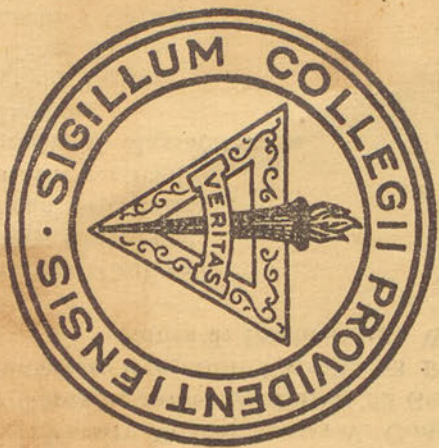

Coatesmen, Crusaders Tangle This Afternoon In Fitton Field Meet

It's still too early to predict how the Friars will fare during their Indoor Track season but last week's informal meet with State which was held here and today's informal meet with Holy Cross at Worcester should add some

enlightenment as to how the squad shapes up. Against State, P. C. showed several weakness particularly in the weight events, high jump, and broad jump. However, in the relays, P. C. showed to good advantage and competition should be rough in picking the mile and two mile team.

In the relays, Mentor Harry Coates will have most of last year's team back with the exception of Bill Sherry and Bill Keenan. Captain Jim Penler, Jack Cassidy, Bob Tiernan, John McMullen, Jim Gannon and Art Corvese will be returning to pace the one milers and Frank Lussier, Dick Johnson, and Dick Tiernan will be back in the fold for the two milers.

Add to this lineup of relayers the names of Chris Lohner and Jack Dowling, members of last year's yearling squad, Paul Methia, Bill Horridge and Dean Slocum, promising freshmen, and Dan Walsh and Gene Coyle a sprinter and hurdler respectively, on last years squad. All will be seeking a starting berth. With this talent on hand, Providence's boardsmen should make a good showing during the coming season.

After the batonpassers, the rest of the team lacks depth. To date the track men have but one pole vaulter, McAlice, and no broadjumpers. In the hurdles McMullen and Murphy are the only prospects and in the dash

again strength is missing with only two hopefuls, Penler and Corvese. The weightmen are a little better off with four contestants, Pederzani, Curran, Petterutti and McMullen. Here again the team is suffering from inexperience.

Sextet, Bears Clash Tomorrow

Friar Sportsman:

Tops In Sports Thrills Offered PC Sports Followers This Week

Facing as rugged and hectic a week as possible, the Providence College basketball and hockey teams get right into the thick of things in two crucial tests with our cross-town intellectual and athletic rivals, Brown University.

Providence College teams are moving in intercollegiate competition for five consecutive nights, beginning with last night's P. C.-A. I. C. court action at Mount Pleasant, and closing on Saturday night when the Cuddymen square off against the University of Massachusetts quintet at the same location. In between these two dates are scheduled two of the most interesting contests of the current season.

P. C. Six Face R. I. U.

Tonight, the Friar sextet faces off against Rhode Island University at the Auditorium. The Rams will offer courage, an admirable quality. But the Friars, with a definite superiority in class besides courage and numbers, should make it five straight amateur hockey games without a loss.

Tomorrow night, the P. C. six will move up when they engage Brown's varsity hockey team at the R. I. Auditorium. I can hear the moans and groans away over here at Donnelly Hall. Feelings of apprehension with a tendency towards consternation seem to pervade this campus in respect to tomorrow night's athletic highlight

which will have one team (the Friars) which has been working as a unit for less than one month encountering another (the Bears) which was second in last year's NCAA playoffs, and with most of its members working together for three or four years. And when you look at the facts on paper, it seems that this pessimism is well grounded.

Friars Have Chance

But there always is in a meeting of this sort the element of surprise in which the underdog gets "up" and plays over its head. Besides the psychological factor which should favor P. C., there appears at present a difference of ability in the two opposing goalies. On the basis of past performances, I would give the Friars' team captain, Howie McGuinness, the edge over anything the Bears can offer in the similar position.

After that, there is room only for speculation. P. C.'s stalwart at defense, Joe McAleer, improves with every game. His brother Tom and Harry Daigle have also shown signs of improvement. At the forward positions, combinations of Army, Patrie, Petit, Ducharme, Torpey, Reilly, Charland should offer the Bears a goodly share of headaches with their fast skating and improved passing.

In conclusion, the game which to some has assumed "David and Goliath" proportions gives the Friars plenty to gain and nothing to lose. It should be a high scoring game well worth the watching of the student body.

Quintet Over Bears Friday

Twenty-four hours later, the Providence College varsity quintet will end a seven game losing streak to Bruin varsity basketball teams. Brown, with team captain Marty Badoian and Lou Murgo leading the attack, will show a well drilled, fast breaking team. They lack much of the necessary height but make up for much of it

with their good ball-handling and all around hustle.

P. C. should be able to control the backboards with a definite superiority in height. The Cuddymen's offense will show a higher calibre than has been seen in years. Before, it was on Capt. Jim Schlimm's shoulders that the Friar scoring was placed. Now Providence has Bob Moran whose set shot ability can alleviate the opponents' heavy guarding of the Friar team captain. Ray Korbusieski's and Hank McQueeney's drive-ins round out a P. C. attack that, at last, appears to have achieved the necessary balance.

Friars Have Defense Depth

Defensively, Vin Cuddy's current aggregation has shown definite improvement. Ronnie Gagnon and Jerry Lembo are well backed up by Tom Mullins and Phil Lynch. These last two gentlemen possess better than average play-making ability and defensive know-how. And in Lynch, Coach Cuddy has the answer to Bob Morris' (the Brown basketball coach) great offensive star, Lou Murgo.

In last year's P. C.-Cubs game, Phil, until he fouled out late in the second half, held Murgo to seven points. Up to this game, the amazing lad from Bristol, R. I., had been scoring about 20 points a game.

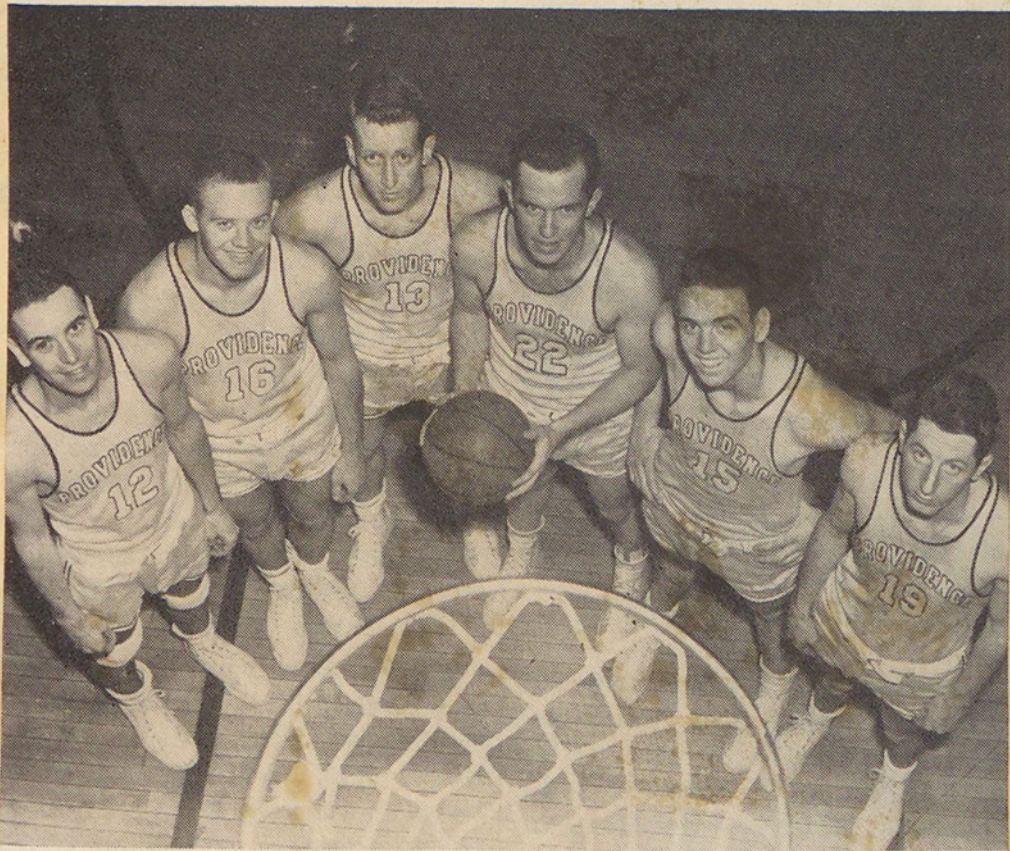
Lynch Holds Steadying Control

We hope that Lynch's hex on Lou will again come out in this game. If so, the Brown Bears' offense will be, for the most part, neutralized. Another factor in Phil's being a definite asset in P. C.'s favor, is that the New Yorker has taken over the conservative influence of the team. He seems to be filling Walt Lozoski's old position—that of being the Friars' steadying influence.

Providence, although a favorite, has only to be wary of underestimating Brown and also of making sure of their shots, i.e., they had better keep their heads about them.

Rams and Northeastern Meet
in Track; Bruin Swimmers

Taking on Columbia

Brown and Providence College will meet for another of their usually vigorous basketball games at Marvel Gymnasium tonight, with the Friars favored to win.

This contest will be one of the feature events of the local collegians' final weekend of sports before they close down for Christmas vacation.

Also on today's schedule is a track meet between Rhode Island and Northeastern this afternoon at Kingston and a swimming meet between Brown and Columbia at New York.

Tomorrow, Rhode Island's basketball team will play St. John's at Madison Square Garden, New York; Brown's wrestlers will take on Columbia at New York and its swimming team will face Navy at Annapolis. The last is scheduled to be televised on the local channel, starting at 2:30 o'clock.

His Year, Maybe

The Friars also have another home game in basketball tomorrow evening against Massachusetts, but their first concern is with the Bruins tonight. This is one of their "big" games, but, curiously, they have been unable to take off a victory in three years.

This is curious because at least half of the time they have been fairly substantial favorites to win. Each time, however, the Bruins have managed to come up with a winning game. Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars has yet to beat Brown in his two seasons on the job.

This might be his year for it, though. His club has won three games in a row, it's big and it has a nice mixture of veterans and sophomores.

One of his sophomores, Bobby Moran, got into action against American International last Tuesday, after missing the first three games because of an injury. He lived up to Cuddy's prediction that he would be one of the team's offensive stars and, with one game under his belt, should be of great aid. He will start at forward against Brown.

Other Starters

Cuddy's other starters will be Capt. Jim Schlimm at center, Ray Korbusieski at the other forward

BROWN'S SEXTET SHUTS OUT FRIARS

Ivy League Champions Skate to 8-to-0 Victory Over P.C. Squad

Brown's hockey team, as expected, had too much savvy for Providence College's amateur-league club and won out, 8-0, last night at the Auditorium before a crowd estimated at 1000 persons.

The powerful Ivy League champions had no parade to the goal, however, as they found out during the opening period when the losers determined puck-ragging held them to two goals and forced them to change their nonchalant tempo of play.

Once down to business, Coach Wes Moulton's sextet made it look easy. The Bruins scored three times within two minutes at the end of the second period. Bob Wheeler, the second period, the left wing on the first line, led the scoring with three goals.

His final effort at 58 seconds of the third period was a masterpiece of trickery. After taking a pass from Jake Murphy, he skated in alone on the opposing goalie, Howie McGuinness, took a mock swipe at the puck and then let it slide softly off the end of his stick into the net.

The change of pace fooled McGuinness completely.

The Friar goalie, a second-team All-Stater at Le Salle in 1946, did a good job at keeping the score down, however. During the second period he had his busiest time with 12 saves.

In the preliminary game, Ed Allard, former Burrillville star, and Bill Conn each scored three goals in leading the Brown Freshmen to a 8-1 victory over the University of Rhode Island's amateur club.

Russ Boss, former Cransford performer, scored the Ram's only goal, tying the game at 1-1 at 3:33 of the first period.

Kelly Paces B.U. To First N. E. Cross Country Title

Wins by 200 Yards in Fast Time of 20:52---Univ. Mass. Takes Titular Honors in Yankee Conference Running

BOSTON, Nov. 12 (AP) — Johnny Kelley, Boston university's sophomore running sensation, paced the Terriers to their first New England intercollegiate cross country title today with the second fastest clocking in the 39-year-old meet's history.

The speedy New London, Conn., harrier, who had cracked course records in all his previous outings this fall, won by 200 yards. His time of 20:52 for the four and one quarter miles was the best since Bob Nichols of Rhode Island set the record of 20:38 4/5 in 1941.

Kelley sped home ahead of Burnham (Burt) Lancaster, a University of Massachusetts freshman. Lancaster, however, was in the race only as a contestant for the Yankee Conference championship which was held in conjunction with the New England event.

Charley Vickers of Massachusetts Institute of Technology took second place in the New England as he finished 20 yards astern of Lancaster. Freshmen are not allowed to compete for the New England varsity championship.

Ed Shea of Northeastern was a surprising third place winner. He romped home five yards behind Vickers and 1:42 behind Kelley. Dick Johnson of Providence, was fourth, Walter Molineaux of Brown, fifth; Adolph Grimm of Connecticut, sixth; Al Roberts of BU, seventh; Bill Nicholson of MIT, eighth; Dick Dow of Maine, ninth, and John Phillips of BU, tenth.

The varsity team totals: Boston University 55, MIT 90, Providence

119, New Hampshire 139, Maine 164, Massachusetts 169, Connecticut 192, Northeastern 193, Brown 220, Tufts 233, Rhode Island 243, Vermont 247, Coast Guard 272, and Springfield 306.

Yankee Conference championship results: Massachusetts 56, Rhode Island 66, New Hampshire 70, Maine 78, Connecticut 91 and Vermont 119.

The freshman New England race was won by Bill Horridge of Providence college, who took the lead 200 yards out in the 3 1/4-mile test and held it to win by five yards over Boston University's Billy Smith in 16:36.8, far from Kelley's frosh record of 15:44 set last year.

Brown Whips P.C. Sextet By 8-0 Score

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P. C. Trumps Aces; R. I. Loses Close One to H. C.

Those Rhode Island Rams sure are up for their games with Holy Cross. Last night at Worcester, Rhody came mighty close to upsetting the highly-touted Crusaders, stopping a highly interesting game, 7 to 64.

The Providence College Friars had to battle it out in the stretch as they preserved their unbeaten status with a 55-to-49 decision over American International at Mount Pleasant High.

The Crusaders put on a second-half drive last night after being down, 38-32, at halftime. Four of their last five meetings have been outstanding games, one going into overtime, two being settled by three points and another by five.

On Upgrade

Maybe the Rams have hit their stride after a slow start. They started to come late in the game against Boston College. Then they stepped on the scoring against Vermont and put up a fine performance last night against a team that led the class of New England. Holy Cross hasn't had the full use of two of its top stars, Jim Dilling and Togo Palazzi, both of whom have been ill, the latter more than the former. But the rest of the talented squad has enough guns to bring down most college opposition in the East.

Rhody surprised the Crusaders with their sterling play, leading at

intermission and trailing only 50-48 going into the final period. The Crusaders had their only really scoring bulge in the third period, when they registered 18 against 10 for Rhody. It was 15-all in the first 10 minutes.

Late Rally

After Fred Congleton sent the Rams into a 50-50 tie early in the last period, Dilling, Jim O'Neil, Palazzi and Ronnie Perry built up an eight-point advantage on four baskets. The Rams never were able to get over that hurdle, although they drew up to 63-62 and trailed by three points with two minutes remaining.

Max Stewart scored 16, Eddie Holt 14, Congleton 13, Art Helwig 12 and Bill Baird eight for the Rams. Dilling, Palazzi, Bob McDermough and O'Neil paced the Crusaders to second victory. Johnny Mitchell's Ramslets were subdued, 70-39, in the opener by the Holy Cross Jaycees.

Coach Vin Cuddy's Friars got away to a fine start, rolling up a 12-1 lead and then holding a 15-point edge, 31-16, at the half. Then they cooled off, in fact the cooling process started in the second period. That was the opening that AIC was looking for and the Aces nearly won the game with a spirited, driving second half.

The Friars' defense was better than usual in some parts of the first half. It took a couple of sophomores, Hank McQueeney and Bobby Moran, to get the Friars rolling. Ray Korbusieski, trying vainly to get his mates up, scored 13 points. Moran's 13 were vital as most of

them came when Providence was fighting to hold off the Aces. McQueeney scored 16.

Oddly enough, Jim Schlimm rescued more rebounds than usual, but was held to seven points. The Aces, sacrificing height for finesse in the second half, turned it into a real ball game. The Friars snapped out of it after the Aces cut their lead to five and three points.

Al Zordan, Bill Butters and Joe Shea led AIC's second-half drive, which forced the Friars to play better basketball. Coach Bob Morris of Brown, scouting the Friars for their Friday game with the Bruins, happened to catch them on an off night, although PC played well in the stretch.

Goalie will be Howie McGuinness, All-State in 1946. Reserve goalie will be Ed Pencarski, who was obscured somewhat when at La Salle because of playing behind Ed Wrynn. But Ed will be remembered for showing some fine puck-stopping when the Maroon All-Stater was injured two seasons ago. Ed is now at the University of Vermont, whose abandonment of hockey as a varsity sport must have been a disappointment to him.

Tomorrow night Lou will also be depending on three more of his former LS flashes, Bob Petit and the McAleer brothers, Joe and Tom. All three learned their hockey together out Wanskuck way.

ALL IN THE GAME

The Lively Time . . .

THIS IS the time of year when a sportswriter, in public opinion, rates a little sympathy, if ever.

"Must be pretty dull for you guys now," the folks say, "with football finished and baseball still four months away."

Naturally, you do nothing to change this point of view.

You like sympathy as well as the next man, however misplaced it may be. So you nod sadly and you give the impression of fighting, chin up, against boredom and hoping that you'll be able to struggle along until spring.

Actually, of course, the winter months can be, and often are, the liveliest part of the year in this trade. Interesting things keep popping up all over the place.

The program is jammed and varied and frequently events sneak up on you before you know it. Like tonight, for instance, basketball comes up with a red-hot item in the shape of the Providence College-Brown game at Marvel Gymnasium.

High Thrill Content . . .

Maybe this one appeals to me because I like basketball in any form. I admit, though, that to the person who isn't especially fond of the game, basketball can be deadly to watch when one team has a decided superiority over the other. On the other hand, I think there's no sport which can provide more thrills a second than a basketball game when it's close during the last five minutes.

I've sat in at some high-class sports events during the two and a half years I've been writing these pieces. I've been fortunate enough to watch three World Series in entirety, a good many so-called football classics and some excellent prize fights. But from the standpoint of spectators' entertainment nothing I've seen has come close to the overtime basketball game between Rhode Island State and Holy Cross at the Auditorium two winters ago.

There's just a chance that tonight's game at Marvel Gym will resemble that one.

Sad Seven . . .

Just a chance, mind you, I say. On form, Providence College rates as a substantial favorite. The Friars have depth this year and all-around height. Brown is especially weak in the latter quality. Even Vin Cuddy, the P.C. coach, goes as far as to say he's "hopeful" of victory.

However, the Bears have the home-floor advantage, plus the inspiration to be derived from the fact that they will be battling to protect a seven-game string of victories in play with P.C. Not since January of 1948 has Providence College scored a basketball victory over Brown.

Cuddy has especial reason for trying to overthrow the Marvel Gymnasium jinx. He has done mighty well with the Friars since taking over the job in 1949. Shortly after he had stepped into the position, his team upset Rhode Island U., the first time Providence College had turned that trick since 1942. But in four tries he has yet to guide the Black and White to a decision over Brown.

So he's "hopeful" tonight's the night, but decidedly not overconfident. He has a healthy respect for the spirit the Bruins carry into a Providence College game and for the coaching ability of his rival wizard, Bob Morris, who is better than a green hand at engineering an upset.

Three of a Kind . . .

At any rate, that's the picture for the first game of this winter's intrastate rivalry among Brown, Providence College and R.I.U. The Friars are the choice, but the game could turn into the kind of thriller that frequently results when any of the three meet.

And, speaking of the three-cornered rivalry, I take occasion to remark that Rhode Island is particularly fortunate in its three major college basketball coaches. Morris, Cuddy and Red Haire, the big, diffident-appearing guy who holds down the job at Kingston.

They're talented coaches, all three, both in their knowledge of the game and the confidence they inspire in their pupils. The latter explains why each is able to come up on occasion with a victory when the odds are all against him.

