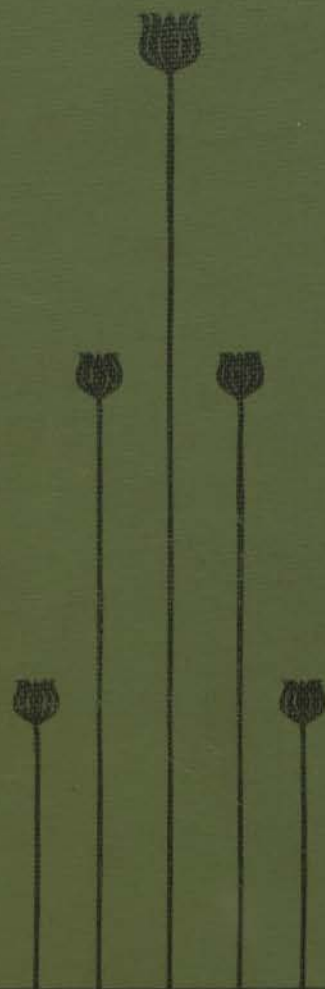
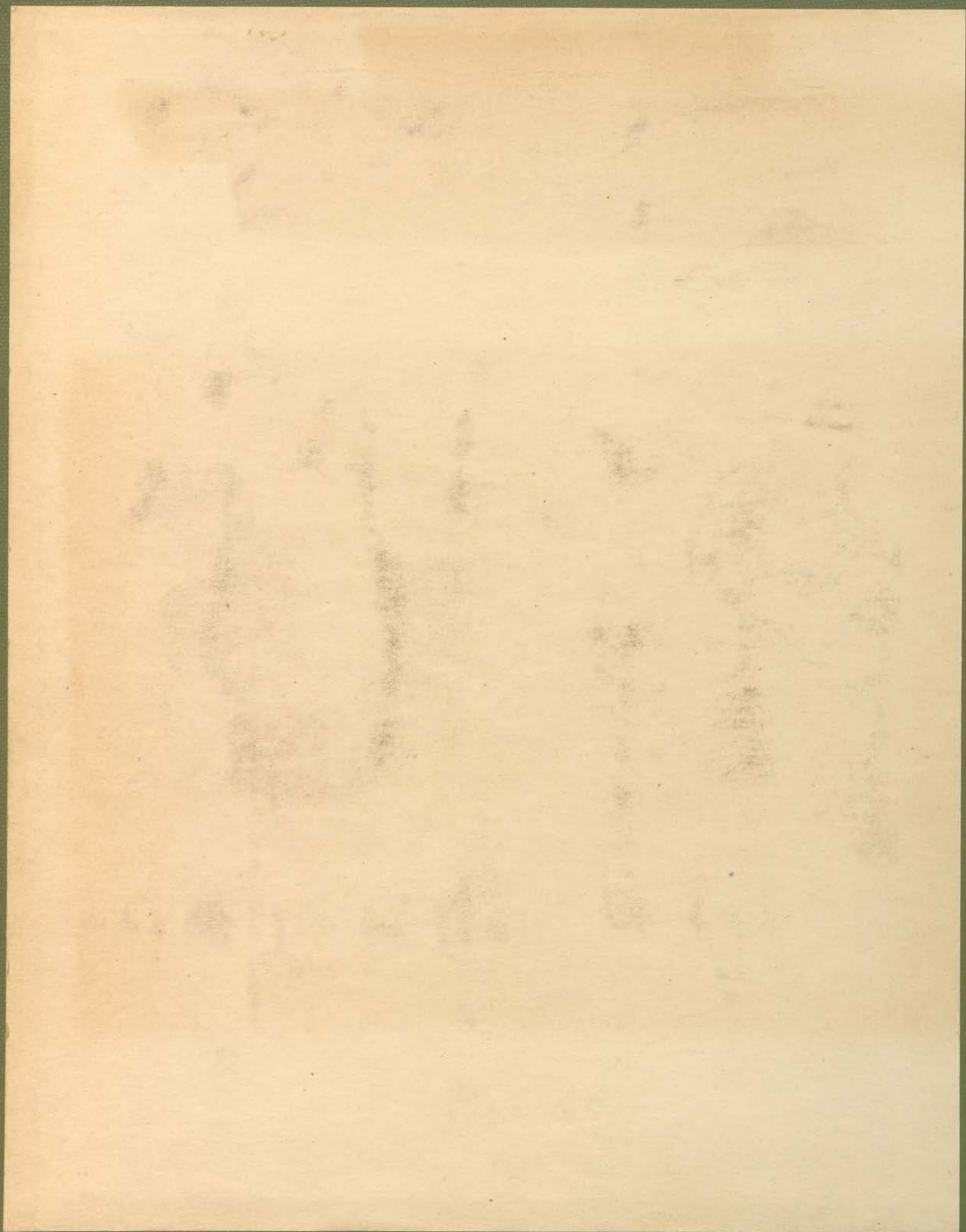

La Salle Trails In 2nd Place By Two Points

The Boston Trade High School track team captured the sixth annual Providence College Outdoor Board Track Meet yesterday at Hendriken Field. The six-man team from the Bay State rolled up 22 points. La Salle took second place with 20 points and Portsmouth, N.H., High was third with eight points.

Other team scores: Mount Pleasant and Boston College High, seven each; Barrington 5; Hope 4; New Bedford Vocational 2, Cardinal Farley Military Academy 1, Sacred Heart Academy of Waterbury, Conn., and St. Raphael Academy failed to score.

St. Augustine's High School of Brooklyn, N.Y., and Mount Pleasant were the co-defending champions. St. Augustine's did not enter a team this year.

Jim Ormand and Francis Washington got the Boston Trade team off to a good start in the first event, the 50-yard dash, when they took second and fourth place. The Mount Pleasant pair of Don Iavarone and Tony Di Orrio spoiled Trade's hopes of a one-two finish in the dash with a fine performance, Don nipping Washington at the tape and Di Orrio edging Ormand for third spot.

Tom Tomasian, Trade's New England cross-country champion and runnerup National Indoor mile champion, scored an easy victory in the mile. Bill Hanlon of La Salle stayed in the lead for about seven laps but Tomasian turned on the pressure and pulled away for the victory.

Marshall Cooper, Trade's other first-place finisher, ran a fine race in winning the 600 over Don Lendry of La Salle. Cooper won going away in the excellent time of 1:18.8. Trade's other first came in the sprint medley relay, its top flight team topping La Salle in the second heat although its second and third men missed up on a pass and momentarily lost the baton. Donald Irving gave Trade its other three points

with a second in the 300, trailing Joe Hughes of Boston College High in the fourth heat.

La Salle took only one first, the distance medley, but scored heavily in the runnerup positions.

Moran's 'Breakfast Basketball' Paves Way to College Success

"Some mornings we have basketball for breakfast when the boys are all home," said Mrs. John Moran of Brooklyn.

And you can well believe it for Mrs. John Moran has seen three of her sons, Jackie, Bobby and Donie, achieve places of prominence in college basketball.

Bobby wound up his college career with the Providence College Friars recently. Jackie played his college ball under General McClellan at Boston College, and Donie has two seasons remaining with the Friars. There is another hoopster coming along but he's getting the rudiments in the lower brackets of the CYO these days.

You have to rate Bobby among the Friars' best. Just where he fits in is a question, but he belongs in the upper bracket. And the future will find him associated with Johnny Krieger, Dick Bracken, Ben Smith, Jim Schlimm, Bill Kutneski and other outstanding players. They were all tops.

"Bobby is a fine player, a real one."

How many times have I heard coach Vin Cuddy say that! A good many, and he always meant it.

All Around Star

Moran would have been a more appreciated player in another era because he's a well rounded player and like some others his finesse and skill isn't always as noticeable in the hustle, bustle and pop of the current game.

"That Moran is a nice player,"

says Bob Morris, Brown's retiring coach. "He would go with a lot of teams."

"How's Bob Moran doing these days . . . was a question thrown in your direction by Jack Guy, Paul Cieurzo and Tom Doherty at the University of Rhode Island.

Now that Bobby's collegiate play is over, there's only one answer to that question and "Very well" just about sums it up. Moran was a fine scorer but he sacrificed his point-making and became a steadying influence with the Friars over the latter half of the season.

Bobby's father was a pretty good player in his day, according to his brother. He played against clubs like the Brooklyn Visitations, the K. of C. and some of the Jersey outfits.

"There was a time," Bobby's uncle said, "when Jack and I played together. My girl and his girl (Bobby's mother) were watching a game one Sunday when he gave me a quick pass. I muffed it and one of our young lady guests got whacked with the ball. We certainly were in Dutch that time. But Bobby's mother has been following her boys on the basketball court for a long time and likes the game."

Like other kids in Brooklyn, the Morans played whenever and wherever they could, on a street, a playground, the church or the school gym. Brooklyn boys learn to handle the ball as kids and bushel baskets with broken bottoms hanging from poles are sometimes in abundance. That's

where the Morans got a lot of their early experience and later it was polished up.

Jackie, who is a second lieutenant with the Marines in Korea, helped Bobby improve his game and Bobby in turn helped Donie. The Friars have had few brother combinations but the Morans worked well together this past season. And they anticipated each other's moves like kids who had played together a long time.

"For three small men, where could you find harder workers and more capable players than Bobby, Lou Murgo of Brown and Slick Pina of Rhody?" asked PC's Cuddy. "Each of them gave you everything he had and each could do a terrific job. Both Murgo and Slick were great against us and Bobby did an outstanding job for us. Each of them could kill you on a good night."

Moran leaves two marks for future Friars to shoot at. He scored 455 points in his junior season and registered 1,245 in his three varsity campaigns. He had an 18-point average. He also leaves a reputation for being a nice guy, which doesn't show in the scoring column.

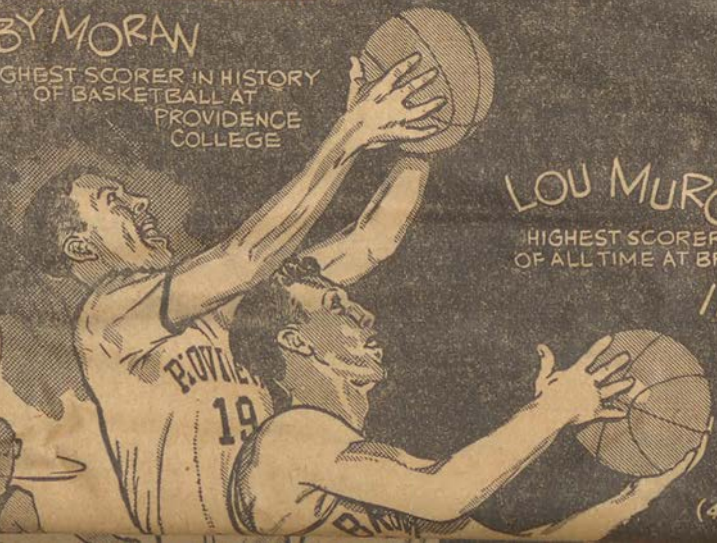


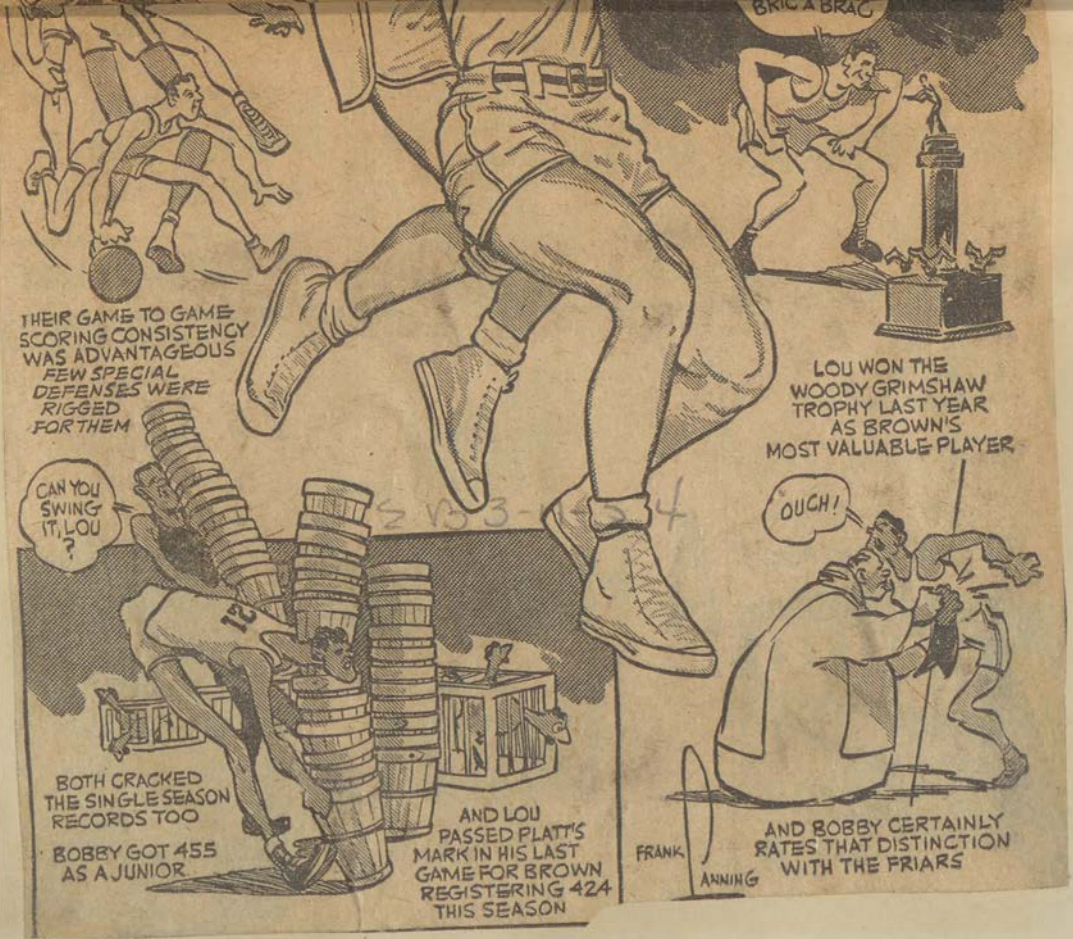

Kerr, Dowling Named Friar

Sport Captains

The Providence College basketball squad elected Ken Kerr of Newport as its captain for the 1954-55 season and the Friar track forces picked John Dowling of Queens Village, N. Y., as the leader of the outdoor track team for the coming seasons. The elections were announced last night.

Kerr, who was an outstanding schoolboy player at De La Salle, has played three seasons with the Friars. He broke in as a freshman and has turned in a capable all-around job for Coach Vin Cuddy.

Kerr did some effective rebounding during the past season and his work was particularly outstanding in the victory over Boston College. He suffered a shoulder injury in his sophomore year that kept him out of action for the last part of that season.

Dowling was a member of the Friars' indoor mile relay team that competed in Boston, Washington, New York and Philadelphia during the winter season. He's a product of Chamnade High and was outstanding in his freshman season.

Coach Harry Coates rates Dowling one of his hardest working performers and looks for some fine results from him during the spring campaign. The Friars have been working out at Hendricken Field and will make their formal debut on April 17 in the New York relays, sponsored by Adelphi College.

Friar Baseball Hopefuls Hold Breezy Spring Drills

Spring training in New England is really a rugged proposition. Up on Hendricken Field where the Providence College Friars are going through their paces, there are more blue tinged complexions than tan ones. And the chill is in the air even for the few topcoated fans who watch the progress.

Coach Hal Martin is faced with a rebuilding job at PC this spring. He lost some of his better players via graduations and Jim White, whom he was counting on as his regular shortstop again, left school to go to work.

General Pattern

The Friars held a long batting drill and an intrasquad game yesterday. That will be the general pattern of things for the time being as Martin tries to find some hitters. Seems managers and coaches are always looking for batting punch and Martin is no exception. Any consistent sticking might land one or several players positions on the top team.

Granted conditions are far from ideal with the temperature hovering in the 40s, the players hustle and try to play heads-up ball. The pitchers have had some opportunity to work in Harkins Hall and they are well ahead of the hitters. But there were some fine plays and good hits for an early spring workout.

Pep and Drive

Captain Eddie Ryder, who has shared the PC catching for the past two seasons, had a lot of pep and drive yesterday, but struck out in one of his turns at the plate. Buzz Moore, a sophomore, poled a long double to left center. Hank McQueeney pulled in a hard smash in left field. Jack Reynolds supplied a nice line single. Walt Malecki pitched well in spots. So things were fairly normal for a baseball practice, except for the weather, which is seldom mild on Hurricane Field.

Martin, who roams around the diamond and gives out playing pointers now and then, has lost his top pitcher from last season. Bill Mullins rated with some of the Friars' top men in pitching

potentiality and turned in some fine games over his varsity career. Currently he's in training with the Washington Senators at Orlando, Fla., but is expected to work in the Nats' farm system.

Heavy Pitching Crew

But with Mullins gone, Martin has a heavy pitching crew of assorted sizes and abilities.

There are 15 pitching prospects headed by Carl Buniva, Pete Drury, John O'Neil and Tom McAleer, all of whom are holdovers from last season. Donie Moran, who won a starting berth on the basketball squad in mid-season; Malecki, Dick Burke and Maurice Orlando all took turns on the mound yesterday.

The Friars play their first college game one month from tomorrow when they take on Yale at New Haven. They will be in action before that, however, playing several service squads on

a southern junket which opens on April 20 with the Norfolk Navy team at Norfolk, Va. But the college baseball season is already rolling in some quarters, with Amherst dropping a 5-1 contest to North Carolina yesterday.

Crusaders Again

Providence may come up with a better club than expected but they don't figure to threaten for the NCAA berth in District 1. Coach Martin picks Holy Cross to nail down that spot. The Crusaders may have been the best team in New England last year but lost the playoff, and then took Boston College, the NE standard bearer, in their annual series.

Martin lost a good slice of his club down the middle and on the left side of his infield. Bill Quinn, a fine prospect but injured in his junior and senior seasons, shared the catching with Ryder. Mullins was the top hurler. Centerfielder Bob Grenier did some timely hitting while Beaver Power played third base effectively. Throw in White, who was a steadying influence at short, and you have quite a rebuilding proposition confronting you.

First baseman Dick Howe and Ryder are the major holdovers, with Moore the best of the newcomers among the infielders. Jerry Romberg, who has played second two seasons, came up with a tricky stop yesterday. Ray McGuinness and Art Alosio are trying to break in at shortstop. Don Podziewski, Bobby Reale, Bill Slattery, Andy Sullivan, Bob O'Connell, and Joe Feeney may figure in the starting club if they produce some batting punch.

Manager Leo Hennessey is optimistic and looks for Moore to come through.

And speaking of that New England hockey tournament over in Providence a couple of weeks ago, Bud O'Connor, who covered the tournament for the *Hamden Chronicle* sends along an interesting side-light. . . . After Hamden won the championship in the finals, the Hamden manager, David Greene, a Jewish boy, suggested that everybody say the Lord's Prayer in thanksgiving. This the Hamden boys did in their locker room, Protestants and Catholic alike. . . . O'Connor, curious, asked coach Don McNeil about it afterwards. Said McNeil, "These kids put out the light before every period of every game this year and in the darkened locker room each prayed for the best in his own way." . . . The Hamden boys have won the New England title two years out of three, but apparently it hasn't gone to their heads.

Bud adds that on the following morning the entire 17-man Hamden squad, along with the players from St. Dominic's (Lewiston, Me.) and Notre Dame, which had lost to Hamden the night before, attended Mass together in the chapel of Providence College at the invitation of Father Aloysius B. Begley, O.P., director of athletics at the college. . . . Speaking briefly at the Mass Father Begley praised the fine example set by these 50 boys who only a short time before had been battling one another for the championship. . . .

Elis Need Only 3 Hits To Defeat Friars, 3-2

New Haven — Tom McAleer and Carl Buniva limited the Yale baseball team to only three hits but the Providence College Friars dropped a 3 to 2 decision to Yale here yesterday.

Yale took a 2-0 lead in the third inning when McAleer gave up the only hit made off him, a triple to left center by Pete Mathais with two men on. In the fourth, Yale picked up what proved to be the winning tally when Ray Walker walked, stole second and third and scored on a sacrifice fly.

The Friars collected nine hits in all against the Canadian sophomore ace of the Yale staff, Ken

MacKenzie, but didn't manage to score until the ninth.

In that frame, Hank McQueeney reached on an error moved to second on Buzz Moore's single and tallied on Jerry Romberg's single. After MacKenzie had walked Art Aloisio, pinch hitting for Buniva, Earle Taylor relieved him. Moore then scored on a fielder's choice before Taylor retired the side.

Bob Woods led the Providence attack with three hits in four trips with Moore and Romberg each collecting two. The defeat left the Friars with a record of two victories and three defeats for the season.

Norfolk, Va.—Providence College successfully launched its baseball season yesterday by walloping the Norfolk Naval Training Station, 13-1.

After giving up a run to the sailors in the second inning, the Friars uncorked their heavy hit-

ting attack for five runs in the third. Single tallies in the fourth and fifth were followed by another five-run burst in the sixth, the latter being featured by Jerry Romberg's grand-slam home run. P.C. closed the scoring with a single run in the seventh. Fred O'Neill pitched the first

six innings for the Friars and gave up three hits, struck out five and walked two. Tom McAleer took over in the seventh and struck out the side in the seventh and nine innings.

Bill Slattery opened P.C.'s big third inning with a double to center field. Bob Wood and O'Neill each beat out drag bunts down the third-base line, loading the bases. Bobby Reall's double to center cleared the bases and, after Dick Howe had grounded out, Reall scored on Ed Ryder's triple to left. Ryder was thrown out at the plate trying to stretch his hit into a homer. The relay went from Bill Kutzko to Ed Potonski to Bill Little. Hank McQueeney then singled. Stole second and scored on Buz Moore's single.

The Friars will play the Norfolk team again this afternoon and will move on to Fort Eustis for a night game tonight. Friars' Senior Allows Only 2 Hits, Fans 15

John (Fred) O'Neill, senior right-hander, hurled the Providence College Friars to a 4-0 shutout over Lowell Textile yesterday at Hendricken Field. The victory was PC's third in six starts.

O'Neill, in his third season with the Friars, turned in his best pitching job yesterday, setting down the Textile team with two hits and striking out 15.

Although the Lowell lineup could do little with O'Neill's hurling, they were within striking distance most of the route. The Friars scored one in the fourth, two in the fifth and one in the seventh.

Dick Howe and Buzz Moore were the leading stickers with two hits apiece for the Friars. Howe drove in two of the four runs. Moore made an outstanding pickup and throw on a slowly hit ball near the pitcher's box in the ninth inning.

Cy Rekant singled in the third for Lowell's first hit and Frank Taplin led off the fourth with a double. Three Lowell players reached second and O'Neill picked off two of them. O'Neill's 15 strikeouts is a high mark among Friars pitchers in recent seasons.

Hank McQueeney singled in the fourth and stole second. He came in with the game's first run as Moore doubled to left. In the fifth, the Friars collected two more. PROVIDENCE — Ice hockey will be raised to the status of a varsity sport at Providence College beginning with the 1954-55 season, it was announced today by the Very Reverend Robert J. Slavin, O.P., President, speaking for the Administration.

The team will play a strictly collegiate schedule and freshmen and transfer students will not be eligible for competition. A schedule of approximately twenty games is being planned with about half that number being played at Rhode Island Auditorium. The first home game is scheduled Friday, December 3rd.

Providence College will apply for membership in the Intercollegiate Ice Hockey Association which is an affiliate of the Eastern College Athletic Conference.

Ice hockey was restored to the Providence College athletic program in 1951 when an informal team was entered in the Rhode Island Amateur League. This team was coached by Jack Gagnon and Louis Cimini.

In the following two seasons, Providence College was coached by Richard Rondeau and played fourteen games each season with college teams only. In the 1952-53 season the team won six and lost

eight, while last year it had a four and ten record.

In his announcement, Father Slavin said that hockey, though a varsity sport, was still on a trial basis and would be continued only if student interest and public support warranted.

Rhode Island Crushes P.C. in Track, 95 to 40

Bob Taylor Breaks Field Record in Hammer As Rams Win 12 Events, Sweeping Four

Bob Taylor, former East Providence High School football star, shattered the field record for the hammer throw yesterday as he featured the 95-to-40 victory the University of Rhode Island track team scored over Providence College at Kingston.

