CLASS HISTORY

FEELING rather statistical the other day, we dropped in on the Registrar, made ourselves welcome by declaring that we were not there for the semester marks and asked for a few facts on the class of '50. They broke it to us that a cool 75 percent of the class is veteran. Now everybody knows that normally the man leaving college is only four years older than the boy leaving high school, and in this respect 112 of us are normal; but it is the rest of us—293 strong—who make the class the anomalous thing that it is: who, by having undergone military service in some form, however arduous or nominal, have brought to the experience of education a background never required by any college and never, perhaps, desired.

Our Thomistic passion for subdistinction tells us that this veteran component is susceptible to a three-fold breakdown. Among the war-fatigued who foregathered at Providence College in the autumn of 1946, three general types were discernible (this, of course, is hindsight): first, the man who, disheartened by the desolation and tragedy of war, wanted to establish, through education, an ideal which would be constructive and responsible in both the personal and social orders; second, the man who wanted to prepare himself to make a living; and third, the man who, ravaged by the demands and outrages of war (Bastogne or Quonset, it doesn't matter) just plain wanted a rest. It is not for us in this history to evaluate the relative worthiness of these motives, but we will return to the types a little later.

But it's time we got down to the details of our history. We see

We see by the Cowl that as early as its first postwar issue it had enlisted for its weekly chores several of our classmen, among them Dan Stafford, Pat Onofrio, Norman Dault, John Barrett and John Shea. The last two, incidentally, have remained active in reporting the sports events of Providence College. Then too, there was Dave Connors who joined the staff of the Cowl shortly after the issue just mentioned and proved his worth by soon becoming the Sports Editor. In reporting the sports we often felt that Dave's column, the Sports Panorama, had a bit of the Dave Egan touch to it. The circulation of the Cowl was entrusted to Jim Coughlin in his junior year while the mysteries of the dark-room were presided over by Ed Strack. Early in February, 1949, the co-editorship of the paper passed to another member of our class. Frank McPeake

In sports the Cowl has an uneven story to tell, let us face it, our teams have had their ups and downs, but the faithful names kept turning up in most reports—Walt Lozoski (whose early basketball successes are still remembered as somewhat spectacular), Art Weinstock, Cy Killian, Dick Maloney, Paul Williams, Jim Sullivan, Bill Littlefield, Ted Mesejewski, John Shanley, Jerry McGurkin and Tony Fratanuono. As a class we turned out to bonfire rallies in good voice, and we climbed into streetcars and busses to witness our boys in action at City Gym, the Providence Auditorium and Mount Pleasant Gym. It might be added for its sociological interest that we were not against rehashing the whole event in a prolonged bull-session afterwards. As for the general athletic life at Providence College, we went to games and read about them—but there was one thing that we did most of all and all the time: we talked about it. In the cafe we outnoised the jukebox, in the classroom we derailed lectures. Student and faculty alike we were proud of our teams—win, lose or draw.

There is a great deal more that could be said about sports but perhaps just a few of the highlights of the past four years will serve to keep our memories fresh.





all in the ninth and banged a clean single to right.





Our senior year has produced three events of great import to date. A new coach came to the College and started a ball of fire rolling on the basketball court which reestablished the pre-war position of the Friars as one of the dangerous teams of the East. His name is James V. Cuddy and his major accomplishments have been a two-point victory over Rhode Island State (a victory which our class has looked forward to for three years and which was rewarded by a school holiday) and a 77-64 upset over the high-flying Eagles of Boston College. Happy days had arrived again.

For the moment, let's occupy our thoughts with what we did socially, still as a class, of course.

Plunging right into the social whirl of the College, we started with a fine Irish zest by bringing off the freshman Saint Patrick's Day Frolic, this in mid-March of 1947. The music was provided by George Johnson and the Cowl elegantly praised the renditions of his "14 piece aggregation". The Cowl prepared us for the Frolic two weeks in advance, a hint of the fine publicity this newspaper was to give our class for the next three years. Although it was our first social venture, we presume that its success is still within the memory of living men. within the memory of living men.

We pass to the Sophomore Hop. The historically minded can to this day consult the Publications archives to examine the group this day consult the Publications archives to examine the group picture of the committee, a fine representation of sophomore manhood. Here we have Bill Ealahan—the picture is before us as we write—flanked by Wales Henry, Jack Connolly, Phil Cunningham, Gerry McGurkin, Jim Coughlin and Art Weinstock. This function came off in late October of 1947, was well attended and well enjoyed. Father Doyle, who was to be our class moderator throughout our four years, gained some knowledge of the hustling group that was to prepare for the biggest social function of any class, the Junior

As early as November it was decided that the Prom co-chairmen would be Phil Cunningham and Bill Ealahan. Conscious that, as a class, we were approaching the social climax of our four years, a class, we were approaching the social climax of our four years, we began a publicity effort never exerted for any previous affair. There was only one mishap. It was announced in February by Paul Joyce, Dance Band Selection Committee Chairman, that Ray Eberle would provide the music. This plan miscarried when Eberle dissolved his orchestra, a catastrophe we were powerless to avert, and the breach was filled by Charlie Barnet. We do not, of course, know how Eberle would have been, but Charlie's renditions were of such a nature that we did not regret the mishap at all. The king of "be-bop" provided us with a few touches of his specialty, but for the most part kept to the plain and danceable. We elected a queen from a bevy of beautiful guests and class president Ed Coogan suitably presented her with the floral bouquet attesting to her newly acquired status. The Cowl prepared a souvenir issue for the event and each guest was given a charm pendant to remind her of the festivities of the evening long after the event became memory. after the event became memory.

We bring you now to the social interest of our senior year. As We bring you now to the social interest of our senior year. As if too busy for anything elaborate we tossed off a neat little confection called the Farmer's Festival. In boots and denims we danced with our farmerettes until a discrete hour, and then, turning down the lamp, retired. But not until we had amazed the unsuspecting by giving away a door prize of a real live porker.

This book goes to press too early for a report on the Senior Ball, but hope, ever a virtue of the class, runs high.

This is not to imply, of course, that we had no hand in other dances, such as, for example, club dances in home cities and attendance at the dances of other classes. The Dorm students attended their annual Autumn Festivals and Carolan Club Weekends while the Junior Veridames caused many a pleasant evening to pass in

the Junior Veridames caused many a pleasant evening to pass in festivity at Harkins Hall. All in all, we had a varied and pleasant social life, we made memories and we made friends. We were active in the way that mattered most to us: we danced.

It seems appropriate at the moment to dwell briefly upon poli-It seems appropriate at the moment to dwell briefly upon politics. Who have been our toilers for the class weal? Well, in our freshman year we elected the following named men to office: Gerry McGurkin, president; Jim Coughlin, vice-president; Tom Murphy, secretary; and Joe Bouchard, treasurer. In the sophomore year: Bill Ealahan, president; Bill White, vice-president; Jack Connolly, secretary; Art Weinstock, treasurer. In the junior year: Ed Coogan, president; Dick Maloney, vice-president; Bill Littlefield, secretary; and as treasurer, Gerry McGurkin. And for our senior year, Steve Fanning was president, Dan Sullivan, vice-president; Wales Henry, secretary; and Jim Coughlin, treasurer. It can be seen at a glance that two men served twice, but in different offices. We're a glance that two men served twice, but in different offices. We're

willing to be reminded, of course, but offhand we can recall no political antagonisms of any significant intensity, no gross inefficiency, and no scandals; neither can we remember that any treasurer

absconded with the funds.

Behind all this, and perhaps basic to it, lay a healthy rivalry and each year a good deal of energetic campaigning. Like our social activities, the political efforts of the class brought out the best talents of the poster makers, but it would be dishonest to imply that, in the matter of campaigning, we ever approached the originality, the resourcefulness, and the daring of our underclassmen. However, the elections were run in an orderly manner, once with the aid of voting machines which incidentally recorded a one vote plurality in the senior election.

Our class has what may or may not be the distinction of being the only class to vote against the Student Congress. It is never safe to generalize, but the cause of this reversal may have come from a feeling of overextreme caution against government by our peers. However, be that as it may, it is now a matter of history that the Student Congress has been duly instituted in accord with the wishes of the entire student body and not being ones to hold up progress when it has so been voted by the majority, the class of 1950 entered into the spirit in which the Student Congress was proposed and has been a bulwark in the initial functioning of this institution.

