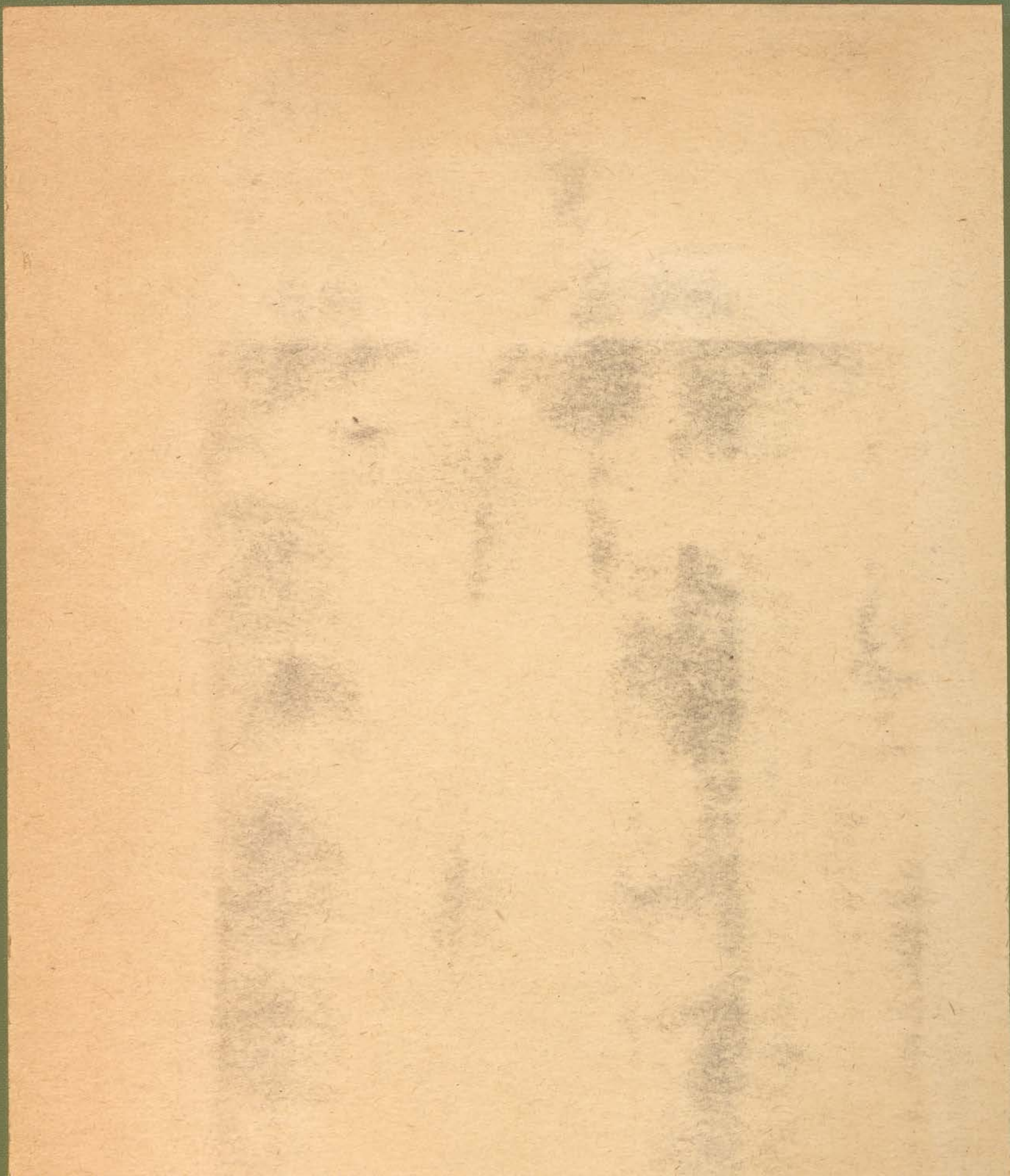


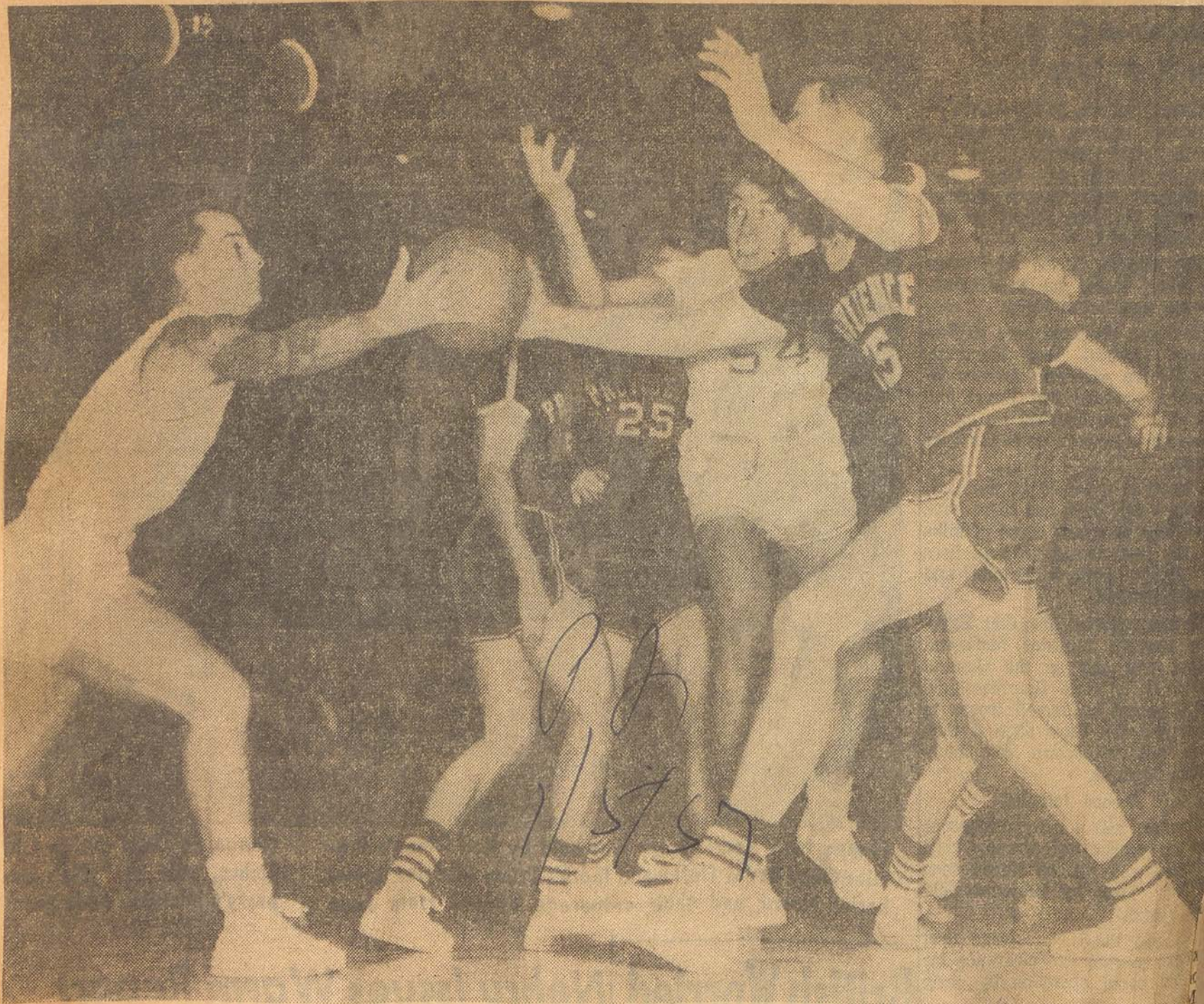

Losers Forced To Fire Mostly From Outside

Providence College's basketball team combined a deliberate offense with a highly effective zone defense and easily defeated the University of Rhode Island, 70-56, before 2,000 spectators last night at Keaney Gym.

With the exception of the first two minutes when Jim Adams' opening basket gave the Rams a brief 2-0 lead, the Friars were out front all the way. Ed Donahue, Captain John Ritch and Mike Pascale supplied the early impetus to PC's steady drive as the Friars ran off 10 straight points and the Rams never were in contention thereafter.

The Friars took their time setting up plays, being content to wait for the optimum shot. And with the Donahue-Ritch-Pascale triumvirate hitting the target with regularity, the PC lead mounted steadily. It was 30-21 at halftime and with four minutes remaining in the game the Friars were 22 points to the good at 64-42.

Conversely the Rams had all kinds of trouble penetrating the Friars' 1-3-1 collapsing defense designed to stop Rhody's scoring twins, Billy Von Weyhe and Ronnie Marozzi. This alignment forced the Rams to shoot from outside, kept Von Weyhe and Marozzi bottled up near the hoop and limited Rhody to very few offensive rebounds.

Figures Talk

In the latter department Ritch, Donahue and Roger Canestrari, who started his first game, excelled for the Friars. URI's shooting figures bespeak the effectiveness of the Friars' defense. The Rams attempted only 50 shots from the floor.

Donahue took down game scoring honors with 20 points while Ritch contributed 15 and Pascale 14. Most of Mike's baskets came on his patented jump shot, set up by well-executed plays. He tallied 12 in the first half while the Friars were going about the business of getting control of the game.

Von Weyhe scored 18 for the Rams but 12 came on free throws and even in this normally excellent phase for him, he was off his game. The leading foul shooter in the nation last year and third going into last night's game with 24 conversions in 26 attempts, Von Weyhe missed five out of 17 from the free-throw line.

Marozzi, who had scored 30 points in the Rams' last game against St. John's, took only eight shots at the basket last night and most of these came in the late stages. He picked up his fourth foul three minutes after the start of the second half and sat out the next nine minutes.

Adams Sharp

Jim Adams made the biggest contribution to the losers' cause with his everlasting hustle on both offense and defense. He led the Rams in field goals with six and scored 15 points in all.

The Rams lost Steve Madreperla on fouls with 2:10 to go but by that time the decision was safely tucked away.

The victory evened the Friars' season record at 3-3 and shot them into the lead in the intrastate series with a 2-0 mark. Rhody is 1-1 and Brown 0-2.

75-72, in overtime, Len Wilkens and Wally DiMasi paced the Friar yearlings' attack with 25 and 22 points, respectively. At one point DiMasi scored three baskets within 12 seconds after stealing the ball on out-of-bounds plays. Adrian Chrust led the Ramlets with 26 points.

The Providence College Friars opened the new year with a 70-56 triumph over the Rhode Island Rams last night at Kingston and balanced up their season with three victories in six starts.

Meanwhile Brown dropped a 76-56 hoop contest to the Colby Mules at Waterville and the powerful Clarkson skaters defeated the Providence College Friars, 7-2, on ice at Potsdam, N.Y.

In tonight's action, the Rhody Rams go up against Rutgers at New Brunswick and Tom Eccleston's P.C. hockey forces tackle St. Lawrence, another eastern hockey power, at Canton, N.Y., in the second game on their trip.

The basketball Friars started out as though they meant busi-

ness and built up a 20-6 margin in the first 12 minutes that just about settled the encounter. The Rams were sluggish and cold in the first half, pepped up some later but not enough to appreciably cut into the Friars when it counted.

Eddie Donohue, 190-pound junior from New York City, took scoring honors for the Friars with 20 points. Donohue played well but perhaps no better than Johnny Ritch, who was good around the boards, and Mike Pascale, who put in several shots that helped kill Ramesses.

Anytime coach Jack Guy gets

only four baskets from his big guns, Billy Von Weyhe and Ronnie Marozzi, Rhody is going to be in serious trouble. Last night the Friars defended Von Weyhe in such a manner that at times he seemed to be surrounded by black shirts. Marozzi didn't get his single bucket until the final minute.

Von Weyhe had 17 rebounds and scored 18 points, including a dozen from the free throw line. Coach Guy thought his charges needed more work collectively and singled out Jimmy Adams as the only one of his regulars who played with any real drive offensively.

At times Coach Joe Mullaney's Friars played it smooth and easy. They moved the ball around for a good shot and Pascale and Donahue sank most of them in the early going as Providence went ahead and led by 30-16 close to halftime.

"They (Providence) were hitting on their shots and we weren't," commented Adams, who played his best game of the year. Jimmy put some life in the Rams in the second half and had 15 points.

Lacked Work

Both coaches, Mullaney and Guy, were worried before the game about the lack of work that their respective squads had engaged in since the holidays got underway. The Friars' key men came up with a better job and that made it so much easier generally.

The Friars, who won their second game in the State series and are on top in that competition with a 2-0 mark, take on the usually tough St. Anselm Hawks tomorrow afternoon at 3 p.m. at Alumni Hall. Al Grenert has another capable team this season and will probably push the Friars, although last night's triumph should boost the PC morale and was a good one for their viewpoint.

A couple of unsung members of the respective squads flashed some fine work last night at Frank Keane gym. Ken Peckham proved a ball hawk for the Rams while Pete Schementi and Gordie Holmes collaborated on one of the prettiest hoops of the night with Pete making a nifty behind-the-back pass right on the mark. Holmes had eight points.

Friar Sextet Too Eager

P.C. Frosh Win

Lenny Wilkens caged some key shots as the P.C. Frosh nipped the URI Ramlets, 75-72, in overtime. Rhody had several wide margins in the first half, leading by 21 points, but the young Friars finally overhauled them in the second half. Adrian Christ's free throw, one of his 26 points, sent the game into overtime for the Ramlets. Both former URI hoop greats, Ernie Calverly and Bill Baird, had some anxious moments before Calverly's club won it.

Eddie Rowe and Bob Van Lammers, highly prominent in Clarkson's unbeaten season a year ago, accounted for five goals last night against the Friars, whose main fault was over-eagerness. Rowe, an All America choice from Cornwall, Ont., had two goals and an assist while Van Lammers, from Ottawa, had three goals and an assist. Bernie McCrink and George Boudreau scored for the Friars, who were tied 1-all at the end of the first period. PC trailed 4-2 starting the final period.

R.I. Colleges To Compete In Hub Meet

Ed Aron of Providence College, who finished fourth in the IC4A shotput last year, will compete in the Knights of Columbus track meet at Boston Garden tomorrow.

The Friars also have entered Jim Sullivan in the pole vault and will compete in one-mile and two-mile varsity races and one-mile freshman relay event.

Friars Check St Anselm's Blazing Rally, Get

67-65 Verdict Ritch, Donohue Shine For P.C. in Thriller

Providence College nipped St. Anselm's, 67-65, in a basketball thriller yesterday at the Friars' Alumni Hall. The Hawks closed with a rush but the Friars withstood their driving finish and won a squeaker that almost slipped away from them.

Early in the second half, P.C. was sailing along on a 17-point lead and had a 16-point margin with about 8:30 remaining. However, the Hawks suddenly found themselves, closed the gap to a point where one shot might have done it, and then ran out of time as the Friars fought tenaciously for the decision.

Twin stars for the Friars were Eddie Donohue, who put in several clutch shots, and Johnny Ritch, who was of great value in the rebounding and defense. Without the scoring assistance supplied by Mike Pascale and Gordie Holmes, Providence couldn't have done it either, but Donohue and Ritch excelled in make-or-break situations.

Typical P.C.-Hawk Tilt

This game followed the pattern of the Friar-Hawks series and was in doubt right to the final second. Providence appeared to have the decision all wrapped up at one stage with some fine work generally, but once the scrappy Hawks started to hit and hurt, it was anybody's ball game.

Donohue, who is an improved and more confident player this season, was taken ill at the start of the second half and Coach Joe Mullaney put in Holmes. The Pawtucket West alumnus ran off eight straight points as the Friars nearly ran the Hawks out of business. But every point was needed as St. Anselm's played terrifically in the closing

Then Jim Dyer fouled Donohue, trying to get at the ball while the Friars were trying to hold it and perhaps run out the clock. The Hawks were all over the court and covering close and somebody was bound to foul in heated congestion.

Two Big Free Throws

Donohue stepped up to the line and sank both his free throws under pressure. The Hawks took time out and netted a 3-point play with 39 seconds left. They worked the ball around quickly and rangy John Collamore, who practically beat the Friars by himself as a sophomore, tapped in a rebound in a

scramble after O'Donnell had tried another one-hander.

With only a one-point advantage, 66-65, and seconds remaining, the Friars got another opportunity from the free throw line when Bob Barrett bumped Donohue. Eddie sank the first one and missed his bonus shot. The Hawks did get the ball in the scramble and then there was a jump between Donohue and Collamore, with P.C. coming up with the ball and passing it around in desperate fashion as the clock ticked off the final 12 seconds.

Big Ritch played brilliantly in the rebound department. Statistically his performance of 14 rebounds doesn't look very big but on the court it was tre-

P.C. Defense

The Hawks couldn't do much with the defenses that Coach Mullaney set up at the start and couldn't hit often enough from the outside. Once Coach Al Grenert changed his offensive strategy a bit and the Friars weakened some, then it developed into quite a ball game.

The Hawks outscored the Friars, 34-31, in the second half and gave P.C. more trouble when they switched to a faster-moving style of offense and a crowding defense. Dick Broderick, Collamore, Barrett and O'Donnell all played leading roles in the Hawks' comeback.

The Providence College Frosh, paced by Walt DiMasi (28), Lenny Wilkens (16) and John Woods (14) won their fifth straight victory with an 84-53 triumph over Nichols Junior College. Bob Huelte featured for Nichols.

Providence College Sextet Plays A.I.C.'s Aces at Arena Tonight

The Providence College hockey team, this season predominantly a road club, makes one of its few home appearances tonight against American International College at the R.I. Auditorium at 8:30 o'clock. This game and a preliminary, at 6:30, comprise the only sports competition locally involving a Rhode Island collegiate team.

While Providence College's sextets are busy at home, its varsity and freshman basketball teams will play tonight at AIC and Leicester Junior College, respectively. Brown also will have two of its teams on the road, the hoopsters facing

Yale at New Haven and the swimmers dueling Amherst.

For the Friar hockey team this will be the last game until after the break for midyear examinations. The next game scheduled is a return engagement with American International in Springfield on Jan. 31. Not until Feb. 14, when Northeastern will be the opponent, do the Friars play in Providence.

Although the Aces of American International are reputed strong, no accurate line can be drawn on them. They have played only once this season, a game they won.

Including a game lost and two games lost in the Boston Holiday Tournament, the Friars have a record of five victories and four defeats.

They found the going rough in upper New York State last weekend, and lost to both Clarkson and St. Lawrence on successive nights. Both are power-packed with experienced operators. Going against them may have given Coach Tommy Eccleston's many sophomore skaters some of the seasoning they admittedly have needed.

Friars' Sextet Turns Back A.I.C. in Rough One, 10-6

Providence College defeated American International College, 10-6, in a wild and rough hockey game at the Auditorium last night. The Friars scored five goals to the Aces' one in the third period of the free-wheeling contest.

No less than 17 penalties were called, two against A.I.C. players for misconduct. Elvin Beaubien and Rudy Basilone shared the box for the better part of half of the final period, the last half, their offenses coming only a little more than a minute apart shortly before mid-period. Basilone's offense was bumping a referee while protesting a minor penalty.

Eight Friars scored goals, with Mike McDonough, a defenseman, and wing Ray Labbee each getting two.

Providence College lost Don Girard, its starting goalie, in the 14th minute of the game. He was forced to leave the ice because of illness. The score was 2-2 at the time. His place was taken by Phil Crawford.

The game opened at a torrid pace, with the Aces scoring in the third minute, the Friars in the fourth and the Aces again in the fifth—three goals in the space of three minutes, lacking a second. Providence College

squared it at mid-period on a goal by Lou LaFontaine.

The score stood at 2-2 going into the second period, during which each side scored three times, with Red Rabitor, Jim Ford and Ray Labbee counting for the Friars and Basilone, Richie Frasco and Beaubien coming through for the opposition.

Labbee started the Friars' third-period five-goal barrage by scoring in 17 seconds. McDonough, Joe Barile, Ray Blanchette, and Paul Sainato followed with the goals that made it 10 for the winners. A.I.C.'s lone tally in the period was made by Leo Fiorini, who netted the puck from an improbable angle.

Girard was not the only person who left the ice because of illness. Referee Bill Kelleher, who had started the game with Gus Rivers, did not come out for the second period after having been examined by a doctor for an upset stomach between periods. He had fallen on ice on his way to the game. His

place was taken by Henry Coupe, who had been one of the referees in the preliminary game.

In the preliminary, the Providence College freshmen defeated LaSalle Academy, 6-1.