Competing in ideal weather and on a fast track, the Ram trackmen had an easy time of it as they compiled their big margin. They won 12 of the 15 events, taking all three places in four of them—the low hurdles, hammer throw, discus and shot put.

The nearest the Friars came to a sweep was in the javelin, in which Jim Flynn and Mike Baccari finished one, two, and in the 220, in which George Kanarly and Jack Dowling finished one, two after trailing substantially through the first 150 yards. They finished with a terrific burst.

The best race was in the mile, which Don MacQuattie won by less than a yard from Bernard Dandley after Dandley had taken the lead with 220 yards to go. In the stretch MacQuattie opened up again, erased a five-yard

deficit and caught Dandley at the tape.

Taylor, a Ram football player as well as trackman, signalized his arrival as a weight star with a 177-foot, 10-inch heave. That achievement bettered the field record, set in 1938 by Irving Folsworth.

Striking out 11 and allowing only four hits, Tom McAleer completely mastered Rhode Island University's ball team yesterday as Providence College won, 7 to 0, at Hendricken Field.

McAleer rarely was in serious difficulties and when danger impended, his fast ball and curve swooped past hitters for third strikes. Moreover he beat out a bunt, squeezed in a run and generally comported himself in the accepted manner.

Lots from Little

Although the Friars got 11 hits off Tony Horton and Carl Stahl, their attack hardly was overwhelming. They got a lot out of a little. The bunt was their most potent weapon and they used it judiciously, five of their hits progressing no farther than the infield grass.

Horton passed Art Aloisio, the first PC batter, and that proved all McAleer needed to win for Aloisio stole second and scored on Dick Howe's single. In the fourth Bob Woods got his second hit (he went 4 for 4, three in the infield), advanced when McAleer walked and scored on Aloisio's single.

PC's sixth was profitable, if not thunderous. Hank McQueeney opened with a triple, scored as Dick Lendrum threw wide on Jerry Romberg's grounder. McQueeney made it by a majestic slide. Woods bunted safely and as McAleer approached the plate another bunt situation became obvious.

So Coach Bill Beck of the Rams instituted a shift that put the Williams' shift to shame. He moved his third baseman in close enough to shake hands with McAleer and put his centerfielder at third. Horton whistled two strikes past McAleer, so Beck returned his boys to their accustomed posts.

Two-Run Ricochet

Then McAleer made the tactic look sound. He bunted, but beautifully, on third strike and the bases were full. The bunt stopped on the spot Lendrum had abandoned. Two runs scored when Jack Wojcik, trying to pick off Romberg, threw into left field (a ricochet off the sliding Romberg's leg) and another came in shortly thereafter when Howe walked, forcing in the run.

Woods scored the last run on a perfectly executed squeeze bunt by McAleer. McAleer, by the way, walked only two and nicked two more with pitches, but all told had himself a time.

Two good double plays enlivened the proceedings, Ken Dellner of State throwing out McQueeney at the plate after taking McAleer's fly in the second and, in the fifth McQueeney doubling Lendrum off first, by at least 45 feet, after making a good catch of Wojcik's hard smash. Pete DeMasi did a grand job at short for the Rams.

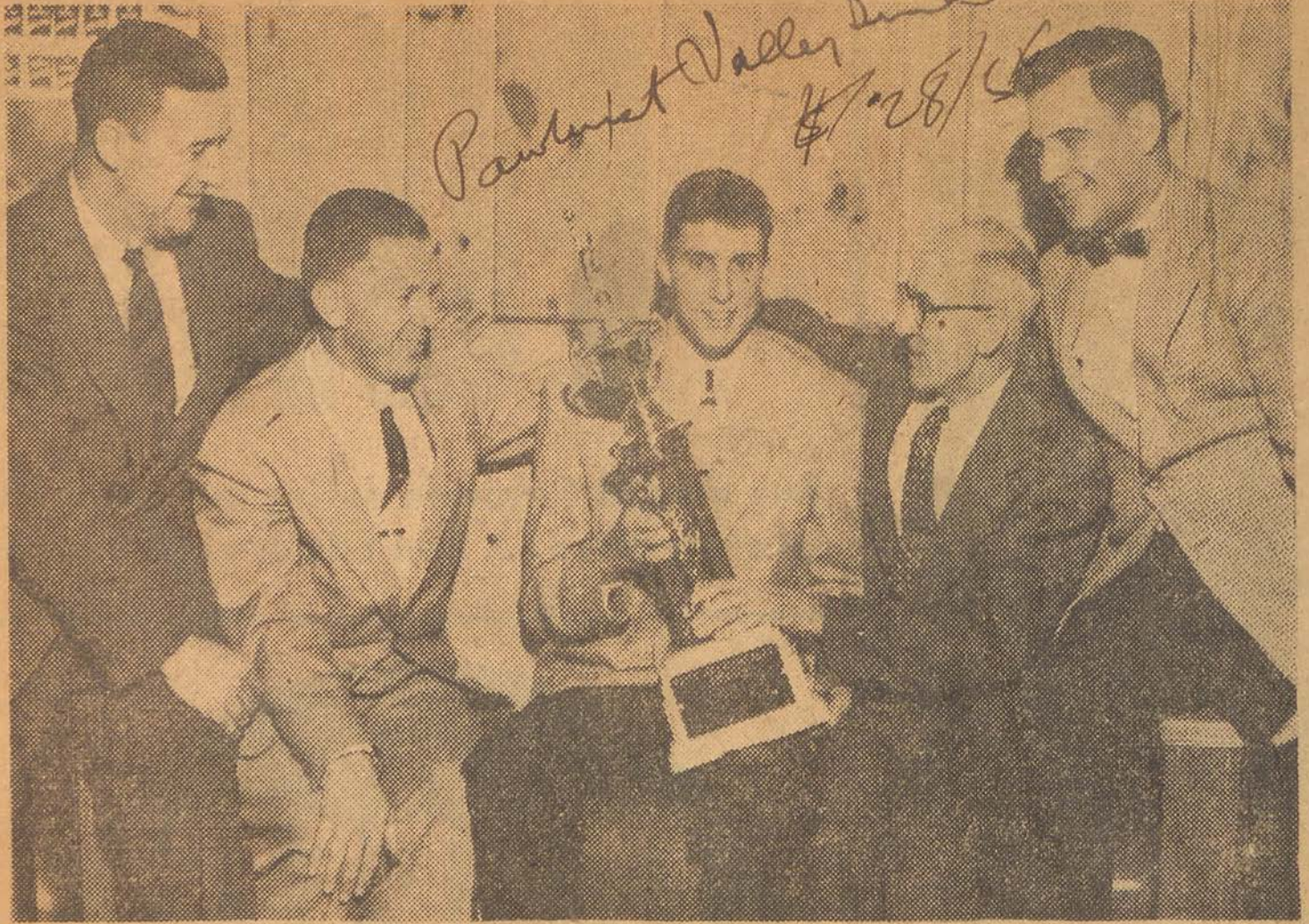

Friars by 4-2; Lefty Toughest With Men On

Carl Buniva's effective pitching in the tight spots and his teammates' hits in the right ones gave Providence College a 4-2 victory over Brown yesterday at Aldrich Field.

The victory enabled the Friars to go into a tie with Brown for the intrastate championship. Each now has a 2-1 series record and the title will be decided in the game between the two next Tuesday.

Buniva, a lefthander, gave 13 hits, but this is not a true indication of his effectiveness. He pitched scoreless ball for six innings, aided by excellent support, and in the last three he was able to come up with the right pitch when Brown threatened.

For example, in the eighth inning, he got the first two batters, then loaded the bases by giving three straight hits, all loopers just beyond the infield. Then he struck out the next man for the third out.

The Friars got their runs, conversely, by producing when they got men on base. In the first, Art Aloisio walked, Bobby Reall singled and Dick Howe singled, scoring Aloisio. Then Reall scored on Ed Ryder's sacrifice fly.

Again in the fourth, the Friars loaded the bases and Reall delivered a double to left-center, scor-

ing Jerry Romberg and Bob Woods.

Brown made several threatening gestures in the early innings, but they were cut off by alert fielding by the Friars. In the third, for instance, with one out and Dave Zucconi on first, Ryder made a catch of a foul right up against the backstop and threw to first for a double play.

Buzz Moore also made a good throw for a double play after getting a forceout at third and Aloisio and Woods contributed strong fielding.

Brown scored in the seventh when Jim Coukos singled as a pinch hitter, advanced on a walk to Zucconi and scored on Josephson's single. Zucconi singled home Skip Campbell in the eighth with his third hit.

Josephson also had three hits and Reall, Ryder and Woods got two each for the Friars.

Brown will play Army at Aldrich Field, starting at 3 o'clock, the Bruins' second Eastern League game in two days. They had Columbia on their schedule today.

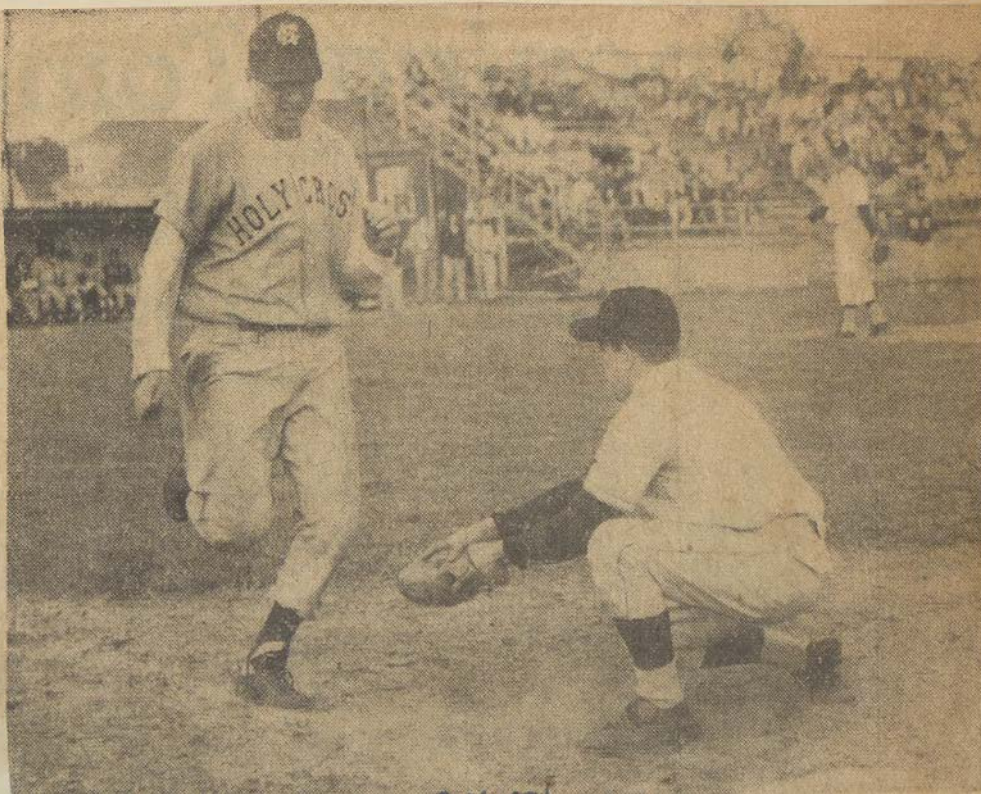

Boston University's track Terriers trampled the opposition in the 17th Eastern Intercollegiate at White Stadium yesterday as they scored in 12 of the 15 events amass 55½ points. Twelve of Doug Raymond's charge contributed points as the winners totalled more than the next two squads in winning the event for the third time, the last four seasons.

THREE MARKS FALL, ONE EQUALLED

Curtis Guild, great nephew of the former Bay State governor of the same name, escorted Springfield to second place as he picked up 13 of the Maroons' 23 1/3 points in the weight events and bettered his own meet record in the discus. Pat Lochiatto boosted Boston College into third place with 21 points as he swept both hurdle events while defending champion Tufts was fourth with 20 1/3 points.

The other scores in the 10-school meet were: Providence 13, Williams 12, Bowdoin 12½, Colby 7 1/3, Middlebury 1 and Trinity 1.

In addition to Guild's feat in the discus event, two other marks were smashed and one equalled. Bill Shearer, 185-pound Terrier Olympic hopeful, tied the 100-yard dash mark when he ran the century in 9.7 seconds to equal the mark set by Trinity's Don Piligian in 1947 and then, smashed Middlebury George West's 220-yard mark of 21.4 with an easy triumph at 21.1.

B.U. football tackle Dick Bates rounded out the record breakers when he broke the shot mark of former teammate Cliff Blair with a heave of 49 feet, 9¾ inches.

Guild, 25-year-old Army veteran of European service, was high man for the meet as he posted a second win in the hammer and was second to Bates in the shot.

Shearer, former Hillhouse of New Haven fullback, was really impressed with the speed of the Boston schoolboy track. After equalling the 100-yard mark he freely predicted that he'd break the 220-yard record and then beat the opposition to the tape by more than 20 feet to accomplish the deed.

Only other double winner of the afternoon was B.U.'s Bruce Hescoock, IC4A pole vault champion. After winning his specialty, the lanky junior from Rochester, N. H., tied for first with Springfield's Ralph Muzzey in the high jump and finished with a third in the hammer toss.

Best race of the day was the two-mile which was won by Providence's Joe Madden, former St. Columbkille's student from Brighton. Madden was matched stride for stride by Bowdoin's little blond Frank Cameron but nally managed to kick away from him for a 10-yard victory edge.

DANDLEY STAYS WITH SMITH

Another Providence runner, Bernie Dandley, stayed right on throughout most of the 880-yard wee Willie Smith's shoulder run but couldn't match the little Terrier's speed in the home stretch as he lost by 15 yards.

The distance events provided a family story as senior Bill Redman of Williams won the mile while kid brother Pete, a sophomore at Middlebury, would up fourth in the two-mile.

In the freshman medley, which did not count in the scoring,

Providence's nifty quartet nosed out Boston College with a strong 880 by Gerry Farley. The little Friar thereby made up for the close second he posted in the Relay Carnival when the Yale anchor man just nipped him.

B.U.'s Terriers Cop Team Title For Third Time

Boston—Joe Madden and Jim Flynn of Providence College captured first places and Boston University's well-balanced forces annexed their third team title yesterday in the Eastern Intercollegiate A.A. track and field championships at White Stadium.

Madden won the two-mile run after a thrilling duel with Bowdoin's Frank Cameron that left the issue in doubt until the last 100 yards. Madden's time was 9:51.4.

Flynn won the javelin with a toss of 172 feet, 5 inches. Team-mate Bernie Dandley placed second in the 880.

In addition, the Providence College freshman quartet of Bob Rourke, Joe DePaolo, Don Fahey and Jerry Farley won the medley relay in 3:39.6. The young Friars beat Boston College, Bowdoin and Springfield.

Boston University piled up 55½ points, finishing far ahead of second-place Springfield, which posted 23½. Then came Boston College, 21; Tufts, 20½; Providence College, 13; Williams, 12; Bowdoin, 10½; Colby 7½; and Middlebury and Trinity, 1 each.

Three meet records were broken and one tied. One of the record-breakers was B.U.'s Dick Bates, former Classical High athlete who raised the shot-put mark to 49 feet, 9¾ inches. Bates also placed third in the discus.

The other records were set by Springfield's Curtis Guild in the discus (151:11¼) and BU's Bill Shearer in the 220-yard dash (21.1). Shearer also equaled the record in the 100-yard dash with a 9.7 clocking.

Another Classical High product, Nat Baker, gained a second in the hammer and fourths in the shot put and discus for the Terriers.

Coach Hal Martin of the Friars said today that Woods had come along nicely on the Providence team this season.

"He played first base on the Frosh last year but he's done a lick job at short," Martin said.

"He's been our leading hitter and he tightened up the infield with some of his work in the field. He's hitting around .400 but some of his plays have really helped our pitching."

Good Recovery

Martin referred to a play he made in the Brown game last week on which he made a good recovery in the hole behind third and threw out a man at first. The ball had already gone by the third baseman and looked like a sure hit.

Woods was talking baseball and the weather with his nurse this morning. He realizes that he will not be able to play any summer ball. His mother and dad visited him yesterday while the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., athletic director of the Friars, planned to drop in on him this afternoon.

Never Gives Up

Harry Coates has had his trials and troubles trying to build a track team at Providence College. But every so often a good performance or a job well done makes the days seem a little bit brighter.

Last Saturday several of the Friars did well in the Easterns and Harry thinks his team may be fairly strong in another season. He don't mean in a big time way but on the Friars' level of competition.

Harry was pleased with the jobs turned in by Jim Flynn, Joe Madden and Bernie Dandley at Boston as well as the victory by the freshman medley relay team.

Didn't Look Too Bad

"About two weeks ago I came across Flynn fooling around with a javelin on Hendriken Field," Harry said, "and he didn't look too bad. I went over and talked with him, showed him a couple of small things and he was really interested. He was out for track before but a fellow his size has no business trying to be a shot putter and throwing it only 30 feet.

"So as we needed field men, he went in and got a suit. And Saturday he beat the fellow who won the javelin in the Harvard relays earlier in the season. And he is going to get better, not this year but next. He's the second PC man to win the javelin. Harry Alexander won it before. By the way Alex is doing very well in the U.S. Air Force as a pilot and is now stationed near Chicago.

"That Madden has been a pleasant surprise also. He's a fighter. He will run and run and run. He was just under a five-minute miler one time but Saturday he won a nice race from Frank Cameron of Bowdoin at Boston. Madden impressed me the first time I saw him. His time wasn't much but he looked like a runner. Sometimes you just sense it."

Madden is a nephew of Tom Hazle, who played the outfield for the Friars in the late 30's. Hazle encouraged Madden and entered him in some foot races even though young Madden had no formal, or expert coaching. His high school didn't sponsor track either except to let him run in isolated instances.

Madden, a sophomore of promise, used to train with Joe Lapierre, now a star at Georgetown, but needed big improvement to reach his friend's stature.

Joe is an A student at PC and one of the most encouraging pupils a coach ever had, Coates explains. "He should be quite a runner before he gets through at Providence and I don't think you can spoil him. He's a real worker and he never gives up.

"Dandley raced a good man in BU's Billy Smith Saturday and he'll fight you right to the finish," Coates continued. "Bernie has a long stride and he's improving. He does a lot of running.

"It was too bad Chris Lohner was sick Saturday but maybe he should have been held out of the Brown meet. He was in no shape to run last Saturday." (Lohner was defending champion in the mile.)

Battling Fool

Harry is strong for a freshman named Gerry Farley. "He's a battling fool," Coates describes him. "He reminds you of Pop Johnson and Jack Cassidy for size but can he run! He's real bright ray of hope, that kid."

Farley anchored a relay team of Joe Burke, Joe Depaolo and Don Fahey in a fine victory Saturday but he has been doing big things right along. He comes from St. Michael's High of Union City, N.J., and has been unbeaten in the 880 among the Frosh runners that he has met in competition.

"It is a funny thing about track," Coates said. "Some fellow who might be a great distance man is content to be a mediocre sprinter, or a poor shot putter won't put in the time to be a good hurdler. They only do the things they like when they might make names for themselves in the event that is more suited to their type of talent.

"We don't have many great runners in New England because we don't have the competition. I got a tremendous kick out of Roger Bannister cracking the four-minute mile and I would like to see someone else do it now. Bannister's feat certainly brought attention to track. It's a great sport but you have to love it, to be good at it. There's no substitute for work no matter how much talent a boy has and a little more punishment at the right time can mean the difference between a fine victory and just as another race."

Romberg Will Lead P.C. Baseball Team

Gerald R. Romberg of Orange, Conn., has been elected captain of the 1955 Providence College varsity baseball squad, it was announced today.

Romberg came to Providence from Notre Dame High School of West Haven, Conn., and is the only man in the squad to play three years of varsity baseball. He played on the 1952 team when the NCAA permitted freshmen to play on varsity teams.

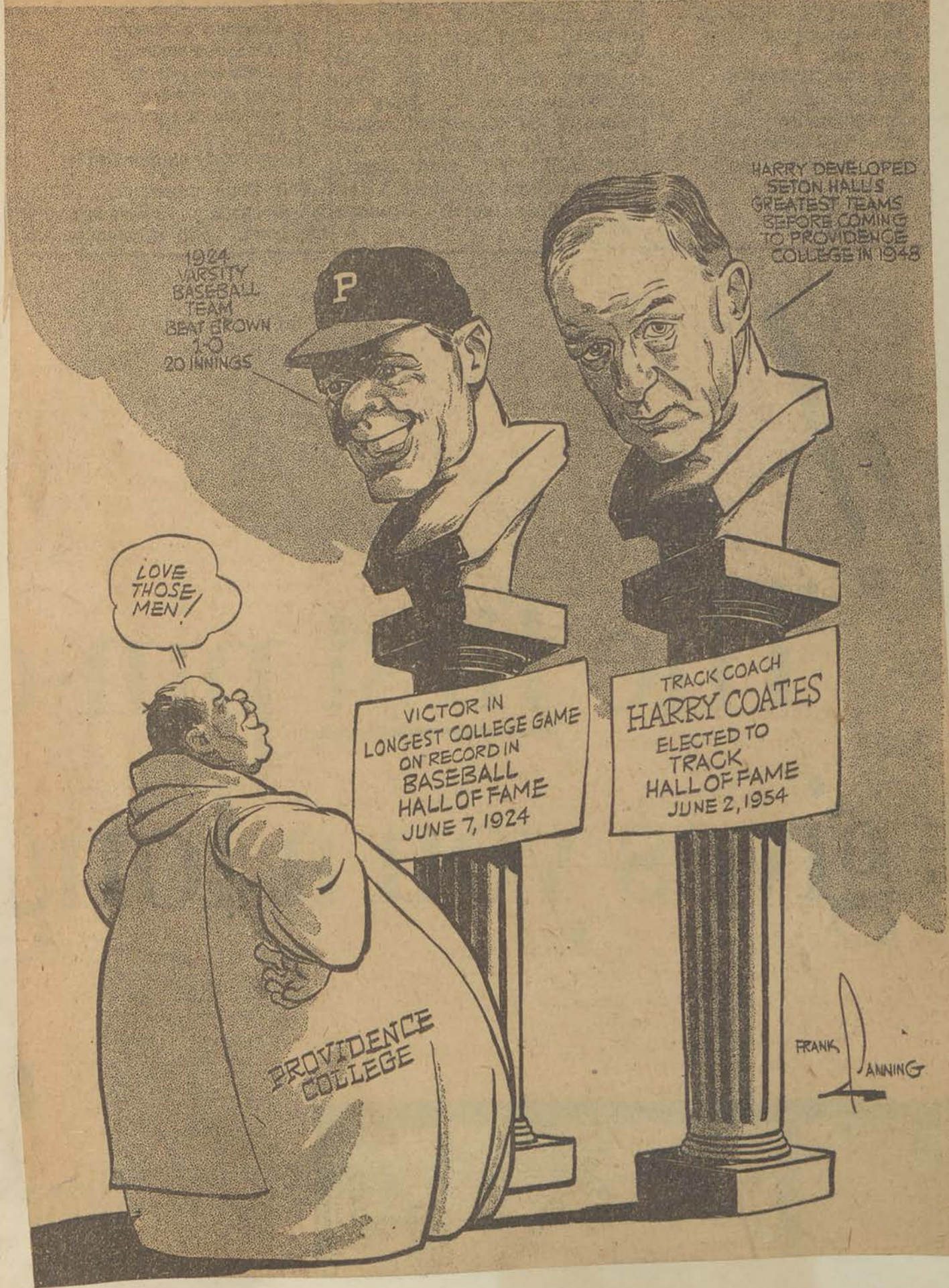

Replaying 20-Inning Battle—30 Years Late

It was Alumni Day at Providence College and in a room on the second floor at Harkins Hall, members of the 1924 baseball team were celebrating the 30th anniversary of the memorable 20-inning, 1-0 victory over Brown. In the center of the table was a handsome trophy, commemorating the event, presented by the team to the college for the trophy room in the new gymnasium now under construction.

