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# DOMINICANS HAVE WON 60 OF 88 GAMES UNDER FLYNN'S COACHING

Two Were Ties and the Other 26 Are Down in the Lost Column During Former Big Leaguer's Four-Year Term

Probleme

If ever an award is given for the most successful college baseball coach in the East, Jack Flynn, a lawyer in this city, is in line for recognition as the result of his remarkable work with the ball tossers at the Providence College.

With limited material Flynn has turned out consistently good baseball teams in the four years that he has held the reins and last spring, his fourth campaign on Smith Hill, he holsted the White and Black colors to the top of the collegiate realm. This season he is faced with the task of rebuilding a goodly portion of his team, but it is a safe bet that he will turn out an aggregation of which Providence College and this city may well be proud.

Flynn's record of wins and losses for his four seasons at P. C. is almost unbelievable when one considers the material from which h4 has moulded his teams to play strenuous schedules with the largest and strongest nines in college circles. Since he accepted the post back in April of 1924, a position he has held since with the exception of the 1926 season when he turned to pro baseball to manage New Haven, Flynn has won 60 of 88 games played, lost 26 and tied 2. In the past two seasons he has produced teams that have been able to win 33 of the 46 contests staged.

The reason for the phenomenal showing of the Dominicans under Flynn is due to his remarkable knowledge of the diamond pastime. Probably no other college coach in the country has such a fund of diamond lore, and certainly few have experienced such a record in pro and annateur baseball as the Dominican coach.

Himself one of the greatest players ever developed in this State, he is well equipped to teach the national pastime. A graduate of Classical High where he played for four years, and then a star at Holy Cross where he won the reputation of being the best hitter ever to wear the Purple togs of the famed Worcester college, Flynn is an ideal type to handle college athletes. Following his graduation from Georgetown Law School, Flynn broke into professional baseball as a player with the Toronto team of the International circuit. Next he went to St. Paul in the American Association, and then moved into major league company when he was bought by Pittsburgh. After three campaigns with the Pirates as a catcher and first baseman, he went to Washington for a season. Then followed terms of service with Indianapolis and Montreal.

In 1916 he broke into the managing end of the game when he took over the reins at Springfield in the then newlyformed Eastern League. From the Cityof-Homes he travelled to Lawvence, New London, Waterbury, then back to Springfield for two years, to Worcester, and after two seasons with Providence College, broke back into the league as pilot of New Haven.

With such a varied career in baseball it is little wonder that Flynn has been able to accomplish such feats with the material that answers his call up on Hendricken Field. He has an uncanny ability to size up ball players. It is seldom he overlooks a promising youngster. His method of spring practice is unique, in that he opens the first outdoor drill with a regulation game, except that he changes the players every three innings. In this manner he is ible to give every lad a chance to show his ability, which probably accounts for the great popularity which he holds with the student body.

In winning five-sevenths of all the games played under his regime, Flynn has developed a number of fine ball tossers who have boosted Providence College into the top place in the collegiate world. Back in 1924, his first season on the hill, Jack took one look at a slim right handed twirler striving to flash his hooks across the plate, and proceeded to make him the most talked-of hurler in college ranks. It was Charley Reynolds who was a bright star for three campaigns, and later joined the Providence Eastern League where he showed to advantage until a shoulder injury put him out of the game altogether.

The same year, Johnny Halloran, clever catcher, who was later to turn down blds from major league aggregations, was developed. Ray Doyle, Hope High School catcher, was converted into a second baseman, to be chosen the best in college ranks three years afterwards and to later star in the York State-Penn circuit. Ed Wholey, diminutive La Salle athlicte, was trained to become one of the finest college outfielders in New England.

The second year saw another crop of ball tossers brought to the fore by the same guiding hand, this number including Heck Allen, who was picked as the outstanding third baseman in the East last spring; John Sullivan, a rangy youngster who hadn't even played ball in high school, but who made good under Flynn in his senior year at P. C.; Leo Smith, captain of the nine last spring, who is now with the Hartford team in the Eastern loop; Joe Whelan, Fall River lad who was developed into a first class twirder; Ed McLaughlin, flashy shortstop, who starred for three seasons at that post.


After a term with New Haven, during 1926, Flynn resumed his activities on Smith Hill in 1927, faced with the worst prospects of his career with the Dominicains. Nevertheless he combed the material carefully and brought forth such fine products as Hal Bradley, who hurled the Grays, Villamova and Yale, among others, to defeat; Joe Duffy, captain of the present nine, and one of the classiest of first basemen; "Nap" Fleurent, diminutive infielder from Ware High, who was converted into an outer gardener with such success that he has been picked as second best flyhlawk for that field in the East for the past two seasons; Bennie Norton, bespectacled infielder from Valley Falls, and Joe Harraghy, first baseman

from Taunton, who was made over into a topmotch catcher.

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Last year this master of dilamond strategy brought the college baseball crown to this city for the first time and climaxed his fourth campaign with the finest record of any college in the East. He continued his "findings," bringing to light Eddie Wincapple, an outfielder, changed into a southpaw hurler, who was such a sensation; Tom McElnoy, who had failed to make the grade at Fordham, but who blossomed into one of the best pitchers in the East under the coaching of Flynn; Hanry Main of Parwtucket High, and Frank Cappalli of Classical, keystome combination; Frank Hebert, colorful center-gardemer, who is now with Allenbown in the Eastern League, and Marty Gibbons, fleet flychaser from Clinton.

This spring Flynn faces an exceptionally difficult schedule with four vacancies in a lineup from the team which won the eastern tille last year. Nevertheless, fans throughout the city, and in the Smith Hill district in particular, are confident that Providence College will again be at or near the top when the curtain rolls down in June.




With a sizeable nucleus from the championship baseball team of last spring with which to build a powerful aggregation to wear the Providence College colors into action this coming campaign, Coach Jack Flynn is patiently awaiting a break in the weather to order to get his charges into the open. Last spring the Dominicans won 19 of their 22 games, and, with a brilliant diamond list carded for the coming months, will have to travel at a sensational clip to compile as fine a record. With three of his infielders ready

for action, including Capt. Joe Duffy at first, and Harry Main, clever Pawtucket second sacker, the mentor will have only to solve the third base problem. Heck Allen, hot corner guardian for four years, finished his campaigning for the Smith Hillers last June, and just who will win the berth will furnish plenty of speculation until the pre-season drills get under way.


The possibility that one of the veteran infielders may be moved over to third base has been suggested and seems to be a logical move. Cappall, shortstop last spring, handled the third base work while at Classical high and was highly rated for his performances for the Purple. Harry Main has also had a little experience at this post and is also a fine shortstop, and as a result may forfeit his second base job to work on the other side of the keysione sack.

In the outfield the mentor will have Harry Gibbons, football captain, and Nap Fleurent, clever all-round, athlete, back to do battle for their positions in left and right fields, respectively. The centre post will be open to competition, as Frank Ekbert, cleanup batter and fly chaser extraordinary, has signed with Allentown in the Eastern circuit.

# THIRD BASE STILL FLYNN'S BIG WORRY

Dominican Coach to Make First Cut in Squad of 70 This Week.

Although it is early to make predictions about the success of a baseball club, local fans, who have watched the Providence College ball tossers in action on Hendricken Field during the past week, are confident that the Dominicans are going to make the going rough for the majority of the Eastern colleges.

Coach Jack Flynn, who is starting his fifth campaign for the Black and White cause, is far from optimistic, as the loss of Hebert and Gibbons in the outfield, Murphy at catch, and Heck Allen at third is causing him plenty of worry as he scans the material aspiring for the vacancies. However, the pessimistic Flynn has an uncanny ability for developing his material, and the followers of the Smith Hill aggregation believe that he will fill the gaps in his machine so as to round out a formidable outfit.

With the opening game set for a week from Tuesday, when Northeastern University, which gave the locals two of their hardest tilts last spring, comes here for the curtain raiser. Flynn will have to make a cut in his large squad in the coming week. Over 70 candidates have been working out on Hendricken Field for the past week.

Believing that it would weaken his veteran infield trio of Captain Duffy, Main and Cappalli, should he shift either of the latter performers over to third in an effort to fill that gap, the mentor. stated yesterday that he would assign the hot corner vacancy to the best performer among the newcomers seeking the post.

Bob Dion, hard-working Nashua product, and Bill Kittredge of Attleboro, appear to have the edge on the rest of the field for filling Heck Allen's shoes, as both have haped up well at bat and in the field. Flynn believes that he will be able to develop his choice for the task to become a dependable all-round performer.

Two Paterson products appear to be leading the quest for the pair of outfield vacancies, as Johnny Krieger, basketball star for the past two years, and sub flychaser with the baseball team last spring, is patrolling left field in fine fashion, while Lobdell, a youngster who towers six feet four inches in the air is making a strong bid for centrefield. Lobdell has featured every session with his sensational hitting, having an exceptionally keen eye and being equally adept at batting from the left or right side of the platter.

If the claim of baseball authorities that good pitching is 75 per cent. of a college team's success, then Flynn has little to worry about, for he has an array of potential mound talent that appears to be the equal of any in the East. Two southpaws, who have proved their ability are Wineapple and Forrest, while the staff of right-handed flingers includes McElroy, who enjoyed the best record of any of the hurlers last spring: Bradley, Moran, Quirk, all veterans; Buckely, Boston High of Commerce product; Gomes of East, Providence; Hoban of La Salle; Lally, outfielder from East Providence, who is now trying his luck as a twirler. and Borden, Sophomore candidate who pitched for Dean Academy two seasons ago.

