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Friars' New Baseball Leader



Joseph F. Harraghy of Taunton Was Elected Captain of the Providence College Baseball Team for Next Year at a Meeting of the Lettermen Yesterday Afternoon. Hararghy Was a Catcher on the Dominican Nine Last Season.

HARRAGHY TO LEAD FRIAR BALL TEAM

Taunton Youth Elected Captain
of Nine by 13 Lettermen.
Club Prospects Bright.

The election of Joseph F. Harraghy of Taunton Mass. as captain of the Providence College Varsity baseball team for next year was confirmed by the Athletic Association of the Dominican College yesterday afternoon following a meeting of the Varsity lettermen. Harraghy has won Varsity insignia for three years and his appointment to the captaincy will be a very popular one with the student body.

Harraghy is a graduate of St. Mary's high school in Taunton where he starred in baseball and basketball for four years. He captained the high school nine for two successive years alternating at first base and catch. Harraghy first reported to Flynn as a first baseman, but was switched to the backstop work where he developed into a first class receiver. Last summer Harraghy starred with the Oleans team on Cape Cod and was rated by Pat Donovan, former Grays manager, as one of the best college prospects playing in that league.

Harraghy will head a strong team into action next spring, as no less than 10 of the 13 players awarded Varsity insignia for their work last year will be available for duty. This number includes Moran and Buckley, pitchers, Duffy, Main, Cappalli, and Dion, the infield quartet, Szydla, Krieger and Lobdell, outfielders.

The players named as lettermen for their work last spring were Capt. Joseph Duffy of Fall River, Captain-elect Joseph Harraghy of Taunton, Henry Main of Pawtucket, Francis Cappalli, Thomas McElroy and Francis Moran, all of this city, Robert Dion of Nashua, N. H., John Krieger and Leo Lobdell, both of Paterson, N. J., Adelard Fleurent and Stanley Szydla of Ware, Mass., Francis Buckley of Roxbury, Edward Wineapple of Salem. Varsity insignia was also awarded to Student Manager Edward J. Higgins of Blackstone, Mass.

Flynn Reappointed Coach Of Providence College Nine

Friars to Play 24 Games.

Brown, Holy Cross and Yale

Included on Schedule.

The announcement of the reappointment of John A. Flynn, well-known local lawyer and baseball authority, as coach of the baseball teams at Providence College for the coming spring; and the release of an attractive 24-game schedule with the leading college teams of the East was made last night by Graduate Manager John E. Farrell of the Dominican college.

Flynn, who has been credited with placing the Friars among the leading college baseball teams of the East since he took over the reins at the Smith Hill college, will be starting his sixth campaign with the local collegians. With the exception of the 1926 season, when he was manager of the New Haven team of the Eastern League, Flynn has been mentor of the Providence College nine since 1924, when he succeeded Joie Connolly.

The schedule for the coming months will bring the Friars into competition with the finest college aggregations in the East, with feature contests listed with New Hampshire, Holy Cross, Villanova, Boston College, Georgetown University, Quantico Marines, Yale, and the two annual tilts with Brown. Sixteen of the contests are to be played on Hendricken Field, home diamond of the Dominican ball tossers.

Coach Flynn, who developed a strong aggregation last spring to succeed the excellent nine of the 1928 season, will have 11 lettermen as a nucleus for his team this spring. The infield will be intact, with ex-Capt. Duffy, Main, Cappali and Dion available for service, while Fleurent, diminutive right fielder, will be the only regular missing from the outer gardens. Capt. Harraghy heads a veteran catching staff, while Moran and Buckley will be the experienced twirlers on hand.

Outdoor work will be started as soon as the weather permits, and the season will be officially opened on April 11 when the City College of New York nine comes here. In all probability an exhibition game, early in April, will be played with the Providence Grays for the benefit of the St. Joseph's Hospital Fund. The final tilt of the campaign will be staged on Commencement Day, June 12, with Boston College as the attraction.

Only three newcomers are included in the new list, Muhlenberg College of Allentown, Pa., visiting New England for the first time, and playing here on April 24; the Coast Guard of New London paying a visit on May 3, and the Quantico Marines from Virginia providing the Memorial Day attraction. Seton Hall returns to the Friars' schedule after an absence of four years, the game this spring being slated for South Orange, N. J.

The annual spring trip has been moved to early in May, with four games to be played in as many days. On May 7, the Dominicans will meet Seton Hall; on the 8th, Upsala at East Orange, N. J.; St. John's in Brooklyn on the 9th, and then will wind up the trip with the Villanova tilt at Villanova, Pa. The locals have not lost a game on their annual spring trip in the past three years.

Dominican Baseball Work Gets Under Way Tuesday

Friars Open Season with Grays
at Kinsley Park on
April 6.

The Providence College baseball squad will inaugurate its 1930 campaign Tuesday at Hendricken Field, when Coach Jack Flynn, veteran mentor for five seasons, issues the first call for outdoor work. A squad of close to 75 aspirants is expected to compete for places on the Varsity nine.

Eleven letter men, including a veteran infield quartet, will be among those on hand to start work for the opening game, which will be an exhibition tilt with the Providence Grays at Kinsley Park on April 6, for the benefit of St. Joseph's Hospital. Outstanding in the group of veterans are Joe Harraghy, clever catcher, and captain of the nine for this spring, and Joe Duffy, veteran first baseman, who piloted the team through the 1929 campaign.

With last year's infield of Duffy at first, Main at second, Cappalli at short and Bob Dion at third, available for service, Flynn will have little worry about the inner defence. The outfield, which was somewhat shaky last spring, should show an improvement. Fleurent, right fielder for three seasons, dropped out of college, but the return of Marty Gibbons to left field will help to equal matters. Lobdell, 6 foot 4 inch centre gardener, and Krieger and Szyda, basketball stars, who alternated in left field last year, complete the roster of outer gardeners who have won Varsity insignia.

Capt. Harraghy heads last year's strong catching staff, with John Curran, Nashua Senior; Jimmie Welch, speedy Sophomore from Hartford, who did the receiving in two of the tilts; a season back, and Ray Boule, Fall River Senior, as his understudies.

In addition several promising recruits in the yearling class promise to make the going hard for the veteran backstops.

The pitching department, which has always been one of the strongest links in the Friar baseball aggregations, appears as the weakest at this writing. Only two lettermen veterans are on hand.

Frankie Moran, Senior from this city, and a regular twirler for three years, and Frank Buckley, rugged right-hander from Roslindale who turned in some sterling work in major games during the 1929 campaign, head the few experienced hurlers ready to carry the Black and White through their ambitious diamond card.

Several Good Prospects

Other seasoned hurlers who may blossom into topnotch performers this spring are Artie Quirk, side arm flinger who enjoyed a fine season in the local amateur loop last summer; Norman Boule of Fall River, and Stan Bednarczyk of Central Falls, the latter a southpaw who pastimed in the Pawtucket Manufacturers' Circuit last summer; Al Hoban, clever curve ball artist who showed form with the Junior Varsity nine, and Lally and Gibney, both rangy right handers who show promise.

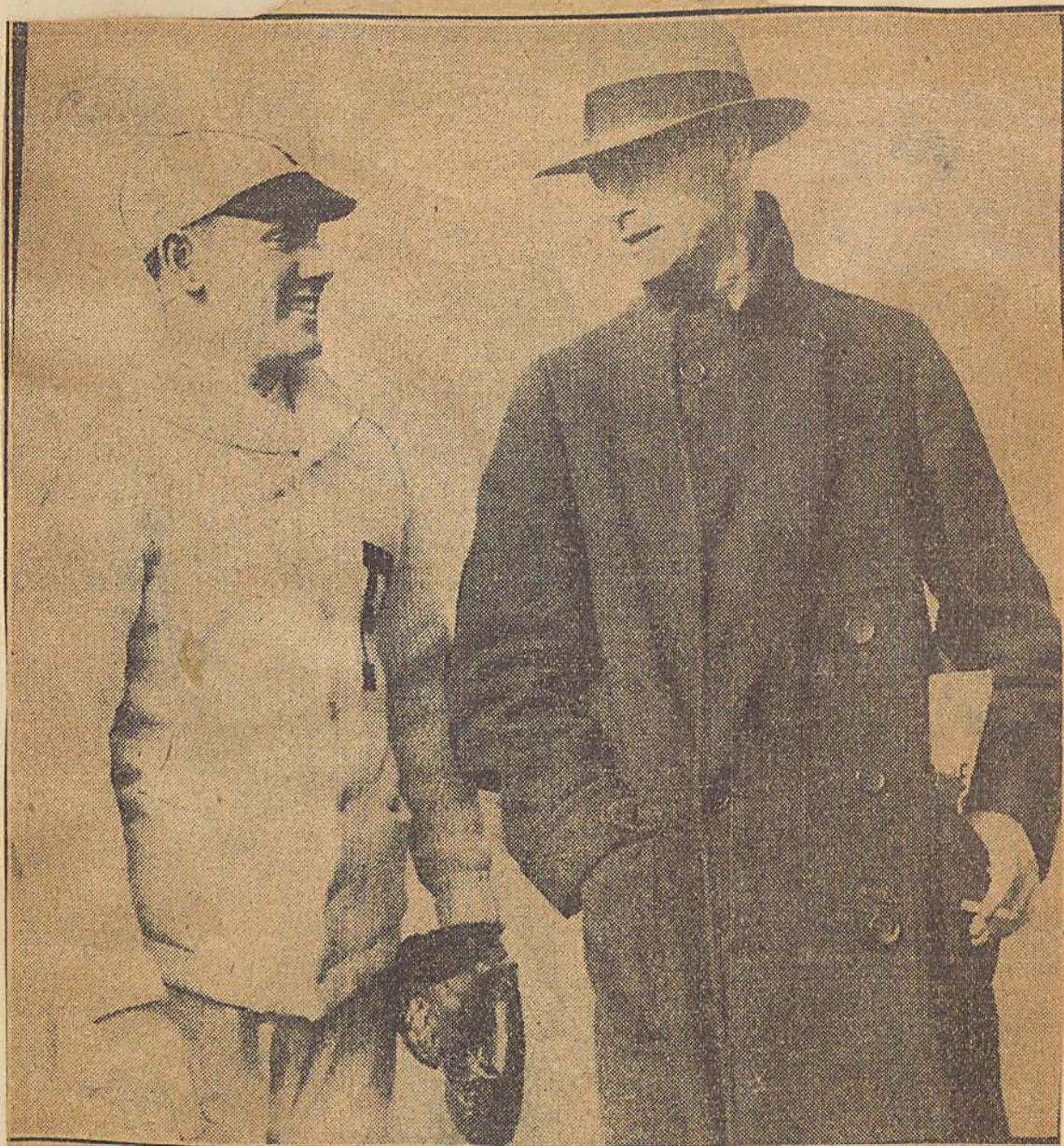
Several former schoolboy stars of this State are included in the list of aspirants who hope to make the grade this year. Chapman and Janas, infielders from La Salle; Joe O'Connor, who made an enviable rep as a ball tosser at Hope; Motta, first baseman; Bekel, third baseman, and Dromgoole, outfielder, all of Classical, and Marsella, hard hitting outer gardener from Burrillville, head the list of newcomers who boast fine scholastic records in this State.

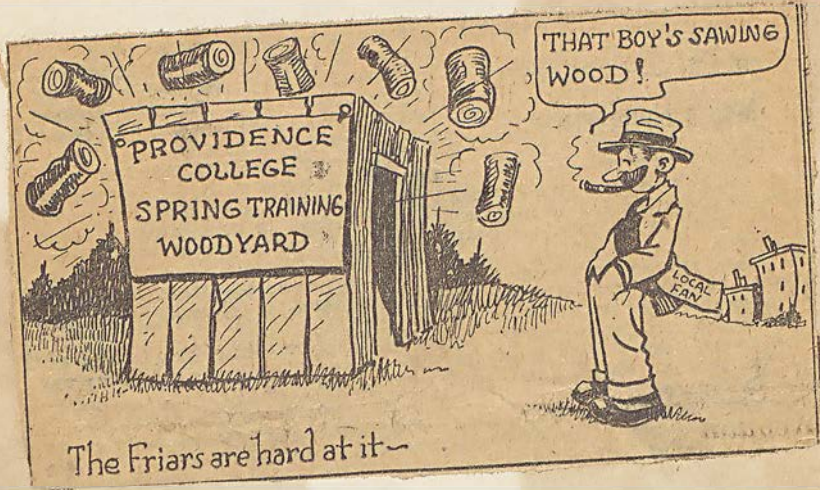

FRIARS' SECONDS DEFEAT 'VARSITY NINE BY 11 TO 8

Artie Quirk's Mound Work
Largely Responsible for
Subs' Victory.

In a practice game on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon, Team B, composed entirely of substitutes from last year's team and newcomers, meted out an 11 to 8 defeat to the 'Varsity nine in a tilt which topped off the first week of intensive drill at Providence College, under the watchful eye of Jack Flynn. The defeat of the veterans was due in no small share to the box work of Artie Quirk, Senior, and star hurler for the Universals last summer.

Quirk set the first stringers down with but six hits in the four innings he worked, and with his mates pounding the offerings of Buckley effectively in the pinches was able to collect the decision. A first inning rally in which six runs were pushed across the plate enabled the Team B aggregation to maintain its advantage until the finish of the contest.

The hitting of Szydlia, who alternated in left field for the first team last spring, was the feature of the second team attack. Szydlia collected three hits in four trips to the plate, crashing the ball over the left field fence on one occasion for the first homer of the year. His other efforts resulted in a double and a single.

Team A, the same outfit which faced Yale last June, with the exception of Gibbons in left field, and Dick Chapman in right, tried hard to get in the running, but in the face of Quirk's puzzling slants were never able to flash a consistent attack.

