winning. As a point of review, the Providence College varsity relay team was considered all but out of the race until Cassedy came up with one of his great races, cut down a big lead and was only nipped by inches at the finish by Delaney of Williams College.

This time there were no accidents. There were two Friar teams in the 1-mile relay finals. The Black and White runners were one-two for the first two and a half legs until Springfield College's Charlie Davis sprinted by Bill Keenan and Dick Johnson and handed a good lead over to Bill Peters, the Gymnast's anchor man. And that's another reason why Harry has one eye on the Georgetown team this season and the other on his Friars. Georgetown equalled one of his marks in Boston recently and Saturday night they did 7:39.4, fastest ever run in New York's Garden, and broke Harry's 7:39.8 in the process.

A lot of coaches think the 7:33.9 is almost unbelievable. It was made in the New York Coliseum. The reason that Seton Hall could run so fast there was the fact that the Coliseum track had the exact dimensions of the Seton Hall track and made from the same type of wood. It was just like running at home for them and the boys really outdid themselves, that was the

all-star group has ever run faster in this event outdoors.

Anchoring the Georgetown team in most of its races has been Joe Deady. Harry coached his father, Ed "Bud" Deady, in the days when he was a 4:20 miler at St. Benedict's. Harry also gave Joe a pointer or two when he was at Plainfield High in Jersey. Frank Sevinge, the present Georgetown coach from Cranston, was on a Seton Hall Prep team which won a national indoor championship in the relays.

Harry says that Fletcher was as good as anybody in the world in the early 40's, his times comparing favorably with John Borican. In a relay, pace is big factor for a speedy team has no one in front of them but the boys have to gauge themselves so they won't go too fast and then bog down.

Johnny Gibson, present Seton Hall coach, was another of Harry's favorites. He held the world's record in the 440-yard hurdles and was one of four of Harry's boys on the 1928 Olympic team at Amsterdam. The others were Melvin Dalton, Walt Gagar and Johnny Bell, with two others missing out in the trials but almost as capable in their events.

