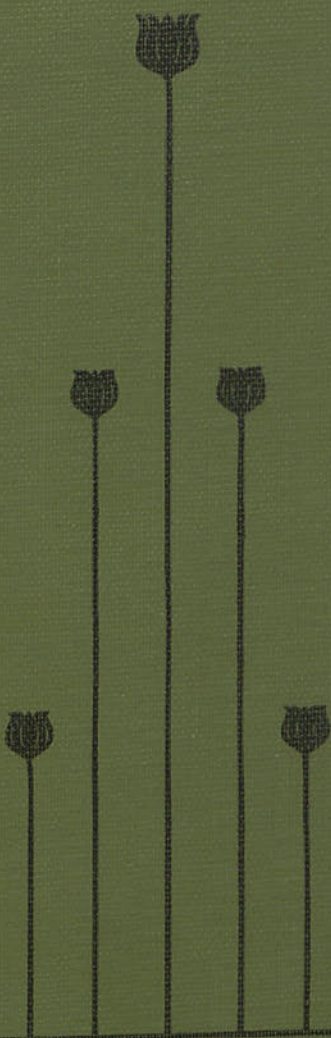
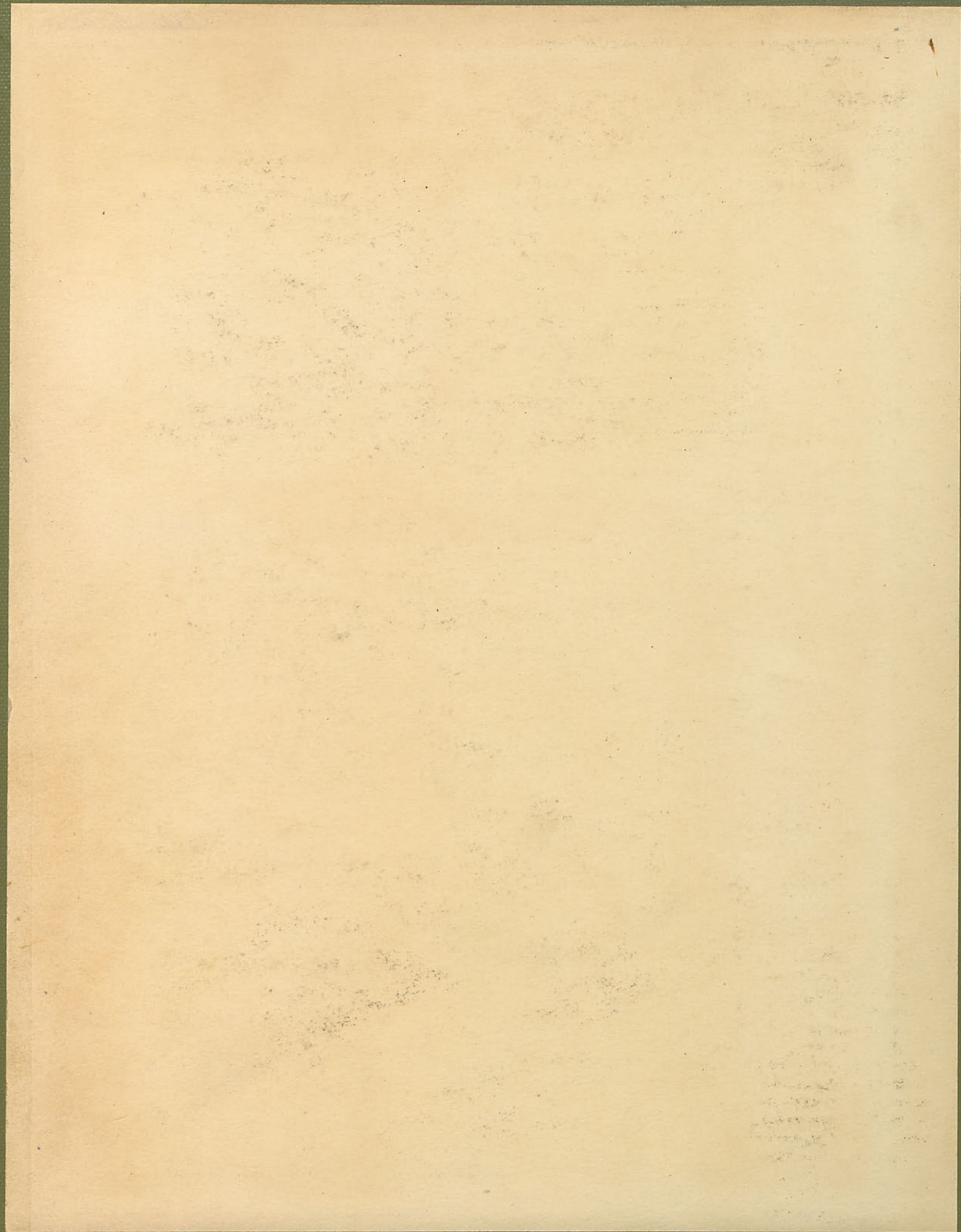

FRIARS REGISTER 71-TO-69 VICTORY OVER SPRINGFIELD

Losers' Schutts Nets 32
Points; Prendergast, Kor-
busiński Star for P.C.

Springfield—Despite a record-smashing 32-point output by Alan Schutts, Springfield College was forced to accept its second home defeat in as many days before 1400 homecoming weekend fans yesterday. A slick-handling bunch of Providence College Friars turned the trick, 71-69, in as interesting a college basketball game as has been seen in this city this season.

A great deal of consolation went to the home side, however, in the performance of Schutts. The red-headed sharpshooter blasted his own field-house mark of 31 points in addition to establishing a new record for foul shots completed on this same floor.

Schutt's previous high of 31 points came on Jan. 5 here against New Hampshire. He also popped 31 against Clark at Worcester on Jan. 9. Completing 16 free throws, Schutts easily set a new field-house figure in this department. Leon Golembiewski of the University of Rhode Island formerly held the record with 11 charity heaves made Mar. 5, 1949.

As for the ball-game—it was a real tinger all the way. The lead changed hands so many times if you said either team was ahead you probably would be right.

Providence was in front by 21-20 at a quarter mark. It led 47-41, its largest margin of the game, at half-time. Again at the end of the third session the Friars held the edge by 62-59. But these figures far from indicate the trend of the tussle. Providence might have been superior—but no one could admit it that saw the gallant fight that Springfield put up.

Is Spring Here? Friar Ball Team Begins Workouts

Maybe someone saw a robin or felt a warm breeze coming up from the Gulfstream, or read down the sport pages further than the recent basketball scandal to find news of spring training. Spring is already here at P.C. A part of the Providence College 1951 baseball squad has been out exercising and limbering up for the past two weeks.

When informed of this fact by freshman basketball coach Hal Martin, who will soon be donning his flannels as the Friars' head diamond mentor, this reporter admitted ignorance and sought further information on this "early bird" enthusiasm.

It all has to do with the schedule which the Friars are going to face this year. Martin will take his men on a two week tour, starting in the middle of April at Emmitsburg, Maryland, against Mt. St. Mary's College and winding up with Fairfield. Between Maryland and New England, Providence will be guests to such strong clubs as Georgetown, U. of Virginia and St. John's of New York, as well as Yale. All told, the team will play eight games in 11 days. Coach Martin believes this to be the roughest schedule ever engaged by the college in a number of years.

Although he considers his team a year away from peak form, Martin is content to meet the best, regardless of where or when. He is adopting a long range view because next year's team will be composed essentially of this season's players. Seven of the nine starting positions excluding pitcher and catcher will be manned by veteran players, most of whom are juniors. As for battery mates where, Martin says, the improvement has been the strongest, two sophomores are expected to be in the front running.

Heading the returnees are co-captains and outfielders Jim Costello and Sam Nissel along with power-boy Dick Duignan, the third flychaser. The infield is also well stocked with Don MacDonald at first; George Ducharme, second; Howie McGuinness, short; and Steve Sulavik, third, with Ed Mooney and Skip McGurkin, the top reserves.

In the pitching department, the southpaws will predominate, as hold-overs Frank Higgins, Bill McKeon and

Jim Schlimm all throw from the left side. Joining this group will be the hot soph prospect, Bill Mullin, a big 200 pounder of exceptional ability.

The catching situation appears to be in better shape than ever and may be the key to solving the pitching difficulties encountered by the Friar club last year. Senior receiver will be Hank Downey with Bill Quinn, the second varsity rookie from whom much is expected for the coming campaign, as the second choice. Quinn is 6'2", about 190 and a left handed swinger.

The scene of the tournament will be Tufts College, Medford, Mass.

In the first of their two previous outings, St. A's caught P. C. on the rebound from the Boston College defeat and handed them an 81-64 setback at Manchester. The Friars returned the compliment with a 72-62 victory over the Hawks at Mount Pleasant.

It will be interesting to watch Jim Schlimm and St. Anselm's Bill O'Conner renew a scoring duel begun last month up in New Hampshire. Other standouts for St. A's will probably be Chuck Duffley and Gus D'Orazio.

With Frank Pelligrino's return to action and the present performances of Sam Nissell, Ray Korbusieski, Ray Garcia and Ed Mooney, the Friars stand a chance of capturing the tourney title. Another interesting factor is that the game will be played on a neutral court.

Two and a half years ago Providence College was graced with one of the finest basketball players ever to come out of Connecticut when "Ray" Korbusieski enrolled here. Ray, better known as "Korby," has lived up to the reputation he had established while playing ball for Leavenworth High School in Waterbury, Conn. When he was a junior in high school, he was selected by the Boston sportswriters after the New England Basketball Championship, which Leavenworth won, as one of New England's best high school basketball players, a distinct honor. He was picked because of his superb defensive play which he has carried with him to college.

Coach "Vin" Cuddy rates him as the most consistent ball player on the club. When asked which were "Korby's" better games, "Vin" replied, "I can't say which games were exemplary of his better playing because he has played well in all. Not only has his fine floor play helped the club immensely but also his great driving spirit has injected life into the whole club as well."

Though the smallest man in the starting line-up, he makes up for his size by his outstanding competitive spirit and his everlasting pep. While in college he has developed a better than average eye for scoring those points, especially at a crucial point in the game. R. I. State Cagers Win Over Friars, 86 to 62

Kingston, March 1—R. I. State evened its series with Providence College last night, scoring an easy 86 to 62 win here in Rodman Hall before 1200 fans. The Friars edged the Rams 68 to 67 earlier in the season.

Paced by the fine set shooting of Billy Baird, who scored 27 points, the Rams raced out front early and held their margin all the way. Rhode Island connected twice in the first minute of play and from then on there was no stopping the Rams, who led 45 to 32 at the half.

After extending their margin to 79 to 48 in the second half, Coach Red Haire sent in his subs and had them finish up. Frank Pellegrino, Westerly boy, who is co-captain of the Friars, did not play last night because of a foot injury. Pellegrino has missed the last four games, and his absence has hurt the Friars plenty.

Pendergarst who filled in for Pellegrino was top scorer for Providence with 16 points, the same number poured in by Fred Congleton of State.

State, Friars Travel; Brown Five At Home

Three Rhode Island college basketball teams will be in action tonight, with Brown being the only one playing at home. The Bruins entertain Dartmouth. In a preliminary game at Marvel Gym, starting at 7 o'clock, the Bruin Freshmen meet Leicester Junior College.

Providence College faces powerful Holy Cross at Worcester tonight. The Crusaders, shooting for a post-season tournament bid, have won 18 games and lost only four. The Friars, who lost to State Wednesday, have won 11 and lost seven.

P. C.'s outstanding Freshman team, rated one of the best in New England, will meet another great Fresh quintet in Holy Cross. The latter, featuring Ronnie Perry, former Somerville ace; and giant Togo Pallazi, has lost only one game. P. C. has lost three.

Skill in Set Shot Pays Off, 86-62, For Easy Revenge in State Series

Substitutes Take Over After 12 Minutes of the Second Period; Baird Stars

Rhode Island State College, on its precise ability with the long shot, defeated Providence College, 86 to 62, before 1200 spectators last night at Rodman Hall, Kingston.

Once they got operational, the Rams played an aggressive type of basketball that was nicely leavened by an excellent—even spectacular—showing on the set shot. Fully half of their 36 baskets were pumped in from the middle ranges.

As a result, they won easily, though the Friars played well enough to be in contention in most any game except this one. The Rams had built a 45-32 lead at the end of the half, then raced to a 79-48 margin in 12 minutes of the second period. The State subs finished up from that point.

The Friars' freshman team posted an early lead and downed the Rams' freshmen, 58-50.

On the Target

State's Wally Baird led the shooters in the varsity game with 27 points and the majority of his 13 baskets were off his deliberate set shot. He was not the only Ram on the target, however. Fred Congleton scored 16 points and did a fine job of clearing the backboards. Ed Hole got 13 points and John Mitchell 12.

Bob Prendergast, the Friars' pivot man, led his club with 16 points. Jim Schlimm scored 15. Prendergast was filling in for the injured Fran Pelligrino, whose usually strong defensive work was missed by the Friars.

The Rams' victory, their 10th in 23 games, more than made up for the 68-67 overtime defeat the Friars had handed them earlier in the season. The Providence College record now is 11 victories and seven defeats.

Rally

State and the Friars now have 1-2 records in the intrastate series and each has another game with Brown, which has won two and lost none.

The first three times the Rams

got the ball they scored, and Baird gave an indication of things to come by making two of the three baskets on set shots. His second one put the Rams in front at the two-minute mark and they were not headed again.

But for seven minutes, at least it was close. The Friars pulled up to 19-12, with Prendergast clicking with his hook shot.

Then the Rams switched to overdrive. In less than five minutes they outscored the Friars, 16-5, and held a 40-22 lead after 15 minutes of play. A minor rally by Providence closed the gap to 13 points at the half.

Called

After intermission, the Rams repeated their first-half show by scoring three straight baskets in less than a minute. Congleton, who had been hindered all week by a cold, showed none of the effects by scoring 10 straight points and putting the Rams in front, 61-39.

Shortly after the half-way point, State had posted a 79-48 lead and Coach Red Haire called off his regulars. The Friars doubled the sub's point production, but the points came much too late.

Oddly, as the Friars' coach, Vin Cuddy, said afterward, his club "didn't play a bad ball game." Their 62 points would win a lot of games. But not this one, with the Rams on their shooting spree.

Bob Moran led the Friars' frosh with 15 points and Don Dunn was high for State with 11.

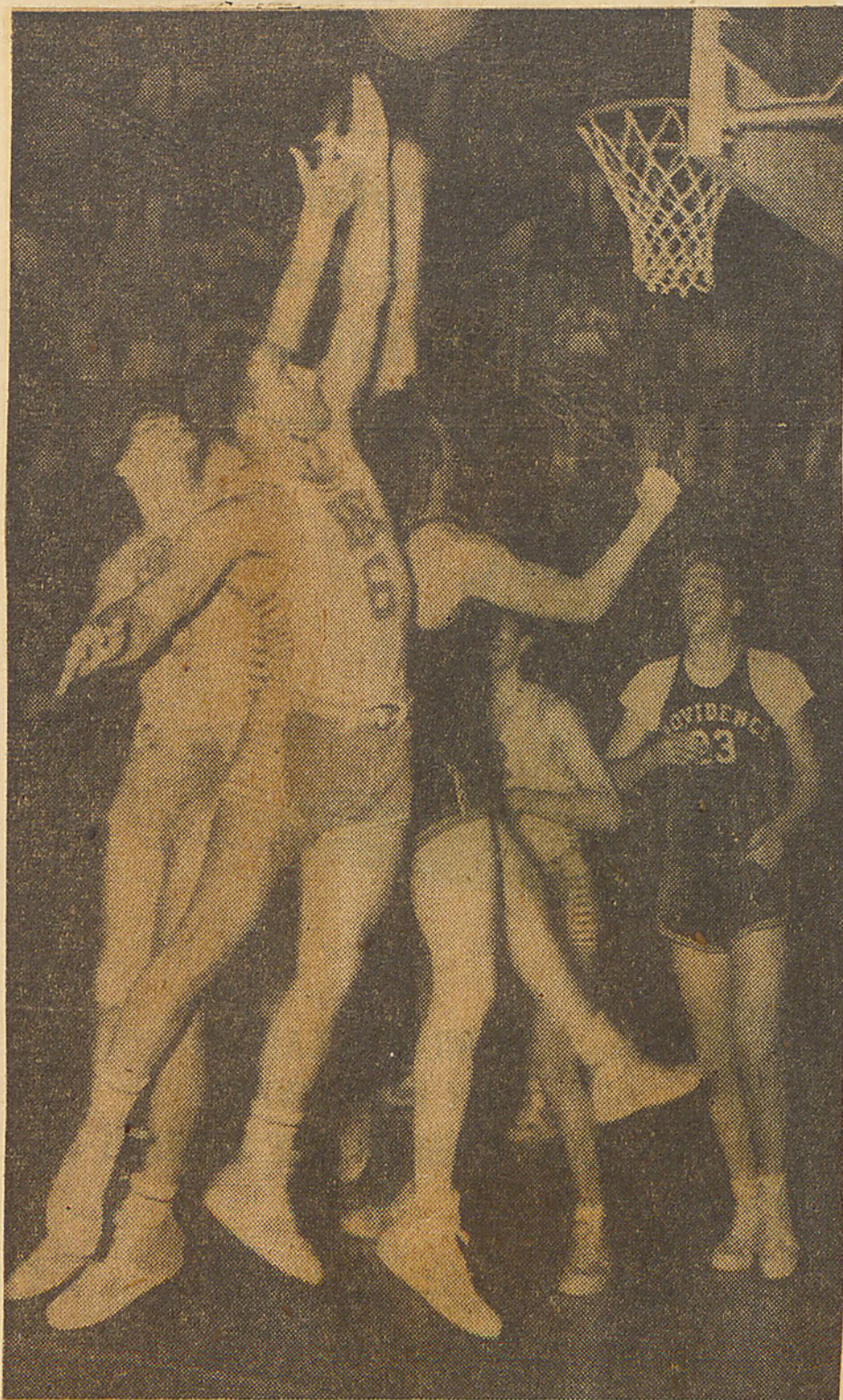

CRUSADERS DUMP

P.C. FRIARS, 70-53

Holy Cross Five Encounters
Difficulty in Starting,
but Finally Rolls

Worcester, Mar. 3.—Providence Colleges' Friars gave Holy Cross a much-sterner struggle than expected here tonight at the Worcester Auditorium before 1700 fans, but the stronger Crusaders prevailed, 70 to 53.

The victory was Holy Cross' 19th of the season, as against four defeats. Providence, losing its third straight game, played much better ball than it had showed in two recent setbacks.

The Friars played well enough to justify some optimism over their chances in the NAIB Tourney next week, which perhaps hadn't been too strong going into this contest.

Ray Korbusieski and Ray Garcia were the leading Friars, with 15 and 12 points, respectively.

Jim O'Neil, a junior from Columbus, Ohio, led the Cross scorers with 15 points. Jim Dilling returned to the lineup after being out with a shoulder injury and was a help, though he scored only eight points. Bob McDonough and Earle Markey also played well for the Crusaders, undefeated on their home court in two seasons.

The Friars played very well during the first half. The Crusaders picked up speed as the game moved along and were better during the second half. Providence made a game of it, led by Bob Prendergast and Sam Nissel up front and Korby and Garcia driving and passing with their early season skill. Nissel also scored 12 points.

The game moved along at a slow but aggressive pace in the early going because that was the way the Friars played it. They matched the Crusaders point for point for the most part. They led, 11-9, after eight minutes, trailed, 12-11, at the 10-minute mark and were down, 19-15, with five minutes to go in the first half.

It was 31-20 at intermission, with Markey tossing in a layup shot about three seconds before the buz-

zer. The Crusaders made it 37-25 about three minutes along in the second half. Although the Cross maintained a comfortable margin, the Friars were plugging along and playing what Coach Vin Cuddy called a "very courageous game against a real ball club."

Jim Schlimm, the Friar's big gun, fouled out around the nine-minute mark of the second half, with just one basket, his lowest scoring mark in two seasons of varsity play. However, Frank Pelligrino, who had been on the bench with an injured foot, picked up some of the slack and turned in a good job defensively.

This was by far the best game the Friars have played against the Crusaders in their last three meetings. There never was much question of an upset, yet the Worcester fans were appreciative of the fine game turned in by the Rhode Island squad against its rangy and competent opposition.

The Holy Cross Frosh scored a 97-to-74 victory of the Providence Freshmen in the preliminary contest.

Togo Palazzi, 18-year-old star from Union City, N.J., set an individual-scoring record for Holy Cross Freshmen, with 45 points in the opener. The Friar Frosh took the lead in the first quarter, 21-18, but the Crusaders came back with 31 points during the second period and led, 49-36, at intermission.

Contests This Week Will Decide Intrastate Collegiate Hoop Crown

The Providence College and Rhode Island State basketball teams will launch the last full week of winter-sports activity for the local collegians when they participate in a basketball doubleheader tonight at the Boston Garden.

The Friars and the University of Massachusetts will clash in the opening game and the Rams will try to avenge their double-overtime defeat at the hands of Boston College earlier in the season in the nightcap.

For Coach Vin Cuddy's P.C. quintet, it will be the first of four games this week. The Friars will compete in the regional tournament of the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball tomorrow and Wednesday at Tufts College and will wind up their regular schedule Saturday night against Brown.

