



AMINCOS SUBDUE FRIAR NINE, 6 TO 3

Aces Garner Seventh Victory in Eight Starts; Homer Causes Squabble

Except for a controversial homerun wallop over the fence in right centerfield, righthander Russ Fish held the Providence College Friars pretty well in check as American International scored a 6-to-3 decision yesterday at Hendricken Field. It was the seventh victory in eight starts for the Aces, one of the best records among the New England collegians.

Fish set down the Friars with six hits in their home opener, only one of which caused him any real damage. That was a 360-foot home run by John "Beaver" Power in the third inning with two mates aboard, accounting for all three Friar runs.

The home-run drive also set off a minor rhubarb involving Coach Hank Butova of the Aces and umpires Pard Pearce and Barney Burke. The ball, well hit into a wind, apparently went through the branches of a tree as it left the park, dropping on the other side of the steel fence, just beyond the confines of the field.

Butova vehemently insisted the ball hit inside the field and bounded over the 10-foot fence and argued for his point. At the spot where the ball left the park, the grass is tufted and the ground is not as hard as in some other places.

The Friars, who now have a 6and-5 record, will meet the Boston College Eagles today at 2 o'clock at Hendricken Field, with sophomore Eddie Sullivan of Fall River, the probable opening moundsman for Coach Hal Martin's club. Mike Roarke of West Warwick is the No. 1 catcher for the Eagles this season.

The Aces, who backed Fish with errorless support, jumped into a 4-0 lead in the first two innings. Roger Methot and Tony Lovallo opened the game with singles off southpaw Frank Higgins. With Methot on third and Lovallo on first, the Aces pulled off a delayed double steal, Methot scoring. Later Wally Hespelt hit a long fly to deer

left with Lovallo scoring the Aces' second run after the catch.

With two outs and runners on second and third in the second inning, Ed Zordan hit a slow roller between the mound and first base. Higgins couldn't field the ball which went for a scratch hit. One run scored on the bingle and another came in when catcher Bill Quinn first tagged Bert Butters and then let the ball get away from him on a close play at the plate.

Bill McKeon took over the Providence hurling in the third inning and pitched good ball over the rest of the route. He got out of a hole nicely in the sixth with men on second and third, when he struck out Johnny Meader and Butters popped to Howie McGuinness. The Aces' fifth tally in the eighth was unearned while McKeon wildpitched home their sixth marker with two outs in the top of the ninth.

In the Providence third, McKeon walked and Buzz Barry singled to left. Power homered over the fence, scoring McKeon and Barry. Had Coach Butova of the Aces been able to get the umpires o rule the ball a ground-rule double, which would have been the case if it bounded over the fence. Providence would have scored only one run. McKeon would have tallied, with Barry moving around to third base and Power to second.

Over the final six innings the Friars made only three hits and got one man as far as third base. Fish, who comes from West Springfield, Mass., retired the last seven Friars in order. He beat Boston College with a four-hit job for his only other college victory of the season.

Jim Manitsas and Lovallo came up with a pair of fine catches in support of Fish. In the seventh the Friars put together two singles by Jim Costello and McGuinness, but a squeeze play failed as the Friars went for the tying run. The Aces led, 4 to 3, at the time.

The Providence College freshmen won their first game of the season beating Stonehill, 4-3, but then they turned around and dropped a 5-3 decision to Holy Cross. Pete Drury went the route for the Stonehill win, scattering ten hits effectively, and had the game pretty well under control all the way.

Joe D'Onofrio and Bobby Moran were the big guns in the fracas, each booming out important triples. Little Joe was the big noise in the Cross game too, going four for five, and really putting the good wood on the ball for the second game in succession.

Edge Stonehill

After their close loss to Brown, the frosh pulled out a squeaker in their own right against Stonehill. Drury was liberal with the base knocks, but he had his stuff when he needed it, stranding a large number of the opposition on the bases. P. C., though outhit, made their blows count.

Moran's triple accounted for two in the first, then Stonehill struck back to tie it up two all. The game then developed into a tight pitchers' duel until the eighth, when the Friars came up with two more runs on Moran's single, D'Onofrio's triple, and Walker's single. Stonehill put on a flurry of their own in the ninth, drawing up within one run, but once again Pete was equal to the task, and he left the mound in possession of his first win.

Free Passes Costly

The mound corps was a little loose with the free passes up in Worcester, and they paid dearly for their extravagance. Loser Don Podziewski wasn't bad at all, giving up five hits in the five innings he worked, but



Jim Penler scored the only double for P.C. by winning the 100 and 220. John McMullen collected 12 points for the Friars with a first in the low hurdles, seconds in the high hurdles and hammer, and a third in the high jump.

Jerry Alexander of the Friars turned in the only noteworthy performance in the varsity meet with his winning javelin toss of 197 feet, 9½ inches. That throw was less than two feet short of the Brown

B.U. Trackmen Win Easily in Easterns

Sherry of P.C. Sets Record in 880; Wilt Near Mark in Special Two Mile

Weston, Mass., May 12. - Fred Wilt, the flying G-man, ran the second fastest outdoor 2-mile ever turned in by an American, and Coach Doug Raymond's Boston University Terriers coasted home in first place with 481/2 points, in the 25th annual Eastern Intercollegiate A.A. track and field championships today at Nickerson Field.

Wilt, trying for a new American outdoor record, was timed in nine minutes, eight-tenths of a second, approximately two seconds back of Don Lash's best time (8:58.3) accomplished at Princeton in 1936.

