DOMINICANS AT HOME FOR 12 CONTESTS

Most Attractive List in
Years Arranged by Far-
rell; 2 with Brown

One of the most attractive baseball schedules ever arranged for a Providence College nine, a list of 23 games with the leading teams of the East was announced this morning by Graduate Manager John E. Farrell of the Dominican College. The list is longer than the card of last year, and numbers four newcomers to Friar schedules in Hosen University, champions of Japan; Syracuse University, Mt. St. Mary's College of Emmitsburg, Md., and Union College of Schenectady, N. Y.

The traditional games with Brown, Holy Cross, Boston College, St. John's, C. C. N. Y., and Yale are found on the list, with a new arrangement in the Brown series in that the contests will not be played on successive Saturdays. The first game is listed for May 9, with the second encounter two weeks later on May 23. On the intervening Saturday date the Friars will meet Middlebury here, while Brown plays Harvard at Cambridge.

COMMENCEMENT GAMES

The commencement week program for the Smith Hill ball tossers is an exceptionally fine one, in that the Hosen University team of Japan, amateur champions of the Orient in the series concluded last fall, will visit here on June 8, the alumni date, while Boston College will be here graduation day, June 11. On Memorial Day the St. John's College aggregation of Brooklyn, old rivals of the locals, will pay their annual visit here.

The annual road trip which was made in May last spring has been shifted to the latter part of April, and is featured by the addition of a game with Manhattan. The tilt with the Jaspers will be played on April 22, and on the three following days the Flynnmen will meet St. John's in Brooklyn, Upsala in New Jersey and C. C. N. Y. in New York.

OPEN ON APRIL 11

Northeastern will again open the local's list, on Saturday, April 11, and after this tilt the Smith Hillers will compete on foreign diamonds until they hook up with Union here the first of May. Then follows a bright program of home contests, 13 in all, with some of the outstanding college nines of the east.

Only seven lettermen from last year's team will return for play when Coach Jack Flynn sounds the call for play late this month. Graduation and ineligibility have removed 10 of the performers of the 1930 outfit, which won 15 of the 20 games played, and which was runner up to Holy Cross for eastern collegiate honors.

Capt. Bob Dion, third baseman and junior classman from Nashua, heads the small roster of lettermen, which includes Ed Quinton, Danny Connors and Frank Buckley, pitchers, and George Sellig, Charles Marsella and John Krieger, outfielders. However, with this nucleus, and with a large number of capable players coming up from the junior 'varsity ranks, the Smith Hillers have high hopes of turning out another contender for titular honors.

STARTS ON MONDAY

Outdoor baseball practice at Providence College will open on Hendricken Field Monday afternoon, according to the plans announced at the Smith Hill college yesterday. Approximately 80 candidates are expected to report and in all probability Coach Jack Flynn, will be greeted by the largest opening-day turnout since he took over the baseball coaching at the Dominican college seven years ago.

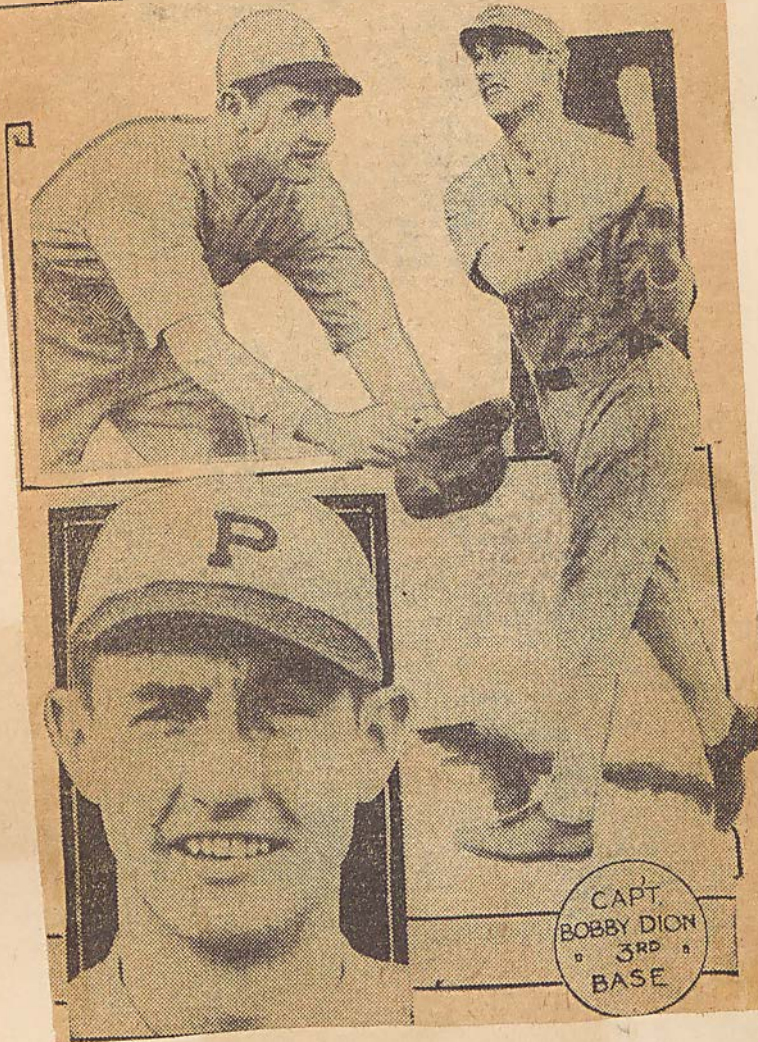
Daily drills will be held and a double drill may be conducted during the Easter recess which starts April 1. The latter program will be adopted only in case the squad is slow in getting into form. Work is progressing on a new athletic field on the property extending toward Admiral street, and it is hoped that a diamond will be laid out early next month.

Many of the players have taken advantage of the batting and throwing drills. The opening game with Northeastern University is listed for April 11. The candidates will have ample opportunity to prove their baseball ability.

Seven lettermen will be in the group which starts drilling Monday. They are headed by Capt. Bobby Dion, Junior class man from Nashua and star third baseman for two seasons. Dion is the only experienced infielder left from the 1930 starting array. Other insignia wearers are Dan Connors, Ed Quinton, and Frank Buckley, all pitchers, and Sellig, Krieger and Marsella, outfielders.

Although Coach Jack Flynn will have his worries when he starts combing the material for capable infielders to replace Duffy, Main and Capall, and catchers to handle the post vacated by Joe Harraghy and John Curran, he should not face any problem regarding the pitching staff. At least seven hurlers from last year's squad are available for action, and this group will undoubtedly be increased by men from the Junior Varsity and Freshman ranks.

65 Friar Baseball Players Report for First Practice

Coach Jack Flynn Sends Large Squad Through Long Drill.

A squad of 65 candidates answered the initial call for outdoor baseball practice at Providence College yesterday afternoon as Coach Jack Flynn started the pre-season work in preparation for an ambitious spring schedule. The turnout was one of the largest in the history of the local college, and as there are many additional aspirants planning to report within the next few days, the roster is expected to reach the 90 mark by the end of the week.

Seven lettermen, survivors of the crack team of last season, were numbered among those in togs yesterday. This group was headed by Capt. Bobby Dion and included three pitchers in Frank Buckley, Danny Connors and Ed Quinton, and three outfielders in George Sellig, John Krieger and Charles Marsella.

In spite of the fact that the squad was unusually large, Coach Flynn managed to stage a very complete and successful opening day drill. The first hour of the session was devoted to batting practice, after which two teams were selected for a regulation game.

After watching his proteges test their batting eyes, Flynn sent the veterans to the corners of the field for light practice in throwing and bunting, and turned his attention to the newcomers, two teams of which played a six-inning tilt.

Pitchers who tested their throwing arms included several youngsters who compiled enviable records in interscholastic competition. In the group were Haddon, former St. Raphael Academy captain, Moakler and Nadeau of La Salle, Brien, who was the mainstay of the hurling corps at Mt. St. Charles last spring, and Murphy, Troy, N. Y. youth.

Jimmy Welch, veteran catcher; Johnny Ward, member of the squad a year ago; Oliver Roberge, all-State receiver from Mt. St. Charles Academy; Mickey Foster, football captain, and George Tebbets, Nashua product, shared in the catching work, and all showed to advantage.

Twenty-six infielders, including Captain Dion, are seeking regular positions. Dion is the only survivor of last year's infield, and with three berths to be filled, some keen competition is anticipated. First base has three likely-looking candidates in Perrin, Frank Lally and Al Blanche.

Although Sellig, Krieger, and Marsella have hopes of claiming the outfield posts they are due for some rugged opposition from a large squad of flycatchers. In that list are: LeBlanc, all-scholastic performer from New York, Griffin, former St. Anselm's captain, Rennick, all-scholastic player from Hope high, McKeon of Warwick, Broderick of La Salle, Franny Dromgoole, and Simons.

65 FRIARS OUT FOR NINE

PROVIDENCE, March 23 (AP)—Sixty-five candidates, approximately one-tenth of the entire student enrollment at Providence College, answered the initial call for outdoor baseball practice today.

The large squad worked out under the direction of Coach Jack Flynn, who expects to have more than 90 men in uniform by the end of the week.

DOMINICANS SEEK KEYSTONE PAIR TO INFIELD, THIS YEAR

Development of a keystone combination to replace Main and Cappalli, stars of the 1930 aggregation, appears to be the main problem confronting Coach Jack Flynn at Providence College as he prepares the Friars for one of the most ambitious campaigns they have ever attempted on the diamond. Main and Cappalli served for three seasons as regulars, and handled the work around the second sack in fine style.

Although several promising performers have come up from the substitute ranks, Flynn is far from decided on an infield lineup, and from present indications will give the matter considerable thought until the season gets underway on April 11 with Northeastern University. Captain Dion appears to be a fixture at third base, while the battle for the first base position has narrowed to Frank Lally of East Providence, and Oe Perrin, lanky Albany lad.

Four performers are outstanding in their play at second base. This quartet is composed of Johnny Notte, substitute for the past two years, Shirty Demoe of Fall River, Ed Hammill, junior from Norwich, and Walter Corbett, clever Somerville product. All four are about equal at the present time, and although the position will not necessarily fall to their lot, it is likely that Coach Flynn will finally turn the assignment over to one of them.

Lou Bekel and Eddie Janas, former stars of the scholastic ranks of this State, and a pair of clever infielders are making strong bids for the shortfield work, but so far this spring have failed to flash the form which marked their play last year. Both should have benefited by the experience of a season under Flynn, and although they have not as yet hit their stride, they can be counted upon to head the fight for the post.

Chick Bleiler, who served at shortstop against Georgetown two years ago, and turned in a fine game, is in the field for the position this spring. Bleiler is a much improved player, especially at the bat, and it would not be at all surprising to see him fit into the inner quartet.

Dominic Welch, a lanky Junior classman from Taunton, and Eddie Reilly of Bridgeport, appear as the other outstanding aspirants for the berth that Frank Cappalli filled last year. Welch sought the third base post last spring, only to lose out to Dion, but his experience in the pre-seasons workouts have aided him in this campaign. Reilly, substitute on the basketball team during the past winter, shapes up well at bat, and if able to improve his fielding will make the tussle for the shortstop work even more exciting.

The battle between Lally and Perrin at first is an even one. The East Providence lad has the experience of three seasons behind him, and is hitting at a lively clip, but has failed to equal this work in the field. Perrin, on the other hand, is a classy fielder, and as a result may edge out Lally for the work should Flynn be forced to develop a defensive team. In view of the fact that three of the infield will be newcomers.

FRIARS WILL HAVE HUSKY BATTERY

Charlie Burdge and Oliver Roberge Weigh More Than 400 Pounds Together.

The Providence College baseball squad for the coming season will boast a husky battery combination in Charlie Burdge, pitcher from Warren, and Oliver Roberge, catcher from Bristol, Conn. The combined weight of these two giants is over 400 pounds.

Burdge, one of the finest built youngsters ever to don athletic regalia at the Smith Hill college, stands 6 feet 3 in his stockings, and weighs 212 pounds. He is a product of Warren high where he starred in basketball and baseball, serving as both a catcher and a pitcher in the latter sport. He was a substitute on the Friar football team last fall as a tackle.

Went to Mt. St. Charles

Roberge, who hails from Connecticut, but is an adopted son of this State as the result of his work at Mt. St. Charles Academy in Woonsocket where he won all State honors in all sports, is 6 feet 2, and weighs 191 pounds. Roberge was selected for all scholastic honors as an end in football, centre in basketball, and catcher in baseball. With the Dominicans he won distinction as a wingman on the eleven last fall, and was a guard on the crack Freshman basketball aggregation.

Both Burdge and Roberge promise to be outstanding performers for the Friars in the next few years. At present Coach Jack Flynn is carefully working on their baseball abilities, and is confident that they have the making of an exceptionally brilliant battery. The Warren giant has a good curve, and a fine fast ball, and with training will be a valuable asset to the Dominican pitching staff.

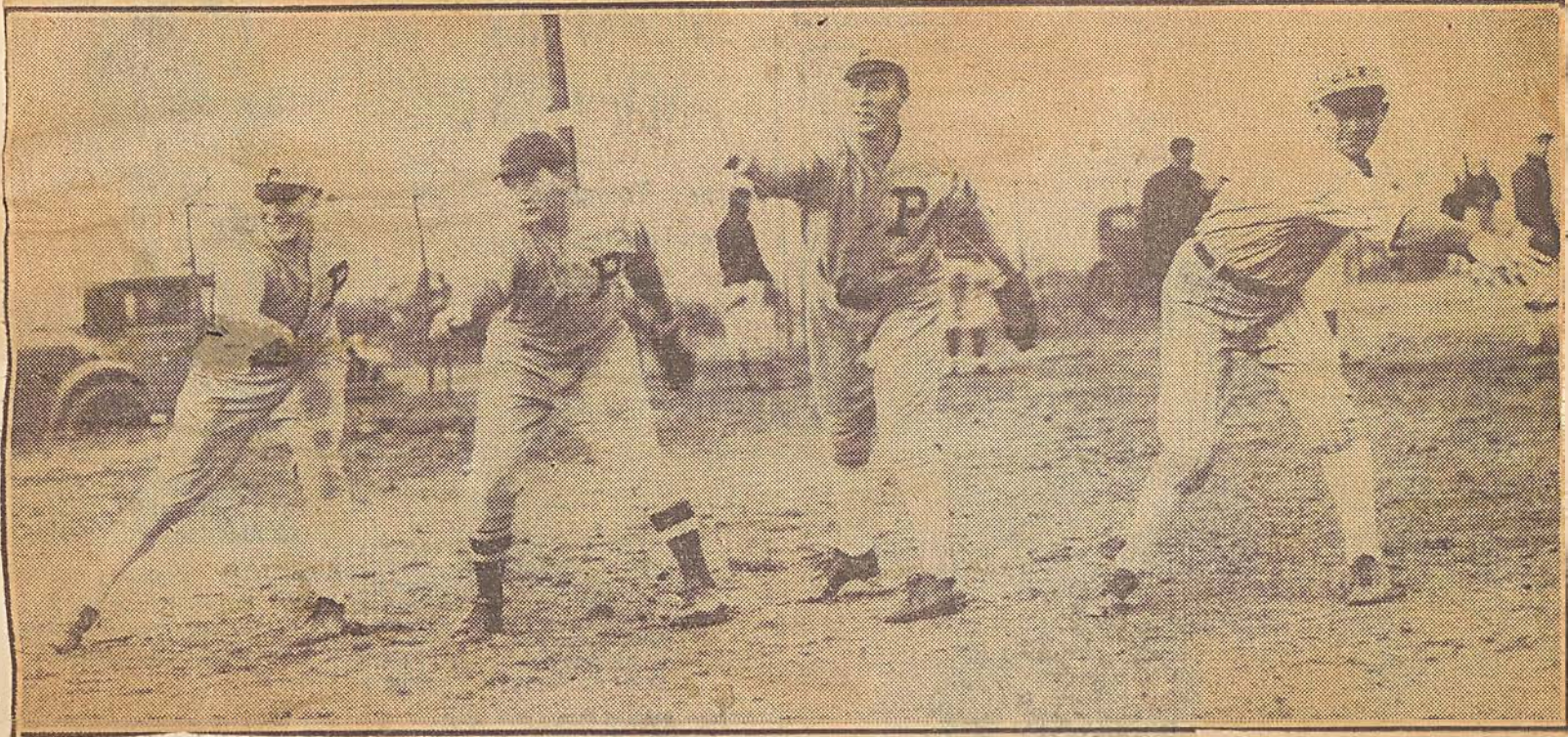
In Roberge the Friar mentor has a successor to the long train of brilliant catchers who have performed for the Smith Hillers since they climbed into baseball prominence nine years ago. The former Woonsocket star is the biggest catcher that Flynn has ever had under his wing.

Two Other Catchers

At present Roberge is giving Jimmie Welch and George Tebbetts, the former a veteran receiver, and the latter a brilliant backstop from New Hampshire, a hard run for the catching work. Although Tebbetts lacks the height of Roberge, he equals his ability in running, throwing and receiving, and rounds out the greatest catching array that Jack Flynn has ever had under his wing at the local college.

FRIARS PREPARING FOR OPENING GAME

**Coach Flynn Will Concentrate
on Infield Where He Faces
Chief Problem.**

With but five days in which to complete its pre-season preparations, the Providence College baseball squad faces a week of strenuous drilling as Coach Jack Flynn endeavors to decide on the replacements for the men lost from last year's aggregation. The season opener is listed for this Saturday, with Northeastern University of Boston providing the opposition on Hendricks Field.

Starting today Flynn will devote the bulk of his time to the infield, where he faces a big problem in picking men for first, second, and short. So far none of the candidates has proved outstanding, and as a result the competition is even for every position. Frank Lally, Oc Perrin, a slim Albany youngster, and Frank Motta, former Classical performer, will fight it out for first base, but the list of aspirants for the other two vacancies is not so limited.

Notte Disappointing So Far

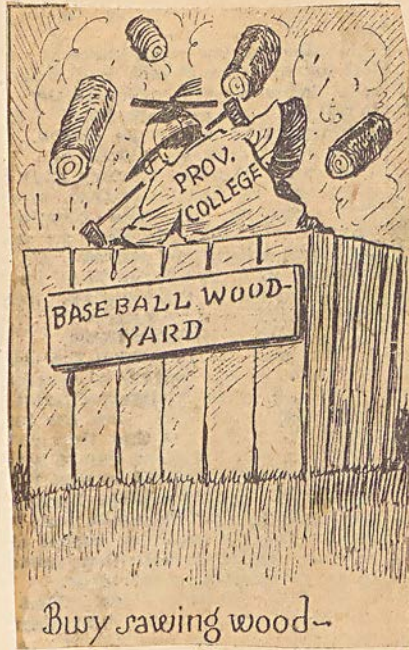
Much was expected of Johnny Notte, who turned in some fine work towards the close of the 1930 campaign as an understudy to Harry Main at second base, but as yet he has failed to flash that form this year. Other aspirants for this work include Demoe of Fall River, and Ed Hammill of Norwich, both of whom subbed a year ago, and Walter Corbett, who captained Somerville high two years back.

If the keystone position is a dubious one, the shortstop assignment is doubly so, as no one has been found yet who appears capable of equalling the work of Frank Cappalli, veteran of three campaigns who was graduated last June. Of the four candidates for the post, Ed Reilly and Welch appear to be outstanding. As was the case with Notte, much was expected of Lou Bekel and Eddie Janas, stars of the junior Varsity aggregation a year ago, but they have proved a disappointment in the past week of drilling, although it is possible that they will come to the fore with the advent of warmer weather.