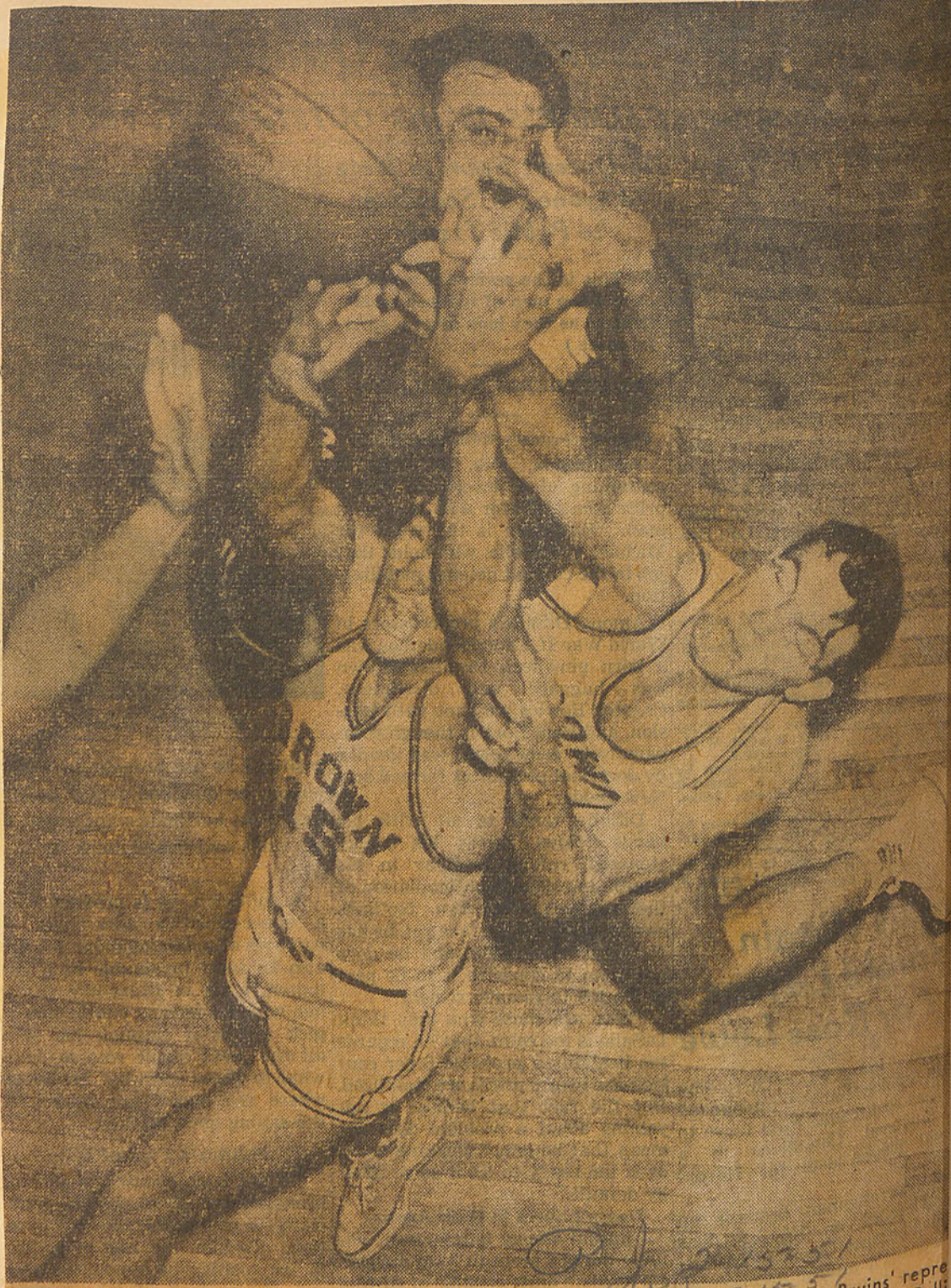

GAUTHIER'S SHOT IN FINAL MINUTES GIVES BEARS EDGE

Brown Protects Lead With
Two-Minute Freeze; P.C.
Freshmen Win, 65-48

Brown squeezed out a basketball victory, 62-61, over Providence College last night at Marvel Gym on a basket by Al Gauthier followed by a two-minute "freeze."

The Friars' freshmen, on a good finish, defeated Brown's Cubs, 65-48. A crowd of about 750 persons, largely P.C. rooters, watched the game.

Gauthier's payoff shot, a one-handed pop from outside the foul circle, was preceded by a layup shot by Bob MacConnell, which put the Bruins ahead, 60-59. That broke the game's fifth tie. Gauthier's basket was the insurance that took care of the Friars' last basket at the 18-minute mark.

Thereafter, the Bruins' put on their freeze and held control for their sixth victory in 13 games.

P.C. Leads at Half

Obviously, this was a rousing finish to a turbulent game. The Friars made it that with a splendid comeback after a dismal start put them behind 11 points. Led by Jim Schlimm, a sure bet from the foul line, they overcame their early line, they overcame their early troubles and went off at the half with a lead of 35-34.

And they kept the Bruins hard at it the rest of the distance. Except for a few seconds, the Friars stayed on top for more than 10 minutes of the half, once leading by eight points. Gauthier wrapped up a good comeback on Brown's part when he stole the ball and dribbled the length of the court that put the Bruins ahead, 50-49, at 10:30.

In the next seven minutes, the lead jockeyed with almost every exchange of the ball. The best margin at any one stage was three points, until MacConnell and Gauthier got in their licks for the ball game. The victory gave Brown the lead, 2-1, in the race for the intrastate championship.

Schlimm Leads Scorers

The Friars' Schlimm won the scoring title for the night with 20 points and he played a great game in the pivot spot as well. Sam Nissel, who made seven foul shots in eight tries, was next for PC with 13. Brown's scoring leaders were Ezra Creswell, with 17, and Joe Christopher with 13. As a club, the Friars were more than adequate in foul shooting, making 23 out of 28.

Brown's best offensive weapon was a carefully executed "weave" with which they worked the ball around until one of its operatives could drive in for a layup. It functioned particularly well in the early going and gave the Bruins' an 18-7 lead, as the Friars went more than five minutes without a floor basket.

But then the Friars began to plug the middle, Schlimm started hitting from inside and his club drove to a 33-33 tie on Jerry Lembo's 15-footer with 30 seconds to go. Schlimm tapped in a rebound that sent the Friars' off at the half with their one-point lead.

They kept rolling early in the second half and went ahead, 47-39. But Christopher, Kozak and Creswell led in hacking away at the margin until Gauthier tied it up at the 10:30 mark. Brown lost Chuck Whelan, Christopher and Creswell on fouls soon after, but the Bruins kept pushing and finally clinched their victory.

