


### Corrigan Wins P.C. Road Race; O'Brien Is 2nd

Jim Corrigan, La Salle's captain and the state's outstanding schoolboy distance runner, finished a perfect season in local cross-country competition yesterday by winning the first annual Providence College invitation road race.

Making his first start since injuring his ankle in the New England championships Nov. 8, Corrigan left no doubt that the ankle was mended and that he was back in top form again. At the tape he led Cranston's Al O'Brien by 100 yards in a time of 15.28 for three miles.

The victory was Corrigan's fourth in local interscholastic meets in addition to his dual-meet triumphs. He placed fifth in the New Englands, but was the first Rhode Islander home in a time of

A field of eight, representing Barrington, Mt. Pleasant, Chanston and La Salle participated in the road race which may become an annual event at Providence College. Five medals, including a sold one for first place and silver for second, will be awarded to the first five finishers.

Al DeAngelis of Mt. Pleasant was the early leader with teammates Tom Richard and Anthony Gallagher and Corrigan just a few steps behind. Corrigan took the lead from DeAngelis on the hill at Huxley Avenue the first time around the course and gradually widened it for the rest of the race.

The meet ended the crosscountry season for local schoolboy runners. Indoor track workouts are expected to begin the first week in December.

Friars Schedule Schoolboy Relay Next Saturday

Eleven schools, including the crack Bayonne, N.J. high quartet, have filed entries for the fourth annual Providence College fourmile high school relay which will be run over the Friars' board track Saturday afternoon, it was announced this morning by Harry Coates, P.C. track coach.

Five Rhode Island high schools and six out-of-state teams representing various sections of New England and the eastern seaboard comprise the field at the moment. One more team may enter.

St. Augustine's of Brooklyn, N. Y., last year's champion, will be back to defend its crown but faces a rugged rival in the talented Bayonne quartet which will probably enter the event as the favorite. Other out-of-state schools are Danbury (Conn.) High School which is coached by Dan O'Grady, former La Salel coach; Hyde Park (Mass.) High School which will be led by Dave Dahl, winner of the New England Cross-Country crown; Concord (Mass.) High School and New Bedford Vocational.

The Rhody delegation is headed by La Salle Academy. Also entered are Mount Pleasant, Woonsocket, St. Raphael and Hope, 1949 winner and holder of the relay record of 18:59.4. # How to Score Minus Schlimm Friar Problem

Providence's Lineup Pretty Much Same Except for Big Jim

The Providence College Friars, with a month of conditioning behind them, open their 22-game schedule tonight at Mount Pleasant High, facing Gorham State Teachers. The visitors from Maine have broken even in two starts so far.

The Friars are not without game-experience, however, as they met the University of Connecticut, Amherst and the U.S. Coast Guard Academy teams in their preseason preparations, and also scrimmaged the strong Newport OCS team.

The Providence lineup is pretty much the same as last season with one major exception. However, Coach Cuddy is wondering where the points that Jim Schlimm contributed fairly consistently to the PC attack over the last three seasons are going to come from. Schlimm, one of the best scorers in New England, graduated last June and is in the Army.

Bobby Moran, who was a sophomore star last year, is the Friars' big gun. He scored 383 points last year and has been off to a brilliant start in the Providence workouts. Bobby is an accomplished set shot.

Gorham, coached by John Bodnarik Jr., opened its season with an 86-50 victory over Lyndon Teachers and dropped an 80-72 decision to Bates Monday night. A year ago the Hilltoppers won 10 out of 16 games as center John Darling registered 388 points for a 24.3 average. Gorham has a small male enrollment but has been fairly successful in basketball in its level of competition.

The Friars haven't been able to scout their foes. But coach Lee Williams of Colby told Cuddy that Gorham had some pretty good shooters when the Mules played them last season and had some of the same personnel this year.

With tonight's game, the PC quintet launches a series of three games in five nights. Following Gorham, Providence meets Assumption Saturday night in Worcester and St. Anselm's on Sunday at Manchester, N.H.

The Friars' starting team will include, Tommy Mullins and Hank McQueeney at guards, Ken Kerr and Moran at forwards and Bob Prendergast at center. Jack Reynolds, Phil Lynch and John "Beaver" Power also rate with the starters and will see much service.

