He dedicated the magnificent War Memorial Grotto of Our Lady of the Rosary before an audience numbering upwards of ten thousand people, laid the cornerstone of the one and one-half million dollar Science Building, and was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree at a formal academic convocation . . . And we're still being amazed by the track teams he's turning out.

SOPHOMORE YEAR

Kennedy, Assistant Editor of the *Catholic Transcript*, spoke on Philosophy, Religion, and Current Fiction," . . . "Courtship and Chastity," a lecture given by Fr. McKenna in conjunction with the annual Courtship and Marriage series, was delivered to a packed house . . . Providence College's first outdoor track meet was an outstanding success. Attendance numbered over three thousand . . . Mr. Maurice "Moe" Timlin was appointed head of the newly created Placement Office . . . The Lenten Retreat was given by Fathers James L. Mitchell, O.P., Walter B. Sullivan, O.P., and Joseph E. Madden, O.P. . . . Only one year after its beginning on the Campus, Track was made a major sport . . . Providence College was accepted as a member of the National Federation of Catholic College Students (NFCCS) . . .

JUNIOR YEAR

Our Junior year got under way socially with the September Frolic, an informal, chummy dance sponsored by the ubiquitous and extremely charming Junior Veridames . . . The enrollment hit the two thousand mark for the first time in the history of the College . . . The Most Reverend Russell J. McVinney, D.D., Bishop of Providence, celebrated the Mass of the Holy Ghost at the War Memorial Grotto . . . We were all pleased to hear that Father Slavin had qualified for the degree of Master of Sacred Theology . . . Mr. James (Vin) Cuddy became head basketball coach. He replaced Larry Drew, who became Director of Intramural Athletics and Physical Education . . . The Holy Name Holy Hour was held at Narragansett Park. The night was a cold one; but the forty-five thousand candles lit during the recitation of the Holy Name Pledge and Benediction spread light and warmth to our very souls . . . The "Junior Action Party" treated the campus to some real, old-fashioned, pre-war electioneering, with airplanes, motorcycles, raccoon coats, derby hats, and cigars . . . 

Gradually we became used to the situation: we never forgot it was there, but our attitude towards it became more healthy and less of a fixation.

School enrollment dropped off about two hundred . . . Perry Borelli played at the Carolan Club's Autumn Festival . . The promulgation of the dogma of the Assumption by Pope Pius XII was celebrated with special services at the War Memorial Grotto . . . The varsity track team defeated Brown . . . The Pyramid Players presented their initial offerings of the current school year, excerpts from "Juno and the Paycock" and "Escape", and provided an enjoyable evening for all who attended . . . The freshman Cross-Country team tied with Boston University for the New England Cross Country Championship . . . The same team placed third in the IC4A cross country championships . . . A big bull and a little pig livened up the Farmers' festival considerably . . . Providence College was presented a check by the Damon Runyon Cancer Fund for fifteen thousand dollars, to carry on further research in radioactive isotopes and their effects on cancers. Cowl headline for January 10, 1951: College Granted ROTC Unit. We were informed that a transportation unit would move in by September of this year . . . At the annual Family Hour sponsored for the married students and their wives, the latter were awarded degrees of Ph. T. (Putting husbands Through) . . . The Juniors decided on Charlie Spivak for the Prom . . .

The rest of the history of our class is still to be made. Deadlines which fall uncomfortably close allow us to chronicle no more. And yet the days which lie ahead will climax our entire college careers. The one final round of exams, Cap and Gown Day, the Commencement Ball, Class Night, Alumni Day, and Commencement actually do not have to be recorded in print; for we will never want to, nor will we ever be able to forget them.

As we write this, we dare not venture even to guess what the Mind of God holds in store for us. The only course we can follow is the course of Grace, which has been made manifest to us during our years of study under the Dominican Fathers. Life may often be unfathomable, but it need never become insurmountable. For we will never be alone.







Practice makes perfect and consequently with very little prac-tice one is considerably less perfect. Truer words were never spoken when referring to Coach Hal Martin's baseball nine of 1950. Martin had slightly more than ten days in which to mold together a team that was riddled by injuries and graduation. Due to the overlapping track season, the new board track, located on Hendricken Field, was still there when the boys were ready to take the field.

The opener with Seton Hall was less than two weeks away and The opener with second than two were saway and the team had hardly swung a bat. Further complicating matters, Nissel, Mooney, McGurkin, and Weinstock were participating in a post-season basketball tournament in Albany, N. Y., and they ar-rived even later. It seemed as though all the trouble came at once. Hal was left in the unenviable position of finding a replacement for his No. 1 backstop, Art Weinstock. Whitey came up with a bad case of bone chips in his elbow received during the hectic basketball season. His substitute, Hank Downey, had a recurrence of an old gland injury in his neck and was sidelined till mid-season.