What's more, I know all of us traveling the sports beat agree that the college boys who come into contact with either Morris, Cuddy or Haire will be the better for it. That, for a change, is something pleasant to think about, in view of the present condition of intercollegiate sports.

Understand me, now, I'm not referring to the accidents that three do on the basketball court as character-building. I mean that they might shy away from me if I put it that way. If the character-building they do comes about, you might almost say, by accident, the fortunate accident that each one, in addition to being a talented basketball coach, happens also to be a gentleman.

QUINTET FIRST LOSS OF

Bruins Maintain Court Hex With Strong Team Effort

Jim Schlimm Held to Four Points as Winners Gain

First Victory

Brown won its first basketball game in four last night and made the victory a resounding one by beating previously undefeated Providence College, 71-62, at Marvel Gynasium.

Despite a 26-point performance by Bobby Moran, the Friars were in charge only for the first quarter. Brown's smaller but harder-driving outfit took the lead midway through the second quarter, built it to 38-33 at the half and completely dominated the play thereafter.

In the preliminary, the Brown freshman team set the pattern by taking the Friars' junior varsity, 69-68, in two overtime periods. Jim Pendergast scored the winning points with a layup shot 45 seconds from the end.

Best of Season

The Friars, after winning three straight games, were substantial favorites to end the hex that has plagued them against Brown for four years. But the Bruins, playing their best of the season, wouldn't buy the pregame rating and took their eighth straight game from their cross-town rivals.

As is usually the case when a less-gifted outfit takes the measure of a stronger opponent, this was a good team effort for the Bruins. Their scoring was fairly well distributed among four men—Arnie Lederman, 19 points; Marty Badoian, 16; Lou Murgo, 14, and Norm Sprinthall, 10.

Moran, on the other side, was practically the only man with a sharp-shooting eye (he had eight baskets and made 10 of 12 foul shots). Next was Hank McQueeney

—he had 12 points—and then it dropped to five by Ray Korbusieski. The Bruins' zone defense tied the others effectively; for example, Jim Schlimm got just one basket and two fouls.

Badoian Clicks

The Friars' basic defense was a man-to-man and it had the Bruins stopped quite effectively at first. But then Badoian started hitting with his set shot and that, helped by a well-executed weave and a fast-paced "break," opened up the lanes.

Neither team tried to play it safe, which made it a hectic contest for the 900-odd spectators present. It also made for a large number of fouls—32 against the Friars and 36 against Brown. But it was not a rough contest—just hard and rugged going.

The Friars lost Tom Mullins on fouls in the third quarter and Korbusieski early in the fourth. Brown's Bob MacConnell, Spike Plentzas, Charley Judkins, Sprinthall and Lederman went out in the final period, and Murgo had four fouls from 7:30 of the first quarter.

Moran and McQueeney got the Friars off fast in the first few minutes and P.C. led twice by seven points—its highest margin at any time.

Then, in the second quarter, the Friars went without a floor basket for six minutes and got three in all for the period. Brown, meanwhile, was not hitting, but it kept within hailing distance by its facility from the foul line. (The Bruins made 25 out of 35 fouls in all.)

Lead by 14

That brought the Bruins up to 23-20 early in the second period and then they got down to business and stayed that way. Lederman, Badoian and Sprinthall did the bulk of the scoring and MacConnell, Plentzas and Murgo did the feeding. The result was that the Bruins went ahead, 26-25, at the five-minute mark and never trailed again.

Twice thereafter, the Bruins led by 14 points. Moran, Tom Bauer and Phil Lynch paced a Friar comeback midway through the half and cut the Bruins' lead to 56-50, but Lederman and Murgo, working well inside, pushed the spread up again. With three minutes to go, the Bruins had a 12-point lead and the final result was so thoroughly indicated that most of the spectators were on their way home.

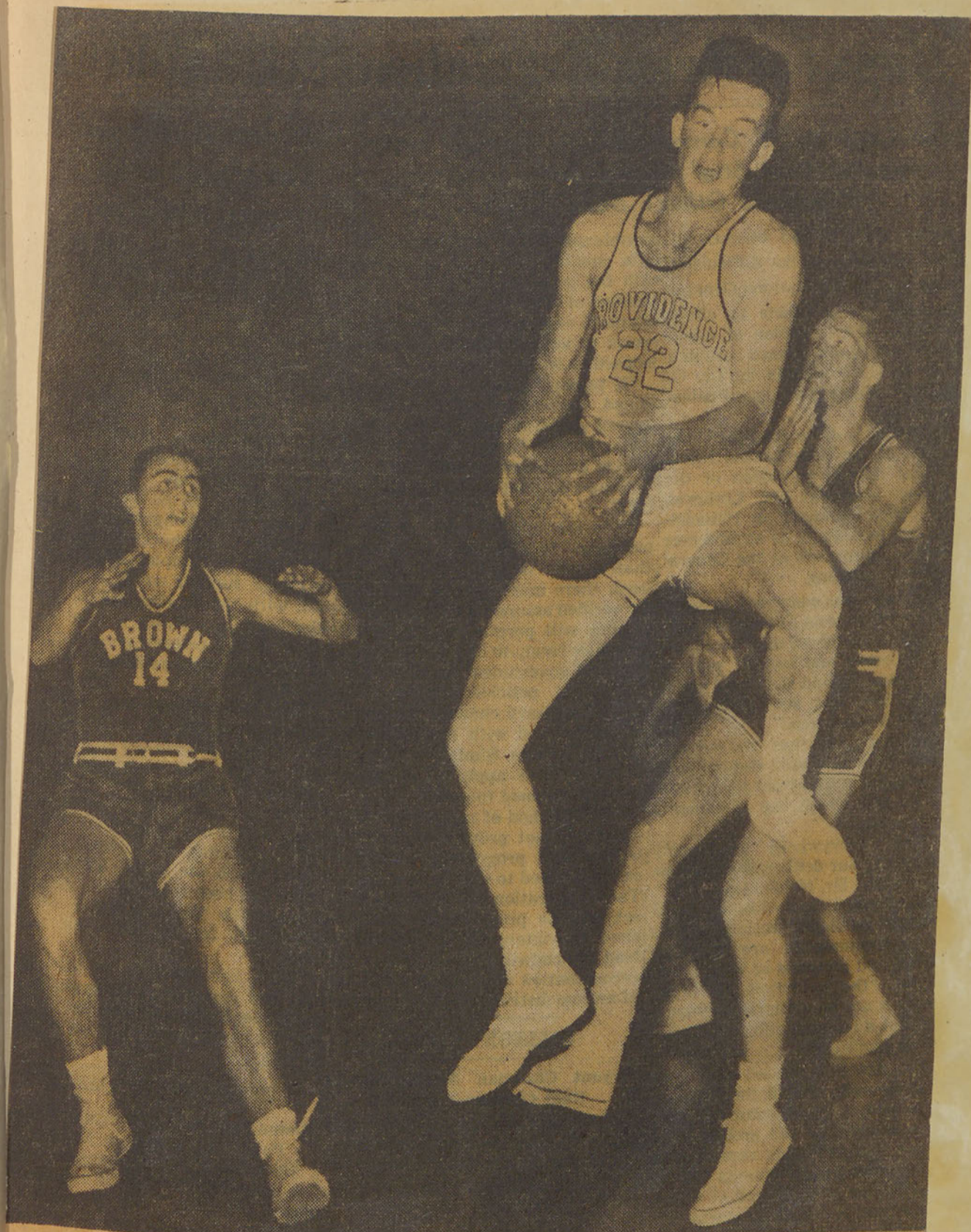
In the preliminary, Brown's Freshmen led, 34-30 at the half, but the Friars tied it at 44-all at the end of the third quarter. Two fouls by the Friars' Ollie Barker made it 59-59 at the end of regulation time and each club scored six points in the first overtime.

The Friars led, 68-67, in the second overtime until Brown's Socrates Mihalakos intercepted a pass at his foul line, dribbled the length of the court and flicked a pass to Pendergast under the basket. The latter made it easily for the victory.

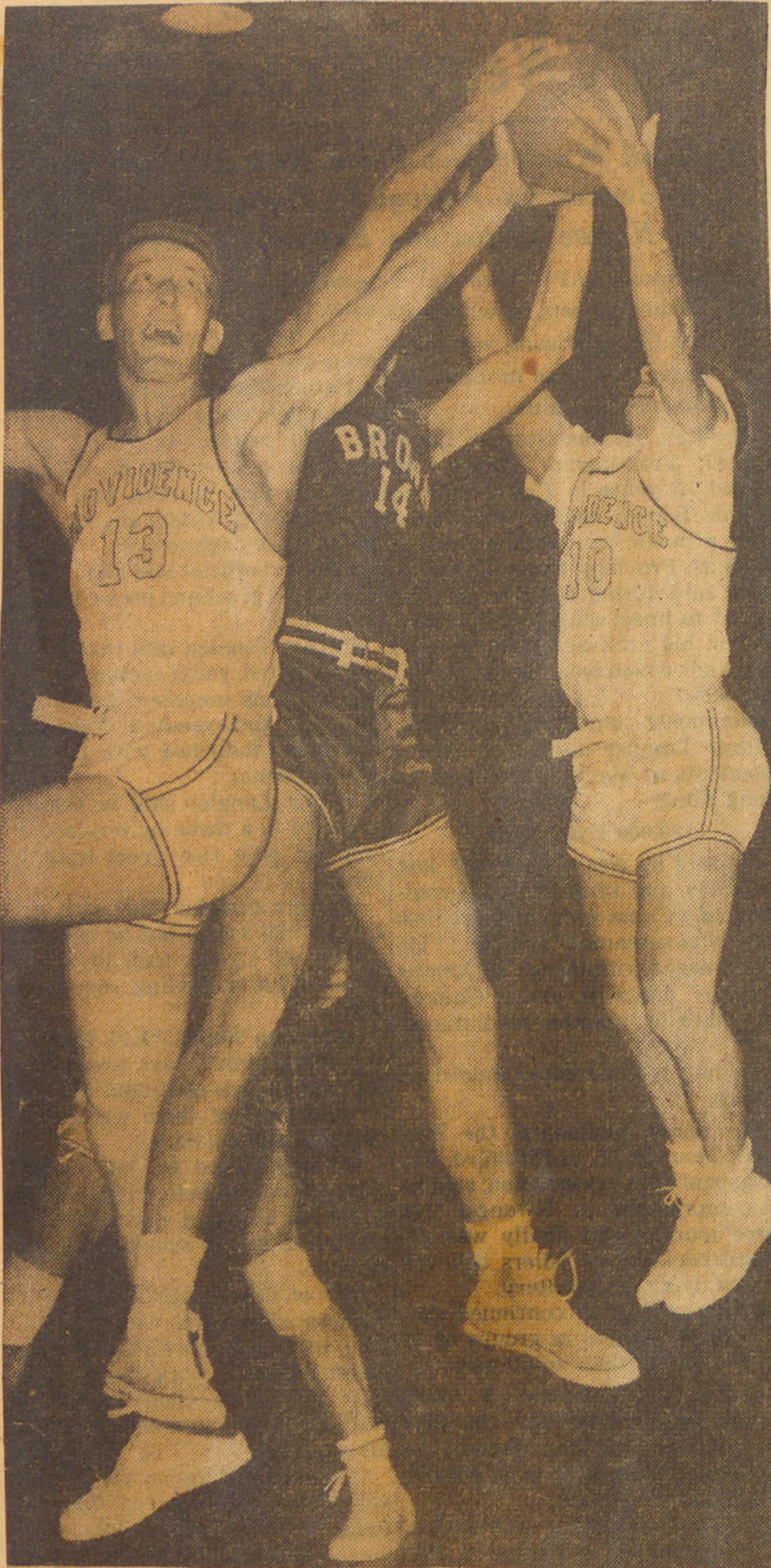

Team Effort Gives Bruins First Victory

P.C. Host to Mass. Tonight; R.I.U. Plays St. John's in Garden

Bob Morris has coached on the highways and byways of basketball over the past quarter-century but last night's triumph by his Brown squad rates with some of his coaching masterpieces. The hustling Bruins scored a 71-to-62 victory over the previously unbeaten Providence College Friars and did it convincingly.

Tonight the Friars will try to get back on the winning track against the University of Massachusetts, meeting the Redmen at 8:30 o'clock at Mount Pleasant High. Meanwhile, the University of Rhode Island plays talented St. John's at Madison Square Garden at 9:30 o'clock.

Morris, who has known considerable success in basketball, was naturally quite happy the way his charges reacted against the Friars.

"Well," he said, "every so often you won one like this, but this was a big one. Just say it was a team accomplishment. Some of my big men are just starting to come but they all did a terrific job."

Hustle

The boys outhustled a good PC team. But you can't buy experience. Those sophomores of theirs are going to be great men like Bobby Moran—but tonight we had a little something extra and they couldn't cope with it."

Actually the Bruins were keyed up to their top achievement and played far better as a group than they have in their other three losing games this season. They reacted quickly to the Friars' attack and balked PC's driving game with a sliding zone, which generally protected underneath the hoop while sacrificing in some other quarters.

"The ball handling was good and we were hitting," Morris said. "I didn't think we could hold them off forever, but Marty Badoian, Lou Murgo, Arnold Lederman and Norm Sprinthall all did a fine job.

"There were lots of things that went into it—playing over here, PC cooling off after a good start, our club coming on and finding itself. We were due, perhaps, but I honestly didn't figure on this one. The boys did most everything right and a lot of them clicked together, even when I had to shuffle the players the way the fouls were coming."

Well Spotted

Granted that Brown played a fine game and caught the Friars off-stride with their speed and fast recoveries, it was quite a coaching feat. Coach Morris apparently spotted a couple of flaws in the Friars' game with AIC and maneuvered his personnel to take advantage of the opportunities. Morris' teams are generally good ball-handlers, schoolboy, college or pro, and this group was excellent in that department last night.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars gave Brown and Coach Morris full credit for a fine victory.

"They really did a splendid job," he said. "We couldn't get rolling after they tied it up in the second period and we went about five or six minutes without scoring. That was the ball game, for Brown found itself."

Moran and Hank McQueeney carried most of the load for the Friars, with Moran accounting for 26 points and McQueeney 12. The

strategy may have had something to do with that as Brown choked off Jim Schlimm and Ray Korbusieski, the Friars' more experienced pace-makers. Moran had eight of the Friars' 20 hoops and 10 of their 22 foul shots.

Floor Leader

Murgo, scoring only four hoops but 14 points, turned in a good floor job for the Bruins, along with Badoian, who seems to have developed into a fine player in his senior season. The Brown defensive rebound squad, unsung like the line in football, outjumped the Friars frequently.

Providence went ahead, 22-15, in the first period and then bogged down as Brown tied it up at 23-all. Then it was nip-and-tuck for a while, but the Bruins pulled away in the final minutes of the half and led, 38-33, at intermission. Providence was 10, 13, 15 and 14 points behind in the third period, although spurting to an eight-point deficit, 56-48, heading into the final period.

Sprinthall and Murgo led a rally which opened up a 13-point lead after PC came up to 56-50 and that was the ball game.

Jim Prendergast scored on a lay-up shot after taking a pass from Socrates Mihalakos as the Bruin Frosh defeated the PC jayvees, 69-68, in a double overtime. Jack Keating of the Friars had 16 points.

Massachusetts, which meets the Friars tonight, has played three games, losing a double-overtime to Northeastern by one point and another one-pointer to AIC. Boston College also defeated them at Newton. The PC jayvees meet Nichols Junior College at 7 o'clock.

71 to 62

Korbusieski, Schlimm Lead Friars to 4th Victory, 86-66

Total Second Highest in Two Seasons; Drive Strategy Pays Off Well

The Providence College Friars ran up their second-highest score in two seasons in handing the University of Massachusetts' quintet an 86-to-66 setback last night at Mount Pleasant High School. The victory was the fourth in five starts for the Friars.

Providence's one-two combination of driving Ray Korbusieski and Jim Schlimm, the hook-shot specialist, was back in business with a vengeance last night for the first time this season. And their effective teamwork lifted the Friars well above the level of play which had marked their efforts in their only losing start against Brown, the previous night.

The Redmen, still without a victory after four games, were paced by the fine efforts of Bill Prevey. The Massachusetts captain scored 33 points, his high for the season, and kept the Redmen within reasonable range of the Friars. Prevey was hampered by a bad wrist.

Providence came up with a good all-around performance. The Friars' passing was sharp and they were finishing off their surges up court with a high percentage on their scoring opportunities.

The Redmen spurred into the lead during the early minutes of the game. Then Schlimm, who hasn't been hitting with his accustomed regularity since the season's opener, dropped in one of his fallaway shots from out of a scramble. He repeated seconds later and this was the sign the P.C. rooters had been waiting for.

After that (Schlimm, working on setups from Korbusieski, came up with several spectacular hoops, turning in by far his best job of

the season. Korby, working off the pivot, made the attack click.

With Schlimm and Korby setting the pace, the Friars were driving last night, rather than bringing the ball up slowly, and it paid off tremendously in the scoring column.

Shuffling

Coach Vin Cuddy had a chance to shuffle his material around somewhat and he started the second half with a team of Tom Bauer, Ken Kerr, Phil Lynch, Schlimm and Korby. This group ocked the Redmen back on their heels with its fine passwork and driving. Kerr, filling in, moved up in ranking with his aggressive second-half work and accounted for 14 points.

Massachusetts, with one of its best teams in recent years, was five points down, 22-17, in the first period and 11 points in arrears at the half, 45-34. Prevey, doing a fine job around the offensive board, scored 15 points during the two periods.

Rough

The game was rough in spots, with 54 fouls being called, 29 against the Friars and 25 against Massachusetts. Providence spurred into a 16-point lead in the first two and a fraction minutes of the third quarter, with Bauer, Schlimm, Korby and Kerr registering. P.C. had a 16-point lead late in the third period and boasted a 68-53 margin going into the last quarter.

The point difference fluctuated thereafter, but there was never much doubt as to the outcome. The Redmen scored only three baskets over the final seven minutes of play.

Schlimm scored 21 points for the Friars, followed by Korbusieski with 16, Bobby Moran with 11 and Kerr 14. Prevey had just half of his team's total, with 10 baskets and 13 foul shots for 33 points. He had 17 free throws.

Joe Markiewicz scored the winning basket during the final minute as Nichols Junior College defeated the Providence College junior varsity, 52 to 50, in the opener. Bob Graham, a Hackensack, N.J., youngster, scored 21 points for Nichols.

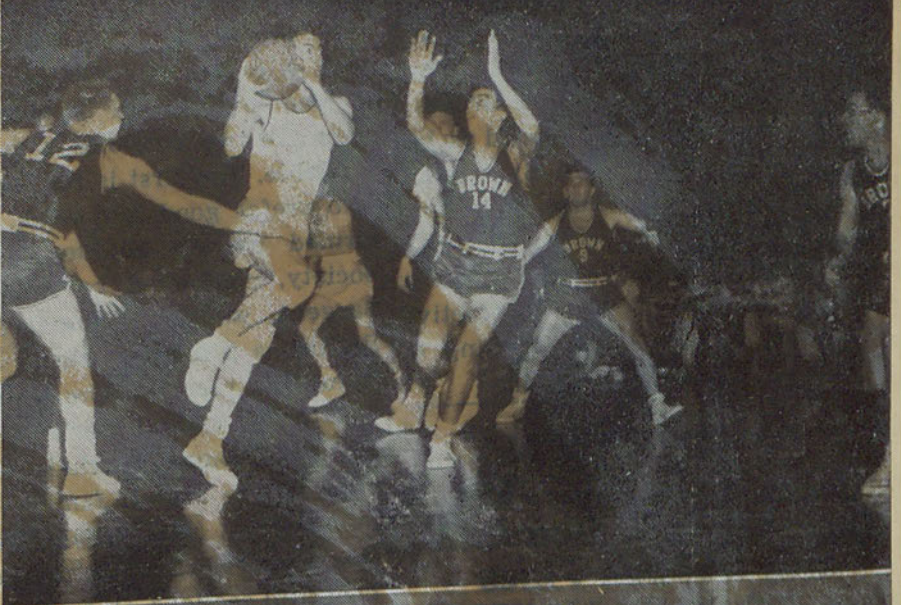
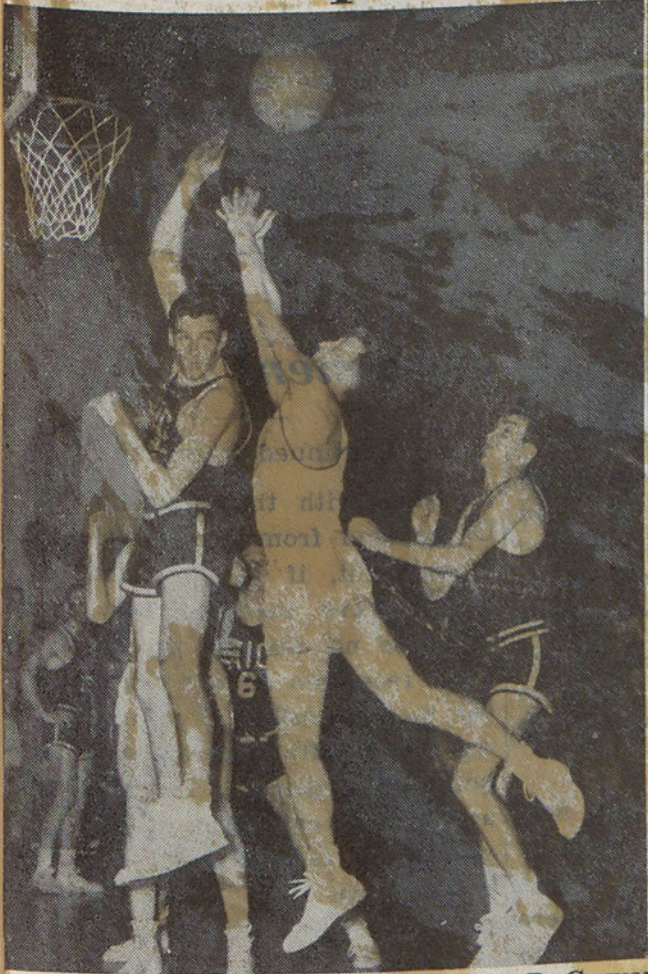

The Bruin basketballers, whose only victory in five starts was in the form of an upset over Providence College, won't find the going any easier this week. They meet Yale Wednesday and powerful Holy Cross Saturday. The game with Yale is at New Haven.