Friars' Late Surge Beats

A.I.C. Five, 75-64

P.C. Accuracy At Foul Stripe Brings Victory

Springfield, Mass. — After trailing for most of the game, Providence College's basketball team put on a flurry of 10 consecutive points and scored a 75-64 victory over American International here last night.

The sudden rally pulled the Friars from a 50-48 deficit to a 58-50 lead. It started with about six minutes remaining as Ed Donohue and Capt. Mike Pascale began finding the range.

A look at the free-throw statistics tells the story of the game. Providence made 25 out of 34 while A.I.C. had only eight out of 13.

The Friars kept picking up free-throw chances through their driving tactics on offense while forcing the Aces to shoot mostly from the outside with a collapsing zone defense. So A.I.C. didn't get too many chances at the charity stripe.

Donohue took scoring honors for the night with 24 points and Pascale had 21. John Ritch, P.C. captain, picked up 13 points and was the rebound star. He picked off 15 rebounds, many

Three Out

PC's hockey team will be without the services of three of its regulars tonight against the Aces. Gil Domingue, who suffered a concussion in the Harvard game last month, is still sidelined and last weekend the Friars lost forward George Boudreau and defenseman Ray Blanchette. Boudreau suffered a broken jaw against Clarkson and Blanchette sustained a bruised ankle in the same contest. The Friars carry a 5-4 record into the game.

The prospect of having Tebo available tonight may give the Brown quintet a lift in its game with Yale but Coach Stan Ward isn't banking on Joe's being able to play. The ankle injury, which he suffered early last month, is coming around and he was able to work out lightly with the Bruins yesterday. The Elis, who still are numbered among the leading contenders for the Ivy League title, appear to have too many scoring guns for the Bruins. Sophomore Larry Downs is their top pointmaker.

Coach Joe Mullaney, whose Friars have won the last two games, is wary of AIC, which has knocked off some of the better clubs in New England so far. PC defeated URI and St. Anslem's in its last two starts and now sports a 4-3 record.

More hockey and basketball action is scheduled tonight for the local collegians. The Friar skaters will play their first home game since before the holidays and their only one this month as they entertain American International College at the Auditorium at 8:30. PC's varsity basketball team also opposes AIC tonight, at Springfield, and its freshman quintet meets Leicester Junior College.

In the home-front action, both the Providence College varsity and freshman hockey teams scored victories at the Auditorium. The varsity skaters defeated the American International College team, 10 to 6, in a tempestuous game marked by a six-goal third period, 17 penalties and sudden illness of one player and one official.

Strong Finish

Eight Providence College players participated in the winners' scoring with Mike McDonough and Ray Labbee getting two each. The third period opened with the teams tied 5 to 5 but the Friars overwhelmed the Aces from Springfield in that last session, getting five more goals and holding their opponents to one.

Among the 17 penalties were two misconduct calls against AIC players. The Friars' starting goalie, Don Girard, was forced out of action in the 14th minute of play by sickness and Referee Bill Kelleher could not continue after the first period. Phil Crawford went into the Providence nets and Henry Coupe replaced Kelleher as referee with Gus Rivers.

The P.C. freshmen defeated La Salle Academy, 6 to 1.

The Providence College basketball team defeated American International College at Springfield, 75 to 46, thus compiling a season record of five victories and three defeats.

George Boudreau, sophomore forward on the P.C. hockey team, has ample evidence to prove that his chosen sport isn't exactly for panty-waists. Green and Gymnasts Guests of Brown, P.C.

Brown's basketball team entertains Dartmouth and the Providence College quintet is at home to Springfield in the only local college sports activity tonight.

Away from home, Brown's hockey team plays Dartmouth in its Ivy League opener at Hanover and the University of Rhode Island basketball team faces Northeastern at Boston.

The Bruin quintet, which is 1-2 in the Ivy League and 2-6 overall, faces a tough assignment against the Indians, who are defending league champions and have a distinct height advantage over the locals. Ron Judson, 6'4", Jim Francis, 6'8", and Rudy LaRusso, 6'6" give the Indians a big edge up front. Judson is the top scorer for the Indians, who have won six of 10 games so far and are 1-1 in league play.

Last year the Indians swamped Brown at Hanover but were extended through two overtime periods before winning on the Bears' home court. The varsity game will start at 8 o'clock.

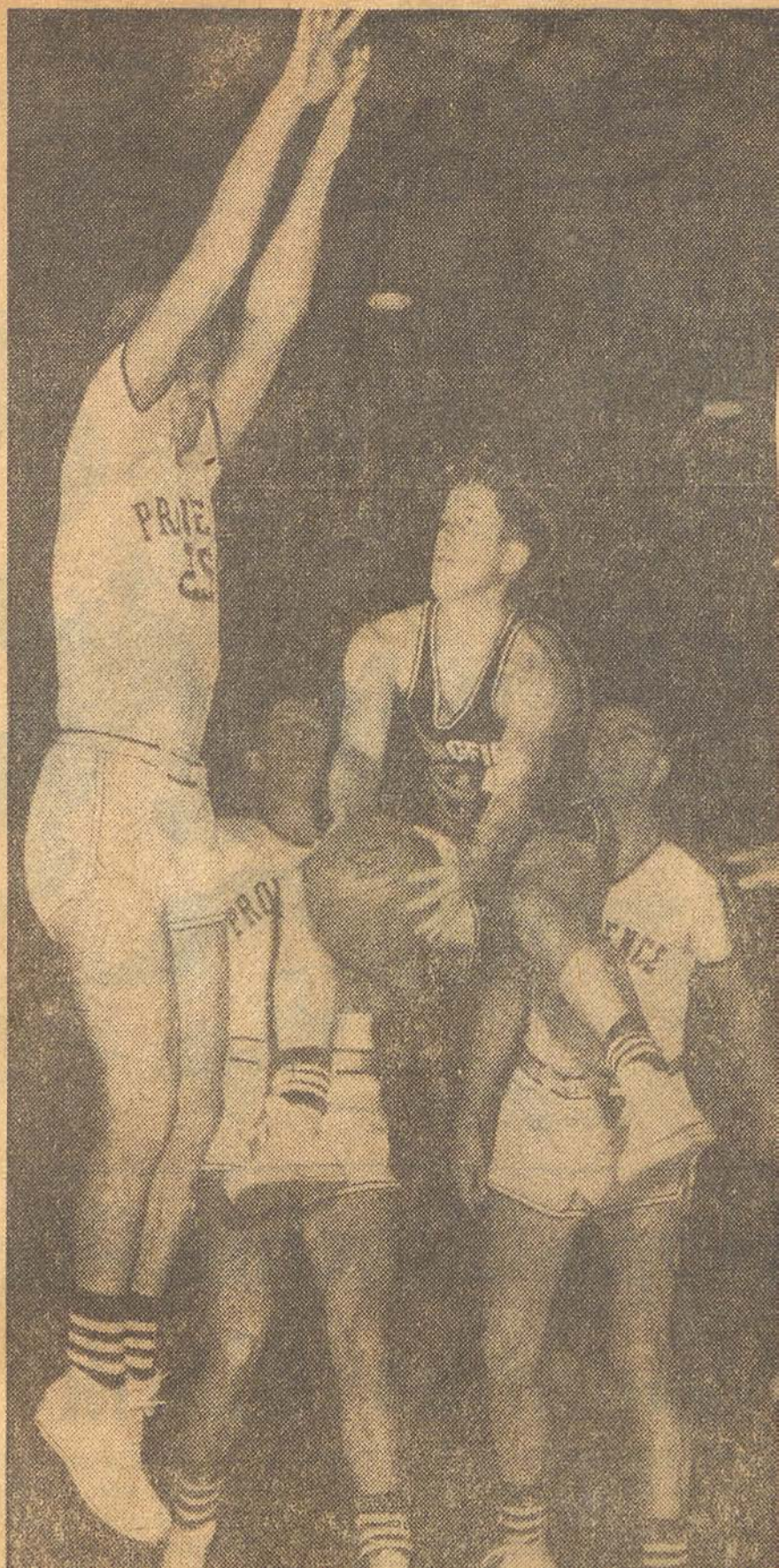

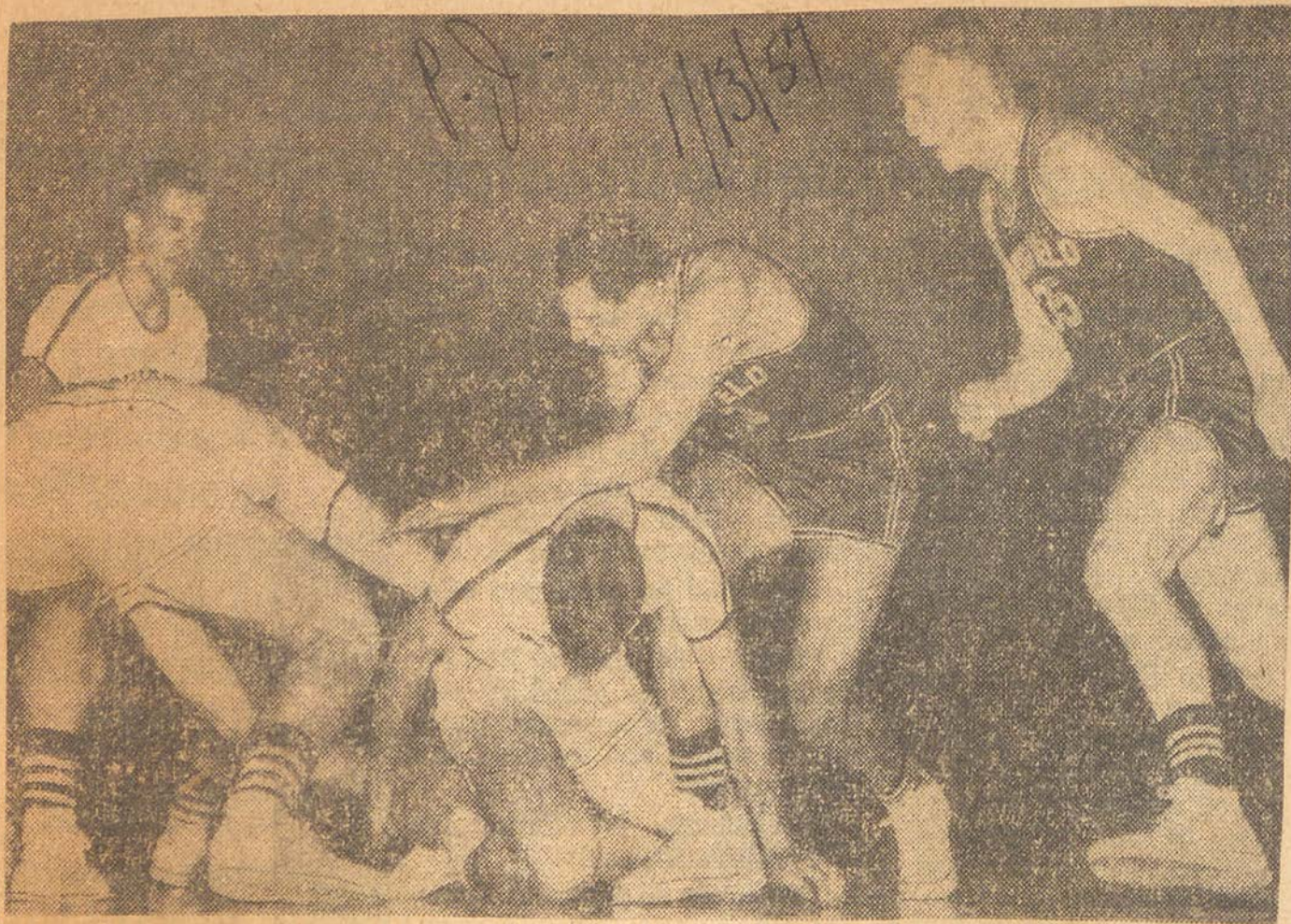

He resigned as coach of the Providence Steam Rollers of the NBA after one season—a rather disastrous one at that—saying that “the situation was untenable.” He hied himself off to Philadelphia, where he returned to the college ranks and directed La Salle to the NCAA championship with what he called (Tom) “Gola and garbage.”

But Texas being Texas, with its fierce desire to boast of nothing but the biggest and the best, and Loeffler being Loeffler, a man who loathes retrogression (Gola graduated), there was a sudden meeting of minds on the problem of how to convert Texas A & M from a basketball non-entity into a national power. Given every assurance that an abundance of player material would be made available to him, Ken had no trouble making up his mind.

Probation!

But now, apparently, Ken has ample reason to regret his move. He was quoted recently as saying, “There's no point in athletics if you must play game after game with no chance of winning. That's the situation at A & M. There's no hope for improvement.”

As a matter of fact, Ken's dis-

cruiting was a new experience for me. I'm not accustomed to spending 40 weeks on the road, living with parents and courting prospects. But that's what recruiting is down there. It's a year-round proposition and you have to have the alumni working for you.

“There's no basketball tradition at A & M. The school has been in the subbasement of the Conference for 35 years and is not used to winning in basketball.

“It's a great place for kids and old women,” was Loeffler's parting shot. “But I don't know how long the old man can hold out.”

With A & M's current record standing at four victories and 11 defeats, it may not be far long

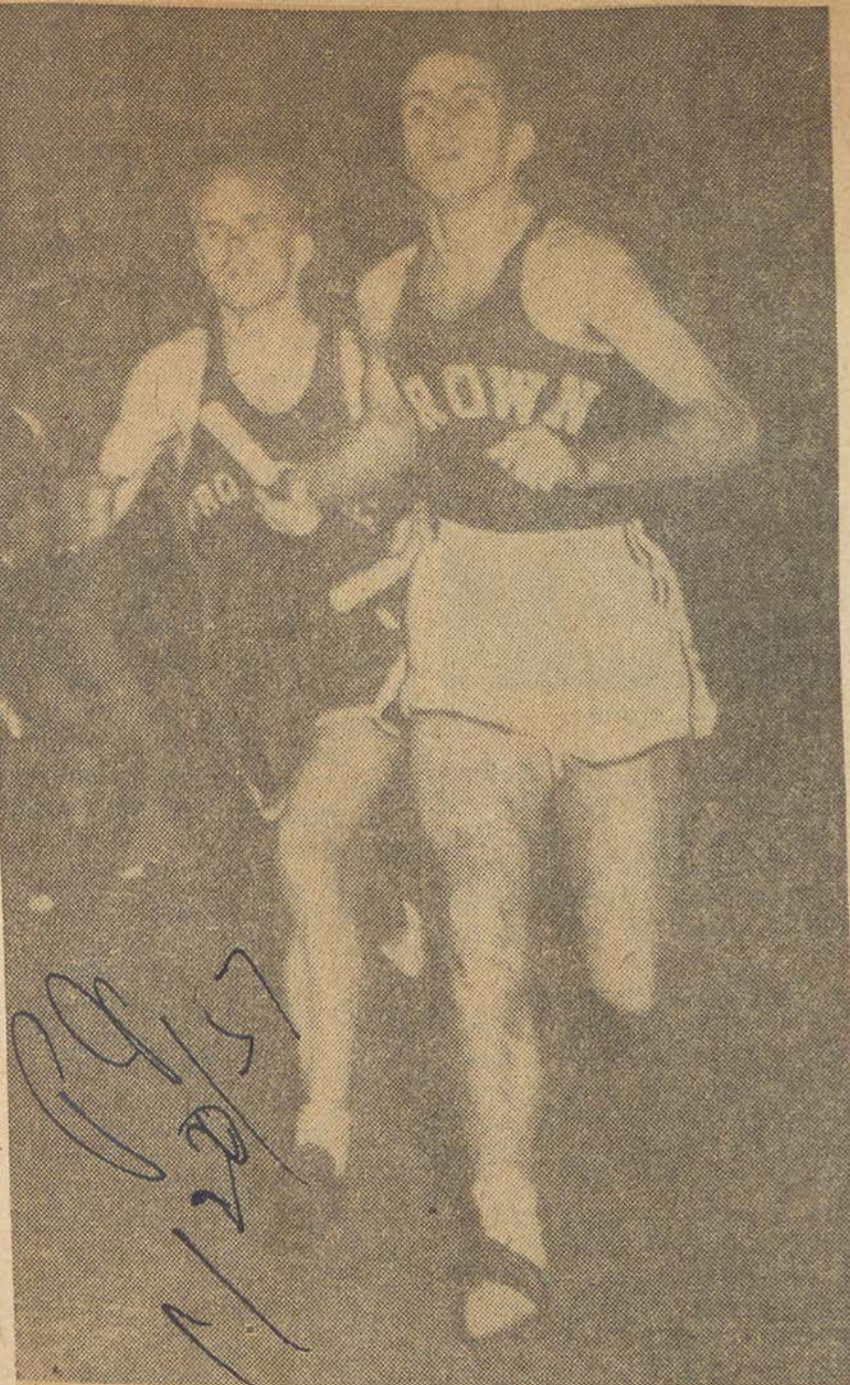

Frankie Five Promises P.C. Stiff Test

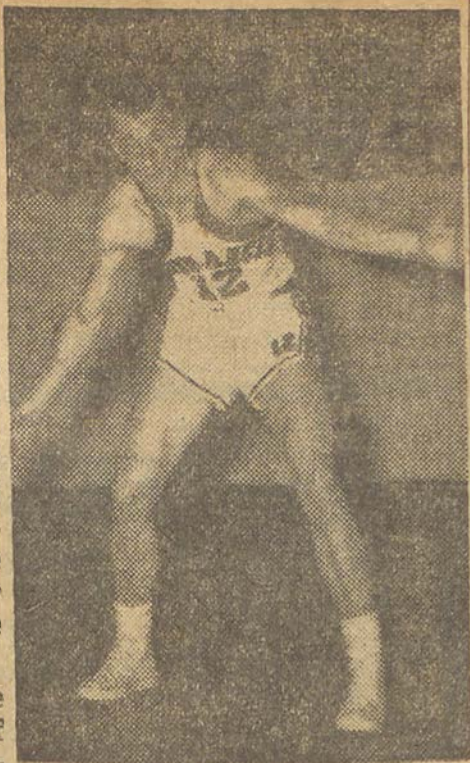

Friars Consistent

Coached by Dr. W. T. (Skip) Hughes, who has taken his team to the N.I.T., the Frankies put up a strong game and might have beaten the Friars on some other night. Frank Puschauber, senior captain, played a steady, dependable game and put in some nice set shots.

Providence had trouble defending against Jim McClellan and Leonard Nixon around the basket. McClellan, who is the team's leading scorer, put in 21 last night. The Frankies out-rebounded the Friars but Providence had superior shooting and handled the ball better in clutch spots.

Coach Joe Mullaney of the Friars was highly satisfied with the victory, one of the biggest and best posted by his charges in his two seasons at the Providence helm. Providence not only won the game but looked good doing it.

