## In Retrospect

With cap and gown there comes somehow that inevitable feeling of regret, regret that the four years are gone, that there again must be left behind that life and those things which only too late begin to have a meaning. Four years, so many seconds in the spring of life, they leave the temptation to reminisce, to review those high lights that stand out in college life.

Back in that first year when for some reason our restless spirit rebelled against the Sophomore Court there were three hundred and eight of us. Only one hundred and fifty-two remain to recall how we threw off forever the yoke of freshman caps and branded ourselves as "trouble-makers"! In that year we elected John Mahoney our first president, and to assist him, Robert Healey, vice-president; Thomas Flynn, treasurer; and Frank King, secretary. With them we took part in the traditional Soph-Frosh Mixer, and later introduced the Freshman Frolic at the College. It was a lean year, for despite our assertions, we were just freshmen.

Fewer in number, we returned a worldly-wise group of sophomores. After the smoke of a fiery election had cleared away, Thomas Flynn was president of the class, William Cunningham, vice-president; Ernest Pike, secretary; and Thomas Conley, treasurer. We found the second year more interesting; there were opened to us more avenues of activity. We entered into the spirit of undergraduate life and became leaders in class activity, outstanding in the part we played in extra-curricular undertaking. We became individualized, too. The outstanding social events of the year were the Sophomore Hop and the Spring Dance. The year meant more than the first; we left more of ourselves in it.

We reached the peak however in our Junior year. It was then that we made our greatest contribution to the history of the Class. It began with the election of Daniel Murphy as president; Albert Ahern, vice-president; Robert Healey, secretary; and Eugene McElroy, treasurer. We opened the social calendar with a Football Dance that was socially, and rarer still financially, a grand success. All activity dwindled before the crowning event of Junior week. It was a week of brilliant social affairs, banquets, and boxing bouts which culminated in the Junior Prom, with the nationally famous Artie Shaw. It was a colorful year and meaningful year.

Time and events flowed on, and with something of the dignity and solemnity of Seniors we concentrated in extra-curricular work to which we were naturally inclined. To round out the activities of collegiate life we elected James Tully, president; John Grady, vice-president; Robert Healey, secretary; and Jiray Avedisian, treasurer. Under them we go on to Commencement Week, to leave behind these sheltering walls, but not without the principles of truth and justice we learned here, not without the hope that they will unerringly direct us in our respective walks of life and make us loyal to ourselves and to the institution which gave itself so generously to us.

The heavyweights, after winning all their games during the regular schedule, were defeated by one point in the playoffs with the Juniors.

Throughout the year, Sophomores were in the forefront in all the extra-curricular activities of the College. They were instrumental in the success of the new athletic system at the College, for they were prominent on all the varsity teams and took part in all athletic campaigns. In the campaign of 1938 the baseball team recaptured some of the prestige that had always characterized it until the past two years. In a schedule reduced to fourteen games because of cancellations due to inclement weather, the Friars won eleven of the games for a club batting average of .320 and a fielding average of .950. At home and away the team played steady ball.

Its first road trip to open the season was marked with victories over St. John's University of Brooklyn, City College of New York, and Bates College of Maine. It was on the road trip that the Friars uncovered their wealth of good pitching material, especially in their rookies. Only once in the course of the season did the pitching ever slacken and that was in the return game with St. John's University when the team, overconfident because of its victory parade, played listless ball. # VARSITY FOOTBALL