# FLYNN HAS LARGE Squad of Pitchers

Seven Veterans Make Up Staff. Four Rated to Divide 'Varsity Honors.

Although Jack Flynn, veteran baseball coach of this city, who started guiding the diamond destinites at Providence College last week-end for the fifth season, is perplexed about the problem of rounding out a strong nine again this year, there is little doubt in his mind but that he has one of the finest pitching staffs in the East.

No less than seven veteran flingers are available for duty with the Dominican team this spring, and of this number four have drawn action against major college nines and have proved their ability to turn in splendid mound exhibitions. This quartet is comprised of Hal Bradley, Tom McElroy, Eddie Wineapple and Frankie Moran. The other twirlers on the squad are George Forrest, Artie Quirk and Norman Boule.

Of the entire group Bradley has probably fiashed some of the best twirling that the Black and White teams have had, as his sterling work two years ago when he defeated Villanova on its home lot, downed the Providence Grays in an exhibition 'tilt, and conquered Yale, ranks with the best ever seen by Smith Hill athletic followers. Last spring he had an off year, failing to show his fine form of the previous campaign, and as a result turned in but two wins, one being a 5 to 3 triumph over Springfield. Bradley is in better shape at present and as a result has high hopes of making a strong comeback.

McErcy, an Olneyville lad, who is one of the best known "grads" of Tim O'Neil's amateur leagues, broke in as a regular at Providence last spring, and when the curtain was hauled down in June he had lost but one game in seven starts. His outstanding feats were the triumphs over Fordham and Brown. A heady plicher, and a versatile ball player, McElroy can be counted upon to play an important role in the Dominican's defence of their Eastern title this spring. Wineapple, sensational southpaw who has just finished a spectacular campaign in basketball, should turn in several victories for the Black and White cause in the next three months. A year ago, under the tuitelage of Flynn, the Salem husky enjoyed a brilliant season in his initial college campaign, registering wins over Georgetown, Yale and Notre Dame as his feature exhibitions.

Moran, fourth letterman on the 'Varsity hurling staff, is perhaps the most versatile ball player on the Dominicans' roster. This local product is equally adept at any position in the infield or outfield, and is credited with having played every position on the nine except catch. He has confined his efforts under Flynn to pitching, with the exception of one game at third base two years ago when Heck Allen was temporarily injured, and with two seasons behind him is due to blossom out into a capable mound artist.

Forrest, in his initial college start last spring, turned in an 18 to 3 victory over Bowdoin, allowing the Maine State aggregation three hits in the initial inning, and then holding them away from first base for the rest of the game. He was held as a relief hurler for the greater part of the season.

Artie Quirk appears to have plenty of deception and speed, and his lack of control has kept him from winning his spurs as a regular. However, his 13inning clash with the Yale second team is proof that he is rapidly improving under the coaching of Flynn.

under the coaching of Flynn. Boule, Junior Varsity hurler last year, pitched the second team to a viotery over Assumption College of Worcester, and, with a season's experience back of him, expects to make the veteran flingers flash their best curves to keep him off the first team.

17 Members of Team, Which Opens Season Tuesday, Boast Former Honors.

If being honored with the captaincy of a high school team marks an athlete as better than the average, then the Providence College baseball squad which opens its season this week can boast some mighty fine performers, as no less than 17 members of the first string squad were high and prep school leaders

Almost the entire first team, at least all the veterans from last year who are sure to start against Northwestern University Tuesday, boast the record of hav-ing captained their high school nines. ing captained then high school lines. Captain Joe Duffy, leader of the locals, holds the unique honor of having cap-tained the Durfee high nine in his Junior year there, and now holds the same honor at the Smith Hill college in his

The keystone combination is composed of two all-Rhode Island scholastic stars. who piloted their respective teams in their Senior terms, as Harry Main, second baseman, held the post at Pawtucket high, while Frank Cappalli, shortstop, was similarly honored in his Senior campaign with the Classical high aggregation. Both these youngsters start their second campaign under the Black and White colors this week.

### Two Captains in Outfield.

In the outfield, two ex-captains of high school outfits are ready for action. in "Nap" Fleurent, who led the Ware high team, which won the Western Massachusetts schoolboy title, and Johnny Krieger, clever Paterson athlete, who held the leadership of the Central high nine of that city.

Fleurent has been regular right fielder for Jack Flynn's team for the past two seasons and has been ranked as one of the best fly-chasers in Eastern college ranks. Krieger was picked on all New Jersey scholastic teams in basketball and baseball two years ago, and last spring served as utility outfielder with the Smith Hill outfit. He is expected to handle the centre field assignment this

The Paterson school also has contributed two other ex-captains to the Dominican cause in Bob Riccardo, third base candidate, who played with the Dominicans' second team last year, and Leo Lobdell, rangy slugger, who is making a strong bid for one of the outfield vacancies. Riccardo held the baseball captaincy at New York Military Academy before coming to the local college. Manley Zande, another promising outer gardener, was captain of Torrington high two years ago.

Three Pitchers Honored Eddie Wincapple, Tom McElroy and George Forrest are the only members of the pitching staff who held baseball cap-taincies in high school. Wineapple led the Salem high team, McElroy piloted the La Salle nine of 1925 which won the State title, and Forrest held the leadership role at St. Joseph's high in Pittsfield for two years. On the other end of the battery, Joe Harraghy, veteran catcher, boasts the record of having been

captain of St. Mary's high in Taunton in his Junior and Senior years there. Among the newcomers striving for places on Jack Flynn's outfit, who were awarded baseball captaincies in their prep schools, are Bob Dion, product of Nashua High, and Bill Kittredge of At-tieboro and Worcester Academy, both third base candidates; Joe Gomes of East Providence; Mickey Foster, twice elected captain of Pittsfield High nines; Emmett Shea, who holds the unique Emmetr Siles, while piloted North High of record of having piloted North High of Worcester for three successive seasons, and Jack McCormac of Webster High.

With such an array of baseball talent Jack Flynn has high hopes of developing a winning combination on Smith Hill in the coming months. Tuesday will be the first test for the reorganized nine. and if it comes through with a victory over the Northeastern team it should be ready for a banner season. Next Saturday the C. C. N. Y. aggregation, with two victories to its credit already, will invade this city to provide the final opposition for the Black and White ball tossers before they go on their annual road trip.

### GIBBONS UNABLE TO PLAY ANY BALL

The epected month's absence from the Providence College baseball squad of Marty Gibbons, clever left fielder, now promises to be for the entire season, according to a report issued this morning by Dr. J. H. Brothers, team physician. According to the latter the versatile White and Black performer will hardly be able to make a recovery from the operation he underwent last week-end in time to get in any action with the ball tossers. As a result Marty will watch the games from the stands this spring, so as to be in top condition to lead the 'Varsity grid team, of which he is captain, into action next fall.

The Dominicens lost one of their feature baseball tilts, originally carded for the coming spring, as the result of the announcement last night by Graduate Manager John E. Farrell that the Osaka Mainichi baseball outfit, amateur champions of Japan, had cancelled its proposed trip to this country. The Japs were slated to appear on Hendricken Field on May 25.

Field on May 25. The reason for the sudden cancellation of the journey to this country by the Osaka aggregation could not be learned, the only official statement being that issued by G. Fukumoto, secretary of the team, who arranged the Eastern trip through his New York office. The unexpected shift in the plans of the Osaka team lessens the Dominicans' schedule to 25 games, with one of that number pending.

Graduate Manager Farrell stated yesterday that he still has hopes of bringing the Meiji University nine into New England should they come to this country. The Meiji management is bookingits games direct from Tokio and as a result the working out of details for their proposed trip is being done under a great handicap. The Tokio authorities favored an early June date with the locals, but the Dominican athletic head is endeavoring to bring them here for a Memorial Day attraction.

# KRIEGER MAY WIN OUTFIELD BERTH

Dominican Nine to Open Season Against Northeastern Here Next Tuesday.

Johnny Krieger, forward on last season's basketball team, probably will handle one of the outfield vacancies on the Providence College nine according to the present plans of Coach Jack Flynn. With the arrival of warmer weather the Dominicans have begun to hit their stride in their daily session on Hendricken Field, and a definite lineup is expected to be pleked by Saturday for the opening game of the season next Turesday.

Krieger served as a utility outfielder last spring. It was not until the Yale game, however, that Krieger flashed his best form, playing a star game in right field as well as collecting two hits.

Because of his experience and natural speed Krieger has been favored to clinch an outfield berth, either in centre or left field.

Lobdell is another promising outfielder, but his chances have been lessened by a weak arm. His hitting has been the best of any of the newcomers and it is this factor which has made Coach Flynn hope that he might fill the centre field role.

Vin Cummings of Cranston, who won his spurs as a regular in the 1926 campaign when Jack White was holding the reins on Smith Hill, may break into the lineup next Tuesday when Northes tern University invades Hendritcken Field. Cummings also served as centra fielder under Flynn the following year, but last spring was forced to abandon the post when he developed eye trouble. If Cummings can return to bis-old form he will round out a fine cutfield. His hitting has shown, improvement in the past few days and it he continues his present pace he is likely to start in centre field. Making Strong Bid

John Krieger, Who is One of Coach Flynn's Likely Prospects for the Dominican Nine.