The Rams, busiest of the three R.I. quintets are down for three contests in four days, beginning with a return clash with Boston College at Newton Wednesday at 4 p.m. Coach Red Haire's charges then will be at home to Springfield Friday night and Connecticut on Saturday. The Rams got off to a flying start after the holiday layoff with victories over Maine and the University of Puerto Rico last week. Their record now is three triumphs against four defeats, one of these losses being registered by B.C. last month.

Providence College will be playing its first game since its victory over Massachusetts last month, when it entertains Fort Devens at Mount Pleasant High School Wednesday. The Friars who also will be at home to Springfield Saturday night, have a 3-1 record.

Providence, Dec. 15—Despite a 33-point effort by center Bill Prevey, the University of Massachusetts lost its fifth straight basketball game here tonight, this time bowing to Providence College, 86-66, before 700 fans in the Mount Pleasant High School gym. Words Unlimited Picks Athlete of the Year

Chet Nichols of Pawtucket, Boston Braves southpaw hurler, has been named the outstanding Rhode Island athlete of 1951 in the annual poll of Words Unlimited, the association of Rhode Island sportswriters and sportscasters.

Nichols will be honored at the sixth annual award dinner to be held Thursday Jan. 24 at Johnson's Hummock's Grill, Providence.

Nichols, who led the National league in earned run average last season in his first year in the majors, was nearly a unanimous choice. He polled 15½ first place votes.

Only others to be considered in the first place voting were Georgie Araujo, New England lightweight boxing champion from Providence and the outstanding R. I. athlete in 1950, and Clem Labine of Woonsocket, Brooklyn Dodger rookie hurler.

Araujo received three first places and Labine drew one-half vote on a ballot which split the first place vote between Nichols and Labine.

Although only first place votes counted in selecting the athlete of the year, honorable mention was given 25 other Rhode Islanders. Nichols was given honorable mention on two ballots. Araujo and Labine had 12 honorable mentions.

The son of a former big league pither, Nichols is rated one of the most brilliant young moundsmen in the majors today. His outstanding record resulted in his placing second to the Giants Willie Mays in all National league rookie-of-the-year polls.

A tall, handsome lad of 21, Chet is regarded as one of the best young hurlers of all time by Braves' manager Tommy Holmes.

Holmes rates Nichols ahead of Warren Spahn when the latter broke in with the Braves and says Chet's future is "unlimited."

Chet's record for the year was 11 and 8. He worked 156 innings, gave up 142 hits, walked 66, struck-out 68 and had an earned run average of 2.88. He is the first rookie to lead the league in earned runs since Jim Turner in 1937, also with the Braves.

Araujo, who was second to Nichols in the athlete of the year voting, rose to a spot among the nation's leading lightweights during the past year.

Labine was another outstanding first year pitcher with the Dodgers. He jumped into the national baseball spotlight with a 10-0 victory over the Giants in the three-game playoff to determine the National League champion.

Receiving honorable mention in the voting were the following: Mike Roarke, Boston college football, nine votes; Max Surkont, Braves pitcher, eight; Dudley Richards, National figure skating champion, seven; Amelia Bert, National track champion, and Bob Capuano, Boston University football, six each; Bill Newman, R.-I. amateur golf champion, Chick Murphy, Holy Cross football, and Don Whiston, Brown hockey, five each; Janet Moreau, National champion and Jim Schlimm, Providence college basketball, four each; Bobby Loud, R. I. junior golf champion, Bobby Allen, golf, Bernie Pina, RIU football, three each; Lucy Crocker, New England swimming champion, Walt Molineux, Brown cross country, Fred Franco, Navy football, Bruce Wilson, St. George's School star athlete, Ed Bogdanovich, Maine football, Irv Panciera, Connecticut Univ. football, two each; Bill Sonner, Ohio State swimming, Joe Gleason, Holy Cross football, Pop Johnson, Providence college cross country, Tom Pilkington, golf, Pat Abbruzzi, RIU football, and Bob Arwezon, National swimming champion, one each.

Strong 2nd Half by Friars Nails Down 67-64 Triumph

Sophomore Moran Gets 22

Points; Gymnasts Lead
at Half Time, 37-26

The Providence College Friars won one the hard way last night overcoming an 11-point halftime deficit for a 67-64 victory over the Springfield College gymnasts at Mount Pleasant High.

The Friars played some of the best basketball of the season in the second half as they climbed back into contention and then went on and won in the final minutes of the thrilling game.

Springfield, seeking a clear sweep of its Rhode Island opposition, appeared to have a fine chance of adding the Friars to their victory list in the first half. With center Alan Schutts doing another outstanding job, the Maroons coasted into a 37-26 lead after a slow start.

Providence played a driving, aggressive game in the second half, with Ray Korbusieski, Jim Schlimm, Jerry Lembo and Hank McQueeney doing much of the active work and Bobby Moran supplying the shooting spark.

Major Factor

Moran was the Friars' top scorer with 22 points, including six-for-six in the foul shooting department. It was a team effort but Moran's popping was a major factor. It was one of his best games and he's had several fine ones in his first varsity season.

Springfield held off the Friars in the third period mainly on its foul shooting, scoring only three baskets. The Friars, playing at a fast pace and capitalizing on several interceptions, cut the lead down to five points, 40-35. They tied it up at 48-all on Lembo's set shot with 1:40 remaining in the period. Four points by Schutts gave the Maroons a 52-50 margin starting the last quarter.

In the final period, the Friars led six times and Springfield three, with the score deadlocked six times. Schlimm, who did a good job on rebounds, put the Friars ahead for the first time since the opening

but the Friars generally had control of the ball. Moran made a foul shot with 13 seconds left.

Schutts, a junior from New York, scored 25 points for the Maroons. McQueeney and Schlimm had 12 each and Korby scored 10 for the Friars. Lembo's hustle sparked the Friars at several stages. Korbusieski was strong on defense.

The Springfield freshmen defeated the P.C. Jayvees, 49-41, with the Friars rallying in the second half after going scoreless for about 11

minutes with a free throw in the first minute. Moran's set made it 60-58 in PC's favor later. Schutts tied the score on a rebound and put his team ahead, 62-60, on a hoop from underneath around the four-minute mark.

Hits From Side

Lembo's arching set shot from outside made it 62-all. Moran sank one from the side, putting PC ahead just after Schlimm fouled out. Bob Talbert's only basket tied the score at 64-all with three minutes remaining. Korbusieski broke the tie, sinking one of two free throws. Schutts committed his fifth foul against Ken Kerr and Kerr's free throw gave PC a two-point lead, 66-64, with two minutes left.

The Friars, using Moran, Lembo, Kerr, McQueeney and Korby, were intent on freezing the ball for the rest of the way. However, in the close contact resulting, Korbusieski fouled out and the Friars were assessed a technical when he protested a bit too vigorously.

Gehrmann won by six yards. Ashenfelter was a good 50 yards ahead of Charley Capozzoli of Georgetown. Ashenfelter's time was 9 minutes, 5 seconds. The previous record was held by another FBI man, Fred Wilt, who won it 9:09 here two years ago.

Richards had won or tied for first in 50 consecutive meets, but his best tonight was 14 feet, 8 inches. Good, but not good enough the way Laz was going.

Bob fell out at 14 feet, 11½ inches. Laz, who like Richards, is a former University of Illinois star, made this on his last try.

Then the bar was raised to 15 feet 3 inches. Again Laz made good on his third attempt. This is the third time Laz has bettered 15 feet, and the highest he ever has achieved.

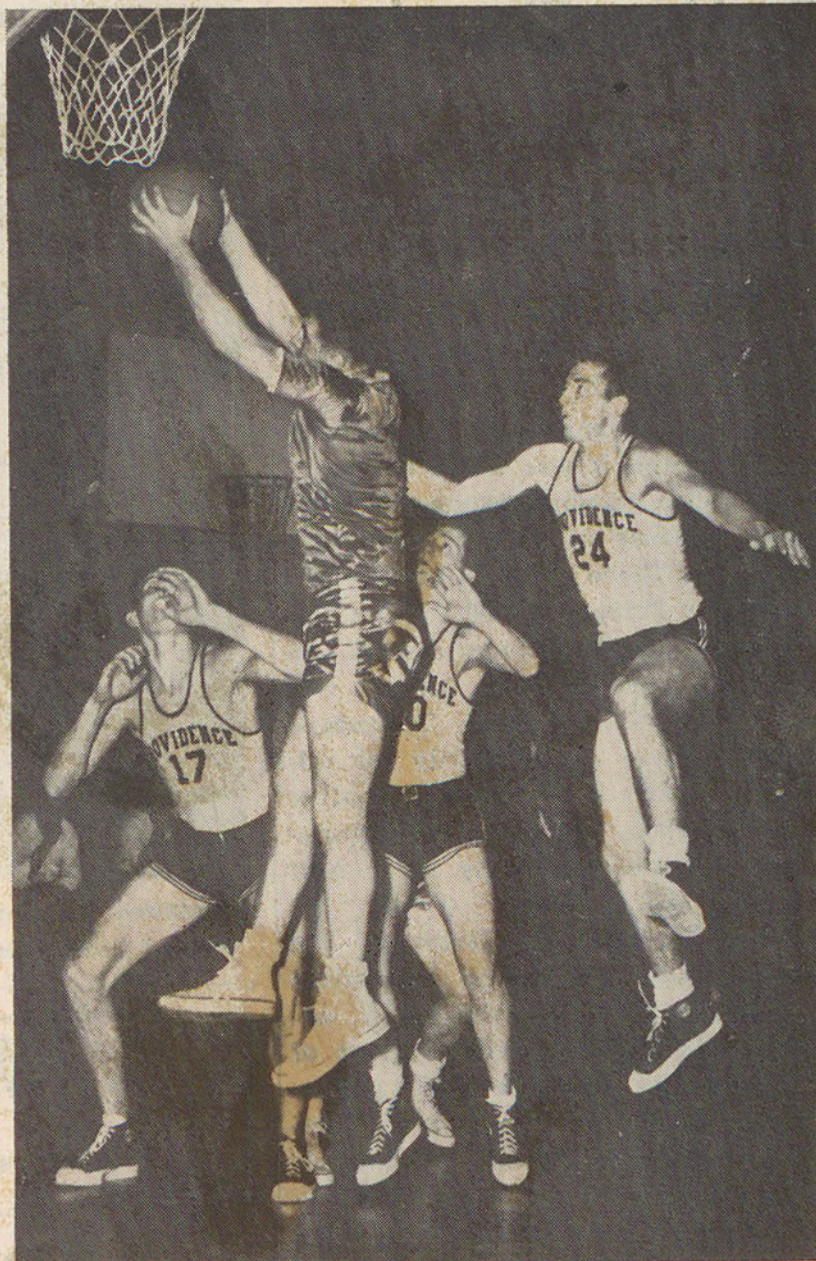

Friars' Moran Faces H.C. with Streak of 13 Foul Points in Row

Bobby Moran, the sharp shooting Providence College forward, puts one of the best foul shooting records in the country on the line tonight as the Friars meet the highly capable Holy Cross quintet at the Worcester Auditorium. Game time is 8:30 o'clock.

Foul shooting requires a certain skill, steady hands and a lot of nerve. Moran seems to have what it takes. He has made good on his last 13 throws (seven against Fort Devens and six against Springfield). His season's mark of 35 out of 40 and a percentage of 87.5 rates with the best.

Moran's shooting compares favorably with any of the accepted leaders in the official NCAA statistics. The percentage leader among the major teams is Dean of Louisiana State, 30 for 32 in eight games for 93.8 percent. Runner-up in the latest figures is Kenney of Kansas with 45 out of 51 in 11 games for 88.2. In third spot is Peters of Santa Clara with 86.1 based on 31 for 36 in nine games.

Small Colleges

In the small college field, in which the Friars are rated, the leader is Magula of Youngstown, who has missed three out of 36 in six games for 91. Second place belongs to Fields of San Diego State, with 30 out of 35 in 10 games for 85.7.

Moran's six-game percentage would put him second among the small schools and fourth among both the major and the smaller colleges. At least the next release should rate his shooting with the recognized leaders. As he missed the first two games with an eye injury, he hadn't played enough games to be ranked when this recent list came out. Moran has accounted for 30 field goals.

He figures the Friars will do a good job tonight against the Cross: "The spirit is good and we will give them a battle."

The way he has been dropping the ball through the hoop from outside

has opened up the Friars' scoring range in two other departments. It gives Jim Schlimm a better chance underneath and spreads the defense a bit for driving in.

All Friends

Bobby is a buddy to several of the Crusaders. He was picked on the All-Brooklyn Catholic League team along with the Cross' Bob Magilligan, played against Jim Kielley, the lanky center, and is on friendly terms with most of the HC and Boston College boys from the Brooklyn-New York area.

Moran has been subject to good coaching under Danny Lynch (now at St. Francis College, Brooklyn), Chick Egan and Vin Cuddy at P.C. Vin advised him to take his time on his foul shooting and he got better results doing that. In the heat of the Friars' game with Springfield, Cuddy had him shoot one, which he converted, in the hectic final minute when a miss and a Springfield hoop could have tied up the ball game.

Bobby's dad has schooled his four sons in the proper shooting methods based on his own experience with the St. Agnes Independents. Jackie is playing well in a spot role for Boston College and Donnie is starring for St. Augustine's High in Brooklyn.

High Praise

Cuddy says Moran has as many shots as any sophomore player he has ever seen. General Al McClellan of BC Eagles rates Bobby an excellent player. Paul Cieurzo, who was Frank Keaney's right-hand man at Rhode Island, is another who places an authoritative stamp of approval on Moran's ability and promise.

The Crusaders may prove much too tough for the Friars tonight but older PC rooters can look back on a string of 10 straight victories by the Friars. Coach Buster Sheary's starting group of Jim Dilling, Jim O'Neil, Kielley, Earle Markey and Magilligan is a skillful group, backed up by Ronnie Perry and Togo Palazzi among others.

The Friars will start Jerry Lembo and Ray Korbusieski at guards, Schlimm at center and Moran and Hank McQueeney at forwards. Providence did a fine job in the second half against

Worcester, Jan. 15.—The Holy Cross Crusaders had one of their most prolific scoring sprees in their history tonight outscoring the Providence College Friars, 106 to 77, before less than 1000 fans at the Worcester Auditorium.

Despite the fact Coach Buster Sheary was in New York to scout the St. Louis Billikens, whom the Cross will meet Thursday night at Boston Garden, the Worcester quintet turned in its usual smart job. The victory was the 24th straight for Holy Cross on the Auditorium court.

Despite the apparent one-sidedness of the score, the Friars played some fair basketball. This was especially true in the second half when they scored 42 points against 50 for the Crusaders and came up with some good shooting and fast breaking.

Top Scores

The Friars' Bobby Moran was the game's top scorer with 26 points. The Brooklyn boy did some fine set shooting and driving. He accounted for 12 points via free throws in 18 attempts and was banged around somewhat in the heavy going under the hoop.

Earle Markey, a junior from West New York, N.J., who led the Cross in scoring last season, turned in a fine game tonight, scoring 22 points and getting his team away to a fast start with his shooting and ball handling in the first quarter.

The height of Holy Cross big men was a heavy factor against the Friars. The Crusaders were in fine fettle, with good ball handling, faking and shooting. The Friars were slow to get started and trailed, 56 to 35, at the half. Providence played some classy bal. in the second half, led by Jim Schlimm, Ray Korbusieski, Moran, Jerry Lembo and Hank McQueeney.

Tonight's game came within a basket of equaling the all-time point-scoring record of the Crusaders, who tallied 108 in the days when Bob Cousy was the big star for the Worcester quintet. Frank

Kasprzak dropped in the basket that sent the Crusaders over the century mark with 2:35 remaining in the fourth period. Holy Cross had a couple of chances to equal their all-time figure but the ball wasn't rolling with them at that time.

Second Largest

Actually Holy Cross was shooting at a sensational pace, accounting for 36 field goals in 81 shots. The Friars' total was the largest scored against the Crusaders this season with the exception of the NYU game, in which the Cross suffered its only loss. It was the second time in four nights that the Crusaders have hit the century mark.

Providence wasn't humiliated by the setback, despite the decisiveness of the score. It was a case of a good small team playing against a good big team and the big team

had more guns than the Friars.

Bob Curran, assistant coach didn't start pulling his top men until the fourth minute of the final period when the game was well wrapped up.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars said he was satisfied with the work of his players. "We would have won a lot of games against weaker teams with a performance as good as we turned in tonight. The Cross is quite a ball club," Cuddy said.

The Holy Cross Jayvees defeated the Providence Jayvees, 50 to 34, in the preliminary game.

Fairfield, Providence Clash Here Saturday

Two of the most popular players ever to play in Waterbury—Bobby Markovic and Ray Korbusieski—will be rivals here next Saturday night when Fairfield University and Providence College clash at 9 in the State Armory.

Markovic, a great star at Sacred Heart under Coach Ebbie Conlan, will open at one of the guard positions for Fairfield, a Jesuit school coached by Jimmy Hanrahan of Waterbury. The latter played basketball at Crosby High under Bill Schofield. Korbusieski, All-New England guard in 1947 when Coach Bill Tracy's Leavenworth High quintet won the New England championship, will be in the lineup of Providence, which is coached by Naugatuck's Vin Cuddy, a product of the late Pete Foley at Naugatuck High.

Charley Aquavia of Naugatuck and Ray Cordon of Waterbury are also members of the Providence College squad. Both are sophomores and both played for Hanrahan when the latter was basketball coach at Marianapolis Prep School in Thompson two years ago. Another player on that Marianapolis squad—Paul (Whitey) Frauenhofer of Torrington—is a member of the Fairfield squad and will see service against his former mates.

Markovic Holds Scoring Title

Markovic, whose defensive ability has improved tremendously in the past few seasons, established the Waterbury scholastic scoring record for a season—499 points in 25 games—during the 1949 season, shattering the previous mark of 424 set by the late J. Alden White of Crosby in 1922. It was Markovic's amazing shooting which sparked Sacred Heart to the state Class B championship, a victory over Tourtlotte of North Grosvenordale and the right to play a New England tournament preliminary game at Boston Garden.

Upon graduating, Markovic played basketball during the summer months with several college

stars including Bob Cousy of Holy Cross, now star of the Boston Olympics, at a New York state resort. He entered Marianapolis in September, played basketball and baseball, then enrolled at Fairfield in September, 1950.

A sophomore, this is his second year on the varsity at Fairfield.

Korbusieski was one of the kingspins on the Leavenworth championship squad of 1947. A junior that season, "Korby" captained the 1948 team which, stripped by graduation, failed to qualify for the state tournament.

