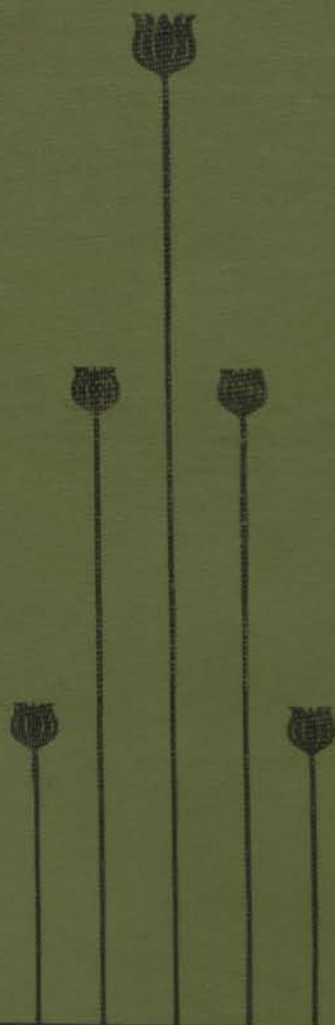
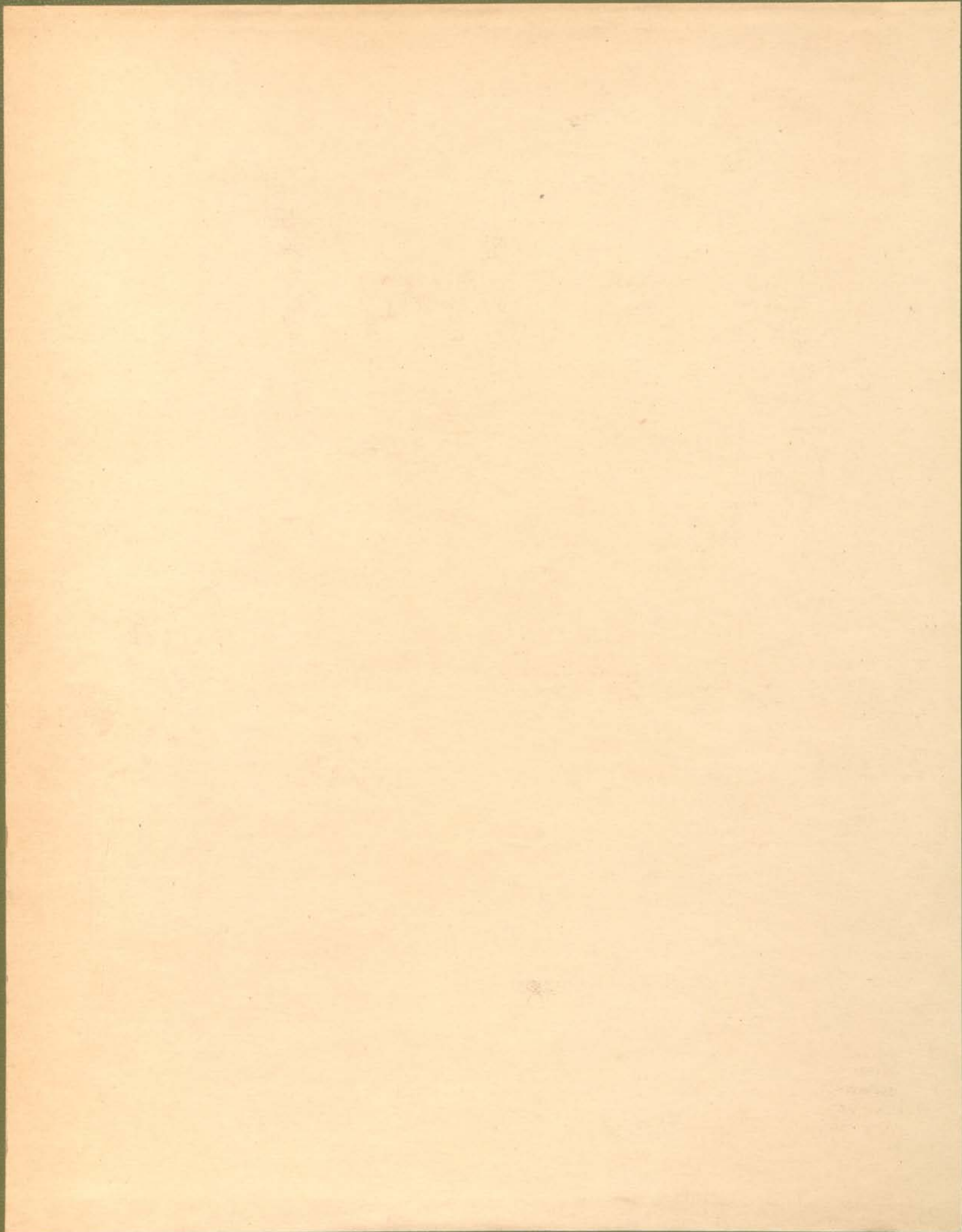

Martinmen Will Open Tough Diamond Slate On April 10

The Providence College varsity baseball squad will play a schedule of twenty games during the 1953 season, it has been announced by the athletic department. The season will officially open on April 10, when the Friars travel to Quonset, R. I., to meet the Quonset Flyers.

Included in this year's schedule are two games with the Holy Cross Crusaders, 1952 national champions. The Martinmen will play the Cross at Hendricken field on May 1, and will tangle with the Crusaders in Worcester on May 16.

Also included in this year's schedule are contests with such top aggregations as Boston College and Connecticut University. The Friars will meet the Eagles twice in a home and away series.

Other top-flight nines on the Friar's schedule include Boston University, Bates, Springfield, and St. Anselms.

The high spots of the season will be reached, of course, in home and away series with arch-rivals Brown and Rhode Island University.

The Martinmen will play host to the Bruins on May 11, and will take the short trip across the city to meet the Bear on May 15.

P. C. will tangle with the Rams in two consecutive ball-games on the 15 and 17 of April. The first of the two contests will be played on Hendricken Field. The schedule in full appears elsewhere in this paper.

Friars Take Second Place In Season's Indoor Finale

Saturday night in Madison Square Garden, P.C.'s mile relayers finished second in their heat. Columbia won the event but the Friars finished ahead of Army, Tufts and Penn.

The first Providence College Freshman Decathlon Championships will be held at Hendricken Field, March 18th through 20th. Competition will start at 3:30 p.m. The idea is two-fold, first to give all Freshmen a chance to compete in track and field and secondly to discover, if possible, future material for the Friar Track team. The competition will be divided into two classes. Class A competitors will be comprised of members of the present Freshmen squad, and the Class B section will be comprised of men who have not been members of the Freshman team and will be allowed to compete only in Class A and will give men of no track experience an even break in the competition.

Medals will be awarded to the first ten men who receive the highest total for all events combined. There will be ten places in every event. Non-scorers will obtain a point just for entering the competition. This point will be figured in the final point scoring.

The following events are scheduled:

Wednesday, March 18, 40 yard dash; broad jump, baseball throw, low hurdles.

Thursday, March 19, 220 yard dash, high jump, 12 lb. shot putt.

Friday, March 20, 880 yard run, pole vault, 28 lb. weight throw.

Instruction will be given every day at 3:30 to 5:30 in the weights and jumps to anyone desiring to receive them. Here is your chance to see if you possess hidden talent in track and field.

Harry Coates, P.C.'s Track Mentor, Is Awarded Citation By Coaches Association

At the ICA4A meet this year a group of men who call themselves the Coaches Association made an award. They made this award to a veteran of their field of endeavor. They made this award to a man they looked up to as a builder of champions, a great tutor. They made this award to Providence College's track coach, Harry Coates. The text of the presentation was just received at this paper, and is as follows:

For devotion to the Development of Track and Field Competition; For faithfulness to its Ideals, and for Outstanding Adherence to the Principles of Good Sportsmanship in Aid, Advice and Assistance to the Youth of Our Nation for more than a Quarter of a Century, this Citation, in token of the Respect and Esteem of his Fellow Coaches, is Conferred upon

Harry Coates—Seton Hall College—Providence College.

It wasn't so long ago that Harry made his way to the local campus, leaving his post as athletic director for the North Jersey Athletic League for boys to take over the reins as P.C.'s track coach. At a St. Patrick's Day smoker Harry was introduced to an enthusiastic audience of students, and he has kept that enthusiasm rampant ever since.

While at Seton Hall Prep, Harry, whose teams were always known for their superb conditioning and excellent middle-distance men, won seven consecutive national prep school championships!

Remarkable Career

During his remarkable career he also handled two Olympians, Mat Dalton, steeplechaser in the Stockholm Olympics, and John Gibson, who participated in the Big Meet eight years later, subsequently returning to Seton Hall as track coach.

Harry's deeds at Providence are so well known and have been recounted so often that they don't merit retelling here, but his record is mute testimony to his ability as a mentor in his chosen field.

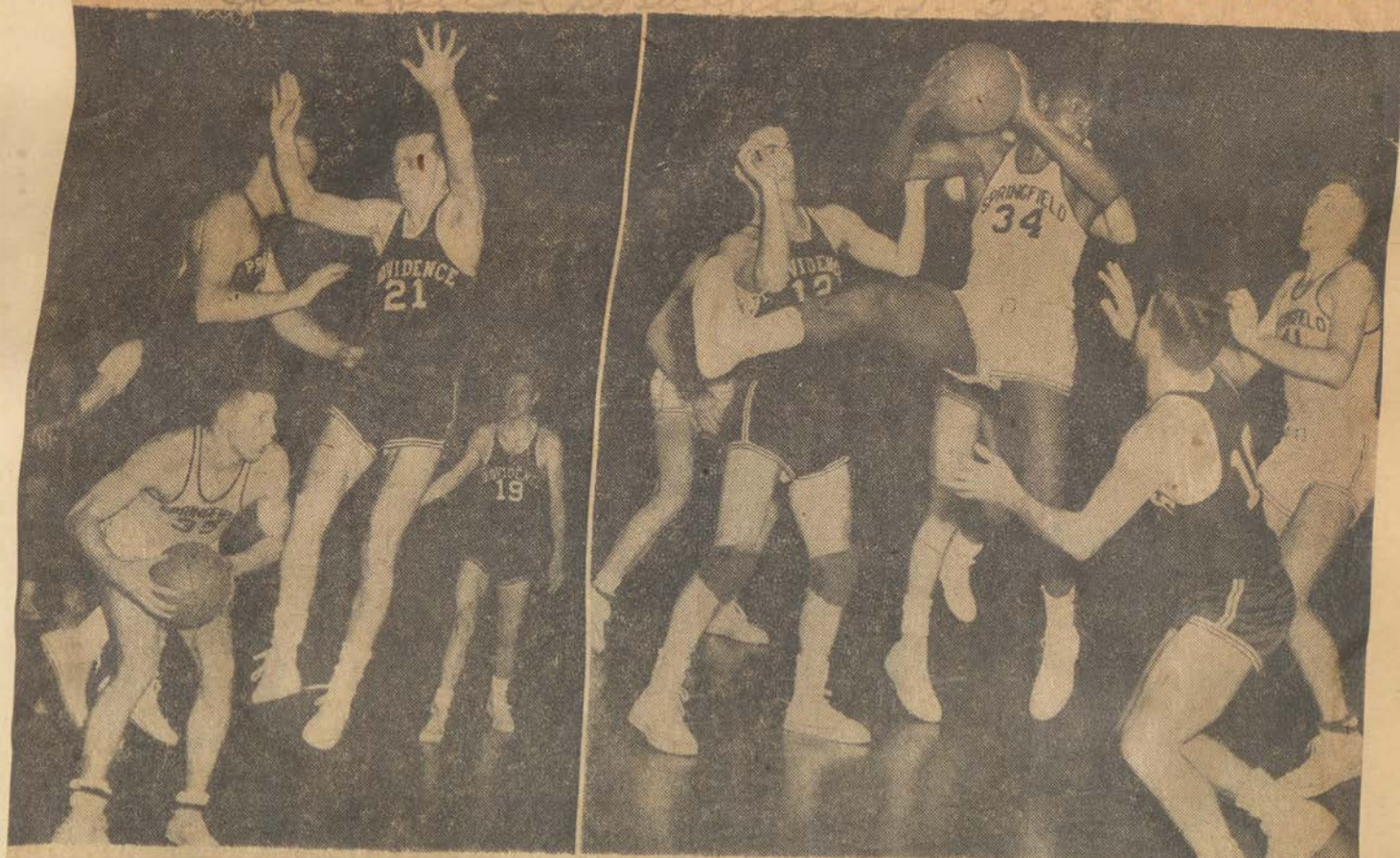
It seems that the night Harry Coates was introduced at the St. Patrick's Day smoker will be one of the more momentous evenings in the school's history.

Nobody envied the job but Harry. He was a pioneer, so to speak, to bring a new sport to the Dominican school. Of course, he was well qualified for the job. After graduating from Seton Hall, Harry went to Mercesburg Academy, then returned to the Hall in the twenties where he coached both college and prep teams for ten years.

Newark Beckoned

Then Newark Prep beckoned, so he moved the short distance from the Pirates den and stayed until 1937 when, once again, the old *alma mater* was in dire need of expert track tutelage. This time he directed the glories of the Jersey school's track forces for ten years before making the move to the job he held preceding his current post.

PROVIDENCE NIPS MAROONS. 87-83, IN OVERTIME

Durkin's Points Decide Game in Friars' Favor

Scores Six Tallies in Overtime as Providence Whips Maroons, 87-83; Schutts, McClements, Vye Lead Springfield Attack; Moran, McQueeney Excel for Winners

Fiery Jack Durkin climaxed a 16-point last half with six tallies in overtime to lead flashy passing Providence College to an 87-83 victory over Springfield College at the Field House yesterday afternoon. The game, part of Homecoming Day on the Springfield campus, was a tingle all the way, with plenty of heroes and near-heroes. It was tied up 16 times, the last being 58 seconds from the end when Bud Vye of Springfield dunked two free tries when fouled by Phil Lynch to make it 79-79. Vye got the ball again with five seconds left in regulation but couldn't get off a shot.

Friars Settle Issue

Providence sewed things up early in the five minute overtime. Durkin hit on a jump almost immediately after the tap-off. Bob Prendergast added a foul, and then Durkin took a pretty pass from Hank McQueeney to run the lead to 84-79. Springfield's Alan Schutts made one of two fouls but there was Durkin again with two free tries to up the score to 86-80. Three points by Vye toward the end just made the score closer.

The win over the Maroons was the second this season for the Friars, and seventh in eight tries since James (Vince) Cuddy has been coaching at the Rhode Island school. His team never had to work harder than it did in this two-fisted jamboree.

Nine of the 10 starters hit double figures, with Schutts topping them all with 23 points. Despite the total, the high-hopping red head did not have a good day. He took just 14 shots, making five of them. In the last half, he fired only five times, making two baskets. True, Providence had two and sometimes three men clogging up the middle on him, but even late in the game, when Springfield set up a double screen, he would hesitate for a second, and the shot was lost.

54 Fouls Called

It was a push and hack type game, with 54 fouls being called, 29 on Springfield. Frank Januszewski was the first to go out, midway through the third period. High-scoring Bob Moran of Providence, and Bob Morrison of Springfield, leaving just half a minute before the game's end.

