FRIARS ANNOUNCE BASKETBALL CARD

Providence College 'Varsity
to Play 22 Contests
This Season.

A schedule of 22 'Varsity hasketball games, the most pretentious to be attempted by a Providence College team in five years, was announced this morning by John & Farrell, graduate manager of athletics at the local college. This list calls for eight home games, including feature contests with Harvard, Holy Cross, Springfield, St. John's of, Brooklyn, and Rhode Island State.

Four of the home games will be played at the R. I. Auditorium, with Harvard as the opponent there on December 11, the season's opener, followed by Holy Cross on January 12. St. John's, arch rivals of the Friars in sports, on January 19, and the first of the Rhode Island State series on February 9. The return game with Rhode Island is listed for Kingston on February 28.

All in the all the schedule will present Coach Al McClellan with the stiffest assignments he has faced since his star team of McCue. Krieger, Wineapple, Wheeler, and Szydla won sectional honors in 1928 With almost the entire team of last year almost the entire team of last year scholastic difficulties, the veteran Friar mentor faces a tremendous task of rebuilding.

Faced with Harvard and Yale in the opening week. McClellan will probably start his drills earlier this fall, and in all probability will depend a great deal on his Sophomore group which comes up to the 'Varsity fold with a record of being undefeated in 19 Freshman games. All of the Freshman squad is back in college and although many of them are now members of the 'Varsity football forces, they should be in top condition to swing into basketball late in November.

Captain Bill Kutneski, who is at present busy leading the gridders, also will be the outstanding veteran back for basketball. He alone survives of last year's star team which lost Bracken. Koslowski. Reilly and Roberge through graduation and Shapiro by scholastic failure. Other experienced men whom McClellan will count upon in forming this year's team are Jim Bostick, clever Senior from Hoboken; Abe Feit, football centre; John Madden, cocaptain of baseball, all lettermen, and Pat Morrison, who saw service as a guard last winter.



Crimson's Court Outlook Very Promising

Providence College, which comes to New York later this season to tangle with St. John's and C. C. N. Y., serves as a testing block for two of the Eastern League entrants tonight and tomorrow. This evening, the Friars play host to Harvard. Tomorrow they oppose Yale in New Haven.

Both contests will be watched with interest. Harvard has given evidence of possessing more court strength than it boasted last year, with one-sided victories over Boston U. and M. I. T. to its credit. Yale, a pre-scason league favorite, was a disappointment in dropping its opener to the University Club of Stamford.

Al McClellan's outfit figures to make the tests severe for both the Cantabs and the Elis. He has three sophomores in his first-team lineup, but those sophs were all members of a freshman team last Winter which won nineteen straight victories without suffering a single loss. McClellan's record of 97 victories in seven years at Providence speaks well for the Friars, too.

Captain Bill Kunetski, guard, and Al Hastrom, forward, are the only veterans in the Providence lineup. Al's running mate is Joe Carew. Abe Feit plays guard with Kunetski, and John Smith, a big, aggressive youngster, handles the pivot assignment for the Priars.

CRIMSON TOUGH FOE

Harvard is nobody's setup this year. Wesley Fesler, of Ohio State fame, appears due to come into his own as a college basketball coach with this present Harvard hookup. Witness the way the Johns have performed in their two tills thus far, rumping over Boston University, 40-26, and hammering a good M. I. T. quintet, 45-12.

Tonight's game will be Harvard's final test before the Crimson begins its Eastern Intercollegiate League campaign in a game with Penn at Philadelphia. It's no secret that Harvard has rosy visions of copping that league crown this season and also of winning the New England title. To get the latter honor the Crimson will have to dispose of the Friars.

Last year the Friars stepped out to a 25-18 win over Harvard. Times have changed, though, and the Friar team tonight will present a far different front from the outfit that took the measure of the Crimson last year.

Last June's graduation, together with withdrawals from college, resulted in one of the heaviest elices the Friars have ever suffered in the matter of basketball talent. Of last year's crack combine, Capt Bill Kutniewski, regular guard, and Abe Feit, reserve guard last season will be the only players with 'variety experience taking the floor at the opening whistle tonight.

THREE SOPHS TO START

Sophomores will fill both forward positions and the important centre post on the Friar combine. FRIAR QUINTET BEATS HARVARD 45-21 AT ARENA

Carew, Hagstrom, Kutneski Lead Attack: Bryant-Stratton Wins Prelim.

