

## Reappointed Coach



Archie Golembeski, Who Again Will Direct Providence College Football Squad Next Fall.

### GOLEMBESKI AGAIN DOMINICAN COACH

Plans Early Fall Conditioning in Lieu of Spring Football Practice.

The reappointment of Anthony A. Golembeski as football coach of the Providence College eleven for the coming season was announced last night by the Dominican college athletic authorities. The announcement puts to rest rumors that the popular Holy Cross alumnus would not handle the grid reins at the Smith Hill college next fall.

Golembeski has been 'Varsity coach of the Black and White eleven for the past four years and in spite of the fact that his elevens have been faced with formidable schedules has had a creditable record. Of the 33 football games that the Dominicans have played since the Crusader alumnus took over the reins as mentor, eight were won and seven were tied.

This fall Golembeski will return to meet nearly 20 lettermen in addition to many capable moleskin artists who falled to win 'Varsity awards last year, but who can be counted upon to make strong bids for places on the 1929 eleven. Steve Nawrocki, tackle and captain last fall, and Joseph Watterson, veteran centre, are the only players to be lost by graduation.

No spring practice session will be held by Coach Golembeski according to his plans at present, but an early start will be made in the fall. The date of Sept. 3, the day following Labor Day, has been tentatively set, by the Dominican mentor for the inauguration of football activity on Hendricken Field.

Coach Golembeski is at present serving as director of physicial education at St. Mary's school in Worcester, and is planning to spend his time this summer as an instructor at a New England college.

PROVIDENCE COLLEGE has been in the front rank of the East's leading baseball teams for several years and this season has a basketball quintet that undoubtedly would finish on a high rung of the Intercollegiate League ladder if berthed with the select clubs on that fast circuit. Football has never been a winner from a playing or financial angle at the Smith Hill institution of learning and judging from the elevens that are to furnish the opposition next fall the Dominicans will have to step down the line at a slashing pace to get a fifty-fifty break on the schedule.

Graduate Manager Farrell did not toss any roses in Coach Archie Golembeski's path when he booked Rutgers for the opening contest and Holy Cross for the second. Colgate and Middlebury will not be rated as easy games, but once those teams are out of the way the Dominicans should finish with a string of three victories at the expense of Coast Guard, St. John's and Lowell Textile.

It was reported late in the fall that the services of the old Holy Cross standard to be dispensed with and a new coach signed, but Golly will be at the helm again, according to a graduate in close touch with the college.

## DOMINICAN ELEVEN TO PLAY COLGATE THIS FALL

Rutgers, Holy Cross, Lowell Textile, Middlebury Listed

Veteran Team Faces Strong
Schedule.—Three Tilts to
Be Played Here.

An eight-game football schedule which includes feature tilts with Rutgers University, Holy Cross, Canisius and Colgate was announced for the Providence College gridders of this fall by Graduate Manager John E. Farrell of the Dominican college. Five games are listed to be played away from here, while the remaining three will be staged on Hendricken Field.

The new program for the Smith Hill gridders is lighter than the card of last fall when Williams, Army, Temple and Springfield were listed among the opponents of the Black and White. With a strong array of veteran material available the locals expect to make a fine showing against the competition that has been lined up for the coming campaign.

Newcomers to the schdeule are Rutgers, marking the first contest between
the Jersey university and the Smith Hillers; Canisius College of Buffalo, which
will make its appearance here on Columbus Day; Colgate, returning to the list
after a two-year absence; Middlebury,
which was last played in 1926, and Lowell
Textile, one of the undefeated teams of
the East last fall.

In addition to the Canisius game here on Oct. 12, Ben Beck's Middlebury aggregation will make its appearance on Smith Hill on Nov. 2, and two weeks later the St. John's College outfit of Brooklyn, rival' of the locals, will come here for their seventh grid encounter with the Dominicans.

The schedule will be opened with the game with Rutgers University at New Brunswick, N. J., inaugurating athletic relations between the two schools. Rutgers always boasts strong grid outfits, and for the past two years has been one of the major opponents on Holy Cross's grid list.

It will be the fifth time that the Providence grid stalwarts have performed on Fitton Field. The locals have yet to annex a win over the Crusaders in the fall sport, but will make a strong bid for such a victory next season.

Canisius, one of the outstanding teams of the East last fall, being beaten but once, by the undefeated Boston College eleven, will renew relations with the locals after a seven year lapse of activity. The Smith Hillers invaded Buffalo in 1922 and dropped a 15 to 6 decision in a blinding snowstorm, and since that time neither college has met in competition. Coached by Luke Urban, Fall River resident, and one of the greatest athletes ever developed at Boston College, Canisius will prove a powerful opponent for the locals to subdue.

Oct. 19 is an open date on the schedule at present, and although the Dominicans have been offered several opportunities to book a game, according to Graduate Manager Farrell, it will probably remain vacant in view of the Colgate game listed for the following Saturday at Hamilton, N. Y. The meeting between the New York Staters and the locals will mark their fourth grid com-


Middlebury, coached by Ben Beck, former Medford high mentor, and well known Brown star, pays a visit to these Plantations on the first Saturday in November to meet the Black and White eleven. The Dominicans tussled to a 13-13 tie at Middlebury three years ago, and the return tilt carded for this city the following campaign, was washed away when the Vermont floods intervened.

Continuing their relations with the Coast Guard Academy the Dominicans will travel to New London on Nov. 9 while Brown entertains Dartmouth at the local stadium. Last fall the Cadets eked out a tie game with the Smith Hillers.

St. John's, oldest rival of the locals, will come here on Nov. 16, meeting the Providence outfit for the seventh successive campaign. In this rival series the Dominicans have won two, lost one and tied three. The game in Brooklyn last season ended in a scoreless decision.

Lowell Tech's undefeated eleven will close its campaign with the Smith Hillers at Lowell. The last grid clash between the two schools was in 1924, when Providence scored a one touchdown win in the Massachusetts city.

## Friar Football Candidates Will Report Next Week

Coach Golembeski to Start Fifth Season .- Faces Huge Task.

Seventeen lettermen are numbered among the candidates who have been invited to start pre-season football practice at Providence College on Ionday, Sept. 9, according to an announcement made last night by Graduate Manager John E. Farrell.

The opening date this season is later than that of last fall, and as a result Coach Archie Golembeski, who is returning for his fifth campaign with the Friars, will have but 21/2 weeks in which to round out an eleven to take the field against Rutgers at New Brunswick on the final Saturday of this month.

Although but two players were lost by graduation last June, Steve Nawrocki, tackle, who will coach Durfee high's eleven this fall, and Joe Watterson, centre, who is to be an instructor at Seton Hall College at South Orange, N. J., several other members of the 1928 squad will be absent from the drills this month for various reasons. Ineligibility has removed Johnny Dublenny, versatile triple threat fullback from Fall River; McVarish, end candidate from Waltham, and Fleurent, clever three-sports star from Ware from the ranks.

Two Candidates Withdraw

McAlevy, rugged tackle from Pawtucket, who developed into one of the best linemen on the Dominican equad last fall, will enter Tufts College, having won the C. M. T. C. four-year scholar-ship, while Murphy, 'Varsity guard, is transferring to Loyola College in Baltimore. Two end candidates are lost with the announcements from Buckley, who starred as a member of the 'Varsity baseball team last spring, and Curran, husky Junior from Nashua, that they planned to work during the fall, thus preventing their taking part in the gridiron activ-

Prospects are bright however, for a fairly successful season. material, well acquainted with Golembeski's system of play, awaits the call to action. Marty Gibbons, clever, athlete from Clinton, who will captain the team from a halfback berth, heads an array of veteran backfield which should provide the Dominicans with a real scoring punch in their clashes this fall.

Assisting Captain Gibbons in smashing opposing lines will be Mickey Foster, rugged ball-carrier from Pitts-field Who field who won a regular assignment in his first year at the Smith Hill college, Johnny Brady, of Pawtucket, whose broken field broken field running in the Holy Cross game last November stamped him as a real find and Szydla, basketball captain, and veteran halfback on the elevens for the past three campaigns.

Center is Weak Link Fred DoGata and Johnny Turco will

be on hand to handle the fullback assignment, while Joe Sharkey and Walt Baeszler will head the staff of quarterbacks. Sharkey generalled the team in most of the tilts last fall, and will round out a veteran backfield to start the clash

Center appears to be the weakest link in the line at present, unless Coach Golembeski uses Jim Zande, husky senior at that assignment. Zande alternated between center and guard work last year, and performed equally well at both positions. Other experienced pivot-men include Eddie Nawrocki and Leo

The guard berths should be well taken care of, as five lettermen are available for those assignments. Manley Zande, letterman for the past two years, will return to battle for his berth on the right side of the line, and will meet strong opposition from Len Sweeney, Joe. Minella, Charlie Ritter and Charlie Jaworski, all of whom have seen action under the Black and White colors.

With Gordon White, 200-pound Ware junior, McGovern, husky Michigan sophomore, John Baeszler of Staten Island and Leo Lobdell, rangy Paterson athlete, returning, the mentor will have a nucleus for the tackle positions. Three lettermen will aspire to guard the flanks, as Charlie John, Jack Halloran and Dixie Matthews are expected to be on hand a week from tomorrow.

With Rutgers furnishing opposition for the Friars on the 28th of this month, Coach Golembeski will have to drive his squad at a fast clip in order to field a well drilled aggregation to open the campaign. Following the Rutgers tilt comes the game with Holy Cross at Worcester on October 5. The remainder of the schedule is as follows: Oct. 12, Canisius College (of Buffalo) at Providence; 19, open; 26, Colgate at Hamilton, N. Y.; Nov. 2, Middlebury at Providence; 9, Coast Guard Academy at New London, Conn.; 16, St. John's College (of Brooklyn) at Providence; 23, Lowell Textile at Lowell, Mass.

## To Lead Friar's Eleven



Marty Gibbons, Veteran Halfback, Who Will Captain the Providence College Football Team in the Season Which Starts Today.

### Dominican Coach Expects To Have Strong Backfield

Providence College Grid Squad Holds First Practice This Morning.

Nearly 30 candidates are expected to answer the first gridiron call at Providence College today when Coach Archie Golembeski starts the Friars on their 10th 'Varsity football campaign in intercollegiate competition. The first drill is listed for this morning, but in all prob-ability it will be a short one, owing to

the fact that many of the gridders will not arrive here until this afternoon. Capt. Marty Gibbons, halfback, and Mark McGovern, tackle, headed the return of the moleskin artists, both making their appearance in town last night. Gibbons heads a strong array of backfield material which shapes up as one of the best ever to wear the Black and White.

Starting ear: this morning, Student Manager Robert M. Dwyer, who himself made quite a record in Rhode Island schoolboy athletic ranks three years ago, will issue equipment to all players reporting for action. The mentor hopes to have a squad of 10 out in togs for the conditioning exercises this afternoon.