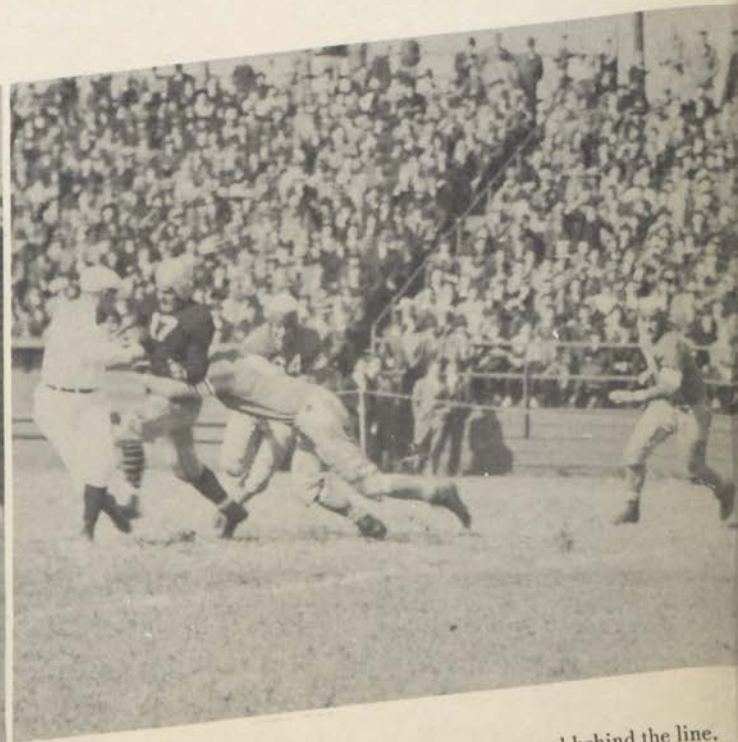

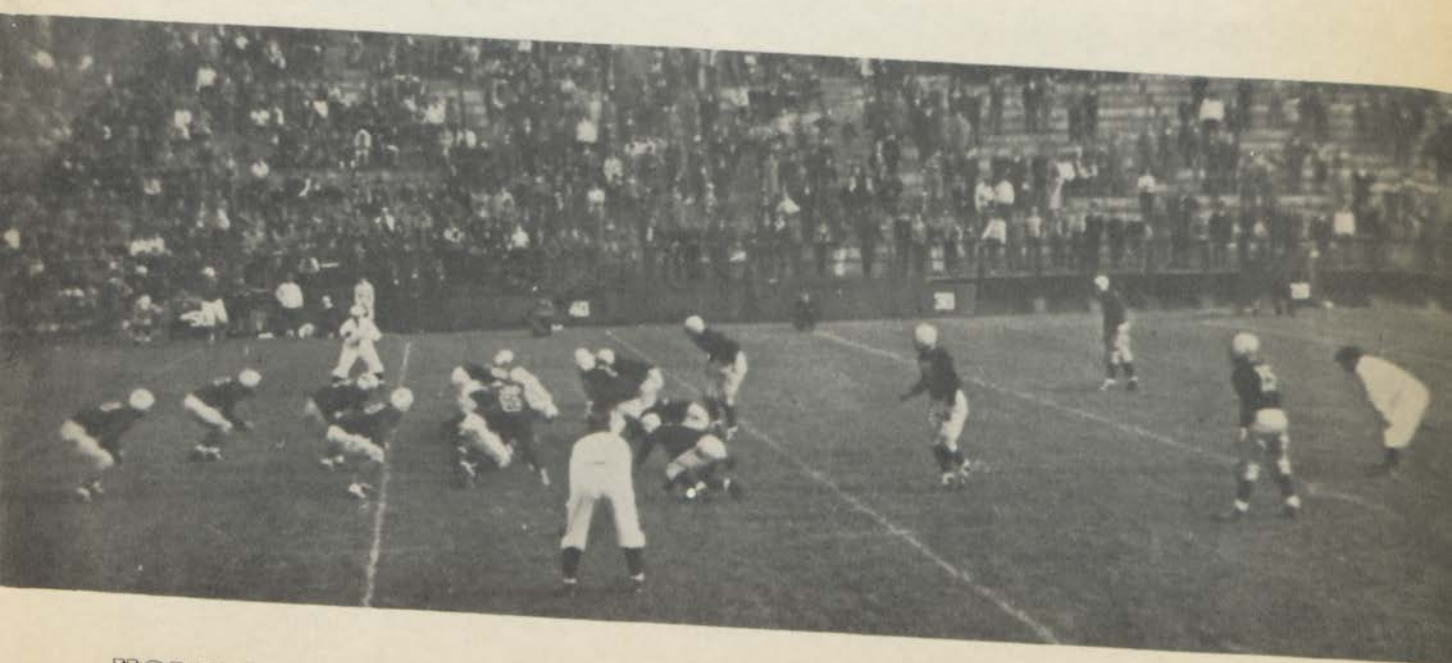

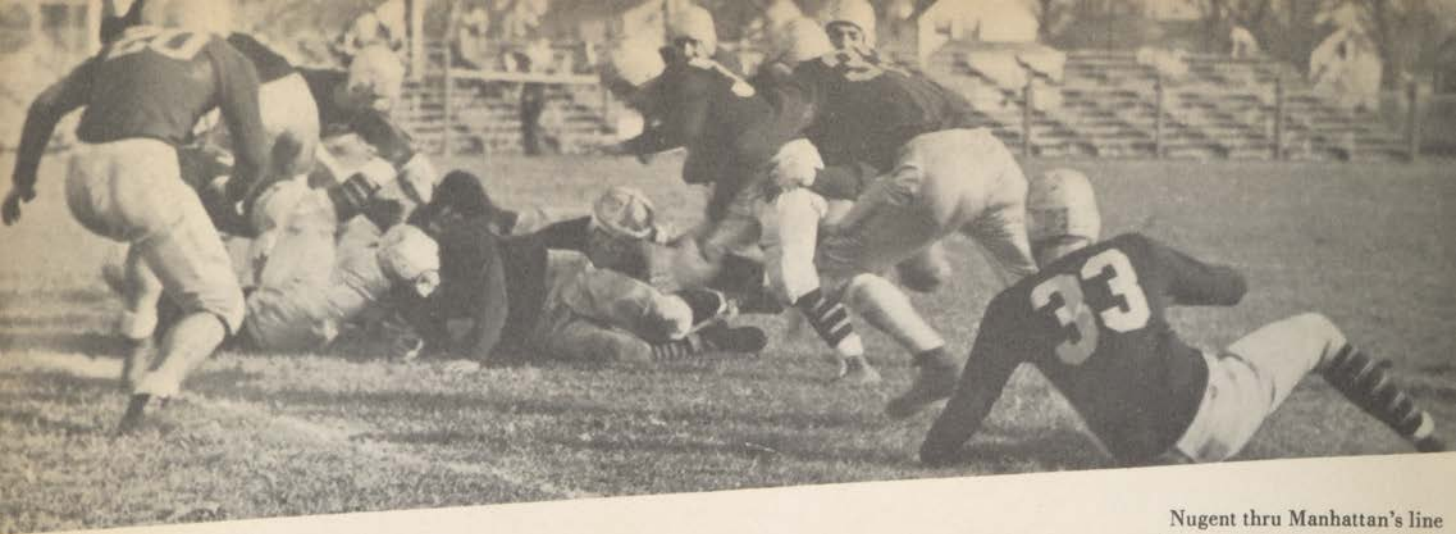
The Fighting Friars opened the season on September 24 in Worcester in their game with Holy Cross. For the first half of the game, played on a brilliant fall afternoon, the Friars held the Crusaders on their own terms; but gradually the power of the purple warriors proved too much for a team that could hardly replace its men on the field, and the Crusaders went on to win without allowing the Friars to capitalize on their opportunities of scoring. The Friars fared little better in the game at Hendricken field a week later with St. Anselm's. Badly crippled and bruised from the previous week they were ragged in spots and gave way to the aggressive play of St. Anselm's College.

The game in Buffalo with Niagara University further crippled the already undermanned squad. Practically every man played the full sixty minutes of the game. Yet the remarkable spirit of the squad sustained its hopes of victory over Manhattan at home the following week. In a game marked by hard play and crippled men, the Friars' line played sixty minutes with the change of only one man. The score of 20-7 hardly tells the closeness of the game. The Friars

# INTRAMURAL SPORTS



The boxing and wrestling bouts are held annually under the auspices of the Junior Class as part of the Junior Week activities. Competition is open to anyone physically fit to enter the contest. The sport is a very popular one on the campus and is usually held in the auditorium of Harkins Hall the first week in May. Last year the program consisted of ten boxing bouts of three rounds each and three wrestling bouts of three falls each. The sport became so popular at the College in the last two years that attendance was possible only through invitation. The organizing of a definite program of intramural activities was begun in the fall of the year by the Reverend Robert G. Quinn, O.P., Athletic Director, in his first move to give every student a chance to participate in some form of sport. Ed Crotty, Athletic Instructor, was appointed to supervise all intramural athletic activities. At the start of the basketball season the young mentor established a student athletic board to assist him in drawing up the various intramural schedules. Two students from each class in the College made up the board and served as arbiters in all intramural competition.

The new department of athletics inaugurated its reign by establishing the Intramural Basketball League which was made up of light and heavyweight divisions. The divisions comprised teams made up from each class in the College. The teams met one another twice in open competition. Play in the hoop league began early in January and continued through the first week of March when the championship playoffs were held. The Junior Class representatives captured both the light and heavyweight laurels, but did so only as a result of one point victories scored in the final games.