Third base is developing into a pitched battle between Bill Klittredge, Bob Dion and Hammel. The latter performed for Norwich Free Academy a year ago and is one of the most aggressive newcomers Flynn has under his wing. Dion and Klittredge appear on a par and the task of picking the successor to Heck Allen will be difficult.

The remainder of the infield will be the same as last year. Capt. Joe Duffy appears ready for his best season while the star keystone combination from Rhode Island schoolboy circles. Harry Main of Pawtucket and Frank Cappalli of Classical, will hold forth at second and short respectively.

Although it is a certainty that Joe Although it is a certainty that Joe Hararghy will draw the backstop assignment for the opening tilt, no indication has been given as to who will be called upon to handle the pitching burden. With a formidable array of talent Flynn has little worry about the mound work.

Last year Northeastern dropped two tilts to the Black and White, losing here in the opening clash, 3-0, and at Boston, 2-0. In the session yesterday Dion worked with the first team and featured with some sparkling plays, but following the drill the mentor stated that he would not decide until game time whether he would try the Nashua lad at the hot corner, or give the work to Kittredge. With the remainder of the lineup stocked with veterans, who are well equipped to meet the strong opposition to be encountered from the Huskies, the Smith Hillers will launch a strong defence for the Eastern title they won last spring. Capt. Joe Duffy will perform at first, Harry Main at second, Frank Cappalli at short and Joe Harraghy behind the plate.



Providence College nine launched its campaign in defence of the title it won last spring by overcoming a four-run handlcap at Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon and eking out a 7 to 5 der clsion over Northeastern University team. The game was closely contested all the way, and proved a severe test for the revamped Dominican nine.

Four newcomers wore Black and White baseball outfits in competition for the first time as regulars, three of them making their initial collegiate appearance, while the fourth, Johnny Krieger, a sub last spring, clinched a left field post by his fine work. The newcomers, all of whom showed to advantage, were Lobdell in centre, McVarish in right, an I Dion'at third.

For the first time since he entered college two years ago "Nap" Fleurent, star right fielder from Ware, failed to take his place in the starting lineup, being on the injured list as the result of an ankle sprain received in the drill yesterday. The injury, to Fleurent robbed Flynn of all veteran outfield material, as Gibbons, regular left fielder of last year, is also on the hospital list.

It remained for Dion, who filled Heck Allens boots at third base in fine fashion, to bring the victory to the Smith Hillers, when he smashed a pretty single into centre field in the eighth inning to score Main and break a 4 to 4 deadlock. In this canto Main singled with one away, and Cappall walked. After McEiroy had filed out Dion came through with his timely blow to send Main home.


#### Krieger Starts Rally.

# SOUTHPAW FANS 14, ISSUES THREE HITS IN 4 TO 0 VICTORY

Dominicans Score Three Runs in First Frame.—Visitors' Errors Costly.

The cold blasts which swept across Smith Hill yesterday failed to halt the second tilt of the season for Providence College which came through with a 4 to 0 triumph over the College of the City of New York. It was the second victory of the week for the Dominicans and was featured by the initial appearance of Eddie Wineapple, brilliant southpaw.

Wineapple displayed excellent form yesterday. His hooks and fast ball baffled the New Yorkers, with the result that no less than 14 batters were retired, struck out. Although he apparently had little chance to reach his best form because of the cold weather, the Salem husky surprised even his most ardent admirers by his sensational work.

The game was cut short in the eighth inning because of the unsatisfactory playing conditions, but the fans who braved the cold were treated to an unusually fine pitching duel between Wineapple and Tenzer, southpaw with the visitors. Both showed good control and a fine assortment of curves, with the result that but three hits were allotted to each nine.

The Friars were lucky to win the decision. It was only the poor handling of the ball by the invaders' third baseman, and two lapses on the part of Schwartz, Lavender backstop, which enabled them to do so. One hit, two walks, a passed ball, and a wild pitch in the opening inning proved sufficient to give the Dominicans a three-run lead which was safe in the hands of Wineapple.

Unless the locals are able to wield the stick more effectively and carry out their assignments better, the Black and White colors are certain to lower often before the current campaign draws to a close. Last spring the Flynnmen hammered C. C. N. Y. to shreds in New York, and as the visitors presented practically the same lineup on Hendricken Field yesterday, it is evident that the locals have a long way to go before they approach the ability of last year's team.

In the first inning, which paved the way for the victory, and which produced the only poor playing that Tenzer was guilty of during the fray, the Dominicans collected three runs on a single hit. aided by C. C. N. Y. miscues. Kittredge, playing third in place of Dion, fanned in his initial college appearance, but Tenzer found it hard to satisfy Krieger and Fleurent, walking both players.

When Tenzer tried to catch Krieger napping off second base he made a poor throw, the ball rolling into centre field while the Dominican runner advanced to third and Fleurent to second. Duffy rolled to third and McMahon spoiled his fine stop by heaving wildly to first, allowing Krieger to tally, and the other runners to advance a peg. Fleurent came home with the second run when Schwartz let one of Tenzer's slants get past him, and Duffy galloped in with the third counter on Harraghy's single to right field.

After this, the invaders settled down and turned in some fine baseball. A fast double play in the second inning nipped a budding rally, when De Phillips made a spectacular stop of Krieger's bid for a hit, tossed to Blum to force Kittredge at second, who completed the play with a fast peg to first for the other out.

Wineapple had matters all his own way and the only chance the visitors had to get in the scoring column was in the third inning, when Liftin reached third as the Dominican hurler tossed the ball into centre field trying to catch him napping off second, and Blum stole second after being walked. But the Friar's hurler proved equal to the task. bearing down on Musicant to retire him with three successive strikes.

Nap Fleurent, veteran right fielder, celebrated his return to the lineup by colecting two of the scores made by the locals. His second tally resulted from clever base running in the seventh. After receiving free transportation to first, Fleurent pilfered second and continued around to the home station when the throw to catch him went astray into the outfield.



Y., April 19-The Providence College nine registered its fourth straight victory of the season here today by taking the measure of the strong St. John's College nine by an 11 to 7 count. Although Wineapple failed to come through with colors flying as high as had been expected, his teammates found their batting eyes at the expense of three local hurlers, battering out no less than 12 hits, three of which Joe Duffy, classy first baseman and captain, collected.

The fielding honors of the class went to Bobby Dion new third sacker with the Friars. The Nashua youngster turned in a sensational play in the first inning when he nabbed a line drive with the bases full and doubled Murther, local right fielder off third base. This play helped to break up the St. John's rally of this inning which netted two runs. Dion also came to the fore with a fielding tidbit in the eighth when he made a spectacular one-hand running stop of Cooper's bid for a hit through short, pegging to first in time to get the run-



Villanova, Pa., April 20.-With Tom McElroy pitching, the hard-hitting. Providence College nine took its fifth straight triumph of the season by defeating Villanova here today, 9 to 6. The victory was a sweet one for the Friars, as it avenged the setback they received at the hands of the locals last spring at Providence when McElroy dropped a 10inning decision.

Although several of the invaders stood out in bringing the victory to Rhode Island, it was a team triumph all the way, with every player turning in a good exhibition after a poor start in the opening stanza. The hitting honors went to Duffy, Dion, Krieger and Lobdell. All of whom collected two hits each.

#### Harraghy Helps McElroy.

Joe Harraghy, turning in his third game from behind the plate, pulled Mc-Elroy through some tight holes when the Olneyville lad faltered in the face of the slugging tactics of the locals. Although he issued eight walks, Mc-Elroy managed to hold the game well in hand in the final stages and after the seventh frame the issue was never in doubt.

Bobby Dion, star third baseman, continued his sensational work, collecting a double and a single, and flashing a steady game afield. It was Dion's single in the second inning which enabled the Flynnmen to come from behind to take the lead, as Main and McEiroy tallied on the hit.

It was Holy Cross's third shut-out victory of the season as W. and M. and the Quantico Marines had been beaten in the same manner previously, the former by 8-0 and the latter by 5-0. The victory over Brown was due to some fine pitching by Bots Nekola. The former Greater New York

schoolboy has won three games to date. Another New England team is doing well, keeping pace with. Holy Cross. Providence College has five victories to its credit, three over rivals in the Metropolitan area if you want to widen the scope and include Upsala, of Jersey. The two other local teams are City College and St. John's while Northeastern, of Boston, and Villanova complete the list. Upsala was beaten on Thursday. 6 to 3, and Villanove Saturday, 9 to 6. Wineapple and McElroy have won two games each and Buckley the fifth.



### Friars Smash Out 16 Hits To Trounce Norwich 14-1

Cappalli Bats in Six Runs with Homer and Double,—Krieger Also Cleans Bases.

Hammering the offerings of Tansey, Norwich University hurler, to all corners of the lot, and giving Frankle Moran and Joe Gomes fixe support in the field, the undefeated Providence College nine scored its sixth straight victory of the season on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon, the final score being 14 to 1.