With the loss of such stalwarts as Steve Nawrocki, who will coach the Durfee high eleven this fall, and Joe Watterson, veteran centre, who will teach at Seton Hall Prep in New Jersey, by graduation, and Tom Murphy, Gordon White and Charlie McAlevy, by transfer, Golembeski will have to uncover some strong lin-men to be able to carry the Dominican colors to triumph this

Although three experienced tackles are lost, there are some capable youngsters returning for action who should turn in some good work. Leo Lobdell, John Baeszler and Mark McGovern are three husky tackles who served throughout the 1928 campaign. In addition a promising recruit has been uncovered in Tom Shea, 200-pound Fall River lad who played with Durfee high two years ago under Bert Shurtleff, but was unable to serve with the Friars last fall owing to illness.

With Nap Fleurent, one of the few three-sports men to be developed at the Smith Hill college, definitely out of college owing to scholastic troubles, the veteran mentor will have but one seasoned quarterback to round out a vet-eran eleven. Joe Sharkey, Lowell Junior, is favored to handle the assignment in

the coming campaign.

The drills will be held twice daily until the start of the college classes, a week from next Thursday. With but three weeks in which to put his squad in first class condition Golembeski will have to start intensive drills, with scrimmage as the feature, by this week-end.

# GREETS 28 GRIDMEN

Tomassis and Bleiler, Former Lettermen, Report.—Rain Halts Practice.

Twenty-eight candidates, including 10 lettermen of last year's squad, answered Coach Archie Golembeskie's initial grid call at Providence College yesterday. Owing to the inclement weather the veteran mentor was forced to abandon his plans for an outdoor drill, holding a short meeting for the discussion of the changes of the rules instead.

The large opening day turnout presages an exceptionally large squad of moleskin artists before the present week is ended, as there are many veterans, as well as newcomers, slated to report today and tomorrow. The mentor will start active work on Hendricken Field this morning, when he meets the squad at 10 o'clock, and a second drill will occupy the afternoon.

#### Former Lettermen Report.

Two former lettermen, both of whom were missing from the squad last, fall, put in an appearance yesterday, when Johny Tomassi, rugged guard and Senior classman from this city, and Charlie Bleiler, Sophomore, signal barker from Everett, reported to Golembeski. Tomassi was forced to give up football last fall, while Bleiler dropped out of college for a year in order to work.

Bleller will help to ease Coach Golembeski's worries about the quarterback work, as Joe Sharkey, Lowell junior, was the only letter man returning for that assignment, as Nap Fleurent failed to meet the scholastic requirements and so dropped out of college this summer. Bleller shared the work with Fleurent throughout the 1927 campaign and turned in some fine work.

## FRIARS JOINED BY MCORMACK Prov. Trebune

#### 185-Pound Tackle, Who Starred With Tech in 1925, Reports

Charlie McCormack, junior classman at Providence College who made an enviable rep as a football performer while at Tech high several years ago, is the latest recruit to Archie Golembeski's growing list of gridiron candidates. Mc-Cormack reported yesterday for the first time. Although he spent last year at the Smith Hill college he did not go out for football, preferring to devote his time to his studies.

McCormack, who scales in the neighborhood of 185 pounds, starred for three years at Tech, playing on the brilliant State championship outfit in 1925 at a tackle assignment. Following his graduation from Tech he played at Massee School in Connecticut where he won all New England Prep school honors for his fine work. Two years ago he enrolled at Holy Cross and played on the Freshman team there, but transferred to the Smith Hill college a year ago.

Possessing weight and experience, Mc-Cormack is indeed a welcome addition to the Friars' ranks, and Coach Golembeski plans to spend no little time in the next two weeks in developing the husky lineman in preparation for the tilts with Rutgers and Holy Cross. The tackle ranks now appear to be one of the strongest departments of the squad, as the mentor has the veterans McGovern and Baeszler on hand, in addition to such stalwarts as Shea, former Durfee high performer, Lepine, Mt. St. Charles product, Gilligan, Pawtucket high leader of last year; Callahan, who won all-Berkshire County honors for his work at Pittsfield high two years ago, and Mardosa, former Bridgton Academy lineman.

Yesterday Golembeski spenit a good deal of time in working the various backfield combinations, and following the drill in the afternoon reported that he believed the Friars would have a real offence this campaign. Capt. Glbbons and Stan Zsydla, both veteran halves, Fred DaGata, powerful fullback, who also does the punting, and Joe Sharkey, junior quarterback, form the first string quartet which is ready to wheel into action.

Another strong set of ball carriers was lined up as follows: Bleiler at quarter, Foster and Rocco at halves, and Turco at full. A third quartet was composed of Walt Baeszler calling the signals, DePippo and Manfredonia at halves, and Olson, husky West Warwick lad, at full.

With such an array of eager backs it is little wonder that Golembeski is facing the future with a bright outlook. The work of the next two weeks will be to get the ball carriers to perfect their plays, and from the way that Capt. Gibbons' mates went through their paces the past week it is evident that Rutgers will be in for a busy afternoon two weeks hence.

Many more candidates are expected to report at the drills to-morrow, as it is registration day at the college, and the newcomers will be on hand to prepare for the start of their classes on Thursday, when the double grid sessions will be halted.

### P. C. FACES STRUNG FOE ON SATURDAY

Rutgers Relying on Group of Sophomores from Undefeated Freshman Team.

New Brunswick, N. J., Sept. 22.—A strong Rutgers football team will be the foe of Providence College in the opening game of this season for both teams, here Saturday. The contest will mark the first contest in any sport between the two institutions.

Although only three games were lost in the nine-game Rutgers schedule played last fall, the scarlet-jerseyed outfit aims to down all its major opponents in this campaign. Rutgers will rely on a powerful group of Sophomore candidates, who formed an undefeated Freshman team a year ago, to perform the feat.


For the past two years, Lionel Conacher, a Canadian who is somewhat of an expert in the lateral passing and rugby football game, has been teaching the Rutgers grid performers how to throw laterals. The locals will depend largely on this style of game.

The ace of the Rutgers aggregation is Grossman, a big hard running triple threat, who will do the kicking. Paired with Grossman is Jerry Cronin, a defence man. With these athletes, both Sophomores, available to round out the backfield, a good season is expected.

The Providence outfit will need a powerful offence to smash through the line that is being groomed to start the opening clash on Saturday. Captain Bernard Crowl, who has played every minute of every game for the past four years both at high school and college, will start his fifth grid campaign at centre and will be flanked by a pair of heavy guards in Bert Harris and Von Glahn.

Dick Knaus, a short stock tackle who did well last year in breaking up plays will pair at the tackle assignments with Smoyer, 210 pounds, who came up from the Freshman team. Don Coursen, veteran of the past two years and George Cronin, the latter a halfback last fall, will handle the wings.

With the best array of talent that he has had at his command in years, Coach Rockafeller anticipates a victory over the Dominicans in the curtain raiser, in spite of the fact that advance reports from Rhode Island indicate that a strong eleven will swing into action here Satur-



### Powerful Rutgers Eleven Topples Dominicans, 17-0

Providence College, Outweighed 10 Pounds Per Man, Fights Hard Throughout.

(Special to the Providence Journal) Brunswick, N. J., Sept. 28 .- With the finest eleven to wear its colors in five years, the powerful Rutgers University aggregation opened its grid campaign here today by toppling an aggressive Providence College team by a 17 to 0

Although outweighed 10 pounds to a man, the Friars fought hard throughout the clash and on several occasions threatened the Rutgers goal. In Grossman, 190-pound fullback, the Scarlet uncovered a backfield performer of rare ability, a long distance kicker, passer, and a hard running back when yardage was needed through the line.

Dixie Matthews, dusky left end of the visitors, won the plaudits of the crowd as he left the field late in the final period after performing brilliantly in breaking up opposing plays. His work in stopping Grossman several times was outstanding.

Dagata Forced Out Early

The Friars were handicapped when Fred Dagata, fullback, was forced to withdraw in the second period owing to illness. Dagata punted on even terms with Grossman in the first quarter, and his loss from the lineup forced Chick Bleiler to do the kicking.

The work of the Providence line stood out. Five times they forced Rutgers to yield the ball on downs, after Rutgers had staged guard running attacks to advance the ball well into Rhode Island

Greenberg, high scorer of the team last year, turned in the outstanding play of the game, aided by Grossman, when he raced off right end in the third period and pulled down a short pass from his burly mate, and then cut loose on a 60-yard dash for the Providence goal line. Halloran and Szydla failed to overtake the flying backfield ace, as Greenberg raced along the sideline.

Bleiler Plays Great Game. In spite of the heat, both elevens turned in some fine football. In the opening stanza, Dagata and Grossman featured with long spirals in an effort to get a break within scoring territory Once Bleiler, who played a remarkable game at quarter, let a Grossman boot roll over the goal line, but he carried the ball out of danger himself on the next play when he skirted right end for 12 yards.

Rutgers unleashing an attack on the Dominicans. Grossman, Greenberg and Stager battered through the line for first downs to plant the ball on the Friars' 15-yard stripe, where a fighting Providence line stiffened and held for downs.

Midway through the period, Rutgers broke into the scoring with a pretty field goal by Harris. Taking the ball on the Providence 35-yard stripe, the scarlet jerseyed aggregation ripped through to the five-yard tape.

A penalty for holding halted the attack temporarily, and after two aerials had been knocked down Harris dropped back out of the line and drop-kicked a field goal from the 18-yard line.

Friars Penalized Twice

On the kickoff, Foster ran the ball back to the 37-yard stripe. The next play was lost when a 15-yard penalty was tacked on the Friars. Bleiler's pass to Gibbons was intercepted by Stager on the Dominicans' 31-yard line. Another 15-yard penalty for holding forced the Friars to drop back within the shadow of their own goal line. Greenberg crashed through for seven yards and Grossman duplicated the distance on the following play to give Rutgers a first down on the one-yard tape. Greenberg hurdled the centre of the line to score the first touchdown of the year, and Harris counted the extra point with a drop kick.

With Dagata out of the lineup, Szydla played full and Foster took over a half-

back role in the second half. The latter performer immediately proceeded to rip through the Rutgers' line for substantial gains, but his efforts failed to enable the Friars to get within scoring range.


The visitors opened fire with aerials in the latter stage of the fray and their ability to pull the ball out of the air was one of the best exhibitions seen here in some time. Ten forwards were completed, all for short gains, with the exception of the aerial which Foster pulled down and carried down the field for a gain of 27 yards.





The attest a year ago was the last one of the campaign for the Dominicans, who had previously encountered Williams, Temple and the Army, and, as a result, Archie Golembeski's outfit was hardly able to withstand the assault unleashed by the Crusaders.

This week, however, with the best-looking outfit that he has had under his wing in years, Golombeski entertains hopes of giving the foo'ball stalwarts of his Alma Mater a real battle. # Crusaders Vanquish Friars as O'Connell Tallies Twice

Purple Wins 14-6.—Da Gata Makes First Dominican Score Against It in Five Tilts.

(Special to the Providence Journal.)

Worcester, Mass., Oct. 5.—A brilliant Providence College eleven held the powerful Holy Cross outfit at bay for four periods, only to lose out by a 14 to 6 count in one of the hardest fought games ever played on Fitton Field, this afternoon.