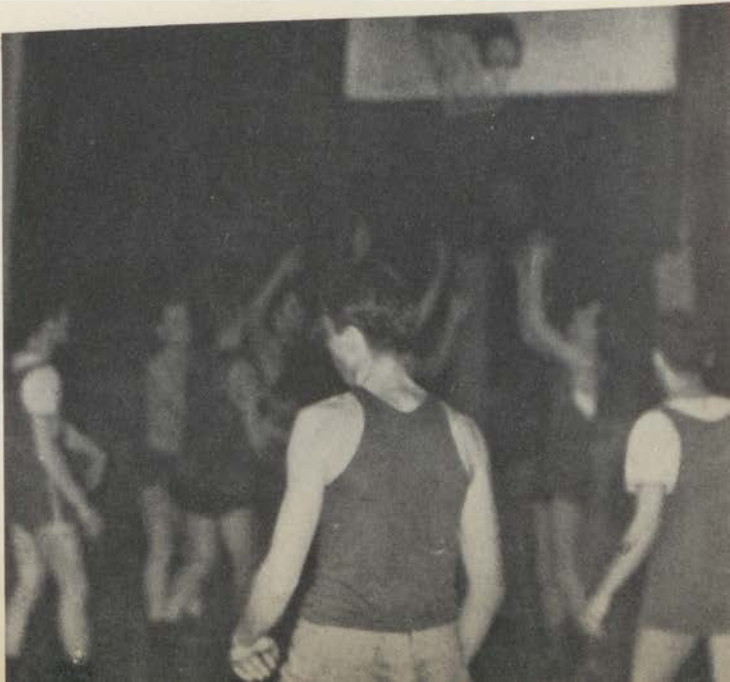
After the class titles had been decided, Instructor Crotty formed an elimination tournament to decide the club champions of the College. Nineteen teams posted entries in the tournament





which lasted over a period of two weeks. The Inter State Club and the Newport Club survived to meet in the championship finals which were won by the Inter State Club.

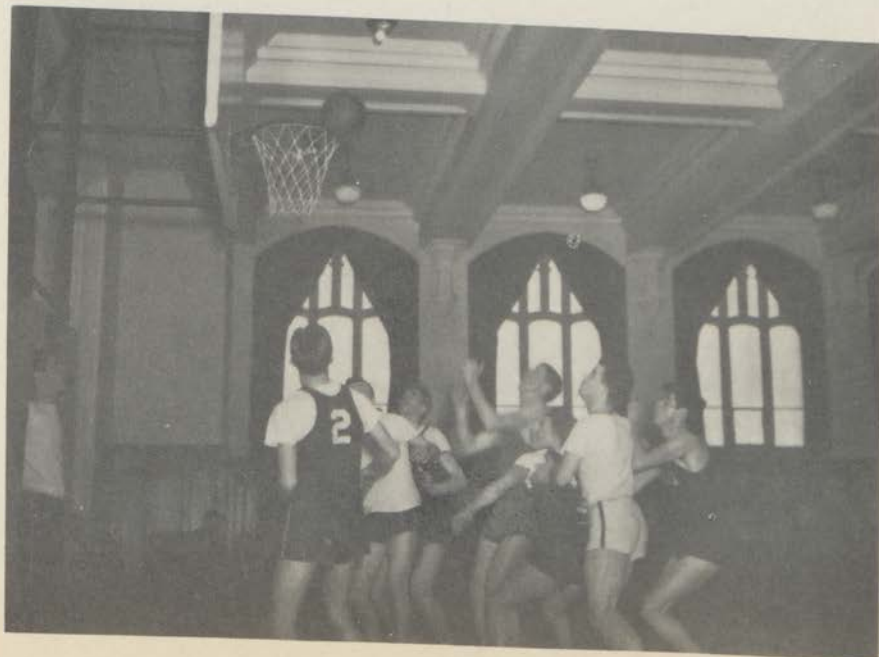
In the early spring Instructor Crotty and the Student Athletic Board formed the Intramural Softball League. The setup in this sport was much the same as that of the Basketball League, except that it was not made up of two divisions. These together with the boxing bouts will be brought under the supervision of the Board. Interest in intramural activities ran high among the students, most of whom were brought in close contact with one another for the first time, a condition long desired at the College. The Athletic Director, Father Quinn, and Instructor Crotty were commended by the students for their efforts to provide a well balanced program of activities for the student body.

