The inclusion of a class history in a yearbook may seem somewhat superfluous. The events herein recorded have been lived by the seniors and in all probability, they need no reminding of them at this time. In another sense class histories are rather superficiary because they give only the externals of overall student life and ruthlessly eliminate the individual. This is unavoidable since it is impossible to record the feelings and the memories of each individual class member. Then too, the real history of the class is not set into motion until the members of the Class have left school and have taken their places in society. How many of them will be great men, average men, or failures? Will they serve God, themselves, families and country well? Answers to these questions would give a realistic history. Why, then, should a class history be written at all. There are several reasons.

The yearbook is the official directory of the graduating class and it is also a *resumé* of what the class has done while at Providence College. For that reason, it is necessary to record all events of interest, not only for the seniors themselves, but for the many other persons who will leaf through its pages. The second reason is that since memories grow dim with age, a reading of the class history years from now may recall to mind an event that has been forgotten. Third, convention and tradition demand that a class history be included in a senior yearbook. With these points in mind, let us proceed to view the birth and life of the Class of 1953.

Like all offspring, school classes are born into new worlds. As Freshmen all of us had one factor in common and that was strangeness to the new life that was to begin for us. For the majority of us high school experiences were still fresh in our minds and the first few days of college routine left us somewhat abashed. During registration we were subjected to many pressures such as assemblies, purchasing books, group pictures, X-ray pictures and handshaking. Once classes began to meet we still felt unadjusted. In the classes many were strangers to one another; we would still get lost looking for class-rooms; a cafeteria without seats was still a thing of wonder; white-robed Dominican Fathers still left us somewhat startled; and there were no parents to see that we got to class on time. However, these things were just of the moment because in a few weeks we were walking about the campus as though we had been here for months.

The school year was opened officially with the Mass of the Holy Ghost. In his talk that day Bishop McVinney urged us to "begin this day to be good Catholic gentlemen." We were now on our way. Many events come to mind as we think of the Freshman year. We remem-ber attending the huge Holy Hour at Narragansett Park . . . the visit of the Master General of the Order of Preachers . . . the dedication of the cemetery . . . the fact that enrollment at P.C. came quite close to the two thousand mark . . . "Operation Cumberland" was an event to remember when many of us went to help the Cistercians after their abbey was consumed by fire ... the visit and the veneration of the Pilgrim Virgin ... the stunning defeat of Rhode Island State in that never--to-be-forgotten basketball game . . . the talks given by Dorothy Day, the noted convert, and Frank M. Folsom, the president of RCA . . . the Mardi-Gras dance which was our first official dance . . . the first class elections






in which Lou Fascio, Charles Banfield, Richard Johnson and Joseph Littlefield were elected to lead our class . . . the election of our school as the seat of the New England Regional Commission on Forensic's . . . the first exposure to college final examinations . . . Father McKenna's great pride and joy, the Penny Sale . . . the naming of James V. Cuddy as the new basketball coach . . . the annual retreat . . . the fact that P.C. graduated the largest class in its history and that Doctor Henry M. Wriston, the president of Brown University, spoke at Commencement . . . the death of Father Jeremiah T. Fitzgerald, vice-president of the College.

These are the important events that are collectively remembered. But, what of the impact of scattered events on the individual. Perhaps contact with a teacher caused us to raise our intellectual sights higher; a fellow student may have given us a better glimpse at the meaning of friendship; one of the priests may have shown us a way out of our troubles; or we met girls who still loom large in our lives. The Freshman year is a powerful influence and no one can tell just where its influence stops. In any event, Aristotle's analysis of youth fitted us well, "Their lives are mainly spent not in memory but in expectation; for expectation refers to the future, memory to the past, and youth has a long future before it and a short past behind it." That is just the way we ended the year, full of expectation of the coming years.

Wisdom perfects the man, and returning for the Sophomore year, we believed that we had been perfected a great deal (and what college Sophomore does not?). Most of us smiled as we saw bewildered Freshmen walking about the campus. We thought we were quite high

on the social ladder but a glance from a Junior or Senior soon put us in our place,

During the summer, an event occurred which was to have a decided impact on our lives as college students. This event was the Korean War. For the veteran student, more military service was a remote possibility, but for the younger men, the specter of the Draft was a very real possibility. Father Slavin's words in the first issue of the *Cowl* were quite apropos, "This year is a year of challenge for all of us." What the future held in store for us was very uncertain but when one is young these things do not put one in a maudlin state of mind. There was more pressing business at hand: old friends to greet, arranging of good schedules, and getting back to the old grind of studying again.