Holy Cross, the top favorite, found the going rough throughout and Coach Cleo O'Donnell of the Purple host stated after the clash that the Friars were one of the finest small college outfits he had

seen in recent years.

To Fred Da Gata, burly fullback, who has been on the sidelines for the greater part of the past two weeks, owing to illness, went the honor of scoring the first touchdown ever registered over a Crusader goal by a Providence College team. Da Gata culminated a 65-yard march for a score by making a spectacular catch of a forward from Marty Gibbons to gallop over the final chalk line for the Friars' tally.

#### Holy Cross Scores

In the second period, Da Gata was forced to punt from behind his own goal line, and hoisted a low kick which O'Connell gathered in on the run and raced 36 yards through both teams to collect the Crusaders' first score. A series of line plunging, with fresh Crusader ball carriers wearing down the resistance of the Friars' forward wall in the final period, netted the second touchdown in the finad minutes of the fourth period.

The Providence team played well. The forward wall, with the Zande brothers handling the guard berths, stopped nearly every thrust by the Furple backs. Tom Shea, rangy—Fall River Sophomore who was playing his first college tilt, and who, incidentally, was the only newcomer to the lineup, turned in a hard game at tackie.

With a dazzling aerial attack, the Rhode Islanders opened fire in the second period and swept the length of the field for their score.

#### Capt. Gibbons Honored.

Capt. Marty Gibbons was tendered a unique tribute by his fellow townsmen when several hundred delegates marched behind their band to honor the Friar leader. Between the halves Gibbons was tendered a purse by the Mayor of Clinton. Gibbons reciprocated by turning in a fine game at right half, doing most of the passing and featuring the scoring play of the Dominicans. He was forced out of the game in the second period with an ankle injury, but returned to the lineup in the fourth

Mickey Foster, hard running halfback, shared the honors with Gibbons. Foster was the only Providence back able to break through consistently, slicing off tackle repeatedly for substantial Game played:

October 5,1929

Providence received the toss and elected to receive. The Friars ripped off a first down immediately, with Foster contributing an eight-yard dash off left tackle. Forced to kick, Da Gata opened a defensive game.

· Penalty Stops Dominicans

Holy Cross collected a brace of first downs, one on a penalty, but the Friars stiffened and forced a kick. Then came one of the first breaks which worked to the disadvantage of the visitors. On a lateral pass formation, Foster tossed to Bleiler, who fumbled but recovered and raced over 40 yards before being downed. However, the referee ruled the ball dead where the Dominican signal barker had fumbled it, although it appeared that no Crusader had touched it. This ruling robbed the invaders of a chance to get within scoring range of the Crusader

The first period ended in a see-saw battle with the ball on the Providence six-yard line, when Bleiler misjudged his distance and caught a long punt from Baker within the shadow of his own goal. The Friar quarterback was tackled in his tracks by Farrell on the six-yard marker. As a result, Da Gata was forced to go behind the goal to punt.

Da Gata's boot was low and fast and came directly into O'Connell's arms. The former Brockton flash raced through both squads and galloped 35 yards to the goal line as the Holy Cross rooters went into an uproar. Baker placekicked the extra point.

#### Friars Start Aerial Attack

Baker kicked off to Jorn, who ran to his own 36-yard tape before being downed. Gibbons shot a pass to Matthews which was good for five yards. Da Gata plugged the line for two more, ard then a 20-yard aerial from Gibbons to Jorn was good when two Crusader backs interfered with the Dominican right end.

Foster ripped off a yard at right tackle and then a triple pass, Bleiler to Gibbons to Foster was good for 22 yards and put the visitors in scoring position. Gibbons picked up a yard at right tackle but Bleiler hit the line without gaining.

On the third down, Gibbons dropped back again and tossed a long pass to DaGata, who raced for the corner of the field and made a sensational catch over his head on the nine-yard tape, dashing the remainder of the distance across the final chalk line. The pass was good for 17 yards. Bleiler attempted a drop kick for the additional point, which would have tied the count at that stage of the game, but he was hurried and his boot missed the cross bar.

#### Friars Cheered

After an exchange of kicks Holy Cross launcred a strong running attack which was finally halted on the Providence 29yard line. .

The Friars broke up a pass play a minute later when Matthews deflected a toss from Baker, the ball landing in Jim Zande's arms. The Dominican guard was downed on the Crusaders' 36yard marker. Foster gained but a yard through the line, and after a lateral pass play had failed to work, Bleiler kicked high, the ball going to the locals on their own 35-yard tape.

Another Holy Cross drive was halted on the invaders' 43-yard line when the Friars took the ball on downs as the period ended.

The summary:

In the fourth quarter the Crusaders rushed a corps of fleet ball carriers into action and proceeded to outrun the Providence team. Meegan, O'Connell and Baker ploughed through for gains. But it was not until the final few minutes of play that O'Donnell's cohorts were able to collect their second score. A 60-yard march, most of which was accomplished through line plunging and end sweeps, carried the leather to the Friar two-yard line from where O'Connell-hurdled the invading eleven to tally. 

## Friars Face Canisius Today in First Home Game of Year

Captain Gibbons Will Not Start Against Buffalo Team.—Other Replacements Made.

Minus the services of its aggressive captain, Marty Gibbons, the Providence College eleven will swing into action on Hendricken Field this afternoon against Canisius College. The Canisius eleven comes here with a brilliant record, having lost buf three games in as many seasons, and boasting a veteran machine which is tutored by Luke Urban, former Boston College ace.

Captain Gibbons, veteran halfback of the Friars, will watch the tilt from the sidelines, although there is a strong possibility that he may be used for part of the game if the eleven falls to flash the power it showed at Worcester against Holy Cross last Saturday. Mosca, a fleet ball carrier from Jersey, will replace Gibbons in the lineup.

Three changes are pending in the line as Golembeski is contemplating using Eddie Nawrocki, sub centre last fall, at the pivot post, and Charles McCormack and Vin Kalishes at the tackles. The latter two gridders have been staging strong battles for the fackle assignments and for the past two weeks have had to watch McGovern and Shea in action.

#### Others May Go In

If the new members of the forward wall are able to hold the Canislus forwards in check they will probably remain in the game, otherwise the Dominican mentor plans to rush Derivian, regular centre, and Shea and McGovern, rangy tackles, to the rescue. With a

wealth of promising substitute material Golembeski is anxious to get a line on the ability of some of the candidates in preparation for the Colgate game two weeks hence, and so will use every opportunity today to test his reserves.

The Canisius squad arrived in this city late last night in a confident mood, and Coach Urban stated that he believes the eleven which he will field this afternoon against the Friars to be the best he has tutored since he took over the grid reins at the Buffalo school several years ago. In Capt, Brennan, veteran end, the visitors boast one of the finest wingmen in Eastern college ranks.

The Friars made careful preparations for the invasion of the New Yorkers by staging a long drill on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. A defence for the spread play, a popular formation of Urban's, was developed by Coach Golembeski, and a long drill in passing and running topped off the day's activities.

The game promises to attract the largest crowd ever to witness a grid tilt on Smith Hill. Although they will be playing on their home gridiron for the first time this season, the Black and white supporters will need more than the moral support of the home town folks to turn back the Canisius outfit.

#### Gibbons Out of Practice.

Capt. Gibbons remained out of the drill yesterday, but will don his togs this afternoon, and, if the team physician will permit him, will take part in the game. Gibbons has been one of the mainstays of the Friar grid machines for the past three years, and his work against Holy Cross stamped him as one of the best ball carriers the locals have ever had.

Matthews and Jorn, veteran wingmen, will be on deck, prepared to smother all Canislus plays directed their way. Both played prominent roles in the Crusader contest last week-end and can be counted upon to upset some of Luke Urban's formations this afternoon.

The Zande brothers, Jim and Manley, who are the real bulwarks in the Dominicans' forward wall, are in top condition and ready to play their usual slashing game at the guard berths. Both are fast and fit well into Golembeski's well formed attack, which calls for the use of speedy and aggressive guards.



# PROVIDENCE COLLEGE BATTLES CANISIUS TO A SCORELESS TIE

Friars in First Home Game Unable to Uncork a Scoring Punch; Absence of Gibbons Causes Aerial Attack to Falter; Other Regulars Out

Providence College opened its home grid campaign on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon by battling a heavy Canisius College outfit to a scoreless decision in a hard-fought game which was featured by the sensational broken field running of Mickey Foster, sophomore halfback of the Friars. Foster collected 119 yards from scrimmage, and was on the threwing end of most of the Dominican passes.

Forced to play without the aid of Capt. Marty Gibbons, veteran halfback, Shea and McGover, husky tackles who turned in such a brilliant game against Holy Cross a week ago, and Eddie Derivan, clever center, the Friars came through with colors flying. In addition to these players who had to watch the game from the side lines owing to injuries, Fred Da Gata, burfy halfback, and Charlie Jorn, veteran end, had to drop out of the game in the first quarter owing to injuries received in half-ing the Canisius attack.

Both elevens fought hard for a chance to score, and although both had fine opportunities to lug the leather over the final chalk mark, they were unable to uncork a scoring punch. Providence outrushed and outplayed the New Yorkers for the greater part of the fray,

Hard-Fought Tussle

in spite of the fact that there were four subs in the forward wall. The Fritars made seven first downs to five for Canisius.

Canisius treated the local fans to something new in gridiron offence in an elaborate set of plays working from a spread formation. Passes from the center were made from every angle, the ball shooting into the backfield from the end of the line, as well as from the middle. In spite of all these tricky plays, however, the Golembeskie coached machine proved too strong for the New Yorkers, and smothered every attempt to gain through the line.

The work of the Dominican reserves, although they certainly should not be called relief material after the showing they made yesterday afternoon, was especially gratifying to Golembeski. McCormack and Klalishes, at the tackles, Nawrocki, at center and Halloran on right end, replacing Jorn when the lanky sophomore was forced out of the game in the opening period, stood out in the fine-work of the forward wall.

Game played: October 12,1929

A punter, cool and collected in the pinches, came to the fore when Golembeski turned the fullback assignment over to Cy Galligan when Da Gata sustained an ankle injury late in the first period. Galligan, former Attleboro high performer, is a sophemore at the local college. In his initial college test yesterday he did the kicking in fine fashion, several times being faced with the task of booting the leather from behind his own goal line.

Aerial Attack Fails

With Capt. Gibbons out of the lineup the Friars' forward pass attack failed to click as well as it did in the first two games of the season. The Canisius outfit collected 99 yards from passes, against 30 for the Smith Hillers. But led by the hard running Berkshire back, Foster, the Friars far surpassed the invaders in rushing the ball, collecting 147 yards to

47 for the New York machine.

Providence won the toss and elected to receive. Bleiler ran the kickoff back to his own 30-yard tape. Da Gata pounded two yards at center and then Foster cut loose on a 20-yard dash off right tackle for first down. The Pittsfield flash added to the din a moment later when he dropped back and shot a 20-yard aerial to Bleiler, who took the pass on the run and was tossed offside on the Canisius 25-yard marker.