The former Indiana star ran his best outdoor race at the 2-mile distance and was a little chagrined that he was unable to establish a new mark. He tried for a new standard about a year ago at Brown Field, turning in nine minutes, 1.5 seconds and winning by 50 yards.

There was little fault to find with the BU track today for three new EIAA records were set on it although it probably would have been faster with less rain in the last 36 hours. However Wilt ran well, just not having enough zip for a recordbreaking race.

The special two mile event paired Wilt and his FBI buddy, Horace Ashentelter, Fred Schoeffler of the

New York A.C. and the BU freshman miler, Johnny Kelley from New London. Ashenfelter, who was situated in the Providence office for a time this spring, made a race of it, although Kelley set an early pace.

P.C. Wins Three Tilts

The Terriers ran away with the team championship, scoring in 12 of the 15 events. Tufts, the defending champions, were second, nosing out Bowdoin and Colby with 26 points. The Providence College Friars won three first places, established one of the new records and finished fifth in the 10-team field with 18 points.

Bill Sherry, of the Friars, really a picture runner, ran his best race today, doing the half mile in 1 minute, 56.5 seconds and just copping the race from Bill Fitzgerald of BU in a tight finish. Jim Haskell of Williams set the pace, with Fitzgerald and Sherry running side by side for some of the route.

Another outstanding job for the Friars was contributed by Bob Tiernan in the 440. Dud O'Leary of BU set a fast pace in quarter but he couldn't hold it. Tiernan, who was All-State in both hockey and track at La Salle, nailed him on the back-stretch and won by about five yards in 49.5 seconds. This was just one-fifth second off the meet record and the best time Tiernan has shown over this distance.

Alexander Wins

Jerry Alexander, third PC firstplace winner, upset the highly favored Bill Seffens of Bowdoin, who had previous marks of better than 200 feet in the javelin. Alexander got off a throw of 197 feet, 11 inches (best of his college career) while Seffens was 10 feet further back on his best effort.

Dick Fitzgerald, a Mount Pleasant product, won the mile for the Terriers in his best time of the year, four minutes, 25.2 seconds. Fitz had a nine yard margin on Bob Goodwin of Springfield while Johnny Phillips of East Providence, running for BU, took third.

Don Murphy of Bowdoin, the former Classical competitor, took the 120-yard high hurdles rather handily, although well over the record. His teammate Dick Getchell set a new record of 24.2 seconds, copping the 220 lows.

Jim Penler of the Friars ran third in the 220 final as George West of Middlebury set a new record. West, double-winner in the sprints, was timed at 21.5 seconds for the 220 in a fairly close finish. The Friars also had a fourth in the two mile as Dick Lee picked up a point and surprised several in that

The Friars spotted the Redmen three runs in the first inning and trailed until the fifth, when they went ahead, 6-5, on a four-run rally P.C. added two more runs in the sixth and salted the game away with a seven-run spree in the

eighth.

Sophomore Jim Gallagher, who has been bothered all spring with a sore arm, made his first start for P.C. and gave up all of the visitors runs before Coach Hal Martin lifted him for a pinch hitter in the fifth Bill McKeon, who had beaten St John's in Brooklyn last month, blanked the Redmen over the last four innings. He allowed only one hit and walked four.

The Friars got to three St. John's pitchers for 12 hits and 10 walks but it took them almost five full innings to do any business with the curves of the Redmen's starter.

The latter was the victim of P.C.'s four-run burst in the fifth after two were out and gave way to a pinch hitter in the sixth. Jack Curran took over in the sixth and was charged with the next eight P.C. runs. He was relieved by Jim Welsh with one out in the eighth.

Bases on balls and loose fielding played a large part in the runmaking. St. John's combined three hits, one a double by Don Mackenzie. and three P.C. errors for its three runs in the first inning and scored its two other runs in the fifth on Rex Shanahan's two-run triple.

Buzz Barry scored the Friars' first run in the first inning with the help of a walk, a wild pitch, Don MacDonald's infield single and Bob McGirr's error. Sam Nissel, who

was P.C.'s hitting star with a triple and two singles, scored in the second on an attempted double steal He had reached on a walk and was moved to third by Bob Grenier's single. He crossed the plate before Grenier was erased on a rundown between first and second.

A St. John's error, a walk and an infield hit by Dick Duignan after two were out set the stage for the P.C. counter-surge in the fifth. Bill Quinn drove in two runs with a single and two more came in on Nissel's triple to the left-field gate.

P.C. added two runs in the sixth on a walk, an error, John Power's double and a passed ball. The Friars sent 11 batters to the plate during their game-clinching rally in the eighth. Triples by Barry and Duignan and Power's double were the key wallops.

Power, Howie McGuinness and Barry contributed three spectacular fielding plays in retiring the side in the third and Power later came up with a run-saying stab on a line drive by Ray Pecorara with two runners on in the eighth.

The triumph was the Friars' sixth in 14 games and the defeat left St. John's with a 7-9 record. The Redmen have dropped their last four games.

Among the Best

Crowley, of the later day players, and Wholey, of the early ones, were the most adept at making fine

catches in the field. Mike Thomas, who covered Providence baseball for years, and Farrell agree on that. Nissel, on his play for the past season, is the best since Crowley.