Korbusieski was a steady influence on the championship squad, and for a guard, a remarkable scorer.

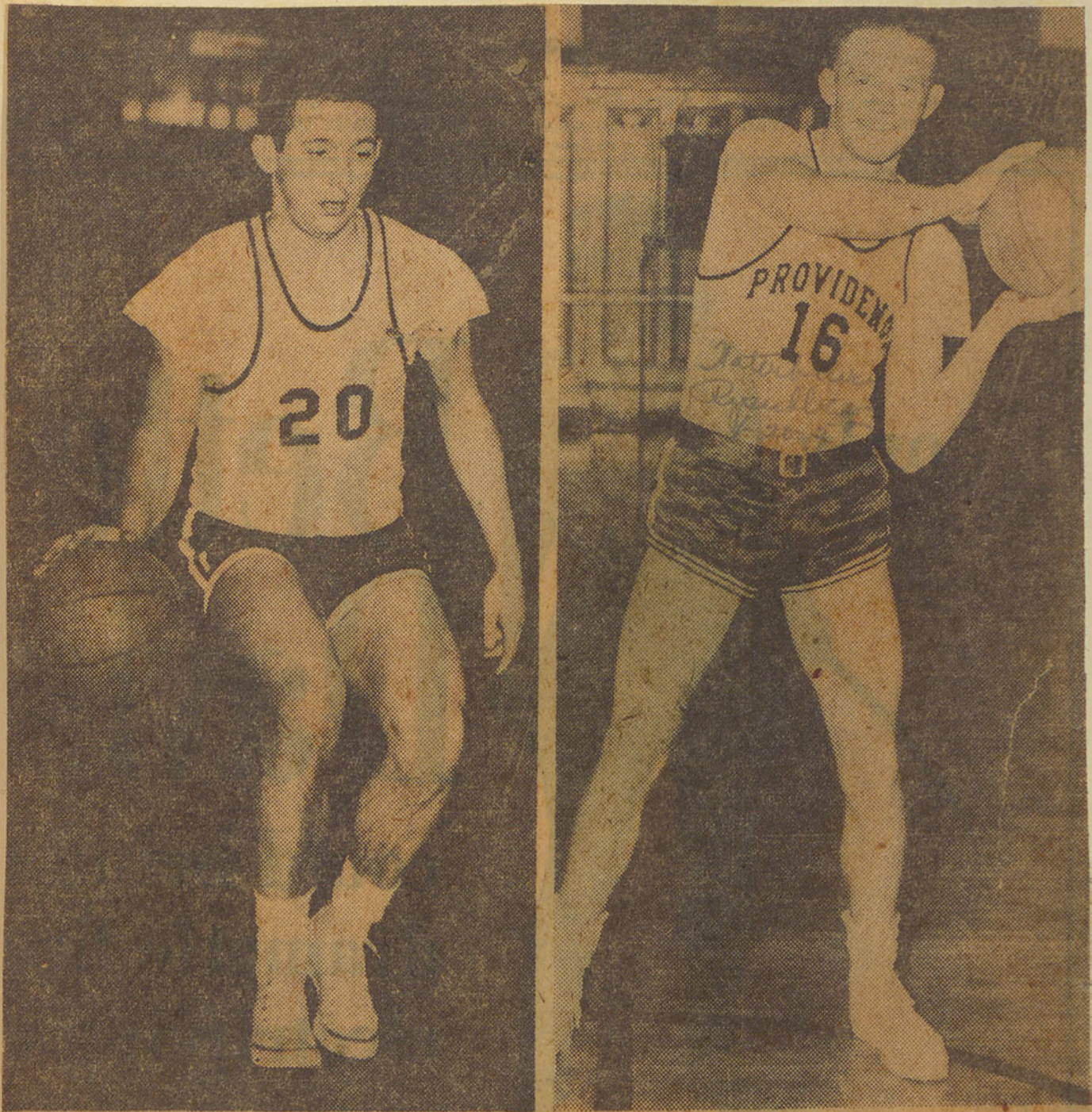
As key playmaker in the backcourt, he set up a large number of the scoring plays for Jimmy Piersall and Johnny Messup and was the team's best defensive performer. He won All-New England recognition in his junior year for his great performance in the New England tournament, in addition to being named All-Naugatuck Valley League and All-City.

Second Year As Starter

Ray played Freshman ball his first year at Providence and was a seldom used substitute as a Sophomore. But last year he made the first squad and needless to report, is a starter again this campaign, his final.

At the start of the present season Coach Cuddy tried an experiment and moved Ray to forward. He filled the bill in fine style but his play-making was missed in the backcourt and just before the fifth game, Cuddy moved him back to his old post where he has been carrying on since.

Only sophomores Aquavia and Cordon have been playing with the Providence Jayvees most of the campaign but both are tabbed for future use by Cuddy. The same holds true for Frauenhofer, the smallest member of the Fairfield squad but the fastest—and the scrappiest.

Schlimm Averages 25.6

The Maroons will move to Providence tomorrow night to meet the Friars of coach Vin Cuddy, who have won five of their first six games this season. With victories over Assumption, Brandeis, AIC, Massachusetts and Ft. Devens, the Friars have only a close defeat at the hands of Brown to mar their record. The Springfield-Providence court rivalry started in 1927 and since then the Friars have won 19 of the 36 games played.

In the 10 games played since the war, Coach Bunn's squads have won six.

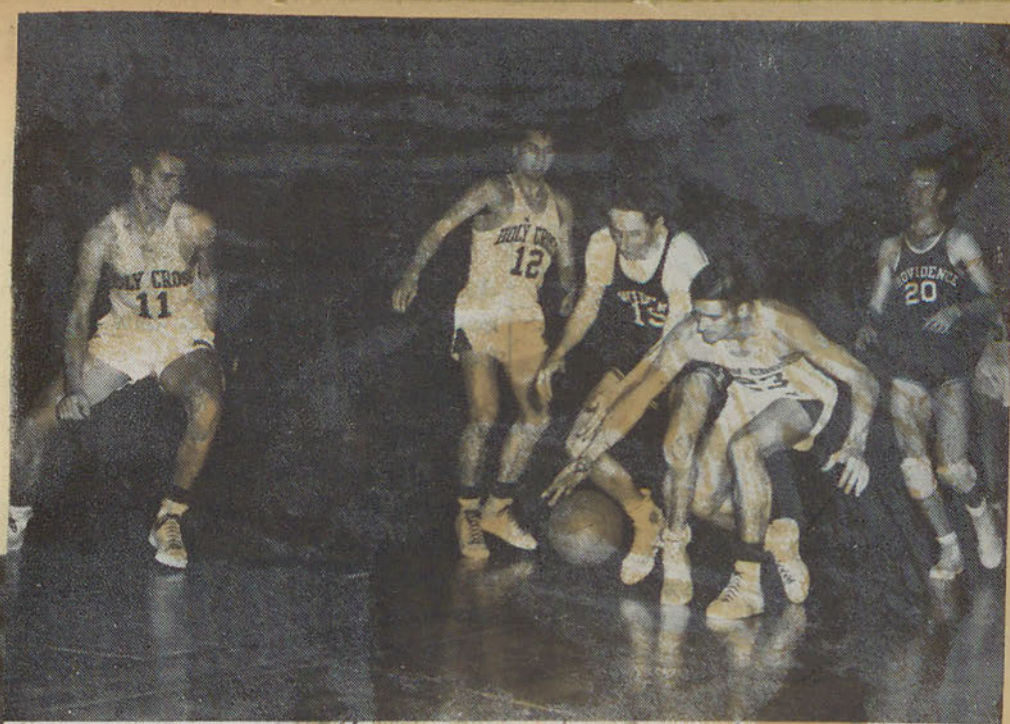

Cross Downs Friars

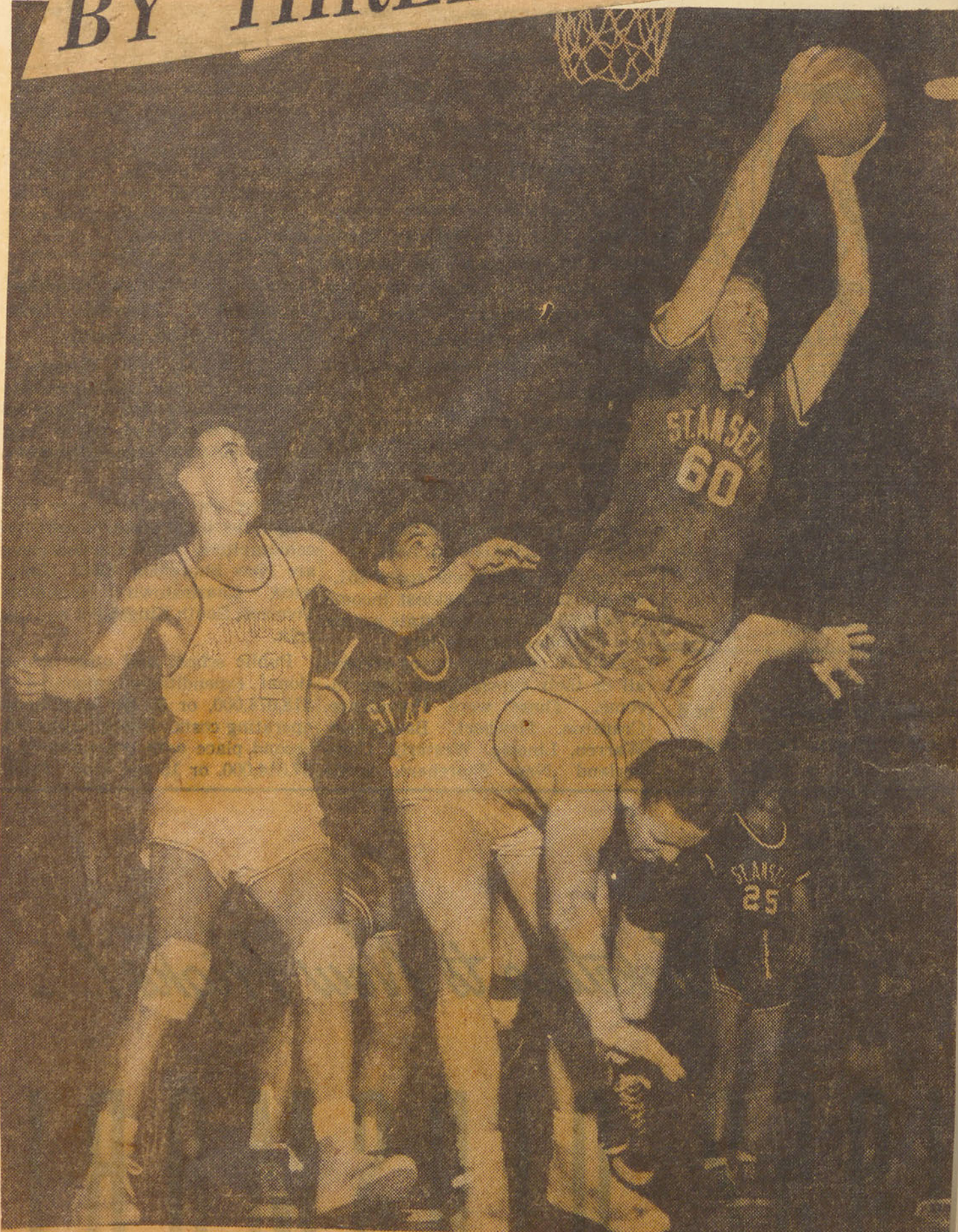

P.C. CHALKS UP 57-54 TRIUMPH IN TOUGH FIGHT

2 Closing-Minute Scores by
Bobby Moran Spell the
Winning Margin

The Providence College Friars changed benches last night and came within an eyelash of dropping their second straight game. A drive-in, layup shot by Bobby Moran just before the final minute pulled out the decision and Providence chalked up a 57-to-54 victory over the dangerous St. Anselm's Hawks at Mount Pleasant High School.

The Friars weren't as sharp as usual in their shooting and it turned out to be a rough, exciting game that could have gone either way. Perhaps the bench-switch had nothing to do with it, but the Friars were as close to losing as they ever have been on their "home" court in the last three years and they have only gone down once in that time.

It was a closely played game throughout, with Providence's seven-point lead during the third quarter the widest margin in the second half. In both the second and fourth quarters, the Friars spurred into the lead during the final minutes. They led, 34-31, at halftime.

Upper Hand

Rangy Charlie Duffley, the Hawks' leading scorer for the sea-

Money Play

Providence had several chances before Moran scored on a drive-in about 68 seconds from the final buzzer. That was the money play.

The Friars got possession seconds later after a scramble for the ball and took time out with 55 seconds remaining. They put on a freeze, with Ray Korbusieski, Moran, Phil Lynch, Jack Durkin and McQueeney handling the ball. Providence men were fouled four times and waived the free throws in favor of possession.

With less than 10 seconds left, Moran dribbled in from midcourt for the clinching basket as the Hawks crowded the Friars near the center line and left the area around the basket open. Moran was whacked hard as he scored this one. The Hawks took time out after the basket and when the game resumed time expired before they could set up a shot.

The Friars, who scored only eight baskets during the first half,

won the game on their free shooting. They converted 21 of 34 tries. The Providence scoring was split up among Moran, with 14, Schlimm, with 13, Lynch, McQueeney, and Korby, all with eight. Lembo turned in a good job, also.

St. Anselm's led, 18-16, in the first quarter and had the lead most of the time during the second quarter. PC tied the score three times during the last five minutes of the half. Kerr and Korby offset baskets by Reilly and Duffley at 28 and 30-all. Then Reilly put the Hawks ahead, 31-30. Lynch and Kerr teamed on a nice play, putting the Friars in front, 32-31, on Lynch's basket. Then Schlimm put in a rebound with 12 seconds left.

Coach Hal Martin's Providence College Jayvees defeated Bryant

College, 92 to 58, with Bill Quinlan scoring 18 points for the Friars. Ken Gillis netted 21 for Bryant, playing its first game of the year.

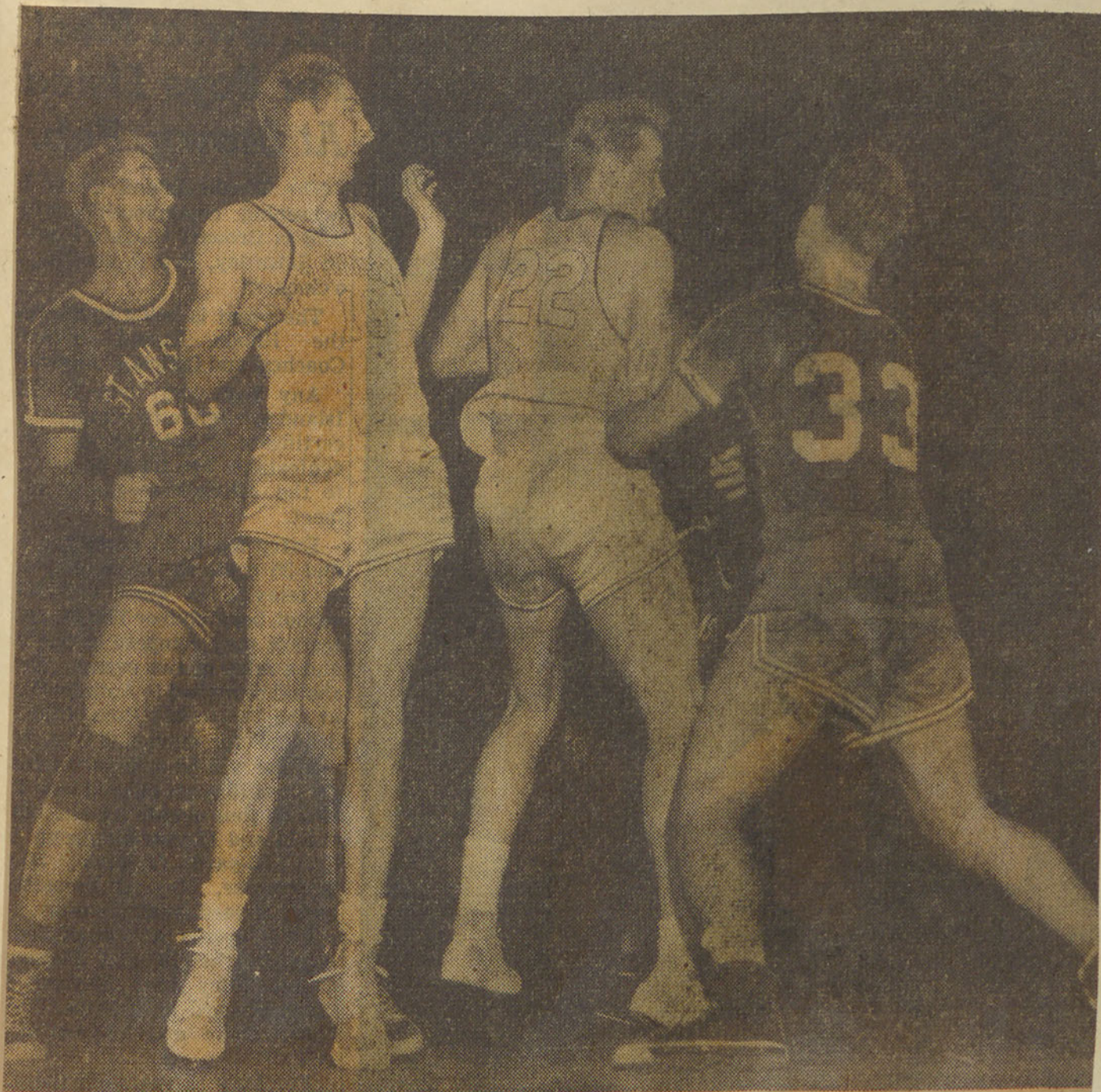

With Joe Kehoe supplying most of the point-making and 18-year-old Freshman Bob Gerwein controlling the backboard traffic, the Red Stags made it a great ball game all the way. Providence, which is coached by Naugatuck's Vin Cuddy, was definitely having an "off" night. But the Red and White from down-state ran out of gas in the final period.

Friars Decide Contest

It was then that Schlimm, Korbusieski & Co. made their move. Heavily favored, Providence couldn't shake off the speedy but comparatively small Stags. With six minutes remaining the Rhode Islanders' lead was only a point, 58-54.

At this juncture Schlimm hooked a left-hander from underneath, and converted a free throw when fouled on the shot, running the count to 58-54. A hoop from the rebound and the Friars moved up to 60-54.

Moments later Korbusieski missed underneath to Schlimm who made it 60-54. Two minutes later Korbusieski wrapped it up with a jump shot from the key.

With three minutes left Fairfield came back with a foul by Center Stan Suchenski, and a hoop by Substitute Jack O'Connell. When Suchenski cut the margin to four points with a free throw a minute later, the Friars decided to play possession basketball and protected their victory, waiving three free throws in the final minutes in doing so.

Providence's zone defense bothered Fairfield no end in the early periods. The Rhode Island team took a seven-point lead before Fairfield even scored. The rest of the way it was pretty even.

Providence led, 17-12, at the close of the first period and 32-25, two minutes before the half ended. But the Stags closed fast. Suchenski pushed in a rebound, added a free throw and Gerwien converted another to cut the edge to 32-29, at the intermission.

Gerwien Sparks Fairfield

Gerwien, whose great job on the boards, featured for Fairfield in the opening periods, continued his great performance in the second half and the youngster seemed to inspire his mates.

Kehoe made it 32-31, on a drive-in shot in the first 30 seconds of the first half. H. C. RIPS PROVIDENCE, 106-77, FOR 11TH VICTORY

Hitting the century mark for the second straight time, the Holy Cross basketball array crushed little Providence College by a 106-77 count before a sparse audience of some 800 last night in the Auditorium.

The Crusaders thus wound up their odds-and-ends business before taking on St. Louis University tomorrow night—the game which could vault the Purple into a high place in the nation's collegiate basketball heap.

The H. C. troupe had a soft time of it in taking their seventh straight victory and their 11th in 12 games.

Take Quick Lead

They quickly skipped off to a comfortable margin. And even though Providence set up a zone defense in the second half in an effort to keep the rolling Crusaders from hitting 100 points, the Purple simply kept pouring in an assortment of baskets to run up their highest total of the year.

Last Saturday the Purple whacked another Rhode Island club, Brown, 100-31.

While the Crusaders won as they pleased, this was not a true indication of what was happening on the floor. Providence was too small to cope with the Purple. But the Friars were rough, so that a number of lesser records were set during the action.