Dion Remains at Third

Captain Dion will probably remain at third base, in spite of the fact that he is also a capable shortstop and might be used to advantage at that position. Bleiler, quarterback on the eleven, and substitute infielder for two seasons, has been shaping up well at third and may be moved to short or second in an effort to strengthen the infield.

Perhaps the brightest outlook for the Friars is in their pitching staff which promises to be the equal of the fine corps of fingers who wore Black and White regalia last spring. Eddie Quinton, ace of the 1930 staff, appears to be in the best condition of the slabsters, and will be the logical candidate to draw the mound work in the opening game on Saturday, with Jimmie Welch on the receiving end.



DOMINICANS WILL TAKE ON HUSKIES

Flynn Doubtful About Start- ing Infield; Quinton to Pitch

With Eddie Quinton, ace of the hurling staff on the mound, the Providence College baseball team will pry the lid off its season on Hendricken field tomorrow afternoon in what promises to be a lively game. The Friars are slated to swing into action against Northeastern University of Boston, and one of the largest crowds ever to witness an opening tilt at the Smith Hill college is expected to be in attendance.

Four newcomers will be included in the Dominican lineup, as Coach Jack Flynn has had to do considerable rebuilding of the nine which battled Holy Cross for the eastern title last spring. The latest additions to the Friar forces will be Perrin at first base, either Notte or Corbett at second, Janas or Bekel at short, and Ed Koslowski in centrefield.

NEW PLAYERS ON INFIELD

Perrin appears to have a slight edge over Lally at first in fielding, and as a result will get the call at the initial hassock. The Albany youngster shapes up as a clever all-round performer, and is expected to prove a worthy successor to Joe Duffy, last year's star. Capt. Dion, veteran of two campaigns, will be at his regular station at third.

Second and short are still doubtful, with Janas and Bekel the leading performers for the short field, and Notte and Corbett heading the fight for second. The combination of Janas and Notte looms as the strongest at the present time, and will probably get the call at starting time.

Ed Koslowski, basketball star, and one of the huskiest players on the squad, will get the centrefield berth to be flanked by Sellig and Marsella, veteran fly chasers from last year's varsity team. Koslowski, who scales over 190 pounds, is a fine fielder and a capable hitter, and will draw the cleanup berth in the batting array.

FRIARS BEAT HUSKIES

Providence College Wins From Northeastern, 4-1

Quinton in Rare Form, Holds
Huskies to Two Hits and
Strikes Out Twelve.

With Eddie Quinton, ace of last year's Providence College team, pitching airtight ball, the Friars opened their season on Hendriken Field yesterday afternoon by downing Northeastern University 4 to 1 in a well played contest. Quinton was in good form, allowing but two hits and striking out 12 of the Boston batsmen.

The game was one of the closest opening tilts the Friars have ever played, with the Huskies furnishing plenty of opposition in the person of Ed Gallagher, a right hander who turned in a fine exhibition in holding the Friars to four hits. The defensive play of the visitors was outstanding with Groz, catcher, and Murray, left fielder, turning in good catches to nip Providence rallies.

A lead, piled up in the first two innings, enabled the Friars to win and it was well that they took advantage of the opportunities presented during these rallies, as Gallagher held them well in check throughout the remainder of the game. An infield which turned in two double plays aided the Husky hurler in his efforts to hold the Providence run total to a minimum.

Eddie Janas, Coach Jack Flynn's choice at shortstop, and Johnny Notte, second base, teamed well turning in some fast fielding. Janas was guilty of the sole error made by the Dominicans, booting Tiffany's slow roller in the first inning when he tried to make a running pickup, but he proved equal to the work for the remainder of the tilt, making several fine pegs to first for outs.

Newcomers Good

The other two Friar newcomers, Perrin at first, and Koslowski in centre-field, turned in creditable performances. Although they did not breaek into the hit column, their fielding was good with Perrin handling the work around first base in faultless manner.

But the glory was all Quinton's, as the rugged East Side lad was never in better form. Aside from Nutter's single to right field in the first inning, and Tiffany's clout in the seventh which the wind carried over Sellig's head for a homer, only two balls were hit beyond the infield. He allowed but one walk, and struck out 12, with the result that no one, aside from Tiffany, got beyond second base.

Fails to Catch Runner

After a Northeastern threat in the first inning had been smothered, the Friars tallied their first runs of the season without making a safe hit. Capt. Bobby Dion opened the frame by reaching first safely when Nutter made a wild peg to Cook on his roller along the third base line. Dion stole second and moved along to third as Sellig reached first on Carter's boot of his grounder at short. Marsella hoisted a high foul fly which Cook gathered in and a moment later Sellig stole second to be in scoring position as Perrin came to bat.

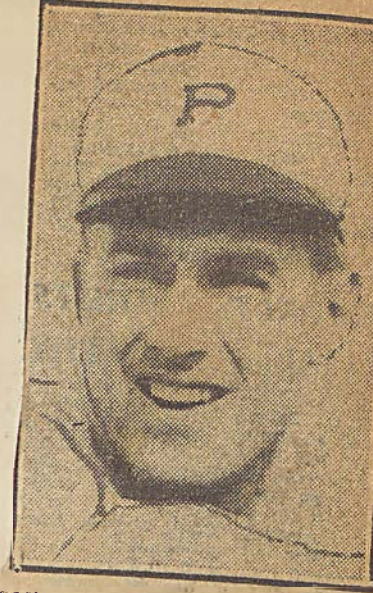
Perrin's Drive Hard

Perrin smashed a hard drive to short field and Carter pegged high to first, Cook making a fine catch, but too late for the out. Dion scored on the play and Sellig followed him home from second when the Northeastern first sacker failed to watch his base runners after making his stop. His belated peg to the plate was low and allowed Perrin to race to second. Welch grounded out to short to end the rally.

In the second inning two more runs, and incidentally the final ones to be scored by the Friars, were added. Johnny Notte drew a walk and on a hit-and-run play dashed around to home when Janes drove McKee into deep right field on his double. The Northeastern fielder made a great bid for a running catch and a fine throw-in to hold Janas to a two-bagger. Eddie Quinton continued the rally by smashing a hard drive off Tiffany's shins at second to score Janas, but a fast double play a few minutes later on Dion's boulder squelched the attack.

Aside from Notte's scratch hit to second in the third inning the Friars went hitless and runless for the remainder of the game, although men were left stranded on bases in the fourth, fifth and seventh innings. A fine opportunity for a rally in the fourth canto, after Gallagher had issued successive passes to Quinton and Dion, was frustrated by brilliant fielding by the Huskies. Nutter made a fine catch of Sellig's riser close to the third base stands. Groz raced to the backstop to gather in Marsella's foul twister, and Petrone took Koslowski's hoister off first for the third out.

Twirls Good Ball



Eddie Quinton Started the Friars Off Right Yesterday by Holding Northeastern to Two Hits and Struck Out 12 as Providence College Defeated the Huskies, 4 to 1, on Hendricken Field.

After being held completely in check from the first inning the visitors blasted another hit and in this case a run off Quinton in the seventh inning to avoid a shutout. Tiffany, second baseman, and a New Bedford boy, opened the frame by smashing a terrific clout high into left field which a stiff wind swept far over Sellig's head to the fence. The runner crossed the plate before the ball was returned to the infield. The rally went no further, however, as Quinton steadied.

Yale, With Four Victories, Tops Eastern Nines

Harvard, New York U. Also Flash Early Power; Holy Cross Disappoints

Yale's impressive start and the unexpectedly disastrous beginning of the Holy Cross campaign gave college baseball observers food for thought as university nines in the East settled down to their schedules.

Yale, which won fourteen games out of twenty-six in a lack-lustre 1930 showing, is leading the procession at this stage of the season with four triumphs in as many starts, two of them over Columbia and Dartmouth in the Eastern Intercollegiate League competition.

Conversely, the Crusaders, who have been synonymous with success in college baseball for years, have scored but one run in eighteen innings while losing to a freshman pitcher at Seton Hall and making one scratch hit off Bob McNamara, New York University's surprising sophomore.

N. Y. U., Harvard Show Power

New York University flashed early season power in vanquishing Columbia and Holy Cross, and Harvard's bats hammered out one-sided triumphs over two New England rivals, Bowdoin and Northeastern. The Crimson and Violet rank with Yale as the only unbeaten nines among those which have played more than one game.

Penn started promisingly by winning three games in four played. The Quakers, with five games on their early season schedule canceled because of rain, have lost only to North Carolina, 2 to 0, but have defeated Wake Forest, Navy and Cornell, the last in a league game. All of their three victories were by large margins.

C. C. N. Y. has also won three out of four, but the opposition was none too rigorous. Of the other metropolitan colleges, Columbia seems to have made the best start, winning three games in five. The Lions were defeated by N. Y. U. and by Yale, in eleven innings. Fordham, after a fine start, was trounced by both Villanova and Navy. St. John's has won two and lost one. Manhattan will open its schedule tomorrow with Lehigh.

Masters Fattens Record

Six men are tied for pitching honors with two victories and no defeats. Walter Masters, Penn's ace for the last two years, started auspiciously by defeating Wake Forest and Cornell to bring his record up to nineteen victories in the twenty games he has worked. Masters ran up a string of sixteen straight before his record was shattered last year. He won one more after that to bring his standing up to seventeen victories in eighteen games for two years.

Tied with Masters are Bill Newton and Ned Wheeler, both of Yale; Buddy Nau, of C. C. N. Y.; Bill McHale, of Harvard, and Melrose, of Temple. Several of the outstanding pitchers of last year have already met defeat, notably Schultz, of Navy, who won seven games and lost none in 1930. He was defeated in his only start by Lehigh. Another is Captain Norman Sims, of Holy Cross, who won six and lost one last year, that to Boston College, in the season's final encounter. Sims was beaten by N. Y. U.

FRIARS TRAMPLE LOWELL 12 TO 1

**Connors Holds Losers to Five
Hits.—Marsella Gets
Home Run.**

(Special to the Providence Journal)
Lowell, Mass., April 18.—With Danny Connors pitching air-tight ball, and with his teammates showing improved ability in hitting, the Providence College nine scored a 12 to 1 victory over Lowell Textile here this afternoon. The game was closely contested for four innings with honors about even between Allard of Lowell and Connors of the Friars, before the visitors climbed into a five-run lead to settle the issue.

Chief Marsella turned in the longest hit of the game when he gave the Friars a sizable advantage by hoisting a home run clout over the Textile building. Connors and Dion were on base when the Burrillville youngster poled his drive, which bounded on the roof of the three-story building fringing left field.

In addition to their improved work at bat, the Friars turned in some classy work in the field with Eddie Janas, new shortstop, featuring with his all round play. Janas handled five difficult chances without a slip, and twice nipped Lowell rallies with his rifle pegs to first base for outs. Griffin, who relieved Koslowski in centrefield in the final two frames, turned in the fielding gem of the clash when he raced to the fence to pull down Hobbs's bid for a homer.

Five Hits Off Connors

Connors was never in serious trouble, allowing but five scattered hits and striking out seven of the Weavers. The lone run chalked up resulted on an error by Tebbetts, who overthrew third trying to catch Shapiro off that base.

After battling on even terms for four innings, the Rhode Islanders broke into the lead with five runs in the fifth frame. Tebbetts walked and went to second when Allard pegged low trying to get him off first base. Notte skied to deep short, but Janas hit hard to third. Hobbs, after making a fine stop, pegged wildly over first, allowing Tebbetts to score and Janas to continue to second.

Connors crashed a hit through short, sending Janas to third. Dion crossed up all the bases. Sellig grounded out. Koska to Mamber. Janas scoring. Then came Marsella's clout, which cleared the sacks and gave the Flynnmen a comfortable lead.

Four More in Sixth.

Four more runs were added in the sixth. Allard issued passes to Notte and Janas. Connors was thrown out at first on his grounder along third as both runners advanced. Dion poked a single to right to score Notte, but Janas was held up at third by a fast relay to the plate. Sellig scored Janas with a single to centre, and moved to second while Dion raced to third as Koskoska pegged low to first on the throw-in. Koslowski scored both runners with a long drive into left field which crashed against the building and went for two bases.

In the eighth Connors started another rally by singling sharply to centre. Dion popped to Turcotte, and Sellig drew a free ticket to first. Marsella came through with a sharp hit to left to fill the bases, Connors being held at third. Allard uncorked a wild heave to allow Connors to clear the platter for the 10th run, and then Perrin contributed a line drive to left to enable Sellig and Marsella to score the final runs.

The infield quartet of Perrin at first, Notte at second, Janas at short, and Captain Bob Dion at third, which has played the two games of the past week, has Walter Corbett as an addition on the journey starting tonight. Corbett is a smart fielder, and may be used for his defensive ability. The outfield of Sellig in left, Koslowski in centre, and Marsella in right, was further bolstered by the presence of Tom Griffin, who is equally at home in either field, and is a good sticker.

The squad of players, together with Coach Flynn and student manager J. Leonard Sweeney, will leave here by boat tonight for New York. Tomorrow afternoon the trip will be opened with the Manhattan game, which shapes up as a stiff assignment for the Smith Hillers. Eddie Quinton is slated to draw the mound work for this tilt, with Jim Welch behind the plate.

Providence was unable to cope with Corrigan through the early stages of the game, one chance fading in the fourth when Sellig and Marsella reached base safely on successive errors, and moved along on a passed ball, but the succeeding batters failed to provide the needed scoring punch.

Tomorrow the Friars face St. John's College in Brooklyn, and Coach Jack Flynn has named Danny Connors, one of his star right-handers, for the pitching assignment.

FRIARS WIN 3 TO 1

AL BLANCHE TWIRLS FRIARS TO VICTORY

Allows but Four Hits and
Strikes Out 13 to Beat
City College, 3-1.

(Special to the Providence Journal.)
New York, April 25.—With Al Blanche, former Somerville star, making his initial college start, the Providence College nine registered its fourth victory in five games by defeating the City College aggregation 3-1 at Lewisohn stadium here this afternoon.

Blanche pitched brilliantly, allowing but four scattered hits, and striking out 13 of the locals.

The Friars were forced to wheel into action with the services of Capt. Bobby Dion, third baseman, who sustained an ankle sprain in the Upsala game on Friday which prevented his even donning a uniform today. Johnny Notte, who has alternated with Corbett at second base this season, took over the hot corner and turned in a fine performance.

Blanche proved his ability to handle Varsity assignments by his convincing box work this afternoon. The tall Somerville right hander held the locals completely in check all the way, and would have scored a shutout had he not faltered in the seventh to walk Oglio, who scored on Schwartz's long double for the lone pointer chalked up by the City Collegians. Blanche was at his best during the second, third and fourth innings, striking out eight of the batters to face him during that period.

Dion on Sidelines

With Captain Dion on the sidelines, Notte led off for the Friars in the first inning with a clean single along the right field foul line, and on a hit and run play moved to second as Marsella was tossed out at first on a brilliant infield play by Kaufman, local's short stop. Nau, Lavender hurler, tried to catch Notte off second, and his throw to that station was wild, allowing the Friar infielder to scamper to third from where he tallied at the home station on a passed ball a moment later for the initial Providence marker.

The Dominicans put on a rally in the sixth which proved to be their winning margin. Sellig opened the frame with a double over the centre field wall. Marsella hit along third base end and was safe at first when Kaplowitz made a play for Sellig off second which failed to nip the runner. Koslowski filled the sacks with a pretty bunt along third which caught the local infield napping. Perrin hit to deep short and reached first while Koslowski was being forced at second. Sellig counted at the home station on the play.

Goldman's Fine Stop

Tebbets, peppy catcher who served as acting captain for the day, lined along first, Goldman making a fine stop to toss to second to force Perrin as Marsella scored the third Providence run. Kaplowitz made a brilliant gloved hand stop of Corbett's line drive to end the rally.

In the seventh, with two out, the locals pushed across their lone score when Oglio, strolled and dashed all the way home when Schwartz rode one of Blanche's fast shoots to deep centre. Aside from this rally only two of the City College performers got beyond second base, and both were left stranded, with Koslowski averting trouble by a sparkling running catch in the first attack, and Blanche saving his own lead by striking out three successive batters to halt the other lavender advance.

Rise of Tiger Nine Features Games in East

Princeton Wins 3 Contests, Ties 1; Tufts, Unbeaten in 4 Starts, Tops Standing

Four of the previously undefeated Eastern teams were relegated to the ranks of the defeated during last week's college baseball activity. Army, Providence, Manhattan and Union all tasted defeat for the first time. Manhattan, after running up three straight victories, dropped a 3 to 1 decision to Fordham last Saturday in their first intracity encounter; Providence, which had won four straight, was defeated by Manhattan as act Corrigan struck out fourteen batters; Army was defeated by Union after winning three consecutive games, and Union was defeated by Rochester after conquering Army and Long Island U.

Only Tufts and Williams of the larger colleges in the East have won more than one game and lost none. The Jumbos bid fair to repeat their performance of last year when they ran their string up to six straight before losing. They have won four consecutive games, defeating Lowell Textile, Boston University, Northeastern and Bates, all by comfortable margins. Williams, which opened its schedule last week, has played two games and won both, conquering R. P. I. and Clark on Filley's pitching.

One of the features last week was the rise of Princeton. The Tigers, after winning one game in their first seven, won three straight, defeating Virginia twice and N. Y. U. and then playing a ten-inning 10 to 10 tie in a league game with Columbia, one of the more consistent teams in this section of the country.

Among the pitchers, Coughlin, of Army, brought his record up to four straight victories to tie William McHale, of Harvard, for the lead. McHale did not play last week. Walter Masters, Penn's star, turned back Yale to bring his record up to three straight triumphs this season and twenty in twenty-one games during the last three years.