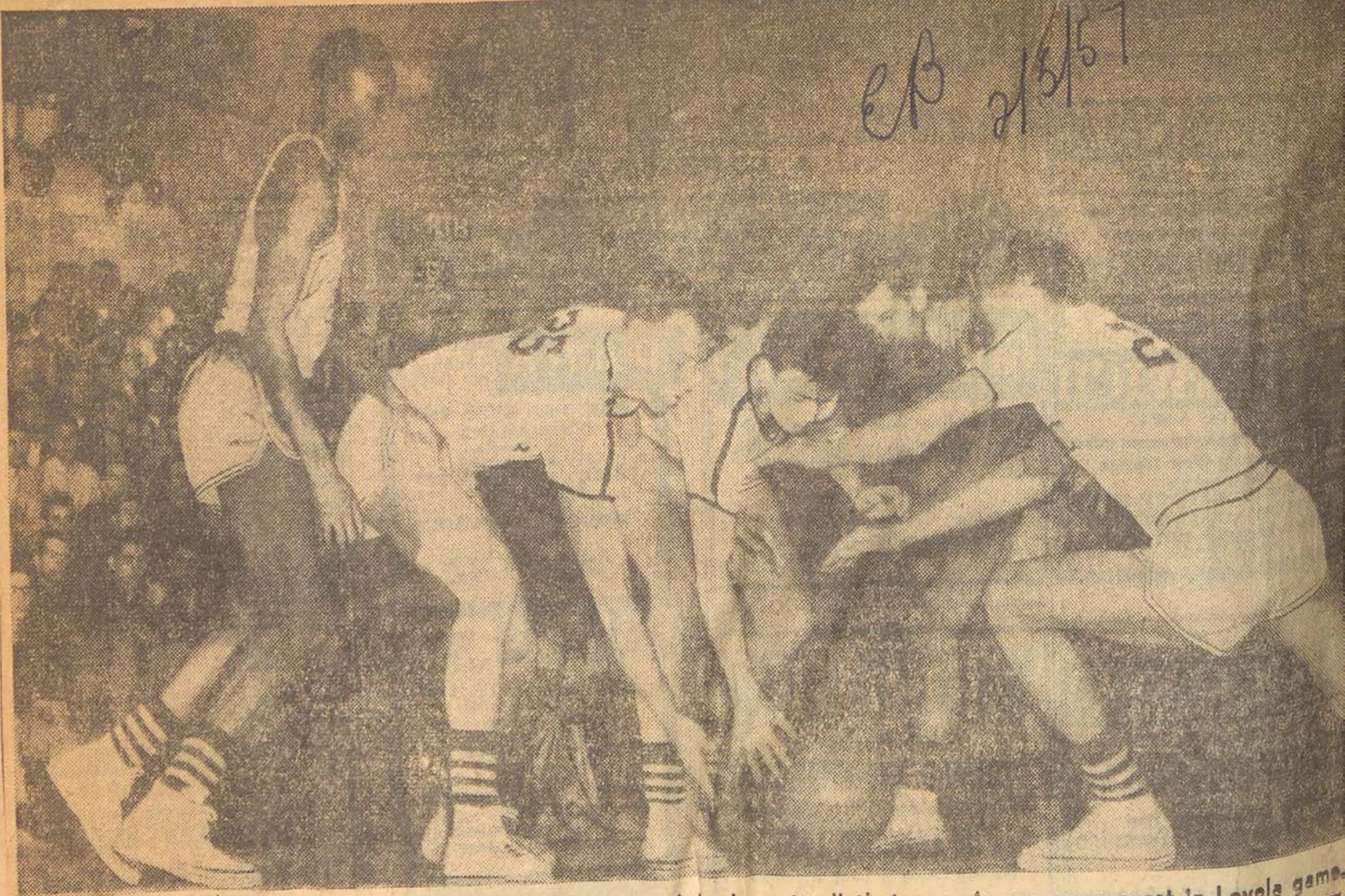

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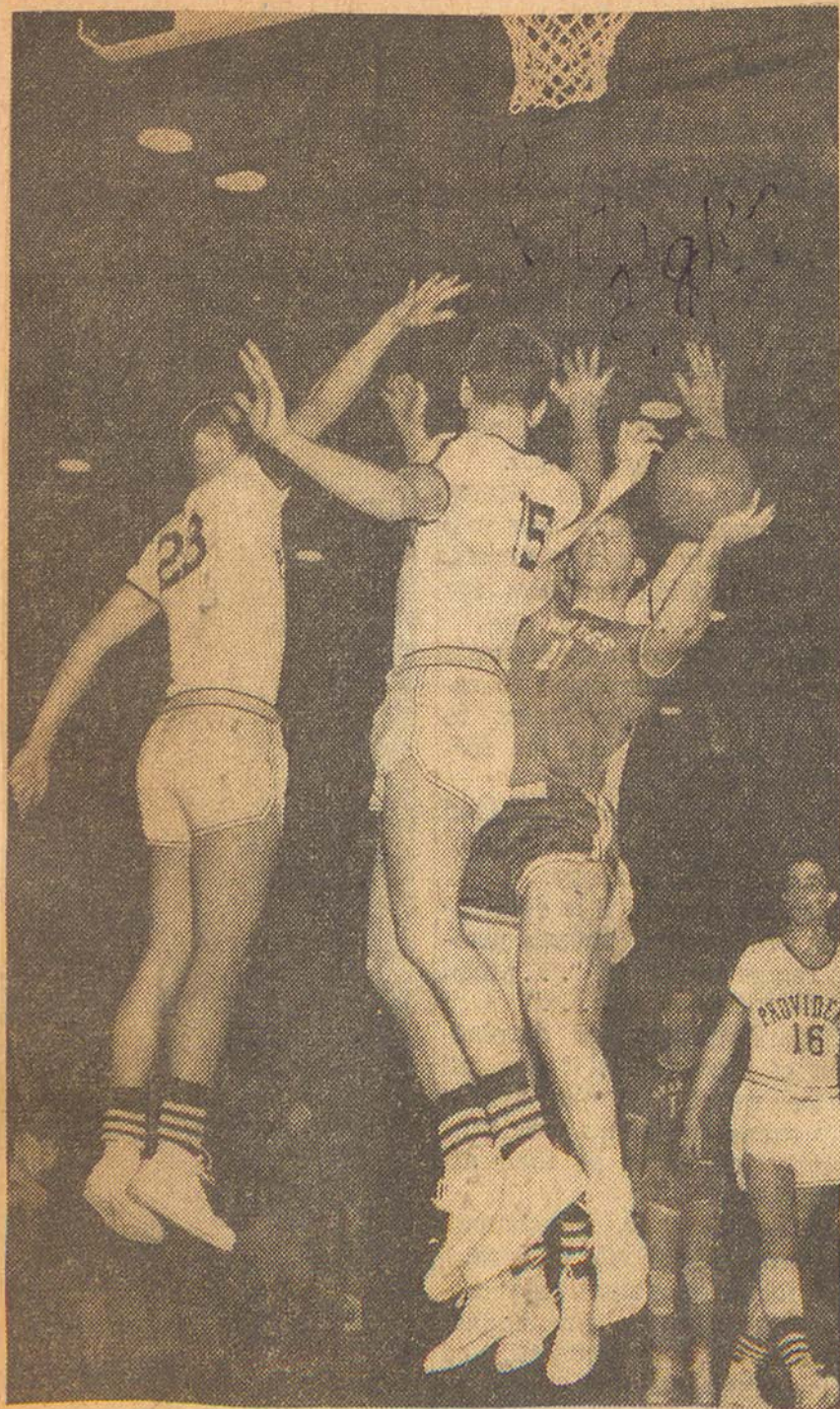

The Judges played their top game of the season in Madison Square Garden when they tripped up New York University. And on the strength of that they got a feeler for the National Invitation Tourney. They are a battling team and are better shooters than they showed last night, according to Stein and his assistant, Foxy Flumere.

The Friars had a host of heroes. Jim Swartz contributed three big points in the closing seconds. His two final pitches from the free throw line came with two seconds left in overtime and definitely clinched it. Roger Canestrari, Dick Bessette, Frank Tirico, and Lionel Jenkins all had their big moments as did Ritch and Donahue. Eddie played a fine game, without any flash. He was at the right spot a good many times and so was Ritch.

Aranow, who played on the New York City All Stars as a schoolboy tossed in some big hoops for the Judges, who trailed, 30-24 at the half. Aranow sent the game into overtime at 60-all and also kept the Judges rolling with three hoops in the extra period.

Len Wilkens scored 41 points—high for a freshman player this

season—as the Friar Frosh defeated Brandeis, 100-71, last night. Walt Di Masi had 25 for the Friar Freshmen, who have won 15 straight games. Adrian Chrust's 15-point effort was high for the Ramlets as they bowed to the UMass Frosh, 74-56.

Friars Drop Brandeis

Jim Swartz' 3 Make It 75-71 in Last Seconds

The Providence College Friars, surging upward in New England basketball, nipped the Brandeis University squad, 75-71, in an overtime thriller last night at Alumni Hall.

Although Providence once held an 11-point advantage late in the second half, the outcome was in doubt right up until the final seconds of the overtime session. A pair of free-throw conversions by Jim Swartz definitely put the Friars home with two seconds remaining in the extra period.

The Friars didn't play up to their form in the victories over St. Francis of Loretto and the Loyola of Chicago. And perhaps the Judges were a little rusty after their layoff for examinations. But both teams played a spirited, aggressive game and the Friars had to in order to come out on top.

It was no place for a person

with a weak heart, but nobody went out of the building complaining of the action. They may have knocked the officiating, which was off and on, or they may have criticized the shooting, but it was a thrilling night for the real hoop adherents.

Swartz put in the final three points for the Friars, which was a healthy contribution, but John Ritch and Eddie Donahue helped Providence to get there. It was a night of heroics on both sides. Rudy Finderson, who was cold at times, finished up with 25 points and a fine job. Marty Aranow, his running mate, was there with three big hoops in the clutch.

Providence held the lead many times but Brandeis fought back. The Judges were the more aggressive of the two but had trouble with their shooting. Providence played brilliantly in some spots and erractical in others. Just when it looked as though the Friars were going to do it, the Judges would come bounding back.

Final Minutes

The Friars, after a 30-24 lead in a slow first half, were fighting tooth and nail to hold onto a slim advantage in the final minutes of regular time. They had 59-56 advantage when Frank Tirico was fouled and converted, making it 60-56 with 30 seconds left.

Aranow was later bumped by Tirico and his two conversions

in the overtime period the Judges had several early shots but Donahue put in the first two baskets for the Friars. He scored on a drive play and then on a jumper from the left side that put Providence out front, 64-60.

Later, when Donahue and Roger Canestrari each converted on a pair of free shots, the Friars had six points to work on, 69-63, with 83 seconds left. Chet Zager scored for Brandeis and Ritch got a long pass and scored a basket for the Friars, making it 71-65.

Within a Point

Then Aranow, second-leading scorer in the Boston district, scored three times while Canestrari was making PC's lone point. The Judges' forward had one bounce around on the hoop but the ball dropped through. Then he scored on a jumper and a short drive. This surge brought Brandeis within a point at 72-71 with less than 20 seconds left.

Swartz was fouled with 13 seconds left and converted one shot. And he was on the line again and made two with just two seconds left, which brought down a roaring din from the highly excited Friar rooters.

Coach Harry Stein of Brandeis was critical of the officiating, which cost him the ball illegally at one time. However, the rival players turned in about as spirited a contest as has been played on the Friar court. The situations were tense and tight, with both clubs responding with clutch efforts.

Coach Stan Ward of the Bruins came up with a varying defense that gave the Friars more trouble than usual. The Friars had a little superiority due mostly to the board and rebound work of John Ritch and Lionel Jenkins.

The Bruins, who were shooting for an upset and their first victory in the state series, were within a couple of baskets of letting even with Providence in the late moments of the game. However, they could never quite close the four-point gap and the Friars lengthened their margin before the finish.

Eddie Donahue, who has been playing a steady, effective game for the Friars, did his usual good job last night. However, he was involved in a collision with Ritch and Brown's Joe Tebo and Allan Palsen and suffered a knee injury that may keep him on the sidelines.

Brown was keyed up and kept the pressure on Providence all the way. The Friars were not shooting as well as they have been but their passwork was solid. Providence, too, had some offensive maneuvers that threw Brown's game off balance, also.

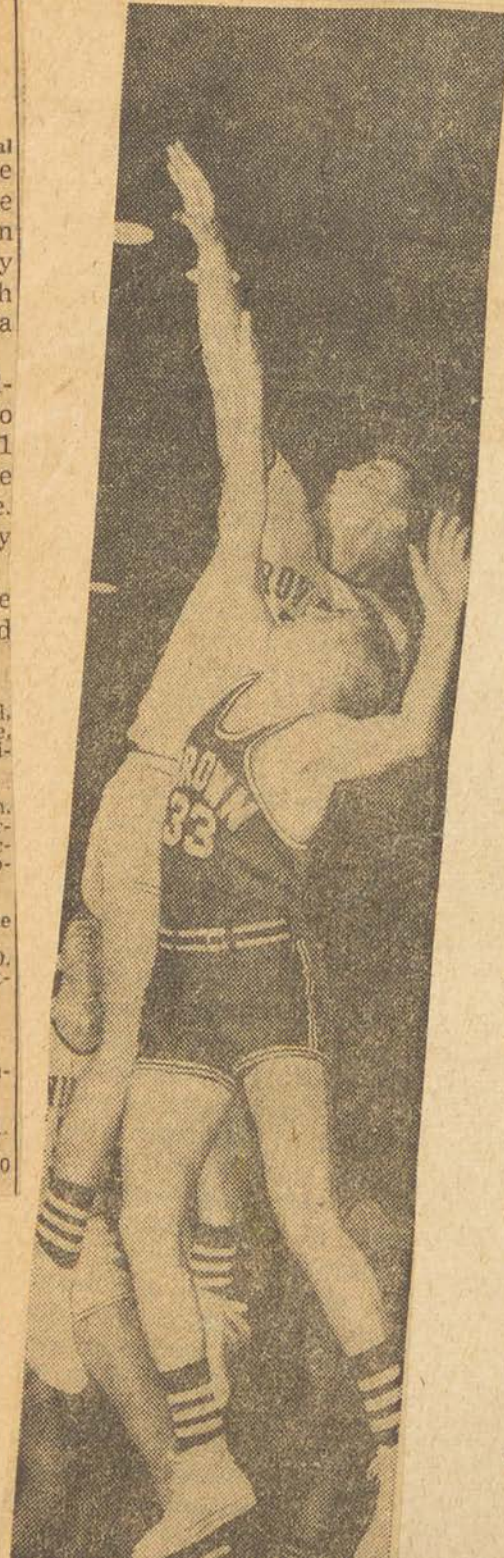

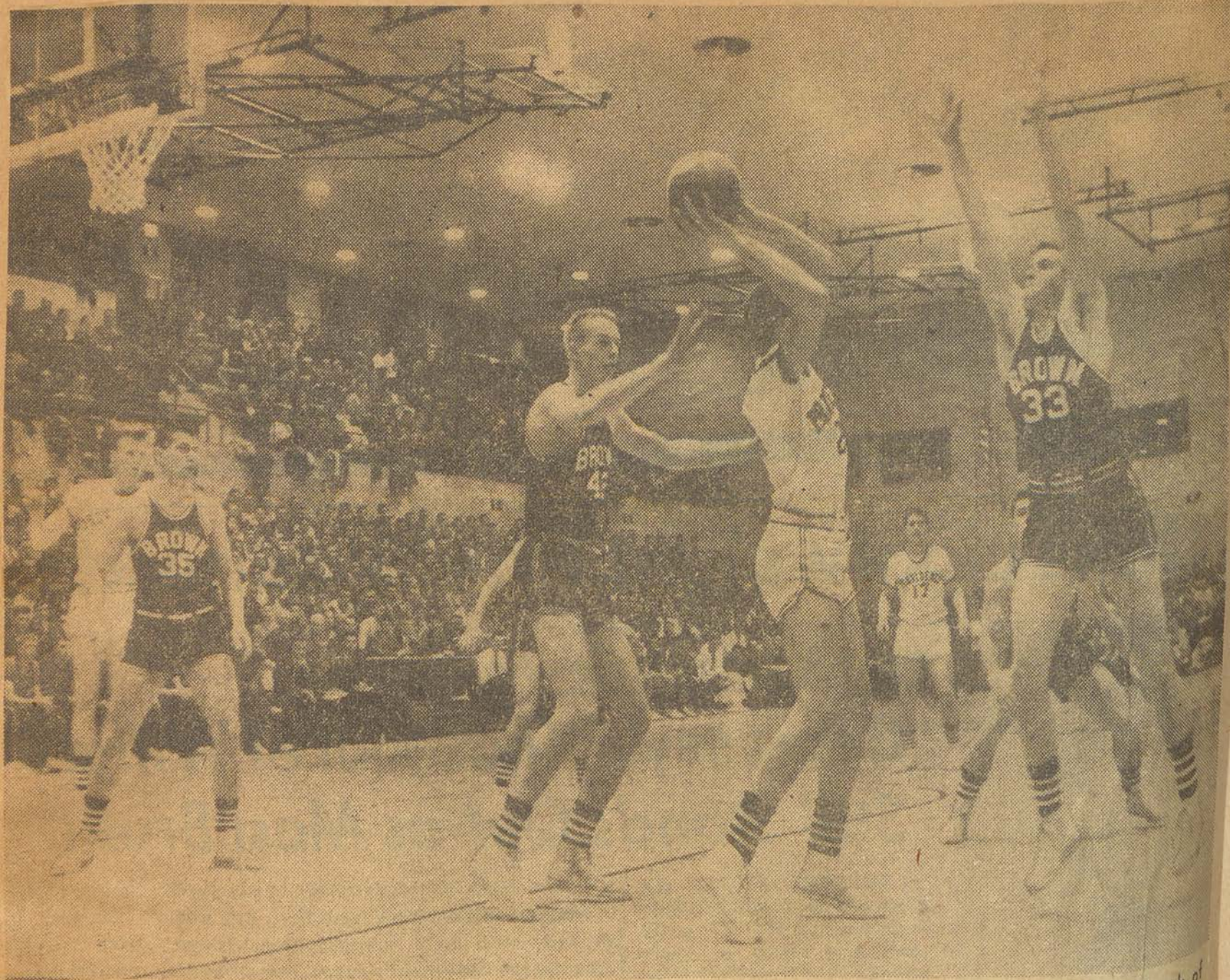

This is a week of showdowns for the University of Rhode Island's basketball team. Each of the two games on the Rams' schedule represents a last-shot opportunity for the Kingston cagers to figure in the race for state and Yankee Conference championships.

Both games will be played on opponents' courts. Tomorrow night the Rams visit Providence College at Alumni Hall and they must win to remain in the running for the state title. The Friars are undefeated in three intrastate contests, having completed a sweep of their home-and-home series with Brown Saturday night and having beaten Rhode last month at Kingston. The Rams are 1-1 and a victory tomorrow night plus a triumph in the return game with the Bruins would deadlock them with PC at 3-1.

Of course, that may be easier said than done, since Coach Joe Mullaney's PCers aren't losing too often these days. One disturbing element of the triumph over Brown was the knee injury suffered by Ed Donohue that may keep him out of tomorrow night's game. The injury was more painful than serious, however, and Mullaney is hopeful that Donohue will be

ready for the Friars' games with Colby and Bates on the annual trip to Maine Friday and Saturday.

PC, with a 10-4 record, is head and shoulders above its two intrastate rivals. If they get by the Rams tomorrow, the Friars should be 13-4 by week's end, though both Maine teams are tough to beat on their home courts.

Brown's quintet, which lost a one-pointer to Penn in addition to the PC defeat last week, will concern itself solely with Ivy League opposition this week, meeting Dartmouth in a return game at Hanover on Wednesday and Princeton here Friday. The Bruins are 2-5 in the league and 4-11 overall.

Hockey Action

Yale became the undisputed champion of Rhode Island college hockey teams last week by

beating PC and Brown. The Elis used the same formula in both contests, namely, a devastating first-period blitz. They scored four against the Friars in nailing down a 6-2 decision and three against Brown in winning, 6-1. The Bruins entertain Princeton here Wednesday night and the Friars will return to the Auditorium ice for the first time in a month, opposing Northeastern Thursday night.

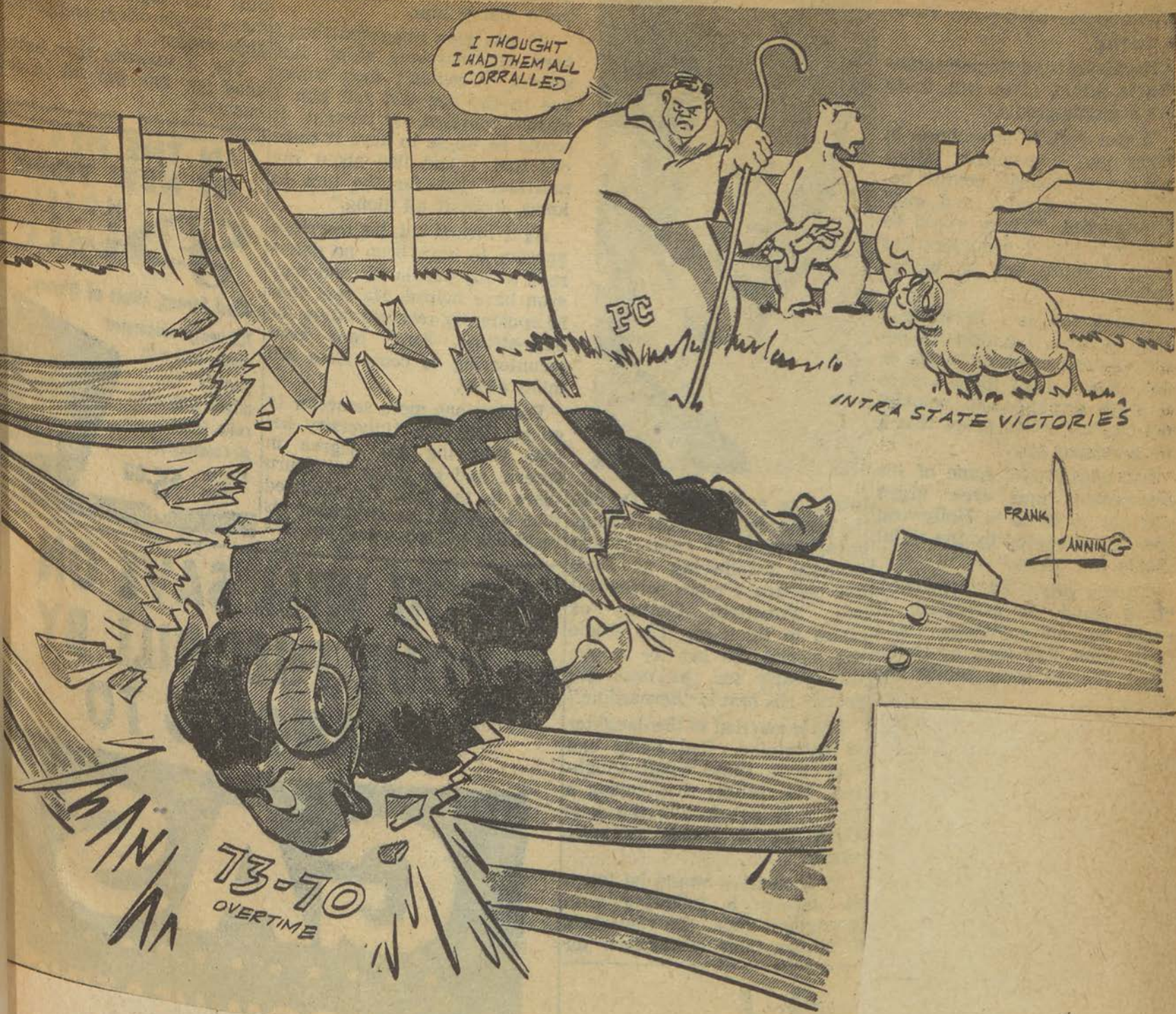

However, with the Friars' Eddie Donahue on the sidelines with an injured knee, the Rams have a reasonable chance of putting over an upset. A year ago Rhody gave the Friars a close tussle at Alumni Hall after beating them earlier at Kingston.

