

The official College diploma, adopted in 1941, is copied from the most famous and venerable manuscript in the Order of Friars Preachers, the liturgical book of 1000 pages, PROTOTYPE of Blessed Humbert of Romans, Master General of the Order from 1254 to 1263.

The caption "Collegium Providentiense" is supported by the extended arm of a friar, just as it appears on the contents page of the PROTOTYPE. This indicates that the College is conducted and upheld by the Dominican Fathers. In this friar very ancient and very modern symbolism meet, since it also stands for the symbol by which the College is popularly known, as in athletics, "The Friars".

The lettering and illumination of the diploma are taken from various alphabets throughout the PROTOTYPE, but the blue and red of the diploma are the colors in which the whole contents page of the PROTOTYPE is finished. The long tendrils of the C and P in the caption extend at times in a most graceful manner along the entire margin of the medieval manuscript.

The technical work was made possible by Father Hinnebusch's photography and research; Mr. Robert Barrie of St. Andrew's Studios, Providence, produced the artistic composition.

But what conclusion can be drawn about the Providence College class of '49?






CAROLAN CLUB




NEW BEDFORD CLUB




SPIKED SHOE CLUB






SWIMMING CLUB



The next game with Brooklyn was a thriller. With the lead changing hands a total of twenty-one times the Kingsmen and Friars battled on even terms throughout most of the encounter. Our stellar Sophomore Sam Nissell led the way with eleven goals and five fouls. The veteran combination of Bresnahan, Lozoski, and Williams—the latter appearing in his first game—contributed immensely to the victory.

"Aces Fashion Major Upset as P. C. Strikes Bad Night". This was the headline that welcomed us the morning after an inspired A. I. C. Club, definitely up for the game, defeated an overconfident Friar quintet, 55-51. Ray Garcia was high for P. C. with twelve points.

After their poor performance against A. I. C., P. C. was decidedly the underdog in the game with Boston College. Coached by General McClellan, former Friar mentor, B. C. went all out in the first half and left the court sporting a five point lead. In the second half, with Alex Becker leading the way, Providence overhauled the Eagles, plucking them, 63-58, for a grand victory.

A week later the Friars began their road trip meeting Yale at New Haven. The eligibility of "Shanky" Pellegrino, high scoring L. I. U. transfer, heartened the squad and its rooters. Pellegrino's presence in the lineup, however, was not enough, as Yale, led by their All-American forward, Tony Lavelli, defeated the Friars, 88-51. Held to a 31-30 half time advantage, the Bulldogs scored ten quick points at the outset of the second half to hop to a commanding lead. From then on it was only a matter of how high they'd go, as they raced the hapless Friars off the court.

Although outscoring the Peacocks of St. Peter's College, 46-44, from the floor, the club lost the second game of their road trip, 70-60. 
On the return trip, Providence met Fairfield for the second time. The strain of playing five road games in eight nights was evident as the club was hard pressed to pull out a 48-44 victory.

As it was, Springfield, though hard pressed, eked out a 54-51 victory. Lozoski's performance that evening is noteworthy. Displaying set shooting at its best, Walt wasted only one shot while scoring seventeen points. To no avail!

Despite frantic juggling of lineups by Coach Drew, the slump continued. Colby and Bates, generally considered two of the weaker clubs on the schedule, were the next to vanquish the Friars. 

TRACK

If we were to conform strictly to rules of procedure, we would not devote a great deal of space to the track team. As yet, at Providence College, Track is not recognized as a major sport, as are Basketball and Baseball. Classification notwithstanding, to relegate the efforts of the members of this team to a "back seat" would be to display shameful ingratitude and complete lack of appreciation. It would be a denial of the obvious fact that an era—yes, a golden era—has begun here at the College.

Little more than a year ago, Track was added to the list of competitive sports. Harry Coates appeared, issued his call for candidates in the form of a challenge, and the era began. Those present when Harry was introduced to the student body, that St. Patrick's night, 1948, will always remember it. This elderly man spoke and all were spellbound—a track team was no longer an ideal, a dream, but a reality; and there in the boxing ring stood

the man, who was to lead that team to the heights. No one doubted his ability that night—no one doubts it today. It is inevitable that he attain success for he will accept nothing else.

Harry promised no miracles. Anyone even slightly familiar with athletics knows that a track team of championship caliber is not the product of weeks or months. If material and team spirit are lacking, no matter the qualifications of the coach. Spirit—Coates found in abundance! Material? Well, work, work, and more work!

Harry asked only for men "with strong legs and guts". His challenge was answered by veterans, softened by years of comparative inactivity—Frosh, right out of high school—kids and men! Some had run before in competition, most had not. All responded to Coates' call with an enthusiasm never before witnessed at Providence College. They say that track is a lonely man's sport

because of the hours spent silently in conditioning; yet such gregarious characters as Frank DiIuglio, Ray Forgays and Jake Powell were among the first to report. And they worked! They ran until, exhausted, they threw themselves on the turf; quarter milers and half milers plodded over a six mile course because Harry told them to do so. By Aquinas and Guzman, down Eaton St., up River Ave., behind the stands at Hendricken Field, round and round again! Thus the team was developed.