Score in Six of Eight Innings

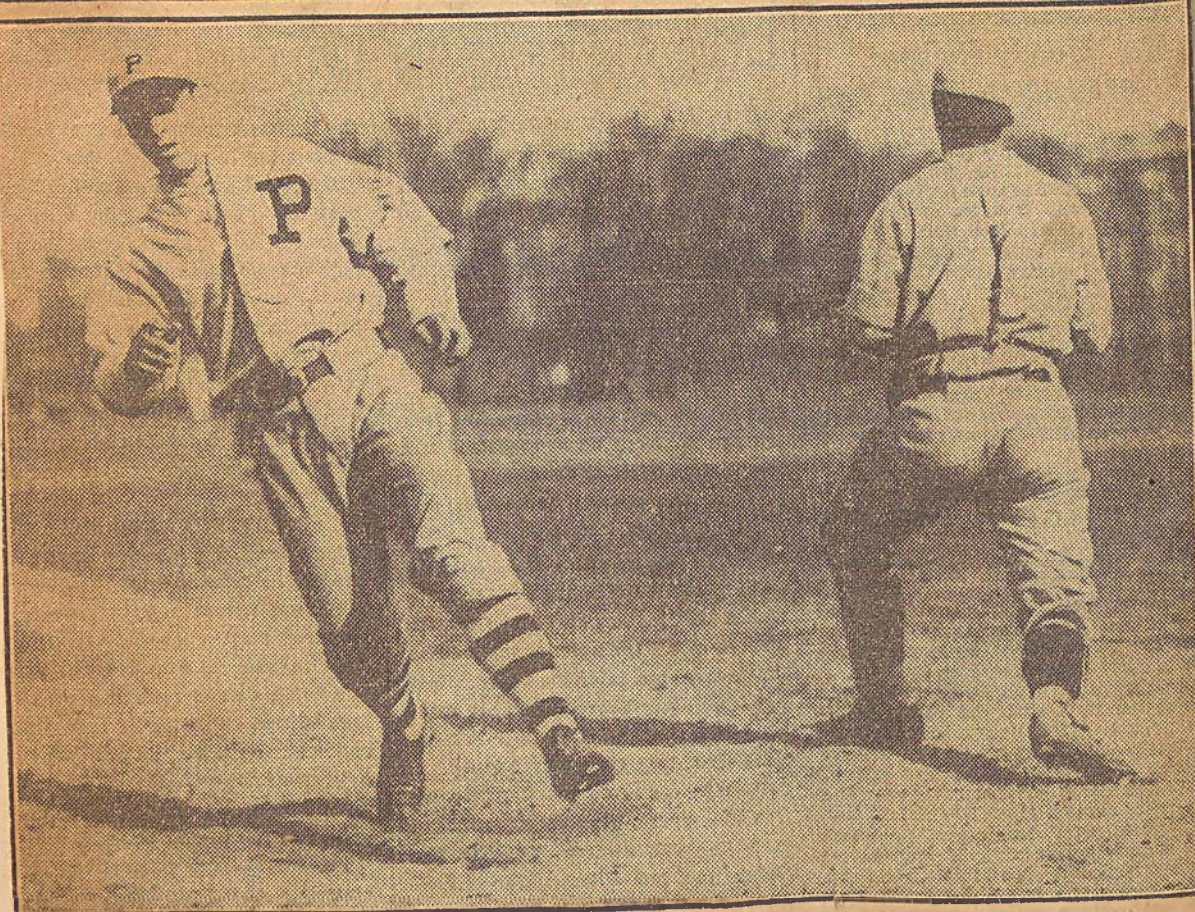

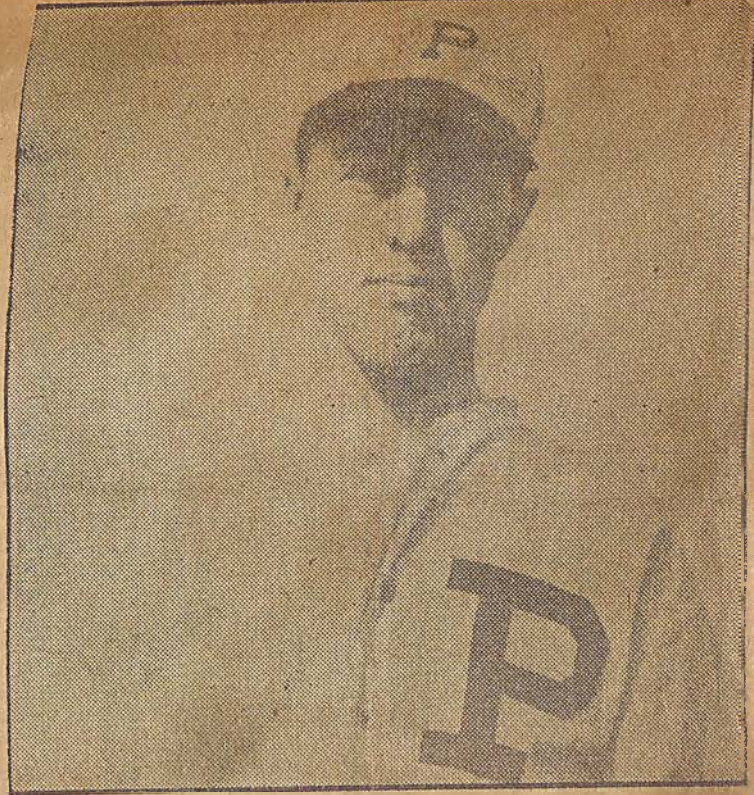
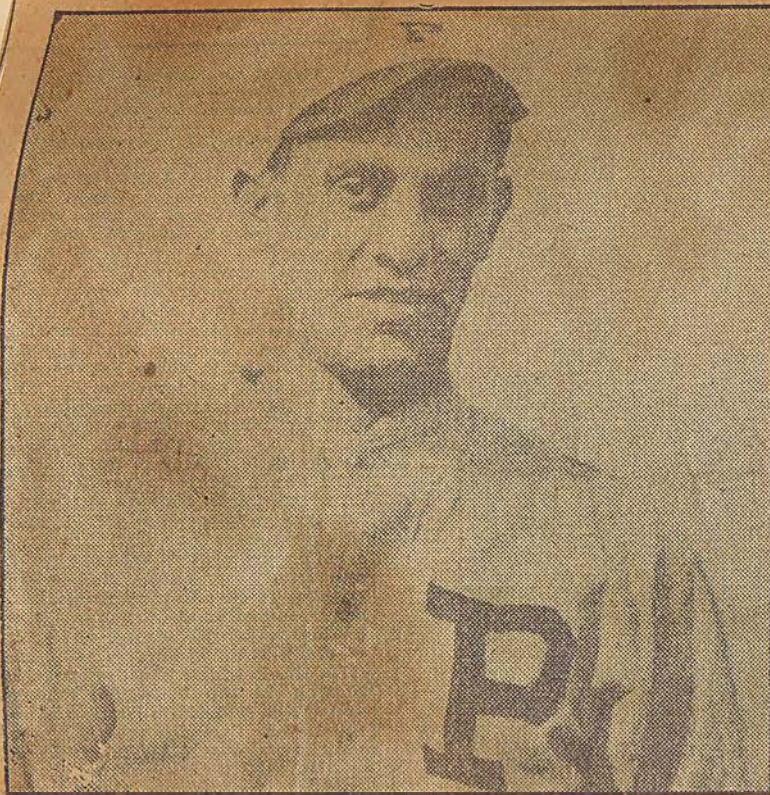

Springfield helps Friars make 6th win-

FRIARS TOP SPRINGFIELD

Roberge's Hit Helps Friars Defeat Springfield, 2-1

Backstop for Dominicans, in
Debut, Settles Pitching

A timely single by Oliver Roberge, who was making his debut as a catcher for the Providence College nine, with runners on second and third, enabled the Friars to come from behind on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon to defeat Springfield College team, 2-1. The victory is the second in as many days for the Smith Hillers, and their sixth triumph of the season.

Trailing by a single run from the first inning, the locals staged their successful rally in the eighth, with Roberge turning in the hero performance in his first college tilt. His hard smash to centre field scored Griffin with the tying run and Perrin with the winning marker. The former reached first on a single, while Perrin was safe on a fielder's choice, both players advancing on Becker's error at second, the only miscue of the game.

The tilt produced a pitching duel with Danny Connors, Medford Sophomore of the Friars, besting Johnson, rangy ace of the Springfield mound staff. Both twirlers were at their best, holding the hits to a minimum and turning in some fine work in the pinches. Connors was master of the situation after getting away to a rocky start in the opening stanza.

Fielding is Feature

Sparkling fielding featured the play of both teams in spite of the cold weather which made accurate fielding difficult. Janas, at short for the Dominicans, and Corbett on the other side of second base, turned in some clever work afield, handling seven difficult chances without an error. Sellig turned in a fine running catch in left field, while Yerrington, Springfield right fielder, just missed a circus catch of Corbett's double in the sixth, the blow being the only extra base hit of the game.

Springfield jumped into the lead at the start when Connors was slow in getting range of the plate. Proctor opened with a single to left and was moved to second on Becker's sacrifice bunt. Yerrington hit to deep short, and although Janas made a fine stop, no play could be made for an out. On the latter hit Proctor moved to third and crossed the plate when Myers drove Griffin to deep centre for his riser.

Other than this rally Connors held the visitors completely in check, turning them back in order in five of the remaining eight innings. In the eighth, with two out, two singles were collected off his delivery, but the attack was stopped when Dion tossed Becker out at first.

The Friars were unable to do much with the slants of Johnson until the fourth inning when Griffin opened with a single and Roberge smashed a hit off Becker's shins. Corbett skied to left and Janas grounded out to end the rally. Two runners were left stranded in the sixth when Perrin singled to deep short and Corbett doubled to right field, only to have Johnson toss Janas out at first for the final out of the inning.

Griffin Opens Rally

Griffin, who is playing a fine game in centre field for the locals, collected his second safe hit of the game to open the winning rally in the eighth. Perrin dropped a bunt along third which Johnson fielded perfectly, only to have his hard peg to second shoot through Becker's glove, the ball breaking the thumb strap in its passage. Griffin raced to third on the miscue, and when Johnson took a windup to pitch to Roberge, Perrin dashed to second to be in scoring position.

Roberge, who led the Smith Hillers in hitting with three safe blows, and who turned in a splendid game in catching Connors, produced the scoring punch when he laced one of Johnson's slants to centre field to bring the two runners to the home station. 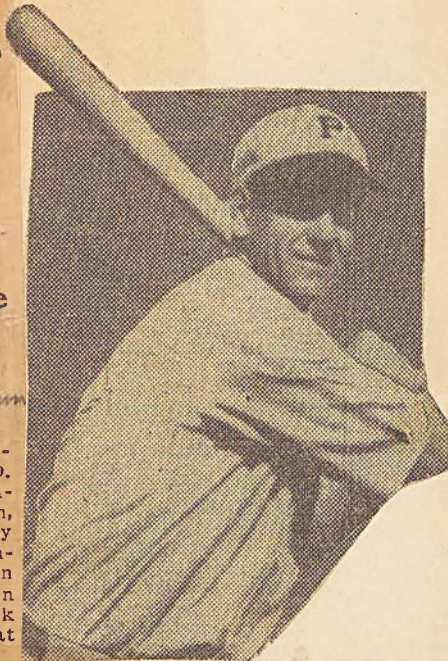

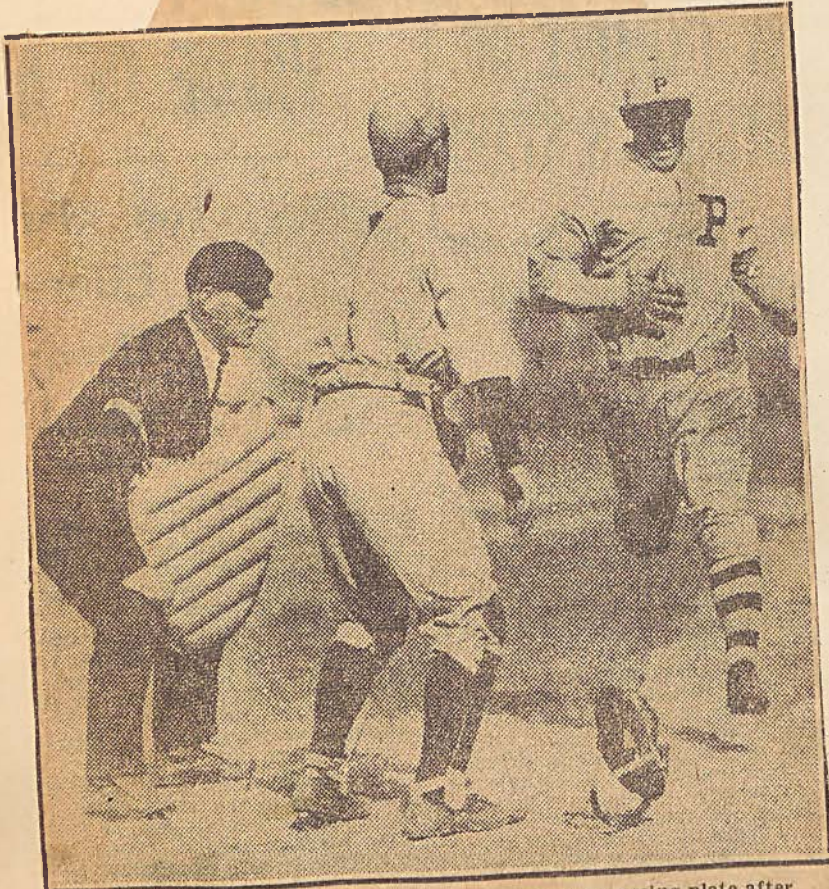

Rather Slow Game

It remained for Marsella to liven up what was otherwise a slow game. The Harrisville home run performer came through with flying colors in the seventh, however, for the one thrill of the tilt, driving one of Garner's slants to the left field fence.

Garner was pitching for the visitors and turned in a creditable performance. FRIARS WIN IN 10TH 5-4

Single With Bases Filled Beats Mt. St. Mary's College

Pinch Hitter Griffin Sends in
Perrin.—Koslowski Hits
Homer in Sixth.

A single off the bat of Tom Griffin, pinch hitter, with the bases loaded in the 10th inning, enabled the Providence College nine to score a 5 to 4 triumph over Mt. St. Mary's College of Maryland at Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. It was the eighth win of the season for the Friars, and the second defeat in 10 starts for the Southerners.

With the score tied, and the bases crowded in the last of the 10th, Griffin, who has been performing regularly in centrefield, but was forced to the sidelines on Tuesday with a sprained ankle, went to bat as a pinch-hitter for Eddie Janas, Friar shortstop. Griffin caught hold of the first ball pitched and shot a bulletlike drive along the first base line, the ball hitting the bag and bounding high in the air for a hit as Perrin raced home with the winning marker.

Al Blanche, conqueror of C. C. N. Y., made his initial home appearance for the Dominicans a memorable one by turning back the invaders. Blanche was nicked for seven hits, including two triples and a double, but was strong in the pinches, striking out seven and issuing but two bases on balls.

Valibus Looks Good

Valibus, on the rubber for the visitors, also showed a fine assortment of curves, and forced the Friars to battle hard all the way for the decision. The defeat was the first of the season for the rangy right hander, who had previously collected five wins in intercollegiate competition this spring.

The Mt. St. Mary stickers opened fire on Blanche in the very first inning. Dooley fanned, but Lynch poked a triple into left field. Mulhern grounded to Janas who threw him out at first as Lynch scored. Ryscavage lined a double into centre, and when Koslowski let the ball get through him continued all the way to the home station for another score. Connell popped to Roberge.

Koslowski contributed the Friars' scoring punch in the third inning, driving in the tying runs with a hard single to right. Blanche was safe on a hit to deep short to start the rally. Madden ran for Blanche, and moved to second on Dion's single to centre. Both runners advanced when Sellig laid down a fine bunt along first. Marsella skied to deep centre, and then Koslowski came through with his single to bring both runners home.

Brown and Providence College completed the final preparation for the first baseball tilt of the intra-city series this afternoon, and tonight the banners of war were unfurled on the rival hills, Smith and College, and the two institutions made ready for the feature game which will be played on Aldrich Field tomorrow afternoon.

The two arenas of play were a direct antithesis this afternoon, as Jack Flynn, veteran major league player and coach at Providence College, sent his nine through a short snappy drill as confidence exuded from every corner of the Dominican organization. Successful in eight of nine starts, Providence College has every right to be optimistic, for critics close to the baseball organization of the Dominican college are already proclaiming the present team as one of the greatest ever to march down through a hard schedule.

Over on the velvety turf of Aldrich Field, Brown went along in a quiet methodical manner, but there wasn't any optimism exuding from under the fence corners, for Brown hasn't been hitting the peaks. On the other hand, Brown is gathering in the loose edges and the Bruin nine that went through the exacting session this afternoon was quietly confident in its own way.

"I think we've had our run of bobbles and it is about time we crashed through to win," was the way one Brown player sized it up, admitting that his was a law-of-averages deduction.

But put it down in your note book that the game isn't won by either team by any method of reckoning, for tomorrow's offering has all of the earmarks of a "natural" and in the realm of sport you can't say more than that.

MOULTON REPORTS FOR BROWN SQUAD

W. E. S. "Wacky" Moulton, one of the greatest little athletes ever to don the brown and white and go places for Brown, joined the team yesterday and in one fell swoop came mighty close to clinching a place in the starting line-up for Brown. Moulton, a star in football, hockey and baseball, had moved to give up sports in the final months of his college career, but the urgent need for men who can deliver in the pinches brought a reconsideration, and yesterday and today the little Dorchester "dynamite-box" was making up for lost time

While Jack Kelleher hasn't definitely decided just what he will do, it isn't beyond the realm of possibility that Wacky will get his turn at right field, and if he does, he'll bat in fourth place, below Bucky Harris, Fred Munroe and Art Kroeger.

But that is getting ahead of the story. Right in the first consideration, Brown has a doubt in her pitching assignment, and it probably won't be determined until just before game time whether Don Bowie or Art "Junie" Sondheim will get the call.

Bowie is ready, for he has been holding the role of "silent waiter" most of the season, since Sondheim's status has been problematical all along. Bowie is a veteran, he's capable, experienced and right in the pink, and at the moment it is safe to say that he is slated to go the distance.

Sondheim, on the other hand, injured in the Northeastern and Holy Cross games, is on the doubtful list and may or may not be ready. Dr. Raymond G. Bugbee, team physician, has been caring for his knee, and it has been making satisfactory progress. Sondheim has been drilling with the team, easing into the routine. The two weeks during which he was not to exert himself is up Saturday and he may be ready. If he is he'll pitch and Bowie will wait until next Wednesday to get his turn.

Eddie Quinton, Sophomore star and former Providence Technical high ace, will get the call for Providence College. Quinton worked both games against Brown a year ago, taking a full turn in one and working for six innings in the other, so he'll be toeing a familiar slab when he takes the mound tomorrow. Quinton has worked three games this season, winning from Northeastern and Union and dropping the decision to Manhattan. He won both Brown games a year ago and otherwise had a highly creditable record.

George Tebbets, Nashua, N. H., freshman, has succeeded into the shoes of Joe Harraghy, and he'll get the call to work behind the plate. Oscar Perrin, a freshman basketball star, will be on first base; Walter Corbett, another first-year hoop ace, will be on second; Capt. Dion will be on the hot corner and Ed Janas, a veteran, will be in the short field.

George Sellig, Ed Koslowski and Chief Marsella will be in the outfield.

Capt. Dion, Sellig, Marsella and Quinton are veterans who saw yeomen service in the Brown series a year ago.

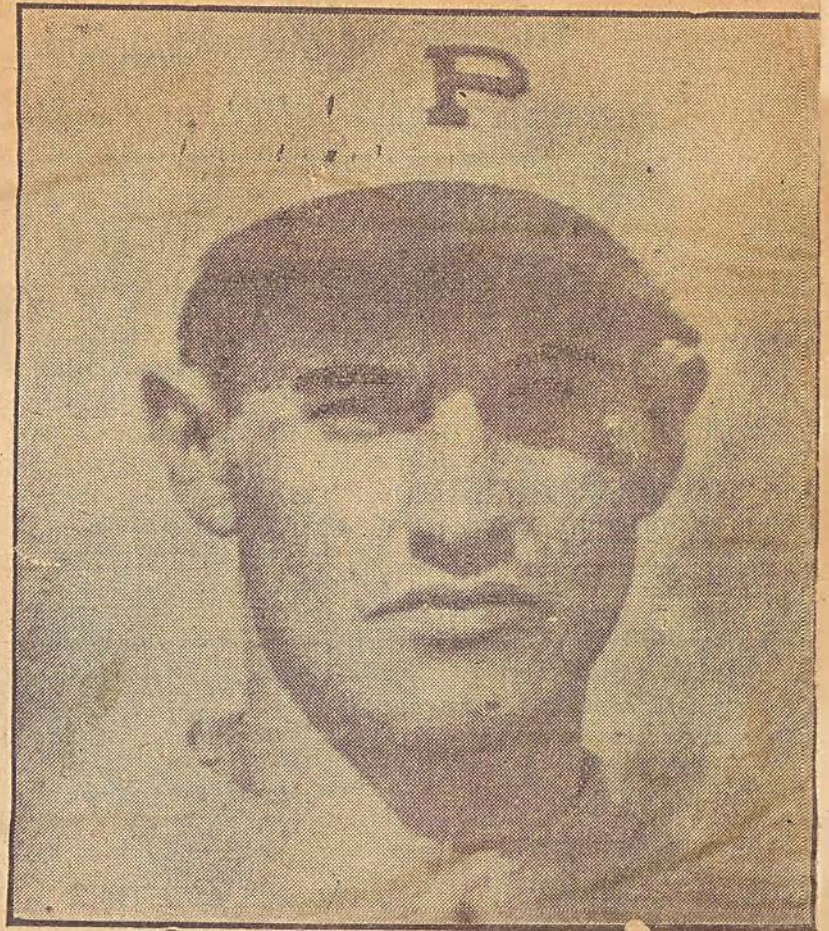

The Brown baseball team will be presented an opportunity to regain some of the prestige it has lost in recent games when it meets the Providence College nine in the first game of the annual intra-city series this afternoon at Aldrich Field. The Friars are favored to win, due to their superior record, but upsets in this series have been numerous and consequently, pre-game predictions amount to naught when these two rivals gather on the diamond.