The Bruins, currently leading the intrastate college series, can clinch the R.I. title by defeating State at Marvel Gym Wednesday night. Judging from the way the Rams have been playing in their last two games against P.C. and Springfield, however, it appears Brown will have to be at its best to win. Should State win Wednesday, the Bruins still could take the crown by defeating the Friars. If the Bears lose both contests, the race for the state crown will wind up in a triple tie.

It's a busy week for the Rhode Island collegians, with the Friars competing in the New England eliminations of the NAIB tourney and the State championship to be settled among Brown, PC and the Rams. Rhody, shooting with the skill and finesse it displayed against PC and Springfield, should prevent the Eagles from closing out their season with a victory. Boston College, which started the campaign with such brilliant prospects, now has lost its last three games, and six of its last seven.

Rams Favored

The Rams, while not hitting quite as well as they did against the Friars, nevertheless took Springfield into camp rather handily, 90-67, with Fred Congleton, Johnny Mitchell, Bill Baird, Chuck Stewart and Eddie Hole playing well for Rhody. The Rams have won four of their last five and will be favored to reverse a 69-66 two-overtime setback tonight. The first meeting between the Eagles and the Rams at Kingston was one of State's better games.

The Friars played a hustling

brand of ball against Holy Cross and came in for considerable commendation from Buster Sheary, the Crusader coach. Providence, which lacked stamina in some of its other games, turned in an improved game over its recent showings and probably would have beaten a less-dangerous foe.

Holy Cross had to stick to business and the Friars were in the contest up until seven or eight minutes from the finish. Bob Prendergast has been getting better with each game, while Frank Pelligrino is ready for first-line duty again and didn't show much effect from the layoff. Ray Garcia, Ray Korbusiecki and Sam Nissel all did good jobs, especially in their driving and ball-handling. Jim Schlimm's rebounding was helpful, although he was off on his shooting.

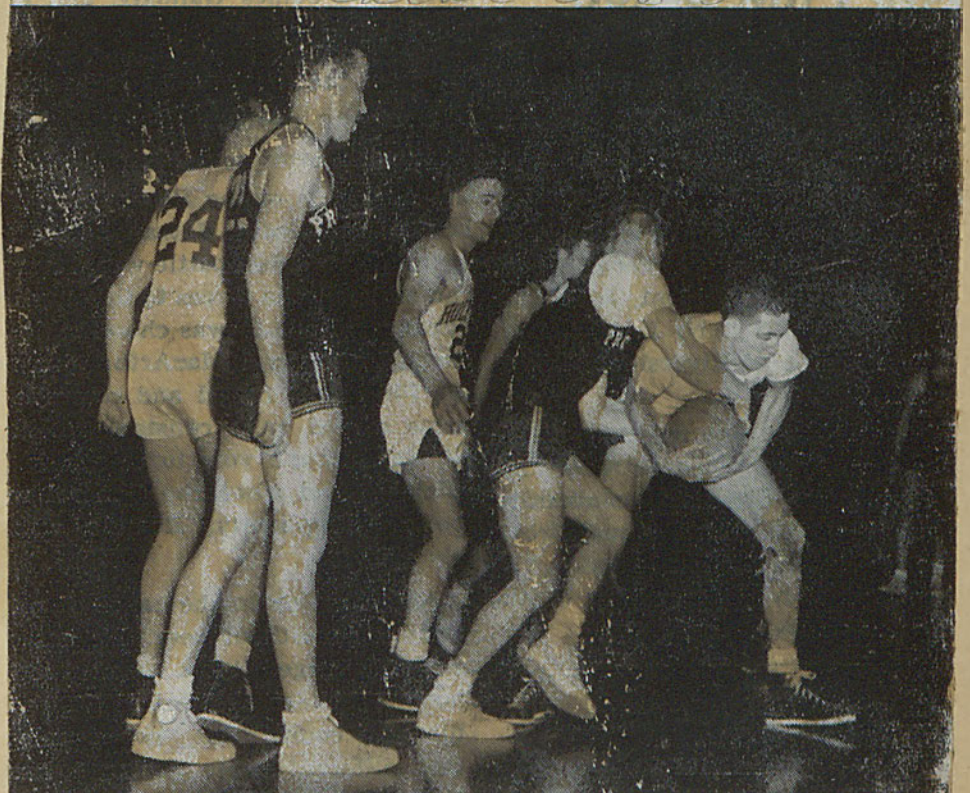

Dominicans Will Play Tufts
Tonight in New England

Medford, Mass., Mar. 6.—The Providence College Friars won their way into the New England final of the NAIB with a thrilling 54-to-50 victory over a favored St. Anselm's quintet tonight at Cousens Gym on the Tufts College campus.

Tomorrow night the Friars take on Tufts in the tourney final with the winner representing the New England sector in the National Tournament next week at Kansas City, Mo. Tufts won the second game here tonight, defeating Fairfield, 65-55, before 1500 fans.

It was one of the outstanding games of the season for the Friars, who came up for this game with a spirited exhibition, combining a modified zone defense with a careful, headsup offense. The Hawks, who had won their last six, gave Providence quite an argument with the result in doubt right to the finish.

The Friars have played as aggressively at other times but they have seldom put fight and skill together as well as they did tonight. Providence took the lead in the first minute and although it was deadlocked twice, never was behind. Whether the Hawks tried to play it fast or slow, the Friars seemed to have the situation in hand.

Newport's Bill O'Connor did a good job for the Hawks but the Friars had the outstanding player of the contest in Frank Pelligrino from Westerly. The lanky center was Johnny-on-the-spot with rebound and was a major factor in the victory.

Practically everybody in the P.C. lineup contributed something. Ray Garcia, Ray Korbusieski, Jim Schlimm and Sam Nissel played well, yet the spot work of Ed Mooney, Bob Prendergast, Tom Bauer and Ronnie Gagnon was important also.

Providence took the lead with three baskets at the outset, saw the Hawks tie it up and then rolled on to a 30-22 halftime margin.

The tension didn't mount until above five minutes along in the second half. The Hawks cut down the P.C. margin from eight points to nothing, as they tied it up on a pair of successful foul conversions by O'Connor at 34-all.

That's the point where the Hawks' rooters figured their club was taking over. The pace was fast with some body contact. Garcia's foul broke the tie and Schlimm, hustling his head off, put in three points, making it 38-34. After that the Hawks kept coming but the Friars held their margin, leading by as much as eight points with eight minutes left at 49-41.

Bob Williams sank two free throws but Schlimm nullified that for the Friars with a hook shot from a scramble. The Friars still had six points, 52-46, after Bob Stone's basket and foul shot. Garcia's two free throws made it 54-46 and then it was a race between the clock and the Hawks in the final four minutes.

Stone put in a set-shot. Korbusieski fouled out with 2:30 to go. Bart Lavin brought the Hawks up to 50 with a short pop shot. The Friars put on a freeze but tried to take advantage of an opening and missed three times from underneath. It was rough and tumble on both sides, with the Hawks straining every effort to score and P.C. trying to prevent it.

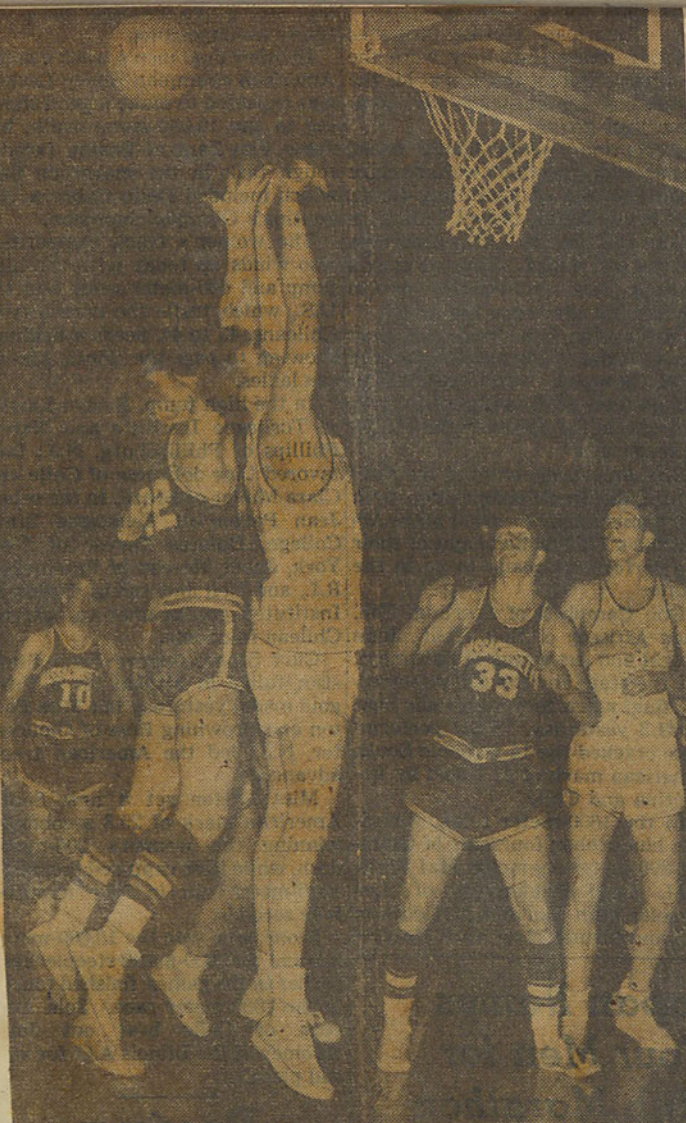

The law of averages caught up with Rhode Island State's sensational shooting of late and the Boston College Eagles handed the Rams a 68-to-54 setback in the second half of the Boston twin bill. 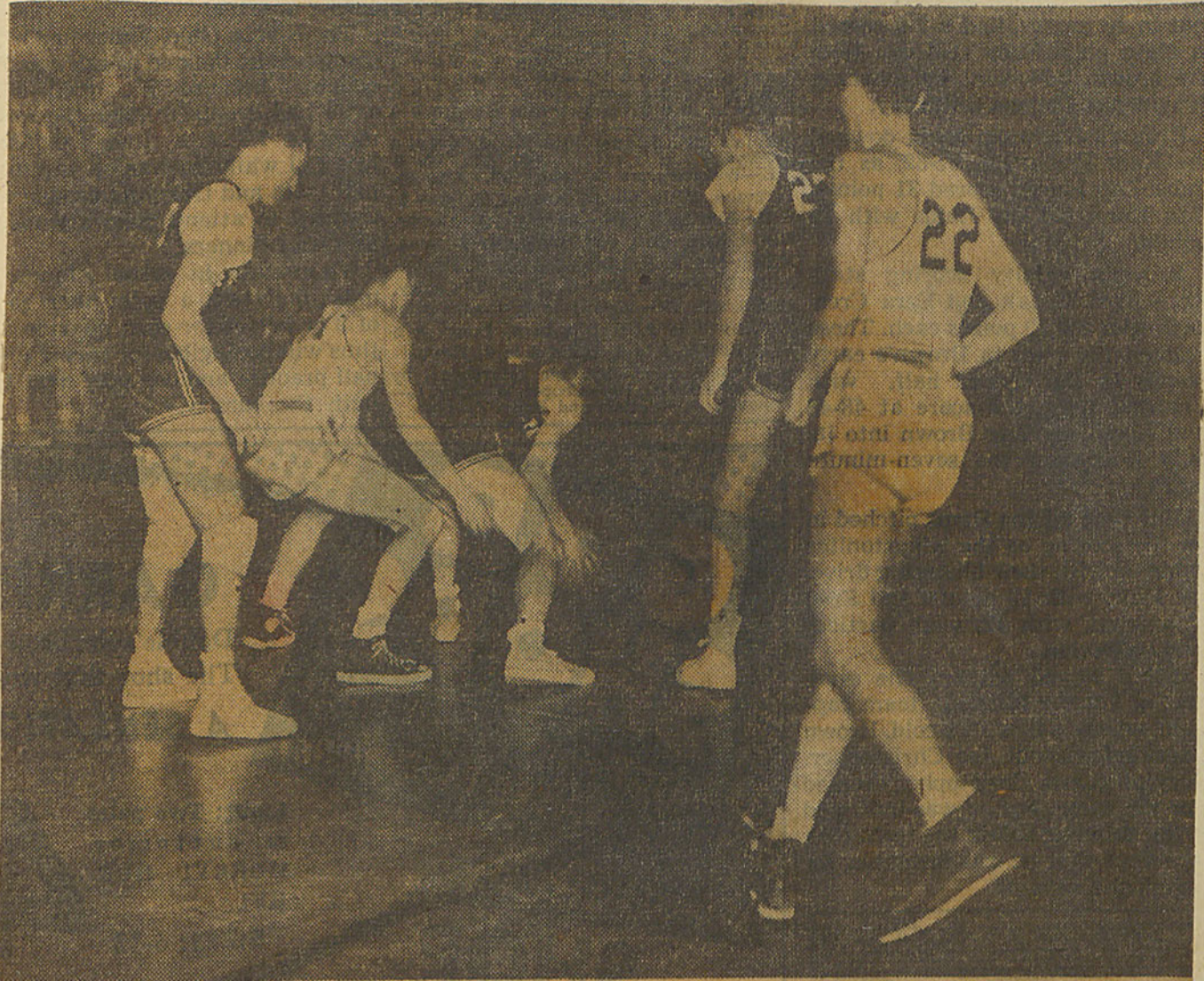

The Friars had the better of Tufts in an early season scrimmage but the Jumbos will be playing on their home court and have a high scoring combination, built around Don Goodwin, brother of Kenny, the former State scorer, and Jim Mullaney, a 1000-point man for his college career.

The Friars, who went all out to beat the Hawks and played a sound game, may not be as formidable tonight. Bob Prendergast, sophomore center, got a twisted ankle and Frank Pelligrino has a charley horse. Pelly, who was the game's outstanding player against St. Anselm's, will play against Tufts but it may slow him down.

Coach Cuddy thought his team played "terrific" and the players were plenty happy over the victory, one of their most important of the season.

"Pelly brought us in," Cuddy said, "but Sam Nissel did a fine job. You have to have somebody to get the rebounds and Pelly can do it. Jim Schlimm was a big help too. That defense (a modified zone)

killed 'em at times and it worked better than we figured. Korby (Ray Korbusieski), Ray Garcia and Sam had a lot to do with it, but they all played well. It was just our night, I guess."

O'Connor Paces Hawks

There's quite a similarity between the Friars' game with Holy Cross and this one last night. In both, they played hard, spirited ball and weren't overanxious to throw the ball just anyplace when they had possession. They were careful and cautious when they had to be and speedy when the tempo picked up. The Friars hit between 30 and 35 per cent and were effective under the boards.

Bill O'Connor from Newport was the Hawks' top man with 14 points. St. Anselm's was always dangerous and some figured the team that won the PC-Hawks game would take the tournament unless they wore each other down. Ross Merrick, coach of the New Britain Teachers and head of the New England group of the NAIB, picks Providence tonight.

The Friars built up a 30-22 lead in the first half, with the Hawks rallying for 12 points at the start of the second half and tying the score eventually at 34-all. Garcia put PC ahead with a foul shot. Then Schlimm, who is noted for scoring with freakish and sometimes nearly impossible shots, dropped in an underhand shot with two Hawks pinching him. When he made good on the free throw that went with it, the Friars had a four-point lead again, 38-34.

Providence had to put on a freeze to protect its lead in the late stages. The tension and the excitement in the second half was easily the best part of the evening for the spectators but hard on the coaches and the players.

P.C. Five Captures

N.E. NAIB Title

Once upon a time somebody named the Providence College athletic teams "the Fighting Friars." At times it has been most appropriate. But few teams have had a better right to be known as "the Fighting Friars" than the group which won the New England play-off for the NAIB tournament last night at Tufts College in Medford, Mass.

The Friars beat a good Tufts team, 77 to 74, in a thriller on their opponents' own court. Providence College is planning to play in the national tournament which opens next Monday in Kansas City, Mo., and will fly west Sunday according to tentative plans at present.

Providence has played a fine brand of ball in its last four games, starting with Holy Cross last Saturday. Both tourney games at Tufts, with St. Anselm's and the Jumbos, were hard fought and each could have gone the other way, if the Friars hadn't played as well and as aggressively as they did.

Pelligrino Top Man

Frank Pelligrino, lanky center from Westerly, was Providence's top man in the Medford games and was selected on the all-tourney team. His rebound work was outstanding against a fairly tall club in the final game. Yet Sam Nissel turned in his best work of the season in the two games, figuring prominently in the shooting and ball handling.

Ray Garcia and Ray Korbusieski were steady and dependable, setting up and scoring. Jim Schlimm, who also made the all-tournament team, had to spend last night's second half in the P.C. locker room with an eye injury that turned out to be less serious than at first believed by the attending doctor.

Coach Fred Ellis of Tufts thought the P.C. bench won the ball game. He wasn't taking anything away from the starters. However, Eddie Mooney scored 11 points in the second half as Schlimm's replace-

ment and Tom Bauer and Ronnie Gagnon both kept the team at top strength. Bauer did his best job of the season in the two games. Bob Prendergast nullified some of the Tufts height.

Determined Team

This has been a determined P.C. team of late. Garcia, Pelly and Nissel are bowing out and they wanted to wind up their college activity with a bang. Pelly's leg bothered him, Garcia is physically tired and Nissel hasn't been as effective this season. Coach Vin Cuddy couldn't have asked for a better effort from these fellows and the spirit and morale was the same down the line.

Tufts, led by Don Goodwin with 26 points, Jim Mullaney with 16 and Lowell Greenberg with 10, is a capable outfit. The Friars' defense, sometimes a two-three zone and sometimes a three-two variation, threw the Jumbos off stride but they came back strong. Coach Ellis said later that he figured his club had the Friars when they came back from 13 and 10-point deficits and tied it up but in each case,

Providence never got behind and kept up its driving and hustle. The Friars played cool, heads-up ball and had enough left in the clutch not to get panicky. While Pelligrino and Schlimm made the "all" team, the other PC starters, Nissel, Garcia and Korby, did an equally good job. Goodwin was the only unanimous choice while Stan Suchenski of Fairfield and Newport's Bill O'Connor completed the star quintet. O'Connor scored 25 points as St. Anselm's bowed to Fairfield, 68-64.

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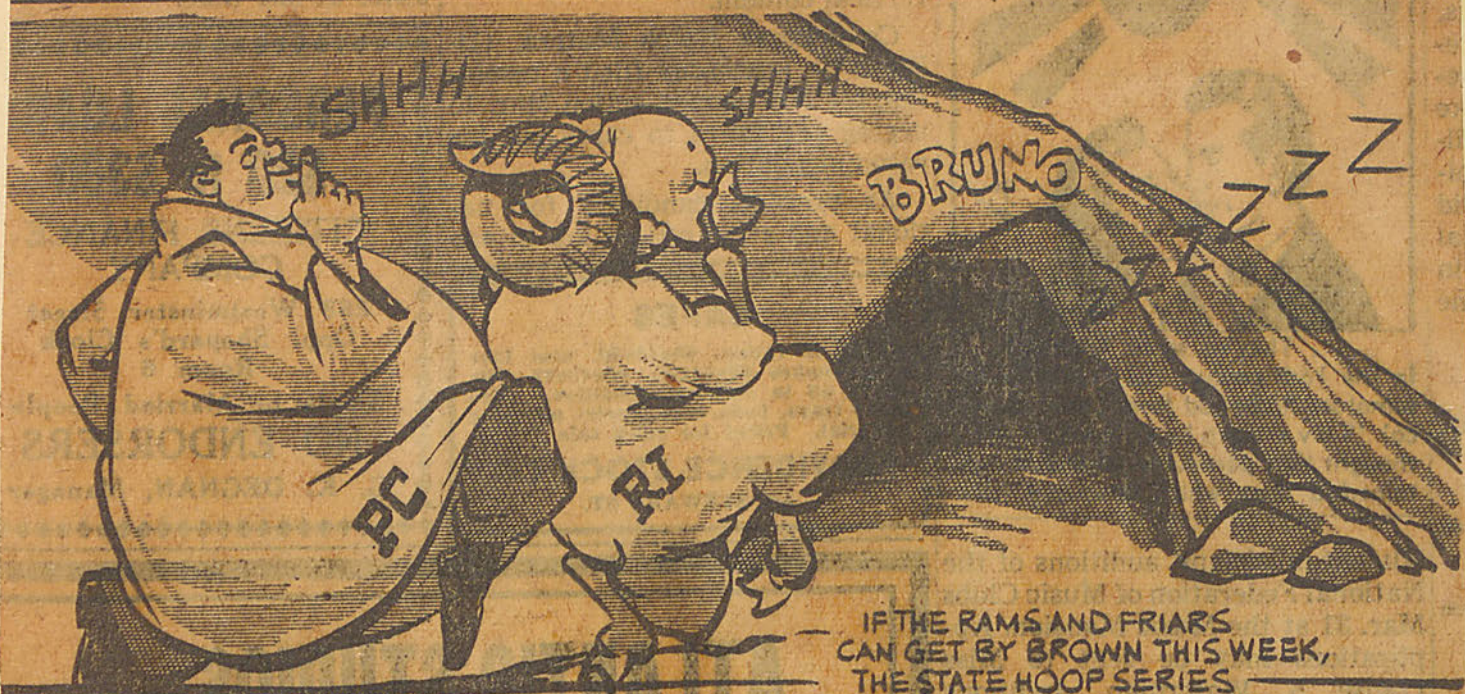

Brown gets a second shot at winning the intrastate basketball title tonight, playing Providence College at Marvel Gymnasium. The game starts at 8:30 o'clock.