The Friars gave an exhibition of hitting yesterday which bodes ill for the Holy Cross twirlers who expect to stop them at Worcester tomorrow in the clash which will go a long way towards deciding the mythical Eastern title. Sixteen hits were smashed to all corners of the Smith Hill diamond, with Frank Cappalli, diminutive shortstop, and Johnny Krieger, left fielder, taking the top honors.

Cappalli had a big afternoon, driving a home run into deep left in the seventh to score Joe Harraghy ahead of him, a double into centre field in the eighth to send three more runs across the platter, and a single in the sixth which paved the way for another rally.

Krieger contributed the first extra base knock when he pounded a home run into left centre in the second inning with the bases crowded. This blow completely wrecked whatever hopes the Vermonters had of taking the measure of the Friars, as it gave the Flynnmen a five run lead which was never threatened.

Moran and Gomes Invincible.

Frankie Moran started on the mound for the Dominicans and was master of the situation throughout. He gave one of the best hurling exhibitions of his career, holding the xisitors to three hits, none of which alded in the lone run made by the Green Mountain cadets. In addition Moran sent no less than seven back to the bench on strikes. Joe Gomes, colored youngster from East Providence, was given a chance to make his collegiate bow in the eighth, and his two-inning performance was exceptional, as but seven men faced him, of whom four were retired via the strikeout route.

With the issue settled beyond any shadow of doubt Coach Flynn gave his reserves a chance to show their wares. In the eighth Gomes relieved Moran, and Weich took over the backstop work, giving Harraghy his first rest since the start of the season. Kittredge and Skocylas worked at second and short respectively in the ninth inning, and Mc-Varish relieved Krieger in left field.

Dion, new third baseman, continued his sensational work in the field, turning in the best plays of the fray. His pickups of line drives in the first, sixth and seventh frames stamped him as a capable successor to Heck Allen, who handled the hot corner for four years

#### Krieger Glears Bases

Providence started its attack on Tansey in the second inning. Lobdell beat out a roller past the pitcher's box and Harraghy wakked. Main forced Lobdell at third on his grass-cuiter to Tansey and Cappalli filed out. Moran kept the rally alive by poking a single into centre which scored Harraghy. With the count three and one, Krieger caught one of Tansey's fast slants and lined it between left and centre field, the ball rolling to the fence as the Paterson star raced around the bases for the first home run of the year.

Norwich garnered a lone tally in the third without a single hit. Kane was safe on Cappaili's error of his grounder, and moved along to second on an infield out, and travelled to third when Main booted Coane's hard bounder. Walning hoisted a high fly into left which the wind carried into foul territory, but Krieger made a brilliant running catch, Kane scoring before the ball cculd be returned to the infield.

Holy Cross Smashes Winning Streak of Flynn's Boys at Worcester

### Game played: APRIL 26,1929

Worcester, Mass., April 27.—Battling its way back into the running for the Eastern intercollegiate baseball title, the crack Holy Cross nine defeated the highly touted Providence College outfit yesterday afternoon by an 11 to 0 count. The defeat was the first of the season for the Dominicans and put the Crusaders on even terms with the Rhode Islanders for the college laurels. A gathering of over 5000, one of the largest weekday crowds ever at a ball game on Fitton Field, witnessed the clash.

It was a case of too much Nekola, for the southpaw ace of the Crusaders held the upper hand throughtout. He was nicked for six hits, which he managed to keep scattered, and in addition to striking out 11, he proved equal to the task of stopping budding Providence rallies on several occasions. The win is the fourth of the year for Nekola.

Eddie Wineapple, starting twirler for the Providence aggregation, failed to flash his best form, and in the second inning made the fatal error of keeping his fast hooks too high, with the result that the Crusader sluggers unleashed seevral hard and timely blows to sew up the decision. In the third Wineapple gave way to Buckley, who was battered for four runs in the fourth before he settled down and held the locals in check until the seventh. Joe Gomes, former East Providence High star, who shaped up exceptionally well, turned in some smart pitching in the final two innings, being nicked for but one hit.

Falture of the Dominicans to come through in the pinches spelled their dereat, for they left 10 players stranded on the hassocks. A hit on several occasions would have sent two ,or more runners scampering across the plate, but the needed punch was lacking. For the first time this campaign, Capt. Joe Duffy went without a hit.

The other glaring weakness in the Providence nine was in its outfield with Lobdell making the one error chalked up against the Rhode Islanders, when he let a ground ball go through his legs to roll far into centre, permitting three runs to come across the platter. This miscue, coming in the third inning, proved the undoing of the Black and White performers, for it gave Nekola a lead that was never to be threatened.

Providence had some fine chances to break through for scores. In the first Krieger was safe on his attempted sacrifice on which Dion was tossed out at second base. Fleuren't reached first when he batted a high bounder which Nekola and Shevlin went after, the former finally getting the ball and pegging to first to Harrell who ran to cover the base. Fleurent was safe by a wide margin, but crashed into Harrell after crossing the base, and bo h players fell to the ground. Krieger travelled to third on the play, but the rally ended there, as Duffy was thrown out on his easy roller to Nekola and Lobdell fanned.

Providence filled the bases in the fourth with one out, but Main popped weakly to Harrell and Cappalli tapped weakly to Nekola. In the fifth, with Krieger and Fleurent waiting on the sacks, Duffy popped up to Shevlin. Again in the ninth, two more Dominicans were stranded when with one out Gomes rapped to Nekola and Dion fanned.

Ryan opened the second canto for the Cross with a triple to deep left, and Lawrence followed with a double into the left field bleachers. Lawrence went to third while Cappalli was tossing Phelan out at first, and scored on Cahill's sacrifice fly to deep center.

In the third Wineapple met his Waterloo, being forced to abandon the box in favor of Buckley. With one away Fisher dropped a pretty bunt and beat it out. Shevlin poked a single into center and Wineapple filled the bases when he hit Hurley in the leg. 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

The fourth week, which has just sped by, left behind it a few shattered hopes. It saw both Holy Cross and Providence College, previously recorded as unbeaten, joining the ranks of those who know what a defeat really is. Princeton attended to smudging Holy Cross's record while the latter carried Providence College along into the beaten column. Lafayette is the only un-beaten member of the triumvirate which ruled a week ago and the Easton, Pa., nine threatens to continue that way some time. It also saw Fordham, which made a disastrous trip into New England, come back with renewed strength and defetat two local rivals and one near-local rival in Columbia, N. Y. U. and Seton Hall, the latter, of course, representing the near-local district inasmuch as the Setonians spend their time at home in Orange, N. J.

Locally, it was a good week. In addition to what Fordham did, there was some signs of activity and life at N. Y. U. The Violet started on Tuesday by losing to Lafayette—nothingnew for N. Y. U as last year, after the local college had taken eleven straight, Lafayette came .. along and won. On Wednesday Stevens was beaten, 5 to 4; on Friday Colgate was shut out, 3 to 0, and on Saturday Fordham met and de-feated N. Y. U.

Columbia Breaks Even Columbia, after losing, 1 to 0, to Fordham in a game Tuesday, which featured the pitching of Murphy for the Maroon, beat Manhattan, 6 to 2, lost to Dartmouth by 2 to 1 on Friday, and then came back with a 4 to 3 victory over Williams which might have been a triumph for the New Englanders if Singmaster had received any support.

City College got an even break with a victory over Upsala, and a beating by Rutgers. 

Providence College Overcomes Three-Run Lead.—McElroy Relieves Hal Bradley.

(Special to the Providence Journal.) Durham, N. H., May 1.—Rallying behind Tom McElroy, their star right hander, the Providence College nine overcame a three-run lead of the University of New Hampshire to eke out an 8 to 7 decision here today. Staging the strongest hitting attack they have uncovered this year, the Providence College nine walloped Lowell Textile to all corners of Hendricken Fleid yesterday afternoon to pile up the highest score made by any college team this season, the final botal being 23 to 4 in favor of the Flynnmen. Play was halted after six and a half immigs had ben played, owing to the one-sided score, and the length of time consumed.

In collecting their ninth victory of the campaign, the Smith Hillers unleashed a salvo of base hits that would be sufficient to win a dozen ball games. Nineteen safe blows were garnared of the combined deliveries of Zalkind, star of the Lowell team, and Allard, his battery mate, who also performs as a pitcher.

Dion and Lobdell, with four safe hits each; Krieger with three out of five, and Main and Cappalli with two safe crashed out of five turns at the platter, led the hitting attack of the locals. Lobdell and Main hammered out home runs, Fleurent and Matthews, triples, and Cappalli, a double.

With the score rapidly mounting to one-sided proportions. Coach Jack Flynn took advantage of the opportunity to use some of his reserve material. Mc-Varish, sub-catcher who started the game and who turned in some fine work behind the platter, gave way to Dixie Matthews, former Tech star, in the fourth, and the latter resigned in favor of Curran in the sixth. Oliver and Zande were given places in the outfield in the final stage of the clash.

Pitching his first game of the year, George Forrest, another one of Jack Flynn's promising young hurlers, turned in a fine exhibition. Four hits and two runs were garnered off his slants in the first five innings, and with the game definitely clinched by the Dominicans, he eased up in the sixth to allow the Weavers to counter two Tuns on four hits.