Foster slid off tackle for 8 yards and Da Gata failed to gain at center. Bleiler shot a flat pass to Foster, who took the ball on the run but fumbled it when he was tackled hard by Bukaty, Connors, Canisius center, recovered on his own 10-yard tape to halt the first attack

of the Friars.

After an exchange of kicks the locals started another attack as the period drew to a close. Starting on his own 31-yard line Foster raced off left tackle, reversed his field and galloped 23 yards before Haskell, the only Canisius man barring his way to a touchdown, pulled him down. Da Gata was hurt on the play and was replaced by Galligan. The latter immediately kicked, the ball being downed on the Canisius 22-yard stripe.

On the next play following Bukaty fumbled and Foster scooped the ball up and raced for the goal line, only to be recalled under the new ruling on recovered fumbles. Two attempts by the Friars to crack the New Yorkers' line failed, and then two pass attempts went astray

to give the ball to Canisius.

As the half drew to a close the Urban coached outfit opened fire with Its unbalanced spread formations. The Friars were slow to adjust themselves to the formation and as a result Canisius swept goalward, collecting 47 yards in rive plays. McNamara tried to skirt right end to score what would have been the winning touchdown, but he was tossed for a five-yard loss by Jack Halloran, who played a strong game on the defence. The half-time whistle ended the attack.

Canisius Nearly Scores

Canisius received the kickoff following the intermission and nearly scored on the first play following. In the mixup for the first lineup following the kick Gallagher, left end, strayed near the sidelines, where he was confused by the Friars as being one of the substitutes who were running up and down in front of the Canisius bench.

The ruse worked to perfection, as Gallagher took a long pass from Haskell and brought the crowd to its feet with a mad dash along the sideline. Three Providence forwards failed to halt his progress, and just as it appeared that he would achieve his purpose, Eddie Nawrocki, aggressive center, made a flying tackle to bring the Canisius wingman to the ground on the Domincan 14-yard chalk line.

Two-line plunges were balked and Bukaty passed long into the end zone to lose possession of the ball. Foster was tossed for a loss on the first play following, and a penalty for holding put the ball on the Providence one-yard line. Galligan rose to the occasion by punting

out to his own 28-yard tape.

A few minutes later the Friars had to make another goaline stand when Mistretta recovered a Bleiler fumble on the locals 22-yard line, and line plunging brought the leather to the 8-yard tape before the Friars stiffened and took the ball on downs. A bad pass from center to Foster was fumbled, but the Friar halfback pounced on the oval on his own two-inch line to prevent the scoring of any points as the Canisius horde swep in on him. Galligan again came through with a fine punt, to avert disaster.

Captain Gibbons went into the game late in the fourth period, and tossed a couple of passes which were unsuccessful. His ankle injury forced him to retire after but a few minutes of play, and as a result the Providence aerial attack had to be stored away for future use.


Canisius attempted a place kick for a field goal in the final minutes of play, but the kick was hurried by the locals, with the result that it barely cleared the line of surging forwards. Matthews recovered the ball and ran 20 yards before being knocked off his feet.

As the final whistle sounded Bukaty intercepted a Sharkey forward pass in

midfield.

## DOMINICANS ARE OUTPLAYED BY HEAVY COLGATE SUBS, 52-0

Providence Puts Up Scrappy Offensive, Threatening Maroon Goal Once, But Winners Are Too Strong.—Da Gata's Absence Is Felt

(Special to The Sunday Tribune)

Hamilton, N. Y., Oct. 26.—Using a strong substitute eleven, while the 'Varsity outfit which gave Indiana such a hard defeat a week ago watched from the sidelines, Colgate swamped Providence College here this afternoon, running up a 52 to 0 score. In spite of the one-sided score the tilt was well-played, and produced some fine football.

Providence possessed an aggressive outfit, but one which was apparently outweighed 10 pounds to a man, and was completely unable to stop the plunging attacks of Macaluso, Lithter, Yablok, or the cleverly executed aerial work of Conway and Reynolds. Colgate made 366 yards by rushing and 118 by passing to register its eight touchdowns and the second highest score to be made on Whitnall Field in four years.

The Dominicans from Rhode Island were handicapped in no small measure by the absence of Da Gata, star kicker and fullback, and had further woe to lament when Szydla, rugged substitute for Da Gata, fell by the wayside early in the game with an injured ankle. In addition, Foster, hard running halfback, was so badly tossed about after running back a kickoff late in the second period that he was unable to play the remainder of the game.

Colgate had matters its own way except on two occasions in the third period when the Friars formed staunch defences for their goal to take the ball on downs. The visitors were unable to cope with the clever formations of Kerr's machine at all other times, however.

Providence never threatened to score except in the last five minutes of play. After driving the entire length of the field, they lost the ball by falling to complete a pass, Sharkey to Matthews, over the goal line. The rally started as Galligan clutched a pass when on his own

In the first period Colgate tallied twice. The first score came after a 55-yard march in which the locals employed a smashing running attack which left the invaders in a daze. With Lithter and Conroy leading the way the Marcon backs pounded through to the four-yard line from where Lithter ploughed through center to score.

Game played: October 26,1929

With the ball on their own 40-yard tape, Conway made the first of his clever passes when he heaved a 20-yard toss to Reynolds, who took the ball on the dead run and sprinted down the left side of the field, along the sidelines, eluding the entire Providence secondary.

Soon after the start of the second period a 29-yard aerial advance, Conway to Sullivan, started the march for another score. Macaluso finally carried the pigskin over on a line plunge to make

the score 19 to 0.

Galigan, who had managed to do well with the punting assignment, was smothered by the Maroon forward wall midway in the second period as he tried to get away a kick from his own 25yard stripe with Abruzzino finally falling on the bounding oval behind the Providence goal line.

A twenty-yard pass from Conway to Reynolds was converted into another score as the first half drew to a close, as the fleet Colgate back took the oval on the run and galloped like an All-American for the distant Providence goal

line.

Two scores were made in the third period, one when Scheidel intercepted a pass to bring the ball to the Providence 12-yard line from where it was lugged across on line plunges and the other

when Duiguid sprinted around right end for 30 yards, crossing the final mark without a single Friar touching him, in the fourth period.



## FRIARS SCORE FIRST TRIUMPH AT EXPENSE OF MIDDLEBURY

## Providence College Wins From Vermonters 33-0

Local Outfit Shows Consistent
Offence for First Time
This Fall.

Flashing a consistent offence for the first time this fall, the Providence College football aggregation completely outclassed Middlebury College on Hendricken Field to chalk up their first win of the campaign, the final count being 33-0 for the Friars. So easily did the locals maintain the edge on their Vermont opponents that Coach Golembeski was able to use his second and third string elevens throughout the second half.

Middlebury, handicapped by the absence from the starting lineup of Sam Guarnaccia, its fullback and captain, toogether with four of the regular linemen, was on the defence throughout the fray. They were never able to get within striking distance of the locals goal, and their aerial attack was completely frustrated by the alert Friars.

In spite of the one-sided score the game was well played and some sparkling bits of grid action were staged by the Friars. In the first period Foster broke the ice with a brilliant 42-yard run from scrimmage through the Middlebury team for a score. In the second period Bleiler tallied twice, one on a long pass from Gibbons, and again on a pretty 40-yard runback of a punt. In the third period Wheeler intercepted a lateral pass to run 35 yards for his marker, and in the final canto, Mal Brown, dusky halfback, carted the leather over from the five-yard line.


#### Substitutes in Early

When it became apparent that his first-string outfit would have no trouble in scoring on the invaders from the Green Mountain district, Golembeski started using a substitute array as the first half ended, The second team played the entire third period, and was in turn relieved by the third-string eleven, with three exceptions, in the final quarter.

One outstanding feature of the game was the fine interference of the Friars on their forward pass plays. Nearly avery attempt to gain via the overhead route proved successful, and the interference provided the passer and receiver could not be bettered. When Bleiler made his runback of a kick for a score, every Middlebury gridder barring his path to the goal was eliminated from play by the Dominicans, and the local signal caller dashed over the line standing up.

Joe Sharkey, sub quarterback, proved to be the best ball carrier for the Friars in the second half of the game. The rangy Lowell Junior tore through the Vermonters' line for consistent gains in the third period, and in addition staged several spectacular runbacks of punts, once dashing 40 yards before being hauled to earth.

Brown Features One Score

The score which proved to be the most popular one to the crowd was that made by Mal Brown, dusky substitute halfback, who relieved Mosca in the fourth quarter. Brown headed a running attack, which started at midfield and carried through to a touchdown. A long pass from Smith to Jorn put the ball on the eight-yard stripe, and after three. line bucks had failed Brown took the ball on a triple criss cross formation and ploughed over the line.

Providence scored its first seven points within three minutes after the game started. Middlebury received the initial kickoff, but was unable to gain through the line and so Paul punted to Gibbons, who made a 20-yard runback to midfield. Two line bucks netted five yards, and then Foster chipped in with

The Pittsfield flash started for left tackle, was blocked and so pivoted outside the end, straightarming Thiele of the Vermont aggregation as he swung into the clear. After running 15 yards along the side line to elude the secondary. Foster cut back into the centre of the field, sidestepped two would-be tacklers, and set sail for a clear goal. The run was good for 42 yards and was without doubt one of the best executed plays ever staged on the Smith Hill gridiron. A pass from Bleiler to Gibbons near the sidelines netted the extra point.

After an exchange of kicks between Da Gata of the locals and Paul of the visitors, the Friars opened their attack again to collect their second score. Mosca ran the opening kick-off of the third period to midfield, a run back of 41 yards, and on the following play Starkey raced off right tackle for 24 yards to put the ball on Middle-bury's 25-yard tape. Two line bucks, were followed by two incomplete passes to give Middlebury the ball on downs. However, the visitors could do little on offence and Paul soon dropped back and punted.

Sharkey carried the kick back to midfield. Two successive first downs marked the goalward march, but just as it looked as if the Black and White gridders would romp through to a score, Markowski intercepted a flat pass over the line to halt

the attack.

Then came one of the most unusual plays of the game, with Larry Wheeler, rangy substitute wingman playing the hero role. # ZANDE BROTHERS DOING FINE WORK ON PROVIDENCE ELEVEN

# Jim and Manley Hold Down Guard Berths For Friars

Harvard has its Ticknor brothers, both playing in the line, but the Providence College eleven which meets Middlebury on Hendricken Field this Saturday goes the Cambridge comt nation one better, with brothers in similar positions on the same eleven. On the Friar oufit Jim Zande, Senior classman, handles the left guard assignment, while on the other side of the line Manley Zande, a Junior, serves as right gaurd.

Both youngsters are veterans, but last fall Jim served at centre more than he did at guard, and so the situation as it exists with the present eleven did not arise as often as has been the case this season. As Archie Golembeski favors an attack where the guards come out of the line as interferers, the Zande brothers offer a real threat when they wheel out of line and, shoulder to shoulder, flatten the defensive end.