Off their record since the start of 1957, the Friars are definitely the state's top team. They have won eight of their last nine games and currently have a three game winning string going with victories over Loyola of Chicago, Brandeis and Brown. They also defeated St. Francis of Loretto, Pa., and St. Anselm's, who are unbeaten since.

Billy Von Weyhe and Ronnie Marozzi, the two Jersey seniors who prepped at Union Hill in Union City, N.J., are the two Rams that have Coach Joe Mullaney of the Friars going into this game with some trepidation. This pair of Rams have averaged almost 40 points collectively and on good

nights they get over the 50 mark.

"It looks like another tough one," Coach Mullaney explained. "We have been going pretty well and yet I can see how we could do better. I've been watching

mistake of trying to choke off Von Weyhe and having Marozzi get rolling either. You have got to keep the ball away from those two and watch them close when they have it. And if they are going good, that gives the other kids a lift. I noticed in the New Hampshire game, they had several in double figures," the Friar coach explained.

Providence is in a position to sweep the state home-and-home series for the first time in history according to the records of the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., the Friars' director of athletics. The Friars have won three of the last four meetings on the Providence end of the series but Rhody holds a 31-13 advantage in the series over the years. The fine team of Frank Keaney piled up much of that superiority although the genial Mr. Basketball of the Rams also lost some games to the Friars when General Al McClellan was coaching at Smith Hill.

The Keaney influence is felt heavily in local coaching circles today as Keaney pupils Ernie Calverley, coaching the Friar Frosh; Al Nichols, coaching at Killingly High, and Warner Keaney, at South Kingstown, are all undefeated in league competition. Calverley's Frosh have won 16 straight although tonight's opponents, the URI Ramlets, gave them their

Mr. Von Weyhe Fills Usual Hoop Role

Whenever a basketball game goes into an overtime period before a verdict is reached, then victory usually goes to the team with the "difference." And for the University of Rhode Island in its unexpected triumph over Providence College last night, the difference was Billy Von Weyhe.



It wasn't that Billy scored the vital points with spectacular derring-do in the Rams' 73-70 victory, or even that he dropped in the tying basket that made it an overtime ball game.

Instead, it was simply his brilliant and continuing all-round performance, a performance that was largely responsible for the Rams' striking comeback in the second half, after all seemed lost. The fullest estimate of its worth was contained in the words of Billy's coach, Jack Guy, who said:

"He never showed me more than he did tonight. That makes it quite the performance, for Billy has been an outstandingly good basketball player in each of his four seasons with the Rams. From the day he reported into Kingston from that basketball hotbed, Union City, N.J., and started flinging the roundball at the hoop he has been a star.

Difficult Season

In several ways, he doesn't look it. At first, especially, his height of 6 feet, 4 inches on a rather frail frame gave him a gangling look. And since he frequently runs with his mouth open, as though gasping for air, he often gives the impression of one always about to collapse.

But through his sophomore and junior years, as the record books will tell, he was anything but gangling and the only "collapsing" he did was as part of that defensive maneuver that coaches, in their fanciful way, term a collapsing defense, whatever that is.

This season, Billy's lot has been a difficult one. He has

Against the Friars last night, Billy was filling his usual assignments. He had John Ritch (6'5") as his man, and all the other jobs as well.

At first, his effectiveness wasn't coming through at all. The Friars, seemingly able to get along sufficiently well without their injured bellweather, Ed Donohue, built themselves a comfortable lead and at halftime with a margin of 43-28, seemed off to a routine victory.

The Plan

But Coach Guy had a plan that involved Von Weyhe and, early in the second half, it began to materialize.

"We figured," Guy was saying afterward, "that Ritch was their important man. So I told Billy that every time he got the ball to run full speed the length of the court. That way, either Ritch or Billy would give out physically and then we could go."

Guy was of the opinion that the strategy worked in Billy's favor, as hoped, and that was the hallmark of the victory. Untrained eyes might not have noticed this development, but whatever happened, suddenly Von Weyhe was getting the rebounds, bringing the ball up the court, doing much of the shooting—well, you know the rest of his assignment.

Gradually the margin narrowed until, with just over five minutes to play, Billy fed Pete Kohlsaas a bounce pass under the basket, Pete layed it up and in, the score was tied at 60-all and it was a brand-new game.

Another Difference

Ritch, tired or not, managed to beat Von Weyhe on a jump shot that finally tied it up for the Friars with 10 seconds to play in regulation time.

But in the overtime, the Rams came up with still another difference. This time it was Jimmy Adams, from the foul line. Jimmy, first of all, made two free throws that tied the score at 70-70, then later made another that put the Rams out in front to stay. Adams is not a good free shooter.

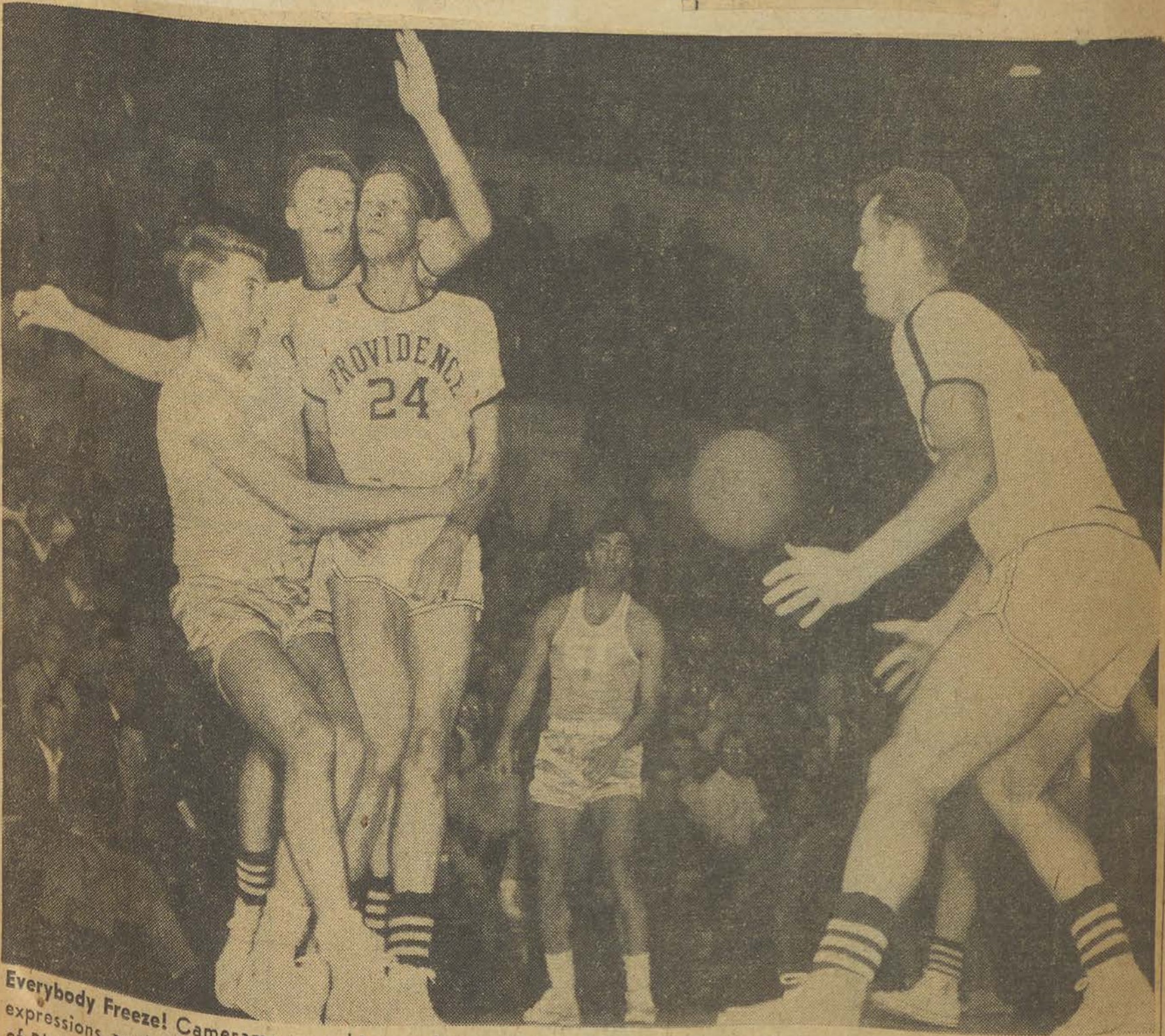

Bill Von Weyhe Leads Stirring Surge by URI

The University of Rhode Island Rams, counted out by many at halftime, bounced back with a surprising 73-70 overtime triumph over Providence College last night before 2,400 at PC's Alumni Hall.

Last night's victory must go down with the great triumphs in URI hoop history, for seldom has a club appeared to be more defeated than Rhody at halftime.

Rhode Island, trailing by 15 points at the intermission, came with a rush in the second half. The Friars couldn't stop Rams, who played a driving, hustling game that was not to be denied.

Billy Von Weyhe led the Rhode Island surge. It was undoubtedly one of the finest games in his brilliant college career. The Rams needed somebody to give them the lift and blond Billy was the boy who completed the man's errand.

The score sheet shows that Von Weyhe scored 20 points but that hardly tells the story. He was the key man in the triumph with his rebounding, setting-up and general utility work and he figured in a good many baskets as Rhody fought back and then took charge.

Halftime Score 43-28

The Friars played well in the first half when they accumulated a 43-28 superiority. They boosted their margin to 18 points in the second half before Providence

Coach Guy said "all six men had a hand in it," but generally gave the most credit to Von Weyhe, who he thinks is one of the best players in the country, regardless of statistics or other measuring standards.

Winning Point By Adams

Jimmy Adams, who came out of the infirmary yesterday, put in three vital points in the overtime as Rhody came up from a 70-68 deficit. His first two free throws tied the game at 70-all and later his next foul shot won it, for it was Rhody's 71st point and that was enough.

However, Ronnie Marozzi, who came to life in the second half and scored 19; Steve Madreperla, who put in the two free throws that clinched the verdict with 24 seconds left; Pete Kohlsaar, who got a clutch rebound; and Frank Mormando, who spelled Adams, all played a part in the triumph.

The Rams were away off in the first half when the Friars were playing as they have in some of their recent triumphs. However, once the Rams scented an upset possibility, they gave it everything they had and that was enough to do it last night.

It was a disappointing setback

for the Friars, who have lost only two of their last 10 games and have risen to a spot among the top five leading teams in the New England area. They were heavy favorites in many corners last night and played as such in the first half. The second half after an early PC surge had a distinct Rhode Island flavor.

After about four-and-a-half minutes of the second half, the Friars were sailing along on an 18-point lead as Frank Tirico hit on three sets and John Ritch also put in a basket. This made it 51-33. Then Rhody started to come back with Von Weyhe

Ritch scored the basket, with Jim Swartz giving him the ball on a nice setup.

Overtime Play

Dick Bessette's short jumper put PC ahead, 68-66, in the five-minute overtime. Marozzi tied it up with two successful free throws. Ritch again scored on his overhead one-hander, making it 70-68 for PC. Roger Canestrari bumped Adams, who is not noted for his foul shoot-

ing. But Adams got both tries and tied the score.

Then Adams was fouled again with 1:43 left and converted the first one. The Friars held the ball for more than 40 seconds when they got it and finally lost it when Bessette missed a drive down the right side. Madreperla was fouled seconds later and made two points and the Rams had a 73-70 margin with 24 seconds left. And that was it.

The undefeated Friar Freshmen made it 17 straight with an 87-60 victory over the URI Ramlets in the preliminary. Walt DiMasi of PC took scoring honors with 27 points. Adrian Chrust had 26 for the Ramlets.

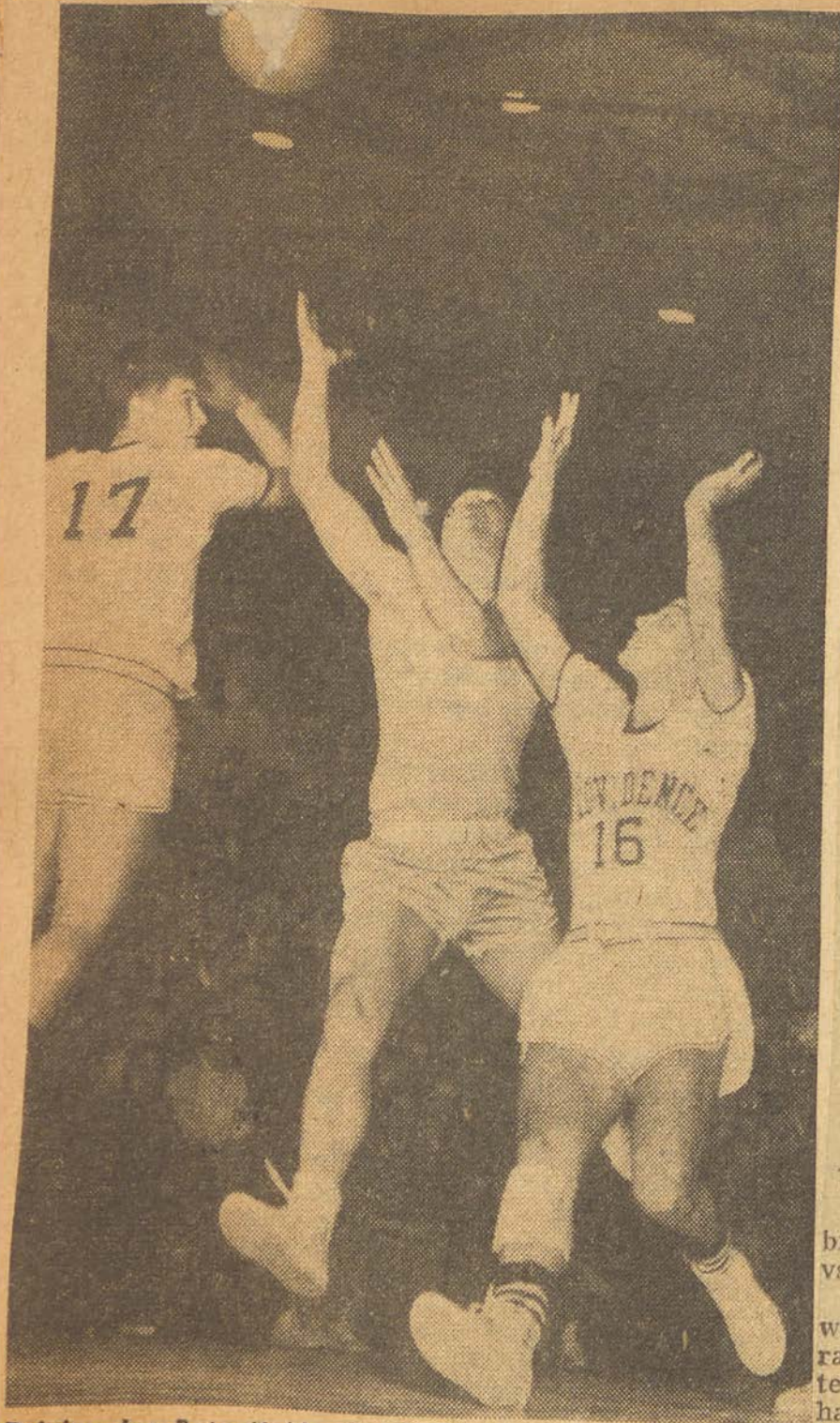

With Capt. Bernie McCrinn contributing a pair of vital goals, Providence College's hockey team scored its eighth victory of the season, at the Auditorium last night, when it came from behind and defeated Northeastern, 5-3, before 1,100 spectators.

The Huskies, a vastly improved team over the one that dropped a 10-2 verdict to P.C. during the Christmas Week tournament in Boston, jumped off to a quick, 2-0 lead. They later fell behind, but made a fight of it until McCrinn came through with a pressure-easing goal for the Friars just shy of the midway mark of the final period.

Providence, still hampered by injuries and presenting another patched-up lineup, appeared headed toward another rough evening as Don Salvucci banged home Marc Wenham's rebound at 2:04 and Richie Cavanaugh hit on a 20-footer less than a minute later.

P.C. Starts to Click

However, the Friars started to find themselves and Lou LaFontaine, on a pretty pass from Joe Barile, fired the puck into the open right side of the Northeastern cage at 5:23 and pulled P.C. within a goal of a tie.

Providence dominated play in the second period and went ahead at 4:59 as Mike Lovett, playing his best game of the year, slapped in Mike McDonough's rebound. Barile, another standout in the P.C. triumph, then made it 4-0 at 6:10 on assists from Bob Labbe and LaFontaine.

McCrinn Scores

The Huskies, still battling, closed in to 4-3, while both teams were shorthanded in the eighth minute, when Cavanaugh whipped home a 20-footer after turning the P.C. defense. That tally fired up Northeastern but McCrinn took much of the steam out of its attack approximately two minutes later on a breakaway goal.

The hard-working Friar leader took Red Rabitor's pass-out behind the Huskie defense and went in alone on Kerr. McCrinn held his fire until 10 feet out, at which point he let go with a hard drive that caught the left corner.

Both Kerr and Phil Crawford, Providence's starting goalie, came up with several fine saves. Kerr had 28 for the game and Crawford, until relieved by Don Girard late in the final period, kicked out 19.

In the prelim, the P.C. Freshmen, with Burrillville's Len Trinque scoring three times in the opening period, defeated the N.U. Freshmen, 7-2.

 Springfield, Mass.—Providence College's basketball team ran out of steam in the second half of its game here last night with Springfield and lost a 76-70 decision to the improving Maroons. There was a measure of consolation for the Friars, though. Their freshman team posted its 21st victory without defeat in downing its Springfield counterpart, also by 76-60. In the varsity game, Providence led through most of the first 19 minutes—by as much as eight points at times. However, as the first half drew to a close, Springfield began bearing down. Springfield's domination of the boards lay in the hands of Tom Karanda, a 6-5 center, and Ron Miller, an agile forward. Karanda, incidentally, was among the winners' leading scorers. He got 17 points, the second highest for his team. Teammate Byrne got 19.

Game-scoring honors, though, went to Providence's Frank Tirico, who had 20. The only other double figure scorer for the Friars was Jim Swartz, who had 15.

The result of the game left the teams with identical records, 12 victories and eight defeats.

In the freshman game, Wally DiMasi, Lenny Wilkins and Bob Woods were the chief point contributors to the Providence cause. DiMasi posted 21 and Wilkins and Woods got 15 each.

Only three games remain on the undefeated Friar Frosh's schedule.

Holy Cross broke a ding-dong battle with Providence College wide open in the last four minutes last night for an 85-73 triumph at the Auditorium.