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In the Student Congress we were represented by George Forcier, Jim Coughlin, Steve Fanning, Jim Sullivan and Dick Maloney. The president of the Congress was Ed Micarelli and the vice-president Ed Coogan. The president of any class is automatically a representative for that class in the Congress. Then too, the various clubs in the college placed men in the Congress as their representatives in a passive role. While they are too numerous to mention, it might be stated that the majority of these were seniors. Through the Student Congress the direction of the activities of the National Federation of Catholic College Students became the special interest of Ed Coogan while John Connolly directed the part our college had to play in the Overseas Service Program.

Although young in inception the Congress has acted with maturity of purpose and with the generous cooperation of the administration has brought about many beneficial reforms and improve-ments. Among these may be listed the repaying of the parking lot, the introduction of track as a major sport, the coordination of social activities and the regulation of voting and voting procedure.

So it is that the members of the class which voted against the Congress have taken in hand the running of that Congress and have laid a firm foundation for the future functioning ability of that body. We can feel that it is to our credit that we spoke freely and yet acquiesced to the will of the many and undertook the task at hand in good spirit.

In talking about the class we have already touched upon athletics, politics, social activities, and to some extent publications; and we intend to bring up still other matters, such as the literary and academic aspects. But everyone knows that college life is pretty much of a piece, there is an interplay among the elements, and they even in a sense give rise to each other. It is precisely this they even in a sense give rise to each other. interplay which we hope to show in this class history, so that from it we can, perhaps, grasp the tone which has pervaded our four years here at Providence College. The tradition which we have become a part of here at our college can best be preserved in the pages of the Veritas, for fundamentally it is in the classbook that we have the guardian of the true spirit of Providence College. More specifically the class history may be the treasure house of recorded memory, of the things which we will wish to remember about our Dominican college: the friendship which pervades the campus, the buildings in which we spent many an hour in study or in comradie, our faculty, perhaps even the ambitions and the hopes or the misgivings and the sorrows which we may have enter-tained while we walked across the grassy lawns with our fellow students in the Spring. Certainly these days will be remembered with nostalgia in the years to come. So the historian, then, must go beyond the here and now and draw the past into its proper So the historian, then, must perspective and express our hopes for the future. And that which may have the greatest bearing on this perspective and on the future may well be the religious experience which we have made part of our lives here at Providence College.

We are conscious then that something should be said of the religious life of our class. Our four years of study have had the basic groundwork running throughout of the theology of the Catholic Church and profound philosophy of Saint Thomas Aqui-In our four years we have become indoctrinated with the fact that man is truly free when his intellect is informed with Truth concerning God and reality; when his will is liberated from the domination of emotion, passion and the slavish pursuit of

material goods.

It is of interest to record that our class cooperated handsomely in the Holy Name Parade in Boston in our sophomore year. The college chaplain provided not only a train, but trains, to take the large contingent of men from the college to Boston. The

parade lasted all day although the actual march of the men from the college was only two hours in duration.

In our senior year we were participants in another large display devoted to the Holy Name, this at the Holy Name Hour held at Narragansett Park. No one can deny that it was a cold night but the weather did not deter the religious fervor of the participants. None of us can forget the spectacle of countless thousands of candles casting their glow before dim faces while the rosary was being intoned through the night.

The Pilgrim Virgin, one of the two statues of Our Lady of Fatima which were making a tour of Europe, Canada and the United States, was received with impressive ceremony at the College on the night of February 7th, 1950. Fortunately this event coincided with the end of our senior retreat and added a solemn and dignified note to an already well implemented series of con-ferences. Monsignor McGrath and the President of the college

ferences. Monsignor McGrath and the President of the college addressed the large gathering at the chapel of Aquinas Hall.

And in mentioning retreats, we attended four of them during our stay at the college, each of them being of three days duration. The retreat-masters were in turn humorous, serious, or philosophical and all were appreciated for the extent of their oratory or the lessons they taught so well. The retreats were a period of contemplation and inner reflection and although it is hard if not impossible to measure the amount of good they influenced on the individual, it is certain that the class as a whole benefitted from them.

The Third Order of Saint Dominic was reconstituted on the campus and a large number of the students joined the college chapter and thereafter became actively engaged in the good works

of the Tertiaries.

Our four years have had a religious background that we were seldom acutely cognizant of although it was always around us. We grew to know it through out priests who were always with us, through our moderators who worked with us, through our active academic participation in Theology classes. In this way, hardly without our realization, we became more firmly adapted to our Catholic way. Only seldom, as in the case of our classmate, Arthur Rogers, who joined the trappists at the end of our junior year to become Brother Damien-only seldom did the drama become clear for all of us to see.

IV

The story of dramatics at Providence College is one of mixed sentiment. Several in our class showed, from the start more or less, an interest in acting, among them Bill Gregory, Henry Keenan, Ray Scungio, George Markham, Don Shea, Sal Amanti and Peter Razza.

The first production in which our class figured was The Amazing Doctor Clitterhouse, and it has, with Room Service, more "reputa tion" than the other pieces presented during the four year period by the Pyramid Players. This came off in December, 1946 with George Markham featured. It marked the first of four competent stage portrayals by George.

Next it was decided to produce a musical comedy written by the students themselves, to be called Sing, Mr. Citizen! Class members still with us who worked on the script are Hank Keenan, George Eagle and Wales Henry, none of whom, in his most sentimental moments would pretend that the writing was anything but inexpert. The Cowl of March 19, 1947, told the truth about the music, which on the whole came off more successfully than the dialogue.

The cast drew from our class George Markham and Don Shea for speaking roles, and we were well represented in the production numbers. It will be remembered that Pete Razza's extemporaneous

In our sophomore year the Pyramid Players presented only one play, a comedy called *Derryowen*. Here the talents of the organization were given adequate scope for expression, the net result of which was a pleasant and well produced version of Ireland during the war. George Markham appeared again, this time with Bill Gregory and Ray Scungio, and in this play the actors showed a new tempo and freshness. The stage crew contrived an interesting and suggestive setting which was a marked advance over their efforts for previous productions.

Our junior year saw the Pyramid production of Room Service, in which the class was represented by Pete Razza and George Markham. Artistically it was perhaps the most successful dramatic venture since the postwar restoration of the Pyramid Players.

As the Veritas goes to press, the plans of the Pyramid Players for this year are uncertain. It is believed that several plays are under consideration and it is to be hoped that the college will once again respond to another curtain call before the year has fled.

A moment ago we alluded to the post-war revival of publications. As we mentioned earlier, the *Cowl*, the weekly newspaper of the Providence College student body, got off to an early start in the fall of 1946. From the start it has shown a wholesome optimism,

a cheerful enthusiasm for college life and action, and a casual respect for grammar and orthography which we feel is authentically In their office in Donnelly Hall, the members of the Cowl staff did their best to duplicate the conditions surrounding a city desk at some big city paper. Long hours were spent in the gathering and editing of the news, pictures were snapped with abandon and on the whole the circulation of the *Cowl* on a Wednesday afternoon was eagerly looked forward to by all the student body. The newspaper carried our class publicity on all and any occasions we approached them to do so. Of direct interest to us was the Junior Prom Souvenir edition which was distributed at the Biltmore Hotel on the night of that gala event. However, as we have previously mentioned the Cowl in this history, let us pass on to the other publications which were edited by the students in the college.

We're not going to be so narcissitic as to discuss the Veritas at length here. Our class members have only recently joined it in any considerable number and furthermore the fruits of their efforts are now in your hands for your appraisal. Needless to say, the Veritas was constantly before the members of the class, usually through the medium of the bulletin board which shouted its requests for picture sittings, baby pictures, club photos and the like. The end results, we believe, have justified the expediency of these

requests.

However, we would like to touch upon the Alembic, in some ways the companion and in others the antithesis of the Cowl. The Alembic is the literary magazine published four times a year by the students of the college and in our freshman year it was revived from its wartime hiatus. Its growth has been a rather interesting spectacle when its present status is compared with what it was before the war.

Before the war the Alembic, written by students not long out of high school, was optimistic in tone and temper—ready to appreciate and perhaps reluctant to evaluate for itself with any real scrutiny the intellectual and moral heritage into which it had grown. The end of the war brought to its pages a new spirit, a willingness to criticize, and a general consciousness of modern complexities. However crude the process and imperfect the results, the Alembic has become less provincial.