The Friars officially open their season next Sunday, when they meet the Providence Eastern League team at Kingsley Park in an exhibition tilt for the benefit of the St. Joseph's Hospital fund.

DOMINICANS FALTER LATE IN GAME TO LOSE TO GRAYS 5 TO 1

Connors Holds Leaguers To One Hit For 6 Innings

Friars Score Lone Tally in 4th
Canto, While Winners Garner
All Runs in 7th and 8th.

Held to one hit for six innings by a Medford youngster pitching his first college ball game, the Providence Grays just staved off defeat at the hands of Providence College yesterday afternoon by collecting four safeties in the seventh and eighth frames for five runs. The final score was 5-1, the Grays scoring three in the seventh and two more in the eighth. The Friars' sole tally came in the fourth inning and for a time it looked like that single run meant the ball game.

Danny Connors of Medford is the lad who puzzled the leaguers. With a baffling delivery of a good fast ball, he went through six innings of sensational pitching. Wildness was his only fault and four of the seven Grays who reached first base during the first six frames were passed there. His opponents were unable to connect with his offerings safely. The balls he pitched seemed to be on the batters before they knew it. Artie Pond made the only hit of the first six frames in the second inning, when with two strikes on him, the big Mobile catcher drove a hot one into right field. He was held at first only by a remarkable throw.

In the meantime, Louis Kalbaugh, who started on the mound for Eddie Onslow's outfit, was being touched for four hits in the five innings he worked. At the end of the five, Manager Onslow sent Walter Schroeder to the mound and the Friars made but one bingle off

him during the remainder of the game. Schroeder fanned five, two each in the seventh and eighth innings, and one, a pinch hitter, in the ninth, for the final out of the game.

Good Support for Connors

It was an interesting affair all the way, despite the cold, windy afternoon. A benefit affair for the St. Joseph's Hospital fund, it drew a crowd of 2195 and after the game Johnny Farrell and Harry Hopkins, master minds of the two teams, figured that approximately \$1000 would be given to the fund. Jack Finnell and Henry Devron, this city's famous pair of umpires, handled the game in their usual efficient fashion and contributed their services to the fund. The staff of ticket sellers and ticket takers, the firm that carries the cash away and other attaches of the park also donated their services so the expenses were cut down to a minimum.

Connors was accorded good support in the field during the early stages of the game and a few fortunate bounds robbed the Grays of hits. For instance, in the second inning Graber's bouncer seemed completely out of reach of Frank Cappalli at short. Then it hit second base and bounded right into the Friars' shortstop's hands.

But finally errors cropped up and these, along with Connors's natural fatigue, snatched the victory from his hands. The Friars made three misplays and all occurred in the Providence scoring innings.

Chapman Makes First Score

The Friars threatened from the start and in the very first inning they pushed a man to third. But there were two out at the time and Al Weston caught Duffy's fly to retire the side. The Grays put men on base in the first six innings but no one went further than second.

Dick Chapman led off for the Friars in the fourth and made the first Providence College hit, a single over second base. A moment later he took second on Pond's passed ball, and scored on Joe Harraghy's double to centre. The Friars touched Kalbaugh for two more hits in the fifth, and then tried in vain to connect with Schroeder's offerings during the remainder of the game.

In the Grays' half of the seventh inning, Sam Jones led off with a double. Phil Voyles laid down a beautiful bunt. From third Jones came romping in when Bo Messner hit toward the pitcher's box. Connors made a nice scoop-up of the ball, but his throw in was poorly aimed. The ball hit Sam in the back and Jones was safe with the first run for the leaguers. In the meantime, Messner made second. Jimmy Galvin, catching the last part of the game in place of Pond, hit to centre field, and Leo Lobbell dropped what looked like an easy catch. Messner stopped at third and Jimmy at second. Schroeder flied out to Duffy, but Boyle scored two runs with his single.

Peploski singled to start off the eighth and took third on Walters's single to left which followed. This time at bat Jones fanned, but Pep and Walters pulled a double steal which brought the Jersey boy in with the fourth Providence run. Walters took third on Main's wide throw to the plate. As Cappalli was throwing out Voyles, Walters scored.

C. C. N. Y. BY 5 TO 1

Moran Holds New Yorkers to Eight Scattered Hits

Main Gets Three Hits to Drive
in Three Runs.—Moran
Breaks Tie in 3rd.

The Providence College Varsity baseball team started its season auspiciously at Hendriken Field yesterday afternoon by scoring a 5 to 1 victory over the City College of New York team. The triumph continued an unbroken string of baseball wins by the local college over the New Yorkers, extending over a period of five years.

Frankie Moran, Senior classman from South Providence, and the outstanding veteran of Jack Flynn's hurling corps, was on the firing line for the Friars, and turned in a fine game. He was nipped for eight hits, but kept them well scattered, and proved a stumbling block to the visitors when they placed men on the bases. Tenzer, a southpaw, twirled for C. C. N. Y., and with better support would have held the Friars to a lower score.

Harry Main, veteran second baseman from Pawtucket, was the hero of the clash, collecting three of the Friars' hits, one blow going for two bases, driving in two of the locals' runs. He handled six chances in the field. He attempted to make a running catch in deep right field in the first inning, and missed by inches, the only play to mar his fielding.

Duffy Scores First Run

Joe Duffy, last year's captain and star first baseman, had the honor of denting the home station for the first run of the season when he trotted in from second in the second canto after Harry Main had crashed a long double into centre field. Duffy singled to left to open the inning and was moved along to second on Szydla's sacrifice bunt. Cappalli dropped a pretty bunt along third, but Main overran the base and was caught by Kaplowitz for the third out.

The New York quintet tied up the score in the third. With one away, Oglio singled and moved to second when Harraghy let one of Moran's fast curves get away. Goldman fanned, but Blum singled through the box, Szydla allowing the ball to elude him in centre field, and Oglio cantered home.

Moran put his aggregation to the fore again in the latter half of the same inning when he tripled to centre. Dion skied to first and Gibbons lined to left, Berger making a fine catch. On the latter drive Moran made a break for the plate and beat the throw by inches, sliding under Schwartz to break the deadlock.

Bracher Starts Seventh

Another marker was chalked up in the fourth when Szydla walked, and moved to second when Goldman missed a throw from Tenzer in an effort to catch the Friar outer gardener off the base. Main came through with his second hit, a single which fell in short left field, and Szydla raced home.

Bracher, a right handed flinger, replaced Tenzer to start the seventh, and two runs were nipped off his delivery in the two innings he worked. The counter in the seventh resulted from Goldman's loose play at first base when he dropped Oglio's peg of Main's grass cutter. Main went to second on the miscue, moved to third on a wild pitch, and scored when Goldman dropped the throw on Dion's infield tap.

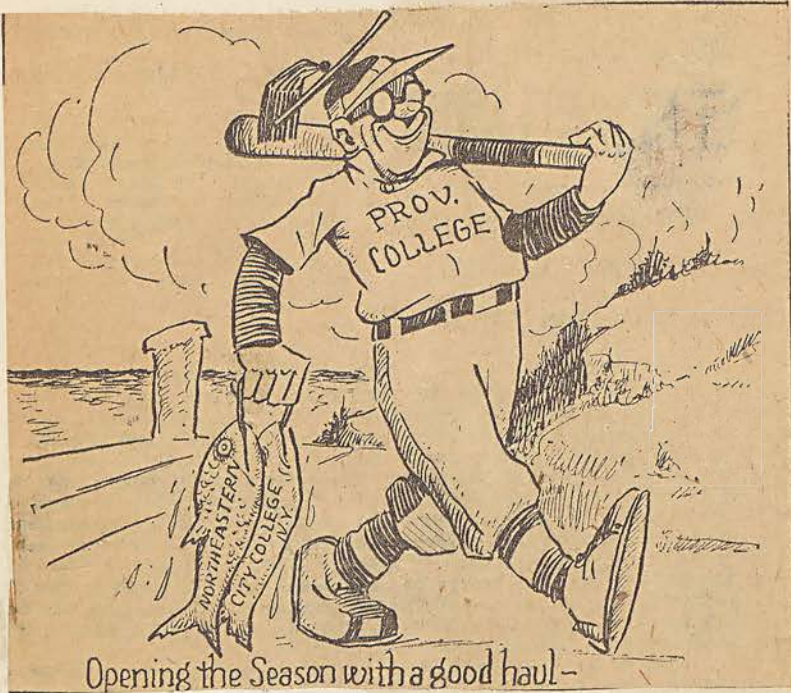
The final Friar marker was added in the locals' last turn at the plate. Duffy beat out a roller past the box, but was forced at second by Szydla. The latter stole second, and tallied on Harraghy's clean two-bagger into centre. Main's third hit, a Texas leaguer into left, moved Harraghy to third, but Cappalli ended the rally by grounding to short to force Main at second.

Quinton, Former Tech Ace, Pitches Friars to Victory

The strong Providence College baseball team scored its second successive victory of the season by swamping a weak Northeastern University nine in a free scoring game on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon, the final score being 12 to 2 in favor of the Friars. No less than 32 players took part in the game, 19 of the Dominican squad seeing action.

Eddie Quinton, former Tech high hurling ace, made his collegiate debut for the Friars and turned in a fine exhibition for the six innings he worked. Only three scattered hits were gleaned off his delivery, while seven of the Northeastern batters were turned back by the strikeout route. Quinton gave way at the start of the seventh to Joe Madden, husky yearling from Philadelphia, who was nicked for two runs in two frames. Al Hoban, former La Salle twirler, finished the game.

Dion Knocks Out Homer

Bob Dion, Friar third baseman, smashed out the team's first home run of the season. His blow, a hard line drive just inside third base which rolled far into the left field foul territory, came in the fifth inning with no one on base.

Carter, visiting shortstop, took the batting honors of the day, however, with a triple, a double and a single in four trips to the plate.

Quinton got away to a poor start when Carter, the first man up, poked a double into right, but then steadied and retired the following three batters without trouble. He pitched hitless ball for the next four frames, and was nicked for two blows, one a scratch hit, in the sixth.

Friars Open Up in Third

It was not until the third inning that the Friars found their batting range. Gibbons opened with a pretty bunt along third which caught Presper napping. Schlimper made a late recovery and pegged wildly to first, Gibbons continuing to second. Chapman hit to second and Tiffany pegged low to first, both runners being safe.

Connors Twirls Dominicans To Victory Over Huskies

Friars' Mound Star Fans 11
and Allows But Three Hits as
Northeastern Bows 4-1.

(Special to the Providence Journal)
Boston, April 16.—With Danny Connors, former Medford twirler, hurling air-tight ball in his initial college appearance, the Providence College nine chalked up its third straight triumph of the season here today by downing Northeastern University by a 4-to-1 score. The victory is the second to be scored by the Friars over the local club.

Connors was in rare form, striking out no less than 11 of the Huskies, and allowing but three scattered hits. The lone run nicked off his delivery resulted from a single, followed by a steal, an infield out, and a double steal in which Hassell came home as a play was made on Nutter at second.

Providence failed to turn in as strong an offensive as they did at Hendricken Field last Saturday. Eleven of the Dominicans were left stranded on the base paths, but Gibbons, Dion, and Lobdell chipped in with timely hits to enable the visitors to gain a three-run advantage over the local aggregation.

Connors Hurls Well

Connors had the Huskies in check throughout the game. Until the eighth inning only one runner got beyond first base, and it was six innings before the Northeastern batters were able to drive the ball outside the infield.

Coach Flynn experimented with two of his substitute shortstops during the fray, turning the shortfield berth over to Eddie Janas, former La Salle star, and Louis Bekel of Classical. Both turned in creditable performances in spite of the fact that they were making their debut in collegiate baseball.

Score in Third

Providence threatened in every inning but one, but was able to garner runs in but three of the cantos. After leaving two men stranded on the sacks in the opening stanza, the Friars nicked Nelson, husky hurler, for a run in the third inning. In this canto Dion opened with a double to the left field fence. Gibbons followed with a short single to right and when Presper allowed the ball to bound past him Dion registered at the home station and Gibbons continued to third. The next three batters were unable to connect safely and as a result the rally netted but the one marker.

With the local nine turning in some sparkling work to support him, Nelson held the Friars to their one run until the sixth inning. In this stanza Duffy drew a base on balls, and after Szydla and Harraghy had popped to the infield, Main came through with a clean single to left. McDonald, husky outer gardener, booted the drive and Duffy went to third while Main took second. Lobdell, lanky substitute outfielder for the Dominicans, was rushed into action by Flynn, and proceeded to produce a scoring punch when he lined past first to send both runners across the plate.

Connors Drives in Run.

The fourth and final run was driven in by Danny Connors, who connected safely to score Main from second. Harraghy was hit to start the inning, and was forced at second by Main. The latter pilfered the base and raced home when Connors poked his hit into centre-field.