Sam is a retiring sort of fellow but a good competitor in both baseball and basketball. Coach Hal Martin says he made at least five or six really brilliant catches, the kind that would ordinarily go for hits. His grab at Kingston against the University of Rhode Island and a game-saving play with the bases loaded at Quantico were among the major contributions:

Nissel isn't helpless at the plate, either. His 3-run homer started the Friars on their way to a decisive victory over Holy Cross and his 10th-inning single with the bases loaded sent Boston College down to defeat. Sam thinks Brown, the Eagles and Springfield are the best in New England and doesn't rate A.I.C. as strong as some other experts do.

Big Week

This was a big weeks in sports for the boys from St. Mary's, Pa. (population 10,000, location near Pittsburgh) at Providence College. Jim Schlimm, one of the Friars' leading basketball players who could be Vin Cuddy's first 1000-point man, was elected captain of the basketball forces. And last night Nissel received the Holland Award, which annually goes to PC's most valuable senior baseball player.

The award was presented by the Rev. Vincent C. Dore, O.P., dean, and a former Friar infielder, and is put up each year by Dr. Frankie Holland of Cranston, who was a cracker-jack third baseman in his intercollegiate days.

There's one thing about Nissel that doesn't show up in the summary. He's a team player first. He played some fine basketball and baseball at Providence College and his teammates elected him to share the captaincies in both sports. He's on the modest side, but friendly and likeable.

If Sam goes into pro ball, and it looks as though he will because he expects to be called up by the Army in the fall, he won't have any worries on his fielding for they don't come much better, no matter where you happen to be looking.





The Friars, having benefited from loose fielding by the Eagles in scoring three runs in the fourth, led by 4-3 going into the last of the ninth. Then Len Ceglarski singled, moved up on a sacrifice and scored with two out on Ray Ducharme's wild throw. Sullivan relieved starter Bill McKeon and struck out Frank Tanner.

Providence's relief pitcher then

singled in the 10th and scored what proved to be the deciding run on Paul Duignan's single. After a hit batsman, Sam Nissel drove in two runs with a single, clinching the

Boston College outhit the visitors, 11 to 9, and had four extrabase blows to the Friars' none. Errors proved pitcher Paul Lockray's undoing, accounting for four unearned runs.


Larry Sullivan, B.C. outfielder, hit one of the longest homers ever seen at the heights in the sixth, a 420-foot drive to deep center.

75th IC4A Meet Attracts Several R.I. Performers

The 75th annual IC4A track and field championships at Philadelphia's Franklin Field on Friday and Saturday, an event that will attract a number of New England and Rhode Island college stars in addition to the country's top performers, heads the collegiate sports program this week.

For local consumption, though, there is the baseball battle between the University of Rhode Island and Providence College at Hendricken Field Friday afternoon that will determine the Rhode Island College baseball championship. The Friars are out of the running, but the Rams could gain a tie with Brown by winning. Each would then wind up with a three-and-one record.

The Friars' baseball team, which gained a split in its home-and-home series with Boston College when it edged the Eagles, 7-4, in a 10-inning duel at Boston yesterday, plays at Springfield Wednesday. The latter will be host to Connecticut at Meade Field Wednesday and then, after playing P.C., close out the season against Springfield at Springfield Saturday.

Ed Sullivan, a sophomore, was one of the heros in P.C.'s victory over Boston College. Coming on in the ninth when the Eagles rallied and tied the score at 4-4, Sullivan pitched hitless ball through the last one and one-third innings and scored the tie-breaking run in the 10th after opening the inning with a single.

For Good Measure

Dick Duignan's single rescued Sullivan and then the Friars put together a hit batsman and another safety by Sam Nissel for a pair of insurance runs. It was Nissel's second hit. He and Jim Costello were the only Friars to collect more than one blow. Costello led both clubs at the plate with three hits.

P.C., taking advantage of some loose defensive play by Boston College, jumped off to a 3-0 lead in the fourth but the Eagles were only a run down, 4-3, going into the ninth. Their last run had been the result of a 420-foot homer by Outfielder Larry Sullivan.

Len Ceglarski opened the inning with a single and was sacrificed to second. Bill McKeon, who had pitched all the way for the Friars, seemed out of trouble as he retired the next batter, but a wild throw by George Ducharme enabled Ceglarski to score the tying run and then Sullivan took over. He fanned Frank Turner for the final out and then picked up credit for the triumph as the charges of Coach Hal Martin pulled the game out in the

Quinn's Single Sends Maroons to 1-0 Loss

Drives in Only Run for Providence as Nevers Loses No-Hitter in Eighth; Mullins Allows Three Blows

Fran Nevers of Springfield College had pitching fame in the palm of his hand yesterday afternoon, but the slim righthander, after hurling seven innings of no-hit, no-run ball, saw it slip from his grasp in the eighth when a scratch infield blow and a solid single to right by Billy Quinn, former Cathedral High catcher, spelled the lone run of the game as Providence College nipped the Maroons, 1-0, in a brilliant pitching battle before some 550 fans at Berry Field. Big Bill Mullins went all the way for Providence to win a three-hit gem.

The spine-tingling loss, only the third of the season for Springfield, snapped an eight-game winning streak. The Maroons now have a 10-3 card. For Providence, the verdict avenged a previous 6-2 loss dished out by Springfield.

Leftfielder Bill Brown had two hits for Springfield, the only man to accomplish this feat as both teams scratched for any way to get a runner on base. Matt Mactozo got the other Maroon bingle.

It was first baseman Ed McDonald ward with what who led Nevers to downfall. His hot hopper eluded Redmond at first for the initial Friar hit, he was sacrificed to second and then Quinn followed with his clincher.