Bob Moran was high scorer for the Providence freshmen with 17 points. Phil Lynch held Brown's high-scoring freshman, Lou Murgog to one basket in the first half, but Lou managed to collect the high total for the Cubs with 15 points. Murgog didn't get going until Lynch fouled out in the second half.

It's an unusual situation and old-timers hereabouts probably find it difficult to believe, but Brown and Providence College will play for the lead in the state championship basketball series tonight.

Normally Rhode Island State would be the team most vitally interested in any struggle for first place in the state round-robin. This year, however, the Rams have been getting their bumps with uncommon frequency and, as of right now, can get nothing better than a tie for the title no matter what happens.

On the other hand, probably the one that sinks the long shots, either the Friars or Bruins could win the championship outright. Needless to say that notion intrigues them greatly since it hasn't happened very often in recent seasons.

This winter both Friar and Bruin quintets are better than usual, largely because of the solidarity of their team play. Tonight's game should be something of a sizzler as they open their home-and-home series. The identity of tonight's home team escapes me at the moment because both games will be played on Brown's spacious court.

It is an intriguing situation, bringing together teams that have done the improbable and the virtually impossible. The Friars defeated State at the Rhode Island Auditorium and the Bruins overhauled State on the Rams' cozy court in Kingston, a rare feat in this or any other season.

Whether Brown is host or guest makes little difference—the battleground still will be the Bruins' own, familiar court. That gives them a substantial advantage because guesswork, observation and scientific study all have demonstrated that the home team in basketball has at least an eight-point advantage.

Recently Bob Morris, the Brown coach, and Vin Cuddy, the P.C. coach, visited our sports program over WPJB and discussed that item with engaging frankness. Brother

He was asked, facetiously of course, if Brown would spot P.C. eight or 10 points in the second game, when P.C. will be host (or in tonight's game, as the case may be) and he, with understandable alarm, apologized for giving a short answer and said "NO".

Whether in an effort to compensate for that customary home-court advantage or whether merely to give the Friars a good look-see at the Marvel Gym court, Brown now and then opens wide the doors for the Friars to practice. Its encouraging when schools have such regard for another's problems.

But it isn't surprising. Brown and P.C. always have been pally. Remember when Ed Crotty was head basketball coach and director of physical education at Providence College—and assistant football coach at Brown at the same time? That's the sort of stuff that makes the Brown-P.C. series, no matter the sport, so engaging—and so thrilling.

This will be a duel between a team that has been consistent—Providence College—and one that is capable of attaining startling heights—Brown. The Bruins, remember, beat State at Kingston and Connecticut at Storrs. Those victories staggered the imagination of up-coming Brown opponents.

However, for a guess, Providence College because of a stronger bench and greater height, items which could offset Brown's home-floor edge.

Rensselaer Makes Friars Step Lively for Triumph

Schlimm's 26 Points, Nissel's 17 Spark P.C.; Victory 10th in 14 Starts

The Providence College Friars won a thrilling 71-to-70 victory over Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute last night at the Mount Pleasant High School gym in about as tough a game as they've ever had on the Highlander court.

Although once holding a 15-point lead early in the second half, the Friars had to fight off the Engineers in the stretch for their 10th victory in 14 games.

It was a tense, spirited contest with the Engineers whittling down the Friars' margin and coming within one point of making up a nine-point deficit in the last four minutes.

One Slip

Providence froze the ball for the last two minutes and 35 seconds, although once losing possession for a basket which brought the Engineers up to within one point. The Friars waived eight free throws in that period, passing up several opportunities for scores but maintaining control except for the one slip.

With injured Frank Pelligrino in the stands, the Friars had all they could do to pull out a decision. The Engineers, led by rangy Kenny Martin (6-foot-6 center) and Ed Dailey, made it quite a match although Providence pulled up to a 3-33 lead in the first half.

Jim Schlimm of the Friars was the game's top scorer with 26 points, and did a fine job on the

board too. Some of his shots were spectacular. His defensive play made up some for the absence of Pelligrino. Sam Nissel played one of his best games, contributing 17 points and sparking the first-half drive.

Severely Pressed

Ray Korbusieski's driving and alert defensive work in picking off passes was another feature of the Friars' game. In the closing minutes, Providence was severely pressed to hold both its lead and the ball, with Schlimm, Korby, Nissel, Ed Mooney and Ray Garcia working the ball around but also taking some rough punishment for their efforts.