In the three years of their participation the Zande brothers have played in every game, with one exception. Last fall Jim was out of one contest owing to an injury. A broken nose failed to halt the senior Zande a year ago from playing out the schedule. This year both lads are playing fine football and will be ready to prove their ability against Middlebury this week-end.

Three years ago when Archie Golembeski of Providence College issued his annual call for gridiron candidates a husky Freshman, answering to the name of Jim Zande, applied for equipment. After diligent search by the managerial staff a uniform was located to fit the 200-pound husky from Torrington, Conn., who refraining from mentioning his fine scholastic grid record, joined the Dominican squad on Hendricken Field.

It didn't take Golembeski many days to find out that he had a stalwart among his cohorts in the person of Zande, who was a real football prospect. Jim battled his way through an ambitious squad of guard candidates and finally clinched one of the starting berths. His play that year was one of the bright features of the Providence eleven's work.

The following fall when the call to action was again issued, Jim returned to the Smith Hill campus, and with him another of the Zande family in Manley, who had captained the Torrington high eleven the previous campaign. Manley, lacking the weight of his brother, found the task of breaking into the 'Varsity eleven a difficult task, but what he lacked in poundage he made up in aggressiveness,

Last year both brothers won 'Varsity insignia for their work, starring as the guards at the start of the season, until the need for a centre caused the mentor to switch Jim to that assignment. In spite of a broken nose Jim played throughout the 1928 campaign, facing such formidable outfits as Temple, Army, Williams and Holy Cross, and never once withdrawing from the fray until ordered to do so.

The prowess of these two youngsters won the plaudits of all who saw them in action, and the praise of Coach Golembeski, who stated at the annual athletic banquet last winter that they were the finest type of football players that he had ever encountered in all his experience as a player and a coach.

This season Jim was groomed for a tackle assignment, while Manley remained true to the guard work. In the Rutgers game at New Brunswick they presented the unusual situation of brother playing beside brother, as Manley was at right guard and Jim at right tackle. Suffice to say very few gains were made through their defence.

Against Holy Cross, Coach Golembeski decided at the last moment to switch Jim back to guard work; much to the delight of the senior classman, who prefers to play from a position flanking the centre than from any other place in the line. To all who watched the Friars hold a stronger Holy Cross team on even terms there was no question but what Jim and Maniey Zande were the main cogs in the locals' forward wall. In the press box the announcer soon become accustomed to calling "Tackle by J. Zande," and when it wasn't Jim the chances were that the call would be for Manley.

Jim outweighs his younger brother by twenty pounds scaling 193 to 173 for Manley. However, the latter makes up in speed and aggressiveness what he lacks in weight, and with these assets fits nicely into the Golembeski fast attask which calls for speedy guards. Both are graduates of Torrington, Conn. high school and both captained the eleven there in their senior years.

Jim is rounding out his fourth campaign as a regular and in all the hard games the Friars have played has been ready to take part in every encounter. He will be graduated next June. Manley is enrolled in the school of medicine and after receiving his two year pre-medical certificate last June decided to continue his studies in order to obtain his bachelou's degree before embarking on a medical career.

With an offence that has been able to score 10 touchdowns in two games, the Friars should cause the invaders from Gotham plenty of trouble. In Capt. Marty Gibbons, Chick Bleiler and Mickey Foster, elusive halfbacks, Golembeski has three scoring threats who will bear plenty of watching. Gibbons has tallied 21 points to date, Bleiler 14 and Foster 12.

Dixie Matthews, colored wingman from this city, who played a spectacular game against the Cadets last Saturday, is in top shape and will be one of the main cogs in Golembeski's aerial attack. The Friars have perfected their overhead attacks in the past few days and as the visitors are also reputed to be adept at flinging the pigskin about, the contest promises many a thrill once the elevens open up their bag of tricks.



# Dominicans Conquer St. John's Eleven, 19-6

# FRIARS EARN TRIUMPH OVER ST. JOHN'S IN FINAL RUSH, 19-6

Capt. Gibbons Stars in Great Victory for Providence College.—Two Touchdowns in Last
Quarter Break Three Period Tie

Staging a last period rally which sent an enthusiastic crowd into an uproar, the Providence College eleven smashed its way through to a 19 to 6 triumph over St. John's College of Brooklyn on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon in the seventh annual grid tussle between the two colleges. The victory is the most cherished of the season for the Friars and marks their third straight triumph.

It remained for Capt. Marty Gibbons to head the downfall of the invaders from Gotham, for the aggressive little Clinton Senior played the game of his career, smashing through for two of the three socres made by his team and playing a sterling game and the defence as well

After watching his accurate forward passes completely blocked in the first half by an alert St. John's secondary defence which had been exceptionally well coached in Providence plays, Gibbons turned his attention to toting the leather in the latter stage of the game and hurled his 160 pounds of brawn and muscle through the St. John's forward wall like a meteor, striking first on one side of the line, and then caroming off the other end.

Co-starring with their clever captain were Stan Szydla, Fred Da Gata and Chick Bleiler, fleet ball carriers.

The victory was a team triumph, and was a fine tribute to Archie Golembeski's work at the Smith Hill college. Although they had not scouted the New Yorkers, the Friars presented a stonewall defence, with every man in the line more than holding his own, and the interference offered the backs on their run was exceptional.

The victory, the third the Dominicans have ever scored over St. John's, takes on added lustre in view of the fact that John, regular right end, and Manley Zande, regular right guard, were out of the game altogether with injuries, and Foster, star Sophomore back, was forced to withdraw in the second period owing

## Friars' Captain Takes a Spill



After a scoreless first half, both elevens broke through with scores in the third period. The Friars blocked a Cooper punt and marched 30 yards for their score, while St. John's had an easy time of it, a 30-yard pass and 45 yards in penalties bringing the ball to the Friars' one-yard line from where it was carried over for the tying counter.

In the first period Providence drovs her visitors back to the shadows of their own goal posts. Gibbons ran a Cooper punt back to mid-field and a moment later shot a pass to Foster which was good for 18 holes. Then the locals' attack wavered and Da Gata was called into action to kick. Sheppard was downed in his tracks on his own 15-yard stripe, and two plays later was pushed back eight yards nearer the goal when he fumbled and was meaned under an avalanche :: Dominican forwards. A long puct pulled the Redmen out of the difficulty.

The Golamieski outfit tested all is forward plays in the first half, and thereby staged a bit of strategy that a robably accounted for the victory The visitors found they could check every aerial raid attempted by the locals, and in the second half played a defence against forwards, only to have Capt Gibbers and his crew of thee, ball carriers tear their line to shreds and ripped off the ends for iong gains.

Jim Janie, stalwart grand who has missed but two games in four years of play at the Smith Hill college, paved the way for the first Providence score early in the third stanza. Zande, who had been playing a smashing game all day, hurled himself in front of Cooper's punt and completely blocked it. Jack Halloran, aggressive wingman, pounced on the oval on the invaders 20-yard line to provide the setting for the Friars.

After Szydla had turned in three yards, Gibbons loped off right end and carted the leather to the six-yard tape. Da Gata added four yards in two tries, and then Gibbons rammed his way through left tackle for the touchdown. Bleiler missed the bars with his dropkick for the point.

The Black and White banners were soon lowered, however, when St. John's staged a strong comeback, aided by three Providence penalties for holding, and deadlocked the score. Two successive penalties of 15 yards each put the hall on the Smith Hillers' 46-yard line, from where Shepperd tossed a 30-yard aerial to Stephens. Another holding penalty put the Friars on their one-yard tape and Sheppard squirmed through the line to push the ball over the final line mark. Halloran and Nawrocki frustrated Copper's attempt for a point via dropkick.

After an exchange of kicks the Friars were started again on their victory march, Sharkey, who replaced Bleiler and did some classy work as signal caller, ran back a punt to his own 43yard line. On the next play he picked up eight yards through the line and Gibbons added seven more for a first down.

Szydla shot through right tackle for 11 yards and a first down on St. John's 30. yard line. Two line bucks, one by Gibbons for six yards, and a short pass from Gibbons to Sharkey, carried the ball to the 20-yard line. After two tries at the line, Gibbons scampered far down the field and Sharkey flipped a pretty pass, which travelled to its mark straight as an arrow. The Friar leader took the throw on the dead run and continued until hurled off side on the one-yard line as the period ended.

It was an easy matter for Da Gata to plunge through a wide gap at left guard for the score, and Gibbons added the point with a placement, Sharkey holding the ball for him on the kick. St. John's took the following kickoff, but was forced to kick after a holding penalty put them on their own 15-yard line.

The final Providence scoring march started after Gibbons had run back a punt to the "Saints" 46-yard tape. Three line bucks netted nine yards, and then Gibbons spun off tackle for 16 yards to lug the ball to the 21-yard stripe.

The attack faltered a little at this point, and it looked as if the Friars would surrender the ball on downs. Capt. Gibbons was called on to find a gap in the line on the fourth down. The fiery Black and White pilot followed his interference through the left tackle, cut across the backfield, straight arming a St. John's back on the way, and sprinted to the goal line, 15 yards away. As he lunged over the line Sheppard, safety man for the Redmen, tackled him. Gibbons placement went astray, and so the final count was chalked up as 19 to 6 for the Smith Hillers.

## FRIARS END SEASON GAME AT LOWELL TOM

A drill in defence against Lowell formations was followed by a snappy signal drill yesterday by the Friars. Two elevens ran through their formations. stressing aerial plays for the greater part of the drill. Ability to handle forwards is expected to count heavily in the locals favor as they endeavor to bring their arduous campaign to a successful

End Gridiron Careers



## LOWELL TEXTILE HOLDS FRIARS TO 12-12 TIE IN HARD-FOUGHT GAME

Game Marred by Rough Playing on Part of Both Teams.—Capt. Gibbons Climaxes Brilliant Grid Career by Tallying Both P. C. Scores

(Special to the Providence Journal) Lowell, Mass., Nov. 23.—The Providence College eleven met strong opposition here this afternoon when a fighting Lowell Textile outfit held the Friars to a 12 to 12 decision on Textile Field here. The game marked the resumption of grid relations between the two schools after a lapse of four years.

The Friars wilted in the face of the rugged game put up by the locals. Time and again the Weavers broke through to stop the Providence ball carriers.

Capt. Gibbons, halfback of the Rhode Islanders, was the main cog in his team's offence and defence, making his collegiate grid finale a memorable one. He tallied the two touchdowns made by the Friars, tying the score in the final quarter on a 10-yard dash through the entire Lowell outfit.

Forward passes paved the way for the Lowell score, the second of which furnished the most spectacular play of the afternoon when Savard took a 15-yard pass from Allard over the centre of the line and raced to the Friars' goal, 50 yards away. The other touchdown made by the locals also was turned in by Savard when he took a 21-yard aerial in the opening period behind the Friars' goal posts.

Inability to tally the points after touchdowns, caused by the slippery field slowed the kickers, and the cold made handling the ball difficult, depriving both elevens of the opportunity to win the game.