Those were the only two hits Providence got. After Nevers threw wildly into centerfield trying to nip Quinn going to second on a sacrifice bunt, the crest-fallen mound ace was relieved by Bill (The Hat) Nordberg, who shut the door the rest of the way. But while Providence was getting only two safeties, the Maroons weren't much better off. They couldn't kayo Mullins, who worked himself in and out of trouble constantly.

Mullins, whose wildness—he allowed nine bases on balls—kept him in hot water all the way, really did some clutch chucking. The frustrated Maroons left a man on, what could have been an all-important run, in every inning but the seventh, the only frame in which they went down in order.

One key play came in the third inning when Springfield had one of its best chances to score. Maetozo, fiery second-sacker, led off with a walk and stole second. With one down Brown cracked a single to right, the first hit of the game, and Maetozo, who had a good lead, streaked plateward with what looked like the ice-breaker. But outfielder Al Grenier came up with ball and uncorked a perfect throw to the plate to nip the sliding Maetozo.

Again in the eighth the Maroons had a big chance, this time to tie it after the visitors had gone ahead. Brown was on third after singling to center, stealing second and advancing on a wild pitch. Ed Redmond then walked. The Maroons tried the double steal but Quinn's peg to second was cut off quickly by shortstop Howie McGuinness and rifled home in time to tag Brown.

Fans Sewell

Mullins really had it in the clutch on the Maroons' final chance. George Flood walked to open the last of the ninth and was sacrificed to second. With two down, the bespectacled hurler wound things up in a blaze of glory as he sent pinch-hitter Red Sewell down swinging for the final out.

Nevers was never faster than yesterday. He mixed his swift one with a knuckler and curve in great style. Nevers retired the first seven/Friars, walked one and then set down five more in a row before issuing another pass. Flood's error at third base in the seventh snapped another string of five.

Quinn needed his game-winning single to redeem himself. The Maroons stole five bases, and all could be said stolen on Quinn. On one play he rifled the ball into centerfield and on another couldn't find the handle when it appeared that he had Redmond cold in the sixth.

Nevers recorded four strikeouts in his heart-breaking stint and walked only three. The great ovation he received when lifted in the eighth, must have helped his spirit plenty. Mullins, who never gave up although under constant pressure, also fanned four, but saved his strikeout for

Competition for this year's team will be rough since there is a wealth of material. It will take lots of talent from the Sophomores to push aside such experienced men as Captain John McMullen. Dick Johnson, Waters, Jim Gannon, Frank Lussier and Dick Tiernan who formed the nucleus of last year's squad. Dick Lee, a former All-Stater at La Salle and junior class member, will be eligible for competition in the coming season. But we can't overlook the fact that last year's Freshmen were co-holders of the New England title and will certainly be placing some men in the starting lineup.

Heading the list of promising Sophomores who are fighting to obtain a berth on the varsity are Chris Lohner, Bill Newman, Bill Hennigan, Gene Coyle and Jack Dowling.

This year for the first time since the war we will probably see Freshmen in varsity sports. Bill Horridge, a former Central High hill and daler, and Bob Mathia, a New Bedford High alumnus

and National Interscholastic Quarter Miler Champion, both stand an excellent chance of appearing in the first five.

Looking at the coming meet with Boston College we see that both teams are untested and as a result there is no basis for comparative merits or demerits. On the credit side for B. C. is the fact that they will be racing on their home grounds which is an advantage, and they do have an excellent runner in the person of Tony Sapienza. Also B. C. has been in session for a week more than P. C. which means that her hill and dalers will probably be in better shape to take to the gruelling five-mile course than the Friars.

This will be the second meeting in the P. C.-B. C. cross-country series which began two years ago with an informal dual meet at Hendricken Field. The Eagles won the meet by the lopsided score of 19 to 36. With the score of two years ago in mind the P. C. harriers should be in a revengeful mood this Saturday.

Against the Eagles two years ago John McMullen finished a respectable second. If he is able to do the same or better this Saturday it should help matters.

McMullen Wins R. I. Decathlon Championship


John McMullen, a senior from Pawtucket, R. I. and captain of the Friar varsity 1951 cross-crounty team, captured the Rhode Island Decathlon title during the summer vacation. Tom DiLuglio of Brown placed second Gerry Ferrara of R. I. University, third, Art Sherman, fourth, Leo Sullivan, B. U., fifth, and Dick Fitzgerald, B. U. sixth.

McMullen, scoring 1200 points more than his closest competitor, DiLuglio, won the 400 meter and 1500 meter runs and the 110 meter high hurdles. In the remaining seven events, he placed second in the 100 meter dash, the high jump, the javelin, the 16 lb. shot put, and the discus. He placed third in the broad jump and tied for fourth in the pole vault.

His best events were the 400 meter run (52 seconds), the 110 meter high hurdles (15.6 seconds), the javelin (153 feet) and the broad jump (20.6 feet).

Times and distances for the other events were: 1500 meter run, 4 min., 39 seconds; 100 meter dash, 11.2 seconds; high jump, 5' 10"; shot put, 36 feet; discus, 104 feet; pole vault, 7 feet.

Dick Johnson's great personal record of winning five dual meets was the outstanding individual accomplishment of the varsity team.

But the freshman team. There was an entirely different story. They had powered through a dual meet season undefeated, frequently applying the proverbial whitewash to their opponents. A couple of tough breaks and they were tied by the Boston University Terriers for co-ownership of the New England IC4A's freshman team title. They came back the following week by placing second or third, depending upon how you count, in the national IC4A's in New York. The following week, they won the Eastern Catholic title for freshmen going away. Then we worried about how many of the team members would be back.