New Free Throw Mark

The H. C. cagers broke a two-year record in the number of free throws cashed—34. The old mark was 31. Also, they had more foul attempts than ever before, 47.

Other records were most fouls for two teams (60), most free throw conversions for two teams (53) and most free throw chances for two teams (75).

22 Points for Markey

With Earle Markey, the slick playmaking guard, leading the way with 22 points, H. C. took an early lead and stormed the nets for 27 points in the opening quarter.

Markey had 13 points in the opening session as the Purple opened up a 27-17 lead. By half-time it was 56-35 with Markey still in the lead role, although abetted by Togo Palazzi's three hoops and a pair of baskets and three free throws by Ronnie Perry.

Captain Jim Dilling and Bob McLarnon made the Friars' zone setup rather porous in the third quarter and the Crusaders continued to roll on to an 80-55 advantage before this third terminal was reached. And Bud Kielley, who had been most efficient from the foul line, tapped in three fielders in the last chapter to continue a dizzy tempo which saw the Purple score 27, 29, 24 and 26 points per period.

Moran Top Scorer

While the Crusaders were breezing, Providence showed a little guy with plenty of zip, sophomore Bobby Moran, who wound up with 26 points for the top production of the night. Twelve of Moran's points came from successes at the foul line.

Trailing Markey for H. C. were Palazzi with 16, Kielley and Dilling with 15 each and McLarnon with 11.

Bob Magilligan, regular guard, was kept out of action because of an ankle injury. He'll be ready for St. Louis, however.

H. C. Jayvees Win

Walt Surprunowicz scored 16 points in leading the H. C. Jayvees to a 50-34 victory over the Providence Jayvees.

Holy Cross is getting "fat" on Rhode Island basketball teams.

In two successive games with clubs from Rhody the Crusaders have totaled 206 points. One hundred of those came in their victory over Brown (100-31) Saturday night and last night at Worcester they defeated Providence College, 106-77.

This was victory No. 9 out of 10 games for the Crusaders and, oddly, the team that gave them their closest battle in winning was the University of Rhode Island. That was 67-64 for the Worcesterites.

3-3 Record

Such closeness is not expected in the Rams game with New Hampshire at Kingston tonight. The Wildcats have a three-three record, but they have been playing the less-gifted clubs of New England.

The varsity game will start at 7:30 and the Ram freshmen will play Quonset in the preliminary, starting at 6 o'clock.

The Rams' last effort was a 64-62 victory in overtime over Connecticut on Saturday. New Hampshire also won its last game, taking Northeastern by a point, 66-65.

Despite the score of the P.C.-Holy Cross game, the Friars were not completely humiliated. Their Bob Moran was the game's leading scorer with 26 points and they played the Crusaders practically even in the second half. The totals for the period were 42 points for the Friars to 50 for the Crusaders.

Wrapped Up

But the game was wrapped up in the first half. The Crusaders' shooting skill was the big item throughout—a factor that was outstanding in both their high-scoring games. They made 42 out of 80 floor shots against Brown and 36 out of 81 against the Friars. That's top-caliber shooting.

That 106 points, by the way, was just two short of the Crusaders' all-time scoring high. And if there is any consolation in it, the Friars' 77 points were the best a losing club has done against the Worcesterites.

Moran of P.C. Leads College Foul Throwers

New York, Jan. 18.—(UP)— Bobby Moran, Providence College forward, having missed only five of his first 40 free throws this season, led the nation's small-college basketball players in shooting from the foul line, with an 87.5 percentage, according to the most recently compiled statistics of the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau.

Harmon Hoffmann of Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute led in scoring, but his percentage lead was so small that you could hardly see it.

Hoffmann's margin over runner-up Johnny O'Brien of Seattle University was a microscopic five-hundredths of a point.

With 324 points in 12 games, the six-foot one-inch Hoffmann showed an average of 27 points per contest while O'Brien, with 539 points in 20 games, had an average of 26.95. O'Brien's point total is tops in the country.

Arthur Press of Western Maryland was third with a 26-point average, followed by Alan Schutts of Springfield, Mass., at 25.8 and Sam Hardy of Florence State, Ala., at 25.7.

Mike Magula of Youngstown continued to lead the field in floor-shooting percentage with 58.7 percent, sinking 91 throws out of 155 tries.

Coach Harry Coates' two Providence College relay teams turned in fine jobs. The mile quartet of Dick Tiernan, Paul Methia, Jack Cassidy and Jim Penler won over Brown and BU. The two-mile team made a race of it against Harvard, Yale and MIT, with Yale the winner. Bob Linne of RIU got over 13 feet in the pole vault while Walt Molineux of Brown took second to Villanova's Fred Dwyer in the 1000.

The Providence College Friars have two basketball games scheduled this week while Brown swings back into action on Saturday night. The Friars meet the St. Anselm's Hawks, who defeated New Hampshire and lost to Springfield in their last two games, on Wednesday night at Mount Pleasant High.

Saturday night the Friars take on Fairfield at Waterbury, Conn., with Providence's Ray Korbusieski getting a chance to show off his ability in his home town. Ray has been a spark for the Friars since he broke into the lineup as a sophomore.

Kullman's tally nipped Henry's string after he'd held the opposition scoreless for 150 minutes and 6 seconds.

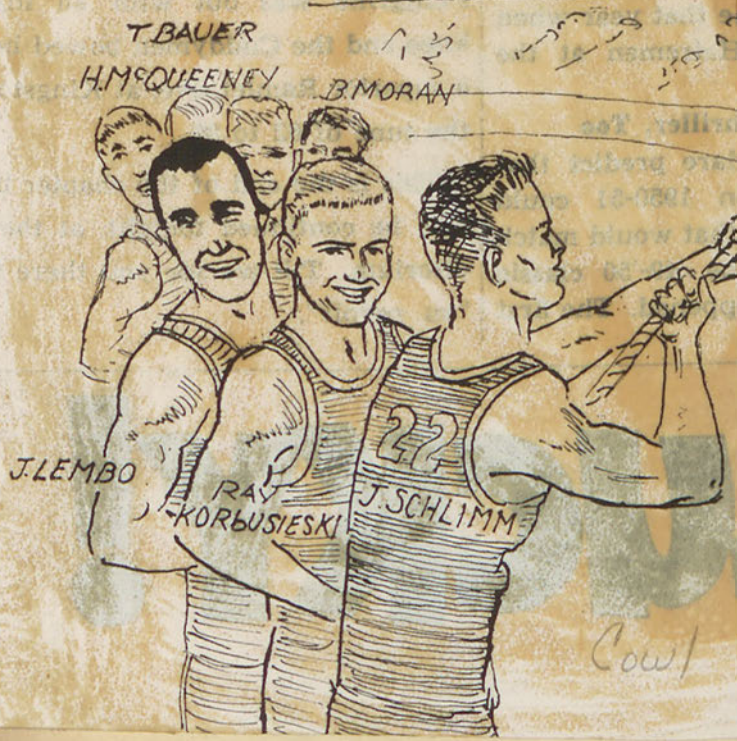
The loss also ended an unbeaten streak for the Bruins after five games and enabled New York to pull within two points of the fourth-place Bostonians.

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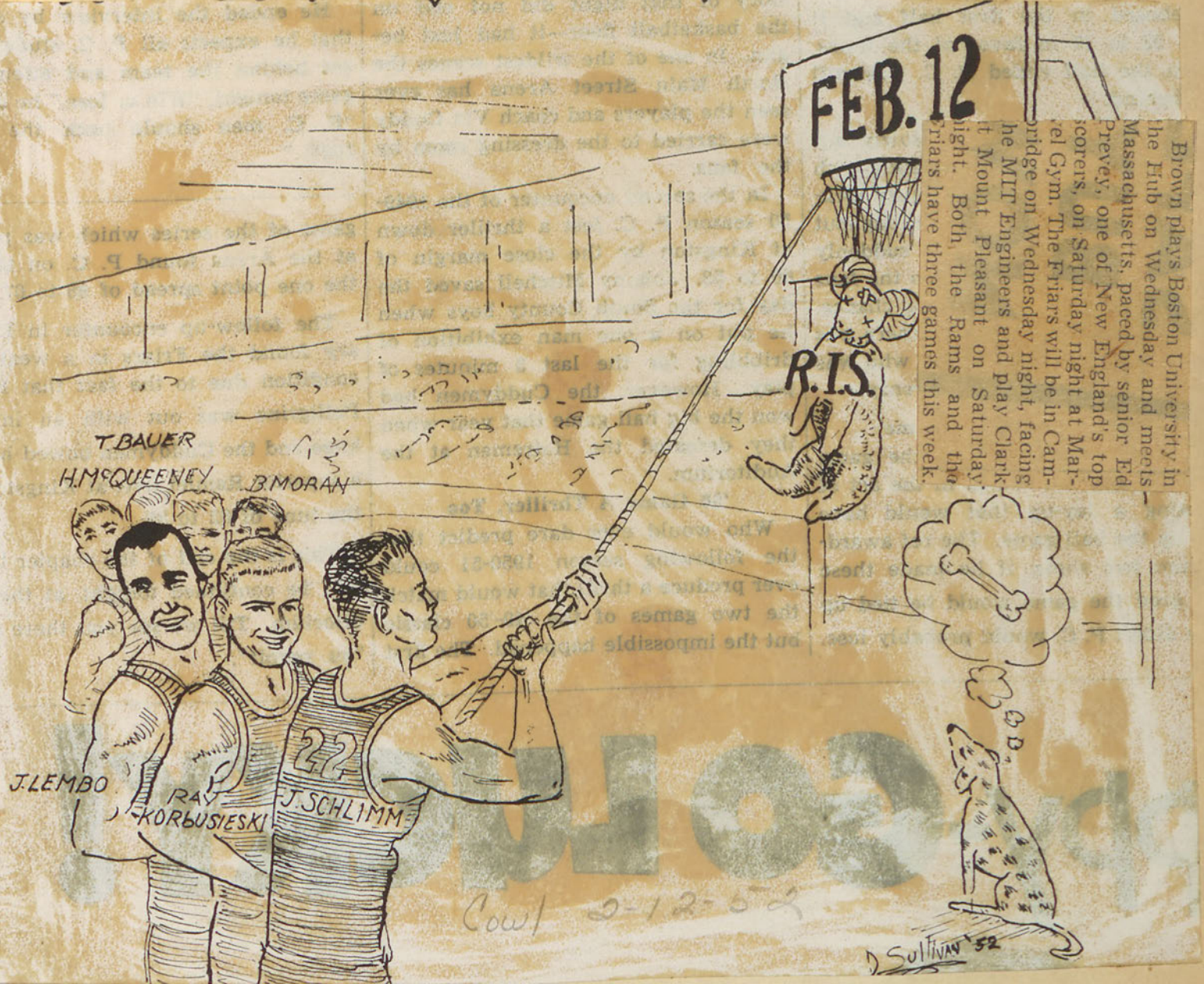

Rams Lead Series

The Rams hold a 25-8 margin over the Friars in the series. A neutral, Coach Bob Morris of Brown, looks for a close, hard fought game. "They're pretty even," he says, and that seems to be the opinion of the rival coaches as well.

The Friars held a light workout yesterday. Coach Cuddy said the RPI game served as a fine tuneup as it was close enough to extend the Friars and yet they won out.

Providence experimented with its lineup at Troy, alternating Bob Prendergast and Hank McQueeney at center and forward. Prendergast will start tonight along with Jim Schlimm, Bob Moran, Ray Korbuseski and Jerry Lembo.

Baird Tops Scorers

Three of the State's best shooters will be in action when Schlimm, Moran and the Rams' Billy Baird

get together. Schlimm is basically an inside man, using a hook shot whereas Moran is a set-shot scorer from outside. Baird can do both and leads the Rhode Island college players with 225 points in 13 games.

Some of Rhody's spot players did a fine job in the Bucknell game, with Rollie Kubiskey, Ray Rossi and Bobby Mitchell leading the pack. Kubiskey may break into the starting lineup. He rejoined the team recently after completing a tour of active duty with the Marines.

Fred Congleton, who has been below par physically, Chuck Stewart, Eddie Hole, Baird and Art Helwig will start for the Rams. This group did a good job in Philadelphia against St. Joseph's but was not as effective against Bucknell, which had a better team than its record would indicate. Congleton and Kubiskey will give the Friars trouble on the boards.

The Providence College Jayvees, coached by Hal Martin and led by Charlie Aquavia and Eddie Ryder, will play the Rhody Frosh, coached by Johnny Mitchell, at 7:15, preceding the varsity game.

Martinmen Face Ramlets In Opener

Providence's J. V. squad will play the preliminary game of tonight's doubleheader at the Arena. The Martinmen will do battle with the Ram Jayvees beginning at 7:00 p. m.

The Martinmen are fresh from last Thursday's victory over Bryant and should be ready for the Rhody men. They took the measure of the Bryant forces by the score of 79 to 64. Leading the scorers in last Thursday's tilt was Charlie Aquavia who tossed 14 points through the hoop for the Smithillers.

Aquavia will be counted on to turn in his usual good performance tonight and if his set shot is working he'll make it pretty rough for the visiting Ramlets. But Aquavia isn't the only Friar with the scoring touch. Coach Martin can depend on Ray Cordon and his deadly set to back up Aquavia at the guard post.

Up at forward the lineup will probably feature Jack Keating, who has been doing a great job off the boards. Jack's colleagues will be Bill Quinlan who has just been rounding into form after having dislocated his shoulder earlier in the season. Cowl Sports Scribe Reminisces On PC, Ram Basketball Rivalry

**Records Show R. I. University Has Won 25 While
Providence College Has Captured 8
In 22 Year Hoop Rivalry**

Tonight when the Friars tangle with the Rams at the Auditorium they will be renewing Providence College's oldest rivalry which dates way back to 1921. The Rhodymen lead in this basketball series with a record of 25 victories to Providence's 8 but the previous record can be disregarded as far as tonight's encounter is concerned.

Glancing back over the records I happened to find that the very first game of basketball that was played at this Dominican institution was against State in 1921 and it found the Rams coming out in front by the score of 85 to 35. The following year found the results almost as disastrous for us as we again ended up on the short end of a 35 to 19 score.

No Games From 1922 to 1935

Sports activities between the two schools were severed in 1922 and it was not until 1935, after a layoff of some thirteen years, that competition was continued. P. C.'s quintet was at that time under the leadership of "General" Al McLellan who was mentor of the Smithhillers until 1938 when Ed Crotty took over. We beat State twice that year and had quite a profitable following year, in 1935-36, when we won both our games from the Rams by a score of 53 to 28 and 47 to 43.

In '36-'37, the Rams and Providence were sporting two of the top teams in New England but neither team was able to gain the upper-hand and we split the series. However, the Rams had something to cheer about since it was the first time in sixteen years that they gained a victory over our squad. Once the State fans got to cheering it seems that they wouldn't stop be-

cause Providence was unable to gain another victory until '41.

Friars Upset Rams in '40

This underdog quintet of the 1940-41 season was lead by Larry Drew, Horace Marone and Ted McConnon who upset the nationally hearded State boys by the score of 60 to 54. This same State team later in the season played in the N.I.T. tourney at Madison Square Garden.

After the '41 victory came the famine. We had to wait until December of '49 before we could gain another victory over the Keaneymen. During these black eight years the Providence rooters could gain some consolation in the fact that State was producing nationally famous teams that were unstoppable. The very word basketball and "fast break" became synonymous with Rhode Island State and Frank Keaney. This was the era of the unforgettable Ernie Calverly, Dick Hole, Ken Goodwin and Jackie Allen.

P.C. Winless From '42 to '49

We had to wait for a long time before we gained another conquest, (12 long games,) but when this victory came it was well worth the wait. It goes back to that notable night of December 15, 1949, at the Arena, when we broke our losing streak by registering a 59 to 57 win.

I was a freshman that year and full of all the enthusiasm that goes with being a yearling, but even I was discouraged when I looked up at the scoreboard in the first half and it read 33 to 15 in favor of the Rams. When the half ended P. C. was still far behind.

The second half started slowly but something seemed to be clicking with the P. C.'ers that was previously lacking. We were still losing throughout most of the second half; then suddenly with about five minutes to go the fans realized that we did have a chance. During the ensuing minutes there was not one patron in the Arena who was sitting—the place was in a frenzy.

Lembo's Fouls Tie Game

With 30 seconds left in the game Jerry Lembo was fouled in the act of shooting a lay-up that would have tied up the ball game. The ref awarded him two shots; if he made these two good the game would be tied up if he didn't P. C. would probably lose.

Calmly, Jerry strode up to the foul line and sank both baskets.

The score was now tied (57 to 57). P. C. got possession of the ball (old ruling) and it was passed off to the balding Walt Lozoski who dribbled into a position about 25 feet from the Rhody basket. Walt just stood there for a second and then he let arch a set shot that swished through the hoop without even touching the rim.

Demonstration Follows '49 Win

In the ensuing 15 second the Rams failed to score and Providence had brought home the "bacon" by the two point margin of 59 to 57. But the story of that night did not end on the basketball floor—it had just begun. In one of the wildest scenes the North Main Street Arena has ever seen the players and coach Vin Cuddy were carried to the dressing room by the fans.

In the second encounter of the 1949-50 season P. C. lost a thriller down at Kingston by the close margin of 60 to 58. Johnny Mitchell saved the day for the South County boys when he put on a one man exhibition of dribbling for the last 3 minutes of play. However, the Cuddymen had won the big ball game that year when they defeated the Hairemen at the Auditorium.

'50 Game A Thriller, Too

Who would ever dare predict that the following season 1950-51 could ever produce a thrill that would match the two games of the '49-'50 classic but the impossible happened. The first

game of the series which was played at the Arena found P. C. on top by the one point spread of 68 to 67.

The follow-up encounter in February found the Friars in a weakened condition due to the fact that Frank Pelligrino was out with an injured knee and the Cuddymen bowed before a superior Ramlet five, at Kingston, to the tune of 62 to 86.

This is the end of the chapter but it will be continued tonight, at the Auditorium. Till we see you there then, "au revoir".

PC's Individual Scoring Record Broken By Moran

Bob Moran, the Friars' star forward, established a new school record when he scored 29 points in last Saturday's encounter against Rensselaer, which the Friars won 71 to 69. The previous school record was held by Captain Jim Schlimm who had scored 26 points against this same New York club a year ago.

Bob, who missed the first two games of the campaign due to an injured eye, has been scoring at the rate of 19.5 points per performance. His total of 176 points, compiled in only eight contests, makes him high man on the

squad. Not only is Bob the team's leading shooter but at last reports he was the top hoopster in New England in foul shooting.

While in high school the Brooklyn boy was chosen on the New York, All-Brooklyn squad. Bob is not the only Moran playing in New England, for his brother is one of the stars for the Boston College five.

Hellwig, A Frosh, Is Starter

Hellwig, a frosh, has more than held his own at a starting position right from the first whistle when Rhode Island fought a good St. Joseph's team

into overtime. Stenhouse walked off with Words Unlimited's "School Boy Athlete of the Year" Award this winter, so you can rest assured he's a capable boy to have around in the event that one of the starters gets fatigued. Dunn returns with bitter memories of last year's pastings at the hands of our top yearling outfit.

Kubiskey, a six-foot-three inch ex-marine, will be in there contributing valuable efforts to the Rams' rebounding cause thanks to a wonderful Christmas present—his discharge from the Marines.

However, we fancy the boys out our way will be more than able to hold their own against anything that the wooly animal with the curved horns can offer.

Schlimm Is Back In Form

Jim Schlimm's playing first fiddle on maestro's Vin Cuddy's bandwagon again. He looked like the James of old scoring 24 points against Fairfield in the Friars' last game. Big Jim showed fine form as he dunked his pivot shot with all the old authority. fourth quarter of the Fairfield game. Lynch appears to have found something of a scoring touch to go with his defensive talents. Both boys will give any shooter fits by their crowding, aggressive tactics.

Lanky Bob Prendergast will get many opportunities to ply his wares against Kingston's representatives. Bob has the height and the shots to go against Congleton and Hellwig, the Rams' big men.

Friars Have Strong Bench

Also on the bench will be veterans of past R.I.U. games, Tom Bauer, and Ronnie Gagnon, who will provide the reserve strength along with sophomores Jack Durkin and Jack Reynolds, who were in on that frosh shel-lacking last season, and Freshmen Ken Kerr, Jack Lowney and Joe King.

So it looks like history will repeat itself and the two teams will stage another of their 24 carat melees with all the stoppers pulled out. My prediction: Friar Boy by a knockout in the last few minutes.

