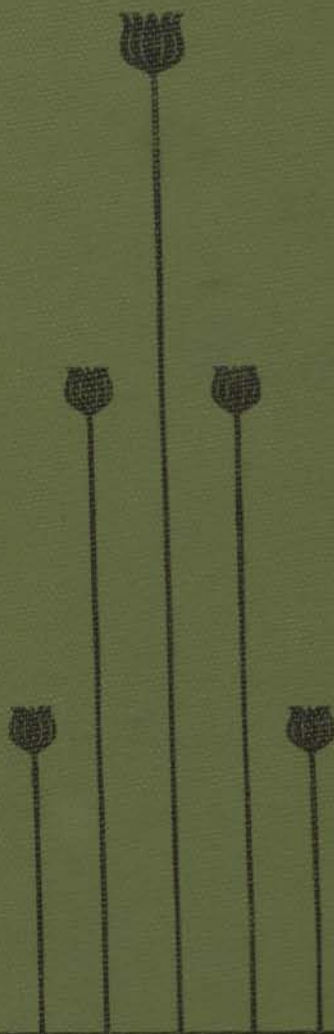
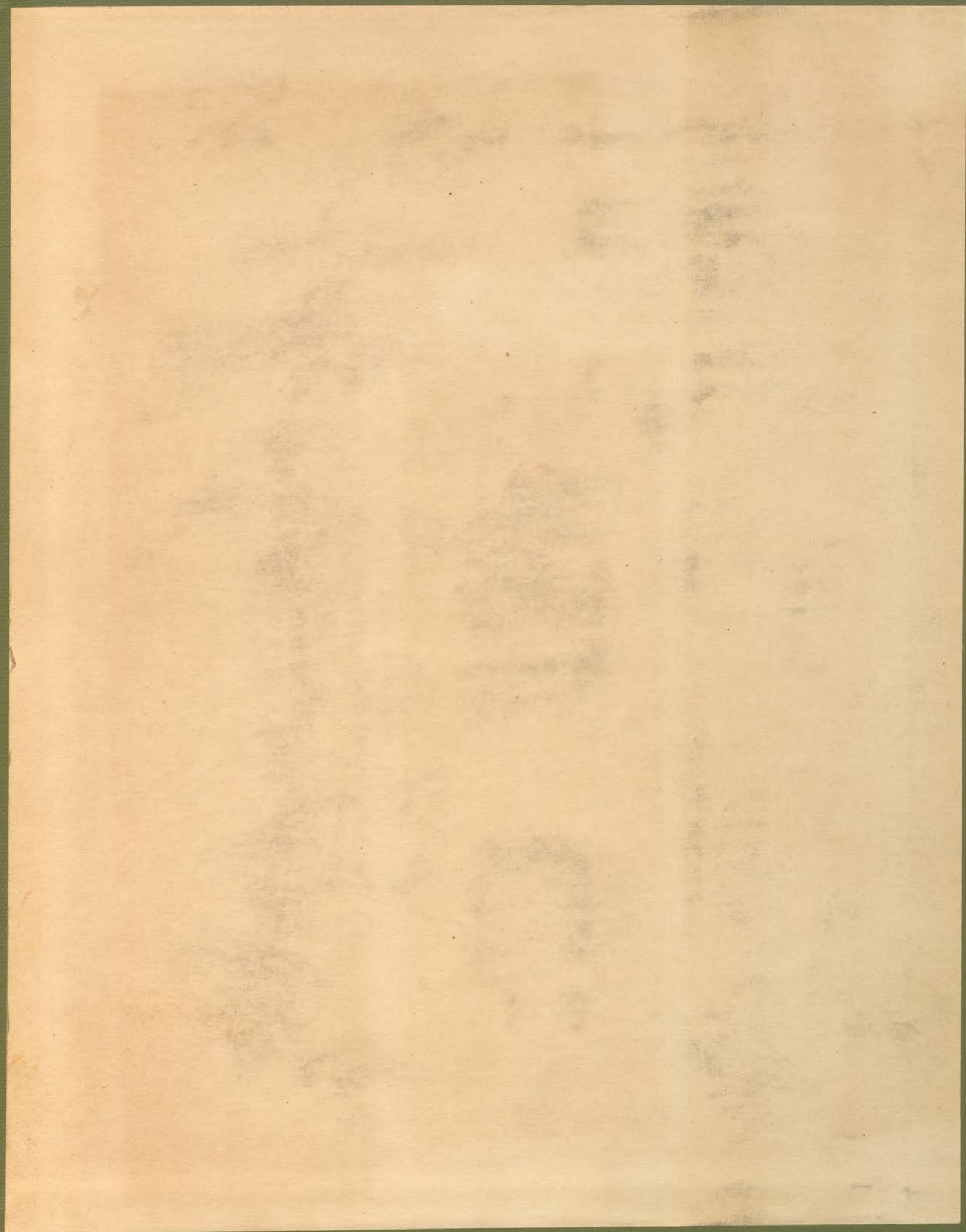

## St. John's Plays On Thursday's Card at Garden

College basketball's 1953-54 campaign, which will fill gymnasiums and field houses with thunder and thumping until next March, gets rolling this week with a nation-wide series of skirmishes designed to prepare those concerned for the more interesting and important holiday junkets and invitation tournaments.

In the Greater New York area only Columbia, which has another week of grace, will be inactive. All the others, large, small and smaller, will be engaged at least once. Madison Square Garden will open its twentieth intercollegiate season on Thursday; Pennsylvania's Palestra and Boston's Garden will begin their college double-header programs and Buffalo's Memorial Auditorium will present its first really good program on Saturday.

Metropolitan curiosity as to the authenticity of one Bevo Francis as a big league shot-maker may be satisfied on Thursday. That night, the pride of Rio Grande College, all 6 feet 9 inches of him, will be trotted out for inspection by the Garden's habitués.

The attenuated sophomore, who has more spectacular scoring feats to his credit than there are rum foundries in the West Indies, warmed up for his New York debut by flinging in 64 points against something known as Erie County Technical Institute in Buffalo a couple of nights back. Adelphi College, of Garden City, L. I., has been selected as the foil for Bevo and his Rio Grande playmates.

# Baptism Tuesday for Keaney Gym

## Twin Bill Matching P.C.-Brown, R.I.-Conn. to Open New Court

A brand new chapter in the Keaney basketball saga will begin Tuesday night when the Frank W. Keaney Gymnasium at the University of Rhode Island will get its first official workout.

An attractive collegiate double-header, matching Providence College against Brown and Rhode Island against Connecticut, will be presented before a crowd that is expected to tax the 4200-seat capacity of the new arena. The structure, which has been named after the man who coached Ram teams for 27 years before retiring in 1948 to become Rhody's athletic director, was completed in time for commencement exercises last spring. But it will be formally dedicated for athletics Tuesday night.

The Friars and the Bruins will meet in the first game at 7:30 p.m., with the Rams-UConn game expected to start at 9:30.

Coach Vin Cuddy at Providence College has seven veterans back from last year. They are Bobby Moran, Ken Kerr and Jack Durkin, forwards; Tom Mullins, Hank McQueeney and Phil Lynch, guards; and Jack Reynolds, center. Teddy Tedesco is the top sophomore candidate.

According to Cuddy, the Friars should be a better club than last year but will give away a lot in height. He said the team looked good against Connecticut in a recent scrimmage but pretty bad against Coast Guard Academy.

Brown, like the Friars, has a generous sprinkling of seasoned players back. Headed by Capt. Lou Murgo, the list includes Ed Tooley, Ed Kincaid, Bill Arnold, Red Judkins, Jim Pendergast, Ray Malkowicz and Norm Sprinthall. Best-looking sophomores to date have been Pete Campisi, Phil Jerauld and Charlie Merritt.

P.C. also will have a busy opening week. The Friars play Assumption College of Worcester in a tornado-disaster benefit game Friday at Woonsocket. Then on Saturday they run smack into Bevo Francis and his Rio Grande College mates at the Boston Garden in the second game of a tripleheader. Boston College meets St. Anselm's in the opener and the Boston Celtics are playing in the finale.

Brown has one other game scheduled this week, meeting Amherst at Amherst Saturday night.

# Twin Bill Opening Keaney Gym Tonight

## Brown Opposes Friars, Rhody Meets Uconns

College basketball hereabouts makes its bow tonight at the University of Rhode Island's new Frank W. Keaney Gymnasium, where Brown meets Providence College and Rhody entertains the University of Connecticut.

The Bruins and the Friars will kick it off at 7:30 o'clock and official dedication ceremonies are scheduled between games.

Dr. Carl W. Woodward, university president, will officiate at the proceedings. Dr. Harold W. Browning, vice president, will present a plaque to Keaney, making him a member of the Helms Hall of Fame. Ed (Smokey) Kelleher, veteran basketball official, now retired, will present a certificate to Keaney, giving him honorary life membership in the Basketball Officials Association of America.

The presidents of the three visiting colleges also will participate in the ceremonies. They are the Very Rev. Robert J. Slavin of

Providence College, Dr. Henry M. Wriston of Brown, and Dr. A. N. Jorgenson of Connecticut.

The "old man himself" will throw out the first ball, thereby officially launching the Rams' first game under the new roof. The inaugural program is expected to attract a crowd that will give every one of the 4,200 seats a workout.

The P.C.-Brown game shapes up as a pretty even affair since both squads have a good supply of veteran material. Coach Vin Cuddy of P.C. still has his top seven men from last year and probably will start Bobby Moran and Ken Kerr at forwards, Jack Reynolds at center, and Tom Mullins and Hank McQueeney at guards. Jack Durkin and Phil Lynch are the other two veterans and if they don't start, they should at least see a good bit of action.

The Friars have a short team, as basketball clubs go nowadays. They don't have a man over 6:2. Brown will have an edge in this department with two of its first-string players standing 6:4.

Coach Bob Morris of Brown is still unsettled on his top five players but probably will start the following tonight: Capt. Lou Mur-

go and Bill Arnold at forwards, Jim Pendergast at center, and Ed Kincaid and Norm Sprinthall at guards.

Jack Guy, the Rhode Island court boss, has five veterans back but the rest of his squad is going to take some rebuilding. Among the newcomers, Eric Anderson, a sophomore, looks like the best prospect.

The Rams' starting lineup comprises Dave Stenhouse and Bernie Pina at guards, Art Helwig at center, and Dan Dunn and Rollie Kubiskie at forwards. Pina, who was one of Rhody's top gridders this season, didn't report, of course, until after the Rams' final game two weeks ago but he cer-

tainly made up for lost time. His hustle left Guy no choice but to put him on the first club.

The UConns, who are expected to make another bid for New England basketball supremacy this season, are led by Art Quimby, high-scoring junior, Phil Jones, Bob Deutsch and Worthy Patterson, plus several top players from last year's freshman team. They stand a good chance of making the Rams' debut anything but an artistic success.

Tonight's games are not considered part of the regular schedules of any of the competing teams and, as such, will not count in the state series or Yankee Conference records.

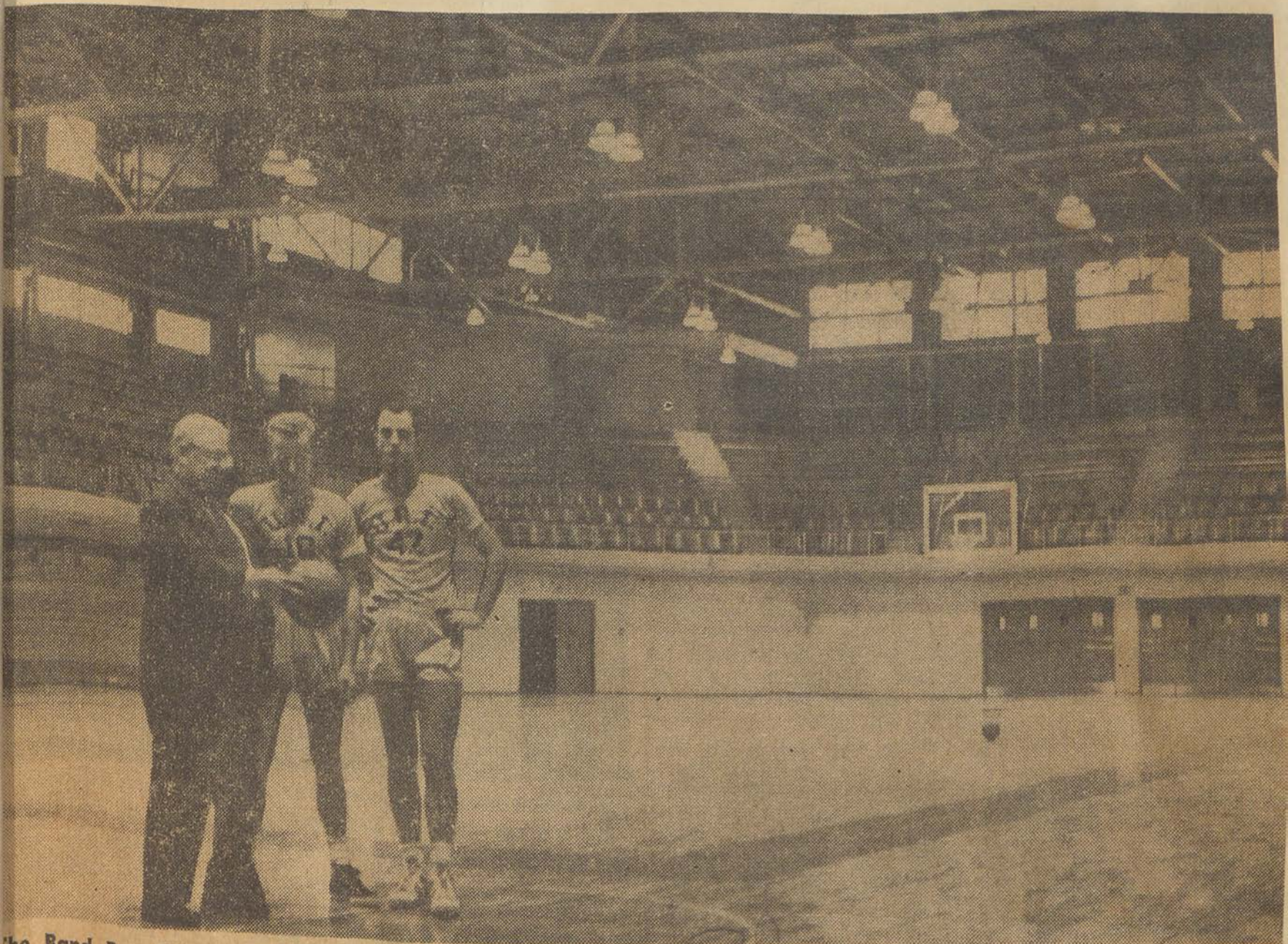
Providence College is Sponsor of Event

# Friar and B.C. Sextets Meet Tonight in Hockey Opener

Providence College has changed from a "soft" to a "suicide" schedule for its fast-improving hockey team because Coach Dick Rondeau is convinced that when you lose you should lose to the best.

Last year the Friars met only Brown, Dartmouth and RPI among the topnotchers and filled in their schedule against minor opponents and informal collegiate teams. The results were not to satisfactory.

This year every member of the fast Pentagonal or Ivy league is on the Friars' schedule in addition to Boston College, that perennial Eastern hockey power which opens against PC tonight at the R.I. Auditorium in an 8:30 o'clock game.

Brown meets the Friars twice, Jan. 5 and Feb. 2, and the Rondeau forces are particularly anxious to improve on their showing last season when the Bruins won out, 12-4.

The Friars are on the threshold of becoming full-fledged members of the Eastern intercollegiate hockey family, but will play one more season with freshmen on the varsity squad, thus eliminating themselves from NCAA tournament consideration.

## Competition Keen

Mike McDonough, an all New England tourney performer with Malden Catholic last year, will definitely be on first-line defense along with Dave Reilly, a junior and former La Salle player. In order to combine an inexperienced man with a veteran, Rondeau has moved Tom McAleer to second-line defense with Paul Lagueux, a sophomore and former St. Dominic's, High School player from Lewiston, Me.

Rondeau thinks his polished first

line, still only in its sophomore year, will arrive this year and eventually be the top line in the East. It consists of John Sweeney at center and Ed Monahan and Bobby Reall on the wings.

## All-Freshman Trio

As was the case last season, the Friars will have an all-freshman trio for its second line. It comprises, Rod Gorman of Malden Catholic at center and Bernie McCrink of La Salle and Norm Auger of St. John's of Danvers, Mass., on his wings.

In the third grouping, known as the "Marine Corps line," there will be John Hobin, one of the early boosters of hockey at PC, at center with Ray Farrell, former La Sallian, and Ray Duffy on his wings. Hobin and Duffy are former leathernecks.

Rondeau, like his counterpart at Brown, Don Whiston, has a problem in the goal position, with three men fighting hard for the berth. The only "veteran" is sophomore Ed Hornstein, a former all-stater from Mt. Pleasant, but still in the running are Phil Crawford, from Malden Catholic and Ralph Lane of Hillhouse High School in New Haven.

Among the former Rhode Island schoolboy performers on the squad are: Herb Hearne and Ed Ferry La Salle; Bill Darcey and Ed Turcotte, Woonsocket; and Bill Gaudreau, Hope.

## Dedicate R.I. Gym Tonight

The University of Rhode Island opens a new era in basketball tonight when it dedicates the Frank W. Keaney gymnasium with a double-header involving its three major rivals.

Providence College and Brown University meet in the opening game at 7:30 o'clock while the Rams entertain the University of Connecticut in the second encounter.

Frank Keaney, who put much of the bounce and brilliance into Rhody basketball and spread the fame of Rhode Island from coast to coast, will be the guest of honor. Frank, who joined basketball's mythical Hall of Fame years ago, will be inducted into the Helms Foundation and receive a plaque from Harold W. Browning, vice president of the University, on behalf of the West Coast organization.

### Honored By Officials

Mr. Keaney, in addition to joining Helms' Hall of Fame, will become an honorary member of the Basketball Officials Association of America, with Ed (Smokey) Kelleher of Boston making that presentation. Dr. Carl R. Woodward, president of the University; Dr. Henry M. Wriston of Brown, the Very Rev. Robert J. Slavin, O.P., of Providence College, and Dr. A. N. Jorgenson of the University of Connecticut, will also participate in the dedicatory program.

For a long time Coach Keaney anticipated a sports building such as the Rams will open tonight. It is modern in every respect and ranks with the finest in the nation. But the winning tradition of Rodman Hall, and its great games and players, is a thing of the past and a new one will have to be formulated.

The long series between the Friars and the Bruins has been played on many sites but this is the first time it has gone to a neutral campus. However, neither the Brown-PC, nor the RIU-UConn game figure in either the State or Yankee Conference ratings for the season. Both are extra games on the respective schedules.

### UConn Tops

The UConns appear to have the brightest prospects of the four

teams involved tonight. Coach Hugh Greer reportedly has another fine team this season built around Art Quimby and Worthy Patterson. The UConns were Yankee Conference champions and a ranking NE team last season with a 17-4 record.

The grapevine has it that Brown played some fine basketball in its scrimmage with Holy Cross. Lou Murgo is once again Coach Bob Morris' top point-maker and Billy Arnold is expected to be an improved player this season. The Bruins will have Murgo and Arnold at forwards, Jim Prendergast at center, Eddie Kincaid and Norm Sprinthall at guards, with Ed Tooley also expected to fit in.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars figures his team is better than last season but lacks a real big man. The PC squad has some speed and good shooters and play-makers. Providence College has scrimmaged several college teams, done well in some cases and showed need of improvement in others.

### Big Guns Lost

Bobby Moran of the Friars, Murgo of Brown and the UConns' Quimby were among the top play-

ers in the New England district a year ago. Rhody lost its two big guns, highscoring Bill Baird and his running mate, Freddy Congelton. Moran has been impressive for the Friars in their pre-season scrimmages.

The Providence lineup will be selected from Hank McQueeney, Moran, Phil Lynch, Kenny Kerr, Jim Durkin, Tommy Mullins and Jack Reynolds. All played last season, although Kerr and Reynolds were out with ailments. Reynolds, a rugged 200-pounder, may be of considerable assistance this season as he's showing more drive. McQueeney has been playing well also.

Coach Jack Guy of the Rams is rebuilding without Ray Rossi, Baird and Congelton, three of his starters. He says Eric Anderson is his top sophomore prospect while the returning players from last season's squad include Slick Pina, Dan Dunn, Rollie Kubiskey, and center Art Helwig. Pina has come fast in the workouts and won a starting job since reporting from football, where he had an outstanding season.

The UConns open a pretentious schedule with tonight's game and have the talent to do well. Patterson and Quimby, two all-district selections, will be working with Sophomore Gordon Ruddy, who was the star of a fine freshman team last season. Phil Jones, Bob Deutch, Ron Bushwell, and Stan Zima are other starting possibilities.

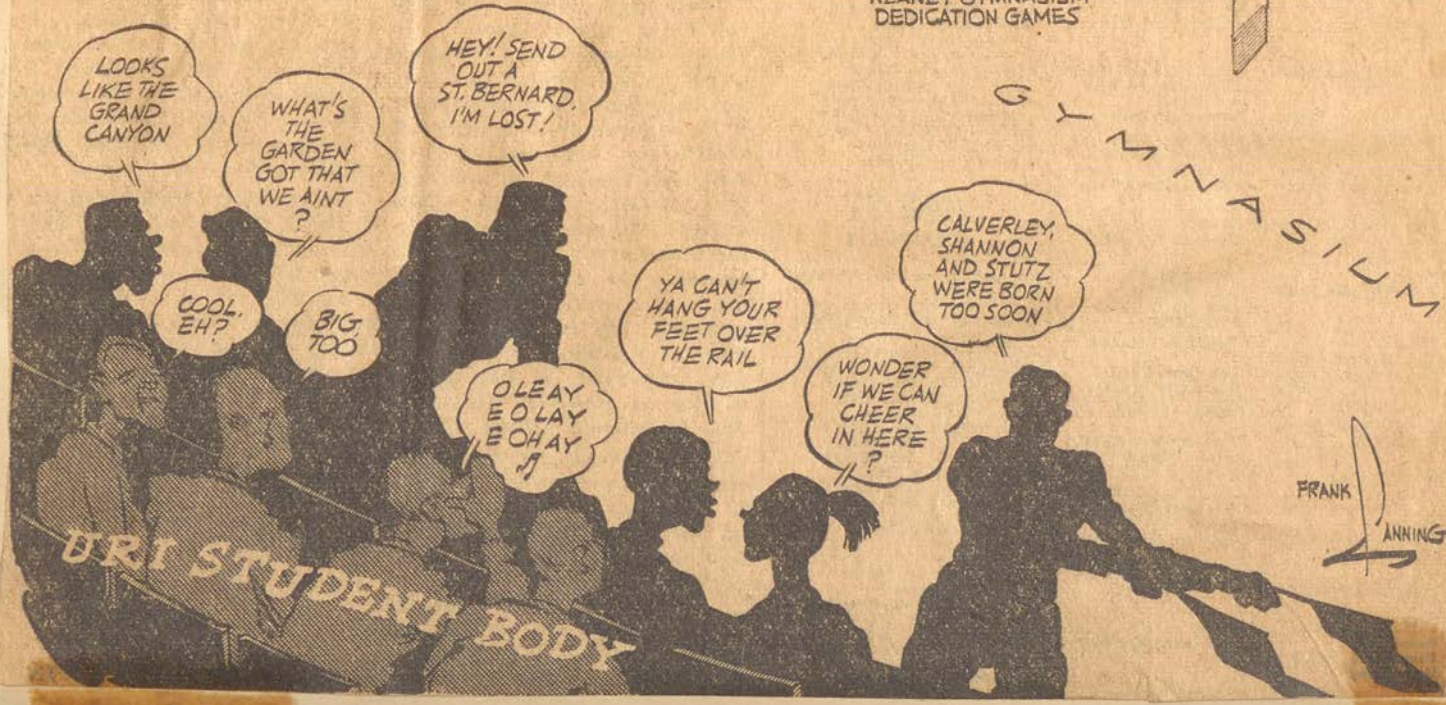

# Bevo Lures Big Crowd To Garden

A curious crowd of 1000, with the possibility of a 13,909 sellout, is expected at the Garden tonight to watch a tripleheader which features Bevo Francis and his friends from Rio Grande, Ohio, and the Celtics vs. Milwaukee.

Boston College, with new Coach Dino Martin at the helm, will open the tripler at 5:30 p. m., facing St. Anselm's. Rio Grande will tackle a reportedly strong Providence team at about 7:15 and the Celtics are due to make their appearance about 9:15.

As Walter Brown aptly put it, Bevo has a certain "rubberneck" value and the little school (88 students including Bevo) is making the most of it. They played to 13,800 in New York Thursday night and last night at Villanova they attracted 7235.