The year opened officially with the Mass of the Holy Ghost and we were told by Bishop McVinney that the problems we faced were not very different from those of any age. Among the events and facts that stand out in this year . . . the enrollment at the College dropped to seventeen hundred . . . spirited campaigning elected to office as class officers Charles Banfield, Charles Cronan, Richard Johnson, and Charles Schlegel . . . on November 1st we joined with the three hundred million other Catholics in the world in welcoming the definition of the dogma of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin into heaven . . . the closeness of world events was brought to mind when the College was granted a Transportation Unit of the R.O.T.C. . . . we were saddened to hear of the death of Friar Boy III, who for twelve years served as a faithful mascot for the school. He was succeeded by Friar Boy IV . . . our Glee Club gained in prestige when (Continued on Page 103)



it was selected to a spot on the radio program "Songs From New England Colleges" . . . Father McKenna's Penny Sale was a success and brought with it many interesting moments . . . Charlie "The Cop" Devron's familiar face was absent from the campus when he retired in January . . . Miss Marguerite Johnson was elected queen of our Sophomore Hop . . . inflation became a reality for us when the Administration announced rises in the tuition and boarding rates.

The basketball five again defeated a favored R. I. State team by a whisker, 68-67. It entered the New England NAIB Tournament and emerged with victory's laurels. This led to the national tournament in Kansas City but the Friars were defeated in the first game. The track team won three relays at the Seton Hall Relays, and the AAU Junior Mile Relay championship. The baseball team ended the season with a not too impressive 9-11 record.

The Pyramid Players had an eventful year. An original musical, "Guys 'n' Ivy" was presented in May. It had a three day run and was enjoyed by all who witnessed its performance. Excerpts from "Escape" and "Juno and the Paycock" were also produced. The Glee Club journeyed to New York's Waldorf Astoria Hotel for a joint concert with New Rochelle College and Fairfield University.

Pleasant memories are aroused when one remembers the Autumn Festival, the Friars' Formal, the Dorm Weekend, the Junior Prom and the many other dances that took place during the year. Our spiritual growth was advanced by First Friday observances, Rosary devotions in October and May, and the annual retreat. Members of our class enjoyed memberships in various regional clubs, campus organizations and publications. As the year came to a close we could look back on two full years of eventful life here at Providence College. How far we advanced intellectually and spiritually only each student himself could answer. The next two years held promises of greatness which were tempered by a struggle in a far-off country called Korea. To many of us the future was uncertain—blazers or olive drab—but we all had the same feeling, if we had to serve our country we would serve it well.

What does one think about after completing two years of college. Quite a few things. Highest on the list is the fact that two years were now out of the way and we were that much closer to the attainment of a degree. We also remember the gay carefree days as Freshmen, the friendships we created, the happy events that are class elections, the formal dances we attended and acting the uncomfortable roles of being polished gentlemen, and the unfulfilled hopes of attaining a place on the Dean's List. There was serious thought too for permanent fields of concentration had to be chosen. What was our goal doctor, lawyer, teacher, social worker, chemist, journalist? Many of us may have felt uncomfortable in making the choice. It had always looked so easy before, but now that the time came for important decisions, we were hesitant. If we could only look into the future! June was very close and when vacation time is near, students have other things on their minds. The curtain had come down. We were now Juniors.

Returning to the campus as third year students was somewhat easier. We knew most of our classmates if not by name at least by face. Professors greeted us with smiles of recognition, registration was routine, and the buying of textbooks had long since lost its novelty. The first few days of our time was taken up by exchanging summer experiences with friends we had not seen since June, asking about Draft status, and the latest rumors on easy elective courses. This was the year of great expectations, or at least, most of us hoped it would be a successful year.

The year opened again with the celebration of the Mass of the Holy Ghost. Bishop McVinney's words urged us to rise above mediocrity. "You must not become satisfied with mediocrity. If you do, you are a failure." How far these words sank in remained to be seen but we left the Grotto with good intentions. We were underway once again.

The first matter of major importance was the choosing of leaders for our class. Strong campaigning resulted in a sweeping victory by the Cloverleaf Party composed of William Conway, Charles Schlegel, Edward Coleman, and Alfred Lamy. After the elections, campus life settled once more into classes, exams, club meetings, coffee in the cafeteria, dances and, of course, study. With the jaws of the Draft yawing before many of us, there was the added incentive to do better in our classes.