Providence went ahead about the 6-minute mark in the first half and had a 23-17 lead after 10 minutes. The Friars were moving at a fast, tiring pace in the second 10 minutes, going from six points ahead to 10 at intermission, with Ronnie Gagnon, Schlimm and Korbusieski scoring in the last 90 seconds.

In a little over three minutes of the second half, the Friars had a 15-point edge, 51-36. However, R.P.I., which played a slow weave, give-and-go game in the first half, stepped up its pace and cut the lead to six points, 59-53, by the 10-minute mark.

They had it down to three at one stretch but the Friars spurted and had a 69-61 margin starting the last five minutes. It was nine points (71-62) on Schlimm's one-hander going away. Successive hoops by Dailey, Bob Halloran and Dailey again, plus a free throw by Joe Bulmer, brought R.P.I. up to 68. Then the Friars started their ball-control tactics, with considerable milling, mauling and dribbling, winding up the spirited play.

The Providence College Frosh scored their 14th victory in 16 games, coming from behind in the second half for a 64-to-49 victory over Newport Naval Prep. The Naps, led by Don Lange, held a 30-25 halftime lead with the Friar Frosh going ahead 49-41 in the third period. Bob Moran (16), Hank McQueeney (14) and Phil Lynch (9) were the Friars' best scorers while Lange had 14 points for the Naps.