The fielding feature of the game came in the fourth frame when the Dominicans staged a pretty double killing. With a runner on third, Truesdale, visitor's shortstop, rolled a bunt towards Forrest. The latter fielded the ball perfectly, pegged to Duffy for the out at first, and the Dominean captain tossed accurately to the plate where Matthews nipped the runner trying to score on the play. ## ST. BONAVENTURE WHIPS FRIARS 10-9

New Yorkers Overcome Seven-Run Lead to Beat Providence College in 11th Inning.

Never giving up the struggle, although they trailed by seven runs at one time, the strong St. Bonaventure College aggregation from western New York nosed out the Providence College nine 10-9 in a thrilling 11-inning tilt on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. The defeat is the second in 11 starts for the Friars, and marks the fifth win of the year for the New Yorkers.

Three Dominican hurlers were used in the attempt to swing the tide of victory to the Black and White, and although Tom McElroy, ace of the staff, was rushed to the rescue in the ninth, he met the fate of his predecessors, Wineapple and Gomes, when the Bonaventure sluggers came through with an 11th inning rally to clinch the decision Wineapple twirled brilliantly for six

Wineapple twirled brilliantly for six innings, allowing but one run and three hits during that time. But in the seventh the Sophomore portsider was bombarded from the box when the visitors went on a hitting spree. Four hits and two walks were garnered off Wineapple in this canto before Coach Flynn sent Joe Gomes on the slab.

#### Friars Lead First Half

The game was perhaps the most unusual upset the Friars have encountered in years. They completely outclassed the invaders for the first half of the game and at the end of the sixth inning were taking things easy with an 8 to 1 lead. Then came the attack which put the Ostergren-coached machine in the running, and the locals were never able to uncork a consistent attack as the result of the deceptive offerings given them by Riley, visitors' star right-hander.

Skierkowski, second baseman of the invading nine, was the hero of the day, driving out a home run in the ninth inning with a man on base, and his team trailing by two runs. This blow spelled the downfall of the Dominicans, as it deadlocked the count, and put the St. Bonaventure team on edge to crash through with a win at the first opportunity.

The chance to gain the verdict came in the first of the 11th, when Rooney, backstop, hoisted a high fly in back of third. Dion, Krieger and Cappalli made a dash for the vic'ity, with the latter calling for the catch. However, when all was said and done, the ball landed untouched on the outfield sod and Rooney was started on the first lap of the fourney around the cushions. After an attempted sacrifice bunt had fizzled into a pop fly to McElroy, Thomas hit to Cappalli, but the ball took a bad hop over the Friars' shortstop and continued on its wav into left field while Rooney raced into the home station with the winning tally. Thomas went to second on the relay to the plate, and travelled to third on Youngblood's drive at Dion. A squeeze play at the plate was nipped by McElroy, who retrieved Conlon's bunt in time to peg to Harraghy for an out.

With Joe Harraghy, peppy catcher, leading the attack the Dominicans had no trouble at all in piling up a commanding lead at the very onset of the clash. In the first canto Dion walked, Krieger moved him up and Fleurent came through with a home run smash, the ball landing along the left field foul line and rolling to the fence. A third run was added when Lobdell was hit, went to third on Harraghy's hard smash into right, and scored when Conlen booted the ball about the outfield in trying to get hold of it.

Cappalli singled to start the second inning, Wineapple moved him along a peg, and Dion unleashed a hard drive over second base to bring him home. In the third frame three more markers were chalked up for the Flynnmen when Duffy, Harraghy and Main reached base safely on successive infield boots, Duffy scoring on the last one and Cappalli contributed a timely blow to left field.

Visitors Move Up in Seventh

In the seventh the visitors found their batting eyes and proceeded to climb back into the running. Wineapple walked Conlon to start the rally, and then came successive singles off the bats of Riley, Evers, Utecht and Rooney. With two runs in and two men on, Wineapple filled the sacks by issuing a free ticket to Skierkowski.

Then Joe Gomes was called in from the pen, and the East Providence lad added to the chaos when he walked the first man to face him to force in another marker. Youngblood caught hold of a fast shoot and sent it safely into centre field territory to push the final two runs of the inning over the plate. Gomes fanned Conlon and caught Youngblood off first to end the attack.

In the first of the ninth Krieger misjudged a high riser from Rooney's bat which went for a double. Then came Skierkowski's terrific blow which rolled to the left centre field fence and knotted the count, which was not broken until the St. Bonaventure outfit got to McElroy in the 11th.

#### Brown Leads in Series

Naturally, the Smith Hill delegation is the favorite of local fans, for Capt, Jo Duffy and his teamates, until they struck a couple of snags this week, have been sailing along at a rapid rate. Their nine victories in 12 games gives them a tremendous advantage over the Brown team, which has dropped seven games in a row. ## DOMINICANS GET TO SONDHEIM IN SEVENTH, EIGHTH

Brown Pitcher's Support Fails as Providence Scores

#### Two to Win.

Getting to Sondheim in the seventh and eighth and staving off a threatening ninth-inning rally, the Providence College nine scored a 5-4 victory over Brown in the first game of the city championship series before 4500 spectators at Aldrich Field Yesterday afternoon. Art Sondheim, holding the Friars to five hits, was the victim of wretched support at critical times and slipped in the seventh and eighth when the Dominicans added their 10th victory in 13 contests.

Brown decisively outhit the Friars and had runners on base in every inning, but brilliant fielding behind Tom McElroy. Providence hurler, enabled him to keep the Bruins well in check until the eighth and ninth when Brown made desperate bids to tie the score. Sondhelm's performance was one of the outstanding features of the game, and after allowing one hit in the first, he held the winners hitless until their seventhinning rally.

McElroy found himself in many bad holes, due to lack of control, combined with Brown's savage batting attack, but the capable supporting cast chopped off two Brown threats with snappy double plays and in general turned in some of the finest fielding seen on Aldrich Field this season. The contest was typical of the sort of baseball turned in by the two local rivals, and outstanding plays of all sorts kept the stands on edge from start to finish. Brown's last-inning bid for the contest was reminiscent of the thrilling finishes in the 1928 contests, and the Bruins were retired with two out and two men on base after one tally had been secured.

#### Misplays Scattered

Brown's misplays were scattered throu; joint the contest, but two of the errors were of vital importance to the Friars' success. McElroy was never able to check Erown and in only two innings did the losers. fail to hit. The six bases on balls distributed by the Friar hurler gave Brown addit al chances to push men around t : bases, but when the situation looked the worst the Dominican infield played superb ball and renewed the winners' chances.

Providence opened the scoring, getting two runs as the Bruins got away to a bad start. Dion worked Soucheim for a pass and manared to get to third when Chaiklin heaved into right field on Szydla's attempted sacrifice. Fleurent drove out a timely right-field single, scoring the two runners, and then was retired on a double play.

The Bruins tied the count in the third, Capt. Bucky Wright driving out a triple with two men on base. Moulton opened the inning with a hit inside third, and McGinley advanced him with a walk. Freedman went out at first, both runners advancing, and then the Brown hitting star tied the score with a long left-field three-b gger. Wright was retired at home on a double play which also retired McGinn at first.

Three-Inning Deadlock

For the next three innings, the two teams strove desperately to break the deadlock, but until Providence's seventh inning rally neither was able to make much use of several openings. Brown pushed one man to third in the fourth, but Providence's second brilliant double killing ended the potential rally, while for three successive innings one Dominican was left stranded on first. Brown sent another runner to third in the fifth, but one of Stanley Szydla's well-managed putouts ended the inning.

Providence's seventh inning rally was the only time during the day when the usually dangercus Dominican batting attack was superior to the crafty pitching of Dubuc's Sophomore ace. Two runs were tallied in the seventh stanza when Sondheim was touched for three hits and two sacrifice blows, and a third was cut off on the bases to retire the side.

Cappalli broke the hitless spell by opening the seventh with a single to right, and McElroy's bunt moved him to second. Dion found Sondheim for another hit, and his left field single put Cappallli across the plate. Dion made second on Freedman's throw to the plate and reached third when Szydla hit to centre. Fleurent lifted a sacrifice fly to left, scoring Dion, but Szydla was subsequently retired trying to steal second.

Flora Makes Double.

Sam Flora was injected into the fray in the eighth as a pinch hitter and scored the third Brown run with a screeching centre field double. Larkin was safe as the inning started on Cappalli's boot. The misplay constituted providence's sole error. Gurll and Crane were retired and Flora scored the Brown catcher with his two-base hit, but was caught at third trying to gain an extra. base.



Locally Fordham and City College were the busiest. The Marcon played St. John's Wednesday and won, 7 to 1 The next game was on Thursday against Holy Cross and the latter was again the victor, 6 to 0. Hebert, who pitched against the Marcon in Worcester a week ago Saturday, was on the mound and he held Fordham to two hits, the first coming in the opening inning and the second in the ninth. Bob Cooney started for Fordham but lasted only a short time and Johnny Murphy finished. To wind up the week Fordham beat St. Bonaventure, Saturday, 6 to 1.

#### City College Won Twice

City College played as many games as Fordham during the week and did just as well, with two victories and one defeat. St. Francis was beaten Monday, Lehigh won Wednesday and Manhattan was overwhelmed Saturday: Columbia played twice and lost both its games, to Princeton on Wednesday and Dartmouth on Saturday, N. Y. U. played once, defeating Haverford Saturday, St. John's won from Rider and R. P. I.