Providence has 10 games listed for its "home" court at Mount Pleasant High, including the second game of the Brown series, and will meet Rhode Island and Manhattan at the Auditorium.

\*Coach Hal Martin's freshman squad has three games in three nights starting with tonight's preliminary with Leicester Junior College, scheduled for 7 o'clock. The PC-Gorham game is listed for 8:30 o'clock.

### Nashua's 38-Year-Old Tebbetts Really 40—And From Burlington

Montpelier, Vt.—(AP)—Now it appears that George Robert "Birdie". Tebbetts, newly appointed manager of the Indianapolis American Association club, knows neither his real age nor his birthplace.

During all of his playing career, the Baseball Register listed Tebbetts, former Detroit Tigers, Boston Red Sox and Cleveland Indians' catcher, as having been born in Nashua, N.H., on Nov. 10, 1914.

Yesterday during a lull in the baseball meetings in Phoenix, Ariz., "Birdie" confessed he was 43 instead of 38. "You know club owners aren't interested in you if you're too old," he explained.


An examination of the birth records filed with the Vermont secretary of state reveal that Tebbetts actually is 40, having been born in Burlington on Nov. 10, 1912. His family moved to Nashua during his early childhood.

"Birdie's" 1934 classmates at Providence College always snick-

ered when his age was mentioned.

"If 'Birdie' was born in 1914, he would have graduated with me when he was only 19," one of his classmates pointed out. "'Birdie' always was smart—but not that smart."

#### **Gorham Five Provides 'Satisfactory Opener'** With Aggressive Play

The tall Friars had their work cut out for them for a time as the Maine team played hustling, aggressive basketball, despite being well outsized in manpower. game proved a fairly satisfactory opener for the Friars.

Bobby Moran took scoring hon- 33-19, at halftime. ors for the Friars with 18 points. He played a fine floor game and picked up on his scoring during the second half. However it was the driving efforts of Tommy Mullins and Phil Lynch that seemed to give the Friars the lift when they needed it.

Gorham wasn't as easy as the score would indicate. It had a fine front combination of Capt. Harry True and Chet Koceika and Tony Wedge, a freshman hookshot artist, was the game's high scorer with 24. The pace told on the Maine team more than it did on the Friars.

#### Fast Break Tells

Gorham's pesty ball-stealing hurt the Friars during the first half, with the Maine club playing them practically even. Providence led, 18-17. at the end of the first quarter and held a three-point lead at halftime, 31-28, as Bob Prendergast, Moran and Hank McQueeney led a fivepoint surge during the closing min-

Providence, despite a drive by Lynch and Mullins, couldn't shake the visitors during the first six minutes of the third quarter. Leading, 41-40, the Friars later scored 11 points on a fast-breaking game while Gorham was limited to a single hoop by Wedge. This drive broke the game open and the Friars had an 11-point lead, 55-44, at the quarter.

After that, it was more or less a question of the score as the Friars were coming and Gorham was tiring badly. After the reserves had taken over with a 21-point advantage, Gorham picked up a little, but the Providence bench acquitted itself well when the chance came.

#### Big Total

Moran seems to be off to another fine season, Mullins and Lynch will help plenty. Prendergast dropped in several key shots and Mc-Queeney, Kenny Kerr, Beaver Power and Jack Durkin all showed flashes of fine play. Once the Friars had got started and over their early nervousness, they The Providence College Friars looked like the makings of a fairly good ball club. Gorham was a good test in that respect.

Last night's total topped by one point the highest mark the Friars turned in last season, against Massachusetts. Prendergast's 11-point total is an improvement for the Friars' big man. However, the Friars' work on rebounds generally wasn't consistent.







Later, Birdie announced that actually he is now 43 years old and the five year difference between his true and his public

The pact had been between Birdie and the sportswriters, who agreed to wince only slightly when they mentioned the official age carried against Birdie's name on squad rosters.

A few years back a reported asked Birdie, "How old

are you?"

His blue eyes stared the questioner in the eye as Birdie answered, "How old was I last year?"

The reporter said he couldn't remember.

"I can't either," said the Nashua song-bird, "and in the absence of any other information why don't we agree to use the age that is printed in the book?"