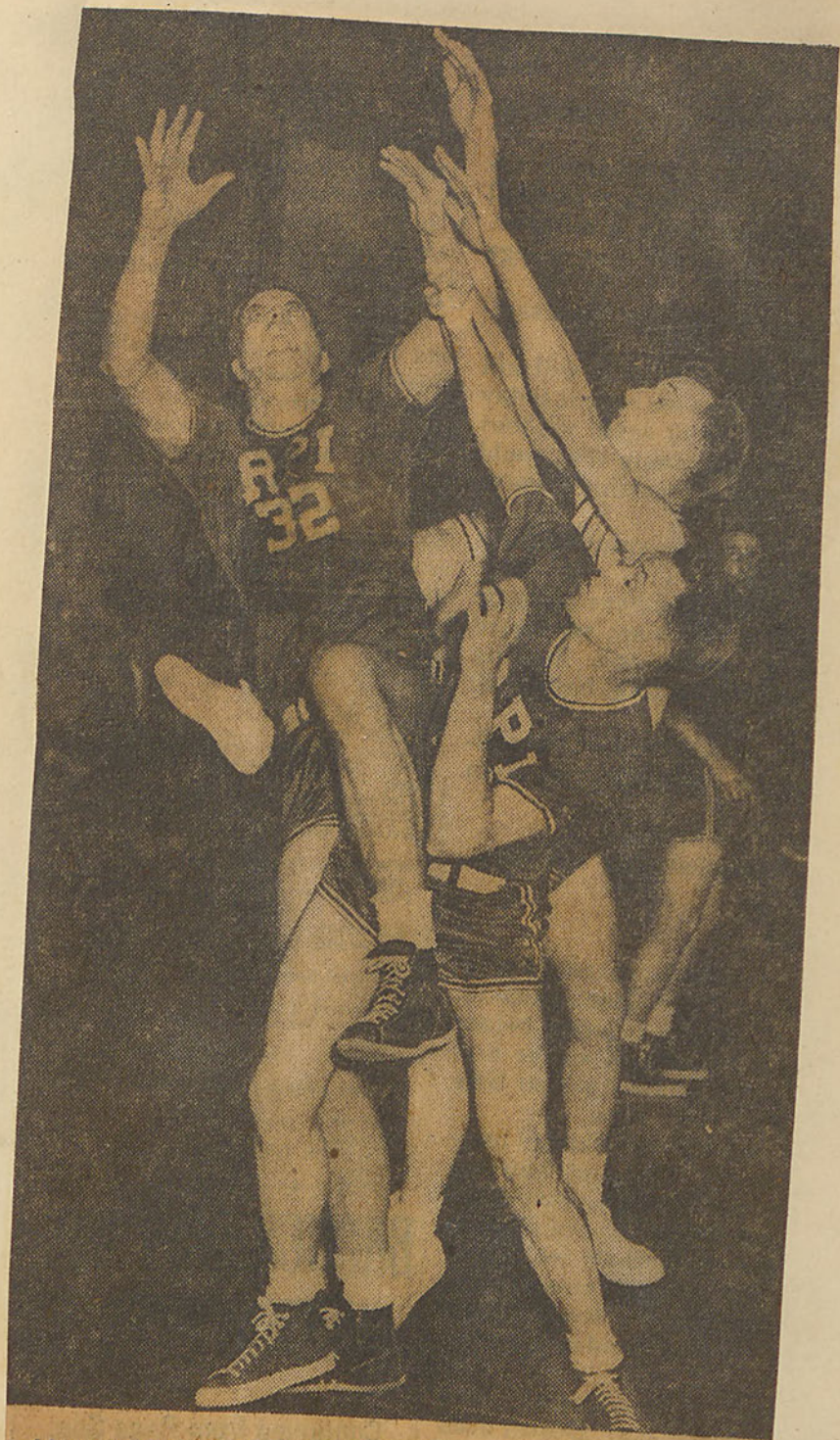

Providence College basketball team will close its home schedule at Mount Pleasant Gymnasium, Providence, with three games within the next five days.

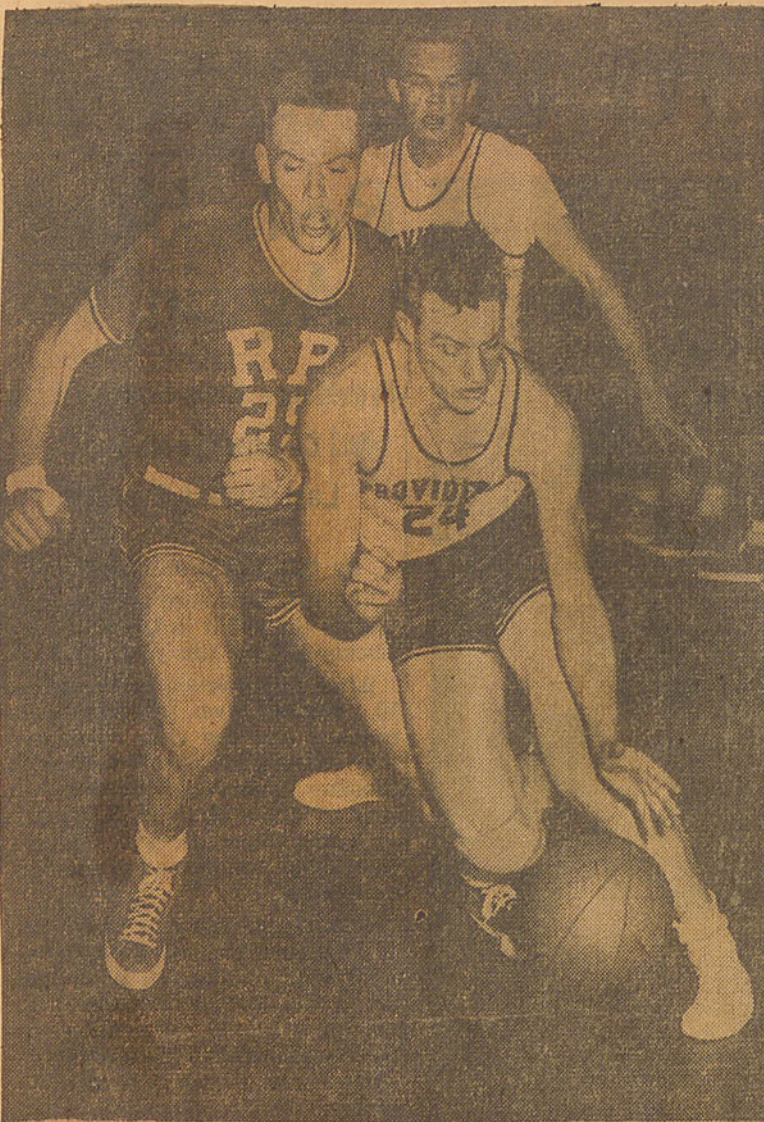

Upsala Five Upsets Providence College, 75-71

Setback Is Friars' First on Home Court in 2 Years;

P.C. Frosh Win

The Upsala Vikings, like their adventurous namesakes of old, scorned the Providence College Friars' supposed superiority and handed the Smith Hill team a 75-to-71 setback last night at Mount Pleasant High.

Upsala, playing as though it didn't know about the Friars' 10-4 record and caring less, surprised them with their first defeat in two years on the Mount Pleasant court. It was a fine victory for the East Orange, N.J. quintet, which was given little chance on P.C.'s "home" court.

The Friars didn't play their best basketball, operating with skill and finesse only infrequently, but Upsala turned in a good job. The Vikings were a loose, driving team and hit on a good percentage of their shots.