Bevo scored 32 against Adelphi in a losing cause Thursday and aged 39 against Villanova last night in Philadelphia, also another loss by Rio Grande, 93-92.

The Celtics also will be unveiling a new man for Boston fans to judge in 6 ft. 8 Jack Nichols, high scoring forward, purchased recently from Milwaukee, which is selling players at a rate indicating they don't plan to stay in the league very long.

Coupled with Don Barksdale, Nichols gives the Celtics a much sounder front line. With this powerful club, coach Red Auerbach seems to be on the spot. His bosses will settle for nothing less than the Eastern championship.

Despite their improvement lately, the Hawks look like a good team to experiment on and such can be expected if the Celts get way ahead tonight.

Milwaukee has added Max Zaslofsky lately which helped their back court considerably. They also have among others, the highly regarded rookie Don Sinderlage, along with Lew Hitch, Bill Toshoff, Don Losgran and Red Holzman.

True. Nevertheless, the boy must have something. He practices in the gym six to eight hours a day. Practice that hard at anything, and you’re bound to become fairly proficient at it.

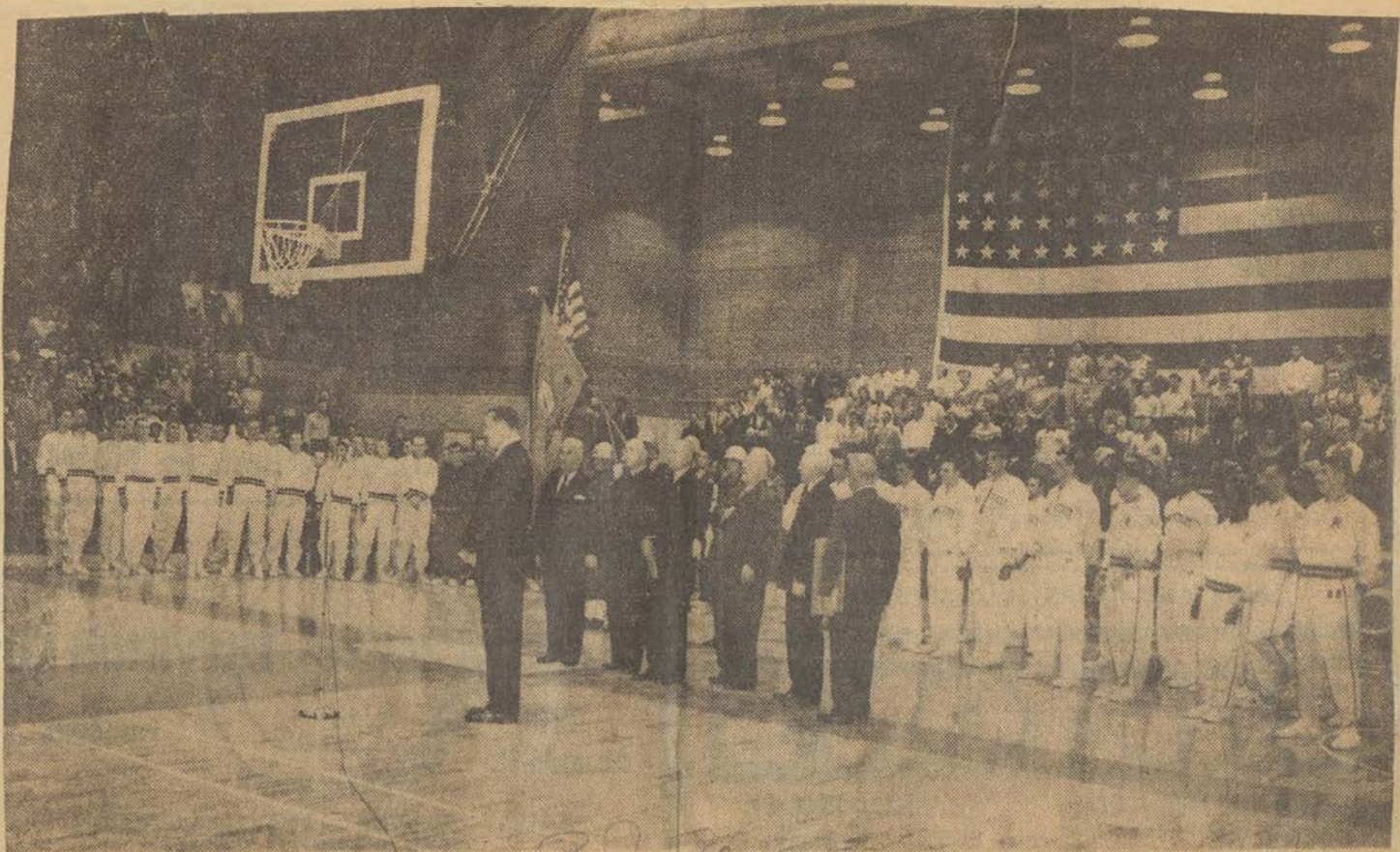

# P.C. Nips Bears, Keaney Is Given Helms Award

Frank W. Keaney was honored once again for his outstanding contributions to basketball last night at Kingston as the University of Rhode Island opened the Keaney gymnasium with a doubleheader.

The Rams tried hard to win one for the "old master" but their spirited rally fell short as they dropped a 90-81 decision to the University of Connecticut. The Providence College Friars were clicking in fine style as they scored a 75-61 victory over Brown in the opening game.

It was a big night in Mr. Keaney's life with many of his former players, including Ernie Calverley, on hand as well as many alumni and friends of Rhody. Frank was accorded a tremendous ovation when he spoke and his remarks were well received. He will always be Mr. Rhode Island to those who follow Rhody.

The Friars showed a better defense than usual and played an alert, hustling game against Bob Morris' Bruins. Providence College is in good shape for early in the season and the result was encouraging to Coach Vin Cuddy.

The Friars' board work was good, which will help over the long run.

### Long Program

The program lasted close to five hours with the final hoop being scored a few minutes before midnight. The fans saw all kinds of basketball and several fast breaks by the Rams drew as much enthusiasm as any maneuvers. The UConn-Rhody game saw an over-assessment of fouls with 78 being called and eight players leaving with five against them.

At times the Friars were the smoothest of the four teams moving the ball, although Connecticut showed the most class until it had to play cautiously because some of its men picked up too many fouls too quickly.

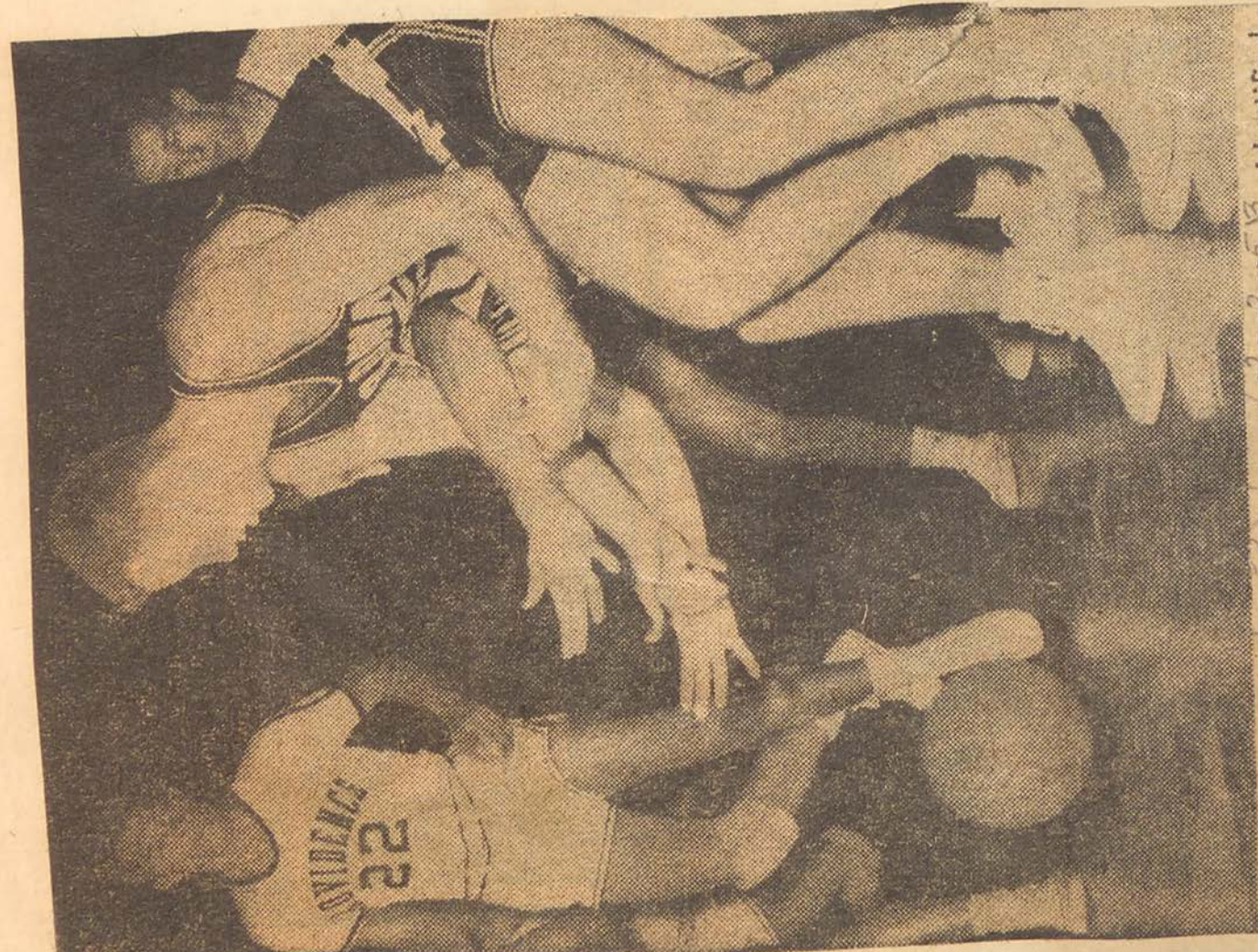
Lou Murgo and Billy Arnold paced the Brown attack, which at times showed considerable promise. Coach Morris commented that the Friars were in tip-top condition and have a fairly well balanced squad. The Bruins' took top honors in the long shot department when Murgo threw in a one-hander from midcourt coming down his right lane. It was a spectacular shot under any circumstances.

#### Rally by Rams In Finale Falls Short by 90-81

Friars Easily Subdue  
Brown, 75-61; Crowd  
Of 4,200 Watches

Connecticut's speedy and sharp-shooting Huskies weathered a blistering counter-rally by Rhode Island's battling Rams in the final period and pulled out a 90-81 victory last night before a crowd of 4,200 fans at the Rams' new Frank W. Keaneey Gymnasium.

In the first game of the double-header, which officially dedicated the new structure for athletics Providence College led all the way in defeating Brown, 75-61.

The Friars, presenting a smooth-passing team and a tight defense, had too much for Brown. Led by Bobby Moran and Hank McQueeney, who led the parade with 17 and 16 points, the Friars had no trouble piercing the Bruin defense with their weaving tactics. Three other Friars scored in double figures. Ken Kerr scored 13, Jack Durkin 12 and Tom Mullins 11. Capt. Lou Murgu paced the Bruins with 15.

#### Close Opener

After a close first period, during which the Friars held leads that varied between one and four points, the P. C. attack started to click. With Moran, McQueeney, Jack Reynolds, Durkin and Kerr working exceptionally well together, the Friars outscored the Bruins, 26-13, during the second 10 minutes and reached the intermission sporting a 44-28 advantage.

That spurt just about settled the issue for the Friars as the

Bruins were never able to come any closer than 12 points during the second half. Each team scored 20 points in the third period and Brown held a 13-11 edge in the finale.

Keaneey, athletic director and former basketball, football and baseball coach of the Rams, was honored with a rising ovation when he received the Helms Foundation plaque "for noteworthy achievement" in a ceremony held before the start of the Rams-Huskies game. The presentation was made by Dr. Harold W. Browning, vice-president of the University of Rhode Island.

Ed Kelleher, veteran hoop official, presented to Keaneey an honorary life membership with the Basketball Officials Association of America.

Dr. Carl R. Woodward, president of URI, gave the welcoming address and introduced the following: the Rev. A. B. Begley, director of athletics at Providence College; J. O. Christian, Connecticut director of athletics, Dr. Henry M. Wriston, president of Brown, and Mrs. Wriston; the Very Rev. Robert J. Slavin, OP, president of P.C., and Dr. R.

# Friar Six Gives B.C. Real Battle Before Eagles Triumph, 8 to 5

Boston College, one of the Eastern hockey powers, had a lively time with Providence College last night before pumping home four goals in the final period and winning out by an 8-5 score.

The contest, witnessed by 1,000 spectators, opened the collegiate hockey season at the R.I. Auditorium. It was also the first meeting between the two sextets and the season's opener for both.

Led by its stylish sophomore line of Bobby Reall, John Sweeney and Bob Monahan, the Friars carried the battle to the highly-favored Eagles and led 3-2 at the end of the first period and 5-4 at the end of the second.

The losers failed to score in the final, however, and they couldn't stop the lightning solo sweeps that either set up or accounted directly for most of the Eagle scoring. Four of the winners' goals were the result of individual efforts with a single skater sweeping around the stationary Friar defense and coming in on its unprotected goalie, Ed Hornstein.

Hornstein, a sophomore and a former Mt. Pleasant all-stater, did a fine job when he had help in front and turned back 26 shots. Vin Tarkey, had 12 saves in the Eagle nets.

Bobby Gallagher, sophomore cen-

ter on the second line, scored three times for the winners, two of his goals coming in the final period. Monahan, who was off the ice for 10 minutes on a misconduct penalty for breaking his stick in disgust, paced the losers with two goals.

Sweeney was carried off the ice at the 9-minute mark of the third period after being caught in a pile-up in front of the BC net get-

ting gashed in the face and head. He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital where he remained overnight after requiring several stitches.

In the preliminary contest, Mike Sweeney scored three times and Ray Marr twice as Hope outlasted St. Raphael, 5-2, Dick Lynch and Tom McDonough scored for the losers.

The Providence College Friars meet the Assumption College quintet tonight at Woonsocket High School with the proceeds going to the Assumption College Reconstruction Fund.

The doubleheader program gets under way at 7 o'clock with Woonsocket High School playing host to the Assumption Prep squad. The college game will go on about 8:30.

The Friars scored a 75-to-61 decision over Brown in an exhibition on Tuesday night at Kingston and looked as though they had the makings of a fine team. Providence handled the ball well and

showed more poise and defensive excellence than usual as they outscored Bob Morris' squad in one-half of the dedication program at the Keaney gymnasium.

Coached by Andy Laska, former Holy Cross athlete, the Assumption team dropped an 87-83 overtime game to New Bedford Textile in a hotly contested opener on Tuesday night.

Laska is more optimistic than usual about this year's team. He was planning on operating with a two-platoon setup but finally decided against it. It's a young team and a speedy one, according to reports of their opening encounter with Textile.

Joe Dyer, Danny Guerin and Bill Ormond, three of the Assumption starters, all played together at St. Stephen's High School in Worcester. Guerin was the top Assumption scorer with 21 points and Ormond accounted for 16 in Tuesday's contest. Joe O'Brien, a New Jerseyite, and Fred Scollan, who averaged 12 points in Frosh competition a year ago, complete the starting lineup.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars has a well-balanced, experienced group of seven top players but lacks a really big man. Bobby Moran and Hank McQueeney are the chief point-makers, though the scoring was well distributed against the Bruins.

Kenny Kerr, who rebounded well in the opener, Phil Lynch, Tommy Mullins, Jack Durkin and Jack Reynolds make up the bulk of the squad's strength. Reynolds has been playing an improved game this season.

Providence is playing more of a possession game this season and

has changed its offense by shifting around some of its man-power. The Friars have a meeting with Rio Grande and its outstanding scorer, Bevo Francis, scheduled for tomorrow night at Boston Garden.

Tonight's game is the 19th between PC and Assumption. Providence won, 82-50, last season. The Greyhounds won five and lost 12 a year ago but are reportedly a much tougher outfit this season, with better speed and shooting.

Assumption Prep defeated Holy Family High School, 55 to 47, with Joey Bouchard scoring 29 points for the Preparatory quintet. Proceeds will be turned over to the Assumption College Reconstruction Fund, which was started after a tornado had destroyed some of the Assumption College property last June.

Providence College, showing more finesse and poise in their game with Brown than they exhibited at times last season, takes on Rio Grande and its much talked about scorer, Bevo Francis, tomorrow night at Boston Garden in the middle game of a triple-header. On Sunday, St. Anselm's plays host to Providence College in Manchester, N.H.

## Clean Sweep

Assumption has yet to beat the Friars in 18 previous games but some of them have been fairly close. While Providence was scoring a 75-61 exhibition victory over Brown, the Greyhounds were dropping a 87-81 overtime game to New Bedford Textile. So many of the Greyhounds fouled out that Assumption finished the game with only two players.

Coach Laska, a former Holy Cross forward who was a member of the Crusaders NCAA championship squad of 1947, looks for improvement in his young squad this season. While he is still feeling out his material, he planned to try out a two-platoon system and has a much stronger bench this year.

The Friars have an experienced squad this season, featuring Bobby Moran, one of the best shooters in New England, and Hank McQueeney, a slick ball handler. But the team has balance and may be headed for a fine season. Against the Bruins in the new Frank Keaney gymnasium, Providence played steady and consistently.

Coach Vin Cuddy says he doesn't have any first team this season, that is a five-man combination. He has seven key players and moves them around as he sees fit. This group includes Moran, McQueeney, Tommy Mullins, Jack Reynolds, Kenny Kerr, Phil Lynch and Jack Durkin. Against Brown the scoring was well divided while the rebounding and ball handling was of fair good caliber for an early season contest.

Assumption has a speedy club, built around sophomore Joe Dyer, Danny Guerin and Bill Ormond. Dyer is a rugged board man while Guerin is a classy freshman who scored 21 points in their opening game. Ormond is rangy and a fair scorer. All three played together as schoolboys. They have been joined by two New Jerseyites this season, Joe O'Brien and Fred Scohan. Roger Lemenager also added some zip to the New Bedford game, which was hotly contested from start to finish.

Last night in New York, Bevo Francis made his Eastern debut and scored 32 points as Adelphi halted Rio Grande's winning string at 40 straight. Adelphi was 17 points down at one stage in the second half but finally pulled out an 83-to-76 decision before 13,832 fans in the Garden.

## Trouble for Bevo

Apparently the experts and coaches who came expecting Bevo to click off the points like an adding machine were disappointed. Naturally Adelphi ganged up on Bevo defensively as will other

teams he meets this season. The pressure, the Garden and the big time have had some effect on his performance and that of his teammates.

Coach Newt Oliver of Rio Grande was keenly disappointed by his team's showing. "Everything went wrong," he said, "Bevo had a bad night and we just about played our worst game."

Bevo was quite dejected, for his 32 points were a far cry from his scoring efforts of last season, when he led the nation with 1954 points and a 50.1 average. Some of the experts rated Francis a fine shot but found flaws in other phases of his game. With a collapsing defense which encircled him with as many as four players at times, it's no wonder Bevo had his troubles.

Rio Grande meets Villanova in Philadelphia tonight and PC in Boston tomorrow. The Boston Garden program starts at 5:30 with Don Martin's Boston College meeting St. Anselm's. PC and Rio Grande play at 7 o'clock, while the Boston Celtics and Bob Cousy meet Milwaukee Hawks in the windup at 8:45.

Providence tuned up for tonight's clash with an 86-68 victory over Assumption College last night at Woonsocket. The Friars played well in spots against the Greyhounds but Coach Cuddy substituted liberally, conserving his top strength and talent for tonight's encounter. The Friars play their third game in three days tomorrow at Manchester when they take on the St. Anselm's Hawks in an afternoon contest.

### 39 Points

Tonight the Friars plan to start a combination of Bobby Moran and Kenny Kerr at the forwards, Jack Reynolds at center and Tommy Mullins and Hank McQueeney at guards. This group started last night's contest but Jackie Durkin and Phil Lynch rate with the starters and will see considerable service as well.

Bevo, who averaged 50.1 points last season, did well last night

against Villanova in Philadelphia, scoring 39 points. He had 32 the night before in New York. However Rio Grande, which came East with a 40-game winning string, has lost both Eastern starts. They gave the Villanova team a stiff argument last night, losing 93-92 in overtime.

Francis is quite a basketball player according to the Providence College coach who watched him in action against Adelphi on Thursday night.

### Really Good

"He's really good," says Cuddy, "and scored 10 baskets on 21 shots by my figuring. Rio Grande was doing a great job against Adelphi until they ran out of gas. They looked terrific in the first half. It was more a case of the rest of the club getting into difficulty than Bevo."

"I thought he was a pretty good player," says the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., director of athletics for the Friars. "He's a better shot than some people might figure him but he got tired with Adelphi covering him very closely. I'm a little more confident about our game now that I've had a look at him."

Bevo showed signs of nervousness warming up in New York but had the big crowd in his pocket. They cheered everything he did. Coach Newt Oliver on the other hand didn't like the Gotham officiating, but officiating has been one of the game's bugaboos, no matter what section of the country you hail from.

### More Relaxed

Last night, Rio Grande was a more relaxed, confident team against Villanova, which also scouted him and his mates the night before. Bevo scored the tying field goal last night with a 25-foot shot but Marty Milligan won the game for the Wildcats with a field goal with 10 seconds remaining in the overtime. Bevo had only 11 points in the first half but Jim McKenzie, Rio's No. 2 man, picked up the slack. McKenzie had 25 points and 21 the night before.

The Friars continued their mastery over the Assumption team, taking an early lead and winning comfortably. Providence played some fine ball but coasted also. McQueeney and Lynch put in some flashy hoops while Moran, Kerr, Durkin, Reynolds and Mullins all played well. Mullins, a Worcesterite, scored nine points against his home town representatives. McQueeney was top scorer with 15.

Walter Scott created some Woonsocket sports lore when he shot a basket against his own team in the preliminary game. Scott got the ball in a scramble, dribbled down for a shot and scored for Assumption Prep. The Prep team could have done without Scotty's hoop for they won, 53 to 24. He's the first to perform that feat in Woonsocket's new gymnasium, a fine school sports plant.

# Bevo Certainly Showed 'em!

## Rio Grande Star Returns to Ohio With 37-Pt. Avg.

Bevo Francis and his Rio Grande basketball teammates are back in their Ohio hamlet today and no one can dispute them if they are telling the home folks:

"Well, we sure showed those city fellers something."

They sure did. They didn't do it so much with victories—they won only one of three games on their Eastern tour. Instead, by their sound basketball, they showed full houses in three big cities that their team was not a myth and neither was their Bevo.

They lost the first game to Adelphi at Madison Square Garden. Then they were defeated by Villanova, but only by a point in overtime. Finally, they defeated Providence College, 89-87, on Saturday.

In all three, Bevo was immense—unless one considers' an average of 37 points in these three games something less than satisfactory.

And any idea that Bevo was just the man on the receiving end of a belt-line of passes was dispelled. He made 13 out of 33 field goals attempted and sank 15 out of 20 free throws, nine in succession. Generally he was double-teamed and frequently triple-teamed by the Friars.

This was good shooting and the

Boston Garden crowd gave him a fine reception. They roared when his last two free throws gave him a tie for O'Brien's record — two points, by the way, that just about sealed the Friars' fate.

But they simply groaned in disappointment, second before the end when Bevo missed the sort of layup he previously had made easily, which would have given him a new record to take home. As it was, he took home the respect of all.

Amidst all the fanfare for Francis, the fact that the Friars pushed mightily right up until the finish should not be overlooked.

Capt. Bobby Moran scored 26 points for P.C., and Jack Durkin, Kenny Kerr and Hank McQueeney played large parts in the Friars' efforts. The club's performance, its first at the Garden in several seasons, was a good one. Against a lesser-hailed opponent, they would have received more attention.

The Friars have two games this week. First they meet Fairfield at home on Wednesday and then play St. Francis at Brooklyn on Saturday.

Brown opened its regular basketball schedule in the comparative quiet of Amherst and took the Lord Jeffs, 56-51.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars scouted Bevo and his mates Thursday night when they lost their first Eastern game to Adelphi. He was much impressed with Bevo's shooting ability and hopes to be

able to keep the nation's top scorer of last season within bounds. The Friars have no big man to match Francis' 6-foot-9 size but will two- and three-team him in order to keep his point production to a minimum.

Rio Grande, which had an enrollment of less than 100 students a year ago, has embarked on a pretentious basketball schedule after its spectacular rise to prominence last season. However, Bevo, who scored 1,954 points, averaged 50.1, and drew a big vote in the United Press basketball poll last spring, is running into a stiffer schedule this season, meeting better teams.

Many of Rio's victories last season came against junior colleges, service teams and other small out-

fits but that's the type of team the school had been meeting for years with little fanfare. Coach Newt Oliver, who discovered and tutored Bevo, was a Rio Grande star at one time. He is a capable young coach who has put Rio and Bevo on the sports map.