Moran, a dead-eye set shot, had scored 17 points and his loss hurt Providence. But McClements was equally as valuable to the Maroons, and without him they don't play the same type ball.

Durkin opened the game with a free try, and then might as well have gone down to the corner drug store as far as scoring went, making nary another point until after intermission. He made up for it then, though. At one point in the second period, Springfield pulled away to a 37-32 lead, but the Friars caught up at halftime, 42-42, on a nice drive-in by Mullin.

A word here too, for Hank McQueeney, who led Providence scorers with 19 points, many of his baskets coming on peculiar drive-ins that look like traveling but aren't.

The Friars moved away to a 54-48 bulge early in the second half as Springfield had trouble moving the ball for good shots. Clayton Bywaters, however, led a Maroon surge that brought another tie at 55-all.

Vye Is Standout

It went like that through the last quarter, a rebound by Vye, who played a standout game for Springfield, knotting the count at 74-74. Substitute Jack Reynolds then scored a gift basket when Vye tried to save an out of bounds ball and threw it right into Reynolds' hands under the basket. McQueeney's two free tries were balanced by McClement's set, but McQueeney dropped another foul to make it 79-76 with just 1:45 left. Morrison made a foul shot with 1:15 remaining, and then Vye deadlocked matters just before the buzzer. But along came Durkin and the last minute Maroon heroics didn't matter. The Providence win made it 12-9 for the year, and broke a four game Maroon winning streak.

In the preliminary, the Springfield Freshmen topped the Providence yearlings, 77-70. The lineups:

Dartmouth Six Hands P.C. 6-to-2 Setback

Hanover, N.H.—Capt. Bruce Haertl scored twice last night and led Dartmouth to a 6-2 hockey victory over Providence College at Davis Rink before 1500 spectators.

Haertl scored the opening goal at 7:47 of the first period on a gang play and thereafter the Indians never were headed. They led 2-0 and 4-1 at the period marks. Haertl added the winner's fourth score at 3:45 of the second period, poking home the rebound from Johnny Titus' long shot.

Bobby Reall put in the Friars' first goal at 18:47 of the second period on passes from his freshmen linemates, Ed Monahan and John Sweeney. Paul Lagueux, another freshman and former St. Dominic High School star, added the losers' final tally on a blazing 50-footer that went booming into the right hand corner of the cage.

This score came at 15:17 of the final period.

The victory was Dartmouth's ninth in 21 starts and closed out its season. PC's record now stands at 6-and-7. Dick Rondeau's Friars meet Norwich University tonight at Northfield, Vt., in a game that winds up their schedule.

After the meet, an official placed La Salle in second spot, but Betagh filed a protest, claiming the Providence school entered two teams in the event, which was against the rules. Betagh yesterday received the following letter from Rev. A. B. Begley, OP, director of athletics at PC.

"Dear Ray:

"It is my happy privilege to inform you that the protest made by you concerning the Providence College Four Mile Relay of December 6, 1952, has been upheld by the Providence College Athletic Council. The council ruled that the upholding of this protest was to be in no way considered derogatory to the directorship or director of the meet, but because of the error in permitting LaSalle Academy to run two teams after previously rejecting the registration of more than one team from any institution. The second place medals are being mailed to you for distribution to your boys.

"I am sorry that I could not notify you of this decision at an earlier date but I left Providence within a few minutes after the athletic council meeting and have been away at conventions and Christmas vacation since that time.

"Please congratulate the members of your fine team and I hope that your track squad will meet with continued success."

Big 3rd Period By Norwich Six Whips Friars

Northfield, Vt.—Three players, including Dave Mortenson, former East Providence star, handled all the scoring for Norwich last night as it buried Providence College under a six-goal avalanche in the third period and won, 10-6, at the Norwich natural-ice rink.

Clark Ginder paced the winners with four goals. His two scores early in the final period erased a 5-4 lead, which the Friars had built up in the second period, and gave Bob Priestly's team a lead it never again lost.

Dick Horne, the Norwich goalie had a busy evening. He made 44 saves, 19 of them in the second period when the Friars wiped out a 3-2 deficit and forged into a 5-4 lead. The Friars' freshman starting line of Bob Reall, Ed Monahan and John Sweeney accounted for all but one Providence goal. Reall scored three and Monahan two. Defense-man Dave Reilly put in the other PC goal.

The contest winds up the season for Dick Rondeau's sextet. The PC record stands at six victories and eight defeats.

Friar Pucksters Close Season; Lose To Indians And Cadets

The Friar sextet wound up a fairly successful season with two games on the road last week. They did battle with the Big Green of Dartmouth on Thursday night and took on the Cadets of Norwich University on Friday night.

The Dartmouth game was a see-saw battle for the first five minutes. However, at 7:47 Captain Bruce Haertl rebounded on a gang attack for the first of his two goals. Hennigan took a pass from Heydt at 14:57 and banged it in to end the scoring for the first period.

Dartmouth Scores Early

Dartmouth started scoring early in the second period with goals by McCarthy from Heydt at 2:26 and again at 3:45, when Haertl rebounded Titus' shot into the upper left hand corner of the cords. Between goals, Dave Conlan, Big Green goalie, had an excellent save on Reall's breakaway and Eddy Hornstein had an equally crowd pleasing save on Ed Heydt's breakaway.

At 18:47 Bob Reall finished a play started by his line mates Sweeney and Monahan, by cutting the twine in the upper left hand corner. With less than 55 seconds left in this canto, Eddy Hornstein was hit between his pads and was injured. Dartmouth waived the remaining 55 seconds, took the period break then and tacked them onto the next period.

Uses "Unclerical Language"

Dartmouth started the scoring early again in the third period when Titus took a pass from Sherwood and Haertl at 1:15 and tucked it away. Two penalties, one at 7:45 and another at 10:20, against Dave Reilly prompted him to use what the Dartmouth paper called, "unclerical language."

The next afternoon the Friars journeyed over the Connecticut River to Norwich University to play the Cadets.

Sweeney Scores

Mortenson opened the scoring for Norwich on a pass from Pulsford at 2:20 of the first period. Norwich scored again at 7:14 as Ginder went down on goalie Eddy Hornstein all alone. P.C. scored right from a face off as Rosco

Sweeney slapped a pass to Bob Reall and he poked it in at 7:55. Ginder garnered his second goal of the night at 18:20 on a rebound from Paquette's shot. P.C. got its second goal, again by Reall, on a pass out from behind the cage by Sweeney at 19:09.

P.C. started hustling in the second period and scored at 2:40 as Dave Reilly slammed one from the blue line that whistled into the cords, the assist going to Sweeney and Petit. Norwich scored again at 3:09 on a breakaway by Cloutier and Dutil.

Reall Pulls "Hat Trick"

Bob Reall got his third goal of the night to pull the seldom seen "hat trick" at 9:50 on a pass from Sweeney.

The first ten minutes of the third period was the downfall for the Friars. Ginder started it at 2:25, and teammates Mortenson got one, Ginder another, and Cloutier two before the ice dust had cleared.

Thus did the Providence College Friars wind up a rather successful season against some top flight competition.

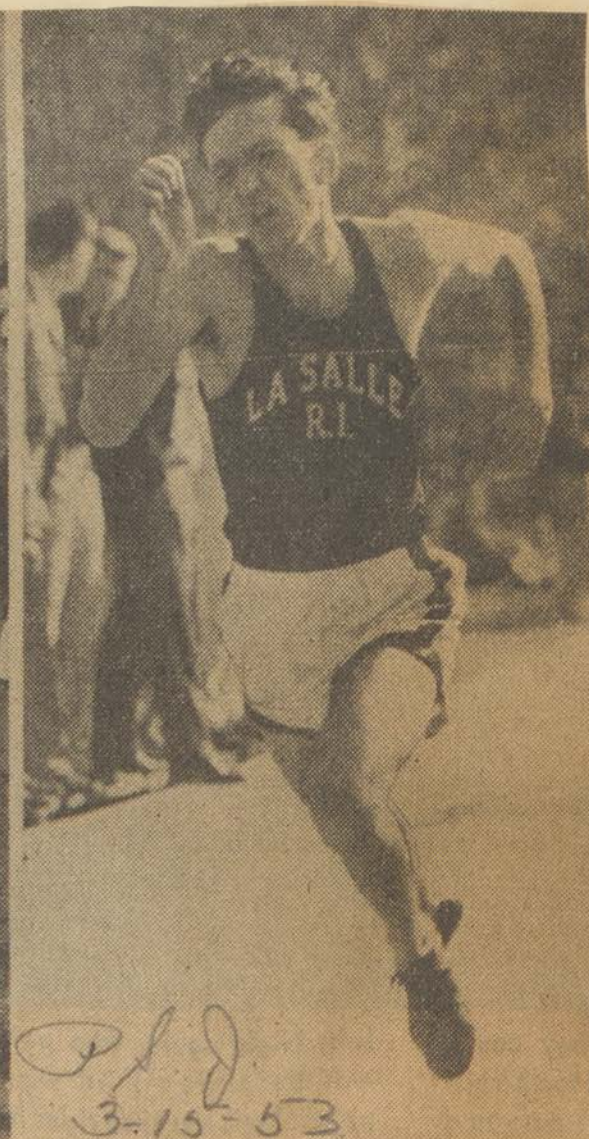
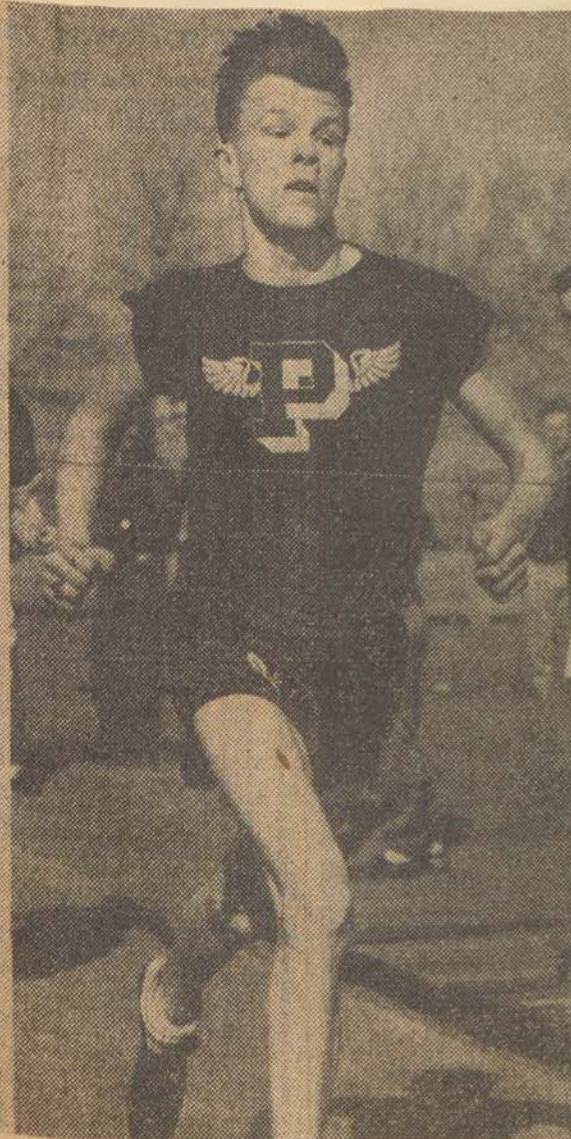

St. Augustine's High School of Brooklyn, N.Y., and Mount Pleasant finished in a tie for top honors in Providence College's first annual Invitational Interscholastic Winter Track Meet yesterday afternoon at Hendricken Field. The outcome was determined in the final event, the shot put, in which Mount Pleasant scored four points and St. Augustine's scored two, deadlocking at 16½ points each.

The final-event result sent the leaders ahead of La Salle, which finished in third place with 15½ points. Other team scores were: Cranston, 12; Portsmouth, N.H., and New Bedford Vocational, 9 each; Boston College High School, 8; Barrington, 5; St. Raphael Academy, 4 and Woonsocket, 2½.

Mount Pleasant didn't win a first place in the nine-event program, but picked up four seconds, shared another second and had two fourths. Standouts for Coach Harold Myers' team were Tony Iavarone in the dash, Frank Zienowicz in the hurdles and high jump, the relay team and Dick Lauro, who edged John Hands of St. Augustine's by 1¼ inches for the valuable second spot in the shot put.

St. Augustine's eight-man team suffered a setback when Frank Kennedy, its top 300 man, pulled up with a bad leg and dropped out of the first heat, won by Vin Iannuzzi of La Salle. La Salle's three-man team took an early lead for the team honors and held on until that final event. Besides Iannuzzi in the 300, La Salle had John Fahey, winner in the high hurdles and second in the 600, and Bill Hickey, who tied for second in the high jump.

Tom Murphy, outstanding St. Augustine's runner, turned in a 1:18.1 600, shaking off a last-lap bid by Fahey and winning going away. Murphy also anchored the winning Brooklyn relay team.

George Foley of Cranston won the 50-yard dash, edging Iavarone of Mount Pleasant and Bob Martin of St. Augustine's in a close finish. Al O'Brien of Cranston got too far behind Henry Butler of Portsmouth in the 1000-yard run and when he finally kicked, he fell short by some 10 yards of overtaking the New Hampshire distance man.

The mile was a two-man race between Al Porter of New Bedford Vocational and Bob Dixon of Portsmouth, who pulled away from the field and romped home in that order. Porter, runnerup in the nationals, was timed in 4:32. Joe Clark of Boston College High School won the high jump at 5' 4". Phil Lenz of Barrington won the shot put at 47' 6".

Turning in one of their most productive first halves in a long time, the Providence College Friars scored a 94-75 victory over Bates last night at Mount Pleasant High.

The Friars played their best game of the season, breaking fast and showing more hustle and enthusiasm than usual. It was the Friars' highest-scoring game in several seasons. They could have reached the century mark.

There was a general improvement and the team played well both as a unit and individually. While Bates didn't prove to be as strong as anticipated, it was a case of the Friars playing well and much better than usual.

Hank McQueenie, who has been a slow starter this season, did a remarkable job all around. He set up his mates frequently and scored 21 points himself. It was easily his best game in two years of varsity ball.

Bucknam Stars

Top-scoring honors went to Bates' Charley Bucknam, who scored 25, mostly on quick jump shots and sets. Bucknam did a fine job and with Ken Weiler and Specs Bean kept the Bobcats fairly close to the fast-moving Friars.

While McQueenie was the Friars' top performer, Bobby Moran contributed 21 points and led several fast breaks. Tommy Mullins assisted on several fine plays, scored 12 points and was outstanding defensively. Jack Durkin and Jack Reynolds helped out considerably in the rebounding and were alert around the boards.

Providence put the pressure on Bates early and managed to keep hustling, with Coach Vin Cuddy substituting judiciously. The Friars haven't driven with such consistency in any one game this season, according to the Providence coach, who found the scrambling, aggressive style of his team more conducive to scoring than a lay-back type of game.

Durkin, who had been ill or injured on several occasions, came into the game in the first period and the team seemed to click from the time he arrived. McQueenie, Mullins and Moran kept moving at a fast clip and the Friars went from 14-12 to 23-12 in a few minutes. PC led, 23-17, at the end of the first period.