Monte Berman, a 6 foot, 2½-inch forward, and center Russ Bissett, who is 6:4, gave the Friars more than they could handle around the boards. P.C. missed Frank Pelligrino who again was forced to sit out the game with an injured foot.

Good on Rebounds

Berman scored 23 points and

Bissett contributed 15 but their size in the rebound scrambles helped out considerably. Driving Monk Rowding, who scored 19 points, also was a major factor in the victory.

The Friars, who won a hard fought game from R.P.I. on Saturday night, weren't as sharp as usual when they had to be. They came from behind and tied up the game at 57-all with 10-minutes left to play but then the Vikings got strong again, scoring 13 straight points and salting the game.

Providence put on a late drive, featuring Ray Korbusieski, Ray Garcia, and John Power but the time element was all in favor of the Jerseyites. Had the Friars played as fiercely earlier in the game, perhaps it would have been a different story.

Jim Schlimm, who did a fine rebound job in the first half, was the game's leading scorer with 19 points. Schlimm kept the Friars rolling in the first half with 13 points. Korbusieski and Garcia paced the Friars' attempted comeback in the second half.

Nip and Tuck

For the first 30 minutes it was a nip-and-tuck game, with the partisan Providence crowd expecting the Friars to break loose at any time. The Friars held a five-point lead early in the game but the score was tied 14-all after 10 minutes and the Vikings led 26-23 with five minutes remaining. After Providence took the lead, Upsala spurred to 34-

33 edge and had a two-point lead, 39-37 at the half.

Korbusieski and Ed Mooney finally got the Friars up even at 57-all midway in the second half. Then Berman, Bissett, Graham Skea and Monk Rowding staged a 13-point rally while the Friars were going scoreless over the next five minutes. That was the game. Thereafter Upsala managed to protect its lead, with a ball-control game.

The Providence College Frosh reversed one of their two setbacks, scoring a 55-to-48 victory over Stonehill College. The Friars trailed, 23-20, at the half and were behind 36-33 going into the final 10 minutes. Paul Sincero, a Mount Pleasant High alumnus, played outstanding ball for Stonehill, scoring 19 points.

Personalities

Two more men of the track team whom Coach Harry Coates has developed since they arrived on the Smith Hill campus are both Bay-Staters. They are Jim Penler from New Bedford and Frank Lussier of Somerset.

Penler, a freckle-faced dash man played three years of basketball at New Bedford High where, in his senior year, 1946, his team won the Massachusetts championship. He did not participate in any of the track and field events.

At P. C., under the direction of Harry Coates, Penler blossomed into a short and middle distance runner. He has since competed in the 50, 60, 300 and 440-yard dashes and the 600-yard run in the indoor track season. On the cinders, Jim has run the 100, 220, and 440-yard dashes.

On four different occasions in which he has been a member of the Friar Varsity 1-mile relay team, P. C. has won. These victories occurred in the Boston K. of C. meet (1950), Seton Hall Relays (1951), Washington Star games (1951), and the Junior Nationals (1951).

Besides being a member of the Junior National champion 1-mile relay team, the red-head includes the winning of the open 60-yard dash in the P. C. Invitation meet (1950), a double victory in last year's Friar-Bear duel meet in the 100 and 220-yard dashes on the cinders at the Eastsider's stadium, and an effort in the 600-yard Invitation Run at this year's Washington Star meet as his top thrills. The last event mentioned included a field of national and international middle distance champions. The race was won by Arthur Wint of Jamaica, 1948 Olympic champion.

His top times include a 1-minute, 16 second 600, 6.4 seconds for the 60-yard dash and 10.1 in the 100.

Frank Lussier is another Coatesman who never competed in track before entering Providence College.

The lean six-footer graduated from Somerset High School in 1947. While in high school, Frank played on the varsity basketball and football teams.

Another member of the P. C. junior class, this Friar went out for track in the spring of 1948. For his first two years, Lussier ran mostly in the mile and two mile runs, and competed in cross-country.

But last fall, he showed signs of definite improvement and since then the Bay-Stater has developed into an excellent half-miler and a very good quarter-miler.

His efforts on the Providence College varsity two-mile relay team have made the Friar quartet a team to be figured with in any circle. He has teamed with Dick Johnson, Bill Sherry and Bill Keenan to give Providence a team second only to Yale's for New England honors and one of the top four or five in the East.