Ed Wholey, who played center field a la Piersall for the Friars on that June afternoon at Andrews Field, back in 1924 when P.C.'s Charley Reynolds and Brown's Elmer Duggan staged their marathon pitching duel, had the happy thought of inscribing the trophy with the names of the players in the exact batting order of the game. Here's how they batted:

Joe McGee, third base; Wholey, center field; Bud Feid, first base; Ray Doyle, second base; Rab Creegan, shortstop; Billy Beck, right field; Johnny Halloran, catcher; the late Arthur Brickley, left field; Reynolds, pitcher. Also inscribed on the trophy are the names of John McKenna, the team manager; the Rev. Ambrose Howley, O.P., the then athletic director, and Jack Flynn, the late great coach.

Flashbacks . . .

And now as the members of the team gathered around the trophy they started to replay the 20-inning game and the other games of that long ago spring. There was, someone noted, a piece of the trophy missing. On its top was the figure of a batter, swinging, but there was no bat in his hands. For safety in transportation the bat had been packed separately and Brother Wholey now proceeded to unwrap same in order to give the player his missing war club. The opportunity to rib Wholey about his somewhat anemic batting average was too great for one of his '24 teammates to pass up.

"No, Ed," he said, "leave out the bat. He can represent you and what use would a bat be to you anyway?"

If Wholey wasn't exactly a Grade A menace at the plate, he certainly was bad news for Brown in the field that day. He made nine putouts, a collegiate record, several of them on chances that were labeled sure hits.

"Maybe," Feid was saying, "there have been more thrilling ball games, but I don't know. When you think of how it could have been all over for us if this guy (Wholey) had missed one of them or if Billy Beck hadn't caught that drive that Harry Hoffman hit. When I saw that one go, I actually began to toss my glove into the bench. Then Beck dove headlong five or six feet and came up with it."

That's how it went for 19 innings until P.C. got that one

big run. Doyle reached first on a grounder that Brown, baseman, Tut Ruckstull, bobbled. Creegan moved him a sacrifice and he went to third on a wild pitch. Beck hit out seven times previously and as he came up the Brown moved in. Bill poked one over the shortstop's head and who had the figure for scampering then, scampered home the run that won the longest college game on record.

The game is enshrined in the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown now through the medium of a cartoon that Frank Lanni drew when the team held its 25th reunion.

That 1924 team had three coaches. Joey Conno, former major leaguer, had the club for part of the season but resigned when he and college officials had a disagreement. The next coach was none other than Feid.

"I didn't want to do it," Bud was saying yesterday, "after all, how could I go around giving players like myself a hard time? But Father Noone, the president, asked me to handle the team until they could get another coach. I certainly was glad to do it. Flynn when he arrived. As soon as he came out on the field he greeted him with 'Hello, coach.' He said I didn't have to be his coach, because after all he and I had played ball together. What kind of a team was it, he wanted to know. I said it was a pretty good team, but maybe we needed to work harder. I said, naturally, I hadn't been able to give any orders. That 'Well,' Flynn said, 'don't worry about it. After this season gets through practice under me, they won't be able even to run around the field once.'"

Perfectionist . . .

"Jack was a perfectionist all right," he went on. "If you get a thing wrong and it turned out right, he didn't like to see you get set up about it. I remember once, on a throw to first, and wide, I couldn't get my glove on it, but managed to catch it with my bare hand. When I came in to the bench I was saying pretty good about making the play and Flynn could see that. All he said was, 'Sure sign of a poor ballplayer when he catches a catch with the wrong hand.'"

The talk turned again to the 20-inning game and the fact that Reynolds and Duggan had stood up under the long grind.

"That Duggan," McGee said, in tribute to a much respected rival, "what a guy! Remember someone on our bench had figured out the pitches he was going to throw. When he held the ball in his bare hand he knew it was going to be a fast ball. If it was in his gloved hand it was sure to be a curve. We knew exactly what he was going to pitch and we still couldn't hit it."

Keefe was also the bad boy of the rather dull contest, sitting out a total of 12 minutes in penalties. All stemmed from a single incident behind the PC cage in the second period. After colliding, Keefe and Tom McAleer, PC defenseman glared at one another for several seconds and then began a pushing contest.

Referee Gus Rivers put both players off the ice on a minor roughing penalty, and as Keefe skated off he raised his stick in a threatening gesture behind the officials' back. This brought a 10-minute misconduct to the Brown speedster. Still full of fight, Keefe shoved PC's John Sweeney as he skated toward the penalty box.

Aftermath

From this point on the slightly zany Bruin skater drew mingled cheers and boos whenever he skated on the ice or took the puck.

Getting back to the hockey game, Brown took command early in the first period on goals by Bob Borah and Keefe. The Bruins led, 3-1, at the end of the period and increased the lead to 5-1 at the end of the second. From midpoint on, the battle had all the excitement of an early-season practice scrimmage. The crowd acted accordingly and things were so quiet over the later stages of the game, that you could actually hear yourself think—a rare happening at the Auditorium when any kind of a contest is in progress.

One bright spot in the rather tedious contest was the goalie play, particularly that of Brown's Dave Halvorsen. Behind, 3-1, PC made a determined bid to get back in the contest early in the second period. They swarmed all over the Bruin defense, but couldn't get the puck past Halvorsen. When he left in favor of his stand-in, Bob Copp, with 11 minutes remaining in the game, he received much-deserved applause.

Total saves were 28 for PC's Phil Crawford and 17 for Halvorsen.

As the game progressed, it became more untidy. A total of 18 penalties were called by Referees Rivers and Lesieur, and neither was calling them particularly close.

The Bruin scorers besides Keefe were Tom Thompson, who picked up two goals, Russ Kingman, Bob Borah, Dick Pettit and John Farrell. Norm Auger, a Freshman scored the Friar's lone goal with assists from Rod Gorman, another yearling, and Capt. Bob Reall.

Reall invented a new kind of defensive move in the second period when he sat on the puck. Rivers gave Reall a quick frisk, but still no puck. It wasn't until the PC captain moved to the relative seclusion of his own bench and undid a few buttons that the black disc appeared from inside his pants.

In the preliminary game last night, Mal Early scored three times and paced Springfield to an 8-2 victory over the Rhode Island University Informals. The Rams' goalie, Al Hunter, caught a puck on the forehead and sat out almost two periods waiting to have the wound stitched up. Meanwhile the Gymnasts scored five goals in the second period against his replacement, Tom Rust, a forward, who was hastily pressed into service in the cage.

Ed LaPierre scored both the losers' goals. The first came on a shot from behind the cage and glanced off the back of the goalie's stick. The second actually was

The URI Rams play a Yankee Conference game with Maine tomorrow at Kingston and the two schools also will compete in tennis and golf at Rhody. Brown also will be in action tomorrow, meeting Pennsylvania Philadelphia in the first of a big row for the Bruins.

Six in Nine Days

This one, the first in the Eastern Intercollegiate League season Brown, begins a string of six

games in nine days for Lefty Lefebvre's club. Five of the six are league contests.

After Penn, the Bruins will move on to Cornell for a game on Saturday. Next Tuesday they play Holy Cross. On Wednesday they play Yale at New Haven. Then Princeton and Navy are here on Friday and Saturday.

Not many college pitching staffs can face up to a schedule such as this, and Brown's is no exception. That is one reason why Lefebvre was delighted with the pitching yesterday of sophomore Frank Rego.

Relief Needed

Rego, in his varsity debut, limited the Rams to five hits in eight innings and had a shutout going. But he ran into trouble

in the ninth and it took good relief pitching by Don Enoch and John Hunter to save the Bruins' first victory of the regular season.

Dave Stenhouse, the Rams ace pitcher, struck out 10, but his tendency to wildness and a couple of untimely bobbles by teammates caused trouble. Brown got a run in the fifth and two more in the seventh. One of these was a 350-foot homer by Harry Josephson.

Bruins, Rams and Friars Busy With Baseball This Afternoon

The University of Rhode Island plays Maine at Kingston today. Brown plays Penn at Philadelphia and Providence College heads north from its stay in Virginia.

That's the schedule for the baseball teams. In addition, the URI Rams also will entertain Maine in tennis and golf and the freshman track team will take on LaSalle Academy.

These are the Kingston starting times: baseball, 3 p.m.; golf, 1 o'clock; tennis, 4 o'clock, and track, 4:15 for the field events.

Coach Bill Beck has Carl Stahl and Dick Nordberg among his eligible starting pitchers. Charley Otterstedt will pitch for Maine. He is the ace of the Bears' staff.

The game is the first of the season in the Yankee Conference for the Rams. They have won one of three so far.

The Rams have another game tomorrow, Springfield at Springfield.

Brown will make a second try at getting started on its Eastern League schedule at Penn. The Bruins were rained out of their scheduled opener with Yale last Wednesday.

Penn has a 4-4 record after beating Georgetown, Yale, Muhlenberg and Lehigh and losing to Princeton, St. Joseph's, Westchester and Rutgers. In their most-recent games the Quakers beat Yale 6-4, and the Bruins topped the U. of R.I., 3-2.

Coach Lefty Lefebvre plans to start Ken Moffat, a right-hander, against the Quakers and then have Harry Josephson available for opening against Cornell tomorrow.

These two games mark the start of a hectic nine days for the Bruins, who have scheduled six games between today and next Saturday. Five are league contests.

Dartmouth will play Princeton in the only other league game today. Princeton, the leader in the early standings this season, is the defending champion.

The Friars, before they left Providence, had tentative plans for playing a game at Fort Dix, N.J., this afternoon. But final word still had not yet received yesterday whether the game was on.

However, the club definitely will play Yale at New Haven tomorrow, the first of the Friars' regularly scheduled contests.

Boston College, with considerable help from three Rhode Islanders, scored a 7-2 baseball victory over Providence College yesterday at Hendricken Field.

Ed DiLorenzo, a quick little righthander, effectively handled by catcher Chet Hanewich of Pawtucket, stopped the Friars almost completely in their last game of the season.

He allowed just two hits in the first seven innings and then four more when the pressure was off and the Eagles had their eighth victory in 11 starts virtually in the record book.

DiLorenzo further contributed by driving in a pair of runs with a double in the seventh inning long after they were really needed.

The need was taken care of in the previous inning, when the Eagles scored four runs on four hits and an error.

One of the four was driven in by Bristol's John Ruggiero, who got two hits in three trips and fielded his shortstop position in top fashion.

Ruggiero's hit followed right after John McGrath had stroked a slow roller over second base that went for a double and drove in two runs.

Pawtucket's Bill Kennedy, the third Rhody resident playing for the Eagles, scored a run and delivered a single that kept the sixth-inning rally going.

The Eagles' first run came when Fred O'Neill walked the first three batters, then hit the fourth man, right at the start.

O'Neill leveled off after this first fluster and avoided trouble until that four-run burst. He struck out seven. He was replaced by Carl Buniva in the sixth. Carl worked the seventh and Pete Drury finished with a two-inning hitless chore.

The Friars made it a 1-1 tie in the third inning when Art Aloisio reached on a fielder's choice and gained second on a balk. He scored on a single by Dick Howe.

Howe started off the sequence leading to the other run by singling in the eighth. Then Buzz Moore singled, as did Ed Ryder,

and the Friars had their second run.

Although outhit by only 7-6, the Friars were hindered by four errors, a couple of which were more vital than any of the Eagles' four, and the nine walks given by their three pitchers. The Eagles' Jim Cisternelli drew five of them.

The defeat closed the Friars' season with a record of seven victories and 10 losses.

Bobby Moran Compiles New PC Scoring Mark

A roaring crowd paid final tribute to the career of the highest scoring player in Providence College history with a prolonged standing ovation last Wednesday night. When Bobby Moran returned to the bench for the last time, in the Friars' duel with Brown, he had rounded out the greatest career in the school's basketball annals, a career that found him editing a complete revision of the Providence College record book.

In three varsity seasons, the brilliant Brooklyn bombardier scored 1245 points, an all-time school record. In his junior year he broke another mark, scoring 455 points in a single season's play. Both these records were formerly held by Jim Schlimm, a teammate of Bobby's in Moran's sophomore year. And, following Schlimm's excellent example, the versatile shotmaking genius became the second Friar in history to score over one thousand points in three seasons of varsity play.

In addition, Moran holds the three-year scoring average mark, with 18 points per game for 69 games; the four-year point total record (includes a year of freshman ball) of 1614 points; and the four-year scoring average record of 17.4 points per game for 93 games.

In all, Robert Joseph Moran added five new pages to the Providence College Chronicle in the course of his remarkable career.

Also, accorded generous ovations upon completion of their respective careers were seniors Hank McQueeney, Phil Lynch, Jack Reynolds, Bill Quinlan, Charlie Aquaviva, Tommy Mullins and Jack Durkin.

Friars' Moran Rates Cheers

Providence — A roaring crowd paid final tribute to the career of the highest scoring player in Providence College history with a prolonged standing ovation last Wednesday night. When Bobby Moran returned to the bench for the last time, in the Friars' duel with Brown, he had rounded out the greatest career in the school's basketball annals, a career that found him editing a complete revision of the Providence College record book.

In three varsity seasons, the brilliant Brooklyn bombardier scored 1245 points, an all-time school record. In his junior year he broke another mark, scoring 455 points in a single season's play. Both these records were formerly held by Jim Schlimm, a teammate of Bobby's in Moran's sophomore year. And, following Schlimm's excellent example, the versatile shotmaking genius became the second Friar in history to score over one thousand points in three seasons of varsity play.

In addition, Moran holds the three year scoring average mark, with 18 points per game for 69 games; the four-year point total record (includes a year of freshman ball) of 1614 points; and the four year scoring average record of 17.4 points per game for 93 games.

In all, Robert Joseph Moran, added five new pages to the Providence College Chronicle in the course of his remarkable career.

1951-52 and was coached by
John Gagnon and Louis Cimini.
Dick Rondeau, former Dartmouth
hockey ace, has coached the
squad for the last two seasons.
In that period the Friars have
won 10 and lost 10.

Friars Get a Lot of Mileage Out of Light Offense

Striking out 11 and allowing only four hits, Tom McAleer completely mastered Rhode Island University's ball team yesterday as Providence College won, 7 to 0, at Hendricken field.

McAleer rarely was in serious difficulties and when danger impended, his fast ball and curve swooped past hitters for third strikes. Moreover he beat out a bunt, squeezed in a run and generally comported himself in the accepted manner.

Although the Friars got 11 hits off Tony Horton and Carl Stahl, their attack hardly was overwhelming. They got a lot out of a little. The bunt was their most

potent weapon and they used it judiciously, five of their hits progressing no farther than the infield grass.

Horton passed Art Aloisio, the first PC batter, and that proved all McAleer needed to win for Aloisio stole second and scored on Dick Howe's single. In the fourth Bob Woods got his second hit (he went 4 for 4, three in the infield), advanced when McAleer walked and scored on Aloisio's single.

PC's sixth was profitable, if not thunderous. Hank McQueeney opened with a triple, scored as Dick Lendrum threw wide on Jerry Romberg's ground-er. McQueeney made it by a ma-

jestic slide. Woods bunted safely and as McAleer approached the plate another bunt situation became obvious.

So Coach Bill Beck of the Rams instituted a shift that put the Williams' shift to shame. He moved his third baseman in close enough to shake hands with McAleer and put his centerfielder at third. Horton whistled two strikes past McAleer, so Beck returned his boys to their accustomed posts.

Then McAleer made the tactic look sound. He bunted, but beautifully, on third strike and the bases were full. The bunt stopped on the spot Lendrum had abandoned. Two runs scored when Jack Wojcik, trying to pick off Romberg, threw into left field (a ricochet off the sliding Romberg's leg) and another came in shortly thereafter when Howe walked, forcing in the run.

Woods scored the last run on a perfectly executed squeeze bunt by McAleer. McAleer, by the way, walked only two and nicked two more with pitches, but all told had himself a time.

Two good double plays enlivened the proceedings, Ken Dellner of State throwing out McQueeney at the plate after taking McAleer's fly in the second and, in the fifth McQueeney doubling Lendrum off first, by at least 45 feet, after making a good catch of Wojcik's hard smash. Pete DeMasi did a grand job at short for the Rams.

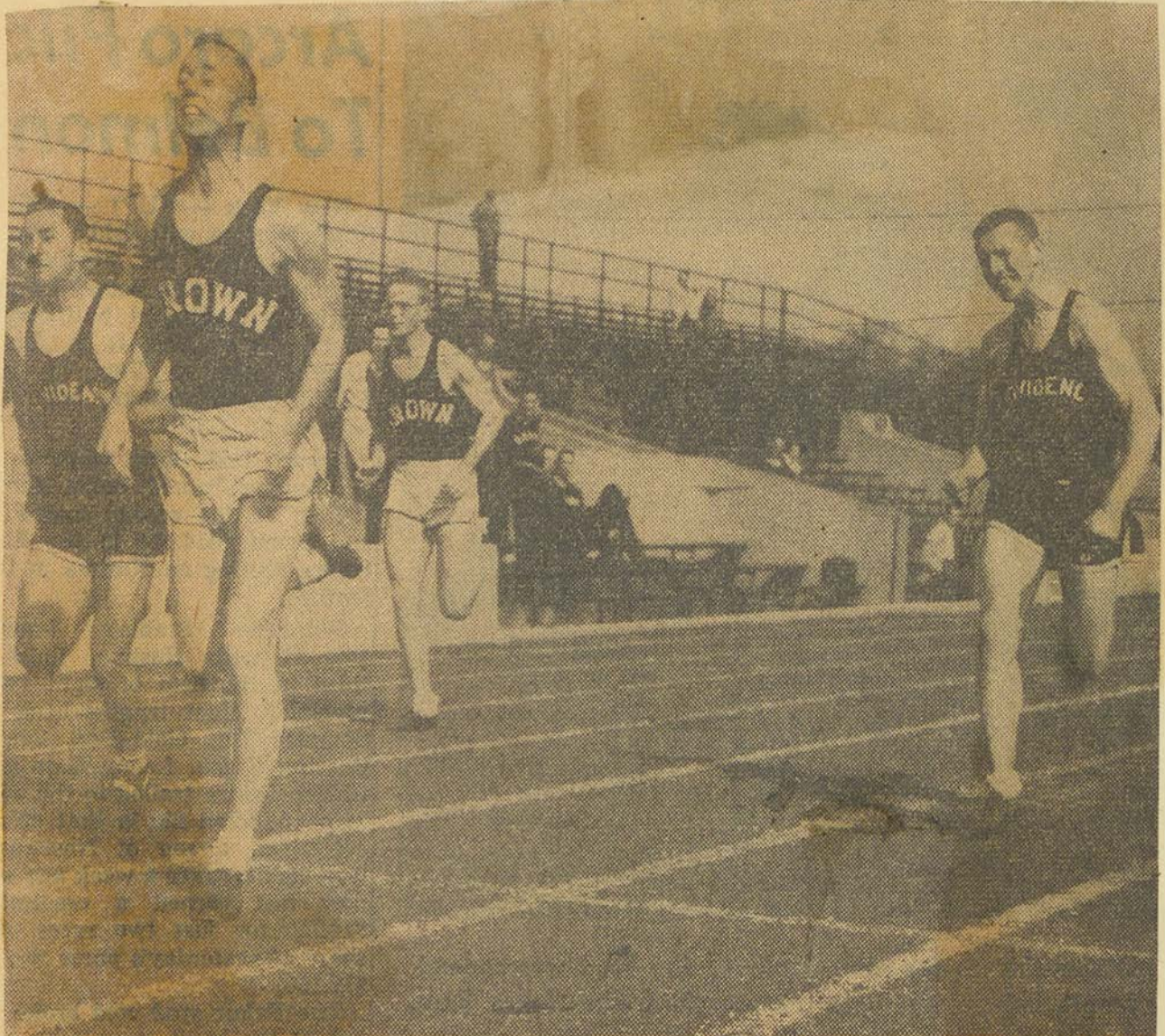

Harry Josephson pitched Brown to a 5-0 victory over Providence College yesterday at Hendricken Field and with it went the intra-state championship for the Bruins.

The triumph closed the season for the Bruins and enabled them to finish on the "plus" side. This one was their ninth; they lost eight and tied one.

Josephson gave four hits and was in difficulty only once — this despite a pitching arm that was slightly sore from inoculations received on Monday.

Trouble, Trouble

Fred forced in Brown's first run — all that was needed, as it developed—in the third. Murgo and Nash paired singles and each advanced when Art Aloisio booted Josephson's grounder. Then Bill Cronin walked, forcing in Murgo.

Cronin Scores

Cronin scored Brown's second run when he walked in the sixth, reached third on an error and came in on Pete Tutless' fine sacrifice bunt.

Murgo doubled as second batter in the seventh, moved to third on Nash's infield hit and scored on an error. Brown's last two runs came in the eighth and were accomplished on the combination of three hits, a walk and two errors.

The Friars' one big inning was the third. With one out, Bob O'Connell singled and O'Neill lined out. Then O'Connell stole second and Aloisio walked. Josephson was charged with a balk and he filled the bases by walking Bobby Reall. He got out of it though, when Dick Howe flied to right field and he didn't give another hit until the ninth.

No. 2 for Joe

The victory was Josephson's second against two defeats for the season and gave Brown the state title with a 3-1 record to the Friars second - place 2-2. Rhode Island has a 1-3 record.

The Friars' season record now is 6-9. They will play Springfield today at Hendricken Field, starting at 3 p.m. Carl Buniva will be their pitcher.

Friars Now Far From Grid Wars But Past Is Rich With Memories

There was not much sign of football on Hendricken Field, just a few kids fooling around in one corner. But then the Providence College Friars haven't been represented on the gridiron for years as college football is measured these days.

And if the Friars went back into football tomorrow, which they won't, they would have to develop many new rivalries. The Friars played a rough schedule in their day and many of their football opponents are merely ghosts of the gridiron today. Holy Cross, Springfield and Rhode Island are operating but how about the others.

La Salle College, the NCAA basketball champion now, was a PC foe. And so too were Niagara, Manhattan, St. Anselm's, St. Bonaventure, Canisius, Catholic University, Duquesne, City College of New York, Long Island University and Lowell Textile at one time or another.

Spread the Word

The Friars in a sense are still represented on the gridiron because many Providence alumni are in the coaching field, both in Rhode Island, New England and in the New York area.

And the Friars, coached in turn by Archie Golembeski, Joe McGee and Hughie Devore, faced some talented mentors: Benny

Friedman, Clem Crowe, Joe Bach, Dutch Bergman, Cleo O'Donnell, Dr. Eddie Anderson and Joe Shekeetski, Frank Keaney. Crowe was the coaching king of Canadian football recently.

In fact Crowe was coach of the last team to beat the Friars. The Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., director of athletics at PC, recalled that final season yesterday.

"We played La Salle in Philadelphia on Saturday and beat them, 20 to 7, in a pretty good game," he said. "Then we went on to Cincinnati where we met Xavier on Thanksgiving Day. Xavier beat us, 33-0, but they had a powerhouse that year, losing only to Kentucky."

Understatement

Powerhouse is practically an understatement in describing Crowe's Xavier club. They won nine out of 10 and beat Georgetown after they played the Friars. For comparative purposes, Denny Meyers' BC team, including Mike Holovak, Eddie Doherty and Monk Maznicki, and Xavier each defeated the Georgetown Hoyas, 14-6.

But after the 1941 season a good many colleges gave up football and never picked it up when things were more normal after World War II. But you still meet people who talk about PC football. Occasionally a former Friar breaks into print.

Last weekend Larry Drew, an outstanding basketball man and a fine football player with the Friars, worked the URI-UMass game as field judge. Maybe it was his presence on the field but I was reminded strongly of a PC legend that actually happened.

Recovery

At one point in Saturday's game the UMass center made a very damaging pass over the kicker's head on a punt situation. Tommy Whelan, the kicker, ran back to the ball, picked it up and got it off for a fine "out" in a bad situation.

PC alumni tell a story of Charlie O'Keefe, now in the coaching field. Charlie, who could kick either foot and did in practice, chased a similar pass that went beyond him, against Boston University. He picked up the ball on the run and kicked it left footed back over his head, like a soccer player, which he was. And it was a fine kick despite the trouble O'Keefe had in getting it away.

One year when Hugh Devore was coaching at PC, two of the best backs in the country were on Hendricken Field every day and ineligible for the team, which needed running backs and power. Joe Dulkie, just out of Fordham, where he played on

some great teams, was the backfield coach, while Mario (Motts) Tonelli worked out every day to stay in shape for his weekend play with the Steam Roller, then coached by McGee.

Tonelli was a Notre Dame product who later played with the Cardinals and also came back from war service in the Pacific after being given up for dead. He and Dulkie could have made a good many backfields in the country that year.