As has been the case in recent years, Providence College is represented with a strong nine, the team having played an excellent brand of baseball in all of its nine games thus far. Brown, on the other hand, has not fared with much success, but the Bruins at spasmodic intervals have shown potential strength and maybe this hitherto hidden power will come out in full force today.

18th Meeting of Two Teams

This will be the 18th meeting between the two teams in a series which dates back to May 2, 1923. Out of the 17 games played the Friars have won nine and the Bears eight. Providence forged ahead of the Bears last year by winning both games, the first 5 to 4 and the second 14 to 2.

Brown has won four out of nine games this season. The Bears defeated Boston University, Connecticut, Vermont and Bates. Two games were dropped to Holy Cross and one to Rhode Island, Tufts and Northeastern. Manhattan is the only team to score a triumph over the Dominicans and that by a 5 to 2 count. Northeastern, Union, City College of New York, Mount St. Mary's and Upsala have

Both teams managed to hold light workouts before the rain began to fall yesterday. Coach Jack Kelleher limited the work for the Bears to bunting and throwing and a short infield practice while Coach Jack Flynn sent the Friars through 40 minutes of hitting and base running.

Don Bowie and Eddie Quinton have been named by the coaches to start in the pitching duties. Both men are right handers. Bowie was given the call yesterday when Dr. Raymond G. Bugee, Brown team physician, announced that Junie Sondheim's knee injury had not healed sufficiently to allow the youth to shoulder the starting assignment. Sondheim, however, may see service in some part of the game if Bowie finds the going rough.

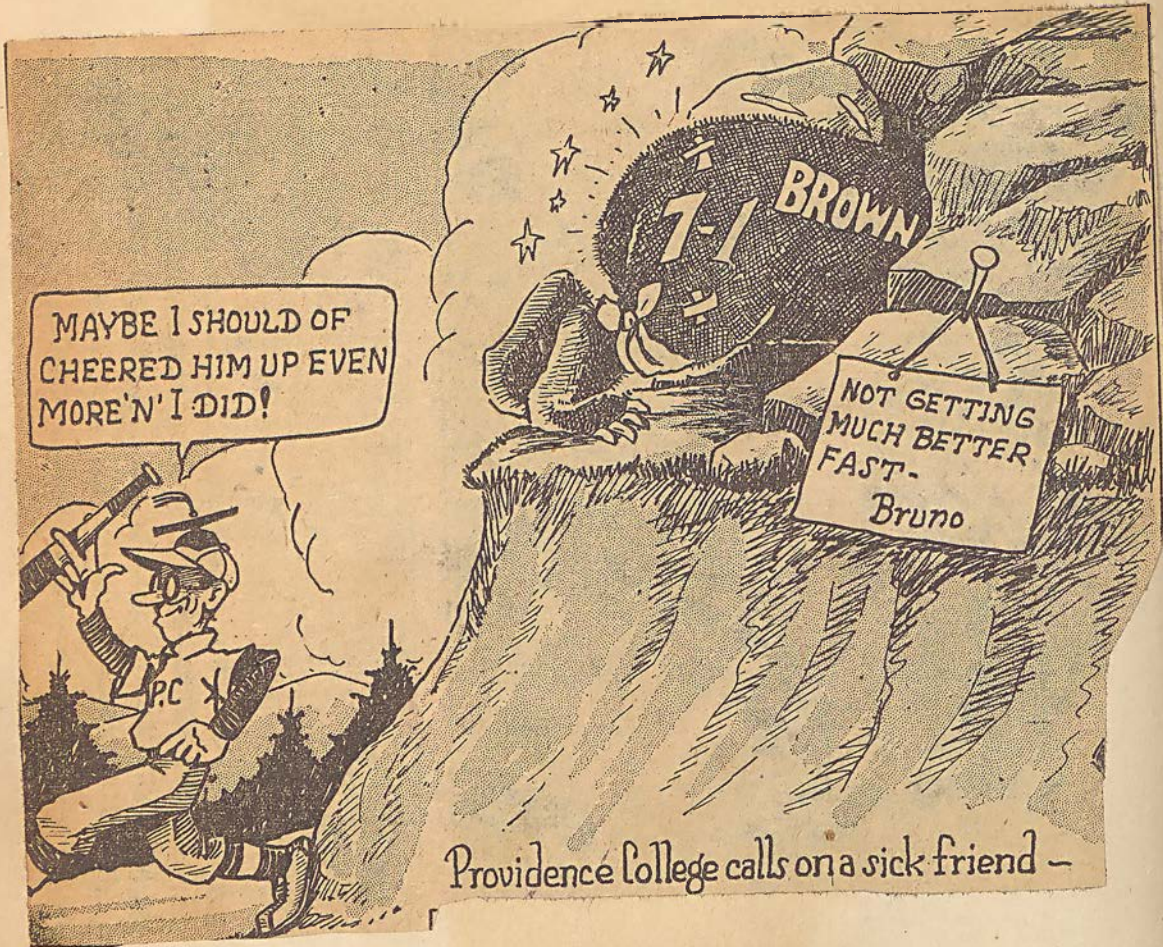

Chief Marsella, hero of the first game of the 1930 series, is a regular with the Friars this season, holding down the right field assignment. Marsella, sent in as a pinch hitter last year, hit a home run which brought in enough runs to beat the Bears.

Approximately 6000 fans, the largest crowd that has attended a Brown game in years, were on hand to see the opening clash between these local rivals.

As is usually the case in this series the spirit of rivalry was intense although it did lack the fever pitch of the miniature Harvard-Yale battles the Friars and Bruins have put on in the past. Blame for that lack can be attached to the Bruins for the Friars were in the game from beginning to end, playing heads-up baseball while the Bears aided their rivals' cause no little by sloppy fielding and base-running.

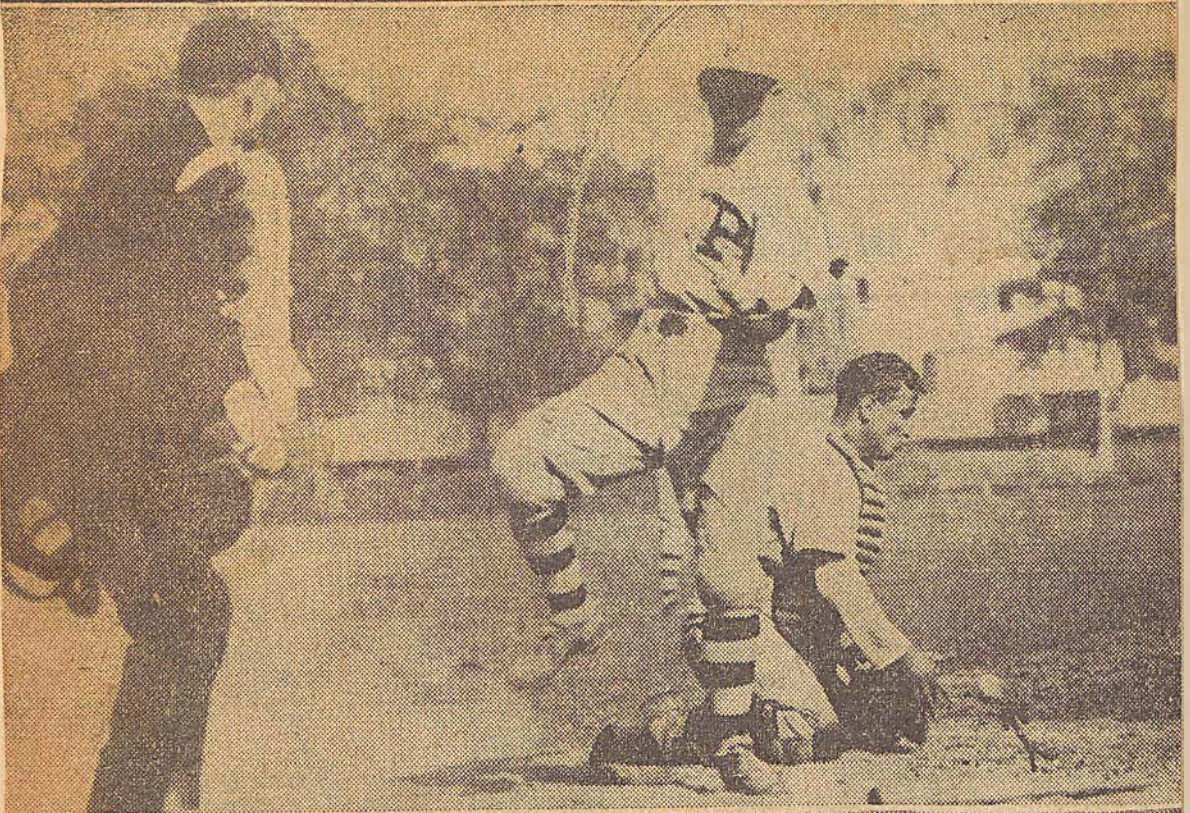
Brown's misplays didn't find their way into the box score for they were errors of omission rather than commission, but for all of that they had a deal to do with the Dominicans' easy triumph. That isn't said to discount the Friar victory for Jack Flynn's club played winning ball and deserved to win.

Quinton's work on the mound just can't be discounted. The Providence nine's sterling right-hander held control of the situation in fine style practically throughout. When he did lapse momentarily his mates came to his rescue like majors with the result that the few threats the Bruins made were but short-lived.

Eddie allowed seven hits, only one of which was for an extra base, and he kept those seven bingles scattered pretty well. On his side of the ledger he had seven strikeouts while the only two free passes he issued caused no damage, both recipients remaining stationed on the sacks as the side was retired. That's a winning performance in anybody's league and to Quinton goes the major credit for the victory.

Two Runs For Friars

Don Bowie, starting hurler for Brown, was the victim of circumstances, not all of which were of his own devising. In five innings and part of the sixth he allowed six hits, only two of which came in a single inning. Had he been accorded the airtight support of his mates the score against him would not have been so great. Checked against him, however, were five free passes, only one of which didn't figure in the scoring.

Sondheim Fares Better

Junie Sondheim, veteran right hander who relieved Bowie with the bases loaded and with none out in the sixth, fared considerably better than the starting moundsman, once he got clear of the load of trouble Bowie had left him. Sondheim ran into a peck of grief in the sixth, when the only hit he gave during his stay on the mound and one wild pitch allowed the three runners Bowie had put on base to score, but from then out he was master of ceremonies with a vengeance.

Only one batsman reached first after that one single garnered off his delivery in the sixth. That runner went to the initial cushion on a free ticket but that was as far as he got. The final two frames found Sondheim setting the Friars down in order and gaining three strikeouts during that process.

"Chief" Marsella, heavy-hitting right fielder for the Friars, opened the scoring in the first inning with a lusty clout to deep left which Munroe misjudged and which went for a home run. Oscar Perrin, Providence first sacker, singled to start the second frame for the Dominicans, and scored when Eddie Crane, third baseman and captain of the Bears, juggled Janas's roller. That short juggling act allowed the run to score but Crane recovered quickly enough to make the putout at first.

Bowie Wild in Third.

Dion and Sellig benefited from Bowie's wildness in the third, going to first on passes. Marsella advanced them on a sacrifice bunt and Dion tallied on Koslowski's long fly to right. Perrin spelled trouble for Bowie once more, punching out a sharp single, which sent Sellig across the plate with the second run of the inning and the fourth of the game.

The fourth and fifth frames found the Friars going scoreless with a sparkling double play in the fifth. Kroeger, Bruin centre fielder, to Caulkins at first, aiding Bowie no little. Sellig had grounded out to start the inning and Marsella had singled and was on first when Koslowski drove a long curving fly out to Kroeger. Marsella raced for second for a hit seemed certain. Kroeger, however, made a fine catch and a perfect throw to Caulkins for the double out.

Providence's big inning was the sixth. Perrin walked on four pitched balls and went to third on Tebbett's single to left field, a hit which probably will prove costly to Brown for Rasmussen, veteran outfielder who had replaced Munroe in the left pasture, suffered a severe injury to his right shoulder when he made a diving try to snare the ball. He was carried from the field and was replaced by Bill Gilbane.

Bone May Be Chipped

X-ray pictures of Rasmussen's shoulder failed to disclose a fracture but according to Dr. Raymond G. Bugbee, team physician, a chipped bone may have been the result of the fall and it is questionable when Rasmussen will be available for duty again. He has been taken to the college infirmary where he will undergo further treatment.

After that accident Bowie continued his distribution of free tickets, handing one to Corbett to fill the bases. It was then that Sondheim replaced him. With the Bruin infield playing close for a force play at the plate, Janas surprised with a Texas leaguer to short right field, which scored both Perrin and Tebbetts. A wild pitch while sending 'em up to Quinton enabled Corbett to scamper across the plate with the third run of the inning. Quinton subsequently

fanned and Dion and Sellig went out easily to end the inning and likewise the scoring for Providence.

Bruins Lose Opportunities

Where the Friars were opportunists the Bruins were exactly the opposite, losing some extremely wide open chances to add to their run total. It wasn't until the third frame that they did push their lone tally across the plate.

Chaiklin opened the third with a double to left field, which came mighty near being a putout for Sellig made a brilliant attempt to make the catch and lost it only by the proverbial eyelash. Bowie was safe on Dion's low peg to first which drew Perrin off the bag and Chaiklin advanced to third from where he scored easily on Bucky Harris's sharp single between third and short. Brown's scoring ended right there and then when Munroe fauned and Kroeger and Moulton hit into easy forceouts.

In the second inning, with Moulton and Kittredge on third and second respectively, as the result of their singles, and Crane's sacrifice bunt, something went haywire with Brown's strategy board. Caulkins was at bat and either a squeeze play was on or Moulton, at least, thought so. The latter dashed for home on Quinton's motion to throw and was caught flatfooted when Caulkins assumed a "bat-on-shoulder" pose. No matter who was to blame on the play it cost Brown a chance to score.

Flynnmen to Meet Georgetown
in First Sunday College

Hendricken Field at Providence College will be the scene of one of the best college baseball games of the season when the Friars wheel into action at 2:30 this afternoon against the strong Georgetown University nine. The game marks the first time that a college baseball game has been staged in the city on Sunday, the contest having been arranged as a homecoming feature in honor of Bob Wholey and Hal Poole, local athletes who are star members of the southern college nine.

Danny Connors, undefeated ace of the Dominican's mound staff, will seek his fourth victory of the season when he climbs the mound this afternoon to face the Capitol City ball tossers who have enjoyed a fairly successful campaign to date. Connors has scored victories over Lowell Textile, Upsala and Springfield, and in each game has shown continued improvement in his hurling, with the result that the Georgetowners will have to be at their best to win today.

Pitted against Connors will be either Hal Poole, rugged Providence youngster, who has been one of the bright stars of the Georgetown team for the past three years, or Ed Nozensky. Poole

has turned in several notable victories this season, including a 4 to 1 triumph over Harvard. If Poole does not draw the starting assignment, Coach Colrick will have Ed Nozensky, rangy southpaw, who coached the Wareham team to the Cape Cod league title last summer, to fire against the Friars. Nozensky is a southpaw with a fine assortment of curves, and possesses a good fast ball.

The other local youngster who will make his finale before the home folks is Bob Wholey, centre fielder and cleaner up batter of the visitors. Wholey, former Hope High star, has been a regular outer gardener during the past three seasons for Georgetown. He is the brother of Ed Wholey, who starred with the Friars as a centre fielder seven years ago.

Included in the array of fine talent which will be hurled against the crack Smith Hill aggregation in addition to Wholey, Poole and Nozensky, will be Johnny Scalzi, Bridgeport Senior, who is being sought by two major league clubs, and who is considered the class

of the college second basemen, and Phil Mooney, rugged first baseman, whose forte is hard and timely hitting.

The Georgetown alumni club of this State is planning to turn out en masse this afternoon to attend the game and to celebrate the homecoming of Poole and Wholey. Both these athletes will be the recipients of presents, with Dr. Raymond L. Mullaney, president of the graduate club, making the presentation speech. The Georgetown committee which has sponsored the game consists of Eugene Gilmartin, chairman, James E. Dooley, John C. Going and Harry Sanderger.

Tufts Nine Tops Colleges of East With Clean Slate

Coughlin, of Army, Leads All Pitchers With 5 Straight Victories to His Credit

With the defeat of Williams by Columbia last Saturday, Tufts College now is the only major college baseball nine in the East which is undefeated. The Jumbos, following in the footsteps of the 1929 and 1930 teams, have won seven straight, adding Brown and Northeastern to their list of victims last week.

Providence College, perennially one of the leaders in the baseball activities of the East, won three games last week, defeating Mount St. Mary's, Lowell Textile and Brown, and bringing its record up to nine victories in ten starts to rank second. The Dominicans have been beaten only by Manhattan, early in the season. The Jaspers rank third in the list, with eight triumphs and one defeat. They won two last week, over C. C. N. Y. and the New York A. C., and since their defeat by Fordham on April 25 have won five straight.

Williams and Boston College rank fourth and fifth respectively, the former with four victories in five and the latter with seven out of nine. Columbia, winning two games from Cornell and Williams, is next, with Army seventh. Yale, which started the season auspiciously, has lost its last four games and now has a record of six victories in eleven starts.

By its triumph over Fordham on Saturday in one of the metropolitan series' outstanding games, N. Y. U. gained a tie with the Lions for first place in the intra-city standings, each with three victories and one defeat. Columbia has completed its metropolitan schedule, while the Violet is still to meet Manhattan, C. C. N. Y. and Fordham again. Manhattan is third and the contest with the Violets next Saturday probably will decide the mythical championship.

By adding Bucknell to his list of victims last Wednesday, Cadet Coughlin, of Army, took undisputed possession of first place in the individual pitching standards. The West Point ace has five straight victories to his credit. It is also interesting to note that every one of Coughlin's victories have come after a full nine innings of work on the mound. Three men have each won four straight games, Walter Masters, Penn.'s veteran ace; Lefty Haas, of Gettysburg, and Bill Braden, of Stevens Tech; while eight others have won three and lost none.

Hal Poole, Local Lad, Gives Friars Two Hits in 8-0 Game

Visitors, on Other Hand, Assault Connors and Blanche.—Bozek Features in Field.

Hal Poole, one of the finest young pitchers ever developed in this State, made his final collegiate appearance in this city a memorable occasion yesterday afternoon by handing the Providence College nine an 8 to 0 defeat, allowing the Friars but two safe hits. The defeat was the second of the season for the locals, and broke a seven game winning streak of the Smith Hillers.

Poole, displaying the best form of his collegiate career, held the Friars at bay throughout the nine innings, and came very close to hurling a perfect game. A single by Roberge in the fifth inning and a scratch hit by Griffin in the eighth were the only hits gleaned off his delivery. Only five Friars reached first base, and not one went as far as second.

Connors Meets Reversal

While Poole was holding the Friars in check, the Georgetown aggregation went to work with a vengeance on the slants of Danny Connors, driving the Medford Sophomore off the slab in the fourth inning to give him his first setback of the season. Al Blanche, victor over the Mt. St. Mary nine which defeated Georgetown earlier in the campaign, took up the burden for the final five innings, and halted the scoring until the ninth when three more tallies were shoved across the plate.