Ram Quintet Holds Off Friar Rally, Scores 60-54 Victory

P.C. Team, 15 Points Down at One Time, Unable to Cope With RIU Zone

Some of the unheralded members of the squad put new life into the University of Rhode Island Rams and the Rams shot their way to a 60-54 victory over the Providence College Friars last night at the Auditorium before 1300 fans.

The Rams played aggressively from the outset, built up a comfortable lead which once reached 15 points, and fought off a driving finish by the Friars.

The Friars were stunned by the Rams' start and then unable to do much with their zone defense. Providence played up to its capabilities in the second half, outscoring the Rams, 31 to 28.

It was a big victory for Coach Red Haire and his charges, after their setback by Bucknell at Kingston. Some of the same men who livened up the Rhody offense in that game—Ray Rossi, Rollie Kubiskey and Dan Dunn—did a fine job last night. Rossi, who hasn't played much previously, started along with Kubiskey, and turned in a heads-up job.

Hit From Inside

Providence had the two leading scorers in senior Jim Schlimm and his running mate, sophomore Bobby Moran. They played outstanding games, with Schlimm accounting for 23 points and Moran 17. A lot of their baskets came the hard way from inside. It was one of Schlimm's best shooting performances.

Although in the second half, the Friars looked more like the team that won nine of its first 11 games, they never were in the driver's seat. The Rams led, 18-8, in the opening period and then by 28-13, 30-16 and 32-20 at various stages in the second quarter. Rhody had a nine-point margin, 32-23, at halftime.

The third quarter was the Friars' best. They were coming with a rush, always threatening, but unable to take the lead. They cut the lead down to four points, 38-34, in five minutes and came within three points later as Moran scored on a driving shot after maneuvering nicely. Moran team with Ray Korbusieski for a hoop which made it 45-43 but Art Helwig tapped one in for Rhody and it was 47-43 starting the final quarter.

Ease Pressure

Bobby Mitchell and Rossi, money in the bank for Rhody, eased the pressure and practically sewed it up with five points in the first minute of the last period. Mitchell scored a basket, was fouled and converted for three points, and Rossi made another basket, for a 52-45 advantage for the Rams.

Later Eddie Hole sunk a pair of free throws, followed by a jump shot by Billy Baird and it was 56-49. Rossi scored again and Freddy Congleton boosted the Rams into a nine-point margin with 4:45 remaining. Schlimm got three points for the Friars around the three-minute mark but generally the Rams controlled the ball and were content to run out the clock.

The action was hectic and spirited in the second half. At times it seemed that the Friars were on their way. They just never got there. Phil Lynch, Bob Prendergast, Korby, Schlimm and Jack Lowney contributed some good defensive work for the Friars. Baird and Congleton topped the Rhody scoring with 12 and 13 points. With the new-found vigor from the bench, the Rams were an improved club.

The P.C. Jayvees defeated the Rhody Freshmen, 68-64, in the preliminary, with Jimmy Murphy scoring 22 points for the losing Ramlets. Ed Ryder, Charlie Aqua-

Three players new to starting positions played major parts in the University of Rhode Island's 60-54 basketball victory over Providence College last night at the Auditorium.

The Friars pulled down the margin to just two points on three separate occasions in the third quarter, but they didn't have the late-stage punch that won this game for them in the past two seasons.

Happy Switch

Coach Red Haire of the Rams said he had no particular reason for making the lineup changes, though he admitted afterward that he was very happy with the way they turned out.

"Rossi and Dunn have played in all our games and Kubiskey is just getting into shape since getting out of the Marines (he entered school this semester)," Haire said. "Oh, maybe some of the boys were getting complacent in there, so we made a few switches. But it doesn't mean much. We may switch right back again for our next game."

Haire will have until Friday to contemplate his next arrangement, but the Friars will be busy again tonight. They play M.I.T. at Cambridge. Slow Start

No one in the Friars' dressing room was of a mood to discuss the contest calmly. Everybody there had figured they could beat the downstaters and the outcome left no one happy.

Friars Lead

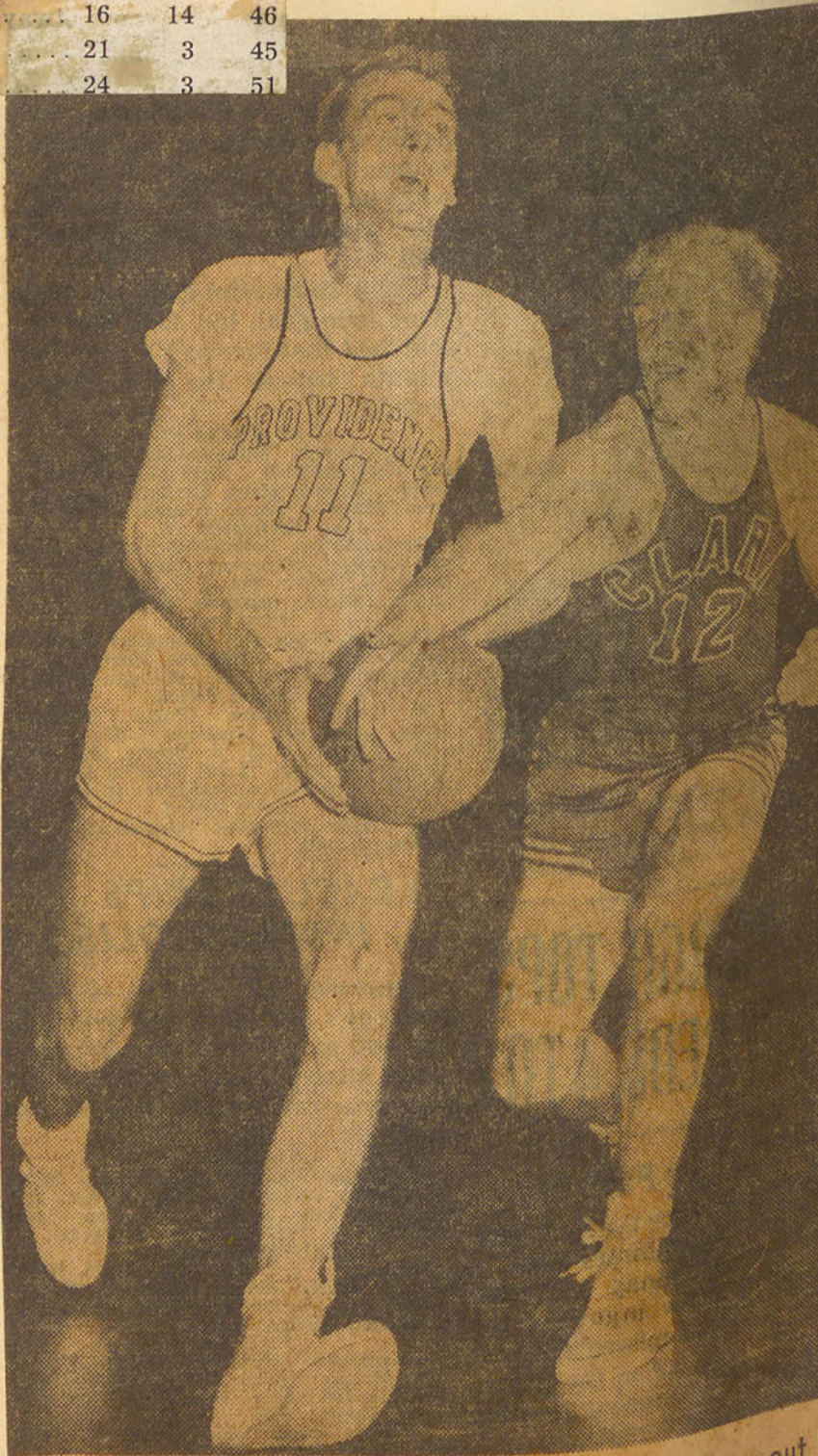

CLARK SURPRISES FRIARS, 50 TO 49

Ken Steingold Scores Winning Free Throw 12 Seconds From the End

The Providence College Friars, who had made a habit of winning on their "home" court at Mount Pleasant High, got a rude awakening last night as the Clark University quintet upset them, 50 to 49. The setback was Providence College's fourth in 14 starts.

Twin heroes for the Worcester collegians in what Coach Russ Granger said was Clark's biggest basketball victory in years and years, were Ralph Saunders and Kenny Steingold. Saunders, a sophomore, scored 22 points and Steingold, a Pawtucket resident, accounted for 15.

Steingold's free throw after he was fouled by Phil Lynch with 12 seconds remaining was the deciding marker. The hectic period proved a Waterloo for the heavily favored Friars.

Plenty of Chances

Actually the Friars had plenty of opportunities to score a victory. They cruised along from 10 to 12 points to the good through most of the middle periods. After a slow start, they took a 15-5 lead at the quarter.

At halftime, the Friars had a 24-17 lead and they ran it up to 29-17 in the first minute of the second half. Later it was 36-24 and 41-31 until Clark closed the gap a bit, with two quick hoops by Saunders and Jim Weller. The Friars started the final period leading by 41-35.

Steingold, who has been doing a fine job this season, got hot just when it did the most good. His efforts sparked Clark's surge in which they took the lead inside the first three minutes of the last pe-

riod. Steingold scored his first hoop after a scramble and then Barry Flint brought the Worcesterites within two points with a basket from the foul line.

All Alone

Kenny tied up the game after Clark shook him loose all alone under the basket and then 30 seconds later he sank a one-hander from about eight feet out. That gave his team a 43-41 lead. Foul conversions by Ray Korbusieski and Phil Lynch brought the Friars up to 43-43 but Saunders put in a rebound and it was 45-43 in Clark's favor.

Jim Schlimm's free throw and Bobby Moran's basket put the Friars ahead by one point with three minutes left. Schlimm made good on another free throw for a 47-45 lead. Flint hit on a one-hander, tying the score with 75 seconds left to play. Saunders was fouled by Hank McQueeney and scored a point with 43 seconds left and Flint added another with 23 seconds remaining.

The Friars had to get the ball and Steingold was nudged by Lynch in the aggressive milling. The Pawtucket boy took his time and the free throw gave Clark a three-point edge, 50-47. Moran scored another hoop for the Friars seven seconds before the final buzzer but Tommy Mullins' bid for the equalizer rolled off the rim.

Schlimm Checked

Moran played an outstanding game for the Friars. Schlimm was held to one basket and five points. Moran had eight of PC's 16 baskets.

Clark has proved a tough foe for the Friars on other occasions. Coach Granger said the defensive play was a big factor and his boys got fired up when they saw they could make it in the final period.

The Friars showed a letdown from some of their other games. It was the second Providence defeat on the Mount Pleasant floor in three seasons.

The Providence College Jayvees scored a 68-48 victory over the Clark Jayvees, with Ed Quinlan, Eddie Ryder and Ed Preisner pacing the Friars.

Won All The Races But Millrose

In competition outside of New England they have fared just as well; in the Washington Star Meet the Friars defeated the University of Virginia, LaSalle and the University of Richmond. The milers only bad showing came in New York at the Millrose Games, when they lost to Holy Cross and ended up last in a field of five. This race was run during exams, however, and anything can happen during the semester finals.

The milers proved though that their loss to the Crusaders was a "fluke" when they went on to defeat them at the B.A.A. in Boston and again last week at New York.

Best Mile Time 3:24:6

In New York when the Friars defeated Holy Cross they ran in the time of 3:25:2 minutes; they might have bettered this time if they were real pressed. The New York track appears somewhat slow than the Boston boards because the times in Boston have been faster. It also might be true because the boards in Boston are comparatively newer. (Providence's best time to date has been 3:24:6 minutes made in the B.A.A. relay in Boston.)

In last years I.C.4-A meet the Friar's milers ran third behind Manhattan and Georgetown and just missed out for qualifying for the finals (The first and second teams in the trial heats qualify for the evening event.) The milers would have finished first or second if it wasn't for a bad pass in handing off the stick.

Rhode Islanders Unleash Power In Handing Bates 20th Loss

Bates College's luckless hoop cluster looked for a while last night, as though it might pull an upset of major proportions, but succeeded only in agitating the Providence College cagers enough to make the visiting Friars unleash the full power of their multi-barreled attack. When the smoke cleared, Bates had dropped its 20th encounter of a disastrous season, 84 to 58.

It could have been worse. Coach Vin Cutty's smartly-trained Rhode Island operatives have ended on the short end against only four foes this season. Their conquerors were Holy Cross, Brown, Rhode Island State and Clark—none of them a disgrace to lose to Providence gave its entire 13-man squad a good sweat, but even the black-and-white reserves had too much moxie for Bates.

Coach Hank Elespuru's Bobcats were very much in the game for a half. Providence closed the opening chapter with a nine point edge, but Larry Quimby almost single-handedly boosted Bates to only a 28-27 deficit midway in the second period. The Bobcats couldn't stay hot, however, and were down 45-29 at the mid-game rest stop.

Play was a little ragged in the second half for the Bobcats and the Providence reserves refused to let up the pressure on the reeling home club.

Quimby Top Shot

Quimby shoved 17 points in the netting and big Ken Weiler added 11 more. Jim Moody cashed in with an even ten. The visitors, who edged Bowdoin 65-63 at Brunswick, Tuesday, were again paced by forward Bob Moran, who tickled the webbing for 19 tallies. Guard Phil Lynch poured in 11 during the last half action.

Again the Bates floor shooting was quite amiss, and too many shots rimmed the hoop to make

Bates a contender. The home five dunked 17 of 64 tries for a losing 26.6% while the winning Rhodies pumped 33 of 77 attempts for a 42.9%.

Bates was immense from the foul line. The Bobcats gained 24 of 30 charity tosses. Providence dunked only 18 of 31 free throws, but didn't really need the free points anyway.

Referees John Fortunato and John Bodnarik assessed 44 fouls during the tussle, a fair minimum for the ragged action in the last 20 minutes. The penalties were evenly divided, 23 against the Friars and 21 against Bates.

Three more shots remain for the Bates forces. They tackle Colby and Maine in State Series contests on the road and are host to New Hampshire here in a postponed windup.

Frosh Nipped 79-71

In a tighter, faster preliminary bout, Nichols Junior College of Dudley, Mass., squeezed the Bates Frosh 79 to 71. Ed McKinnon zipped in 20 tallies and George Shroder accounted for 13 more. Last period action was enlivened when Bob Smith, rugged Bates forward, tangled with a Nichols player following a backboard shuffle. Smith was sent to the bench for his flare-up, but time was almost run out when the incident occurred.

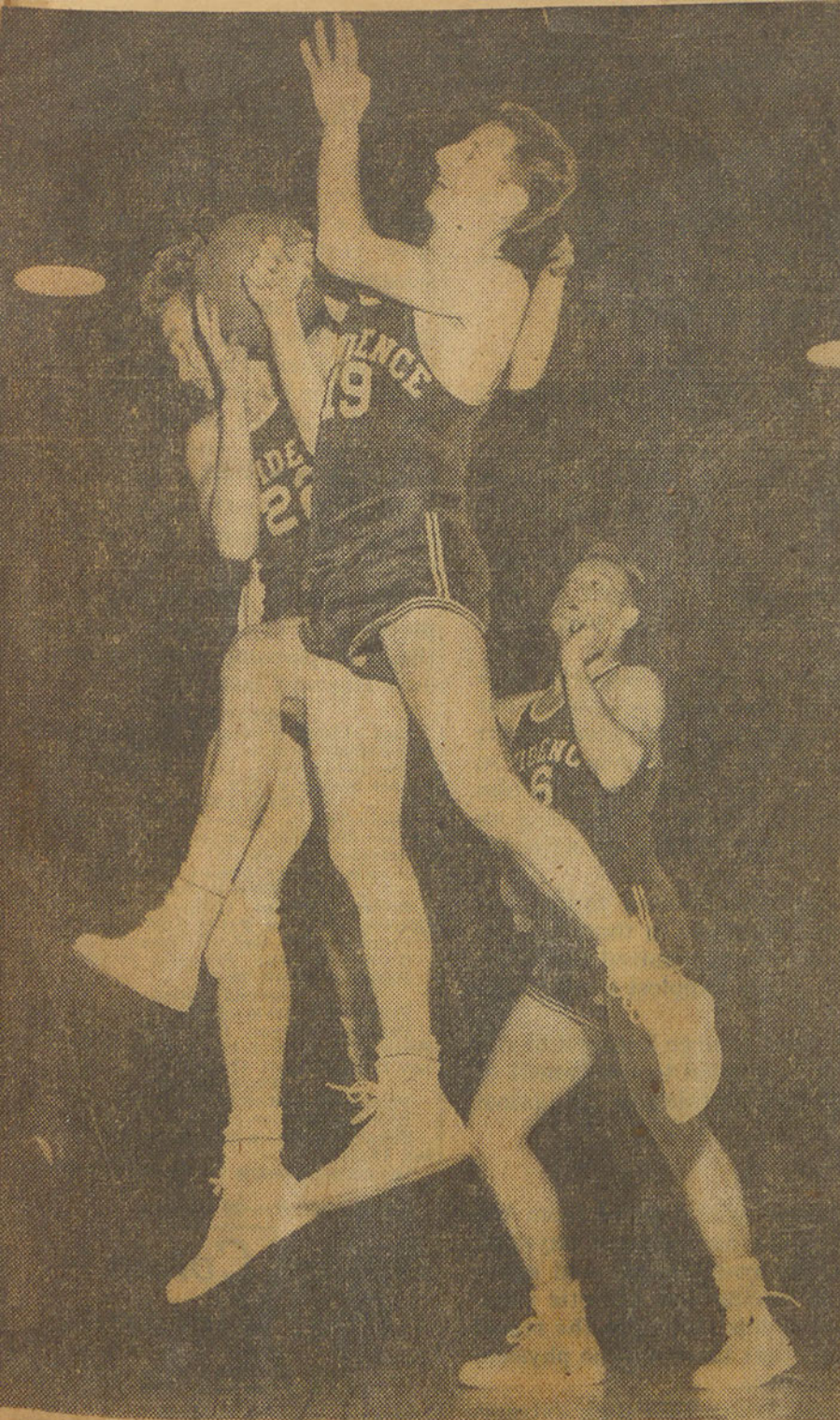

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Hoop Ace Jim Schlimm May Be First Friar To Score 1000 Points

When Jim Schlimm was learning how to shoot a basket, he took one step and fired a one-hander. As a collegian he has become so adept at his particular style of shooting that he's just 23 points away from becoming the Providence College Friars' first 1000-point player.

Schlimm shoots like nobody else. Providence rooters don't recall an unorthodox hook shooter like him. Perhaps that's because he copied no particular style as he was growing up. And like batting stances, it's the result that counts. So nobody changed him.

But when they are talking about Johnny Krieger, Bill McCue, Eddie Wineapple, Ted McConnon, Dick Bracken, Bill Kutneski and some of the other Friar greats, Schlimm belongs in that group some place. He's been stopped but he's a fine competitor and in his particular field of scoring, he's pulled off some beauties.

Good on Rebounds

If Jim was bigger and stronger defensively, he would be a natural in professional basketball. This season Schlimm has been a big help off the boards while he and Bobby Moran make up one of the strongest scoring duos the Friars have had since the coaching days of Al "General" McClellan at P.C.

"One of the best I have ever seen," is the way Coach Vin Cuddy describes his senior captain from St. Mary's, Pa. "I never saw anybody with that twist around hook shot just the way Jimmy does it. It's a gift. You can't develop it. Perhaps it could be copied but it's the touch. He's just a natural same as Moran in his style.

"Jim is one of the nicest boys I have coached at P.C. Very few ever manage to get the ball up to the hoop and keep the shot as soft as Schlimm. In several games he's come up with baskets when you would wonder how he gets rid of ball, never mind putting it in baskets.

am. It is probably the best unit, s a team, we played against but then Boston College, Rhode Island and Siena have been real good too sometimes when we were playing them.

"Biggest thrill... maybe beating Boston College in my sophomore year at Mount Pleasant. They had a great team led by Tommy O'Brien. But with all his success in basketball, Schlimm himself wishes he was more like Bob Cousy, the former Holy Cross ace now playing brilliantly with the Celtics. "That guy can do everything," Schlimm says. "He was sick the night we played them but he probably would have got 30 or 40. He's away ahead of George Mikan in my book."

Home Hoop Finale Tonight; Schlimm Seeks 1000th Point

Tonight's game against Fairfield will find five seniors playing on the familiar Mount Pleasant court for the last time. It will mark the departure of Jerry Lembo, Tom Bauer, Ronnie Gaggon, Ray Korbusieski and Jim Schlimm from the local scene but the occasion will probably be noteworthy from another angle. It might well mark, for the first time in the history of Providence College that a Friars' basketball player will have scored 1000 points.