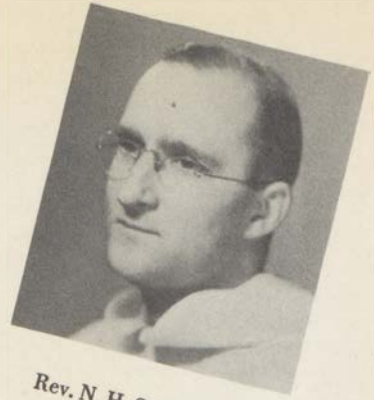

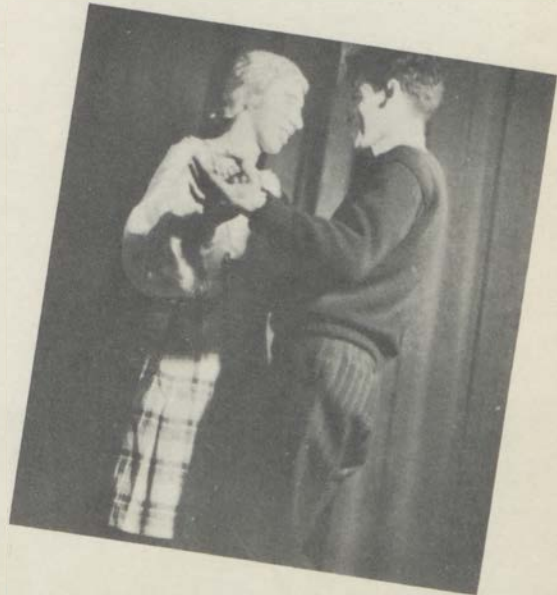

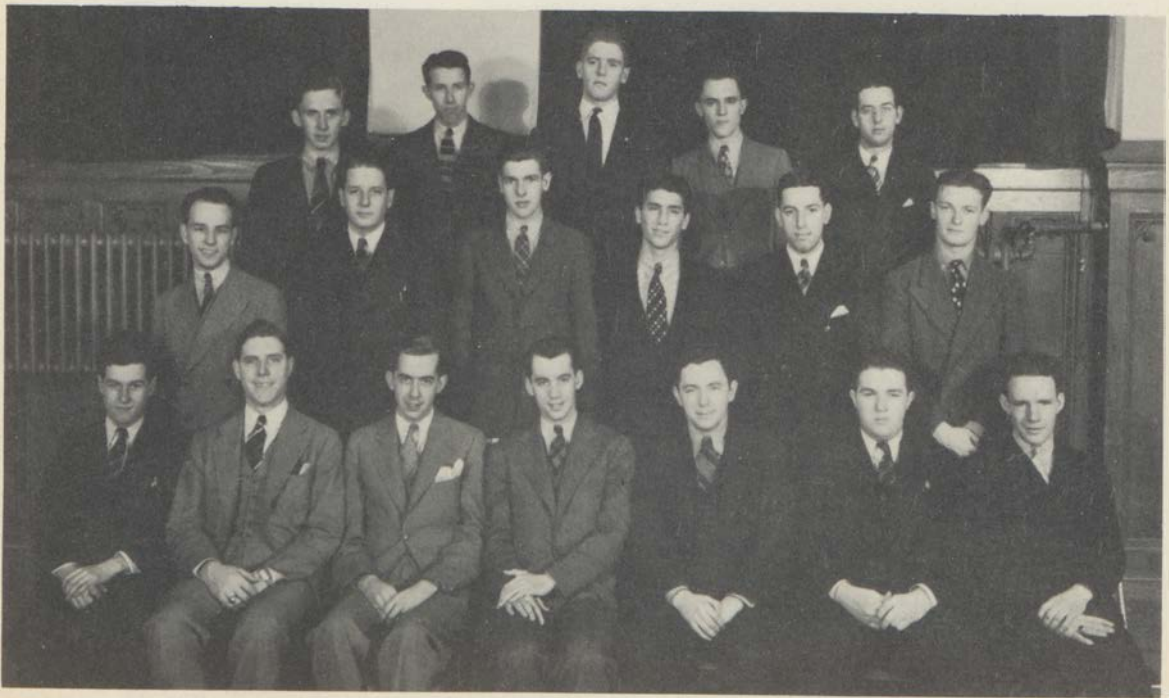