The Crusaders, mindful of their woe-begone blowup in Tuesday night's game at Hanover, N. H., made a complete switch this time. They set sail on a poised ride to the wire, letting the pressing Friars make the mistakes and then capitalizing.

While there were occasions when each team allowed the pace and the pressure to carry them into sloppy floor patterns, this was a tense presentation for the crowd of 1,000. And over the last half, alone, the lead changed hands 13 times and was knotted on six other occasions.

10 Straight Points

Actually, Holy Cross made a preliminary gesture toward taking charge by clicking for 10 straight points in a two-minute spurt shortly after the teams passed the midpoint of the last half. This brought the Crusaders from a two-point deficit into a 70-62 advantage with just 5:17 left to play.

However, Providence, well coached by ex-Crusader star Joe Mullaney, wasn't ready to be shaken off. The Friars came back with a six-point retaliation and many in the assemblage envisioned another Purple puncture, similar to Tuesday night's when Dartmouth roared from 12 points back to win, 73-69, in the last four minutes.

There were still just over four minutes remaining when P. C. pulled to within two points at 70-68.

Andreoli's 25 High

Here, however, Art Andreoli, high scorer with 25 points, injected one of his patented jump shots from 18 feet out and another 20 seconds along Tom Ryan converted the starring Joe Hughes' feed with a 9-foot baseline pusher.

P. C.'s Dick Bessette dropped one of two free throws with three minutes showing to play, but the Crusaders, now operating in a semi-freeze, began clicking on give-and-go moves which produced two more

Pascale and the bucket work of Captain Ed Ritch.

Friars Ahead at Half

The Friars never were able to pull away by more than six points and they had a shaky 37-36 edge at halftime.

That opening 20 minutes produced some fine defensive work by both teams, Coach Roy Leenig again having his Crusaders deploy in either a sagging 1-3-1 zone or a tight man to man, depending on what happened on the Purple's previous turn up the floor.

While Andreoli showed the way with 25 points, Hughes was just a shade back with 21. Captain George Waddleton and Tom Ryan, the Purple's back court operatives, hit double figures, too. Waddleton had 15, Ryan 14.

Ritch had 21 and Pascale 18 for Providence, while Jim Swartz added 10 more.

Andreoli had 9 baskets in 22 attempts from the floor. Hughes hit on 6 for 12 shots. H. C. out-rebounded P. C., 50-38.

Providence Frosh Win

Providence College's tremendously impressive Freshman team ran off to an easy 77-60 triumph over the H. C. Frosh in the opener. It was the P. C. yearlings' 20th victory in an unbeaten season. Quick Surge, Semi-Freeze Bring Victory

Worcester — The Providence College Friars snapped out of their slump with an outstanding game here last night, but it wasn't good enough as the Holy Cross Crusaders outscored them, 85-73, in a basketball thriller before more than 1,500 customers.

The Friars led, 37-36, at halftime and made the Crusaders hustle all the way for the victory. It was a far cry from the performance the Friars had put up the previous night against Boston University. Unfortunately for them, the Crusaders also were playing well in a fast, speedy game that had a touch of contact and some real aggressiveness.

Joe Hughes of Central Falls played a leading role in the Holy Cross triumph. He scored 25 points. He and the Friars' John Ritch had a duel of sorts in which honors were about even. The Friars were ahead by a basket when Swartz put in a jumper on a setup from Ritch. However, Waddleton tied the score at 56-all after the 10-minute mark. Andreoli converted two free throws, making it 58-56, but Ritch tallied a basket with fine individual effort near the hoop.

Twice the sharpshooting Andreoli connected, once from 20 feet out but each time the Friars fought back. Providence tied the score on a set by Frank Tirico and went ahead, momentarily, on a drive by Ritch. Andreoli's 20-footer made it 64-62 for the Cross with 7:30 left. Then Ritch missed a pair of free throws that could have tied it up. John left the game in the final seconds with an injured leg.

Hughes and Denny Nochese led a rally that boosted the Crusaders into a 70-62 advantage. However, the Friars were not done yet. Ritch registered on two free throws and Donahue hit on a set that closed the gap to four points, 70-66.

Donahue put in two pressure free shots that made it 70-68, with 4:15 left. The action was spirited and helter skelter at this time with both clubs pressing for an advantage. Finally Andreoli hit on a set and Ryan followed with a jumper from the side, making it 74-68. The Friars had several chances to get the points back but the ball rolled around the hoop on one shot and some free throws were missed.

Dick Bessette made one free shot for P.C.'s 69th point and later Donahue made another. But meanwhile the Cross had got up to 78-70 and were on the way home.

The Friars led by 28-22 in the first half and later by 34-29. It was a disappointing setback for Coach Joe Mullaney of Providence College, a former Holy Cross star

The home forces made it 2-0 at 9:04 on a deep angle shot by Bob Blandy that slipped between Toomey's pads and the right post.

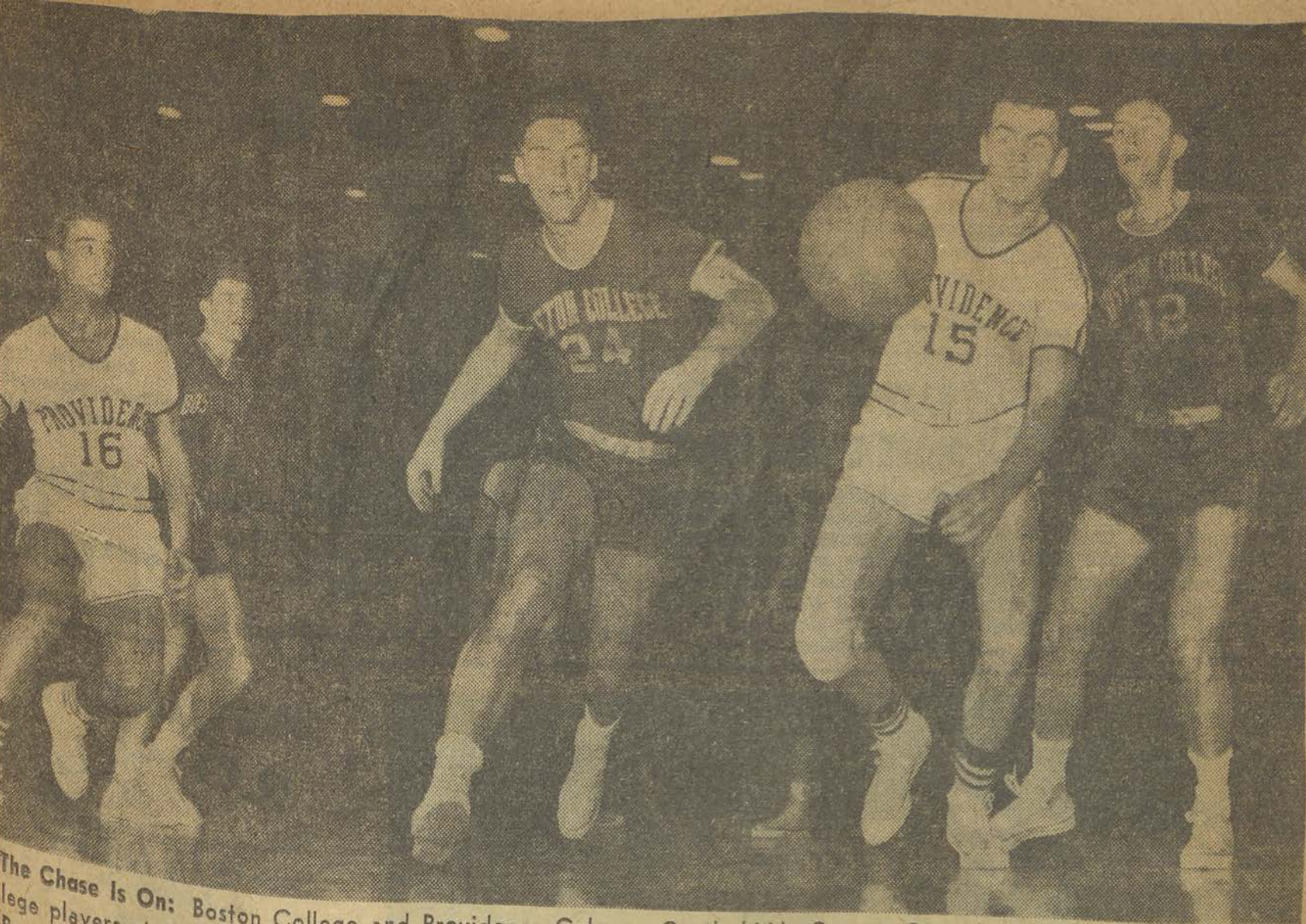

Pascale Paces Triumph

Whoever said "basketball is a crazy game" was justified. Unfortunately he's anonymous.

Last night the Providence College Friars scored an 89-71 triumph over Boston College while Yale was handing Dartmouth a 57-56 setback in an important Ivy League game at Hanover.

Last week the same Friars scored only 17 points in the first half against Boston University while Yale later got only eight points in the first half against Princeton. Both clubs have men

capable of hitting 17 points individually and frequently do as Mike Pascale did last night for the Friars with 18 in the first half.

In between last night and last week's action, Boston College pulled off a stunning upset, nipping Boston University, one of the hottest teams in New England of late.

So the Friars turned around and played like champions last night, scoring a convincing triumph over Don Martin's Eagles, who early this month snapped a five-game winning streak of the

Friars. And if this all sounds confusing, it is no less true.

It has puzzled local basketball minds like Joe Mullaney, Stan Ward, Vin Cuddy, Ernie Calverley and Dino Martin and it has also upset Yale's Joe Vancisin and the Terriers' Matt Zunic, who are very much involved.

Providence had another hot shooting game last night similar to the one that sank Loyola of Chicago and hurt St. Francis of Loretto. But the team worked well as a unit, set up its shots and dropped them from all angles. The Friars had a

50.8 percentage for the night after clicking for 62.5 in the first half as they took a 13-point lead 48-35.

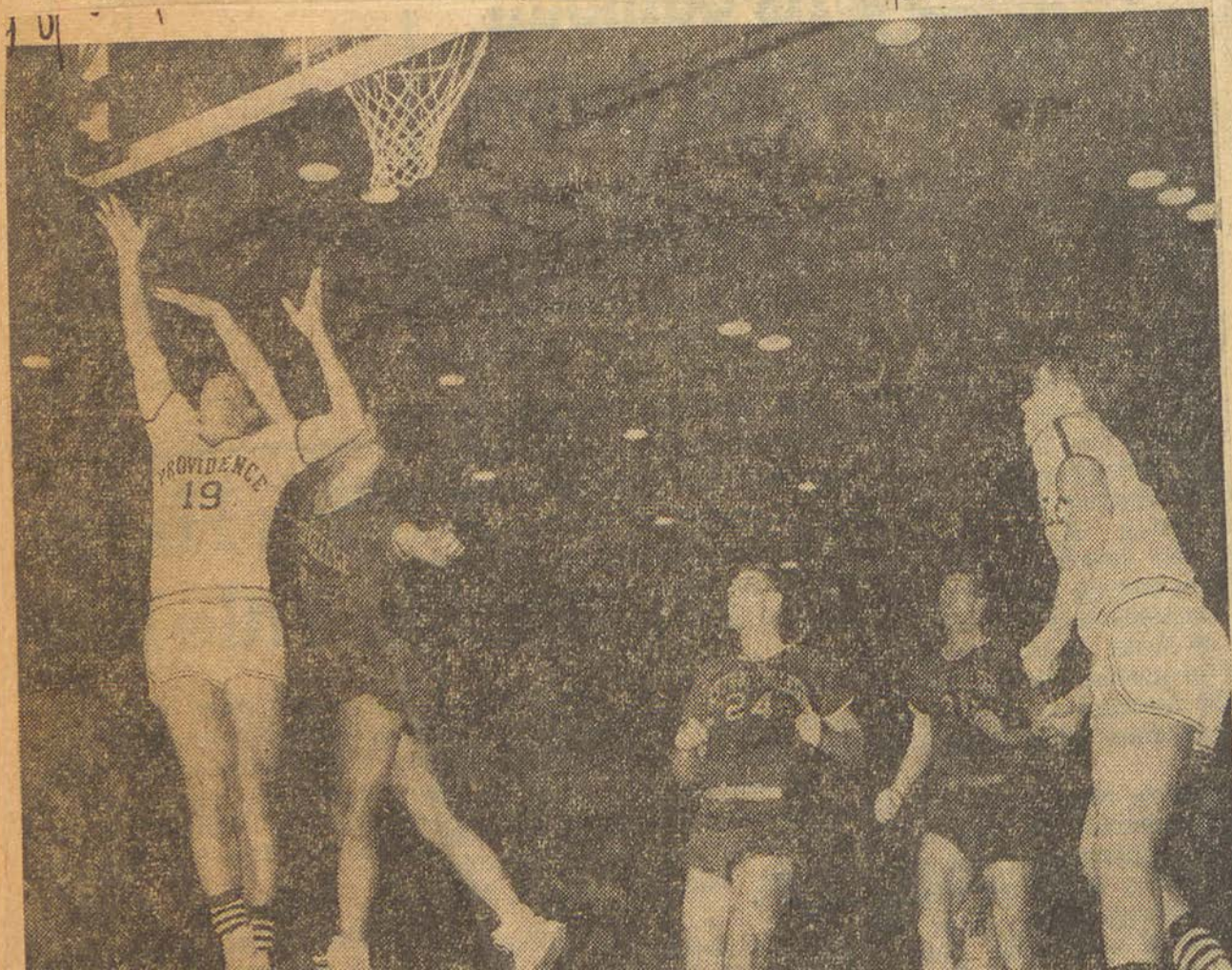
"You can't do much about shooting like that," commented Martin who wound up his season last night. "The Friars were really hot. When you get 60 per cent or 50 for the game, you're hitting and any coach would be happy with that."

Harvard Gains Ice Honors, P.C. Top Scorer Overlooked

Ralph (Cooney) Weiland of Harvard was named Coach of the Year and the Crimson's Bobby Cleary won the Most Valuable Player award in a poll of New England college hockey coaches and sportswriters released today, but the big surprise was the failure of Providence College's Joe Barile to place among the top three in the balloting for the Outstanding Sophomore honor.

Dick Fischer, another Harvard player, took down that award by a slim margin over Dartmouth's Rod Anderson and Ned Bunyon of Boston College, over whom there was some question because of his having played one game last season, finished third.

Top Playmaker

Barile, generally acknowledged as one of the finest playmakers in Eastern college ice circles, wound up in the pack that received mention for the award despite his having finished higher than Fischer, Anderson and Bunyon in the individual scoring race.

"Little Joe" from Hamden, Conn., led the Friars in scoring and shattered the school's record high of 44 points posted last year by Ed Monahan. Barile tallied 11 goals and 37 assists for a total of 48 points. According to the latest scoring figures available, Fischer finished with 37 points.

Expected

The selected of Weiland and Cleary, who also was named the outstanding forward in New England, was pretty much of a foregone conclusion. Weiland led

the Crimson to its fourth straight Ivy League crown this season and a bid to the NCAA championships at Colorado.

Cleary, the East's leading scorer, won by a comfortable majority in the most valuable player voting and had an even wider superiority in the outstanding forward balloting. Brown's Harry Batchelder and Bob McVey, Cleary's Harvard teammate, were his closest rivals.

Cleary's winning of two of the top individual awards followed on the heels of his selection as center on the New England Collegiate All-Star team for 1956-57. He, McVey and Batchelder, who was named to the first team goalie post, were the top vote-getters in the balloting.

Two Repeaters

Rounding out the first team were defensemen Bob Dupuis and Don MacLeod of Boston University and wing Bunyon of B.C. Dupuis and Cleary are the only repeaters from the 1955-56 All-Star squad.

Lou LaFontaine, high-scoring Providence College wing, was named to the second team along with forwards Lyle Guttu of Harvard and Richie Cavanaugh of Northeastern, defensemen Bob Owen of Harvard and Dan Goggin of Dartmouth and goalie Jim Bailey of Harvard.

Another P.C. standout, defenseman Mike McDonough, was named as a spare on the "Star" squad while Barile and Red Rabbit of the Friars and Capt. George Delaney, Rod Dashnaw and Don Hebert of Brown received honorable mention.

College Starts Memorial For Paterson Priest

Memory of the twin qualities of virtue and talent which were the marks of Father Anselm A. Krieger, O.F.M., still glow with warmth and vividness at Providence College, from which he graduated in the 1930's. Father Krieger passed away one year ago tomorrow.

An impressive memorial program was put into motion recently at the college on the occasion of the annual alumni homecoming. Athletic awards, designated the "Father Krieger Award," were presented to captains of the school's varsity teams in basketball, baseball, hockey and track.

In addition the school athletic directors decided, as a further tribute to the late Paterson priest, to substitute St. Bonaventure University's basketball team for Brown College's in its traditional climax game of the season, the big game which is held annually on "Alumni Homecoming Day." Father Krieger was St. Bonaventure's first athletic director and as such introduced to that school big time basketball and football. He was a member of the faculty of St. Bonaventure, which is in Allegany, N. Y., for a number of years.

The Rev. Paul C. Perrotta, O.P., former member of the Providence College faculty and now a teacher of philosophy at Coldwell College of New Jersey and at Seton Hall, spoke of the life of Father Krieger during a

luncheon at which the memorial awards were presented.

"It was most appropriate to memorialize Father Krieger's memory," he said. He was a legend typical of Providence College with a great heart and a winning soul and he gave his all for his Alma Mater so that others might be inspired to follow in his worn footsteps.

"Johnny Krieger, whom I knew well in classes, on the basketball court and as a priest, was a great graduate, a fine priest of God and established a great legend. It is a splendid thing that the memory of his deeds will always be kept green for coming generations of students."

It was at Providence College that Johnny Krieger, along with his inseparable classmate from Central High School, Bill McCue, went on to become one of the nation's outstanding basketball stars. He twice won positions on All-American teams. He was also a member of the varsity baseball team.

Memorial masses will be held for the priest tomorrow in various places. There will be one at St. Francis Hospital, in Olean, N. Y., where he passed away; another at the Immaculate Conception Convent in West Paterson, where he spent several years as chaplain, and at 7 a. m. a Solemn High Mass will be offered at St. Bonaventure Church here, where he was ordained to the priesthood in '939.

Holy Cross Unknown Wins Cathedral Run

Boston — (AP) — Richard Donohue—a Holy Cross sophomore who never seen a road race—won the 47th annual Cathedral 10-mile Handicap Run in South Boston yesterday.

Donohue, a member of the Crusader track team whose home is in Albany, N.Y., came home first as the sleeper entry in 1:02:06.

Overlooked by the handicappers, Donohue drew only a 30-second impost so that his corrected time (subtracting the handicap) was 1:01:36.

In a field of 100 entries, Rudy Mendez of the New York Pioneer Club and Keizo Yamada of Japan—preparing for the Boston A.A. Marathon April 20 — drew the highest handicaps. Each started nine and a half minutes after the first group.

Mendez captured the time prize in 55:53 but was third across the finish line in 1:05:23, including handicap. The Pioneer Club won the team prize with the Boston A.A. second.

Yamada finished 15th but was second to Mendez in the time-prize competition with an actual clocking of 56.44. Yamada won the B.A.A. event in 1953.

Donohue took over the lead after a mile and a half and was in front for the rest of the way. Three minutes and a half a mile behind him was John Sterner of the Pioneer Club, who had a handicap time of 1:05:20.

Nobuyoshi Sadanaga, one of

the other two Japanese runners who accompanied Yamada for the B.A.A. Marathon, did not compete because of a run-in with a dog.

Sadanaga was working out Friday on the Hopkinton-to-Boston course where the B.A.A. classic will be held when a dog bit him on the calf of the leg. The result was a superficial but painful wound, which kept him out of yesterday's race.

Many local marathoners, like Johnny Kelley, did not compete because of the proximity of the B.A.A. run.

However, both Ernie and Joe also point out that the PC varsity is losing by graduation where it hurts most—height. There will be no one around next season to replace Captain John Ritch (6'6") in height and experience. Ritch has been the Friars' mainstay in the rebounding department for the last three years, besides being one of the team's leading scorers. Missing, too, will be Mike Pascale and his patented jump shot. Mike led the Friars in scoring this season.