Gibbons missed his two tries for the point via the placement method, while Allard failed in a similar attempt in the first period in a forward to Nile, but Dagata smashed the Weaver backfield man to earth a yard from the final line mark. Matthews took the opening kickoff on his own 30-yard line and ran it to the 45-yard tape before being hauled to earth

Gibbons picked up seven yards at left tackle and then Foster slid off the right side of the line for a 20-yard gain. Line plunging brought the oval to the 23-yard stripe from where Sharkey flipped a pass, good for 13 yards, to Gibbons.

Gibbons picked up a yard at centre and Sharkey sliced off tackle for seven more. Da Gata plugged the line for a first down, carrying the ball to the Weavers' one-yard line in the advance. Then Gibbons smashed through right tackle for the score. He missed the bars in his attempted placement.

Lowell came back to tie the count in the same period. The locals took the kickoff but failed to gain. Then Savard got off the longest kick of the afternoon, aided by a stiff breeze, the ball bounding offside on the Providence one-yard line. Da Gata returned the boot, but his punt went offside on his own 29-yard tape.

# McGovern and Zande Named Co-Captains of Friar Eleven

Dominican Grid Lettermen Honor Two Stars.—1930 Football Schedule Announced.

The election of two captains for the Providence College 'Varsity football team of next fall in Mark McGovern of Flint, Mich., tackle, and Manley A. Zande of Torrington, Conn., guard, and the announcement of an eight-game schedule for the Friar gridders by Graduate Manager John E. Farrell was announced last night.

The naming of two men to the post of captain resulted when a ballot of the lettermen showed a tie vote, and the solution of the problem was made by a unanimous decision that both men should share the honor during the 1930 season. The election of co-captains marks the first time in the annals of the Dominicans' sports activities that such action has ever been taken.

Manley Zande entered the Smith Hill College from Torrington high where he captained the football team in his senior year, and also served as manager of the basketball team which went to Chicago for the scholastic championships of the country. He entered Providence in the fall of 1927 and immediately won a regular place as guard on the 'Varsity eleven, a position he has successfully held for the past three seasons.

Mark McGovern, big tackle from Flint, Mich., is a graduate of St. Matthew's high of that city where he starred in football and basketball. He served as substitute end on the Dominican grid team his Freshman year at the Smith Hill college, and the following campaign clinched a tackle berth, starring at that position for two seasons. He has also been a member of the 'Varsity basketball squad for the past three years.

The football schedule as announced for next fall includes three newcomers, including the Coast Guard eleven of New London, which will visit this city on Oct. 11; Clarkson College of Potsdam, N. Y., booked to play here Oct. 18, and Duquesne University, to be met at Pittsburgh, Pa., on Thanksgiving Day.

Rutgers, Holy Cross, Canisius, Lowell Textile and St. John's of Brooklyn, teams that were met by the Friars last Iall, retain places on the schedule for this year, with all but the Lowell game to be played away from home. One open date, Nov. 8, may be filled in the near future, as negotiations are under way to list an intersectional contest on that day.

#### Grid Dates Listed

The game with Duquesne, which was undefeated last fall and is coached by Elmer Layden, one of the members of the famous "Four Horsemen" of Notre Dame, will complete the list. The game is carded for Nov. 27 and probably will be played in the afternoon, with the Pittsburgh-Penn State clash on tap at the Pittsburgh stadium in the morning.

## MCCLELLAN NAMED COACH OF FRIARS' BASKETBALL SQUAD

Appointed for Third Season. Team to Play 19 Games, 10 at Home.

Al McClellan of Swampscott, Mass., will again coach the Providence College basketball squad according to an official announcement yesterday. At the same time an attractive 19-game schedule for the 'Varsity quintet was an-nounced by Graduate Manager Farrell.

McClellan returns to the Dominican college for his third season with prospects for another fine team, although he will have to start his campaign without the services of Eddie Wineapple, all-American guard who turned professional and is now with the Syracuse team in the American basketball rague. Five of the six letter men of last year are available for the coming season.

The schedule calls for 10 games in

this city, with nine of them as home contests for the Friars, and the other game the tilt with Brown at the Bruin's

court on Elmgrove avenue.

Outstanding on the home schedule are the games with Northeastern, Springfield, Middlebury, Holy Cross, St. John's of Brooklyn, and Seton Hall College. Of this group Middlebury and Seton Hall are newcomers to the list. The former team won all but three of its games last, winter, and captured the Vermont State title, while Seton Hall lost but two games against the fastest teams 'n the New York district.

Although Dartmouth and Connecticut, two of the three teams to vanquish the Friars last winter, are missing from the list owing to conflicts in dates, nearly all the other major oponents of last season are included. Yale, defeated by one point in a hectic game last December, will be host to the Friars again this campaign, the game being slated for New Haven on Dec. 17.

For the first time a home and home series will be effected with the strong St. John's five of Brooklyn. This outfit was rated as second best in the East last winter, although the Friars handed them one of their two setbacks. This first game of this series will be staged in December when the Dominicans make their holiday trip to New York, and the second game will be played in this city

Coach McClellan plans to start preseason drills the middle of this month, and although several of his court stars will not be able to join in the work until the end of the football season, he will have a sizeable squad when he calls the first drill. Capt. Szydla, veteran guard, and Larry Wheeler, rangy centre, and captain of the quintet last winter, are two regulars with the football aggregation who will not don their basketball togs unutil the end of the month.

However, Johnny Krieger, all New Eng. land forward and sixth highest scorer of the East last year, his running mate from Paterson, Bill McCue, and Chick Gainor, who played at centre and guard last winter, are available. Other members of the 'Varsity squad of 1928 who are ready to don togs are George Cody, guard, from Woonsocket, and Jimmie Welch and Bob Dion, forwards.

With the close of football activity the roster will be augmented by Capt. Szydla, Wheeler, Derivan, Foster, Mc-Govern, Sharkey, Jorn, Bleiler and Shea. The appointment of Louis A. Imbriano of Revers, Mass., a Junior, as student manager of the 'Varsity basketball squad, was also confirmed by the Dominican athletic council yesterday.

## LEO LOBDELL JOINS FRIAR COURT SQUAD



## Friars Swamp Huskies 48-21 In Opening Game

Krieger Starts Basketball Campaign by Scoring Total of 16 Points.

The Providence College 'Varsity basketball team opened its 1929 campaign before an enthusiastic crowd at Infantry Hall by defeating Northeastern University of Boston 48 to 21. The Friars proved superior in every department of play and had matters much their own way.

Johnny Krieger, runner-up to Eddie Wineapple for scoring honors last winter, led the field in tossing in baskets last night, the blonde-haired Paterson forward collecting 16 of the markers hung up by the Dominicans. McCue took second place with 15 points.

Any doubt of the strength of the team was disspelled once the locals got under way. McClellan's latest aggregation to make a bid for collegiate basketball honors shapes up as a better passing outfit, and once it has hit its stride will be a hard team to defeat.

#### Gainor Plays Well

Gainor, the only newcomer to the 'Varsity lineup, proved a capable replacement, rounding out a veteran team. Gainor did not take part in any of the scoring, but played a smashing game in holding Tiffany, ace of the Northeastern outfit, to four field goals throughout the game.

So strong were the Dominicans that they unleashed a running attack to open the second half which left the Huskies in a daze. Twenty-two points were added by the Smith Hillers in the first 12 minutes of the second period, while the Boston hoopsters failed to score a single marker. In this scoring spree, Krieger, McCue and Wheeler turned in some brilliant work, aided by fine passing on the part of Szydla and Gainor.

Providence jumped into an early lead with McCue breaking the ice with a double decker from under the hoop after taking a quick pass from Wheeler. Tiffany tallied from the foul line after being fouled by McCue, but this one point mainly served as an incentive to the McClellan coached machine to get under way.

With Wheeler and McCue snaring rebounds, and Krieger flashing with onehand shots from the side of the court, the Friars soon put the home crowd in a happy mood. At the halftime the locals were on the long end of a 20-to-11 decision.

#### Huskies Bewildered.

Following the rest period, the Black and White jerseyed court stars gave one of the finest exhibitions of passing ten here in some time. Using a five-man offence, with every player taking his turn at carrying through to the hoop, the locals had the Huskies bewildered in their attempt to hold them in check. Eleven field goals were tossed through the meshes in rapid order, although Coach McCoy of Northeastern attempted to frustrate the rally by sending an entire new team on the floor.



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#### DEMONSTRATION TILT BY FRIARS TONIGHT

The Providence College basketball squad, comprising the 'Varsity and Freshmen conquerors of Northeastern University and the Providence Boys' Club in a double bill Wednesday night, will provide plenty of action at the City high school gymnasium tonight when picked teams from the entire squad stage the annual demonstration game for the coaches and officials of the State. several potential rallies.



## FRIARS WIN OVER PHARMACISTS 43-12

Swing Back Into Win Column by Victory at New York. McCue High Scorer.

## Long Range Shooting Gives Dominicans Edge

Victory Is Second in Row Over Gym Teachers. — McCue, Krieger Run Up Points

The Providence College 'Varsity basketball five against Springfield College flashed a sparkling brand of the indoor game at Infantry Hall last night to collect a 41 to 28 decision. The victory marks the second successive of the locals over the Gymteachers, as the Friars took the decision at Springfield last year by a four-point margin.

Ability to make good on long range shooting, together with fine team work, accounted for the Friars' triumph. The stout five-man defence of the invaders proved equal to the task of breaking up any close shots at their hoop in the first half, but the long tosses by Krieger. Wheeler and Capt. Szydla enabled the locals to pile up a commanding lead.

As has been the case in all the games played so far this campaign, the forward tandem of McCue and Krieger again took the high honors for scoring. The former collected five field goals, several as the result of his ability to convert rebounds, while Krieger featured with his long range tactics. Wheeler, with four field goals, and Capt. Szydla and Gainor, with two each, accounted for additional scores.

#### Total Unexpected

The high total run up by the Dominicans was totally unexpected as Spring-

field with one exception placed the same team on the floor which battled the Friars to such a close decision last winter, and as a result was favored to make an exceptionally strong bid last night.

The Providence College subs were rushed into the contest in the final minutes and flashed some fine work with Jimmie Welch, relief forward, collecting the last three points of the fray.

After two minutes of action the locals broke the ice when Krieger made good on a pretty shot from the side of the court. Then Wheeler accounted for the second score when he completed a pivot play to sink the leather from in front of the hoop. Becker garnered the invaders' initial score a minute later, but his effort was soon overshadowed by the barrage of successful tosses loosed by the Friars.

Szydla caught the defence napping to score from the foul line. Wheeler cleared the rim on a long shot from close to the edge of the court, and Krieger rolled the score to 10 to 2 after taking a long pass from Gainor.

#### Springfield Rallies

The Hickcoxmen rallied in the final stage of the opening period, but at best could only keep pace with the speedy local machine. With Krieger making some sensational set shots from far outside the five-man defence, the Dominicans were able to boost their total to 20 against 9 for the invaders when the halftime whistle sounded.