The book referred to was the Baseball Register which carries the alleged ages of all the athletes. By cross checking references in the book, a sound research man would have discovered that Birdie was a boy genius. He graduated from Providence College in 1934 which, according to his published birth date would have made him 19 years old on commencement day.

Deduct four years of college, two years of prep school and four years of high school, and there you have the picture of a boy prodigy graduating from grammar school at the age of 9 years. An amazing scholar, no doubt.

#### HAD AGREEMENT WITH REPORTERS

All the reporters who cover sports agreed many years ago that Birdie's age would be a secret until the day he quit playing. They reminded him of the joint secret once in while when he got out of line, but they didn't break out with the truth. He was always able to keep the myth going he was still a young fellow trying to get along, although there were reporters who as college freshmen remembered covering games at Boston College at which Birdie, a senior, was catching for Providence College.

Maintaining the fraud was the least the reporters could do for the fiery little gentleman. As a player, he was one of the few Red Sox with a tremendous urge to win. Birdie were other catchers of more mechanical ability than and most of the big leaguers could bang the ball harder and more frequently, but no one in the game ever gave it more undivided attention then Birdie.

He was what the British call "a great occasion player."
In 1950, when the spring had gone from his legs, at the age of 40, he hitched himself together and gave the finest days onstration of catching the Red Sox had seen since the

At the time he was not in good favor with the Red Sox management. Steve O'Neill was managing the club and relations between the two of them were on the cold side. They had to win this one or forget about the pennant.

Off the bench came Birdie. He caught the whole game and as the last pitch of a winning game reached his glove, he made a dramatic gesture. He grabbed the ball in his bare hand and held it high in the air while he turned slowly. It was the defiant act of a tough little guy showing the crowd that he could still catch the big games—the ones which had

Birdie knew then that he was finished with the Red Sox although he didn't get traded officially until he made an offseason speech about the "juvenile malcontents" on the Red Sox pitching staff. Saying that he was traded is a weasel way of putting it. Actually, he was given away, although catchers, even old catchers, were hard to find. He had wort out his welcome among the sensitive Red Sox players who resented his demands for more hustle on the field.

What are the odds against his reaching the major leagues as a manager? They're pretty strong against any minor league manger, especially a driving type, but Birdie is an unusual person. As a player he demanded the best from his pitchers, most of whom were drawing more salary than he was, One Red Sox pitcher stopped speaking to Birdie because on several occasions he fired the ball back at the pitcher so hard it bruised his hand.

Birdie explained later that he was sick of catching "choke-up" throws, but the pitcher wouldn't listen. He got stuffy about it and cut Birdie dead socially. Birdie didn't mind. He wished to have no part of "choke-up" ball players, those who couldn't cut loose with their best stuff in difficult situations. So, he went his way, fighting for every base, screaming on every pitch and giving everything he had for the team employing him.

He will always play the game that way. Two decades ago, he would have been tremendously successful. Two decades ago, and their catcher. ades ago the Red Sox would have kept him as their catcher, eventually made him a coach and finally, a manager. the new baseball idea is different. Coaches and managers now hold their jobs by their ability to get along with the players. Miller Huggins wouldn't have lasted a month with the Red Sox. The charge against him would have been that he upset the players by screaming at them, but with the old

Yankees he was the greatest manager in the game. The new trend is the only thing that raises the slightest doubt that Birdie will be successful as a manager. He has brains, determination and ambition and was a leader when the Red continuous and ambition and was a leader when the Red Sox let him do any leading. He is also a bit of a literary lies. literary light, being the only major league baseball player who ever was a ghost-writer for a sports columnist. He performed this wonderful switch on custom by beating out a readable and wonderful switch on custom by beating out a readable column for a Chicago newspaperman a few years

If Birdie finds out he can't speak firmly to his players, be had he'll be back selling insurance in Nashua by midsummer. It he lasts the major leagues, he lasts through August, he can't miss the major leagues, probably in Cleveland, within five years.

it—and draw your own conclusions:

Reverend Dear Father:

I am addressing this protest, as you requested, to the Providence College Athletic Council. Woonsocket was one of ten teams entered in the Fourth Annual Invitation Four-mile Relay Race sponsored by Providence College at Hendricken Field on December 6th. La Salle was entered in the first heat and finished the first leg of the race. At the beginning of the second leg of the race, the La Salle runner lost a shoe. After running about one lap of his leg without a shoe, he dropped out at the behest of his coach.