Hank Soar and Charlie Avedisian played and starred with the New York Giants after their days at PC. Hank scored the winning touchdown on a pass from Ed Danowski when the Giants were champions of the pro football world.

No, PC doesn't have any football today, just some memories.

Terry is a fraternal brother of B. U.'s last cross country champ,

Johnny Kelley, last year's winner of the I. C. 4-A. title. By taking yesterday's race, Terry equalled Kelley's sophomore pace of winning eight straight without defeat.

Hanlon Freshman Champion

The former soldier, who held three United States Army championships, was expected to romp yesterday. But there were unexpected developments. Tech, a school its own coach, Oscar Hedlund, claimed was up against too much to do better than third, edged in to win the team championship with 125 points, five better than Connecticut. Providence was third with 138, one point ahead of Rhode Island, while New Hampshire eased home ahead of favored Maine, 142 to 146.

The 25th annual freshman run also failed to follow form. An 18 year old former Rhode Island interscholastic mile and cross country champ, Billy Hanlon of Providence, ran away from favored John Fawcett of Tufts in the last mile to beat teammate Gerard Corrado by 15 yards in 14m. 50s. over

the 2.5 mile route, with Fawcett 25 more yards astern.

The only question concerning the individual varsity competition was Terry's time and whether he could cover the distance more quickly than Northeastern's Ed Shea did a year ago. Terry was caught in 20m.53.4s., 10 seconds off Shea's mark. But it was explained the course was 200 yards longer than the route a year ago. Had he gone all out in the last quarter mile, it was estimated he would have broken 20:40, although his first mile of 4m.40s. probably precluded any chance of that.

Anchor Holds 75-Yd. Margin At the Finish

St. John's Prep won the annual Providence College Invitation Four-mile Relay yesterday for the second straight year. Harry Howell's junior Redmen did it with a flourish too.

They set a possible national schoolboy mark for the infrequently run distance in addition to a meet record. And probably more important to them, they licked their two keen rivals from Brooklyn, Bishop Loughlin High School and St. Francis Prep.

The winners' foursome of Ed Goehring, Bob McKay, Frank Treutlein and Tom Cawley, running in that order, toured the 11 laps on the board track at Hendricken Field in 18:53.2. This was 6.2 seconds better than the mark set by Hope High School in 1949 and 11.8 seconds better than the Redmen's time of last year.

Their performance casts into disrepute a record that has been disputed ever since it was established. The Blue Wave supposedly ran one lap short of four miles. The mark was erased from the books at one point, but was restored last year.

6 R.I. Teams

Harry Coates, Friar track coach and meet director, said the Redmen's time was the fastest he knew of in schoolboy circles and that he would submit the mark to the National High School Federation for acceptance as a national record.

Six Rhode Island teams were among the 12 entered, but the top local performer, La Salle, could do no better than sixth, more than a minute behind St. John's. St. Raphael Academy, Mt. Pleasant, Hope, Hartford Public, Coventry, and Lockwood followed the Maroon in that order.

A Bishop Loughlin foursome placed second with a 19:01 clocking, and St. Francis Prep was close on its heels in third place with 19:05. Chaminade High School of Mineola, Long Island, was fourth in 20:01.8 and Danbury, Conn., High School placed fifth in 20:08.

Danbury, coached by Dan O'Grady, former La Salle mentor, was the only team running in the second heat that displaced a first-

heat team. It edged Hartford Senior Public High School by 58.2 seconds when times were compared. O'Grady's foursome ran in a heat with six Rhode Island schools and defeated them all.

McKay Sparkles

Its margin over La Salle came on the strength of a strong anchor leg by big Don Karcheski, the Connecticut low-hurdles champion, who took over the lead from the Maroon's Keer McIntyre with nine and one-half laps to go and held it to the tape, though McIntyre was closing the gap at the end. Ray Dwyer, Maroon coach, claimed Danbury had run 10 instead of the required 11 laps, but decided not to protest because no important placings were at stake. Don Lendry, Maroon cross-country runner who was counting the Danbury laps, said the required number had been completed.

St. John's impressive showing was sparked by Bob McKay, a tall senior and only survivor from last year's winning foursome. He turned in a 4:37.5 mile while running in the No. 2 spot. McKay took over the lead from Bishop Loughlin's Charlie Goetz at the half-mile mark. The winners never trailed from that point. Loughlin's anchorman, Tom Cummings, made a fine bid to get back in the race with Cawley, but he faded from his

early efforts. Cawley had 75 yards at the tape.

Gold medals and a plaque went to the winners. Silver medals were awarded to the runners-up and bronze medals to the third-place

Friars in Varsity Debut On Boston Garden Ice

Providence College opens its first formal hockey season the hard way tonight—with a game against Boston College, the perennial Eastern powerhouse.

The Friars and Eagles, who met for the first time in hockey last season, play the first game in a doubleheader at the Boston Garden at 7 p.m. Harvard and Northeastern are paired in the second game.

John Kelley's sextet has lost some illustrious names through graduation — Bob Kiley, Bob Babine, Jack Caniff, Billy Maguire—but it is also getting an unexpected lift from returning servicemen.

They are Ed Emery, a 6:3, 190-pound defenseman who will team with veteran Norbert Timmons on the first defense, and Billy Leary, a sophomore from Arlington, Mass., who is expected to be the sparkplug of their second line.

NCAA Choice

Besides Timmons, Capt. Dick Dempsey, first-line winger, is the only returnee from last year's starting six, an NCAA tourney choice. Dick Michaud, a 5:8 sophomore from Amesbury, will center the Dempsey line with Frank Quinn, a junior from Melrose, on his other wing. In the goal will be Chick D'Entremont, a junior from Stoneham and a one-time pupil of Brown's Don Whiston.

Kelley terms this his "team of the future" because of the preponderance of sophomores—there are 11 on the squad as against six juniors and three seniors. It will be no surprise, however, if the sextet produces in the "here

and now" under Kelley's inspiration and deft handling. The material is there.

PC Coach Dick Rondeau will operate with almost the same team as last year's. The one new face belongs to Tom Army, a service returnee who is expected to add scoring punch to the Friars' second line.

Three Sophs

There will be three sophomores, former Malden Catholic performers, in the Friars' starting lineup—Rod Gorman at center, Mike McDonough at defense and Phil Crawford in the goal. Gorman will center for Bob Reall and Ed Monahan. Paul Lagueux from St. Dominic High School, Lewiston, Maine, will pair with McDonough.

In last year's game, the Eagles overpowered the Friars, 8-5, with a four-goal final period. The losers had led, 3-2, and 5-4 at the first and second-period marks.

Tomorrow PC plays Tufts at the Auditorium and Brown meets Northeastern in a doubleheader that starts at 7 p.m.

Paced by Mike Pascale, a sophomore, the Providence College Friars opened their basketball campaign with an 83-71 triumph over Assumption's much-improved quintet last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

The small and scrappy Greyhounds, with one of their best teams in years, put up a fairly good game against the Friars. Providence College looked very good in spots with its sophomore-studded lineup.

Pascale, an outstanding member of last season's freshmen squad, led the Friars with 23 points. However, a pair of juniors from Brooklyn, Don Moran and Ralph Tedesco, also did a fine job with 17 points each.

Despite the closeness of the score and the fact that the Friars have beaten Assumption in 20 straight meetings, it was a fine game for an opener.

Although the Friars were in command for the most part, the speedy Greyhounds kept within range with some one-hand shooting and some hustling play.

John Ritch, the Friars' '65" sophomore center, did outstanding work around the boards, especially in the first half, and indicated he will partially fill the spot that the Friars have been weak in for several seasons.

Ritch chipped in 12 points and did an outstanding job in gathering in loose balls.

The Friars started at a fast pace and built up an 11-4 advantage, in which Ken Kerr, Ritch and Moran featured. Then the Greyhounds put on a drive, closed to 17-18 and pretty well matched the Friars, point for point, for the first 15 minutes. In the closing minutes of the half, the Friars scored 12 points, mostly by Moran and Pascale, and had a 31 lead at halftime.

In the second half, Tedesco and Pascale started working in combination and clicked for 12 points in about seven minutes. Tedesco gave the Friars a 21-point lead and decided the game, but the Worcester quintet showed no signs of quitting and came back longer than ever.

They put in several one-hand shots, notably by Joe Bouchard, Joe O'Brien, and played very well for a period of about seven or eight minutes.

Capt. Ken Kerr, starting his first season, did a fine floor job. Moran was the most-improved player among the newcomers. Coach Vin Cuddy, well satisfied with the victory, used 11 players, relieving the pressure on when he could. It was easily the best Assumption team the Friars have met in the last four or five seasons.

Frank Tirico, a New York City product, led Ernie Calverly's freshman squad with 33 points as the Friars scored their second victory of the season by downing Leicester Junior College, 94-57. The Providence team outscored Leicester, 43-24, in the first half and 51-33 in the second.

Tom Army Back

Tom Army, a senior and son of the R.I. Reds' trainer, is the only new face on the squad. He has returned after a stint in the Army. Rondeau says Army's presence will do wonders for the Friars' attack.

Rondeau is breaking up the Bob Reall-Ed Monahan-John

Sweeney line after two years of playing together and is moving Rod Gorman, a sophomore from Malden Catholic, into Sweeney's center post. "Roscoe" will be the playmaker for the second line with Army and Bernie McCrink, a sophomore from La Salle, at his wings.

The make-up of the third line is anybody's guess at this point with five players battling for three berths. They are John Hobin and Ray Farrell, veterans of PC's earliest postwar hockey efforts, Ed Turcotte, a junior from Woonsocket and two sophomores, Ed Ferry and Norm Auger.

At defense, Dave Reilly and Tom McAleer, the old reliables from La Salle, will be together again for their final season as collegians. In the second defense pairing, not necessarily second string, Mike McDonough, the promising sophomore from Malden Catholic, will play with Paul Lagueux, junior from St. Dominic in Lewiston, Maine. As the fifth backliner the Friars have Herb Hearne, former La Salle football and hockey performer.

Good Workouts

Phil Crawford, a sophomore from the 1953 New England

championship squad at Malden Catholic, appears to have an edge in the battle for the goaltender's post, though Rondeau has competent reserves in Ed Hornstein, former Mt. Pleasant All-Stater, and Ralph Lane of New Haven.

The Friars have looked good in their workouts to date and have outscored both Brown and Boston University in scrimmages. Reportedly, however, they have had a real battle from their own freshmen.

This is understandable when one scans the freshman roster, which reads like a who's who of last year's New England schoolboy championship. From Hamden, Conn., High School, the titlist, comes Dick Stratton, Al McMahan and defenseman Lou LaFontaine. From Burrillville are Ted Carter, Buz Boisvert and Dan Malley in addition to Roland (Red) Rabitor, former St. Lawrence performer and all-state defenseman in 1953. And from Notre Dame, N.H., the New England runnerup last year, comes Ray Blanchette, all-tourney defenseman. In addition there are two boys from a fine Malden Catholic sextet which failed to make the tourney.

P.C. and Brown Host Teams in Hockey Double

The R.I. Auditorium will stage its first hockey doubleheader between formal college teams tonight when Providence College meets Tufts at 7 p.m. and Brown battles Northeastern at 8:45 p.m.

Several similar cards are scheduled throughout the season with the two local sextets competing.

Don Whiston's Bruins will be after their second victory in two starts against the Huskies, who may be hampered by injuries. The visitors shut out M.I.T., 2-0, in their opener but lost to Yale, 6-1, Saturday night. Brown topped BU, 3-1, in its opener.

Three Northeastern players were

injured in the game with the Elis including Don Whynot, the Huskies' fine goalie who gave the Bruins such a bad time last season in Providence. All are on the doubtful list.

Their starting six will probably line up as follows: Fred Voderer, Capt. Bob Lally and sophomore Dick Johnson on the first line; football captain Sid Watson and Bob (Bq) Averill, an ex-Marine sergeant with Korean War experience, at defense; and Bill Lawn, Whynot's fill-in, in the nets.

Friars Give B.C. Sextet Hard Fight Before Bowing, 4-2

Eagles Hit Empty Cage As P.C. Strives for Tie

Boston — Boston College, a perennial leader in Eastern intercollegiate hockey, had to go all out last night to defeat Providence College, 4-2, in the opener for both sextets at the Boston Garden.

A crowd of 3,872 persons watched the two games.

Dick Rondeau's Friars, playing their initial game as a formal sextet, were pressing the Eagles hard as the end came, trying to erase a 3-2 deficit. With 27 seconds left, Bill Leary, sophomore center, fired the puck into the empty PC cage. Goalie Phil Crawford, who was the defensive star of the night, had been yanked with a minute to go in favor of another forward.

Crawford, a former Malden Catholic star, had 27 saves against 32 for the Eagles' Chick D'Entremont, but these figures are misleading. At least eight of Crawford's stops came against lone breakaways by Eagle players and more than half of his

total were the type that brought applause from the crowd. D'Entremont, of Stoneham, was good also but he had a stout defense in front of him. He did his best work in the final minutes when the Friars were on the target and hungry for the tying score.

Breakaway

Going into the final trailing by 2-1, PC gave up a goal at 1:59 when Leary came in alone on Crawford and tucked it away. The losers got it back at 7:38 with Bernie McCrink, former La Salle defenseman now a forward scoring from a seemingly impossible angle on the right side. Nice teamwork by Tom Army and John (Roscoe) Sweeney, McCrink's linemates for the moment, set up this score.

The Eagles pierced the PC defense frequently in the scoreless first period, but could do nothing with Crawford, one of three PC sophomore starters from the 1953 Malden Catholic New England schoolboy championship sextet. The pudgy net-tender was uncanny in anticipating the enemy's moves and turned back 13 shots in all. Four times Eagle forwards came in on lone breakaways, but none saw the red light for his effort. D'Entremont, the Eagle goalie, had eight saves. He had sustained trouble only once when the Sweeney line buzzed around the cage and peppered him with consecutive shots.

Jim Tiernan, former La Salle all-starter, made his varsity debut for the Eagles midway through the period. A sophomore, he is their fifth defenseman.

The Eagles, NCAA tourney selection last year, went to work early in the second period and had two goals in less than two minutes of one another. Carl Marino, Hamden, Conn., sophomore, took a pass at the goal mouth

from Ed Carroll in the right corner and deflected it past Crawford into the nets. The time was 2:11. Norbert Timmons, veteran Eagle defenseman, got the second at 3:23 when he tipped in the rebound of Bill Leary's hard, waist-high shot. Crawford almost caught Leary's shot, but it slipped through his gloves to the ice.

Friars Score

With the Eagles penetrating to the cage time after time it appeared here that they might put the game away. But the Friars rallied and narrowed the margin to one goal with a score at 10:22. Bobby Reall got it on a sweep down the right alley after taking a neat pass across the goal mouth from Ed Monahan. Reall put it away with a low shot to the far corner. The Friars had a fine chance to tie it up midway through the period when Jerry Forgues went off twice on minor penalties. They put several shots on the cage, but nothing that D'Entremont couldn't handle. Crawford, meanwhile, continued his brilliant play in the Friar nets and stemmed an Eagle tide that threatened to engulf the Providence sextet. At least twice Eagle forwards swept in alone on Crawford without success. Saves were 13 for D'Entremont and six for Crawford in the period.

In the second game of the doubleheader, Harvard drubbed Northeastern 11-1. Ed Frye and Frank Mahoney got two goals each for Harvard.

Friars Trounce Brown in Hockey

Opening Flurry Paves the Way For 5-2 Edge

Providence College got off to a rousing start with three goals in the first period and then kept on going for a 5-2 victory over Brown at the Auditorium last night before 1,800 fans.

This was a big one for Dick Rondeau's forces, marking their first triumph over their intracity rivals and establishing beyond a doubt that they are one of the major teams of New England College hockey.

The winners led by 3-1 and 5-1 at the period marks. The losers' final goal came with less than a minute to play against the Friar reserves and their second-string goal-tender.

Rondeau described the victory as a "true team effort," and the scoring column reflected his words. Five men netted the puck for the winners—Co-captain Bob Reall, John (Roscoe) Sweeney, Eddie Monahan and sophomores Mike McDonough and Rod Gorman.

Good Defense

And everyone pitched in on defense. PC's back-checking and fore-checking was determined at all times. The defensemen were clearing well, and as the final barrier, sophomore goalie Phil Crawford was superb.

It was Crawford's stop on Danny Keefe's penalty shot at 2:45 of the second period that kept the tide running in the Friars' favor. If Keefe had been successful, the Bruins would have closed the gap to 3-2 and would have had almost two periods left to tie it up.

The Friars stopped Keefe except for the assist on Pete Tutless' first goal at 18:08 of the first period. This was a big factor in their victory. Without

their big, rawboned winger going well, the Bruins appeared, last night anyway, to be just another college hockey sextet.

Although the entire PC team did well, McDonough and Crawford deserve special mention. McDonough, who was invited to the Boston Bruins' tryout camp at Lynn, Mass., this fall but didn't go, was equally effective on defense and offense. His goal, the third for PC in the first period, was the picture shot of the night, a sizzling backhand high into the far corner. The pressure was really on Crawford in the nets, but he held up in sensational fashion, never more so than when Keefe, the Bruins' leading scorer, came in on him alone. He had 30 saves. Co-Captain Dave Halvorsen of the Bruins had 32.

The victory was PC's second in three starts. The Friars have also defeated Tufts, 9-7, but lost to Boston College, 4-2. Brown has beaten Northeastern, 8-3, and Boston University, 4-3.

Fast Flurry

The Friars actually won the game with their spirited and skillful play in the first period when they picked up those three goals in less than five minutes. They poured 18 shots in all on the Brown cage during the period. The opener came at 5:31 and was actually tipped in by Brown defenseman Don Arsenault. Reall, who had come sweeping across the goal mouth with the puck, received credit for the score.

Sweeney, second-line center, made it 2-0 just 13 seconds later when he pushed the puck home from in close during a scramble. McDonough found an opening up the middle and tallied with his sharp backhand to the upper right corner at 10:23. The Friars were really flying, and their partisans were chanting, "Roll It Up!"

The Bruins managed to hold them in check for the rest of the period and got one of the goals back when Tutless, standing just outside the crease, deflected Keefe's shot past Crawford.

If the losers had a period last

night it was the second when they put 13 shots on the PC cage as against eight for PC. Their brightest scoring opportunity was Keefe's penalty shot but Crawford got a leg on the puck just as it was about to slip into the right corner along the ice.

Monahan, the winners' slow but extremely clever wing, quashed Brown hopes for a comeback at 16:39 when he fired a 40-footer past Halvorsen. The Brown goalie had a clear view of the shot, but it slipped past him into the upper right corner. Gorman ended any excitement left in the game with his goal at 18:46 of the second period. He put in the rebound from Reall's shot.

The PC freshman team came from behind and nipped the Brown yearlings, 3-2, in overtime. Paul Sainato's goal at 4:06 of the six-minute sudden-death period decided the game. The Friars were losing, 2-1, late in the third period. With a minute to play Rondeau pulled his goalie out of the cage, and the move paid off when John Cullen, a Canadian student scored from a scramble at 11:10.

Harvard's Cleary Tallies Six In 10-3 Blast on Friar Sextet

Boston—Billy Cleary, Harvard's celebrated center, scored twice as many goals as the entire Providence College team last night in leading the Crimson to a 10-3 victory over the Friars at the Boston Garden before 1,000 spectators.

Northeastern defeated Boston University, 8-4, in the nightcap.

The chunky former Belmont Hills skater poked home six goals and two assists for a total of eight points. Although official information was not available last night, long-time observers of Harvard hockey said Cleary's total might be an individual record against major opposition.

Only one his goals was a cheap one. At the five-minute mark of the final period he was checked hard 20 feet out, but his soft shot along the ice eluded Phil Crawford as the P.C. goalie tried to pick it up with his gloved hand.

The period scores were 4-0 and 6-3.

Wrecks Friars' Chances

Cleary's amazing performance wrecked the Friars' chances of victory, although the Providence team came up with a strong offensive show of its own. The Friars put 39 shots on the cage as against 24 for Harvard. The Crimson's goalie, Chuck Flynn, was magnificent with the pressure on, and with Cleary formed an effective two-man stopper to Friar hopes.

Ned Bliss, Doug Manchester, Terence O'Malley and Tom Worthen also scored for the Crimson. Tom Army, Capt. Bob Reall and sophomore Rod Gorman scored for the Friars. All their goals came in the second period.

The Friars got an eyeful of Cleary in the first period. He opened the scoring at 10:04 on a solo effort, picking up a loose puck in mid-ice, stichhandling around defender Tom McAleer and pushing a hard shot past Crawford. The P.C. goalie got his stick on the rubber, but the disc caromed off and into the nets.

Sets Up Score

The second goal, 19 seconds later, was the only one of the period the chunky center didn't score, but it was his pass to the goal mouth that set it up. Ned Bliss came swooping across the cage at just the right time and put it away neatly. The final tallies came at 17:10 and 18:33 with Cleary getting the first on a short, soft backhand through Crawford's legs and the second on a close-in shot from the left of the cage.

The Friars actually were the more constant aggressors throughout the period, as evidenced by the 15 shots they put on the Harvard cage, but their efforts were frustrated by Flynn's fine work in the goal. He saved on a breakaway by Reall at the 9-minute mark, stopped Gorman cold in front of the cage at 15:45 and checked the losers' last bid by John Sweeney 30 seconds before the period buzzer.

Tom Army Scores

Although they made it 4-1 at 5:57, when Tom Army put in the rebound with Mike McDonough's shot, the Friars still couldn't cope with Cleary in the second period. He took a pass at the goal mouth from Capt. Scott Cooledge and converted it at 6:51 and then scored unassisted from in close at 8:13. At this point he was injured slightly and went out briefly. With this, P.C. perked up and bagged two goals within 25 seconds at the 11-minute mark. Gorman tucked away the rebound from McAleer's 40-footer after Flynn appeared to have saved successfully, and then Reall grabbed a loose puck and battled his way in for a score.

The Crimson played defensive hockey until the end of the period. With 40 seconds remaining and a face-off in the Harvard zone, Dick Rondeau pulled his goalie out and used six forwards. Worcester — The Holy Cross Crusaders ran up a 34-point lead in the first half and coasted to a 101-to-47 victory over Providence College before less than 1,000 fans last night at the Worcester Auditorium.

Tom Heinsohn, one of the outstanding players in the East this season, turned in a fine job for Holy Cross, seeking to regain its place in the basketball sun after a bad performance last weekend at New York.

The Crusaders ran up their highest scoring total for the season with Dick Santaniello, a former La Salle athlete from North Providence, dropping in the basket that put the Cross over the century mark. There were two seconds left to play when the Cross finally hit on its 45th hoop for its 100-point total.

The Friars were never really in contention although they played an improved game in the second half. Holy Cross got the jump in the early minutes of play and set a fast pace throughout. Last night the Crusaders were a sharp looking club, even if the Friars weren't.

Heinsohn Hurt

Holy Cross played about as well as it has in any of its winning games this season. The Crusaders shot exceptionally well, hitting on 45 shots in 92 attempts while the Friars managed to get 17 hoops in 73 shots, well below par.

Heinsohn, a strong candidate for most all-star teams, was hurt in the first few minutes of play when he and the Friars' Ken Kerr collided near the PC basket. After a brief respite, he resumed play and did an outstanding job, offensively and in the rebounding departments.

Heinsohn scored 26 points, some on tap-ins and some on hook shots. He outrebounded the Friars with Kerr doing PC's best work on the boards. The Union City, N.J., junior scored

his 26 points by sinking 12 hoops in 20 shots, plus two free throws. Wally Supronowicz scored 20, getting 10 baskets in 13 tries.

This was the Cross' widest margin of victory over a PC team since the informal days in the 20's.

With Heinsohn as their key man, the Crusaders showed good team, speed and ballhandling. Joe Early, Joe Liebler, Supronowicz, Frank Kasprzack and Tom Burke all worked nicely.

Coach Buster Sheary was pleased with the all-around job turned in by his squad, especially Heinsohn. It was Holy Cross' ninth straight decision over PC teams since the early 40's.

Holy Cross, controlling the boards effectively, never gave the Friars much room to breathe, much less get a sustained offensive rolling. The Friars scored only four baskets in the first half as Holy Cross led, 51-17, at intermission.

With Ken Willoughby and Frank Williams playing well, the Friars showed to better advantage in the second half but were still outclassed. Willoughby did a real good job, and scored 10 points.

