Physical Education

OVER THE HURDLES

The summer trimester itself was an innovation at the College. But along with this, the summer and the war ushered in another new baby—the Physical Education program. Coach Crotty spent a considerable amount of time and energy planning the program which was designed to make every Providence College man physically fit for the armed services. The fireworks started on Monday, June 15th, 1942.

Of course, the program was comprehensive. Calisthenics and relay races were introduced in addition to a 200-yard barrier race. The course for this ordeal was dotted every twenty yards with such obstacles as hurdles, a four-foot vault, a twelve-foot ladder climb, a five-and-one-half-foot barrier, additional hurdles, and a final six-foot wall which had to be negotiated.

The fellows were kept stepping. For the first few weeks they were nursing aching backs and treating sprained ankles. Some thought that they would not be able to stand the grind. But perfect practice makes perfect. Time did tell a tale.

Each student had to meet certain time requirements. Marks were given on the basis of a student's ability and effort. Coach Crotty kept a detailed file of each student's record and potentialities. Student athletes acted as assistants in the calisthenic drills. The entire program was in accord with Army and Navy standards.

Most memorable of all the exercises, was the cross country run around the circumference of the campus properties. The distance covered varied from one to two and one-half miles, depending on both the student's athletic ability and his ingenuity. The latter was frustrated by Coach Crotty after the first few days of the course when the wise guys who had employed their jallopies to cover the Eaton and Smith Street portions of the course were apprehended.

A Physical Education Jamboree was held at the College on August 13th. Medals were awarded to the winners in the 100-yard dash, the running broad jump, and the cross country run. In addition there was a series of relay races between six-man teams representing the various classes.

When late autumn came, Coach Crotty moved his Olympic field indoors to the auditorium of Harkins Hall. Here new body building exercises were introduced. Boxing was added and now wrestling.

Providence College men now are graduated with diplomas representing brawn as well as brain.

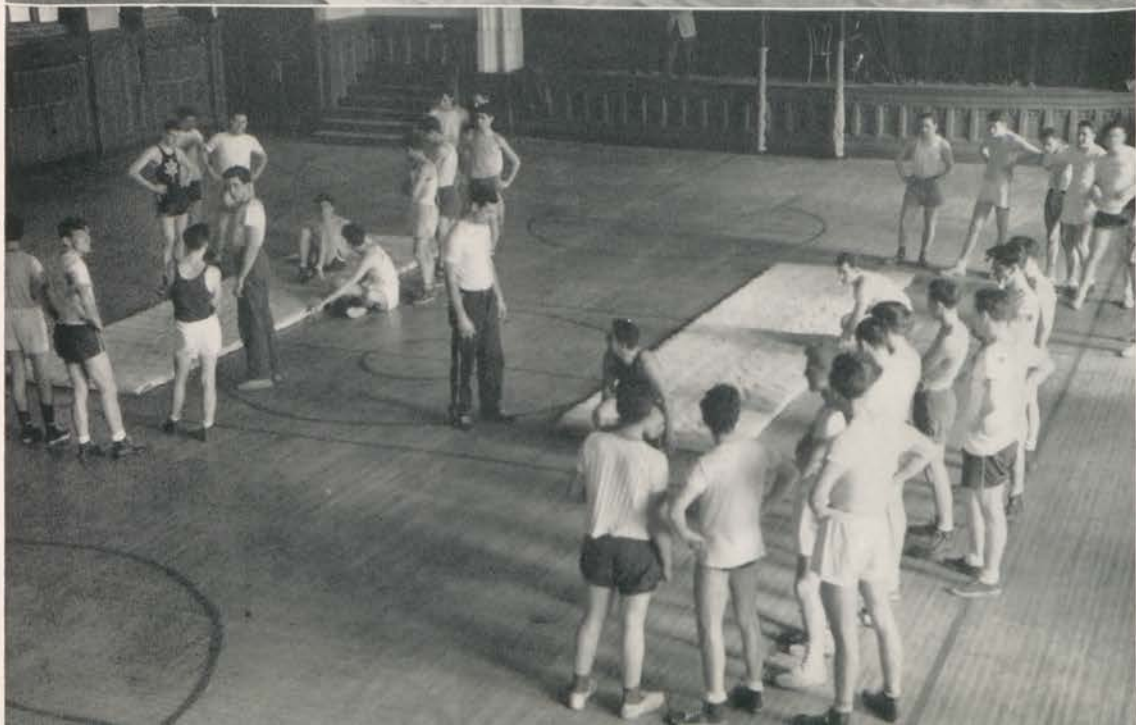
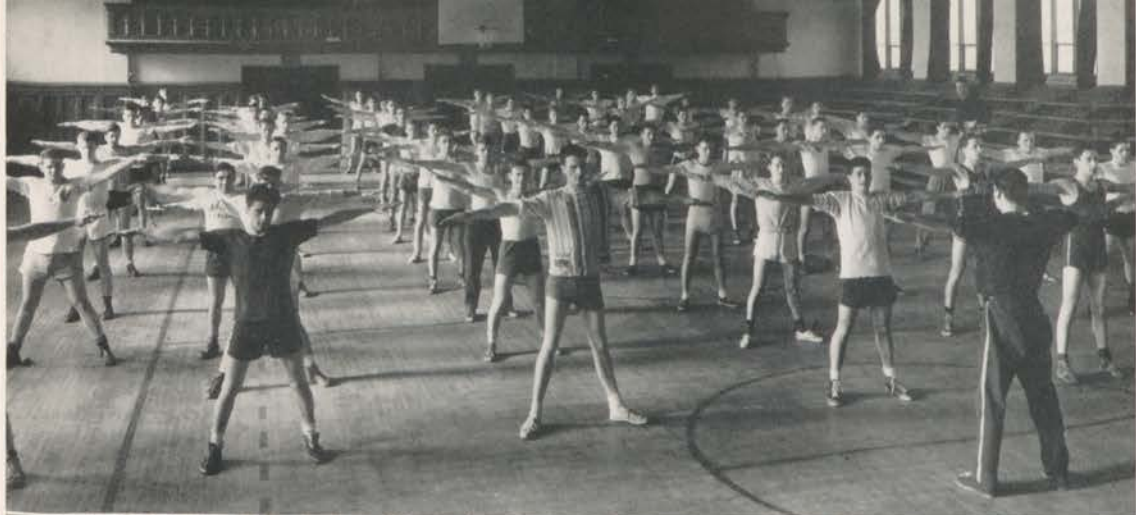

1942-43 Varsity basketball made the best record at Providence College since the championship days of the "roaring 'twenties'." The team won fifteen games out of twenty starts. Two of the losses were by close scores—by one point to Springfield, by two points to Rhode Island State. It was no disgrace to lose to Manhattan this year, nor to Seton Hall in any year of recent date. Selective Service and call of the Reserves took men who were stars in the early part of the season, but the over-all scoring put the Friars in second place for team high-scoring in national collegiate circles with a general average of 62 points per game. One of the sweetest victories was over Brown, because Brown had beaten Rhode Island State, after State had beaten the Friars twice.