Top Men Return

Of course, some of them left for the service, some dropped from the squad, and some left the school entirely. But the leading members of the squad including Chris Lohner, Bill Newman and Bill Hennigan returned. These men plus the return of Dick Johnson, John McMullen, and Herb Waters and the eligibility of Dick Lee are prime factors in giving Providence College one of the top outfits in New England, for that matter, in the East.

And only last Sunday the Athletic Council put the final OK on freshmen eligibility for varsity competition. Thus it is possible for such first year men as Bill Horridge (a former R. I. all-stater at Central), Paul Methia (national interscholastic quarter mile champion) and Dave Lavalette (a prime prospect) to compete in varsity cross-country.

And now I hope these predictions are as good as my pennant predictions.

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

Many great athletic achievements have been made on Hendricken Field during its many years. Football, baseball and lately, cross-country and track. It is about the rugged hill and dale sport of which I shall treat.

This sport, contrary to popular opinion, has as many hazards or more than other more popular team games. Anything can happen in an event that stretches from three to five miles and sometimes more. The name itself, cross-country, signifies just the environment upon which it is run. It is run on pavement, on grass, on soft ground, on sand, gravel, clay, and all mixtures of ground too numerous to mention here, whether it rains, snows, or the sun shines brightly.

Nature Offers Handicaps

Harriers, in the course of a season, will run over rolling hills, up seemingly perpendicular hills, through woods, down ledges and sometimes, through small brooks and streams. And since these men are primarily runners, personal care of feet and legs is a prime requisite for each man's individual success. A team's success naturally depends upon its individual members.

Now the x-country runner has to look out for loose pebbles, rocks, low-hanging branches and the designated route, as a miscalculated step upon an unseen rock can mean anything from a slight strain to a broken ankle. Needless to say if anything of this sort occurs, the runner's career may be finished for the day, season, or for life. An unfamiliar course with poor route markings may mean the loss of a meet to a visiting team.

R.I.-P.C. Rivalry Renewed

Besides all this the harrier must pace himself correctly to maintain enough wind to finish the race. He has to be wary of his opponents' running ability.

On Friday afternoon of this week, P.C. students will be able to see for themselves the Friars' hill and dalers in action against the Rams of Rhode Island University at Hendricken Field.

In a meeting of this type, the runner faces another difficulty in turning back a team whose members are looking for an upset. Much is at stake. Either team can go on to become the mythical collegiate champion of Rhode Island. Possibly one might go on to a New England IC4A title. A victory to either team can be just enough of a psychological push for the winner to accomplish even greater things. To the Rams a win against the favored Friars would be just what the doctor ordered.

Rams See Power Ebb

The Blue and White's coach Fred Tootell has had better teams under his direction. With the great Bob Black leading the way, the Rams were a powerhouse for several years. But the cross-country coach's dream come true in the person of the 6 foot, 120 pound stringbean Blackie ended in the June 1950 graduation from R.I. It meant the end or practically the finish of a fine team—one that steamrollered through all-comers in this section of the country.

Despite this, R.I. defeated Providence at Kingston in the Friars' first official cross-country season last year. They were later edged by a Brown team which in turn was upset by P.C.

Friars Favored on Paper

Now the Ram must leave his favorite domain to meet the Friar in Providence. This time, it is they who must play the role of the under-dog. That is the situation as it appears on paper. (The results of the P.C.-Springfield meet were not known at the time this article was written.)

But then, events such as there are not won on paper but rather are they accomplished on the athletic field. If teams can rise to the occasion, nothing is impossible. The P.C.-R.I. basketball games at the Auditorium in the last two years also rate high in Friar annals of great upset victories. Baseball also has made many marks.

All this points to one of the better Rhode Island intercollegiate sports events of the year. The meet itself should be hard fought with the Friars having the edge when the final tabulations are made.

ALL IN THE GAME



Action in the Afternoon . . . E.B 10-24-67

MARRY COATES had just sent the field away in a crosscountry meet between his Providence College junior varsity and Nichols Junior College. Now Hal Martin, the freshman basketball coach, was starting his pupils on a one-lap conditioning jog over the same course. On the practice field,

where a short time before the college ROTC unit had been drilling, a boy was tossing the javelin. Down in the gym in Harkins Hall, Vin Cuddy had the basketball varsity working

under a full head of steam.

Still, it was difficult to be around Hendricken Field on an October afternoon and not think about football. Particularly difficult for one visitor whose thoughts kept turning back to a football game there on an afternoon in an autumn long gone. There was a big blond ball-carrier wearing the Black and White that afternoon and he was battering through the opposition for long gains despite the handicap of an injured arm which he had to hold tight to one side. A sore of easy-going lad, Jack Triggs. If he had been a bit more intense, had a shade more of the "killer" in him, he might be remembered today as one of the small-college greats. As it was, he made an outstanding name for himself locally for the Friars in both football and baseball. And that afternoon the handicap under which he was playing seemed to inspire him to what was probably his top performance.

Vivid Football Memory . . .

Yes, you couldn't help thinking about football at Hendricken Field, because, although you'd watched countless games since that afternoon 27 years ago and had, in fact, made a business of watching them, the picture of the old Trigger playing with one arm remained one of your most vivid football memories. It was an especially vivid picture at the moment, for you'd just read the name of a Jack Triggs on the roster of the present Friar senior class, learned he was a son of the all-around athlete of your time, and then learned that the Trigger himself had died during the summer.