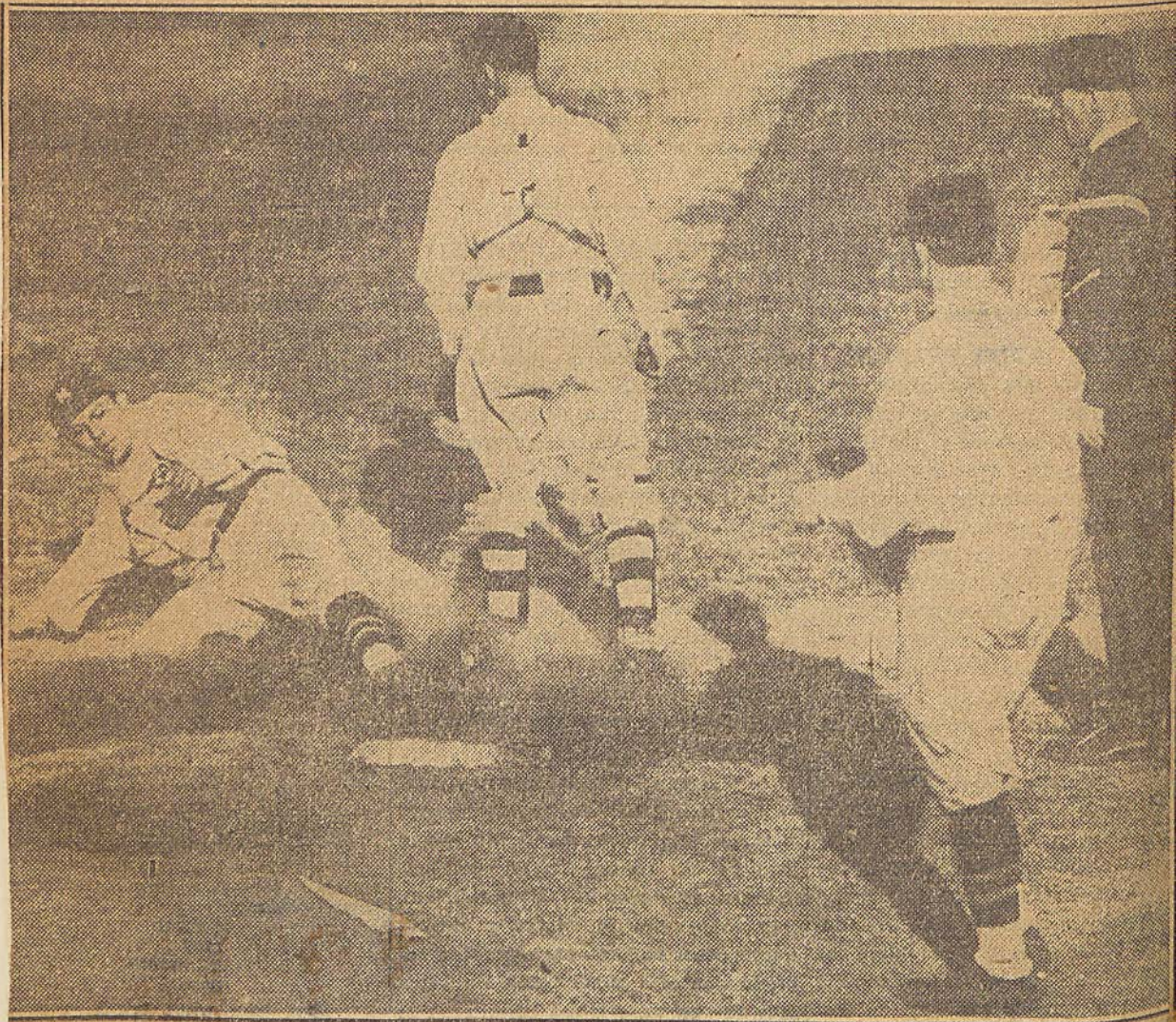

Staving off a ninth inning rally by which the Muhlenberg College nine threatened to break their clean record, the Providence College nine eked out a 5 to 4 decision over the Pennsylvanians on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. The Allentown collegians bombarded Moran off the mound in the eighth, coming within a run of tying the score, and then fell short in their final inning attack when Capt. Joe Harraghy of the Friars caught Borrelli trying to steal home.

The finish of the tilt was one of the most exciting that has been staged by the Friars this season. Providence coasted along favored by a 5 to 1 margin until the eighth inning, when the Muhlenberg ball tossers pounded Moran's offerings to all corners of the lot.

CRUSADERS BEAT FRIARS

Holy Cross Halts Friars' Winning Streak on Diamond

Connors Walks Six as Worcester Collegians Score 9-4 Victory.

Worcester, Mass., April 26.—For the second successive year Holy Cross shattered a winning streak of the Providence College nine when the Crusaders capitalized every opportunity to score to register a 9-4 decision over the Friars here today. The defeat was the first of the year for the Rhode Islanders, and was the third successive victory for the locals.

Better twirling on the part of Connors might have staved off several of the Purple runs as the Medford yearling was free with free tickets to first, walking six of the men to face him, all of whom subsequently scored on hits.

Normie Sims, ace of the Crusaders' staff, was on the mound for the locals, and only fine support in the pinches enabled him to turn back the Dominicans on several occasions.

Providence jumped into the lead in the very first inning, but handed back the score in double measure in the latter half of the same canto as the result of loose playing. Holy Cross added two more scores on a walk, a triple, and a single in the second frame, and then in the fifth Providence came back strong to come within a run of the locals. Two markers in the sixth and two more in the following inning completely shattered the Friars' hopes, however, and their string of victories was snapped after four successive triumphs.

For the first time this year the Dominicans flashed a real offence and from a Providence angle this was the most satisfying point of their play. The Crusaders outhit the visitors 8 to 6, but were able to collect their blows with runners on the cushions. Dion grounded out to open the game, but Gibbons sounded the Friars' attack with a sharp single to left and Chapman followed with a blow into right centre. Gibbons raced to third on the hit, and Chapman went down to second on the throw-in. Duffy popped a fly to Farrell in deep left and Gibbons sprinted in with the first run of the game. Chapman tried to go to third on the sacrifice, but was caught as he slid into that station when Ryan cut off the throw-in and pegged to Shanahan.

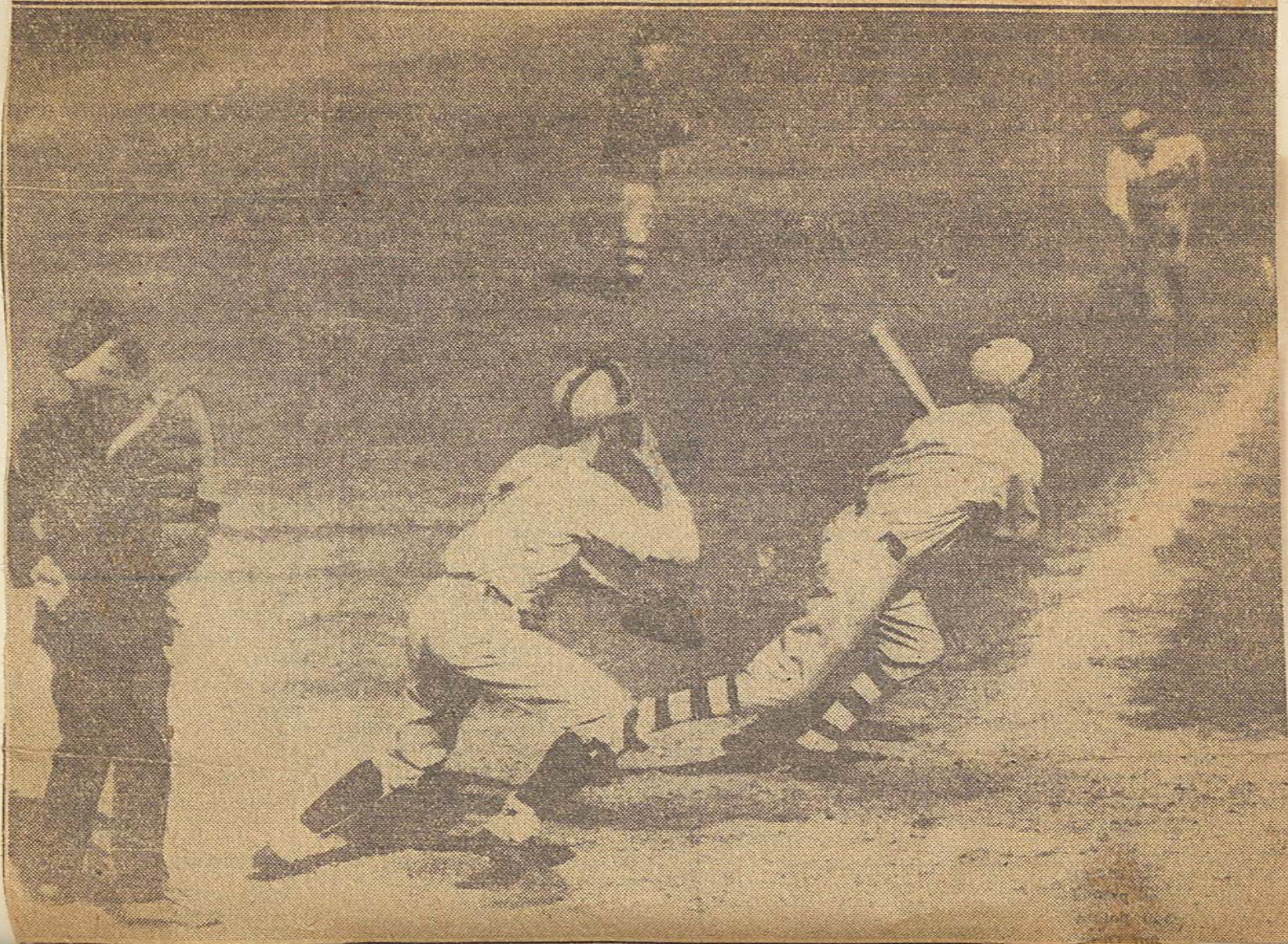

Smith Hillers Win Easily in Slow, Ragged Contest

10 Errors Mar Game; Dominicans Capitalize on Seven Miscues of Weavers.

With Frank Buckley, Sophomore hurler from Roslindale, making his 1930 debut, the Providence College nine swung back into the win column on Hendriken Field yesterday afternoon by annexing a 6 to 1 decision over the Lowell Textile team. The victory was the fifth of the season for the Friars.

Except for two sparkling double plays, engineered by Dion, Main and Duffy, and a terrific home run clout in the first inning by Dick Chapman, play was slow throughout, with both teams turning in some ragged work in the field. No less than 10 errors were committed, with the visiting aggregation offending on seven occasions.

Buckley, making his first start of the campaign, had the Weavers well under his control at all times, allowing but four scattered hits. The one run which they scored was due to loose play on the part of the Dominican infield, and other than that occasion all attempts to register at the home station were frustrated. Eight were retired by striking out, with Truesdale the first to fade before Buckley's curves, in the opening inning with the bases loaded.

The Friars capitalized every miscue made by the Lowell aggregation, but at the same time uncovered a consistent batting attack which enabled them to earn five of the six markers which they collected. Buckley was the leading stickler for the Dominicans, pounding out a double, a single and a sacrifice during the fray.

Game played: April 29, 1930

Lowell garnered its lone score in the first canto. Dick Chapman provided the scoring punch for the Smith Hillers in their half of the same inning. Dion had opened with a single to centre, and was moved along the paths by Gibbons. Chapman caught hold of one of Allard's fast shoots and hoisted it far over Kilmartin's head. The ball rolled through the centre field gate and the Friar right fielder made an easy circuit of the bases to give the locals a 2 to 1 lead.

Another Providence score was added in the second canto. In the fifth Chapman strolled, went to second when Truesdale dropped a throw from Allard, and moved to third when Duffy grounded out to first. Szydla poked a single into centre to bring in the run.

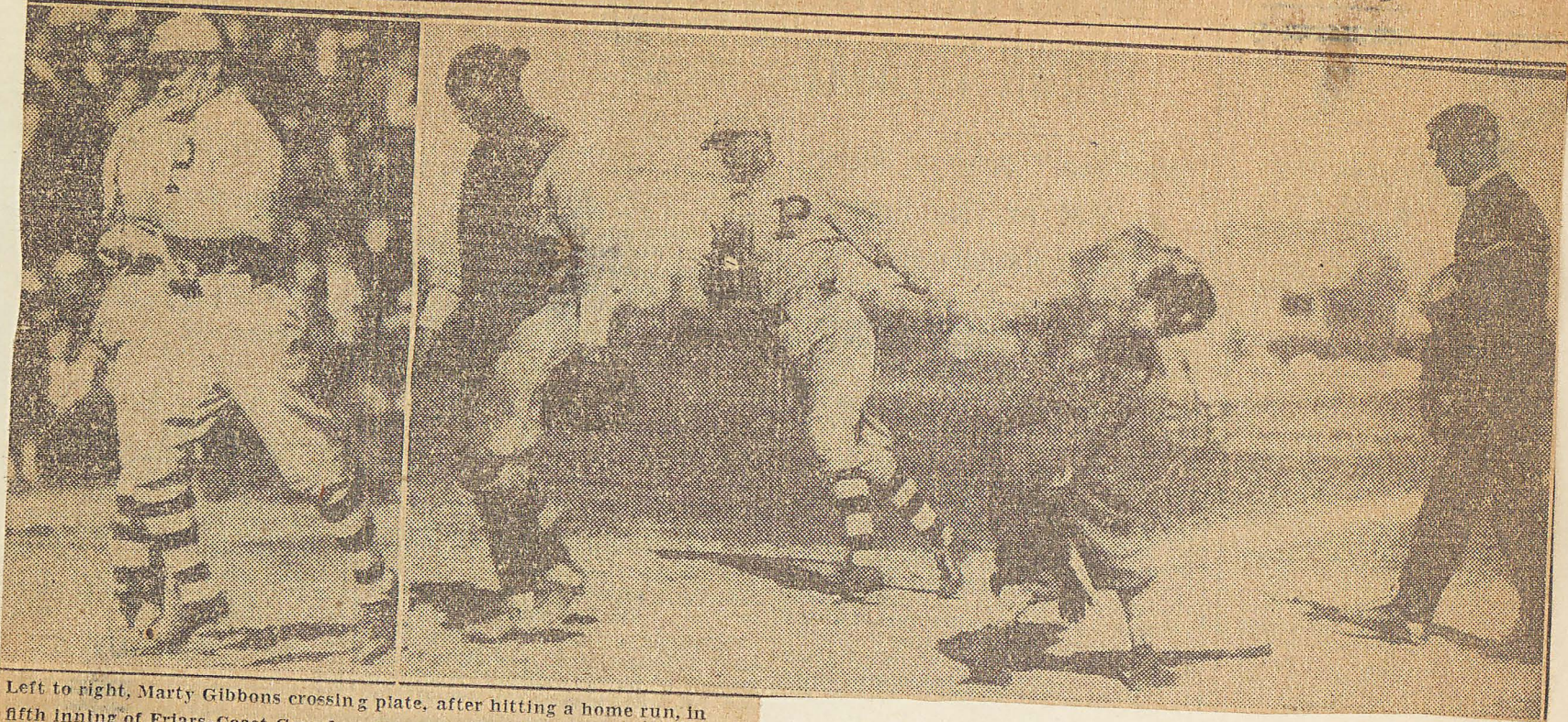

FRIARS QUIT DIAMOND IN 7TH INNING

Dispute Over Double Play at Villanova Causes Hot Argument

(Special to The News-Tribune)
Villanova, Pa. May 10.—Providence College forfeited its game with Villanova College here this afternoon in the seventh inning when the Friars withdrew from the field in protest of the unfair officiating which completely checked their attempts to win.