For Brown, it is the last game of the season, which means that four regulars will be closing out their basketball careers for the Bruins. They are Fred Kozak, Chuck Whelan, Zeke Creswell and Al Gauthier.

It is the last regular scheduled game for the Friars, as well, and three of their regulars will be in for their last game in these parts. They are Ray Garcia, Sam Nissel and Fran Pelligrino.

The Friars' freshman team will meet the Brown Cubs in the preliminary game at 7 o'clock.

Friar Quintet Departs Tomorrow For NAIB Action at Kansas City

The Providence College Friars will undertake their longest sports junket in history tomorrow when they take off from Hillsgrove for the National Intercollegiate (NAIB) basketball tournament which opens Monday at Kansas City, Mo.

The Friars, who have a record of 13 victories and eight defeats, climaxed one of their best seasons in years by winning the New England tournament to select this section's representative at Kansas City. Competition starts Monday at 11 a.m. at the Municipal Auditorium in Kansas City among 32 teams from all sections of the nation.

The Providence College team will leave Hillsgrove tomorrow morning at 8:50, after Mass in the college chapel. The party will fly to Hartford in a special plane to meet the Boston-to-Chicago flight, leaving Hartford at 9:30. The group will arrive in Chicago at 1:40 in the afternoon and take a plane for Kansas City at 4 o'clock, reaching the tournament site at 6:15.

The Friars have enjoyed a successful season, regardless of the outcome of tonight's game with Brown. They played well in winning the NE bid with victories over St. Anselm's and Tufts. The competition will be keen in the Missouri metropolis, for some of the best small-college teams in the country, selected from a field of 365 schools, will be on hand for the tourney. The festivities open with a civic

dinner Sunday night at the Hotel Phillips.

Coach Vin Cuddy, the Rev. A.B. Begley, O.P., athletic director of the Friars, and 10 players will make the trip. Father Begley was in communication with Al Duer, the NAIB executive secretary in Kansas City, and the tourney directors said they would try to spot the Friars in a Tuesday game as they are playing tonight and traveling tomorrow.

This is the second tourney in which the Friars will play in two seasons. They were in the National Catholic tournament at Albany last season, losing to Siena, the tournament champion, in the first round.

Friars To Leave Sunday For NAIB Tourney Games

The Providence College Friars will fly to Kansas City Sunday for the National Intercollegiate (NAIB) basketball tournament, according to an announcement today by the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., athletic director at Providence College.

The Friars won the right to represent the New England district at Kansas City by defeating St. Anselm's and Tufts in a pair of hard-fought games earlier this week at the Tufts gym in Medford, Mass.

Present plans call for the Friars to take off Sunday at 8:50 a.m. from Hillsgrove via special plane for Hartford to catch the Boston-to-Chicago plane at 9:30 o'clock. The flight is due in Chicago at 1:40 in the afternoon. The party will take off for Kansas City, Mo., site of the 32-team tournament, at 4 o'clock, arriving at its destination at 6:15 p.m.

12-Man Party

Coach Vin Cuddy, Father Begley and 10 players will make the trip. The group will be met by special police escort at the Kansas City airport and proceed to the Hotel Phillips for the civic banquet which opens the tourney program Sunday night. The Friars' headquarters in Kansas City will be at the State Hotel.

Father Begley talked with Al Duer, NAIB executive secretary, yesterday via phone from Kansas City, regarding the tournament setup. The Friars will play either Monday or Tuesday, Duer said, and he'd try to arrange to spot them in a Tuesday game in view of the fact that they are playing Brown in a traditional game here tomorrow night.

The tournament is nation-wide, with teams representing 32 dis-

tricts from California to New England. The New Britain State Teachers have represented the New England sector at Kansas City for the last three seasons, being eliminated by Westminster College from New Wilmington, Pa., last year.

Evansville No. 1

Indiana State Teachers, 1950 tournament champion, is not defending its title this season. Evansville College from Indiana, which had an outstanding record this season with victories over Western Kentucky, Dayton, Tulsa, Butler and Indiana State, is top seeded with a 19-and-6 record.

Tournaments have been held in all sections of the country to determine the contenders for the national competition. Last night Hamline of St. Paul won the Minnesota tournament with a 49-to-45 victory over Bemidji, Minn., Teachers. Other teams among the 28 which have been certified for the tournament are Wisconsin Teachers from Eau Claire, New Mexico Aggies, East Texas Baptists, Rocky Mountain College of Billings, Montana, Pepperdine from Los Angeles, Morehead State from Kentucky and Baldwin-Wallace from Berea, Ohio.

This junket will be the longest ever made by the Friars, who have turned in several outstanding games of late, climaxed by their victory over Tufts on the Jumbos' home court for the N.E. bid.

Providence has played three games on successive nights already this week and two of them were right down to the wire—St. Anselm's and Tufts.

Zeke Creswell, Al Gauthier, Chuck Whelan and Kozak will be trying to close out their careers with a victory for the Bruins, while Sam Nissel, Frank Pelligrino, Ray Garcia, Al Becker, Skip McGurkin, Jim Power, and Eddie Mooney are among the senior Friars.

Brown won the opener, 62 to 61, and has a 2-1 lead in the race for the state title. A PC victory would make a three-way tie among Brown, Providence and Rhode Island State.

Bruins Gain 69-64 Victory Despite Friars' Late Drive

Kozak, Named Best Brown
Player of Year, Justifies
Choice in Game

Brown won the state basketball championship by staving off Providence College's strong second-half comeback and defeating the Friars, 69-64, last night at Marvel Gymnasium.

The Bruins raced ahead, 42-24, paced by Fred Kozak, in the first half, but the Friars hauled them up short by closing the margin to 52-49 and, later, to 67-64. Then the Bruins built a five-point lead with three minutes left and nurtured it to the end.

Providence College's freshmen closed out their season with a 20-4 record by beating the Brown Cubs, 75-73, in overtime.

The varsity game was turned into a zestful affair by the Friars' second-half rush and, throughout, there was plenty of fast action, a lot of rugged play and a couple of arguments.

Questioned

Vin Cuddy, Friar coach, volubly questioned one of referee Sid MacKay's calls and, after the game, several of the Friars ~~saw~~ the same official what-for on his decisions.

As is usually the case, the officiating, to this observer, was adequate. Each side had its gripes, each its moments of tactful silence.

Before the game, Kozak was given a trophy as Brown's outstanding player of the season and then he proceeded to justify the choice to the 1300 persons present. In the first half he scored nine baskets to the Friars' eight and took total-scoring honors with 24 points. It was an excellent closeout to a sterling athletic career for Kozak, for this was the Bruins' final game.

Ray Garcia led the Friars with 16 points, but in that second half, Sam Nissel, Frank Pelligrino and Jerry Lembo had especially hot hands.

Ninth Setback

The victory was Brown's second of the season over the Friars, their eighth in 19 games. They now have won seven straight from their crosstown rivals. The Friars, who leave tomorrow as New England's representative in the NAIB tourney at Kansas City, absorbed their ninth defeat as against 14 victories. This was their finale of the regular season.

Brown held a distinct margin in the first half, as Kozak, Chuck Whelan and Zeke Creswell, hitting from all points, sent their club into a 30-12 lead in 10 minutes.

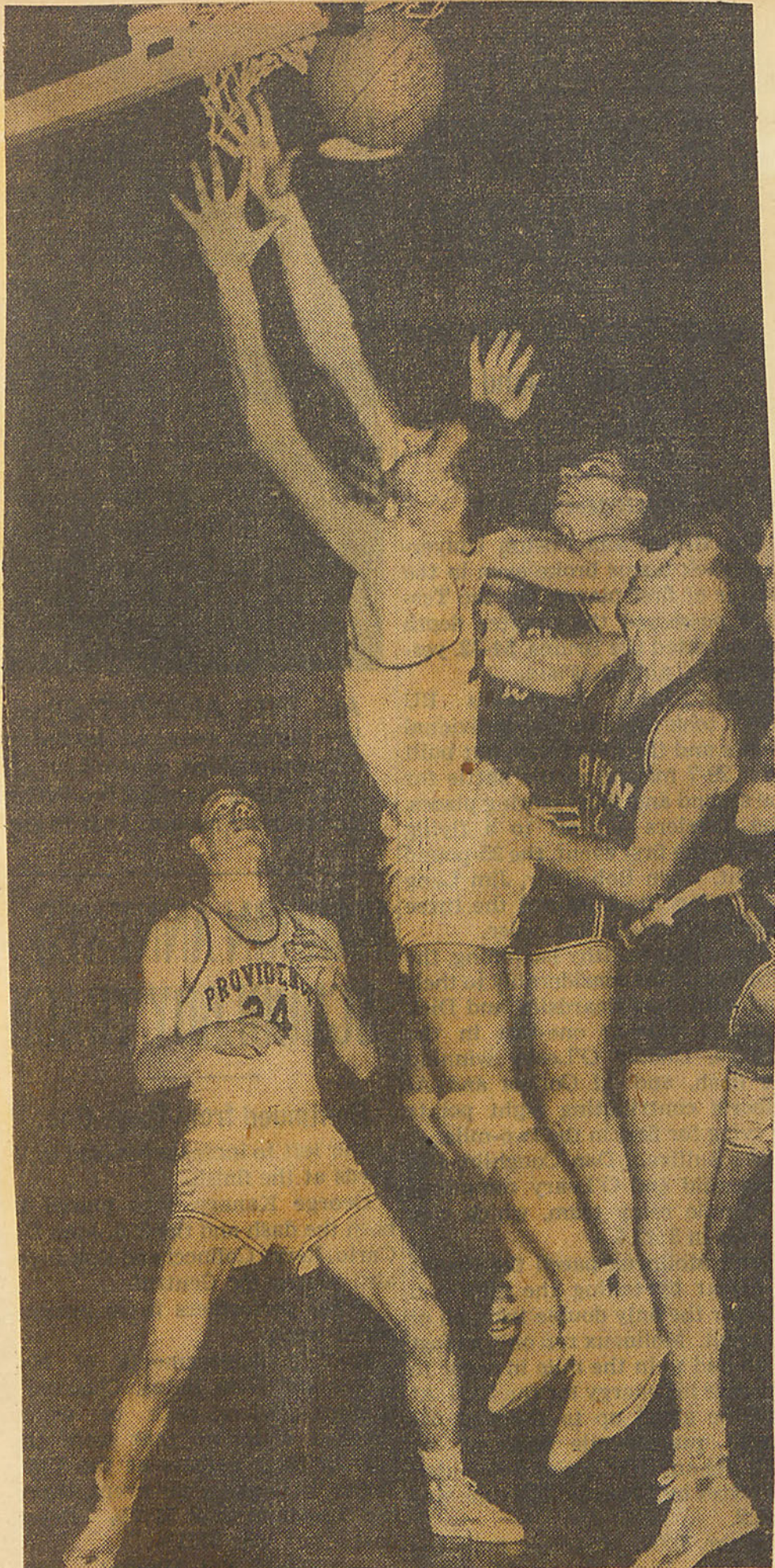
And they continued to pile it on for three minutes of the second period. But then, with Lembo bottling Kozak effectively, the Friars began to roll. In one four-minute period they outscored Brown, 14-0, and, by the nine-minute mark, had scared a 19-point Brown lead to three points. Creswell, who had held the Friars' Jim Schlimm scoreless in the first half, paced Brown's slight comeback to the point where the Bruins led, 63-53.

Cut Margin

But Schlimm got going momentarily and the Friars, playing great basketball now, cut the margin to five points, 67-62. That was at 17:30. Brown, however put on a successful freeze and held for the final horn.

Bob Moran's 20-foot shot tied the score for the Friar Freshmen, 64-64, with seconds left in regulation play and then, in combination with Hank McQueeney, led the club to victory in overtime. Moran was high scorer with 24 points.

Charley Judkins paced the Cubs.

Providence College's basketball team, winner of the New England regional tournament in the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball preliminaries, will meet Morningside College of Sioux City, Iowa, on Tuesday morning at 11 a.m., national tourney officials announced last night. The tourney site is Kansas City, Mo.

Thirty-two teams from as many sections of the nation are competing for the small-college court title of the U.S. Play starts tomorrow morning at 11 a.m. when New Mexico A. & M. faces West Virginia State College. There will be morning and afternoon doubleheaders and four games each evening during the first three days as the big field is pared down.

The Friars were scheduled to fly from Hillsgrove this morning for Kansas City.

The party of twelve, heading on the Friars' longest athletic junket, includes Coach Vin Cuddy, the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., athletic director, and the following players: Ray Garcia, Sam Nissel, Jim Schlimm, Frank Pelligrino, Ray Korbusieski, Eddie Mooney, Tom Bauer, Bob Prendergast, Jerry Lembo and Ronnie Gagnon.

Coach Cuddy, well satisfied with the work of his charges in their recent games, figures his team has just as much chance in the 32-team tournament as anybody else.

"Naturally, if we stack up against some club like Hamline, which is very good, or this Evansville, Ind., team, which is top-seeded, we'll probably be over our heads. But if we draw an average team, there's no reason why we shouldn't stay in competition for a couple of rounds or so," Cuddy said.

"We've told the boys to relax. We've really been keyed up in our last few ball games. The team played very well against the Cross and then St. Anselm's and Tufts in the New England tournament. Frank Pelligrino and Sam Nissel played about as well as they ever have at Providence. Those kids gave us some great effort and I think anybody who has watched us can appreciate the scrap and hustle they put out."

The Friars' itinerary called for an 8:50 getaway from Hillsgrove by plane for Hartford. The party will leave Hartford at 9:30 on the Boston-Chicago plane, with a stopover in Cleveland. The flight is due in Chicago at 1:40 p.m. with arrival in Kansas City at 6:15, after a 4 p.m. takeoff from Chicago.

The NAIB is made up of 365 schools from California to New England, with the nation divided into 32 districts. The tournament is the 13th annual.

Last season Indiana State from Terre Haute won the title and some of the players were on the United States team which played recently in the Pan-American Games, winning that competition. The tourney, which already has an advance sale of \$38,000, drew 58,240 paying customers with a gate of \$73,656 last year.

The Friars, who will arrive in time for the tournament dinner tonight, will make their headquarters at the State Hotel. They'll have some fans when they take the court as Dominicans have a parish there. The Rev. Walter J. Conway, O.P., who graduated from Providence College with the class of 1931, is pastor of the Holy Name parish in Kansas City.

Two curates, the Rev. Richard Byrnes, O.P., class of 1927, and the Rev. Casimir Wroblewski, O.P., class of 1928, are other Friar alumni who will cheer on the team.

The Pirates' entries list some of the top track men in the East. Don Shanks (E.C.I.A.C. Cross-country champion last fall) may anchor for the South Orange, N. J. team. The rest of the team will be made up from the following men: Dick Twomey, John Corcoran, George Robbins, John Farmer, Frank Turner, Jerry Grossi, Stan Bestys and Paul Monte.

Coach Harry Coates will work with Bill Sherry, Jim Penler, Dan Walsh, Dick Johnson, Bob Tiernan, Dick Tiernan, Frank Lussier, and Jack Cassedy. Any combination of the aforementioned men is capable of winning the championship. One probability is a renewal of a personal duel between Pop Johnson and Don Shanks which began in last fall's E.C.I.A.C. cross-country championship when the latter barely nipped Johnson. The first event of the day, will be the A.A.U. handicap pole vault. Art Sherman of the N.Y.A.C. and former IC4A title-holder while at R. I. This meet will mark another major "first" for the Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. It will be the first time on which E.C.I.A.C. indoor track event championships have been held. Last fall saw the first Eastern Catholic cross-country championships.

High Schools from four states will take part in 1-7/8 mile medley relay race. Team entries, including the best of three states, have been received from Boston English High, La Salle Academy (Providence), Mount Pleasant (Providence, R. Despite a great final-game performance by Westerly's Frank Pelligrino, the Friars went down to defeat yesterday, at the hands of Morningside College of Sioux City, Iowa, by a score of 66 to 63 in the opening round of the NAIB Tourney at Kansas City, Missouri.

The 6' 2" center, who has been P.C.'s main backboard worker for the past three years, was aided no little by the sterling performances of Sam Nissel and Jim Schlimm. Ray Garcia and Ray Korbusieski also turned in good work.

But Morningside's 6' 6" center, Dick Weidenfelt, Doug Gresham, a 6' 4" forward, and Ken File proved that height can be a definite advantage, as they scored 45 points between them.

Coach Vin Cuddy had his men use a zone defense to concentrate on the Sioux City five's towering center, Weidenfelt.

It slowed him down but his team's superiority in height gave Morningside the majority of rebounds and thereby hung the margin of victory.

However, the highly exciting game proved to be a nip-and-tuck affair, as the lead changed hands many times and there were numerous ties.

The Friars, a little nervous at the start, found themselves down by five points, 9-4, in the opening minutes.

Then they started to hit and it was Pelly's free throw that made it 9-9 at the nine-minute mark. Nissel's and Schlimm's shooting then caught fire and gave P.C. its biggest lead of the game, 20-15. Morningside came back and tied the game at 20-all at the 15-minute mark.

Providence held short-lived leads in the closing minutes of the first half, but the Iowa quintet managed to tie it up again, 29-29, as the first half ended.

During the second half the contest was still very close, with the lead often changing hands. At the 15-minute mark of the second half the score was 59-59.

Then Morningside's Ray Berry dropped in a field goal and his club was never again headed.

The excellent work of Gresham and File turned the tide in favor of the Sioux City five late in the second half.

A long set shot by Jim Schlimm cut the margin to 65-63 in the closing seconds. However, Pelly's attempt failed and Gresham tallied the last point of the game on a foul shot.

Pelligrino (15) led the Cuddymen's attack, with Nissel (13), Garcia (13), Schlimm (11), and Korbusieski (8) next in line.

Gresham (16), File (16), Weidenfelt (13), and Berry (10) were the top scorers for Morningside.

The loss of this game eliminated the Friars from further tournament play.

As an individual Frank Pelligrino proved himself a valuable asset to the club by his laudable playing of the backboards. He is regarded as one of the best ball hawks in the east.

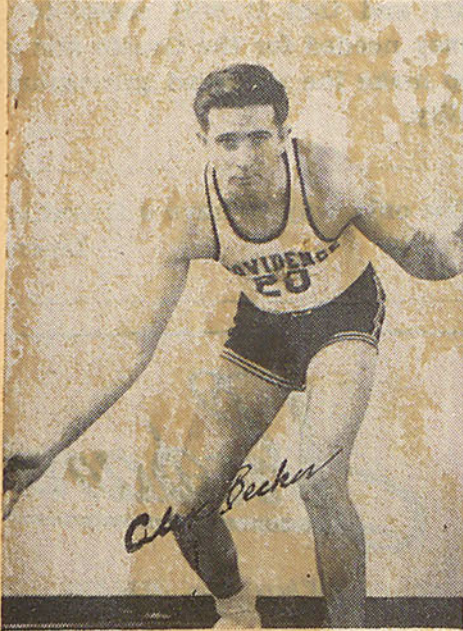

Franny McGurkin was one of the smallest men on the club, but his great agility and aggressiveness proved to all that he deserves honorable mention.

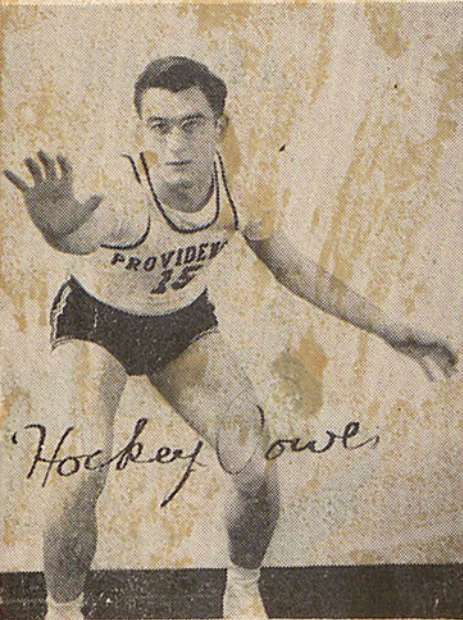

It's wonderful to have you basketball players, coaches and managers here for the week and we hope that when you depart you'll be wishing to come back. . . These are troublous times for college basketball. . . Players have fallen for money bribes from vicious gamblers. . . Coaches have been careless, to say the least, in shepherding their players on trips away from the college campuses. . . Kansas City has been free from gambling scandals. . . New York, of course, is the hotbed for that sort of sordid business but always and everywhere there is danger, even on the college campus where parlay cards are circulated. . . This week's college basketball play is under the direct and immediate management of a very splendid group of college athletic men. . . They have made, are making and will make every possible move calculated to protect the integrity of the tournament, its players and its coaches. . . These college men—Lee Prather (he's a college president now), Al Duer, Frank Casey, Gus Miller, Ray Hansen and the others—will have the aid of every Kansas Citian interested in the reputation of this city as a college sports center in keeping the basketball play above suspicion. . . The college authorities in charge of the tournament will be working in close alliance with the city officials, the mayor, the city manager, the police, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Auditorium management, to keep the tournament free of gambling evils. . . But in the final analysis, Mr. Player and Mr. Coach, it is your game and your tournament and yours the main job of keeping it beyond reproach. . . Anything remotely suggesting the idea of a fix should be reported immediately by player or coach to the tournament officials. . . A player's first recourse should be his coach, who should never for a minute forget that he holds the reins over a group of impressionable kids far from home surroundings and that he is responsible not alone for their basketball play but also for their moral welfare. . . Sounds like a sermon but somehow we cannot forget that great coaches like Clair Bee and Nat Holman somehow let their boys slip away from the guidance that should have been theirs. . . Let's keep the N. A. I. B. tournament clean and wholesome. . . Players and coaches can—and will—do the job.