What is remembered from this year? Perhaps the following may come to mind as we look back . . . one third of the College student body was enrolled in the R.O.T.C. . . . enrollment at the school was down to four-teen hundred students as the Armed Forces continued their attrition . . . in a *Cowl* poll, the student body

demonstrated prophetic insight when they chose Eisenhowever as the victor of the 1952 presidential election . . . the fact that our nation was still at war to mind forcibly when a Red Cross Bloodmobile visited the campus for blood to be used in Korea . . . we were grieved to learn of the death of Father Walter Farrell, O.P., who while not a member of the faculty had great effect on the students for it was through his volumes on the Summa that we were exposed to the wisdom of theology . . . we all joined in congratulations to our president, Father Slavin, on his attainment of the highest Dominican degree, Master of Sacred Theology . . . the Farmers' Festival and the Friars' Formal proved to be enjoyable to all who attended these affairs . . . the Glee Club was again chosen to appear on the "Songs From New England Colleges" program.

The Junior Prom, the really "big" dance of the year was held at the Sheraton-Biltmore Hotel and featured Art Mooney's orchestra. The Prom Committee, under the direction of Andrew Resnisky and James Gannon provided some novel innovations to the affair. Favors took the form of small stuffed Dalmatian dogs, and parking space was secured in the Biltmore parking lot. The highlight of the evening, crowning the queen, was further enhanced by an honor guard of R.O.T.C. cadets.

In the second semester many of us began to look like newly engaged girls, the reason was simple, we had our class rings... James Marshall and Robert Finneran were chosen as co-Editors of the *Cowl*... John Del Giudice was named Editor-in-Chief of the VERITAS for our class ... thirty-five members of our class were elected to Delta Epsilon Sigma ... members of our class became presidents of various regional clubs and campus societies ... final examinations came and went without any great upheavals since we were used to them now ... Archbishop Richard Cushing delivered the Commencement address.

The sands of the Junior year were rapidly running out. We watched senior graduation activities with interest because we would be going through the same program in a year. June arrived and we looked forward to this vacation because for many of us it would be the last school vacation we would enjoy. We left in high spirits for we were now in the seats of the mighty. We were seniors.

We came back to the campus for the fourth time feeling somewhat uncertain because the senior year is one of mixed emotion. There is a feeling of gladness for we were now close to graduation; there is a feeling of sadness because it meant that a four year relationship with students and faculty members would come to an end.

Opening week was the same as it had been in previous years, registration, schedules, purchasing books, X-ray pictures; but we drew some satisfaction in knowing that this would be the last time we would be doing these things. In the Grotto, we heard the Mass of the Holy Ghost opening the school year and again the thought of finality crept into our minds, for this would be our last attendance at this function as students. Schedules were somewhat easier this year because most of our courses were in the elective category.

Class elections were a big event this year. Campaigning was vigorous and showy with parades, a dance, and a

party along with the usual flood of posters and handbills plus the blaring of sound cars. After the dust had settled Alfred Lamy, Andrew Resnisky, Frank Merlino and John McCarthy emerged as the leaders of our class for our last year at P.C. The social activities of the year got off to a good start with successful dances sponsored by the Student Congress, Friars' Club, Carolan Club and the Monogram Club. The Farmers' Festival attracted a capacity crowd, and the Friars' Club Formal provided an enjoyable evening for all who attended these affairs.

Work on the yearbook proceeded at an even pace. We sat for portraits, filled in activity sheets, and grouped for club pictures. Work was also in the air when we sat down for the eight hour Graduate Record Examination. The war in Korea was still on and a Bloodmobile once again visited the campus. The R.O.T.C. Unit began to look more polished as it moved into its second year of existence on campus, and seeing men in uniform in the cafeteria and the corridors was now commonplace.

The basketball season found us rooting ourselves hoarse. The first game found P. C. on the losing side but the team showed fine spirit. The Friars' Club staged a pre-game rally which included an address by the president and a march to the gym with a band and a motorcade. Hockey was up-and-coming and it has a bright future at the College. January brought its examinations. We began our final semester at the College.

The big events of the second semester are still to come as we write but the shadows of deadlines fall across our pages. The final round of exams, Cap and Gown Day, the Commencement Ball, Alumni Day, and Commencement are still before us but these things will hardly need notation here for they will be indelibly inscribed on our minds. We have come to the end of our stay at Providence College.