The Holy Cross Frosh scored their first victory in five games with a 60-50 triumph over the PC yearlings in the opener. The Cross outscored the Friars 25-21, in the first half and 35-29 in the second. Joe Hughes, a Central Falls product, was prominent in the Crusader attack with 12 points.

Gordon Holmes and Pete Dugan led the young Friars with 17 and 13 points, respectively.

Troy, N.Y. — Providence College's basketball team snapped a six-game losing streak here last night by scoring a 77-71 victory over Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

But victory had its price for the Friars as they lost the services, temporarily at least, of John Ritch, 6:6 sophomore center who suffered a sprained ankle early in the second half.

Prior to his injury, which occurred during a battle under the boards, Ritch had dominated the rebounding as the Friars built up a 35-25 halftime lead. After his departure, Sonny DeCecco and Joe Pagano sparked an RPI rally that enabled the Engineers to go ahead at 56-55 with eight minutes to go.

PC Rallies

At that point Gus Westerhuis and Ken Kerr rallied the PC forces quickly and after the Friars regained the lead, they held onto it to the finish.

The Friars took charge in the early going and built up a 25-16 advantage after 10 minutes. PC's attack then bogged down momentarily and Bobby Deluca led an RPI surge that cut the deficit to 23-27 at the 15-minute mark.

Then Larry Connolly came off the PC bench and set up some fast breaks that lifted the Friars to their 10-point halftime perch.

During the first 20 minutes, Kerr did an excellent job of holding DeCecco in check. The latter, who had been averaging 26 points a game, was limited to two points over that stretch. When Ritch was injured, in the second half, Kerr had to switch to guard Deluca.

Moran Top Scorer

Don Moran, who drew a number of free-throw opportunities as the result of his driving tac-

tics, paced the PC scoring with 19 points. He sank 13 of 17 foul shots. Mike Pascale scored 17 and Kerr 13. Ken Willoughby turned in a fine job around the backboards for the Friars.

Ronnie Cassedella and DeCecco shared scoring honors for RPI with 16 points each.

The victory was the second in eight games for the Friars. They will meet American International tonight at Springfield.

making his first start for P.C., in place of Ritch, racked up 14 points but lacked Ritch's all-around experience off the boards. Ritch probably will be out until February.

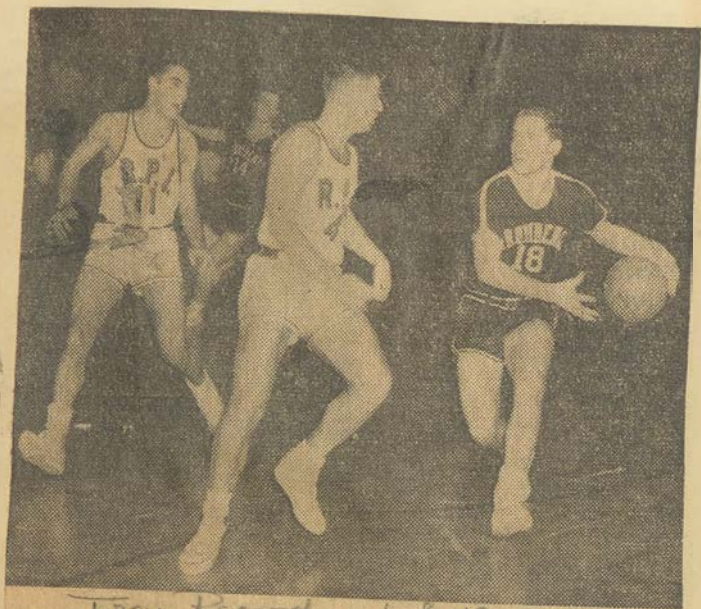

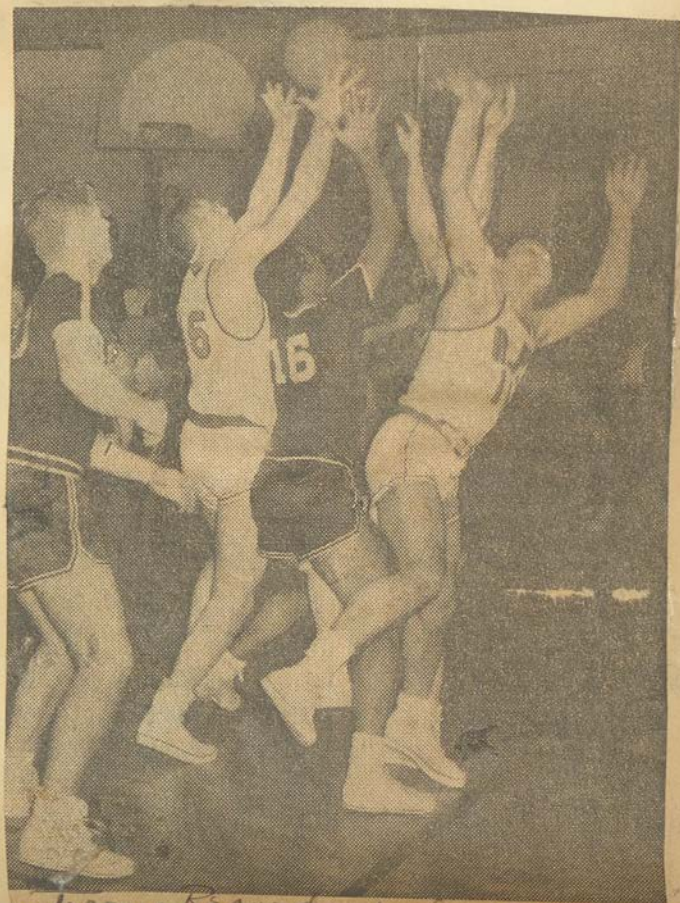

Rensselaer Poly almost hustled the Providence College basketball team right off the court in '87 Gym, but the taller Friars from Rhode Island managed to squeak out a 77-71 decision last night on the Hill.

The Engineers fought back from a 25-35 halftime deficit to take a 60-59 lead early in the fourth quarter. The late stages of the third and the early segment of the last canto saw the lead see-saw back and forth, with the game knotted up seven times before the Friars moved ahead 66-61 midway in the period. They hung on to the lead by playing possession ball and cashing in on their foul shots.

The Polymen moved up to 66-69, 68-70, and 70-72 margins but were unable to overtake the Rhode Islanders. Ken Kerr and Don Moran were the wheels in the last ditch stand by Providence, Kerr caging three important field goals and Moran chipping in with four timely free throws and two goals.

De Cecco Warms Up.

For the RPI quintet, a cold-shooting Sec De Cecco and Frank Cassella led the scoring parade. De Cecco, averaging 26 points per game, chipped in only one field goal in the first half but came through with 14 points in the second half to tally 16. Cassella equalled his teammate's achievements on five shots from the floor and six charity tosses. Bob Pagana and Vic Nadaskay came through with 13 and 12 points respectively and sophomore Don De Luca tapped in ten for the Kalbaughmen.

The first half was all Providence with big John Ritch of Providence utilizing his 6-foot-5 height effectively on rebounds and tap-ins to score eight points for the Friars. The Polymen held their own with the visitors for the first ten minutes, but fell behind in the second portion of the first half as Ritch and Moran paced the Black and White to the ten-point halftime lead.

Ritch Injured.

The Friars suffered a blow when Ritch hurt his right ankle in a scrimmage under the Rhode Island basket. He was helped to the dressing room, and then the Engineers began to creep up. Boston College, showing far more drive and determination, handed the Providence College Friars a 65-40 setback last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

The margin of victory was decisive in a game that had shaped up as a fairly even scrap off their respective records. The Friars were handicapped by the loss of their center, John Ritch, who is injured, but turned in an ineffective performance generally and scored only three baskets during the entire second half.

The Eagles, who have been hot and cold, played a fairly good game. At times they ran and passed the ball well but PC never seemed to get rolling and the outcome was a forgone conclusion early in the second half.

The defeat was one of the worst for the Friars since the resumption of basketball after World War II. Rarely have they been unable to score 50 points and have registered more than 40 many times in recent seasons in one half.

Smart Game

The Eagles once defeated Providence, 84-54, in the postwar period. Last night the Friars scored only 22 points in the first half and once hit a 10-minute stretch in which they produced six points, four free throws and a basket.

The Eagles played the game smartly. They shot their way into a 15-3 advantage with Tom Cullinane, Dick Skeffington, Pat Cahill and Phil Powell featuring the drive. They had boosted their lead up 24-8, moving the ball and shooting well, before the Friars came to life.

Providence outscored BC, 14 to 12, in the final 11 minutes of the first half, with an aggressive out-

burst. Ken Willoughby's hustle, Walt Malecki's fight and Mike Pascale's shooting were the main ingredients. However, the Eagles held a comfortable 36-22 lead at halftime.

Due for a Night

Powell played an outstanding game off the boards for the Eagles. BC outscored PC, 12-9, in field goals in the first half, and 13-3 in the second. The Friars also lost ground on the free-throw line when they were within a reasonable distance. Dick Rondeau's sextet has played

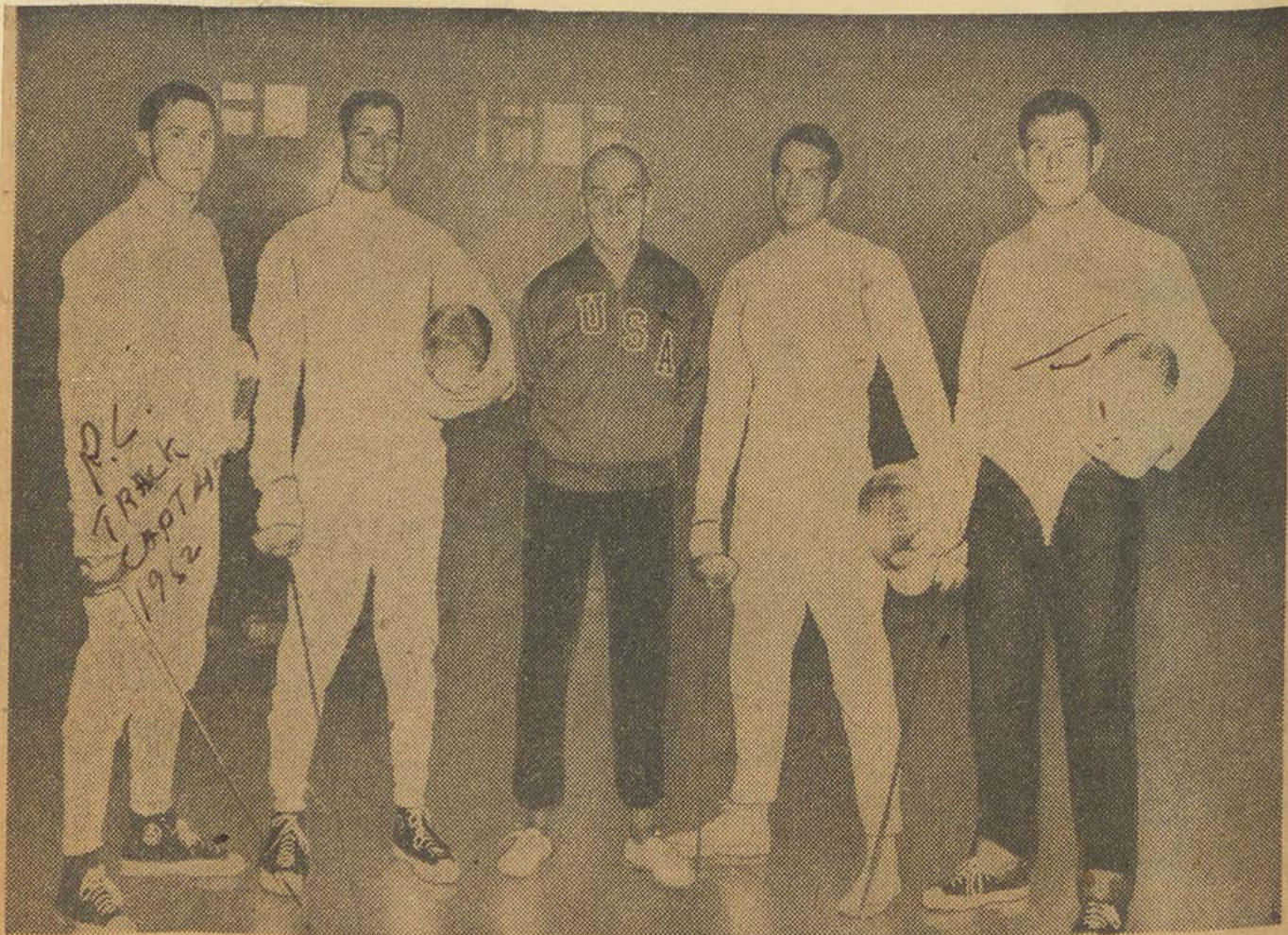

Providence College came up with three quick goals early in the second period that broke open its hockey game with Northeastern last night and enabled the Friars to go on to a 7-1 victory. A crowd of 250 was present at the Auditorium.

Army Stars
Tommy Army, second-line forward, sparked the Friars second-period surge by netting goals at

Other Friar scorers were Rod Gorman and defensemen Dave Reilly and Mike McDonough.

The Huskies couldn't mount much of an attack against the close-checking winners. Their outstanding performer was the goalie, Bill Lawn, who stopped 37 shots, a fair night's work in any league. Phil Crawford played commendably in the Friars' nets and had 18 saves.

The Friars had a big edge offensively in the first period, but it took a stroke of luck for them to leave at the end, leading, 2-1. With the score tied at 1-1 and 39 seconds left in the period, McDonough fired toward the cage from just inside the Huskies blue line. The shot was wide to the right but it hit Ted Williamson and angled into the cage through Lawn's legs. The Huskies had tied it up at 13:19 from a scramble. Heerter put it in after two teammates had failed.

Dull Final Period
The Friars put 18 shots on the cage as against 7 for Northeastern.

Coach Vin Cuddy took a time out with PC in possession and 60 seconds remaining. He told his men to play for a real sure shot but Kerr fouled Paul Grogan trying to drive with 11 seconds remaining.

Close But Out

Grogan's first one was close but rolled off. His second missed completely and PC came up with the rebound. Frankie Williams hustled it upcourt. They gave it to Ritch in the corner. He adjusted his aim and the ball went through clean for the winning basket.

The Friars weren't stylish last night but you couldn't say they didn't hustle. Cuddy didn't mince any words in his pregame and halftime talks to the team and they played aggressive basketball. The score was tied at 24-all at halftime.

Pascale's scoring was noteworthy but so, too, was the defense floor work of his mates. The PC centers, Pat Grady, Larry Collamore, Ritch and at times Ken Willoughby, did a fine job in the recovery of rebounds. And they bothered Springfield's big men.

With Colonel Pete Tutless leading the charge, Brown's hockey team got their "fustes' with the mostes'" last night and whacked Providence College, 10-5, before 1,800 at the Auditorium.

The game ended the home-and-home series between the two sextets this season and evened the count at one game each. The Friars had dumped the Bruins, 5-2, Dec. 13.

Tutless, the pride of Seekonk, Mass. and East Providence High School, scored four goals and three assists. Danny Keefe, a particular PC nemesis, was right behind him with three goals and three assists. The third member of the line, Bill Cronin, had a single goal and four assists.

Most of this scoring by Brown's first line came in the important first period, at the end of which the winners were ahead, 6-2. At the second period mark it was 7-3.

Brief Rally

Don Whiston's squad got off to a 1-0 lead at 1:42 of the first period on Keefe's short backhand and were never again behind. At the seven-minute mark at was 3-0. The Friars rallied midway through the period, scoring two goals in less than a minute and making it 3-2, but this tide reversal was only temporary.

Dick Rondeau tried everything, including all three of his goalies, to check the Brown surge, but it was one of those nights when the other team was really hungry and nothing short of a bricked-up cage would have stopped them. PC should know. They were in the same mood in the first meeting between the teams.

Although the score was one-sided almost from the start, the Friars kept the interest up throughout with their ever-dangerous attack. They forced Coach captain Dave Halvorsen to make 28 saves, many of them hard ones. The PC goalies, Phil Crawford, Ed Hornstein and Ralph Lane, turned aside 28 shots.

Boomerang

Rondeau had the rinkside critics buzzing midway through the final period. The losers were rallying and had come within three goals of the Bears. With 10 minutes to go and a faceoff in Brown ice, he pulled out his goalie. In a few seconds this unorthodox move boomeranged when Georgie Conn sent one into the empty cords from the center line.

This made it 9-5. The last lingering fears that the Bruins had about the game vanished.

Brown was playing its first game in 16 days and did not have the services of Tommy Thompson, the little center who puts the buzz in its second line. Whiston said Thompson was home in bed with a bad cold.

But the Bruins' first line was hot from the beginning, apparently the better for their long layoff. They were passing well and taking advantage of split-second opportunities. The first eight Brown goals were put in by the first trio.

Conn, a second-line winger, and Ken Rider, junior defenseman converted from a wing this season, put in the other two in the closing stages. Rider's goal, a straightaway effort from about 25 feet out on a pass from Cronin, was his first of the season.

Team Effort

The Friar scoring was spread evenly among Capt. Bob Reall, Rod Gorman, John Sweeney, Bob Monahan and Tommy Army. Reall, Bernie McCrink and Tom McAleer each had two assists.

Whiston described the victory as a team effort. Although the score doesn't particularly reflect this, the Bruin defense played a whale of a game in checking the hard-pressing losers. Captain Bob Borah was a particularly busy and effective defender.

In the freshman game PC outscored the Bruins 7-4 with one of its forwards, Dick Stratton, playing in the goal over the final period. The winners lost their regular goal-tender, Bob Manger, at the end of the second period.

He joined a free-for-all behind the PC cage and was one of four players banished for fighting.

The others were PC's Ray Blanchette and Brown's Ronnie Dashnaw and Paul Prindle.

Friars Shade Brown, 66 to 62

Bruin Rally Checked In Closing Seconds

The Providence College Friars scored a thrilling 66-62 triumph over Brown University in a tense, spirited and tightly-played basketball encounter last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

The Friars, using their more deliberate but scrambling style, held off the determined Bruins in the closing minutes of a contest that was long on excitement and perhaps short on outstanding basketball.

Brown's Eddie Tooley was the game's top scorer with 25 points. He paced the Bruins' second-half drive after the Friars took a

30-22 advantage in the first half. Tooley also picked up a shiner which was non-beautifying, somewhere in the first-half milling from a stray elbow or forearm.

The Friars thus continued their determined efforts that have resulted in victories over Springfield and Brown and a fine performance against BU in their last three games. It appeared that the Friars would make an iron-man effort until Kenny Kerr fouled out with 3:40 remaining and was replaced by Don Moran, who put in a pair of key free throws.

Top Effort

John Ritch, Kerr, Mike Pascale, Ted Tedesco and Frank Williams carried practically the entire load and at times did it brilliantly. Ritch and Pascale were the offensive leaders with 14 and 18 points, respectively, while Kerr, deadly from the foul line, turned in one of his top performances.

The Bruins made a fine drive in the stretch but they were unable to take the lead. They closed the gap from 10 points to two but couldn't get that one extra basket.

The Friars held a 60-54 edge starting the final three minutes and added another point when Tedesco converted a free throw. Brown's Billy Arnold scored a hoop out of a scramble but fouled out seconds later.

Williams' one-pointer made it 62-56 with 1:43 left. Ray Malkiewicz sank two fouls under real pressure that cut PC's lead to four points. Tooley grabbed a

bad pass-in and somehow converted it into a basket. That made it 60-62. But then Eddie missed two free throws that could have tied the score.

In the Clutch

Moran made two clutch contributions for the Friars within seconds. He threw in two free throws in a church-like stillness in the jam-packed gymnasium and then later dove on a loose ball after Brown had several open shots at the basket.

With less than four seconds remaining, Tooley dropped in a layup after a previous effort rolled off the rim. He was fouled on the basket and the Bruins took a time out. Now he could go for the shot but Brown would be one point short even if he made. The Bruins' boss, Stan Ward, had him miss deliberately hoping against hope the Brown team could get the ball and get a basket.

Eddie missed the shot on purpose and then fouled trying to get the ball. Ritch, a steady board man last night, made the two free throws that sewed it up, 66-62.

Providence's foul shooting accounted for 32 points in 42 tries. The game was hard fought, with lots of contact which made the officiating tougher. However, some thought the officiating could have been improved upon.

Lionel Jenkins scored a basket and two free throws in the final minute that enabled the Providence College Freshmen to nail down a 67-64 victory over the Bruin Cubs. It, too, had a thrilling windup. Jerry Alaimo of Brown and Frank Tirico of PC scored 28 and 26 points respectively.