At Halftime, 44-35

Mullins and McQueenie collaborated on several fine plays, with Reynolds and Durkin assisting, in the second period. Although only nine points ahead, 44-35, at the half, Providence had the game under control.

Moran, who leads the Friar scorers, paced himself the early

surge in the third period, with Bean fouling out midway. The Bobcats, playing their third game in three nights, tired in the final quarter. They came through with an occasional basket before the Friars pulled into a 15-point lead, 80-65, and coasted home thereafter.

Ken Kerr, Bill Lynch, Reynolds, Bob Predergast and Ed Ryder all chipped in some top work somewhere along the line as the PC bench acquitted itself almost as well as the starting lineup.

The Providence College Freshmen, led by Gus Westerhuis and Dick Elston, scored an 85-60 decision over Bradford-Durfee Textile in the preliminary. Westerhuis and Elston each scored 25 points for the Friars, who led, 38-26, at the half. Joe Freeman had 16 for Textile.

They might have broken into the starting lineup if they were in good health.

Much Improved

Bates is a much improved team this season, winning five of its nine games. Coach Bob Addison, 12-letter man as a collegian at Oberlin, has the Bobcats playing a fairly good brand of ball. Both Colby and Maine had trouble with them and each has already chalked up a victory at the expense of the Rhody rivals, PC and URI.

Providence played well in spurts against Fairfield. All season Bobby Moran has been carrying the offensive load and Tommy Mullins leading the defensive operations. Moran has been averaging 21 points per game. Mullins has been playing an outstanding game and averaging 12 points a game, which is a fine average for a player of Mullins' defensive value.

Charlie Bucknam was high scorer in the game with 25 points—but that wasn't enough of a punch to keep the Bobcats in the running.

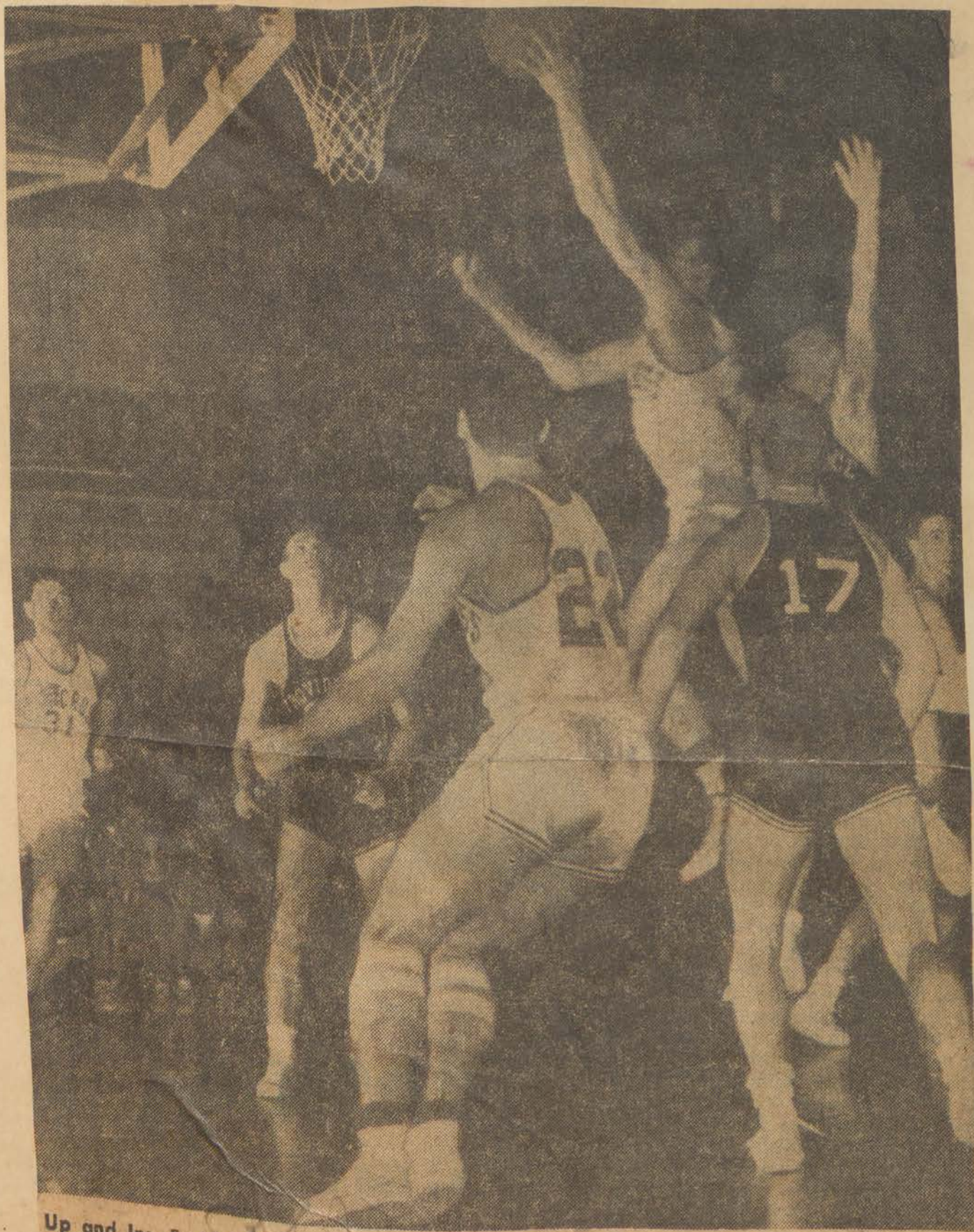

In all, nine teams, including freshmen, ventured out of town on Saturday and all except one came home on their shields—without a victory.

The University of Rhode Island's basketball Rams, playing at Storrs, lost to Connecticut, 80-74, and the Rams' freshman team was a loser to the young Huskies, 80-74.

And three Brown teams—basketball, wrestling and swimming—went up to West Point and lost in all three events to Army. The basketball team went down, 64-56; the swimmers lost out, 56-28, and the wrestlers were defeated, 22-10. The defeats were the first in three

wrestlers and the fifth without a victory for the basketball team.

About the only ray of consolation in any of this was the record-breaking performance of Brown's Ralph Brisco in the swimming meet against Army. Brisco, a junior from Pawtucket, won the 50-yard freestyle in 22.8 seconds, one-tenth of a second faster than the West Point pool and school record set in 1945 by Yale's Alan Ford.

Providence College Alumni Here Asked by Athletics Director to 'Steer' Promising Youths There

Members of Fall River Chapter, Providence College Alumni Association, at a dinner meeting last night in the Quequechan Club were asked to be on the alert for high school boys with athletic and scholastic ability and interest in Providence College.

The request came from guest speaker, Rev. Aloysius B. Begley, P., faculty director of athletics at the college, in an address on the athletic program and policy here.

The college has been losing choice athletes, sometimes at the door," Father Begley charged, "because the alumni has not been alert to talent in their territories. "Interest these boys in Providence College, and be sure that the purses they take in high school prepare them for college entrance. The school is not only interested in athletic ability, but scholastic ability as well."

He informed members that the college can offer the same scholarship as any other of the 100 member colleges of the Eastern College Athletic Association. The scholarship includes room and board, tuition and fees, he said.

The college is liberal in granting the number of scholarships requested, the athletic director said. With the exception of football which was discontinued in the 1940s, sports engaged in include baseball, basketball, track, rifle shooting and ice hockey.

The scholarships are open to all boys meriting them irregardless of religious affiliation, Father Begley emphasized.

Academic scholarships can be obtained also he said, in reminding members to be on the lookout for boys of scholastic promise.

During a question-answer period, Father Begley revealed that work on a \$2,000,000 gymnasium on the campus will begin this Spring. The building will house a cafeteria, a student lounge, post office and rifle range as well as spacious accommodations for sports, he said.

Rev. Vincent P. Dore, O.P., dean of the college also spoke briefly on student recruitment "to the pioneers of territorial clubs of the college." He asked that a committee be formed to contact, talk to and convince students of both athletic and scholastic promise that Providence College is the school for them.

He cited the college's ROTC program as an attraction for students. The unit at the college is in Army Transportation, he said.

Other speakers included Alumni Association President Frank Barlow and Dr. Paul P. Dunn, immediate past president of the Fall River Chapter.

Chapter President Francis J. Devine presided.

Tallies 28 Points

A swift, smart-feinting Providence College basketball team, mindful of a stunning upset defeat at the hands of Clark last season, pulled out all stops to score a rapid-fire, 92-72, victory over the Scarlet last night in Clark gym.

Steered as usual by speedy Bobby Moran, the Friars tossed in an assortment of fancy hoops mostly on running inside flips to break away from the stubborn Main Southers midway of the second quarter to a daylight advantage.

Interesting Fireworks

Still, it was well that the visitors were having one of their hot shooting nights—they caged 34 baskets on 73 flips—for the uncanny Ralph Saunders and lanky Andy Viestra kept up steady rat-tat which made for high-scoring and interesting fireworks all along.

Saunders was immense. Despite a close check on his antics, and shackled by four fouls much of the way, Ralph poured home 11 baskets and six free throws for 28 points to lead all scorers.

Many of his hoops were sensational, to say the least, and those which weren't bordered on that type.

Faced Smooth Club

However, the vastly improved Scarlet was up against a smooth club which was still singing along in fine fettle following its tremendous 30-point triumph over Rhode Island State earlier in the week. The Friars, who have won their last four in a row including three for the week, had devised routes by which they stormed the key.

But all roads led to the same spot—in close where the Friars were able to storm the net repeatedly against the befuddled defenders. Moran was the chief culprit with a 24 point output to hoist him over the 400-mark for the season at 405. Every time

this fellow drops a point now he adds to his single season P. C. scoring record which he broke early last week.

Others Also Brilliant

But there were others in this cast of Friar brilliants—an almost endless chain of lightning-fast hoopsters who have learned their fundamentals well and now seem bent on making all N. E. sit up and take notice.

There was, for instance, Worcester's Tommy Mullin who generally does most of the play-directing for the visitors. Mullin checked home with 15 points, a total equalled by Hank McQueeney and Viestra of Clark.

Mullin had five dazzlers from the floor, mostly layups on express sorties up the court.

It didn't seem as though the Main Southers would ever stay close to these flying Friars. Still, with Saunders and Viestra leading the scoring assault and the others playing less starry but important roles, Clark kept the P. C. troupe on its toes right up to the end.

Indeed, only a one-sided burst on the part of the Friars in the last seconds shoved the P. C. gang to its ultimate 20-point victory margin.

Thus, there was no disgrace attached to this 11th defeat in 12 starts for the Main Southers. They, too, were brilliant in their shotmaking, cashing 28 flips of 62 tries.

Providence, with Moran taking charge, moved ahead at 12-6 and seemed headed for a lopsided romp as early as the fifth minute of action. However, Saunders and Viestra nurtured other ideas and the Scarlets kept battling strongly so that the Friar edge was only two points at 21-19 at the first terminal.

Clark Ahead Twice

And early in the second session, the Scarlets managed to forge ahead on a couple of occasions until big Bob Prendergast began to make his presence felt scoring-wise. The burly Friar captain tossed home three straight baskets to start the visitors on an eight-point spree which gave them a 34-29 margin midway of the period. From here the P. C.'ers held sway comfortably, hanging up a 47-36 advantage at halftime.

The Scarlets suffered a third-period lapse which lightened the Providence task and the Friars were in the van at 68-49 at the close of the third period.

P. C.'s 11th Win

The victory was Providence's 11th against eight defeats.

Saunders flipped 18 of his points in the first half. When he was charged with his fourth personal early in the third quarter Coach Russ Granger pulled his

star and captain for a few minutes. Ralph also went out for good with about three minutes left.

The Providence College Friars and the University of Rhode Island Rams meet tonight at Kingston, with the Rams confident of squaring up for their previous defeat by the Friars. The varsity game will start at 8 o'clock, following a PC-URI Freshman contest set for 6:30.

The game matches two of the leading scorers in New England in Bobby Moran of the Friars and Billy Baird of Rhody. Moran, scoring at an average of 21.8 for the season, ranks 25th in the nation among the small college players while Baird, hitting at a 20.6 pace, rates in 28th place among the nation's major college players.

The Friars, playing one of their best games in several seasons, ran up a 92-66 decision over the Rams at the Auditorium. It was probably the high point of the Friars' season although they came back last Saturday and upset Springfield on the Gymnasts' home court.

Five in a Row

Since their first meeting with the Friars, the Rams have had an all-winning record, scoring successive victories over Vermont, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maine and Connecticut. The Rams reached an emotional and playing peak against the UConns, scoring a surprising victory over a team that anticipated a tourney bid until that contest.

Providence has never done very well at Rodman Hall in the way of victories. But the days are gone when Rhody was invincible there. The weekend games with PC and Brown (tomorrow night), will be the Rams' final games at Rodman, which has housed Rhody basketball since the 1928 season. Next season they will play at the new Keaney Gymnasium.

Freddy Congleton sparked the Rams to victory against the UConns. He and Billy Baird will be making the final home appearances in tonight and tomorrow night's games. If they play anything like they did last week against the UConns, the Friars will have to come up with another superlative performance to beat them.

Moran is the leading college scorer in Rhode Island with 457 points while Baird has 416 and Congleton 296. Lou Murgio has 310 points for Brown, averaging 19.4 for the year. Nationally Murgio is 38th among the individual scoring leaders. Rhody has averaged 80.7 points against 75.6 for the Friars. Brown's team average is a shade under 64 points. In the national ratings in team offense, Rhody is 12th, between La Salle and Illinois.

State Title at Stake

Coach Jack Guy's charges could end up their season very nicely by taking their remaining three games with PC, Brown and Springfield. The Rams can win the state crown by taking both the Friars and the Bruins. Brown can win or tie depending on the results of tonight's game coupled with a victory tomorrow night.

Rhody's starting lineup will include Baird, Congleton, Ray Rossi, Dave Stenhouse and Rollie Kubiskey, all of whom did a good job against the UConns. Coach Vin Cuddy will start Moran and Hank McQueeney, Bob Prendergast, Tommy Mullins and either Jack Durkin or Phil Lynch. It's PC's final game and the wind-up for Prendergast, who at times has played some fine basketball, with his hook shots and rebounding.

Home Advantage

Only three times in the 34-game history of the series have the teams played on a court other than Marvel Gymnasium. In 1922 they played at Brown's old Lyman Gym. In 1945 they played at the Friars' Harkins Hall and in 1947 they played at the R.I. Auditorium. Brown won in each case.

There is no other reason for shifting the site of the game other than the fact that attendance has fallen off in the past few years for this one and now the schools' authorities figure that Mt. Pleasant can hold the crowd.

Better Record

This miscellanea out of the way, the Friars go into this one with a much more impressive record than Brown. The Friars have won seven of their last nine, including a victory over Springfield in overtime on Saturday.

Brown, on the other hand, has won just three games. The Bruins lost to Holy Cross Saturday and they have little to show—on the plus side—for their season.