Battle Ahead

Thus it will be up to Woods, whom Calverley describes as a good rebounder who can hold his own with players two inches taller, and Pete Schementi, a sophomore who gained limited experience this season as Ritch's replacement, to take up the slack. Outside of the height

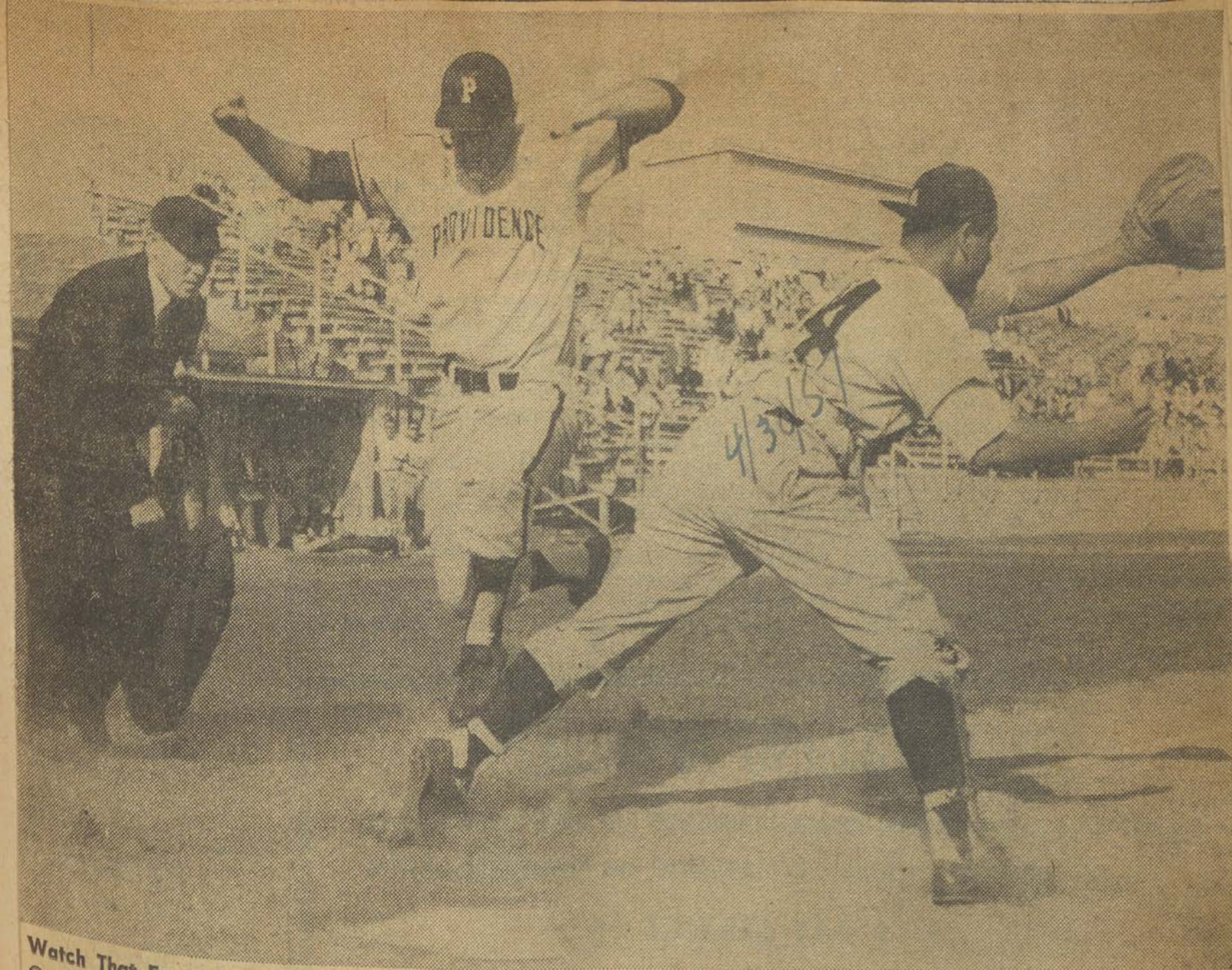

Preacher Roe has already made his public confession, and Mickey Owen has hinted broadly that the famous third strike he missed against the Yankees was a damp one from the hand of the late Hugh Casey.

Joe Page has never exactly denied that he would have a little saliva going for him now and then in a tight spot, and the real chuckler is that Tommy Bridges, when he was with Detroit, fared quite well with an occasional spitter thrown to a then non-complaining catcher named Birdie Tebbetts.

But back beyond these, there was a time when the spitter was one of the lesser evils that a batter had to face, and a man who knows all about them is Bobby Murray, the baseball coach at Providence College, who has been in and about baseball for 40 years.

Needling the Hitters

"There was a time," Bobby was saying before his club's game yesterday at the Friars' field, "when you'd welcome the spitter, after some of those things they'd throw at you. I've played baseball from coast to coast, North and South, and I know.

"One they had was the shine ball. The pitcher would have paraffin on his thigh, and he'd wax that ball up until it would shine. When he'd throw, there'd

One of the most inventive pitchers Bobby ran across was one Kid Eberle, who had a secret method of weighting the ball in his favor.

"The Kid," said Bobby, "would have a few ph graph needles in his pocket and he'd just push on them into the ball and with that extra weight could make it drop as you've never seen a ball do. The way he got found out is that they cut up a couple of balls he'd thrown and found the needles in them."

A Cool Trick

Then there was another trick that at least one player Bobby knows was not above employing. This is the simple idea of keeping a half-dozen or so baseballs in a refrigerator and then, when your team got a lead in the late innings, substituting these rocks for a regular ball.

As a true baseball man, Bobby was and is against such unfair advantages for the pitchers, but he has no logical reason for keeping the spitball on the forbidden list. But there can be exceptions to this.

"One pitcher I knew, name of Dave Danforth, came up with Chicago and St. Louis of the American League," Bobby said, "and I finally caught up with him one season in New Orleans. He said to me one game, 'Bobby, do you chew tobacco?' I said I do. Dave says to me, 'All right, I want you to be the man to handle the ball when it's thrown around the infield. And before you give it to me, dunk it a little in your glove. I'll do the rest.'

"So what he'd do, he'd take the resin bag and dunk up the ball with resin, right where I'd dunked it. The thing would just sail when he threw it."

Birdie's Feud

Murray is of the school that believes the spitball was banned because it was a handicap to the hitters that the fans supposedly like to see.

"All you can do against a spitball is choke up the bat and hope you can meet it," Bobby says. "You can break any way. Those hitters that hold the bat right down on the handle can't even touch it. So why I think they ruled it out."

Collegians Too Busy To Be Baseball Fans

Several of my acquaintances, for-league pitcher and more re-

among the many sports fans who stay away from intercollegiate baseball in droves these days have remarked to me recently, "College baseball isn't what it used to be, is it?"

To which I reply, "No, it isn't. But it's not as bad as you might think it is."

I've seen six games so far this spring and all of them have produced some sound and enjoyable baseball. It won't put the major leagues out of business, mind you, but it's a far cry from some of the turkeys we've seen in recent seasons.

But from the standpoint of student enthusiasm and support, baseball, it seems, has slid far down the list of sports attractions for the college undergraduate. There are many reasons for this, of course, but perhaps the most-significant one lies in the time of the year the sport is played.

Busy Time

In spring the college young man's fancy turns toward many things, including the one Tennyson had in mind. It's the time for play and the great outdoors and many colleges, like Brown, have a host of spring sports to keep a young fellow so occupied that he doesn't have time to get to a game.

For instance, at Brown there are such springtime sports as tennis, golf, lacrosse, crew, sailing, track, yes, and even cricket. Then when you consider the more serious side of the collegian's calendar, there are final exams to prepare for and term papers to write and the deadline for these has been pushed ahead in the postwar years to the middle of May. This last item ap-

The Reasons

You ask the coaches what has happened to college baseball in the past 20 years and almost without exception they'll tell you that the current short season and the demise of summer baseball are the two big reasons for the decline in the caliber of college play. The college basketball scandals sounded the death knell of such institutions of a bygone era as the industrial leagues and the resort leagues, whereby college ball players were able to play 40 games during the summer months and draw their salaries as employees of the factories and hotels.

"The boys just don't play enough baseball," laments Brown's coach, Lefty Lefebvre. "The talent is there but it just doesn't get a chance to develop. You can't develop it in six weeks and with New England spring weather being what it is, usually you don't have more than a month of decent weather. There are only a few summer leagues still operating in the whole country, but the kid who plays in one of them sticks out like a sore thumb, especially if he's a pitcher."

Lefty doesn't hold out much hope for the return of summer ball for college players, but lacking that, the next best thing, apparently, is to hope that we have more spring weather like the present one. The bad weather we've experienced hereabouts for the last month undoubtedly is chiefly responsible for the proved caliber of college baseball this season.

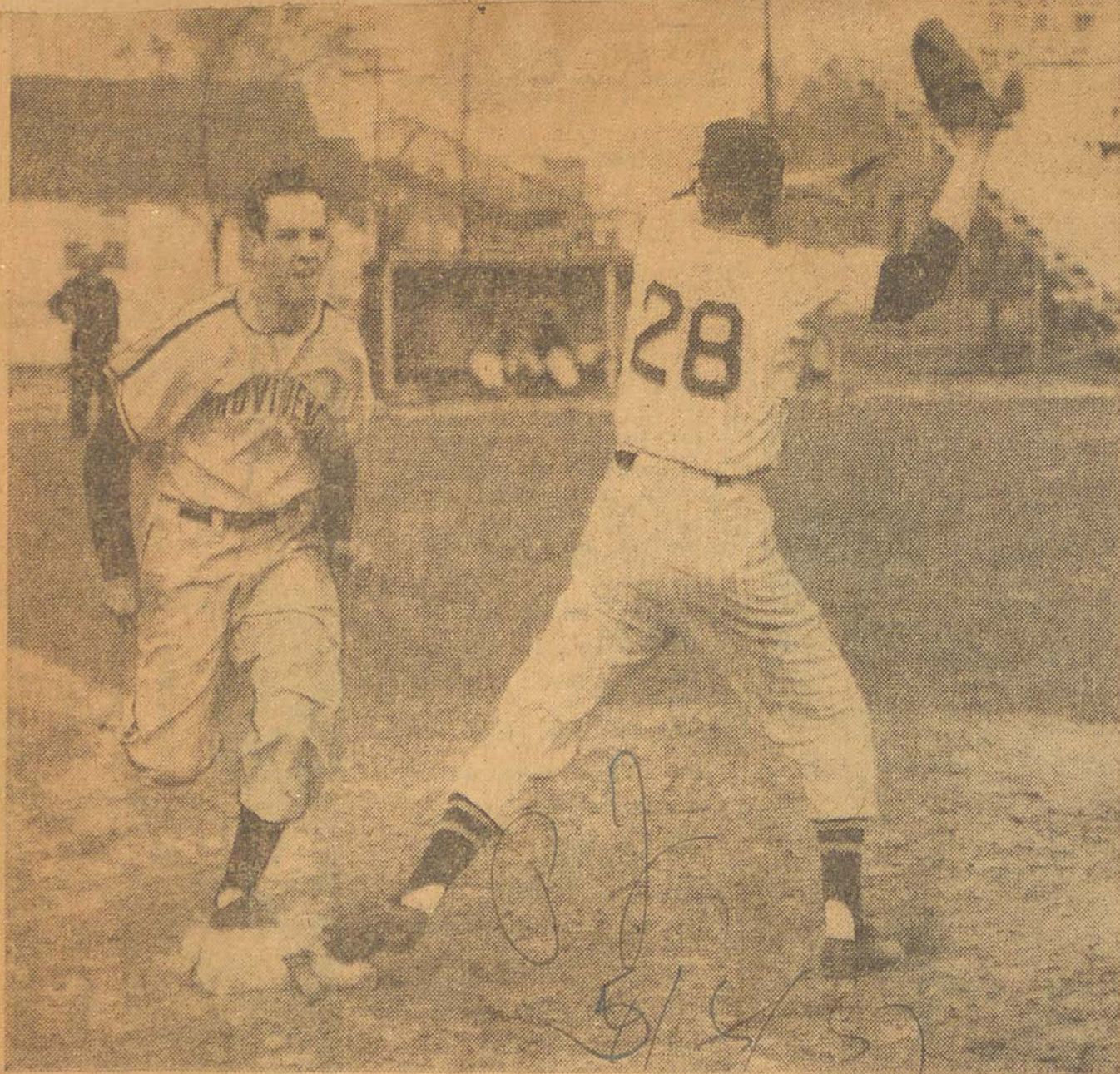

P.C.-St. Bonaventure Trophy Honors Fr. Krieger's Memory

When Providence College and St. Bonaventure University meet for the first time in basketball next season at Olean, N. Y., the teams will be competing for a trophy honoring the memory of the Rev. Anselm Krieger, O. F. M., all-time basketball great at Providence College and later athletic director at St. Bonaventure.

The trophy, a permanent one for competition between the two institutions, is being presented by Father Krieger's classmates of the class of 1931 at Providence College. Father Krieger died at Olean last year after a long illness.

Johnny Krieger, who was to become Father Anselm, O. F. M., entered Providence College in 1927 from Central High School, Paterson, N. J. While at Providence College, he was twice named to the first All-New England basketball team and second All America.

After graduation he taught and coached at La Salle Academy, then entered the Franciscan Order and was ordained in 1939. His first assignment was at the newly founded Siena College in Loudonville, N. Y. where he helped organize the athletic department.

In 1942 he was appointed athletic director at St. Bonaventure and was in charge of the sports program until failing health forced him to resign in October of 1947. During the 1945-46 season he acted as basketball coach at St. Bonaventure and his team won 12 of 15 games. In 1945 also he launched the football program which was to bring St. Bonaventure national recognition.

Defino's Winning Smash For H.C. Recalls Big Hits

Bob Defino, southpaw pitcher from Shrewsbury, Mass., made with the bat like a Mickey Mantle and hit one of the longest home runs ever seen at Henricksen Field in Holy Cross' 2-1 triumph over Providence College yesterday.

"Little Joe" Guglielmo, pint-sized righthander with good stuff, pitched fine ball for the Friars in a duel with Defino and Jim Farino. "Little Joe," who was coached by Whitey Piurek, a Holy Cross alumnus, and Vin Eldred of PC and La Salle fame, dropped a tight battle that was a throw-back to the great days of PC-Crusader rivalry.

The Others

Defino settled the contest with a home run smash over the left field fence as leadoff batter in the seventh inning. It was totally unexpected as Defino hadn't done much at the plate in his previous trips and hit .174 with the Frosh last season. But yesterday's smash was tagged and hit a tree that sits just beyond the left field fence.

College baseball records are not as closely tabulated as some others but the Rev. A. B. Begley, O.P., the P.C. director of athletics, recalls only one longer smash during his tenure of office. That was a 450-foot belt by Dick Duignan, hit against Brown in 1952 and of such dimensions that the Phillies signed him to a bonus baseball contract.

Defino's game-winning homer was an estimated 430-footer. Only Jimmy Foxx, then the Selling Beast of the Red Sox and now in the Hall of Fame, hit the ball farther in the general direction of the left field area that has generally been well out of range for the college stickers, even on days of high tailwinds.

Dick Arcand led off the game with a scratch hit and scored the Cross' first run.

Reunion

Guglielmo, who has a good curve ball, fanned 13 Crusaders and allowed five hits. Defino was lifted by coach Jack Barry in the seventh with Farino finishing up effectively. Lefty Lefebvre, Bill Horan and Camille Durand of other Crusader baseball days were on hand for a visit with coach Barry while Johnny Farrell, long affiliated with Friar sports, also enjoyed the well-played contest.

North Providence's Bob Butterfield, back from Army duty and pitching well, turned in a seven-hitter against the Rams and had the benefit of a 10-run inning as the UConns won their ninth game in 12 starts.

Ray Peltier, URI ace, started but apparently didn't have it yesterday. His brother, Bob, however, hit a homer that had coach J. Orlean Christian comparing the wallop with one of Walt Dropo's. Dropo was a UConn sports star before he became a big-leaguer. Bill Beck, URI coach, described Peltier's sock "as some wallop."

Rhody plays Northeastern tomorrow at Meade Field, while the Friars and Brown open their intra-city series at Aldrich Field. The Holy Cross Freshmen turned back the PC yearlings, 9-6, at Worcester, while the UConn Frosh defeated the Ramlets, 8-1, at Storrs. The Cross broke a 5-5 tie with three runs in the fourth. Ted Secenko paced the UConn Frosh with four hits.

The undefeated Rhode Island track forces meet New Hampshire and Tufts tomorrow at Durham while Brown takes on Columbia and Penn in a triangular meet at New York. Eddie Aron, in the shot; Jim Baker, in the 440 and broad jump; Donald Fahey, in the low hurdles and broad jump, and Bill Hanlon, in the two-mile, will represent Providence College in the Eastons at Worcester.

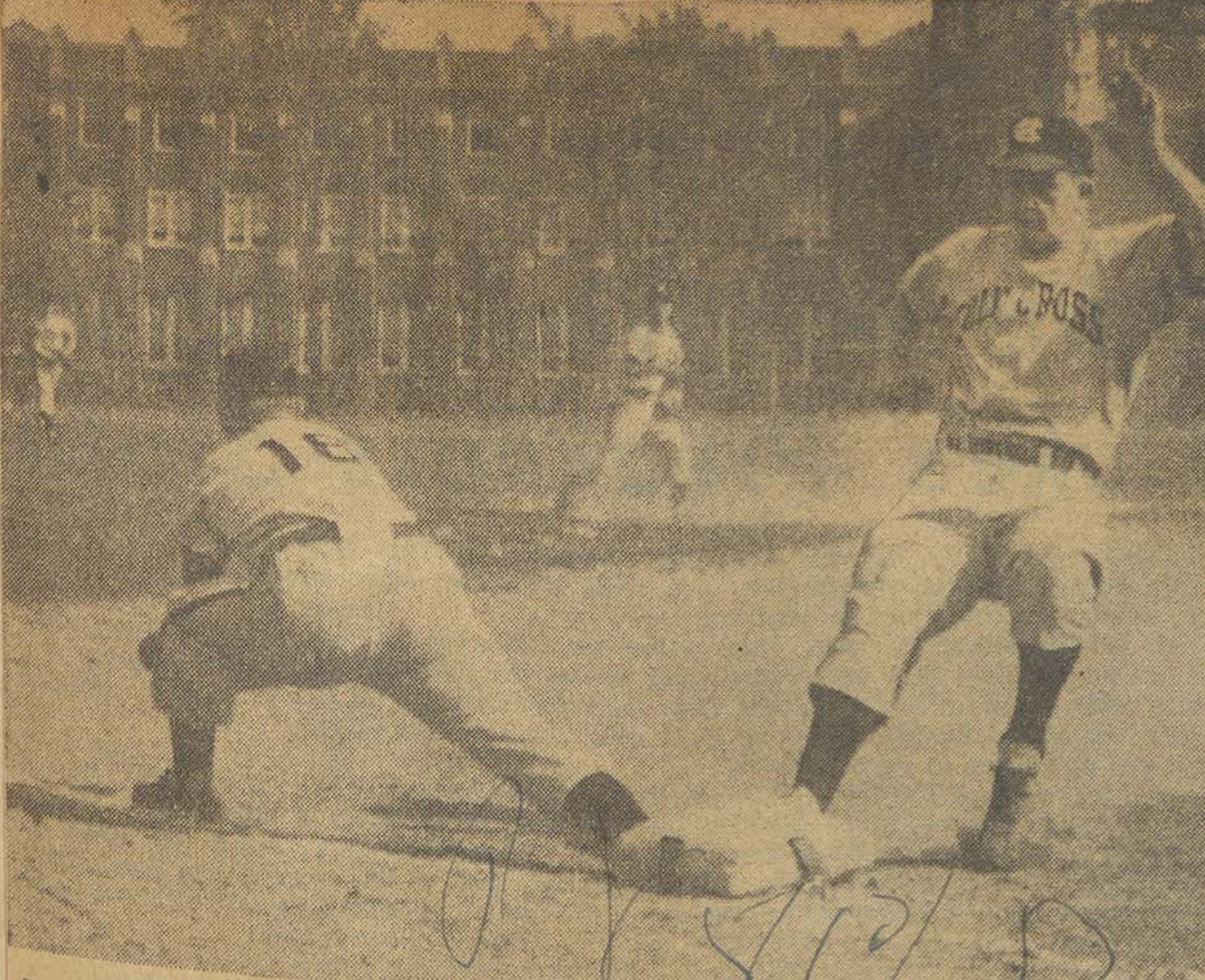

To Honor All-American Who Became Franciscan

St. Bonaventure and Providence Basketball Teams To Play for Father Anselm Krieger Trophy

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—A trophy named in memory of Father Anselm Krieger, O.F.M., will be placed in competition next Fall between St. Bonaventure University and Providence College. This is to be a permanent trophy for competition in varsity basketball between the two institutions which shared Father Anselm's love and loyalty, and is being presented by his classmates of the Providence College Class of 1931.