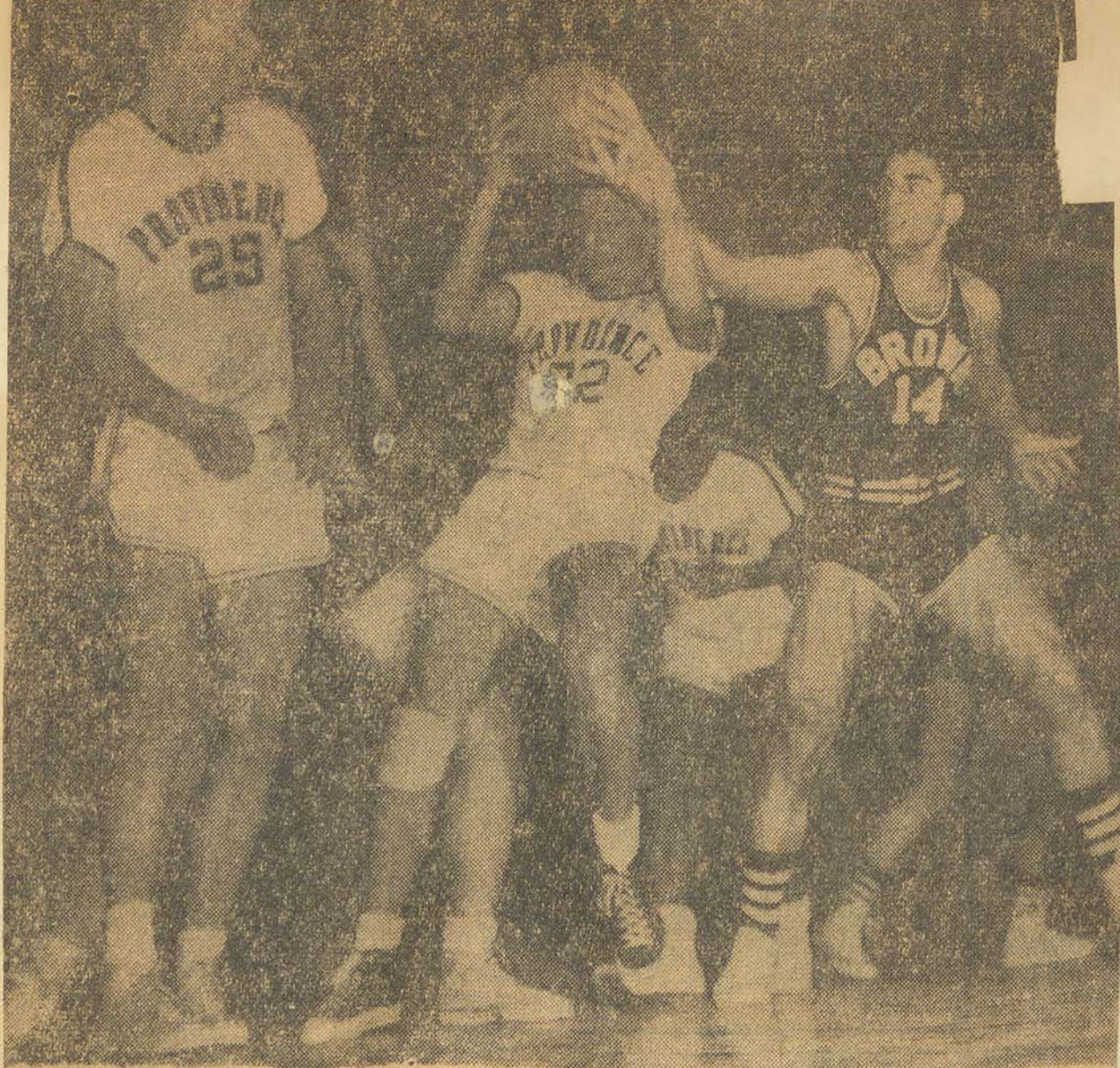

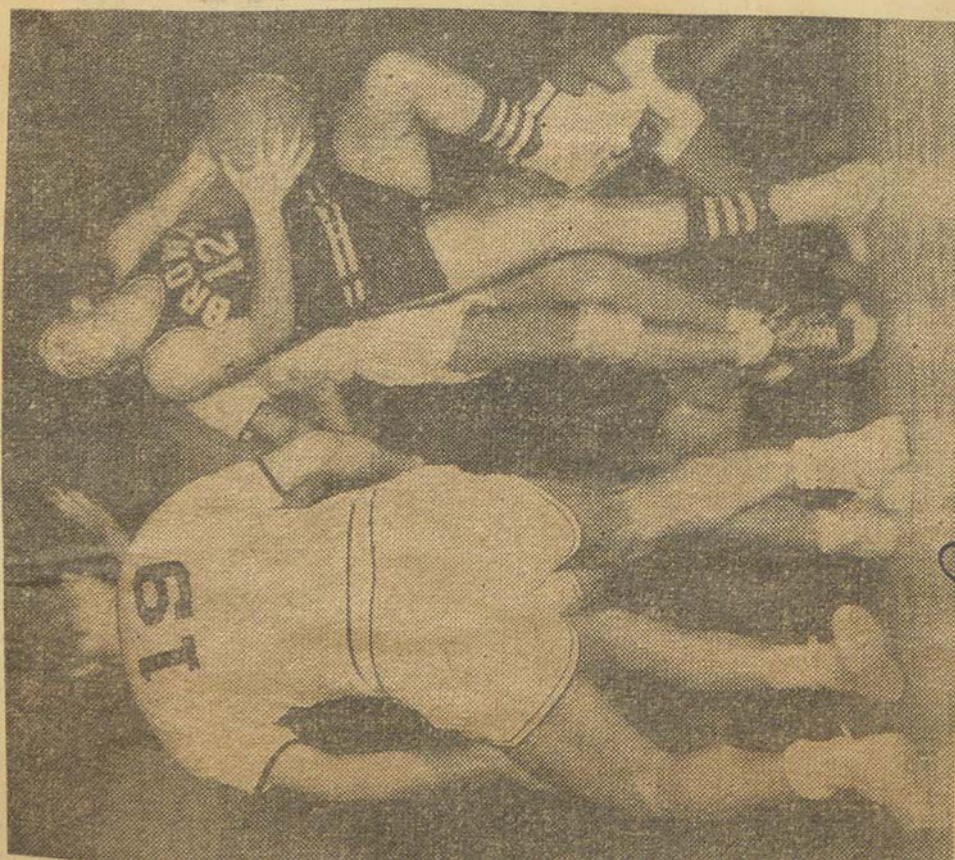

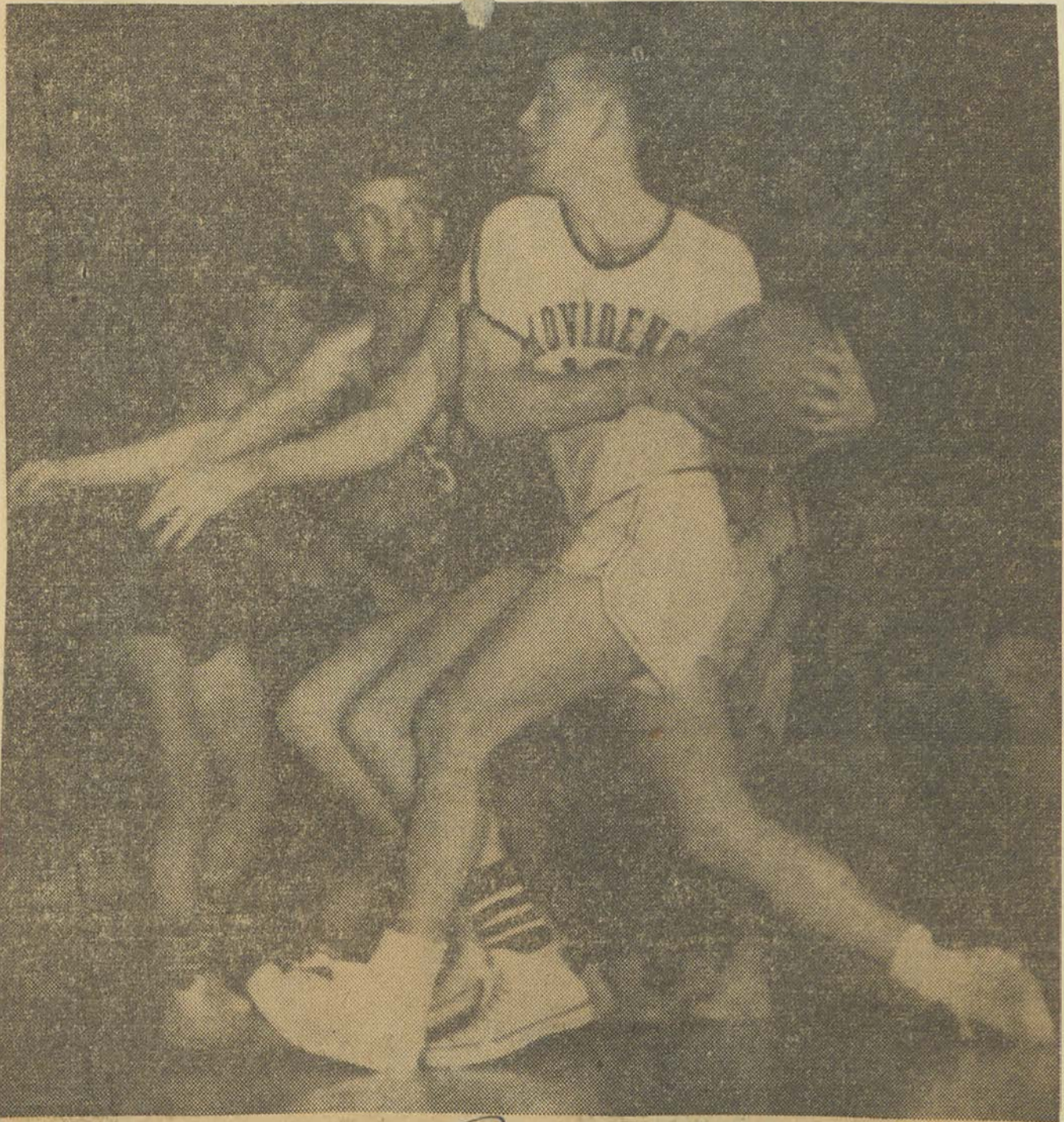

Merrimack Visits P.C. Five; Northeastern Host to Brown

The Providence College Friars meet Merrimack College tonight at 8:30 at Mount Pleasant High School while Brown engages the Northeastern Huskies at Boston.

Merrimack is appearing on the PC basketball schedule for the first time. The team has one of the nation's small-college scoring leaders in Co-captain John Martin. Martin, who played little school-boy basketball, has scored over 400 points to date and was averaging 29.4 nationally, according to figures released last week.

Martin had the second-best scoring average among the smaller New England teams, topped only by Porky Vieira of Quinnipiac. He hit for 49 points in one game, 43 in each of two others and 35 in another. Martin has played most-

ly against minor opposition, but accounted for 43 against St. Anselm's Hawks, who beat the Friars early in the season.

Friars Definite Choice

Providence is a definite favorite. The Friars have played well in their last three games, defeating Springfield and Brown, and losing to BU in a close contest.

"We are playing better defensively and not throwing the ball away as often," comments coach Vin Cuddy of the Friars. "While our offense has picked up, it is our defense that has helped us the most. We are not taking as many shots, but we are not holding the ball either.

"Little Frankie Williams, has steadied our team lately while center John Ritch has been doing a fine job. Kenny Kerr has been very effective. The kids all hustled

and scrapped in our victory over Brown. Teddy Tedesco and Mike Pascale are our shooters and maybe the team is starting to come along," Cuddy said.

While Providence was edging Brown, 66-62, Saturday night, Merrimack dropped a 65-51 decision to Durfee Textile of Fall River. Jack McDaid, a one-hand shot, paced the Warriors in that game with 20 points. The visitors from North Andover, Mass., are coached by Kevin Harrington, who played his college basketball with the St. Louis Billikens.

Providence College's basketball team, showing signs of getting rolling, edged Brown, 66-62, in an intrastate-series contest and held a

10-point lead near the end against a strong rally by the Bruins.

A look at the summary gives the best indication of the difference between the teams in that game. Our Friars scored in a span of 10 minutes from 19 to 23 points. For Brown, Ed Tooley got 25 points, and the next highest man got 19.

The Friars doing the big scoring were John Ritch, the 19-point man; Mike Pascale, who got 18, and Ken Kerr and Teddy Tedesco, who got 13 each.

Frankie Williams, the fifth man, did excellently without scoring and Don Moran, who came in near the end when Kerr fouled out, was most helpful in the big defense staged at the end.

Merrimack played well in the first half. They had the lead seven times as it went back and forth in the first 15 minutes or so. They played smartly and handled the ball well, with Martin and Bill McDade doing a good job of finishing off the play-making setups.

Friars Pull Away

Tedesco, Williams and Ritch, hit for three hoops that put PC definitely ahead, 25-22, but Vinny Gomes' basket cut PC's lead to

one point, 25-24. In the last three minutes of the first half, the Friars pulled away with Kerr's hoop on a pass from Williams and Donie Moran's basket on a drive play the features. This spurt gave the Friars a 35-26 edge but the game appeared closer than that.

Again the teams swapped baskets in the first minutes of the second half. With PC leading 42-34, the Friars went on their hottest drive of the night and just about sewed up the decision. The Friars, leading by eight points, boosted their total to 62 and had a 24-point margin as they scored 20 points against four in a stretch of approximately seven minutes.

Martin, who has a good jump shot, took scoring honors and boosted his season's total to 450 points.

The Providence College Frosh scored a 90-27 victory over the Merrimack Jayvees in the preliminary and this may have had a bad effect on the Friar varsity temporarily.

College Friars turned in their best team effort of the year here last night and defeated Fairfield University, 65-57, for their sixth victory of the season.

With Ken Kerr and Johnny Ritch controlling the boards and Ted Tedesco and Mike Pascale handling the shooting, the Providence team jumped away to an early lead, holding a 39-29 margin at halftime. Ritch, who picked up four fouls in the first period, played in the second half after a brief rest and stayed in action throughout.

In the second half, Jack O'Connell led a Fairfield resurgence that cut the Friar margin to four points, at which point Kerr returned to action and steadied the Friar attack. Kerr played a fine defensive game, holding Dick Gerwien, Fairfield forward who had been averaging 20 points a game, to only 10 points. Gerwien got six foul shots in the first half and two field goals in the second half.

Pascale was the scoring leader with 24 points, with Ritch getting 16 and Tedesco 13. O'Connell led Fairfield with 22.

The Friars used only seven players in the game.

The visitors outscored Fair-

field from the floor by only one basket, 25-24, but held a 15-9 bulge from the free-throw line. Pascale got eight of these.

The victory was the Friars' first in two seasons here and it came over a Fairfield team that had been rated as much better than average by Providence's coach, Vin Cuddy.

Cuddy, incidentally, is a native of this area, and was delighted that the Friars could finally come up with a winning effort hereabouts.

ALL IN THE Game

Introducing the Friars . . .

There'll be a dinner at the Narragansett Hotel Tuesday night "introducing" the Providence College hockey team. The reason for the introduction is that the current Friars of the ice represent what seems certain to be the start of a big era in hockey at P.C., but most of the public and even some of the Friar old grads aren't aware of it. So a group of the alumni has chosen this way to turn the spotlight on Coach Dick Rondeau's colorful band of bladesmen.

Thus far in the season the Friars, playing a stiff schedule, have won six and lost six. That's not an overpowering record, but it's better than it sounds. Two of their losses were by one point, 6-5 to Yale and 12-11 to Tufts; and another defeat, 4-2, at the hands of Boston College, might also have been a one-pointer except that P.C. pulled its goalie near the end in an effort to get a score that would send the game into overtime.

Their two goals in the B.C. game represent the Friars' lowest scoring total of the season. Rondeau, whose scoring exploits in his college hockey days at Dartmouth verged on the fabulous, has been able to inject some of his own ability along those lines into his pupils. There'll probably never be another point-getter like Rondeau, however, who in a single game against Middlebury, his last for Dartmouth, collected an almost unbelievable total of 23 points on 12 goals and 11 assists.

Dick was denied what undoubtedly would have been an illustrious pro hockey career, because of an injury suffered while with the Marines. In a rest camp after going through the Iwo Jima invasion, he went swimming and suffered a broken neck in a shallow-water dive. If it hadn't been for that, he might have become hockey's outstanding American-born player. Now, however, there's some compensation for him in the fact that he's embarked on a successful coaching career in the game he loves.

Bright Future . . .

For, as was pointed out above, the future of hockey at Providence College seems unusually bright. Only three players from this year's varsity squad, Tommy Army, Tom McAleer and Dave Reilly, will be lost by June graduation. Moving up next season will be the manpower from the currently undefeated Freshman squad, which includes most of the cream of last season's New England schoolboy hockeyists. The Friars already have received an invitation to next season's St. Lawrence Carnival, blue-ribbon event for Eastern bladesmen. The hockey reputation of Providence College now is such that the athletic office there is constantly getting inquiries from outstanding schoolboy stars about requirements for admission.

All this had been accomplished in four seasons, during the first three of which the sport was conducted on an informal basis, without full varsity status.

The driving force behind the Friars' entrance into the sport was the Rev. Herman Schneider, O.P., assistant athletic director and hockey moderator. Father Schneider was a Marine chaplain in World War II and, by an interesting coincidence, the young man who did most to convince him that Providence College should play hockey is a former Marine, John Hobin. Coming back to college after service, Hobin joined with some other former high school players in presenting the game's case to Father Schneider. It was a letter Hobin wrote to the priest during the summer that persuaded the latter to urge his superiors to sanction the sport. And, the Marine angle goes further than that, since the gyrene veteran of Iwo Jima, Rondeau, holds the coaching reins.

From Scratch . . .

When they began playing in 1951, the Friars were, of course, starting from scratch. They had no equipment and their budget was limited. The school had no hockey tradition and many were skeptical about the game's survival there. It has not only survived, but has grown amazingly healthy. It hasn't prospered financially yet, but the prospect is that it will.

The success of the sport ought to make one group of old Friar grads particularly happy. That would be the bunch which played on the only other Providence College hockey team previous to 1951, the squad of 1927, which included Tom (Junie) Bride, Ed Cunningham, Johnny Graham, Frank McKenna and Dr. Frank Moran, among others. They hoped then that they had pioneered in a game that would become a permanent part of the college athletic program. It was dropped the next year, however, for lack of support. Now their game is alive and thriving again at Alma Mater.

The hope is that a goodly number of the old hockey Friars will be on hand Tuesday night to be introduced along with the young Friars.

It will be the last local public appearance of the current P.C. squad, since its remaining three games are away. That is, it will be the last unless the Friars and Brown, who have split even in two games, could be persuaded to meet in a rubber match. That one would seem to be a natural for a March of Dimes benefit.

Kenny Kerr, Friar Hoop Captain, Reaches Apogee of Cage Career

Kenny Kerr, whose angelic expression frequently belies his tenacious covering of an opponent, is playing some of the best basketball of his career for the Providence College Friars.

A Newport native, Kerr has been shooting baskets and developing his game since his days in the third grade. He's one of the few players in PC's basketball history to play four seasons and was a regular in the latter part of his freshman campaign.

Kerr plays a hard game and gives no quarter. Last Saturday night he turned in what coach Vin Cuddy termed a "terrific job" in the Friars' victory over Fairfield.

Best Ever

"That might have been the best game Kenny ever played for us," Cuddy said. "He's been doing well lately, really playing the game that we expected. And what rebounding between Kerr and (John) Ritch!"

Kenny is a busy man these days. He is a practice teacher in American history at Hope High where Tommy Russell, the Blue Wave track coach, is his critic teacher. And tomorrow night, the Friars play their final "home" game at Mount Pleasant High against the University of Rhode Island.

If Kerr hadn't been hurt late in his sophomore season in another game with Rhody when he collided with Fred Congelton, he might not have missed a game during his four seasons at PC. He broke into a strong lineup after mid-season as a freshman and has been pretty much of a regular ever since.

Basketball plays a large part in Kenny's life. He first played on his third grade team and every season thereafter, which adds up to 15 seasons, if you want to count them. He played four years on some crack De La Salle teams and put in a year at Marianapolis, where he roomed with Pat Abbruzzi before he came to the Friars.

Top Offensive Game

He says he tries to take each game in stride but the games with Brown and Rhody mean quite a bit more to the players. He played one of his top offensive games a year ago against BC, coached by his former De La

Salle mentor, Don Martin. In addition to Cuddy and Ernie Calverley, Kerr has been exposed to the basketball teachings of Lee Connerton, Duke Abbruzzi and Martin among others.

Who would he pick as the best he ever played against?

"That's easy ... Togo Palazzi of Holy Cross was really outstanding of the men we met. He could shoot. He could move the ball and you know his scoring records.

"Some other good ones would include Andy McGowan of Manhattan, Tim O'Connell of BC, Hank Daubenschmidt of St. Francis, Ronnie Perry, Palazzi and Earl Markey of Holy Cross, the UConns' Art Quimby and Bevo Francis of Rio Grande. Lou Murgo, Eddie Tooley, Tom Heinsohn, Dave Stenhouse ... they have all played well against us.

"Jim Schlimm and Bobby Moran were great to have as teammates. Our current team is playing a more relaxed cohesive game now.

"My biggest thrill in basketball came the night we won the ESCIT at Newport. That was really something. And when they voted for the top players in that tourney I tied for fifth place in the ballots with Tom Gola, who is now the ace of La Salle, which won the NCAA playoffs last season.

One to Remember

"I never was really a great scorer. I got 21 against Holy Cross one time and that was probably my best. At least that's

the one that I like to remember. The year I was at Marianapolis, I scored 35 points one night against the Springfield Jayvees," Kenny said.

Kerr hopes to take up teaching and coaching eventually but figures Uncle Sam has a couple of years of service waiting for him before that.

What about the game with Rhode Island tomorrow night?

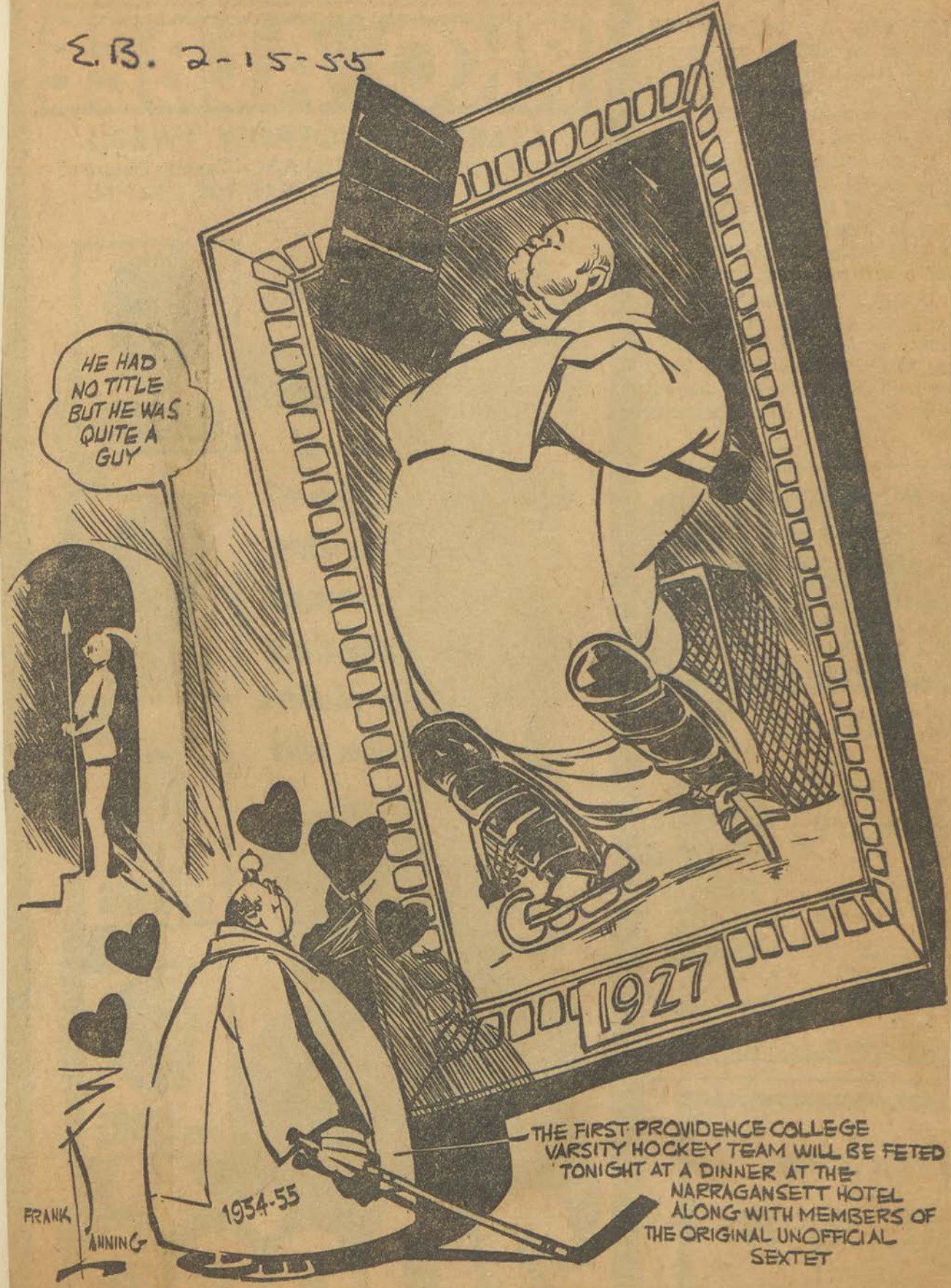
"We hope to continue to play as well as we have in our last few games. Rhody will be tough. They are a scoring club but we are a little tougher now, too," the Friar captain stated.

All in the Game

Oversight . . .

SEEMS that in writing about hockey at Providence College and the dinner being given for the present Friar squad tonight, as I did a couple of columns ago, I was guilty of an oversight. I wrote that until the revival of the sport at P.C. in 1951, the Friars had been without representation in hockey since 1927, when the game was played there for a single season.

Technically that's true, but actually it's a somewhat different story as an old friend and former co-worker, Izzy Siperstein, Providence College, '38, points out. He reminds me that students at the college banded together in an informal squad known as the Providence Collegians during the 1935-36 season.

"We weren't officially the college team," he said, "but we got permission

from the college authorities to use the name. We played that season in the Intercity League, of which Jimmy Darke of your paper was president for so many years.

"I managed, coached and played as a spare. We had a pretty good club. Wallv Geier from Central was our goal tender. Hank Soar and Charlie "Swede" Gaffney were our top defensemen and anyone who got through them had really been through the mill. Some of the others on the squad were Dan and John McQueeney, Joe Berg, Martin Johnson, Joe Cavanagh and Joe Isacco. Then there was Paul Ryan from the football team, Joe McHenry, who writes for your paper, and, I think, big Franny Fitzpatrick, the tennis champ.

Short-Handed . . .

"We did pretty well in the league except for games with a Cranston club that featured Red Gould and a Woonsocket team which used players from Mount St. Charles when the Mount had all those good Canadian boys. I remember one night—it must have been around the Christmas season when a lot of the guys used to work in the post office—we played Cranston when we had just one spare. We were able to make a good game of it for two periods, but in the last period we could just about stand up.

"You know how we managed to get up the entrance fee of \$25 the league required. Borrowed it from Danny O'Neil."

That would be Dr. Daniel J. O'Neil, president now of a girls' college near Portland, Maine, then professor of English and Latin on the P.C. faculty.

"And you know," Iz concluded, "I don't believe we ever paid him back. Maybe we'll get a bill from him now."

Before leaving the subject of Providence College hockey, I have a roster of the 1927 squad, which is printed herewith because of the memories it will awaken for many of the old Friars:

Thomas H. Bride Jr., '27, left wing; Edward H. Cunningham, '27, right wing; Francis T. Coleman, '30, right defense; Vincent Cummings, '29, goal; William H. Flynn, '28, goal; John Graham, '27, left defense; Lawrence Mailloux, '28, assistant manager; Francis D. Maloney, '28, right defense; Frederick J. McGarry, '27, center; Frank McKenna, '27 right wing; Francis P. Moran, '30, center; James Morley, '27, assistant manager.