The climax to the trouble which brought about the cessation of the game came in the seventh inning. At the time the Friars were trailing by a 5 to 1 score, due to the fact that Connors encountered a stormy fourth inning.

Sellig, first batter up in the seventh was safe on an infield error. Chapman hit a grounder to second and Sellig was forced at the second sack by at least six feet. Czesick attempted to make a play on Chapman at first for a possible double killing, and pegged wildly to that station. Dinsmore, umpire on bases ruled Sellig out and Chapman safe. But Vorhees, working from behind the plate claimed that Sellig interfered with the throw, and ruled both players out.

VIGOROUS PROTESTS

The Friars protested the decision, but Vorhees was adamant and so Coach Jack Flynn of the Dominicans called his team off the field in protest. It was the first time in the Friars' baseball history that they have ever left a field for such a reason.

The contest between the Dominicans and the locals scheduled for next week at Providence was cancelled by the visitors, and the incident will probably cause a rift in the athletic relations of the two colleges.

MARTY GIBBONS OUT FOR SEASON

The Providence College nine, facing the heaviest part of its schedule in the coming weeks, received a severe blow with the announcement yesterday that Marty Gibbons, star left fielder, has been declared ineligible for further participation this year owing to scholastic difficulties. Gibbons started every game until the road trip last week, when he was forced to give way to a substitute when he sustained a severe finger bruise during a practice session.

Gibbons starred with the championship team two years ago, and turned in some fine work this spring in patrolling left field for the Friars. Although he will be unable to play with the Dominicans this spring, he plans to continue his college course and if able to lift the ban by next spring will compete for his place on the nine. Owing to the fact that he did not play Varsity ball last spring owing to an operation, Gibbons is still eligible for another season of baseball.

The permanent loss of Gibbons means that George Sellig will retain his place in the lineup for the remainder of the season. Sellig is a hard hitter, and in replacing Gibbons for the contests last week had a batting average of .333 for the four games.

Thursday the Friars will resume their competitions on Hendricken Field when they entertain the Middlebury College nine. Either Moran or Buckley will be in line for the mound assignment against Middlebury, with Quinton and Connors held in reserve for the Brown game at Aldrich Field on Saturday afternoon. The latter tilt promises to be as hotly contested as all the previous encounters between the two local nines, with neither team conceded any advantage over the other.

Both are in fine shape, with Quinton having a slight edge over his classmate from Medford.

Friars will have the added strength of their full mound staff, which in addition to Quinton and Connors, numbers such capable hurlers as Moran, senior classman from this city, who has turned in three wins this spring: Buckley, husky right-hander from Rosindale, and Madden, promising recruit from Philadelphia.

WELL MATCHED TEAMS

Joe Duffy, who captained the Friars a year ago, will match his prowess at guarding first base with Calkins, who is considered the finest initial sack guardian to wear the Brown colors in recent years. Both are clever fielders, with Duffy rated as one of the outstanding performers in college ranks.

Captain Joe Harraghy will draw his fourth assignment against Brown from behind the plate, having caught all the tilts of the series a year ago. Harraghy has developed into an exceptionally fine backstop and no few of the major league scouts who plan to sit in on the tilt will keep a watchful eye on his work behind the platter.

The Friars will enter the game favored to clinch the State championship for the third straight year, but past experience has shown that season records count for little when the two teams swing into action on Aldrich Field. Brown boasts a faster and more aggressive nine than that which wore its colors last spring, and as a result the Smith Hillers will need all their power to capture the

FRIARS 5-4 GAME

OVER BEAR

DOMINICANS WIN, 5-4, FROM BROWN

Marsella Crashes Out Homer in
Eighth Producing Three Runs
for Providence College.

VICTORY EVENS UP SERIES

Bruins Drive Connors from Pitch-
er's Box.—Crowd of 2500 Sees
Game at Aldrich Field

Chief Marsella, whose home run slugging was a feature of his work with the Burrillville high school baseball team in 1929, stole all the thunder from the regular batters on the Providence College team yesterday at Aldrich Field when, as a pinch-hitter, he strode to the plate in the eighth inning and exploded a four-ply wallop right in the teeth of the old Brown Bear, the drive careening far over Captain Freedman's head in left field and producing the three tallies that gave the Dominicans a 5-4 victory over Brown.

For seven and a half innings the Bears were in complete command of the game in spite of wretched work on the part of Bucky Harris at shortstop, some timely batting behind the excellent pitching of Art Sondheim giving them what looked like a safe lead of 4 to 1. Only 10 men had looked over Sondheim's slants in the fifth, sixth and seventh innings.

Szydla, first man up for Providence College in the fatal eighth, took advantage of momentary wildness on the pitcher's part and drew a walk, whereupon Captain Harraghy pumped a clean single to centre field. Brown's supporters breathed a bit easier when Main poled a fly to Freedman, but skipped a heart beat when Cappall, who always hits well in games with the Bruins, slashed a single to centre on which Szydla crossed the plate.

Marsella Turns the Trick

With the tying runs on the bases, Coach Flynn benched Quinton, successor to Connors, the starting pitcher, in favor of Marsella and all this youngster did was to take a toe-hold, swing from the cellar and try to lose the ball on the fringes of Freedman's garden. It was a beautiful drive, good for three bases in any company in the land, but the daring Marsella took the desperate chance of stretching it into a homer. Crossing the plate safely meant a Providence triumph. Cleaner handling of the ball on the part of the fielders might have resulted in nipping the runner at the home station, but it was the consensus of the scorers that Marsella merited the honor of a four-base hit.

As a result of this victory the annual series between the Dominicans and the Bears is tied in a knot, each having won eight contests. The second game in this year's series will be played next week Saturday.

Coach Kelleher's proteges concentrated their attack in the second, third and fourth innings, during which they pounded out all their hits, six in number, and their four runs. Connors, first of the three Providence fingers to greet them, retired at the end of the second inning after he was bombarded for a brace of singles and a triple that netted two tallies.

Quinton Tightens in Fifth.

Quinton faced the Brown batsmen in the third round and was nicked for a run when a pass was followed by a pretty two-bagger by McGinn. In the fourth, extra base drives by Crane and Harris produced the fourth and final Brown counter, but thereafter Quinton had the gunners in the hollow of his big right hand, only 12 hitters looking over his stuff in the next four rounds. Quirk subdued the Bruins very effectively in the ninth inning, his submarine delivery netting him a brace of strikeouts.

Of the five safeties which the Dominicans pried from Sondheim's delivery, three were made in the rollicking eighth, but his wildness, combined with loose play on the first line of defence, kept him in constant trouble, the Dominicans having nine runners left on bases.

Barring a sparkling catch by Chapman of a bid for a hit by Harris in the opening inning and a nifty one-handed stop by Dion of a teasing roller from Houlton's bat in the fifth, the game was devoid of fielding features.

Brown Nets Two in Second

After a scoreless first round, Brown crashed through for two runs in the second, Freedman, opening on Connors with a single through second. McGinn's out, Main to Duffy, advanced the runner, who trotted home on Caulkins's ripping triple to right field. Crane lifted Caulkins home with a single to centre.

Providence filled the bases in the second half when Szydla singled, Sondheim hit Harraghy and Cappalli walked, but Lobdell, pinch-hitting for Connors, fell a victim on strikes for the third out.

Two were down in the third for Brown when Freedman worked Quinton for a pass and raced home on McGinn's two-bagger to centre. Crane opened the fourth by prying loose a triple. He waited on third while Chaiklin and Sondheim were fanning and then sauntered home on Harris's two-bagger to left.

Providence Opens in 4th.

Flynn's charges broke into the run column in the second half of the fourth. Szydla singled, but was forced at second when Moulton, after dropping Harraghy's loft, recovered the ball in time to get it to Crane ahead of the runner. Mair's walk sent Harraghy to second. Cappalli hit to Harris, who tried to force Main at the keystone but lost his man. Quinton hit to Crane, who tossed to Harris in time to head off Cappalli at second, but Harraghy went over the plate on the play.

During the next three rounds the play was desultory, with little to interest the crowd of 2500, but enough was seen in the big scoring round of the Dominicans to make up for such shortcomings. Marsella left the ball yard riding on a real wave of popularity. He was the hero of the contest and every fan in the

stands would like nothing better than to see him swing that big bat again next Saturday afternoon.

ARTIE QUIRK HURLS FRIARS TO 3-2 TRIUMPH OVER EAGLES

RALLY BY LOSERS IN 9TH ONE SHORT OF TYING COUNT

Victory Marks First for Friars
Over Eagles in Boston.
Duffy Hits Hard.

(Special to The Providence Journal.)

Boston, Mass., May 20—An eight year quest by Providence College for a win over a Boston College team on its own field was finally fulfilled here today when Artie Quirk turned back the Eagles by a 3 to 2 score to register the Friar's tenth victory of the season. The triumph marked the first time that the Rhode Island College has subdued the locals in this city.

The victory was entirely Quirk's, and marked the first college tilt that he has started and finished for the Dominicans. Lack of control has kept Quirk in the background in previous campaigns but he proved effective today as he held the slugging Boston aggregation to three hits until the ninth inning when he was nicked for three additional safeties and the two runs.

The game was featured by some of the sharpest fielding seen here this year, with both teams sharing in the classy work afield.

Shaker O'Connor, husky southpaw and ace of the Eagles mound staff, who defeated Holy Cross last year, started on the slab for the locals, but was replaced by Captain Pete Herman in the eighth after the Friars had collected two runs to take the lead.

Early Play Close.

Play was airtight for the first five innings, with both nines stopping every attempt to place men on the base paths. Boston nearly scored in the fourth, when Temple doubled and Colbert walked, and both advanced on Quirk's wild peg into centre field, but the rally was cut short when Dion made a fine stop of Gibson's grounder for a peg to first for the third out.

Game played: May 20, 1930

Providence nicked O'Connor for the first run of the tilt in the sixth inning. Cappalli opened with a sharp single to right field. Quirk's efforts to bunt went foul, but he came through with a hard smash down the third base line which Temple barely knocked down. Dion grounded to short, and Quirk was forced at second on a close decision when Kelley fumbled the throw.

Sellig smashed a hard grounder to short, and while Dion was being thrown out at second Cappalli scored.

In the seventh Duffy opened with a double to right and moved along to third after Kelly made a running catch of Harraghy's bid for a Texas Leaguer into right. Main drove Creedon into deep short for his grass cutter and made first easily, while Duffy cantered home with the second run.

Duffy Scores for Friars.

In the ninth inning, Duffy gave the Friars their winning margin when he scored on Szydla's long sacrifice fly to deep centre. Duffy opened the inning by smashing a hard hit to right field which Regan allowed to get past him, and the Providence first sacker travelled to third before the ball was finally brought back to the infield.

Colbert opened Boston's half of the ninth by smashing a hard drive at Dion, reaching first ahead of the throw. Cappalli booted Gibson's easy roller, and Colbert raced to third on the error. Regan fanned for the first out, and Gibson reached second on the play. Shea sent Sellig to deep left for his riser and Colbert tallied after the catch. Capt. Herman brought Gibson in with the second marker when he singled to centre. Kelly continued the rally with another safe blow to the same spot, but Harraghy gathered in Creedon's twisting foul fly to end the game.