Johnny Krieger, who was to become Father Anselm, O.F.M., entered Providence College in 1927 from Central High School, Paterson, N. J., and remains enshrined as one of Providence's all-time basketball greats. He died at St. Bonaventure's, Olean, N. Y., in February, 1956. While at Providence, Johnny was named to the first All New England and second All American teams. After graduation he taught and coached at LaSalle

Academy here and then entered the Franciscan Order and was ordained in 1939.

Father Anselm's first assignment was to the newly founded Siena College in Loudonville, N. Y., where he helped organize the athletic department. In 1941 he was appointed athletic director at St. Bonaventure and was in charge of the sports program until failing health forced him to resign in October, 1947.

During the 1945-46 season he acted as basketball coach at St. Bonaventure as his team won 17 of 15 games. In 1945 he also launched the football program which was to bring St. Bonaventure national recognition.

This trophy, named after an outstanding student and athlete teacher and coach, administrator and priest, will achieve what Father Anselm so earnestly desired—the opening of intercollegiate athletic relations between his colleges.

Tex. A&M Pilot Denies Trip To R.I. Was for Roberts Tryout

With Texas A & M rebuked by the Southwest Conference for alleged violation of the conference's tryout and transportation-expense rules in the case of basketball player Alex Roberts of Pawtucket, Ken Loeffler, A & M coach, yesterday elaborated upon his explanation of the case.

Without mentioning Roberts' name, the Conference charged that Loeffler had observed a tryout of prospective players at Pawtucket, in April, 1955; that transportation of a prospective student athlete from Pawtucket to College Station, Tex., for the purpose of enrolling at A & M had been illegally provided in September, 1955, and that a round-trip airline ticket from College Station to Providence had been illegally provided for a basketball player by a representative of A & M at Christmas, 1955.

Loeffler denied any wrongdoing, stating that this had occurred before he had come to A & M as coach, though he already had signed to go there.

So, he said, he attended a game at the Pawtucket Boys' Club. He said it had not been a tryout. But he contacted two boys and they came to A & M. One of them—Alex Roberts

hadn't paid for the airline trip, though Roberts said he had.

George Duffy, R.I. Auditorium publicity director and a friend of Loeffler since the days when the latter was coaching the Providence Steam Roller in the Basketball Association of America, said last night that Loeffler's visit to Pawtucket hadn't been to attend a "tryout."

"I told Loeffler," Duffy said, "that nights during the basketball season when no games were being played and for some time after the season was over a bunch of us got together and swimmaged at the Boys' Club. I told him if he came to town that's where he'd probably find Alex of an evening. He came to town, came to the club, talked with Alex and with Dick Besette. Later Alex and Dick went down to Texas. Alex enrolled, but Dick came back and went to Providence College."

Paying the transportation of an athlete on a trip away from the college is against the rules since, under NCAA standards, it is giving a boy more than is allowed on an athletic scholarship.

League Charges Texas A&M Broke Rules in Roberts Case

New Southwest Conference findings of rules violations by Texas A&M, which centered around basketball player Alex Roberts of Pawtucket, came to light yesterday.

The Conference rebuked A&M for violating the tryout rule and for twice furnishing illegal transportation for the former

Pawtucket West High School player. The Aggies have been on National Collegiate Athletic Association probation since May, 1955 for violating recruiting rules in football. The Conference had the Aggies under similar probation, but removed the ban last May and asked the National Collegiate Athletic Association to do the same. The NCAA refused, however, because a new violation had been brought to its attention and said further investigation was necessary.

The NCAA-imposed probation is scheduled to run out May 31, but there was speculation the term might be extended in light of the new case. Under the current probation the Aggies have been banned from bowl games and championships of the NCAA in all sports.

Howard Grubbs, executive secretary of the Southwest Conference, announced the latest "findings" and said the conference was asking D. W. Williams, A&M president, to take "corrective or disciplinary action" or report to the conference

"his reasons for taking no action."

This didn't mean, however, that the Conference won't take punitive action, Grubbs said.

"Further action upon the above violations is postponed until the next meeting of the Conference," said the statement from the faculty committee, governing body of the Conference.

The new rules violations are said to have occurred in 1955, one—the tryout—before the conference meeting at which A&M was placed on probation. The others—both involving alleged illegal transportation—are said to have come in the fall, after the probationary action.

But the Conference didn't have information on these alleged violations until after the winter meeting at Dallas, at which time basketball coach Ken Loeffler of A&M was reprimanded for allowing a representative of the coaching staff to take two basketball prospects to Houston on a pleasure trip.

One was Jackie Moreland, the Louisiana schoolboy star, who figured in the celebrated case that got North Carolina State on NCAA probation.

The Moreland case was also referred to the A&M president for action, although it had been disposed of by the Conference at the winter meeting.

The Conference wouldn't name the "member of the coaching staff" who it said, observed the tryout of a prospective basketball player at Pawtucket, R.I., in April, 1955, nor the player. The Associated Press said the coach "obviously was Loeffler and the player was apparently Alex Roberts, who played freshman basketball at A&M in 1955-56, then dropped out of school."

At College Station, Loeffler verified that he was the coach in question and also that Rob-

erts was the player. He denied wrongdoing in the case, saying there was no tryout and that he did not pay the transportation.

Roberts entered Providence College last September as a freshman, but could not return because of the transfer rule, which requires a one-year waiting period.

(Roberts said last night his reason for leaving A&M was because of illness in his family and that he entered Providence College so he could be close to home. His father had had an operation and his mother was also ill.)

Grubbs said a close associate of the coach, who had helped him in recruiting players in the past, had paid the transportation of a prospective athlete from Pawtucket to College Station for the purpose of enrolling in A&M in September. Grubbs said this man also had arranged for the A&M coach to observe the tryout of prospective basketball players in a gymnasium at Pawtucket.

The other violations, Grubbs said, involved a round-trip air line ticket from College Station to Providence, R.I., which was provided by a "representative of Texas A&M college at Christmas 1955." Grubbs said the coach reported the ticket had furnished the ticket. This the coach denied, Grubbs added. "But the Conference knows somebody provided it and it was illegal," he commented. "The coach's parents said they didn't provide it."

The PC right-hander struck out the

out Bob Gulla, and loaded the bases with a walk to Mulvey. Ritacco advanced toward the plate with the hope of winning his own game but was recalled in favor of Bassett. Garrett retired the pinch hitter on three fast balls. The first one came in just below the shoulders, the second slightly above the waist and the last one, at which Bassett swung and missed, roared across just above the knees. The victory evened the Bruins' record for the season at 7-7 and enabled them to remain in position to tie the University of Rhode Island for the state title. To do that they must defeat the Friars again in their final game Tuesday at Hendricken Field.

Friars Blitz Bears With Five Runs In Sixth, 5-2; Rain Shortens Tilt

A home run by Ed Lewis triggered a five-run sixth inning that gave Providence College a 5-2 victory over Brown in a rain-shortened finale of the intrastate baseball series yesterday at Hendriken Field.

The Friar triumph killed the Bruins' chances of tying the University of Rhode Island for the state collegiate title. Brown wound up with a 2-2 record; URI was 3-1 and PC 1-3.

Bruin starter Don Nelson blanked the Friars for the first five innings and the Bears were riding a 2-0 lead when PC erupted in the last of the sixth.

Leadoff batter Herb Nicholas reached safely on shortstop Vic O'Bryan's error and then Lewis,

a left-handed hitter, drove the ball well beyond the 292-foot fence in right field. Walks to Jack Healey and Dan Mulvey were sandwiched around Nelson's strikeout of Bob Gulla and Coach Bob Murray sent up Jim Riordan to pinch hit for the Friars' starting pitcher, Bob Plante.

Riordan grounded out, short to first, both runners moving up a base. Red Rabitor drove both runners home with a double down the left-field foul line and Rabitor scored the fifth run of the inning on Lou LaFontaine's third hit of the game, a single to center field.

That was all for Nelson. Coach Lefty Lefebvre replaced him with Scott Garrett, the senior right-hander who had stopped the Friars on a one-hitter last Saturday. Gar-

rett walked Mike McDonough, the ninth Friar to bat in the inning, and then retired the side by getting Nicholas on a fly ball to George Gorgodian in left field.

Light rain began to fall as the Bruins came to bat in the seventh inning and the slightly slippery ball became a factor as the visitors loaded the bases. First Rabitor bobbled Rusty Chandler's high bouncer down to third. Then Joe Guglielmo, who had replaced Plante, walked Garrett, retired Gorgodian on a fly to left field, and filled the bases by walking O'Bryan.

That put the tying run on first but Guglielmo erased Jim Steiner on a weak pop fly to the mound and escaped unscathed when Healey hauled down Joel Baumgarten's curving fly ball to left field for the third out.

The rain began falling more steadily and after Garrett had retired PC in the seventh, the umpires ordered play held up. After a wait of 30 minutes, the game was called.

Brown scored its two runs in the second inning as the result of a walk to Baumgarten, a triple by Bob Pinch and a wild pitch. Pinch's hit sailed well over Healey's head in left field and it took a fine relay to hold the Bruin first baseman to a triple.

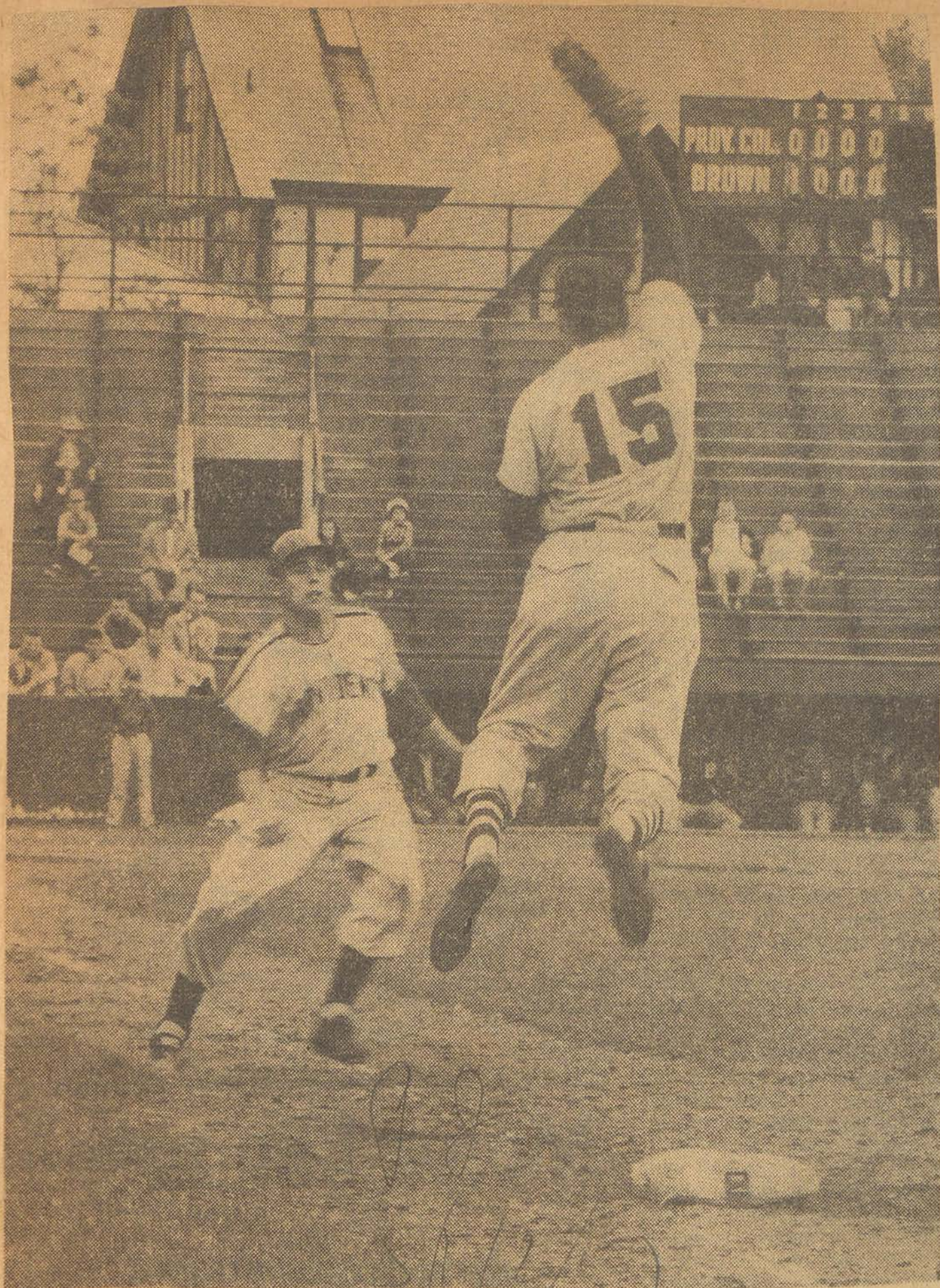
Fairbanks held the Bruins hitless in every inning except the eighth, in which they scored their lone run. That came on two singles, a walk and a fielder's choice.

Bob Daly of Holy Cross was the top individual performer. He won four events.

Ed Aron of Providence College, one of the leading shotputters in the East, has been selected R.I. Jewish Athlete of the Year.

The announcement by the R.I. 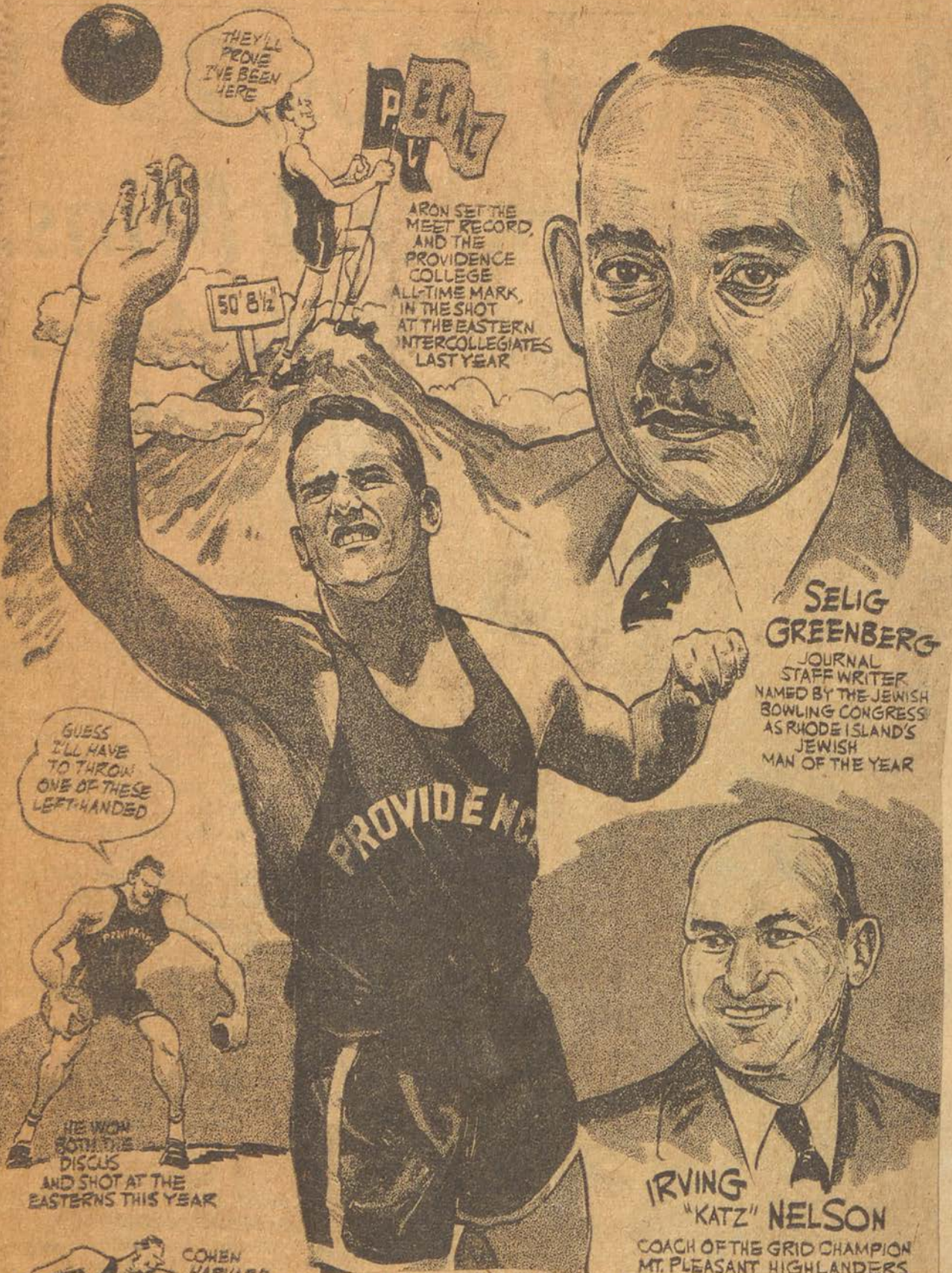

"That's one thing about it," he said. "I always got a kick out of beating the bigger guys. Of course, it wasn't all winning for me, and I think that learning to lose was just as important as learning to win. But I did get a kick out of beating the big ones."

Secondly, much of his development was, so to speak, self-attained. In high school, he came under the tutelage of Tommy Russell, now track and field coach at the University of Rhode Island, and Tommy still gave him encouragement even when, in the last season or so, Ed was competing against Russell's athletes.

"I'd drop down for workouts with Tommy now and then," Ed said, "and whenever I'd see him at a meet, he'd wish me luck. Naturally, when I was competing against one of his own boys he'd wish me luck in coming in second that day, but he always was most helpful to me."

Helping Hand

At Providence College he had the helping hand of Harry Coates, but there was no great pressure on him to work. With Ed, it was mostly a personal challenge to develop and prosper. Fortunately, as one member of the Friars' athletic staff put it, Ed is a "beaver," and he would work at his sport in all seasons and every chance he had.

Thirdly, and possibly most important, Ed realized early that there was something beyond pure results that could be gained from success in his sport.

"I guess I was a sophomore in high school," he said, "when I got the incentive. Everything I've ever done, even when I'd go out to practice, I always said to myself, 'Well, if I'm going to put the time into it, I might as well go all the way. So when I was a sophomore, I realize that I might be able to get help toward a college education out of this thing, so I went at it. And that's the way it worked out.'"

Confidence

One of the most difficult accomplishments in Ed's development was "crossing" the 50-foot barrier in shot putting. And, as with the beginnings, this came rather inauspiciously.

"One day I went out for practice," he said, "and it was cold and damp and I didn't feel especially like working and then, all of a sudden, there it was. It was a great moment."

Ernie Calverley, Ex-Ram Ace, Gets URI Hoop Post

Ernie Calverley, one of the University of Rhode Island's all-time basketball greats, will return to Kingston this fall as head basketball coach, replacing Jack Guy who resigned last month after five years, as boss of the Ram hoophoopers.

Calverley's appointment was made this morning in Providence at a meeting of the college's board of trustees.

A four-year star with one of the best of Coach Frank Keaney's brilliant "Firehorse" basketball aggregations, Calverley broke all-time Ram scoring records in his heyday with a total of 1,868 points.

The Rams, however, lost in the final to Kentucky.

Following his graduation from URI in 1946 Calverley played professional basketball with the Providence Steamrollers of the National Basketball Association. Last year he was fresh-

Athlete of Year Still Has a Goal

Ed Aron, the Providence College shot putter celebrated last night as Rhode Island's Jewish athlete of the year, made his beginnings in the sport in a typically inauspicious manner.

This is often the situation in these case histories of athletes; not all are set to their apprenticeships at a tender age and Aron's began as a freshman at Hope High School, almost by default.