With Jim Schlimm needing only 23 tallies to break the 1000 mark, Providence's fans will be sitting on the edge of their seats tonight, hoping to see a treat which is parallel to a no-hitter in baseball. To date Schlimm has scored a total of 977 points and he appears a cinch to surpass the 1000 mark before the end of the week.

When Jim was a Sophomore, in his first year of varsity ball, he broke the individual record for one year by scoring a total of 357 points. Up to that time, Ted McConnon had set the previous high, in the 1941-42 season when he amassed a total of 309 tallies. That was the year when the Friars placed second in the country in team high-scoring with an average of 62 points.

The fact that Schlimm broke the record in his Sophomore year seems all the more surprising when it is realized that he played as a reserve during most of the schedule. It was not until the eleventh contest, against Iona, that Schlimm started as a regular. Since the eventful Iona encounter, in which Jim marked his debut as a starter by 21 points, his name has

never been absent from the starting five.

It seems that Jim was not satisfied with establishing a record and letting it stand and in his Junior year (1950-51), he cracked his mark of the previous season by scoring 371 points. Jim averaged 15.7 for 24 games that season. Jim received added laurels when he was chosen to the regional N.A.I.B. All-Star squad, in addition to being awarded All-New England honorable mention.

Although he has never reached the coveted 30 point circle he has come close many times. His high game total is 27 markers made against St. Peter's two years ago. Against our arch-rival, State, Jim seems to be at his best. In the 1949-50 campaign he tallied 21 and

26 points against Rhody, as a junior it was 21 and 15, and this year it is 23 markers with one encounter left.

Jim's success can be attributed to two factors: his coach, Vin Cuddy, who has labored diligently to improve him, and his own tireless efforts. As a result of this combination P.C. has produced its finest basketball player.

The 6'3½" Schlimm comes to us from the small town of St. Mary's, Pa., (pop. 12,000), where he was an outstanding high school ball player at St. Mary's Catholic. In his senior year he paced the team in scoring by garnering 400 points. This small town should be quite familiar to P.C.ers since it has produced a wealth of material for the Friars' cause. Our present Tom Bauer, who incidently will also be playing his last game at the Mount, and Sam Nissel, of last year's quintet, both are residents of St. Mary's.

Most people think of Jim as strictly a scorer; a possessor of a hook shot from the bucket or a two-handed push from the outside, but they fail to realize that Slim Jim is the squad's leading rebounder. Too many people tend to disregard Jim because he is not the "Fancy Dan" type of ball player but to those people I recommend a look at the record book after the game to see who has gathered in all the rebounds and scored all the points. It is usually a lad named, Jim.

My personal opinion as to why Schlimm is one of the best ball players in the country is his ability to get his shot away fast. Jim lets the ball fly towards the basket so soon after he gets it that it is impossible to defend against it. In fact Jim has let the ball swish through the basket to the tune of 977 points. Good Luck!

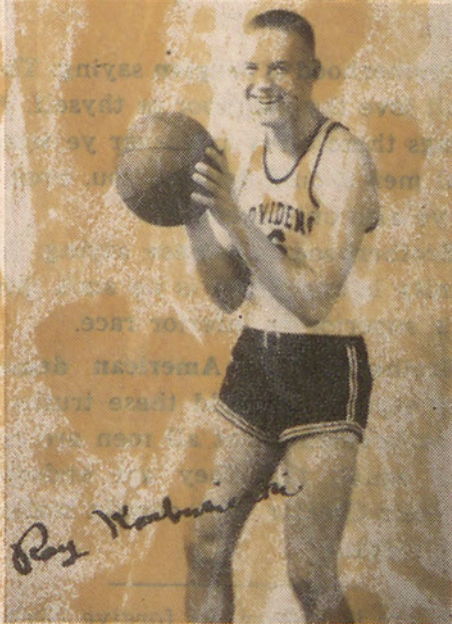

ter blanket over Portland and vicinity and the team was stranded in Portsmouth, N. H.

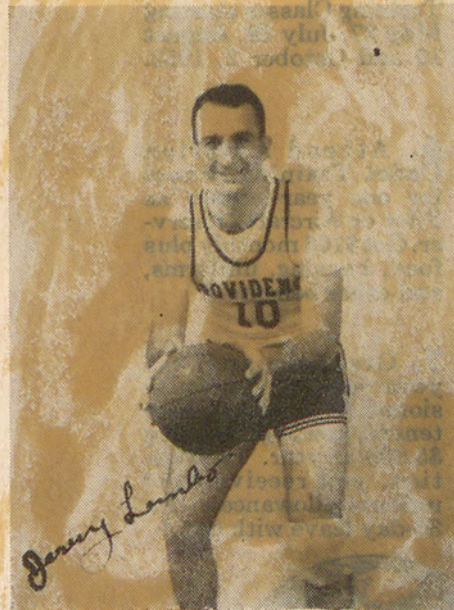
Beat Fairfield 67-64

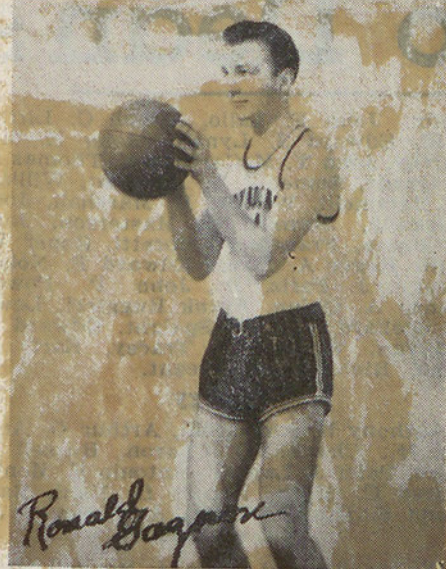
this time they stand a good chance of bringing home the bacon. Their unprecedented perfect road trip is the cause for all this optimism.

It was warm and comfortable in the coaches' office at Harkins Hall as Coach Harry Coates went out to put his Providence College relay men through their paces. Out on the board track on Hendricken Field a snowy northeaster was kicking up.

Later Harry came back to talk about track. His Friars will tackle Colgate, Syracuse, Villanova and Columbia in the mile relay tomorrow night in the New York K. of C. games. The boys were invited back to the Garden on the basis of a fine showing previously in New York but they have their work cut out against this quartet.

Although not up to Manhattan's crack team which recently set a new world's record on an 11-lap track, the Friars are a competent team. They have won four times—Washington Star meet, Boston K. of C., BAA and the N.Y.A.C.—in seven starts.

Anchoring the quartet is Bob Tiernan, one of a family of athletes. His oldest brother, Joe, was a fine goalie at Hope. Paul was outstanding in hockey and track at La Salle and later ran for Manhattan. Jim is the current captain of the La Salle hockey team and played end for the Maroons in football.

'Battling Fool'

Bob Tiernan was all-state center in hockey and gave it up for track while a student at La Salle. On the other hand, Frank Lussier, a senior, never did much running before he came to Bradley Hill. He wanted to be a basketball player but when the coach didn't use him too often, he quit the team and turned his sporting interest to track.

Johnny Cassedy is just a 'battling fool' in Harry's book. "That boy lays it on the line every time he runs a race," Harry said. "He's a great competitor. Last Saturday night he got a second in "500" in the Jersey City CYO meet. But you know a boy like that runs as far and as fast as he's able. And he follows instructions if you tell him to run a certain way."

Jim Penler, a senior who ran the fastest quarter on the Friars' track this season, sometimes is the lead-off man. He's been a member of most of the winning Friar relay teams in the past three seasons with few exceptions. He's got speed but doesn't always pace himself.

Another fast man is freshman Paul Methia from New Bedford. Paul has run the fastest two laps on the PC track of any of the current team although Harry says he can't beat Bob Tiernan. Bob's 49.5 quarter last season so far is the best Friar mark at that distance.

"Getting out front is the big

thing in the relay," Harry said, "so you have to have a speedy man who can get you on top at the start. And you have your four best men in there, you can't carry anybody and keep your team rolling. After the seven races, there isn't much doubt who the best men are."

Close Finish

"We ran a good race against Manhattan in a mile handicap at New York. That was on the flat. Fordham, NYU, Manhattan and us finished fairly close together. There wasn't much real difference that night. Penler twice ran practically a dead heat with Bob Carty, the Manhattan anchor man, at the Penn relays, although Carty got the decision. That shows how fast he can travel."

"Our gang has beaten most of the New England mile teams—Holy Cross, Boston College, Brown twice, Maine, M.I.T. and B.U. twice. We haven't met Yale or Harvard in the mile and we might beat Yale but comparative times aren't always what they seem to be. We did 3:25 in Boston on our best night but I think we are capable of hitting 3:22 or so with good baton passing and good running.

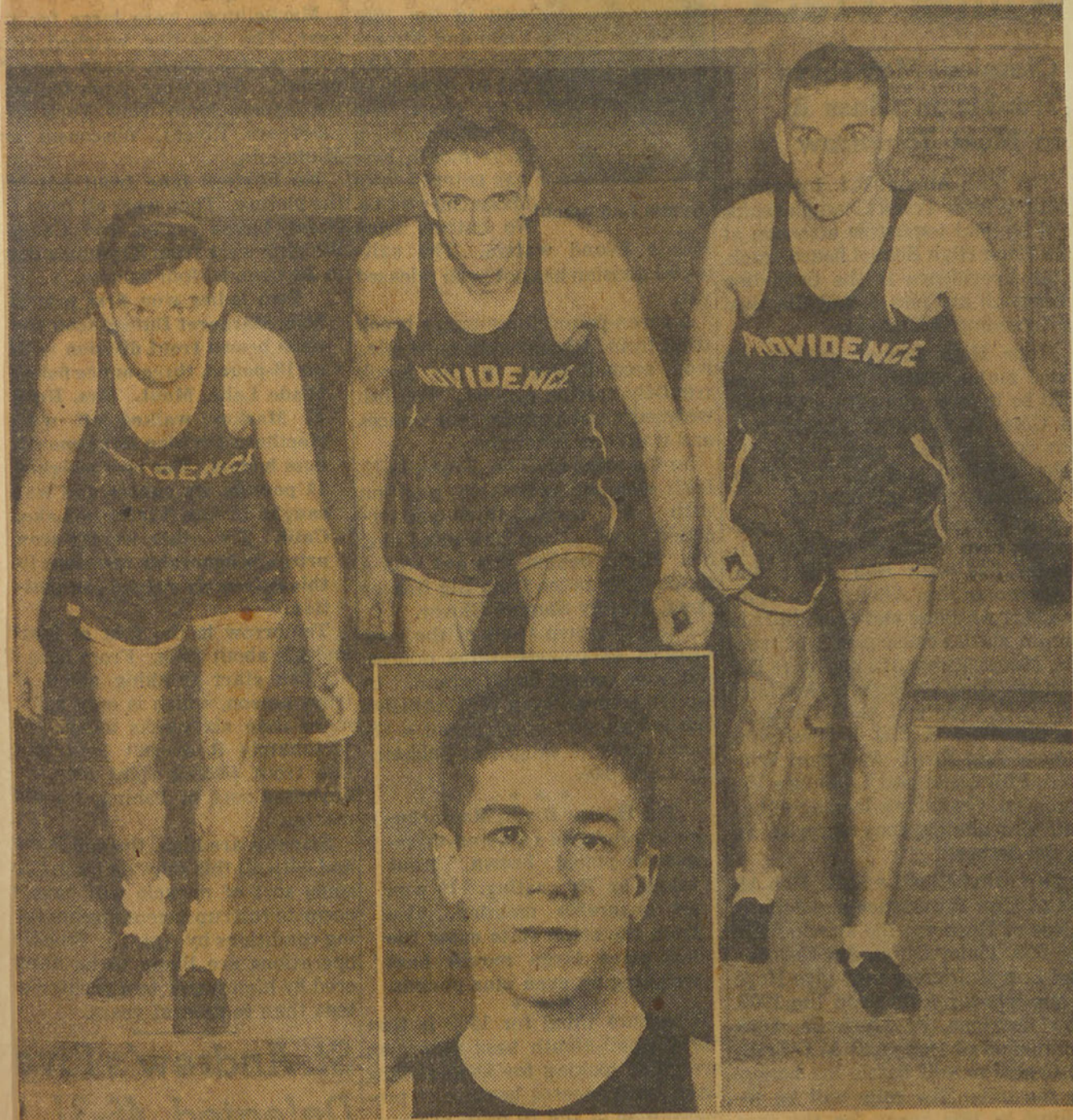
When Manhattan did 3:17.6 for the mile recently in Boston, Harry was vividly carried back to another race in which Georgetown set a world's record of 3:17.2. The latter time was made over a 9-lap track at the Bronx Coliseum.

As Harry describes the race, Seton Hall was leading on the last lap when a Colgate man grabbed the Setonian. In the commotion, the Hoya's Hugh Short shot through the gap at the pole and sprinted the final yards for the record. That night the Seton Hall Prep team set a world mark for preps and Short equaled the "600" mark held by John Borican, three record performances.

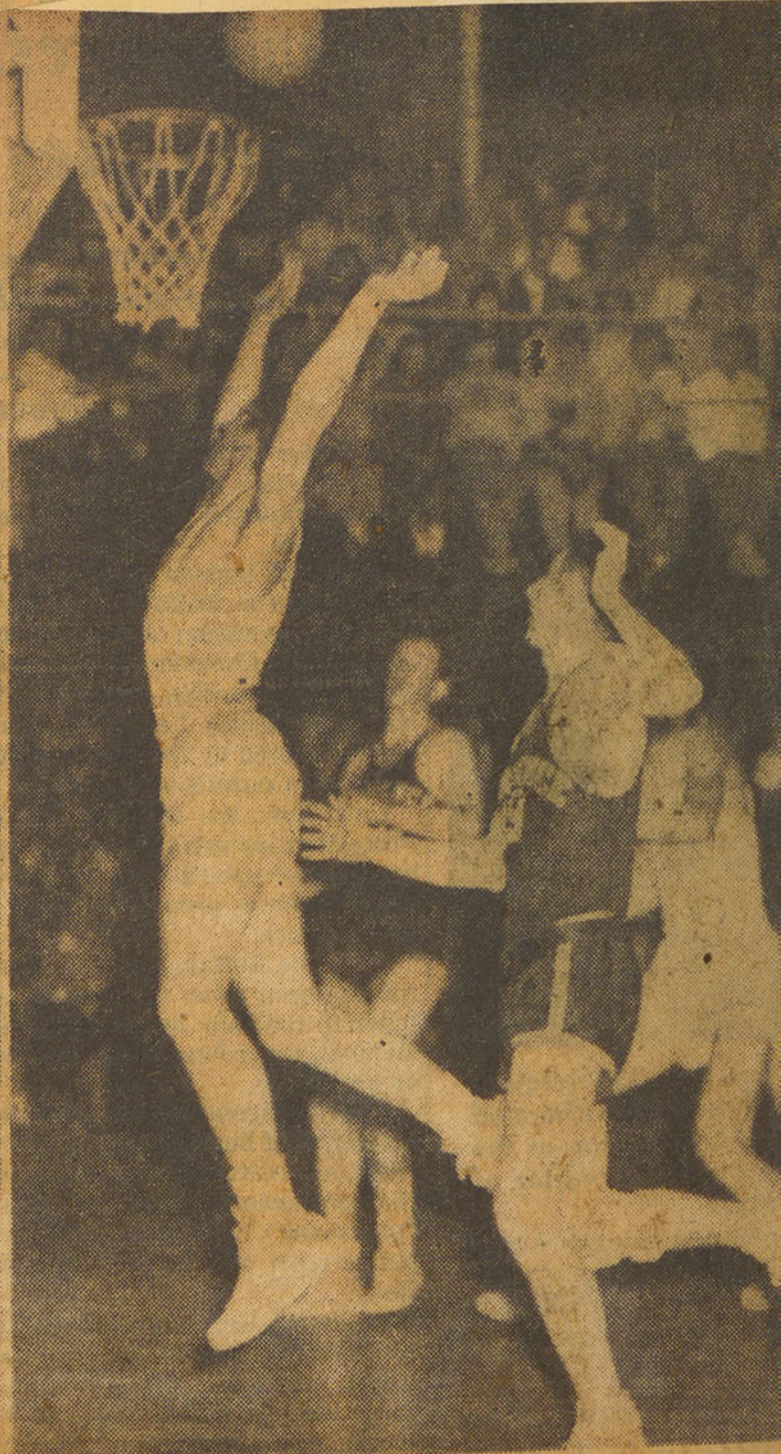
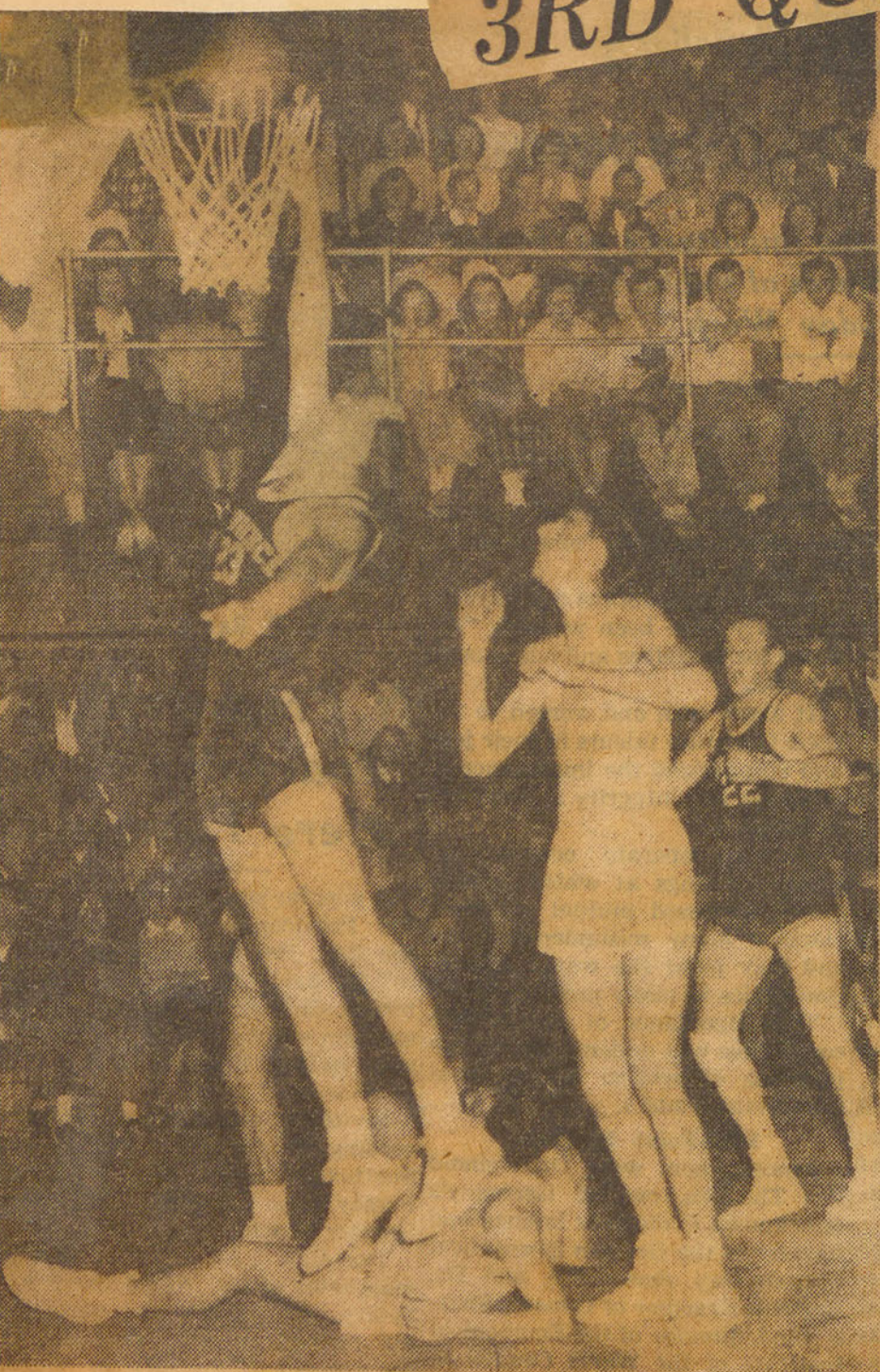

BAIRD, SCHLIMM, CONGLETON GAIN SCORING HEIGHTS

Latter Sets Game Record for
Year of 36; Others Pass
the 1000 Mark

The University of Rhode Island switched on the power in the third quarter last night and ran up a 98-82 basketball victory over Providence College at Rodman Hall, Kingston.