Bevo, who played only one season of schoolboy basketball after developing his shooting in a barn, has some talent in his speciality. He's a good shot on hooks and pivot plays but has trouble when he's pressed. His scoring record is quite unusual for he scored more points in one season than do most players in their entire careers. His competition wasn't the best perhaps but Bevo's ability has received national attention. His top one-game total last season was 116.

Rio Grande, which has been in sports for years, drew a paid gate of \$18.75 for one of its early games last winter. Now the big arenas are guaranteeing them \$2,000 per game and drawing well wherever Bevo and his buddies perform. Tonight's tripleheader may sellout the Boston Garden for the advances have been heavy. In New York 13,832 fans turned out.

Bevo will be shooting for the Boston Garden-Arena scoring mark held by Johnny O'Brien, another prolific scorer from Seattle. Johnny scored 41 points last December against Boston College. Coach Oliver of Rio Grande predicted Bevo would break the N.Y. record of 54 points, held by St. John's Harry Boykoff, but Bevo made 32.

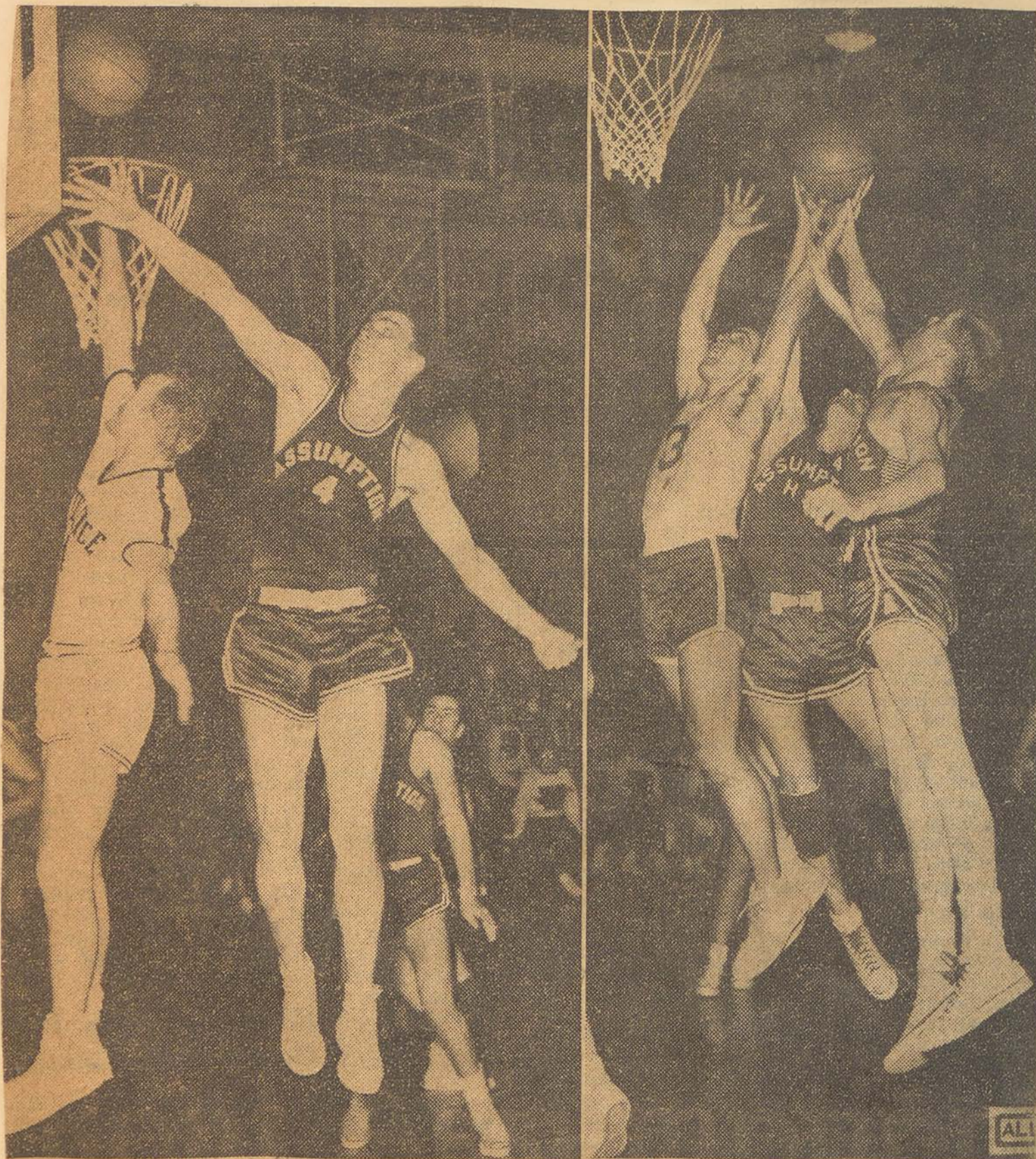
Monahan dislocated his collarbone in the first period, but didn't know it until after the game. He scored two of his team's goals in spite of the injury.

# La Salle Quartet Leads Local Entries With 5th

A crack two-mile relay team from St. John's Prep of Brooklyn, running the four-mile distance for the first time, captured Providence College's fifth annual invitational event yesterday at Hendriken Field.

The junior Redmen, Vin DiStephan, Bob McKay, Ted Muellers and John Flynn, turned in a time of 19:05, 5.6 seconds slower than the record for the meet, set by a Hope High School quartet in 1949.

A record-sized field of 14 schools, four of them from the Metropolitan New York area, competed in two heats. Times were compared to determine the three award winners.

All three, St. John's, Keene, N.H., High School, the runnerup, and St. Augustine's Diocesan High School of Brooklyn, ran in the first heat. The New Hampshire team, comprised of four of the five boys who had won the New England cross-country championship for Keene three weeks ago, gave the winners a battle, but Muellers and Flynn, the latter a 4:35 miler, were too strong on the final legs.

Muellers worked out to a 35-

yard lead midway through the third leg, and Flynn then built it up to about half a lap at the tape. St. Aloysius of Jersey City challenged St. Augustine's for third place late in the race, but the Brooklynites' powerful anchorman, Tom Murphy, finished with a kick that gave him a 15-yard edge on Vic DiMaio of St. Aloysius.

La Salle's team of Leon Tetreault, Bill Hanlon, Dick Cullen and John Gormally placed fifth in 19:43.5. Of the other local entries, Hope placed seventh and St. Raphael Academy and Coventry were 12th and 13th.

New Bedford Vocational had to be disqualified after its anchorman had started one lap too early.

## Decision Reversed

Although it placed sixth in the overall standings, Melrose High School's team of Phil Crosby, Ken Maher, Ed O'Dowd and Bob Dias was so superior to other teams in the second heat that it came within one runner of lapping the entire field twice.

St. John's, coached by Harry Howell, former quarter-miler from Manhattan College, set six straight records over the two-mile relay distance last season in the New York area. Two of its times set a private-school and a New Jersey schoolboy record.

Harry Coates, meet director, reversed one of his own decisions in

re-establishing Hope as the record-holder in the meet. Last year he had claimed the Blue Wave trio had run one lap short of a mile in posting a time of 18:59.4 and named Bayonne, N.J., High School as its successor.

The Jersey quartet ran the event in 19:12.2, but did not defend its title this year.

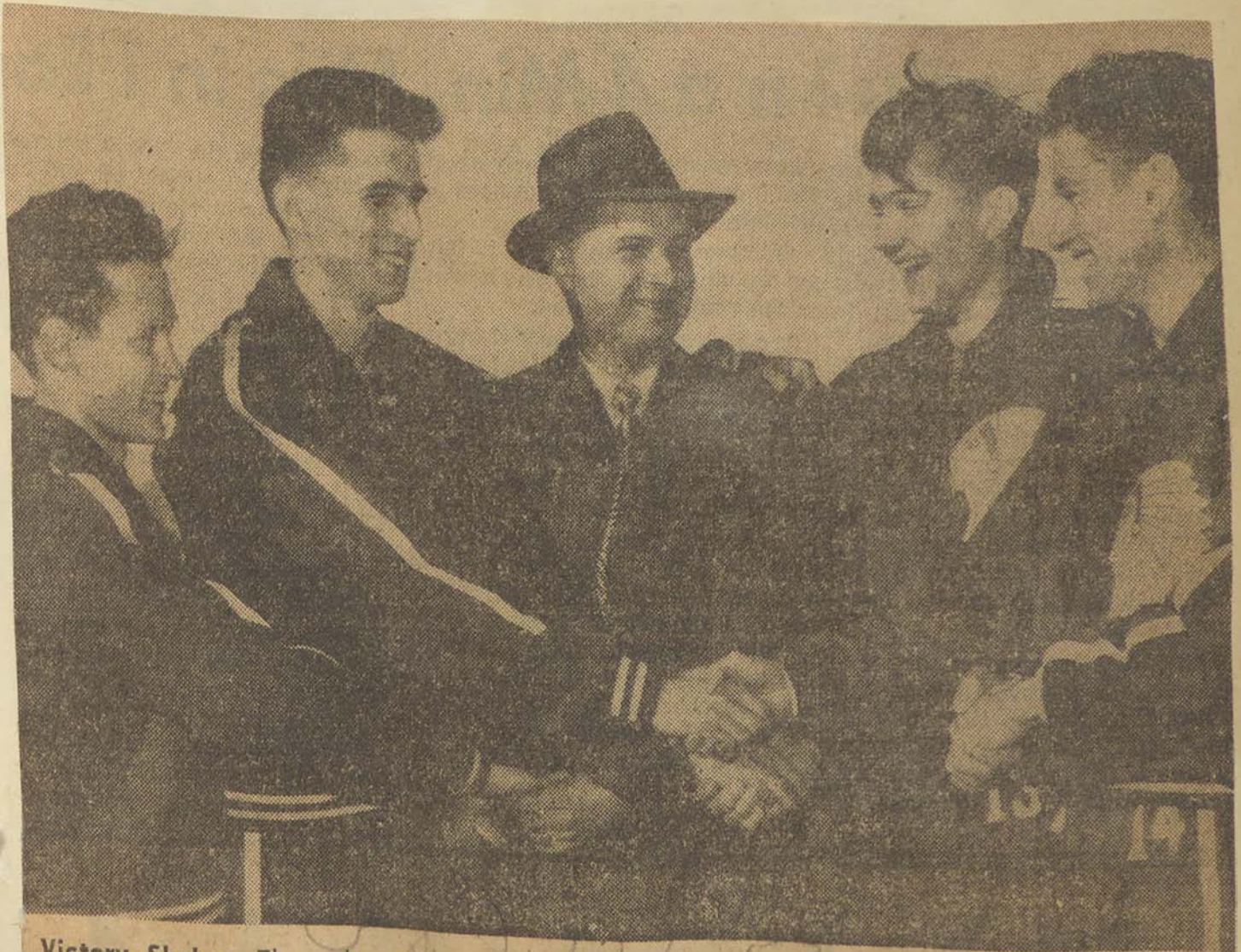

# Rio Grande Ace Hits on 13 of 33 Floor Attempts

**Sinks 15 of His 20 Foul Tosses; Moran Keeps P.C. in Game With 26**

Boston—The Providence College Friars dropped a heart-breaking 89-87 decision to Bevo Francis and his Rio Grande teammates in a basketball thriller before 13,000 fans last night at Boston Garden.

Francis scored 41 points, which equaled the Boston Garden-Arena college scoring mark set last season by another prolific scorer, Johnny O'Brien of Seattle University.

The Friars played some fine basketball, once leading the Ohio visitors by eight points in the second half, but were unable to check Francis and his teammates in their closing drive.

## First in Three

It was Rio's first victory in three Eastern games and the Friars' first defeat of the season after two impressive triumphs.

It was an interesting game from start to finish and the crowd was definitely with Bevo, sort of a small-town boy adopted by the big city. There was nothing small-timish about Bevo's playing, however. The Friars covered him closely, drawing a lot of fouls in doing so, but the lanky center managed to score 13 field goals and an additional 15 points from the foul line. He had 33 tries from the floor and 20 from the free-throw line.

Providence had little to be ashamed of in its first appearance on the Garden court in several seasons. The Friars appeared to have the game under control at halftime and later in the third period but became over-anxious and cautious while the Rio team started to come on. Rio is a good small-college team and has some able personnel working with its national scoring leader of 1952.

Bobby Moran, the Friars' leading scorer for the past two seasons, turned in his best job of the season, scoring 26 points. Some of his hoops came in rough go-

ing, for there was plenty of close contact under the baskets.

## Moran Stars

While Moran was particularly outstanding, the Friars all played high-caliber basketball. Kenny Kerr, Jackie Durkin, Hank McQueeney, Phil Lynch, Jack Reynolds and Tommy Mullins all had big moments.

The Friars fell behind in the late moments of the third period after being ahead, 66-62, but the point spread fluctuated frequently in the final 10 minutes. With five minutes remaining, Rio had an 80-75 margin after Bevo and Kerr traded a pair of free throws apiece. Reynolds, who guarded Bevo at times, fouled out trying to stop Bevo from converting a jump shot and Francis put in the two shots, giving his team a seven-point spread, 82-75.

Moran came out of a scramble and scored on a layup for the Friars. Then Durkin intercepted a pass in the back court and Lynch scored on a two-man break with Durkin. This made it 82-79. Then Durkin, a real spark in the final drive, took a long pass from Lynch for a hoop, making it 82-81.

The Friars, playing desperately but coolly, went ahead with 2:20 left when Moran set up Durkin and the former Pawtucket Westerner scored on a fine shot. But then Jim McKenzie put in two quickies, one on a pop and the other on a three-man rush, and Rio was ahead again, 86-83.

Mullins stole the ball as Rio stalled and made it 85 for the Friars with a basket.

Durkin fouled Francis with 51 seconds left and Bevo just about put the game on ice by calmly dropping in two free throws, which boosted Rio up to 88 points. Charlie Aquavia then came up with a loose ball and handed it off to Mullins, who put in the Friars final hoop.

## The Final Point

Pressing Rio Grande, the Friars couldn't get the ball and fouled McKenzie, who scored the final point.

Francis scored 13 baskets in 33 shots and converted 15 free shots in 20 tries. He was double and triple-teamed at times with Durkin, Reynolds, Kerr, and McQueeney all working around him. This left some of his mates open.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars was a bit disappointed in the outcome, but said his team had turned in a fine performance. He termed Bevo a good big man who

could play on a lot of college teams.

Newt Oliver, the Rio Grande coach, was well satisfied with the result, but at times disagreed with the officiating and prefaced his remarks by slapping a wet towel or a Rio Grande jacket on the floor to show his displeasure.

## Eagles Win

Bevo, a pleasant individual who likes to go fishing when he isn't shooting baskets, shook hands with the entire Providence College squad as the teams fraternized after the final whistle.

Boston College scored its second victory under the direction of Newport's Dino Martin by toppling St. Anselm's, 68 to 64, in the opening game of the triple-header. Johnny O'Hara, a Providence native, led the Eagles with 17 points, chipping in the clinching basket in the final minute. Tony Daukas also gave the team a lift with eight straight points in the last quarter.

Frank O'Donnell was outstanding for St. Anselm's, who face the Friars this afternoon at Manchester, N.H. The Hawks led, 36-30, at halftime and 46-45 in the third quarter.

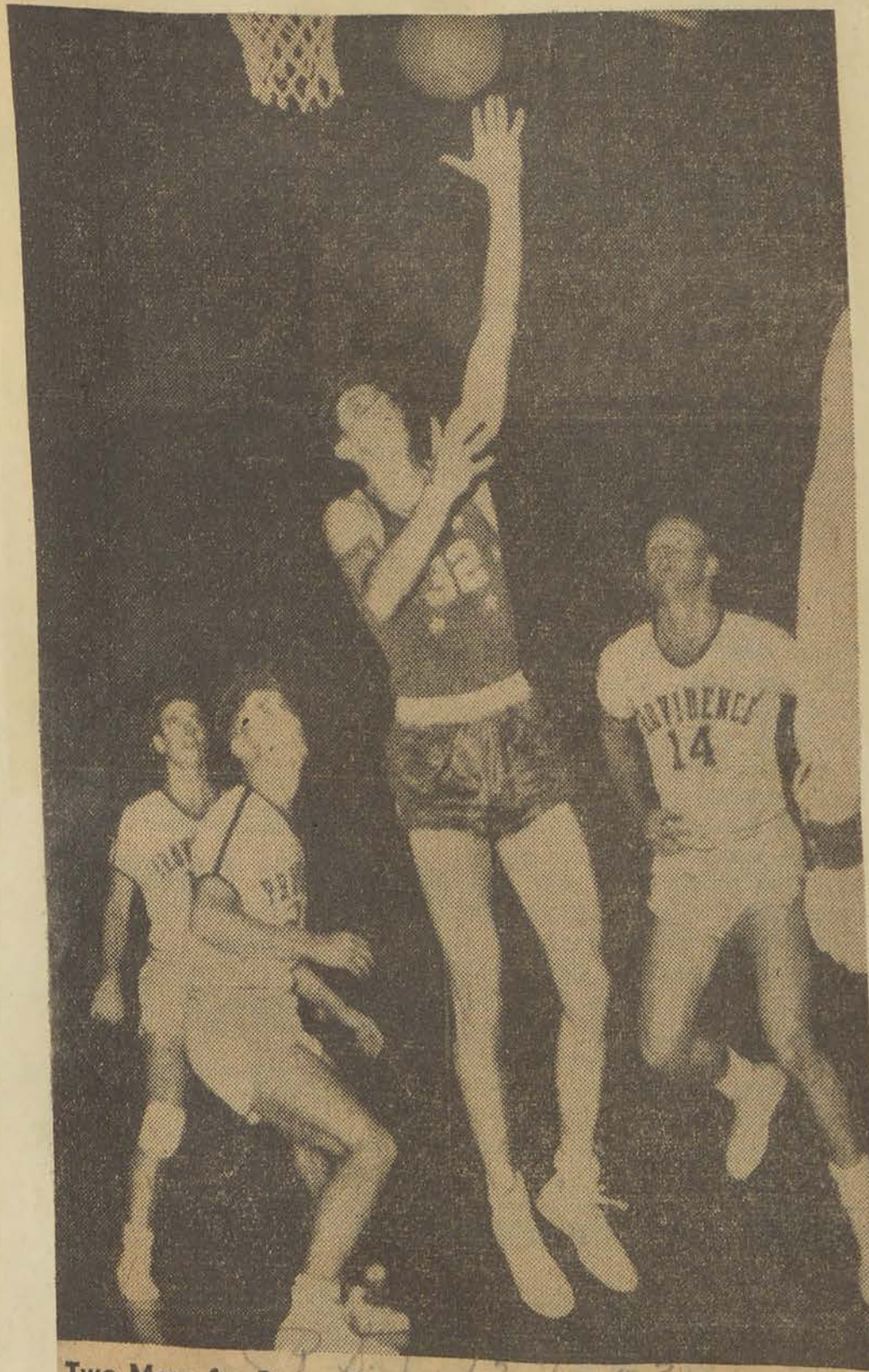

Both college games were thrillers. Boston College nipped scrappy St. Anselm's, 68-64, in the first one as Tony Daukas, big center, got hot in the last four minutes and dropped in eight points.

However, Bevo was the man they wanted to see. He hit three baskets in 12 attempts in the first period, five out of nine in the second.

In the third period he made four throws and hit for two baskets and the final period saw him hit three for eight.

He dropped in 15 fouls, making nine in a row.

Providence was a good match for Rio Grande. Bob Moran, a

veteran, did his best to grab the headlines from Francis. He accounted for 26 of the Friars' points.

Tommy Mullins, Ken Kerr and Jack Durkin all hit double figures for Providence while Bevo handled everything for Rio Grande, with the exception of Wayne Wiseman, who notched 12.

### Battle to Wire

The teams battled nip and tuck right down to the wire. It wasn't until the last two minutes that the game was decided in Rio Grande's favor.

With one minute remaining, Rio Grande held an 86-85 advantage. Francis dropped in two free throws and it was 88-85. Tom Mullins got loose for Providence and sank one to make it 88-87.

The clock was fast running out as Jim McKenzie sank the final Rio Grande foul.

Rio Grande, a team that held a 41-game winning streak going into this season's play, won its first game in three tries against top Eastern competition.

The game was close all the way. At half time Rio led 68-67. Bevo & Co. got hot in the third period and once held a lead of 80-73. But Providence, an experienced team, refused to buckle and was trailing only 84-83 with two min-

# Bevo Scores 41 to Tie Garden Record

## Rio Winner, B. C. Downs St. Anselm's

'Twas true what they said about Bevo. Basketball's most colorful character of the present day equalled the Boston Garden collegiate record of 41 points last night, as he led his equally colorful Rio Grande team to a thrilling 89 to 87 victory over Providence.

Bevo Francis took over after Boston College had won its second straight triumph of the season by defeating St. Anselm's, 68 to 64, in the first game of a combination college-professional hoop triple-header.

The big guy from the little school nestled in the Ohio hill country more than delighted a near-capacity crowd, as, with the exception of the Providence students present, the spectators took Rio Grande to their hearts and rewarded the Redmen with their cheers.

They rooted especially for Bevo to break the record set by Johnny O'Brien of Seattle University last season. But with a golden opportunity to do just that in the dying seconds of play, Bevo blew the easiest kind of layup, and the crowd groaned.

However, prior to that Bevo sank just about every manner of shot in the book, as he led his club to a thrilling comeback from an eight-point deficit in the third period. Providence, a classy club on its own, ran up a 47 to 43 lead at halftime, mainly on the shooting arm of Bobby Moran, who scored 16 of his total 26 points during the first two periods.

The Friars increased this margin to 58-50 in the third quarter, but here Rio Grande began to click and Bevo eventually tied it at 62-each with a free throw. At the start of the final period, Bevo also took command of the offensive board, sinking two of his own rebounds to put his team ahead, 72-68. The Friars caught up again, even went ahead, 83-82. Then after Rio Grande's scrappy Jim McKenzie broke away for two hoops, they cut the count to only 86-85.

Here Bevo really took charge. He leaped high in the air to grab an important tapoff and was fouled in the process. His two free throws equalled the scoring record and wrapped up the game as well.

In all, Bevo hit for 13 field goals in 33 shots, and sank 15 out of 18 free throws. The guy has grace. He got his points legitimately, for his mates do not spend their time setting him up despite reports to the contrary. In fact, after the game, Coach Red Auerbach expressed the opinion that Bevo will definitely go as a pro.

His height was advertised at 6 feet, 9 inches. He did not look to be more than 6-7 at most.

But beyond that, everything they said above Bevo was true.

# Nip and Tuck Friar Losses Mark Exciting Hoop Weekend

among the top players in New England. But Moran has been very consistent for the Friars almost from the first day he put on a Black and White uniform.

Providence was up to its peak performance on Saturday night and came back strong again yesterday. Their game against the Hawks wasn't as polished but it was a hard-driving one which just fell short of victory.

Moran, who was high scorer again yesterday, put in the basket which put Providence College ahead, 69-68, with 70 seconds remaining at Manchester. He made a nice fake from a pivot spot after Jackie Durkin and Tommy Mullins got the ball to him with a quick-passing setup. It was a well-executed play and came in clutch circumstances of a tight game, which was tied 16 times.

## Winning Hoop

The winning hoop was engineered by a couple of New York boys who played together as schoolboys at LaSalle Academy. Frank O'Donnell made a hook pass to Pat McCarthy while apparently tied up and McCarthy put in the game-winning basket. O'Donnell, a freshman, led the Hawks' scoring on Saturday against Dino

Martin's Boston College team and set up the winning points yesterday.

Durkin, a Pawtucket West alumnus, was honorary captain of the Friars yesterday and did some fine rebounding. Hank McQueeney and Mullins shared the team leadership against Rio. Mullins played well in both games but all the Friars did a good job Saturday. Jack Reynolds, Phil Lynch, and Kenny Kerr also contributed to PC's fine stands.

Charlie Aquavia of the Friars had the good fortune to come up with the ball and get over to Mullins for a key basket in the Rio Grande game. And then the misfortune to have his name omitted from the official box score. Bobby Williams, the Hawks' married captain, played an outstanding game yesterday while McCarthy, a converted soccer player, O'Donnell and Bud Mathews also helped the Hawks to their first major victory.

## Fairfield Wednesday

The Friars take on Jimmy Hanrahan's Fairfield quintet, always a tough foe, on Wednesday night at Mount Pleasant High and meet St. Francis College on Saturday night at Brooklyn, opening a three-game trip around the New York area.