Under the circumstances you felt that you could exercise an old grad's privilege in remembering when just for a few moments; even though you had come back to the campus not to hark back to the old days when football was king in the fall but to write about the present glories of cross-country.

And so now to the business of hand, the ups and downs of the current crop of Friar hill-and-dalers. Definitely, the ups predominate. This seems to be the year Coates was pointing for when he took over the P.C. job. In fact, the big year probably has come a year earlier than he expected, for under the

wartime emergency ruling the Friars have the privilege

using freshmen in their varsity meets.

And Coates has some first-year standouts. Notable in this group are Paul Mathia from New Bedford, the national scholastic quarter-mile champ; Bill Horridge, the Central High distance man who won the Joe Nutter Mile at the Brown Interscholastics last Memorial Day, and Len Riley, the New Bedford boy who did heroic rescue work in the fishing-boat capsizal off Montauk last summer.

Big Little Man . . .

Then there are the star upper-classmen, Chris Lohner, ace of last year's crack freshman team, Bill Newman and Dick Lee. The latter is a transfer from Notre Dame as of last year and eligible for the first time this season. And of course, Pop Johnson. The little man with the rugged underpinnings hasn't been up to top trim thus far because of foot blisters, but he battled this handicap off last week against Rhode Island and ran one of his finest races in playing a feature role in

the Friars' first harrier victory over the Rams.

The Rhode Island victory was the third dual meet triumph, Boston College and Springfield being the other victims. To give you an idea of how Coates feels about his runners, he even went so far as to predict they'll beat Holy Cross in their meet over the P.C. course Friday. About everyone else concedes the meet to the Friars, but for Harry to win a meet "on paper" for himself is something else again. His team also will be the choice in the Eastern Catholic meet in Boston, Nov. 1, figures to be strong in the New Englands at Boston Nov. 12, might even be rated an outside possibility in the IC4A's in New York Nov. 19.

What about the Brown meet Nov. 5? There is one on which Coates will do no predicting, even though the Friars figure to win handsomely "on paper." Brown was in just that favored position over the Friars last fall and P.C. pulled one of the upsets of the season. Coates returns to his pessimistic norm when you mention the Brown meet. He knows his friend, Ivan Fuqua, will be all out to turn the tables.

"No sir," he says, "too many things can happen in this cross-country business. A fellow gets sore feet, another gets

sick to his stomach, has a cold, something like that."

De-Emphasis . . .

It was thought best to head him off before he worked himself into acute depression. To change the subject someone pointed out track coaches were fortunate their sport didn't have the spectator appeal others did. At least, they didn't have to worry about the gamblers getting at their athletes.

"Right," Coates said, "but track wasn't always that way. Guess you never heard about the betting there used to be on foot races in the old days. I remember one race down in a mining town in Pennsylvania. There were four of the best sprinters of the world matched for a hundred yards. Those miners had bet around \$50,000 on it."

The starter was the parish priest, however, and he sup-

plied a touch of de-emphasis, Coates said.

"There they were, the four of them lined up, tense, waiting for the gun, each hoping to get that little edge. The priest came out and in his rich brogue said: 'Are ye ready?' Then they tensed up more, straining for the gun. And the priest simply said: "All right, then. Be off with ye."

Boston, Nov. 1.—Chris Lohner, a sophomore from Irvington, N.J., paced the Providence College Friars to victory in the second annual Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate Athletic Conference cross-country championship here today at Franklin Park.

Lohner, running well in the soggy going, covered the approximately 4.2-mile course in 23 minutes, 11 seconds as he led Charles "Red" Short of Seton Hall by about 50 yards. Short's time was 23 minutes, 17 seconds.

The Friars placed six men in the first 10, winning the team championship with 28 points and gaining the first leg on the "Bishop McVinney Trophy," which must be won three years for permanent possession. Following Lohner were Short and Art Nellback of Seton Hall and James Maloney of Iona.

Dick Lee of Providence was fifth, followed by teammates Bill Newman and Bill Horridge in sixth and seventh positions. Bill Henningan and "Pop" Johnson were ninth and 10th as they crossed the finish line behind eighth-place O'Donnel Joshua of Iona. Seton Hall, which placed its five men among the first 17 finishers, took second place with 49 points. Herb Waters of the Friars wound up 13th.

Jornson, the favorite, and Lohner led the pack after about a mileand-a-half and still headed the field

along with their teammate Lee approximately at the halfway mark. With about a half-mile to go, Lohner had opened up a lead of about 25 yards over Short before they headed into the quarter-mile straightaway at the finish.

Iona of New Rochelle, N.Y., was third with 64 points while LeMoyne of Syracuse was fourth with 95.



Boston, Nov. 1.-Chris Lohner, showing the more amphibious nature, paced the Providence College Friars to their first Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate Athletic Conference cross-country championship here today at Franklin Park.

The 18-year-old sophomore from Irvington, N.J., was the first man home in a field of 24 as the Friars carried off team honors with 28 points to 49 for the strong Seton Hall group, which finished second.

Lohner won the race by about 40 yards in 23 minutes and 11 seconds, outracing the veteran Charlie Short of the Setonians in the last half mile. Conditions under which the race was conducted were miserable, with a driving rain, mud and slop underfoot and a cold raw temperature.

Coach Harry Coates' Friars placed six men among the first 10 finishers. The victory was the fifth straight for the Friars, who loom as strong contenders for the New England championship.