This, then, is the history of the Class of 1953. How good a record is it? Understandably, it could have been better in many ways, not as a class, but on the individual level. As a class we have left a record that will compare favorably with those of other years. Surveying four years of accomplishment is not always an easy task for one usually thinks of what might have been rather than what is. If we had studied harder, perhaps our scholastic average would be higher. If we had shown more interest in various activities, we might have become leaders. If we had taken a different concentration, perhaps we would be more certain of our future. However, one cannot change the past. We are only what we have made ourselves.

For four years we were guided down our chosen paths by Dominican Fathers who always showed us the way to wisdom, knowledge and virtue. How far we advanced on those paths is for ourselves to answer. This much we all knew, we were not the same men that came to Providence College four years ago. We are older in years, wiser in mind, and tempered with experience. As graduates we hope to go forth and enjoy financial and social success and also to help establish the Kingdom spoken of in the preface to the Feast of Christ the King, "Regnum veritatis et vitae; regnum sanctitatis et gratiae; regnum justitiae, amoris et pacis." God grant us help in these endeavors.




THIRD ORDER OF ST. DOMINIC

Classes are held from Monday through Friday as part of the regular curriculum, with an additional two-hour drill period on Tuesday afternoons. It is during these classes and drill periods that the students learn the functionings and fundamentals of Army life and procedure. At the conclusion of the compulsory two-year basic course, a student may, if properly qualified by the advance board and physical examination, enter the two-year advanced course where, upon successful completion, which includes a six-week training period at Fort Eustis, Virginia, he is commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army or Marines if he so prefers.







After five weeks of practice the Providence College baseball team initiated its 1952 season. The spring weather proved rough on the team led by veterans Bill Mullins, Bill Mc-Keon, Captain Howie McGuiness, and Don McDonald. However, weather and injuries did not halt the team's enthusiasm and spirit.

The opening game of the season was held on April 24th at Hendricken Field. Bates College journeyed from Maine to be defeated by the Martinmen, 11-7. In this first contest the Friars were fortunate that Bates was also newly organized and not yet in good condition. Big Bill Mullins was the Providence hero in this game when he struck out seventeen. Captain Howie McGuiness and Don Mc-Donald were the leading batters with three hits apiece. Larry Quimby, a fast left-hander from Bates, fought the battle alone and was lucky to keep the score under twenty. The following game, which was scheduled with Assumption College of Worcester, was rained out. This gave the P. C.'ers more opportunity to sharpen their game.

On the last day of April, Springfield College upset the Friar nine, 7-5. All went well until the Gymnasts, who had been trailing 5-4, picked up three runs from starter "Mo" Mullins. P. C.'s ace reliefer, Tom Army, came in to finish out the game and did not allow any more runs. Bill Quinn with a pair of doubles and Captain McGuiness with a pair of triples were the big guns in the Friar attack.

Two days following, Dick Duignan, with a two-run homer and Eddie Ryder, who hit three runs in four attempts, led the squad in their best early season victory when they overcame Seton Hall, 4-3. Peter Drury,





a sophomore, was the winning pitcher; his fast ball certainly found its mark in this game. It was a big fifth inning for the Friars when they picked up three runs. Bob Grenier hit two for three.

The following day, May 3, American International College was overcome by sophomore Fred O'Neil and the varsity nine by the score of 12-5. Fred helped Bill McKeon from the third inning, when he took over. It was Bob Grenier, who hit a triple in the big sixth with three men on base, that started the Providence College landslide. During this contest Bill Quinn, first-string catcher, suffered a split thumb and was lost for the remainder of the season. While this was a tough blow to Coach Hal Martin it opened his eyes to sophomore Eddie Ryder who took over the backstop position for the remainder of the season like a veteran.

On May 4, the last day of an extensive week-end, the Friars lost a tough one up at Boston College, 6-4. The team outhit the Eagles 13-8 but because of poor fielding they couldn't win this one for the starting pitcher Bill Mullins. "Big Mo" had tough luck in the sixth and was relieved by Don Podziewski who stayed in only one inning when Tom Army helped him. Buzz Barry, the *diminutive* right fielder, and the new "E." Ryder were top hitters in this skirmish of the campaign.