Poole was accorded splendid support at all times, the team playing errorless ball behind him, and pulling down everything hit past the infield. Johnny Bozek in left field, contributed several spectacular catches to prevent possible Providence hits, while Wholey, centre-fielder, celebrated his return to this city by gathering in four difficult drives to his vicinity.

Takes Lead in Second

Georgetown jumped into the lead in the second inning after two were out. After Wholey had lined out to Sellig and Mooney to Marsella, King drove the Friar rightfielder to the fence for his long drive which bounded off the barrier for a two base hit. Evers singled to centre to score King, and a moment later O'Toole punched out a hit to the same district, Evers racing all the way to third on the blow.

Here a lapse on the part of the Friars gave the visitors another marker. On a double steal Evers slid safely to home when Janas took Roberge's fine throw to second and returned it to the plate instead of making a play on O'Toole at second.

Wholey chipped in with a single just inside third base to score Morris and send Scalzi to second. Mooney grounded to Reilley who made a fine pickup only to toss wildly to first to allow two more runs to trickle across the plate to boost the visitors' total.

Dominican Captain Collects 3
Hits.—Quinton Is Master
on Mound.

With Captain Bobby Dion, third baseman, leading its attack, the Providence College Varsity nine scored its 10th victory of the season by meting out a 7 to 4 defeat to Middlebury College on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. Dion turned in a perfect day in the field, and collected three hits, one a double, in five trips to bat, driving in three Friar runs.

Middlebury presented one of the finest aggregations to face the Dominicans on the Smith Hill diamond this spring, and from start to finish forced the Flynnmen to battle hard for the decision. They scored first, and midway through the game staged a strong rally to tie the count at 4-all, only to fade before the hitting of the Friars in the final stage of the contest.

Eddie Quinton was on the slab for the Dominicans and in turning in his fourth victory of the campaign hurled fine ball, allowing seven hits which were scattered except for the sixth inning when the Vermonters bunched three safe blows for as many runs. Quinton struck out six batters and did not allow a walk.

After two scoreless innings marked by fast fielding, the visitors from the Green Mountains nicked Quinton for their first run. Hartrey started trouble with a single to rightfield. He moved to second on E. Olson's sacrifice and scampered across the plate a few moments later when J. Olson doubled to the right-field fence.

Friars Tie Score

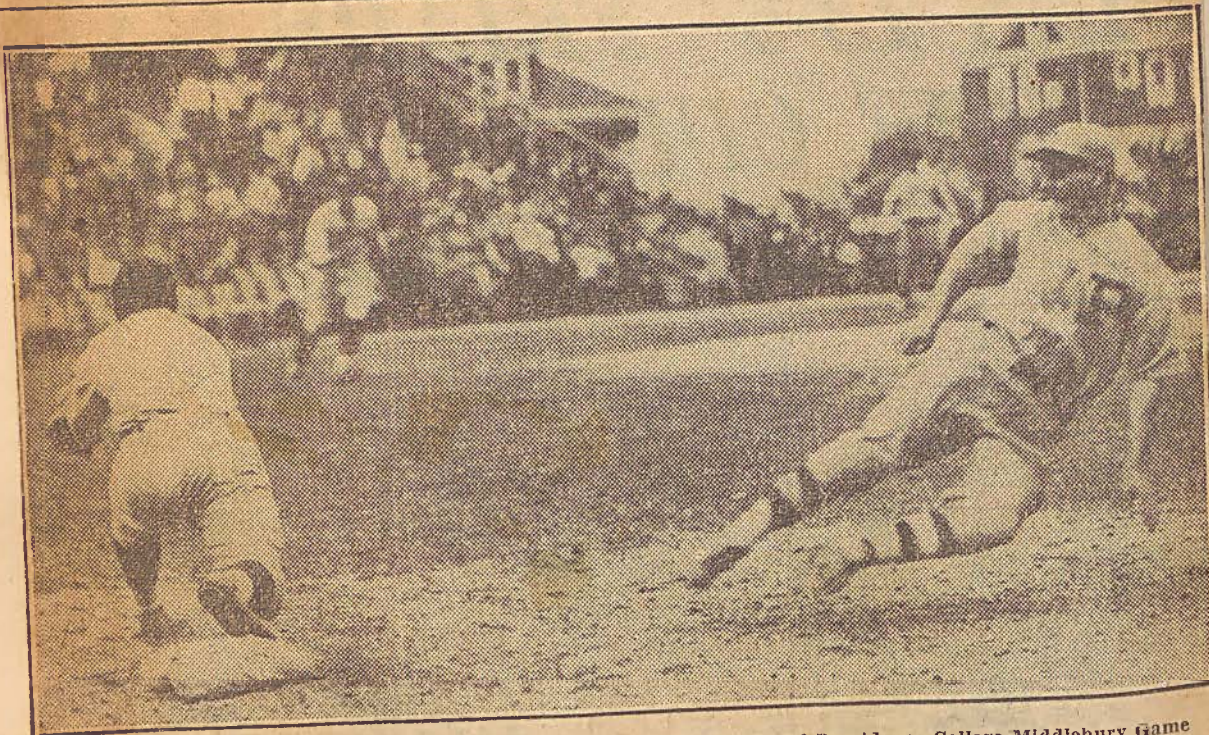

Columbia Adds 3 Triumphs to Baseball Record

Lions' Work Features College Games; Tufts, Held Up by Rain, Still Unbeaten

Rain handicapped college baseball activities in the East considerably last week, but Columbia found enough clear weather to win three games in two days. The Lions defeated Colgate Friday, 3 to 2, in ten innings, then took a twin bill from Dartmouth on Saturday to bring their season's record to twelve games won and three lost.

Columbia has won six games straight since its 11-0 defeat by Penn on April 29, taking two from Cornell, one from Williams in addition to the three last week. But the Lions, with their percentage of .800, only rank third. Both Tufts and Providence top them, the Jumbos with seven games won and none lost and the Dominicans with ten victories in twelve starts.

Tufts had two games scheduled last week. The contest with Middlebury was called off because of weather and the Boston U. game in the tenth inning with the score 3-3 because of rain. Providence lost its second game of the season on Monday when Georgetown took an 8-0 decision, but the Dominicans defeated Middlebury on Saturday to maintain their hold on second place.

Jaspers Suffer 2d Defeat

Manhattan College also suffered its second defeat last week, losing to N. Y. U. on Saturday by 17-7. The Jaspers now have won eight and lost two, and both defeats have been at the hands of metropolitan rivals, Fordham administering the first late in April. Boston College likewise has won eight and lost two, and here, too, Fordham was one of the teams which spoiled a record. The Rams have not been particularly strong this year, having won eight out of fourteen, but they have been a jinx to teams boasting better records.

N. Y. U.'s victory over Manhattan gives the Violet undisputed possession of first place in the metropolitan series standings, with four victories and one defeat. Columbia is second, with three out of four, with St. John's, by virtue of its second victory over C. C. N. Y. last week, in third place with two out of four.

Bill MacHale, of Harvard, turned in the most striking pitching performances of the week when he pitched two games and won them both to make his record seven won and one lost. Walter Masters, of Penn., added another victim to his list and brought his total to five straight victories, as did Orville Braden, of Stevens Tech. Several of the hitherto undefeated hurlers, namely Coughlin, of Army; Sargent, of Vermont, and Connors, of Providence, sustained all their first defeats in games last week.

Friars Capture Weird Game from Boston College 7 to 6

Locals Score Five Runs in Third Inning on One Hit.—Game Marred by Errors.

(Special to the Providence Journal.)

Boston, Mass., May 20. — The Providence College nine eked out a 7 to 6 victory over the Boston College nine here this afternoon to score its 11th victory in 13 starts. The setback was but the third of the season for the Eagles and marks the second successive year that the Friars have scored a triumph over the locals on the Newton diamond.

The game was marred by loose playing on the part of the Dominicans, and unsteady hurling by the Boston College moundsmen. The Rhode Islanders were guilty of six errors, but proved able to come through in the final stages of the game to halt threatening Boston rallies.

Both the starting pitchers served but short terms, with Gallagher, conqueror of Princeton, yielding to Downes for Boston in the third inning, and Connors of the Friars abdicating in favor of Al Blanche in the fourth when an Eagle rally brought the score to a 5 to 4 count in favor of the visitors. Blanche encountered no little trouble in keeping the base paths clear, and had to battle hard to the final out to avert a defeat.

Boston scored first, collecting two runs in the first frame, only to have the Friars go far into the lead in the third when Southpaw Gallagher lost control and walked two men, and Downes, his successor, encountered a similar wild streak which resulted in the Rhode Islanders collecting five runs on a single scratch hit. Two errors and a hit in the fourth put the Eagles back in the running, and in the fifth they tied the score at five all.

It remained for Ollie Roberge and Eddie Janas to put across the winning rally in the seventh, two runs being scored. Aside from this attack, the visitors had trouble in solving Downes's delivery, and as a result had to be content with safeguarding their lead.

Connors got away to a shaky start, walking Spognardi, the first Boston batter. Crowley laid down the expected bunt to advance the runner. Colbert came through with a timely single to left to score Spognardi, and when Sellig pegged wildly to the plate instead of throwing to second base, he continued to that station, from where he scored when Marsella let Herman's fly to right fall safely.

Roberge and Corbett singled in succession in the second with one away, but the rally died short when Janas and Connors failed to produce the necessary scoring punch. However, Ed Gallagher, Eagle southpaw ace, found the going rough the following frame, and the Friars were able to break through for five scores.

In the fourth, after getting by two innings without any trouble, Connors was the victim of poor play by his mates, and after the Eagles had tallied two runs and after the Friars had tallied two runs was withdrawn in favor of Blanche. Successive errors by Janas and Corbett on infield rollers, followed by a sacrifice bunt, and then a clean single by Downes, brought the locals within a run of the Dominicans.

Corbett's boot of Shea's roller started trouble in the sixth, as Marsella added further chaos by dropping Downes's high fly to right. Crowley walked to fill the bases. Colbert hoisted a sacrifice fly to Griffin to score Shea, but the Friar centerfielder turned in his circus catch on the next blow, a holster off Lane's bat, to end the inning.

In the seventh with one out, Griffin walked, and went to second on Perrin's single to right. Roberge singled sharply to centre, Griffin scoring, but Perrin was tossed out at third on a fast relay from the outfield. Roberge went down on the throw in, and after Corbett had walked, Janas came through with a clean single to right to score him. Blanche grounded out to halt the attack.

Boston picked up a run in the eighth when Colbert doubled and with two away, Herman came through with a single to centre. Herman went to third on Chesnulevich's double along the left field line.

FRIARS DEFEAT MANHATTAN

Friars Blank Manhattan 2-0 and Avenge Previous Defeat

Marsella's Single in 8th, Scoring Dion Breaks Up Fine Hurling Duel.

A hard drive off Chief Marsella's bat in the eighth inning, which scored Capt. Bobby Dion from second, broke up a brilliant pitching duel between Danny Connors of Providence College and Tom Garrison of Manhattan College on Hendrickson Field yesterday afternoon, as the Friars chalked up a 2 to 0 triumph for their 12th victory of the season. Marsella followed Dion across the plate on a passed ball and an error by Keegan of the visitors.

The tilt was one of the finest staged on the Smith Hill diamond in years, with both nines turning in some sparkling work afield, and both pitchers hurling a superior brand of ball. Danny Connors, who got off to a poor start in the Boston College game on Tuesday, went right back on the slab yesterday and held the highly touted visitors in check throughout, giving the Friars their first shutout victory of the season. He did not allow a single walk, and three times stopped the invaders with a runner on third.

With both teams playing hard to garner a run, the Friars came to bat at the end of the eighth with the head of the batting order. Dion worked Garrison hard and finally drew a base on balls. Sellig laid down the bunt to move the runner to second.

McCormick Makes Fine Stop

Then Marsella contributed his second hit, a screaming line drive into left field on which McCormick, Jasper outer-gardener made a spectacular diving stop, getting the ball on the first hop to prevent what would otherwise have been a home run. Dion raced home with the winning run on the hit. Keegan let one of Garrison's shots get out of reach and Marsella made a break for third, reaching that station safely, and then romped home when Keegan pegged high and wide trying to prevent the advance of Marsella.

Although outhit 8 to 6, the Dominicans managed to produce a scoring punch for what proved to be the winning margin, while the Gotham ball tossers were left stranded on the sacks when the Friars steadied in the field, and Connors bore down in the pinches. The defeat was the first in five starts for Tom Garrison, ace of the visitor's mound staff, and helped to atone for the setback meted out to the locals in New York last month.

Jumbos, Unbeaten, Score 9th Victory; N. Y. U. and Fordham Feature Week

The performances of two metropolitan college basketball teams featured last week's activity in Eastern intercollegiate baseball circles. The New University turned in three victories and Fordham two to raise their averages in the sectional standings. Tufts, leading the East since early in the season, continued its winning ways and increased its season's total to nine straight victories and no defeats. Holy Cross, always among the leaders, also won three games and lost none.

N. Y. U., demonstrating much power at bat, defeated Rutgers, Lafayette and Army, the first two named by comfortable margins. Bob McNamara pitched and won the last two games within three days of each other. The Violet now has a record of eleven victories in fourteen starts and will close its season with Fordham Saturday, N. Y. U. leads in the metropolitan series standings, with four victories and one defeat. Fordham defeated St. John's and Boston College easily, and here, too, it was one pitcher, Neil Andrews, who turned in both triumphs to make the Rams' record 10 won and 6 lost.

Tufts Wins 2 Games

Tufts defeated Middlebury and St. Michael's during the week, while Holy Cross won from Lowell Textile and Manhattan, to tie N. Y. U. for fifth place in the Eastern standings, also with eleven victories out of fourteen. Providence won two games, defeating Boston College and Manhattan, to maintain its hold on second place with a record of twelve victories and two defeats. Columbia is third with twelve out of fifteen.

In the individual pitching standings, Walter Masters, of Penn., added a victory to keep one game ahead of the rest of the field, with six triumphs and no defeats. Lefty Haas, of Gettysburg, and Orville Braden, of Stevens, each have won five and lost none. Bill McMaha, of Harvard, has won seven and lost one, while Ray White, of Columbia; Coughlin, of Army; Norman Sims, of Holy Cross, and McNamara each have won six and lost one.

Friars Easy for Friedrich as Holy Cross Wins 10 to 3

Holds Dominicans to 5 Hits as
Mates Pound Local Twirl-
ers Hard.

Worcester, Mass., May 27.—The Holy Cross nine proved too strong for Providence College here this afternoon, pounding out a 10 to 3 victory over the Friars to hand the latter aggregation its third setback of the season. The triumph was the 10th straight for the Crusaders, and sends them into a tie with the Friars for the second place in the Eastern college rankings, both teams boasting a record of 12 victories in 15 starts.

Ability to hit hard and often, coupled with ineffective box work by the Dominican hurlers, caused the downfall of the Rhode Islanders. Connors, starting twirler for the Flynnmen, was forced out of the picture in the third inning, and Blanche, his successor, had his hands full trying to stem the hitting of the locals.

Led by the hitting of Marshall, Niemiec and Colucci, each of whom collected three hits, the Crusaders crashed out 14 safe blows off the combined deliveries of Connors and Blanche to win in decisive fashion. Niemiec, with a home run and a triple, and Marshall, with a homer and a double, accounted for the long range hitting of the fray.

With Bobby Friedrich pitching brilliantly, the locals had matters much their own way after the fourth inning, when they piled up a 6 to 2 lead. Friedrich was never in real serious trouble after this inning and held the invaders well in check, striking out 10, while only five safe hits were made off him.

Fine Plays Made

In spite of the one sided score the game produced some fine plays, with both outfielders featuring with spectacular running catches. In the sixth with runners on second and third, Sellig of the Friars contributed the fielding gem of the clash when he raced into deep left, crossing the cinder track to pull down Murray's bid for a home run. In the following inning Murray performed a similar feat in robbing Sellig of a circuit drive. Corbett's running catch into right field with his back to the plate in the sixth frame also won a round of applause.

Holy Cross scored first, chalking up a run in the initial stanza, when Johnny Marshall caught hold of one of Connors's fast shoots and smashed it to deep left field, the ball rolling out of the playing field for a circuit blow.

Providence climbed ahead in the third inning. Dion singled along third and Sellig came through with a double to centre to send Dion to third. Marsella continued the attack and sent the Dominican rooters into an uproar when he lined a single to left scoring Dion and Sellig.

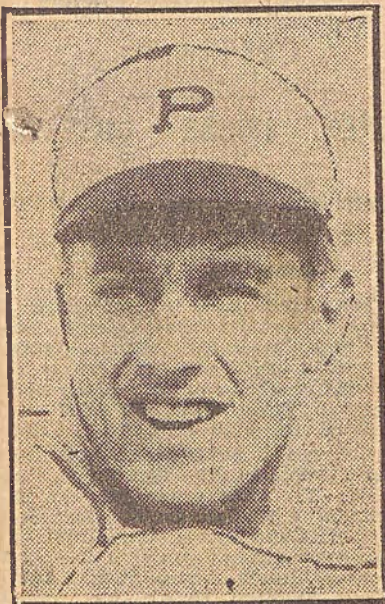

A single by Eddie Reilley, new short-stop of the Providence College, in the 10th inning of a hard-fought game with St. John's College of Brooklyn, enabled the Friars to win, 5 to 4, on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon for their 13th triumph of the season. Reilley's blow came after Walter Corbett had reached scoring position with a double to centre after two were out.

The Friars came from behind to take the lead in the sixth, only to have the visitors make it four apiece with a ninth-inning rally. Corbett handled nine chances around second without a slip.

Quinton pitched a good game, striking out 10 men. He allowed St. John's six hits. Marsella took the fielding honors for his running catch of Cooper's fly in the sixth inning. The Harrisville Friar faced to deep right to pull down the drive, falling over backwards against the fence as he made the putout.

Visitors Take Lead

The New Yorkers got away to a flying lead when the Friars faltered in the opening stanza. Fernandez, lead-off batter, was safe on Janas's boot of his roller, and a moment later stole second. He moved to third while Neary was being tossed out at first. Rubinsky, a rugged southpaw hitter, poked a drive down the left field line, the ball rolling to the fence for a home run. Providence College Wins 5-1 for 14th Victory of Season

George Tebbetts Features At-
tack with Timely Hitting.
Blanche Fans 10.

Timely hitting by George Tebbetts enabled the Providence College nine to chalk up its 14th win of the season yesterday, St. John's College nine bowing 5-1 on Hendricken Field. Tebbetts collected two hits in four trips to the plate, one a home run, to drive in three runs. It was the second victory in two days for the Friars over St. John's.

The tilt marked the close of intercollegiate baseball activities for the New York college, and it was an aggressive aggregation which endeavored to down the Dominicans. Capt. McElroy, starting moundsman for the Vincentions, gave a fine exhibition until he encountered a wild streak in the sixth and gave way to McCormack, who was in turn relieved by Fernandez.

Blanche in Good Form

Al Blanche, on the slab for the Flynnmen, was in good form, allowing but three safe hits, one of which might have been an out had the ball not struck Neary, St. John's fielder, as he was running from second to third. Blanche struck out 10 batters and walked but two, being in serious trouble but once during the fray.