It experimented with verse in its freest, most undisciplined forms, a style curiously appropriate to the spirit it sought to communicate and interpret. In this technique, Wales Henry, himself elected editor in our junior year rendered rather optimistic and uncritical opinions in "The Seven Sins". Clifford Brott adhered to more rigid and conventional poetic traditions and by the senior year had clearly evinced his penchant for romanticism. Ray Scungio, a faithful contributor, preached, in his absurd comedies, an innocent and bumptious hedonism, while George Eagle, in more serious work, stressed the egocentricity of the individual subtly at odds with his peers and his milieu. Charles Wooley and Tom Boning expressed themselves in the essay, each showing skill in touching the nerve centers of emotion.

Now our word on the academic side. In writing a class history, it's easy enough to cite a cold fact—like the sopolmore year seizing of the R. I. State ram—but how can you describe the less tangible effects of education itself, the less visible academic victories? How can you tell what happened intellectually to the man who came here back in 1946? Well, that is a hard one to answer, but perhaps the climate can be suggested, the intellectual climate that built up over the years among the students as they went about being exposed to the thought and special viewpoint of Providence College. You began to feel it building, making itself felt, back when the jukebox played "The Coffee Song" and by the time "Music, Music, Music" came by to infect us with its bounce, this intellectual climate had become something that we lived and breathed in. Some of us prided ourselves on the fact that we had become quite learned —others of us knew how little we knew now that the door to knowledge had swung open to us. But, at any rate, these four years are susceptible to a bit of academic generalization.

It can be said that history came to enjoy a rather lively, if by no means universal, popularity. The student in our time, especially, perhaps, the veteran, has come to fancy himself the victim of world events, the pawn of circumstances. And so he turned to history to find his place in the fast moving melieu in which he was swept up. It was one of our more popular courses with the elective subjects on contemporary history being well received. At the outbreak in Europe of the recent war, the American philosopher Irwin Edman prescribed historical-mindedness as a support to sanity on a planet of madness. It seems to us as advice both saga-cious and useful; we have impulsively turned to history for equinimity and a reassuring sense of tradition.

Business courses were oversubscribed as were the sciences. The fact that education in the mind of the student was a stepping stone to financial gain in future years was not overlooked by most of us. In fact, this very line of thought inspired an editorial in the Alembic which severely criticised the trend of overspecialization to the detriment of the liberal arts. Yet, perhaps even this editorial was an example of restricted thought for there were many of us who devoted our four years at Providence College to the cultural arts.

The English courses, which were basic to our freshman and sopho-The English Courses, which were basic to our freshman and sephomore years found many adherents in our junior and senior years. The dramas of Shakespeare and the Miltonian epics transported us from our own age. In Browning's "Spanish Cloister" we found solace and the sturdy cadences of Chaucer happily reaffirmed for many of us the durability of the human kind. Even a cup of tea in Henry James' overcivilized salon had the value of asserting that all is not gore and bloodshed, and who of us could resist the harmonies of Emily Dickinson's verse?

The experimental and exact sciences are too special, like the various commercial subjects, for treatment in this history, but we come now to an academic influence felt by every member of the

class. What shall we say then, about philosophy?

Some of us it vexed, some of us it bored, still others it bewildered. But all of us felt, perhaps in the far recesses of our minds, that here was the basic subject, the *sine qua non*, as it were, of our education. It should surprise no reader of this history that philosophy established itself early as a topic of heated and lively conversa-tion. However illiterately we discussed it, however subjectively, we did have it out over coffee in the cafe, and, as humans will, we kept changing our minds. One day the whole thing would seem like a good idea, the next day it was a folly and a fraud. We talked of the professors and wondered how they could ever expect us to learn such a difficult subject. We amazed ourselves when we found the "difficult subject" to be relatively easy and we griped when the report showed that we did well in everything but Philosophy. thought we had the Angelic Doctor right on the tip of our tongues—we found out that we did not. But we learned. We learned by daily and continuous contact with the matter and we surprised ourselves at our erudition when we were confronted with a philosophical

We complained that philosophy was too abstract, which is like chiding the grass for its greenness. We frequently hated to study it, but we thought it would be nice to have, against the day we ran into that athiest on the New York, New Haven, and Hartford. We lambasted its diction but we never lost a chance to display it. We espoused Thomism. In short, we were philosophers. At least we thought we were.

But philosophy had its effect, which imposed itself upon us and we could never quite escape it. It became part of that climate we mentioned, as real in many ways as the crowded cafe, the pin-ball machines and "I Can Dream, Can't I?". We kept referring to it in religion, brought it into our daily lives, solved the problems of the world with it, even decided next week's basketball game with it. It made us both polysyllabic and profane, and we kept making those awful, rancid puns on prime matter and substantial

The mention of philosophy in general brings us back to the three types of student we mentioned at the beginning of this history. It does so by reminding us of the type who thought through education to mould an ideal with which to meet the reality both within himself and without. But first let's look in, four years later, on the other two types. The student who sought to prepare to earn himself a living has done, in general, exactly that. Already we have begun to hear reports of men in our class who will go on to medical, legal and other advanced schools next year; and of others who have prospects in industry and business; and of others who are reasonably certain that they will teach.

The man who came for a rest got it. It is no trick to find rest if you really want it and if you don't want anything else. People have slept under the most improbable circumstances and sometimes

with the most appalling results.

And what about the idealist, the man who emerged from a crisis looking for his star? Has he found it? Has he been able, over four years of college education, to fashion an ideal, a philosophy which will see him through, which will both motivate and sustain him? The evidence is only fragmentary, inconsistent and incon-clusive and our inferences may be, of necessity, suspect. But we believe that the search has not been in vain for most of us. Out of the world of intangibles we live in we have found something tangible to hold on to. Education, religion, philosophy—somewhere we have found the fundamentals in our four years here with the Dominicans which will stand us in good stead when we leave the precincts of our campus. Perhaps we cannot put our finger right on it, but we can feel that the star we sought has now become incorporated in us—that some part of our mind contains the elusive ideal. And this, we are certain, will be borne out in the process of time.

And now we draw near to the end. What is left of a class history? What is there yet to tell? There are certainly minutiae which may

bring back memories or help to chart our progress.

Construction certainly enjoyed a hey-day during our time at the college. When we were freshmen there were only three major buildings on the campus; now there are seven if we include the Grotto. We are all intrigued by the heating system they installed in the Business Administration Building and we wondered if it would work but the fact that the Business students have not suffered from frozen feet attests to the technical knowledge of the builders.

Then there was Albertus Magnus Hall. We were fortunate enough to have the Master General of the Order of Preachers here for the dedication of the building and both the visit of Father Suarez and the dedication of the new science building were duly recorded in the columns of the Cowl.

The Navy gave us Donnelly Hall. Almost enough said. But we saw the building used for classroom purposes, student residence, faculty residence, and, perhaps most important of all it became the home of the offices of the various publications in the college. Indeed, it was from the office in Donnelly Hall that the book you are now reading was edited—from early in the morning till late at night the thin walls resounded to the click of typewriter keys and the

hum of the photo enlarger. Perhaps the most outstanding and certainly the most unusual bit of construction on the campus was that of the Grotto of Our Lady of the Rosary. This grotto was conceived in the mind of the chaplain of the college as being the most fitting memorial that we could have to those men who left Harkins Hall to find death on the distant battlefields of strange lands. In the services held at the grotto they are fittingly remembered in the Masses and prayers which are offered whenever the weather is clement enough to permit outdoor services.

Of course when one speaks of the grotto it automatically brings to mind the Penny Sales which helped to finance this venture. Our class cooperated with the chaplain in selling tickets and in working

at the large and exciting Winter Festivals which were held in Harkins Hall and in the Providence Auditorium.

Of course, when one speaks of staging successful affairs, we can never forget that when we were sophomores we put on the first Saint Patricks' Day Smoker to be held since the war. Under the direction of the capable Pete Louthis, trainer for the college, the fistic experts gave us an exciting evening. It was that night also that our new track coach, Harry Coates, was introduced to the student body. As a matter of fact, it might be said that the successful track team which now represents the college was born at the Sophomore Smoker.

"Write a history for the yearbook", we were told and it seemed like an easy assignment. Mention the Family Hour and the Glee Club, the seniors who are auditing high-school classes three times Mention the assemblies and the tickets we had for them and the Catholic Scholastic Honor Fraternity. Mention these and

a million other things. It is impossible.