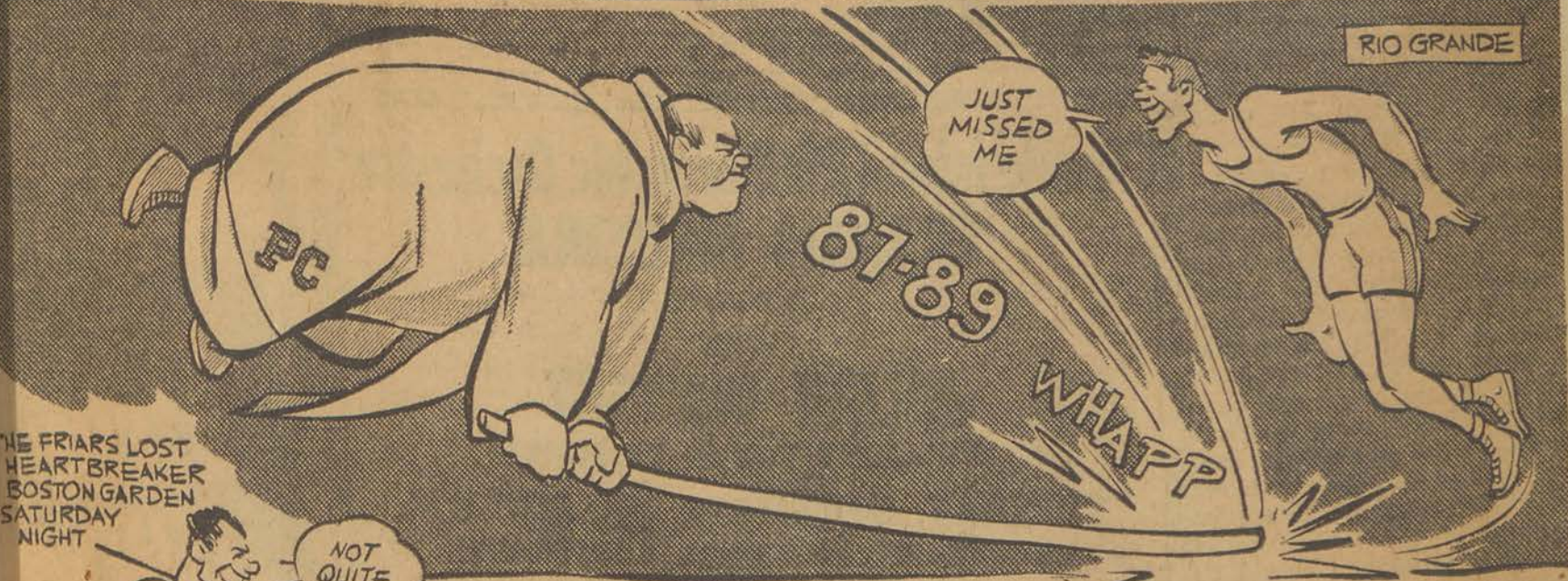

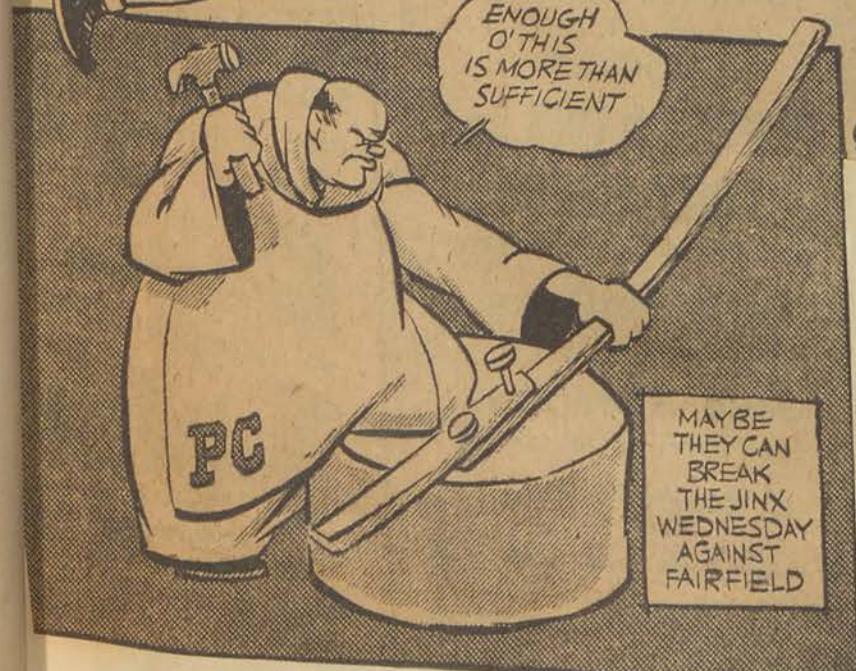

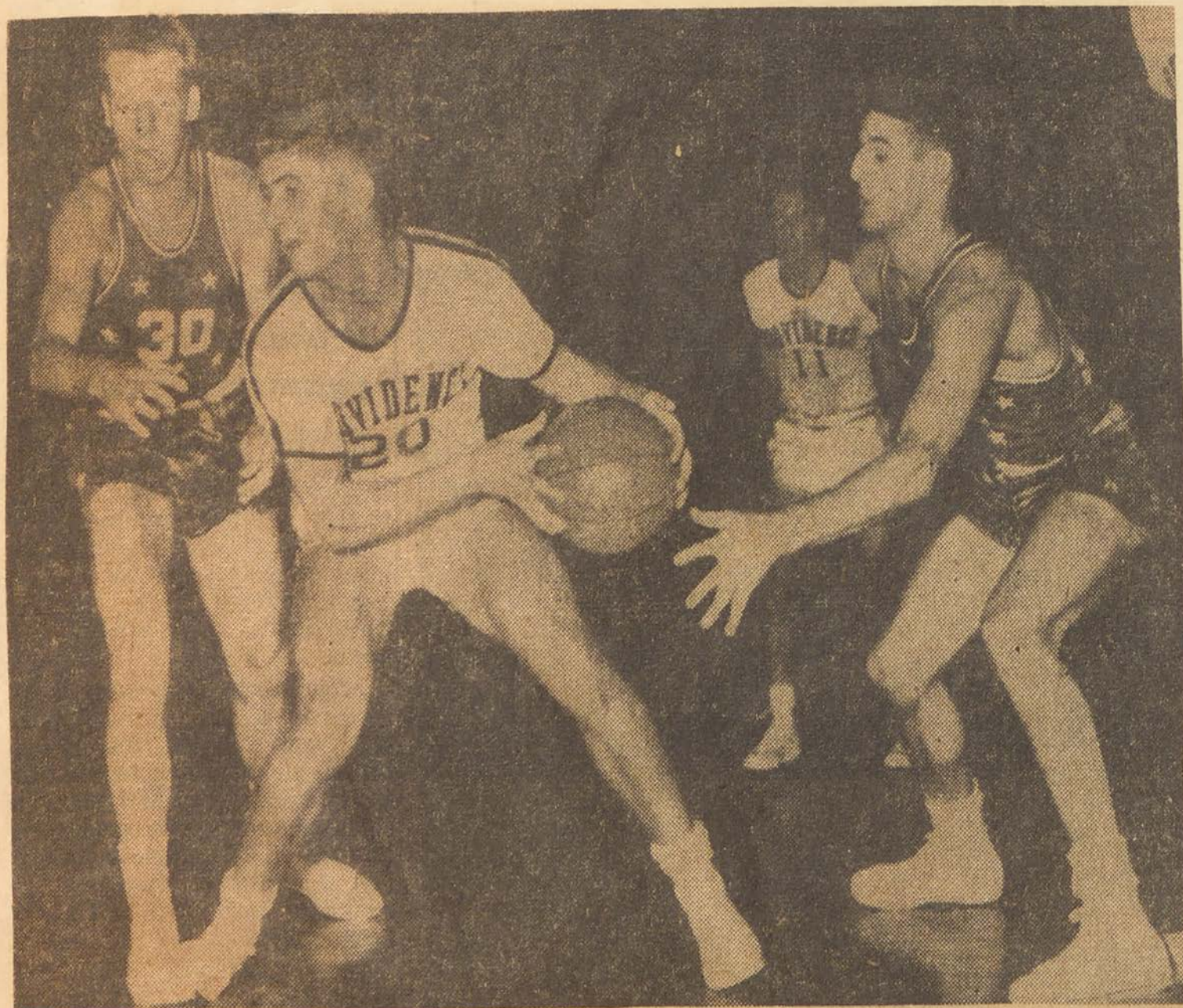

Count Tied 16 Times; Moran Game's Top Man With 18 Pts.

Manchester, N.H.—St. Anselm's Hawks nipped the Providence College Friars, 70 to 69, in the final minute of play in a basketball thriller yesterday at Bradley Gymnasium.

Pat McCarthy, an 18-year-old sophomore from New York City, scored the winning basket with 31 seconds remaining. The Friars had only one crack at the ball after McCarthy's tally and lost possession on a traveling violation in the front court.

It was a nip-and-tuck game from start to finish. The score was tied on 16 occasions. Although the game was the second on consecutive days for the Hawks and the third in three days for the Friars, it was played at a fast pace.

The Friars were a shade below their skilled performance of Saturday night against Bevo Francis and Rio Grande, but again Bobby Moran set the pace for Providence. Moran scored 18 points, tops for the game, and had several other baskets that were disallowed.

#### Five-Minute Mark

Around the five-minute mark of the last period, the Friars took a 60-59 lead as center Jack Reynolds put in two baskets, one on a driving shot and the other from the corner. Then Bobby Williams, the only family man in the game, scored on a nifty left-hand shot, which put the Hawks ahead by

one point. Seconds later, after some milling, Williams put in an overhead shot, which gave his team a three-point edge, 63-60.

Moran scored on a pass-in and was fouled. He converted the free throw, making it 63-all. Then Williams sank a foul shot and Frank O'Donnell, a freshman, scored as the Hawks had a two-one setup. Jackie Durkin, who did some fine rebounding, put in two free throws for the Friars, but St. Anselm's still led, 66-65.

PC fell three points in arrears again as the Hawks scored on a combination setup. Trying to control the ball, the Hawks ran into some aggressive guarding and scrambling. Durkin scored on a rebound shot, leaving the Friars one-point down, 68-67, with 1:48 remaining.

The Friars gained the ball with 88 seconds left and played it carefully. Finally a quick-passing maneuver was made from Tommy Mullins to Durkin to Moran, who scored after a nice fake. This put Providence in the lead, 69-68; and from the way the Friars were handling things, it appeared they would go on to victory.

#### Pressing

The Hawks were pressing, but waiting for a good shot. They took three wild ones, but managed to pick off the rebounds. Providence appeared to have O'Donnell bottled up, when he hooked a pass to McCarthy under the hoop and McCarthy dropped in the winning basket.

Providence brought the ball up court but lost it for traveling. Later the Friars forced a jump ball, when Kenny Kerr tied up a St. Anselm's player.

It was the second exciting game for the Friars, who lost similarly to Rio Grande, 89-87, Saturday night at Boston Garden. Yesterday Reynolds, Kerr and Durkin did well on the defensive board and Moran and Mullins excelled in shooting and playmaking. Hank McQueeney's lone hoop was a flashy one.

Moran, Kerr and Durkin shot the Friars into a first-half lead, 37-35, and Providence led, 53-48, going into the final period. Mullins, Phil Lynch, Moran and Kerr sparked the third-period surge.

# Bevo Wins Over Skeptical Fans The Way Ernie Calverley Used To

Perhaps the NCAA will never recognize Bevo Francis and his talents but certainly the basket ball fans of America will, if he continues to produce. Many go to watch him in a skeptical frame of mind but leave admitting he's quite a basketball player.

Bevo was just a name and a story in the papers to most of us until he came East last week. Like many others, I wondered how good a basketball player he was. But he passed the test for me and the majority of the 13,000 fans who sat in on the Rio Grande-Providence College game.

Francis is no great shakes as a defensive player but he's a fine shooter and point maker. Any player coming East for his first crack at the big time, with his reputation preceding him, is in for trouble. But Bevo delivered with 32, 39 and 41 points in three of the East's bigger basketball centers.

## Takes Defeat Hard

The national scoring leader is one of 50 boys attending Rio Grande, according to Coach Newt Oliver's own figures, and he takes his basketball quite seriously. Rio set its heart on winning over Villanova but lost out in the final half-minute of overtime after an outstanding performance. Francis took the defeat most hard. He sat on a bench in the Rio Grande dressing room and cried for more than 15 minutes.

Although some figure Bevo will make a good pro, his likings are more for the small town. Bevo doesn't like all this new-found glamor and wasn't too keen on Rio Grande's big time schedule. He would rather go fishing and hunting and raise sporting dogs than most anything else except playing basketball.

## Wins Fans Over

When I first saw him, he reminded me of Ernie Calverley, perhaps Frank Keaney's greatest player at Rhody. He's unlike Ernie in his game but he wins the fans over much the same way. And like Rhody, Rio is not a one-man team. Bevo's mates handle the ball well and are fairly good players themselves.

Coach Oliver, a peppy little guy and apparently a smart coach, said he would have liked to have played against the University of Rhode Island. "We were in the tentative stage for a game with

the Rams," Oliver explained, "but somewhere along the line the booking fell through."

"I would liken Bevo to Yale's Tony Lavelli," said Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars. "He shoots something like Tony and the officials give him that same protection. A great shooter commands a certain amount of respect and he always gets it. That was true of Lavelli, Bob Cousy, and many others when they were collegians but they earned that respect by some great work coming up."

## Recalls Joe Fulks

"The first time I watched Bevo on the foul line, I was trying to think back to the days of the Rollers," said Earl Shannon, another former Rhody star and currently PC Frosh coach. "Bevo is similiar to Joe Fulks. You'll remember Joe ran away with the BAA (now NBA) scoring title a couple of times.

"Get the ball to Joe and many a time he'll get you two points.

"That's the way it is with Bevo. Now he's not as polished as Fulks but he could be. He made some tough ones against PC and he might do all right with the pros. Certainly he'll be a big attraction," Shannon concluded.

## Real Nice Guy

"Bevo is a real nice guy," said Lloyd Thompson, one of his teammates. "I saw him play in high school when he was with Wellsville and he was good then. We all like him and he's quick to give the rest of us some of the credit. I'm only a freshman and I didn't see him when he was scoring all those points last year. But he was good against Villanova and some of the others.

"We practice on a small court, what most basketball people would call a crackerbox," Thompson said. "but the kids all play together and work for the team's success. This was a tough trip but we put up a good game. Bevo was terrific."

Bevo ran afoul of the NCAA last year when his prolific scoring record came up for national approval, which it didn't get. But you can't fool the people who pay in to see him. They like him. Me too!

# Friars' Sextet Meeting Harvard Here Tonight

Francis, who scored 1954 points last season, including 116 against Ashland Junior College, and compiled a spectacular 50-point average for a 39-game schedule, will lead his Rio Grande Redmen against Providence College at 7 o'clock.

At 5:30 Boston College engages St. Anselm's of Manchester, N.H., where interest is so high that 200 supporters will invade the Garden by special train.

The five-hour program will be

topped by an 8:45 clash between Boston Celtics and Milwaukee Hawks.

The college-major league tie-up has been approved by both AAU and NCAA, since profits of this program go to the AAU in its drive for \$500,000.

Francis was in the public eye all last season. In spite of the fact that some of Rio Grande's opposition admittedly was weak, many who saw the 6-9 star claim he would be a standout at almost any other college. He has a wide assortment of shots, is fast for his size and all the NBA clubs already have him tabbed for the 1956 draft meeting.

## Fantastic Story

The story of Bevo is one of the most fantastic in the history of college athletes. As a youngster, he was so anemic that for two years he had to be carried wherever the family went. Regaining his strength he played both football and baseball but gave up both sports when he sensed that basketball was made just for him.

When he switched high schools, the Ohio Principals' Association suspended him for two years. When he finally became eligible, Bevo was a unanimous All-Ohio forward. He received scholarship offers from 64 colleges, including some of the country's principal universities, but elected to follow his Wellsville High coach, Newt Oliver, to Rio Grande. Today, Oliver is the Rio Grande A.A. in himself, acting as publicity director, athletic director, trainer and coach.

Admitted to Rio Grande conditionally, Bevo made up his high school credits so that by last Jan-

uary he received his diploma. Nearby Gallipolis held a citywide celebration in his honor, named him "Mayor for the Day" — he already having 1225 points in college competition by then.

## Has 18-Month-Old Son

Bevo earns every cent of his college expenses by doing chores around the campus. His wife is his high school sweetheart; they have an 18-month-old son, Jeffrey. Bevo's dad, a clay-miner; also contributes to their support. With Bevo's spectacular rise to fame, the outlook at Rio Grande has brightened. Up to a year ago, when the enrollment dropped to 90, it looked as if the little teacher-training institution would have to fold for lack of funds. However, last Winter's 39-game undefeated campaign has changed all that.

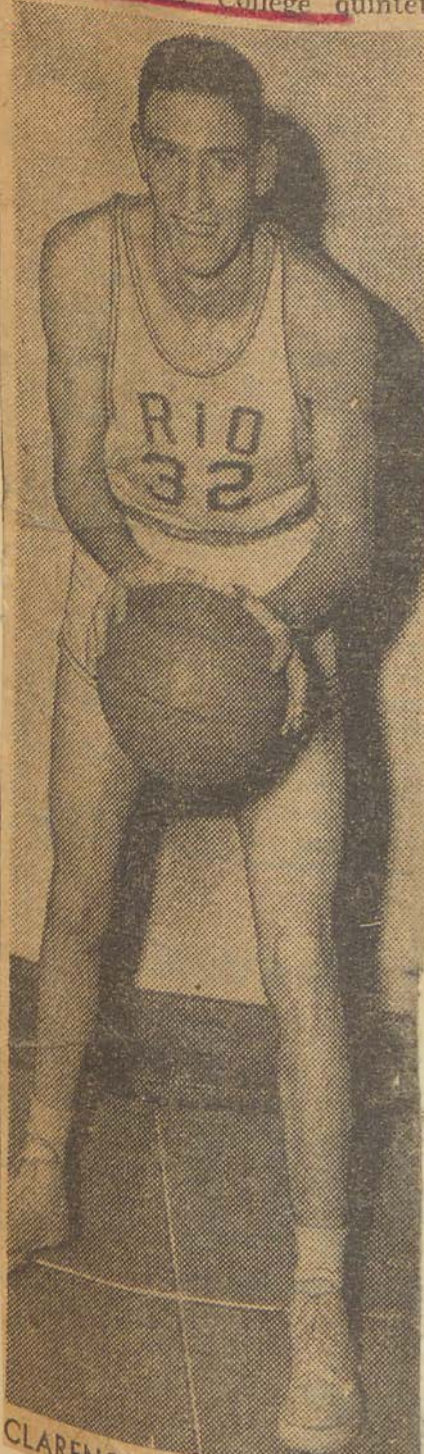
Bevo, the nation's most publicized—and allegedly best—basketball player, is to lead his Rio Grande (Ohio) team against the Providence College quintet

# N.E. Hoop Fans Get Chance To See Bevo Saturday Night

Bevo Francis, who is more man than myth, plays before three critical audiences that think they know basketball, starting with tonight's game in Madison Square Garden against Adelphi. Tomorrow night he goes against Villanova in Philadelphia and on Saturday Rio Grande faces the Providence College Friars at the Boston Garden.

Francis is one of those fabulous characters that come along every so often in sports. He put little Rio Grande College on the sports map. Scoring at a 50-1 average over 39 games is quite a feat, even playing against midgets.

## Small-Town Boy

But Bevo's story is not so unusual in some other ways. He was a small-town boy in Ohio who learned how to shoot a basket in an old barn, as have many others. Coach Newt Oliver, who was an outstanding scorer himself, also for Rio Grande, found him in high school, worked with him and together they have become national figures.

It's true, Bevo made some of his records against small and little-known teams, but Rio Grande had an enrollment of less than 100 a year ago. They were not new to sports, however, for in the 30's the Rio Grande football team played schools like Bradley, Cincinnati and Lawrence College. When Bevo smashed all the intercollegiate marks last year, the NCAA and the coaches got together and caused a general reduction all along the line in basket-making marks as a result.

Oliver apparently is a capable coach and a glib-talking one and he's as much a part of Bevo's saga as Bevo himself. Somebody must have worked hard with Bevo, for his talent didn't reach a high standard without some polish. Oliver once scored 59 points himself while Don Duncan, another Rio Grande hoop ace, tallied 87 another time.

## First Major Test

Bevo passed his first major test in Buffalo last week, scoring 64 against Erie, which is a junior college. However he scrimmaged against Dayton, a fairly good club, and scored 34. He hit his all-time peak against Ashland last January when he hooped in 47 field goals and 22 free throws for 116 points. He had quite a few other big ones, getting 76 and 72 points in a couple.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars has learned that Bevo isn't the entire team. "They have some good ballhandlers and shooters," Cuddy says "but naturally they give it to Bevo. Who wouldn't under the circumstances? He must be good for he scores 'em every place and he must have run into some pretty fine players someplace along the line."

Bevo comes from the foothills of lower Ohio near Gallipolis, which made him honorary mayor last year after his great scoring exploits. Wellsville is his home town but recently he was elected the constable of Racoon township on write-in ballots. This tends to show his everyday life is on the unusual, similar to his basketball.

## Good Hook Shot

Experts, qualified or otherwise, don't always agree on Bevo's relative merits. Most of the qualified ones, however, indicate that he's a pretty fair player. He has a good hook shot and can put the ball in from spots other than right under the basket. With his 6 foot 9 inch height and his agility, he's a hard man to guard.

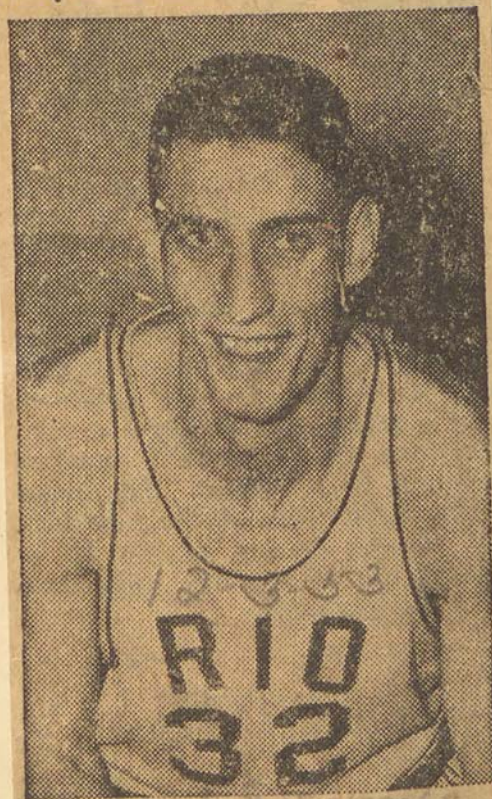
Most folks thought Rio Grande was down Mexico way until Bevo gradually assumed more prominence. However Rio Grande was founded in 1896, four years before the University of Rhode Island, and was a little co-ed college with 88 students and 15 teachers until Oliver and Francis arrived on the scene. Oliver couldn't do it himself for he was a student there and then went out coaching and teaching since the war.

Francis, who is married and the father of an 18 months old boy, is quick to give credit to his teammates for any success Rio Grande enjoys. He also is most loyal to Oliver and says, "Wherever Newt goes, I go too."

"They put at least two or three men on Bevo sometimes," his coach explains. "We have a much tougher schedule this year but we will show them some basketball."

# Rio Grande Star Faces Providence in Feature

The Celtics, who blew a chance to gain on both New York and Syracuse in the Eastern Division standings of the NBA by losing to Fort Wayne last night, will join forces with four college quintets tomorrow evening to give Boston its first basketball triple-header.

Boston College will open the proceedings against St. Anselm's at 5:30 p.m., Rio Grande featuring Bevo Francis meeting Providence at approximately 7 p.m., with the Celtics and the Milwaukee Hawks tapping off around 8:45 p.m.

Stripped of all their basketball scoring records by the NCAA because of inadequate competition, Bevo Francis and his Rio Grande College teammates may have bitten off more than they can chew with a very ambitious 25-game schedule in order to prove to the NCAA that it was mistaken.

## 100 Students

Rio Grande, with an enrollment of around 100 students, has scheduled such powerhouses as Villanova, North Carolina State, Miami, Wake Forest, and Butler. If it should get through such a schedule without too much damage it stands an excellent chance of receiving an invitation to at least one of the many post season tournaments.

Clarence 'Bevo' Francis caused quite a stir throughout the nation while breaking all existing scoring records in leading his team to a perfect 39-0 record last season. With an almost unbelievable total of 1,954 points that figures out to an average of 50.1 points per game Bevo could be one of the biggest figures in sports this season.

If he doesn't come close to scoring 1,000 points in Rio Grande's 25-game schedule for an average of near 40 points per game, fans will say that Bevo built his fame against setups. He must produce. Last fall he scored an unprecedented 116 points in one game against Ashland Junior College.