All sorts of individual scoring feats were booked. Fred Congleton scored 36 points for a season's one-game high for the Rams and his teammate, Billy Baird, reached and passed a total of 1000 points for his three-year college career.

And the Friars' Capt. Jim Schlimm also got over the 1000-point mark for his four years of college competition. Each total included freshman points.

(The Rams' point total, incidentally, was their third best of the season.)

These individual performances were roundly appreciated and applauded by the audience of approximately 1100 persons, but they were incidental to the interesting, hectic and, for the first half, close game.

Solve Defense

Actually, the closeness prevailed for about three minutes into the third quarter. At that point, the Friars had snipped the Rams' half-time lead of 41-30 to just seven points, 48-41, and they appeared to be back in the contest.

Then it happened. The Rams, playing with dash and deftness in the next seven minutes, cut through the Friars' man-to-man defense and piled up a lead of 74-51 by the end of the third quarter. That wrapped up the ball game and gave the Rams a surprisingly large victory over a club they had managed to defeat by only six points, 60-54, in their previous game.

The victory also put Rhode Island back in contention for the intrastate championship and, at the same time, put the Friars out of it. The Rams now have a 2-1 record in the series with one more game with Brown. Brown has a 2-0 card with two games left. The Friars have lost three, with one more to play.

Plenty of Help

Congleton, in addition to his shooting show, also played an excellent floor game, but he wasn't the only star for the Rams. Baird got 20 points for himself and Chuck Stewart had his set shot working and it got him 11 points.

In addition, Ed Hole distinguished himself by guarding well the Friars' leading scorer for the season, Bob Moran. The latter got 17 points, but 10 of these came in the second half when the Rams were thoroughly in control.

Bob Prendergast, the Friars' big center, had a good offensive night and scored 22 points—his team's high. Schlimm and Ray Korbusieski got 11 each. Tom Mullins and Hank McQueeney also worked well for the Friars.

Prendergast was the man who got the Friars off to an adequate start, scoring seven of his team's first nine points. The Friars, with this to work on, were ahead, 13-8, at the five-minute point, but it didn't last. Congleton tapped in a foul shot that missed and, at seven minutes, the Rams went ahead, 16-15, and stayed ahead the rest of the way.

Rams Get Rolling

After three minutes of sloppy basketball by each team after the intermission, the Rams got rolling. That seven-point lead (48-41) quickly grew to 64-42 in two minutes of play and they continued to pile it on until they had a 20-point margin.

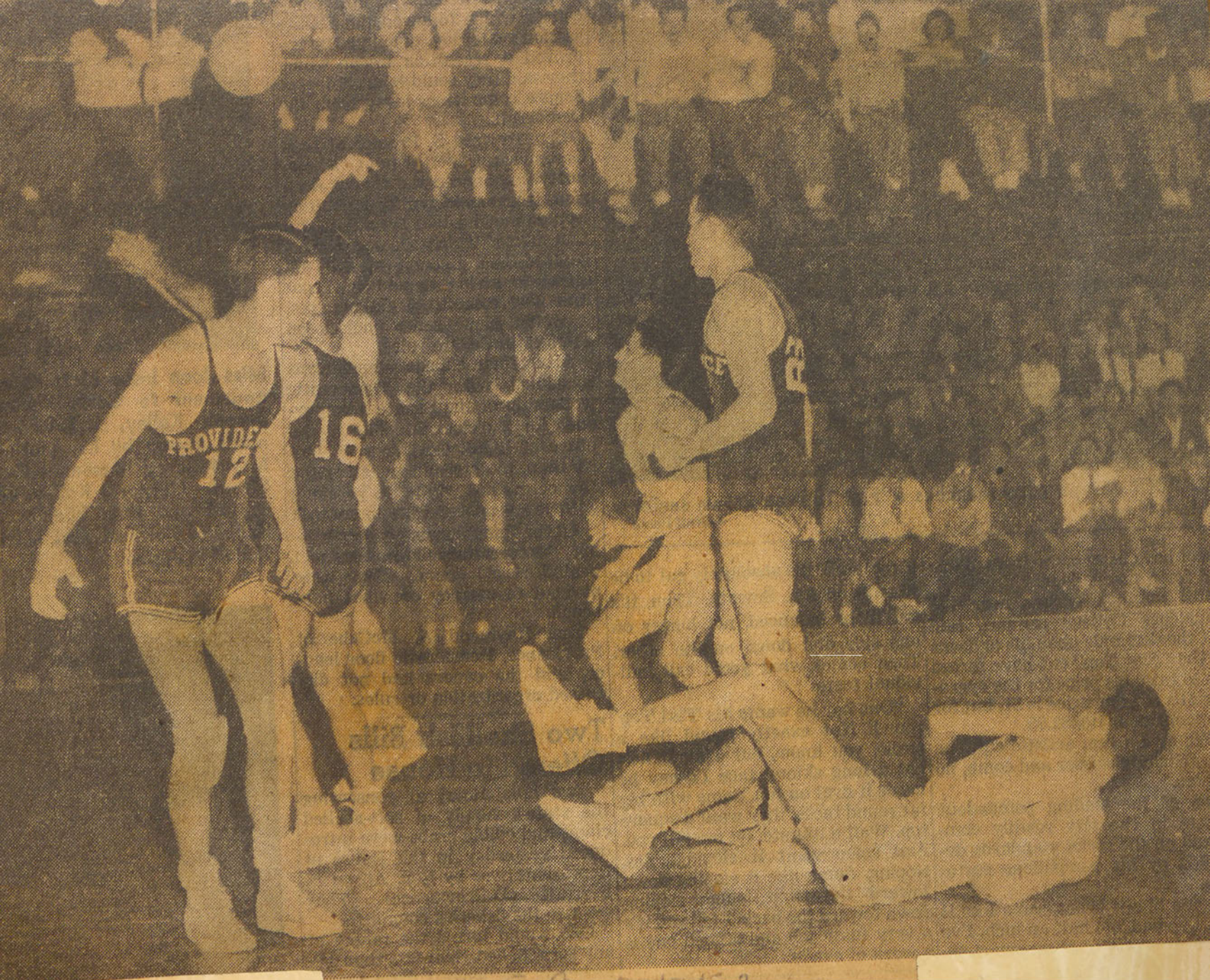
An indication of their excellence during this spree is the fact that they made almost one-third—12—of their floor baskets in this third quarter. They made, in all, 37 out of 93 shots, compared to the Friars' 29 out of 95. Each team made 24 out of 36 fouls.

The defeat was the Friars' sixth against 13 victories. For the Rams it was victory No. 9. They have lost 12.

In the preliminary, the Rams' freshman team defeated the Friar junior varsity, 70-65.

Congleton was not the only man to turn a feat in scoring, however. Each club had a man who reached and passed the 1000-point mark for his college career.

Ceremonies

Finally, near the end of the game, Boyle unlimbered and spoke and the 1100 spectators gave Baird his due. The total for each man included his freshman points. Baird is a junior, Schlimm a senior.

Such business aside, this was quite a basketball game for slightly more than two quarters. The Friars took an early lead, as Bob Prendergast scored seven of his team's first nine points, but the Rams took over at the seven-minute mark of the

first quarter and remained in front the rest of the way.

They led at the half, 41-30, suffered the pangs as a mild PC rally cut this to 48-41 early in the third quarter, then settled down to business. The result was that they poured in the points and, by the end of the third quarter, had the game stashed away on a 74-51 lead.

Still staggering from two defeats during the past week, Providence College is struggling to retain its balance in time for the opening doubleheader of the New England NAIB Tournament tonight. It's Lou Murgó and Co. this Saturday at Marvel. The Bruins pulled a big upset over on the hill when they stopped the Friars back in Dec., but things should be different this time, with the coming onto the scene of Bob Prendergast. Look for Murgó to be stopped again by Tommy Mullins and Phil Lynch. The Friars, stopped by Fairfield, 68-67, and R.I.U., 98-82, during the past week, will probably do battle with A.I.C. in the opener of a twin bill at Colby's Mayflower Hill Fieldhouse in Waterville, Maine. Bridgeport and Colby figure to round out the first night's action in the second game. Tomorrow evening the winners will meet to determine who'll be the lucky club to spend a few days in Kansas City in the national tourney, while the losers will meet in a consolation contest.

Colby looms as the favorite, especially since they're entering the fray as the host club, while Bridgeport U. must be regarded as the tournament "darkhorse." The Mules from Maine are regarded by most observers as the greatest quintet the state has ever produced, which is going some. They have a fast and sure handling Mutt and Jeff combination which features small guards and a trio up front which averages 6'5". This combination has suffered only three defeats, with Coast Guard being the only New England outfit to turn the trick.

Big man in the Colby attack is Frank Piacentini, 6'3" forward and member of the All-Maine team. Averaging 17 points per game, the lean junior is backed by playmaker Johnny Jabar, the Mules' aggressive captain, and 6'7" center Ted Lallier. However, these three are just the outstanding contents of a prize package. Coach Williams, employing the best

football tradition, has used what may be described as a two platoon system, and has found spots for all of his 14 man squad in most of the games this season.

A.I.C. has been improving consistently since they dropped a decision to P.C., 55-49, back on Dec. 11. Nick Rodis has two outstanding ball players in Al Zordan and Bert Butters, and he can also boast three large jads in Russ Matteson, Ray Shekowski, and Harry Collins. This long trio averages 6'4". Incidentally, P.C. and American International are the only two teams in the tourney who have tangled previously. From the looks of things, A.I.C. will prove tougher up North than they did over at Mount Pleasant, when only six points separated them from the victorious Friars.

Bridgeport, unbeaten on their home court, has been highly successful while shouldering an impressive 26-game schedule. In addition, the Purple Knights have held several opponents below 50 points this season, which is some going in this day of throw - it - the - length-of-the-floor-or-

shoot basketball. Coach Herb Glines boasts a prolific scorer in Lou Saccone, a glue-fingered rebounder in Gus Seaman, and a talented all-around performer in co-captain Dick LaBash. U. B. holds an 85-66 victory over Fairfield, recent conquerer of the Friars. Saccone has scored 329 points, while averaging 17 points per contest; Seaman has hit for an even 300; and LaBash has been good for 286 markers.

It's an impressive aggregation that the Friars have agreed to meet for travelling rights to the Corn Belt, but you can bet that there are three coaches in different corners of New England suffering nightmares over the prospect of stopping Vin Cuddy's crew. Mr. C. has Jim Schlimm, who laid claim to his 1000th point last Friday, Bobby Moran, who has stunned opponents all season long while compiling a 19-point average, and long Robert Prendergast, who has come to the fore in the last three games with 17 points against Springfield, 18 against Fairfield, and 22 against Rhode Island.

Although the relayers finished third, they ran a good race and finished in the time of approximately 3:25.

Particularly pleasing was the fine showing of Frank Lussier, who ran his quarter mile leg in 49.8 seconds, an excellent time. Making his appearance on the mile squad for the first time this season was John McMullen. John has been handicapped since the Christmas holidays with a bad knee, but on the basis of last Saturday's showing, it looks like John is raring to go.

Completing the combination in the K. of C. meet were Bob Tiernan and Paul Methia, both of whom turned in their usual good performances. Jack Cassedy was unable to race in this meet because of a slight case of the flu.

Had the milers been placed in another heat last week they would probably have been able to come home with a first place, but because of their previous fine showing in the Garden (N. Y.), they were invited back to compete against the "big boys." To get an idea of the strength of Syracuse and Colgate, one only has to look at the I.C.-4A results when both teams reached the final and placed two-three behind Manhattan in the official tabulations.

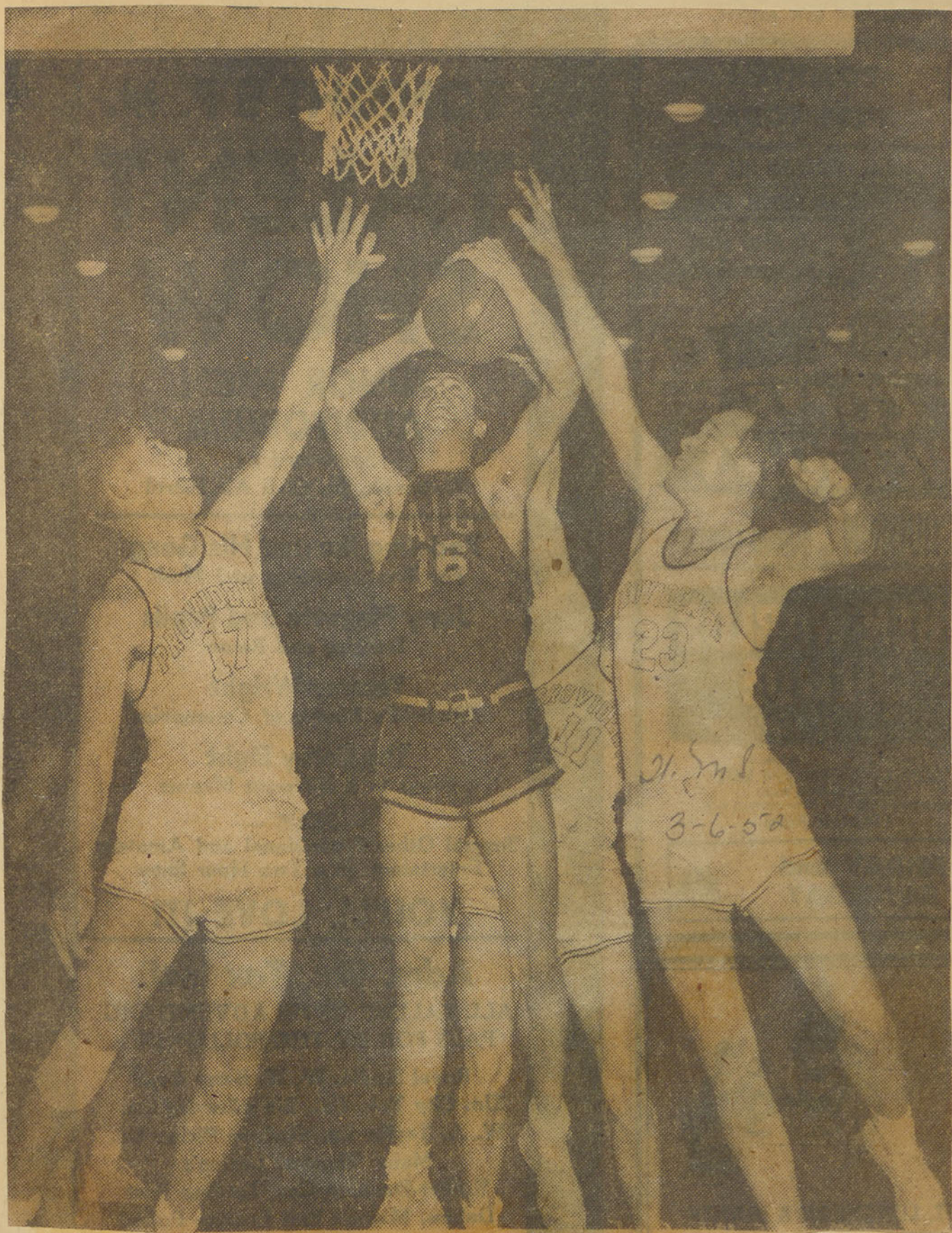

P.C. Point Total Is Highest in
History of Series; Bear

Four years of basketball defeats at Marvel Gymnasium ended for Providence College last night as the Friars finally beat Brown and did it decisively, 84-66, before 1100 spectators.

Except for a brief Brown splurge in the first quarter, the Friars bossed the game all the way. They were particularly adept in the second half and this enabled them to pile up the highest score a team has compiled in this series.

Further, it gave Vin Cuddy the first victory over Brown in his three years as the Friars' coach as well as the team's first triumph at Marvel Gym since Jan. 24, 1948. (The Friars play their "home" game on the Brown court.)

Secondarily, the victory gave Rhode Island University, which completed its season last Wednesday, the intrastate championship with a 3-1 record. The defeat cost Brown a tie for the title and its record stands at 2-2. The Friars had only last night's satisfaction and a 1-3 record to show in the series.

About the only thing Brown salvaged was a victory in the freshman game, in which the Cubs defeated the Friar junior varsity, 84-75. This gave the Cubs a 17-2 record for the season, the best mark for a Brown freshman team since the game went modern.

the past eight games, no matter what their previous showings, the Bruins would go on from there and win it. But not this time.

This time the Friars overtook the Bruins and went ahead again just before the quarter, 20-19. From there in, they were never less than three points ahead and, in the second half, poured in the points on a fast-break, sharp-passing game.

Jim Schlimm, Bobby Moran, Bob Prendergast and Jerry Lembo led the offensive portion of the spree and Tom Mullins and Ray Korbuciski were the defensive stars. The latter two took turns guarding Lou Murgo, Brown's best shooter, and limited him to just four floor baskets, two of them in the first half.

Each team captain tied for high-scoring honors. Schlimm got 19, mainly off his left-handed hook shot, and Brown's Marty Badoian got the same number. He was hitting with his set shot and had, in addition, some luck with a driving hook shot.

Bob MacConnell scored 15 points for Brown's second high and Lembo, as active as any man on the court, scored 14.

The Friars' only letup occurred in that first quarter. Then their floor shooting fell off and Brown took its only lead of the game. But the Friars stayed close on free shots. They went dead with the score 11-7 against them and six of their next eight points came solely on fouls.

Brown meanwhile, ran its total only to 18 points, so the Friars were down just three points (18-15) when they found the scoring formula again. From then on, it was all theirs.

The game was the season's last for each club and the result gave the Friars a record of 14 victories and eight defeats and Brown five victories and 14 defeats.

Rams Will Try to Shake R. I. Auditorium 'Hex'

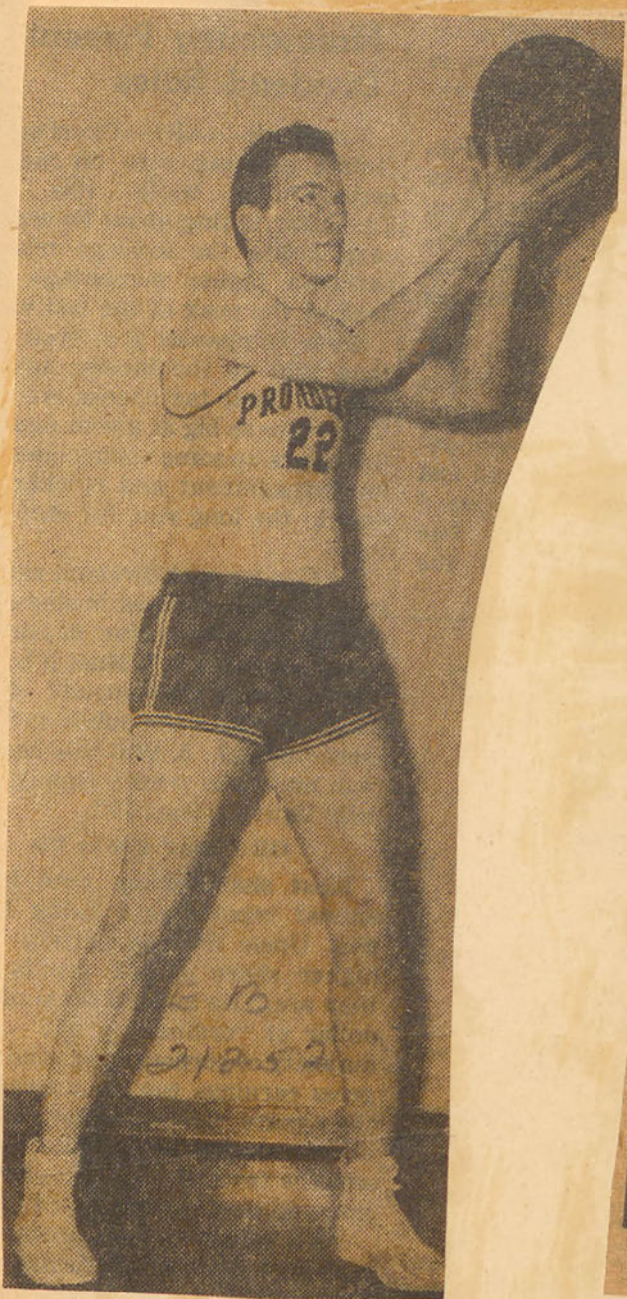