It is only in our minds that a real class history can be inscribed. Only our memories can retain those little events and happenings which may seem trivial to some, but which have become an everlasting part of our college life to each of us. The years will mellow the events; time will make us better understand the whys and wherefores of what happened here. Experience will show us that our academic foundation was solid—so firm that we can face the world with resolution—and we will be thankful for our collegiate heritage.

So each must read in this history what he has contributed to it and to this he must add the invisible adventures of his spirit, the unweighed profits of his mind, and the subtle disenchantments of his heart; and perhaps this, more than the printed word will record the history of the class of 1950.

And when we individually reflect on our four years at Providence College we shall find, as a sign of the past and a guidepost to the future, that one burning word—VERITAS.









The Athletic staff of Providence College—these are the men whose duty it is to shape the policies of the Friar athletic teams.

Reverend Aloysius Begley, O.P., Athletic Director, is a graduate of Providence College, class of 1931. After ordination Father Begley returned to his Alma Mater as Professor of English. In 1941, Father Begley was named Athletic Director. During his tenure Father Begley has been instrumental in placing P. C. back on the sports map from which it slipped during the war years. At the beginning of his tour of duty, the Friars were represented on the football field and were coached by Hugh Devore. This sport was dropped in 1942. Ed Crotty was coach of basketball and Arthur Quirk coach of baseball at the inception of his career. In the past school year through the efforts of Father Begley an Athletic Council of faculty, students, and alumni was formed.

James "Vin" Cuddy is in his initial year as a member of the Athletic staff. "Vin" is a graduate of the University of Connecticut, 1943. He was a three letter man at the Nutmeg institution and captained the Husky basketball team in his senior year. Married, the father of a future Friar, "Vin" was head coach of football, basketball, and baseball at the Fort Trumbull Branch of the University of Connecticut, prior to coming to P. C. "Vin" served three years in the Air Force and was discharged with the rank of Captain. While studying for his Master's degree at Columbia, "Vin" was Assistant Physical Director at the New York school.

Harold T. "Hal" Martin, baseball coach since the season of 1947, is a graduate of P. C., class of 1939. Prior to enlisting in the Army in 1942, Martin played with Springfield in the Eastern League and Utica in the Canadian-American loop. "Hal" coached the Orly Field Flyers at Paris in both basketball and baseball. The Flyers compiled a 33-2 record in baseball and had won 19 straight on the court under Martin. He is married and the father of two children.

Larry Drew, a graduate of P. C., is Director of Intramurals, Larry excelled in basketball, baseball, and football while a student at Providence College. He is probably best remembered for the part he played in the upset victory of the Brown five upon his return from the service. Married, Larry is an Air Force veteran.

Probably the best known member of the Athletic staff on the national front is Harry Coates, coach of track. Harry is a graduate of Seton Hall and was formerly coach of track at Seton Hall Prep and College, Newark Prep, and Villanova. While at Seton Hall Prep, Coates led the Pirates to seven consecutive national prep


school titles. He is credited with the development of two Olympians, Mal Dalton and John Gibson.

Pete Louthis, P. C. '43, is the trainer of all athletic teams. Pete also doubles as instructor in boxing, prepping the contestants for the annual smokers. He is fully qualified for the latter position, having been holder of the National Amateur heavyweight crown and Golden Gloves crown. An Army veteran, Louthis is married and the father of one son.







Baseball Review 1949

M ARCH 17 was St. Patrick's Day to every Irishman throughout the world, but to Coach Hal Martin and his baseball candidates it was the first day of Spring Training. With one of the toughest schedules Providence College has had in years staring him in the face, Coach Martin had but one month to choose his starting team. Had his troubles ended there, an undefeated team did not seem too far out of reach, but the loss of key third baseman Ray St. George to the Seminary, and "Slugger" Cv Killian, ace backstop, to the Newark Bears was enough to make any coach pessimistic about the future.

This very same day the N. C. A. A. made a formal announcement to the Athletic Board of the College declaring Co-Captain, centerfielder Ralph Mattera ineligible because he had played in the Northern League the previous season. This was the picture when the Coach greeted his candidates in Harkins Hall gymnasium.

As was expected, a record number of candidates heeded the call. including eight veterans: outfielder Ted Mezejewski, infielders Walt Lozoski, Dick Maloney and Jim Sullivan, catchers Walt Modliszewski and Art Weinstock. Pitchers included "Lefty" Tom Keenan, right-handers Don Foley, Jim Fox and Brad McDermott, a newcomer. It was around these men that Coach Martin was to build his team.

The first two weeks of training were really tough, as Coach Martin, with the aid of "Old Reliable" Cy Barker, directed the squad over a grilling cross-country run followed by long sessions of calisthenics in the gym. April 2 the team moved to Henricken Field for practice. Larry De Palma, Sam Nissel, Ed Mooney, Owen Beatty, Jim Costello. "Skip" McGurkin and Frank Higgins came up from the Freshman Squad. Candidates battled for every position in the intra-squad games, and by April 16, with final cuts having been made, the picture had brightened.

De Palma had filled Mattera's shoes in the outfield, Moonev replaced our loss at third base and Beatty's top-flight fielding had won him the second-base position. "Lefty" Frank Higgins strengthened the pitching squad, and Sam Nissel had planted himself in centerfield for the season. Maloney moved to first base, Lozoski remained at shortstop and Sullivan was shifted from the infield to fill the rightfield gap. Modliszewski and Weinstock were to alternate behind the plate for another season.

The first game of the 1949 season saw the Friars of Providence College go down on the short end of an 8-to-2 score against the Bridgeport Bees before a small half-frozen crowd in Candlelight Stadium. It was a game in which hits were at a premium and free tickets to first base "a dime a dozen". A total of twenty-six passes were issued along with five hits. Starting pitcher Jim Fox and relief hurler "Lefty" Higgins issued three hits and fourteen passes between them, while the Bridgeport pitching staff issued twelve walks and two hits, both singles by Ed Mooney and Jim Sullivan. Due to the freezing weather the game was called at the end of seven innings, with the agreement of both teams.

April 20th, the day the Friars had looked forward to, was at hand. The team travelled from Bridgeport to New Haven to take on the mighty Bulldogs of Yale. Coach Martin gave Tom Keenan the nod for this one. The Friars made a fine start by shelling Yale's starting pitcher Bob Decoursey for three consecutive hits along with a hit batter and two passes for a total of four runs. Jack Alexander relieved Decoursey with only one away in the first, and for six and two-thirds innings not a P. C. man crossed the plate. Sid Rosner pitched the final two frames for the Bulldogs and repeated Alexander's feat by holding the Friars scoreless.

The Friars held their own for eight complete innings. Yale tied the count in the seventh on two errors, but Keenan, with the bases loaded, worked out of the difficulty with ease. However, with a man on first and third in the ninth, Tom let loose with a wild pitch that proved to be the ball game, the score being 5 to 4. This was the second defeat for the Friars.

Providence then moved on to Villanova where it was tagged with another defeat. Baseball's rarity, a triple play, plus a three-run rally in the seventh, gave the Wildcats the verdict. The Friars exploded for three doubles in the fourth to take a 4-to-2 lead but P. C.'s firemen Brad McDermott and Don Foley proved ineffective, and Villanova pulled it out 7 to 5.

With Walt Lozoski, Larry De Palma, Jim Sullivan and Tom Keenan leading the attack, the Friars, playing errorless ball, defeated the Providence Grays, of the New England League 10 to 5. Lozoski stole the spotlight in the game with three hits in five trips and three R. B. I.'s.

The Rhode Island State Rams were the victims of the Friars' second successive victory. Tom Keenan pitched six-hit ball and blanked the Rams in all but one inning in gaining a 4-to-2 victory for the Martinmen. Beatty and Lozoski each powdered two hits for the Friars, while De Palma and Mooney drove in the all-important

tallies. Both runs scored by the Rams came in the fifth as the result of two perfectly executed squeeze plays. This was the only time the Rams threatened.

Determined to continue the spell former Providence College teams have held over Holy Cross, the Martinmen journeyed to Worcester. The Crusaders, having other ideas, came up with a four-run uprising in the eighth inning to simplify matters and take a 9-to-6 decision. The Friars threatened seriously in the ninth when Weinstock singled and the hard-hitting De Palma swatted a 410-ft. drive to the centerfield fence to make the score 9 to 6. However, a quick double play relieved the pressure and the Cross had succeeded in breaking the spell held over them.