Sharp fielding marked the play of both teams, with the visitors taking the honors with three double plays to nip Providence rallies. Rubinsky, Vincention centrefielder, turned in several running catches in the outfield, sharing the honors in this work with Marsella and Sellig of the Friars. 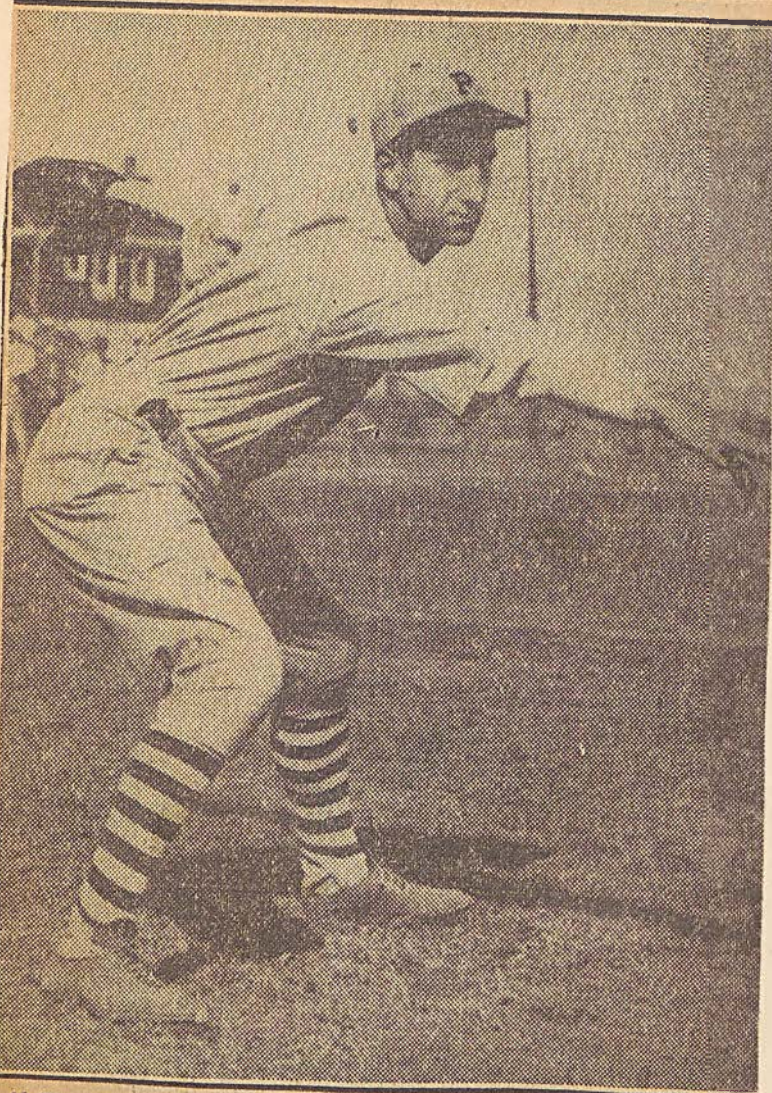
Fast Game for Four Innings

Tufts Baseball Nine Now in Beaten Class

Brown Mars Jumbos' Clean Slate; Columbia Is in Lead for City Honors

The last undefeated college baseball team in the East entered the ranks of the beaten last week when Tufts College, after ten straight, went down before Brown, 16-12. The Jumbos, however, maintained their lead over teams in this section of the country by defeating St. Michael's for a second time last Saturday to make their record eleven victories in twelve starts. They still have three games to play.

Holy Cross continued its winning ways and added two victories last week, making its total of consecutive victories eleven, the most in the East. These were over traditional rivals, Boston and Holy Cross. By defeating Providence, the Crusaders jumped into third place in the standings, with thirteen won and three lost, for an average of .813. Providence, defeating St. John's twice in two days, is second.

Both Stevens Tech and Penn State have won seven and lost two to rank next, numerically, while Columbia, despite its 8-1 defeat by the New York A. C. Saturday, holds on fifth place with a record of twelve victories in fourteen starts for an average of .750.

Lions Pass Violet Nine

The Lions also jumped into undisputed possession of the mythical metropolitan collegiate title when Fordham surprised by defeating N. Y. U., 7-6, in the second game of the home-and-home series Saturday. The Violet, which had led the "Big Six" in the city for most of the season, finished its campaign in second place. Columbia won three out of four intra-city contests, while N. Y. U. captured four out of six. Fordham ranks third in the final standings, with three out of five, while St. John's, which defeated Manhattan last week in another intra-city affair, is next with three won and three lost.

The Jasper team was one of the disappointments of the campaign. After starting in whirlwind fashion to rank with the leaders of the East, the Green slumped in its last quarter. It lost five games in eight played and finished with eleven victories and six defeats.

In individual pitching, Walter Masters, of Penn., continues to lead in the field, turning in another victory and bringing his string to seven straight this season and twenty-four out of twenty-six starts in three years of competition with the Quaker nine. Felix Andruskiewicz, of Tufts, also added another victim to rank second with six straight triumphs, while Lefty Haas, of Gettysburg, and Orville Bradenm, of Stevens, each have won five and lost none. Bill McHale, of Harvard, heads the pitchers who have sustained only one defeat. The Crimson hurler has won eight in nine.

Challengers for the Eastern college baseball crown, Providence College and Holy Cross meet in an all-important tussle on Hendricken Field this afternoon in the second game of their series. The Friars, with a record of 14 wins, one more than their Worcester rivals, lost the first game of the series, but are confident of reversing the tables on the Crusaders this afternoon.

Eddie Quinton will be Coach Jack Flynn's choice to do the hurling, with Danny Connors ready for relief duty at a moment's notice. Both are in fine condition for the test, with Quinton eager to better his two-year record of 12 wins in 14 games. Connors started the game at Worcester, but gave way to Blanche when the team failed to click behind him.

With the memory of last year, when they came back to down the Crusaders here after losing the first game at Worcester, still bright, the Friars will wheel into action today determined to score a win. It was a confident group of athletes who travelled to the showers after the long drill yesterday, and even Coach Jack Flynn predicted that his charges would be equal to the task of turning back the Purple and continuing the march for collegian baseball honors of the East.

Holy Cross, mindful of the last visit here, will field its strongest array, a team which has won 11 straight games. Maynard won all scholastic diamond honors as a receiver for the St. Raphael Academy nine two years back, and this spring has done the bulk of the backstopping for the Purple collegians, alternating at the work with Hank Garrity, football captain.

Mayors of two cities will attend the contest, as Mayor Dunne of Providence is expected to witness the tilt in company with Mayor O'Hare of Worcester who heads a large delegation of Crusader followers from that vicinity. The largest crowd ever to witness a tilt on the Smith Hill diamond is expected to be in attendance when play is started at 3:15.

Quinton's Effective Hurling Brings Victory to Dominicans

Holds Crusaders to Five Hits.

Flashing a championship brand of ball, the Providence College nine defeated its traditional rival, Holy Cross, by a 3 to 2 score in a thrilling game on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. The defeat shattered an 11-game victory streak of the Worcester nine.

Going into the last of the ninth with the score deadlocked, the Dominicans duplicated their brilliant rally of a year ago to crash through with a winning marker. Tebbetts, first batter, worked Friedrichs for a free ticket, was sacrificed to second and came home on Dion's hit to left. Garrity, Holy Cross catcher, dropping the throw-in to the plate to allow Tebbetts to score the deciding run.

The contest was witnessed by the largest crowd to attend a game on Hendricken Field this year. Mayor James E. Dunne of this city attended the tilt in company with Mayor Michael O'Hara of Worcester. The two civic leaders watched the first half of the game from the Providence stands and then moved to the Holy Cross side of the field for the final four innings.

Dominicans Get Early Lead To Win Over Syracuse 6-4

Visitors Stage 4-Run Rally in
4th.—Heavy Hitting Features
Nip and Tuck Game.

Pounding the offerings of Pitcher Jim Kelly hard in the first two innings to pile up a five-run lead, the Providence College nine continued its brilliant diamond play by scoring a 6 to 4 decision over Syracuse University on Hendricken Field yesterday afternoon. The win was the 16th of the season for the Friars and their second major triumph of the week, as they downed Holy Cross here on Wednesday.

Chief Marsella, slugging Friar right fielder, provided most of the excitement of the game, wielding his war club effectively on four of the five trips to the plate, driving out a single, a double, a triple and a home run. The circuit smash was his sixth of the season, and was one of the hardest hit balls of the current campaign.

Undaunted by the Dominicans' opening splurge, the Syracusans came back strong in the fourth frame to drive Danny Connors, Flynn's starting choice, from the mound and make the game a nip and tuck affair until the finish. Al Blanche, who has performed yeoman work in relieving Connors twice previously this campaign, finished the game, allowing but one safe hit in five and a third innings.

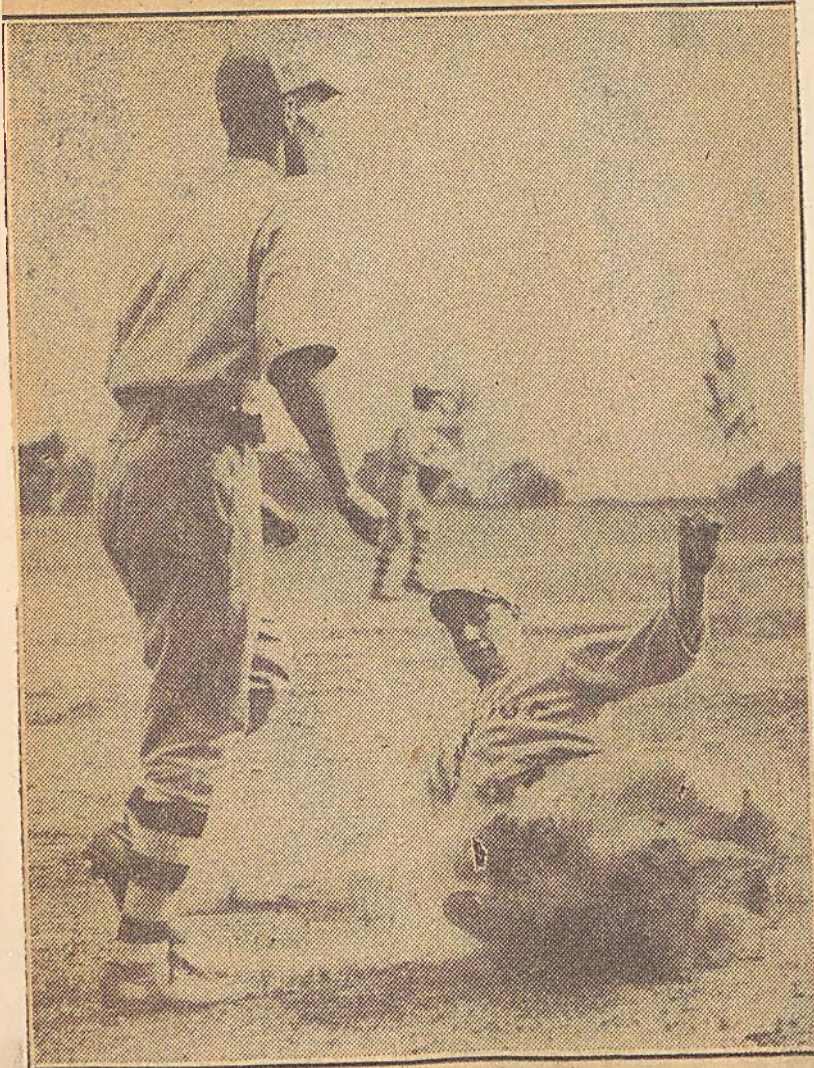
The Smith Hillers turned in an errorless game, giving both Connors and Blanche sterling support throughout the clash, and in addition flashing as strong an offense as Flynn has viewed in some time. Aside from the fatal fourth frame not a Syracuse runner got beyond second base, and in the second inning when Topol doubled to open the stanza, Capt. 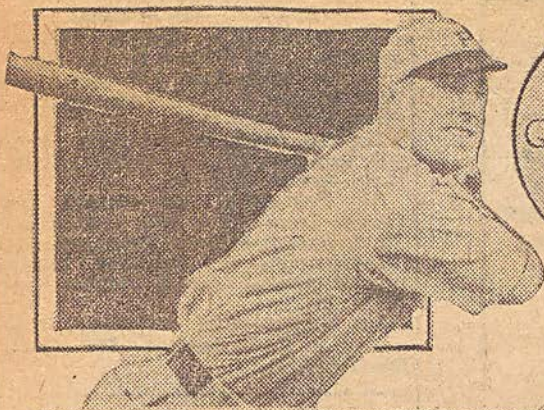

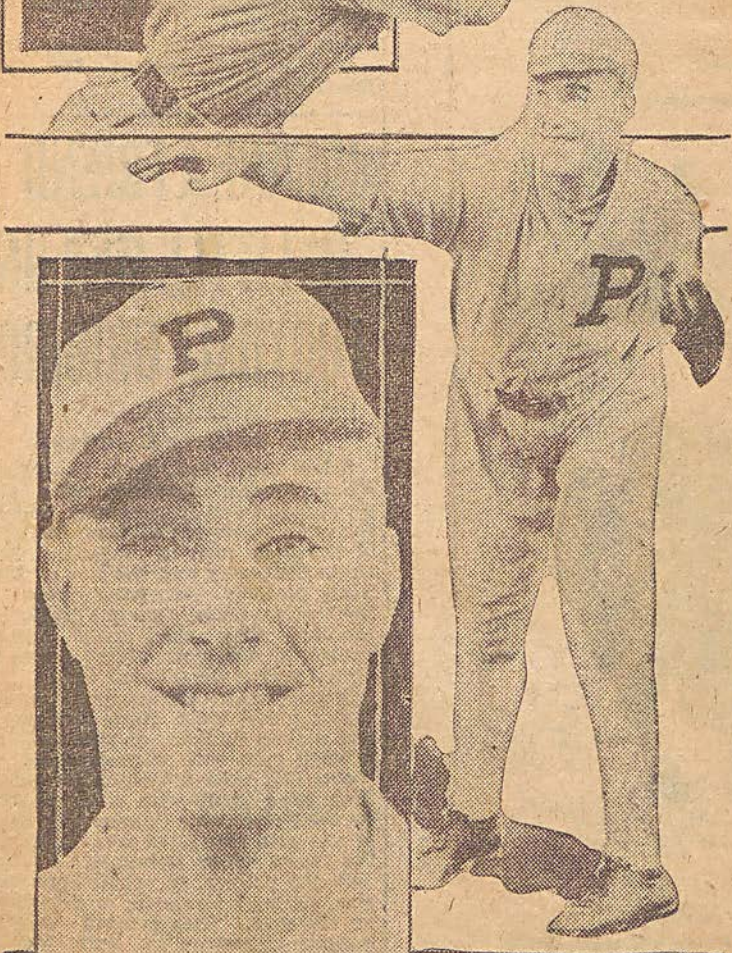

Dominicans' Ace "Blows Up" in
Second; Yale Halts Rally
in Seventh.

New Haven, Conn., June 6.—A Yale batting drive which produced five runs off Pitcher Ed Quinton from five hits in the second inning was the keynote of Yale's 6 to 4 victory over Providence College today. It was the fourth defeat of the season for the visitors, who have won 16 games. The visiting bats cracked merrily in the first inning, when safeties by Charley Marsella, Ed Koslowski and Roberge produced two runs.

Yale's 5 to 2 margin prevailed until the seventh, with Pitcher Ed Quinton, who blanked Yale here 1 to 0 last year, and Bill Kies in airtight form.

Bill Newton replaced Kies in the opening of the seventh and Providence made a crashing final bid to overcome the three-run lead when hits by Dion, Sellig and Marsella and three passes yielded two runs. With the bases filled, Reilly's bounder to Booth, forcing Roberge at third, closed the score. Newton held Providence hitless in the remaining two innings.

Yale Scores in Seventh

Yale increased its lead in the seventh, when passes to Booth and Fletcher, Linehan's safety to centre and Capt. Fay Vincent's sacrifice fly to left registered Booth, whose all-round game again featured the Yale play.

Booth stole home in the second inning, catching the Providence battery napping. Pitcher Quinton threw late and wild to the plate to catch him. Fletcher accepted 11 chances, including half a dozen of the spectacular type. Koslowski's two doubles, coupled with his two passes, were Providence's most threatening batting gestures.

His running catch of Vincent's long fly in the first, Dion's capture of Vincent's whizzing grounder in the fifth and Reilly's stop of Brown's bounder the other side of second base and his sharpshooting

throw to first ahead of Brown were the Providence fielding features.

Both the Yale and Providence pitchers contributed a total of five passes, but dazzling infield stops repeatedly rescued the twirlers. Warren led the Yale batting attack with a single and double, but Howard Burke, who was tried out in centre, furnished the most timely drive with his single which scored McGowan and Warren in the first.

B. C. PLAYS FRIARS AT COMMENCEMENT

Japanese Play Here Tuesday.
Season Closes with
Brown Game.

Providence College winds up one of its most successful baseball campaigns this week meeting the Hosei University nine from Japan, Boston College and Brown University. The last named game is the contest postponed from May 23.

The tilt with the Japanese invaders on Hendricken Field on Tuesday afternoon, may be a colorful contest. The Hosei nine won the Tokio intercollegiate baseball championship last fall by defeating Kelo University, and was chosen to tour this country to meet the leading college nines.

The Friars are well acquainted with the baseball prowess of the Far Eastern ball tossers, as the Meiji University nine of Tokio visited Hendricken Field two years ago and scored a well deserved 8 to 6 victory. On that occasion the visitors flashed a fine exhibition of America's national pastime.

The outstanding player with the Hosei nine is Wakabayashi, star pitcher and leading hitter. He was born in Hawaii and finished high school there before matriculating at Hosei in Tokio. He was one of the pitchers selected to represent Japan in the last Far Eastern Olympics, and has done the bulk of the pitching during the present tour of this country.

On Thursday, Commencement Day at the Smith Hill college, the strong Boston College nine will be the attraction. Last year the Eagles handed the Friars a one-sided setback here after the locals had scored a win at Boston. The Flynnmen collected a 7 to 6 victory over the Eagles two weeks ago, and will be on edge to duplicate the win.

The final contest of the season is booked for Friday afternoon at Aldrich Field, when Brown will be met for the second time, this game being the contest postponed from May 23 when rain frustrated attempts to play. The game Friday will necessarily begin at 4 o'clock in view of the fact that Class Day exercises are to be held at Brown that afternoon.

The pitching selections for the Friars for these games is rather uncertain, although it is more than likely that Eddie Quinton will be saved for the Brown game on Friday, with Connors and Blanche working the other two contests. Another arrangement would send Quinton against the Japanese, thereby leaving him free to either start or serve as relief in the Brown game.

Tigers Defeat Of Masters Was Week's Surprise

Princeton's unexpected victory over Pennsylvania, leader in the Eastern Intercollegiate Baseball League, and the defeat of Penn's star, Walter Masters, after eight consecutive victories on the mound, featured the last week of college baseball in the East, the next-to-final week of 1931 activity on the diamond. The Tigers, last in the league, were outhit, but Masters weakened in the pinches and lost, 7 to 6.

Though Penn still leads with five victories and one defeat, its position is not as secure as it was. The Quakers still have Cornell and Dartmouth to meet, the latter in a doubleheader. Previous to meeting Princeton, Penn conquered Columbia, 5-3. This victory gave Masters his eighth.

Tuft Still Leader

In general standing, Tufts still leads, though that team was defeated for a second time this season, Springfield administering the 4-2 defeat last Saturday. Felix Andruskiewicz, the Jumbos' hurler, undefeated up to this game, went down before the Springfield bats after he had won seven straight.

Holy Cross and Providence, other leaders in this section, were defeated also, Holy Cross by the Dominicans in the second game of their annual series, 3 to 2, and Providence, rather unexpectedly by Yale, 6-4.

Providence's victory over the Crusaders ended an eleven-game winning streak and avenged the 10-3 victory turned in by the Purple over the Dominicans the week before.

Providence now has a season's record of fifteen victories in nineteen starts to rank third; Holy Cross is fourth with fourteen victories in eighteen games. Providence has two more games to go and Holy Cross three. Tufts, in the first place, has won eleven and lost two, and Penn State jumped into second place, mathematically, with eight victories in ten starts.