The pitching staff suffered a jolt with the loss of veteran Tom Keenan through graduation. It was evident that most of the mound work would fall upon the shoulders of two southpaws, Frank Higgins and Bill McKeon. The loss of such standout performers as

Owen Beatty, Larry DePalma, and Walt Lozoski was truly felt. Except for Sam Nissel's centerfield post, all the positions were open to the candidates. The returning lettermen in-cluded Captain Art Weinstock, Jim Costello, Sam Nissel, Dick Maloney, Jim Sullivan, Frank Higgins, Skip Mc-Gurkin, and Ed Mooney

Promising candidates up from the freshman squad in the persons of Dick Duignan, Don MacDonald, Buzz Barry, and Howie McGuinness proved in the intrasquad games that they had plenty of power and speed and would play a decisive role in the rugged schedule. On opening day, April 19, at Seton College in Orange, New Jersey. Hall the 1950 edition of Providence College baseball took the field. The starting line-up included Bill McKeon on the mound and Jim Sullivan behind the plate. Don MacDonald on first, Dick Maloney at second, Skip McGurkin at short, and Ed Mooney on third rounded out the infield. In the outer garden were Dick Duignan in left, Sam Nissel in center, and Jim Costello in right.

Faultiness afield proved to be the Friars' undoing as they committed seven costly errors against the Pirates of Seton Hall. Though they did collect 5 runs over the nine-inning route. Seton Hall garnered 10 to top P. C. in the season opener.

Southpaw Bill McKeon held on till the fourth when Seton Hall pushed across 3 tallies. Providence countered with two in the fifth stanza for their only scoring of the day. From then on, Paul Oliver, the Priates ace righthander, held the Friars to one hit. Jim Schlimm took over the mound duties

in the fourth. Although he was scratched for 4 runs in the final 5 innings, 4 errors by the infield contributed heavily.

Following the season opener, the Friars journeyed to Orange, New Jersey, where erratic pitching cost them a tough one at the hands of Upsala. Stopping off at New Haven on the way home, P. C. outhit the boys from Yale, but again bases on balls proved to be their downfall. The score was 14-4.

Returning home, the Martinmen opened the home season with a return game with Upsala. Lefty Frank Higgins started on the mound for P. C. and promptly proceeded to chalk up the first Providence victory of the year by pitching a masterful 5-hitter, evening the series with the Vikings of New Jersey. The home team's 3 runs were enough to win as the visitors were able to collect but 2 markers. Sam Nissel came through in the clutch to help Higgins win the pitching duel in the eighth inning when he tripled and scored from third base when the centerfielder threw wild to the plate.

The Friars jumped away to a 2-0 lead in the first inning when Skip McGurkin reached on an error and scored when Dick Ma-loney hit a long double to left. Dick crossed the plate with the second tally as Don MacDonald, who started to break out of his batting slump, tapped a timely single to left. Except for a wild

pitch, Higgins might have had himself a shut-out, but in the seventh, an infield hit, a walk, a wild pitch, and a single gave the Vikings two runs.

Upsala almost upset the applecart in the ninth when, with one out, they drew 3 walks to load 'em up. Higgins forced their second-baseman, Bill Statchel, to hit back to the box; he made the play at the plate and when the man on second overran third base. Catcher Jim Sullivan alertly whipped the ball to Steve Sulavik on third completing the double play and ending the Thus ended a fine afternoon inning. of baseball.

In quest of their second victory, the Black and White travelled to Spring-Capt. Elect Sam Nissel Capt. C., the oppo-sition collected 13 hits and 12 runs to down the Friars, 12-8.

6 hits as a quarter of Providence flingers chipped in with 14 free passes providing the Crusaders with the wide margin. Before they were able to recover, Brown hopped on the Friars at Aldrich Field and tagged them with an 8-5 defeat. Poor fielding proved to be the Providence stumbling block as they outhit the Bruins, 9 to 8.

Although Manager Tom Gorman swears that he dusted off the plate and laid down clear chalk lines, a couple of P. C. hurlers would attest to the opposite. With a half-dozen errors committed behind them, they issued 14 bases on balls as Boston College gar-nered only 4 hits and whipped the Martinmen, 11-8. The Eagles jumped away to an early 9-2 lead before the heavy artillery of P. C. began to go to work. Doubles by Weinstock, Nissel, and Mooney, and triples by McGuiness and MacDonald brought Providence back into contention in the 5th and 7th stanzas. Art Weinstock's hit was one of the longest doubles in P. C. baseball annals. In the 5th, he stepped into one of Jerry Levinson's pitches and hit it deep to left centerfield. It bounced over the fence and Art stopped at second base with a 425-ft, ground rule two-bagger. The Friars outhit the boys from the Hub, 14 to 4, again prov-

ing that as a club they could stand up against any team in New

The ability of the Eagles to draw free passes, however, England. eventually led to the Rhode Islanders' waterloo. Lefty Frank Higgins looked well in this contest, until he was driven out in the 4th. The pitching chores were taken over by Bill Fagan who held the Eagles hitless over the rest of the route. But the damage was done, and the Beantowners travelled back to Boston with a victory in their hip pockets.