But it is a curious fact that the Bruins have the "sign" on the Friars, no matter what the records. For example, the Bruins have won nine of the last 10 games the teams have played, and generally the Friars have had the better record.

Series Tried

Again, the Friars have the edge on paper this time. Hank McQueeny, Bobby Moran, Tom Mullins and Jack Durkin have been playing outstanding basketball for the Friars of late and P.C. as a team appears to be a better club.

Brown has been plugging along with its mainly sophomore club, with Bill Arnold, Ed Kincade and junior Lou Murgo doing the bulk of the scoring.

The series between the two clubs is tied. Each has won 17 games.

Two hockey games also are on today's schedule, each out of town. The Friars will play Clarkson at Potsdam, N.Y., and Rhode Island will meet Army at West Point.

The University of Rhode Island defeated Providence College, 76-62, last night at Rodman Hall by stopping the Friars' top scorers and turning out a well-rounded offense of its own.

Four Rams had scoring totals ranging from 13 to 18 points each and their Ray Rossi and Dave Stenhouse clamped onto Bobby Moran and Hank McQueeney, the Friars' best shooters, and held them to three baskets between them.

The Rams took the lead at 3:30 of the first quarter on a set shot by Rollie Kubiskey and never once faltered after that. They led at the half, 40-26, and had their margin up to 22 points before they eased off in the final quarter.

Rams Gain Tie

This victory moved the Rams into a tie for first place with Brown in the intrastate series. Each has won two and lost one and the two will play for the title tonight at Kingston.

For the Friars, this was the last game of their season and the defeat set their record at 11 victories and 11 defeats. Two seniors, Capt. Bob Prendergast and Jack Keating, played their last game with the club.

With a better shake in their shooting luck, particularly in the first half, the Friars might have made it closer. In all, they had 97 shots and made only 19 baskets, but they seemed to have at least a dozen of those kind that go in, then

spin out. At any rate, they were far off the form that enabled them to defeat the Rams by 26 points as recently as Feb. 10.

Finesse was hardly the keynote of either team's performance, but the Rams had considerably more lift and drive—and a fellow named Fred Congleton.

Congleton Key Factor

Congleton didn't get every rebound, but at times it seemed that he did. His work under the basket was largely responsible for the fact that the Friars were unable to get in that second shot and his passing after getting the rebounds gave the Rams a fast start down the court.

In the second half, Congleton

polished off his performance by getting the bulk of his 14 points. Bill Baird topped the club with his 18 and Stenhouse got 16, in addition to playing an excellent floor game. Dan Dunn collected 13.

Moran managed to get just two baskets, one just before the half and one right after, and Rossi—with occasional help from Bernie Pina—obviously did a good job of guarding. McQueeney got one basket.

Jack Durkin was the only Friar to score in double figures and he got 14 points. Bill Quinlan's nine points were next best. Tom Mullins and Phil Lynch did commendable work, as did Moran and McQueeney, despite their lack of scoring.

The Rams were not able to establish a lead of any proportions until the last part of the second quarter and then they ran the count to 36-22, with Baird and Stenhouse as the main contributors.

The third quarter just about settled matters as Congleton made three successive baskets and put his club ahead, 56-34. Thereafter it was a coast for the Rams as each club used subs in most of the fourth quarter. The Friars outscored the Rams, nine points to three, near the end, but by then the results were in. The victory was the Rams' 12th in 21 games.

In the preliminary game, the Friars' freshmen took the young Rams, 94-78. Bob Serra scored 30 points for the Rams. For the Friars, Dick Elston scored 23, Gus Westhuis 22 and Ralph Tedesco 20.

3 Cage Coaches Contend Their Lot Not a Happy One

Vin Cuddy, Bob Morris and Jack Guy, who may be biased on the matter, maintain that coaching college basketball is a busier, tougher job than coaching football.

Each of course is a basketball coach, which allows a first-hand view of what the sport requires, as well as a prejudice on the subject of who works harder.

But what gives their opinions at least a two-third majority of credibility is that Guy of Rhode Island also is a football coach—he assists Hal Kopp with the Rams—and Cuddy of Providence College was, at a branch school of the University of Connecticut.

This, it would appear, sort of leaves Robert Bruce Morris of Brown in mid-air without a basis of comparison. But with the firmness of opinion characteristic of good Scots, he simply says basketball is tougher, and no talking back, laddie.

I am inclined to agree, even though I have coached neither, or anything, for that matter, and am not particularly shattered with pity for either clan. Barney Madden, boss of this menagerie, always tells me, when I complain that things are coming too fast, that I asked for work when I came here and the same goes for coaches.

Now, where were we? Oh, yes, basketball versus football. Well, some factors are obvious. The basketball season is longer by some two months and teams play at least 22 games, where 10 is a round number on the average football schedule. Most football coaches have anywhere from two to seven assistants to help them, granted that some of their operations are more complex and involve more boys. Basketball coaches generally go it alone.

Guy points out that his team plays at least two games a week, which allows no time at all to think back. And there's no chance to regroup between one Saturday and the next.

"Furthermore," he says, "the complexion of basketball constantly changes. In football you can combat the changes. In basketball they come too fast."

All three make a good case out of the fact that for five solid months they are either playing a game, watching another team play or traveling. Cuddy says he is involved one way or another in basketball six nights a week and on

the seventh he tries to see the pros play.

Cuddy also contributes what he calls the emotional factor of coaching basketball, which he says is not present in football.

"The nature of basketball . . . the speed, the constant changing of the score . . . is more wearing," he says. "In football there are really only two or three crises. Basketball has one every minute."

Morris is of the same general opinion. "You are closer to basketball, physically and mentally," he says. "It's a more personalized sport. As for the pressure, there's no difference. One is as bad as the other."

Of course, none of the three expect that any reasonable football coach will agree with them. In fact, if you listen carefully, you probably can hear the wails from Al Kelley, Kopp & Co., right now.

Friars' Hurler Fans 13 In Posting Six-Hitter

State's Stenhouse Also Stingy With Hits but Lacks Control

Bill Mullins exhibited pitching form that belied the unseasonable elements yesterday as he hurled Providence College to a 9-1 victory over the University of Rhode Island in the Friars' opener at Hendriken Field.

The bespectacled right-hander from Worcester scattered six hits, struck out 13 and walked only one. The single run scored against him, in the sixth inning, was unearned.

Mullins' mound opponent, Dave Stenhouse, was equally as stingy with base hits, yielding only six; but the Westerly sophomore was plagued by a familiar jinx—lack of control.

He had a no-hitter going until the seventh when the Friars' Bill Quinn got a fluke double on a high pop-up that started in foul territory but was caught by the wind and carried back inside third base. Jerry Loeber, RIU third baseman, followed it all the way but couldn't hold onto it as he made last-second lunge at the ball. The Friars drove Stenhouse from the box with a five-hit, six-run eighth.

Control Trouble

As it turned out, P.C. collected enough runs for the victory without need of a hit. After the Rams had gone ahead, 1-0, in the first of the sixth on singles by Ralph Petrarca and Phil Niles, plus Ed Ryder's throwing error, the Friars took a 2-1 lead in the last half of the inning on two walks, two wild pitches and an outfield fly.

Mullins was walked and he advanced to third on a wild pitch. Stenhouse then walked Jim White and another wild pitch permitted Mullins to tie the score and White to go to third, whence he scored when Dick Howe flied out to Petrarca in left field.

Quinn opened the P. C. eighth with his wind-blown double and moved to third when Stenhouse threw into the dirt in an attempt to pick him off second. He later scored the Friars' third run on Jerry Romberg's squeeze bunt down the first-base line.

P.C. sent 10 men to bat in the eighth and Mullins had the dubious distinction of making two of the outs. After he had led off the inning by striking out, White drew a walk and went to third on Howe's single to center. White scored on another wild pitch by Stenhouse and Howe came home on Ryder's single to right that got away from Bob Downer, allowing Ryder to go to third.

Fill Bases

Still another wild pitch enabled Ryder to score and then the Friars filled the bases again on singles by Bob Grenier and John Higgins and an error by shortstop Pete DiMasi on Romberg's grounder. Beaver Power promptly cleared them with a solid double to left center. That was all for Stenhouse. Bill Marine replaced him and retired the side by

getting Mullins on a grounder to short.

In the second inning, Johnny Pagano, RIU center fielder, had provided one of the game's fielding features by pulling down a drive by Power after a long run. Mullins accounted for the other glove gem with his stab of Pagano's sizzler through the box in the sixth.

The loss was the Rams' second in as many starts. These two teams play again tomorrow afternoon at Kingston.

Mullins Excels as Friars Trip R.I. Rams

Senior Shows Control As P.C. Wins Opener, 9-1

The Providence College Friars opened their 1953 baseball season with a 9-to-1 victory over the University of Rhode Island behind the effective hurling of Bill Mullins yesterday at Hendriken Field.

Coach Hal Martin of the Friars expects big things from the Worcester senior this season. Mullins hurled one of the steadiest games of his college career yesterday, limiting the Rams to six hits, one unearned run and striking out 13.

Control has been a problem for Mullins at various times. Against Rhody he gave up only one base on balls and was ahead of the hitters. "It was easily one of his better games," Martin said, "but he's worked harder than usual this spring and is 20 pounds lighter. Taking off that excess weight could make him an improved pitcher but he's always had good stuff."

Rhody's Dave Stenhouse also pitched a fine game but tired in the late innings. The Friars didn't get a hit off him until the seventh, although leading 2 to 1. There weren't many solidly hit drives on either side over the first five or six innings. Stenhouse, pitching his second game, struck out 12, but ran into trouble in the eighth when the Friars scored six times.

The Rams and Friars will meet again tomorrow afternoon at Kingston with John O'Neil, a right-hander, scheduled to pitch for the Friars. Rocco Negriz is the prob-

able starter for Rhody. O'Neil beat the Rams last season in the only game between these two intra-state rivals.

Phil Niles of the Rams had three hits yesterday. Dick Howe, Eddie Ryder, and Beaver Power hit three solid ones for PC with Power driving in three runs. Johnny Pagano, who had the advantage of conditioning with the Braves at Waycross, Ga., contributed the fielding feature with a fine catch on a drive by Power.

Providence sent 10 men up in the eighth, with Power's double with the bases loaded being the big wallop in the six-run inning.

P.C. Sending Relay Teams to Seton Hall

Larry Drew, director of intramural athletics at Providence College and former Friar basketball coach, last night was appointed director of physical education at New London High School. He will assume his new duties in September.

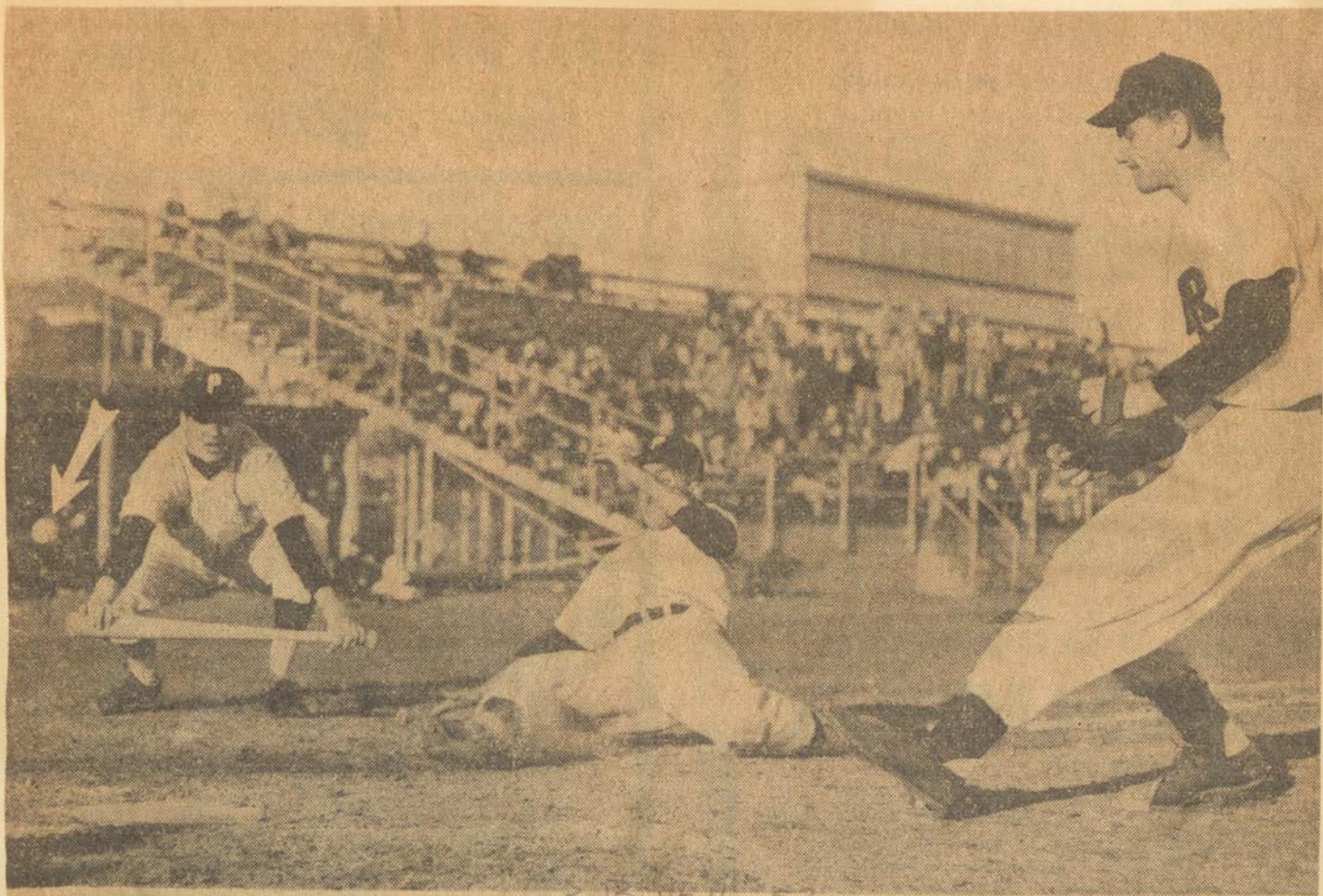
The appointment was made by the New London Board of Education.

Negriz Shackles Friars' Batters With Five-Hitter

Rams' Hurler Gets Excellent Support; State Series Tied

Rhode Island's Rocco Negriz, his curve ball working fine, pitched a five-hitter that stopped Providence College, 4-0, in the wind and cold yesterday at Kingston.

The victory evened—and closed—the season's two-game series between the clubs. The P. C. Friars won the other, 9-1, on Wednesday and thus each has a 1-1 record in the intra-state baseball championship race.

Negriz is a resident of North Providence, a senior at Kingston and this was his first shutout of his college career. He did it "big." One of the five hits he gave was a weak infield roller, another came with two out in the ninth. He struck out four and only one man got to third base.

Good Support

He had excellent fielding support, particularly by Jerry Loeber at

third, and his club's timely if not particularly lusty hitting picked up single runs in the second, third fourth and eighth innings.

John O'Neil worked seven innings for the Friars and although he gave up three runs, deserved better. He allowed seven hits and his mates made four errors behind him. Carl Buniva pitched one inning and permitted the other run.