"Lefty" Frank Higgins started the game for the Friars and was doing great until he caught a line drive on his pitching hand in the third inning. Brad McDermott relieved Higgins and was the victim of the Crusaders' surge in the eighth.

Although P. C. went down in defeat they proved they were capable of brilliant baseball. Nissel was sensational in left field, making sparkling catches. Lozoski made another outstanding play at shortstop when he recovered the ball that had caromed off Higgins' hand, to force a man at second. The finishing touches were added by De Palma. Not only did he blast one far out of reach of any man in the ball park, but he managed to drive in three runs to keep P. C. right in the ball game.

At Boston College, where Frank Shellenbach set the Friars down 3 to 0, clutch pitching and sensational fielding proved to be the deciding issues. Tom Keenan, now the iron man of the Friars, proved a worthy foe for Shellenbach by giving up six hits with only two of them figuring in Boston College's three runs. The team supported Keenan superbly in the field, but Shellenbach was too much for the Friars at the plate, and they failed to capitalize when they had the bases loaded on two occasions. De Palma was robbed of a homer in the third when the Eagles centerfielder made a great catch of his 390-ft, drive. In the eighth, "Skip" McGurkin suffered the same fate when rightfielder Bill Ryan made a one-hand catch of his drive to save three runs and the ball game.

Back in Boston again Providence College won its third game of the season by defeating M. I. T. 4 to 2 at Briggs Field. With the score tied 1 to 1, P. C. came up with a three-run splurge in the fifth on Downey's single, an infield error allowing Foley to be safe at first and Beatty's hard-hit double down the left field line, scoring two runs. Beatty advanced to third on an error and then scored on De Palma's long fly ball wrapping up the ball game for the Friars and giving Don Foley his first win of the season. Over the full nine innings Foley pitched magnificent ball, allowing Tech four hits and pitching shutout ball for seven innings, fanning twelve in the process.

The much-talked about and feared Gymnasts of Springfield College were the hosts for Providence College's final game on the road. Springfield took an early four-run lead, staved off several middle-inning Friar threats and sent Providence home with a 7-to-4 defeat. P. C. broke out with four base hits, including a double by Art Weinstock in the fourth for two runs, but in the fifth inning, after loading the bases on De Palma's triple and two walks, they failed to hit in the clutch and Springfield got out of it with only one P. C. run scoring. Frank Higgins was scored with the loss, but deserved a much better fate than is indicated. The Friars made five errors behind Higgins, and the Maroons were quick to combine these with eight hits for a total of seven runs.

The first home game of the season saw undefeated Boston College edge a fighting Friars' team in a tight battle at Hendricken Field 6 to 5. The Eagles came up with four big runs in the third to lead 4 to 0, but Providence jumped right back with three in the fourth and one more in the sixth on Larry De Palma's homer to drive Bob Quirk to the showers. In the seventh, Boston College came up with two more runs to clinch the game and give relief hurler Shellenbach his second win over the Friars.

De Palma took the individual batting laurels, followed closely by Weinstock and Maloney. De Palma banged out three hits, one of them being his second homer of the year. Weinstock and Maloney each contributed two hits for a total of three runs to lead the P. C. hitting attack. In spite of good hurling and hard hitting behind him. Tom Keenan was charged with the loss, as the Providence Friars made five key miscues.

The Martinmen suffered their third consecutive setback at Brown's Aldrich Field when the Bears edged the Friar Nine 2 to 1 in a tight pitchers' duel. John "Red" McClain, Brown's ace pitcher, held the Friars scoreless for eight innings before throwing a homerun pitch in the ninth. The Bears scored both runs in the sixth on a single, a sacrifice, a triple and an error. Except for this one inning, Keenan turned in a creditable performance and with a little luck could have come out on top. With a man on third and none away in the second, McClain retired three men via the strikcout route. That just about finished the Friars until the ninth; then Art Weinstock hit McClain's first pitch into deep centerfield for Providence's only run.

Providence, after trailing 4 to 0 in their second game with Spring-field, rallied in the eighth inning and went on to beat the Maroons in the ninth 5 to 4. The Springfield club opened the game with three runs on two hits, two walks, two stolen bases and an error. Pitcher Neverdauski strengthened his lead by belting a homer in the fourth.

Don Foley, starting pitcher for Providence College, hurled five-hit ball for eight innings before giving away to pinch-hitter Frank Higgins. All seemed lost for the Friars in the eighth inning, when as a last desperate chance Ted Mezejewski was sent in to pinch hit for Ed Mooney. Mezejewski walked, moved to second on Walt Modliszewski's single to center, and then scored the first run for P. C. on Art Weinstock's single to right. Modliszewski and Weinstock advanced to second and third respectively on Owen Beatty's sacrifice. Modliszewski scored on Larry De Palma's single and Weinstock later stole home to tie it up 4 to 4. In the ninth the Friars loaded the bases on three walks to Maloney, Mezejewski and Modliszewski. A wild pitch by relief hurler Gleason enabled Maloney to score the tie-breaking run and the Friars had another victory.

Providence College again captured an unforeseen victory by defeating Villanova 8 to 7. The Martinmen gained a two-run lead but went behind as Villanova scored two in the fourth and four in the fifth to lead 6 to 2 through Keenan's ineffectiveness. The Friars tallied two more runs in the sixth but Villanova added another run to their lead in the eighth, making the score 7 to 4.

The turning point came when the error by Villanova's shortstop, Benny Moskol, put Sam Nissel on first base in the eighth. Nissel moved to second when Modliszewski walked. Then Mac Wright, hurler for the visitors, allowed Nissel and Modliszewski to score on two wild pitches. Ed Mooney scored on another error by Moskal tying the score 7 to 7. Beatty climaxed the game, after moving to third on De Palma's double, by stealing home for the winning run.

In an exciting and well-played game at Hendricken Field, the Martinmen took their third straight by nosing out Brown 4 to 3. Sparked by the masterful relief performance of Captain Tom Keenan, the Friars broke a four-inning deadlock in the last frame to wrap up the decision.

With men on first and second in the last of the ninth, Walt Modliszewski skied deep to centerfield, Sullivan racing from second to third after the catch. Centerfielder Lapides' throw to third was wild, and although relief-pitcher Powell backed up neatly, his quick return snap to second base attempting to nip Weinstock, was wild, allowing Sullivan to score; and the game was over.

The game was highlighted by some exceptional defensive plays. Featuring were Tom Keenan, for Providence, and right-fielder Bendroth for the Bruins. Entering the game after Brown had loaded the sacks with none out in the eighth, Tom promptly retired the next three batters to end the threat. Bendroth supplied a pair of catches which were star-studded beauties, in pulling down long drives from the bats of Sullivan and De Palma.

Rhode Island State stopped Providence College 6 to 1 through the exceptional pitching of Jack Smith to capture the State Championship. Tom Keenan, the Friars' number-one ace, matched Smith's efforts in hits, both giving up seven, but Smith rarely was in serious trouble, and he was able to hold his lead over Providence.

Despite De Palma's triple in the first, Sullivan's single, and Lozoski's walk in the second, Providence wasn't able to score until the fifth when a single by Mooney, a double by Modliszewski, and Beatty's fly produced the tally. The Friars threatened again in the seventh when Weinstock beat out a bunt and Keenan singled, but luck wasn't with the Martinmen and Malinowski made the third putout on Beatty's pop-up. All but the first two runs were at the expense of Providence errors.

Providence wound up its 1949 season with an impressive 3-to-2 victory over Holy Cross before more than a thousand returning alumni. Trailing 2 to 0 going into the sixth the fighting Friars combined successive singles by Beatty, De Palma and Weinstock for one run. Maloney's double and Mooney's single tied it up in the seventh, and then in the eighth De Palma poled a long triple followed by Weinstock's double to score the final winning run.

In piling up a record of seven wins and nine losses, the Friars enjoyed a better season than was indicated. Although it is only pure conjecture, the outcome might have been altogether different had Mattera, Killian and St. George been on the squad. What the future holds for the Friar Nine no one knows. The additional loss of Keenan to Flint, Michigan, of the Class A Central League, Larry De Palma to the Milwaukee Brewers of the American Association, and Owen Beatty to the Dominican Novitiate will be hard to replace.

Yet, despite the losses and disappointments of the past season, the alumni and students of P, C, look to the coming year with optimism. They feel that under the able leadership of Coach Hal Martin, Providence College will take its rightful place as a leader in the field of baseball.