Violet Leads City Teams

Among the nines in the city, N. Y. U. made the best average of the season, winning eleven and losing four for a percentage of .733 to rank sixth. Columbia is eighth with twelve triumphs in seventeen games and Fordham tenth with thirteen out of nineteen. Columbia and Fordham brought their intercollegiate seasons to an end last week, the former by losing to Penn and the latter by defeating Rutgers, 6-2.

With the defeats of Andruskiewicz and Masters, Orville Braden, Stevens Tech pitcher, has turned in the most victories, five with no defeats. Tom Neary, of St. John's, and Buck Mahoney, of Holy Cross, each have won four and lost none. The last week of competition was a jinx for other twirlers in addition to the two leaders. Lefty Haas, of Gettysburg, after winning six straight, was defeated by Dickinson, and Bill McHale, of Harvard, was downed for the second time this season when Holy Cross's batters nipped him for a 10-to-3 victory last Saturday. He has won eight.

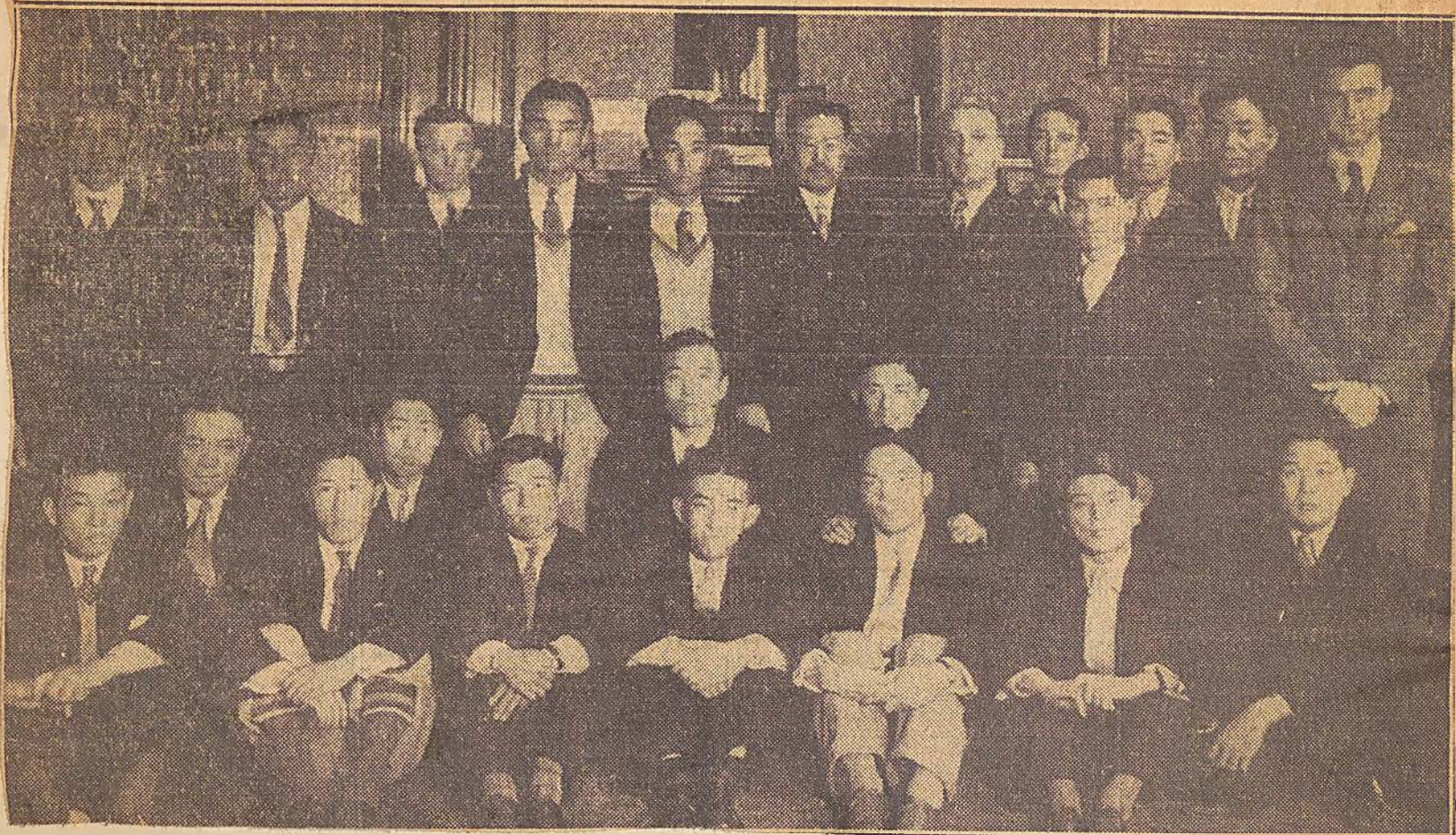

They visited City Hall, where an official welcome to the city was extended by Mayor James E. Dunne.

In addition to their baseball competitions, the Japanese visitors are making their tour of this country a real educational trip, and as a result decided to make the journey to this city even though it was apparent that the weather would not permit their playing the baseball contest with the Friars. Arriving shortly after noon, the visitors went to Providence College, and after an inspection of Harkins Hall, were taken in

charge by John E. Farrell, graduate manager of athletics, and members of the Friars Club of the college.

After lunch the visitors viewed Providence from the tower of the Industrial Trust building. They said the city was one of the most attractive they have seen in their tour of the country. The State House was visited next. It was the first Capitol building they had visited.

After witnessing a performance at a down-town theatre as the guests of the management, the players departed for Boston, where they are to meet Harvard tomorrow.

BOOTH STEALS HOME TO PUT GAME ON ICE

Fleet Albie Adds Fifth Counter for Elis in Second Frame, Enough to Win Contest

Black Jack Flynn, lawyer, big league baseball player, one time manager of New Haven's professional baseballers, and now the mentor of the Friars of Providence College, came into New Haven yesterday to see his charges suffer the fourth defeat of the season. And, prominent in the performance, was a speedy dash for home by Albie Booth to steal a run which meant the victory. The final score was Yale 6, Providence 4.

On the basis of the figures it is hard to build an Horatio Alger story around the daredevil and dazzling exhibition of "Albie" as he stole home in the second inning. Because Yale had a two-run margin at the finish it may be disputed that Booth's run meant the victory. As a matter of record Booth was the fifth man to score in the second inning and when he came home, later developments to the contrary, Yale had the game on ice.

Maybe as Booth did the stretch down the paths to score as his charges made a desperate effort to knock him off, Flynn thought of what a nice boy Albie would be for a big league organization. Playing out of position, for third is not his place, Booth did a nice job at the dizzy corner although he did peg one over Vincent's head in the seventh to advance Dion to second and from that spot the Providence third baseman eventually scored one of the two Friar's runs in that heat.

Newton and Kies divided the pitching assignment for the Elis, Newton taking over the job in the sixth and bringing Browne along with him as a battery mate to succeed Joe Maine. And, with the time on the mound about equally divided, the Bulldog hurriers had the same kind of an afternoon with each contributing a wild spot but in their entirety the two weren't enough to put Providence in.

Kies had his bad spot in the first when the Friars sent two men across the plate and it was Newton's turn in the seventh—a bad turn at that and only fine fielding pulled him out of what looked like a dark hole. Twice in that frame the bases were loaded.

The first time he had the bags fully tenanted a fine double play, Warren to Fletcher to Vincent saved him. Then he turned right around to issue a pair of passes and Old Man Trouble was right in front of him again. This time Booth provided the stop. He took a hot one off the bag, raced to the pillow for the forceout and the side retired.

Five hits in the second inning, one of them off the bat of Howie Burke, a newcomer to the Yale lineup, accounted for five runs in the frame. Burke drove in the first two of the counters with his stinging drive.

Throughout the contest Providence was threatening, with wildness on the part of Kies and Newton helping to make scoring chances and the cause of the visitors being helped further by the fine hitting of Marsella and Koslowski, the latter clouting out a pair of fine two-baggers. Warren connected with a double and a single to lead the Elis at batting, and his infield mate, Fletcher, was the spark-plug at second base. Reilly featured in the field work for the Friars.

But one more game faces the Elis outside of the championship competition with Princeton and Harvard. Brown is due here Wednesday, with the second game with Princeton in Jersey on Saturday. After that follow the two with Harvard:

Coach McCrehan of the Eagles plans to have his entire hurling staff in top form for the clash, and will probably start Ed Gallagher, southpaw, or Harry Downes, right-hander, against the locals. This pair worked the game in Boston, and although they held the Friars to a limited number of safe blows, they defeated their own cause by their wildness.

The last of the ninth, two out, the bases loaded, Providence College trailing Boston College 2 to 1! That was the story book lineup at Hendricken Field yesterday when Tom Griffin, substitute outfielder on the Friar squad, stepped to the plate and lifted a high fly over the right field fence for a home run which gave the Dominicans a 5 to 2 victory over the Eagles.

That triumph was the 17th of the present season for Providence College and their second victory of the season over Boston College.

Griffin's heroic punch climaxed a pitching duel between Harry Downes of the Eagles and Al Blanche of the Friars. Held completely in check until the final frame the Flynnmen burst forth to turn apparent defeat into victory in as smashing a finish as has ever been witnessed on Hendricken Field, the large Commencement Day crowd creating a bedlam of noise when Griffin's hit turned the tide of victory to Providence.

Downes, after pitching strongly throughout the earlier stages of the tilt, weakened under the strain as the game drew to its close, and added to his own downfall in the ninth. Marsella, who garnered two of the four safe hits made by the Smith Hillers, started the winning rally when he singled to centre. Koslowski and Perrin walked to fill the bases and sent the crowd into an uproar.

Roberge, who relieved Tebbetts with the catching when the latter was hurt in the seventh, hit hard to short and Spognardi booted the grounder, allowing Marsella to score and the bases to remain crowded with none out. Corbett rolled to second and Chesnulevich, playing close, scooped up the ball and pegged to the plate for a force play on Koslowski. Reilley popped a weak riser towards first which Meehan pulled down, all the runners holding their bases to prevent a double killing.

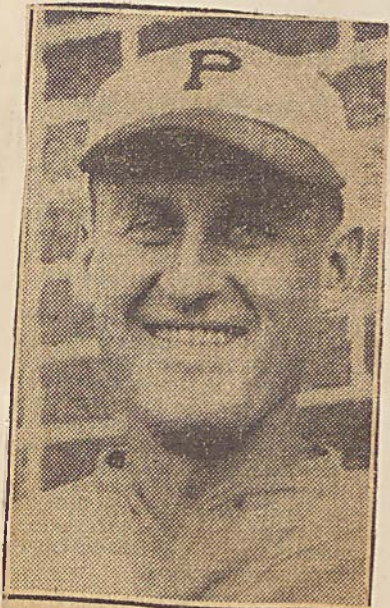

The Friars with their fine record are the favorites to win but past contests in this series have proven that pre-game predictions are worthless. Both teams usually play heads up ball and neither team is ever sure of the triumph until the last man has been retired.

Sondheim to Face Quinton

Jack Kelleher and Jack Flynn, the respective coaches of the two teams, have named their best twirlers for the pitching assignments. Kelleher is going to send Junie Sondheim to the mound for the Bears, while Flynn will use Eddie Quinton, the youth who already has three victories to his credit over the Bears.

The Friars topped off preparations for the clash yesterday with a 5 to 2 victory over Boston College. Tom Griffin, the lad who was called to the plate in the ninth inning to pinch hit and who banged out a home run to win the game may be rewarded with a starting berth in centre field. He is bracketed in the starting lineup with Koslowski and Coach Flynn was undecided last night which one he will use.

Another change in the regular lineup of the Black and White team will be in the catching department. George Tebbets, regular backstop on the squad, was injured against Boston College and will give way to Ollie Roberge. These are the only changes that have been contemplated.

The inclement weather has raised havoc with the practice sessions of the Bruins and they have been inactive since the Syracuse game on Saturday. Coach Kelleher had a few of the men out for a brief workout yesterday morning. In the afternoon many of the Bruin players went over to Hendriken Field to watch the Friars down the Eagles.

Rasmussen Returns

Harry Rasmussen, who was injured in trying to make a shoelace catch in the first game against Providence, has recovered and will be in left field for the Bears. This is the first time that he has played since the accident and his return is timely for Ollie Silvonen, who has been filling in at the berth, has had to leave for his home in New York shortly after the completion of his last examination on Monday.

Coach Kelleher is full of confidence and makes no attempt to conceal the fact that he believes his team will win.

Kelleher, who is rounding his second year on College Hill, has been unable to defeat the Friars. Victories have been scored in this time over Dartmouth, Harvard, Yale and other major opponents, but never once over the Flynn-coached nine.

In the first game in 1930 the Bears had the game practically won, but a home run by Chief Marsella turned the tide in favor of Providence. Incidentally Marsella hit another home run in the first game this season, which started the Friars on the road to another victory.

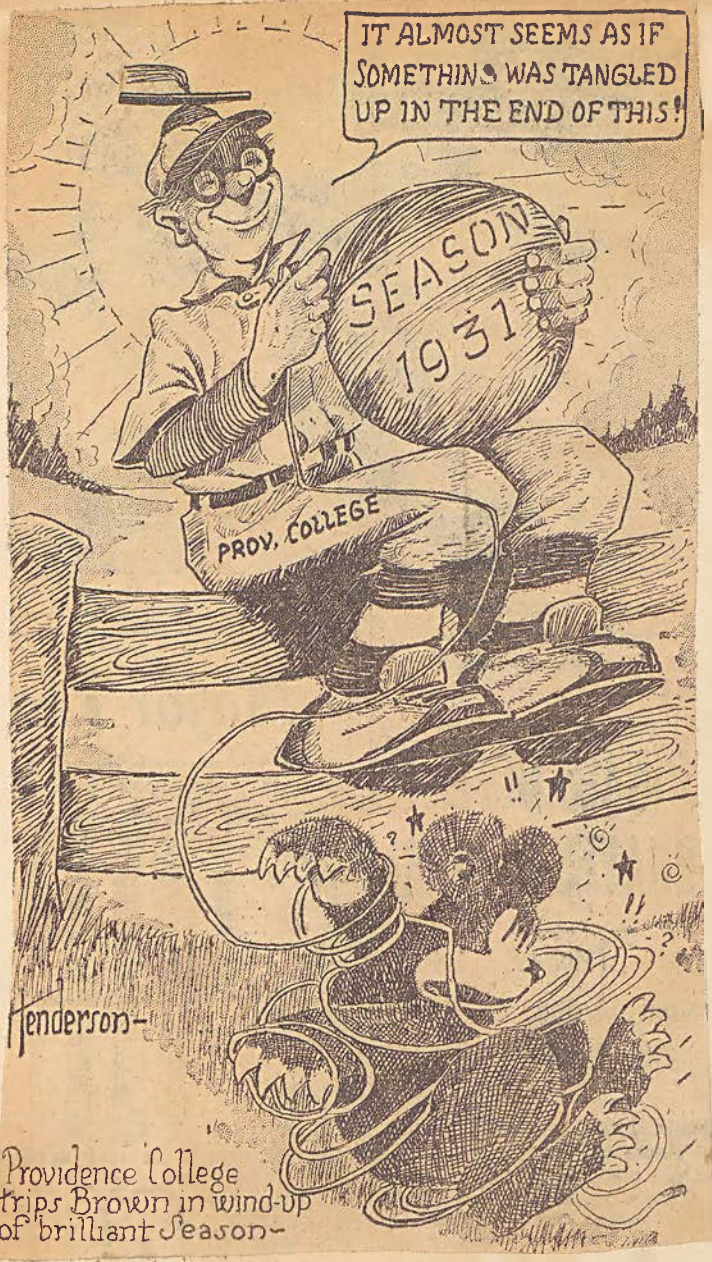
Bruins Improved

QUINTON HURLS FRIARS TO ANOTHER VICTORY OVER BRUINS

Brilliant Moundsman Gives But Three Hits; P. C. Wins 2-1

Junie Sondheim Not Far Behind
But Brown Misplays
Hurt Latter.

Behind the three-hit pitching of Eddie Quinton, brilliant right-hand twirler, the Providence College nine made a clean sweep of their two-game series with Brown yesterday at Aldrich Field by shading the Bruins 2 to 1 to chalk up their 18th triumph of the present season and their fifth straight over the Bruins in the last three spring campaigns. It was the last game of the year for the Friars.

Quinton's individual achievements in the last four of the Bruin-Friar games are noteworthy, for the Dominican's capable Sophomore hurler has been credited with the entire quartet of triumphs, both games of last year's series and both games of this year's series.

Sondheim Good, Too

Yesterday Quinton had to be good to eke out the victory for the game was close throughout and Junie Sondheim, leading light of the Bruin mound corps, was giving the Friar ace a close battle in the matter of handing out base hits. Only five were nicked off the delivery of Sondheim, but the Dominicans coupled them with misplays on the part of the Bruins to gain their brace of runs which meant the victory.

As was the case in their first tilt of the year it was Quinton's sterling mound work which was of major importance in the Providence triumph yet, similar to that first game, it was misplays on the part of the Bruins which aided their rivals' cause. Some of those Brown misplays found their way into the error column in the box score and some of them didn't.

Bucky Harris, Bruin shortstop, was guilty of one of each variety of misplay. His misjudgment and muff of Reilly's high infield fly in the second inning enabled Roberge to score from second to tie the score. Then in the eighth Harris went berserk on the base paths after receiving one of the three passes Quinton handed out during the game. The chunky short fielder stole second, then stole third to put the Bears in a dangerous scoring position.

Kittredge entered the game at this point as a pinch hitter for Rasmussen and Brown's chances seemed exceedingly brighter for Kittredge has shown before that he is an opportune hitter. Harris, however, nullified his base pilfering activities and his team's chances of tying the count by taking too long a lead off third and a snap throw, Roberge to Dion, caught him off the cushion.

Friars Start Early

Providence started right in after a victory in their first time at bat, Dion leading off in the second half of the first inning by getting one of the trio of walks Sondheim allowed. The Friar captain went to second on Sellig's sacrifice bunt and then on to third when Sondheim threw a wild pitch past Chaiklin.

Marsella came to bat and lifted a long fly to left field which Rasmussen gathered in. Dion raced home beating the throw by a wide margin as the ball rolled into Chaiklin's hands after being slightly deflected by Sondheim's glove as the Bear hurler tried to intercept the throw. To all intents and purposes Dion had scored but Chaiklin apparently knew otherwise, for he ran down to third and touched the bag for a double play as Umpire Gardella ruled Dion out for starting off the bag ahead of the catch.

With one down in the second "Red" McGinn, Brown second sacker, lifted a looping fly into right field that sailed over Marsella's head and went for a triple. Crane went out, Quinton to Perrin, but Chaiklin sent a neat single over Reilly's head to score McGinn and give Brown a 1-0 lead as the inning closed with Sondheim grounding weakly to Corbett.

The Friars lost little time evening the count after two were out in their half of the second. Roberge, third man up, drew a pass as did Corbett, who followed him to the plate. Then Reilly shot a skyscraper just back of second which Harris dropped. Roberge scored on that error and Corbett went to third, but Quinton ended the short rally by fanning.

Perrin opened the fourth for the Friars by grounding out, McGinn to Caulkins, but Roberge came through with a sharp single to right field, advanced to second on Corbett's easy roller to Sondheim and scored on Reilly's single with the run that ultimately won the ball game for the Friars. Once again Quinton ended a rally by whiffing the breezes.