The Providence College basketball team, composed mainly of Sophomores, won an impressive 45-21 victory over Harvard last night at the R. I. Auditorium in the opening game of the season for the Friars. The Friars presented a smooth working guintet which moved through the Harvard defence with precision and capitalized upon every Crimson misplay.

The Friars took the lead after a minute and a half of play and were never in danger of losing it thereafter. Despite a frantic attempt on the part of the visitors in the secend half to close the wide margin between the scores the Friar second team subbing for the regulars in the final minutes, continued a steady game and stopped the Harvard threat.

Wildness upon the part of the visitors in passing and basketshooting spoiled many chances to score. Harvard broke away up the floor again and again only to fail to score under the basket on poor timing.

Joe Carew opened the scoring when he sent Providence a basket ahead after one minute and a half of action. Capt. Providence College's crack basketball team, headed for New England championship honors, found Springfield College too high a hurdle to leap yesterday afternoon and fell, 35 to 30, in a thrilling contest. A crowd of 1200 that packed Pratt Gymnasium thrilled to the game and saw an embattled, determined Maroon quintet rally twice in a final, exiting second half to overtake the Friars and win, with the issue always close.

In the last three minutes of play and with the score at a deadlock, 29 points all, George Cella and Dick Hebard tossed in timely doubledeckers while Frovidence could make only a foul shot, and clinch the hardfought issue

A powerful Providence quintet found itself outplayed nearly three quarters of the way of the first half and it wasn't until near the end of the period that the Friars gave any show of the strength that has carried them to victories over most of the New Eugland colleges with the exception of Yale.

Then Gen. Al McClellan's charges found themselves. Faced with an eight-point deficit, the visitors put on pressure and speed. The result was an avalanche of points that enabled them to leave the floor with a margin of three points, 18 to 15, and convince most of the large crowd that the game was to be another romp for Providence, which had beaten Springfield on a Rhode Island floor earlier in the season.

The belief was quickly strengthened when the second half started for Capt. Bill Kutniewski, an able guard and captain of the Providence quintet, one of the smoothest players in New England, incidentally, tossed in a double decker and Smith, a rangy center followed suit, to give Providence its longest working margin of the contest, a seven-point lead.

But it was at this point that a determined Springfield team started to play baskeball. The Maroon put on a brilliant rally with Cella, Roy Nuttall, a Westfield boy, and Hebard heading it. They quickly rang in the seven points to deadlock the issue at 22 points.

The tie remained only a minute, however, when the dangerous Kutniewski made one of the prettiest baskets of the game, a one-handed shot off balance. He got the ball from Smith who had intercepted a Springfield pass.





The game is the second of the season between the two rivals, with the Friars having eked out a 37 to 25 victory over the Hilltoppers last Saturday at Providence.

Chalking up a 41 to 25 triumphrover American International Wednesday night at Springfield, knotted the Bluejoys' record for the season at six wins and six defeats. A victory tomorrow night over the vaunted Friar contingent would enable the Anselmians to conclude their initial college campaign in a blaze of glory.

The basketball destinies of Providence are invested in Coach Albert McClellan of Swampscott, Mass., one of the best basketball authorities in the East, During his college athletic career he starred in sports at Mt. St. Joseph's college in Baltimore, but left before his senior year to join the Baltimore International league baseball team as a twirler. He later played in the Eastern league and for one season was a member of the Washington Senators. However, his baseball career was cut short as the result of an arm injury sustained while playing professional basketball.

After turning out county high school champions for four years at Salem, Mass., High, McClellan accepted the coaching post at St. John's prep in Danvers where his team won New England Prep school honors for two seasons and competed in Eastern Prep tournaments for sectional honors, In 1927 he came to Providence college to handle the varsity and freshman teams.

Winner Also May Claim City College Court Crown

Two titles will be at stake when the Brown and Providence College basketball teams meet in their annual game at Brown gymnasium Wednesday night. Besides the usual city college championship for which they strive, the Rhode Island college crown also will be at stake.

Both have scored two victories over Rhode Island State College and the winner of their contest will have clear claim to the championship. Considerable interest is being shown in the game and a record crowd is expected to attend.