Pooler Goes Six Innings

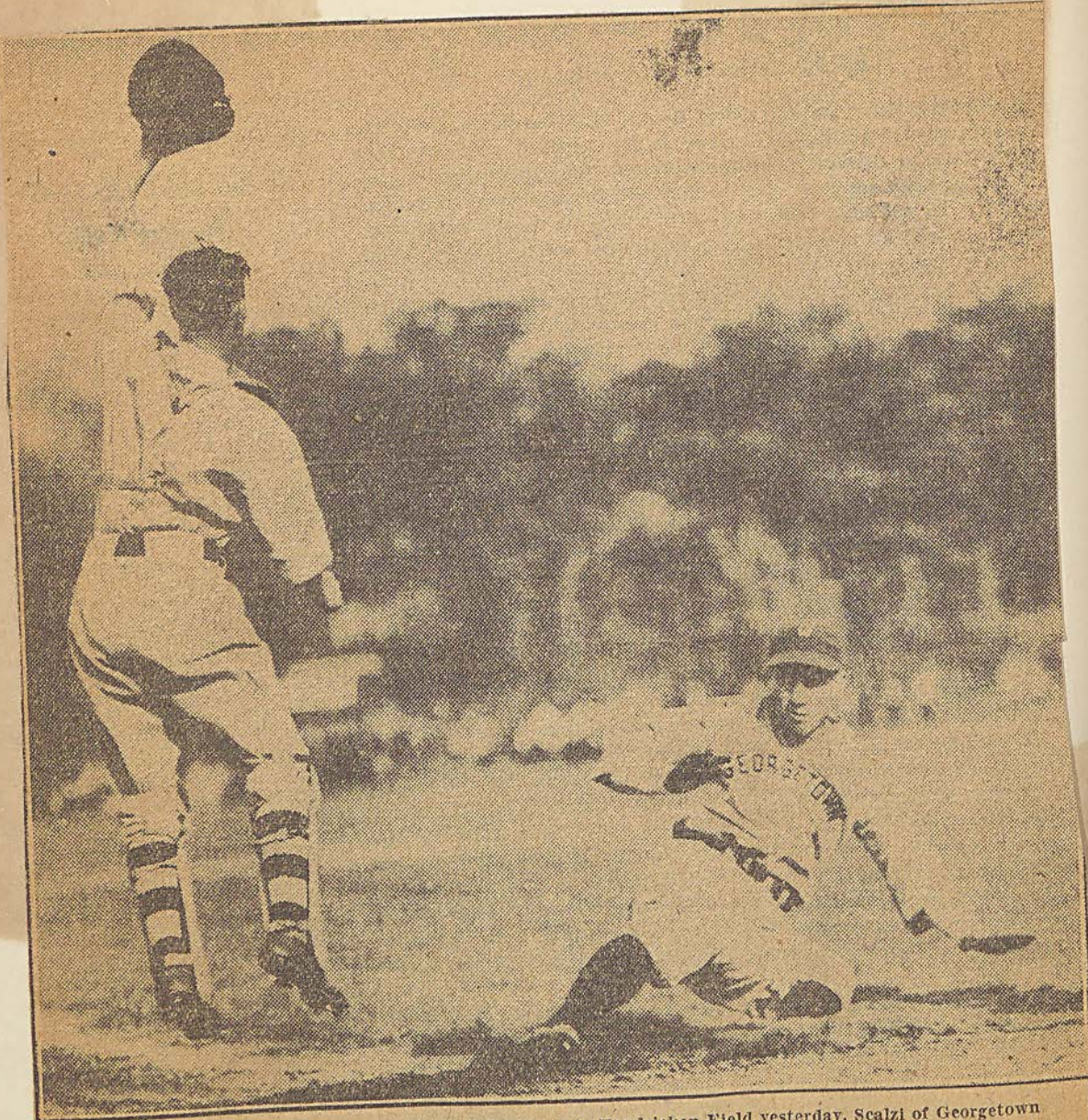

McCarthy hit to Cappalli, whose throw to the plate was too late to prevent Bozek from scoring the fifth Georgetown marker. McCarthy went out stealing. Dunn ended the inning by grounding out to second.

Buckley Doubles.

Buckley put the Smith Hill aggregation in the running again in the fifth inning. Cappalli opened by drawing a walk, and Buckley brought him home with a solid two-base smash into deep centre. Dion fanned, but Sellig came through with a sharp hit through short to score Buckley. Chapman forced Sellig, and Duffy grounded out, Poole to Bozek, to finish the attack.

In the following inning Poole was driven to the showers as the Friars climbed into a one run lead. Szydla, first man up, singled to left, and Harraghy collected a three bagger when his hard drive bounded past McCarthy in centrefield. Szydla brought in the tying run on this hit, and Lomax was rushed to the mound in an effort to stem the Dominican's barrage of hits. Main drove Rapp to the right field fence for his high fly and Harraghy easily scored after the catch to give his aggregation the lead. Lomax forced Cappalli to sky out to short and Buckley to centre to finish the inning.

Dion Scores

In the first of the seventh the Black and White collegians added to their lead when Dion landed on first when his boulder to short took a bad hop over Dunn's head. He moved to second when Lomax uncorked a wild pitch and reached third while Sellig was being forced at second on Duffy's roller. He scored when Lomax loosed another wild heave which eluded catcher Tierney.

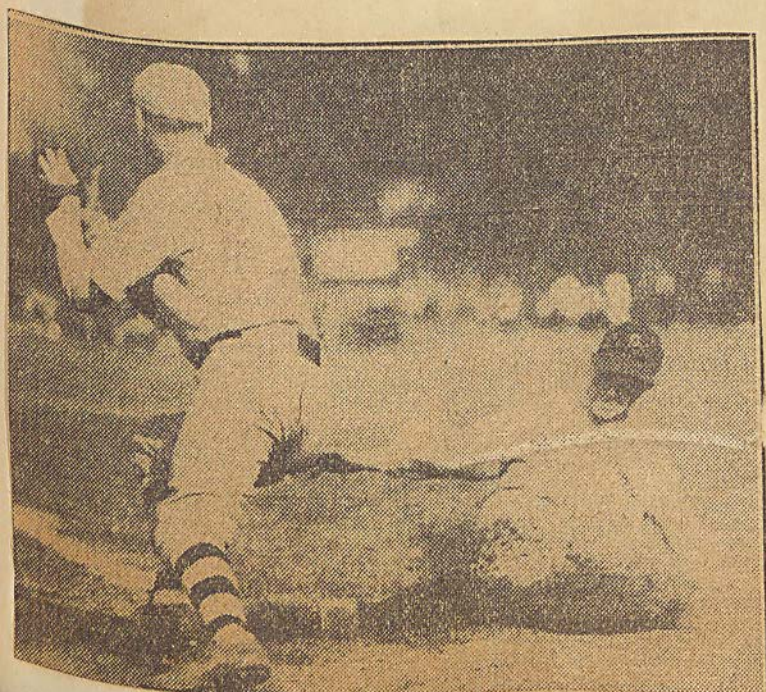

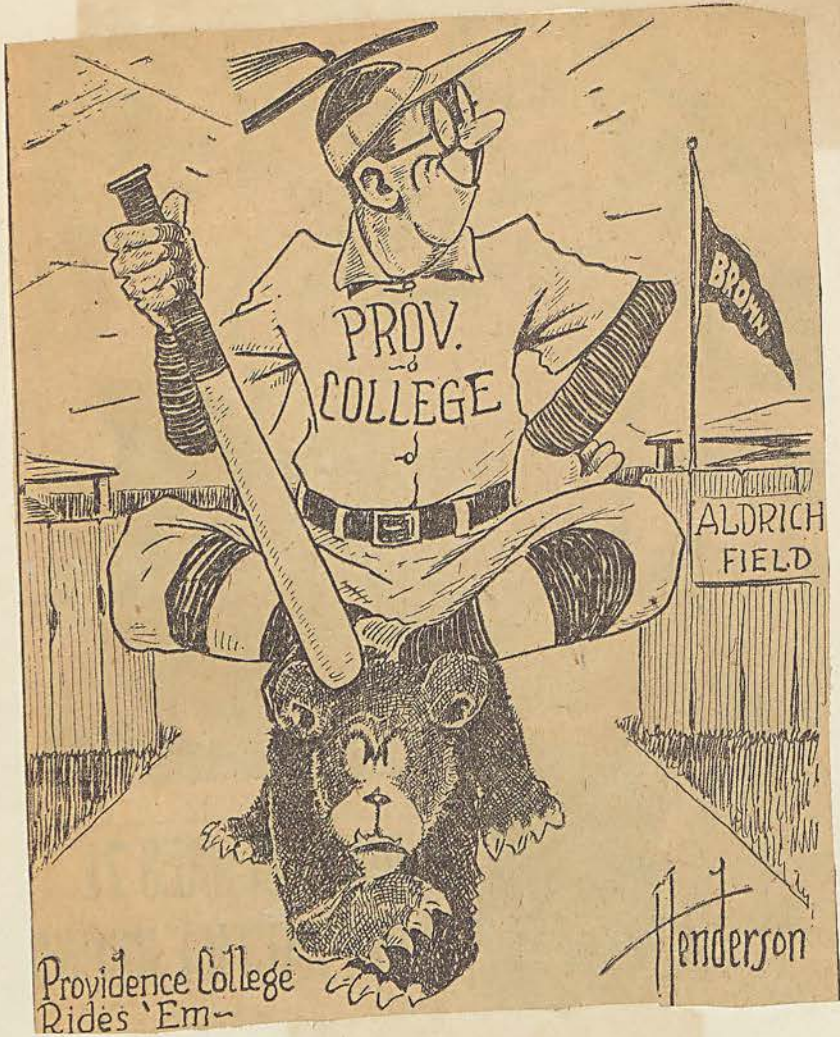

14 TO 2 AS BRUIN

PITCHERS FAIL

Dominicans Make Clean Sweep of Brown Series

Friar Hits, Mingled with Wild
Bruin Hurling, Tells
Weird Story.

The four members of the pitching staff of the Brown baseball team did their best to hand Providence College a victory in the second game of their series at Aldrich Field yesterday afternoon, and with the assistance of the Friars, who hit almost everything that was within reach of their bats, they did so well that Providence won 14-2.

A crowd of about 2500 saw the Bruins, fresh from a 3-1 victory over Harvard, put up an exhibition that was laughable when it was not pitiful, while the game gave Providence its first clean sweep in the annual series and a nine to eight lead in the 17 games the two teams have played.

In five and a third innings, Don Bowie, Phil Lingham, Art Sondheim and Al Gell toed the rubber for Brown. Collectively, they issued 13 passes and allowed nine hits. In addition to this, Gell, in the two-thirds of an inning which he worked, uncorked five wild pitches and hit two batters.

Moulton Finishes in Box

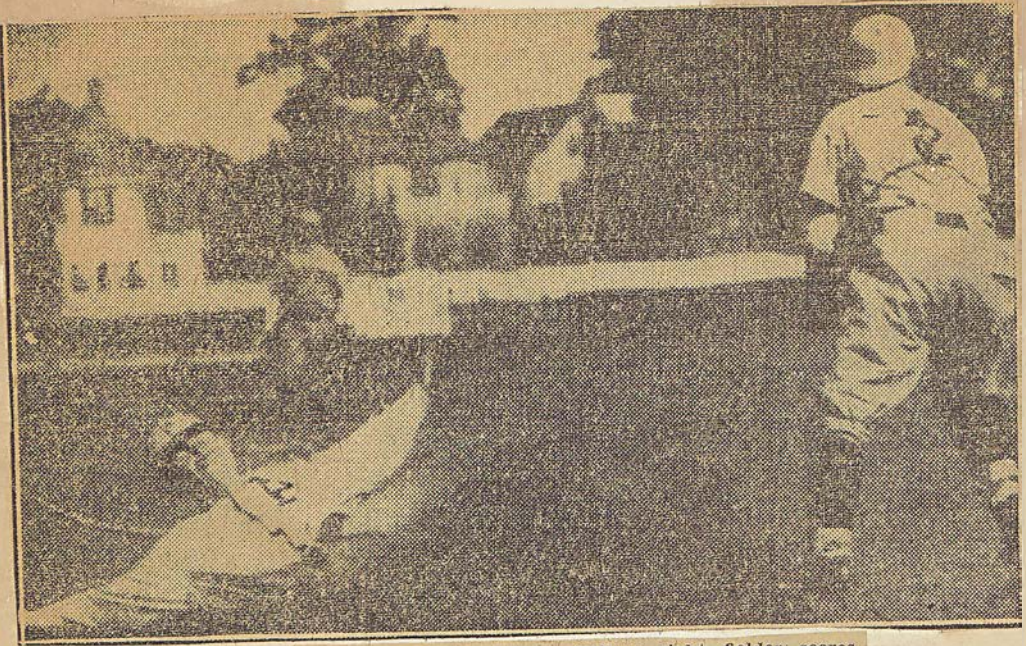
Wackie Moulton, the Bruins' half-pint-sized centrefielder, finished the game in the box. He came in from the outer garden in the sixth with one out and the bases loaded. The first batter to face him singled, scoring one run. Thereafter, Moulton, tossing up slow balls, allowed but two hits and there was no more scoring.

Providence bunched all its runs in three innings, the second, fifth and sixth, when the Bruin pitchers were committing atrocities that would have brought the death penalty in any court of law. Not to be outdone by their twirlers, the rest of the Bruin team committed four errors, one by Bucky Harris, who was guilty of five misplays in the series, starting the debacle in the second frame.

The Friars did their best to make a real game out of the affair, but their work was overshadowed by the wretched playing of the Bruins. The Dominicans collected 12 hits when they weren't being walked and played errorless ball afield.

Quinton Commands

Eddie Quinton, who finished the Georgetown game on Friday, worked on a big advantage from the second inning. Never in serious trouble, he allowed but six hits, had eight strikeouts and in the eighth gave Harris the only pass he issued.

Harris, who had two hits, scored Brown's runs in the fourth and sixth innings, singles by Moulton and Dave Freedman driving him across the plate. Eddie Crane had the other two hits for Brown, and was the best performer in the field.

Don Bowie started on the mound for Brown. He passed Bob Dion, Friars' lead-off man, but was pulled out of a hole when McGinn, Crane and Caulkins worked a fine double play on Sellig's grounder to the Brown third baseman. Chapman drew a pass and Joe Duffy advanced him with a single. With Szydla at bat, Duffy got his signals mixed. He started for second, forcing Chapman off the bag and the latter was trapped between second and third.

The second inning was a nightmare for Brown, one hit, a sacrifice, two errors and six bases on balls giving the Friars six runs. Szydla walked and Harris fumbled Harraghy's easy roller. Further unnerved by this error, Bowie walked Main and Cappalli. This last pass forced Szydla and Bowie left the box in favor of Lingham.