Freshman Baseball



Basketball Review for 1950

Coach Vin Cuddy, beginning his first year as head basketball mentor, issued his call for candidates early in October and approximately thirty-five aspirants turned out for the initial practice. After weeks of conditioning with cross-country running and practice games with the University of Connecticut and the Flyers from the Quonset Naval Air Station, the squad was finally narrowed down to twenty men.

Those successful in gaining positions on the team were Co-Captains Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock, along with Ray Garcia, Sam Nissel, Frank Pellegrino, Ray Korbusieski, Jim Schlimm, Tom Orr, Alex Becker, Tom Bauer, Jerry Lembo, Skip McGurkin, Charlie Shea, Ed Mooney, Ronnie Gagnon, Jim Power, Bill Higgins, and Joe Blain.

Most of last year's veteran varsity squad were back this year. Combining this fact with the system introduced by our new coach and the newcomers up from last year's outstanding Freshman club, you have the reasons why things were looking brighter for our fighting Friars. We remembered all too well last year's disastrous record of 7 wins and 19 losses, so everyone looked forward to the 1949-50 basketball season with great hopes for a more successful year.

Assumption College afforded, once again, the opening game opposition. As is typical in many opening games, the play was sloppy and the shooting was far from perfect. Coach Cuddy substituted freely in an effort to find a smooth working combination and to see just what his boys could do. The P. C. hoopsters finally settled down in the second half, playing the brand of ball of which they were capable, and walked off the floor a 53-44 victor.


The Red Stags from Fairfield University, a comparative newcomer to college sports, then paid a visit to Providence with intentions of avenging last year's defeats, but to no avail. The Cuddymen squeezed by Fairfield 60-59 for their second straight victory. Sam Nissel took the scoring leadership with 16 points while Pellegrino accounted for 12.

The Friars next journeyed to Springfield on December 10th and made it three in a row in downing American International College 54-51. The team showed considerable improvement over the first two performances. Ray Korbusieski and Jim Schlimm, a pair of sophomores, set the scoring pace for the Friars with 12 and 10 points respectively.

FRIARS UPSET R. I. STATE

December 15, 1949 will be a date long remembered by the Providence College adherents. It was the day that the Friars, after eight long years of waiting, finally defeated their greatest rival, Rhode Island State, 59-57 at the Rhode Island Auditorium. The words of Walt Lozoski "This is the game we're after" summed up the sentiments of the team and the entire student body. This was the game we wanted to win. The Rams were favored and there were few in the crowd at the Auditorium that night who actually believed that the Friars would upset R. I. State, a team of national prominence. In fact, in the early stages of the game, it looked very much like another routine victory for the Rams with P. C. at one time 18 points down. But the fighting Friars did it the hard way going uphill and finally tying the count 55-55 on Jerry Lembo's two converted foul shots with less than two minutes to go. P. C. then worked the ball down the right side of the floor and with seconds to go, Walt Lozoski dropped in a 20-foot game-winning heave and victory was ours. As the gun sounded the

end of the game, one of the most enthusiastic outbursts ever to be seen at the Auditorium took place. Coach Cuddy was lifted upon the shoulders of the P. C. rooters. Lozoski, Nissel, Weinstock, Lembo, Pellegrino, Garcia, Schlimm and Korbusieski, all equal heroes of the victory, were hugged and pounded on the backs. Yes, indeed! It was a night long to be remembered.

On the following Saturday the Cuddymen, now a redhot ball club, played host to the Bobcats from Bates. P. C. proceeded to turn in their best scoring job of the season and handed Bates a 93-67 setback. The victory was marred however by an untimely accident to Sam Nissel who was knocked unconscious for fully twenty minutes. Everyone was heartened by the news that the high scoring forward would be all right with a few days rest. Nissel, playing one of his best games of the year, throwing in 20 points before his injury, was high man for the Friars.

The Christmas recess gave the team a two-week lay-off. On January 8th the Friars returned to the basketball wars when they travelled to Manchester, N. H. to face St. Anslem's Hawks. The Cuddymen were minus the services of Co-Captain Art Weinstock who was recovering from a tonsilectomy. The P. C. hoopsters edged the Hawks 63-61 on a last minute basket by Jim Schlimm and made it six in a row. Ray Garcia led the P. C. scorers with 13 points while Jim Schlimm and Frank Pellegrino also hit the double figures.

On January 11th P. C. continued its winning ways by taking A. I. C. into camp, to the tune of 78-62. In doing so, the Friars extended their winning streak to seven. Frank Pellegrino did his usual good job in clearing the backboards and also led the scoring with 16 points. Sam Nissel, back in form after his injury, threw in 15 and Jim Schlimm hit the nets for 10.

Springfield College was the eighth victim of the Friars and the Gymnasts proved to be no Tougher a foe than the rest. P. C. swamped the invaders 70-48. The Springfield zone defense had the Cuddymen baffled for the first few minutes of play but once Skip McGurkin started to hit with his set shots from the outside, the Friars began to roll. Schlimm and Pellegrino once again led the scorers while Lozoski and Weinstock played excellent floor games.

Two days before our undefeated Friars were to meet Holy Cross, the sportswriters, in their weekly Associated Press poll, selected the undefeated Crusaders the leading quintet in the nation. With this fact in mind, the fighting Friars travelled to Worcester with the hopes of gaining national prominence by upsetting the country's best. It was to no avail however as the classy Crusaders, minus All-American Bob Cousy, put an end to P. C.'s eight-game winning streak and defeated the Friars 84-56. Although the scrappy Friars were outclassed, they never stopped hustling and with a little more luck in the shooting department, the score would have been much closer. For P. C., Art Weinstock, Walt Lozoski, Frank Pellegrino and Ray Korbusieski performed well as did Jim Schlimm. Pellegrino and Schlimm paced the Friar's attack with 13 points each, while Lozoski, Weinstock and Korbusieski chipped in with fine offensive and defensive

On January 20th P. C., beginning their only extended road trip of the season, traveled to New York to face a couple of tall and talented ball clubs, Brooklyn College and Iona. Friday night the Friars dropped their second game in a row. Brooklyn took the Cuddymen into camp, 81-65. Although the Kingsmen hit on eighty-five per cent of their floor shots and had a definite height advantage, they were able to hold only a seven-point lead at halftime. P. C. faded in the second half however and the "comeback-kids" couldn't catch up. Frank Pellegrino led the Friars with 18 points while Schlimm was also in the double figures.

The following night at New Rochelle, N. Y., the Cuddymen once again ran into height trouble. Before twelve hundred spectators, the Iona College quintet handed P. C. their third straight loss, 81-70. Jim Schlimm and Walt Lozoski were the top men for the Friars. Schlimm hooked in 21 points, most of them from the bucket, and Lozoski's set shots were good for 14 points.

On January 24th, the Friars journeyed to Boston and to their fourth straight defeat. Boston College turned back the Cuddymen by the score of 67-50, in a game in which loose officiating was very prevalent. Jim Schlimm, the Friars' leading scored of late, was high man again with 17 points. Tom Deegan of Boston College collected 15 points to pace the victors.

On January 27th, P. C. resumed their winning ways when they traveled to Bridgeport, Conn. and swamped the Fairfield College Stags, 83-55. The game was fairly close for the first half with Providence holding a 31-25 advantage at half-time. In the second half the Friars put on the pressure and by scoring 52 points turned the game into a rout. Jim Schlimm had another good night and sparked the Friars' attack in scoring 18 points. Tom Orr played one of his best games of the season and hooked in 9 points. Co-captains Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock, also Nissel and Pellegrino, played fine ball while the second combine of Jerry Lembo, Ray Korbusieski, Ed Mooney, Ray Garcia and Al Becker also did a fine job.

On January 28th the Cuddymen played host to St. Anselms and scored a 91-81 victory before a packed house at the Mt. Pleasant Gymnasium. The Friars played brilliant ball as they piled up a 21 point lead in the first half. The Hawks caught fire however in the second half and with Bill O'Connor and 6' 7" Russ Bastian, sparking a St. Anslem's drive, the game turned out to be exciting. Sam Nissel led the Friars with 20 points and Jim Schlimm tossed in 18. Frank Pellegrino turned in a good job in getting the rebounds and also tossed in 14 points. Old reliable Walt Lozoski hit for 11 points and Ray Korbusieski and Ronnie Gagnon both had a big hand in the scoring.