All this was played in a frigid wind that hooted across the flats. The simplest way to describe the conditions is this: Hal Kopp, the football coach who now is holding spring practice for the Rams, called off his drill. Said it was too cold for football players.

Negriz seemed least effected by the cold and he actually improved as the game progressed. In the eighth, for example, he twice walked batters and each time got the next man on rollers back to the mound.

First Run Unearned

Only the first run of the Rams was unearned, that one scored by Pete DeMasi on the end of a double steal in the second inning. DeMasi had reached on an error by Dick Howe at first and had reached third when Jim White's throw on Dick Cahill pulled Howe off the bag. DeMasi came in standing up when a cut-off play to second failed.

Negriz opened the third with a single and scored when Johnny Pagano slammed a curving triple to right. Pagano later was tagged out

at the plate when Ralph Petrarca failed to bunt on a squeeze play.

Pat Abbruzzi scored in the four on a fly ball by Dick Cahill. He had singled, gone to second on a fielder's choice and to third on a passed ball. Pat also got the Rams' fourth run; this time by getting a walk off Buniva, stealing second, stealing third and scoring on Cahill's double.

The Friar's one real scoring chance came in the third inning, which Beaver Power opened with a double. O'Neil sacrificed him to third. White then hit sharply to Loeber's left, but Jerry grabbed the ball, spun, threw to Abbruzzi at the plate and they got Power.

Brown's track team had too many one-two punches for Providence College yesterday and the Bruins romped to a 92-43 victory in a dual meet at Brown Field.

There was a real contest in the freshman meet, however, as the Bruin Cubs needed the second-place finish of Bill Jacobsmeyer in the final event, the 220-yard dash, to nip the Friar yearlings, 67½-65½.

The Brown varsity swept all scoring places in the hammer and high jump and took first and second in six others, the 100, 220, 880, mile, shot and pole vault.

Mel Holland led the Brown assault with 11 points by winning the

440 and placing second in the 100 and 220. Tom Donaldson and Bob Seifert each picked up 10 points with double victories. Walt Molineux, Bill Reid, Mike Reilly and Ed McAllister each contributed eight and Rodney Ralston scored seven.

Dean Slocum won both hurdles races for the Friars and Mike Baccari won the javelin and took second in the discus for seven P.C. points.

George Kanary won three events for the Friar Freshmen, the 100, 220 and 440. Jim Molloy of P.C. won both hurdles races and teammate Joe Madden bested the varsity and freshman runners in winning the two-mile, which was run as one race. Madden later came back and took a second in the 880 behind Pete Wallach of P.C.

Jacobsmeyer was a busy as well as an important man for the Bruin Cubs. He contributed six points with thirds in the 100, high and low hurdles and his second in the 220.

The P.C. freshmen won all eight running races but were outscored heavily in the field. Brown took six firsts, swept three events and tied for first in the high jump.

Maybe some Alaskan visitors would have enjoyed the baseball at Hendricken Field yesterday but I couldn't locate any to inquire. Between the heavy mist, the rain and the cold weather, Providence College and American International played a 7-7 tie, which was called at the end of nine innings. The Friars' home field has never been noted for pleasant spring weather and yesterday did nothing to besmirch its reputation. Even the ducks must have been in hiding, as many people in the PC dug-out as were watching from the stands and vantage points. The game started and finished on a high note for the Aces. Jerry Frazier, the AIC leadoff man, hit a high fast ball over the right field fence and Carl Buniva was behind 1-0 after one pitch in the first inning. In the ninth, the Aces scored four runs and tied up the game with two outs on a wild pitch by John O'Neill.

Six Assists for Ryder
Throwing errors were excusable under the game conditions but this didn't prevent Eddie Ryder, the La Salle alumnus, from picking up six assists for the Friars on throws to bases. All pitchers, except reliefer Eddie Willey of the Aces, had trouble with the wet ball.

Willey, who broke into college baseball with a 2-hit victory in which he posted 18 strikeouts, was in top form late in the game yesterday. He retired the Friars in their big inning when he struck out Dick Howe with the bases loaded. Providence tied the score in the first inning after Frazier's first homer of the season, a good drive over the short fence. Jimmy White singled and eventually scored on a throwing error as Ryder was caught in a rundown, after being picked off first.

Trailing 3 to 1 going into the Providence sixth, Jack Reynolds led off with a pinch single. A walk to White and Howe's infield hit loaded the bases. Ryder's second walk, forced in a run. Then Hank McQueeney came through with a line hit to the fence in right center. Mac cleared the bases and completed the circuit but had to return to second for a ground-rule double when the ball got caught under the outfield fence.

Friars Go Ahead

However, McQueeney's hit put PC ahead, 4 to 3, and finished starter Bob Ford. Russ Fish couldn't get the ball over frequently enough. He gave up three walks and committed a throwing error which led to three more Friar tallies. Then Willey took over and the Friars might just as well have left their bats in the dugout.

The Friars had a 7-4 lead starting the ninth with Tommy McAleer pitching. The Aces filled the bases on Joe Dion's hit, John Doldoorian's walk and McAleer's pitch which hit Frazier. Tommy threw a fast one in the mud for a wild pitch and one run scored. Then he hit Dick Ullery loading the bases again.

O'Neil, another righthander relieved and eased the pressure some by striking out dangerous Gay Salvucci. But Bill Murray whacked a line single to left on a 3-2 pitch, scoring two men and putting the tying run on third. Then with weak sticking Joe Perlik at bat, O'Neil wild pitched home the tying run.

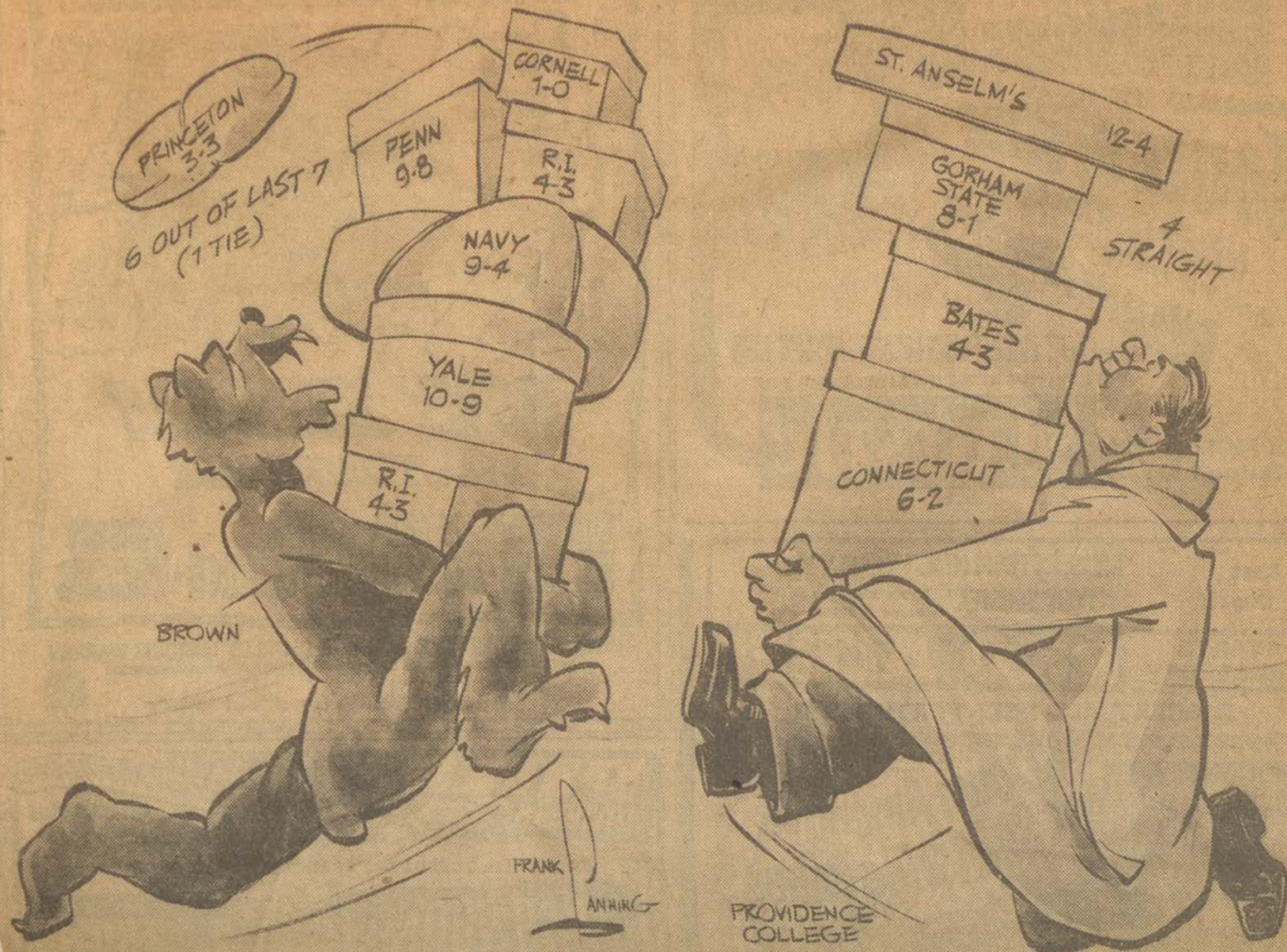

White's Single in 9th Provides Big Run as Friars Down Brown, 2-1

Timely Hit Aids Buniva To Best Kincade in Duel

Carl Limits Bruins to 3 Hits; Power Paces Providence Attack

Jim White's single to left with two out in the ninth inning yesterday enabled Providence College to defeat Brown, 2-1, at Hendricken Field and aided Carl Buniva to gain the decision over Ed Kincade in one of the collegiate baseball season's better duels. Buniva allowed only three hits, none until the sixth.

Bill Quinn, a pinch hitter, had opened the inning by drawing a walk and Dave Kelley ran for him. Buniva sacrificed and Jerry Romberg fanned, before Brown pupose-ly passed John "Beaver" Power, who previously had twice lost home runs on flukes.

Then, with two strikes on him, White looped a single into left and Kelley scored. The third-base coach originally had held up Kelley, but when the ball took a bad bounce in left, he changed the signals and the interesting, well-played game was over. The victory was the Friars' fifth straight. The loss for Brown was the first in five games.

Fluke

The Friars had scored first in the third, when a prospective big inning was halted by a highly unusual double play. Power, dropped to ninth place in the batting order, opened the inning by hitting a drive high above the right field fence. Homer? No—the ball hit a tree and bounced back, Power having to settle for a double. White slashed a single down the third-base line on which Power couldn't advance because Vin Jazwinski threw himself in front of the ball, stopping it with his deep chest. Dick Howe then bunted so proficiently that everyone was safe, the bases loaded.

Ed Ryder scored Power with a fly to center, but a double play resulted when White overslid third and was erased before he could scramble back.

The Bruins tied it in the sixth, which Harry Josephson opened by getting Brown's first hit. He grounded deep to White at short and went to second when White threw wildly. Jazwinski singled him home. The only other hit the Bruins got was Al Lauber's single in the ninth.

With the pitchers in such command of the situation, there were not many opportunities for spectacular defensive work, but the fielding was sharp and the throwing generally excellent. Hank McQueeney of the Friars came up with the best of the defensive plays, a fine running catch of Jazwinski's long smash into left field in the ninth.

Excellent Catch

The value of the catch became immediately apparent because Lauber singled and Kincade walked. But, with danger imminent, Romberg handled Dave Zucconi's mean hopper and threw him out for the final out.

Power, the top hitter with a double and triple in as many official trips, lost his second homer in the seventh when he hit one over the scoreboard, only to have it strike something and bounce back.

In pitching his three-hitter, Buniva walked six and struck out seven. Kincade passed four, and fanned two. Each issued one intentional pass.

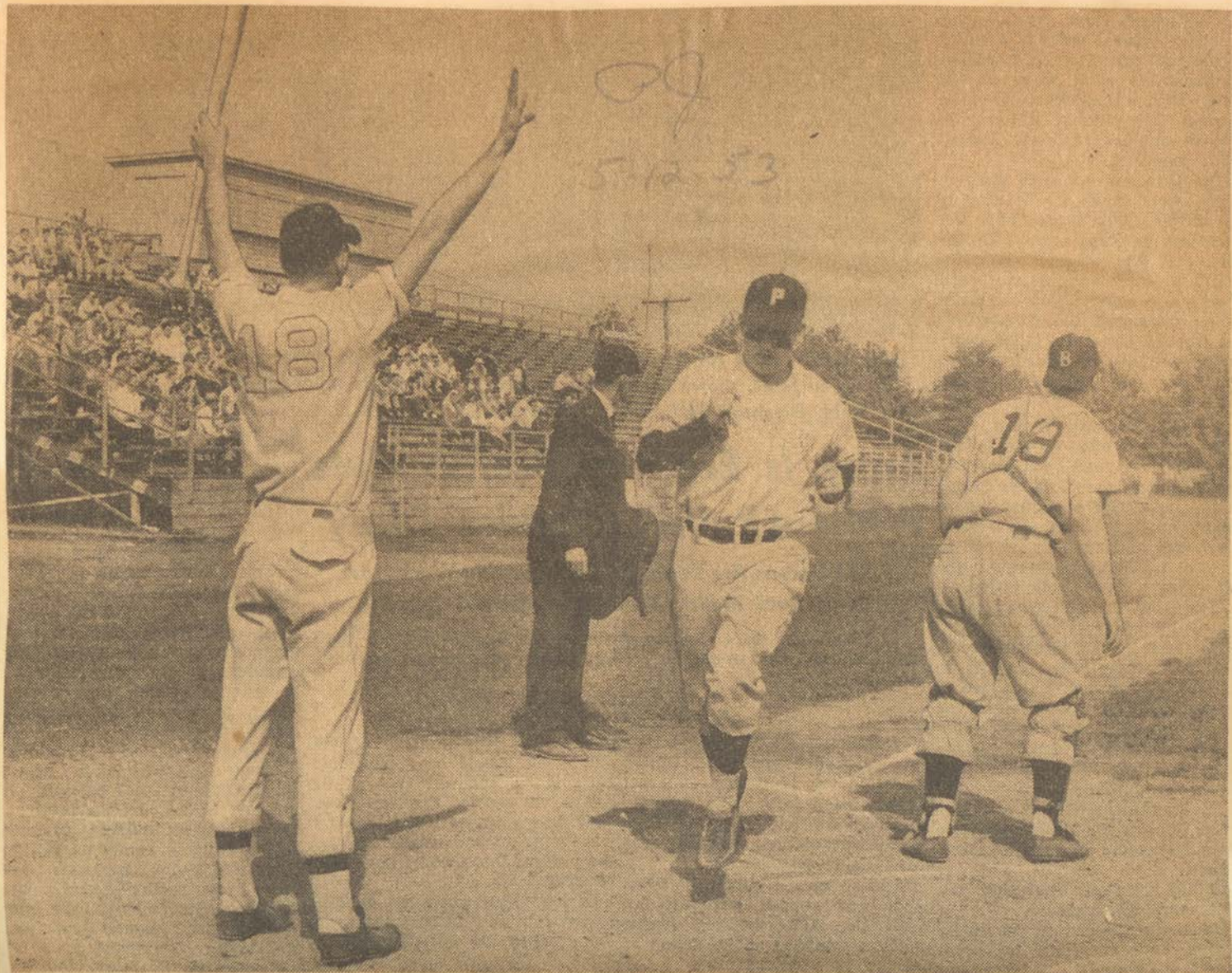
The result of the game threw the Friars and Bruins into a deadlock for the state championship. Brown has defeated Rhode Island twice, lost to the Friars; P.C. has split with Rhode Island and beaten Brown.