Brown athletic officials are making plans to seat 2000. The game will be played on the centre court of the

Providence will enter the game a slight favorite but a Brown triumph will not be regarded as an upset. Because of Brown's strength this year and the excellent records compiled by each team, the game should be productive of good basketball. It would not be surprising if the game is a replica of the Brown-State battle and not be decided until the final minutes of play.

Providence has played stronger teams and has more experienced players and in the final analysis this may swing the result in its favor. But the Friars oppose an inspired group of Bears who have not won a game in this series since its inception in 1928 and who will hurl the full fury of their powerful offensive against the Dominicans.

Defensively, the Friars are stronger. They have employed a three-man attack all season, leaving two players in the back court to take care of defensive emergencies. On the other hand, the Bears play a fast breaking four-man attack with only one guard in the back court. This has accounted for the high scores Brown foes have compiled this season. Coach Arthur Kahler of the Bears, however, said a few weeks back that he may change his team's defence for Providence.

Some of the best college basketball players in New England will compete in this game. On the other hand, there is some trepidation in the Dominican camp that the team may have passed its peak. Dominicans Stage Fast Attack in 2nd Half to Win 63-43

Bruins Trail 26-25 at Half: Overflow Crowd of 3000 Sees Game.

Acquiring power as the game progressed, the Providence College basketball team defeated Brown 63 to 43 at the Brown gymnasium last night before an overflow crowd of 3000 to annex the city and State college championships. The Friar Freshmen won the preliminary, 51 to 29, over the Brown yearlings.

The 'Varsity game was closely fought during the first half. The Bears trailed by only one point, 26 to 25, at the halfway mark, but it was a walkaway for the Dominicans in the second part of the game. The Friars put on a superlative performance in the second half and clearly manifested their superiority.

Brown made an excellent bid for victory, but was unable to maintain its early fast pace over the route. The Bears played winning basketball, but they were opposed by a team which showed few weaknesses.

Capt. Bill Kutneski of the Friars played an excellent game while bringing his college basketball career to a close, leading his team's attack with 15 points. Providence's victory, however, can be traced to the excellent defensive play of Ben Smith and Leo Davin, who used their height to good advantage in breaking up Brown plays.

Smith also contributed 12 points towards the Providence cause and he was the only one who played the entire 40 minutes. Coach Al Mc-Ciellan of the Friars saved Davin for the psychological time. Davin was the one player who could steady his teammates when the Bears were attacking at their strongest and it was upon these occasions that he was sent into the fray.

Ray Noonan was by far Brown's best performer. It was his excellent shooting during the first half that enabled the Bears to stay with the Friars. Most of his shots came on long toms and one of his baskets was scored from nearly the middle of the floor. Ken Kennedy, Brown's scoring ace, was well guarded by the Friars, being held to two baskets for the lowest number of points he has made this season.

At this point Noonan sank a beautiful shot from out near the center circle and the Bruins were out ahead again. All told the two teams were tied six times during the initial twenty min utes, but the half ended with Providence enjoying a one point lead at 26-25.

Soon after the resumption of hostilities Floren put his team out ahead for the last time at 31-30. Several minutes of scoreless though action packed ball resulted before the Friars finally came to life and began to open up their final margin. A flurry of scores by Belliveau and Carew stuck the victors in the van by eight points before Samdperil counted. The Providence reserve strength was beginning to tell on the Brunonians about this time and there was no denying the Friars' victory march.

Fittingly Captain Howie Floren caged the final Brown basket to end his college career and a very successful Brown season. Throughout the game Floren played consistently good ball and tallied a total of 13 points. However it would be very unfair to single out any one member of the team for special praise for every one of the starting five were equally good. Although held to only two baskets all evening Ken Kennedy did good floor work and little Ray Noonan enjoyed a very good night with his fifteen point total. Harrisson Van Aken was called upon to clear the backboard most of the time because of his superior height. For the most part the Brown team was sadly outclassed by the Friars in the matter of height and this had a noticeable effect on the play. Bill Karaban and Nate Samdperil, also playing their final games, turned in some fine guarding and contributed several points toward the losing cause.

SMITH ELECTED FRIAR CAPTAIN

Sophomore Played Brilliant Basketball During Past

Season.

John "Ben" Smith, centre of the Providence College basketball team and a candidate for all-New England honors, was unanimously elected captain of the 1935-36 court quintet at a meeting of lettermen today. Rated as one of the most spectacular players to appear on a New England college team this year, Smith combines speed and accuracy in passing with six feet two inches of height and 190 pounds weight.