Frank turned in a very good quarter mile for the winning 1-mile relay team in last month's Washington Star games. He also did a very good job in the duel meet victory over Brown on last fall's cross-country team.

Lussier's best time is 1 minute, 56.5 seconds clocking for his 880 on the 2-mile relay team in the B.A.A. meet last month.

Thus such men as Frank Lussier and Jim Penler of the class of 1952 have shown what drive, the will to win and good coaching can do. They continue the Harry Coates tradition.

Boxers Continue Daily Workouts

Pete Louthis' boxers are continuing their workouts which began more than a week ago in preparation for the arrival of the highly enjoyable annual smoker to be held next month.

Returnees from last year's bouts include such men as Dick McAllister, Vin Callahan, Jerry Hanrahan, Frank Kilbride and Leo McCarthy. McAllister, Callahan and Hanrahan numbered among the victors a year ago. Vin later went on to become the only Providence winner in a match with Dartmouth College at Hanover, N. H.

Stan Bator, Jim Marum, Joe Devine and Jim Shugrue are others taking part in the training.

Boxing coach Pete Louthis is still on the look-out for more pugilists for the annual smoker to be held in March. Those who wish to take part in these bouts had better report to Louthis soon as the training time is getting shorter.

The Providence College varsity 1-mile and 2-mile relay teams are entered in the 30th annual I.C.4A indoor track meet at Madison Square Garden on Saturday night.

The Junior National AAU championship 1-mile relay team will be made up of Bob Tiernan, John McMullen, Jack Cassidy, and either Jim Penler or Dick Tiernan.

Dick Johnson, Bill Sherry, Frank Lussier, and Bill Keenan or Jim Gannon will comprise the 2-mile relay team which barely missed a championship in the Junior National AAU meet when it was nipped by Yale.

A Friar freshman 1 7/8 mile medley relay team with Chris Lohner (880), Art Corvese (440), Bob Dugas (220) and Bill Newman (1 mile) may be entered if the latter's injured ankle heals in time.

Marcuccie is one of the foremost socialites on the campus. Beside being a glutton for work, he has such a soft-spoken and convincing manner that he was elected president of the Monogram Club and secretary of the Friar Club.

As a side note on Steve's concern for the team, there is now a proposal under consideration to put two crying towels in the locker room after the team has lost. Not that Marcuccie or coach Cuddy have need for any windshield wipers, but both men are so devoted to the team that it's hard for them to console each other after defeats.

They first crossed paths in 1941 while attending the University of Connecticut. (Steve put in a year at Uconn before going into the Navy.) The fates that brought them together at Providence certainly produced one of the hardest-working coach-and-manager combinations to be found on any campus.

The Rams meet Bates Wednesday and the University of Maine Thursday on their two-game junket to the Pine Tree State and will be back home for a return encounter with Connecticut on Saturday.

That game may decide the Yankee Conference championship since both the Rams and Uconns are currently tied for the lead with only one defeat apiece. State beat the Huskies in their first meeting but lost to Vermont.

Holy Cross Here

The Brown cagers are down for only one contest but that one is a killer. The powerful Holy Cross quintet will be the party of the second part at Marvel Gym Saturday night.

Following the Bowdoin contest, Coach Cuddy will take his squad on the road for the remaining five games, starting with Springfield College at Springfield, Mass. on Saturday night.

The Polar Bears from Brunswick have been strictly on a small college schedule meeting only Colby and St. Anselm as mutual opponents of P. C. Whether the Friars have a breather or not will depend on their being hot or cold this evening.

Over the week-end, Providence was forced to go the limit in playing Brown and Rensselear. At Marvel Gym, P. C. found that an eight point advantage at one point of the game proved ineffective to tame the hustling Bruins who roared back to hand the Friars a heart-breaking 63-62 setback. On Saturday evening, the Dominicans again saw a big lead melt as the surging Rensselear Engineers threw a second half scare into the home team, before succumbing 71-70.

The absence of Frank Pelligrino to combat the height of the Rensselear Club was one of the principal reasons for the team's inability to handle the Engineers despite P. C.'s fast first half. However, Jim Schlimm's excellence under the boards plus his 26 points and Ray Korbusieski's drive provided the Friars with just enough spark to stifle the New Yorkers.

Coach Vin Cuddy expects his Friars will have their hands full tonight against Upsala, especially since Frank Pelligrino will continue to sit it out on the sidelines with a bruised foot. Pelly suffered the injury in practice last week and may not be ready until next week. His loss weakens P.C. considerably around the boards.