They meet again Friday at Brown and in view of yesterday's increased attendance and the fine brand of ball played, it is probable that Friday's game will attract the season's best crowd.

The University of Rhode Island trackmen lowered the boom on Providence College yesterday at Kingston as the Rams completed an unbeaten dual-meet season with a 115-20 triumph over the Friars.

The Rams captured 13 firsts and swept all scoring places in eight events in compiling their lopsided victory margin. Only P.C.'s Mike Baccari was able to break their chain of first-place finishes. He won the javelin and discus and accounted for half of the Friars' meager total.

Three of the Rams scored double victories. Bob Linne won the pole vault and high jump; Joe Pizzo took the 100 and 220-yard dashes, and Dick Ratta captured the high and low hurdles.

Bounces Back

Stuart Smith bounced back from his defeat last week by Brown's Walt Molineux and won the mile in 4:35.5. The Ram runner set the early pace with P.C.'s Chris Lohner right at his heels. Smith covered the first quarter in 68 seconds and the half in 2:18.

Lohner took the lead on the first turn of the third lap and tried his best to lose Smith down the back stretch but the Ram runner stayed within challenging distance until the last turn of the final lap, when he made his victory bid. Smith passed Lohner with such authority on the turn that the P.C. runner simply stopped cold. After walking some 20 yards, Lohner looked back and caught a glimpse of the fast-closing Ray McGuire and jogged in ahead of the Ram runner for second place.

Lohner came back in the 880 and placed third behind the Rams' Conde twins, Bob and Dick, in that order. Bob's time was 2:01.

Art Tingley held off the challenges of Dave Kehoe and Bob Tiernan down the stretch and won the 440 in 51 seconds.

Fake Turns

Hank Trembley won the two-mile run after outlasting P.C.'s Dick Lee. The two rivals took turns at the lead for the first five laps but Trembley went ahead for keeps on the sixth and won going away. Teammate Bob Hammond was second and Lee third. Trembley's winning time was 10:29.6.

Kazar Apkarian won the shot put with a creditable toss of 48:10 $\frac{3}{4}$, and Bob Taylor took the hammer throw with a distance of 166:2 $\frac{1}{2}$.

The victory was the Rams' fourth in as many meets.

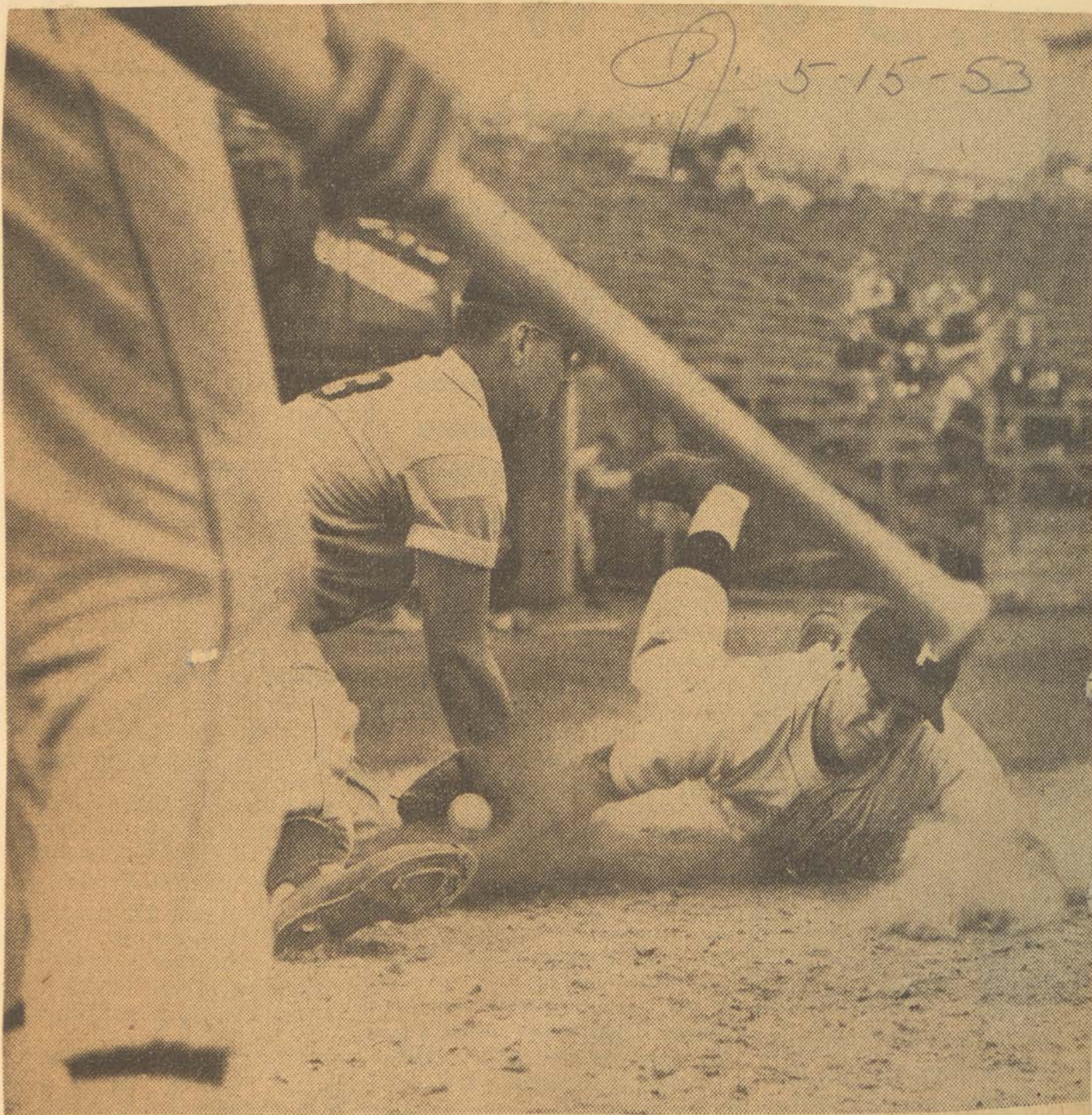

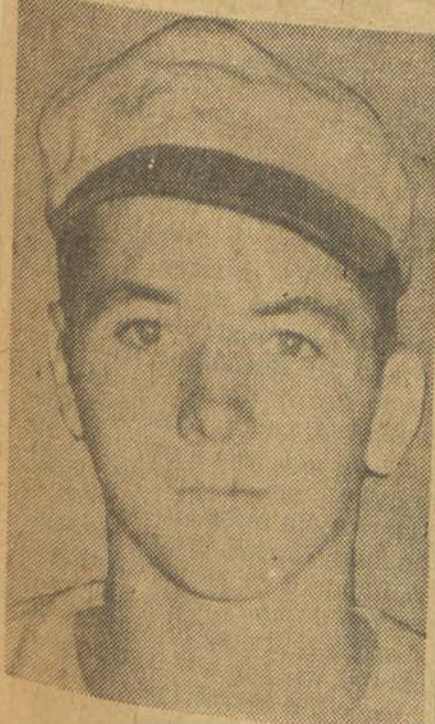

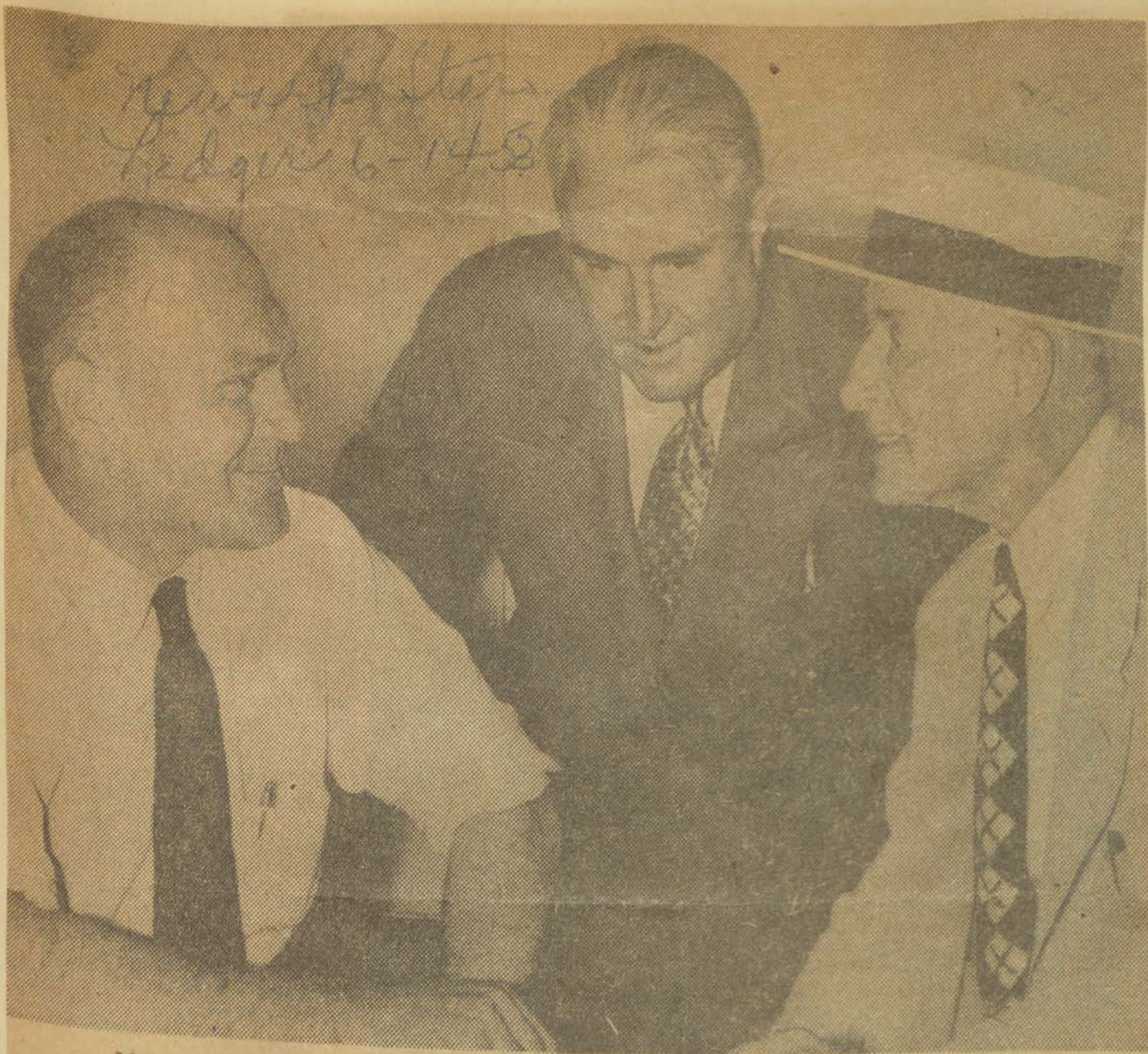

Coates will be feted on Saturday by 'boys' he coached to fame

Harry Coates has never been a guy given to surprises. Forty-odd years as a track and field coach have produced for him patterns of production, ways of getting the best out of a lad with ambitions to attain stardom. Yet he has never grown self-complacent, is ever on the qui vive for the diamond in the rough.

However, recent days have startled him!

First of all, pursuing his job as track mentor at Providence College in Rhode Island, recently he picked up a couple of papers. He learned for the first time that his many friends in New Jersey were planning a party for him at the Hibernian Club on First ave., Elizabeth, the night of June 20.

Then, when he returned to his Newark home a few days ago after completing his fifth year of teaching track and field at the Dominican College in Providenc, the surprises continued. He tells it this way:

FRIENDS GALORE

"I never met so many friends at Broad and Market and around my Roseville section. They all knew more about my party than I did and—hold your hat—several of them insisted that I accept the 'ante' for tickets. It was overwhelming but I promptly told 'em to complete arrangements with Joe Nulty, Bill Mulligan, John Mulvihill, Jack Hoey or any of the other fellows who insist on honoring me."

Yep, "Coatsie" continues to be surprised. Sure, he's coached some 5,000 athletes, many of them to stardom in the past 40 years. Sure, he's one of the most respected members of the American Track Coaches Association. Certainly, he's one of the most witty men in the history of sport. And that's why fellows who ran with him almost half a century ago and competed against his proteges in the decades since insist on honoring "The Hat" with a party next Saturday night.

A SICKLY CHILD

Few have ever known it, but Harry Coates, around the age of 10, was given a very short time to live by his family physician. Harry's mother, who was his greatest rooter until she passed away a few years ago, took the doctor's advice to "keep the lad out of doors."

He had a burning ambition and, with the aid of a hundred of the youngsters who lived near the City Hospital, a 16-lap running track was laid on Fairmount ave. between Cabinet and Bank sts. They used cinders from the hospital's furnaces. And thus the Redmen A. C. (Harry doesn't recall the "why" of the name) was born.

From that distant day, close to six decades ago, the name of Coates has been symbolic of all phases of track and field. He ran for Seton Hall Prep and helped form one of the fastest—and unbeaten—relay teams of all times. Members of that team, shortly after the turn of the century, besides Harry, were Andy McDonough, now a suburbanite; the Rev. Robert Burke, now of Chicago; Raoul Walsh, still one of Hollywood's greatest directors; Rev. Walter Hennessey, pastor Good Counsel Church, Newark; Carl Fegan and the late Ferdinand Hax, later a Newark policeman who was killed in line of duty.

PLENTY OF CHAMPS

Through a thoroughly absorbing career—in which on occasions he filled in for ailing coaches, including Emil Von Elling at New York University and the famed Mercersburg Academy mentor, Jimmy Curran—Coates, still a resident of the Roseville section of Newark, has developed 34 world's record-holding relay teams, 30 American team champions and 16 individual American champions in addition to Olympic stars.

The roster of the "Coates boys" is lengthy during those years he coached at Seton Hall, Bloomfield High, Bloomfield Catholic Lyceum, St. Benedict's Prep, Newark Prep, Villanova College, Mercersburg Academy and various clubs. And most pleasing to Coach Harry Coates is the success, in all walks of life, that his boys have attained.

Just a few of the men who attained stardom under the Coates banner: Johnny Gibson, Frank Zuna, Willie Kelly, Joe Nulty (chairman of the June 20 committee, Herbert Staub, Eddie Garlock, Millard Cook, Howard Rawson, Eddie Roll, Gus Desch, Tom Tully, the late Charley McCraith, Alec Brewster, Alec Duncan, Frank Malanphy, Mike Devaney, Al Hulsebosch, Eddie Garvey, Jack Hoey, Charley Kelly, Bill Mulli-

gan, John Mulvihill, Al Post, Bernie McCafferty, Bill Read, "Bump" Hadley (famed big league pitcher who tossed the shot for Coates at Mercersburg Academy), John Tomasko, John Kerr, John Ul-drick, Victor Burke.