Harry wanted a board track! Faced with conditions that would have deterred many a younger coach and a more experienced squad, Coates did not falter. One of his first acts was to lay out a temporary track on land but recently brushland. Nothing elaborate, not even cinders, but a track, nonetheless! Here he conducted several intramural meets, culling the most promising aspirants for his squad. Here, too, he trained his original team. Any day, any time, one had but to look past the parking lot to see him there, striding about shouting instructions, demonstrating proper form, setting an example for effort. Even then he was formulating plans for the construction of a board track, an inestimable asset to an indoor track team. Last fall there was dumped on Hendricken Field a pile of lumber and some nails. There was the track. Between workouts the team transformed that shapeless pile into a board track that will



see plenty of use these coming years. Another step forward!

During the summer of 1948, Gerry Alexander, representing P. C., won the New England A.A.U. Senior Championship with a javelin throw of 191 feet 5½ inches. This was the first entry into a track record book of a P. C. athlete.

Fall came—Cross country, more for conditioning than competition, was introduced. Two thousand students roamed the campus and with them the ever watchful with Brown and La Salle. The Mutt and Jeff combination of the Frosh relay team, Jerry Kallman and John Cassedy, believed that "long Johns" were the uniform of the day as they successfully gave their all, time and time again, preparing for the big days to come—days when they would lead the pack to the wire in the best meets in the country.

The Friars made their first New England appearance in the Boston Garden, the occasion being the K. of C. meet. The Frosh finished second to the amazing Seton Hall freshman. The Varsity placed fourth in their race which was taken by Springfield College. In the Annual BAA games the frosh closely followed Boston University to the tape and the Varsity placed third to B. C. and R.P.I.

The big event on the schedule is the Providence College Board Track Meet, both interscholastic and intercollegiate. This is scheduled for Saturday, March 12, and as the Veritas goes to press entries are pouring in from all over the East.

Perhaps this story on track at P.C. is a story of Harry Coates, but isn't the name Coates synonomous with track?

At Bloomfield High School, several years ago, Coates' team won the American Championship in the first year, at St. Benedict's, in the second year, at Newark Prep the same span elapsed. Seton Hall Prep, Mercersburg, and N.Y.U. were champs also in the initial venture. Again at Villanova, Seton Hall Prep and Seton Hall College, world records and championships were achieved by Coates coached harriers. From far off Setonia has come the cry that Harry Coates has lost his touch that no longer were his trackmen human whipping posts. The Pirates have already eaten their words—P.C. has made and will make their mark on both board and cinder. It's not a loss of touch—just a change of system.

In the interim the Harriers successfully competed in the Brooklyn K. of C. meet and in the Boston Y.M.C.A. meet. The great Seton Hall frosh this time defeated the Friar yearlings by a scant margin. This was a feather in the Coates hat as the frosh had been handily defeated Harry Coates. He too was a student—not in the academic, but in the athletic sense. He was seeking and separating the men from the boys, picking out future harriers in his fast expanding plans.

A cross-country meet with Brown was scheduled. None of the Friars had ever run the tedious four mile distance; the heavens opened and a courageous band of trackmen plodded through seas of mud over the unknown terrain. Maps were not the order of the day and many a runner was seen to head toward the nurse's home at Butler Hospital. Knowledge of the course and good conditioning, brought about by many summer meets, spelt victory for the Bruins. Frank Hannaway finished fourth leading all other Friars to the tape. By the time the last Friar came into view Harry had had his evening meal and was lighting his last Pall Mall. It was a hardy and gallant crew that fell victim to Lady Luck and Brown.

With the first snowfall, informal meets were held by the Pirates previously. A point had been proven—the board track on Hendricken Field spelt improvement.

Before 500 rabid fans an intrasquad meet was held on February 27. Alexander tossed the javelin 198' 11", while Anthony Fratantuono hurled the discuss 147' 4".



WITH Dick Maloney, peppery Friar second sacker, contributing several breath-taking defensive plays in addition to his usual timely hitting, the Friars made it three in a row, trouncing Upsala College, 10-4. As in the first two games the Providence pitcher went the distance, with Soph. Don Foley scattering 9 hits over the route. THAT'S THREE!

ONE of the largest crowds of the season was on hand to view the 19th in the series of diamond battles between the R. I. Rams and the P. C. Friars. Highly publicised as a mound duel between big Tom Keenan and State's submarine ball artist, Jack Smith, the game opened in the expected manner. Midway in the game, however, the Friar's defense cracked wide open to the extent of nine errors. So it was that the Rams triumphed, although

outhit and unable to score a single earned run. Final score, R. I. State 10, P. C. 3. A TRAGEDY OF ERRORS!

ON April 28, the Friars journeyed to "Bean Town" where the Eagles of Boston College combined 16 hits, 14 free tickets, a hit batsman and 5 Providence errors to notch a thumping 22-4 win. Five Boston runs in the first inning proved but a forerunner of the deluge. "NUFF SAID!

THE whole school had been waiting impatiently for the game with St. John's. OUT of all the games played, the first encounter with the Bruins will probably be remembered for the longest time. Going into the 6th, Providence held a seemingly comfortable lead of 7-0. 