CAGE SHOW READY

Thirty-Two Teams Start Week-Long Grind Tomorrow in Annual N. A. I. B. Tourney.

ACTION GALORE FOR FANS

Many of Nation's Leading Scorers to Compete in Meet Which Produces Many Thrills.

Eight Games Will Be Played Each of First Three Days With Quarterfinals Thursday.

The police circus moves out of Municipal Auditorium at midnight and tomorrow morning the 3-ring basketball show that is the National Intercollegiate Championship tournament opens a week's stand.

New Mexico Aggies and Glenville State of West Virginia will inaugurate this, the thirteenth annual N. A. I. B. tournament at 11 o'clock, followed by three other afternoon games. The 3:30 o'clock tilt between Southwest Texas State Teachers of San Marcos and Morehead State of Kentucky gives promise of being one of the stiffest battles of the first round of play.

American university, Washington, D. C., was the last team to qualify. American defeated Johns Hopkins 84-62 in the finals of the Mason-Dixson tournament.

Kansas night will be observed in connection with tomorrow night's schedule of four games, starting at 6 o'clock. Paul R. Shanahan, secretary of state, will say a good word about sunflowers and Ottawa university, favorite son candidate for the in-

tercollegiate title, will provide a sample of Kansas basketball against Hillsdale college of Michigan.

A Parade of Champions.

A part from the basketball thrills of which there is usually a large measure in this 32-team tournament, the big feature of the evening will be a slicked-up Parade of Champions in which more than 400 uniformed players and their coaches will appear.

There should be no letdown in interest for the final game, however, if for no other reason than that it will serve as an introduction to one of the most widely discussed players in the game, Scotty Steagall of Millikin university, who, though a relatively little man as basketball players go, is leading the nation in scoring among the smaller colleges with an average of more than twenty-nine points a game for twenty-three games.

Eight games are scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday, starting at 11 o'clock in the morning each day, and the four games of the quarterfinals on Thursday will get under way at 6 o'clock.

Opinion Evenly Divided.

Among those who know basketball best here the opinion was about evenly divided on which teams would be around Saturday night to take home the prizes.

Evansville, which was seeded No. 1, was a strong favorite as was the No. 2 team, Hamline university, which will be out for its third championship.

Hamline has the added advantage of knowing the Auditorium better than almost any team in the field. Since their Christmas appearance here, the Pipers of Hamline have come along fast and many coaches and writers who have followed them through the season say it is the best team that Coach Joe Hutton has ever had at the St. Paul school.

In this year's campaign the Pipers, who lost only two games, one to Phillips 66 and the other to St. Thomas of St. Paul, have averaged 63.1 to their opponents' 51.4. Their leading scorer is Lloyd Thorgaard, who is good for eighteen points a game.

One Hamline Flaw.

Their only flaw, according to the experts, is that they have a tendency to play only as hard as is required to win a game, a procedure that can bring disaster in this week-long tournament.

Evansville, which has felled some of the mighty oaks of the basketball forest, is an unusual team in that it probably will be the smallest in size and the fastest moving team in the tournament.

The starting five is composed entirely of seniors, all of whom are well versed in the art of the fast break. All are consistently good from the field or free throw lane as their 21 and 6 record shows.

Evansville's starting center, Harry Axford, is only 6 feet 1 inch. Axford has shown a lot of fighting ability by cutting much larger centers down to his own size. Axford has averaged more than eleven points a game to date and comes here heralded as one of the slickest pivot men among the entries of the entire tournament.

Sakel Is Top Scorer.

The number one point getter for the Hoosier quintet this season has been Bob Sakel, lanky 6-foot, 3-inch guard from Jasper, Indiana. Picked on Nat Holman's pre-season N. A. I. B. All-American, Sakel has made Holman look good ever since. He has scored close to 400 points, averaging nearly fifteen points a game.

Central college won't be without strong support during the week and the same is true of Ottawa, which won its N. A. I. B. bid the hard way.

Spearheading the Seminoles is Bob Hartman, who, if he scores in today's game, will set a new all-time scoring record for the state of Florida.

South Dakota State, under coach Jack Frost, won a tournament in the North Central conference at the outset of the season, defeating Morningside, the Iowa entry here, in the finals. The Jack Rabbits scored victories over Huron college and North Dakota Teachers of Minot, both Intercollegiate loop champions, to win the invitation.

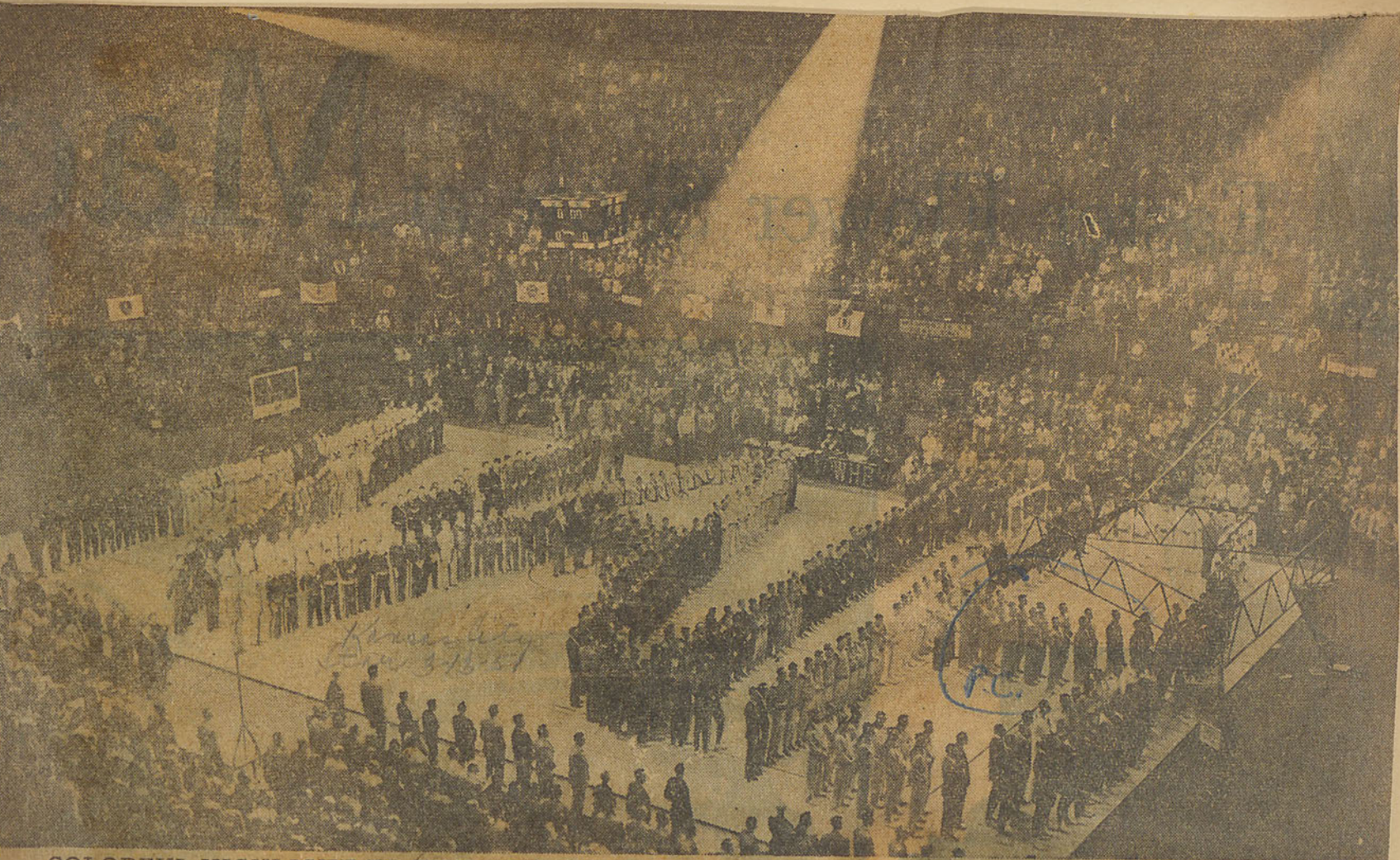

At Hays, Kas., and Enid, Ok., Regis defeated the Ada team.

Kansas City, Mo., Mar. 13. —The field in the 13th annual NAIB championship tournament was reduced to 16 teams here at the Municipal Auditorium tonight and among the clubs that fell by the wayside was Providence College. The Friars lost a toughie to Morningside College of Iowa, 66-63, in a nerve-wracking opening-round tilt.

Results of other first-round games played today and tonight: East Texas Baptist 67, High Point 64; Baldwin-Wallace 67, American University 66; Hastings 71, Pacific Lutheran 51; Pepperdine 86, Eau Claire 53; Hamline 82, Rocky Mountain 57; Evansville 85, Westminster, Pa. 74.

The Providence quintet played well but the Iowans had a height advantage that they made the most of and, in the end, it proved to be the difference between the teams. The Friars though, never stopped trying and with a bit of luck in the final two minutes might have pulled the game out.

It was close all the way with the score being tied 11 times and the lead changing hands on 15 occasions. P. C.'s biggest edge was five points, 20-15, midway through the first half. Morningside had a similar lead earlier in the game and boasted a six-point bulge, 65-59, with less than four minutes of the game remaining.

The Friars, who were ahead five times in the second half, 32-31; 33-32; 43-40; 45-43; and 59-57 made a last-ditch bid at that stage and out-scored the victors, 4 to 1, but four shots rolled around the hoop and out in the final two minutes. A long set by Ray Korbusieski and a hook by Jim Schlimm, were P.C.'s final baskets.

Frank Pelligrino, who did a fine job of rebounding, paced the Providence attack with 15 points but ran second to Doug Gresham and Ken Niles of Morningside who had 16. They led the victors' second-half drive as they scored 23 of their team's 37 points.

The Rhody quintet is scheduled to leave here by plane at 9:35 a.m. tomorrow and will arrive at Hills-grove at 5:16 p.m.

Tense, and a trifle nervous at the start, the Friars had trouble with their shooting. But they settled down after the first five minutes, came back from a 9-4 deficit and tied things up, 9-9, in the ninth minute on a free throw by Pelligrino.

Using a zone defense in an attempt to bottle up Dick Weidenfelt, Morningside's 6-6 center, the Providence quintet was fairly successful. However Weidenfelt and Gresham, 6-4, were tough to handle under the offensive boards.

After the 9-9 tie, Providence College forged ahead but never by a sizeable advantage. With Schlimm and Nissel doing most of the sniping, they once built a 20-15 bulge, but Morningside rallied and created a 20-20 tie with five minutes of the half remaining.

It was nip and tuck until the intermission with the Friars twice going ahead, 27-25 and 29-27 and on free throws by Pelligrino and a driving layup by Ray Garcia, re-

spectively. A set by Gresham matched Pelly's foul shots and then Wally Piper hit on a rebound that pulled Morningside even at the half.

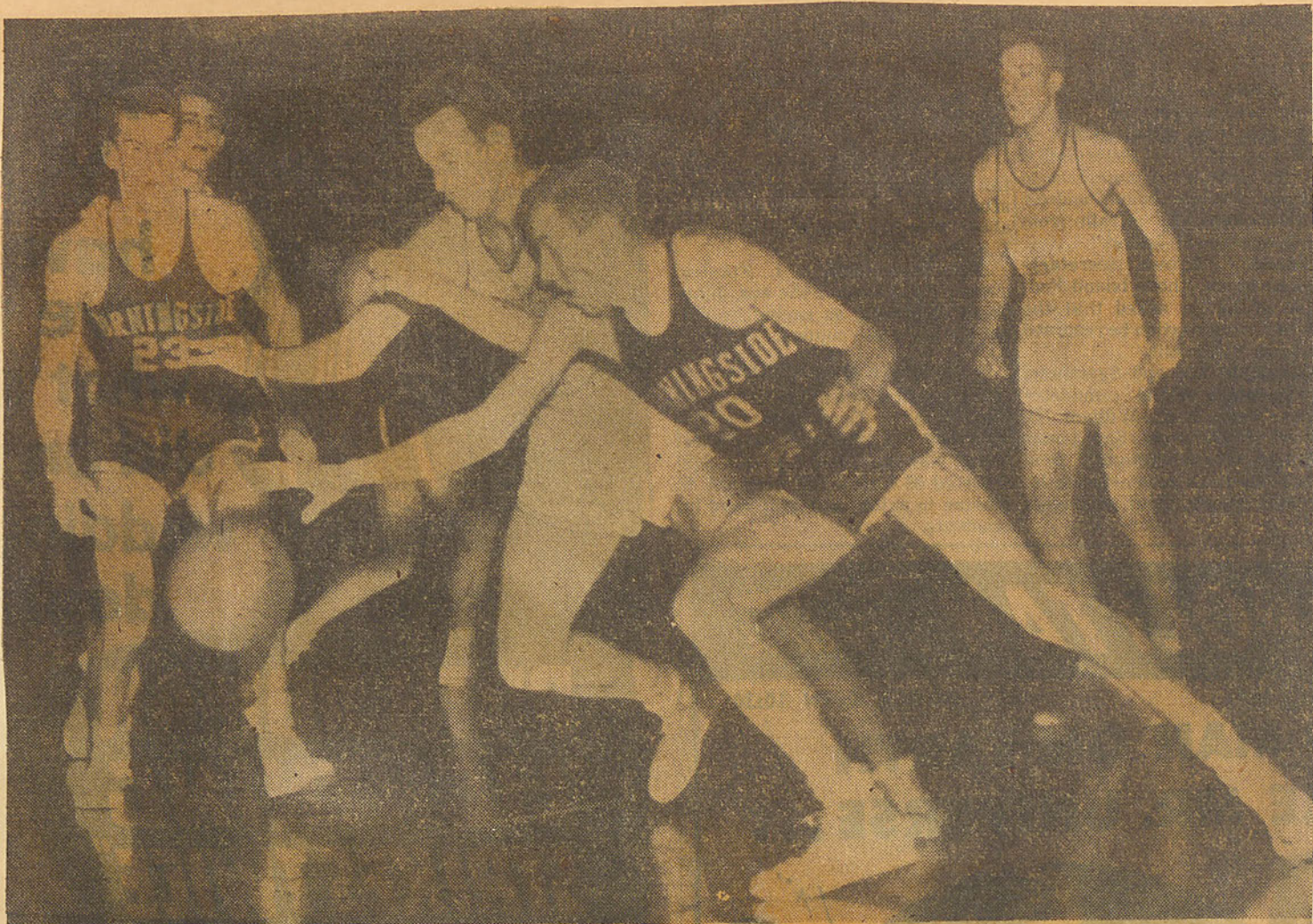

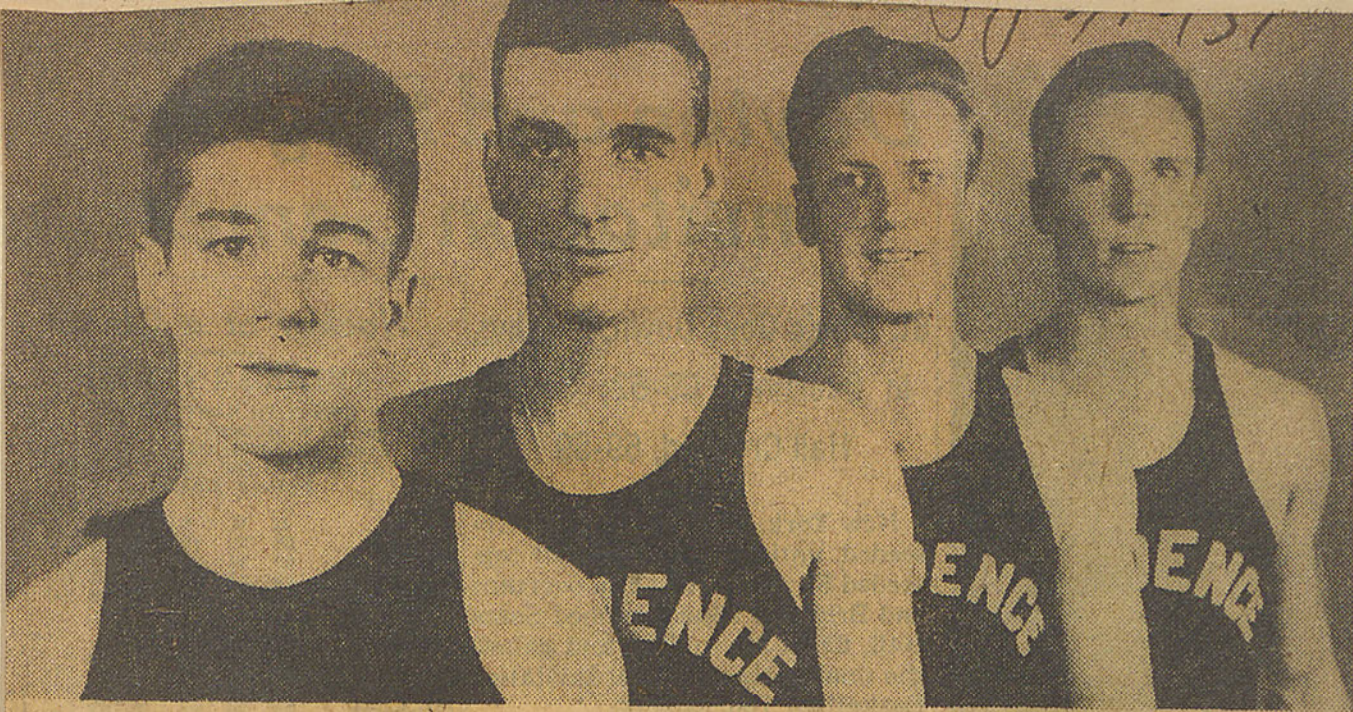

ECAC Endorses TV Ban Despite Plea by Penn

New York, Mar. 14.—(AP)—Despite a plea by Fran Murray, director of athletics at Pennsylvania, members of the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference have endorsed the NCAA ban on live television broadcasts of 1951 games.

The action by the 91-school organization was taken at a special meeting yesterday at which the ECAC also decided to waive the freshman rule immediately for its smaller members upon request.

Murray told the delegates "we at Penn feel that live television offers a big boost to our public relations. We have been televising our games since 1939. We feel we owe it to the students, alumni and fans to explore the situation."

The Penn games televised a decade ago were experimental.

"We are taking bids on television for our games this year," Murray said, "but we have made no decision on the matter."

If Penn decides to continue televising of its games in violation of the ECAC and NCAA ban, Asa Bushnell, ECAC commissioner indicated the school might be threatened with a possible schedule boycott.

Schools with a male enrollment of 1000 or with less than 650 males in the sophomore, junior and senior classes will be permitted to use freshman in varsity competition upon making a request to Bushnell. He estimated this would affect about 40 per cent of the 91 members.

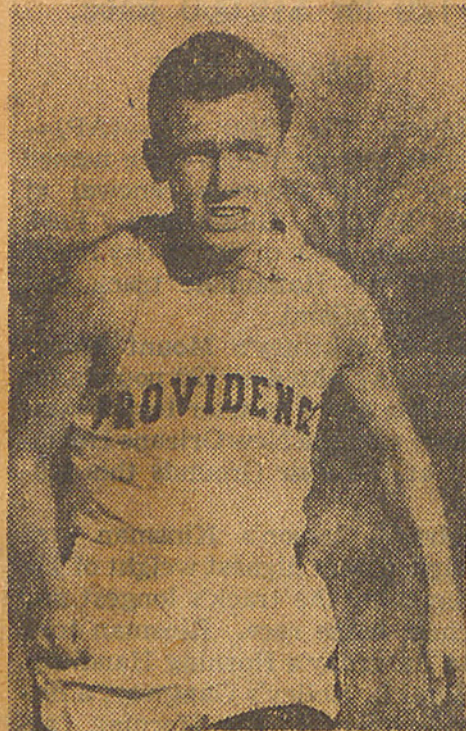

Vocational Scores

Seton Hall College and New Bedford Vocational School captured the major laurels at the third annual Providence College invitation track meet yesterday afternoon at Hendriken Field.

The former won Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship with 16 points and the Whaling City team defeated six other schools in the high school medley relay race on the strength of a fine anchor leg by Al Porter.

The South Orange, N.J., college hooked up in a pair of close relay duels with Providence College and edified the crowd of about 500 with victories in both races. Those two first places along with seconds in the 50-yard dash and the mile gave the Setonians a wide margin in the team scoring. St. Francis College of Brooklyn was second with eight points and P.C. was third with six. Iona College, the only other entrant, failed to score in the title events.