Quinton Gets Single

Quinton scored Harraghy and Main with the only clean hit of the inning. McGinn booted Dion's slow grounder, filling the bases again. Lingham lost all his control when he passed Sellig and Chapman. Cappalli and Quinton crossed the plate on these two walks and Lingham was derricked in favor of Sondheim, who went into the box in spite of a sore arm which has bothered him since the Harvard game.

Duffy sacrificed Dion across the plate, but after Szydla had been passed Harraghy fled out to Moulton and Chapman was caught between third and home to end the inning.

Sondheim managed to weather the third and fourth innings, although he was nicked for three hits. With one out in the fifth, Sondheim's arm failed him. He walked Cappalli, but the Friar shortstop was out when he tried to make third on Quinton's single to Moulton. Dion beat out a hit to Harris and then Harris committed his second error on Sellig's grounder. Sondheim's turn in the box ended when he passed Chapman to score Quinton.

Gell Goes on Rubber

Gell took up mound duty, but the big left-hander couldn't find the plate. Dion walked across the plate on a wild pitch and Gell hit Duffy. Szydla singled, scoring Chapman and Harraghy gave Gell a short respite when he fled out to Freedman.

But Gell got into trouble again in the sixth when he walked Main, sent him to second on another wild pitch and passed Cappalli. Quinton forced Cappalli at second. Main scored on another wild pitch after he had gone to third when Chaiklin tried to catch him off second. Gell completed his appearance by walking Dion and hitting Selleg to fill the bases.

Moulton was called to the mound. Chapman, the first batter to face him, singled to right scoring Quinton. Caulkins started off a fine succession of fielding plays by the Bruins on a grounder by Szydla which hit the bag at first and bounded into the air. Caulkins dove for the ball and twisted around in time to make the putout, but Dion and Sellig scored on the play. Harraghy's fly to Crane ended the inning.

Moulton did a good job in the last three innings and his teammates fielded well behind him. Main and Harraghy, the first batters in the seventh and ninth, were the only ones to hit safely. Harris and Crane had a couple of circus catches which cut off likely hits and Moulton forced the rest of the batters to fly out to the outfielders.

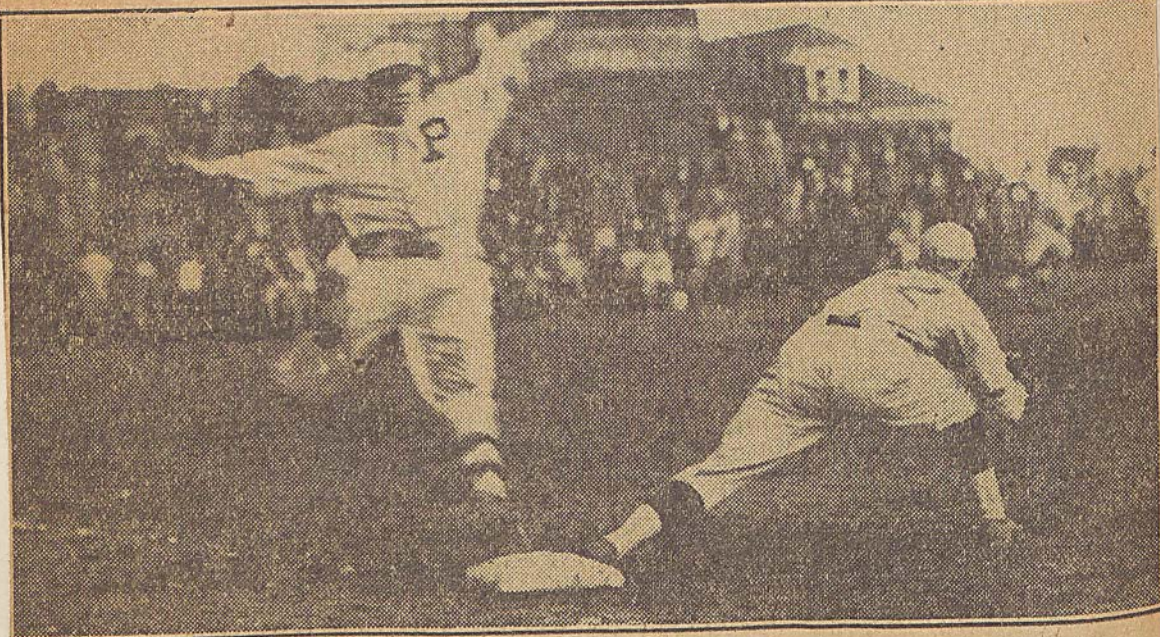

MARINES BLANKED BY FRIARS 7 TO 0

Providence College Chalks Up
Twelfth Victory.—Quirk Al-
lows but Four Hits.

Brilliant pitching by Artie Quirk in his second major assignment of the season, coupled with heavy hitting enabled the Providence College nine to register its 12th triumph of the season by whitewashing the Quantico Marines 7 to 0 at Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. Quirk had allowed but four scattered hits when the game was called in the eighth owing to rain.

With Quirk holding the Southerners at bay, the Friar ball tossers took kindly to the offerings of Couch and Armour and in the seven innings at bat collected 13 hits, three of which were for extra bases. Frankie Cappalli, diminutive shortstop, contributed the longest smash of the day, driving a home run into deep centre, while Sellig with a long triple, and Duffy with a double accounted for the other distance blows.

Only one of the visitors got as far as third base, and his chance to score was eliminated when Quirk forced the next batter to ground out to end the rally.

Tolan started the first inning well for the Marines when he lifted a single into centre and moved along to second on Gorman's sacrifice bunt. Sellig and Szydlia nipped the rally.

In the latter half of the same canto, the Friars opened with their attack, which netted a run. MARSELLA AGAIN PLAYS HERO ROLE

Bangs Out Homer with Two on
Base to Give Friars 6 to 4
Victory Over St. John's.

A home run by Chief Marsella with two runners on the bases in the eighth inning, broke a 3 to 3 deadlock with St. John's College of Brooklyn on Hendriken Field yesterday afternoon, and enabled Providence College to score a 6 to 4 triumph for their 13th win of the season. The victory was the second over St. John's this year, and also the second win in successive days for the Dominicans.

Eddie Quinton, Friar mound ace, turned in his fifth victory of the year. He allowed the New Yorkers but five hits and struck out nine batters.

Marsella, hero of the first victory over Brown this season when he smashed a home run with two men on, has replaced Chapman in the Dominican outfield.

Marsella a Hero Again

In the eighth, with both hurlers apparently going well, Dion was safe on a fielder's choice, and Sellig followed him to first a moment later in similar fashion. Both advanced on an infield error. Then the Burrillville slugger laced the ball over Fernandez's head in left field and three runs came across.

Up to this point, McCormick, clever portsider of the Vincentians, who turned back Catholic University a week ago, had done some fine twirling. He stopped several Friar rallies, and left 10 of the locals stranded on the bases. He fanned Quinton three times for the final out with a runner on third, but the Friar twirler came back strong in the eighth to start the winning rally with a single to left.

Marsella Also Stars in Field.

Marsella, besides his home run and a single, also made two fine catches in right field, the first on Di Domenico's drive in the fourth, and the second on Krist's bid for a double in the eighth. Szydla also raced into deep outfield to rob Fernandez of a possible home run in the eighth.

Providence opened the scoring in the first inning. Dion and Sellig singled. Marsella skied to right and when Dion yaked a dash to the plate, Sellig started from second and forced the Friar third

baseman to continue to the home station where he was thrown out. Sellig reached third safely and scored when Duffy crashed a double along the left field foul line.

In the third, with two out, McCormick had a streak of wildness, walking Duffy and Szydla. Harraghy singled to right to score Duffy.

St. John's Takes Lead

St. John's had gone into the lead in the second inning. Posnak opened with a triple to the left field fence. Cooper fanned, but Di Domenico drew a walk. Singles to Send Dion Over with Winning Run.—Sims, Worcester Ace, Driven from Mound

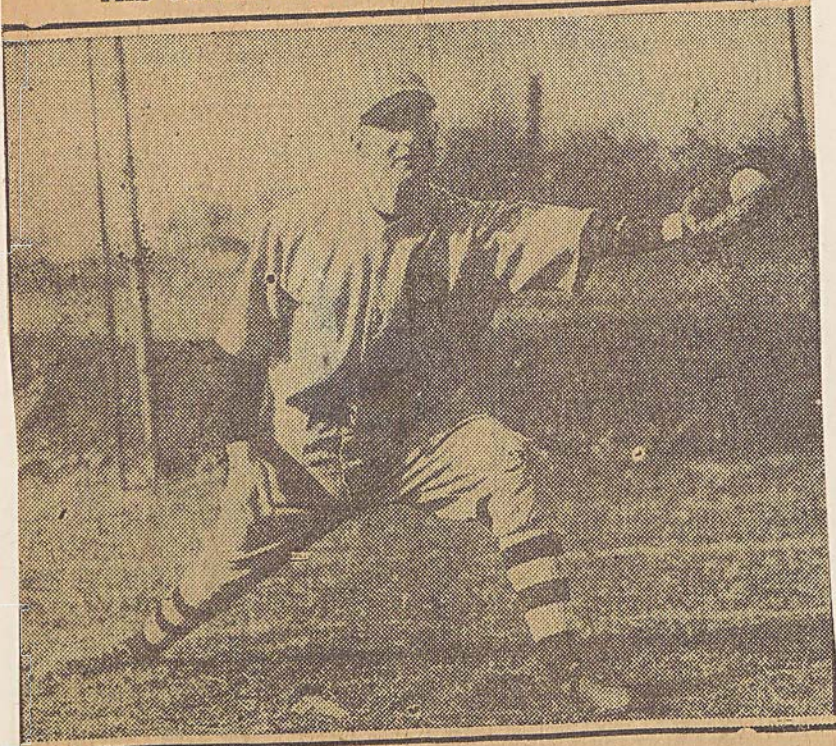
An inspired Providence College team matched baseball skill and courage with the best in college ranks yesterday—and won. A movement is under way for a third game between the two schools to settle the matter of supremacy. The Dominican athletic authorities announced last night they would be willing to play late next week, probably a week from Saturday, at Worcester. Holy Cross now has lost two games, having bowed previously to Columbia. Providence was defeated by the Worcester nine earlier in the season, by Georgetown and by Villanova, the latter in a forfeited game.

It was a fine display of courage that won for the Smith Hill boys yesterday in a ninth-inning rally that capped as good a college contest as has ever been played in this city.

HIS TIMELY HIT GAVE FRIARS VERDICT

**Veteran First Baseman Who Sent Out Single in Ninth to Score Run
That Defeated Holy Cross**

Duffy Knocks in Winning Run

The Friars jumped into a five-run lead by pounding out four scores in the fifth and knocking Sims, the star of the Crusaders' hurling staff, from the box. Gradually this advantage slipped away until in the first of the ninth Holy Cross put over a tally to knot the count. The crowd of about 3000 at Hendricken Field began to fear the worst. But Joe Duffy connected with the first ball pitched for a sharp single through the box to bring home Dion and the bacon. It was Duffy's third hit of the game.

Dion started the victorious rally by walking. Sellig moved him along with a bunt. Marsella, famed for breaking up two games already this season with home runs, was deliberately walked, and then came Duffy.

The game abounded with thrilling plays. Marsella, slugging right fielder who collected two hits and drove in one of the runs, turned in the feature catch when he pulled down Shanahan's hard drive in the fourth inning. Marsella slipped and fell as he started for the ball, but regained his feet in time to make a spectacular one-hand catch for the third out of the inning.

Cappalli Brilliant

Cappelli starred at shortstop, handling six difficult chances, starting a double play with Main on one of them, and breaking up a Holy Cross bid for a score by some quick thinking in the first canto when he caught Shevlin after the Crusader third sacker had overrun third on an infield hit.

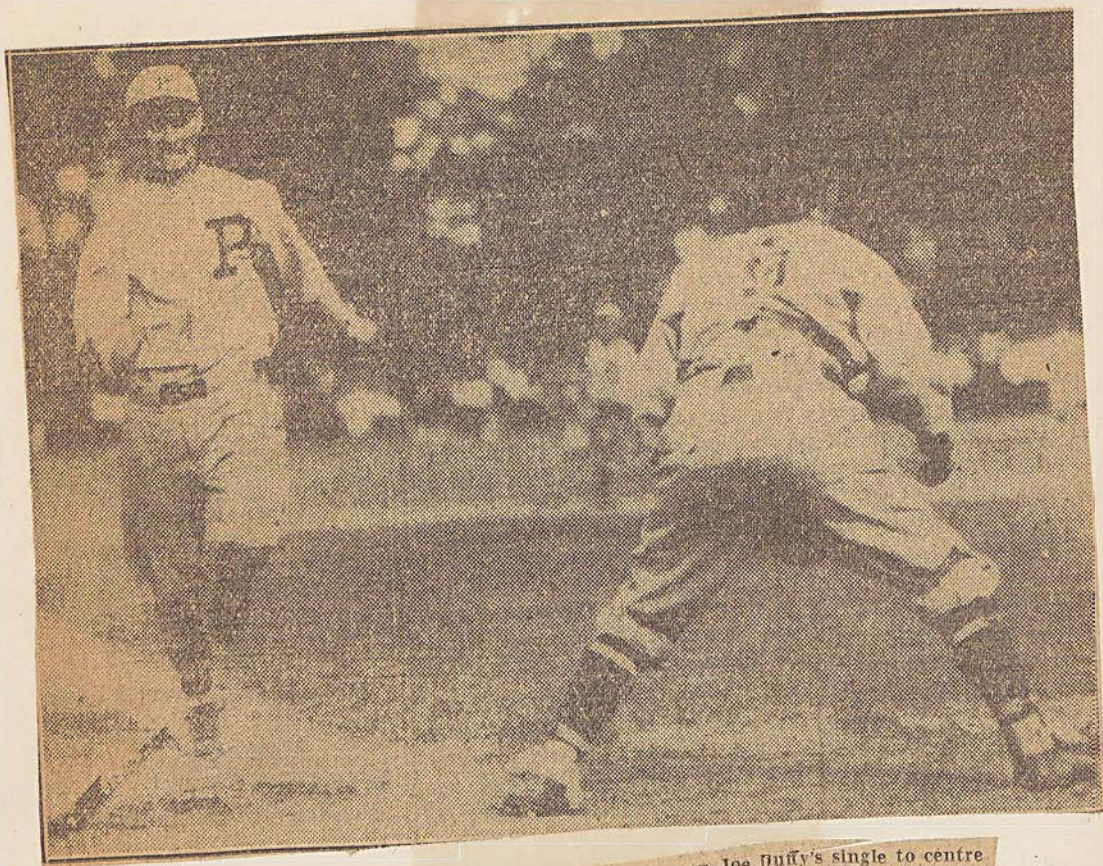
Quirk was on the slab for the Smith Hillers, and the star underhand artist held the powerful invaders well in check until the eighth inning when he weakened from the strain and gave way to Eddie Quinton. The latter halted the rally in the eighth only to have the Crusaders nick him for an additional run in the ninth to tie the score.