Only three days later, the University of Connecticut, leaders of the Yankee Conference, gave the Friar nine a rough match before they were subdued, 8-7. The Huskies were leading by four runs in the first four innings. In the fifth, Captain McGuiness and Eddie Ryder teamed up to get three runs for P. C. Then in the next inning the Uconns stole two runs from Pete Drury. It was then that Fred O'Neil took over and choked the Huskies' rally. Don Mc-Donald hit a 380-foot home run in the seventh inning to help the Friar cause. He pushed in two runs by doing so. In the top of the ninth with the score tied at 6-6, the Ucoms scored a run on an error. Then, when it was P. C.'s turn at the plate, Dick Duignan walked and Bob Grenier hit the first pitch served to him right over the right-field fence. This was the Friars fourth win against two losses.

The team picked up win number five when soph. Carl Buniva shut out the Towermen of St. Anselms, 14-0 on May 10. "Bun" gave only five hits in the nine innings and fanned eight. Again it was Captain Howie McGuiness, Don McDonald, and Buzz Barry who led the Friars hitting. These three stars hit two home runs each. Buzz's second round tripper was a grand slam presented to Buniva.





The thirteenth of May started the unfortunate Brown series. This first meeting between the cross-town rivals resulted in an 8-4 victory by the Brown Bear.

In the second inning at Aldrich Field, the Bruins combined six walks, a hit, an error and a double steal to amass six runs or two more than needed to win the game. The Friars used the Brown errors, a hit batter, and one hit in their fifth to score four runs. They were not enough. In the ninth Dick Duignan had a chance with the bases loaded but could only watch Ken Moffat of Brown's hurling staff pull the strings against him. Buzz Barry hit a double in the fourth for P. C.'s big wallop of the day. This was the team's third defeat in eight games.

Brown made it two in a row when they outhit and outran the Martinmen at Hendricken Field on the following day. During this ball game


Dick Duignan drove the longest home run ever hit at Hendricken Field, directly over the left-center field fence at the 431-foot mark. Unfortunately this was not enough and 6 P. C. errors and 6 P. C. walks lost the game for Coach Hal Martin and his team. Sophomore Jerry Romberg, who held down the second base post throughout the season, hit two for four and was second in the batting attack only to Duignan who received three hits in four attempts. Four hurlers were used in this farce. Mc-Keon, Buniva, Drury, and Sullivan. Drury had this one scored against him. Ken Moffat of Brown was listed as the winner. Two Bobs, Wheeler and MacConnell, paced the Bruin offense.

The Crusader nine of Holy Cross, nipped the Friars, 5-4, on the seventeenth of May. This gave P. C. a 5-5 record. Big Bill Mullins matched Ronnie Perry of Holy Cross and gave only seven hits against Perry's six. Eddie Ryder hit a single and scored one of the P. C. runs. McGuiness, McDonald, and Duignan each got two hits. Dick Hogan's triple in the fifth drove in the winning run for Holy Cross.

Fred O'Neil's three-hit pitching and six Friar hits gave the P. C. nine a 7-1 victory over the University of Rhode Island nine at Hendricken Field on the 21st of May. Buzz Barry's double which scored two runs in the fourth and Grenier's three-run homer in the sixth gave P. C. more than enough runs to win the ball game. The second game of the double-header, with Bill Mullins of P. C. opposing Bill Parenteau of U. of R. I., was called in the second inning because of rain. No runs had been scored.

The toughest break of the season occurred on May 25th when Springfield, who was trailing 4-0 in the ninth, overcame the Friars, 10-4. The team just couldn't get those three outs. Buniva had a shut-out in the ninth until he walked the first batter and Ed Redmond, a pinch hitter, hit a home run. That started the trouble. This was defeat number six in twelve games for the Friars.


The final game of the season was held on Alumni Day, May 31st, at Hendricken Field. Holy Cross rallied in the ninth to score four runs and beat P. C., 16-14. This victory saved the Crusaders from considerable consternation for they were named immediately after the game as the New England representative at the NCAA Championships. (They later went ahead and won it.) Before the Purple Knights left for Omaha they had a tough joust here with the Friars. Two homers by Bob Grenier, one with two on, and one by Ed Ryder and Dick Duignan almost were enough to beat the Crusaders.





On April 18-19, the Friars opened the 1952 spring season by traveling to Newark, New Jersey, to defend their Eastern Catholic Intercollegiate Championship in the Seton Hall Relays. In the one-mile relay, won by Seton Hall, the hard running Coatesmen (Cassedy, Penler, Methia, Tiernan) placed second. The winning time was 3:23.8. Providence College runners (Lohner, Lussier, Tiernan, Johnson), scored another second in the two-mile relay which was won in the time of 8:05.