The list also includes Francis (Pat) Troy, Joe Burns, Ernie Oshetcky, Victor Smith, Mel Dalton, the late Walter Gegan, Tommy Mitchell, Art O'Connor, Frank Sevigne, Jumbo Elliott, Frank Ward, Walter Slovenski, Tom Finn, Pete Wilson, Harold Brugieure, Earl Audet, Carmen Bova, Eddie Styrna, Lou Collado, Joe Matyunas, Mel Vincent, Bud Hynes, Ted Janiack, Walter Malita, Paul Plumer, Jimmy O'Hear; the late Chet End, Larry Dineen, Bill Gannon—and a raft of others.

So that takes care of the 'middle' in fine shape, even if Martin doesn't say so. The other spots are

not as settled, but Martin indicates it is a matter of moving the right man into the right spot.

For instance, Quinn or Ryder can play one of the outfield positions, or even first base; and there is Hank McQueeney, another candidate for catcher, who may end up as an outfielder.

And for third base there is John "Beaver" Power, though he has been something of an all-around man so far. In yesterday's game, he started out on first, later shifted to third. In a previous game, he was the catcher.

Natives Return

Against the Friars it was Jack McKinnon of Pawtucket, who pitched a four-hitter as Boston College took a 7-4 victory at Hendricken Field. McKinnon defeated Rhode Island earlier this season and on Saturday he had allowed just two hits going into the ninth. That's the inning the Friars got their runs.

Dartmouth, similarly, held Brown scoreless until the ninth at Aldrich Field, as the Indians took a 5-1 victory. Dick Major pitched a four-hitter for the Indians and the first two runs his team got — all that were needed, as it turned out — were driven in by Bill Beck Jr., of Kingston, son of the Rams' coach.

Brown's baseball team will be back in action on Wednesday at Aldrich Field against Yale, the first of three Ivy League opponents for the Bruins this week.

Track Meets

Yale is the strong club of the league this season and demonstrated it perfectly Saturday by defeating Cornell, 3-0, on a no-hitter by Bob Davis, a sophomore left-hander. He may start against Brown. The Eli's tennis team also will meet the Bruins in Providence that day.

Providence College's Wednesday opponent will be Springfield, which took a 13-inning, 3-2 victory over Amherst on Saturday.

Brown and the Rams will take to the road on Friday for a couple of games. The Rams go northward and the Bruins southward.

Brown will play Princeton on Friday and Navy on Saturday. The Rams first will meet Maine and then New Hampshire.

Holy Cross, the collegiate world's baseball champion, will be the Friars' opponent on Friday, as noted. The Crusaders took Boston University, 10-6, in 10 innings on Saturday.

Two track meets are listed for the day — Holy Cross at Brown and Providence College at Rhode Island. All three Rhody schools had representatives at the Penn Relays on Saturday, but only Bob Linne of the Rams was in on the scoring. He tied for first in the pole vault with Jim Harrington of Notre Dame and Van Zimmerman of Penn. Their height was 13 feet, four inches.

The Friars will have the sports scene practically to themselves on Saturday when they play American International College at Hendricken Field. The only competition will be the Brown-M.I.T. tennis.

Teams active out of town include Brown's golfers, who play Williams, and Brown's freshman nine, which takes on Worcester Academy. Brown's crew will race LaSalle at Philadelphia.

Tominaga Gets Win

Quinn Injured

Springfield grabbed a 3-0 lead in the first inning with the aid of another infield hit—once again off the bat of Sunderland. Three Providence infield errors and a couple of bases on balls helped the cause.

Providence came back with some gilded runs of its own—five to be exact—to take over the advantage in the fifth. Ten men batted in this horrendous frame that saw Ulrich make his exit in favor of Tominaga. Singles by Howe, Romberg and Dave Kelley helped the Friars but a trio of Springfield miscues also contributed to the damage. Four of the five tallies were unearned.

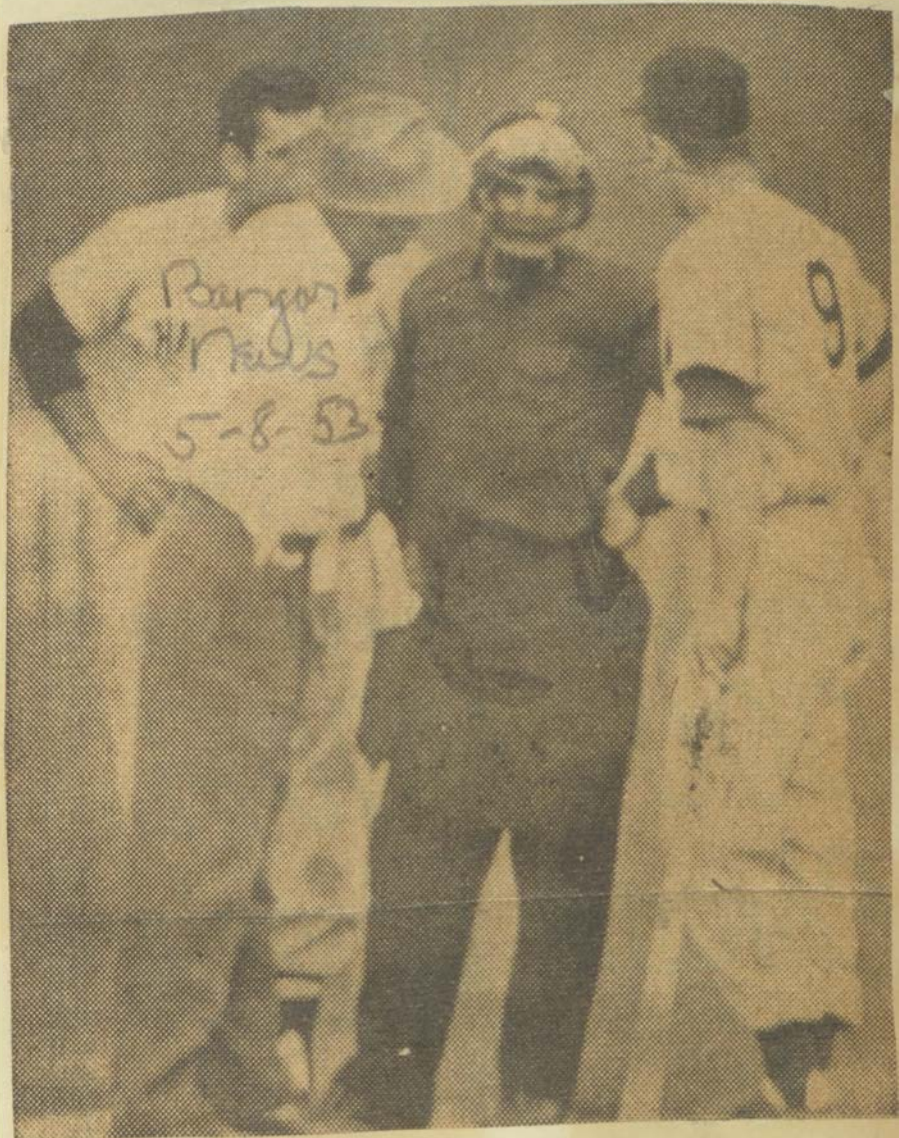

Plainfield, all graduates of the Coates school, are familiar to local fans.

Those are some of the names that cropped up last week as the aging but still energetic tutor (currently working on a five-year contract at Providence College) reminisced at his home while slowly puffing on a corn cob pipe.

BUT THE ENERGY and drive that earned him the reputation as the outstanding coach in America during a 15-year period at Seton Hall College; and the same energy and boundless love for the sport that led him to accept the position at Providence after leaving Seton Hall in 1948, were all too apparent.

One minute he'd be relaxing on the sofa and the next he'd be bounding across the floor, sending an imaginary shot crashing through the window and up against the side of St. Rose of Lima Church across the street from his residence at 47 Humboldt St.

Coates has a marvelous memory. He remembers the smallest details of every race of any consequence. He knows the quarter-by-quarter splits of every relay championship he's ever won.

And he can remember other things like Gibson shoveling snow



off an outdoor track at 1:30 on a cold Winter morning so he could continue to practice. Or Frank Zuna, Newark plumber who won the 26-mile Boston Marathon, asking Coates not to run him in any more of "those two-mile sprints."

ZUNA, WHOM COATES calls "the greatest marathon runner who ever lived," won the Boston chase in 1920, the same year the famed mentor placed five men including Desh in the Olympics. Gibson, Mel Dalton and Walt Geegan made the Olympic team in 1928 and over the years, starting in 1912 when Coates was coaching on his own and saw Ben Adams make the American team, he's developed more than 15 Olympic competitors.

Since he started coaching Coates has worked at St. Benedict's, Bloomfield High, St. Joseph's Catholic Club, Newark Police, Newark Prep, Seton Hall Prep, Seton Hall College, Villanova College, Mercersburg Academy, Providence and assorted athletic clubs.

He was at Seton Hall twice, from



1925 through '28, and 1933 through '48. During the latter stretch he also handled the prep school and developed one of the most devastating scholastic squads in the history of the sport.

"From 1939 through '41," he said, "the prep school could have won or placed pretty high up in the IC4A collegiate championships. In 1940 at the Penn Relays we won the 440, mile, two-mile and medley relay championships while the college freshmen won in their division and the varsity took a class race."

Seton Hall College won the national championships at the Penn Relays in 1925 and two years later copped the medley relay crown while Newark Prep was winning the scholastic mile title.

COATES CAME UP with a record foursome in 1940 when Seton Hall College cracked the world half-mile indoor standard while winning the National AAU title in 1:32. Two years later his two-mile quartet established what he considers one of the greatest records of the time when it lowered the indoor mark to 7:33.9.

But Harry, who once thought of retiring but decided he couldn't be happy on the sidelines, doesn't spend his time thinking of past glories. He had some good teams at Providence, where he won the national junior one-mile relay crown in 1950 when his cross-country team was unbeaten, and he's continually trying to build the squad up.

Coates has a keen and active mind and during last week's interview made some poignant observations about the sport. Some samples:

On development:

"A lot of good high school

that smile is a shame for me to quit and I lost that smile the day I trained under you."

"That," said Coates as he finished the story, "is what's wrong with too many of today's competitors. When they lose that smile they quit."

And quitting is one thing you don't do if you ever want to run for a competitor like Harry Coates.—J.T.

. . . If any more Malden Catholic athletes head for Providence College, they'll have to change the nickname of that college from Friars to Blues. . . No less than five outstanding athletes will enroll next month. . . They are Mike McDonough, Phil Crawford, Red Gorman, Jim Coates and Bob Gulla. . . McDonough, Crawford and Gorman are brilliant hockey players, so the Friars might be coming up with a good hockey team one of these years.

A Fighting Heart—That's What Harry Coates Still Asks Of His Runners After 40 Successful Years as a Coach

NEWARK—The year was 1913. Harry Coates was addressing five candidates for the first track team ever organized at St. Benedict's Prep.

Coates, now one of the world's foremost coaches, looked the boys over. Then he uncorked the first of many stirring locker-room speeches and ended by telling his awed charges, "If each of you has a fighting heart and a good pair of legs, we'll have ourselves a track team!"

Two years later four members of his original five-man audience made the All-America prep school team. Three years in a row the Gray Bees won the National Catholic relay championships at the Penn Relays. St. Benedict's had itself a track team!

TODAY, SOME OF those fellows are almost as legendary as Coates himself. And those who can possibly make it will be among the guests when his pupils help Coates celebrate his 40th anniversary as a coach at a testimonial dinner in the Hibernian Hall, Elizabeth, June 20.

A roll call of his former charges almost sounds like a roster of American track. There are men like Gus Desh, Alec Brewster, Tom and Joe Tully from his early days at St. Benedict's. Jumbo Elliott, track coach at Villanova; Frank Sevigne, serving in the same capacity at Villanova; Johnny Gibson, one of his greatest finds and now head tutor at Seton Hall University; Art O'Connor, Fordham mentor, all came under Harry's wing at one time or another.

The coaching accomplishments of Tom Mitchell at St. Peter's Prep; Tom Finn at St. Michael's Jersey City; Charley Kelly at St. Benedict's, and Hal Bruguere at Plainfield, all graduates of the

athletes are mentally burned out by the time they get to college. The majority of the fellows you hear about today were only second raters in high school but they have been developed properly."

On college policy:

"SMALL COLLEGES must concentrate on developing relay teams. They can't carry shot putters, jumpers and vaulters on scholarships. A dual meet involving these fellows may draw 300 fans. But a relay team often runs before 16,000 people."

On the Olympics:

"It's a wonder our boys do so well in the Olympics. A boy must hit his peak long before the Olympics in order to make the team whereas in Europe the squad is picked a year or two in advance and the athlete is allowed to train to hit his peak in time for the games."

Coates then told of a runner who had come to him after being beaten by three of Harry's charges in a Paterson meet although he had a 15-yard lead with 50 yards to go. Coates told the runner he was yellow and had quit but the boy denied it and asked Coates to train him.

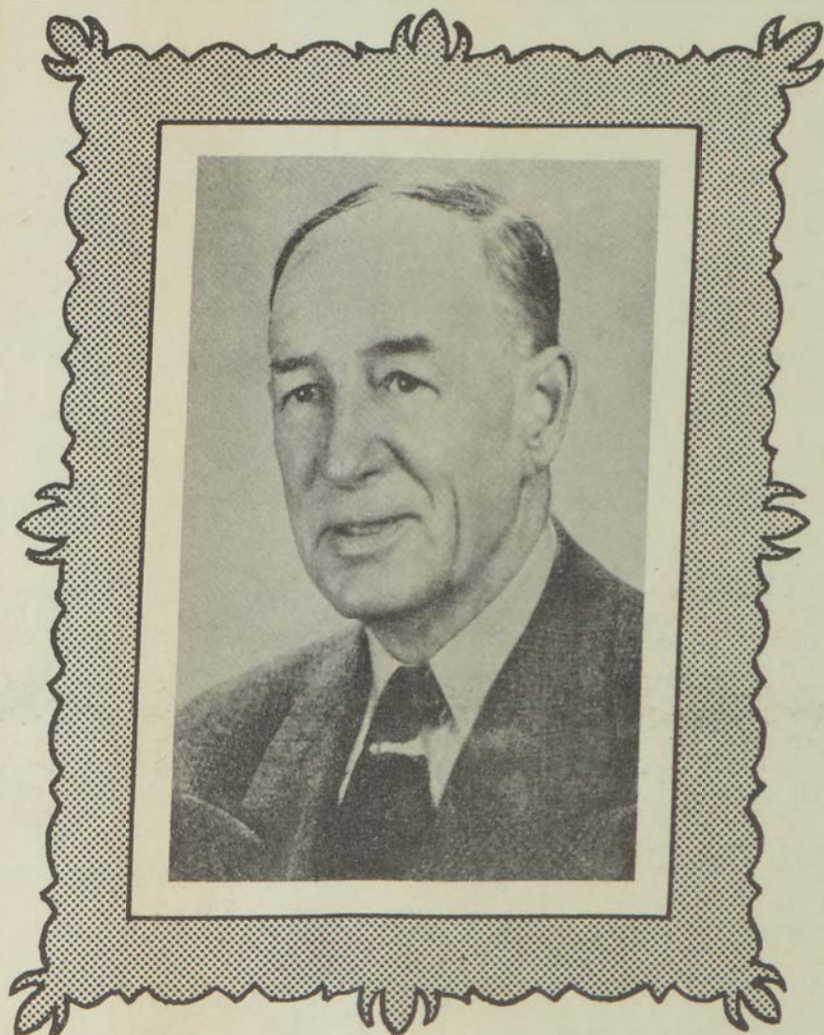
"The next day," Harry relates, "he showed up and I had him sprint and trot alternately down at Branch Brook Park until his tongue was hanging out. At one stretch he ran the equivalent of a 4:12 mile—A terrific pace in those days—and I told him to come back next day.