In the medley event Dick Johnson of the Friars started the mile anchor leg about two yards behind Seton Hall's Don Shanks. The lead jockeyed back and forth until the final lap when Shanks passed Johnson with a terrific kick on the backstretch and beat him to the tape by about two yards. The winning time for the 1 1/8 miles was 7:39.1. Frank Turner, Harry Bright and Bob Carter ran the first three legs for the Pirates.

The mile relay race was almost an exact duplication of the medley with Seton Hall leading P.C. by about five yards going into the final leg. Bob Tiernan, the Friars' anchor man, closed the gap on Carter several times but never was able to overtake the Pirates' star who won by about four yards. The Seton Hall quartet of Turner, Ed McArdle, Morris Curatta and Carter was timed in 3:25.8.

Bill Casey and Bill Welch gave St. Francis two firsts with victories in the 50-yard dash and the mile, respectively. Casey ran the sprint in 5.5 seconds and Welch covered the mile in 4:30.4.

New Bedford Vocational had to make up a lot of ground before winning the high school medley relay and the aforementioned Porter was equal to the task. At the start of the mile final leg, St. Augustine's of Brooklyn was in the lead with La Salle close behind in second place and New Bedford a third by almost 80 yards.

Bob Conde of La Salle moved out front of St. Augustine's John Moran on the second lap and that order prevailed until the final turn with Porter of New Bedford closing gradually.

Here Porter really turned it on as he passed both Moran and Conde on the backstretch and beat them to the wire by about 10 yards. Moran overtook Conde in the stretch for second place.

Porter, by no means a darkhorse, is the Massachusetts Class B school-boy mile champion and placed third in the nationals last month. New Bedford's time was 8:07.2. Conde's 4:41 mile leg was the best of his career.

Dick Fitzgerald of Boston University, former Mount Pleasant runner, paced a Terrier sweep in the AAU mile handicap when he won the race while running from scratch in 4:28.6. Teammates Johnny Phillips, ex-La Salle runner, and Garry Beckwith were second and third, respectively.

Former R.I. Athletes Boost Danbury Sports

It has been a long time since Danny O'Grady took his boys to a track meet and they came home empty-handed. When the capable little mentor was at La Salle Academy, the Maroons won practically everything in sight.

Now Danny is starting from scratch again at Danbury, Conn., High School. Saturday he brought his neophyte team to town for the Providence College Friars' third annual meet. They went unplaced in a medley relay, all of them running on a board track for the first time in their lives.

Coach O'Grady figures it will take him three years, at least, to build up the sport. He has a five or six-man nucleus to work with but the high school corridors have been his track testing laboratory this winter. Occasionally the boys would run outside on good days but mostly their training came from sprinting up and down the corridors.

Coming On

Danbury, with Ed Crotty, the former Brown and Providence College coach at the helm, has been coming into power in Connecticut sports. Their schoolboy football team was outstanding, unbeaten but tied twice. The basketball team made the state playoffs. O'Grady's cross-country group won four out of five meets. And the sports picture is blooming in all directions.

Rhode Island contributes much to the Danbury picture. Crotty, who presently is a patient at the Lahey Clinic, heads the physical education program for the schools. Junior Keane, the former R.I. State athlete and son of Rhode's dynamic coach, Frank Keane; Carl Steinwachs, R.I. College of Education alumnus, and O'Grady are important men in the athletic setup.

The Providence College meet had

its usual share of thrills. One of the best races was the renewal of a duel between Don Shanks of Seton Hall and Dick "Pop" Johnson of the Friars in the mile leg of the medley relay. Shanks beat the game Friar a second time but it was a hard fought race with Shanks overhauling Johnson with less than half a half-lap to go and winning by a couple of strides, or less.

All the Way

Johnson is one of Coach Harry Coates' favorites because he always runs with everything he has. "Sometimes a boy feels lousy and yet runs great," Coates will tell you. "Another time he feels great and he can't run. Jim Penler has a bum arch and yet he ran five 50's in a short stretch but he's that kind of a kid. I'd like to have seen Johnson win that relay but Shanks is a good boy, too, and it was quite a race."

"That Seton Hall team that took the mile would have done a lot faster than 3:25.8 on a dry track or indoors. How do they compare with my old team of Fletcher, Lipsky and those fellows? I still like my boys but Johnny Gibson has done a fine job. He's a good coach and one of the best men in the game," Coates said.

The wet runway also had its effect on the pole vault. Some track experts figured the boys did remarkably well to clear 13 feet under the conditions and circumstances. Art Sherman, ex-R.I. State; Bob Linne, State sophomore; and Tony Pavone of Seton Hall each got over 13 feet but Sherman gave away three inches in handicap to each and was third in the final count.

Too Cold

Linne, who may equal Sherman's 14-foot mark for State athletes, said the cold, which tightens up the muscles, was a bigger factor than the mild rain. "Although while

you're watching that your takeoff foot doesn't slip, sometimes you take your mind off some other phase of your vaulting," Linne explained.

Mount Pleasant's Dick Fitzgerald ran a nice mile, beating Johnny Kelley in the process. . . Harry Bright of Seton Hall ran a snappy 610 yards but couldn't overhaul PC's Jim Gannon, who had a 15-yard handicap. . . Joe McClusky, holder of 24 national championships, arrived too late for the mile but later took a workout on the PC track. . . Seton Hall, winning the first Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate Athletic Conference track crown, so far has made a clean sweep of the ECIAC honors in cross-country and basketball as well.

After Providence comes Yale at New Haven and then Dartmouth at the Auditorium on March 8. By that time the tournament plans of the Crusaders should be well known. No choice of the New England independent team has been made, nor has any announcement come as to where the New England independent team will play. The Ivy league champion, probably Columbia, will be one of the Eastern teams.

Providence could give an over-confident Holy Cross team trouble. The Friars can not boast the record made by the Crusaders, but they have un-corked some excellent games. They lost to Boston College, but split with Springfield College, split with St. Anselm's, upset R. I. State and beat

A. I. C. twice. They have in Jim Schlimm an exceptionally fine shot who has scored 300 points with five more games to play. That point total is only 57 short of the Providence College scoring record.

Ray Garcia is another of their outstanding marksmen and the team record was good enough to win it a chance to play in the New England eliminations for the NAIB tournament.

While Jim Dilling, Wally Baird are not up to par, it is expected that the Purple will have strength enough to turn back Providence.

It may be a different story with the freshmen team. Beaten by Trinity freshmen, the Purple yearlings have since then managed to come through with a new string of wins. But some of the battles have been close. It took two overtime periods for the H. C. Cubs to beat Boston University freshmen a few days ago.

Providence has lost three games. Two were by one point, one by two points. They also boast height and speed and have a record of 17 wins against three defeats.

The freshman game gets underway at 7 p. m. and the varsity contest at 8.30.

Dilling, McLarnon May Play for H. C. Against Providence

There is some uncertainty about Holy Cross' starting lineup for tonight's game with the Providence College basketball team at the Auditorium but it seems certain now that scrappy Jimmy Dilling isn't going to be sidelined much longer.

There also is the possibility that Bob McLarnon, a great boardman who has been sidelined for more than a month now with a shoulder injury, also might dress for the game. But whether McLarnon gets into action or not will depend on his physical condition.

Shoot for 19th Victory

The Crusaders will be shooting for their 19th victory in 23 starts in this one. Providence has won 13 and lost 6.

Although Holy Cross is a big favorite to win the Friars promise an interesting evening. Providence record includes a split with St. Anselm, a sweep against Rhode Island State, a split with

Springfield and a one-point loss to Brown.

The Rhode Islanders have a big and veteran team with three seniors—Frank Pelligrino, Sam Nissel and Ray Garcia—in the starting five. The other starters are juniors—Jim Schlimm and Ray Korbusieski. All stand six feet or taller with Schlimm the tallest at six-three.

Certain Starters

Crusaders Win 19th Game By Defeating Providence

Holy Cross' tournament-ambitious Crusaders sputtered and stalled through four unexciting periods to a 70-53 victory over Providence College last night before 1500 basketball fans at the Auditorium.

With their sights set on the NCAA competition but their hopes of being selected dipping because of the inaction of the selection committee, the Crusaders found it difficult to get started, picked up speed slowly but finally cruised home safely to their 19th victory in 23 starts.

Providence was a contender in this game for only the first seven minutes. During that stretch the teams were tied twice and the lead changed hands five times. After those uncertain opening minutes it was just a matter of how high this Crusader team would soar in the scoring column and who was going to pilot the club there.

The first half, chiefly because of the low count in the opening seven minutes, produced only 51 points but Holy Cross had the majority of these and entered the intermission on the long side of a 31-20 score. The second half produced somewhat better basketball and substantially more points, the Crusaders outscoring the Friars, 39-33.

Palazzi Gets Big Hand

During that colorless first half the spectators got some enjoyment from reviewing the H. C. Freshman five's 97-74 triumph over Providence Freshmen and Togo Palazzi's record-smashing contribution of 45 points in the preliminary.

Palazzi's big night was just two points better than the 43 he pitched against the Harvard Freshmen back on Dec. 13. His record-smashing basket came in the final two minutes and brought a resounding cheer from the spectators. Thereafter, they appealed to the players to "feed" Togo so that the colorful freshman might build up an even greater single game record.

O'Neill Top Scorer

Big Jim O'Neill's push shot was in fine working order last night and he pitched six baskets and three free tries in leading the Crusaders' offense. He was followed in the scoring column by

Bob McDonough with 11 and Earle Markey and Jim Dilling with 10 each.

Providence's Ray Korbusieski equalled O'Neill's 15-point output while Ray Garcia and Sam

Nissel each tossed 12 for the Friars. But the Rhode Islanders didn't get much scoring from their corner men and therein, perhaps, lies the reason why they stumbled to their seventh setback in 18 games this season.

Pace Picks Up

During those lacklustre opening minutes the spectators must have felt that if the points didn't come any faster that the total production wouldn't equal the major league run-scoring record for a single game. After seven minutes the teams were tied at 7-7.

The pace started to pick up then. As a basket by Garcia offset two free shots by Dilling. The Friars forged ahead for the second time in the game on a deep set shot by Korbusieski. It was the last time that they led.

H. C. Starts Wheeling

Dilling caged a free try and McDonough set from deep out-

side Providence's two-three zone and put H. C. on top by 12-11. Then the Crusader started to wheel better, not much but still enough to make a decided difference between these teams. Moreover, discouraging misses as the ball rolled around the hoop and away from the basket became less frequent than in the first minutes of play.

Once McDonough had showed the Crusaders the way, Markey and O'Neill took over with an occasional hand from Dilling and Kielley in building up that 31-20 halftime advantage. Still, as the team moved ahead, H. C.'s play left something to be desired. It lost control of both boards to the smaller Friars and the Worcester team's passing wasn't all that it has been. A charitable estimate would call it erratic.

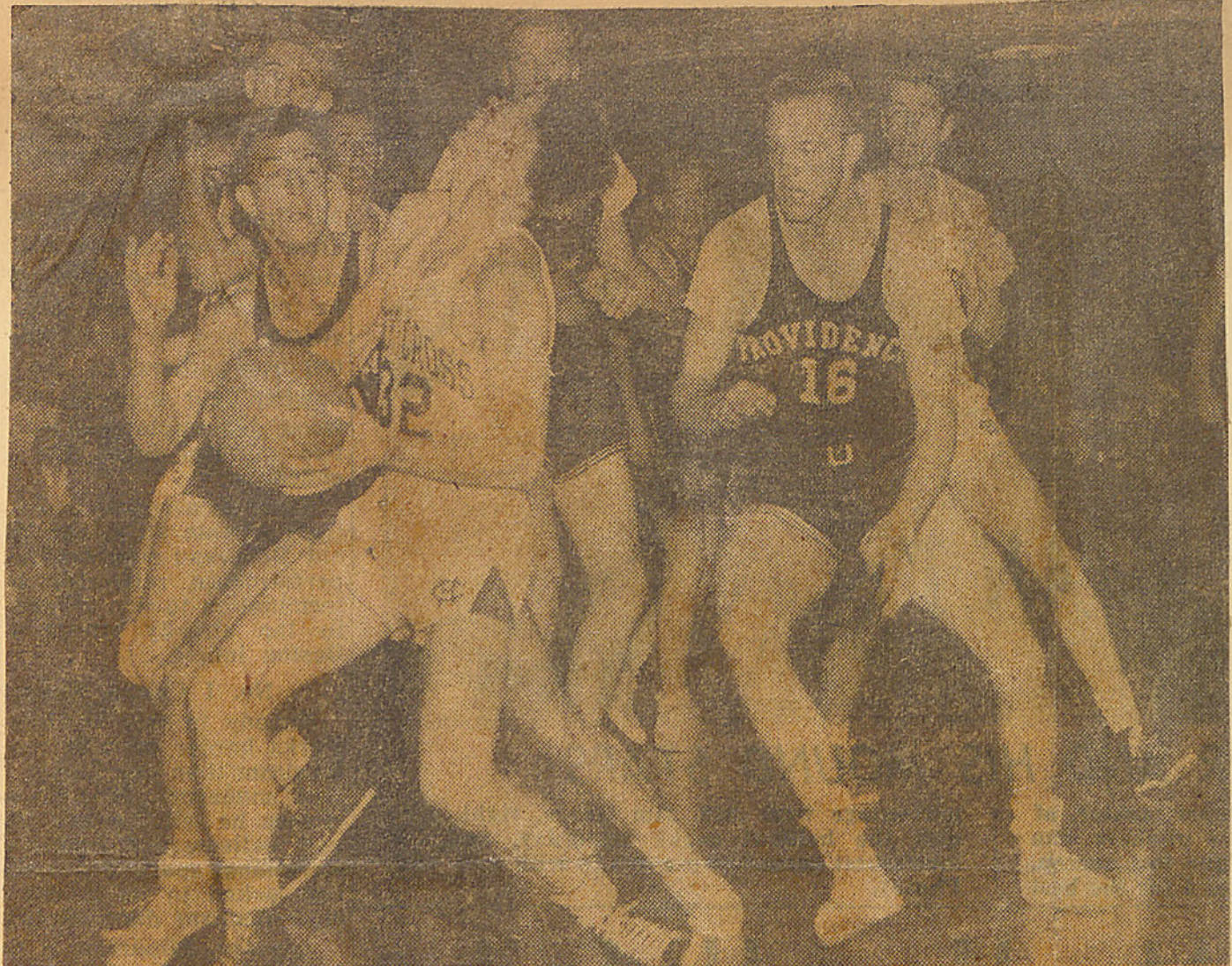
Lack Consistency

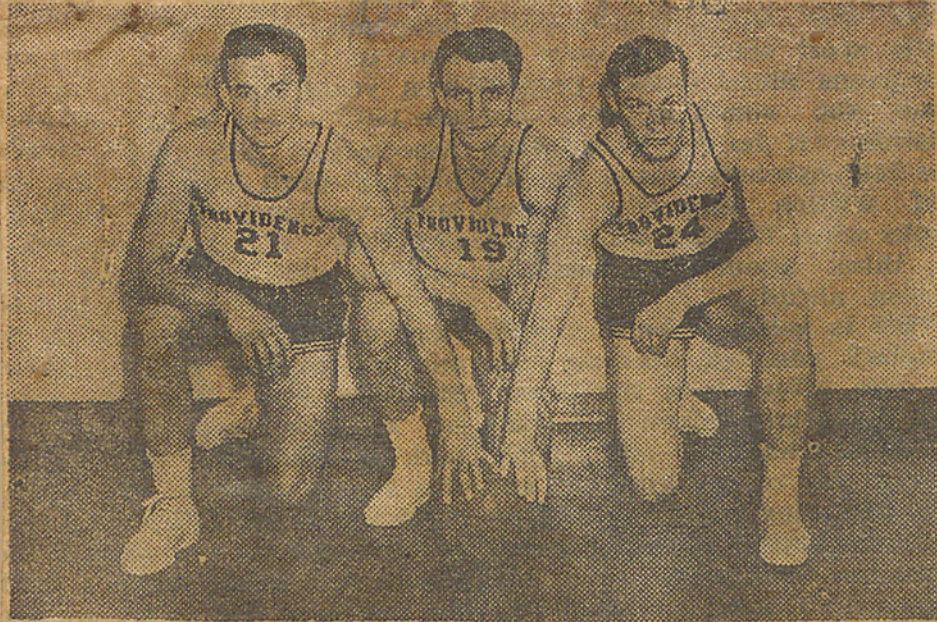

Although undefeated in its four games against Assumption, A. I. C., Fairfield and Colby, Providence College will be faced with its stiffest test when the Friars meet Boston College, in the second game of a college double-header tomorrow night at the Boston Arena.

Boston College, boasting a 5-1 mark for the season, is rated behind Holy Cross and Connecticut University at the moment among New England teams. The Eagles' only loss was administered by Connecticut on the latter's home court.

If Newton's Henry McQueeney doesn't blossom into a top-flight college basketball player in the not too distant future, Vin Cuddy, Providence College basketball coach, will be mighty surprised, and also a very poor prophet.

Cornered after yesterday's Basketball Writers' Luncheon at the Lenox, Vin, whose undefeated Friars (four victories) tangle with Boston College at the Arena tonight, waxed optimistic when asked about the 6-2 Garden City freshman who made the News-Tribune Suburban All-Star team last March.

"Why I think Henry has the makings of another Bob Cousy. In two years he should be one of the best college basketball players in New England. I'm delighted with him, with the progress he's made and especially with the promise he's shown," enthused the whiffle-wearing, cigar-smoking Providence mentor, now in his second year as the Friar bossman.

One doesn't have to twist Vin's arm to get him to say a few thousand well-chosen words about his freshman club. "You know," he continued, "everybody comes very early to see our games. Most of the fans want to get a look at our freshman team as well as see the varsity in action. McQueeney's been terrific so far. We also have a couple of very good freshmen in a boy named Walsh and another lad named Moran. Walsh, 6-4, is big and strong. Moran, who comes from Brooklyn, can set and drive very well. The only thing we need is another big boy. If we had a fellow like this Kielly of Holy Cross, we'd be all set."

McQueeney, the Suburban League's second highest scorer with 164 points last year, isn't the only local boy on Cuddy's frosh team. Paul E. McBride, former Our Lady's High athlete, is listed as a reserve on the Friar frosh roster. McQueeney, Newton High's top scorer last season and the season before, is not only a starter but is also leading the team in scoring. In his first four games, versatile Henry racked up 46 points.

McQueeney and McBride were steered to Providence College by Charlie Gallagher, the Our Lady's basketball coach and a Friar baseball and basketball great in the middle 1930's. Charlie contacted Cuddy and arranged for basketball tryouts for McQueeney and McBride. Both made the grade and were given scholarships.

Not long ago, Cuddy wrote Gallagher a letter of thanks for his help. In the letter, Vin called Mc-

Queeney "one of the best young prospects I've ever seen."

In his junior year at NHS, McQueeney tallied 140 points. The next year, he upped his output to 197 points. While Henry was at Newton he showed tremendous possibilities, but sometimes failed to score as often as he should have, considering his ability. Perhaps the most remarkable thing about the lean Newton Corner product is his variety of shots. He can score from inside or outside. He can set and drive. His foul shooting is good, he packs a good one-hander and can whip the ball in while on the run. His overhead set is especially damaging because there's no defense against it.

One of Henry's staunchest boosters is his high school coach, Reg Smith. Smith contended last year

that all Henry had to do was brush up on his defensive play, which wasn't too sharp while he was in high school, to go a long way in college basketball ranks.

And unless Cuddy's faith in McQueeney is misplaced and his enthusiasm concerning Henry excessive, that's exactly where McQueeney's going. And he may take Providence College right along with him.

The Providence College basketball team will be back on its home court at Mt. Pleasant gymnasium tomorrow night when the Friars play Springfield College of Massachusetts at 8:30 P. M. In the preliminary, the beaten P. C. freshman team will meet the Springfield freshman.

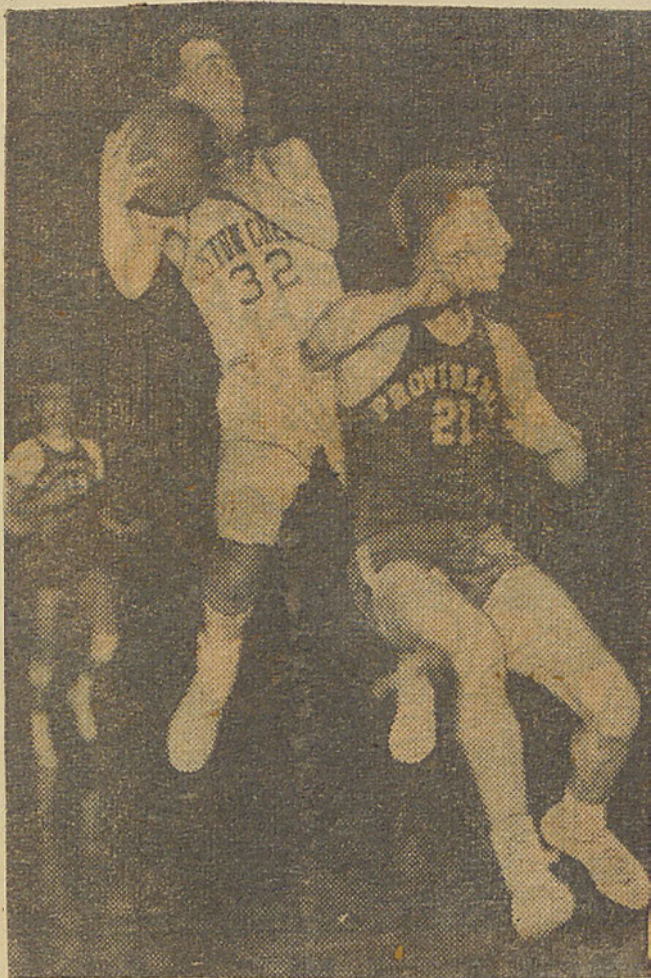
FRIARS RAGGED

BREAK UP ZONE

The Eagles were successful on 33 of 87 shots made from the floor while Providence hit on only 18 of 81 floor shots. That tells the story in a nutshell.