In dual meets with Brown University and the University of Rhode Island on April 30 and May 2, respectively, unfavorable weather conditions hampered both opponents. The hard fighting Friars were not as successful as their opponents in these adverse conditions, being defeated in both meets.

On May 10, the varsity trackmen moved into Medford, Mass., to tangle with Tufts. Combining a few double winners with their advantage in the weights, the Jumbos scored an 81-51 win. The P. C. team fought valiantly for top laurels, but they lacked the depth to score sufficient points for a team victory.



During this time the hockey team has acquired a new coach and an enviable record. The coach is Dick Rondeau, former Dartmouth star, and the record for this past season was excellent for its age.

Less than a month after practice had begun at the Rhode Island Auditorium, Brown University was taken on as the first opponent for the '52-'53 season. Brown's experience enabled them to overcome the Friars 12-4. During this opener the freshman line of Monahan, Sweeney, and Reall exposed its talent, which was put to much use throughout the campaign.

In the first week of December, Tufts College became the second team to defeat the P.C. sextet. The score was 8-4. The Jumboes lived up to their reputation of high class hockey, but the Friars exhibited some of their skill which was to help them in later contests. Reall, Farrell, McAleer and Jim White scored goals for P.C. in this fast game.

At this time the team lost the services of one of its co-captains, Tom Army, because of his induction. The other captain, Bob Petit, led the team for the remainder of the season.

On December 11, the team won its first game in three starts when they defeated the University of Rhode Island 3-1. Sweeney, McAleer, and Monahan scored the P.C. goals.

The first game of the new year was held at West Point where the P.C. sextet outskated and outscored the cadets 6-3. Rosco Sweeney opened the scoring for P.C. and before the afternoon was over he had another goal to his credit. Petit also scored two goals. Reilly and Reall also scored.

American International College of Springfield, Mass. defeated the squad in their next game which was held in Springfield. This game, played on Jan. 29, ended up 5-4. A.I.C. scored the winning goal half-way through the final period and the Rondeauites just couldn't even up the score.

On the fifth of February, the Friars scored their third win to even up the record. This was done at the expense of Holy Cross who was overwhelmed 10-0. During this skirmish many Friars scored, among them were

Monahan, Wholey, Reall, Sweeney, Charland, and Cap. Petit. This was Eddie Hornstein's first shut-out.

Five men, Sweeney, Monahan, Petit, Reall, and White, scored a goal apiece to skim past Springfield College 5-4. This contest turned out hot and heavy in the last period but team play enabled the Friars to overcome the Gymnasts.

They were not as fortunate on their next trip which was to Troy, N. Y. where R.P.I. outshot them 13-1. The Engineers were a highly talented outfit well sprinkled with Canadian stars.

On February 17, the Friar icemen revenged their former defeat by outscoring A.I.C. 7-3. The Freshman line led the attack in this game. One week later, in another game held at the R. I. Arena, the squad downed Springfield for the second time. This time the score was more in conformity with their talents, 8-2. Eddy Monahan got two and Reall, Reilly, and Charland were also valuable contributors to the cause.

Three days later the team journeyed to Potsdam, N. Y. where they were defeated by a highly talented Clarkson sextet, 7-4. Eddie Hornstein stopped the puck 37 times and prevented a much higher score. The next night of the road trip found the skaters in Lynn, Mass, where they faced off against Tufts team for the second time of the season. It was also their second defeat by the well-stocked Jumboes. The score was 5-2. Many penalties were evidenced in this ragged contest.

March 4, found the skaters at Coach Dick Rondeau's Alma Mater, Dartmouth, where they were outplayed to the tune of 5-1. Reall scored the lone goal for P.C. The score does not show the true spirit of the contest which saw the small P.C. squad fight all the way against a noted and experienced Dartmouth sextet.






November 1, was the starting date for prac-tice, as Coach Vin Cuddy began to make preparations for the 1952-53 edition of the Providence College Basketball Team. With the loss of such men as Jim Schlimm, Ray Korbusieski, Jerry Lembo, Tom Bauer, and Ronnie Gagnon from last season's squad, there were some gaps to be filled. The Friars did have three starters returning and enough experienced ball players to afford prospects for a successful season. Such ball players as Charlie Aquavia, Ed Ryder, Bill Quinlan, Bob O'Connell, Jack Keating and Jack Priessner had made the jump from members of the J. V. squad to the varsity. John "Beaver" Powers was back after missing the 1951-52 season. The returning veterans who were expected to carry much of the load were: Bob Prendergast (Captain), Bob Moran, Hank McQueeney, Tom Mullins, Ken Kerr, Jack Reynolds, Jack Durkin, and Phil Lynch. Joe King suffered an early season injury which disabled him for the remainder of the season.





