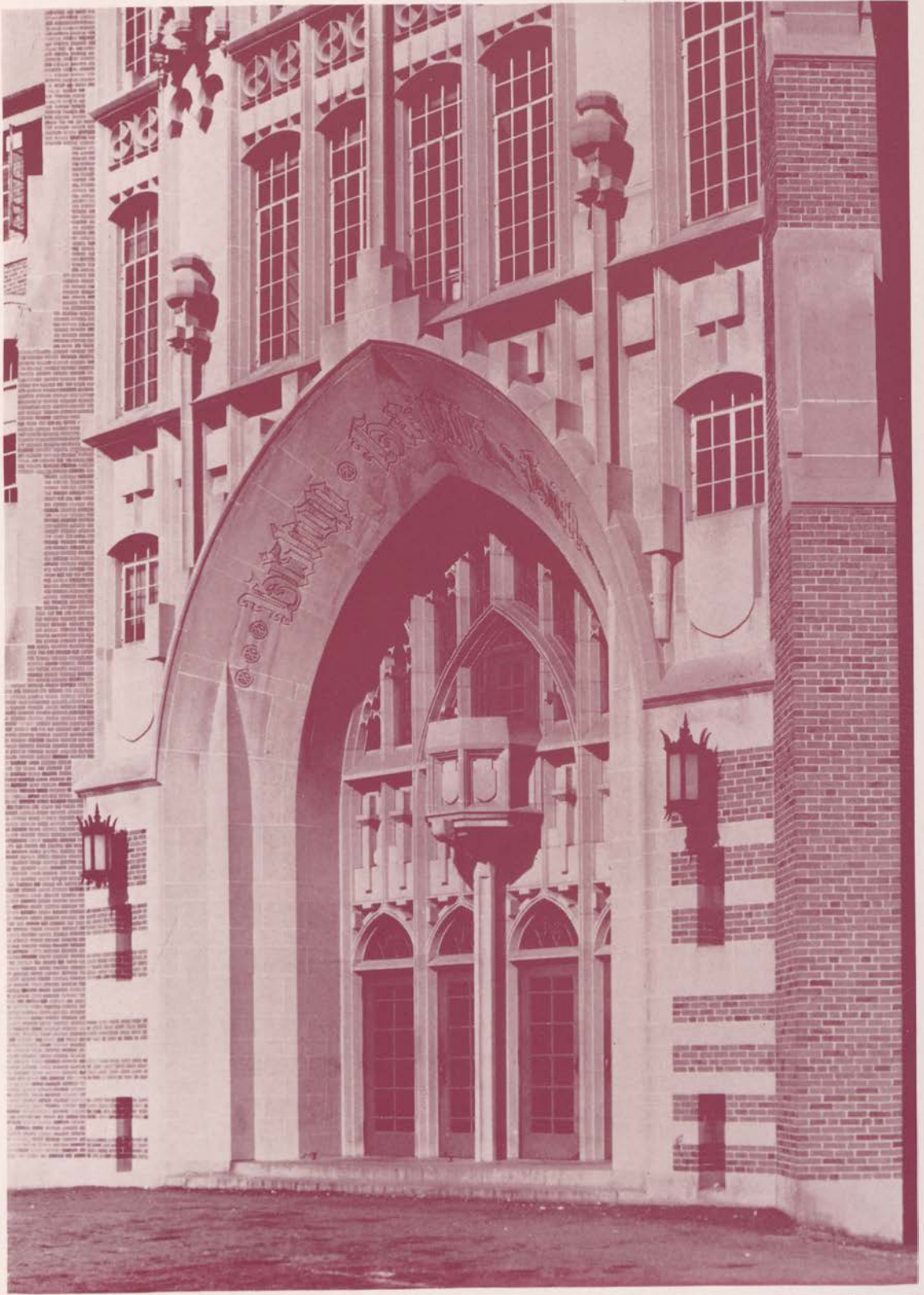

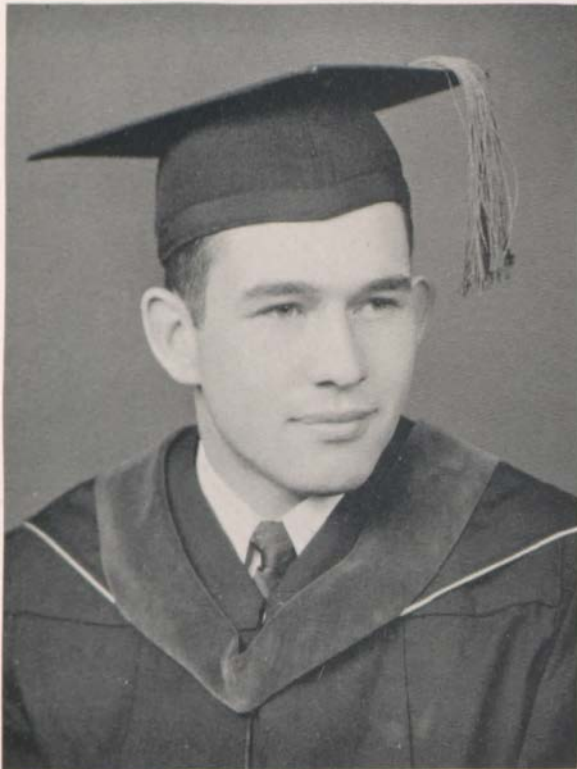
REVEREND JOHN PHILIP ARCHDEACON, O.P.

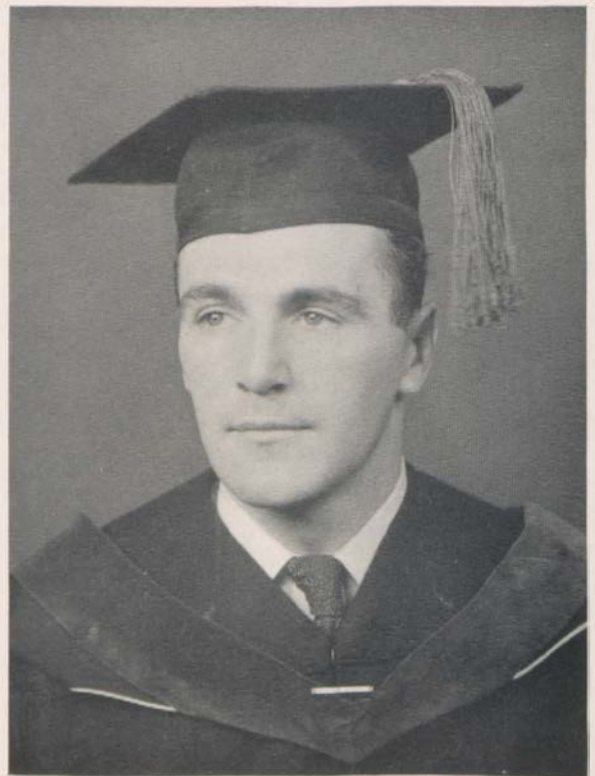