Freshman Champ

Lohner, who is a strong runner and can plow along in rough going, took the freshmen ECIAC crown a year ago. Over the first part of the course today, Lohner and his teammate, Dick "Pop" Johnson, led the pack. They took over somewhere in the first mile of the 4.2-mile route and were running about two strides apart at the two-mile point.

Johnson, picked by several of the coaches as the man to beat, couldn't stand the gaff going uphill in the third mile. Then Short, who tried the Boston marathon last spring, came into the picture, though he had been always reasonably close.

Short, built something like his name, was right at Lohner's shoulder with about three quarters of a mile remaining. He stuck with the Providence runner and was about 25 yards behind Lohner as the pair headed into the final quartermile straightaway. He never made up the difference.

Johnny Gibson's Seton Hall team lost ground when Capt. Dave Evans couldn't run on his numbed feet after crossing a rain-made pond and had to discard his shoes. He covered the latter part of the race in his stocking feet.


Rugged

If Evans had performed closer to what was expected, it would have been a tighter battle for team honors. The Setonians offset Lohner's victory by running two-three as Art Nellbach followed Short home, a fairly close third.

Friars Take ECC Title; Then Defeat Brown

Providence's harriers ended their undefeated dual meet season last Monday, by romping to a 20 to 40 victory over Brown, on the East Side. Brown's Walt Molineux covered the four-mile course in the winning time of 19:30 minutes.

Early in the race, P.C.'s "Pop" Johnson set the pace but he was soon overtaken by Walt Molineux. Johnson was running close on Molineux's heels throughout the entire race but he was unable to catch him. Before Brown was able to place another man, the Friars had taken the next six positions. Johnson was followed across the tape by Dick Lee (3), Chris Lohner (4), Bill Horridge (5), Bill Newman (6), Bill Hennigan (7). Herb Waters placed eleventh.

This was the Coatesmen's seventh straight dual meet win over a two-year span and completed the dual meet season for the Friars. By beating Brown, Providence was able to win the state title. Earlier in the season the Friars downed Rhode Island here at Hendricken Field.

Previous to the win over Brown, the Coatesmen, last week, were able to gain their first leg on the Bishop McVinney Trophy. This trophy is given every year to the winner of the E.C.I.A.C., until one team is able to retire it by obtaining three victories. Providence's Chris Lohner took individual laurels by leading the pack over the Franklin Park course in 23:11 minutes.

The race was run under conditions of rain, wind, and sleet which should have had all sensible people at home, but the weather hardly bothered the Friars, who placed six men in the first ten, as they triumphed over Seton Hall, Iona, and Le Moyne.

Lohner who proved to be more of a frogman than the others was ahead all the way but it was far from an easy victory as he was pressed by "Red" Short of Seton Hall from the start. This was Lohner's best effort to date, but winning an E.C.I.A.C. title is nothing new to Lohner, who captured last year's freshmen title. (It was discontinued this year because of the freshmen eligibility.)

Dick Lee was the next Providence entry to finish as he ended up fifth. Following Lee were Bill Newman (6), Bill Horridge (7), Bill Hennigan (9). Dick Johnson (10), and Herb Waters (13). This was an exceptionally fine showing by the Friars' squad.

Lohner Is Day's Best Mudder

When the runners disappeared in the distance, we moved to a better vantage point to view further proceedings. Joe McHenry asked me if there were so many ponds on the course as we saw that day. I answered that they weren't there in the 1950 New England championships. It sure must have rained. But on went the runners.

At the end, the Friars won out. But it was Christian Michael Lohner a P.C. sophomore from Irvington, New Jersey who ran off with the individual honors of the day. The strong lighthaired lad, who stands in the vicinity of six feet proved to be the best mudder of the day by at least fifty yards ahead of the second place finisher.

However, it took more than Chris to win a team title in the second annual E.C.I.A.C. x-country championships. It took fine performances from Richard Lee, William Newman, William Horridge, William Hennigan, Richard Johnson and Herbert Waters to mark another milestone in Providence College's star-lit sports history, the first P.C. varsity intercollegiate cross-country championship. The win also gave Coach Harry Coates' varsity hill and dale teams a total of seven consecutive victories over a two year period.

Paul Methia was only seconds behind Horridge in seventh place followed by Len Riley in 13th, Neil Sullivan in 30th, and Dan Slocum in 31st position.

Sports Scandals Victims Not Only Ones At Fault; We All Are

With all the recent scandal in intercollegiate and professional athletics, all too many of us have a tendency to place the blame upon the players, referees and "fixers" involved. Let us attempt to understand how and why these things have occured.

The best way to accomplish this would be by way of a method that should be familiar to most of us at Providence College—deductive reasoning.

The place to begin with is the beginning. Being rational animals born with the defects involved with original sin we are, for one fault, lazy. We seek to achieve our goal by the easiest means possible. However we must all exist and, most of us, do enjoy luxuries. We also seek excitement which may be classified as a luxury as an outlet for excess energy not spent upon other fields of endeavor.

One of these outlets is gambling. We don't need "bookies," etc., to do this. We do it among each other every day—whether we put off going to confession, cross a street before onrushing traffic, "beat" a read light when we're driving a car, not studying in the hope of getting through the next class or day without being called upon to furnish evidence of studying to a professor, putting off things, re-

lying upon our neighbor, and so on You and I—we all do elementry gambling every day of our lives. If not on what I have already mentioned then on something else—all of us participate in this fault of mankind. The only difference is in degree and extension.

And this is where the bookmaker comes in. There are "honest" books and then there are some that are dishonest. Some seek to make a living while others, a majority, seek more than the necessities. These want more money with which they hope to buy the respect of others or lavish on entertainment. They are gamblers but the smart ones are always ahead of the game.