## 64 Offers

Rio Grande Coach Newt Oliver was his coach at Wellsville, Ohio High School in Bevo's senior year, his only year of basketball competition before entering Rio Grande. Although receiving offers from 64 colleges Bevo chose to remain with Oliver, who had just been appointed as coach at Rio Grande.

Bevo, who has been accused of scoring his record output against men much smaller than his 6ft., 9in., frame, faced Bill Uhl of Dayton University last season and while the 6ft., 11in., center was scoring 10 points, Bevo was busy netting 35.

## Bevo Scouted

There is little doubt that Bevo has put tiny Rio Grande College on the map. The college profit in 1953 from basketball was estimated between \$14,000 and \$15,000. Not much to a large university but everything to a school of its size. It helped pay the salary of the 13-member faculty.

Joe Lapchick, coach of the National Basketball Association New York Knicks has scouted Bevo several times and says, "He's ready right now. I hope to get him."

An NBA club is unable, under the rules, to contact a college player until his class has graduated. So, unless Bevo leaves school the pro clubs will have to wait until the fall of 1956 to sign him. Francis is only a sophomore.

Asked what he thought of his prize star, Oliver said, "He's just the greatest player in the college game—maybe the greatest of all time."

Francis realized one of his lifetime ambitions last night, playing in Madison Square Garden, New York. Although his team was defeated by Adelphi College, 83-76, Bevo led all scorers with a total of 32 points. It was the first loss for Rio Grande in 41 contests. Earlier this season they topped Buffalo State Institute, with Bevo getting 64 points.

Tonight Rio Grande faces another rugged test in Philadelphia against an always strong Villanova quintet before meeting Providence College tomorrow night in its Boston debut.

## Top Small College

Providence shapes up as having one of the top small college basketball teams in the New England area. The Friars boast a senior club sparked by Bobby Moran, Henry McQueeney and Tom Mullins. Moran has a three year average of 22 points per game.

If there is any such thing as a one man team, those gathered at Boston Garden tomorrow night around 7 p.m. will be able to find out for themselves.

Big "Bev," whose best output in a single game last year was 116 points, opened the 1954 season last Friday by scoring 62 points against Buffalo State Institute.

Whether Rio Grande taps against Providence with a 42-game winning streak depends on tonight's clash with powerful Villanova.

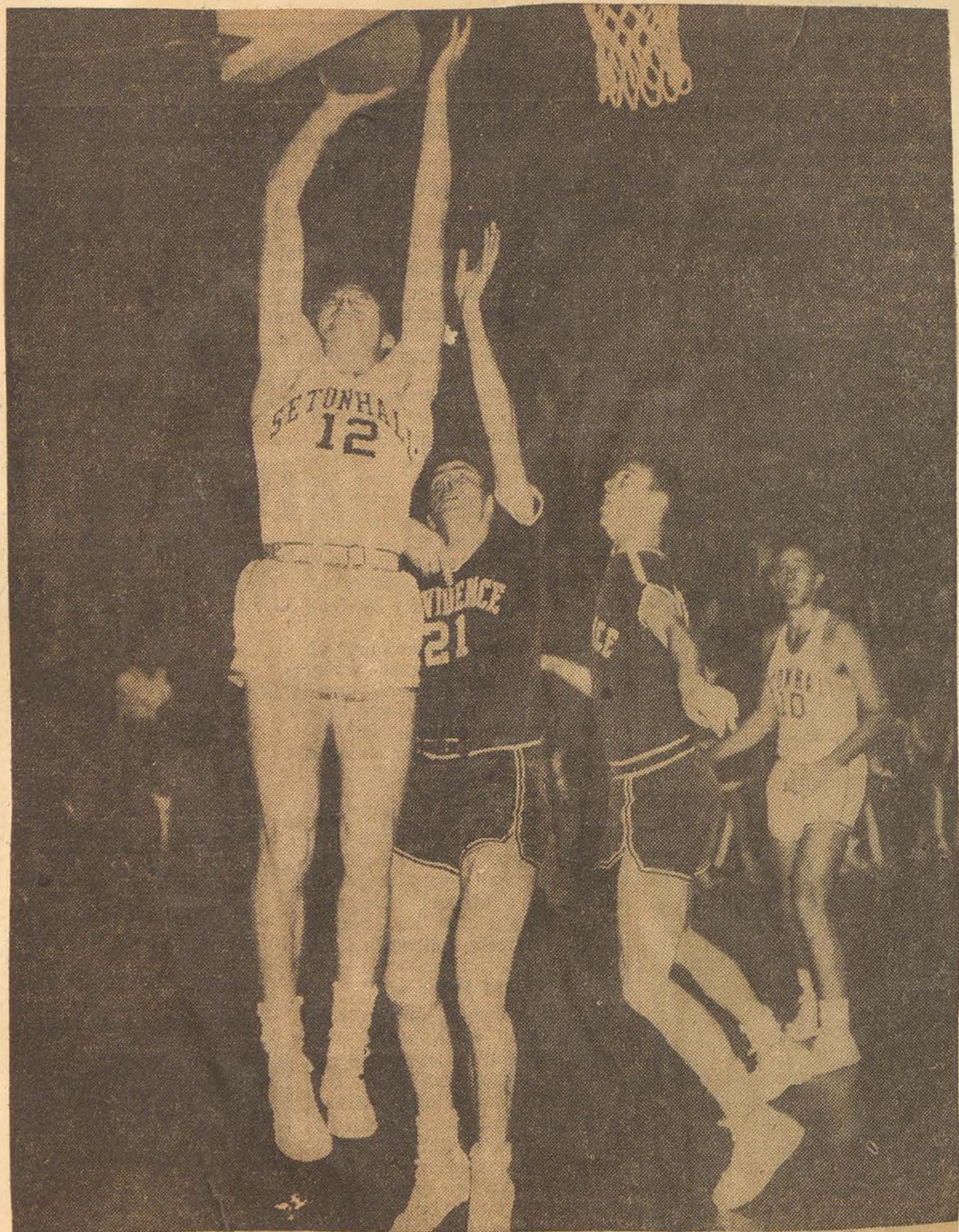

## Starts Petrie, Long

Russell said that the two-platoon system is definitely out for Saturday night's game. However, he did start Ed Petrie and Richie Long for the first time last night in place of Mickey Hannon and Arnie Ring.

"St. Francis is as good as any in the East," Russell said. "We haven't got the personnel to play two teams against St. Francis."

Brooks' outstanding defense was not the only bright spot in last night's victory. The Pirates controlled the boards most of the time and this enabled them to get off more shots and clean off Providence's as well. Seton Hall recovered the ball 68 times to the Friars' 19.

## Top Rebounder

Long, a ball hawk whenever the ball hits the boards, recovered 16 rebounds, while Henry Cooper had 15.

The Pirates went ahead, 15-10, at the end of the first quarter and were leading 33-22, at the halftime intermission. Ring and Hannon, who started the second period, both scored goals before a minute of play had elapsed. While Moran was scoring two fouls for the Friars in the third

quarter, Long and Ronnie Nathanic, who hit for seven of 12 shots from the floor, led a rampage that put the Pirates in front, 52-24. Long, Charley Travers and Hugh Gallagher kept the Pirates well in front in the fourth quarter.

Nathanic finished the game with 16 points, while Long had 11. Petrie made good on his first starting role, collecting three assists and doing yeoman work on the boards with Long and Cooper.

Leading the Friars were Moran and Ken Kerr with 11 points. Providence has won three of its seven games.

## PIRATES BREEZE PAST PROVIDENCE

Looking like their old championship selves, particularly in the third period, Seton Hall University swept to a 69-46 victory over Providence College before 1,500 at the Pirate court last night for their second triumph in three starts.

Although leading, 34-22, at the end of the first half, it was not until the third quarter that Setonia really flashed its best form. In that period, the Pirates moved the ball with more deftness than they've shown all season.

There were several standouts for the Hall. Ronnie Nathanic, rangy junior, dropped in seven field goals out of 12 attempts. Added to two fouls, these gave him 16 points for the fray, although he was in for only about three quarters.

### PIRATES CONTROL BOARDS

The Pirate rebounding, a factor in the Temple loss, was much better with 66 rebounds to only 19 for Providence. Soph Richie Long not only got 16 rebounds but had 11 points. Hank Cooper had 15 rebounds.

Ed Petrie, Harry Brooks and Mickey Hannon turned in sparkling floor games. Russell juggled his lineup, starting with Long, Brooks, Cooper, Nathanic and Petrie. He inserted Arnie Ring and Mickey Hannon in the second period and banked on these seven until the game became one-sided.

Brooks did a great job on Providence's high-scoring Bob Moran. The latter did not get a field goal while Brooks was on him.

The Pirates stepped out smartly at the start, as Petrie and Nathanic dropped in layups, after clever passing. Moran dropped in a foul for the Friars, but Brooks hit on a set for Seton. Moran came back with another free throw, and again Brooks retaliated.

### PIRATES SLOW UP

The Pirates then started to slow up and a Kerr layup and two Moran fouls brought the Friars to within a point, 7-6. Cooper and Ralph Lynch swapped fouls. The Pirates were out of trouble when Long swished in a jump shot and Nathanic contributed a three-point play. Kerr broke the run with a free throw but Brooks broke back in with a layup. Tom Mullins' jumped ended the period at 15-10 for Seton.

Ring made a layup and Hannon and Brooks set shots, as the Pirates opened the gap to 21-10. Ring and Hannon entered the game as the second period opened. Mullins set, but Ring again made a jump shot and Long and Cooper free throws.

Another run of five points, with Travers getting a foul and Hannon and Cooper double-deckers, ran the count to 31-17. Providence managed to whittle off two points and the half ended with Setonia up, 34-22.

### LONG, NATHANIC EXCELL

Long and Nathanic were the big guns in the third-period spurt. Long had four field goals and Nathanic five double deckers and a four. Petrie did some fine feeding.

The Pirates started the quarter with runs of three and six points, broken up by two Providence fouls. Then came a nine-point skein with Nathanic dropping in three of his field goals at that stage.

Coach Russell cleared the Seton bench in the last period but the Friars could do little.

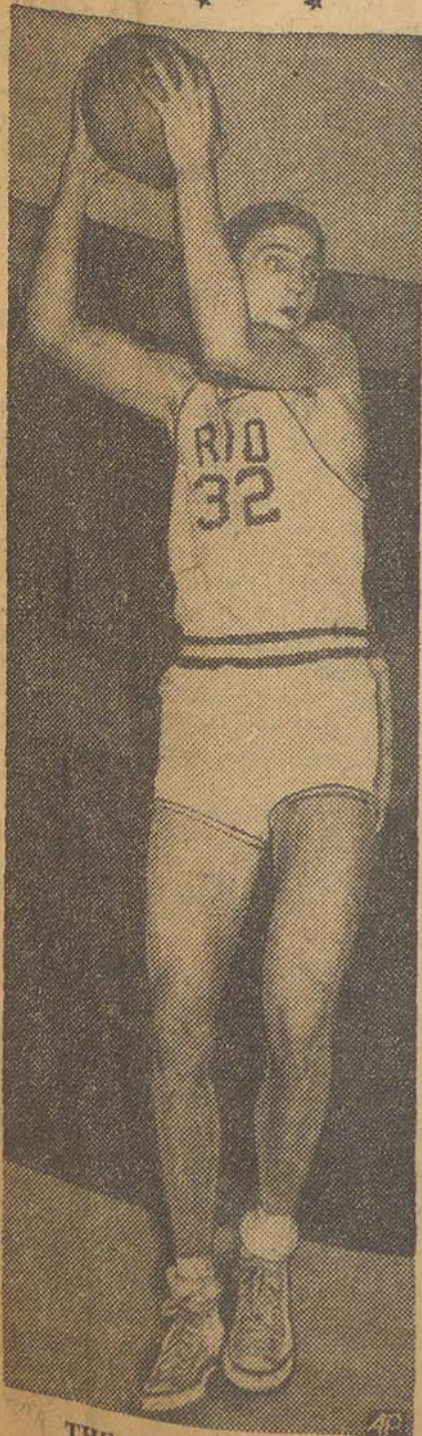


# Something To Think About

Bevo, the boy wonder, is making the NCAA look sillier and sillier every time he steps onto the court. Against Villanova Friday night, he popped 39 points through the hoop, then followed up Saturday at Boston Garden with 41 against Providence College.

Even the mighty NCAA will have to admit that both Villanova and Providence College are major teams. Anyone who saw the six-foot-nine Francis in action against Providence will tell you—he's not a freak, but one fine basketball player. He was mainly responsible for the 89-87 loss the Friars suffered, as he hit on 13 of 33 attempts from the floor, and dropped in 15 of his 20 foul attempts.

Providence has a smart, aggressive team, yet was unable to stop Bevo when it counted most. The Rio Grande ace was double and triple-teamed at times by such performers as Jackie Durkin, Ken Keer, Hank McQueeney and Jack Reynolds—but he had it when he needed it.

Incidentally, Rio Grande has a pretty good team. In addition to Bevo, it has real scoring threats in Jim McKenzie and Wiseman. Francis' 41 points tied the Boston Garden-Arena college scoring mark set last season by Johnny O'Brien of Seattle.

Bevo's quite a guy. After the game, he shook hands with every man on the Providence College squad and wished them luck during the rest of the season. Bobby Moran had 26 points, Ken Kerr 17, Jackie Durkin 15 for PC.

## Moran Threat To Terriers' Court Streak

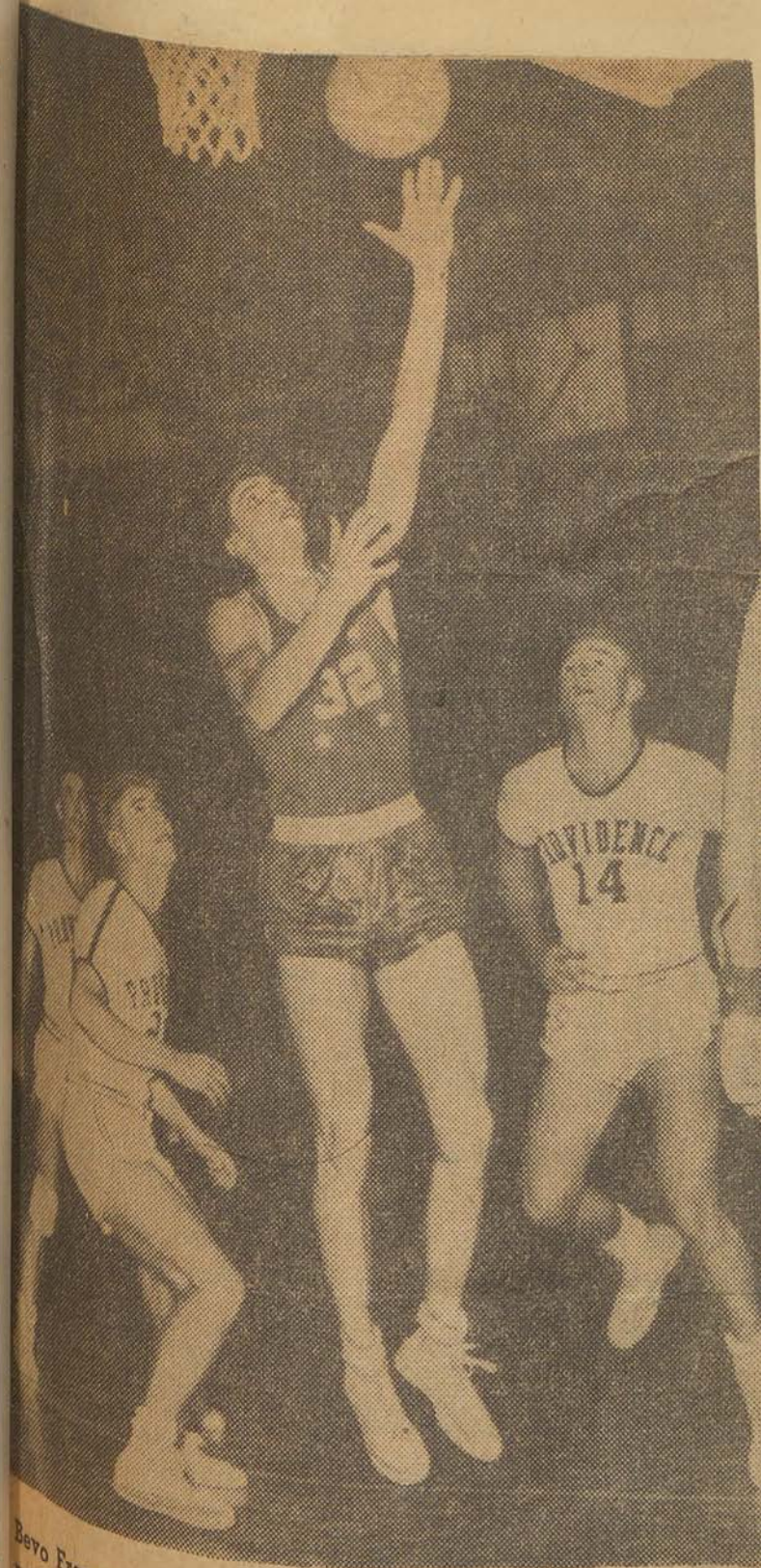

Fairfield beat the Friars, 73-65, at Waterbury last season.

Sophomore Larry Collamore may work into the Friars' top group in the next few games. He's 6-foot-4 and will get an opportunity to work with Bobby Moran, Hank McQueeney, Tommy Mullins, Jack Durkin, Ken Kerr, Phil Lynch and Reynolds, who have been carrying the load for the Friars. Moran was the high scorer during the pre-Christmas trip.

Bobby Gerwein, Jack O'Connell, Fred Lane and Bob Markovic, a Waterbury resident, gave the Friars the most trouble in their first meeting at Mount Pleasant High School. The Stags lost to St. John's of Brooklyn and defeated Rider College, 67 to 59, since the Providence game.

# P. C. Upsets Boston College

## Eagles Suffer First Loss of Season, 63-58

Friars Check Late B.C. Drive; P.C. Frosh Down Eaglets, 61-50

Playing some of their best basketball in several seasons, the Providence College Friars tumbled Boston College out of the unbeaten basketball ranks last night with a 63-to-58 victory in a hard-fought game at Mount Pleasant High.

The Friars, who had been in something of a slump, rebounded against the high-flying Eagles, checked a late drive and posted their first decision over a Boston College quintet in some time. It was a solid, all-around performance with Providence hitting a consistent pace throughout.

With seven minutes left, the Eagles tied the score at 50-all on a pop shot by Providence's Johnny O'Hara, the BC captain. Then Hank McQueeney, Bobby Moran and Tommy Mullins put on a fancy ball-handling exhibition that netted the Friars three baskets for a 56-50 advantage. Dick Skeffington sank a free throw for the Eagles but sophomore Larry Collamore boosted PC up to 58 points by sinking two free throws.

There were other big plays before and after but that surge gave PC a seven-point margin with 3:45 to go. BC threatened and came within a hoop on some fine work by big Tony Daukas, who had 21 points in all, but never closed in completely. The action was fast and exciting most of the way with PC's rooting section pleasantly surprised and rooting in bedlam fashion at times.

The clincher was supplied by Kenny Kerr, who learned some of his hoop tricks from BC mentor, Don Martin, when the two were working together for basketball success at De La Salle Academy.

Kerr put in two free throws with 44 seconds remaining after he had been knocked down and the points gave PC a 61-56 edge, which was overly sufficient at that point.

Boston College, with a rangy club, turned in a fairly fine game in defeat but the Friars were "up" and they weren't settling for second best last night. Jack Durkin, Kerr, Jack Reynolds and Collamore were effective rebounders for the Friars while McQueeney, who grew up in the shadows of the Heights, played one of the top games of his college career.

Moran, who chipped in some timely shots, took scoring honors with 14 points. He had two free-throw chances that would have put him over the 1,000-point mark for his collegiate career but failed in the closing seconds. Moran is the second PC shooter to score 1000 in his college career. He's right even with the mark today.

Lynch put in the basket that enabled the Friars to stay even at 45-all near the end of the third period. The Eagles had several shots in the closing seconds but missed before Kerr put in the game's final points with a layup shot with five seconds remaining. PC trailed in the first quarter, 16-14, and led by three, 31-28, at the half.

Boston outscored the Friars on baskets, 23-20, but PC made good on 40 per cent of its shots with 20 hoops in 50 attempts. Daukas, Skeffington, O'Hara and Paul Cullinane all helped to keep the Eagles' attack rolling.

Earl Shannon's Friar Frosh scored a 61-to-50 decision over the BC Freshmen in the preliminary after trailing, 26-25, at the half.

Because of the bad driving conditions, the Aces first wished to call off the game and then had trouble reaching Providence. But once they had arrived here, they turned in their best performance of the season. With five freshmen and two sophomores in the lineup, the Aces out hustled and outscored the Providence College team, which on Wednesday night had dropped Boston College from the undefeated ranks.

The Friars were well below their form of the B.C. victory, but the Aces generally outplayed them and scored one of their top victories in several seasons.

### Kross Gets 27

Richie Kross, from a Class B high school in Oakville, Conn., scored 27 points for the Aces and turned in an outstanding game, with the assistance of Johnny Jones, Reggie Spears and Jackie Donohue. The young Aces started fast and even in the wild and scrambling first quarter, held a 16-to-7 margin. The Friars registered only one basket. The Friars spurted at times, but were not consistent enough to overtake the Aces with one exception.

Early in the final quarter, the Friars went into the lead, 52-51, on two combination plays involv-

ing Bob Moran, Tom Mullins and Jack Reynolds, plus a free throw by Phil Lynch. But in the final seven minutes, the Aces came back again, rolled into a six-point lead, 58-52, and then more or less ran out the clock in the final four minutes.

### Good Defense

Providence had trouble penetrating the Aces' zone defense, especially in the first half. They got around the defense by a series of fast breaks, but were unable to keep up a fast-moving attack.

In the second half, Providence showed an improved game and seemed on the way to victory. But each time the Aces came bounding back. The AIC work on rebounds was a big factor, with Spears, Richie Clark, Jones and Kross picking off most of them.

The undefeated P.C. Freshmen rallied in the fourth quarter and scored a 62-57 victory over Nichols Junior College. Ken Willoughby, Ed Connelly and Mike Pascale led the Friars to their sixth victory.

The Friars have had 37 goals scored against them in four games.

Twenty-four of these came, however, when their top line was not functioning as a unit because of injuries.

Dave Reilly and Mike McDonough will be at defense for the Friars with Phil Crawford in the nets. Whiston will go with Co-captain Dick Pettit and Bob Borah, former Hope all-stater, at defense and Dave Halvorsen, an erstwhile Cranstonite, in the nets.

His first line tonight probably will skate as follows: Co-captain Art Vietze at center with Pete Tutless, a sophomore, and John Farrell on the wings.

# Ex-Friar 'Slip' Barnini, Who Did It Too, Offers Advice to Tom Lewis

John (Slip) Barnini, former Providence College center, who in 1938 jumped off the bench at Cincinnati, Ohio, and tackled an Xavier University touchdown-bound gridman, assures Tommy Lewis, Alabama fullback who did the same thing in the Cotton Bowl New Year's Day, that he will not be a marked man.

Contacted by telephone last night at Pompano Beach, Fla., where the ex-Friar three-sports flash sells real estate during the winter vacation season, Barnini said that since he graduated from college in 1940 he had received no mention of the incident which headlined his name throughout the nation.

"Guess it evens up for an athlete," he said philosophically. "People forget the things you like to forget just like they forget the things you like to remember."

"I remember being very embarrassed," Slip recalled, "but I was glad the kid I tackled wasn't hurt and I was sorry that what I did made the sportswriters forget all about the great game Charlie Avedisian, Bill Carter and others played that day."

## Pass Nullified

In the second period of the contest, played on a Sunday afternoon before 12,000 fans, P.C. was ahead 7-6. When Vin Nugent completed a pass in the end zone to Joe Levey, it looked like 13-6, but the aerial was nullified as Irv Slattery, Xavier end, and Slip engaged in a brief bout and were banished.

On the next play, Tom Hogan, Xavier quarterback, intercepted a Nugent pass and scooted down the sidelines bordering on the Providence bench. That was more than the ever-excitabile and never-subdued Slip, who had previously played every minute of every game, could take. Bounding off the bench without a helmet, he smacked down Hogan on the Xavier 45.

Hundreds of fans, mostly Xavierites, poured down from the stands and rushed over to the scene of the amazing occurrence.

"I couldn't get up and I would have been trampled," Slip says "if

Mal Brown (P. C. trainer, now deceased) had not thrown himself over me to protect me."

The referee also aided in saving Slip's life by awarding a touchdown to Xavier, whose outraged enthusiasts became still more mollified as their team went on and won, 33-7.

Always a stranger to fear in any form, Slip walked into the Xavier dressing room after the game and apologized.

"Hogan and everybody else were the best and they all told me to forget it," he declares.