O'Connell Hurt

Silk was especially accurate, dunking exactly 50 per cent of his shots, seven in 14. Frank Gaffney, playing in spots, hit on four of his six floor goal attempts.

General Al McClellan used practically his entire squad in the Arena contest witnessed by only 2102 spectators, most of them from Providence.

B. C.'s Timmy O'Connell sprained an ankle early in the first half and was forced to leave the game. In the second half, Referee "Buddo" Greenberg pulled a muscle and was replaced by Tony Gentile who had officiated in the first game.

Start Slowly

B. C.'s marksmen were slow to find the range and trailed in the early minutes of the game. Providence was equally sloppy from the

floor, however, and B. C. was only two foul shots behind when captain Deegan hit on a set shot at 2:20 to tie the score, 2-2. Two foul shots by Duggan and B. C. took the lead which it never relinquished.

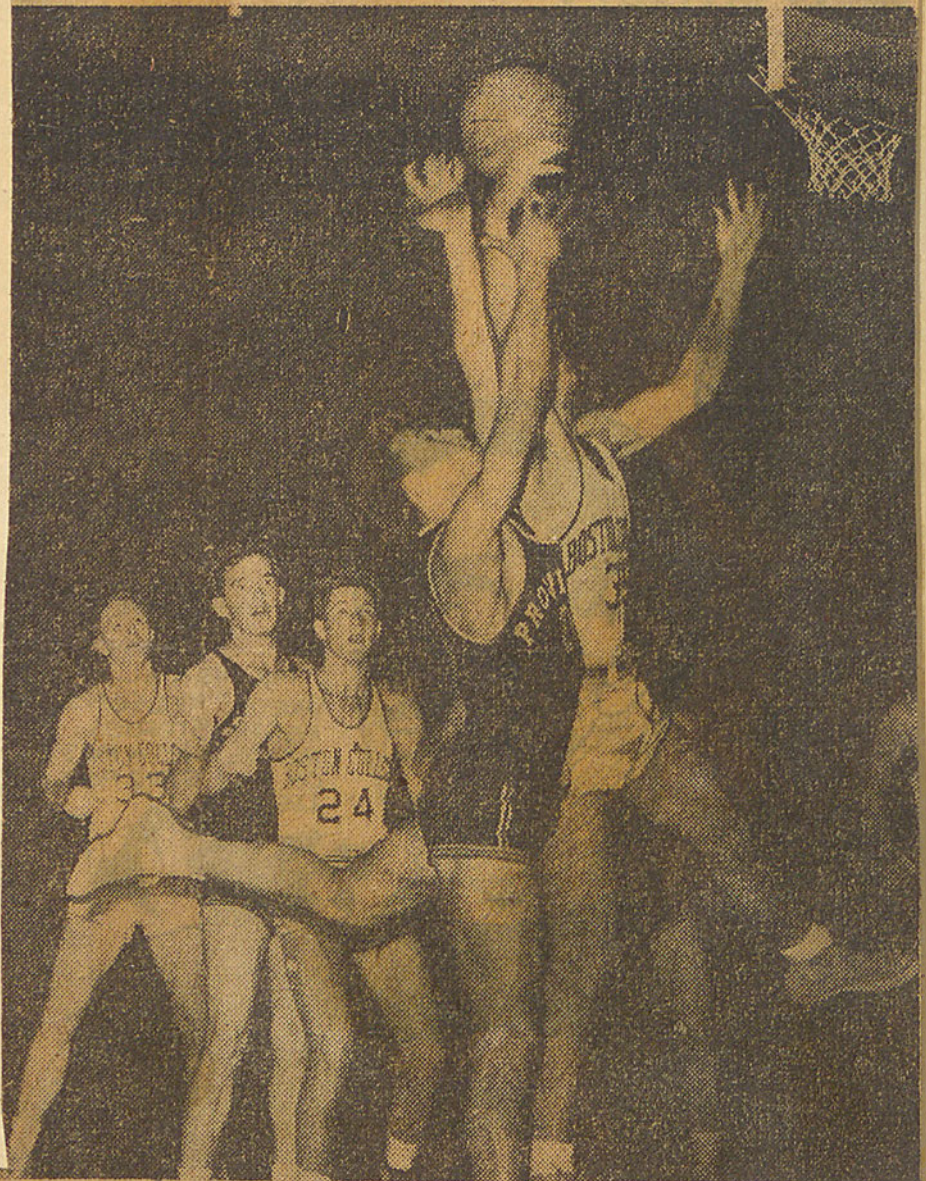

All the anticipated thrills were furnished the fans last night at the Auditorium when Providence College's Friars slipped past Rhode Island State College, 68-67, in an overtime battle. Ray Garcia settled the hectic outcome with a foul shot in the last minute and a half. The score was tied at 62-all at the end of regulation play.

Providence College had been leading, 37-30, at halftime only to have the Rams stage a terrific comeback and forge in front, 41-39 after three minutes had elapsed in the second half. Coach "Red" Haire's outfit then kept well out front and had leads of from seven to 10 points.

STATE BLOWS LEAD

State was showing its heels to the Friars with a 10-point 62-52 lead and just six minutes remaining. Up to this point in the second half the Cuddymen had been able to slip in only three field goals—15 less than they did in the first half. The Friars had taken 29 shots at their basket and State had been successful on 12 out of its 28 shots since the intermission.

As was the case in their upset victory last year (59-57) at the Auditorium, the Friars refused to be counted out and started a drive that pulled them to within 62-58 at the 2:30 mark.

Sammy Nissell, the Friars' third highest scorer last year, but scoreless in the game up to this point, ignited the rally with a layup. Ray Korbusieski followed with a foul shot and Jim Schlimm threw in a one-hander from the corner.

With 1:51 left PC's Ed Mooney, who calls Attleboro his home, was fouled by State's Ray Rossi, ex-East High star, and Mooney flipped in two free throws to bring his mates to within a basket of a tie.

RAMS MISS FOUL SHOTS

Frank Pellegrino then tied the score at 62-all with 1:30 left on a 15-foot set shot sending the Friar fans wild. In the remaining time State had two golden cracks to clinch the verdict but failed again at the foul line. Bob

by Mitchell, brother to State's starting guard, John, erred on a foul attempt, as did Fred Congleton. Congleton went up to the foul stripe with 48 seconds left and it was thought the law of averages would do the trick. He had previously missed six successive foul shots. He missed his seventh, also. Both teams had possession in the fleeting seconds but didn't get a scoring opportunity and the game went into the five minute overtime. State had control at the gun.

The Friars' Korbusieski, six-foot former Waterbury, Conn. High ace, pitched in the first basket in the overtime—a neat set shot. But Freddy Lennon of Pawtucket, another former East High standout, put in his first two points of the game on a one-hand jump shot from the bucket. Mooney put in a close shot and Korbusieski a foul toss putting the Friars ahead by three, 67-64.

However, Lennon showed how cool a player he is in the clutch as he tapped in a rebound of a missed shot by Chuck Stewart and converted a foul attempt after being hacked by Bob Prendergast from behind. This tied the score at 67-all and 2:05 playing time remained.

Garcia, a senior from Newport, walked to the foul line a few seconds later and calmly arched in a free throw—his fourth of the night in seven attempts. This point won the game for the Friars, but what happened in the remaining seconds sent the crowd of 2,304 home in a tizzy.

Providence College players were fouled six times by the anxious Rams, who saw their chances of forging ahead, rapidly disappearing. On all occasions the Friars waived the free throws and took the ball out of bounds. Johnny Mitchell of State left the game on fouls with 15 seconds left.

Then, with 10 seconds remaining, State had what looked like the break it was waiting for. A Providence College player, with the ball in his possession, was detected out of bounds by the referees. State's Bobby Mitchell, great in the stretch drive, was handed the ball by the officials at midcourt and started to call a time out. However, he changed his mind and immedi-

ately threw a long pass to Congleton, who was stationed under the boards. He was about 10 feet away from the basket on the side, but before he could get off his feet for a shot the gun sounded.

Providence Conquers Fairfield Five, 82-64

Bridgeport, Jan. 26 — Coach Vin Cuddy's big, fast, and sharp shooting Providence College Friars had too much all-round experience and scored an 82-64 victory over Jim Hanrahan's Fairfield University quintet here tonight.

The victory was No. 9 in 11 starts for Cuddy, a former Naugatuck High and Connecticut University athlete. It was Fairfield's fifth loss in 13 games and its first in nine home starts. A crowd of 1,200 including a large number of them from Waterbury, witnessed the game.

With big Jim Schlimm and Frankie Pellegrino controlling the backboard traffic, the Rhode Islanders built up a 41-26 advantage in the first half and used it as a cushion when Fairfield came storming back in the second half.

The second half was only five minutes old and Fairfield had narrowed the margin to 46-40, mainly on the sensational shooting of Naugatuck's Bob Markovic and New Yorker Joe Kehoe. From this juncture till the final five minutes of play the teams were always within eight points of each other.

Fairfield came as close as one point—52-51—near the end of the third period but the Red Stags were never able to pull up on even terms. Two free throws by Ray Garcia, a basket and a foul by Sammy Nissel enabled Providence to widen its margin to a more comfortable 57-51 lead in the next minutes.

Fairfield never figured the rest of the way.

But the home forces threw a scare into Providence when they came back to cut the lead again. This time to 61-57.

Then two hoops by Nissel, plus another by Waterbury's Ray Korbusieski, made it 67-57.

Providence played possession basketball with six minutes remaining. Behind, Fairfield began pressing to gain possession and in doing so left the area underneath the hoop unprotected. Providence moved inside quickly, to score three hoops within two minutes and that was the ball game.

Schlimm led the Providence scorers with 20 points while Nissel contributed 19. The pair along with Pellegrino enabled the Friars to control the boards most of the way. Korbusieski, ex-Leavenworth High star, tallied 10 before leaving on personals with 10 minutes remaining.

Markovic, former Sacred Heart High star, who incidentally, like Cuddy is a resident of Naugatuck, and Joe Kehoe each tallied 21 for Fairfield. Torrington's Whitey Frauenhofer also played well for Fairfield.

Friar Freshmen, Bryant Hoopmen Win Polio Tilts

The Providence College Freshmen handed the Apponaug Athletic Association a 50-31 setback at the Lockwood gymnasium last night, and in the second game of the charity triple header, St. Matthews of nearby Cranston dropped a 70-49 decision to a classy Bryant College five.

Providence College Downs Fairfield U. Five, 82 to 64

There was no denying that Fairfield University was enjoying its most successful basketball season in history today, but it will be at least another year before the Red Stags are able to give Providence College definite proof of their impending maturity.

Armed with two of their best-ever winning streaks, the surging Stags matched shots with the red-hot Friars in the State Armory last night, only to come off second best once again, this time by a misleading count of 82-64.

The defeat was Fairfield's sixth straight setback in the three-year series with the Rhode Island squad. Perhaps more important, the reversal snapped the Stags' current four-game winning streak and also ended an eight-game unbeaten skein on the Armory surface.

Face Willimantic Teachers

But it isn't likely that Coach Jim Hanrahan will give his team much time to grieve over the result because tonight the Stags are off again to face Willimantic State Teachers upstate in hopes of regaining their winning ways against a foe they whipped earlier in the season.

Providence, also enjoying its best cage season since the war years, found two surprises last night before it was able to post its ninth win in 11 starts and send the Stags down to their fifth defeat in 13 games.

First, close to 1,000 spectators turned out for the struggle, and second, Fairfield, beaten by 81-61 back in December, seriously threatened to send the crowd home amazed by shaving a 15-point deficit to almost nothing before finally succumbing.

Play opened up at a fast clip and after early ties at 2-2, 4-4 and 6-6, the Friars, sparked by a 20-point first half shooting performance by Jim Schlimm, pulled ahead 11-8 at the end of the first three minutes. They never were headed after that.

Getting only an occasional rebound, Fairfield was unable to score from the floor during the next eight minutes and quickly went under. The Friars steadily moved ahead to an advantage of 24-12 and by intermission, Providence was up by 41-26.

Markovic is Outstanding

In the second half, Fairfield's freshman find—Bobby Markovic—who had accounted for half of the Stags' points in the first 20-minute period, started the Redcoats digging into Providence's big lead with a brilliant team effort that eventually cut the score to 52-51 before falling short.

Joe Kehoe combined with Markovic to contribute most of the scoring punch in this drive with Joe Miko supplying much-needed backboard strength and Stan Suchenski completing the attack with an eye-catching defensive job on Schlimm, who was held scoreless after halftime.

Ahead by just one point with nine minutes left, Providence escaped from trouble when Sam Nissel came to the rescue. In the remaining time Nissel bucketed 10 points to offset the loss of Schlimm, who was guarded so closely by Suchenski that he rarely had time to even attempt a shot.

Markovic and Kehoe each finished with 21 points for the best individual efforts of the evening. Kehoe hit for 18 of his in the second half. Schlimm's 20 was tops for Providence with Nissel totaling 19, including his late but important windfall.

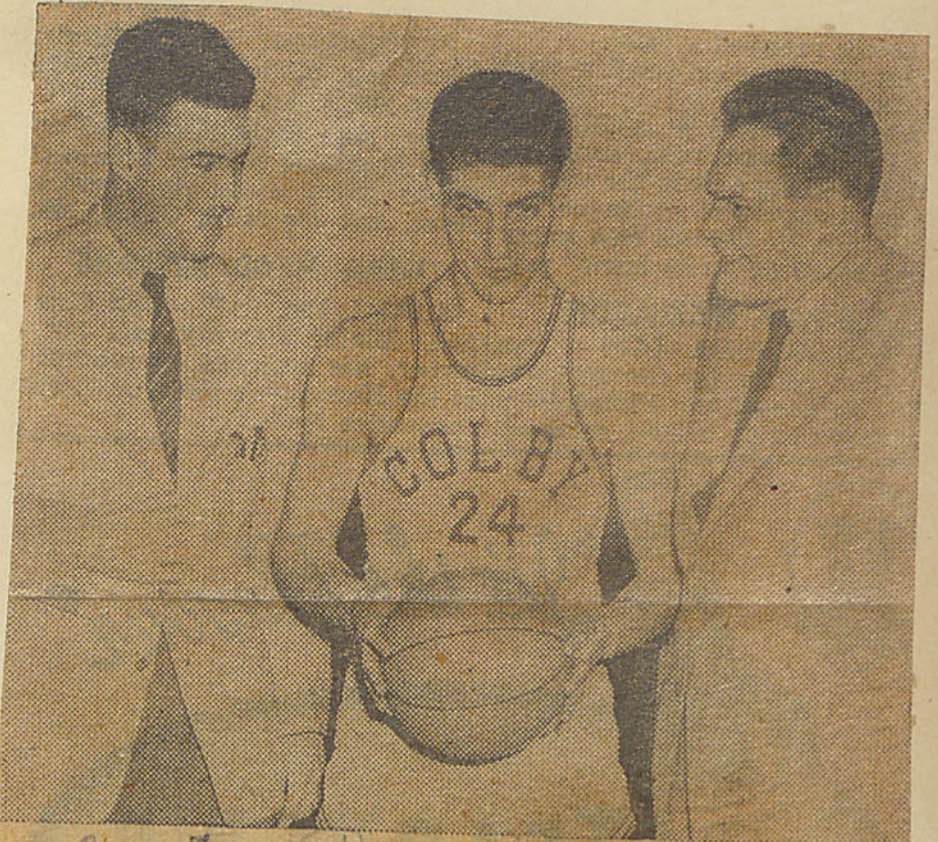

Brown's basketball team will play Providence College tonight at Marvel Gymnasium, with first place in the run for the state championship as the stake.

The Friars' strong freshman team will meet the Brown Cubs, starting at 7 o'clock, in the preliminary. The varsity game will start at 8:30 o'clock.

This one rates about even, with the basis of comparison a common opponent, one against whom each team plays a sparked-up game. That is Rhode Island State, whom the Friars and the Bruins dearly like to beat (besides each other).

Past Performances

However, for the curious, here are the scorecards to date: The Friars have won nine of their 12 games; Brown has won five and lost seven. In the series record, Providence College has the edge, 16-11.

The brightest mark on Brown's list so far has been its defeat of Connecticut last Wednesday. There have been some dark spots, too. Defeats by American International, Army and Colby were not good, but the Bruins have shown themselves

The Friars, a tall, handy club, have played fairly consistent basketball. Their only bad game was against Boston College. Their defeat by Colby last Friday came after a long midterm layoff.

Jim Schlimm, after a slow spell in the middle of the schedule, has been the key of the Friars' offense lately and his return to form has helped Vin Cuddy's team considerably. But he has had plenty of aid from the other starters, Ray Garcia, Ray Korbusieski, Sam Nissel and Frank Pelligrino.

Two Stars

Brown's top men are two, Fred Kozak and Zeke Creswell. Between them, they have taken scoring honors for the Bruins in practically every game. The other starters, tonight included, are Chuck Whelan, Joe Christopher and Al Gauthier.

There, except for a height advantage to the Friars, are two evenly matched teams. Each has had dull spots in shooting during games, but each has shown a remarkable ability to keep plugging, as in their games with R.I. State. That makes for interesting basketball, which is exactly what this game should be.

Offensively and defensively the Springfield College basketball team never played better this season as it made Providence College a surprisingly easy victim yesterday afternoon in the Field House. The score was 78-44 and the 11th triumph of the campaign for the Maroons served as a happy climax for a "Homecoming Weekend" crowd of 3000 fans. So well did the charges of coach John Bunn function as a team, especially in the final 20 minutes of play, that they made a good Providence team look bad in comparison.

Schutts Gets 26 Points

It was the sixth defeat in 16 games for the Friars and sweet revenge for the Maroons who were handed a 77-60 beating by the same Providence team in Rhode Island earlier in the season. Springfield could do no wrong so well did players carry out their assignments in bottling up the Friar attack and at the same time set up productive plays of their own.

Alan Schutts wasn't the key man—the Maroons were all key men—but he was the center of attraction in this latest meeting between these great cage rivals who, will be remembered, played the first collegiate basketball game in the Field House four years ago. Schutts was flying high in the second half of the contest, despite the fact that he was playing under the handicap of having four fouls chalked up against his name. After being benched for protection late in the first half, the lanky Maroon center came back to toss 19 points in the final 20 minutes and wound up as the game's big point-getter with grand total of 26. His sharp shooting was responsible for changing the contest into a runaway for the Maroons.

The big feature of the contest, however, was the short and sharp passes the Maroons befuddled the Friars with as they worked their way in for closeup shots which always paid off in points.

Although outclassed, the Friars stayed in striking distance throughout the first half, although they never once had the honor of being on the

long end of the score after two baskets by John Burke gave the Maroons a running start. Springfield sported only a 25-21 edge at the rest period and Jim Schlimm cut the Providence deficit to two points with a basket to open the second half.

Maroons Take Off

That was the finish for the Friars. Larry McClements hit the twine, Schutts dumped in two more Springfield baskets, John Burke made good on a free try, Jim Pelcher jumped into the picture with a basket and then Schutts pumped in two more double deckers. All this hoisted the Maroons to a 38-23 advantage and there was no stopping them after that.

From the start the Maroons made Schlimm, Providence's chief scoring threat, one of their chief worries. They couldn't stop him completely but the Friar ace had to settle for 11 points. Big Bob Pendercast was the only other Providence man to hit double figures. He scored 10.

Burke was next to Schutts in helping the Maroon total grow. He set the early scoring pace and wound up with 14 markers. Little McClements was next with 10 and John Donahue did plenty to help with nine.

The Springfield Freshmen made it an all winning program by nosing out the Providence Freshmen, 46-45. They had to freeze the ball in the last two minutes to do it, even refusing several free throws to keep possession of the ball. Frank Korbut, former Cathedral High athlete, led the winning attack with 12 pointers.