After the rest, the Friars continued their relentless attack, averaging two goals to every one sunk through the meshes by the Springfield aggregation. Ackerman, former running mate of McCue at Paterson High, turned in the best work for his team in this period, counting three times on tosses from under the hoop.

To check the long range basket shooting of the Friars, Coach Hickox pulled his defence out, but the locals merely shifted their plan of attack. Instead of taking their long shots, they worked the pivot play from the foul line, with Wheeler handling the passes, and cut through repeatedly for spectacular

In the preliminary game the Junior Varsity team of the Smith Hill college swamped the men's team of the College of Education under a 56 to 20 score. In this contest, Franny Dromgoole, former Classical star, was the high scorer with 16 points, while Sam Rice ran him a close second with five field goals.

# PROVIDENCE COLLEGE FIVE WINS FOURTH STRAIGHT VICTORY

## Friars Down Middlebury, Vermont Champions, 44-24

Krieger Leads Scorers with 16
Points.—Friar Second
Team Is Winner.

The Providence College Varsity basketball teams continued their winning streaks at the La Salle Academy gym last night, with Al McClellan's crack first-string outfit completely outclassing Middlebury College, Vermont champions, by a 44 to 24 count, and the Dominican Jayvees topping the St. Joseph's Club of Pawtucket by a 34 to 26 score.

The victory was the fourth in six starts for the 'Varsity, and the decisive manner in which the Friar sharpshooters riddled the strong Middlebury defence sent the large crowd into a continual uproar. With Johnny Krieger, all-New England choice, leading the attack, the Friars bombarded the visitors' hoop with a vengeance, and at the halftime were resting comfortably on the long end of a 29 to 14 score.

After the Smith Hillers had tucked the decision safely away, Coach McClellan gave his strong substitutes, headed by Jimmie Welch and Eddie Derivan, a chance to show their wares. The second team was unable to continue the offence of the 'Varsity quintet, but did manage to hold the Vermonters to the low score.

All the regulars broke into the scoring column, with Kreiger taking the top honors with eight field goals, one of which capped one of the most sensational plays ever made on the La Salle court. This effort came when Krieger took a bounce pass from McCue; faked a shot and then split the defence on a dribble to the net to cage the goal as he pitched forward on the floor, wheeler and McCue tied for the runner-up honors with 12 markers apiece.

Vermonters Score First

Middlebury jumped into the lead in the opening period with Capt. Humeston, rangy centre, who was well covered throughout the fray by Wheeler, getting his lone field goal of the contest on a rebound off the backboards. The Friar pivot man retaliated with a similar score a moment later to start the Black and White offence. Play was nip and tuck for the first five minutes, and then the locals started to show their class and forge to the front.

With Wheeler scoring on a pivot from the foul line, McCue garnering rebounds to send the leather back through the nets, and Krieger doing some clever sharpshooting from beyond the foul line, the Providence machine soon ran its total into double figures. In the final 10 minutes of play the visitors collected

but four field goals.

Second Team Wins.

In the prelim game the Jayvees had a hard battle on their hands to down the St. Joseph's Club of Pawtucket, the latter quintet being composed of several former St. Raphael Academy basketeers. McCormack and Marty Gibbons, football captain last fall, led the scoring in this fray, the former collecting 10 points and Gibbons eight. A last-period surge

The victory hoists the Black and White colors well into the collegiate limelight, as the New Yorkers had a string of 12 straight wins to their credit, most of which were scored at the ex-pense of major colleges of the East. The verdict also served as ample revenge for the Friars, who sustained a 27 to 20 setback at Brooklyn last December.

One of the largest crowds ever to watch a basketball tilt at Infantry Hall saw Al McClellan's quintet come through the most trying contest of their sched-ule. To Bill McCue, lanky forward, belongs the lion's share of the victory, for it was due largely to his brilliant floor work that the Dominicans were able to keep in the running. Content to feed the ball to his mates. McCue sacrificed many a chance to score himself. In addition he turned in some clever work in securing the tap and in retrieving the ball off the back boards.

#### Wheeler Leads Scorers

Larry Wheeler, playing his last game against the New Yorkers, after four years of competition, was the outstanding scorer for the locals. Wheeler outjumped Begovich, his highly touted rival from Gotham, and while holding the St. John's giant to a lone field goal. managed to take the high scoring honors of the clash himself with 13 points.

After two minutes of play Providence got under way by opening an offence well adapted to the Brooklynites' style of play. With McCue working as the pivot from the foul line, and Wheeler joining in as a scorer, the locals soon took the lead. On a clever block play Krieger shot through to open the scoring. Then Wheeler sent the crowd into an uproar with the first of his long shots, dropping the leather through the net from the side of the court. Krieger made it five points when he converted on Schuckman's first foul.

St. John's broke into the scoring after five minutes of play with Hinchcliffe doing the honors on a long toss from close to mid-court. This field goal started a rally which tied the count at seven all, before the Friars again slipped ahead. At the half-time the Dominicans had piled up a seven-point lead, mainly through the scoring efforts of Wheeler, and left the floor for the rest on the long end of a 16 to 9 score.

#### Take Lead in Second.

The Redmen from Brooklyn showed their best form at the start of the second half. Schuckman made a sensational running shot from the corner of the court, and was fouled in the act by Wheeler. He made good on both his

free tries, to boost his team's total to 14, and then O'Shea tallied on Krieger's foul. With the crowd in an uproar, Schuckman sent St. John's into the lead when he hoisted a long toss through the rim.

Jimmie Welch, substitute forward, was rushed into action in place of Krieger, and a minute later tied the score at 17 apiece when he made good from the free throw line after being fouled by Posnack, burly leader of the invaders. Capt. Szydla of the Friars contributed his lone scoring effort of the fray, tossing the leather in from close to midfloor, but the lead was short-lived, as Schuckman, clever guard of the visitors, knotted the count again a moment later.

#### Resort to Rough Tactics.

Then the Friars jumped into a lead which was never seriously challenged for the remainder of the tilt. Wheeler and Gainor made good on foul shots, Wheeler scored with a double-decker, and Welch duplicated the feat shortly after to bring the Providence score to 25.

The St. John's players, facing their first defeat of the year, and with visions of their claim for the Eastern court title being blasted away by the Smith Hillers, resorted to rough tactics in the closing minutes of the clash, and, as a result, the locals collected four points from free tries, and Wheeler tapped a rebound back through the rim to bring the total to 31 as the final gun barked the downfall of the New Yorkers.

In the back court, Leary will team with Farrell, who was the hero of the Cross rallies against the Friars in the

the Friars in the first game of the series. Luke Driscoll will get the starting call at centre over Don Fitzgerald, veteran of two seasons, and tackle on the eleven for the past three years. Fitzgerald is a former pupil of Coach McClellan of the Dominicans, having served as pilot man on his St. John's Prep team three years ago. With Driscoll in the lineup, Larry Wheeler, centre of the locals, will have to be at his best to garner the tap for the Black and White.

· With the advantage of meeting the Purple team on a larger court, and before a home crowd the Smith Hillers are confident of being able to pull through with the decision. The Crusaders have never scored a victory over the locals, having dropped both games of the series last winter.

Preliminary Game Carded

In view of the fact that the contest will be the last home appearance of the Friars until late in the month, in addition to the fact that the winning margin over the Crusaders in the first tilt was but a single point, the largest crowd to witness a court game in the Couth Main street hall is expected to be on hand. Inasmuch as the Brown and Rhode Island State basketball squads will be idle tonight, owing to mid-year exams, both squads have been invited to attend the Friars-Crusaders contest as the guests of the Providence College Athletic Association.

PROVIDENCE COLLEGE stands an excellent chance fo either winning the mythical Eastern basketball championship or finishing in the runner-up berth and this fact is recognized by court game writers in New York city who are bracketing the Dominicans with the crack Pittsburgh and Syracuse quintets as the fastest in this section. By defeating Holy Cross in the return game at Infantry Hall this evening, Coach McCullough's basket shooters will have a record of seven decisions in a row and eight victories in 10 contests. Whipping the Crusaders, who were nosed out by the margin of one point at Worcester, may be anything but an easy proposition.

Any team that can average 35 points per game against tough competition is worthy of being given championship rating and that happens to be what the Friars have been doing in nine battles.



Three handsome silver loving cups, which will be awarded by Doc tonight have been on display in a local shop window for the past week and have aroused considerable interest in the event tonight.

Bond Changing Lineups

Coach Rufus Bond of the Bruin court squad has been working hi men hard during the past week in preparation for the encounter tonight and has been trying several combinations in his line-ups. The Bruin mentor is planning to field his strongest combination tonight and at least two changes are expected in the lineup. Joe Schein and Bob Morey are slated to start in the guard positions as one of the new combinations while Jack Caulkins, who has been handling left guard part of the season will resume his original position at left forward. Captain Paul Snyder will pair with him at the forwards, and Bob Brown will open the game at centre.

# KRIEGER AWARDED ALL-STAR BERTH

Providence College Scoring Ace
Is Forward on Second
All-American

John E. Krieger, star Providence College forward, has been named as one of the forwards on the second all-American basketball team selected by Les Gage, sports editor of College Humor magazine. Krieger is paired on the second team forward berths with Schoonover of Arkansas. The seeletion of Krieger on an all-American team marks the second time in as many years that a Providence College basketball player has received such an honor, as last year Eddie Wineapple was chosen as a guard on the first all-American team also selected by College Humor.

In commenting on his selections, Mr. Gage says: "This honor role is not the result of my personal views alone, but is based to a considerable degree on advice tendered by prominent coaches in countless conferences throughout the country."

The two forwards winning first team berths are Hyatt of Pittsburgh, and Ward of Montana State. The former is the lone Eastern court performer to be selected on the first team, the other positions going to players from Western colleges. Magner of Pennsylvania is the only Eastern player besides Krieger to be chosen on the second team, while on the third team Kinsbrunner of St. John's College, Brooklyn, is the lone Eastern college representative. Kinsbrunner and Krieger were close rivals as they played against each other during the past court campaign.

The first team lines up as folows: Hyatt, Pittsburgh, and Ward, Montana State, forwards; Murphy, Loyola, centre; Wooden, Purdue, and Johnson, North Carolina State, guards. The second team is composed of Schoonover, Arkansas, and Krieger, Providence College, forwards; Murphy, Purdue, centre; Chmielewski, Wisconsin, and Magner, Pennsylvania, guards. The third team has Kinsbrunner, St. John's, and Hildebrand, Butler, forwards; MacCracken, Indiana, centre; Grayson, Oregon State, and McGinnis, Kentucky, guards.

Krieger, a Junior at the local college, was recently elected co-captain of next year's basketball quintet with William T. McCue. Both these youths attended Paterson high, N. J., previous to entering Providence College. Krieger has been the outstanding scorer on the Friat teams for the past three seasons, averaging better than 10 points per game. In his Freshman year he was the leading scorer in New England and during the past two years he was runner-up. He was recently selected on the New England all star college team, an honor which he also held last year.