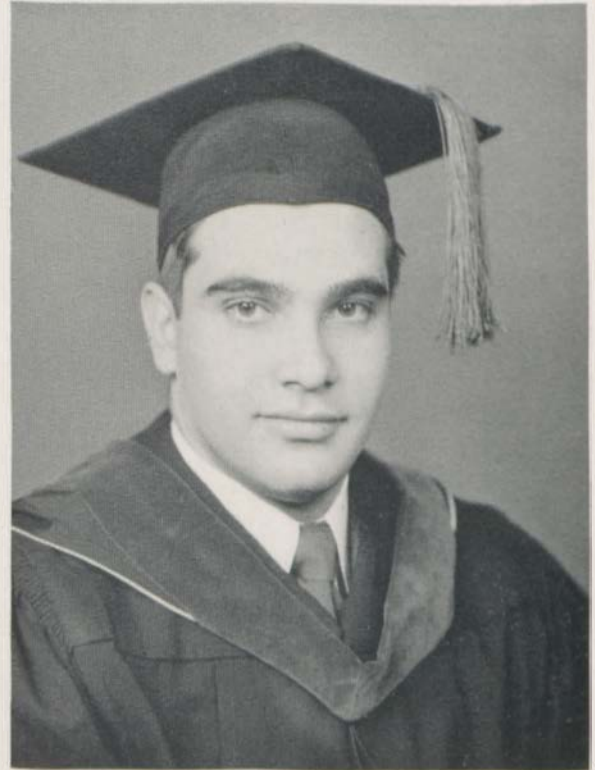

Robert F. Dunn, treasurer. This year was a memorable one as we held one of the largest dances in the history of the college—the Sophomore Hop.