"BUT I DIDN'T see him again for another year when I ran into him at a club meet and I asked him why he never came back."

"Mr. Coates," the boy replied, "I smile when I win and I smile when I lose, but when I lose that smile it's time for me to

"Can't Win Without Agony On My Face"

One of our best and most generally recognized track and field coaches will be honored by his former charges at a testimonial in the Hibernian Clubhouse tomorrow night. The colleges have closed and more schools are closing every day. It is the season of new graduates, and it is particularly good timing that brings Harry Coates to Elizabeth just as so many young folks leave the classroom to face the world.

There is no particular reason why the champions in so many divisions of track and field competition should choose a clubhouse in Elizabeth as the stage on which they propose to acknowledge Mr. Coates' "forty years" of coaching. Among the school and college stars, the Olympic point winners, and the title holders in open competition assembled there will not be more than a mere three or four from Elizabeth and yet, without ever speaking a word, what a sermon there is in his presence for the new graduates setting out to conquer the world.

Among the literally hundreds of interesting stories about Harry Coates' career as an athlete and coach is the one about his "discovery" who, to all appearance, had everything to make a champion. Furthermore, the coach was solidly convinced in his belief when the novice ran a 4.23 training mile over a track with four sharp corners. To a track follower this meant a mile in about 4.12 on a track of the usual construction with great possibilities ahead as the training progressed.

However, to his great sense of loss, Mr. Coates saw no more of his prodigy for a full year after that performance. And when they finally met up the coach wanted to know what happened. He got his answer without a pause and new graduates will please pay attention. The prodigy said:

"My Coates, I like to win with a smile and when I lose I lose with a smile. When I got to get agony in my face to win I want no part of it."

In those few words the young man was totaling up one whole lifetime. Life is a series of races against opponents who'll "use an elbow on the turns" and who'll use their spikes if they can get away with it. Some hardly worthwhile races can be won with a smile, but the big ones can only be won with "agony on my face," which simply means "going all out."

"Victory" doesn't come looking for the fellow with the new diploma; the fellow with the diploma has to go looking for "victory." If he goes after it with "agony" on his face, if he gives the race his all, he's the kind of a competitor the coaches of the business world are looking for. And you can't "smile" away failure. Ask Mr. Coates. He's coached a thousand winners.

SHANNON JOINS FRIARS' STAFF

Earl F. Shannon, former R. I. University star, has been appointed to the position of assistant coach of basketball at Providence College it was announced last night. Shannon will succeed Harold T. Big Night for Harry Coates

The yarns will be tall and probably long tonight at Hibernian Hall in Elizabeth as his friends and former pupils tender a testimonial dinner to Harry Coates, a top figure in this country's track and field history.

An impressive battery of speakers will be on hand to extoll the feats of the 68-year Providence College track mentor on reaching his 40th year of coaching. They will be a little bit short on the number of years since Harry leaned to coaching since the first day he took up foot-racing with the Redmen A. C. of Newark way back in 1898.

His first venture in running was on a 16-lap cinder track he built with his pals opposite the hospital in Fairmount avenue, between Cabinet and Bank streets. Many members of the Redmen team later blossomed as stars for the neighboring high and prep schools.

Prominent Teammates

Harry's own running days lasted until 1910. He coached as well as ran on the great Seton Hall prep teams of 1905 and 1906. Some of his teammates were Raoul Walsh, prominent movie director; Rev. Walter A. Hennessey, pastor of Good Counsel of Newark; Rev. Robert Burke, present pastor of a Chicago church; Andy McDonough of West Orange, Carl Fegan and the late Ferdinand Hax.

At his best over the half-mile

distance, Coates defeated Peerless Mel Sheppard, Olympic great, in 1907. Another of his victims that year was Guy Haskins of New Zealand, a University of Pennsylvania student who held the intercollegiate 880 and mile titles.

At St. Benedict's Prep in Newark and at Bloomfield High in 1913 Coates began to concentrate on coaching. A book could be written on his activities and development of Olympians and other champions from there and he worked with several schools and

clubs at one time as he moved throughout the East.

Olympians

Schools and clubs coached by the gray-haired coach include Seton Hall Prep and College, Villanova, New York University, Newark Academy, Bloomfield Lyceum and the Paulist A. C. of New York.

Harry traveled to the 1912 Olympics at Stockholm as an assistant coach and trainer of the Canadian team. Among his boys who went on to become Olympians were Gus Desch, Frank Zuna, Al Hulsebosh, Mike Devaney, John Gibson, Mel Dalton and Walt Gegan. National AAU and collegiate champions are too numerous to mention.

One thing Coates is exceptionally proud of is that a number of his boys turned to coaching to help track and field maintain its high place among competitive sports. They include Gibson, now at Seton Hall University; Fordham's Artie O'Conner, Frank Sevigne of Georgetown, Jim Elliott of Villanova, Frank Ward at Virginia, Walt Slovenski at Bates, Tom Mitchell and Tom Finn of St. Peter's and St. Michael's of Jersey City, respectively; Pete Wilson of Bloomfield, Harold Bruguiere of Plainfield and Chink Kelley of St. Benedict's.

About 200 of Harry's boys are expected to be on hand for the dinner. Stop watches will be checked at the door.

Tom Mitchell's Track Record Outstanding

This is the 46th in a series of articles about coaches in the Catholic schools of the Newark Archdiocese.

JERSEY CITY—Tom Mitchell has been coaching track at St. Peter's Prep since 1945. Since then his teams have won six out of eight Catholic high school championships in the annual NJSIAA carnival.

And what does Tom Mitchell have to say about that record? Only that "My wife and Harry Coates made it possible." Why so? "My wife," he says, "has been a patient listener; she's heard all my comments and laments for years but she's still an enthusiastic and interested adviser."

AND HARRY COATES? "Harry's been my idol and counselor in track matters for 25 years. Most of what I know about coaching has been picked up from him. In my opinion he is the world's greatest track coach." That opinion, incidentally, is shared by many another. Coates has been turning out champions for more than 40 years and he's still at it at Providence College.

But let's take a further look at Mitchell's record at St. Peter's. From 1946 through 1949 he won the state outdoor crown. The Petreans were second in 1950, failed to enter in '51 and won again in '52 and '53. From 1946 through '51, the last year they were held, St. Peter's won the

Catholic indoor championships.

During the 1946 indoor campaign the Petreans won the six-lap sprint relay and the one-mile relay in the prep school division of the nationals. The following year they repeated their sprint relay conquest in the high school division and that Spring copped the Eastern High school crown at the Seton Hall relays.

In 1948 the team won the Hudson County outdoor crown and Northern New Jersey indoor championships. This season the Petreans picked up the Jersey City, Hudson County Catholic and state Catholic championships. In eight years Mitchell's relay teams have won class races at the Penn Relays five times.

QUITE A RECORD! But it's only a continuation of a successful track career begun at Newark's Barringer High at the age of 13. In 1918 he won the city half mile crown and the following year entered St. Benedict's. Before graduating in 1922 he won the state cross-country title, half mile indoor diadem, 440 outdoor championship and the broad jump. Competing as an individual he also picked up the state industrial 880 title.

In college, he was only a sporadic track competitor at Manhattan, Temple and Panzer but by 1925 he was already making a name for himself as a coach. He brought the Newark parochial

championship to St. Antoninus in 1925 and the following year repeated with St. Rose of Lima's.

In 1927 he began teaching at Public School 6 in Jersey City and for the next four years that school won the city public school championship.

From 1931 to 1942 he coached track at Lincoln High School. The year after his appointment Lincoln won the national championship at the Newark Armory with a three-man team. Between 1934 and 1941 the school won the Hudson County title six times and the Northern New Jersey five times. In 1939, '40 and '41 the school won the state indoor crown and in the latter two years copped the outdoor title.

OUTSTANDING for Lincoln during these years were Dave Wilson, Ed Dixon and James Branch. In 1934 Wilson equalled a world's record of 7 seconds flat for the 70-yard dash in the Newark Armory. From 1939 to '41 Dixon and Branch ran one-two in the sprints in every meet entered by Lincoln.

As for the future, Mitchell takes a pessimistic view for the '53 - '54 season. "I had 13 lettermen last year but 11 of them have graduated," he says. "It may take us a year or two to rebuild, but I'm quite sure we'll be on top again before long."

In view of Tom Mitchell's past record, you'll have to admit the truth of that last statement.

Hailing Harry . . .

It would be well to get off the subject of dinners before I talk myself into raiding the ice-box, but that must have been quite a party they threw for Harry Coates, the Providence College track coach, down at Elizabeth, N.J., last night. . . . The veteran Friar instructor, who can quote you Shakespeare and track records with equal ease, has coached more than 5000 athletes during a 40-year career in which he taught the sport at Seton Hall, Bloomfield High, Bloomfield Catholic Lyceum, St. Benedict's Prep, Newark Prep, Villanova College, Mercersburg Academy and various clubs before coming to P.C. five years ago. . . . A good many of his "old boys" joined with his host of friends throughout New Jersey in staging last night's affair. . . . While preparing for the dinner the committee dug into the record books and found that Coates had developed 34 world-record relay teams, 30 American team champions and 16 individual American champs as well as Olympic performers. . . . Harry developed his own interest in track when he was a frail and sickly lad of 10 and the doctor advised his mother to keep him out in the fresh air as much as possible. . . . With his mother's hearty encouragement, he formed a track club among the neighborhood boys and they built a 16-lap running oval. . . . There he built himself into a durable runner and went on to Seton Hall Prep where he was a member of an unbeaten relay team. . . . One of his fellow relayers there was Raoul Walsh, the movie director.

P.C. Plays Host To Schoolboys

More Than 50 Harriers Expected to Compete In 2 1/2-Mile Race

Providence College will play host to a group of schoolboy cross country runners this afternoon at 4 o'clock at its second annual interscholastic road race. More than 50 schoolboy athletes are expected to compete over the 2 1/2 mile course which covers the Providence College campus and surrounding area.

P.C. Gymnasium Contract Is Let

Gilbane Firm Submits Lowest of 11 Bids; Early Start Foreseen

A contract for construction of the new gymnasium building at Providence College has been awarded the Gilbane Building Co., the Very Rev. Robert J. Slavin, O.P., president of the college, said last night.

Father Slavin said the Gilbane firm was the lowest of 11 bidders. The amount of the contract was not announced and the contract will not be formally signed for several days.

Previously, the cost of the new 235 by 190 foot structure was estimated at \$1,500,000. The excavation already has been dug on the campus near the athletic field.

The building will be two stories high, of concrete block construction, with red brick facing and limestone trim. A great arch over

the main gymnasium will have a clear span of 150 feet, with a glass roof 45 feet above the center of the floor for day lighting.

The main floor will be large enough to house the varsity basketball court plus three intramural courts. The gym will seat 2,441 persons on the main floor and 1,658 in the balcony.

An unusual feature in a gymnasium building will be a large student lounge with a glass front overlooking the campus. There also will be a cafeteria, soda fountain and recreation room, in addition to offices, coaches' rooms, exercise rooms, lockers, showers and storage space.

Father Slavin said last night that he hoped construction could start immediately after the formal signing of the contract.

Mass. Harriers Take Crown in New Englands

Shea Individual Victor; P.C. Team First In Freshman Race

Boston—Ed Shea, 21-year-old Northeastern senior, captured the individual title yesterday in the 41st annual New England Intercollegiate Cross-County Championships at Franklin Park, but he and his Huskie teammates were nosed out for the team crown by Massachusetts, 82-83.

The Providence College Freshmen easily won the team title in the yearling race by placing five men in the first 13. The Friars' winning total was 36 points, 22 better than second-place Tufts.

Shea, who is the New England intercollegiate outdoor two-mile champion and record holder, defeated Johnny Kelley of Boston University by about 75 yards in the excellent time of 20 minutes, 42 seconds for the 4.2-mile course. The victory climaxed a brilliant three-year career for the Northeastern runner. He had finished third in 1951 (the year Kelley won) and second behind Brown's Walt Molineux last year. His time yesterday was 52 seconds faster than his effort a year ago.

He and Kelley took turns at the lead for the first two miles but after the Northeastern runner went out in front at about the two-mile mark, he never was headed. Approximately a mile and a quarter from the finish, Shea lengthened his lead to 50 yards and Kelley was unable to challenge him seriously thereafter.

John Farquhar of M.I.T. finished third for the second straight year. His time yesterday was 21:06.

Herbert Hinman, 18-year-old Bronx, N.Y. native running for Wesleyan, won the freshman race in 13:58. He had been unbeaten in his junior and senior years at Roosevelt High School and in all of his previous meets this season.

Point scorers on the winning P.C. Freshman team were: Rod Boucher (3), Arthur Hewes (4), Gerald Farley (9), Al O'Brien (10) and Ed Nelson (13). The last three men were moved up one place on a corrected-scoring basis as B.U.'s sixth-place finish did not count since the Terriers didn't field a full five-man team.

In the varsity race, everybody who finished after sixth-place Frank Cameron of Bowdoin was moved up one place. Bowdoin didn't have a team entered.

P.C. finished sixth in the varsity standings with Chris Lohner (12), Joe Madden (13), Pierre Wallack (20), Bernard Dandley (45) and Connie Sullivan (74). The University of Rhode Island, defending team champions, placed ninth with Gerald Smith (36), Bill MacQuattie (39), Henry Tremblay (41), Stuart Smith (47) and Bill Hammond (61).

Brown was 14th with Bill Reid (43), Adrian Ise (46), Tinley Olton (70), Hendrick Van Loon (73) and Robert Ise (81).

Assumption Five Weathers Storm

Gederman, the Kilties' No. 1 distance runner won by 15 yards over 106 pound George Massey of St. Raphael, the runnerup. Close behind Massey in third place was Ed Lucini, a teammate.

These three led the pack of 50 runners throughout the latter half of the race with first one and then the other taking a short lead. Gederman finally took command over the last half-mile and held his margin to the finish. His time was 13:17.5.

Two La Salle runners, Don Lendry and Keer McIntyre, placed fourth and fifth. The first five finishers received medals for their efforts. Mount Pleasant was awarded the Providence College Spike Shoe Club Trophy for one year.

This year's race was in the nature of a novice event with the top 10 finishers in the state meet and any runner who placed within the first 20 in the New England championships ineligible, according to Harry Coates, PC track coach.

No team scores were kept so that the emphasis would be on individual performance.