Woonsocket was entered in the second heat. After the first heat was run, the La Salle coach remarked to me that he knew his team was out of the race, but that he was going to ask the meet director to allow his boys to run in the second heat—just for a work out. To this request Woonsocket voiced no complaint, naturally, since it conceded La Salle's disqualification.

After the race I sent one of my boys to check with the timers, as I had clocked my team on a new official stop watch at 19:57. He was informed that Woonsocket had taken second place since La Salle was disqualified. The meet director, standing nearby, overhead the boy reporting to me and angrily interrupted our conversation by shouting for all to hear that he was not disqualifying La Salle and was giving them second place in the meet.

Considering the quick anger and dictatorial attitude of the meet director, the decision must have been influenced by a very strong sympathy for the unfortunate team.

But at the time it struck me as shocking that such an arbitrary, biased and unprecedented decision out be even conceived, let alone be publicly proclaimed, by one who had devoted his life to developing the ideal of good sportsmanship and fair play in empetitive sports among school boys. So, not being especial a noted for any timid or mouselike

traits, I did a bit of sh uting myself. However, aside from any printed rule, simple justice demands that no team in a race be allowed to run it twice while the other teams have only one chance to win. Otherwise any team entered in the first heat of any race scheduled to be run in two heats might find some plausible pretense to drop out, if it was being defeated, and to enter again for another try in the second heat while those teams unfortunate enough to be assigned to the second heat would have no such

recourse available to them.

If fairplay in competitive sports means anything, it must mean that all competitors are to have an equal opportunity to win. All rules are made with that end in view. Any arbitrary or ill-considered ruling that would give one competitor any advantage over the others is simply unfair. If the same misfortune had befallen Woonsocket or any other team assigned to the second heat, how could they possibly be accorded the special privilege of running again that was given to the Lagrangian privilege of running again that was given to the La Salle team? And if the same privilege couldn't be made available to them, how can the ruling that accorded it to La Salle be anything other than a regrettable miscarriage of justice and fairplay? Surely it must be presumed that every team that enters a race has the right to enter it to win or to make the best possible showing. Or was it presumptuous on our part to think that way?

If we must have recourse to printed rules in this matter where simple justice should prevail, there is a rule which I believe is generally applied in all amateur relay found in just such a contingency as this one. That rule found in the rule book of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States provides as follows, "In all relay races an announcement must be made as to the distance each. competitor is to run in his relay. Any competitor failing to run the distance required shall cause his team to be disqualified (Rule XLVI, Relay Races, article 5.)

This rule is also incorporated in the "Official Rules Governing Rhode Island Interscholastic Track and Cross Country" wherein Bull 18 also incorporated in the Official Rules wherein Bull 18 also inco wherein Rule 18 states, "All competitors must run the full distance of the 18 states, "All competitors must run the full distance of the race;" and Rule 19 concludes, "Disqualification of these tion of any member of a relay team for violation of these Rules shall disqualify his team."

It is also an admitted fact that the four La Salle runners that started in the first heat did not run in the second heat.





#### College Hoop Coaches Dislike New Foul Rule

STORRS, Nov. 25-If the coaches of the teams that took part in the basketball jamboree at the Univer-sity of Connecticut on Monday night are a cross-section of their profession, then the new rule on foul-shooting will be in for revision before too long. Of the four questioned, only Rick Wilson of Amherst was on the fence. Hugh Greer of Connecticut, Nels Nitchman of Coast Guard, and Vin Cuddy of Providence were very strong in their disapproval of the new rule. disapproval of the new rule.

The rule in question gives shooter "one on one" during first 37-minutes of the game, and two shots for a normal "one on one" during the last three minutes. The "one on one" means that the shooter is allowed another free throw if he misses the first one. Another part of the new foul rule forbids the waiving of a free throw during the final three minutes of play.

At the jamboree last Monday, 15-minute period ran between 30 and 35 minutes. Thus playing time is estimated at 2 to 1. Therefore, in a college game with four 10-minute periods, the time would be 80 minutes. Add time out between pewould be 80 riods for another 19 minutes and allow five minutes for other timeouts and the game will last about 105 minutes for 40 minutes of actual playing!