Junie Bride, a football mainstay for P.C. and an all-around star at Cranston High before that, is now director of the state employment service. Eddie Cunningham is a Providence school teacher. Vin Cummings was an outfielder on the baseball team as well as a goalie. Johnny Graham is now vice president of a downtown bank. Frank Moran, now a dentist, also pitched for Friar baseball teams of that era, which, land sakes!, is 28 years ago.

Coach Vin Cuddy of the Friar has had two key players trouble with colds—Capt. Ken Kerr and Don Moram. He is figuring that each will be available, however.

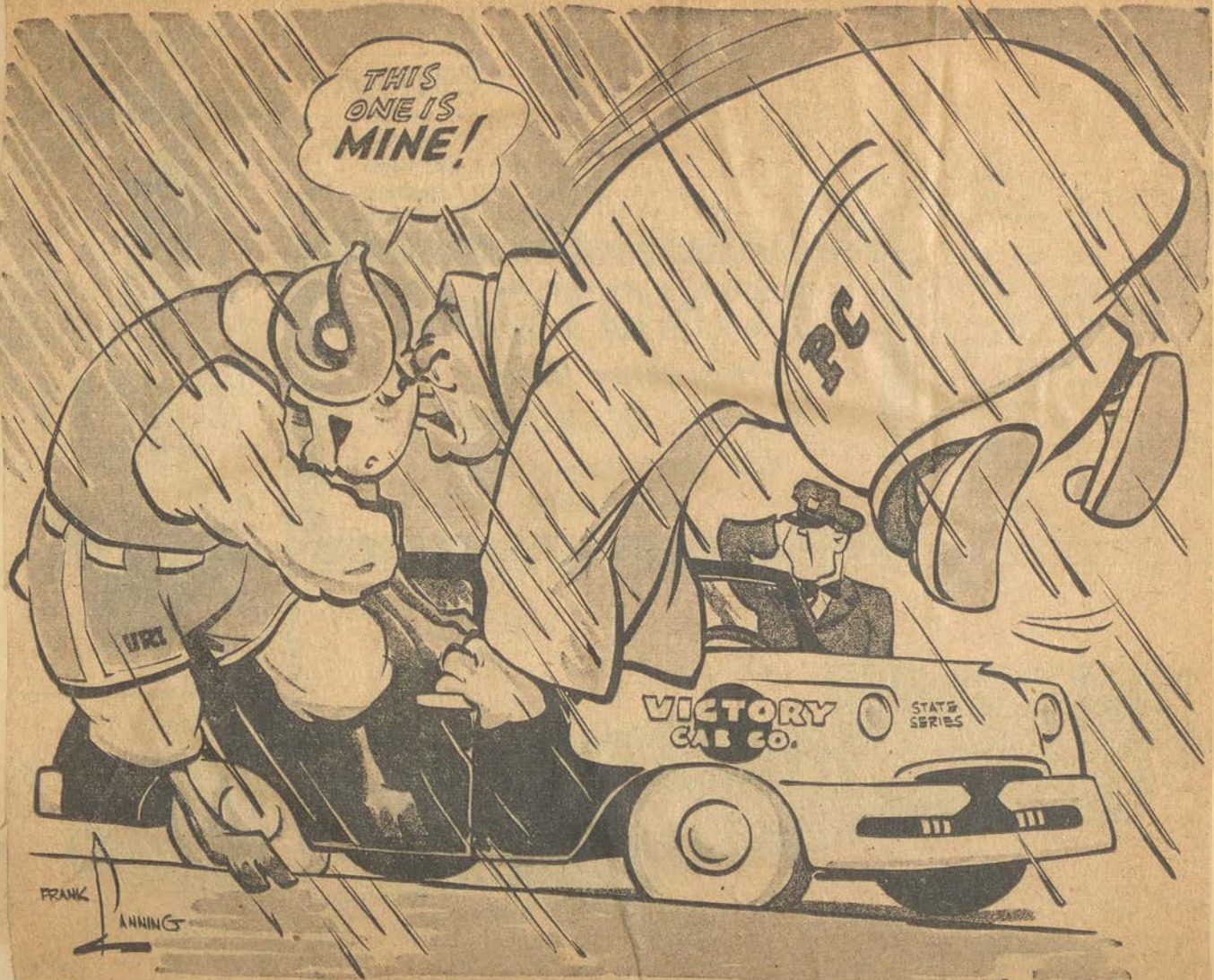
Kerr will start, as usual, along with John Ritch, Frank Williams, Teddy Tedesco and Mike Pascale.

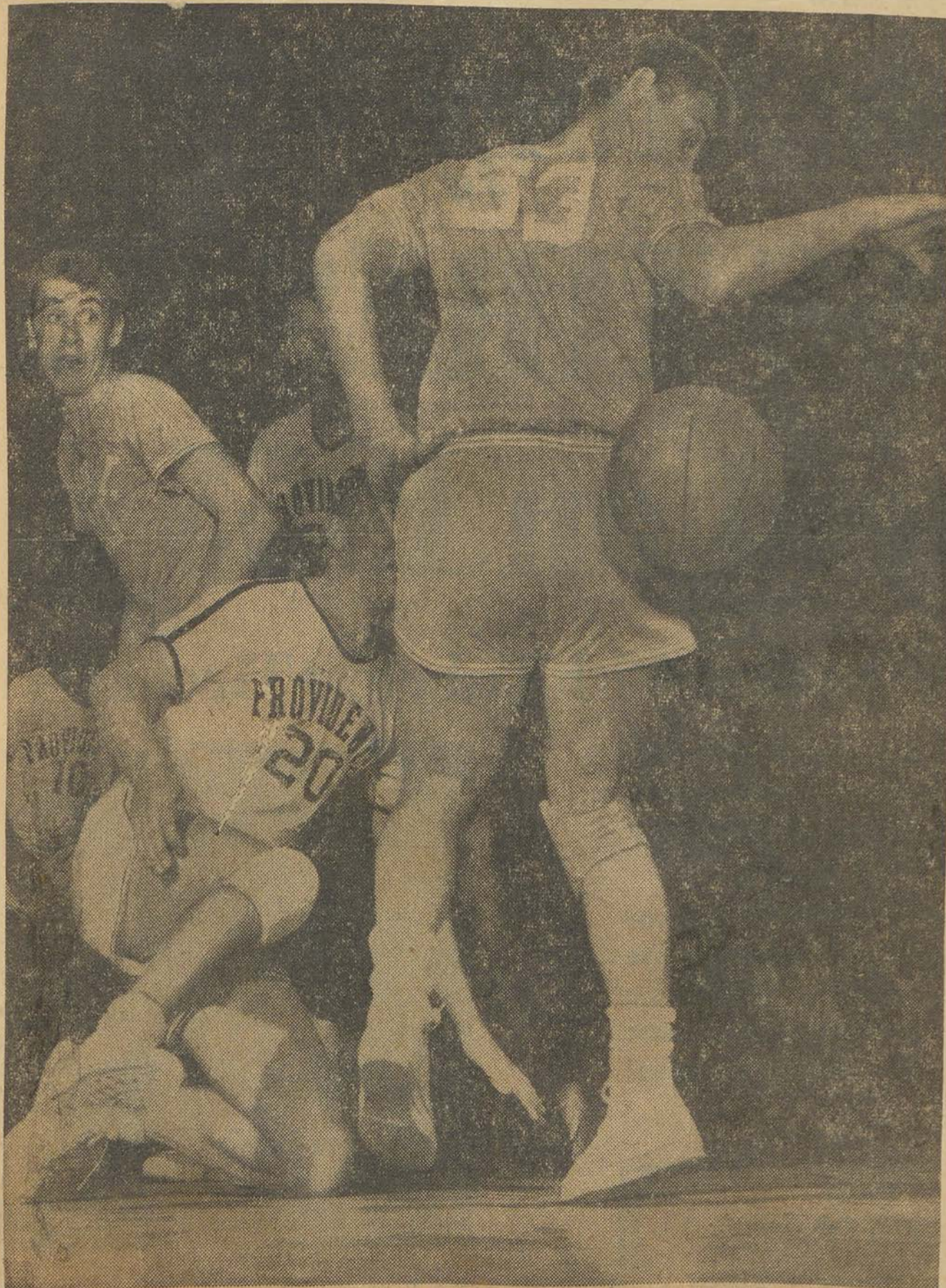

Rams' Attack Pivots Upon Von Weyhe

The University of Rhode Island Rams turned in their best Providence game against the PC Friars in several seasons and scored a convincing 92-72 triumph before a jammed-packed crowd last night at Mount Pleasant High School.

Coach Jack Guy of the Rams was among the missing with a virus and fever that have kept him bedded down all week. But there was nothing sick about the URI attack, which accounted for 46 points in each half and 40 field goals for the night.

Herb Maack, Rhody's assistant basketball coach, saw his URI Freshmen walloped, 116 to 76, in the preliminary but had the satisfaction of directing the varsity to its first victory over the Friars in PC's home game in three seasons.

Some would pick out Rhody's blond sophomore, Billy Von Weyhe, as the Rams' top man. He played a terrific game, as did another sophomore from New Jersey, Ronnie Marozzi. Von Weyhe, with 16 points in the first half, was a 21-point man, as against 22 for Marozzi.

Hellwig the Star

But much of the credit for the Rams' victory belongs on the tall shoulders of Art Hellwig, a senior who is playing his best basketball in his final season. Hellwig gave the Rams an edge on their defensive board, and with Andy Anderson around to help him out, Rhody was able to handle the Friars much more easily than several other teams they have met lately.

Hellwig, Anderson and Von Weyhe set the URI attack in motion generally by picking off the rebounds. Then Dave Stenhouse and Marozzi or Von Weyhe finished things off at the other end of the court.

It was a smooth performance. Rhode Island thus won five of its last six games. The Rhody outfit shot well in the first half, in when it rolled up a 12-point edge, 46-34, but it did things loose and easy while the Friars were pressing.

Ritch Leads

Providence was not up to its recent performances. Ritch did some nice shooting, but was outnumbered in the rebounding. Ritch scored 22 points and led a PC drive that put the Friars in contention in the first half.

The Friars' big moments were infrequent, with Ritch, Ralph Tedesco and Ken Kerr probably their best performers. At times, Frank Williams and Ken Willoughby contributed some fine individual effort. Mike Pascale, the Friars' top shooter normally, was bottled up.

After Rhody's fast start, the Friars picked up gradually and tied the game at 17-all. Rhody went ahead again, but it was fairly even going into the last five minutes of the first half, with the Rams having a 30-25 edge.

Then Marozzi, Stenhouse, Von Weyhe and Bob Stairs sparked a rally that gave Rhody a 12-point lead at intermission. Von Weyhe's first-half efforts were outstanding. His shooting and ball-handling were of a high caliber.

Those Freshmen

The Rams never let the Friars get started in the second half. Maack had his squad practicing its shooting during most of the intermission and the Rams had a 20-point advantage, 62-42, within the first four minutes of the period. Once Rhody outscored PC, 16 to 4, and then it was only a question of playing out the string.

The PC Frosh couldn't miss, well hardly, in registering the highest point total by a Friar team in years. Mike Tirico had 24 points, but 10 men figured in the scoring. Steve Madrepela netted 31 for the Ramlets.

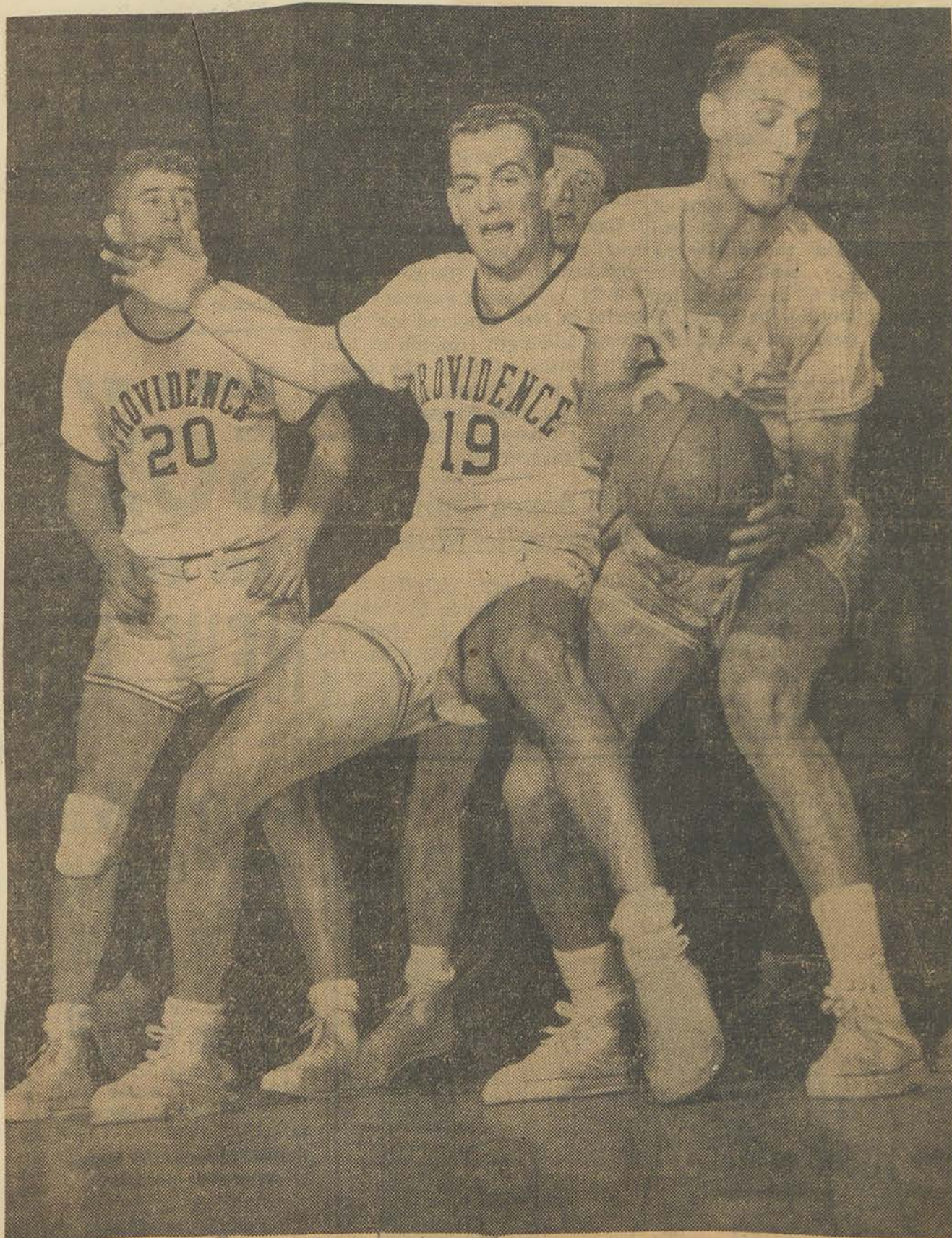

Rhody, which meets the UConn Saturday night at Kingston, came up with a standout performance. While the Rams may have been looser and smoother on some other night, they were traveling at top speed for the most part and won convincingly.

Letdown

The Friars, who had been playing well, had a letdown of sorts but Rhody was playing a winning game, regardless of the PC efforts. In the first half, the Friars fought back into contention after URI got off to a fast start. But the Rams came on again and managed to stay comfortably ahead.

The improved play of center Art Hellwig has been a big factor in Rhody's efforts this season. Last night, he and Eric Anderson took command early and that's when the scorers and offensive men opened up a gap that PC never closed.

Hellwig's rebound work was outstanding in Rhody's third victory in the State series. The Rams are sure of a tie and most likely will win the State crown in a sweep as they will be heavy favorites when they meet the Friars on their own home court next time. Earlier, Rhody led at Brown twice.

21 For Billy

Billy Von Weyhe, 6:4 blond sophomore from Union City, N.J., did a terrific offensive job for Rhody and scored 21 points. A player of outstanding offensive talent, Von Weyhe played one of his top games as a collegian. Sometimes the ball seemed to follow him, instead of him following the ball.

Scoring 40 field goals, and 46 points in each half, the Rams could do little wrong. The Friars, on the other hand, were pressing early and Rhody took advantage of their tenseness. In the first half, Rhody had a hot shooting streak and Coach Herb Maack didn't let them cool off during intermission.

Meanwhile, Eywater was hitting consistently on jump shots. He scored 13 of his points in the first half and helped the Gymnasts take an 18-9 lead after six minutes and a 36-25 margin at the half.

The loss was the 10th of the season for P.C., which has won six games.

Boston College Squeezes Past P.C.

Eagles Score By 2 Points P.I. 2-23-54 Sweep Series

Newton, Mass.—Time was on the side of the Boston College Eagles as they held off a determined late-game drive by the Providence College Friars and posted a 69-67 triumph here yesterday.

Like their meeting here a year ago, it was a thriller. The Friars came with a rush in the final five minutes and just fell short.

John Ritch of the Friars got off a shot from near midcourt and the ball was in the air when time expired. His aim was wide of the mark and the action-packed contest was over. Boston College swept the series.

Heading into the final five minutes, the Eagles had spurred into a 11-point lead on a rally led by Phil Powell, Jim Brosnahan and Tom Cullinane. Stan Kieon, Pawtucket East alumnus, assisted with a pair of free throws. Don Moran had cut the Eagles' margin with a basket, but Brosnahan's hoop offset that one.

Kenny Kerr scored on a jump shot from the foul line and Mike Pascale tallied on a pass from Moran for four points for PC. Then Ritch scored on a pop shot and Frankie Williams sank a pair of free shots under terrific pressure. This rally brought the Friars within three points, 69-66, with less than two minutes remaining.

The Eagles were fighting desperately all during the PC rally and in the final minutes as well. Don Martin's club tried to run out the clock, but had trouble holding the ball with the Friars pressing. Kerr made one of two free shots with less than 15 seconds remaining.

Providence gained a tap with six seconds to go and Ritch's long pitch was PC's last-ditch

bid to tie. The teams played a far better game than the first time they met at Mount Pleasant High School.

Dick Skeffington, Powell and Cullinane were the Eagles' top performers. "Skeff" had 23 points and Powell 17. At times Powell was the best player on the court. He contributed 11 points from the foul line in 15 tries.

Scoring honors for PC went to Pascale, who had 17 points. Kerr and Ritch played well as did Pat Grady, a newcomer who has been trying to crack the top lineup right along. Grady had 10 points. Larry Connolly, Ken Willoughby, Moran and Williams also contributed some fine spot work for the Friars.

The Friars took the lead at the start of the game and then the teams swapped points on an even basis. Two fine plays by Kerr and a hoop by Willoughby gave the Friars a 32-29 lead but the Eagles flipped in nine points in about 90 seconds and held a 38-32 halftime advantage. The Friars were five points down, 61-56, with about eight minutes remaining.

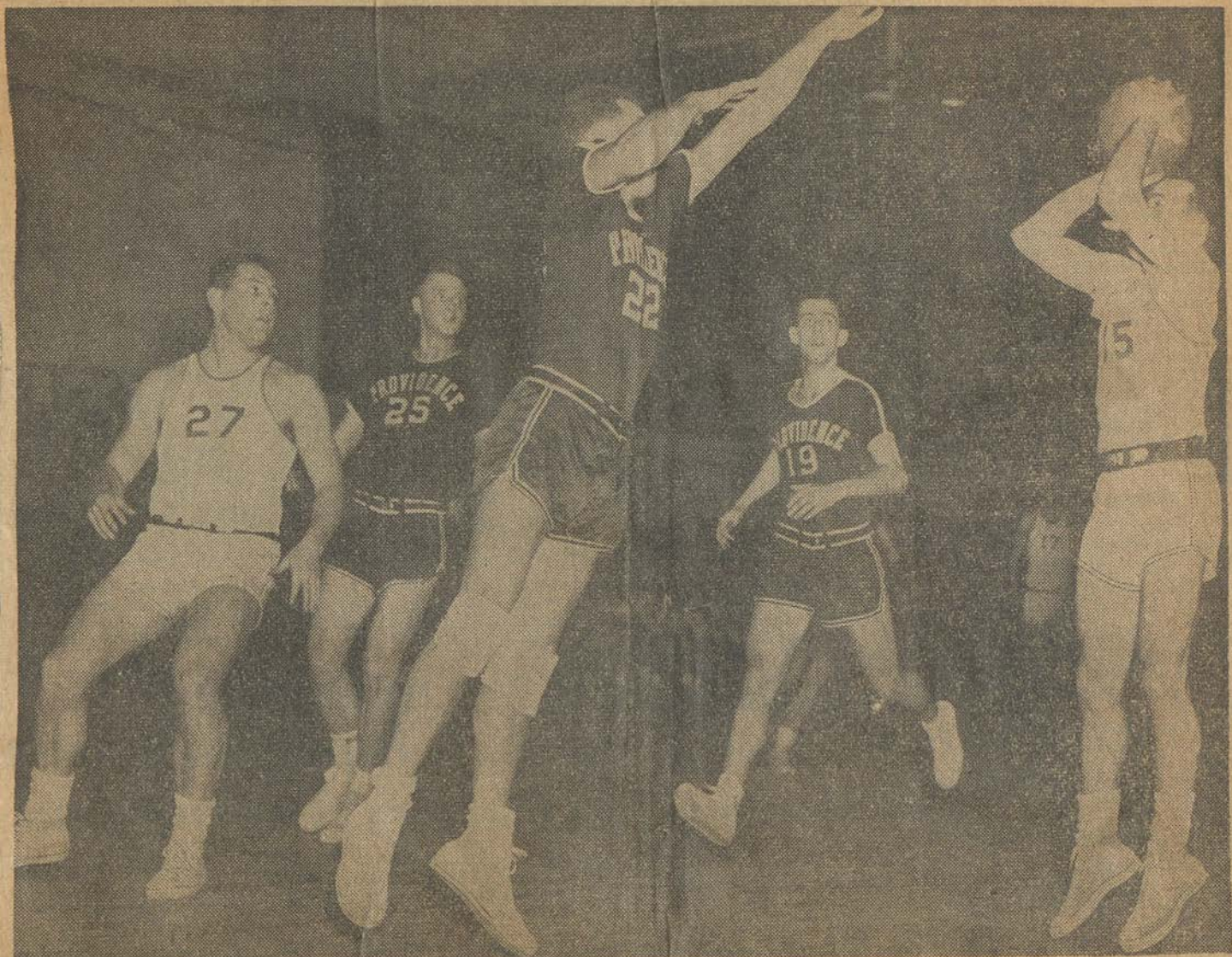

For a starting lineup, Cuddy probably will go with his newcomer to the first club, Pat Grady, and the old hands, Ken Kerr, John Ritch, Mike Pascale and either Don Moran or Frankie Williams.

The Rams, who won two in a row up north recently and got more than 100 points each time, probably will have their big man, Art Hellwig, back in action after illness. He'll start, along with Ronnie Marozzi, Eric Anderson, Dave Stenhouse and Bill Von Weyhe.

Friars' Sextet Stuns Clarkson, 4-3

Potsdam, N.Y. — The Providence College hockey team virtually knocked the Clarkson Tech team out of the N.C.A.A. championships at Colorado Springs next month with a brilliant 4-3 comeback victory over the Engineers here last night. The spectacular goal-teading of Ed Hornstein and the equally brilliant shooting of Ed Monahan

sparked the Friars in their most outstanding victory of the season. Hornstein racked up 63 saves in the game, holding the powerful Clarkson team scoreless in the first and last periods. Only in the second period, when Clarkson broke through Hornstein for three goals in 20 shots, did it appear that the home club would prevail. After

Clarkson had got its third goal, the Friars finally broke through as Monahan scored at 17:55. Mike McDonough and Bob Reall assisted on the play.

The amazing Friars continued their excellent play in the third period and Monahan, hitting at 1:26 and 7:24, deadlocked the game at 3-3. Less than a minute after Monahan had tied the game, Tom Army stole a loose puck at center ice, eluded the Clarkson defense and drove the puck past Don Cooper, Clarkson goalie, for the clincher.

Bill Harrison, Clarkson coach, pulled his goalie in the final 90 seconds and put six forwards on the attack in a desperate attempt to get the tying goal.