Renewing an old inter-state rivalry, the Friars journeyed to Kingston, R. I., for the first game of a home and home series against the Rams of Rhode Island State. Jim Schlimm, star of Vin Cuddy's basketball team, was the starting pitcher for the Friars. He was pitted against Bruce Blount, in what proved to be one of the best games of the season. The Friars got a run in the first without benefit of a hit. Buzz Barry led off with a base on balls, stole sec-ond and third, and scored as Art Weinstock grounded out. The Rams forged ahead in their half of the third, when they took ad-

vantage of a couple of errors and scored two runs. Barry, MacDonald, and Duignan combined to push P. C. into the lead in the fourth, when a free pass, a double, and a single (in that order) produced two tallies. The Friars came back in the late innings to tie the score, 9-9, in the ninth, when Dick Duignan sent Blount to the showers by driving in two runs with a long double. Jim Schlimm, had he had bet-

ter support afield, could have been tough, as he held the Rams to six hits.

In the top of the tenth, Providence went out in order and then the trouble began. Steve Sulavik, now pitching for P. C., loaded the bases. Roy Man-sollio, Ram second baseman, laid down a perfect squeeze bunt which slipped across the winning run for Rhody. It was a close game and a tough one for the Friars to lose.



After several weeks of conditioning under Coach Vin Cuddy's careful supervision, the Friar aggregation shaped up as one that would afford opposing clubs a great deal of competition. Following scrimmages with Tufts and the University of Connecticut, the Friar mentor narrowed the squad down to sixteen men; thirteen returning veterans and a trio of promising sophomores.


For the first time in the history of Providence College, tricaptains were chosen to lead the Friar forces. Two Rhode Islanders, Ray Garcia from Newport, and Frank Pelligrino from Westerly, along with Sam Nissel from St. Mary's, Pa., were those elected to the honorary posts. Jim Schlimm, who set the Providence College scoring record last year with 357 points, and Ray Korbusieski rounded out the starting five as the Smith Hillers prepared for the opening game of the campaign. Optimism ran high among P. C. rooters who expected great things of the Friars after last year's fine record of fourteen wins and nine losses.

Win Opener with Assumption

On Saturday, December 2, the Friars opened the 1950-51 season against Assumption College at Worcester. Though the Greyhounds managed to make a ball game of it for the first twenty minutes, they were completely outclassed early in the third quarter as Jim Schlimm and Sophomore Bob Prendergast teamed up to put the game on ice for the Smith Hillers. Schlimm was high man for the victors with 15 points. High scoring honors, however, went to Pontbriand who garnered 16 for the vanquished. Garcia, Pelligrino, Prendergast, and Nissel all hit double figures as P. C. swamped the opposition, 80-53.


Swamped the opposition, 50-55, On December 6, the Cuddymen entertained the A. I. C. Aces at Mt. Pleasant Gym. The visitors played fairly good ball but were unable to cope with the Friars fast breaking attack. Jim Schlimm and Ray Korbusieski spearheaded the drive that resulted in an 80-56 win for Providence. Schlimm again led P. C. scorers with 16 points. Korbusieski's efforts were good for 13 markers while Pelligrino and Prendergast scored 11 points each.

Several nights later, the P. C. quintet took on a scrappy Fairfield five at Mt. Pleasant. At the outset, the Connecticut aggregation gave every indication of having one of "those" nights as they hit from all angles. The Friars, led by Frank Pelligrino, overcame an 11-5 deficit, forged ahead but had to go all out to gain a three point halftime advantage. During the second half, Korbusieski put on a remarkable display of ball hawking ability while Ray Garcia and Jim Schlimm went on a scoring spree. The Red Stags



Before a capacity crowd at Mt. Pleasant, the following Saturday, the Friars succeeded in downing a spirited Colby team. Though the visitors had a definite height advantage, the Friars Frank Pelligrino did a noteworthy job under the boards and took more than his share of rebounds. With Bob Prendergast and Pelligrino showing the way, P. C. led at intermission, 38-31. In the third quarter, big Jim Schlimm connected with three fast hoops, temporarily taking the wind out of the Mules' sails. Colby came on strong once more but the home forces were not to be denied victory. The Friar reserves, led by Tom Bauer, quelled the uprising and Providence went on to triumph, 76-62. Ray Garcia, playing his usually good floor game, tallied an even dozen to lead P. C. forces in that department. Prendergast notched 11 points and Pelligrino 10 as the Cuddymen made it four straight. After a three week layoff, the Cuddymen journeyed to the Boston



P. C. Tops Rhody at Auditorium


In one of the feature games of the season, the Friars met the Rhody Rams on January 18 in their annual classic at the Rhode Island Auditorium. Apparently inspired by the previous night's campus rally, the Cuddymen for the second straight year rose to the occasion by beating the heavily favored Rams. A spirited throng of Providence rooters was on hand to cheer the Friars to an overtime win, 68-67.