Semester exams gave the Friars a much needed rest—a two-week lay-off. On February 11th P. C. opposed our crosstown rivals, Brown University. The Friars, looking more like an intra-mural club from Harkins Hall gym, showed the effects of their two-week recess. Paced by Moe Mahoney, the Bruins' ace, and Ken Provost, Brown scored a 62-48 victory over the fighting Friars. The only bright spot in the Providence attack was the brilliant all-round play of Ray Garcia. Tom Orr and Ray Korbusieski also performed well. Garcia was high man for the Friars with 11 points.

P. C. next played host to St. Peter's and showing vast improvement over their previous performance, the Cuddymen edged the Peacocks 69-68. The game was close all the way and it wasn't decided until the last minute of play. The Friars were behind with less than two minutes to go when Sam Nissel dropped in a foul shot and a clutch basket for the victory. Jim Schlimm had one of his best nights of the season and scored 27 points and Sam Nissel tossed in 20 points. Ray Garcia played another outstanding game and was all over the court, stealing the ball, taking off rebounds and setting up scores. For the Peacocks, Wally Sheil, one of the leading scorers in the country, and Tom Smith were outstanding.

On February 18th the Friars travelled to Springfield, and edged a vastly improved Springfield College quintet, 62-59. The Gymnasts who were badly defeated by the Friars earlier in the season, were out to square the season's series. Springfield played a hustling game, but Providence came up with one of their better performances. Frank Pellegrino did a great job on the backboards and also tossed in 14 points. Jim Schlimm took high scoring honors and pitched in 16 points, while Ray Garcia played another staunch floor game and also scored 13 points. The Friars were minus the services of their high-scoring forward, Sam Nissel, who fractured his finger in practice and was expected to be lost to the team for the rest of the season.

Journeying to Troy, N. Y., the favored Cuddymen were upset by the Rensselaer team 58-53. Frank Murphy of R. P. I. was high man for the night with 18 points while Jim Schlimm and Frank Pellegrino were the big guns for the Friars.

On Wednesday, March 1st, the Friars traveled to Kingston to face the Rhode Island State Rams in their chummy confines of Rodman Hall. The Friars, who were edged by State, proved to all concerned that their previous victory over the Rams was no fluke. The Rams squeezed by the Cuddymen 60-58 in a hard-fought contest. Providence jumped into a quick 10-2 lead and outplayed R. I. State in the first half, and at half-time the score was deadlocked at 32-all. The second half however found P. C. falling behind and could only draw within one point of the victors. The Cuddymen outscored the Rams from the floor and lost the game from the foul line. Jim Schlimm was by far the outstanding scorer on the floor as he scored 25 points. Lozoski, Weinstock, Garcia, Mooney, Korbusieski, Pellegrino, McGurkin and Lembo all played major parts in the tilt.

The Providence College Friars playing their last home game of the season at Mt. Pleasant Gym, wound up undefeated on their home court by whipping the Boston College Eagles 77-64. The Cuddymen, remembering the defeat "General" McClellan's crew pinned on them early in the season, were keyed up for this one and played spirited and aggressive ball. The Eagles, a good and fast ball club, were in the ball game all the way, but the Friars were at their best and would not be denied this victory. Once again Jim Schlimm led all the scorers with 26 points but it was a team victory with Garcia, Gagnon, Pellegrino, Mooney, Lozoski, Lembo, Weinstock, Korbusieski and McGurkin along with Schlimm, all playing a big part in the victory. For the Friars, the big scorers besides Schlimm, were Ray Garcia 10, Frank Pellegrino 14, and Ray Korbusieski 13. For the Eagles, Tom O'Brien, ranked among the best ball players in New England, played a brilliant game.

On March 8th, P. C. traveled once again to Worcester—this time in the role of favorite—and defeated Clark University in an exciting contest 82-75. It took an overtime period for the fighting Friars to overcome an inspired Scarlet five, but in this extra period P. C. scored 12 points which provided the margin of victory. The Friars were minus the services of Sam Nissel and cocaptain Walt Lozoski, and their absence was noticeable. Frank Pellegrino hit his scoring peak for the season by pitching in 28 points. Ray Garcia also had a good night with 18 points as did Jim Schlimm who tossed in 9 field goals and two foul shots for a total of 20 points.

The Providence College quintet wound up their basketball season at Marvel Gym against Brown University and the Bruins turned back the Friars 66-54. Once again it was Moe Mahoney, the Bruin star, who spelled defeat

for the Friars. Providence started out fast and at one time had a 23-13 lead. Brown closed the gap, however, and at half-time were only 2 points down. The second half was all Brown and in the first eight minutes of the second period they scored 20 points to the Friars' 5, and P. C. could not catch up. Mahoney of Brown topped the scorers with 19 points, while Jim Schlimm tossed in 18 points to lead the Friars. Ronnie Gagnon, playing his best game of the season, threw in 12 points for Providence. The season ended on a bit of a low note as cocaptain Walt Lozoski, whose absence, along with the injured Nissel, was apparent, had to sit out his last game for P. C. Walt sustained an injury in the Boston College game and was unable to play the last two games of the season. Lozoski, who is considered by many as one of the best athletes to have entered P. C. in years, graduates in June. Co-captain "Whitey" Weinstock-who played an excellent game against Brown-and the always popular Tom Orr are the other graduating seniors.

At the season's end, the Friars boasted a record of fourteen wins and eight losses. Jim Schlimm paced all the scorers with a grand total of 343 points, while Frank Pellegrino, Sam Nissel and Walt Lozoski were also among the leaders.

Coach Vin Cuddy, who did an excellent job in his first year as head mentor, deserves much praise as do cocaptains Walt Lozoski and Art Weinstock, and the entire varsity squad for such a successful season.

FRIARS SELECTED FOR N.C.I.T.



Freshman Basketball







Track Review 1949-1950

Track, the baby of varsity sports, at Providence College is rapidly reaching great heights. Since that St. Patrick's Day of 1948 when Harry Coates was introduced to the student body as the new track coach who hoped to put the Friars on the map as far as cinders and splinters are concerned, track, as a sport, has advanced by leaps and bounds.

The name of Providence College was spread throughout the country during the month of March 1949 when one year after the inception of the sport at the Dominican institution, the first annual Providence College Invitation Outdoor Board track meet was held. Such names as Bill Dwyer, National A. A. U. 50 yard dash champion; Andy Stanfield, Phil Thigpen, Frank Fox, Charlie Slade, and Bazil McKenzie of Seton Hall, Jim Fielding and Carl Joyce of Seton Hall Prep, Herb McKenley, member of the Jamaican Olympic squad and holder of the world's quarter mile record, Dick Phillips of Brown, national high jump titleholder, as well as Hank Dreyer and Sam Felton, Olympic weightmen performed for 3500 fans who jammed the Hendricken Field track.

Dwyer, running for R. I. Track and Field Officials was the individual standout. He took the 50 yard low hurdles by 2 yards from Andy Stanfield, IC4A champion from Seton Hall. In the 50 yard dash Dwyer defeated Stanfield and Jim Fielding by 2 yards. Hank Dreyer, N. Y. A. C., tossed the 35 pound weight 60 feet, 100 inches, breaking the 15 kilogram record. Sam Felton, also of N. Y. A. C., won the hammer with a heave of 181 feet, 7½ inches. Phil Thigpen of Seton Hall and Carl Joyce battled to an almost dead heat with Thigpen hitting the wire by a whisker in 2 minutes, 2 and 6 tenths seconds. Frank Fox of Seton Hall took the special 500 meter run by 8 yards from Herb McKenley and Charlie Slade in 1 minute, 7.8 seconds. Dick Phillips of Brown took the high jump at a height of 6 feet, 6½ inches. The P. C. varsity relay team won the sprint-medley, mile, and two mile relays. The Friar Frosh won the sprint-medlev, and mile relays, and placed second to B. U. Frosh in the two mile. Tony Fratantuano of P. C. captured the A. A. U. discus event with a toss of 140 feet, 7 inches.



At Penn the varsity (Diluglio, Ed Poirier, McGurkin, and Sherry) placed fourth while the frosh (Jack Cassedy, Danny Walsh, Bill Aldrich, and Jim Pendler) finished fourth in the Relay Championship of America for freshmen.

In dual competition the Brown Frosh defeated the Friars 67-59. Danny Walsh took the 100 and 220, Bill Keenan the 880 and pole yault, John McMullan the hammer, and Jack Cassedy the 440.