## 1200 FANS SEE FRIARS SUBDUE BROV QUINTET BY 30 TO

### Take Hard Fought Game For 14th Victory of Season

Hold Lead Throughout.-Score at Half 14-8 .- Caulkins, Welch High Scorers.

Before a capacity crowd of 1200 spectators, the Providence College basketball team scored its 14th victory of the season by defeating the Brown squad 30 to 20 in the Brown gymnasium last night. The encounter was hotly contested and the stands were in an uproar a greater part of the time. Seven minutes of play preceeded the opening score of the game, while the Bruins went scoreless for almost 15 minutes.

Taking a lead from the start, the Friars kept their total a little above that of the Bruins throughout. Johnny Kreiger and Captain Stan Szydla starred, the former scoring five points on five free tries and adding one field goal early in

the game.

The Bruins laid down an almost impregnable defence which the Friars were unable to penetrate for seven minutes of play. Jack Caulkins, Brown's left forward was playing in great form last night turning in 10 points to share high honors with Welch, Friar, guard. The

visitors were 10 points in the lead before Bob Brown, veteran centre, tallied the first Brown goal. Following a time-out after Brown's score, the Bears opened up a dazzling attack which accounted for three goals in half a minute with Caulkins netting two and Captain Paul Snyder the other. 'The visitors then called for another time-out and the Bruins were unable to regain their stride when play was resumed. At the half the Friars were leading by 14 to 8.

Krieger's opening score when fouled by Bon Morey, Britin guard, was followed on the next play by a field goal by Capt. Szydia. Morey again fouled the Friar sharpshooter, and Kreiger added another point. Several minutes later, Kreiger again penetrated the Britin defence and netted the ball after a nest pass from Larry Wheeler, centre. Welch netted two shots from the door soon after and then the Bruins found themselves. Brown's goal followed by the Bruin rally brought the score to 10 to 8, but Kreiger netted two more fouls, and Bill McCue, one field goal before the close of the period.

The Friars were unable to penetrate the Bruin defence for several minutes after the opening of the second half. A faulty pass gave the Hilltoppers possession of the ball, and a determined attack netted a basket by Caulkins, Bruin hopes were short-lived, however, and Wheeler added two points on free tries. Wheeler scored again from the floor and then Welch sunk a short shot from the sidelines. Capt. Snyder scored one point on a foul, but Kreiger retaliated as a result of a technical foul by the Bruin captain. Stan Szydla found the basket on a free try, and then the Bruin centre made good on a foul shot. Welch's field goal brought the score to 24 to 14 regaining the 10-point lead with which the Friars had started.

It was then that the Bruins rallied momentarily. Caulkins, unable to get within close range, shot from mid-floor for the longest scoring shot of the game. Seconds later, the Bruin star tallied again on another spectacular toss. Getting within scoring distance. Caulkins netted a hurried one-hand shot as the defence forced him to the side of the court. Welch's two foul shots for the Priars were followed in quick succession by field goals from Szydla and Wheeler. Joe Schein, Bruin guard, tallied on a long shot as the final gun boomed.



Picked for Positions on New England College Quintet for Second Year

Five basketball teams, two in Massachusetts, two in Rhode Island and one in Connecticut, are represented on the coaches' New England all-star college quintet for the 1929-30 season. The group includes two players who were honored in a like manner last year, while one of the other three, Captain Stuart Clancy of Holy Cross, who had been picked for a guard position on the second team for two seasons, has topped off his college career by reaching the top with

career by reaching the top rung.
John Kreiger, star forward on the Providence College quintet, and Daniel Chubbuck, heavyweight center at Conn. Aggies, are the players who have been picked for the second successive year. Although the latter did not meet with as much favor from the coaches this year as last, he managed to edge out the other candidates for the position, the most outstanding of whom was Laurence Wheeler of Providence College, runnerup to him a year ago. How close the rase was between these two players may be judged by the fact that Wheeler received four votes, one less than the Conn. Aggie player. As a whole there were not many outstanding centers this season. The votes were split between ten players.

Greiger received eight votes for his position at forward, which was one more than Captain Paul Snyder of Brown University. With Captain Clancy of H. C. at guard is Captain-elect Arthur Cochran of Tufts College. Although only a sophomore, the local player had an exceptionally fine year to give the Jumbos a representation on the first team for the second year in succession. Fred Ellis was the Tufts player on the team last year.

#### Joehran All-Around Choice

Some might argue that Cochran does not deserve a place at guard, insofar as he played most of the season at center. Ten coaches have voiced their opinion on the subject. Of Tufts' thirteen games this season, only one was with a team outside the section, which shows how well the coaches thought of him when only two failed to select him. The Med-ford boy received more votes than any other member of the all-star team. The votes he received were distributed in all three positions.

Cochran's lack of height is very much against his choice for center but Coach Lou Manly played him there when Charles Butters injured an ankle in the early part of the season and then kept him at the position because he was a big help on the offense. It is an interesting fact that only two of the ten votes cast in favor of the Tufts captainelect were for the pivot position, while three were for guard and five for for-Under the circumstances, how ward. could he be kept off the team? Coach Manly started him at guard in the early part of the season and there he has been placed on the all-star team.

This team would be a very fine scoring combination for four of the players have tallied over 125 points this season. The high scorer was Kreiger with 193 points. Snyder had 185, Chubbuck 154 and Cochran 129. Clancy, who received nine votes in the poll despite the fact he was out in the early part of the season with his old knee injury, would also be a good threat on the offense. When the Holy Cross forward situation was below standard this year he filled in there very acceptably. He has been honored with the captaincy of this all-star quintet because of his sterling leadership qualities. On the bench at the start of the season he put the loitering Holy Cross quintet on its feet when he returned to action. Clancy also was captain of the varsity football team last fall.

#### Team Has Two Rooters

Four members of this team will be back again for another bid for honor places. Captain Clancy of Holy Cross is the only senior of the group. Captain Snyder of Brown, Kreiger and Chubbuck are all juniors, while Cochran is the lone sophomore The Brown basketball team is being given a dinner in Providence tonight, and the chances are that Snyder, an Erie, Pa., youth, will be re-elected for next season

Kreiger, who comes from Patterson, N. J., has played three years of basketball at Providence College, but there is no freshman rule at the Dominican university. The other two members of the "all" group reside in Connecticut. Chubbuck comes from Mechanicsville, a small tow. in eastern Connecticut. He is a graduate of Tourtelotte High School in North Grosvenordale, where he captained the high school quintet in 1925-'26. That year the team was undefeated and won the State championship in the class D school tournament. During his last two years in high school his team won thirty straight games and he was the leading scorer both years. He was also captain of the Conn. Aggies freshman team. While playing varsity basketball the following year he broke his ankle in the latter part of the season. He had kept up his fine scoring, however, and his play had brought about his selection for the allstar team. This season his total of 154 points was one-third of the entire scoring of the Conn. Aggies quintet. Clancy's home is in Stamford.

This all-star team has achieved an honor which no other before it can match. It has two mascots, or, better still, one mascot and a "howling" rooter. When the selections from the coaches arrived at the office word also arrived of new arrivals in two of their families. A boy, John Sandford Manly, has brightened the home of Coach and Mrs. Lewis F. Manly of Tufts, while Miss Nancy Gordon Gore has arrived at the Amherst home of the director of athletics at M. A. C.

Because of the large number of players who receive votes in the poll it is always the form to select a second team. These players have missed out by the scantiest of margins, and they may reach the top another year. The following are picked for second team honors:



This wealth of pivot players presents a perplexing problem which has been partially solved by the shifting of Frank Ward (Montana State) to one forward position. Branch

MacCracken is deserving of more than third team mention, but it is impractical to eliminate all of these clever forwards and assign every offensive berth to the

many brilliant centers.

Strange as it may seem, there were two freak athletes this year, both Irishmen and both Charlies—"Loyola" Murphy and "Purdue" Murphy. "Loyola" Charlie out scored, out pushed and out generaled "Purdue" Charlie in that memorable battle between their two teams at Lafayette, although the latter's six feet seven inches towered almost two inches above the Chicagoan. The all-around performance of Johnny Wooden of Purdue, however, enabled the Big Ten champions to turn back Loyola in overtime. It is doubtful if there were ever two greater pivot men playing college ball during one school generation than Charles "Stretch" Murphy of Purdue and Charles "Feed" Murphy of Loyola.

Frank Ward was the scoring sensation of the West, and his versatile performances attracted much attention on the eastern invasion of Montana State during the Christmas holidays. The rangy Bobact center could play any position, for he is just as valuable on the defensive as in the attack. His captain, "Cat" Thompson, enjoyed another successful season but could not expect to repeat as an All-

American when playing on the same five with "Pop" Ward. For three years the Montana State boy has been named All-Conference center, a remarkable achieve-

ment for any athlete.

No one can convince me that there was ever a better college forward than Charley Hyatt. The wiry Pittsburgh senior has completed his three years of competition under Doctor Carlson. His uncanny shooting eye has led to an average season's scoring of three hundred points. In 1928 Charley was the key to that remarkable Pitt machine which won every contest and was unanimously acknowledged the national champions. And in this, his final season, Hyatt was just as effective—perhaps more so.

Johnny Wooden, the flashy sophomore floor guard, is the latest addition to Purdue's perennial assortment of basketball experts. Probably his greatest forte is his devastating dribble. Johnny controls the ball to perfection when traveling at top speed, and is a sure shot when on the

move.

North Carolina State College has a basketball player—a guard named Morris William Johnson—who has the same qualifications for an All-American berth as Johnny Wooden. Johnson was the driving type with a low, fast dribble and a quick

Is Forward on Second
All-American

John E. Krieger, star Providence College forward, has been named as one of the forwards on the second all-american basketball team selected by Les Gage, sports editor of College Humor magazine. Krieger is paired on the second team forward berths with Schoonover of Arkansas. The seelction of Krieger on an all-American team marks the second time in as many years that a Providence College basketball player has received such an honor, as last year Eddie Wineapple was chosen as a guard on the first all-American team also selected by College Humor.

In commenting on his selections, Mr. Gage says: "This honor role is not the result of my personal views alone, but is based to a considerable degree on advice tendered by prominent coaches in countless conferences throughout the country."

The two forwards winning first team berths are Hyatt of Pittsburgh, and Ward of Montana State. The second team is composed of Schoonover, Arkansas, and Krieger, Providence College, forwards; Murphy, Purdue, centre; Chmielewski, Wisconsin, and Magner, Pennsylvania, guards. The third team has Kinsbrunner, St. John's, and Hildebrand, Butler, forwards; MacCracken, Indiana, centre; Grayson, Oregon State, and McGinnis, Kentucky, guards.

Krieger, a Junior at the local college. was recently elected co-captain of next year's basketball quintet with William T. McCuc. Both these youths attended Paterson high, N. J., previous to entering Providence College. Krieger has been the outstanding scorer on the Friar teams for the past three seasons, averaging better than 10 points per game. In his Freshman year he was the leading scorer in New England and during the past two years he was runner-up. He was recently selected on the New England all star college team, an honor which he also held last year.