Classes in the art of pugalism will start next week. These classes will be so arranged so as to be held during the free periods of the students.



A recent edition of a Boston newspaper carried the following headline on the sports page: "Moran Most Underrated in N. E." Truer words were never spoken. But the Beantown tabloid didn't stop there, naturally. Beneath the banner a "by-lined" story bore out the declaration with a barrage of statements and examples. Moran's magnificence was properly extolled with the Brooklyn boy at last getting his just due.

It is gratifying, to say the least, to see Robert Joseph emerge from unjustified obscurity. Since his spectacular freshman year Hank has been a prime favorite with Providence fans. They stuck with him through the dark days when five points was an outstanding night's work for Number Fifteen, and now that he's back in the van there's no stopping the faithful who cheer his every move.

Hank Gets Tired Too

This is all very fine. We're all glad to see Hank going so well, but the boy's only human: he gets tired like everyone else, he makes mistakes like everyone else, and Mr. Cuddy, recognizing this, has to rest him now and and then, no matter how much local "coaches" resent the move. The demise is usually only temporary, so give the boy and the coach a break. After a few minutes to get his breath back, Hank will be back in there leading the fast break down the court.

Random notes: Local enthusiasm got out of hand at the Springfield game when Vin had to appeal to the fans to contain themselves after a complaint from a visiting player. Cheer all you want, but keep it as impersonal as possible and within reasonable bounds . . . . Kerr is "up" for the big ones. Kenny's best work to date has been in the Holy Cross and Manhattan games. He was brilliant last Tuesday night at the Auditorium, but a fellow named O'Connor spoiled the evening . . . . Army officials complimented the Friar hockey team as "the finest bunch of gentlemen to come to West Point in quite some time." Seems the boys know how to handle themselves off the ice too. 





#### Watch Larry McClements



### Providence Quintet To Help Dedicate Keaney Gymnasium

The Providence College basketball quintet will play an important part in the opening of the new "Frank Keaney Gymnasium" next December, it has been announced by the University of Rhode Island Athletic Department. The Friars will help the Rams open their new gym when the Cuddymen tangle with arch-rival Brown University on that date.

In the second game of that evening R.I.U. will meet Connecticut University. Thus the Friars will open their 1953-54 season meeting their biggest opponent. The game will not be counted in the Rhode Island Intercollegiate Championship series and thus the Friars and the Bruins will meet three times next year.

#### Named For Keaney

The new \$1,700,000 gymnasium is named in honor of Frank W. Keaney, coach and athletic director at R.I.U. since 1920. The gym will contain Athletic Department offices, officials' room, a medical room, and three rooms for visiting teams. There will be three basketball courts on the main floor and the building will contain 1000 lockers and thirty shower baths. The structure will have a spectator capacity of 4,000 people for basketball games, and will hold 6,000 for assemblies.

It is indeed fitting and proper that the gym is named for Frank Keaney. He is regarded by most veteran observers as the greatest coach in New England history. It was under his tutelage that the Rams introduced the "razzle-dazzle" era of basketball to the nation. Keaney-coached R.I.U. squads scored more than 100 points on no less than 27 occasions.

#### 1945-46 Team Best

The 1945-46 team was Keaney's best. In the National Invitation Tournament his team defeated Bowling Green 82-79 on the strength of Ernie Calverly's 55 foot basket that tied the score with two seconds remaining. The Rams ultimately lost a heartbreaking final to Kentucky, 46-45.

Three Keaney-coached All-Americans and their all-time scoring totals are Calverly with 1868 points, Stan Stutz with 1730, and Chet Jaworski with 1426.

#### Born on June 6

Keaney was born on June 6, 1886, in Boston and was graduated from Bates College in 1911. At Bates he was a baseball star, batting .480 and stealing 38 bases for a college record. After graduation he signed with the Chicago White Sox and was farmed out to Des Moines where a sore arm ended his pro baseball career.

Besides coaching basketball at R.I.U., Keaney has coached football, baseball, and track. For several years he taught chemistry and was regarded as an extremely effective lecturer.