During the early stages of the game, Friar hopes were considerably dimmed as Rhody jumped to a quick lead and outplayed the P. C. forces. At the ten minute mark, Coach Cuddy's charges took a breather which seemed to do them a world of good. After the time out, the Smith Hillers played like a rejuvenated ball club and stunned the Downstaters in gaining a 37-30 halftime lead. The game was far from over, however, as Fred Congleton and Chuck Stewart put on a scoring exhibition. They proceeded to amas a total of thirteen points between them in the space of five minutes and the complexion of the game changed again as-Rhode Island State asserted itself. Providence kept pecking away at the 12 point lead enjoyed by the Rams, but with only five and a half minutes remaining the scoreboard showed a 10 point P. C. deficit. The Friars refused to give up and with the help of reserves Skip McGurkin, Ed Mooney, Jerry Lembo, and Ron Gagnon, narrowed the lead to two points with less than thirty seconds to play. Frank Pelligrino received a pass, skirted the sidelines, and pushed in as beautiful and as timely a one hander as anyone (State fans excepted) would care to see. It tied up the ball game necessitating an overtime period.

During those extra five minutes, bench strength told the story and P. C. triumphed. Ray Garcia's conversion from the foul line cinched things. Jerry Lembo excelled defensively in his close guarding of Stewart. Jim Schlimm was the offensive ace with 21 points while Pelligrino and Korbusieski were outstanding in scoring 11 markers each. Garcit played an excellent floor game and helped out with 8 valuable points. It was indeed a team victory. As the final buzzer sounded, enthusiastic P. C. fans rushed on the floor and gave the Friars a thunderous ovation similar to the outburst following last year's upset victory over State. Another night long to be remembered in the annals of Providence College basketball history.

Avenge St. Anselm Loss

The Friars, fresh from their win over Rhode Island State, played and defeated the St. Anselm's Hawks at Mt. Pleasant on January 24, avenging an earlier loss pinned on them by the New Hampshire club. Determined to show themselves a better team than the previous meeting's seventeen point loss indicated, the Cuddymen played with a vengeance. With Pelligrino and Prendergast controlling the boards, and Jim Schlimm's excellent shooting, P. C. conquered their taller foes, 72-62. While the Friars never relinquished the lead, they had to go all out in suppressing a last minute surge by the Hawks. Korbusieski, Nissel, and Garcia all were instrumental in the victory. Schlimm had another good night, scoring 20 points, closely followed by Prendergast with 15 markers, and Pelligrino who tallied 13.

At the Bridgeport Armory, on January 26, the Friars found themselves facing a club that could, on a good night, campaign successfully against many New England quintets. Fairfield did not reckon with the sharpshooting ability of Sam Nissel, who had been coming along slowly but surely during the earlier part of the season. As he and Jim Schlimm hit frequently, P. C. ran up a twenty point lead at the halfway mark. Ray Korbusieski and Frank Pelligrino found the range and Providence rolled to an 82-64 win. Again, big Jim Schlimm led P. C. scorers accounting for 20 points. Nissel hooped 19, Pelligrino 14, and Korbusieski 10.

It looked like the Friars had finally come into their own, but the morning of February 10, brought bad news to P. C. fans. The papers gave an account of how, on the previous night at Waterville, Maine, the Colby Mules reversed an earlier decision. The Cuddymen, unable to bottle up the Mules' Ted Shiro (25) and not equal to the task of rebounding against much taller opponents, came out on the short end of a 77-64 count. Providence trailed by a mere six points with ten minutes left, but tired as the Colby attack caught fire in the last quarter. Ray Garcia tossed in 17, Pelligrino hit for 16, and Schlim mnotched 15 markers for the losers.

On the night of February 14, the Friars journeyed across town to engage the Brown Bruins at Marvel Gym. The game was (except for the first ten minutes) extremely close throughout with neither team holding any definite advantage. Brown used the weave effectively and often succeeded in working a pick off play in which a defenseman was manuevered out of position. Through the efforts of big Jim Schlimm who tallied 16 in the first half, the Friars were able to stay close to the Bruins and never fell far behind. The Cuddymen played well offensively but P. C. defensive lapses proved expensive and Brown took a 62-61 decision. During the last two minutes a freeze prevented the Smith Hillers from getting the ball and that was the game. Jerry Lembo did a workmanlike job in holding Kozak's point total down and in the offensive department hit on three sets for a total of six points. Schlimm, the leading P. C. scorer, racked up 20 points while Nissel hit for 13. After the game Friar fans learned that ace rebounder, Frank Pelligrino would be out of the lineup for several weeks because of an ankle injury sustained during the game.

Schlimm Leads Friars Over R. P. I.