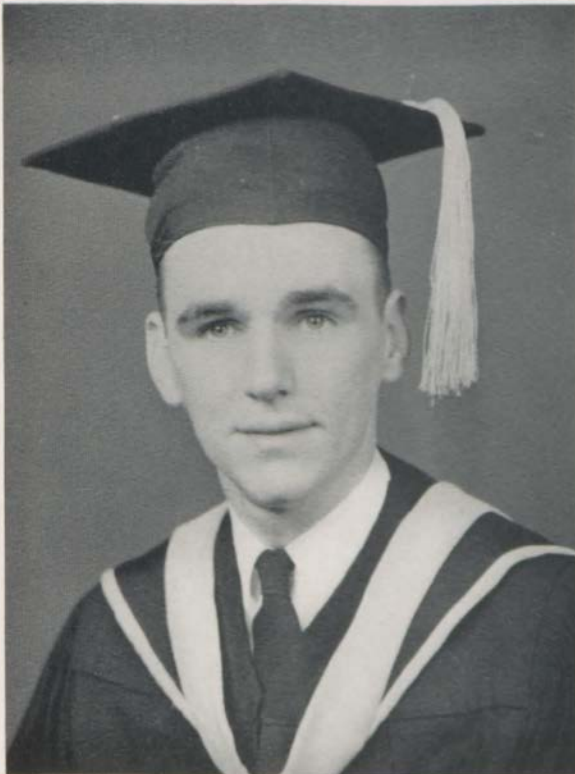

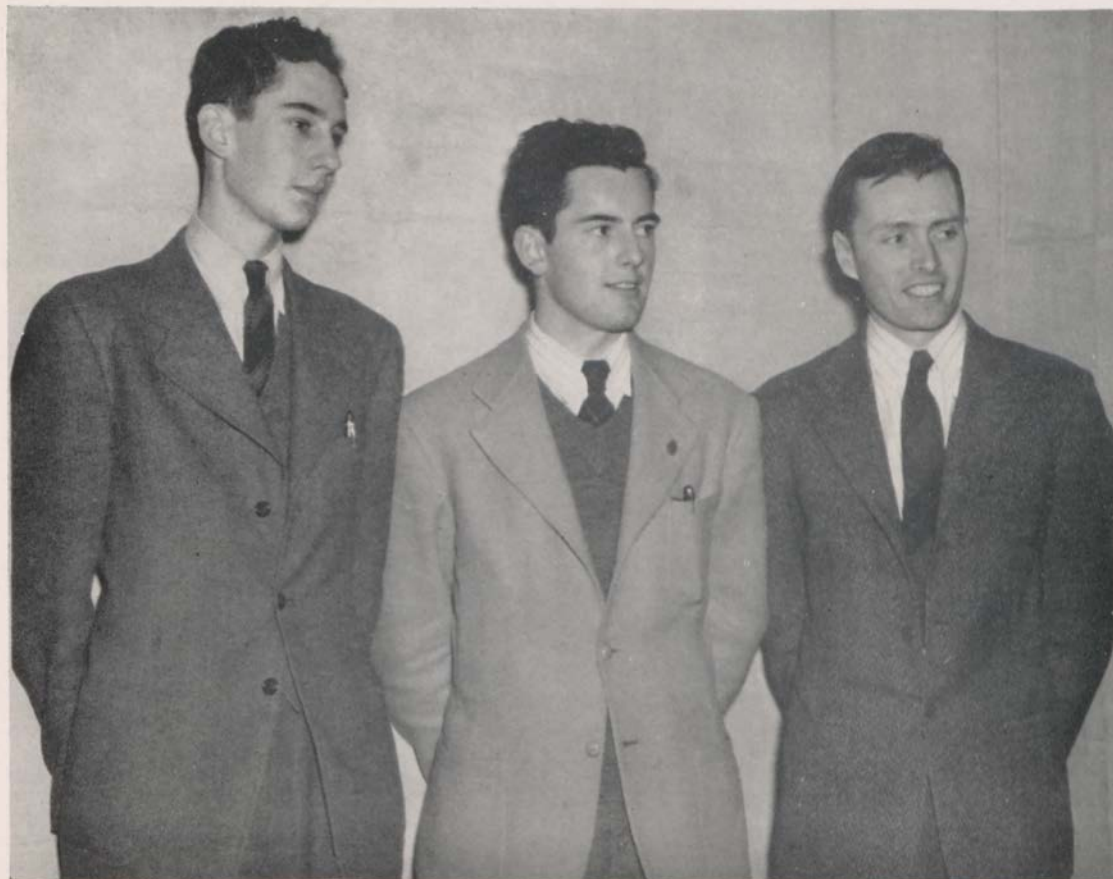
DEBATING UNION

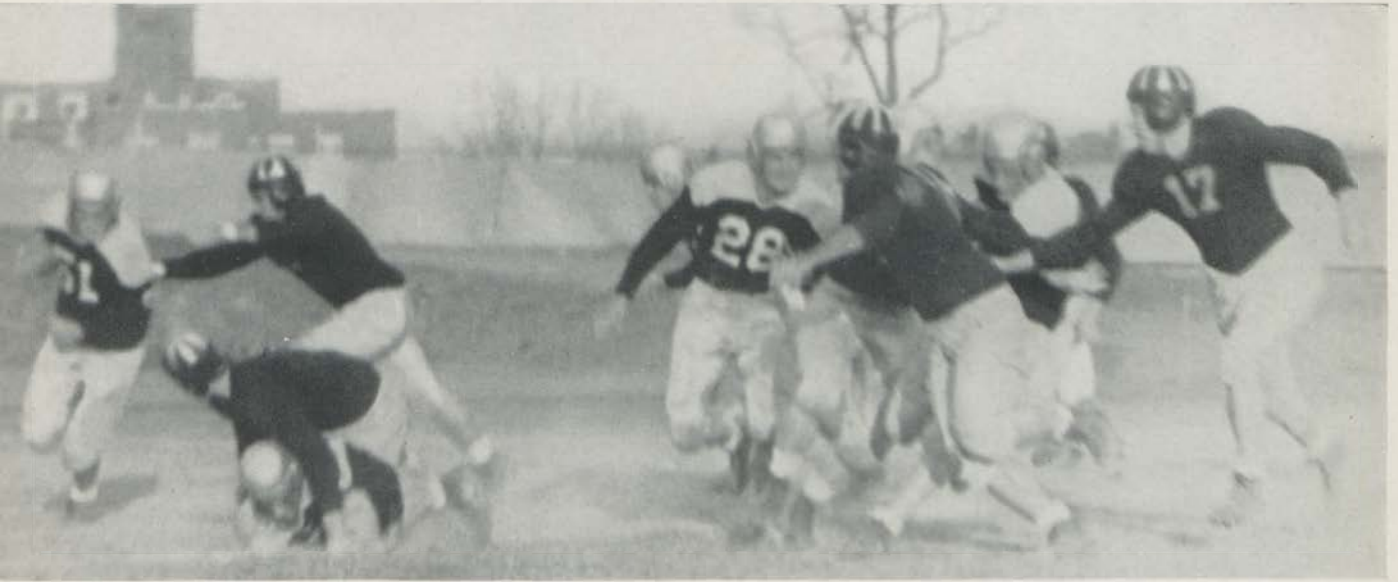

ManhattanFive Loses, 59 to 39, To Providence

Foes Tied at Half, 23 to 23;
Friars Score Season's
Ninth Straight Victory

Manhattan's "Fire brigade," sent into action with ten minutes to go to smother a smoldering Providence College quintet, poured gasoline onto the coals instead of water. Quickly adjusting themselves to the situation, the New Englanders burst into a conflagration of twenty-one straight points and burned the Kelly Green to a 59-to-39 frazzle on Riverdale Heights last night. It was the ninth consecutive triumph for the unbeaten Friars and the sixth defeat in twelve starts for the Jaspers.

Ted McConnon, the Providence one-hand shooting expert, fired in ten field goals and two free throws for the night's high of twenty-two points. Three others of the starting Friars hit double figures. Dick Murphy and Dan Christie, the only regulars in Green shirts who could find the hoop, caged eight points apiece, but were topped by Ed McCabe, chief of the fire department. He chucked in ten points.

Teams Tied at Half, 23-23

This Providence team is as poised, sound and well rounded an organization as New York has ever seen come out of New England. It handled the ball cleverly, moved with deception and direction and repeatedly opened up the target for point-blank shots. The Friars were held to a 23-all tie in the first half chiefly because they missed too many underneath and partly because Manhattan rallied strongly in the closing minutes of the period after being seven points down.

Manhattan went ahead for the first time on the first shot of the second half, a lay-up by Murphy on Christie's pass off a quick break situation. Providence refused to become ruffled. Chet Zabek, its deftly operating center, and Bob Reilly, a hustling, playmaking guard, paced the Friars through a seven-point spurt.

Providence Runs Up 21 Points

At this juncture, with the score, 30 to 25, against his fading regulars, Neil Cohalan, the Manhattan coach, sent in his replacement quintet, an outfit schooled in the quick-breaking, snap-shooting attack. This aggregation pulled up to within a point of the Friars, 32 to 31, before the visitors could adjust themselves to the change of pace.