John's yon from Rider and R. P. I. Holy Cross did not only bring disaster to the Fordham campus, but also beat William and Mary, on Friday by the score of 12 to 3, and Yale on Saturday, 15 to 3. Saturday's game was Nekola's sixth victory of the season, and it also served to send the former Evander Childs High School boy to the top of the pitching averages with a perfect record. Dobens attended to the victory over William and Mary.

## Friars Beat Villanova, 5-4, In Twelve Inning Game

Eddie Wincapple Saves Own Tilt by Starting Rally

#### in Ninth.

Led by Eddie Wineapple, rugged southpaw hurler, the Providence College nine turned in its finest exhibition of the season in coming from behind to stage a ninth inning rally to the the score, then crashing through in the 12th to send the strong Villanova outfit down to a 5-4 defeat on Hendricken Fleid yesterday afternoon. The victory is the 11th of the year for the Friars, and their second over the Pennsylvanians, whom they defeated last month, 9-6.

The game was spectacular throughout and although the Friars cashed in with the winning marker in the 12th inning as the result of two infield errors on the part of the Villanova outfit, they earned the decision by their aggressiveness in fighting their way to the front after trailing for nine innings.

It was Wineapple who proved to be the hero of the clash, for in addition to showing his oldtime form in subduing the hard-hitting invaders he challenged their right to the decision when he started the ninth inning rally by singling to right after two were out. The Salem southpaw was slow in getting under way, but as the tilt progressed opened fire with full force and never looked better than when he fought the Villanovans with all his speed and power in the three overtime frames.

Facing their fourth setback of the year, the first two Friars up in the ninth, Main and Cappalli, failed to even worry Hanzik, clever right-hander of the visiting team. Wineapple, however, came through with a clean blow to right field. Dion, brilliant third baseman of the Flynnmen, provided the winning punch when he continued the assault with a ringing double along the left field foul line which put Wineapple on third. Szydla, playing his second game in left field, slashed the first offering of Hensil, portsider, who relieved Hanzik, into centre field, and Donahue made a spectacular attempt to pull a shoe string catch, hurling himself through the air only to lose the ball after almost having it in his clutches for what would have been the third out. Both runners counted on the play and the score was knotted at four apiece.



## DOUBLES IN SIXTH WITH BASES FULL TO SEW UP GAME

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4500 See Bruins Even Series. McElroy, Sondheim Unable to Finish.

Moulton's double with the bases loaded in the sixth enabled Brown to beat Providence College and even the standing in this year's city championship series with a thrilling 5-3 victory before 4500 spectators at Aldrich Field yesterday afternoon. Tom McElroy, starting pitcher for the Friars, caused his own downfall and blew up completely in the inning when the Bruins turned a likely defeat into certain victory.

Neither of the starting pitchers, Mc-Elroy and Sondheim, was able to go the route yesterday, for the Brown Sophomore ace gave way in the sixth to a pinch hitter. As far as McElroy was concerned, yesterday's contest was similar to the second game in last year's series, when the Olneyville hurler, after winning the first game, failed to survive two innings of the second contest. Both McElroy and Sondheim kept

Both McEroy and Sondheim kept hits well scattered, but neither was very effective because of frequent bases on balls, which played prominent parts in the scoring. The Dominican pitcher filled the bases in the sixth by passing three men and then was found for the hit which meant the ball game to Brown. The Bruins were held to five hits, four of them secured while Mc-Elroy was in the box, while Providence touched Sondheim for five in five innings and collected one of Rawlings.

#### Bruins Start Scoring.

The Bruins took the lead with one hard-earned run in the first. Then Providence overcame the advantage with a pair of markers in the third. The Bruins knotted the score again in the fourth and Providence took the lead for a second time in the fifth. Brown's winning rally, staged with the ald of three walks and one hit, came in the sixth, and thereafter the Bruins never were in a position to threaten. Providence began to make the going bad for Rawlings in the eighth, but in that inning, as in the ninth, good defensive work kept the Friars subdued.

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Brown's first run was the result of two hits, the only time the Bruins bunched their blows. Moulton was retired at first, but Red McGinley laid down a perfect bunt along the third base line and beat Dion's throw to first. The Friar third baseman partially deflected the drive, but Szydla was unable to secure the ball in time to play for McGinley at home.

Lobdell's three-base hit scored two runs and put Providence in the lead in the last of the third. Dion was retired when McGinley made a spectacular catch of his long fly to left centre, but Szydla was safe on a hot grounder to the field which bounded over Wright's glove. Fleurent hit safely to left, advancing Szydla, but was retired at second when Duffy hit to the box. Lobdell then drove out a three-base hit over Mc-Ginley's head, both runners scoring. Harraghy hit to short to end the inning.

#### McGinn Scores

Brown's tying run in the fourth was scored without the use of a hit. Mc-Ginn drew a pass at the start and was safe at second when McElroy threw wild on Crane's attempted sacrifice. Crane was also safe at first, giving Brown two men on bases and none out. Gurll's sacrifice advanced the men, and Mc-Ginn tallied when Chaiklin was thrown. out by Cappalli. Sondheim drew a pass, but Moulton flied out to short.

Providence regained its previous onerun lead in the fifth. Dion flied out but Szydla worked Sondheim for a pass and made second when Fleurent was thrown out at first. Duffy's timely fly scored the left fielder, and during an argument between Chaiklin and Umpire McLaughlin the Dominican captain made third. Chaiklin maintained that Szydla did not touch the plate and tagged him after receiving Freedman's throw, but the arbiter ruled Szydla safe.



The triumph marks the second successive victory for Eddie Wineapple over the Washington collegians, as he sent them to defeat here a year ago by a 9 to 7 score.

The rugged portsider had matters well in hand for the greater part of the fray, although he had to pull out of some holes to hold the small lead collected by his mates. Once he stopped an attack with the bases filled and twice he had to fight off rallies which ended with two Georgetown runners in scoring position.

Nap Fleurent, star right fielder, had but one chance to help the cause, but that assist proved to be the fielding tidbit of the game. In the sixth frame, with one out, runners on first and third, Hal Poole, local lad, who did the hurling for the visitors, crashed a hard drive into right centre. Fleurent was off with the crack of the bat, making a sensational diving catch to come up with the ball in his gloved hand. As Morris, runner on first, left his base on the hit, he was easily doubled up to squelch the rally.

McCarthy Cuts Down Main.

McCarthy, fleet centre fielder with the Georgetown outfit, proved the best fiyhawk on the field, going back for long drives by the Friars to make seemingly easy catches in spite of the high wind. In addition he stopped a Dominican rally in the second, when he made a brilliant peg from the outfield to the plate to cut down Main trying to score on Szydla's single.

Ceorgetown took a one-run lead in the second, only to have the Friars move to the fore in the latter half of the same inning. The count was tied at two-all when the invaders broke through with a counter in the first of the eighth, and then the Friars claimed the decision with a two-run attack in their half of the same inning, in which three safe blows were pounded off Poole's delivery.


Eddie Wineapple, relief hurler when the teams last met, and George Rawlings, right-handed Senior who went the distance for the first time this year last Wednesday, are the pitching selections for Providence College and Brown University for this afternoon's rubber game of the 1929 city championship series, which will be settled at Aldrich Field at 4 o'clock. For the first time in the last six games, Tom McElroy, Olneyville hurler, who has three victories over Brown to his credit, will not start in one of the local games.

Both Jean Dubuc and Jack Flynn will stand pat on their regular lineups for this afternoon's meeting, but will make a change in the pitching selections. Sondheim worked for the Bruins against Harvard Saturday. Flynn was so pleased with the work of Wineapple in the last previous series tussle that he prefers him over the usual starter, McElroy. The Olneyville boy went to the mound at the start of all of last year's contests, winning the first and third by 4-1 decisions and being knocked out of the box in the second, and then pitched the Dominicans to a victory over Brown in the first of this year's games. In the second contest, a week and a half ago, Brown drove McElroy from the mound and Frank Buckley and Wineapple were rushed to the rescue. Rawlings has not started against the Friars since the second game last season, and with the exception of the opening game of the season, this will be his first start on the rubber in a major contest this season.

Since the Bruins evened the series a week ago Saturday with a surprising 5-3 victory, the Dominicans have returned to winning form, scoring a victory over Georgetown, while Brown has added a second victory and lost once more. The Bruins nosed out Rhode Island State College 7-2 and were victims of chance at Harvard when they lost 4-2.

Wineapple appears to have returned to the form which made him such a dangerous hurler in 1928, but Rawlings is only beginning to reach his previous standards. The blonde veteran pitched good ball in the Rhode Island contest, but grew weak because of a sore arm in the last two innings. This was his first impressive performance this year, aside from his relief duty in the Pennsylvania game, when he allowed only a pair of hits in seven innings. Wineapple's most recent first-quality exhibition was against Georgetown last Friday when the Dominicans won the only game they played during the week.

Brown still holds the edge since the series started in 1924, having won eight of the 14 contests. But Providence has been coming along rapidly in recent years, although Brown won both of the 1927 contests. Last season was the first that the series has included three games, with the Dominicans winning the first and third contests.

# Back Until Eighth Frame

Trio of Hits Brings in Lone Run by Wineapple.—Bruins Pass Chances.