In preparation for their opening game, the Friars participated in a scrimmage against the combined opposition of Connecticut, Amherst and the U. S. Coast Guard Academy. They also met the UConns again and had two scrimmages with Newport O.C.S. With this opposition under their belts, P. C. was ready to open their season on December 3, at Mt. Pleasant High School. The game marked the beginning of a new athletic rivalry with Gorham State Teachers College from Maine, who were the defending New England Teachers College A. A. Champions. As is typical of most opening games the play was ragged in many spots, but the Friars scored an 87 to 69 victory. Starting slowly Providence led by three points at half-time, 31-28; showing improvement in the second half, they forged ahead in the late part of the game. Phil Lynch, playing one of his best offensive games, collected 15











P. C.'s top point producer with 23; Tom Mullins continued his good scoring with 13 points.

In their next game, on December 10, the Friars, who were host to a highly rated Maryland State team, displayed some of their best basketball of the year, although ending up on the short end of a 76-67 score. Maryland was outscored 39-32 in the second half, but their 16-point halftime lead proved to be the difference. Bob Prendergast was hitting with his hook shots as he picked up 16 points. Moran (20), Mullins (13) and Kerr (10) all hit double figures.

Travelling to Springfield, Massachusetts, the Providence quintet defeated American International College in a hard-fought 78-69 game. Bob "Sag" Prendergast's accurate hook shots helped defeat A.I.C.'s zone defense. Hank McQueeney (13) and Tommy Mullins (15) showed well with their hard driving game. Bobby Moran again was the top scorer with 24 points. On December 17, Brandeis, one of the better

On December 17, Brandeis, one of the better teams in New England, played host to the Friars




points. Tom Mullins also displayed his scoring ability with 16 markers, as Bob Moran, who led the team in scoring last year with 383 points, was top man with 18 points.

On December 6, Providence College made it two in a row by opening a week-end trip with a 78-52 win over Assumption at Worcester. Showing speed, a good passing attack, and accurate shooting, the Friars cracked open the Worcester Greyhounds zone defense. Bob Moran led the way with 20 points, while Tommy Mullins scored 10.

The following night at Manchester, N. H., the varsity played St. Anselm's. They looked great in the first half as they were leading by a 47 to 35 score, but the second half resulted in a complete form reversal. Scoring only 9 points in the third period and 13 in the fourth, the Friars dropped a tough 72-69 decision. Chuck Duffley paced the Hawks with 32 points. Moran was

at Waltham, Mass. The score was tied 57-all late in the third period; but the Judges, finishing strong, opened up a 12-point margin early in the fourth quarter. The final score was: Brandeis 95, P. C. 83. Captain Bob Prendergast scored 18 points. Bob Moran, continuing his remarkable scoring with 24 points, and Tom Mullins with 13 both hit double figures for the sixth consecutive game.

In their final game before the Christmas vacation, the Friar five faced Colby at Mt. Pleasant Gym. Colby had three big men in the lineup over 6' 5", including 6' 7" Ted Lallier, who pushed 30 points through the nets. That was the big difference, since Bobby Moran's 23 points were not enough to sway the balance in P. C.'s favor. The Colby Mules won, 71-62. Thus the Friars, with a 3 won, 4 lost record, were having their troubles, and hoped that the new year might have better fortune in store for them.

Waterbury, Connecticut, was the scene of the Cuddymen's first game of 1953. Fairfield jumped to a 14-9 first period lead. As a result of a pressing defense, the Friars narrowed the margin to 67-63 late in the fourth period. Fairfield again forged ahead and scored a 73 to 65 victory.

At Mount Pleasant Gym, on January 9, Providence College entertained Bates College. It was on this night that Henry McQueeney chose to break out of the wraps he had been laboring under throughout his sophomore season and the first eight games of this season. Leading 44-35 after a torrid first half, the Cuddymen continued to roll and opened up an 80-65 margin in the fourth period. The entire team played well in their best game of the season at this point. Mc-Queeney (21) and Moran (21) tied for scoring honors, while Mullins chipped in 12 points. The final score was 94 to 75 and the Friars won a very important victory.