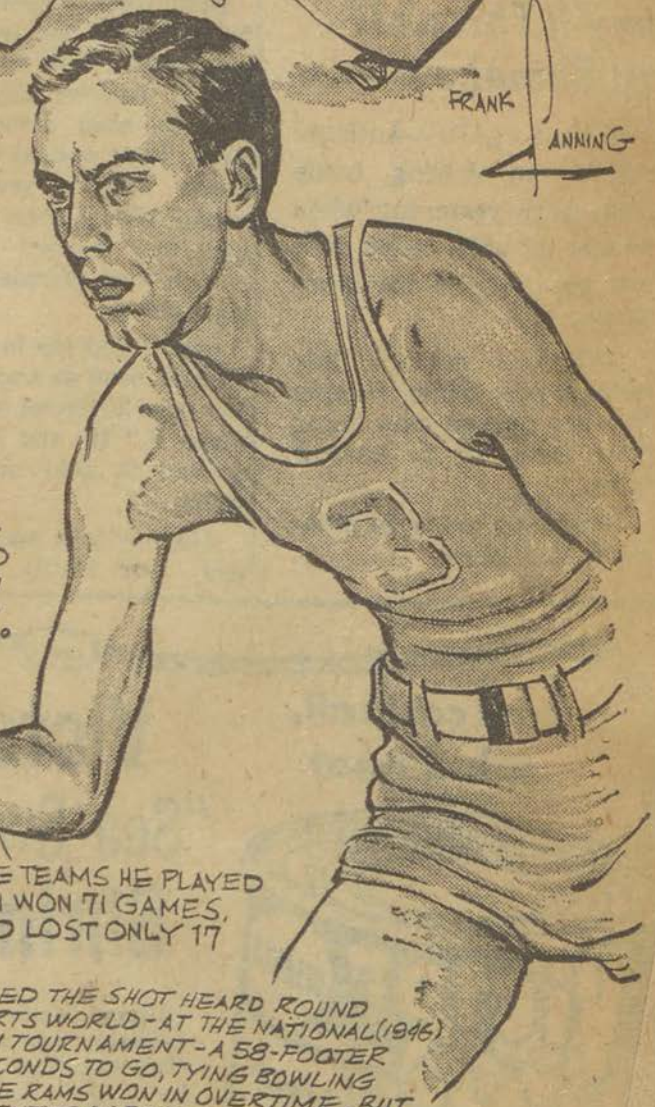

Ernie Calverley Gets URI Basketball Post

Ernie Calverley, who led Frank Keaney's Rhode Island Rams to many victories on the basketball court, will now attempt to get the same results from the coach's bench.

Calverley, who coached the Providence College Freshmen to an unbeaten season last winter, was named yesterday to the head basketball coaching berth at the University of Rhode Island. He succeeds the popular Jack Guy, who resigned recently.

The selection of Calverley to coach the Rams is a natural, for the then slim Pawtucket sniper was the darling of the basketball fans when he played for Rhody and now he comes home to coach the Rams.

Calverley is well qualified for his new job with a background of outstanding college and professional activity with the Rams and the Providence Steam Roller. He is also talented in the coaching field as he has proved for several years with the freshman squads at Providence College.

Ernie is the second of Keaney's players to coach at Rhody. Red Haire followed the Old Master and was in turn succeeded by Guy, who had sent his teams against the Rams upon several occasions.

Keen Student

Calverley, small and slim by nature, was among the greatest small men that have come out of Eastern basketball. He has been a keen student of the game and perfected his own playing and coaching techniques through his associations with Keaney at Kingston, Bob Morris at Pawtucket and in the pros, and with Joe Mulaney and Vin Cuddy of late at Providence College.

Rhode Island basketball rebounded to some extent under Guy's direction as the Rams won some big ones upon occasion and held their own against some name clubs that had stronger manpower. However, the Rams will be in for a period of rebuilding under Calverley as they have been to some extent under Guy.

Ernie, who probably always had an ambition to follow in Keaney's footsteps and had been denied an opportunity to coach as head man in the college ranks, is looking forward to the challenge that presents itself at Kingston.

Since Ernie left Rhody, the Rams have switched the games from Rodman Hall to Frank Keaney Gymnasium. At Rodman Hall, Calverley and his mates put on some of the most stirring hoop epics in local college basketball, not once or twice, but upon many occasions.

Ernie starts practically from scratch and faces some of the same problems that Guy had. However, in Calverley's case, he has no Ron Marozzi or Billy Von Weyhe for a nucleus and these two made a spot for themselves among the biggest and best of the Rams in recent court campaigns.

The Famous Shot

Calverley's career is generally pinpointed around the Rams' uphill triumph over Bowling Green in Madison Square Garden in National Invitation Tournament. Then Ernie fired a 58-foot shot before a packed Garden that kept the Rams alive and eventually they won that one. Kentucky, with Adolph Rupp having another great team, topped the Rams by one point in the final.

Calverley to Look To Local Product

Ernie Calverley has been the University of Rhode Island basketball coach for less than a full week, but he has already decided one thing about his team to come. It will be basically a "home-bred" operation.

The other day, before leaving his Seekonk home to look over a homesite for himself and family in Kingston, Ernie was talking about what plans he has been able to formulate during his short time in office and the foremost one, easily, was his hopes for local talent.



"If," he said, "I can get the best three or four high school players in Rhode Island to come to Kingston, then I'll have a good nucleus. For a big man I'll probably have to look elsewhere, because we just don't seem to grow 'em big enough around here. But otherwise, our own kids should be able to do the job."

"Anyway, I'd be foolish to try to attract players from the New York and New Jersey and Pennsylvania areas. Let's face it. All I could get from there would be the leftovers, and I'm sure that the good Rhode Island boys are much better than the leftovers from those other places."

Evidence Enough . . .

He ticked off a number of Rhode Islanders making good in basketball elsewhere—two at Holy Cross, one at Michigan State, another at Boston College, a few at Providence College—and said that this was evidence enough that our talent was good enough if it could be brought together on one court.

But did he think he could attract them to Kingston?

"Well," he said, "it won't be through lack of effort on my part. I'll certainly try. I don't mean that when I get them, either, that they'll be All-Americans,

This was just about as "under" as a statement can get, for there probably is not a name in Rhode Island basketball that means more than Calverley. Those basketball buffs who remember Ernie as "the gaunt, pale young case of malnutrition," as he was once described during his magnificent playing days with the Rams in the mid-40's, might have to take a second look these days—he now weighs 185 pounds, compared to the 140 of those times—but the magic of his reputation is still alive.

And such a reputation! "When he lays hand on that ball and starts moving," Red Smith once wrote of him, "he is a whole troop of Calverley, including the pretty white horses. The guy is terrific, colossal, and also very good."

Further on, Smith described Ernie as ". . . the man who set up Rhode Island's plays, taking the ball down the court, hiding it, passing it, shooting, dribbling, feinting, weaving, running the show with almost unbelievable dexterity and poise."

Proper and Fitting . . .

That was the Ernie Calverley under the great coaching of Frank Keaney, and it seems only proper and fitting that the greatest student of the greatest coach of the finest teams the Rams ever had should be selected to take charge in these days. If only a little of Ernie's ability rubs off on his players, they will be very good indeed.

To date, Ernie's best coaching job was with the Providence College freshman team of last season. The club was undefeated in 23 games, so there is at least an indication that, given a fair shake in talent, he can make something of it.

However, he has no illusions of fast success at Rhode Island.

"I don't expect to go down there," he said, "and set the world on fire right away. I'm certainly not a defeatist, but it will take two or three years at best before we can hope to show something. Everyone at Kingston understands that."

Did he have any hesitations, he was asked, about going back to the scene of his great triumphs in this new role?

"No, none," he said. "Of course, we deliberated a . . . but I can say

This was late in June, when the National League race had brought on a jam close to the top as the Redlegs, Cardinals, Dodgers, Phillies and Braves were jostling each other. The Redlegs were at the Polo Grounds and Jimmy Dykes said:

"It's a funny league. As soon as a club gets in first place they get their brains knocked out."

A week or so later the Redlegs went into first place and got their brains knocked out.

This was the day before the All-Star game in St. Louis. In the lounge bar of the Hotel Chase a group of baseball guys were sitting at a large round table, having a late spot of lunch, and Birdie Tebbetts was directly across from his friend, Fred Hutchinson, whose Cardinals had blasted the Redlegs out of first place the day before by beating them in both games of a doubleheader at Busch Stadium.

"To think," Birdie said, "it was only a little while ago that I was

feeling sorry for him when we knocked the Cards out of the lead. We had dinner together that night, and neither of us mentioned what had happened that day. Last night we had dinner together again. But it was his turn to feel sorry for me . . . and I know he did."

It's Been Rougher on Birdie

It has been a rough season for these two who once were battery mates with the Tigers, but it has been rougher for Birdie than it has been for Fred. After all, the Cardinals still are in the race, theoretically at least. The Redlegs are fighting it out with the Phillies for fourth place and losing ground . . . and looking back over their shoulders as the Giants make their belated move for a place in the Sun.

Not so long ago it seemed that Birdie might give Cincinnati its first pennant since 1940. Spotty Hitting and No Pitching

If any one asks you what happened to the Redlegs after their early rush for glory, refer him to Gabe Paul, general manager of the club. Gabe, who is just as truthful as Birdie, took Birdie off the hook the other day, explaining to the Rhinelanders that he hadn't supplied the manager with the pitchers he needed but would try to do so before the coming of another season.

It was Ducharme who scored the winning run in the memorable third and deciding game of the R. I. Interscholastic Baseball League playoffs when the Broncos edged Pawtucket East and Chet Nichols, 3-2, in a brilliant 10-inning struggle. Phil Paine, now of the Milwaukee Braves, outdueled Nichols in that one.

That triumph ignited a chain reaction that produced three consecutive state schoolboy baseball championships for Burrillville and the school's hockey and football teams also continued to enjoy huge success. It was probably the three finest years in the Broncos' sports history.

In acquiring Ducharme, Providence College has taken a big step up the collegiate hockey ladder because Eccleston will now have an aide familiar with his system to handle the incoming freshmen and at the same time, leave him free to concentrate on the varsity squad instead of dividing his time as he did last season, his first at P. C.

Eccleston figures that it takes at least three years to install his system of team play, precision passing and passing patterns and much time will be saved if players coming up to the varsity are well schooled in his methods.

That will be Ducharme's job and Eccleston is confident he'll more than fill the bill.

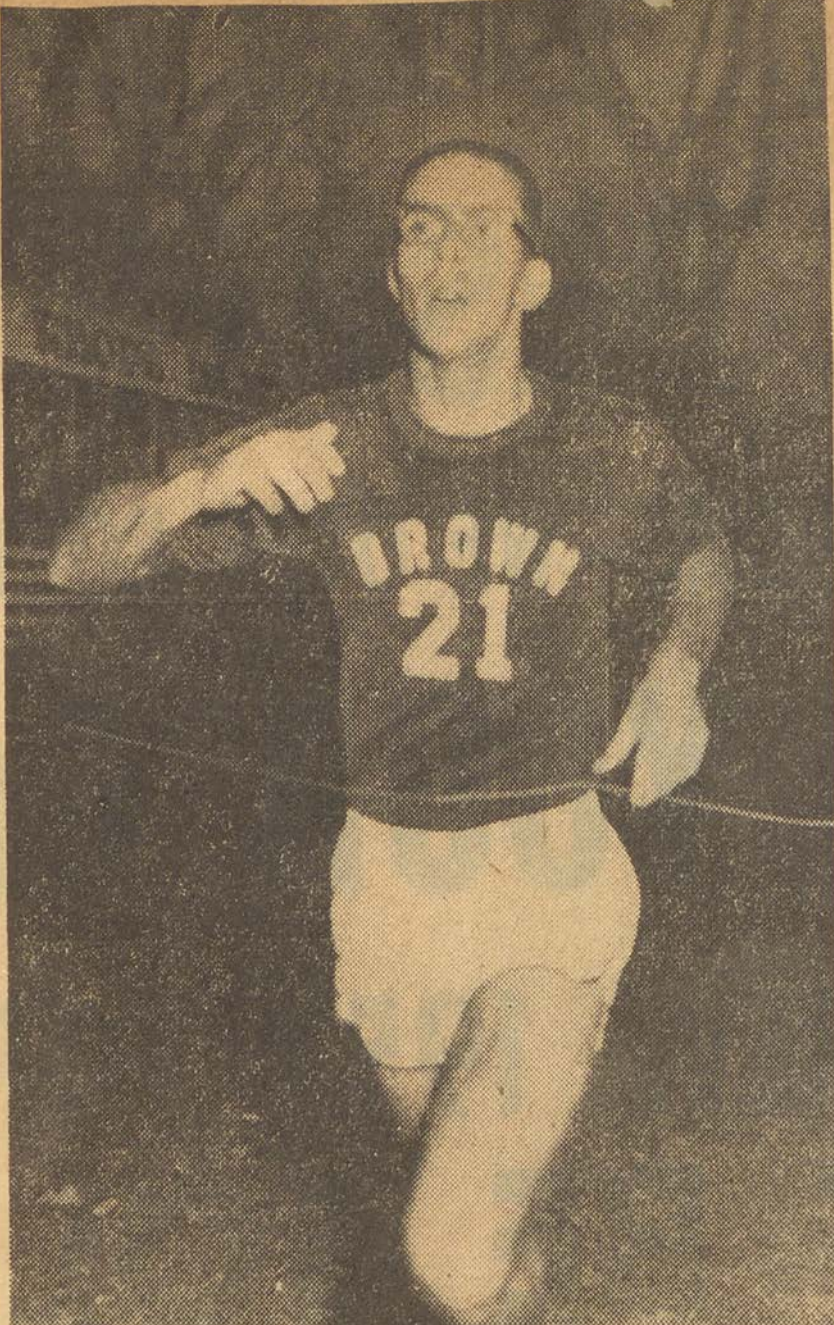
It was the fourth consecutive race in which the slim Brown senior from Keene, N.H., had led the field home.

P.C. Has the Horses For Happy Hooping

The sounds from Providence College as the basketball season approaches are giving promise of a bang-up team for the Friars; at least there are such sounds of bright promise from certain quarters.

Much of this optimism, it seems, is built on the rather shaky premise that: 1. Last season's freshman team, with its glossy record of 23-0, is back almost intact; and 2, a good portion of last year's varsity, with its 15-9 record, is also present. On paper, they can show you, this spells winner.

There are a few, however, who realize that it is not all that simple, and the mere fact that an all-winning freshman group is moving up to a competent varsity outfit is not necessarily a sure thing. And the one man not so sure of what it spells is Joe Mullaney, the coach of the club.

It Was Good, but . . .

"The point that gets me about it all," Joe was saying yesterday, in the course of an estimate of his club, "is that a lot of people don't understand about records. They look at the figures—23-0—and they say to me, 'Joe, looks like you really got 'em this year, eh? This ought to be it.'

"Well, I can't very well say I'm *not* happy to have those freshmen, and there's no doubt about it, I have at least four who will help us. But they don't understand the way things work.

"Look," he said, "there's no question about that freshman team. It was good. But not many realize that it was one of those things where we happened to play a lot of teams that weren't as good as they might have been. It's just that they had never seen

of the regulars were complaining to Ernie (Calverley, the coach, now at URI) and saying, 'When are we going to get some decent teams to play?' These kids were complaining because they weren't playing enough."

Needed: One Big Man . . .

But don't get him wrong, Joe said. He was delighted to have such a situation. But there was more.

"The worst part of it all," he said, "is that we're getting added strength, all right, but we're getting strength where we don't need it. A couple of these freshmen are small and they're good back-court men, but we already have those.

"What we need is a good, big man, such as we had in John Ritch last year, a big man who can play the other team's big man and rough him up a little and lean on him and tire him out. We're not getting that from the freshmen.

"We do have a boy named Woods coming up," He said, and he described John Woods, a boy who stands 6-4 and does, on height, qualify as "big."

"But he isn't Ritch," Joe said. "I'd say that if Woods has good position he can jump as high as Ritch, but so far he can't work around and maneuver for position the way John could. So that's where we need the strength and we're not getting it."

The Winning Habit . . .

Still, he allowed, it was not the worst situation a coach could find himself in, and he had to acknowledge, he said, that he could take a "positive approach" with this coming team.

"For one thing," he said, "we'll be better defensively. I guess for the first time since I've been here I can feel that I can say to a man, 'You guard this man or that one,' and feel that the job will be done. So, Ritch notwithstanding, we'll be better off in that way."

And there was one other point.

shooters like Mike Pascale, who had a fine jump shot and tallied 331 points last season. "Wally gets the tough ones," Joe said, "you need a guy like that."

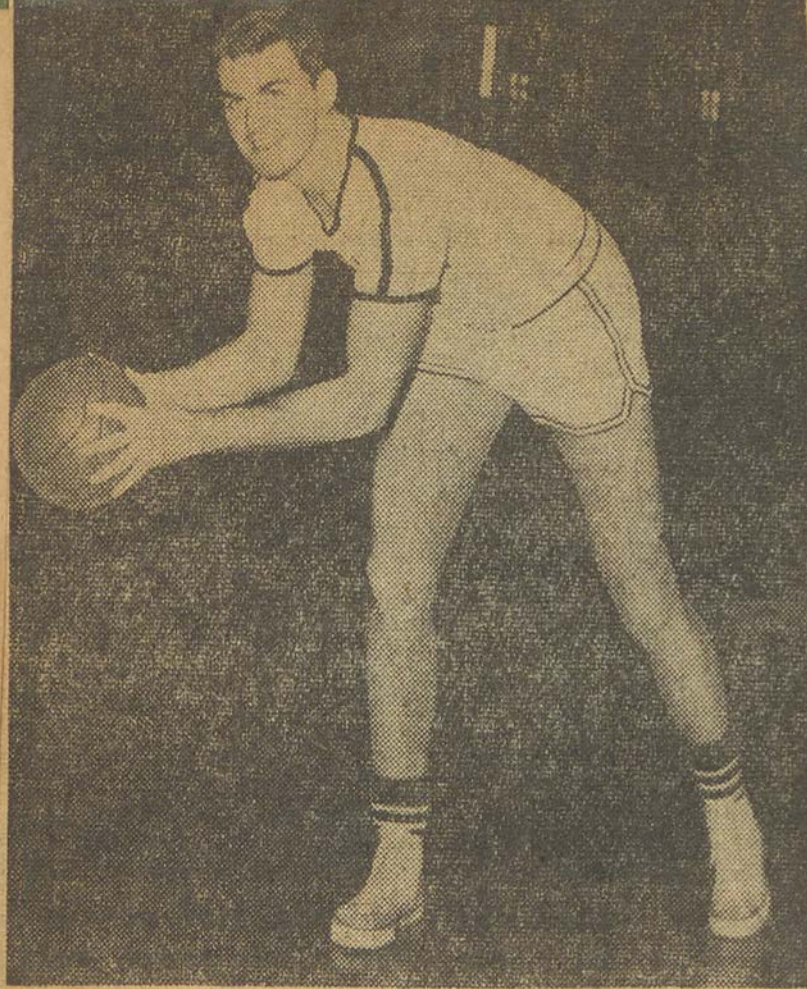

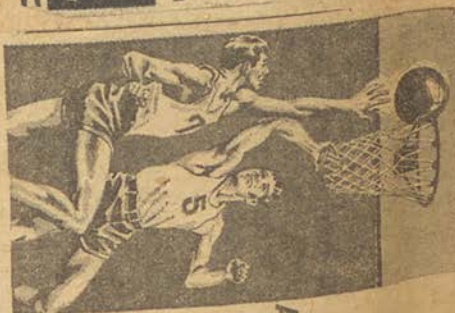

Friars Launch Basketball Season With 83-60 Conquest of Fairfield

Providence College's sophomore-studded basketball team opened its season yesterday with an impressive 83-60 victory over Fairfield University before 1,500 spectators at Alumni Hall.

With three members of last season's undefeated freshman team in their starting lineup, the Friars broke a 6-6 deadlock in the early minutes of the game and pulled steadily away.

The Friars increased their lead to 16 points late in the first half but the visitors closed the gap to 44-31 at halftime. Fairfield drew to within nine points at 46-35 early in the second half but PC took charge again and quickly removed all element of doubt.

Sophomores Len Wilkens and Wally DiMasi were the most frequent snipers in the Friars' early push and wound up as the leading scorers with 18 and 17 points, respectively. John Woods, a 6-4 sophomore, took over the pivot spot vacated by last year's captain, John Ritch, and turned in a fine job under both boards. He also contributed eight points.

These three were joined in the starting lineup by two seniors, Capt. Ed Donohue and Frank Tirico. Even allowing for the fact that the Stags had not had the benefit of a pre-season scrimmage, the Friars set up their plays well on several occasions, achieved a 43 per cent shooting average on 32 buckets in 74 attempts from the floor, and threw up an effective man-to-man defense that har-

a line-drive shot made with one or both hands which like those of Wilkens and DiMasi are difficult to defend against. Swartz hit for 11 points yesterday.

Of the reserves, Pete Schementi, a 6-6 center who should help with the rebounding, Dick Bessette and Ken Clements turned in some good spot work in relief.