Last year Smith was regular centre of the Friar Freshman team which played 19 games without a defeat. He has been a reserve tackle on the Freshman and Varsity football elevens during the past two seasons. In baseball he was centre fielder of Jack Flynn's Freshman outfit. However he stands out as an ace in

basketball.

This may be due to the fact that Brockton, his home town, is a centre of basketball fever. The court sport holds the Shoe City in a tight grip and Smith seems to be inspired by this fever. He did not compete for any high school team for his school-boy days were spent at work in his spare hours.

But he found time to play for several of the amateur teams in Blockton and there gained a wealth of experience under the keenest sort of competition. It is no wonder that he exhibits a pace which would tire the ordinary college athlete. During the Brown game, which closed the Friars' season, Smith was here, there and everywhere, so that his number of assists would total high if the game had been scored as hockey and baseball are!

Like Charlie Burdge. Warren giant, Smith received his first taste of scholastic sport in a Friar uniform. He is a competitor in three sports and if he shows as much improvement in baseball and football as he did this year on the court he will be one of the most valuable athletes at the college, His selection as basketball captain is expected to meet with approval both on and off the campus, as student and fan alike have been impressed by his whole-hearted contribution to the Friara' success.

Going along the graduation trail with Kutneski are Jim Bostick and Jim Feit. That removes the entire. first-string goard department, since Bostick and Feit alternated in one guard positions with Kutneski doing full time in the other. But any woes the Friars may feel at these losses can quickly be dispelled by a glance at the material that will be available o all the vacancies.

For those guard positions Coach Al. "General" McClellan can put his hands on wiry Eay Belliveau and hig Leo Davin, the cruck reserve per-formers in this season's squad. If you watched those two bandle their jobs in last Wednesday night's game with Brown, you'll understand just how handy they'll come in next season. Despite the fact that they were in reserve roles, they did just about as much as any of the regulars to win that one.

Belliveau can operate both at guard and at forward, but because of the over-supply of forwards McClelisn will have next year, he'll probably be spotted in a guard role. And, at the same time, there'll be a couple of reliable guards coming up from the Freshman team in the perthe sharpshooting Bill Spinnler.

TWO CRACK CENTRES

It's at centre that the big problem of finding room enough to take care of the material will come. With the efficient Captain-elect Ben Smith good for two more years of 'varsity play, there'll come up from the Freshman team another crack pivotman, who should be able to do wonders with 'varsity exeprience. He's Ed Bobinski, a lad who played a huge part in the yearling's winning campaign.

Right now it's a question among many fans as to which is the better player. Bobinski or Smith. And that's not taking any credit away And from Smith, who after a steady improvement all season finished the campaign as one of the greatest pivot-men the Friars have ever had. But Bobinski was unusually good for a yearling. He perhaps lacks some of the Smith finesse in play-making, but hasn't a peer in the entire squad in the matter of dribbling. Anv coach would consider himself fortunate with either Smith or Bobinski under his wing, but the unfortunate part of having two such performers is that you can play only one centre at a time.

The same situation to some degree will exist at the forwards. This year's aces, Joe Carew and Al Hagatrom, will both be back. And the Freshman team will send up two charlie Kelley, both apparently ready to step into anyone's 'varsity and make good. The regular pair will have to step at tops to hold their jobs against these graduates from the yearling ranks.

CAN FACE TOUGH SCHEDULE

With that kind of material at hand, Graduate Manager Johany Farrell of the Friars can go right out and arrange for the Friars as tough a schedule as he can find, with high hopes that the Dominicans will come through it successfully. Local fams are hoping that some of the classy New York teams can come here to meet the Friars. On that basis, the Friars should be able to offer invaders from New York some very attractive guarantees.


Four members of the 1933-'34 All-New England college basketball team, selected each year by the coaches for the Transcript, were eligible this season to retain their places on the all-star team, but now that the balloting is over we find that two of last year's leading players have fallen by the wayside. The same is also true of two of the three second team players who competed again the past winter, so there are many newcomers to the top ranks.