But opponents encountered in future games that season did not forget it. Instead they needled him with cracks like "put him in a cage." By then, however, Slip had received an effective defense against such offensive remarks.

## Chin Up

"Hughie Devore (Friars' head coach) told me to keep my chin up and my mouth shut," he relates.

But staying silent long was contrary to Slip's nature. He was always a "holler" guy, whose enthusiasm was just as esteemed by friends and foes as his ability to win nine letters at P. C. When a Friar freshman, he even pinch hit as a cheer leader during contests in which he doubled as a participant.

He now doubles as real estate sales manager and general superintendent of the road building company, operated by his father-in-law, C. L. Hale, of Manchester, Conn.

During the Florida vacation season, Slip is sales manager of Hillsboro Harbor, a 160-acre waterfront development at Pompano Beach, owned by his father-in-law.

"Last year I sold \$120,000 in lots," he proudly reports.

Apparently he doesn't object to overtime any more now than when he was playing. At 7 o'clock last night he was still on the job.

Slip, who after graduating from Providence College, coached at Woonsocket High and St. Mary's of Waltham, Mass., received a friendly letter from Hogan a few years ago but hasn't heard from him since.

"I wish he would drop around because I owe him a good time. I'd like to get together with Tommy Lewis, too. We members of the "12th Man Club" should stick together. After all, there aren't many of us. I guess it's a good thing there aren't," he concluded.

# Rondeau Suggests Curb On Canadian Players

## P.C. Hockey Coach Would Limit U.S. Squads To Three Boys From North of the Border

Dick Rondeau, hockey coach at Providence College and a former Dartmouth star, said yesterday he favors limiting U.S. college hockey squads to three Canadian performers.

"In this way, Canadian boys won't be deprived of an opportunity to come over the border for an education, but at the same time they won't be able to form the entire nucleus of a college hockey team, as they do at several schools today," Rondeau said.

He indicated that he would bring his plan before the convention of the American Hockey Coaches Association, listed for Boston, March 18, 19 and 20.

The issue of Canadian skaters, always a smoldering one among the Eastern teams that do not have them, flared up recently when Harvard's coach, Ralph

(Cooney) Weiland, warned that the preponderance of Canadians on most Western teams would render the NCAA tourney between East and West meaningless.

His remarks came after the Crimson sextet had lost six straight games on a holiday Western tour, most of them by lopsided scores.

Weiland said the Canadians outnumbered U.S. players, three to one, on most Western squads and intimated that all are not legitimate amateur collegians. This was subsequently denied by coaches at Colorado College, Denver University and North Dakota.

Rondeau, a former Mount St. Charles performer, backed up Weiland. The indiscriminate use of Canadian skaters is exerting a bad influence on college hockey, he said. The PC coach believes, however, that the practice eventually will be self-defeating.

"Teams made up largely of Canadians will lose out in scheduling other sextets, and then they will wind up playing one another four or five times a season," he said. Rondeau's Friars met predominantly Canadian opposition in its game with Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute this season and lost, 14-1.

### Agree About Problem

Other coaches and officials in Providence hockey circles agree there is a problem caused by the invasion from north of the border. They agree, also, that an arbitrary ban on all Canadians is not the answer.

Paul F. Mackesey, athletic director at Brown and president of the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference, says: "There's nothing wrong with Canadians playing if they're bona-fide students. We've had a few at Brown, and there are some at Princeton now."

Mackesey, who recently has been re-elected to the hockey committee for the New England district of the NCAA, feels that the main problem with Canadian players lies with making sure they are real amateurs.

### Strict Code

He said the NCAA might solve the problem by adopting a strict eligibility code similar to that used by the ECAC for the last two years. This code, he said, calls for sworn affidavits from Canadian players that they have not signed professional contracts or played on professional teams and that they have not received "money or other valuable considerations, including expenses," for playing outside of college.

Don Whiston, Brown coach, said that he had "no gripes" against Canadian players and that no bar should be set up.

# Murgo Shines as Bruins Edge Friars

## Bear Ace Hoops Winning Points In 68-64 Victory

Overcoming a seven-point deficit in the final quarter with some shrewd, steady play, the Brown basketball forces scored a 68-64 victory over Providence College in a hotly contested game last night at Marvel Gym.

Coach Bob Morris' Bruins have come a long way since the two clubs faced each other last month in the dedication program at the Frank Keaney gymnasium. Last night's contest might have gone the other way but the Bruins' driving finish gave them their second victory in the State championship series.

Capt. Lou Murgo fired the clutch points for the Bruins in the final 80 seconds. Murgo, a marked man, let go with a long set shot which put his club ahead, 65-64, and later dropped in two free throws which boosted the Bruins' margin to 67-64 with less than a half minute remaining.

### Comparison

Murgo's long shot was reminiscent of Pawtucket's Ernie Calverley's exploits when he was playing for Frank Keaney at Rhody and later with the Bruins' Morris in the pro league. The Brown coach agreed later there is quite a similarity between the two shots and said "sometimes the quicker Lou gets it away, the better it is."

Both teams played some fine ball at times. While some individuals were better than others, most of the participants were keyed up and played a rough, aggressive game and a most interesting one

to watch. The Friars came out strong in the third period and rolled up a 53-46 advantage after trailing by 34-32 at halftime. The middle periods were the Friars best.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars thought the play of Charlie Blankfort of the Bruins had a large influence on the outcome. "He threw in three hoops and that was a big one when he stole a pass near midcourt and dribbled in for a basket. Sure, he fouled out later but he came through, once putting Brown ahead. And he bothers you plenty."

### Good Ball Game

Blankfort is a senior from New York City who sparked the Bruins against Colby in the Dartmouth tourney. "He gives you a good ball game," Morris said, "but I try not to have two small men in there at the same time if I can help it."

Both coaches figured it was a good ball game. The Bruins were outplayed in the third period when PC looked its best with a combination of Bob Moran, Ken Kerr, Tom Mullins, Jack Reynolds and Jack Durkin. But Brown came back with a 22-point fourth quarter, going ahead at 57-56 along about the first four minutes. It was a thrilling windup.

Mullins played one of his top games for the Friars. However Kerr, Durkin and Reynolds did some effective rebounding. Eddie Tooley, Ed Kincade and Ray Malkiewicz were effective in the game's rougher aspects for the

Bruins. Moran, Hank McQueeney, Phil Lynch and Ralph Tedesco all had their moments of brilliance. Sophomore Tedesco gave PC a spark in the second period.

Murgo and Blankfort were Coach Cuddy's choices as the top Bruins. "Brown is a lot tougher and better, since the first time we played them," Cuddy said. "Our gang played well but it resolved itself into a one- or two-shot game and Brown had the guns. Murgo had it in the clutch but our kids did a fine job."

The only undefeated college quintet in the State, the Providence College Freshmen, also had to come from behind to preserve their unbeaten record. Coach Earl Shannon's Friar Frosh scored a 56-52 decision over the Bear Cubs with John Ritch (16) and Ed Donohue (13) pacing the winners. Four Bruin Cubs hit double figures. They were John Lyden (11), John Keith (11), Dick Nooney (10) and Ed Adameczyk (10).

The University of Rhode Island Rams meet the New Hampshire Huskies tonight at Durham. Billy Pappas, who played well against the Rams in football, is also a leading basketball player. Dartmouth scored a 75-59 victory over the Huskies earlier this week. Rhody plans a starting lineup of Dave Stenhouse, Bernie Pina, Eric Anderson, Rollie Kubiskey and either Art Helwig or Dan Dunn.

Coming up with one of their best games of the season, the Springfield College Maroons smashed the hex the Providence College Friars have had on them over recent seasons as they scored a 73-56 victory over the Friars last night at Mt. Pleasant High.

After Springfield had built up a 13-point lead in the second quarter, although the Friars had been ahead, 14-13, in the first period. Coach Vin Cuddy benched his starting combination.

The wholesale benching wasn't the complete answer, but the reserves played a far better game than the regulars. A combination of Larry Collamore, Charley Aquaviva, Donny Moran, Bill Quinlan and Ralph Tedesco pulled the Friars up to within seven points in the third period and trailed by 10 at 48-38 starting the last quarter.

The reserve group played hustling aggressive ball. That they didn't do relatively better in a scoring way wasn't entirely their fault, for the Gymnasts were hitting more consistently with their shots in the second half.

The second half was exciting, much in contrast to the deliberate play in the opening two periods. Only Bobby Moran of the Friar

regulars came back into the game in the second half.

Moran figured in 10 of PC's first 14 points and scored the Friars' only field goal in the final six minutes of the second quarter.

Coach Vin Cuddy said yesterday he meant business when he scrapped his all-veteran starting lineup Saturday and "definitely will start mostly sophomores" in the Friars' next game.

Cuddy benched his regulars Saturday after they had blown sky-high in the second quarter against Springfield. After holding a one-point lead in the first quarter, the Friars trailed by 13 points at the half.

That was the clincher for Cuddy, who has been perplexed and at times bewildered by the off-again, on-again performances his club has turned in all season.

So his immediate solution was to start an all-sub combination in the second half. And even though they couldn't catch up, they did what Cuddy termed "a good, hustling job."

Those who took over and played most of the second half included Ralph Tedesco, Larry Collamore, Charley Aquavia, Don Moran and Bill Quinlan.

This group managed at one point to cut Springfield's lead to seven points, but the latter won, 73-56. The defeat was the Friar's ninth in 12 regularly scheduled games.

Cuddy said that the demotion of his regulars, who include Capt. Bobby Moran, Ken Kerr, Tom Mullins, Hank McQueeney and Jack Reynolds, was not necessarily permanent. Neither was he fully decided on the combination he would use.

"But on Wednesday (against St. Anselm's here)," he said, "I definitely will go with the 'kids.'" Presumably these are the men who saw second-half action against Springfield.

Cuddy added that his club now has passed the halfway mark on a 26-game schedule and, since he was

not winning with his vets, he might try several combinations.

"I might even use a two-platoon system, playing the vets and the kids a period each," he said. "Or I might try four sophomores and Bobby Moran. I don't think five sophomores have the experience to go all the way, but I'm certainly going to give my young ball players a good chance at it."

Cuddy said he believed there were "numerous reasons" for the team's lackluster performance, but he couldn't put his finger on any one cause except "senioritus." That is, a team composed mainly of seniors who are not as eager for the fray as they were previously.

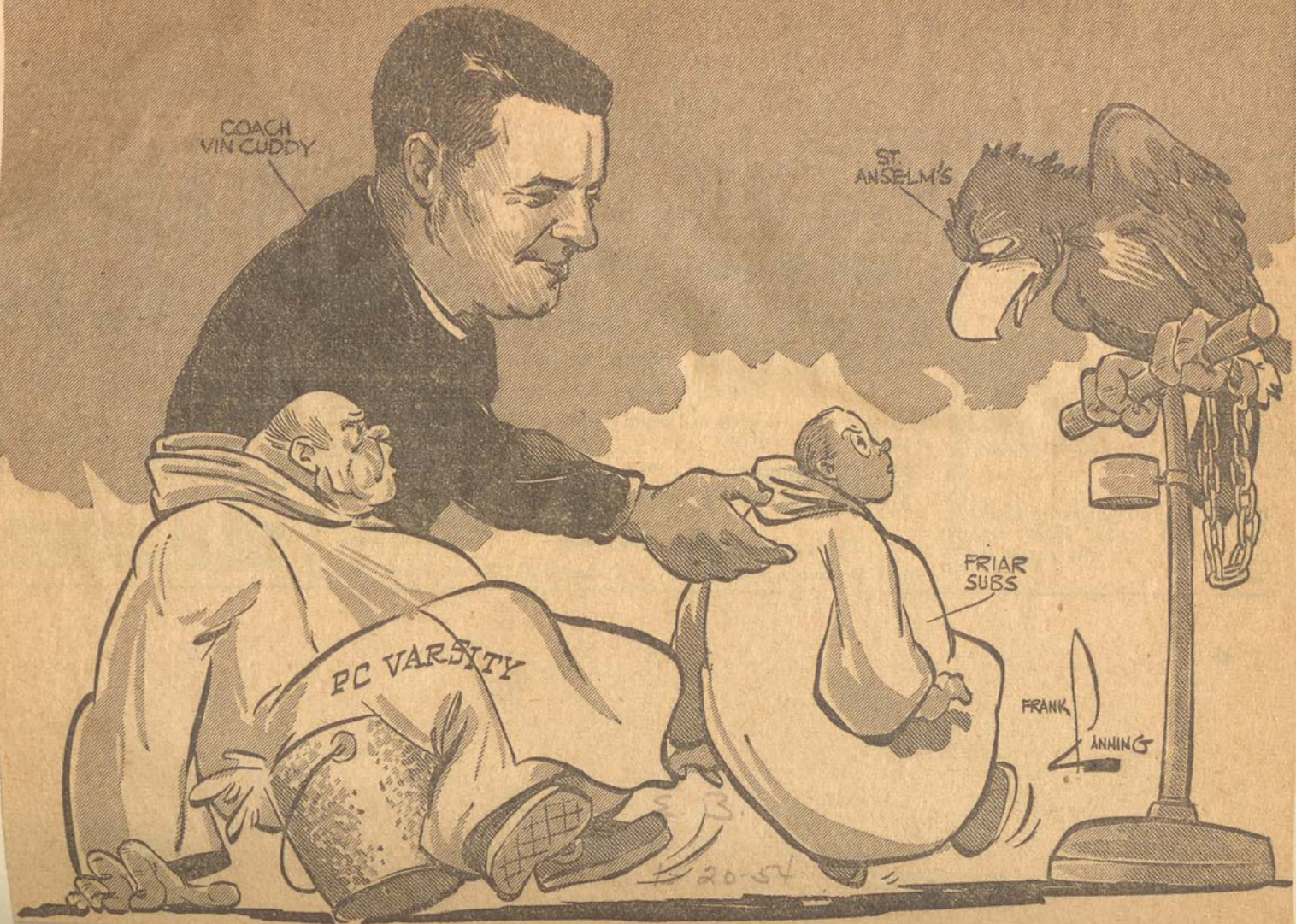
Providence may snap out of its slump with a change in lineup but the more experienced group that played so well in the early games has definitely bogged down in some of its recent outings.

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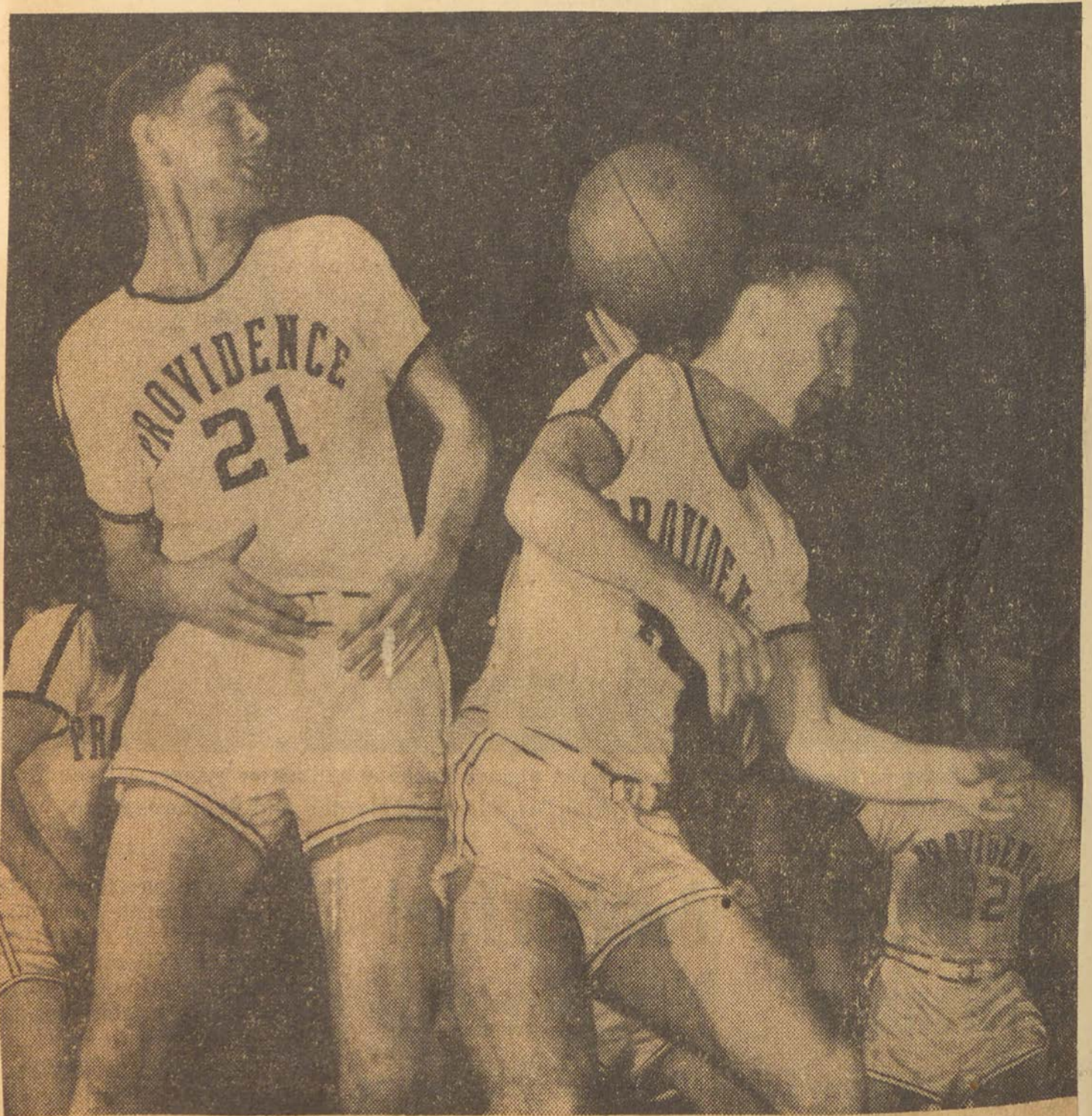

# Friars Avenge Earlier 1-Point Loss to Hawks

**Bobby Moran Leads Fourth-Period Rally; P.C. Freshmen Win**

The Providence College Friars scored a 62-61 victory over St. Anselm's College in a basketball thriller last night at Mount Pleasant High.

The Hawks nearly repeated their earlier one-point victory at Manchester when a shot by Bobby Williams went in and out of the basket in the closing seconds of a spirited contest. Williams' shot had too much English and spun off the hoop just prior to the final buzzer.

It was an uphill fight for the Friars, who got an early lift from some aggressive reserves, mainly sophomores, and fought through to the finish with more of a veteran combination. The shakeup in the PC lineup had its good points for the Friars played one of their most aggressive games of the season.

## Steadies Rookies

Outstanding in the Providence victory was Capt. Bobby Moran. The Brooklyn senior came through with several clutch points in the second half and also steadied a rookie combination. Moran hit one of his season's peaks in scoring 23 points and he was easily PC's most effective player.

The Friars' scrambling tactics paid off in the first half but the game played at a smoother pace over the final two periods. Providence was not as sharp perhaps as in some other games but it was driving and forcing breaks. Its offensive rebounding helped turn the tide also.

With the reserves starting the game, as Coach Vin Cuddy had announced, the Friars gained a 14-12 lead in the first period after a slow getaway. The second quarter was nip and tuck with Bobby Moran sinking a driving basket

in the final minute that offset a set shot by John Walsh of the Hawks and left the teams tied at 28-all at intermission.

Frank O'Donnell, an 18-year old freshman with a soft set shot, sparked a rally by St. Anselm's that gave the visitors a five-point edge, 48-43 starting the last quarter. O'Donnell and lanky Jim Keaveney did the bulk of the scoring in the Hawks' 20-point period, with Williams assisting with his floor work.

## Turning Point

The turning point for the Friars came about three minutes along in the last quarter. The Hawks led by 52-47 and 55-50 at two spots. Then Ralph Tedesco's free throw and three points by Bob Moran on a set shot and a free throw, pulled PC up within a point at 55-54.

Senior Phil Lynch fed Tedesco a pass for a short set that put the Friars ahead for the first time since late in the first half. Then Bud Matthews tied it at 56-all on a successful free throw. Moran broke the tie with three points from the foul line and later Ken Kerr set up Tedesco with a hoop that made it 61-57 in Providence's favor.

Williams dropped in a pretty, arching set from the side and then Lynch sank one of two foul shots, that made it 62-59 in the Friars' advantage. O'Donnell later put in two foul shots but Williams couldn't convert one of his two tries with the Hawks needing only a point to send the game into overtime.

In the nerve-wracking final 75 seconds, PC tried to control the ball but Tedesco came up all alone under the hoop. The ball rolled around the rim and off on his sucker shot as the Friar rooters groaned. The Hawks came down court trying to get O'Donnell in the clear for a clean shot. They had to settle for Williams. And the ball went in and out.

Bill Quinlan, Walt Malecki, Don Moran and Kerr put some life in the Friars. Keaveney was a problem with his 6-foot-6 altitude while Walsh, Williams and O'Donnell all played well for the Hawks.

The Providence College Frosh made it eight out of nine with an 83-73 triumph over Dean Academy. Larry Connolly, John Ritch and Ed Donohue paced the Friar Frosh attack.

Washington has been a good spot for the Providence College relay forces. Saturday night the Friars arrived early for the Washington Star meet, were paired up with a couple of southern teams and unofficially won the Southern Conference "championship."

"That's four times we have been to the nation's capital," said the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., the Friars' director of athletics today, "and we have won a race each time. The boys all ran well. George Kanary got us off to about a 10-yard lead on the first leg and Pierre Wallack and Dave Kehoe just about held it on their legs.

"Ben Angle, who later ran third to Carl Joyce (Georgetown and Quantico) in the 1000, ran anchor for Maryland against our John Dowling. Angle is a big, powerful runner and he was cutting down our lead. He tried to get by Dowling near the finish and knocked the baton loose from our man. We were awarded the victory but it was going to be a very close finish even if that didn't happen. Our boys did a real fine job.

## Nothing Left

"But we didn't have anything left for the two-mile. The boys were pretty tired after running at both Philadelphia and Washington. One of the most surprising things of the meet was Ken Wiesner's high jump victory after driving for approximately 11 hours to get to the meet from some place in

Carolina. We didn't have much trouble with the snow conditions but some others did.

"Coach Harry Coates was happy to talk over the victory and peruse the Washington papers when I visited him at St. Joseph's Hospital after we got back. He has been laid up for about a week. ## NCAA Playoffs In Region One At Springfield

Boston—(AP)—The New England (District 1) selection committee yesterday chose Springfield College for the site of a March 4-6 tournament to determine the region's entry in the NCAA basketball tournament.

Chairman John W. Bunn, head of the six-man committee, said the group "expressed a desire to have eight teams" in the New England tourney. He said that Springfield College has been asked to hold the tournament and "it is quite probable" that it will do so. The committee will meet at M.I.T., Feb. 28, to select the entries.

The committee said the tourney will be conducted under NCAA rules, which means that freshmen will be ineligible, as will transfer students who have not completed required residence requirements. Also, only teams from member schools of the NCAA and the New England Conference on Athletics will be eligible.

The no-freshman rule will hurt one of New England's two undefeated basketball teams, Norwich University (13-0). The Cadets use freshmen by agreement with the teams they play. Norwich might be chosen for the tournament, but freshmen would be unable to play. The committee explained that the reason for this rule in the regional tourney is that freshmen are ineligible for the NCAA championships.

If the tourney is not held in Springfield as planned, all tournament games will be played on a neutral court and on a college campus, the committee added.

Along with Bunn, who is athletic director at Springfield, the committee includes the Rev. A. B. Begley, Providence College; J. E. Donnelly, University of Vermont; Gilbert Loeb, Colby; Carl Lundholm, University of New Hampshire; Ray Oosting, Trinity, and Ivan Geiger of M.I.T.



# Friars' Sophs, Moran Tag RPI Five at Start

The Providence College Friars rolled up 55 points in the first half and coasted to a 94-71 victory over Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute last night at Mount Pleasant High.

Working with mainly a sophomore group, Capt. Bobby Moran paced the Friars to their highest scoring total of the season. Moran chipped in 20 points, including several of his sets from outside, and generally looked the part of the outstanding player he had been in his previous two seasons with the Friars.

With a reorganized and revitalized group, the Friars started out at a fast clip. They scored 25 points in the first period and 30 in the second with perhaps their most impressive scoring bulge in quite some time. Moran steadied and led the newcomers. His brother Donie, Ralph Tedesco, Ed Quinlan and Larry Collamore have become an aggressive unit. Gus Westenhuis also works well with this group.

The Engineers from Troy had high hopes of nailing the Friars as they came here with only one defeat in eight games. Providence never gave them a chance to get rolling, zipping into a 14-5 lead early in the first period and keeping the pressure on until the game was definitely wrapped up.