Kroeger Makes Nice Catch

Sharp fielding by the Bruins and a great diving catch by Kroeger, Bruin centre gardener, held the Friars at bay in the fifth frame after Bobby Dion had started the inning with a triple to right field. Sellig followed Dion at bat and left his captain stranded on third when he dropped a short hit in front of the plate and was thrown out at first by Chaiklin. Marsella could do little better, rolling an easy grounder to Crane which he failed to beat to first.

Kosowski cracked a low drive over second which Kroeger snared after a fast sprint and a headlong dive. The game was halted at the end of the sixth due to a shower but was resumed after a 15-minute wait.

The rest had good effects on both twirlers as neither handed out a hit for the remainder of the game, although the Bruins threatened to score in both the eighth and ninth innings. Harris pulled his stealing act after two were out in the eighth and helped the Friars out of that hole when he was caught off third. "Red" Hunt replaced Rasmussen in left field in the eighth and drew a pass as the Bruins started the ninth at bat. Moulton's efforts to sacrifice him down to second on a bunt went for naught when he popped a fly into Roberge's hands. Caulkins slashed a hard grounder through the box which Quinton touched just enough to give him an assist on the double play which Reilly started by gathering in the ball just back of second to step on the keystone sack forcing out Hunt and snapping the ball to Perrin to complete the twin killing which ended the game.

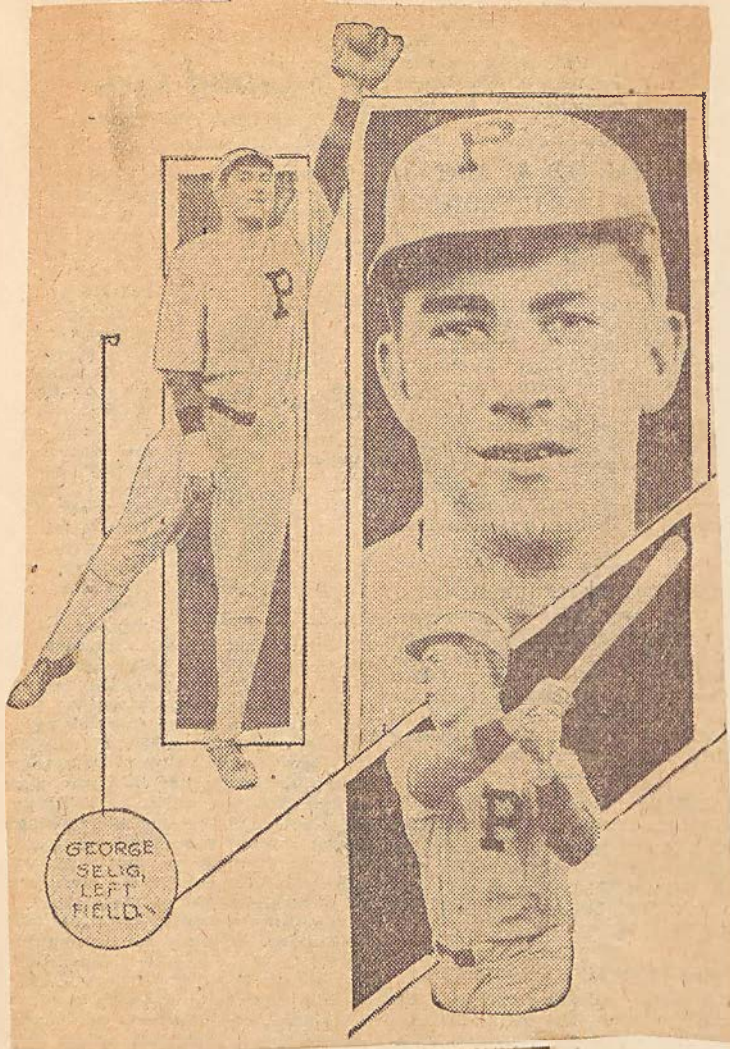

Somehow or other we just can't help sliding through another little boost for the successful methods of Jack Flynn as a college baseball coach.

Here is a man who could very easily take a professional team of willing or unwilling performers and mould a winning combination of it, thus acquiring national fame. His dynamic spirit, his ability to handle all types of athletes ranks him with the greatest college mentors the game of baseball has ever praised.

Providence College owes much of its diamond success to his teachings. He has had championship teams before, but perhaps none quite equal to the 1931 collection of ambitious baseball luminaries.

Last April when Flynn issued a call for candidates his request was answered by some 60 odd young men at the Friars school who wanted to "make" the team. He had only a couple of holdovers from the 1930 ensemble. The more work to be done, the better Jack likes his task. Freshmen and sophomores were whipped into the process and the finished product has just been crowned champions of the Eastern College world. Any time a green team steps out amongst the elite of the boardwalk and cleans up to the tune of 18 victories in 22 starts, there is something to it besides "dying for dear old Rutgers" and a headline or two for the heroes.

In the schoolboy and college field there are all sorts of baseball and football coaches, some good, others poor. Sorry to say the poor coaches predominate. The Rocknes, Warners, Haughtons, and Dobies are few and well scattered. Most anybody can win with a team of experienced, talented material. The man who produces a winner out of practically nothing deserves the grand prize and what goes with it. Jack Flynn is such a man.

Dominican Nine Earns Place Among Best Eastern Clubs

Eighteen Victories Listed in
22-Game Schedule; Major
Opponents Fall.

For the second time within four years, the Providence College baseball team has closed its season with a record which places it well within the top flight of Eastern college nines. The Friars won 18 of the 22 games they played, scoring fine victories over the outstanding nines of the East, including Holy Cross, Boston College, Brown, Syracuse, Manhattan and Springfield.

An inexperienced team which started the season with little hope of being better than average, swung into a strong early season stride, bowling over all opposition in its march for honors. Confidence in their abilities, plus the guiding genius of Jack Flynn, carried the team into its final stretch to score triumphs over many major opponents.

The record is the second best ever compiled by a Dominican team, and closely resembles that which the Black and White made through the 1928 season, when only three games of an arduous 22-game schedule were lost.

After collecting wins in the first two games this spring, the Friars tasted defeat for the first time when Manhattan scored a 5 to 2 win over them in New York. The following two weeks, however, saw the Smith Hillers run up a string of seven straight wins until they met Georgetown.

Holy Cross gave the Friars their third defeat of the season, and incidentally the worst setback of the four meted out, but the Flynnmen evened the score here a week later when Eddie Quinton scored his 13th victory in two seasons, annexing a 3 to 2 victory over the Crusaders to snap an 11 game winning streak they had compiled.

Yale, with one of the best teams in its history, caught the Friars at the end of a strenuous week, and collected a 6 to 4 win, the fourth defeat of the campaign for the Dominicans. Earlier in that week the Friars had downed Holy Cross and Syracuse. The win over Brown, the second of the season, gave the Smith Hillers the city title once a gain, and climaxed the brilliant campaign.

With the entire first team, and practically all the substitutes returning next year, Coach Jack Flynn has a nucleus for another formidable aggregation. The only players lost from the squad were John Notte, sub infielder, and John Krieger, sub outfielder.

College Nines In East Topped By Providence

Rhode Islanders End Baseball With a Record of 18 Victories and 4 Defeats

Providence College, with a record of eighteen victories and four defeats for an average of .818, led the major colleges in the East as the intercollegiate diamond season ended three months of activity last week. Only one more game is listed, that between Harvard and Yale on Tuesday.

The Dominicans, for the last few years well up among the leaders annually, were defeated by only Yale, Holy Cross, Georgetown and Manhattan, but they later defeated the Crusaders and the Jaspers in second games. Holy Cross, which topped the field last year, is in second place among the teams which engaged in arduous schedules, though Penn State and Stevens Tech, both playing minor opponents, top the Crusaders' mark.

Penn. in addition to winning the Eastern Intercollegiate League title, captured third place in the standings with seventeen victories and six defeats. Holy Cross won sixteen out of twenty-one. In the major event of the week just passed, Yale defeated Princeton, 13 to 6, on Saturday, to win that series and is still to meet Harvard for the play-off of the Big Three championship.

Among the pitchers, Orville Braden, of Stevens Tech, and Buck Mahoney, of Holy Cross, lead with five victories and no defeats, but the real leaders are Walter Masters, of Penn., and Norman Sims, of Holy Cross, each having won nine and lost one. Both men ended their college pitching activities this year.

In the metropolitan area, N. Y. U. turned in the best general record, winning eleven and losing four, but Columbia took the mythical metropolitan championship by winning three of the four intra-city games it played, with the Violet second. The Lions, in their general record, won twelve out of seventeen; Fordham won thirteen and lost six; Manhattan and St. John's both won eleven and lost six, while C. C. Y. took seven out of eighteen.

Friars Are Eastern Champs with 18 Wins in 22 Starts

Jack Flynn's Smith Hillers Nose
Out Holy Cross for Col-
lege Baseball Title.

The completion of collegiate baseball activities for the season bring the brilliant Providence College nine to the fore as the outstanding college team of the East and for the first time in their short athletic history gives the Friars undisputed claim to the college championships.

The Smith Hillers won 18 of their 22 games to lead the East, with Holy Cross second among the colleges which engaged in heavy schedules with a record of 16 victories out of 21 games.

The fine general play of the Friars during the past campaign was similar to that of the strong aggregation of 1928 which compiled the finest mark ever hung up in winning 19 out of 22 to tie Holy Cross for the eastern title.

During the past spring the Friars managed to hold a top place among the colleges, trailing Holy Cross and Tufts for several weeks. A victory over the Crusaders, sent the locals into second place two weeks prior to the close of the campaign, and when Tufts, which led the parade for most of the season, bowed to Boston College and Harvard in the final week, while the Friars were downing Boston and Brown, the Flynnmen moved into first place.

Flynn's Great Record

The brilliant work of the Smith Hillers brings to the forefront once again the master generalship of Jack Flynn whose guiding hand has been at the helm of the Friar nines for the past seven years with the exception of the 1926 season when he turned to professional baseball as a manager. This year, starting the season with mediocre talent, Flynn moulded together a nine which attracted wide attention by its smoothness of play, and which pounded through to lead all the college outfits.

Flynn's record on Smith Hill is probably without parallel in the country as his teams have turned in no less than 107 victories out of 153 starts in six seasons of competition. This record is all the more outstanding when it is realized that the local lawyer and baseball authority has developed the majority of his teams from seemingly mediocre players.

Develops Pitchers

Although a catcher and a first baseman in his younger days, and a star at both these positions as a major leaguer, Flynn has shown an uncanny ability to develop young pitchers, and his success along this line has had no little to do with the fine records that the Friar nines have made in recent years. Under his direction such clever college performers as Charlie Reynolds, Joe Whalen, Hal Bradley, Leo Smith, Tom McElroy, Ed Wineapple and Artie Quirk have flashed to the front. This year, Flynn, with two aces from last year in Eddie Quinton and Dan Connors, uncovered another brilliant moundsman in Al Blanche, who aspired for the first base job at the start of the season.

◆ a fine defensive infield, proved the factors which enabled the Dominicans to continue their winning ways.

One of the main cogs in the Providence array was Oscar Perrin, lanky Albany youngster, who handled the first-base work. Perrin faced a big task in filling the shoes of Joe Duffy, all college first sacker of last year's nine, but came through in flying colors, and under the tutelage of Coach Flynn promises to develop into one of the premier first sackers in college ranks. Perrin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Perrin of 962 Madison avenue.

Ranked as the best college nine as the result of its work this year, the Friars face an even brighter prospect for next spring, as the entire squad, with three exceptions will be backed for further competition. None of the regulars were lost by graduation, and as a result Jack Flynn looks to the future with an optimistic eye.

DR. MARVEL AND J. E. FARRELL HONORED AT SPORTS MEETING

The sponsoring of a winter track meet closed to members of the New England colleges, to be held in the Boston Garden on Feb. 20, by the University Club of Boston, was one of the proposals made at the annual meeting of the Association of New England Colleges for Conference on Athletics at the Engineers' Club in Boston yesterday afternoon. R. G. Sykes, a graduate of Brown and chairman of the University Club of Boston committee on sports, made the proposal, and it met with enough approval to indicate that the prospect for a meet is bright.

If the meet does go through it will be one of the very unique turns in sport in this part of the country, for hitherto graduates of colleges have shown relatively little interest in the actual promotion of sports projects. Major indoor track meets have largely been under the sponsorship of clubs, lodges, the American Legion and fraternal or college organizations, but there is nothing on the surface to prevent the alumni of colleges from putting on a meet that should rank high in the long list that have been held in Boston.

Although Brown was without representation at the annual meeting which was held yesterday afternoon and evening, Dr. Frederick W. Marvel, Director of Athletics at Brown, was elected president of the association, moving up from vice president to succeed Prof. L. S. Corbett of the University of Maine, whose term expired.

FARRELL APPOINTED- COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

John E. Farrell, Graduate Manager of Athletics at Providence College, and a member of the Soccer Committee of the association for the past two years, was elevated to the chairmanship of his committee, his associates for the new term being G. W. Messer of Williams and A. W. Marsh of Amherst. Fred Tootell, track coach at Rhode Island, represented his institution. Farrell read the annual report of his committee yesterday.

One of the most interesting developments in the meeting, was the noticeable trend toward clearing houses and certified lists in officials in all college sports. The idea that has been successfully carried out in college basketball, where certified lists of A and B groups have been drafted with the co-operation of the colleges, and which are backed by a board which can act as a clearing house, is eventually to be carried into soccer, hockey, lacrosse, baseball and other sports, track being about the only sport in which the idea is not practical. The age of incompetence in officiating is pretty much a thing of the past, and men who have a definite stamp of approval by college officials who have studied their qualifications and watched their work will probably be the vogue in all sports before many more months have passed.

SULLIVAN TO LEAD FRIAR TENNIS TEAM

Nine Matches Scheduled.—31
Candidates Report at
Opening Meeting.

Tennis was officially inaugurated at Providence College yesterday afternoon with the announcement of a schedule of nine intercollegiate matches to be played this spring, and the appointment of Allyn F. Sullivan, '32, of this city, as captain of the 'Varsity team, and of William J. Keenan, '31, of Edgewood, as manager. Sullivan was winner of the interclass tournament conducted at the college last year, and is undoubtedly the outstanding court performer at the college.

The schedule as announced last night is featured by matches with Brown, Holy Cross, Springfield, Tufts, Wesleyan and Boston College. The match with Brown at the Thayer street courts on April 25 will open the season, and incidentally will mark the Dominicans' entrance into the collegiate tennis world.

Three matches are to be played at home, and the remainder on foreign courts. The home matches will in all probability be contested at Roger Williams Park as playing facilities are not yet available on the Smith Hill campus. The home opponents will be Springfield on May 2, Tufts on May 8, and Connecticut State on May 20.

The appointment of Allyn Sullivan as captain of the team this season was accorded favorable comment throughout the college yesterday, as he is one of the most capable racquet wielders in the city. Sullivan is a graduate of La Salle, where he captained the tennis team his Senior year. He was city junior champion in 1926 and 1927 and semi-finalist in the men's tourney in 1929 and 1930. He was also runner-up in the New England junior championships three years ago. William Keenan, appointed manager of the team, is a graduate of La Salle, and has been one of the most prominent students at the college since his matriculation four years ago.

Thirty-one men answered the initial call. Included in the group reporting were many former high school performers of this State. Alves of Taunton high, and Barrette of Durfee high, finalist in the Fall River city tournament.

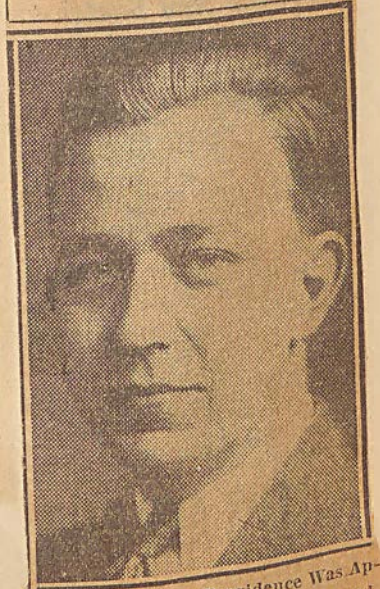

PROVIDENCE COLLEGE TO ADD 1930 TENNIS TO LIST OF SPORTS



Sufficient Interest in Court Game Believed to Exist Among Students; Schedule Planned for Next Year

Providence College will add tennis to its list of sports next spring. According to Graduate Manager John E. Farrell, the net sport will take a place on the Dominican list of sports next spring and plans call for the completion of a schedule that will send the black and white out against representative college teams in New England and neighboring sections.

Adding tennis to the list of sports at the Smith Hill institution will bring the list to four—football, baseball and basketball being the present sports on the roster. According to Graduate Manager Farrell, interest in the net sport has been on the increase for some years and the students who favored the court game were given a proposition a year ago that has been completely fulfilled.

Farrell told the tennis enthusiasts that Providence College stood ready to recognize their efforts when they could show an interest in tennis in the undergraduate body that would justify the move. Now, months since that statement, the students have organized and carried to completion an intramural tennis tournament, the results of which clearly indicate that there is enough enthusiasm in the college to merit a move to an organized sport.

MATCH WITH BROWN

TEAMS EXPECTED

According to Dr. Frederick W. Marvel, Brown athletic director, Brown University will do all it can in aiding the Dominican institution to make good its venture into intercollegiate tennis and it seems more than likely that the Bruin will give the Smith Hill team a date on the 1931 schedule.

The move to add the sport at Providence College will be hailed with enthusiasm by the host of net enthusiasts hereabouts, for the sport has been on the upward swing for some years. This is one of the major moves to be noted in the past decade so far as development of the game in this city goes. Athletic officials, far and wide, have followed the trends of the times by noting an increase in the interest in sports, activity in which may be followed after graduation, and tennis takes rank with golf as a leader in that respect.

It is interesting to note that the expansion of the sports program at Providence College has been slow and along well organized lines, the present schedule permitting but one sport each season. Hockey was tried for a year, but it proved unsatisfactory for several reasons, some of the factors contributing to its downfall being outside the control of the college authorities, and it was eventually dropped.

While the Dominican authorities are unwilling to forecast with any degree of certainty the trends of the times in the expansion program, it will not be

surprising to find soccer finding a niche for itself in the future development of sports there.

Track, one of the natural additions according to the experience of older colleges, is not likely to find its place for some years, unless considerable interest among the students is uncovered. The authorities have no intention of adding sports faster than condition of the checker permits, and no one has yet found a way to maintain a worthwhile track and field team without considerable expense.

Announcements carrying the complete details of the plans for the third annual Narragansett Bay tennis championships, which will be held at the Conanicut Country Club from July 28th to Aug. 2nd, are in the mails. Chief among the notations that are being listed by the Conanicut committee, aside from the run of details on the tournaments, is the word that Mr. William Williams of Newport will be in the referee's stand, his selection insuring the tournaments of capable officiating in every particular.

The Junior tourney, which runs from July 28th to Aug. 2nd (for players whose 18th birthday comes after Jan. 1st, 1930), will start with the junior singles on Monday, July 28th, at 9:30 a. m., and the junior doubles starting Monday afternoon at 2 p. m. The junior girls' singles will begin Tuesday, July 29th, at 9:30 a. m., and the junior girls' doubles will begin Wednesday, July 30th, at 9 p. m.

The senior tournament will run from Aug. 4 to 9, with the men's singles starting Monday, Aug. 4, at 9:30 a. m., and the men's doubles starting Monday, Aug. 4, at 2 p. m. The women's singles will start on Tuesday, Aug. 5, at 9:30 a. m., and the women's doubles will start on Tuesday, Aug. 5, at 2 p. m.

The prizes up for competition include the Conanicut cups donated in 1928 by Charles M. McCloud of Philadelphia, and which must be won three years for permanent possession. The men's singles cup was won by G. Huntington Hartford of Newport in 1928, and by Albert Horton, 3rd, of Providence, in 1929.