Providence stifled a serious Holy Cross attack in the first inning, and in so doing flashed some sensational baseball. Fisher fled to left to open the inning, but on the next drive to the same territory by Desautels, Sellig, Friar outer gardener, dropped the ball. Quirk tried to get the runner off first on a quick peg, but his throw was wild and Desautels moved to second.

Caught at Plate.

Shevlin, captain of the Crusaders and leading college hitter of the East, singled sharply to right and Desautels cut loose for the plate. A beautiful peg by Marsella to Harraghy caught the Holy Cross catcher sliding into the plate and the first score was averted. Shevlin went to second on the throw-in. Then Cappalli raced into deep short to make a running stop of Ryan's bid for a hit, and when Shevlin dashed past third base and started for home, Cappalli made a quick throw to the plate and the runner was run down midway between the two stations.

The Friars broke into the scoring column in the third inning when Cappalli started a rally with a sharp single to left and went to second on Quirk's pretty bunt along third. After Dion had skied out to Desautels, Sellig crashed a single through the box to bring in the run. Sellig went out stealing.

In the fourth, Marsella contributed his spectacular catch to stifle another Crusader rally. With two out, Lawrence singled to left. On a hit and run play, Shannahan lined into right and as Marsella started for the ball he slipped and fell, but quickly regained his feet and speared the ball, which would have been good for a two-base hit at least had it gone past him.

Sims Driven from Mound.

Sims, ace of the Cross mound staff, met his fate in the fifth canto, when the Friars loosed a vicious batting attack to drive four runs across the plate. Main started the fireworks with a triple to deep left. After Cappalli had grounded out, Quirk knocked a tricky single to left to score Main.

Dion caught Shannahan, the third baseman, napping, and beat out a bunt along the third base line. Sellig struck out, but Marsella laced a single into centre to score Quirk and send Dion to

third. Marsella moved to second on the throw-in to the plate, and followed Dion to the home station a moment later when Joe Duffy, hero of the fray, smashed a single to deep centre to send both runners home. Szydla continued the rally with a single through short, but Shannahan pulled down Harraghy's line drive to end the trouble.

An error, a triple and a sacrifice hit gave the Worcester outfit a pair of runs in the sixth. Fisher was safe on Main's boot of his hard roller, and Desautels followed with a long hoist over Sellig's head into deep left field. Shevlin drove Marsella to the right field barrier, and Desautels scored after the catch.

Freidrich Halts Friars

Freidrich replaced Sims for Holy Cross to start the seventh, and the change of hurlers halted the Friars' hitting activities for three innings. Duffy was safe on a hit to third in the seventh, but was left stranded, while Cappalli met a similar fate in the following inning when Quinton fanned for the third out.

Quirk was forced out of the picture in the eighth when the Barrymen broke loose with three hits to come within a run of tying the score. Freidrich opened with a triple to left which Sellig misjudged, and Fisher singled to centre to bring him home. Desautels singled to centre and Fisher moved along to second.

Quinton took the mound assignment and tossed out Shevlin on his sacrifice bunt which advanced both runners to scoring positions. Ryan lifted a high fly which Marsella gathered in, and Fisher tallied after the catch while Desautels went to third. With the tying marker at hand, Quinton struck out Lawrence to end the inning.

Dougherty went to second a minute later on a passed ball by Harraghy, but Quinton forced Freidrich to retire before his slants, and Fisher to hoist a fly to Cappalli to end the rally.

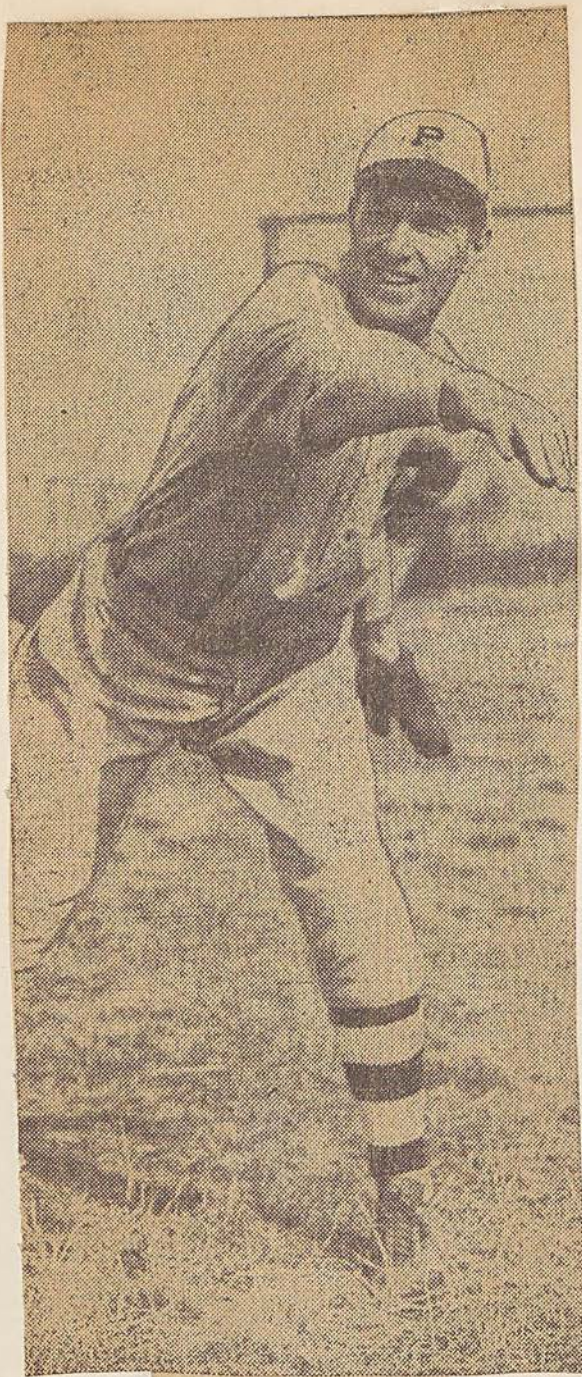
Victory Comes in Third

Teams May Play 'Rubber' in Series; Masters's Record of 16 Straight Broken

The defeat of Holy Cross by Providence was the feature of the past week in college baseball, a week which saw seventeen of the teams in the rankings close their schedules. The Dominicans nosed out Holy Cross, 6 to 5, after the Crusaders had beaten them earlier in the season, 9 to 4. Holy Cross, however, won one game during the past week, beating Harvard on Saturday by the most decisive score of the season, 22 to 0.

With Providence and Holy Cross each winning one game in the two-game series, and with the Dominicans second in the college rankings in the East, a movement is on foot to have the two teams play the rubber game some time before their season's end. Thus far, however, nothing has been done to set a date. The Purple has a record of fifteen victories in seventeen starts, while Providence has won fifteen and lost three.

Georgetown closed its year in third place, with a record of twenty-one games won and six lost. The Hayes have won more games than any college nines in this section of the country.

Two pitchers who were undefeated in previous starts this year went down last week when Walter Masters of Penn. who had run his string up to sixteen (eight last year and eight this season) was defeated by Columbia, 4 to 3, in a ten-inning game. Sims, of Holy Cross, who had won six straight games, was the losing pitcher in the Providence contest.

FRIARS 8 TO 2

Creedon, Colbert Hit Home Run Clouts for Visitors

Winners Pound Quirk for Nine
Hits, Get Two-Run Lead
in First.

The Boston College baseball team, playing brilliantly behind the masterful pitching of Capt. Pete Herman, completely upset the Providence College aggregation on Hendriken Field yesterday afternoon, winning the Commencement Day tilt with the Friars, 8 to 2. It was the fourth and the most decisive setback sustained by the Dominicans this year.

Artie Quirk, who was graduated in the morning, was on the slab for the locals, and although he worked hard to make his college finale successful, the fates were against him. He struck out eight of the visiting batsmen, but was nicked for nine hits. Danny Connors relieved Quirk in the eighth and held the Bostonians in check for the last two cantos.

The heavy hitting invaders collected two home runs and a triple. Paddy Creedon completely dashed all hopes of the Friars of overtaking a 4 to 1 lead run up by the visitors when he poled a home run clout over the right field barrier in the sixth inning with two men on base. Colbert lifted a homer into deep centre in the seventh with no one on, while Shea contributed his extra base drive in the fourth.

Boston started trouble in the first inning. Creedon, first man up, beat out a roller to short, and Murphy was safe when Dion booted his grounder. Colbert advanced both runners with a bunt. Temple hit to Dion who forced Creedon at the plate to halt the rally temporarily. Then Reagan lined to right field and Marsella played the ball poorly, allowing it to bound past him so that two runs crossed the plate while the batter raced all the way around to third.

In the second inning Downes started another rally when he opened with a single to centre, going to second when Shea bunted along the first base line. Herman hit to Cappalli who booted the bouncer, allowing Downes to score. In the fourth inning Shea added another tally when he tripled over Sellig's head in left field and came home while Main was throwing out Herman at first.

One Runner That Didn't Score



Boston College made enough runs yesterday to defeat Providence College 3-2 at Hendricken Field but this picture shows one attempt for a tally that did not succeed. The Friars went down in order without a single man reaching first base for the first four innings, but Joe Duffy singled to right in the fifth. Szydla walked and Harraghy rolled to Herman who threw to third in ample time to force Duffy, but Temple dropped the throw and the bases were loaded. Main popped to third, and then Cappalli hoisted a long sacrifice fly to centre, Duffy scoring after the catch. Quirk walked to fill the bases again, but Dion's bid for a hit was pulled down by Shea in centrefield.

In the sixth Boston clinched the verdict as the result of Creedon's circuit smash. Downes singled to left and after Shea had filed to Szydla, Herman hit to right field, Downes going to third on the hit. Then Creedon smashed one of Quirk's fast shoots over the rightfield fence to send the Eagles' score to seven.

Two walks and a balk placed Providence runners on second and third in the sixth. But Herman tightened to fan Szydla and force Harraghy to ground out. In the seventh Harry Main brought in the Dominicans' second run when he singled, moved to second on Cappalli's walk, to third when Curran, who batted for Quirk, was hit, and crossed the plate while Curran was being tossed out at second on Sellig's grounder. Marsella walked to fill the bases again, but Duffy's grounder was fielded faultlessly by Temple.

COACH JACK FLYNN'S Dominicans, on the threshold of the Eastern intercollegiate baseball championship, have cracked wide open under terrific pressure, part of it supplied by Hugh Duffy's Boston College Eagles, one of the strongest combinations along the Atlantic seaboard, and the balance furnished by too heavy a strain on frazzled nerves. During the closing weeks of a campaign which will be concluded with the third and deciding battle of the series with Holy Cross at Worcester tomorrow the Providence collegians have been shouldering an unusually heavy burden, i. e., the knowledge that one slip might ruin their chances of marching to the mythical title.

The burden took on additional weight when they raced into what amounted to virtually a tie for the crown with Jack Barry's Crusaders in the contest at Hendriken Field. Holy Cross, with the championship at her fingertips, cracked in that game just as Providence did yesterday.

Four defeats now mar the record of the Providence team. Another setback in tomorrow's battle might rob the Dominicans of a chance to finish in the runner-up berth. If the Smith Hill lads can make a comeback at the expense of Holy Cross they will merit a bracket with the Crusaders at the head of the Eastern list although Barry's men would probably be hailed as the leading team by most of the experts.

HOLY CROSS TOPS

FRIARS 7-3

Friars' Title Hopes Dashed As Crusader Nine Wins 7-3

Holy Cross Has Big Inning in
5th, Scoring Five Runs;
Farrell Hits Homer.

Fitton Field, Worcester, June 14.—
The hopes of Providence College for the
Eastern intercollegiate baseball cham-
pionship were shattered as Holy Cross
sent the Friars down to a 7 to 3 defeat
in the deciding game of their series
here this afternoon. A crowd of more
than 6500, one of the largest of the
season, saw the contest.

Both starting pitchers wilted under
the rays of a scorching sun, Eddie Quin-
ton of Providence giving way to a pinch
hitter after the Crusaders had scored
five runs in the fifth, while Gene Hebert
was replaced by Bobby Friederich in the
sixth after he had allowed two hits and
walked four batters. It was in this in-
ning that the Dominicans did all their
scoring, Capt. Joe Harraghy driving two
of the runs across with a hard single
down the left field foul line.

The defeat was but the fifth in 20
starts for Providence College, but after
the last putout, the record of Holy Cross
was 16 victories and two defeats, giv-
ing the Purple a strong claim to cham-
pionship honors. It was the last game
for Providence, while Holy Cross will
play Boston College twice this week.