On February 17, the Friars returned to Mt. Pleasant for their first home game since exam week and engaged a strong Rensselaer quintet which previously had defeated the University of Connecticut. Coach Vin Cuddy's charges had things pretty much their own way throughout the first half and third quarter, but it took a supreme effort in subduing a do-or-die drive on the part of the Engineers during the waning minutes of the game. In the last ten minutes, the Friar lead dwindled from twelve points to a single marker, and the Cuddymen had barely enough left to squeeze by the visitors, 71-70. Jim Schlimm had his best night of the season, hitting the nets for 26 points. Sam Nissel, displaying the form that won him recognition as a freshman, scored 17 points. Ray Korbusieski contributed to the cause with 13.

For the first time in two years, the Friars were defeated on their home court. A comparative newcomer to these parts, Upsala from New Jersey, did the trick edging the Friars, 75-71. With Frank Pelligrino still on the inactive list because of a bruised ankle bone suffered in the Brown game, P. C.'s chances were considerably lessened as they had to cope with a starting five boasting four men well over six feet. The Cuddymen, all things considered, did extremely well in holding the visitors to a two point halftime lead. Following a second half ten point splurge by the Vikings, Korbusieski almost succeeded in snatching victory from Upsala's grasp. Less than seven minutes remaind as his jump shot tied it up at 57-all, but the Jerseyites dunked twelve straight points while holding P. C. scoreless. Beaver Power came off the bench to score two quick hoops but they were not enough to stem the tide. Jim Schlimm tallied 19, Korbusieski 18, and Garcia 14.

On February 21, Bowdoin invaded Mt. Pleasant hoping to turn the tables on a favored Friar five. The Polar Bears were in for a rude awakening, however, as the Smith Hillers poured it on from the opening whistle. Ed Mooney, subbing for the ailing Frank Pelligrino, sparked the drive and the Friars left the floor at halftime sporting a twenty-four point bulge. Providence could do little

wrong and went on to thrash the visitors, 89-57. Schlimm again led the parade of P. C. scorers with 22 points. Mooney and Garcia each accounted for 15 markers while close behind were Sam Nissel with 14 and Prendergast with 10.

In the persons of the Springfield Gymnasts, the Friars opposed a club that had come a long way since their previous meeting. On February 24, at the former's field house and before a Homecoming Day crowd, the Gymnasts played the brand of basketball used so effectively in downing Manhattan. It was touch and go for the first twenty minutes with the home team holding a slight lead. After the intermission, Springfield started with a rush and was never again headed. As Burke and Schutts combined their scoring efforts, the Friars lost composure and had little further success in penetrating the Gymnasts' zone defense. Springfield played excellent ball in drubbing the Cuddymen, 78-44. Schlimm was high man for the losers with 11 points.

Rhode Island State Evens Series

For the following encounter which took place on February 28 at Rodman Hall, the Friars used a zone defense against the Rhody Rams, but to no avail, as Bill Baird and Johnny Mitchell hit from outside with amazing accuracy. The Cuddymen quickly switched to a man to man defense but it wasn't their night as the Rams scored on seventy per cent of their shots in the first half. The Friars did well in holding the Downstaters to a 45-32 lead at the halftime buzzer. State did not cool off and continued their scoring splurge that spelled finis to Friar hopes. Despite the lopsided




Led by Sam Nissel, Ray Garcia, and Ray Korbusieski, the Smith Hillers fought back in the second half, and what had been a rout turned into a close, exciting game. Nissel and Garcia brought the Friars up to within three points late in the fray, but that was as close as they could come. Jerry Lembo held Kozak to a pair of field goals during his stay in the second half, but Greswell and Whalen took up the slack and Providence went down to defeat. 69-64. A perfectly executed two minute freeze kept the Friars from winning. Providence Elected to NAIB Tourney

Because of their outstanding record compiled against small college competition, the Friars won a berth in the district NAIB playoff. The other three competing teams were Fairfield, St. Anselm's, and top seeded Tufts. The Cuddymen came up with two outstanding performances in as many nights, edging St. Anselm's in the opener, 54-50, and Tufts, previously victorious over Fairfield, 77-74, in the finale, gaining the right to represent New England in the NAIB Tournament at Kansas City, Mo. Against St. Anselm's, P. C. played what was probably their best game of the campaign. The two clubs had split a pair of regularly scheduled games, and on Tuesday, March 6, at the Tufts' Gymnasium at Medford, Mass., squared off in a hard fought tilt to determine the winner of the rubber match. St. Anselm's, by virtue of recent wins over Boston College, Colby, and St. Michael's was, established as the favorite, but the Friars refused to be influenced by pre-tourney predictions. The Hawks had great difficulty in breaking the Dominican's zone and were held to twentytwo points at the half. Sam Nissel hit the nets frequently while Pelligrino controlled the backboards. A recurrence of an old leg injury, aggravated by the rough contact under the boards, hampered Pelligrino somewhat in that he had to be used sparingly in the second half.