Bunching three of their four hits in the eighth and saving Eddie Wineapple on four occasions with superb fielding, the Providence College Dominicans captured the city championship yesterday afternoon with a 1-0 victory over a desperate Brown University nine. A crowd of 2500 saw a thrilling climax to one of the most interesting series played by these local rivals, and watched Pete Rawlings, Brown veteran, pitch a great brand of ball.

Wineapple was unable to stop the Brown attack, but his supporting cast, playing brilliantly and making good use of Bruin base-running mistakes, kept him on even terms with his blonde rival until the eighth when the trio of hits sent the Salem southpaw over the plate with the deciding tally. After the first three stanzas, during which five Friars reached the paths, Providence was unable to make any impression on Rawlings's air-tight hurling, and the winners went hitless until Duffy beat out a hit to deep short in the seventh. While Rawlings was checking the Dominicans in this effective manner, Brown was putting men on bases in every frame and gathered seven safeties.

Bruins Pass Chances The Bruins passed up a number of chances to score, while the fast Dominican fielding performance, which included a quartet of double plays, further assisted the winning southpaw to bring the number of Providence victories in 15 series games to seven. In the second, third, fifth, seventh and ninth innings, Brown threatened, but the four twinkillings, combined with poor work by Brown base runners, prevented the potential tallies from being scored.

MAY 28,1929

Cappalli opened the eighth with a solid smash to left, but was thrown out at second by Rawlings on Wineapple's attempted sacrifice. Dion hit to centre, and Szydla followed with a blow to deep right, scoring Wineapple. McGinley, Brown right fielder, was slow in getting off his throw to home and although Wineapple slowed up at third for a moment, the big Dominican hurler scored. Chaiklin pegged to second in an attempt to get Szydla, but McGinn threw to Gurll trying to catch Dion. Gurll returned the ball to the plate and the Dominican left gardner was retired by Chaiklin, Wright threw out Fleurent at first to end the inning.

Wineapple assisted Brown by distributing 11 bases on balls, four of them in the second, and was hit consistently after the second, but Brown never bunched hits successfully. On two occasions when a timely hit promised a run, the Bruins were kept scoreless by poor work on the bases. There were a dozen Brown men stranded, and seven retired on the bases, so that the free tickets and seven hits were of little value.

#### Double Plays Timely.

Brown threatened first in the second, a double play being followed by three walks in succession, but Rawlings was retired on strikes. A second double play in the third pulled Wineapple out of another hole, for Brown had two men on bases with only one out when Cappalli, Main and Duffy caught Mc-Ginley and Wright on the latter's infield blow. Crane was caught at second on Chaiklin's hit to short in the fourth and two men went out in order after the bases had been filled with one out in the fifth.

In the sixth inning, with two out, two Bruins reached the paths, but Chaiklin was nailed at third on Freedman's roller to Dion. Again in the seventh, Brown had a fine opening, but McGinley's slow work on an attempt to score from second on Wright's timely hit made it possible for Providence to work a third double play and choke off the rally.

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The last Dominican double play was staged in the ninth and provided a finish entirely in keeping with the rest of the game. Flora batted for Rawlings and was passed, while Freedman sacrificed. McGinley drew a walk, but Moulton flied to Fleurent. The Brown pinch hitter had advanced too far off second to get back safely, and was retired on Fleurent's heave to Main, ending the game.

From the end of the third until Duffy broke into the hit column in the seventh, Rawlings sent the Dominicans back in order, and after Duffy had opened with his grounder to short in the inning preceeding the winning rally, the next three Providence batters were retired in succession. The Brown veteran walked four, one in the first and second, and two in the third, and hit Szydla, also in the third, but seemed to grow more effective as the game progressed while Wineapple's arm tired noticeably.

Providence did not draw all of the fielding honors, however, for Freedman and McGinn staged one of the fastest double plays of the game in the second, and Wright raced over to second to grab Harraghy's grounder in the fourth and delay for two more innings the first Friar hit



An international baseball game, with the Meiji University nine of Tokio, Japan, providing the opposition for the strong Providence College outfit will be one of the feature attractions of the day for baseball fans of this city. The Japanese are slated to start action on Hendricken Field at 3:15 o'clock and the largest crowd ever to witness a contest on the Friars' home field is expected.

Knowing well that his charges will have their hands full to come through with their 15th win of the season by topping the Japanese invaders this afternoon, Coach Flynn is undecided on his pitching selection. He will have to have a strong twirler ready for action against the St. John's nine here Saturday.

Frank Buckley, clever flinger from Roxbury who turned in a good game against the William and Mary nine, although he was forced to finish on the short end of the score, may be awarded with the assignment today, with Tom McElroy and Frankie Moran ready to swing into action on a moment's notice. Should Fockley be able to go the route, the latter two twirlers will be prepared to face the Friars' old rivals from Brooklyn here Saturday.

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The Meiji nine gave Holy Cross a hard run for the decision at Worcester Tuesday, driving Ray Dobens from the mound and turning in a sensational game affield. The Japanese have long been noted for their agility and this asset has helped them to field some remarkable defensive nines in the past few years. The Meiji cutht, champions of the Orient, proved formidable opposition for most of the Western colleges of this country, winning 19 games of a 29 game schedule.

In Zenimura, right fielder and captain of the team, the visitors from across the Pacific boast one of the finest all-round baseball artists in Japan. Coach Okada, mentor of the Meiji nine, and himself a brilliant baseball player, believes that Zenimura would have no 'trouble in making major league competition in this country.

Herai, conqueror of Iowa and Michigan, will probably draw the mound work against the Friars, although there are no less than five clever hurlers with the invaders, all of whom have proved to be first class timber in their American competitions. As the game here completes the Japanese tour of this country, they will sail for England on Saturday, the mentor will be ready to use his entire staff of moundamen, if necessary, to clinch the verdict.

GRADUATE MANAGER JOHNNY FARRELL spent several months negotiating for a game between the Dominicans and the strong Meiji University team of Japan and he will also look at the world with smiling eyes if his efforts are rewarded with well-filled stands this afternoon. The Meiji nine is a colorful team according to reports and capable of giving any of Uncle Sam's college outfits a real fight. Playing Holy Cross Tuesday at Worcester, Meiji went down in a stubbornly waged contest, Coach Barry's great batsmen pounding out a victory, their 18th in 19 starts in intercollegiate circles.

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Defeating Brown in the final and deciding battle of the series put the Friars in rare fighting trim and they expect to climb a notch or two on the collegiate ladder by vanquishing both the Meiji nine today and St. John's Saturday. Tom McElroy, who wanted another shot at the Bears Tuesday, but warmed the bench, will probably draw the pitching assignment.

## MEIJI SURPRISES FRIARS; WINS 8-6

Japanese College Nine Keeps Dominicans on Edge Throughout Game.

Playing its first international contest the Providence College baseball aggregation bowed to a superior nine from Japan on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon when the Meiji University team of Tokio completed its American tour by tacking an 8 to 6 defeat on the Friars. The game was by far the fastest and most exciting the Dominicans have engaged in this year.

Meiji presented a colorful team and an aggregation that could hit and field exceptionally well. In Tabe, sensational shortstop, the visitors from the Orient presented a youngster who would be an asset to any major league nine. He was easily the outstanding performer of the fray.

Combing the offerings of Buckley and Moran for 13 hits Meiji piled up a commanding lead in the final stage of the fray, which proved to be needed when the Friars in a ninth inning attack, with Lobdell leading the way with a home run over the right field fence, netted four runs. The Japs proved fast on the bases and had the locals on edge throughout the tilt to hold them in check.

#### Meiji Lives Up to Reports

In handing the Friars their fifth setback of the season, the Meiji nine lived up to advance rc orts of its ability. In Nakamura, pitcher; Tabe, shortstop, and Washio, first baseman, the visitors presented three stars who were selected as the best college performres in Japan's collegiate ranks, and all three proved their wor''. Tabe roved the shortfield to frustrate every attempt of the Friars to punch a hit through his territory. Nakamura had matters well in hand throughout the clash, until he weakened in the ninth, an I Washio was the slugging ace of the day, gamering four hits out of five trips to the plate.

Leo Lobdell ave the final thrill to the fine game whan he poled the longest hit ever made on Hendricken Field, driving the ball over the right field fence, the horsehide clearing the barrier with 30 feet to spare. The blow came with the bases loaded and enabled the locals to boost their count to six. Incidentally, Lobdell wins the unique honor of being the first Providence ball tosser to perform the feat of driving a homer out of the Smith Hill ball park.

#### Tabe Brilliant Flash

While both teams flashed some fine fielding, it was the work of the diminutive Tabe, shortstop for the Meiji nine, which caught the favor of the large holiday crowd. In the third he broke up a rally when he made a fine stop of Szydla's grounder near second, stepped on that base to force out Dion, and completed the double killing with a lightning to first. In the fourth he won the plaudits of the fans with a spectacular unassisted double play, which he started when he hurled himself into the air to pull down Duffy's line drive, and then doubled Fleurent c " the keystone sack. Nakamura, a rangy right hander with

Nakamura, a rangy right hander with plenty of speed, managed to keep the locals in check, allowing but three scattered hits in the first four innings.