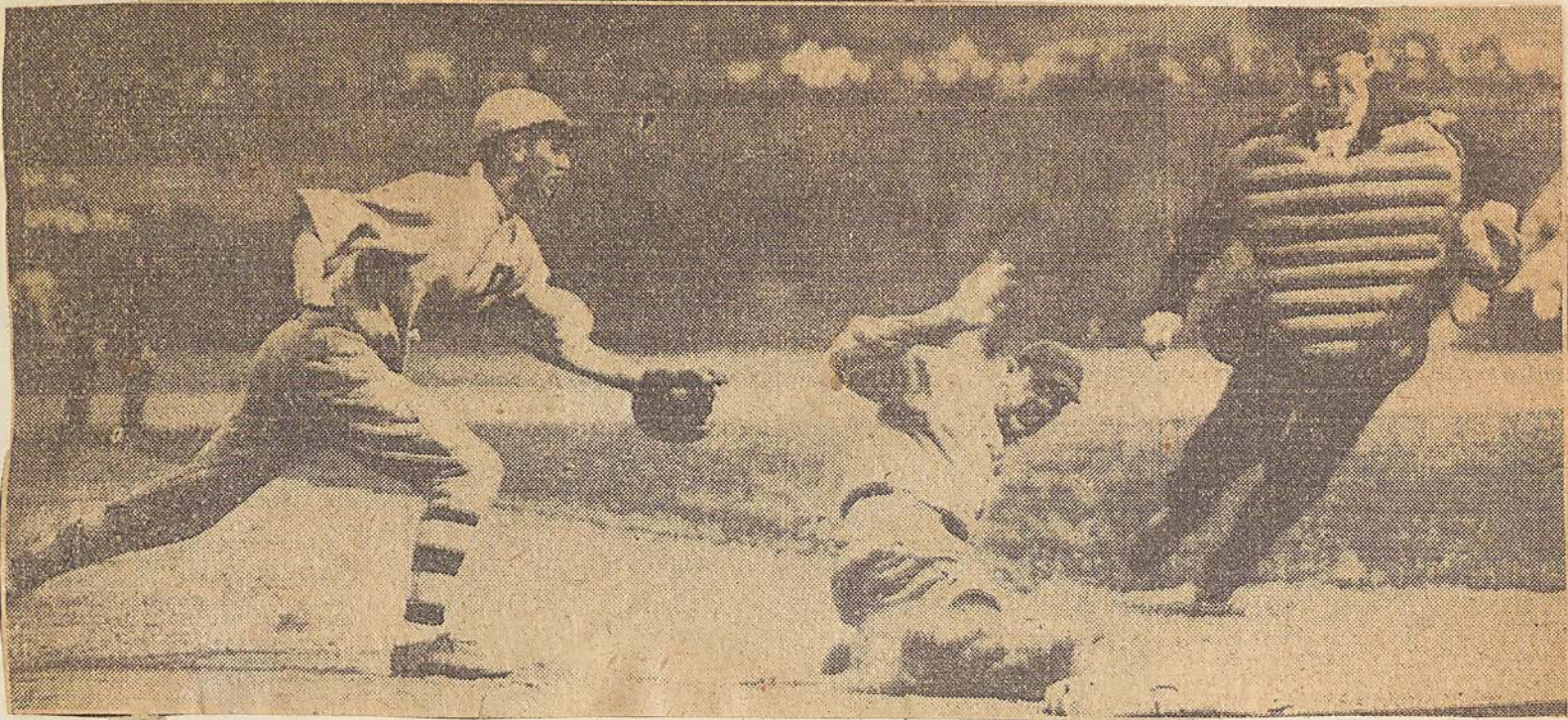
Harraghy's Work Outstanding.

The game marked the last appearance
of five of the Providence team under
the Black and White colors—Capt. Har-
raghy, Joe Duffy, who led the team last
year; Stanley Szydla, Harry Main and
Frank Cappalli. Harraghy's work was

outstanding throughout the game, and
Duffy played his usual good game at
first. Harraghy made three fine catches
of foul flies and kept the Crusader base-
runners close to the bags, in addition to
providing a timely hit.

Main went into right field to make a
running catch of Andy Fisher's fly in
the sixth for one of the best bits of play
in the game, but he and Cappalli were
guilty of three errors which led to scores.

All through his turn on the mound, Quinton, previously undefeated, deserved a better break than was destined to be his. He gave only three hits until the fifth inning, and probably would have done better in that frame but for two balls dropped by his teammates. One was an error and the other, a magnificently attempted catch by Chief Marsella, was turned into a triple, which scored one run, and two more followed on a home run by Tom Farrell, the next batter.

Score Five Runs in 5th.

Holy Cross scored in the first and third before putting over five tallies in the fifth. Danny Connors replaced Quinton after that disastrous inning and did not allow a man to reach second in the last three frames.

Providence came back in the sixth to score three runs, but Friederich, replacing Hebert, stopped the rally by striking out two men with the bases full. Again in the seventh the Friars filled the sacks with one out but could not score. Friederich struck out six batters in the sixth, seventh and eighth innings, and a double play stifled Providence hopes in the ninth.

Fisher drew a pass in the first inning. Dougherty bunted to Quinton and the Providence twirler tried to get Fisher, at second, but he slid into the bag ahead of the throw. Shevlin fled out to Duffy and Blondy Ryan scored Fisher with a single to centre field.

Cappalli Errs Twice

With one out in the third, Dougherty beat out a bouncer which Cappalli knocked down behind third base. Shevlin sent a grounder to Main, who attempted to force Dougherty at second. Cappalli dropped the throw as Dougherty slid far over the bag. Then the Providence shortfielder waited for Dougherty to come back to the bag, but the Crusader catcher started for third. Cappalli chased him down the path and then threw to Dion, but the throw was high and wide and Dougherty made the bag easily. Ryan walked, and Dougherty scored when Lawrence forced Ryan at second, Cappalli to Main.

Fisher opened the fifth with a single to right. Dougherty bunted again and he was safe for the second time when Main dropped Duffy's perfect throw. Shevlin forced Dougherty at second, Fisher taking third. Ryan lifted a foul fly to the edge of the stands and Harraghy made a fine catch, but was too far away to catch Shevlin, who started for second.

Lawrence drove a hard single to Duffy, scoring Fisher with the first run of the inning. Shanahan hit a long fly deep into right field. Marsella raced to the foot of the hill and touched the ball with his gloved hand while running at full speed, but he was off balance and the ball rolled out of his glove. He failed to complete what would have been the most spectacular play of the game only by the narrowest of margins, and Farrell easily made third, scoring Shevlin and Lawrence.

Farrell Hits Homer.

Quinton had struck out Farrell on the Crusader's two previous appearances at the plate, but he put one square across the rubber in this frame. Farrell met the pitch in the middle of his swing and it went over Szydla's head, past the flagpole and onto the football field, for one of the longest hits ever seen on the field. Marshall walked, but Quinton tightened and struck Hebert out for the second time.

Hebert went along in fine shape until after his team mates had put across their five runs. Outside of Szydla and Main in the second, Cappall was the only Dominican to reach first until the sixth.

With the Crusaders seven runs in the lead, Dion opened the sixth with a single to left. Hebert lost all semblance of control and walked Sellig and Marsella on eight pitched balls, filling the bases. Then he pitched four more balls to Duffy, getting only one strike on the Dominican first baseman, and sending Dion home.

Harraghy Comes Through

Szydla tried his hardest to get a hit, but with two strikes on him, he fled to Farrell, whose quick throw home held Sellig on third. Harraghy came through with a single to left that sent Sellig and Marsella across the plate. Main drew a pass, filling the bases again, and Hebert left the mound.

Friederich worked a count of one and two on Cappall and then the Providence shortstop was out on a called strike. John Curran batted for Quinton, but struck out when he missed a wide pitch, ending the inning.

to Lead 1931 Nine.—16
Letters Awarded.

Worcester, Mass., June 14.—Robert Dion, Sophomore third baseman on the Providence College nine, was elected captain of the 'Varsity team for next season, following a meeting of the letter men here today at the close of the Holy Cross game. Sixteen letters were awarded, including 'Varsity insignia to Student Manager Frank Marrah of Woonsocket.

The past week was a total disappointment to Providence College, Rhode Island's leading contender for college baseball honors, while for Brown, the other local team still in action, brilliant victories over Yale and Dartmouth were followed by a setback at the hands of New Hampshire.

Holy Cross's odd-game triumph over the Dominicans on Saturday practically assured the Crusaders of the mythical Eastern title. Boston College will have to take both of this week's games from the Purple to put the Worcester team out of top place, and the leaders should at least break even.

If Pete Herman performs as brilliantly as he did against Providence College, the Eagles may take one game, but the Crusaders still have Normie Simms to fall back on.

Friars End Season.

The Dominicans are through for the season, and Brown will ring the curtain down on college baseball for Rhode Island teams in the return game with New Hampshire at Aldrich Field this afternoon. Figuring on a percentage basis, Providence College is in fifth place, with Holy Cross the only team above it still playing.

Boston College was entirely too much for the Dominicans in the Commencement Day game, and one bad inning completely ruined their chances of establishing a claim for championship honors.

Brown's defeat in Durham cost the team several percentage points, but it did not dim the glory which will go to Coach Jack Kelleher for the victories over Yale and Dartmouth. The record of a three-game sweep against Harvard and Yale and an even break with Dartmouth is the best Brown has had against these opponents in years, and Kelleher will get a lot of credit for those victories.

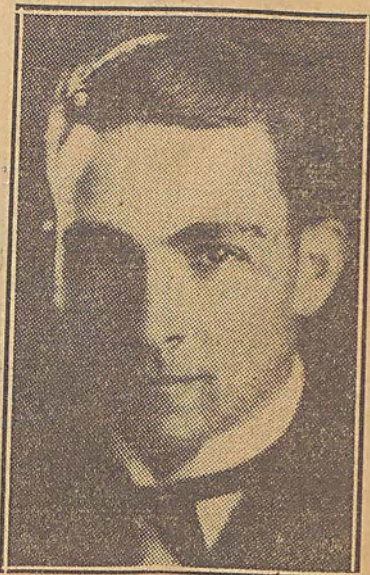
As the Providence youth balanced athletic ability and scholastic excellence at school, his start in the world likewise has been aided by recognition in two widely separated fields. Yesterday, he signed a contract with the Boston Red Sox, the American League baseball club of that city. A few hours later, he learned he had been awarded a Knights of Columbus national scholarship for four years of graduate study at the Catholic University of America.

Quirk won the scholarship in a competitive examination. He plans to major in psychology when he matriculates at the Washington institution next October. At the Providence College Commencement exercises he was graduated magna cum laude. As one of three student speakers on Commencement Day, he delivered an original oration on the "Menace of Bolshevism from an Economic Viewpoint."

Previously, at Classical high school, Quirk made a name for himself on the diamond and was graduated with honors. At the time he was an all-State choice as a high school baseball player. In his Senior year at Providence College he won a place on the Varsity team and during the season was credited with victories over Boston College, Quantico Marines and Holy Cross.

His ability as a pitcher attracted no-

75 COLLEGE DEANS DENOUNCE FOOTBALL BUT ARE POWERLESS TO ACT ON REFORM

Washington, April 12. — (UP)— College football, with its paid athletes, page one publicity and hysterical spectators, was contemplated somewhat sadly today by the 75 deans of men holding their annual conference here.

S. H. Goodnight, vigorous administrator of the University of Wisconsin, pictured football as a monster which lures students from their studies and leads to no end of campus evils. He called upon his associates to do something about it.

But a frank discussion of his paper revealed that the deans, fully realizing that their opinions have less weight in their respective institutions than the football coach, were not enthusiastic about undertaking the job.

"A homecoming football game disrupts academic work for an entire week-end in the college where it is played and often in the opposing institution as well," Goodnight complained. "Furthermore our schedules are growing and our seasons are prolonged by post-season championship games."

He charged, too, that athletes continue to be paid despite the efforts of college officials to wipe out the practice. Often, after an apparently self-supporting athlete leaves college, it is found that some

"sporty alumnus" has been paying his way, Goodnight said.

All this comes within the province of the deans," he continued. "We could help eliminate these evils by working together against them."

Secretary of Interior Willbur, president of Stanford University, agreed with Goodnight that athletics have lowered scholastic standards, but said he considered their benefits compensate in a measure for this loss. He added that undergraduates can better be trusted than alumni to keep athletics clean.

J. W. Armstrong, Northwestern University dean, discussed the problem of student migrations to out-of-town games by special train, collegiate flivver and automobile.

"Only a few poor students are left on the campus when one of these crusades to worship the god of football begins," he said, "and the rest come straggling back anywhere from a day to three days late."

Armstrong said Northwestern has partially solved the problem by encouraging students to make the trips on chaperoned special trains from which inebriated alumni are carefully excluded. When it is an overnight trip, he said, guards are placed in every coach to prevent the "pajama parties" which make such undesirable headlines.

The win was the fourteenth of the year for the Friars, and marked their initial victory over the Crusaders.

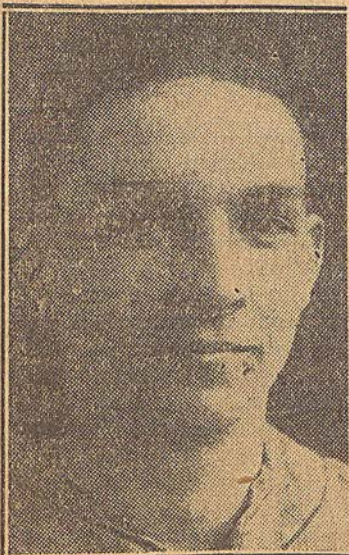