An eight point lead enjoyed by the Friars at the intermission failed to hold up as the Hawks came on fast putting three fast hoops together to challenge once more. St. Anselm's tied it up at 34 all, but could not take the lead. Providence went ahead again then staved off several last minute Hawk rallies as Lembo and Gagnon executed an excellent freeze as time ran out. Nissel, Pelligrino, Garcia, and Korbusieski were outstanding for the Friars. Sam Nissel, in scoring 13 points, and Frank Pelligrino, with an





equal number, were prominent in the P. C. offense. Jim Schlimm was high man for the Smith Hillers with six field goals and three fouls for a total of 15.

New England NAIB Champs

On the following night, March 7, the Friars opposed a rangy Tufts club at the Jumboes' gym and succeeded in downing the top seeded five, 77-74. At one time in the first half, the Cuddymen held a thirteen point lead, but Don Goodwin whitled it down to three at the halftime buzzer. Tufts started strong in the second half, and on a couple of baskets by Goodwin and Shenfeld tied it up at 40-40. Korbusieski and Pelligrino gave the Friars a six point edge, 53-47, on drive-ins, but Tufts rallied again and evened things up at 55-55. Three straight hoops, one by Tom Bauer and two by Ron Gagnon, carried the Smith Hillers to another six point bulge, 61-55, but with less than seven minutes left Tufts trailed by only three points.


In Ed Mooney, the Friars had a "sleeper". Mooney's uncanny shooting good for 11 points, all scored in the last few minutes, together with the excellent spot playing of Tom Bauer and Ron Gagnon were big reasons P. C. triumphed. Sam Nissel, who played the greatest game of his college career, led Friar scorers with 15 points. Pellegrino and Korbusieski scored 14 each. Ray Garcia played a fine floor game and aided Pelligrino and Nissel in clearing the boards.

Jim Schlimm and Frank Pelligrino were among those chosen for the all tournament team, including Goodwin of Tufts, Suchenski of Fairfield, and O'Connor of St. Anselm's,

In the opening game at Kansas City, the Friars were defeated by Morningside (Iowa) Colleg, 66-63 and because of the loss were eliminated from further tournament play. In twenty-four games of varsity competition, Jim Schlimm, Friar ace forward from St. Mary's, Pa., amassed a total of 371 points breaking his own record of last year, when as a sophomore, he totalled 357. With another year of eligibility remaining, Schlimm has an excellent chance of becoming the first 1000 point man in the history of Providence College.



PROVIDENCE COLLEGE INVITATIONAL OUTDOOR TRACK MEET MARCH 25, 1950






Track, under the guidance of Coach Harry Coates, continued to grow by leaps and bounds despite its comparative infancy as a college sport.

The men of the spiked shoe have shown vast improvement and as a recognition of their splendid achievements, track has become a major sport here at Providence entitling trackmen to the varsity "P" and membership in the Monogram Club.

Track Carnival Draw All-Star Field

Again, one of the major highlights of the sports calendar was the Second Annual Providence College Invitation Track Meet held at Hendricken Field. Encouraged by the tremendous success of the first track carnival held in 1949, Coach Coates and the athletic department again rounded up a standout field to participate in the 1950 program. Included were: George Wade, the outstanding miler from Yale; Andy Stanfield, perhaps the most versatile runner in the sport today, from Seton Hall; Phil Thigpen also from Seton Hall; and that school's crack relay team. One of the features of the

meet was the appearance of Ireland's John Joe Barry running for Villanova College, Jamaica's Herb Mc-Kenley, who has set several world records, returned to our meet for the second straight year.


Thigpen Stars in P. C. Relays

One of the most exciting of the several races was the special three-quarter mile relay won by Wade in a gruelling finish with Thigpen. Barry was forced to drop out of the race because of a severe cold and was given a tremendous ovation for his courageous effort. The time was 3.6.6. Several A.A.U. handicap events were also listed. Jim Penler of P. C. won the 60 yd. dash in 6.3. Bill Keenan also of P. C. took the 300 yard run in 33.2 seconds. The mile run went to Fitzgerald of Boston U. in 4.30.6, while Sullivan, also of B. U., captured the 600 in 1.15.7. The Providence varsity captured the one lap relay and finished second to Seton Hall in the two lap relay and second to Holy Cross in the four lap relay. The special invitation 60 yard dash was won by Stanfield in 6.2. In a special relay with each man running 390 yards Seton Hall (Evans, Slade, Bright, and Carter) defeated the All Stars composed of Cassedy, McConnel, and Sherry of P. C. with Wade of Yale the anchor man. The Invitation 320 yard run was won by Stanfield with McKenley second. The P. C. Freshmen mile relay team won its race with R. I. S. and Holy Cross.