Providence is accustomed to the rushing style of game and in a jiffy was off on a scoring rampage which extended over twenty-one

Completely outplaying the vaunted R. I. State Rams, the Fighting Friars of Providence College hit their peak form of the season, downing the Keaneymen, 60-54, in last night's encounter at the R. I. Auditorium.

Before 5000 enthusiastic fans, Ed Crotty's well-drilled charges chalked up their seventh consecutive win, maintaining their position as top team among the 33 quintets in New England.

The Keaney forces held a four point advantage at half-time, by virtue of conversions from the foul stripe. Their lead was short-lived, for the Friars forged ahead soon after the second half opened. Three quick baskets by Ted McConnen gave the Friars a lead which they never relinquished. R. I. State gamely fought back, but they could not combat the clever ball-handling of the Crottymen.

Ted McConnon, the Friars' ace sniper, led the attack with 18 points to keep his place among New England's leading hoopmen.

Captain Horace Marone played an inspired defensive game, and flipped 14 points through the hoop. Before leaving the contest early in the second half on personal fouls, Chet Zabek tallied 9 markers for the Friar cause.

To the guards, Larry Drew and Bob Reilly, much credit must be given for slowing the scoring pace of Rutledge, Modzelewski, and Shannon, and the other members of the State's artillery.

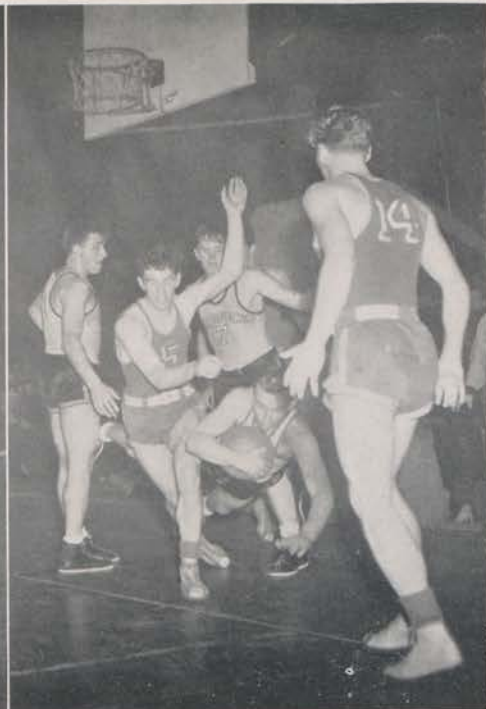
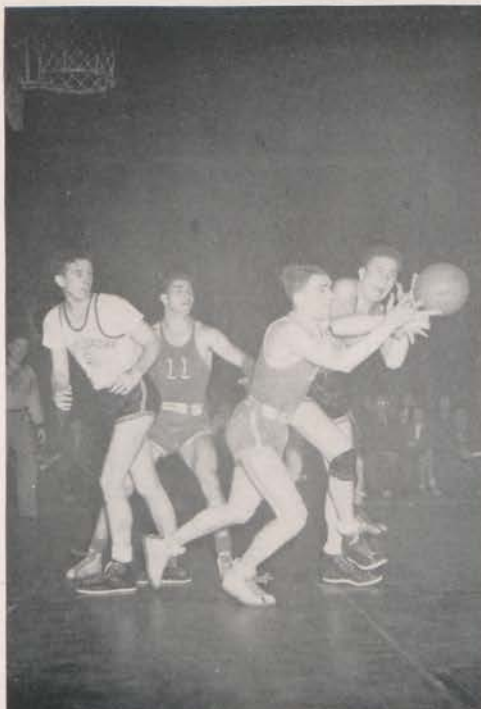
Stutz Modzelewski, who paced the Rams with 14 points, surpassed the record of his high-scoring predecessor at State, Chet Jaworski. His 7 points in the first half were enough to eclipse the mark. He now has tallied the incredible number of 1436 points in his collegiate career.

Bill Rutledge and Bob Applebee kept the Rams within striking distance throughout the game with their sizzling floor play.

Providence has now defeated Colby, Lowell Textile, Worcester Tech, Assumption, Siena, Springfield and R. I. State and ranks as one of the leading court powers in the East. St. Anselm comes to town tomorrow night to battle the Friars at Harkins Hall.