Providence sank 22 out of 45 shots for baskets in the first half with the Moran brothers, Tedesco and Phil Lynch hitting with clean, sure baskets. Later Ken Kerr was effective from inside. Providence appears to have better operatives around the boards for the rebound work since Coach Vin Cuddy shook up his squad. The team has won its last two starts with the rookies opening up and a modified offensive switch which has worked wonders.

The story of the game was in the first half. The Friars were driving, hustling and scrambling. They got off to a fast pace and never let RPI get started. In the second half, it was a more leisurely gait with considerable fouling and a general lack of smooth play although the scoring was fairly good on both sides.

Providence put on a drive for the century mark in the last period but the surge came too late. Frank Cassella and Vince Detrano gave the Friars the most trouble, scoring 20 and 19 points, respectively. Perhaps RPI had a let-down after its close victory over the Coast Guard Academy on Friday night but PC was ready last night and they got in their best work early.

The Quonset Flyers scored their

20th victory in 27 starts in the preliminary, humbling the Providence College Freshmen, 75-64, with a strong second half. It was PC's second defeat in 12 games. George Schringer and Paul Shafer played well for the winning Flyers.

**St. John's Player Hurls Down Bristol Referee; Friars Lose in Overtime**

Boston—Holy Cross defeated St. John's 78-58 in a rough, turbulent basketball game which resembled a street fight on one occasion last night before 6,614 spectators at Boston Garden.

Under much calmer circumstances, St. Anselm's scored a 62-to-54 victory over the Providence College Friars in overtime, winning the odd game of a three-game series.

Twice the Holy Cross-St. John's encounter developed situations that had dangerous implications. Late in the first half, Marty Satalino, St. John's junior, roughed up one of the referees, Anthony Agatiello of Bristol, R.I., grabbing him around the neck and slamming him to the floor. In the third period fans, players and policemen stormed the court in a punching bee involving several players on both teams.

### Players Scuffle

The mass invasion of the court was preceded by a scuffle between the Cross' Joe Liebler and St. John's Solly Walker, who roughed Liebler. Satalino, sitting on the bench although ineligible to play grabbed Liebler and the two mixed it up. The Redmen's Pete Carroll was conspicuous in the commotion, which resulted after spirited body contact and rough play had marked the game almost from the outset.

What top flight basketball there was featured Ronnie Perry and Tom Heinsohn. Perry scored only 15 points but his passing and setup work was of a high calibre. There were 64 fouls called. Holy Cross led 35-28 at half time.

Providence College led the Hawks 35-26, at halftime. However, PC registered only four baskets and 19 points in the final 25 minutes of activity.

Outstanding for St. Anselm's was Al Collamore, a transfer from NYU. The 6-foot-4 sophomore, who became eligible this week, scored 22 points for St. Anselm's and was a troublesome marauder for the Friars on the backboards. Collamore's shooting wasn't surprising as he led the NYU freshmen in scoring a year ago.

### Moran Breaks Record

Ken Matthews and Collamore scored all 12 points for St. Anselm's in the last period as the Friars were limited to seven. Matthews tapped in a hoop from a scramble as he was fouled and then sank the free throw which knotted the score at 52-all with five minutes left.

O'Donnell paired with McCarthy and Bobby Williams to kill the clock in the regulation game and the overtime session as well.

## Duo Seen Waging Test Typical of Keen Rivalry

Friars to Be Minus  
Services of Aquavia;  
Frosh in Preliminary

The Providence College Friars meet the University of Rhode Island tonight at 8:30 o'clock at Mount Pleasant High School in the game of their intrastate basketball series. In the preliminary, the PC Freshmen play the Rhody Ramlets at 7 o'clock.

The Mount Pleasant gymnasium can accommodate approximately 800 fans at best, so it's a case of first come, first served. The game originally was listed for the Auditorium but was recently transferred to Mount Pleasant, which has been the Friars' "home" playing surface for several seasons.

At one time, the Friars would have been heavy favorites on the Mount Pleasant court. That was in the days when they were practically unbeatable there. Coach Jack Guy of the Rams figures the Friars have great potential.

The Friars have won the game played in Providence in three of the last four seasons, scoring a 92-to-66 decision last season. Rhody swept the series during the 1951-52 season, but in the two previous seasons Coach Vin Cuddy's team notched victories over Rhody on the Auditorium court.

Rhode Island has been on the upsurge since Bob Serra became eligible at the start of the new term. The Rams have won three of their last four, including a surprising 103-point performance against Boston College for a Boston Garden record.

"Serra has given us a lift," Guy said yesterday. "He played a nice game against St. Joseph's even though he strained a neck muscle the day before. Our attack hasn't been consistent enough to suit me, even though we are scoring more points than we did earlier."

Up on Smith Hill yesterday, Coach Cuddy found out that he won't be able to use Charlie Aquavia tonight. Charlie, who is a hustler and a bothersome defensive man, injured his leg in the St. Anselm's game and won't be ready to suit up tonight. Aquavia turned in some good work against St. Anselm's.

The Friars will have Bob and

Donie Moran in the backcourt, with Ralph Tedesco and Phil Lynch at forwards. Kenny Kerr, Larry Collamore and Jack Reynolds are all possibilities for the center post. Lynch won his starting berth by some consistently steady work as a spot man.

Although Art Helwig, who played well in the Springfield game Saturday, isn't being counted on as a Rhody starter, he will see heavy duty against PC. Serra, Slick Pina, Dave Stenhouse, Dan Dunn and Eric Anderson are Rhody's probable starters, though rugged Rollie Kubiskey, who has been rebounding effectively, may be in the lineup at the opening tap.

Providence and Rhody both have outstanding Freshmen teams this season. The Ramlets have won five out of six, losing only to the University of Connecticut Frosh. The Friars have a 9-2 record. Both PC losses were to service units.

# Ralph Tedesco Sets Pattern in Intrastate Clash

Sophomore Tallies 31;  
3rd-Period Rally Does  
It After Halftime Lag

The unpredictable Providence College Friars came through with a standout performance and rolled up a 101-to-81 triumph over the University of Rhode Island Rams last night at Mount Pleasant High. The gym was jam-packed with a crowd of approximately 900.

The Friars were definitely up for this one, playing a forceful driving game in the second half that brought them a much-prized victory. The Friars took the lead, lost it in the second quarter as Rhody started hitting, but came back strong and sewed it up with 39 points in the third period.

Sophomore Ralph Tedesco, a sort of "rags to riches" player, played one of the most productive games ever turned in by a Providence College sophomore. Tedesco, who was held scoreless in his last start, hit for 31 points last night on brilliant shooting.

It was the first time the Friars had ever hit the century mark in 38 games with Rhody and the first time a Vin Cuddy-coached club reached that rarified level. But the Friars had been over the century mark before in the eras of Ted McConnon, Larry Drew, Bob Reilly and Ed Crotty.

### Top Scorer

Tedesco's 31-point total is among the all-time highs for the Friars. Twice Bob Moran has hit for 30. The record holder, however, is Henri Ethier, who scored 34 against St. Michael's in Boston Garden in 1945.

The Friars could do little wrong last night. While Tedesco was the big pointmaker and Bob Moran chipped in 20, it was a team victory. Phil Lynch, Kenny Kerr, Tedesco and Hank McQueeney were outstanding offensively on close-ups, and Bob and Donie Moran, Jack Durkin, Tommy Mullins, Jack Reynolds

and McQueeney excelled from the outside. Each contributed significantly, for the team strength stayed about the same high level even with replacements coming and going.

The Rams played well in the first half and led, 45-42, at intermission. Twice they had seven-point leads in the second period but the Friars chipped away little by little. Dave Stenhouse had six one-handers, some from 20 feet out, in the first half. Dan Dunn, Eric Anderson, Bob

Serra and Slick Pina were others who helped Rhody to its lead at halftime.

Providence has seldom driven as effectively as in last night's third period. Kerr and Tedesco tallied baskets in the first 25 seconds of the third period that put PC ahead, 46-45. The Rams tied it up on a free throw by Bob Shannon. But after that, PC was off to the races, leading, 54-46, at one stage and later, 64-50.

The Friars were clicking on combinations and scoring at a 50 per cent shooting average in the second half. PC hit for 14 hoops in 25 shots in the third period and broke the game wide open. The Friars had an 81-59 advantage going into the last period.

The University of Rhode Island Frosh hit record proportions with a 109-to-92 decision over the PC Freshmen in the preliminary. Bill Von Weyhe was the pace-maker for the Ramlets, assisted by Ronnie Marozzi and Angelo Dages. Larry Connelly and Ed Donahue were PC's top men. Rhody led 44-37 at intermission.

Tedesco's extra practice session with Coach Cuddy on Saturday afternoon had its effect for Tedesco never played as well before. He put in some brilliant shots, having one of those nights when he couldn't seem to miss.

PC hit the century mark for the first time during Cuddy's five seasons on Smith Hill. Tom Doherty, Rams' publicity director, was much impressed with the Friars' team effort. Providence shot 14 hoops in 25 tries in the third period. Rhody led 45-42 at the half.

The URI Ramlets scored a 109-92 victory over the PC Frosh in perhaps the highest scoring Freshman game ever played be-

tween the two schools. Bill Von Weyhe, Angelo Dages Jr. and Ronnie Marozzi looked like varsity regulars of next season, collaborating for 78 points. Larry Connelly and Ed Donahue were the PC leaders.

## Homecoming

Crawford also played spectacularly and twice saved when Huskie forwards came in on solo breakaways.

## 40-Footer

Gilbody sent the winners off to a 1-0 lead at 5:05 of the first period but at 16:13, Paul Lagueux sophomore defenseman, tied it up with a steaming 40-footer that just slipped under the bar.

The Huskies went ahead, 3-1, with two goals within 12 seconds early in the second period scored by Vorderer and George Buckley. McDonough got one back at the six-minute mark on a play set up beautifully by Monahan.

The losers failed to tie the score when they had a two-man advantage for 2:34 minutes just after the midway mark, but then with the teams even in manpower, they made it on Vorderer's miscue.

Reall's tie-breaking score came after some fine checkerboard passing just inside the blue line. Davy Reilly and McDonough got the assists.

The victory was the second in six starts for Herb Gallagher's sextet. PC has dropped its first four games, but its fortunes should now begin to look up with Monahan and Sweeney back in action. Both have been out three weeks with injuries.

### Current Leader

Brown is the current leader in the state basketball race by virtue of its victory over the R.I. Rams last week. But the Bruins are not that high in the standings of their other league, the Ivy Group. Cornell handed the Bruins a defeat, 72-54, on Saturday and that was No. 2 as against one league victory for the Bruins.

In the first and last quarters, Brown managed to outscore the Big Red, but in between it was all Cornell, the league leader. Ed Tooley scored 21 points for Brown and Lee Morton was Cornell's leader with 18.

The Bruins have two more league contests this week, meeting Princeton on Friday and Pennsylvania on Saturday, both on the road. Penn defeated Yale, 83-48, on Saturday and Harvard downed Princeton, 64-43, for its first league victory.

Providence College was surprisingly ~~defeated~~ by American International College, 65-57, but the Friars asked for it. At first, AIC wanted to stay home because of hazardous driving conditions, but the Friar organization begged them to come. The Aces arrived late, but they didn't lose any time

piling up a 16-7 margin in the first quarter.

### Let Down

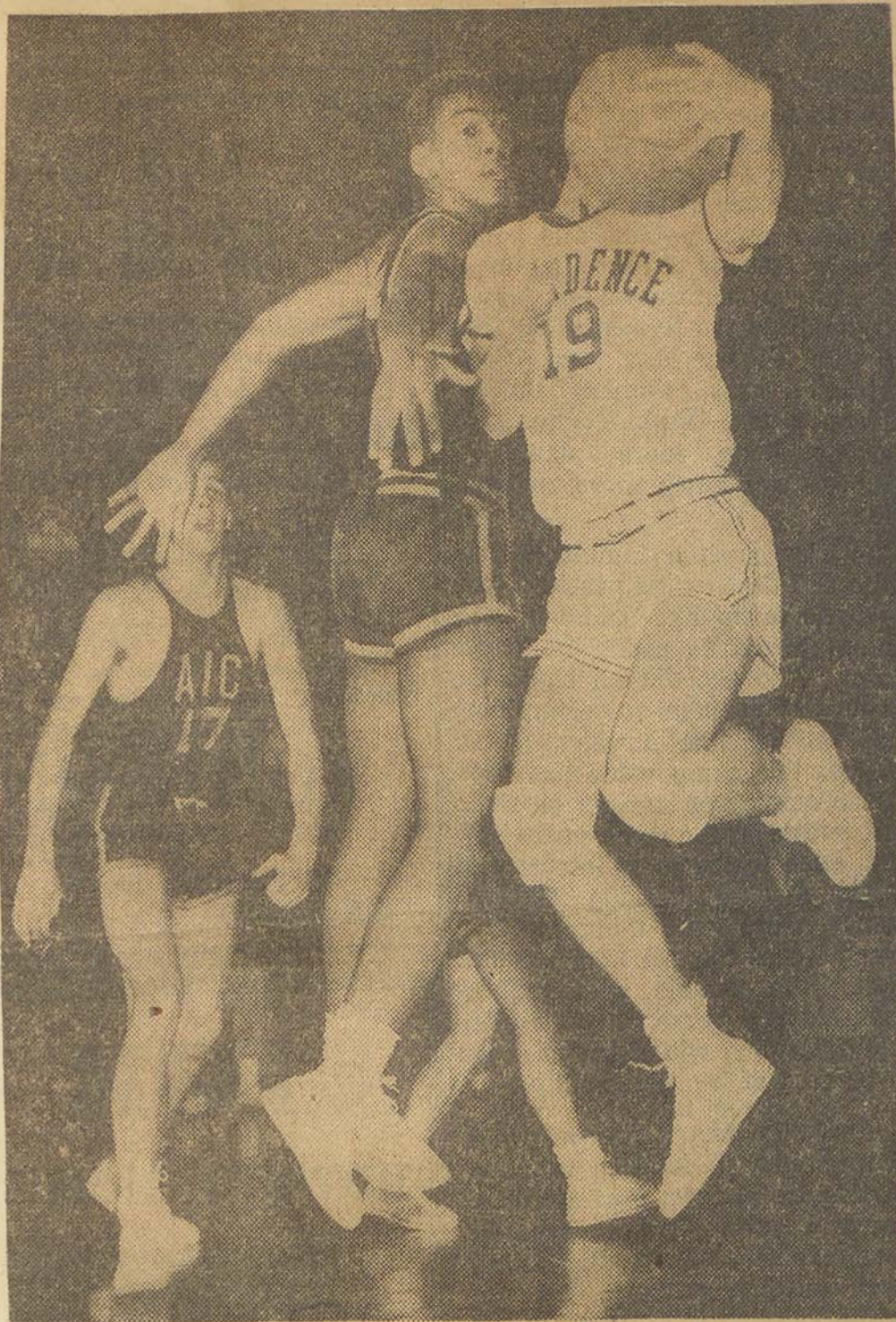

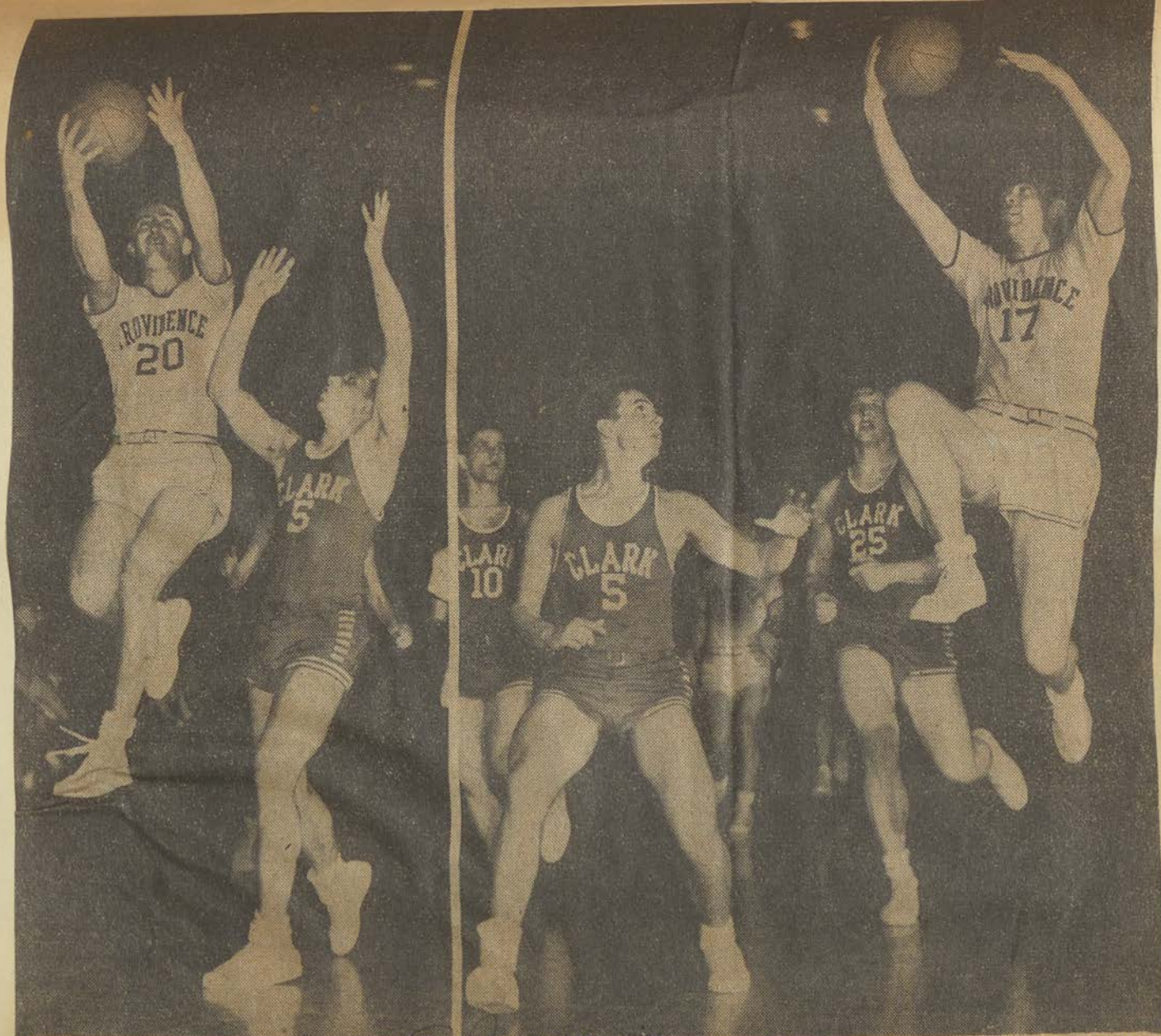

The Providence College Friars who had clicked off four straight victories, made it five last night with an 81-51 triumph over Clark University at Mount Pleasant High.

When the shooters are on the mark, a team can do little wrong. And that was part of the story last night. The Friars hit on approximately 50 per cent of their shots and romped to a comfortable victory after a fairly close first half.

Clark had hopes of repeating an earlier upset victory, recalling its last meeting with the Friars at Mount Pleasant. They started out well enough and played PC even in the first period when the score was tied at 14-all.

### Clark Counters

The Friars took over in the second quarter and went ahead, 26-18, but then the Scarlets put on a counterrally and crept up at 27-26. It was 29-27 with two minutes remaining in the first half when Gus Westerhuis, Bill Quilan and Jack Reynolds led a spurt that shot the Friars into a 10-point halftime lead, 37-27.

Providence played the third period at a fast pace and left little doubt about the outcome. The starting combination of Bob and Donie Moran, Hank McQueeney, Phil Lynch and Ken Kerr went out to wrap it up and they had a 44-30 advantage in the first 3½ minutes. They were 16 points to

the good shortly after the five-minute mark and led, 64-39, just before the buzzer.

Clark, which dropped a six-point-er to Massachusetts, recent conqueror of Rhode Island, couldn't match the PC shooting and speed in the second half. Andy Viestra, 6-foot-7 center, was their top scorer with 15 points but he had trouble with Kerr on the boards and on pass-ins in the last two periods.

### Kerr Defensive Star

The Friars have shown more zip and general effectiveness since the mid-January shakeup and last night the reserve group hustled and contributed some fine ball right down the line. Phil Lynch topped the PC scorers for the first time in varsity competition with 14 points. McQueeney was having a hot hand and scored 13. Bob Moran had 11 after getting a finger stuck in his eye in the pregame work.

Mike Pascale, Ken Willoughby, Ed Connelly and Ed Donahue paced the Providence College Freshmen to their 12th victory in 15 games. The young Friars led all the way, scoring a 70-53 victory over the Clark Freshmen in the preliminary.

# B.C. Eagles Nip Friars In Top Hoop Tilt, 87-84

Boston College nipped the Providence College Friars, 87-84, yesterday at Newton in one of the speediest and most exciting games ever played between these two rivals.

The Friars had their six-game winning string snapped but they had nothing to be ashamed of in defeat. Both teams played some real top flight basketball.

The small but capacity crowd in the BC gym was treated to a pair of fine contests. The freshman game also was a thriller and the winning shot dropped through the hoop after time had expired. Ed Donahue's winning basket hung on the lip of the hoop as the buzzer went off. If the ball dropped off, BC would have won, 71-70, but when it dropped in the young Friars took it, 72-71.

Coach Don Martin's Eagles were really flying in the first half as they ran off a 49-37 advantage. The Friars weren't playing badly but the Eagles had terrific team speed and brilliant passwork. Every phase of their offensive play was of a high calibre.

But the Friars hit one of their seasonal peaks in the second half and came close to pulling it out. Coach Vin Cuddy thought his club turned in one of its best

team efforts. That would include PC's 101 points against Rhody, the earlier victory over BC, the first Brown game at Kingston and the Rio Grande clash.

Providence is playing some fine ball these days. Since the Rhode Island victory the Friars have had outstanding performances against Colby and the Eagles and effective games to a lesser extent against their other opponents. It was a tough one to lose yesterday but it would have been tougher still for the Eagles.

Before the game, Tony Daukas of BC had some trouble with his ankle but he played beautifully and tossed in 23 points. Tim Cullinane and Phil Powell contributed some fine work. Johnny O'Hare, BC's captain from Providence, scored 14 points and was a leading figure in the victory.

The Friars are weakened for a major foe when Ralph Tedesco is ailing and Phil Lynch can't move around on a lame ankle. Yet Tommy Mullins played one of his better games and scored 17 points. He plays an inspired game it seems against the Eagles.

The BC coach figured the rebounding job turned in by Ken Kerr and Jack Durkin made a

tremendous difference in the second half. Kerr, Durkin and Jack Reynolds gave them all a battle on the boards. Durkin is playing the best ball of his college career these days.

## 25 For Moran

Capt. Bobby Moran scored 26 points for the Friars. He was the gunner again. Durkin (17), Kerr (10), Reynolds (11), Mullins (17), and Don Moran all helped. Mullins counted twice, once on a combination setup from Kerr, as Providence came up to 70-68 in the last quarter. But the Eagles managed to hang onto their lead, even though it got as close as a single point late in the game.

With 2:30 remaining, Kerr, who was a protege of Martin's at De La Salle, had a chance to tie the score by making two free throws. He made one and BC still led, 81-80. Then O'Hara had a run of three straight fouls conversions which boosted the Eagles to 84-80. Dick Skeffington put in two more with about 20 seconds remaining which sealed it up.

Down with a heavy cold, Martin was happy to square the series with the Friars and rated it a terrific ball game. PC's Cuddy and his assistant, Earl Shannon, agreed. Played in a building like the Boston Garden or the R.I. Auditorium, it would have made some friends for basketball. The officiating by Red Donnellan and Walter Corbett was first rate.

# Friars Host to Upsala; Bruin Five at Harvard

Upsala, which already holds an 18-point verdict over Providence College this season, will meet the Friars tonight at Mt. Pleasant High School Gymnasium.

Starting time for the return match will be 8:30, with a preliminary game between the PC freshman team and an outfit from Davisville base starting at 7 o'clock.

Brown's basketball team also will be playing a return engagement, meeting Harvard at Cambridge. Brown defeated the Crimson earlier in the season for its first and only Ivy League victory.

Other sports action includes a pair of track meets — Massachusetts at Providence College on the Hendricken Field board track, starting at 1:30, and Brown at Tufts, beginning at 6:30.

And there is one hockey game, this for the University of Rhode Island's team at Army.

The PC Friars, just about the hottest basketball team in the state at the moment, suffered an 82-64 walloping at Upsala last December. Actually, the New Jerseyites held

For a starting club, Cuddy plans to open with Jack Reynolds, Jack Durkin, Ken Kerr and the Morans, Bob and Don.

Hitting a fast pace over the middle periods, the Providence College Friars reversed an earlier setback with a surprising 88-66 victory over Upsala College last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

# Pina Posts 18, Excels for R.I.; Moran Has 22

## Team Effort Turns the Trick for Rhody in Last Home Game

The University of Rhode Island Rams came up with one of their top performances of the season and surprised the Providence College Friars with an 82-67 setback last night at Keaney Gymnasium in Kingston.