Their loss couldn't have come at a worse time for the Golden Knights. They were locked in a tight battle with Harvard and St. Lawrence for the two Eastern NCAA tourney berths. Now they are the only team of the three that has lost to an unranked sextet. It could well mean a Waterloo when the selection committee goes over the three forwards with a fine-toothed comb early next month.

The Providence College Friars, playing a deliberate game and generally going only for the good shots, surprised the University of Rhode Island with a 79-73 setback before 1,200 fans last night at Keaney Gym.

The Friars handled the ball well and made the most of their opportunities. They were up and ready for the game while Rhody wasn't as sharp as it has been in recent outings.

It was the first setback in the state championship series for the Rams, who had won their first three games. The Rams were favored but the Friars really wanted to win it and played a smart game in doing so.

Providence has seldom played as poised basketball over the route as it did last night. The game wasn't as aggressively waged as most intrastate games but the fouls came frequently nevertheless.

Seven players fouled out and 47 fouls were assessed although it didn't look like that rough a game from the sidelines. The Friars outshot the Rams, 29-23 in field goals while Rhody had a 27-21 edge in free throws.

Scoring their first victory on a Kingston court in 16 years, the Friars came up with some good shooting in the clutch and played their steadiest game of the year.

They outrebounded the Rams when it hurt and controlled the ball far better than Rhody. Coach Vin Cuddy had his club work the ball around in a weave, until the Friars opened up the URI defenses. This enabled Mike Pascale, Larry Connolly and Ken Kerr to drive in or pop from

reasonably close and P.C. cashed in on its fine shooting last night.

Center John Ritch, Kerr, Connolly, Ken Willoughby and Pat Grady did a brilliant job for the Friars. Ritch and Kerr did the P.C. rebounding with Willoughby assisting in the second half. Connolly, one of the smallest men on any of the R.I. college squads, handled the ball well and chipped in 13 points. Kerr set up his mates with some fine pass work. Ritch, top big man on the court by far, threw in 20 points for the winning Friars.

Dave Stenhouse led the Rams with 21 points while Ronnie Marozzi had 16. Andy Anderson was Rhody's best defensive man. The Rams were not hitting on their shots and P.C.'s more eager players were taking the rebounds.

Both the Friars and the Rams played well in the first half which ended 38-all. The Rams were ahead twice in the second half at 47-46 close to the five-minute mark and 54-52 later.

Providence went ahead, 60-54, on some fine teamwork and play-making. Rhody came within a basket at 62-60 but P.C. spurted. The Rams came on again and were within another hoop at 73-71. Junior Dagres put in a one-hander but then Connolly had a three-point play, scoring after Frank Williams had dribbled around the Rams and held the ball close to a minute with less than two minutes remaining.

'On to Colorado'

And from the background, a cheer went up:

"On to Colorado, on to Colorado!"

This last was, of course, too much to expect, even though the unranked Friars had beaten a team that was figured as a good bet for college hockey's big tournament in Colorado. But any and all other excitement was more than boyish exuberance. This was a major victory.

Ed Monahan, as the cheerers indicated, was just great with

three goals and Tom Army had scored the winning goal on a breakaway. But the young man who turned in the chore of the night was Ed Hornstein, the Friars' goalie.

His was a task. The night previous, Clarkson had rapped Army, 17-0, and then Hornstein came in and blanked this sterling hockey team for two periods. The three goals came in the second period.

All hands, of course, contributed to what was easily the most compelling victory of their season, if not their hockey history.

In the cold morning's light, the effect of it is, for Clarkson, the probable loss of a tourney spot. St. Lawrence and Harvard figure as the Eastern choices now. The former has a 14-1 record, not counting those games with non-N.C.A.A. foes, and Harvard the same. Clarkson is 13-3.

The Friars are still up there and tonight they will play St. Lawrence, the club for which Burrillville's Ed Zifcak stars, at Canton.

Basketball, Too

And what if the Friars take that one, too?

There'll be no doubt about it then: "On to Colorado."

This victory completely overshadowed another sterling triumph by a Providence College team. The basketball club took the University of Rhode Island, just when the Rams were favored all over the place, and got itself back in the race for the intrastate title. The score: 79-73.

This one was taken by the

steadiest, most consistent basketball the Friars have played this year and they held off the Rams' late bid. PC's John Ritch got 20 points and Mike Pascale scored 22, the top for the game.

The Rams twice pulled within a basket of tying near the end, but their efforts were stymied when, before the contest was over, four of their starters had fouled out.

This victory gave the Friars a 2-1 mark in the state race, compared to the Rams' 3-1. But the latter now are finished in that competition and the Friars have a chance to tie when they play Brown Wednesday.

The Bruins exchanged victories with Dartmouth, with the Indians taking a 52-41 basketball verdict and Brown getting the decision in hockey, 11-2. Dan Keefe got five goals and two assists for the Bruins.

Comes now the "wrapup" week for most of the locals. That St. Lawrence game is the finale for the Friars' hockey team and the basketball game at Brown is also the last for the Friars. Tonight they play Tufts at Boston Garden.

Friar Hoopsters Now Aim At Tie for State Crown

Heartiest congratulations are hereby tendered to the athletes, and to their coaches, Vin Cuddy of the basketball squad and Dick Rondeau, the hockey tutor. The Clarkson victory gave Rondeau a coaching triumph over an old teammate, Bill Harrison, who played with Dick and Jack Riley on that great Dartmouth hockey line in the early 40's.

From 1941 through 1943, while that trio was performing for the Hanover Indians, the team ran up a string of 36 straight victories after starting with losses to Colorado and Illinois. In the period in which the three played together the Big Green never lost a game to an Eastern team. All three are coaches now, Riley operating at West Point.

The Hard Way ...

But to return to the present and the Friars' day of glory. The players on both the basketball and hockey squads rate all the praise that can be given them. What they've accomplished, they've accomplished the hard way.

The basketball team, for instance, plays its home games on the Mount Pleasant High School court because of the limited accommodations in the auditorium at Harkins Hall. That means when the players want to practice at Mount Pleasant to retain the feel of the home court, they have to do it mostly at night, when the gym isn't being used by the schoolboys. That, of course, is far from an ideal practice schedule.

The hockey team has similar difficulties working out, because the Auditorium ice is kept so busy by the Reds, the two college hockey teams—Brown and P.C.—and all the schoolboy sextets. That means sandwiching in practice sessions at odd hours, sometimes after the finish of the Reds games.

There's a lot of perserverance as well as skill and spirit behind each victory either team scores.

Improvement Ahead . . .

Conditions will improve for the basketball squad with the opening of the new college gymnasium next season. In addition to that, the Friars have a good freshman team, which should reenforce next season's varsity considerably. It's possible that the team which dedicates the new gym will be a throwback to brilliant P.C. arrays of years gone by.

(Remember the days of Johnny Krieger and Bill McCue, of Joe Carew and Al Hagstrom, of Ben Smith and Leo Davin, the coaching duels between those two colorful personalties, Frank Keaney and General Al McClellan, when Rhode Island's Rams and the Friars used to perform in the Auditorium with the place jammed to the roof.)

As for the hockey team, it was pointed out once here before that big things seem in line for the Friars of the ice next season, what with this season's freshman sextet unbeaten and only a few players slated to be lost from the current varsity. Matter of fact, the Friars didn't have to wait until next season. Beating Clarkson Tech is a big thing that has already happened.

The National Spotlight . . .

They did a lot to bring Providence College into the national sports spotlight, Eddie Hornstein, Ed Monahan, Bobby Reall, Mike McDonough, Tommy Army, Roscoe Sweeney and the others who combined in the triumph over Clarkson.

A hockey team can be a big asset in that way to a small college. Compared to the number of colleges playing football, basketball and baseball, college hockey varsities are few, probably only a little more than 50. If a small college can get together a good team, it has a reasonable chance of taking an occasional decision from the game's elite.

Just as the Friars did Saturday and as they are likely to do several times next season.

Friars Defeat Tufts in Basketball

Roberts Sparks Bantams

Trinity stayed in the game until about the eight minute mark of the second half, mostly on the fine shooting of Captain Dave Roberts. The Bantams' leader paced the Trinity scorers with 24 points, getting 12 in each half.

Providence erected a nine point bulge, 29-20, a little more than half way through the first half but Trinity tallied ten straight points to go ahead 30 to 29. The Friars countered to take a 35-32 lead off the floor at half-time.

Roberts was red hot in the early moments of the first half dunking four field goals and two free throws to spark Trinity to a 48-45 advantage with five minutes gone in the second half.

No Help For Roberts

But little Roberts cooled off and Trinity had no one to take over the scoring burden. Providence led 59-52 at the midpoint of the second half, were out front 71-61 with five minutes left and were still ahead by ten, 77-67, when Cuddy sent in his reserves with three minutes left in the game.

Providence has a comparatively young ball club with only one Senior and nine Sophomores on the 12 man roster. Setting the scoring pace for the Friars was Soph Mike Pascale with 25 points. Captain Ken Kerr tallied 20 while two more Sophs, John Ritch and Ralph Tedesco, scored 13 and 12 respectively for the well balanced Providence quintet.

Nichols Junior College defeated the Trinity Frosh, 86-72, in the preliminary game. Jack McGowan caged 42 points in a losing cause for the Bantam Frosh.

Lose to St. Lawrence in Hockey

NCAA-Bent N.Y. Team Delivers 13-3 Barrage

Canton, N.Y. — Providence College's hockey team had half the town of Potsdam cheering them on here last night against St. Lawrence but despite the support, the Friars were tagged with a 13-3 defeat.

The reason for the upstate support was P.C.'s startling upset of Clarkson Saturday night in Potsdam. Potsdam is only 11 miles from here and there is no love lost between Clarkson and St. Lawrence hockey fans.

Last night 3,000 fans turned out in Appleton Arena to see the giant-killers from Rhode Island, but the Friars were just not up to the task of scoring another upset.

Larries Take 4-1 Lead

St. Lawrence took a 4-1 lead in the opening period, built it to 8-1 as P.C. switched goalies in the second period and blasted home five more goals in the finale. According to P.C. players, the St. Lawrence team of last night was the classiest, most skillful spud to oppose the Friars this year.

A look at the saves made by the rival goalies supplies proof of the pressure applied by the Larries. Regular P.C. goalie Ed Hornstein had 13 saves in the first period and 13 more in the third period, in which he relieved sophomore Ralph Lane at the two-minute mark. Lane had made no saves at that point. But Phil Crawford, who played the second period in the P.C. goal, made 17. The grand total was 43. For St. Lawrence, Bill Sloan had nine saves in the first period, five in the second and eight in the third, a total of 22.

In addition to the explosive St. Lawrence offense, there were some fireworks in the second period as half a dozen players started swinging fists. This fracas was touched off by a squabble

between P.C. center John Sweeney and defenseman Mickey Walker of St. Lawrence. Each was given a five-minute penalty at the 18:14 mark and also ejected from the game. The flareup lasted about a minute and after it had ended, the Larries struck for two quick goals in the last 52 seconds of the period.

Friars' Last Game

The P.C. scorers were Eddie Monahan, who had tallied three goals in the 4-3 victory over Clarkson, Capt. Bob Reall and Tom Army, who had accounted for the winning goal in the Clarkson upset.

This was P.C.'s last game of the season and three of the Friars were playing their last college game, Army and defense-

men Dave Reilly and Tom McAleer. The season record is 8-7.

Ed Zifcak, former Burrillville High School star, scored two goals and an assist for St. Lawrence.

The big game of the season in this hockey-mad upstate area, will be played here tomorrow night when the Larries take on Clarkson. If St. Lawrence wins that one, they will have an iron grip on one of the two Eastern berths for the NCAA tournament in Colorado Springs.

Another starter will be Bill Arnold, a senior whose contributions have been many, and the rest from among Ray Malkiewicz, Pete Campisi, Ed Kincade, Bobby Popp and — the players who have created the "confusion," Arnie Smith, Charley Merritt or Jim Pendergast.

As for Ward's starting "problem," he says the men providing the complications are Arnie Smith, Charley Merritt and Jim Pendergast.

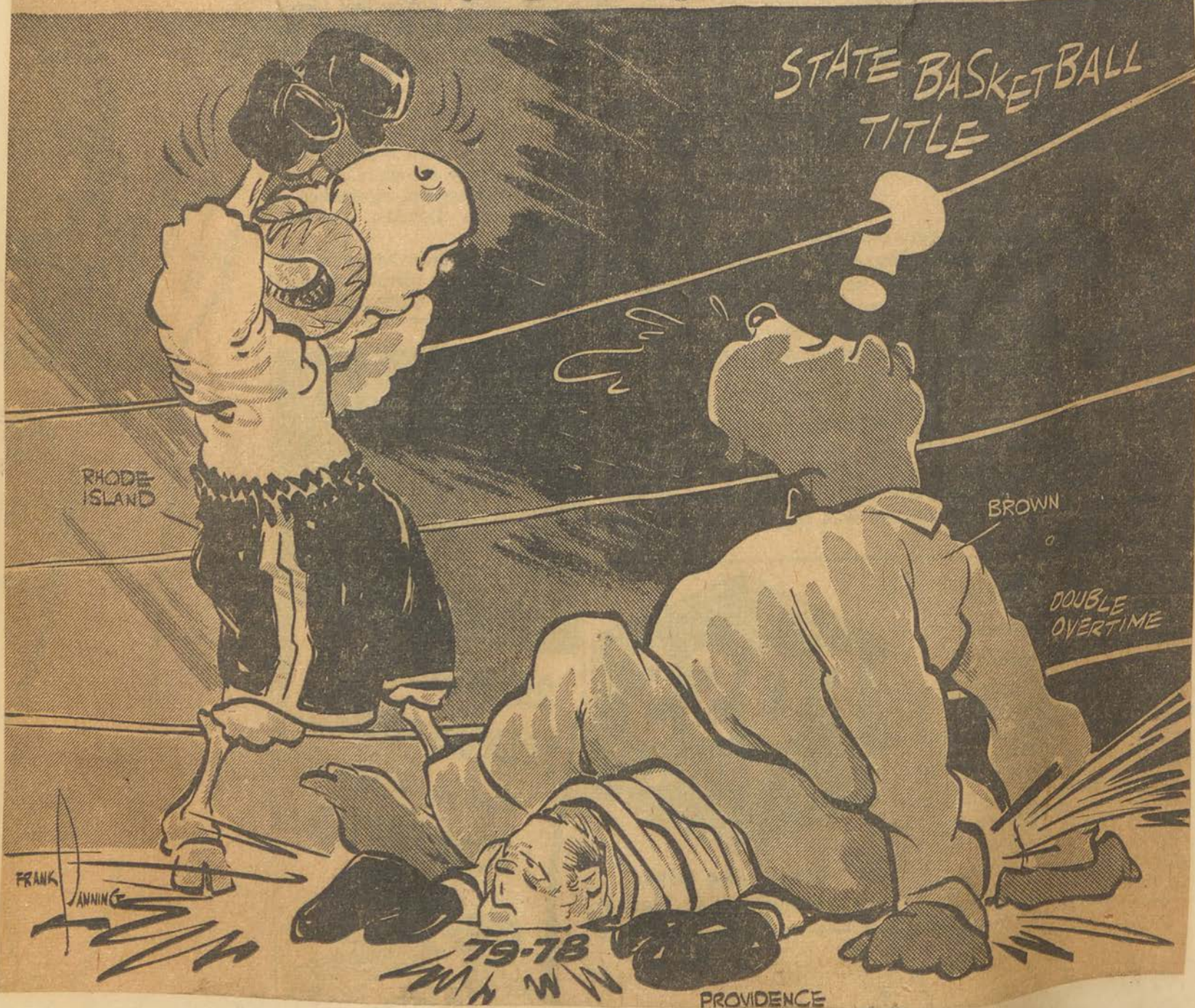

Friar Setback Gives R.I. Hoop 2.B. 3-3-55 Title to Rams

Brown edged Providence College in basketball last night by a whisker — a one-point victory in two overtimes—and it is just possible that this is the "easiest" the Friars will be for some time to come.

The thought behind the statement is this: Brown accomplished its 79-78 victory at Marvel Gym with a cast that is, for the most part, graduating—and there are no Ed Tooleys on the horizon.

But the Friars played their game with mostly sophomores. Only one man on this year's squad is a senior, Capt. Ken Kerr. He's a valuable man, but sheer numbers take the sting out of his loss.

In addition, the Friars have at least two bright prospects from the freshman squad, plus the chance that the man who was supposed to make this year's team, Tom Donahue, is expected to return to school. Illness forced him out.

Included among the sophomores scheduled to return are these, who played major parts in last night's game: Mike Pascale, Frankie Williams, Ken Willoughby, John Ritch and Larry Connolly.

So, the Friars, with their new gym abuilding and almost ready, and a team that showed vast improvement since midseason, should be a formidable opponent for Brown and anyone else.

However, for the moment, they are the losers. In addition to losing to Brown, they lost a chance to gain a tie for the state title with the University of Rhode Island.

The Rams, who took Yale last night at New Haven, 106-98, collected the title with a 3-1 record. The Friars are 2-2 and Brown is 1-3.

The game was the last of the season for Providence College and left the record at seven victories and 12 defeats, not includ-

ing a loss to the New York Athletic Club, which had been listed as an exhibition.

Brown still has two games to go over the weekend, with Columbia and Princeton, and these could have a large bearing on the outcome of the Ivy League race.

As for the victory over Providence College, it was a beauty for Brown, no matter what the future holds. Actually, the Bruins might have packed it away in regulation time.

They held a 10-point lead at one stage of the second half, but a full-court press by the Friars over the last six minutes worked to the latter's perfection and they tied the score at 65-all with just 40 seconds to play.

Pascale got the basket on a perfectly turned out-of-bounds play in combination with Frankie Williams and Larry Connolly and then, in the first overtime, Pascale put his club three points up.

Eventually, Billy Arnold tied it for Brown at 73-73 and that brought the game into its climatic stages—and surely one of the longest and most hectic in the series between the two.

Ed Tooley put his Bruins three points up at the start of it, but again the Friars came back and made it 78-77 in their favor.

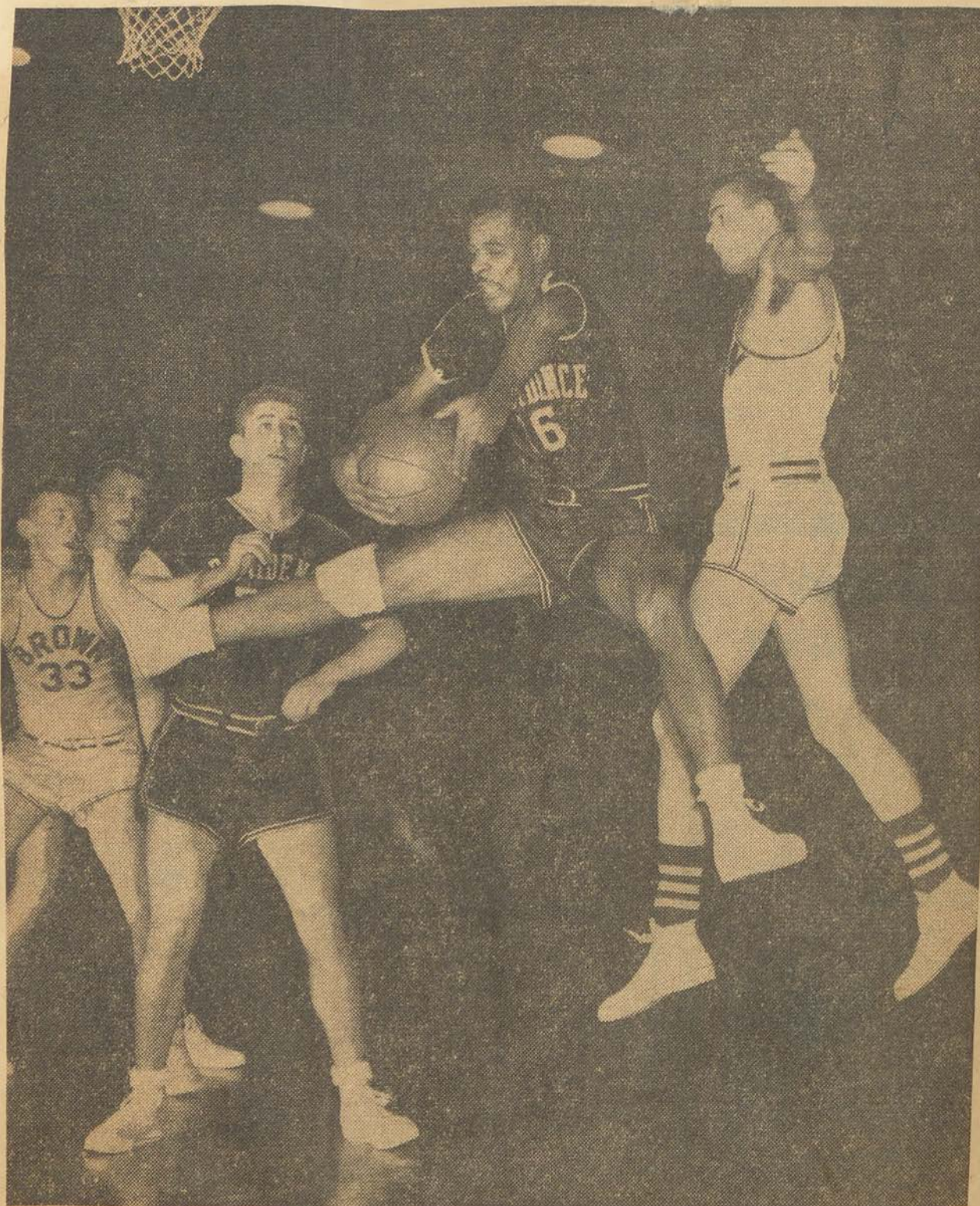
But finally, with 84 seconds to go, Pete Campisi put in an easy one for Brown and that did it.

Among the seniors, Kerr did excellently for the Friars, and Tooley, Arnold, Ed Kincade, Bobby Popp, Ray Malkiewicz and Jim Pendergast contributed largely in their last home-court appearance for the Bruins.

At halftime Tooley, Brown's captain and leading scorer, was presented the Woody Grimshaw Trophy for all-around contribution to Brown's basketball team for the second straight year. Jim McGuinness made the presentation for the trophy donors, Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity.

Grimshaw, Tufts hoop coach, was a Brown basketball star in the 1940's.

Campisi's Goal Settles Issue In Hectic Tilt

Providence College and Brown staged two frantic overtimes last night before the Bruins carried off a 79-78 victory at Marvel Gym on a basket by Pete Campisi.

Campisi's basket, a simply scored thing that clinched, 84 seconds before the end, a game filled with complexities and heroes of the moment, killed the Friar's chance of tying the state series in their final game.

The crown, as a result, now goes to Rhode Island with its 3-1 record. The Friars are 2-2 in the intrastate race and 9-12 for the season. Brown is 1-3 and 7-16.

Providence College lost a three-point lead set up by Mike Pascale in the first overtime and Billy Arnold's rebound basket with 45 seconds to play tied the score at 73-73.

Then, in the second extra session, Brown went three points up, compliments of Ed Tooley. But a free throw by Ken Willoughby and baskets by Larry Connolly and Pascale put the Friars ahead 78-77, with 1:48 to go.

On the next trip down the floor, Campisi hooked in his payoff shot and then came the hectic finish. The Friars had one more crack at it, but their last shot missed the mark.

The sparks of coaching strategy were flying all over the place near the end of regulation play and, at least this once, the conferences worked.

It was this way The Friars, after having things to their liking for the early part of the game, went into a second-half decline during which they could hardly beg a basket.

At the very first, they took a six-point lead, but Brown caught up at 19-19 and eventually went ahead seconds before halftime on Shelly Lubin's basket, 33-32.

Then the Friars hit sparse times. They got just three field goals in some 13 minutes and only free shooting (13 out of 14 shots over the same span of time) kept them going. Brown, at one point, led by 47-37.

With 6:48 to play and the Friars trailing, 51-60, Coach Vin Cuddy gave the signal for a full-court press and it did the trick—but just barely.

With 40 seconds of regulation time to play, the Friars conferred on an out-of-bounds play. They needed two points.

So, Frankie Williams passed in to Connolly, who passed back to Williams, who fed Pascale for a perfect layup that tied the score at 65-65.

Brown's scoring leader was Bob Popp, with 20 points. Tooley, wrapping up his Bruin career, got 17 points, but 13 of them came