In the third Zenimura, captain of the invaders, broke the ice with a hard blow through the box, the ball bounding off Buckley's shins, pilfering second and scoring on Washio's first hit, a clean single to left. Another counter was chalked up the following stanza when Tezuka and Nakamura walked with two out and Capalli booted Mano's easy roller, adding to the miscue with a wild peg to first to allow a run to trickle across the plate.

Buckley met disaster in the fifth after two were out. Washio smashed his second hit into right field, and Sumida followed with a one baser into centre. Then Masu, the Babe Ruth of Japan's colleges, contributed a hard drive over Szydla's head for a home run.

### Providence Gets Two

Providence came back with a brace of tallies in its half of the same canto. Main singled to right and Capalli walked. Wineapple, hitting for Buckley grounded out, the runners moving up a peg on the play. Nakamura tightened and fanned Dion, Szydla ducked a fast shoot, and in so doing popped a bunt along third which Sumida retrieved and threw wild to first, both Main and Cappalli scoring.

Moran twirled fine ball for three frames, and then met the fate of Buckley when the Japs broke loose with a strong ninth inning rally. Three singles, a double, a sacrifice and an error -tted three runs before the Friars were finally able to halt the rally. Moran making a fine double play on fielding Masu's roller, pegging to Cappalli at second for the forceout and the latter player com-



pleting the double killing with a speedy throw to Duffy.

## ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE SURPRISES DOMINICANS IN 12-6 SLUGFEST

**Brooklyn Collegians Upset Friars** 

Brooklyn Batsmen Assault McElroy, Bradley and Moran for 1 Wallops, Including Three Triples and Five Doubles.—Three Hits for Harraghy

Game played: JUNE 1,1929

Pounding out seventeen hits and twelve runs, the St. John's College nine of Brooklyn staged a real upset on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon by smashing through with a 12 to 6 triumph over Jack Flynn's Providence Colleeg aggregation. The Dominicans took the invaders over by an 11 to 7 score in New York last Easter week and as a result were forced to make a clean sweep of the series.

Three hurlers were used by the Smith Hillers in an effort to stave off the terrific attacks launched by the visitors, but neither McElroy, Bradley, or Moran, the trio to toil for the White and Black cause, proved effective enough to stem the sluggers. Eight of the hits were extra base knocks, three being triples, five doubles.

Posnack, considered by major league scouts to be one of the best outfield prospects in college ranks, proved that he is league timber. In five trips to the plate he hammered out two triples, and a double. All three blows cleared the outfielders' heads and rolled to the centerfield fence. Only the fact that Lobdell, Dominican outer gardener was playing deep, prevented the double from being a three base blow.

Fernandez, a stocky southpaw with good control had matters well in hand, allowing the Flynnmen but six scattered hits, and holding them in check whenever they threatened to be dangerous. Joe Harraghy, veteran catcher of the Friars was the only member of that aggregation able to wield his bludgeon effectively, the Taunton junior garnering three hits.

The visitors turned in some fine work afield, the outer gardeners handling everything driven their way, with but one miscue, Posnack dropping Harraghy's riser after a hard run in the fourth, while the infield chipped in with a pair of double killings. Evers starfed the first such play to break up a rally in the first inning, and Krist engineering the start of a second one to spoil the Dominicans chance of a score in the sixth.

St. John's scored first, chalking up two markers in the first liming and adding another one in the fourth. The Dominicans counted once in the second, and then rallied to tie the score at three all in the fourth. A heavy St. John's rally in the sixth, netting five runs, gave the lead to the visitors, and three runs in the electrh and one in the ninth placed the verdict far beyond the reach of the Smith Hillers, whose final effort resulted in three runs in the last of the eighth.

Lobdell made a fine bld for a running catch off Clynick's bat as the game got underway, but the ball eluded him and the hit was good for two bases. Copper popped out to Cappalli, but Posnack rammed a long drive into left, the ball bounding past Szwila to the fence. Collins flied to Lobdell and Posnack raced home on the out.

Harraghy singled to start the second frame, but was forced out at second when Main grounded to Evers. Cappalli was walked, and McElroy hit to third, Evers booting the chance and Main slid across the plate with the first Providence run. Dion flied out to halt the rally.

In the fourth both teams counted, with the Friars tying the score in their half. St. John's added one run when Evers doubled to center, and Kinszrunner followed with a two-bagger to the same spot a few moments later. The Dominicans garnered two tallies on one hit. Harraghy was safe when Posnack dropped his fly, and Evers made a poor peg to second for a force out on Main's grass cutter, the ball going into the outfield to allow both runners to race flearer the home station. Cappalli contributed a timely single to left to score both players.

In the sixth Cappalli started trouble when he mussed up Krist's grounder, and then overthrew first. Fernandez singled to right, and Clynick dropped a bingle into the same territory. Cooper continued the assault with a one baser into center, and Coach Flynn rushed Bradley to the rescue. With two out, Posnack greeted Bradley with a long triple over Lobdell's head, clearing the bases. ## O'Connor Holds Dominicans to Five Hits, B. C. Wins 3-0

Visitors Bunch Safeties Off Wineapple to Score in First, Fifth and Seventh.

Playing brilliantly behind their clever southpaw ace, Shaker O'Connor, the Boston College nine hung up its 15th victory of the season by shutting out the Providence College ball tossers on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon, 3-0. The defeat is the third straight to be sustained by the Smith Hillers, and marks their seventh setback of the year.

The contest was a fine pitchers' battle all the way between Eddie Wineapple, elever portsider of the Friars, and O'Connor, with honors about even. Both fanned five men and both proved strong in the pinches. The ability of the sluggers from the Hub to bunch their safe blows in the first, fifth and seventh innings spelled the defeat of the Dominican performer.

O'Connor, with a fine change of pace. held the Friars well in check throughout, although no small share of the honor belongs to the fine aggregation he had behind him. Time and again the Friars attempted to break loose, but every effort was frustrated by sharp fielding on the part of the visitors. Five scattered hits were all that O'Connor permitted during the fray.

### Weston Gets One Hit

Al Weston, home-run king of the New England colleges, and leader of the Eagles, falled to show anything against Wineapple's deceptive slants yesterday, retiring via the strikeout route twice, and getting but one hit in four trips to the platter. The hitting honors of the day went to Colbert, rugged catcher of the Newton nine, who collected a double and a single to lead the Eagles' attack.

The fielding features of the clash went to the Friars, with Cappalli staging a clever double Killing unassisted in the seventh when he speared Spögnardi's line drive over second and doubled Paddy Creedon off the keystone sack, while Joe Duffy calle to the fore with a brilliant pickup of Cappalli's poor throw to first in the fifth to prevent an error and to hold a runner on third. Spognardi with five chances at short without a miscue was the shining light in the Eagles' infield. Bocton chalked up an unearned run in the first inning. Creedon, first batter, walked. 

Both were effective many times in the pinches, and although the Friars' Senior was forced to take the loser's end, he had the satisfaction of toiling at his best in behalf of the Black and White cause.

In the fatal ninth, with the score deadlocked, Musgrove, third baseman of the visitors, dropped a bunt along third which both McElroy and Dion went after at top speed. However, their efforts were in vain, as the fleet Iowan raced safely to the first sack, and the winning rally was started. Sahs carried out his assignment perfectly, dropping a bunt along first to prevent a play at second for a forceout there. Then Glassgow, sturdy shortstop, who has been one of the athletes listed in the banning of Iowa from the Big Ten, came through with a onebase smash to centrefield to score Musgrove.







Daterest in Eastern intercollegiate baseball, which is nearing the end of a record season, shifted to New England during the last week. Only seventeen games were played.

In the matter of activity Holy Cross and Boston College were the busiest. Each played and won three games, the former increasing its winning streak to nineteen straight, and its season's record to twenty-four victories and one defeat. Boston College has now won fifteen and lost three games. 

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Among the pitchers the work of Nekola was the outstanding feature. When he struck out weive Harvard batsmen. Saturday he brought his total of strikeouts for the season up to 112. Other members of the Crusader pitching staff have also been effective. Hebert has struck out 55, Dobens, 35; Sime, 21, and Fredericks, 11. Additional features of Nekola's record include four shutout games and the fact that he has passed but twenty men in eleven contests. The only record which approaches Nekola's strikeout mark is the one held by Demucchio, of Ruigers, who has fanned .seventy-two batters in seven games.

#### Unbeaten Ranks Lose Two

The list of unbeaten pitchers was reduced during the week when Bresiloff, of Syracuse, and Page, of Harvard, lost for the first time. Nichols, of Amherst, has won eight straight; O'Connor, of Boston College, seven; Demucchio, of Rutgers; Drewes, of Penn, and Hebert, of Holy Cross, six, and Heydt, of Princeton; Clyde, of N. Y. U., and Johnson, of Springfield, four.

Continuining the probe on the Holy Cross team it is found that the Crusaders have won eight by shutout scores. Their one defeat was by Princeton, 3 to 1. The first winning streak of Holy Cross was five games and was compiled at the expense of the University of Richmond, William and Mary, Georgetown, Brown and the Quantico Marines. Then Princeton, always a stumblinig block for the Crusaders, won. Since then victories have been recorded over Providence College, Brown, Yale (twice), Fordham (twice), William and Mary, Lafayette, Penn State, N. Y. U., St. Lawrence, Tufts, Georgetown, Meiji, of Japan; Boston College, Harvard (twice), Springfield and the University of Iowa.