On April 15, the Friars launched their outdoor season on the cinders, when they fell before R. I. S., 91-44. The lack of team depth which was to handicap the spiked shoe men throughout the spring proved to be a major factor. For P. C., John McMullen, in the 220 low hurdles, Tony Frantantuano in the discus, and Jerry Alexander with a javelin throw of 194 feet were individual winners.

Relay Team Victor at Seton Hall

Next came the two outstanding outdoor relay carnivals,

the Seton Hall Relays at South Orange, N. J. and the Penn Relays in Philadelphia. At Seton Hall on April 23, the varsity (McMullen, Jim Penler, Captain Gerry McGurkin, and John Cassedy) scored a victory in the one mile relay in the time of 3.30.4 at Philadelphia. On April 28, the Friar varsity relayers finished third despite a brilliant 49.5 quarter by Captain McGurkin.

P. C. returned to dual meets on May 2, when they lost to Holy Cross in Worcester, 73-44. Bill Sherry in the 880, Jerry Kallman in the 120 high hurdles, Jerry Alexander in the javelin, and Bill Keenan in the pole vault won for Providence.

On May 5, the Friars were beaten by Springfield College in Springfield, 991/2-351/2. Sherry coming into his own as a middle distance runner captured the mile and placed second in the 880. Alexander was the only other Providence winner, taking the javelin with a throw of 179 ft. 5 in.

Next for the trackmen was the dual meet with Brown on May 9 which the Bruins won 941/2-391/2. With his brilliant "kick" working to perfection, Sherry scored a thrilling victory over Brown's great Jon Tobey in the 880 in the good time of 1.59.2. Penler came home a double winner for P. C. in the 220 and 100. Again the lack of depth, particularly in the field events which plagued the Friars all spring, played a huge role in the defeat.

In the Eastern Intercollegiate Championships at Springfield, Mass., Sherry continued his fine running

by winning the 880 in the fast time of 1.57.6 for the lone Providence victory.

The P. C. outdoor season for 1950 came to an end at the N. E. Intercollegiate Championships on May 20 at Bowdoin College in Brunswick, Me. Sherry running in the 880 narrowly missed a second championship losing by a foot in the excellent time of 1.56.0. Alexander also placed second in the javelin.

With Gerry McGurkin graduating, the Friar Trackmen elected Bill Sherry as captain for the 1950-51 season.

Frosh Win Two Outdoor Meets

The Freshmen competed in four dual meets. The Frosh defeated Holy Cross 582/3-511/2 with Dick Johnson and Rocco DiFolco winning two events apiece. The Springfield Freshmen and Brown Freshman stopped the Friars, 92-44 and 92-43 respectively. The freshmen also lost to R. I. S., 94-41.

The Friars formally opened their indoor season on the boards, after several informal practice meets, by participating in the N.E.A.A.U. sponsored Naval Track Meet in Boston, Jan. 6. Jack Cassedy successfully defended his 440 title winning in 55.3. Dick Johnson set a new record in the 880 winning in 2.01. Bill Newman placed 2nd in the mile.

The following week on the 13th, the Friars split up with a relay team traveling to Washington, D. C. for the

Washington Evening Star Games. The mile team (Penler, Keenan, Lussier, Johnson) defeated Catholic U. and LaSalle. The two mile relayers (Keenan, Lussier, Johnson, and Sherry) lost a close race to Maryland, finishing second. The remainder of the squad entered the Boston Y.M.C.A. meet where Chris Lohner captured the 1000.

On Jan. 20th in the Mass. K. of C. meet in Boston the one mile team placed 4th despite running the fastest time for any N. E. college in the meet, 3.26. The twomile relayers (Keenan, Lussier, Johnson, Sherry) finished second to Yale with Johnson running a very fast half-mile in 1.56.6.

In the N.E.A.A.U. Indoor Championships held in Cranston, R. I. on Jan. 24, Springfield defeated the mile relay team in a photo finish.

On February 3, the Friars took part in the B.A.A. games in Boston. Colgate and Tufts finished ahead of the one mile team while the two mile team lost a fast race to Syracuse; the time, 7.51.5. The Frosh mile relay (Art Cowese, Chris Lohner, Bill Newman, Bob Jugas) won their race over B. U. and Massachusetts.

Relayers Junior National Champs

February 12, the one mile team running at top form won the Junior National Championships in N. Y. The team composed of John McMullen, Bob Tiernan, Cassedy, and Penler defeated Manhattan and Fordham in the time of 3.27.8 after running trials in the afternoon. The two mile relayers again bowed to Yale with both Yale and the Friars breaking the record. The winning time was 7.56.

Next for P. C. was the I.C.4A. Championships in N. Y. on Feb. 24th. After running a fast 2nd in the trials the two mile team finished fifth in the finals. The Frosh mile relay placed 6th.

Good Showing in K. of C. Games

The indoor season came to a close with the N. Y. K. of C. Games at Madison Square Garden. The one mile relay (Penler, Johnson, Cassedy, B. Tiernan) won their race defeating St. Francis and Williams in the time of 3.26.4.