Frosh Also Win

The Friar Frosh also outscored the R. I. State yearlings winning 74-65. The Frosh once again came from behind to preserve their undefeated slate. Henri Ethier and Ben Paglioroli scored 28 and 23 points respectively to lead the Friar point-makers. Don Donabedian contributed 27 points to the losing cause.

Stutz Modzelewski, Rhode Island State Senior from Worcester, boosted himself to the major college scoring pinnacle as he amassed 18 points in a sensational duel with Holy Cross before 4435 shrieking fans at the Auditorium last night. Rewriting the record book, he emblazoned his staggering total of 1598 points in place of the 1596 Hank Luisetti of Stanford had written therein several years ago.

In the opening engagement, Providence College toyed with the Boston College Independents, 64-37, allowing mercy to temper justice, after quickly demonstrating that they could win with almost effortless ease. The Eagles, football stars all, were willing and generous in their eagerness to contribute their services to the splendid cause for which the games were sponsored, but they lacked the condition and finesse of the well-drilled Friars, and were never serious contenders.

Providence College, although lax in the shooting department, outplayed Boston College so decisively in the early stages of their game that they enjoyed leads of 15-3, 19-4 and 23-6 before they put on the brakes.

As it was, with Capt. Horace Marone gathering 11 points and Larry Drew eight, the Friars reached the halfway mark sporting the expansive bulge of 25 to 10.

The second half was much more evenly played, for the Eagles improved as they went along, until the fresher Friars staged a brief spurt late in the last half that eliminated the last vestiges of competition.

McConnon Gets Six

Marone didn't score at all in the second half, but the ailing Ted McConnon elected to give his shooting a little exercise and rippled the ribbons six times from the field. His 12 points were high for the night, followed by Marone's 11 and Drew's 10. Angelo Nicketakis paced the Eagles with eight points, while Monk Maznicki was gathering six and Ed Zabilski, another Rhode Island product, four.

Coach Ed Crotty of the Friars used his entire Varsity squad, and every one scored. Coach Denny Myers of the Eagles used all his men too, shifting them around as the demands of leghpower and wind required. Nine of the 10 Bostons managed to tally, too.

P. C.'S UNDEFEATED RECORD BLASTED AT SPRINGFIELD

Crottymen, Beaten 58 to 48,

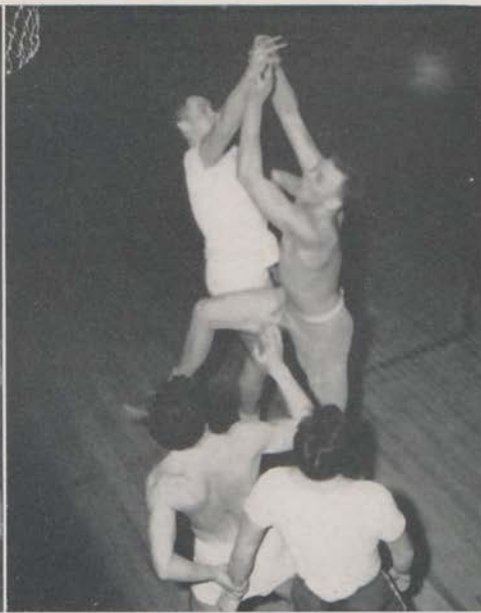
Shooting with amazing accuracy and presenting such aggressiveness on defense that the highly favored visitors never could get any system into their attack, the AIC's started bombarding the basket right from the start and, although there were many anxious moments when it appeared the visitors would gain a decisive edge, they piled up a lead that at one stage of the second half reached 17 points.

Except for the first 10 minutes, when the lead changed hands several times, and for a few moments of the last half, when Providence threw five successive field goals, the game belonged entirely to AIC.

This was an AIC team that was really hot. It threw shots from all angles—from the corners, on the run, off balance and long set pops—and often as not the ball swished through the netting while Providence, taller, heavier and confident, battled through the early stages waiting for its anticipated superiority to assert itself. But the more the AIC's surged forward, the higher grew their point total, and when Providence started to miss set shots, fumble passes and then muff lay-up tosses there wasn't much that could be done.

There was a time in the second half when Providence slashed AIC's lead from 17 to seven points—and then it cooled off. AIC couldn't score for the next three minutes—in fact it went six minutes in all without a point—but the Friars couldn't take advantage of their opportunities. When a basket did come it was tossed by an AIC player—and Coach Bill Moge's charges were off and running to the finish.

To boil it down the game was one of those story-book affairs that seldom come true. AIC spurted into