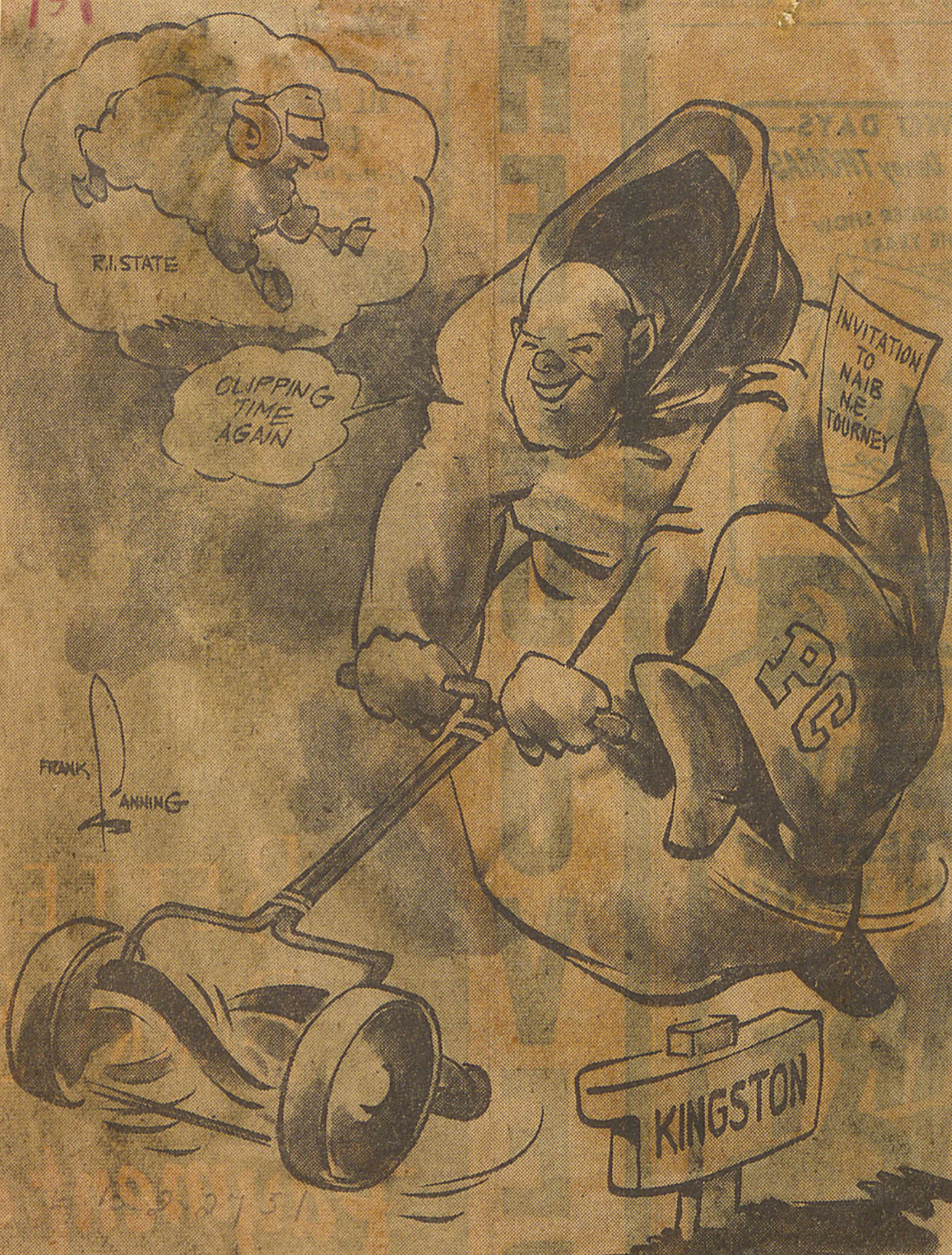

Too Small

R.I. College Hoop Coaches Pick Their All-State Fives

If you had the pick of the Rhode Island college basketball players of the past season, who would you take?

Coach Bob Morris of Brown picks Fran Pelligrino and Ray Garcia of Providence College; Bill Baird and Fred Congleton of R.I. State and Zeke Creswell and Freddy Kozak of Brown.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars nominates Kozak, Congleton and Baird and then says you'd take Jim Schlimm, if you wanted a good close-up scorer; Pelligrino for rebounding, or Ray Korbusieski if you were looking for a real driver.

Coach Red Haire of the Rams picks his group a little differently. He says all three centers, Pelligrino, Creswell and Congleton belong. For shooters, you'd have Schlimm for an inside man, Kozak for an outside man, and Baird, the only player on the three teams who is equally effective both inside and out. And for defense, Johnny Mitchell of the Rams and Korbusieski of the Friars.

Fun on Defense

Coach Morris had a lot of fun rigging up defenses, maneuvering in such a way that he and his boys won key games against strong foes. He explained how he once rigged up a defense for the Rollers in which Earl Shannon and George Mearns stopped Joe Fulks of Philadelphia, only to have Angelo Musi score 20 or so. He used much the same setup in stopping PC's Jim Schlimm, only Sam Nissell almost fouled it up with his fine performance.

Morris said he liked Garcia about as well as anybody his club played against and rated Korbusieski a good man, also. You have to figure out counter-moves to bother the opposition, Morris said, but none of the RI teams had one big man who was certain of getting you the rebounds.

"We (meaning Brown) could stall beautifully, I thought, but when you have small men, you find that they can handle the ball and dribble. We've held the ball as much

as five minutes at a time in our drills against the second team and I had confidence we could beat the clock if we were lucky enough to get into that spot against good teams."

Underrated

Coach Haire said he thought Creswell was a bit underrated. "He can go up with our boy (Congleton), and he's not too bad. I liked Creswell's work, although it was unspectacular. Mitchell is one of the best I've seen for a small man coming up with the ball in those scrambles under the boards. If there's a loose ball, frequently he gets it. He brings the ball up court well, as does Ray Korbusieski, who is strong defensively."

"Baird had a wonderful season. Chuck Stewart did well in the early part. Although Stewart handled the ball well in the late games, his scoring fell off. Pelligrino, Schlimm and Kozak all played well against us," Haire said.

"Kozak murdered us," was Cuddy's comment on the Fall River athlete. "He's a fine player and he's best under pressure. I heard that from Bob Morris and I was unfortunate enough, if you can say that, to have him at his best against us."

"Schlimm set a new Providence scoring record this season with 377 points and I don't see how they can pick these all New England teams without giving a fellow like that even honorable mention. Nissell and Pelly helped us tremendously in our last few games, especially Sam," Cuddy concluded.

Coach Morris said this was the best Providence College team his boys have met since he took over the Brown basketball post. It has savvy, hustle and determination.

Cuddy and Morris picked Red Donnellan of Boston as one of New England's better referees.

Good Shape

In keeping with the vigorous schedule, the Friars of 1951 appear in the best possible shape to meet that challenge since the prewar days. Coach Hal Martin will have a generous sprinkling of lettermen augmented by the strongest pitching corps since the days of Joe Kwasniewski, Steve Fallon, Walt Morris and Amby Reynolds, who held sway a decade ago.

The veterans include Co-Captains Sam Nissel and Jim Cotello, outfielders, Howie McGuinness of Cranston, former La Salle All-State shortstop; Don McDonald of Newport, another All-Stater from De La Salle at first base; Steve Sulavik and Ed Mooney, who shared third base last year; pitchers Frank Higgins and Bill McKeon, catcher Hank Downey and left fielder Dick Duignan.

Sophomores who will have a lot to do with the success or failure of the team are pitchers Bill Mullins of Worcester and Jim Gallagher of Lowell; catcher Bill Quinn of Springfield; and George Ducharme of Burrillville, who was an All-State third baseman at Burrillville High two years ago.

Perhaps it is best that we go into the local track situation before looking at the type of competition that Danbury High will face this weekend. Since track is in its infancy at DHS, the interest that will eventually be reached is not yet at its peak. The group of lads who are interested have been practicing diligently for the past six weeks in an effort to make some showing in the meets in which Coach O'Grady has entered a team.

Daily they either run through the halls or when the weather is nice can be found pounding the hard pavement that surrounds the High school. No track is available to them and they have to make the best of what space is available. Even such things as hurdles are a scarcity in Danbury, and the team has undertaken the job of making its own.

With the coming of good weather it is hoped that many more boys will catch the track "bug" and join the hard-working lads under the tutelage of one of the finest track mentors available, for that is just what the "Mighty Mite" is. Dan O'Grady came to Danbury this season, leaving an enviable track record in Rhode Island, and with the knowledge that he has given some boys a fine start in the track sports world. Many are the young men pounding the boards at such schools as Providence, Georgetown, Rhode Island State, Manhattan and others, who have given credit to Danny as their main teacher of the finer points of running.

The team that Danbury High will present in the Providence meet will be the guests of four of the lads who now run for Providence college and formerly ran for Dan O'Grady at LaSalle in their high school days.

The medley team from Danbury will consist of sophomore Ed Sutton, who will run the half mile; Eugene Edwards, who will run the quarter mile; Fred St. Jean who will travel 220 yds.; and Andy James who will finish with a one-mile effort.

Sutton is a letterman from DHS's previous cross-country team, while Edwards is a football player who will captain next year's squad. St. Jean, a junior, is developing into a fine low hurdler and is a prominent gridster also. James is a small lad who has shown great promise as a miler. His last effort was a 4:57 mile.

The meet this weekend will be run on a banked track, something the forces of Coach O'Grady have never done before. They will be up against some of the finest track teams in the New England States. Among these are LaSalle, the defending champs; Hope High, Rhode Island cross-country champs; Mt. Pleasant, holder of the relay record at the Brown Interscholastic meet; Boston English, New England track champions; New Bedford High, winner of the quarter mile National Schoolboy championship at Madison Square Garden last month; St. Augustine's, national one-mile champions; and Boston Trade which has recently won the Northeastern University meet.

Just where Danbury High's inexperienced track squad will finish among these competitors seems rather obvious. However, the experience the lads will gain by running against such competition is of the highest value, and if they gain nothing but this the trip will be worth that much at least.

This is the first track meet of the season for Danbury High, but there will be many more if Coach Dan O'Grady has any say about it.

Martinmen Intensify Drills

Rugged Schedule In Store For Coach Hal Martin's Team

Baseball celebrates its 30th anniversary at Providence College this year. Advance reports have indicated that everybody from the athletic staff on down to the managers are looking forward to one of the better seasons in Friar history and possibly a return to their exalted diamond stature of a decade or more ago.

Coach Hal Martin is maintaining the same optimism concerning diamond prospects that characterized his attitude during the basketball season when he was commanding the sensational freshman squad. Martin is looking forward as is his entire baseball personnel to their first objective—the southern trip which commences next week.

Seven days from today the squad will open its season at Emmitsburg, Maryland, against Mt. St. Mary's College.

A review of several important factors about this year's team will reveal that Martin isn't trying to "bite off more than he can chew" with the trip south and the tough slate of games to follow.

Item number one is the dozen veteran players of the more than 20 candidates reporting daily to Hendricken Field.

Item number two is a group of talented sophomores, notably pitchers, who are expected to add considerable strength and depth to the team.

Of the veteran group, Martin will have most of last season's infielders and outfielders returning intact.

The outfield appears set with co-captains Jim Costello and Sam Nissel in right and center, respectively, and third year man, Dick Duignan, a fellow who can get plenty of distance in his clouts, filling out the garden in left. Helping this trio will be Bob Grenier, a sophomore, who had been selected as an All-State pitcher-outfielder while playing for West Warwick High School.

With the exception of shortstop and first base, where the respective third

year men, Howie McGuinness and Don MacDonald seem likely to prevail again, the second and third base slots will probably be subject to a slight realignment. George Ducharme and Buz Barry, two worthy veterans, are contesting the keystone position while Steve Sulavik, also a holdover, will be battling newcomer John "Beaver" Power, formally a part-time pitcher-outfielder, for the hot corner.

Ducharme, a third baseman by trade, was injured last season and did not see much action. With the surplus of third sackers, he has been moved over to second and his duel with Barry should supply the stimulus that could promote some great playing between first and second base this year.

Sulavik, the regular third baseman, just recently made an appearance on the field this week. But "Beaver" Power seems to have a sufficiently strong hold on the bag so that he will probably be one of the starters for the first few weeks at least. Afternoon lab classes have made it difficult for Sulavik to get out every day and will prevent him from making the southern trip. Earl Dobler, a sophomore, is also an infield reserve.

Catching, which, along with pitching, was Martin's biggest headache last year, is being entrusted to Bill Quinn, a strong, lanky sophomore from Springfield, Mass. Quinn, who can hit, throw and handle pitchers

with finesse and authority, has been tabbed as an excellent prospect and the probable answer to P. C.'s backstop worries. Right now he is nursing a leg which he injured slightly while playing basketball. Martin has been using him in the field during the intersquad games. Reserve strength behind the plate will come from returnee Hank Downey and sophomores Ed Tenero and Lewis Ferretti.

However, the problem most affecting the Friar's chances this year will be on the mound where the majority of games are either won or lost, as P. C. adherents know so well from last year's results.

In seeking to remedy their disappointing 3-12 record of 1950, Martin will depend principally on a fine group of sophomores to carry the pitching burden. Leading the returnees is senior Frank Higgins and two juniors, Bill McKeon and Joe Destefano.

Bill Mullins, a right hander, who stands over six feet and carries about 200 lbs., is being touted as the finest sophomore prospect on the squad. But, in recent practices, Ed Sullivan from Durfee has been looking very sharp and could quite conceivably move into one of the top pitching spots on the team. Following these two recruits are Jim Gallagher and Tom Army, also sophomores, who are expected to add plenty of depth to the staff. Grenier will also be available for pitching duty, should the occasion demand.

With only three seniors, eight juniors and 10 sophomores competing for positions on the team, it's obvious that Coach Martin will have a somewhat green squad this year. But this does not necessarily contradict what was said in the beginning about prospects for a successful season. The pitching department which will have its good and bad days is definitely stronger than last year and just that fact is going to be an immense improvement to the team. Secondly, the catching will be more than capably handled by Bill Quinn, while the infield and outfield units are filled by proven campaigners of better than average ability. This may not be a championship season, but it will certainly be a step toward that eventually which may come about next year.

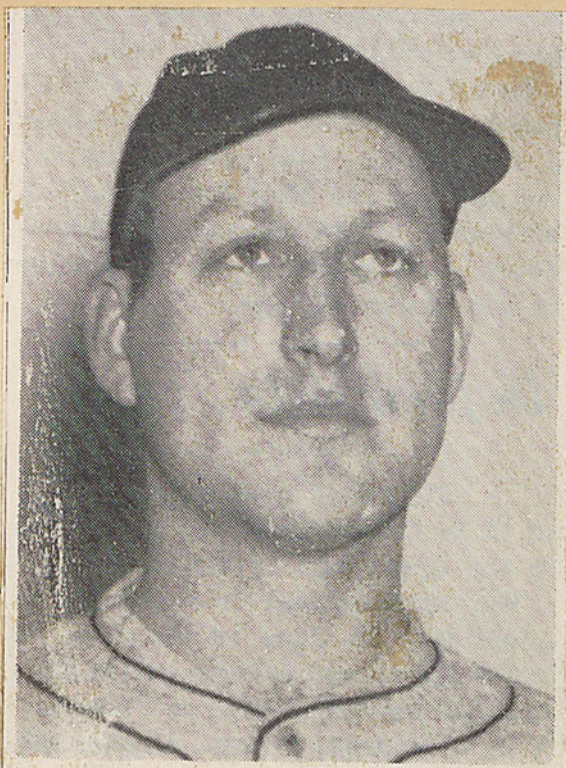

Wins Mile, 880

An overwhelming point majority in the field events enabled the University of Rhode Island track team to defeat Providence College, 84-51, in the opening spring meet for both schools yesterday at Kingston.

The Rams outscored the Friars, 55-8, in the seven field events, but P.C. had the better of it in the eight running races, piling up a 43-29 advantage. The winners' landslide in the field phase included three clean sweeps—in the hammer, shot and discus—and three one-two finishes—in the pole vault, broad jump and high jump.

Only Gerry Alexander's near-record javelin toss of 190 feet, 3¼ inches interrupted the Rams' parade of first places. That throw just missed by 6¼ inches the Meade Field record set by E. H. Perkins of R.I. in 1940.

Some Surprises

Although the P.C. superiority in the running events was not great enough to offset its field weakness, the Friars, nevertheless, sprang a few surprises. They enjoyed clean sweeps in the 440 and 880 and placed one-two in the mile and 220 low hurdles.

Bill Sherry paced the Friars with two victories. He won the mile and 880 by 10 yards over teammate

Dick Johnson in both cases. John Cassidy, Bob and Dick Tiernan finished in that order in the 440 and John McMullen and Frank Lussier gave P.C. an 8-1 margin in the low hurdles by placing one-two. These two also finished second and third, respectively, in the high hurdles.

Alton Wiley and Jack Bulleit featured the Rams' pointmaking, each scoring double triumphs. Wiley won the 100 in 9.8 seconds and the 220 in 21.5. Though both times bettered school records, they were not allowed because of a favoring wind. Bulleit captured the high hurdles and high jump.

Scores Nine

Bob Linne, with a first in the pole vault, a second in the broad jump, and a one-quarter share of second place in the high jump, contributed nine points to the Rams' total. Alan Garrity scored eight by winning the discus and taking second in the shot.