The Friars definitely proved that they belong among the nation's top teams and not only belong, but can give a very creditable account of themselves.

On March 17, 1951, Providence College was host to a large field in the 3rd Annual P. C. Invitation Meet rapidly becoming a N. E. fixture. Seton Hall, St. Francis, and Iona College were among the several colleges and high schools who competed. This year several Eastern Catholic Championship races were run. The rise of track at P. C. has been phenomenal due to the tireless patience and skill of Coach Coates and the courage of the team itself.

Another first was recorded by track coach Harry Coates as cross-country was added to the sports program of the College. In its first season, the varsity club compiled a record of two victories as against three defeats. Leading the Friars was the brilliant Dick "Pop" Johnson, who ran to individual victories in all five meets and was awarded the Varsity "P" for his fine performance.

On October 20, the varsity travelled to Kingston where they were beaten by Rhode Island State, 22-32. Then, Holy Cross defeated the P. C. team on October 24, by the score of 25-31. On November 21, Providence fell before Springfield College, 22-35. November 4 saw the Friars break into the win column for the first time as they defeated Worcester Polytech in Worcester, 25-32 with Johnson setting a new course record for the distance of 3.7 miles of 18 minutes and 9 seconds.

The highlight of the Varsity season came on November

6, when the Friars played host to a heavily favored Brown University team. With Johnson leading the way, the Friars rose to the heights of team effort stunning the Bruins over the P. C. 4.2 mile course by the score of 21-37. Along with Johnson, Bill Sherry, John McMullen, Jim Gannon, and Herb Waters all contributed heavily to the victory. This final triumph closed out the season for the cross-country men and gave conclusive proof to the tremendous strides they had made as a team since the sport's inception early in the fall.

On November 13, Johnson ran thirteenth in a large field in the New England Intercollegiate Cross-Country Championships in Boston. One week later competing against the nation's best, "Pop" finished forty-eighth in the I.C.4A. Cross-Country Championship in New York. The newly organized Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate Athletic Conference held its first annual meet on November 25. Dick Johnson was the lone entry of Providence College. He ran a tremendous race against the rough competition of the Metropolitan area and finished strongly in second place.

Although predictions in these uncertain times are, at best, risky, it can be safely said that if military service does not claim too many of the Friar hill and dalers, the foundation for one of the nation's finest cross-country teams has been established by Harry Coates. With the crack freshmen team moving up to the varsity club next season, Providence can look forward to having a great year in its newest of sports, cross-country.

Freshmen Cross Country

The Freshmen opened their season with a victory over La Salle Academy of Providence, 26-31. On October 7, they scored their second win. This time they topped Hope High School, 17-41. Then the young Friars started their college competition by shutting out Rhode Island State, 15-40. Chris Lohner, Bill Newman, Bill Hennigan, Omar Thibideau, and Gerry Absi finished in that order for Providence. The Holy Cross freshmen were the next victims for the P. C. team. This time it was Bill Newman, former Hope star, who led them across the tape to victory, the score was 17-43.

October 30 was the Friars defeat Pawtucket East High School, 15-48. Again it was a clean sweep with Tom Farrell joining the above five in a hand-in-hand finish. The Frosh scored their third shutout with their six men once more coming in hand-in-hand to defeat the Springfield College Freshmen, 15-45. The Freshmen team made it seven in a row and their fourth shutout on November 6, when the defeated the Brown yearlings, 15-49. Chris Lohner, St. Benedicts' prep star from Jersey City, N. J., finished first for the Friars closely followed by the other top five, the time was 15.47 over the 31/4 mile course.

The Frosh next competed in the Freshmen New England Intercollegiate Championships held at Franklin Park in Boston on November 13. They suffered a heartbreaking disappointment when Lohner was forced to drop out because of illness. Despite this bad luck, the Friars team strength again came to the fore and they finished in a first place tie with Boston University, each team scoring 118 points. Bill Newman led the Friars finishing fourth in the time of 16.10.


One week later the Friar Frosh travelled to New York to participate in the greatest cross-country race of them all, the I.C.4A Freshman Championships in Van Cortlandt Park. Lohner finished first for the Friars in twelfth place, Hennigan was 13th, Newman 16th, Farrell 43rd, and Thibideau 51st. These results gave the crack Providence team a third place finish behind the Syracuse and Manhattan freshmen hill and dalers.

On November 25, the Friar yearlings ended their cross-country season on a brilliant note, capturing the first annual Eastern Catholic Championships, for freshmen at New York's Van Cortlandt Park. The Freshmen scored 24 points while Iona College, which ran second, scored 32. Chris Lohner and Bill Hennigan finished 1-2 respectively to insure the Friar victory. This achievement is even more notable when it is recalled that this victory was won under the most adverse weather conditions imaginable. November 25 brought to the East one of the most severe wind and rain storms on record.