R. I. State trounced P. C. in the initial varsity dual meet, Bill Sherry winning the half mile—the only Friar victor. Sherry defeated Dan Cashman, N. E. A. A. U. half-mile king. The Crusaders from Holy Cross won 94-22 in the second dual meet. John Shanley won the pole vault, Sherry the 880, Fratantuano the hammer.

The Friars next entered the E. I. A. A. meet at Springfield. Jerry Alexander, New England A. A. U. javelin champion, won his event with a heave of 185 feet, 9½ inches. Fratantuano placed second in the discus, the frosh medley relay team (Cassedy, Walsh, Penler, and Keenan) ran fourth while Bill Sherry took 3rd in the half mile.

P. C. handily trimmed Bryant 81-43. Shanley, Fratantuano, Poirier and Sherry were double winners for the Friars. Fairfield University also proved an easy victim.

The Ramlets defeated the Friar Frosh 78-57. Jerry Kallman captured the 120 high and 220 low hurdles. Walsh, Penler, Cassedy, and Keenan also scored. The Yearlings entered the win column defeating Worcester Academy 74-43. Bill Keenan took the 880, broad jump, and pole vault, Walsh and Kallman were double winners.

The Friar varsity Cross Country team was defeated by B. C. 19-36, Brown 18-44, and Holy Cross 15-40. John McMullan was the first Friar to cross the wire in all three meets.

The Brown Frosh defeated the Yearlings 22-35. Walt Malineaux of Brown and Dick "Pop" Johnson of P. C. ran the course neck and neck but half way around the last lap Malineaux pulled away and won by 4 yards. Johnson and Jim Gannon placed first and second to lead the Frosh to a 23-32 victory over the Holy Cross first year squad. Gannon placed 26th and Johnson 27th in the IC4A Freshman Cross Country meet at Van Cortland Park in New York.

Two records were set by P. C. harriers in the 1st Naval District Meet in Boston. Jack Cassedy set a meet mark of 54.6 seconds in the 440, while Dick Johnson ran a record 4:40.4 mile. Keenan and McMullan placed second and third respectively in the 880.

The two mile relay team (Keenan, Aldrich, Sherry, and McMullen) traveled to Washington, D. C. to participate in the annual Inquirer meet. Maryland and Navy crossed the wire ahead of the Friars, whose time was only 2 seconds off that of the victorious Terrapins.

At the Boston K. of C. meet the varsity relay team (Captain McGurkin, Penler, Kallman, and Cassedy) defeated R. I. State, Springfield and Tufts. The frosh (Johnson, Bob Tiernan, Jim Gannon, and Joe Tetreault) placed second to Colby.

Again at the Garden in the B. A. A. meet the two mile relay team (Keenan, Frank Lussier, Sherry, and McMullan) finished third, three yards behind the winner, Tufts. The varsity relay team was fourth in a race won by Holy Cross. The frosh placed second to Brown.

The N. E. A. A. U. meet held at the Cranston Street Armory found the Friars third in total points with 12½ behind Brown and Tufts. The varsity (McMullan, McGurkin, Kallman, and Cassedy) were well in front of the pack when on the second leg a youngster crossed the track and was hit by Jerry McGurkin. When Kallman took the baton the Friars were last but thru his and Jack Cassedy's efforts the race ended in almost a triple dead heat with Williams defeating the frosh (Bob Tiernan, Dick Tiernan, Joe Tetreault, and Jim Gannon) and the varsity.

On March 25th another galaxy of track stars will compete in the Second Annual P. C. Invitation. The relay teams will compete in the Seton Hall and Penn Relays. Dual meets will be held with R. I. State, Worcester Tech, and Springfield in the spring. The squad will enter the New England Intercollegiates at the University of Maine at Orono. All in all track has proven itself as a major sport—thanks to the tireless efforts of Harry Coates and his boys led by Captain Jerry McGurkin.



WALTER LOZOSKI AWARDED ATHLETIC TROPHY

Walter Edward Lozoski, '50, one of the greatest freshman athletes, and subsequently to be proved one of the best all around athletes in the annals of Providence College was, in his freshman year the winner of the Jack Dempsey Outstanding Athlete Trophy, an award given to the most valuable athlete in the leading colleges and universities throughout the country. Presentation of the trophy was made to Lozoski by the Very Reverend Frederick C. Foley, O.P., former President of the College, in May of 1947 for the superlative work of the athlete from West Hazelton on the basketball courts during the fall and winter of his freshman year. Asked for a statement after the presentation, Lozoski had this to say, "I have just received a thrill that I will never forget, but I want to add that I feel as though I am receiving this trophy only as a representative of all my basketball mates, They, grand and capable group of fellows that they are, made it possible for me to receive this honor today."

And with these words, Walt Lozoski reflected the temperment that has made him one of the outstanding athletes to pass through the portals of our Alma Mater. Both on and off the basketball court and the diamond, Walt has proven himself to be a "team" man, ever ready to pass on the credit for the victory or to assume the blame for the defeat. He has always spoken well of his opponents and been willing to give credit to the proper source. So it is that Walt Lozoski has always earned from the Providence College opposition the accolades that one athlete accords to the good sportsmanship he finds in his fellow athlete.

Walt attended West Hazleton High School where he played basket-ball and baseball and was awarded five letters during his high school career. After graduation, Walt turned down offers from Southern and Mid-Western colleges to try his luck in the business world. A news bulletin which was of vital interest to most of the class of '50 halted this business venture on the afternoon of December 7th, 1941. After technical training with the Air Corps at Chanute, Illinois, Walt was sent to Williams Field, Arizona. While stationed there, he really came into his own as an athlete, playing baseball and basketball with the best in the Southwest. In the summer of 1942 the Phoenix Thunderbirds borrowed Lozoski from the Army nine and took him to the national A.A.U. baseball tournament at Wichita, Kansas. Walt played shortstop on that nine. He returned to the tournament again in 1945 as a member of the Williams Field nine. Lou Stringer of the Chicago Cubs was Lozoski's running mate around the keystone sack for two years with the Williams nine. This combine figured in more twin killings than any other second base duo in the Southwestern league. Porter Vaughn, Bob Savage and Red Ruffing were some pretty fair tossers in that loop and still Walt managed to stay over the 300 mark. Joe DiMaggio, Bobby Adams and Clay Lampert were a few of the other major league players in the Southwestern Service League.

During the winter months Walt played on the basketball team representing Williams Field. In 1943 they went to the A.A.U. tourney in Denver and were only defeated in the quarter finals by Denver University.

Discharged from the service late in 1945. Walt decided to enter Providence College as a step in realizing his boyhood ambition, to become a teacher and an athletic coach. It looks like Walt is well on his way in that direction,

Here at Providence College he caught on in the opening game of 1946 against Saint Anselm's and added to his popularity with each game. His antics on the floor, his superb mastery of the game, his playmaking abilities and his long shot artistry have made him an outstanding favorite with the crowd, whether home-town or anti-P.C. Against Brown in the 1946-1947 season he won over the audience with a one act pantomime at the hottest moment of the game. He set himself for a long shot. Then he shook his head in the negative. Next he reconsidered the shot but nixed it with a reprimanding finger and hurried off a pass as if to end the temptation. The house went wild—all except the elongated Bruin defender who tried frantically but unsuccessfully to break up the proceedings. However, Walt could and did get off those long shots on many an occasion as can be testified by the Rhode Island State aggregation who faced him in his Sophomore year. With one second to go, Providence trailing by two points at half-time, Walt let go a long arching shot from behind the midcourt stripe which snapped the nets cleanly after the gun had fired to tie the score.

On the road Walt was invariably the center of attraction whether he was narrating some witty anecdote or tipping that Adams creation at some ridiculous angle. In the social whirl he feigns coyness with a shy smile, but underneath we feel that he is plenty sure of himself.

Of his record we can only produce the figures to augment our praise. In basketball in his freshman year he scored 135 points; 184 as a sophomore; 115 as a junior and 122 in his senior year for a grand total of 556 points and a 7.0 average per game for the four years. Not a bad record when we consider that he played the guard position for most of the time he was on the court. He played a total of 81 out of 84 possible games which earned him the title of "Iron Man", one which we feel he well deserves.

In baseball Walt led the team with a phenominal .357 batting average during the 1948 season and his fielding was consistently over the .870 percent mark.



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