Last year the players selected by the coaches were Louis Bush of Mass. State and John Martens of Trinity, forwards: Jack Francis Martin of R. I. State, center, and Johnny Grinnell of Tufts and Nick Holmes of Williams, guards. Bush was the one that was graduated, while Martens and Holmes, in the opinion of the coaches, did not warrant repeating this season, Martens, however, did figure prominently in another highly successful season for Trinity, although it was not quite so good as the past two years. In Holmes's case the fact that Coach Charley Caldwell shifted him around, trying to locate a workable group, undoubtedly militated against his chances. Eventually the Purple achieved a triple tie for the "Little Three" crown, so that was some reward, anyway.

As a freshman at Brown he injured his knee and did not play, and he was then forced to withdraw from college because of finances. He came back this year and forthwith stepped into a varisty borth and the 235 points he has tallied exemplify best his work. He is a quiet, retiring youth who believes in letting his play talk for itself. Only twice in his career has he been forced from the game on fouls. Incidentally, if a coach had Grinnell, Martin and Kennedy on the same team there would be little need to worry about losing them on personals.

Kutneski a High Scorer, Too

It is very evident that this all-star team would lack nothing in scoring. It might be well first to announce the other two players. They are William Kutneski, captain of the Providence five, who pairs with Grinnell in the rear court, and Leo Connerton, leader of St. Anselm's first college quintet, who joins Martin as forward. Their selection gives the team a decided Rhode Island tinge, for Kutneski's home is in Providence, too, while Connerton halls from Martin's home town, Newport. Connerton graduated from De Le Salle High, where he played basketball four years and gained all-state honors and then matriculated at St. Anselm's Prep. He continued his education at the Manchester Institute when it became a college, playing quarterback on the eleven and then captaining the freshman basketball team. This past spason, with the first varsity quintet, he scored 174 points in twelve games against some of the leading teams of the section. That he was able to score 22 points against Dartmouth, 21 against Previdence and 19 against New Hampshire is enough backing for the coaches' choice.

All four of the players already discussed led their teams in scoring and the same is also true of Kutneski. The brilliant Dominican guard, who also played a leading role at the same position on the football team for four years, tallied 175 points. In addition to playing a stellar game defensively, Kutneski more than did his share offensively, outscoring some of his more prominent opponents. He is also one of the most popular undergraduates at the college,

holding the office of vice president of the senior class.

In addition, to Kennedy, the leading centers of the section were John Cory of Amherst. Ben Smith of Providence, both sophomores, and Bill Davis of Maks. State. To Coey went the honor of second team pivot after an exceedingly close ballot. His mates on the second team are Howard Floren, Brown captain from Brockton, and Louis Athanas of Lowell Textile, who gained a similar honor last year, forwards; with Kenneth Morris of Springfield and Curtis Funston of New Hampshire, guards. The odd thing about the rear court players is that both are seniors who were inactive last year. Funston gave up the sport for track, while Morris was injured and underwent su operation.

To be perfectly frank we were uncertain whether the three-sport athlete would achieve the distinction again. He was shifted to guard this year, after doing duty in former seasons at forward and center. At times it was questionable whether the Jumbos, who played an inconsistent game throughout most of the season, were handicapping themselves by placing such an excellent scorer in the rear court and placing on his shoulders the burden of feeder. That he led all the guards in votes received is proof that the coaches realized the work he was doing. In addition Grinnell, whose end play and signal calling were so prominent in the undefeated football season of last fall and who will earn his ninth letter this spring on the diamond, turned in his best performances away from home. Now we write the closing page on his co..ege basketball career, during which he gained the second team as a sophomore and the first group as a junior and senior. That's a fitting tribute to one of the best performers to ever represent a Greater Boston institution.

Kennedy Best Sophomore

A year ago Martin was placed at center on the all-star team, the position he played, although he lacked the height necessary for a capable jumper, but this past season there were several exceedingly good pivot men, strong in every department of the game, so it is not surprising that all of Martin's votes were either for forward or guard. If Coach Frank Keaney could have kept him at forward, or if he had not been injured, his point total would have exceeded the 212 points that he made. The year previous he rang up 210, which would make him a good man on any team.

Martin a junior now, is an alumnus of Rogers High of Newport, R. I. He is one of the best natured players in college ranks today, on who can easily uphold his own in any repartee. In every game he is a marked man, but leads the Rams to victory. Exceedingly fast, he is dangerous as a scorer from any position on the floor and seidom does he total less than ten points. The high mark was thirty against Brown, He is also a letterman in baseball, his speed of foot making him an ideal centerfielder.