Three seniors, Slick Pina, Dan Dunn and Rollie Kubiskey, playing their final game on the campus, did much to turn the tide. Dave Stenhouse played a steady game and threw in 17 points while some spot contributions by Eric Anderson and Bob Stairs also came at crucial moments.

Pina played one of the top games of his college career and pulled the Rams together when they were badly disorganized. Slick's shooting put Rhody on the right road in the first period and he sank a "big" hoop just before halftime intermission as the Rams led, 34-27.

The Friars appeared capable of pulling it out when they went ahead in the third quarter and were within striking distance early in the fourth quarter. But Rhody caught fire, knowing it had the upset within its grasp, and really rolled in the late moments of the game.

The Rams went 10 points ahead in the third period with Dunn the principal scorer. Then the Friars put on a drive, held Rhody scoreless for close to five full minutes from the floor and piled up a 49-46 advantage.

Pina's set shot and three points by Stairs gave Rhody a 55-51 edge going into the last quarter. Pina, incidentally, wound up with

18 points. The Friars tied it up on a set by Bob Moran and a combination hoop involving Hank McQueeney and Don Moran. The Rams went ahead, 58-55, and Bob Moran fired a set for the Friars. Stairs' drive basket offset a breakaway by Tom Mullins. Rhody leading 60-59.

Then the Rams put on one of their most effective spurts of the season. The Rhody rooters were hollering "Roll It Up" as the Rams literally did, scoring five straight baskets, three by Stenhouse and one apiece by Dunn and Stairs. In a stretch of approximately five minutes the Friars ran dry and the Rams went from 60-59 to 73-60.

Bob Moran scored 22 points with some excellent set shots for the Friars.

There was a brief scuffle between the Friars' Ken Kerr and Dunn in the second half but both stayed in the game. The Rams partially won the game from the foul line as each team made 26 hoops. The Rhody contingent sank 30 free throws, having an 18-4 edge in the second half. The Friars were assessed with 29 fouls against 17. Both teams had peaks but Rhody was definitely in charge at the finish.

The Providence College Freshmen scored a 92-68 victory over the Rhody Ramlets, who had routed them in the first meeting.

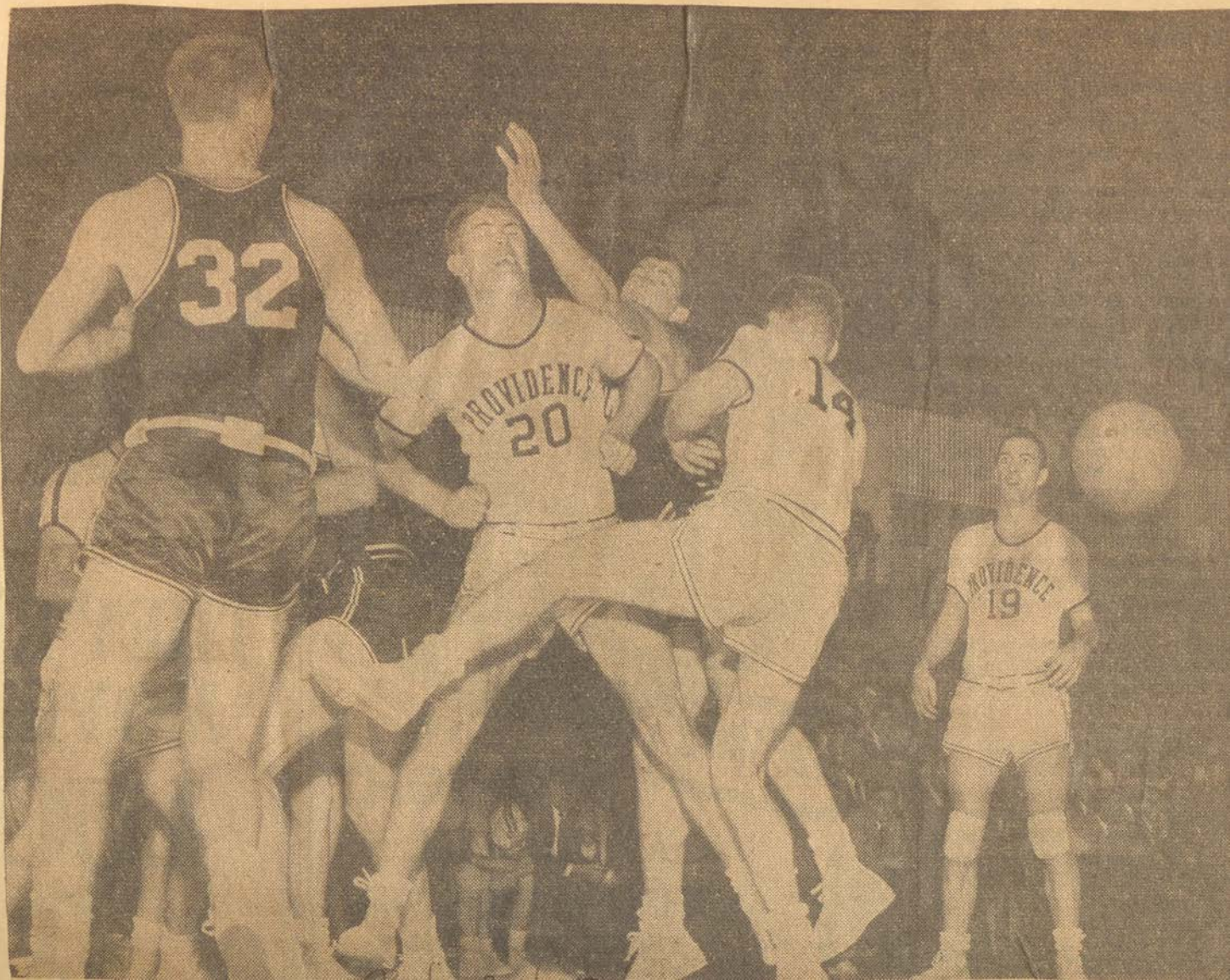

# Brown Five Whips Providence College, 75-61, Clinches State Title

## Victory Enables Bears to Take Season's Series

Playing one of their better games, the Brown basketball forces scored a 75-61 victory over the Providence College Friars last night at Mount Pleasant High and clinched the state college basketball crown.

The Bruins were "up" for the intricacy clash and played a relaxed game without losing sight of their objective. It was a spirited game all the way but, at times, the Friars tried too hard and pressed in their efforts to win.

Brown swept the season's regular series with the Friars and has scored three victories without defeat in the competition for the state title with PC and the University of Rhode Island. The Bruins have one intrastate game remaining with URI on Saturday night.

### Good Rebounding

Eddie Tooley, perhaps, was the difference in this one. The Brown junior from Yonkers, N.Y., had another big night on the boards and tossed in 27 points as well. Tooley came down with more than his share of rebounds again and played a cool, steady game while action flared up around him.

Lou Murgio showed little trace of an injured foot and turned in some fine work in the ball-handling and setting-up in addition to scoring 18 points. Lou had only four hoops but one of them was a fancy one-hand shot just before halftime that gave the Bruins a seven-point bulge, 36-29.

Brown was clearly superior over the route. For a time it appeared that the Bruins started to kill the clock too early for they were content to run out the time from midway in the third period. But they also got a man free now and then, and kept a safe margin between them and the aggressive Friars.

The game was an anticlimax from PC's point of view. However, the Friars were not hitting on their shots and Brown was getting a jump here and there. PC gave the capacity crowd a thrill or two with its driving comeback in the third period but never could get close enough to threaten the Bruins' advantage.

### Moran, McQueeney Star

Playing their final college games, Capt. Bob Moran and Hank McQueeney performed the best among the Friars. Moran scored 13 points and fouled out for one of the few times in his career. McQueeney gave PC a lift in the third period when he brought the Friars up to 43-53 with the help of Tommy Mullins and Jack Durkin.

Providence cut the lead to nine points, 53-44 on Durkin's free throw in the fourth quarter. Then Billy Arnold, Murgio and Tooley put on a spurt of their own that practically put the Bruins home. This drive boosted Brown up to 64-51 with 4:35 remaining and that was a safe margin the way things were going.

Bob Morris' defensive maneuvers cut down PC's opportunities with Tooley, Arnold, Jim Pendergast, Ray Malkiewicz and Red Judkins helping out in the rebounding. Providence couldn't fast break the Bruins enough to hurt them but Brown cracked PC for several hoops on hustle and quick passwork.

At times, the game was rough and aggressive with some contact. There were 50 fouls called but the officiating could have been improved upon. Brown was much more accurate from the

foul line with 27 points in 40 attempts.

The Providence College Freshmen closed their season with a record of 20 victories and three defeats, scoring a 68-54 decision over the Brown Freshmen in the

preliminary. John Ritch and Mike Pascale were top scorers but it was a team achievement by the younger Friars.

Tooley played one of the top games of his college career last night as he led Brown to a 75-61 victory over the Providence College Friars. The impressive triumph gave Brown the state basketball crown, although they have one game remaining with the University of Rhode Island.

Coach Morris rates Tooley with the top men in the Eastern Intercollegiate League. Last night he out-rebounded some aggressive Friars and played a steady game. He was the major difference in coming up with the ball off the boards and pacing both clubs with 27 points.

Lou Murgo, the Brown captain

who also had a hand in the victory over the Friars, said "last night's job was Tooley's best of the season." Tooley has had a bigger offensive night, scoring 31 points against Princeton, but last night he was a team man as well as a specialist.

## Award Winner

If awards were given out by the colleges for the most valuable man in last night's contest, Tooley would have won easily. He had the votes of coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars, Ernie Calverley, the former Ram and pro ace, Mrs. Bob Morris and Barbara Marr, the Bruins' sports publicity gal. And naturally, Morris himself.

Tooley holds down a couple of odd jobs at Brown in addition to his basketball activity. He was a leading schoolboy scorer at Yonkers, N.Y., and played well with Jack Heffernan's frosh team.

"He's a fine boy," Heffernan

said, "and a good hustler. He does the job of a bigger man when it comes to rebounds for us."

Brown played a more relaxed confident game than the Friars last night. PC tried hard but was pressing to some extent which at times nullified its best efforts. The Bruins had the game in hand from the second period on and everything seemed to go their way after they shot ahead. Nothing the Friars could do paid off to any great extent.

Murgo boosted his point total over the 1,500 mark for his four seasons at Brown with 18 points against the Friars. He's scored 1,093 in his three varsity seasons. He made 10 free throws in 11 attempts last night.

## Bob's Finale

Bobby Moran wound up his career for the Friars. The game guy from Brooklyn scored 13 points and fouled out for one of the few times as a collegian. It wasn't one of his top games but he'll never forget the splendid ovation the capacity crowd extended to him as he left the court for the last time. And he rated it.

Hank McQueeney sparked a PC rally in the third period and finished up as the Friars' top point-getter with 15. Hank put life in the PC offensive, but Brown had pulled into a comfortable lead and PC never got sufficiently close to really worry the Bruins.

It was the final PC game for Jack Durkin, Jack Reynolds, Phil Lynch, Charlie Aquavia, Bill Quinlan, Tommy Mullins and McQueeney, in addition to Moran, and each of them hoped to call it a career with a victory. They made the effort but the ball wasn't rolling with them.

Earl Shannon's PC frosh ended their season with 20 victories in 23 games. They defeated the Brown frosh, 68-54, last night. The young Friars include Frank Williams, Ken Willoughby, Ed Donahue, John Ritch, Mike Pascale, Larry Connelly, Tom Caruso, Roy Guarino, Bill Flynn and Bill Devine.

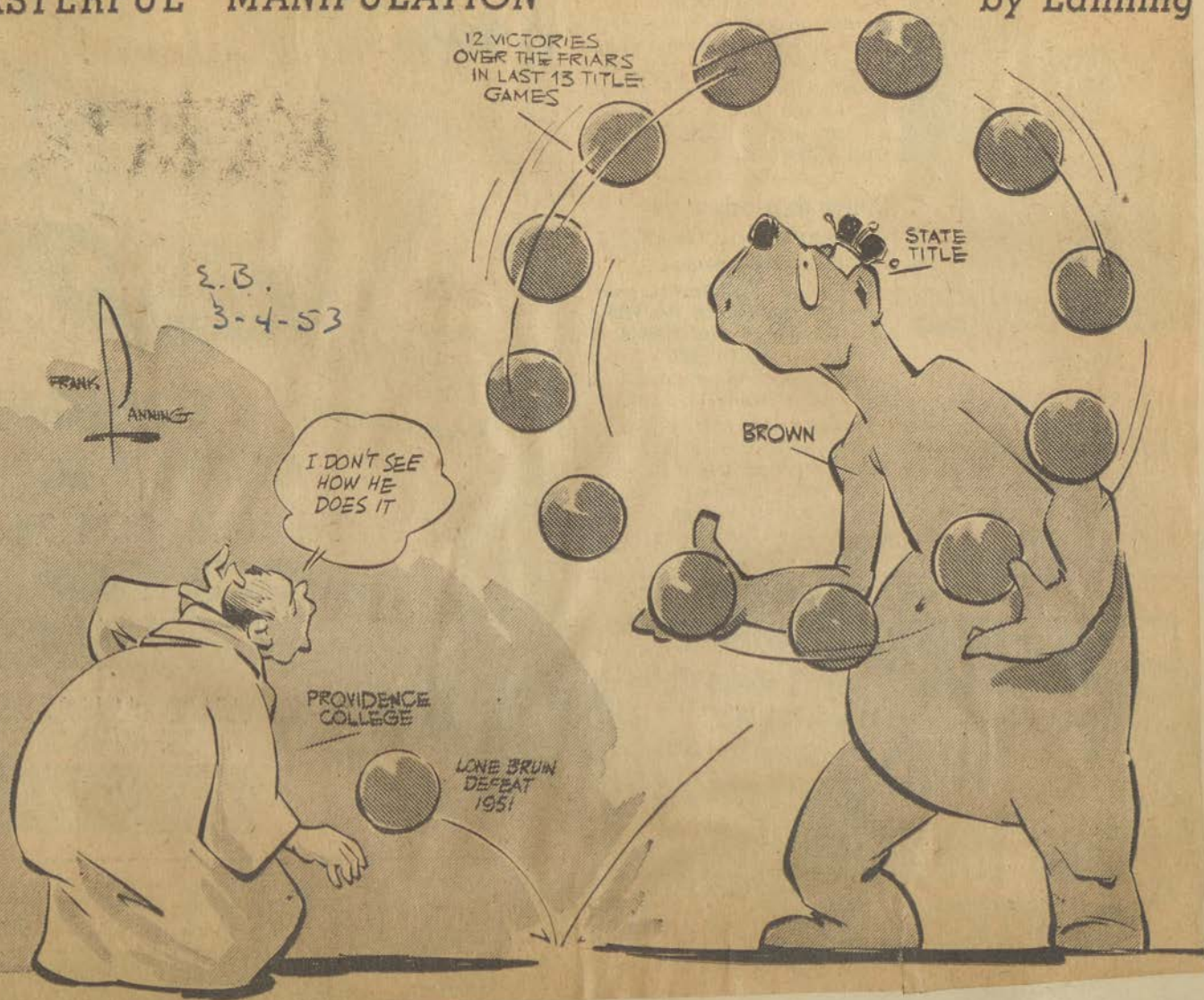

# Bob McAllister, Morze Excel in 52-38 Victory

The Boston College track team, paced by Bob McAllister and Frank Morze, handed Providence College a 52-38 setback yesterday at Hendricken Field. The victory was the Eagles' second in four dual meets. They had previously defeated the University of Massachusetts and lost to Tufts and Harvard. For the Friars, the defeat was their first of the season as against one victory.

McAllister, son of a former Olympian, won the 50-yard dash and the 300-yard dash in impressive fashion. In the 50, he was timed in 5.5 seconds, defeating George Kanary of Providence by three yards. And in the 300, he hit 32.8 seconds as he won by some 10 yards.

Morze, noted for his football ability, won the weights, also in easy fashion. His distance in the 35-pound weight throw was 51 feet, 2 inches. Dick Myles and Maurice Caron of Boston College took second and third, completing a sweep for the Eagles. Morze won the shot put and Myles also took second. Mike Baccari took third for the Friars.

The Friars won three first places, their most impressive performance coming in the 600, in which Pete Wallach, Dave Kehoe and Dean Slocum ran 1-2-3. Bernie Dandley in the 1,000 and Joe Madden in the two-mile were the other winners for the Friars.

In the freshman meet, run in conjunction with the varsity, the Friar yearlings turned in a fine team effort for a 58-30 victory over the Eaglets. The young Friars swept the 50-yard dash, the mile, the two-mile and the 300. There were three double winners, Don Fahey won the 50-yard dash and the 1,000 for the Friars and Rod Boucher took the mile and two-mile for the Friars. Ed Allard was the Boston College double winner, taking the high jump and the 600.

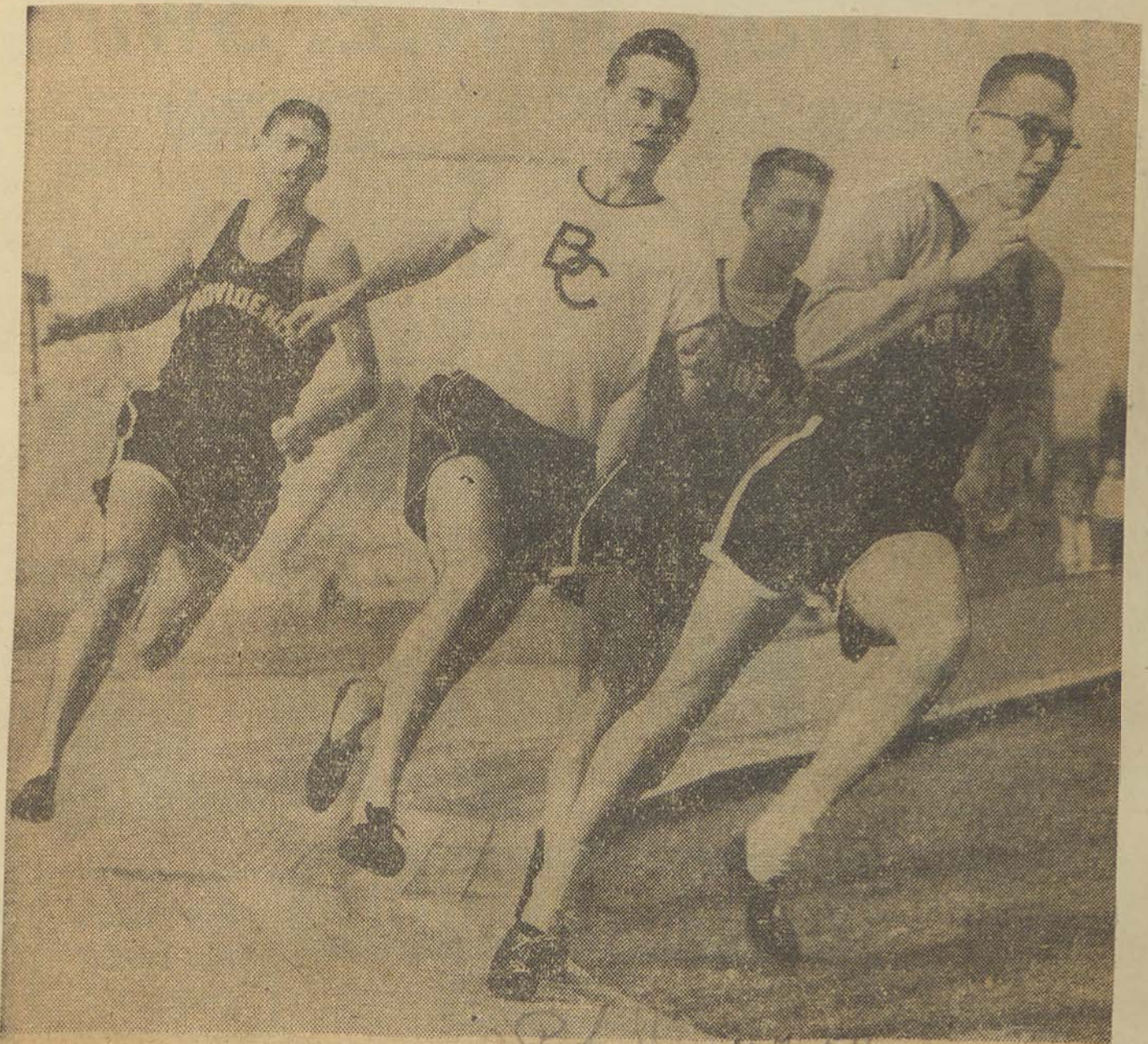

# All In The Game

Remember When? . . .

**T**HIS is going to be written along "remember-when" lines and I guess you can put the blame for it on a recent visit to Providence College, when the good fathers were hosts at dinner to the members of Words Unlimited. In the lounge at beautiful Aquinas Hall there's a trophy case containing baseballs used in Friar games that go back to the days of Jack Flynn's great teams and before that. Looking at them, a man got to thinking not only of P. C. triumphs of other days, but of other days in general in sports around here. The old days, I guess, you'd have to call them now, alas!

But surely it's not 30 years since that memorable afternoon at old Andrews Field, when Providence College and Brown fought into the dusk in the 20-inning game which the Friars won, 1-0. It is, though for that was 1924 and this is 1954. This doddering old-timer, who sat in the stands that day as a P. C. freshman, is able to console himself with one thing, however. His memory is still good, for the lineup of the Friar nine that day came right to mind without assistance from clippings or records of any kind. It's the correct one, too, attested to as such by one Joseph P. McGee, who has good reason to know it, since he was one of the nine Friars who went the route.

Here's the lineup: Johnny Halloran, catcher; Bud Feid, first base; Ray Doyle, second; Rab Creegan, short; Joe McGee, third; the late Arthur Brickley, brother of Harvard's famed drop-kicker, Charlie Brickley, left field; Ed Wholey, center; Billy Beck, right, and pitching of course, Charley Reynolds, who staged that brilliant duel with Brown's Elmer Duggan.

Goat Into Hero . . .

There were no P.C. lineup changes, though, at one point, Coach Flynn contemplated sending Frank McGee in as a pinch-hitter for Beck, who struck out in his first seven times at bat. Flynn didn't, though, and had no reason to regret it. Beck, Rhode Island U. baseball coach now, was terrific in the late stages. He saved the game with a sensational catch in the 17th inning and then, in the 20th, it was a hit from Billy's bat that drove Doyle in from third with the winning run.

Let's see now, Charley Reynolds tried professional baseball with the Providence Grays after leaving college. That would have been the Grays of 1926, Rube Marquard's fine team which won the Eastern League championship. This old-timer is more familiar, though, with King Bader's Grays of 1928, having covered a game of theirs now and then as a very green sports reporter. The names that first come to mind from that club are Sheriff Harris, who later made the big leagues; Red Barron, the former Georgia Tech football star, and the pitchers, Clay Touchstone and Juan Eccleson. During baseball's manpower shortage in World War II, the aging Touchstone came up from the Pacific Coast League and pitched for one of the Chicago clubs. Eccleson, a Cuban, knew only a word or two of English when he was with the Grays. Used to have Harry Hopkins, the club secretary, write his letters to his girl for him.

It was then, or around then, that Young Montreal was making a boxing comeback, meeting such as Bushy Graham, Johnny Datto and Sammy Fuller. It was in 1928 that Jimmy Conzelman's Steam Roller, featuring Wildcat Wilson, won the National Pro League title. With Cy Mitchell as the ring-master, the pro wrestlers were cavorting to the music of clicking turnstiles and the town was filled with talk of Gus Sonnenberg, Joe De Vito, Cowboy Jack Wagner, Charley Strack and John Spellman, the latter one of Brown's former football stalwarts.

### The Amateurs . . .

Amateur boxing was big in Providence in those days with such as Al Koziol, Albion Holden and Paris Apice performing and later on Ralph Zannelli, of course, and two talented college boys, Chic Gaynor from Providence College and Pat James from Brown. Gaynor was also a basketball player at P. C., contemporary, I guess with Johnny Krieger, Bill McCue and Eddie Wineapple. Now there was a pitcher and also a hitter, Wineapple. Remember him and Al Blanche on the hill for the Friars and that fancy Dan first baseman, Oc Perrin? Also at P. C. on the diamond there were Leo Marion and Chief Marsella of the mighty war club and, of course, that peppery, chirpy-voiced catcher, Birdie Tebbetts.

Remember the Providence College-R.I. State basketball games when they used to jam the Auditorium and when you were lucky to get within hearing distance of them if they were played at little Rodman Hall in Kingston? What shows they were, with two of the most colorful coaches in the business, Frank Keaney and Al McClellan, directing operations.

But that's enough for now. Thanks for listening while an old-timer rambled on.