Pelligrino is also expected to be missing for tonight's game. Cuddy, however, won't have to worry much about a height advantage such as he faced in the Rensselear game. The biggest man on the Bowdoin squad is John Handy who stands about 6'3". Defensively, the Polar Bears will be tough, having held their opponents to little over 52 points per game.

The Providence College offensive average has been moving along at a good 70-point per game clip. When Sam Nissel—now hitting with his old-time form—scored 17 points against Rensselear, he became the last of the five starters to reach the 100 point total this year. But the P.C.-Friar game is the top attraction on the list. The Rams are almost at par, but the Friars are below normal because Frank Pelligrino will not be ready to play.

Key Man Out

Pelly, who is sidelined with an injured foot, was one of the key men in the Friars' early victory over State. His 20-foot hook shot

with 90 seconds remaining tied the score at 62-62 and sent the game into the overtime period. His work on clearing the backboards was invaluable, as it has been in every game, and his absence will hinder the Friars considerably.

Ed Mooney will start in Pelligrino's place, with Bob Prendergast as his alternate. The other starters will be Sam Nissel, Jim Schlimm, Ray Korbusieski and Garcia.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars yesterday said that his outlook on the game hung on one of those intangibles: "If we are hitting like we did against Bowdoin, we'll be okay; if we are like we were against Springfield (the Friars made 15 out of 72 shots) it will be a rout. But we're always 'up' for this one, so we should make it a game."

Doubtful

The Rams' man on the doubtful list is Fred Congleton, who has a cold. However, he was up and around yesterday and definitely will start for the Rams. The other starters are Ed Hole, Chuck Stewart, Bill Baird and John Mitchell.

The Rams, after a few rocky games, played in normal fashion against Connecticut Saturday. They went all out before losing by five points. Their coach, Red Haire, looks for a continued good showing tonight.

In the series record, the Rams have won 24 out of the 32 games.

N.E. Hoop Tournney Setup Presents Confusing Picture

NAIB Regional Playoff Listed

First; Then Comes the
'New England'

Now let's get squared away on all these college basketball tournaments.

Providence College on Monday accepted an invitation to participate in the New England playoffs of the tournament sponsored by the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball (NAIB).

The NAIB is a grouping of small colleges throughout the country—32 regions in all. The Friars, among others, are playing for the

right to represent New England in the finals at Kansas City, Mar. 12-17.

The playoff starts next Tuesday at Tufts College, and the Friars will play St. Ansem's, New Britain Teachers, regional winner last year, will play Tufts. The final will be played Wednesday night and the winner will go to the big playoff at Kansas City.

Everybody clear on that one? Still to come is the so-called New England tournament. This one is being run by a group with the longest title in the world—the Association of New England Colleges for Conference on Athletics.

This is not a conference at all. It has no powers. Instead, its members—largely athletic directors of

New England institutions—meet once a year to discuss mutual problems in athletics.

This year they decided to run a basketball tourney of their own and, adding confusion to confusion, will hold part of it at Tufts College.

First, they will hold an elimination: one for northern New England, at Colby on Mar. 12 and 13; one for southern New England at Tufts on the same dates. The final will be played at Tufts on Mar. 16.

Eight teams will be invited to play. The selection of the teams probably will be made this week-end.

This year's tourney will, in effect, be played for the championship of practically nothing, for the region's two top teams, Holy Cross and

Connecticut, have signified they are not interested. They are holding off for bigger things. Yale, Dartmouth and Harvard, because of Ivy League commitments, are out this year, but may be interested next year.

Parsons said yesterday that 14 teams have expressed a willingness to play. Rhode Island's eligibles—Brown, Providence College and F.I. State—when questioned independently yesterday expressed anything but a deep yearning to participate, as follows:

Frank Keane, athletic director at State, said the Rams "would play if we could help out."

Brown's athletic director, Paul F. Mackesy, said the Bruins would not be "too anxious" to enter the

tourney as it lines up this year, but would not want to shut the door for future participation.

The Rev. A. B. Begley, P.C.'s athletic director, indicated that the Friars were not too high on the matter, considering their commitments to the NAIB.

But that is not the end of the tournament picture. There are, still to come, the two "big" ones, held at New York's Madison Square Garden.

The first is the National Invitation (N.I.T.), a Garden-sponsored deal that runs from Mar. 10-13, with the final on Mar. 17. Then comes the tourney run by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the week after N.I.T.