However, these men cannot operate unless there are people who delve in seeking entertainment and/or excitement. Some of these people gamble as an investment—a quick one with a lucrative pay-off. The trouble with the whole thing evolves around the fact that everybody can't win. Naturally this fact occurs to all but each and everyone of us believes or knows that he will win.

When one knows that he will win and the fact is accomplished, he, all too often, is involved in a fix." Sometimes the "book" is "in" on it and sometimes he is caught by it.

The "fix." the paying of key men on an athletic team to play below their standard performance in a certain game not only hurts those who are caught in the act but also those who honestly play the game. The sport itself is dealt a blow.

Now the question is, whether those involved in these scandals have committed a greater wrong than those who gamble with their moral lives.

Having started something with my previous article, suggestions for a cure are in order. His Holiness, Pope Pius XII, in a recent address to a group of European sportwriters gave a fourpoint guide considered by the Church as principles which sport should follow:

- 2. Regarding spectators, "Sport has the aim of providing a relaxation in order to permit a return to the tasks with a renewed vigor and will."

- 4. "The same principle holds true with even stronger reason and again with greater importance when it affects religious duties. On Sunday, God has the first place."

My own suggestions include:

- 1. The banning of any athlete who deliberately maims an opposing athlete who is witnessed to be entirely out of the play involved.
- 2. Strict supervision of athletes before and during all sports functions of national interest.
- 3. Individual college administration of college athletic departments.
- 4. College administrations should run athletic programs not as means to increase the college physically (financially) because the end does not necesthey should be run to teach student places in this league. spectators and players (for whom they were first intended) to develop the body and to take victory and defeat in stride.
- 5. Finally, college administrations should not do away with sports programs merely because of present difficulties. They can not! If they do, they deny the elemental principle of education - to develop the whole of man.

Actually it wasn't a very stiff test for Coach Vin Cuddy's team, which doubled the Greyhounds' total in the first half at 46 to 23. It was the 17th

victory for the Friars over their Worcester foes, who have an unusually small team this season.

Providence College's Friars have had few closer calls in winning games than last night at Mount Pleasant High School, where they edged Brandeis University, 60 to 55, before a capacity crowd of more than 800. Actually the spirited basketball game; was closer than the five-point bulge would indicate.

Brandeis, rated a sleeper off its fine showing against Dartmouth, proved to be all of that. The visitors had the height and the ball handling to bother the Friars and were in contention right up to the final willistle.

Providence came up with a strong second half in pulling out the decision. The Friars had only a onepoint lead, 52-51, with about four and one-half minutes remaining and only a three-point edge, 58-55. with three minutes to go. It was a hair-raising last quarter, but the Friars steadier play pulled them through.

Bauer Stars

Usually it's Jim Schlimm who makes the points for the Friars, but last night it was his fellow townsman from St. Mary's, Pa., long Tom Bauer, who saved the bacon for the Friars. Bauer, who gained a starting berth through a teammate's injury, played just about the best game he has shown with the Friars.

It was Bauer's shooting and work on rebounds which kept the Friars out front during the early going and he was just as effective later. Schlimm got off to a bad start, couldn't seem to grab the ball on the passing, but finished up with several fine shots in the pinch.

Ray Korbusieski did his usual driving. Phil Lynch, Jack Durkin, Bob Prendergast and Hank Mc-

Queeney all had moments of outstanding play.

Bobby Griffin, 6:7 and Bob Sheridan 6:9 led Brandeis. Griffin scored 12 points, including several spectacular baskets. P.C. teamed well on Len Winograd, the Blues star, but Bob Yoselewitz, Chet Zager and Murray Heller all contributed good spot work.

Furious Pace

Providence seldom enjoyed any great leads. The Friars had a fivepoint lead during the first quarter. but led only 15-13 at the period, Brandeis went ahead, 20-19 and 26-25, during the second period, with Durkin netting four points and Ronnie Gagnon a basket as the Friars went into a 31-26 halftime

The second half was played at a furious pace, with Providence going 11 points ahead on effective team play. Had the Friars been shooting better, they might have wrapped it up during the third quarter, but Brandeis cut the lead down to 47-40 with 10 minutes left.

Trailing, 50-42, Brandeis came up with five points and then a couple of hoops by Murray Heller made it 52-51. They matched two baskets and then Bauer's one-hander gave the Friars a three - point edge, 58-55. Later Schlimm converted two free throws as the Friars tried to control the ball over the last three minutes, with much contact and speedy play on both sides.

The Friars' Jayvees defeated Leicester Junior College, 67 to 47, in the opener, paced by Eddie Ryder and Bob Miller.

Led by a sophomore anchorman, Tom Murphy, the visitors scarcely had to get steam up to defeat La Salle, the defending champion, and Hope, winner of the first relay meet in 1949. The winning time was 19:39.

The order of finish behind St. Augustine's was: La Salle, Hope, Mount Pleasant, East Providence and Pawtucket East.

Although Rhode Island runners took the lead momentarily on numerous occasions and Tinley Olton, Blue Wave anchorman, had a five-yard edge as late as the last lap, the winners were in full control at all times.

· Steady Pattern

The pattern was substantially the same for each of their runners. He would maintain a steady pace either in front or not more than a stride or two behind the leader and then at the coach's signal would start the seemingly effortless finishing kick that invariably gave St. Augustine's a comfortable margin when his mile had ended.