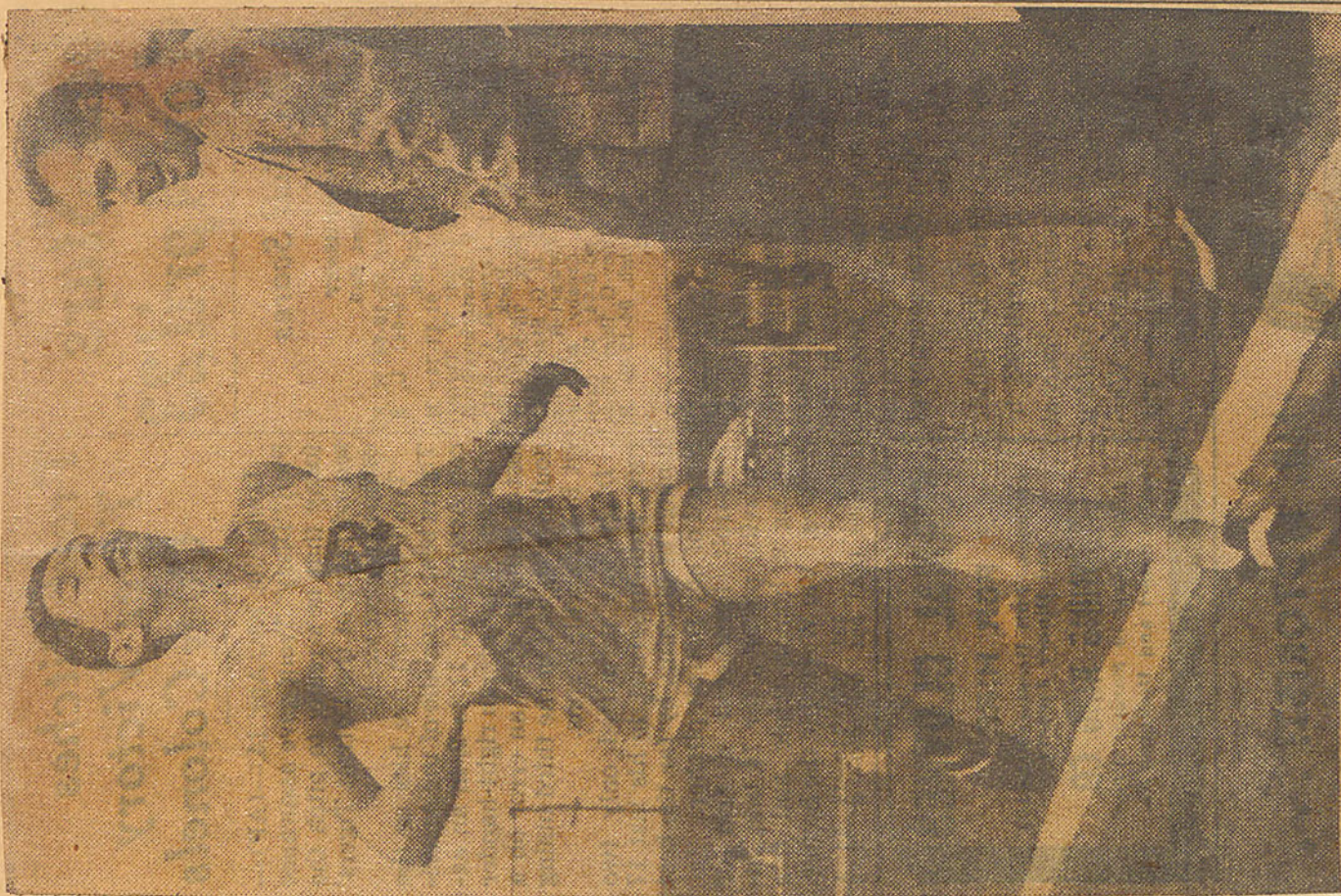

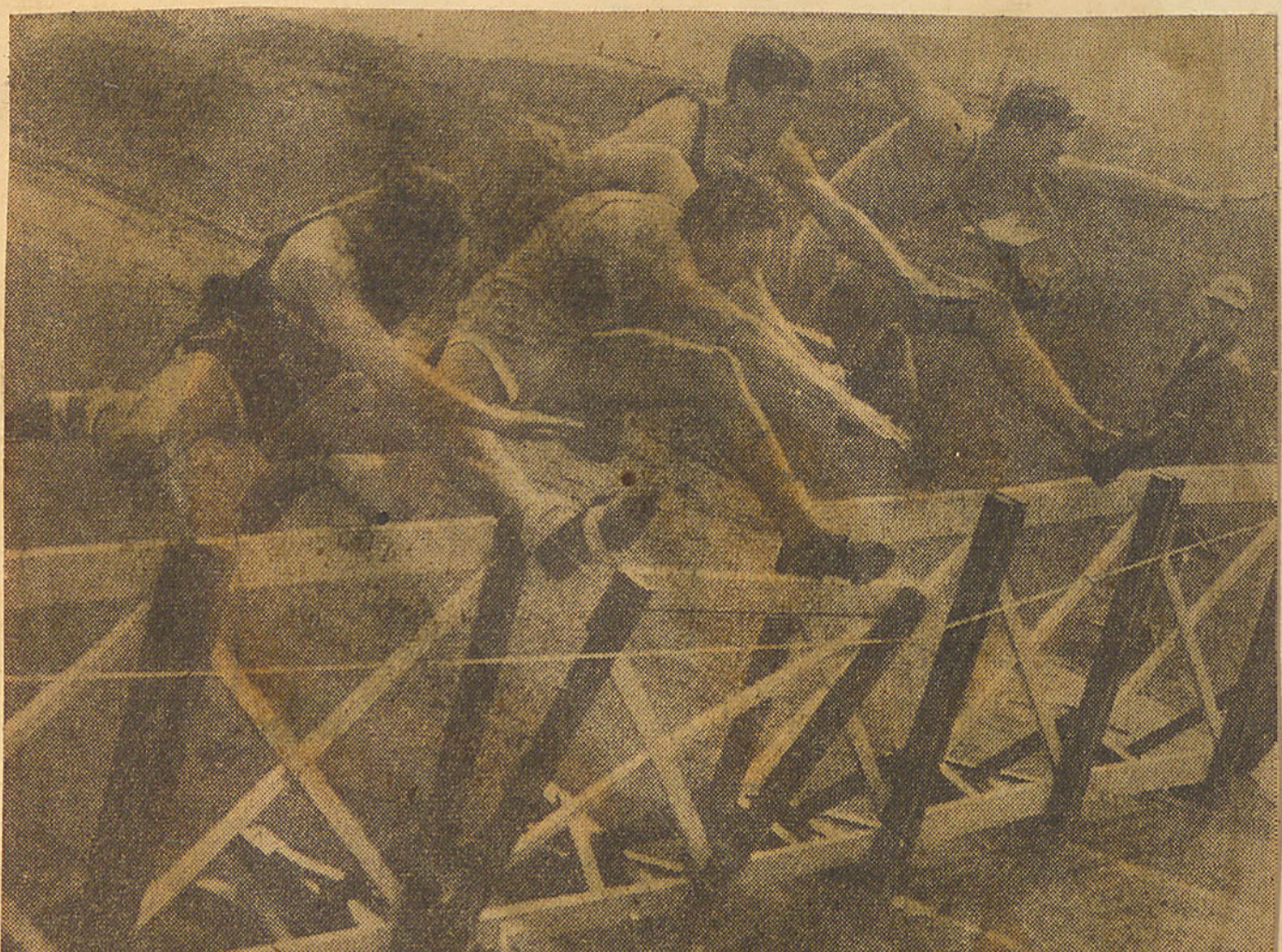

Mullins To Pitch Opener At Mount St. Mary's Today

Sophomore Bill Mullins, the two hundred pound righthander from Lowell, Massachusetts, will pitch Providence College's opening game of the season against Mt. St. Mary's College today at Emmitsburg, Maryland.

The talented fastballer has been nominated from a staff of five pitchers being carried by coach Hal Martin on the southern trip. Standing by for duty will be sophomores Ed Sullivan and Jim Gallagher, righthanders; and southpaws Frank Higgins, a senior, and Bill McKeon, a junior.

15 Friars Make Trip

The remaining portion of the 15 man squad making the seven game excursion through Maryland, Virginia and Washington, D. C., will consist of four outfielders, five infielders and one catcher.

Co-captains Sam Nissel and Jim Costello and Dick Duignan will make up the regular outfield with Bob Grenier in reserve. The infield will be manned by Donald MacDonald, first; George Ducharme, second; Howie McGuinness, short, and John "Beaver" Power, third, with Bob Barry, the number one reserve.

Quinn Starting Receiver

Bill Quinn will handle the catching assignment. Howie McGuinness and Beaver Power will back Quinn up.

Excluding strong pitching reserves, Martin will have thin replacements for the remaining eight positions. However, the reserve strength of his infield, outfield and catching will have more versatility than in former years. Most versatile man on the squad is

sophomore Beaver Power who is capable of playing any position with better than average ability. At the present, Beaver will be stationed at third but is ready to jump into an outfield, first base or catching spot should the need arise.

Grenier, Barry Top Reserves

In reserves Bob Grenier and Bob Barry, Martin will have two very good hitters and capable fielders as well. Grenier who can pitch and play the outfield has been hitting the ball at a hefty clip during practice sessions. Barry will move into the third base slot should it be found necessary to shift Power to another spot. As for hitting ability, Barry was one of the three players to bat .300 or better last year. He has continued to show his authority with the bat in recent intersquad games.

In rotating his pitching staff for the five consecutive games, beginning today and finishing with Georgetown on Monday, Martin has mapped something of a tentative plan. Higgins will

probably follow Mullins, then Sullivan or Gallagher. This will be subject to change depending on whether Mullins is able to go most of the game today. If he doesn't then he'll come back in the third contest.

Martin Hopeful For Split

Martin is hoping for a split at least, but he is definitely aiming for wins over Virginia, Georgetown and St. John's.

Pitching will be the key to success or failure of the Friars this year. The bench will be stronger, and the catching appears to be the best in years. Given some respectable hurling to go along with this then Providence College can be assured of a good season.

One of the "mysteries" of the staff who may provide the Friars with a solid pitching foundation is Bill McKeon. Last year, McKeon pitched with but little success. He has the capabilities of a winning pitcher. During an intersquad game last week, Bill did such a fine job that Martin believes the youngster's potentialities may finally be realized.

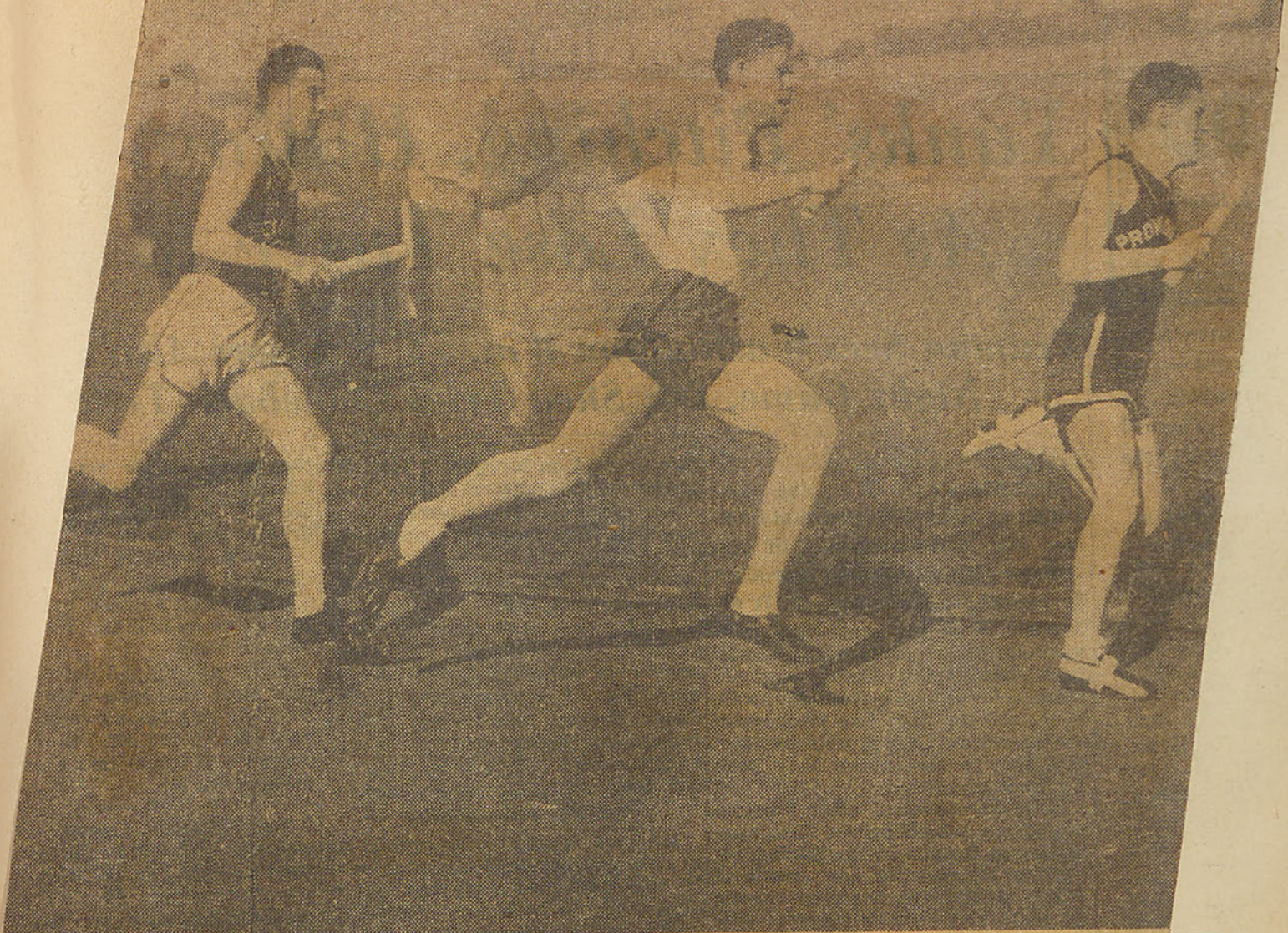

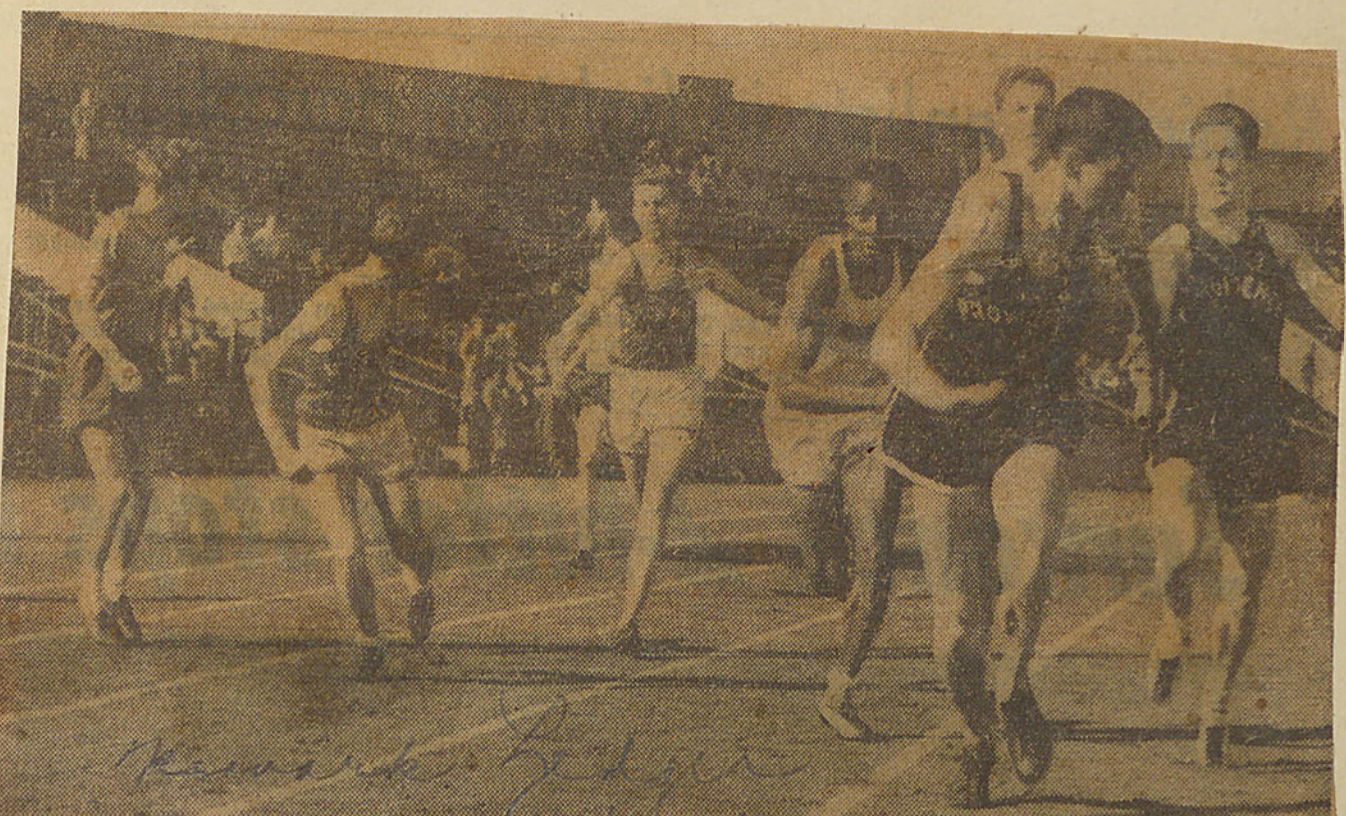

The Providence College baseball team will complete its southern trip today with a game against St. John's College of Brooklyn. The team is expected to arrive home tonight.

As can be surmised from reports sent in after each game, the present season can be tabbed as moderately successful.

Over and above their struggle for a decent won and lost percentage, the Friars have shown a general improvement in comparison with last year's inauspicious start. The pitching department headed by Bill Mullins looms better and stronger. The hitting will definitely have added vitality with Beaver Power in the lineup. In fact the first four men in the batting order, Bob Barry, Power, Bill Quinn and Dick Duignan could probably be ranked as the hardest hitting lead-off quartet on any college team. That group and Don MacDonald in sixth position have had a monopoly in the slugging department.

After the first two ball games which resulted in victories, the Friars' tight defensive play on the mound and afield suffered a lapse in the following three contests with defeat being the natural consequence.

Errors are part of any ball game and in a close tilt as was probably experienced in the Hampden-Sydney and Virginia contests, pressure could

easily cause a boy to kick one away. That would relieve the pitching of any excessive censure. Also it would seem that in the last few games, the Friars have demonstrated a tendency to 'freeze' in the tight games. Inability to hit in the clutch or complete the double play will certainly increase the pressure on every pitch and swing in the late innings when one run can decide the game.

This view of the Friars, south of the Mason-Dixon line, may prove as distorted as the hyperbole. It won't be known until they open their season here on the 5th of May. It follows the old axiom, "There can be a million reasons for losing a one run game, but no one questions too deeply a 10 run loss."

However, one of the biggest questions concerning the team is, "What sort of an impression did the Friars make on their southern opponents?" This has been their first trip south. Will they return next year?

One individual player who is due for recognition is second baseman Bob Barry from Warren. Barry has been literally 'murdering' the ball. While not the smoothest fielding second sacker the little 'Indian' from Warren high school is rapping base hits with more authority than ever. Before leaving on the trip, Coach Hal Martin revealed his intention of using Barry as his first reserve whether it be, at third or second. Apparently George Ducharme the regular second baseman was incapacitated in some way in the first game because Ducharme has not come back and Barry has remained in command. At his present batting rate, it does not appear that anyone will move Bob out of his keystone post.

Good Things Come In Small Packages; Note "Pop" Johnson

Former LaSalle Star Shows Outstanding Versatility

I had never really believed that old saying about "good things coming in small packages." I always thought that the big things were the best.

Even in sports, in my adolescence, I maintained the same opinion.

Now at Providence College, there is one athlete who stands at not much more than five feet, six inches. He is not the only small man in the P. C. sports picture but he is about the most outstanding.

Richard "Pop" Johnson is now one of Coach Harry Coates' best track men. He came to this campus from La Salle Academy when he graduated in June, 1948. At that Smith Street school, he starred in state and sectional circles under the direction of Dan O'Grady (now coaching at Danbury High, Conn.) and received all-state high school honors for his efforts. Mr. O'Grady always claims that Pop was one of the best he ever turned out and Pop has proved this to the satisfaction of Harry Coates.

At Providence, he has improved even more so. The fact that he is a fine athlete plus the indefinable something which gives him the will to win even against seemingly insurmountable odds make him the type of man every coach wants.

Another one of Coach Coates' capable and versatile track men, Pop has run in about every event from 440 yards to the gruelling five-mile cross-country run. As a freshman last year, he took a third place in the running broad jump besides winning the 880-yard and 1-mile runs as the Friar yearlings turned back Holy Cross.

An interesting duel was started in his first year with Walt Molineaux of Brown when the latter edged him in hill-and-dale run between the two colleges at Hendricken Field. The 1949 season's loss to Molineaux was Pop's only dual meet loss for the year. He held victories over Holy Cross and the U. of R. I.

He was a member of the 1950 indoor season 1-mile relay team. The outdoor season of the same year saw him compete in the 880-yard and 1-mile events and also as a member of the Eastern Intercollegiate record breaking medley relay team.

Last fall, he placed first in every varsity cross-country dual meet. Johnson outran such men as Lister (R. I.), Ahearn (Holy Cross), Davis (Springfield), Zeleney (at W. P. I. he set a new course record), and Molineaux. The last meet was the upset of the year as the whole team ran exceptionally well as they inflicted a decisive setback upon a surprised Brown team. It was also a personal victory for Pop who avenged last year's setback by beating Molineaux by more than 70 yards. He placed second and

thirteenth in the Eastern Catholic and New England championships respectively.

During the recent indoor track season, the Friar continued his great work on 1-mile and 2-mile relay teams. He was a member of victorious 1-mile relay teams which competed in the Washington Star games and the New York K. of C. meet. He ran with the 2-mile relay team of Jim Gannon, Frank Lussier and Bill Sherry which picked up a fifth place in the I.C.4A's.

Truly a fine competitor, Pop is looking forward to the current outdoor season as are the rest of his team mates. He exemplifies what has come to be practically a dead issue as far as P. C. students are concerned. Other extracurricular activities for the busy Mr. Johnson include class officer for two years and treasurer of the Metropolitan Providence Club.

Pop is continuing to show well in the current outdoor track season. In a dual meet at the U. of R. I., he picked up six points for the Friars with second place finishes in 880 yard and 1 mile runs. He was also a member of the P. C. relay teams which won the Eastern Catholic Championships for the 2-mile and 2½-mile relays.

Hayes Sets Records in Mile, Half Mile at Seton Hall Relays

32 Colleges to Compete in Varsity Division Today; Georgetown's 2-Mile Team Favored

NEWARK, N. J., April 20.—Cardinal Hayes High School backed up its favorite rating with a vengeance today as the fifth annual Seton Hall Relays opened at Newark School Stadium. Howie Borck's boys from Grand Concourse not only won the half-mile and mile events but also shattered records in each event.

In the 880, the Hayes foursome of Bill Cochrane, Tom Flaherty, Len Moore and Jim Howard sped around the track in 1:32.8, a full second below the old mark which Hayes itself set in 1947 and then tied last year. It was Moore, running the third leg, who stood out on the great Bronx squad. Len, winner of the Catholic High School 60-yard dash and high-jump titles in March, took the baton from Flaherty close to ten yards behind leading New Rochelle. When Moore handed the stick to anchor Jim Howard, Hayes was five yards in front and Howard had no trouble holding the lead to the end.

Mile Mark Set

George Kohutanyecz, Bill Copeland, Bob Roche and Jim Moran lowered the one-mile relay mark from the 3:30 of last year's New Rochelle team to 3:28.7, but, even so, just managed to hold off Armstrong High, of Washington, D. C.

Fine performance by Wheeler gave Armstrong a victory in the only other Eastern High School championship of the day. Don Wheeler's fine anchor brought Armstrong's 440-yard relay squad in by five yards over Princeton, N. J., High in 0:44.1. Ken McCall, Paul Ellis and Jim Young ran the first three legs for the winners.

Three college relays, all Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate athletic conference championships were on the card and Seton Hall turned in a fine performance in winning the featured mile relay. The Setonians, who go for the Eastern intercollegiate mile crown tomorrow used Harry Bright, Charley Slade, Morris Currotta and Bob Carter and ran away from the field in 3:22.8. St. Francis, of Brooklyn, was second, Providence College third and Lemoyne College fourth.

Friars Take First 2 Races

In the first two college relays Seton Hall played the perfect host to Providence College, dropping both races by twenty yards. The Rhode Island Friars foursome of John Cassidy, Frank Lussier, Dick Johnson and Bill Sherry won a 440-880-1320 and mile medley in 10:37.4 from Setonia. St. Francis, of Brooklyn, finished a distant third, and Iona College trailed.

The pattern was repeated in the two-mile test as Jim Gannon, Dick Johnson and Bob Tiernan won decisively from the Seton Hall in 7:59.2. Iona College ran third.

With delegates from thirty-two colleges, the varsity division of the Seton Hall Relays will be held tomorrow, starting at 1:45 p.m. Outstanding favorites include Georgetown's two-mile relay, which shattered a string of eight meet records indoors winding up with a 7:35.7 clocking; Manhattan's 440-yard relay of John O'Connell, Joe Schatzle, Lindy Remigino and Bob Carty, and Seton Hall's mile relay of Harry Bright, Charley Slade, Morris Currotta and Bob Carter which swept all indoor titles.