After the Bates win, the Friars journeyed to Worcester to play Holy Cross, one of the nation's top ranking teams. P. C. scored 21 points in the first period and found themselves 8 points behind. Ken Kerr, shooting in sensational fashion, scored 14 points in the first half. At halftime the Crusaders led 56-41, as they hit with a phenomenal 52% shooting average. The final score was 95 to 73. One of the bright spots of







the game was Ken Kerr's great all-around performance as he scored 17 points. Moran and McQueeney scored 20 and 16 points respectively.

Lou Murgo and Marvel Gym. — That just about sums up the Friars January 14 athletic contest with Brown University. Providence was behind 41-26 at half-time. The Bruins scored one field goal in each of the last two quarters and 25 free throws (13 by Capt. Murgo). Although they were hardly in the ball game in the second half, Brown prevailed 70-66. Moran (26) and McQueeney (20) were the Friars top point producers.

Providence College played host to Springfield in their next game. In contrast to the below par performances of the Friars against Brown, their games with Springfield seem to find P. C. at their best. Despite the efforts of Allan

nor ended any hope of a victorious evening for the Friars. Manhattan got into high gear in the second half, winning easily 98 to 72. Kerr (17), Moran (23), and McQueeney (11) all played well against a team that eventually placed fourth in the National Invitation Tournament.

On Saturday, February 7, by virtue of a 55 point second half, P. C. won an exciting 85-80 game over Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. Captain Prendergast, McQueeney, Moran, and Mullins, with their excellent performances, engineered the win over R. P. I.

Tuesday, February 10, marked the change of an erratic season for Vin Cuddy's basketballers. The opponent was R. I. U. At the R. I. Auditorium, which had been the setting of two P. C. upsets in the past three years, all the Friars' dormant potential was unleashed. Rhody could do little to harness the rampaging Friars. Providence set a torrid pace from the opening gun and led 22-12 at the first way station. Hank Mc-Queeney, who played his best ball of the season, got the team off to a fast start with his tricky ball handling and passing, heading the offense. Captain Bob Prendergast's spirited rebounding and timely shooting, Mullin's driving and playmaking, Moran's sets and drives, Durkin's rebounding, and the timely relief work of Aquavia and Lynch were the highlights of a brilliant team victory. Kenny Kerr's injury, a fractured shoulder, in the early minutes of the first period resulted in his loss for the remainder of the season. As the Friar heroes were carried from the Auditorium floor, the scoreboard read P. C. 92. R. I. U. 66, in one of the greatest wins in Providence College basketball history.

The highlight of the following night's game with M. I. T. at Mt. Pleasant was Robert Moran. In this contest Moran brought his season's scoring total to 381 points, thus breaking his record of 379 points established last season. The Friars suffered a slight let-down after the astounding win over Rhody, but won handily, 77-50.

At Worcester, Mass., the Friars defeated Clark 92-72 for their fourth straight victory and their sixth win in their last seven games. Moran (24), McQueeney (18), and Mullins (15) sparked the offensive.






Schutts, Springfield's top scorer, the Friars gained a thrilling 83-76 victory. Bob Moran sparked Providence in the stretch, scoring 16 of their last 21 points and 13 fouls in succession. Tallying 26 points, he was best when the pressure was greatest. Ken Kerr, hitting well from the outside, scored 19 points, while Hank Mc-Queeney played an excellent floor game and contributed 10 points.

On December 21, the Friars avenged an early season setback by defeating a good St. Anselm's team (who entered the game with a 10 and 1 record), 78 to 67. Kerr, McQueeney, Mullins, and Moran paced the attack as Moran continued his prolific scoring with 27 points.

At the Rhode Island Auditorium, on January 27, the P. C. quintet played Manhattan College. The 37-point performance of 6' 6'' Eddie O'Con-

On February 18, at Mt. Pleasant, the Fairfield Stags defeated Providence College, 110-88. By breaking four of their scoring records, they ran up the highest total ever scored by a P. C. opponent. Fairfield did practically everything right as they maintained an exceedingly high shooting average—56.5%. Bill Quinlan, who saw limited service this season, had his best scoring night with 14 points. Moran, McQueeney and Prendergast also scored in double figures.

In their return game at Springfield, Mass., the Friars continued to show their superiority over the Gymnasts with an 87-83 overtime victory. Jack Durkin, who was given a starting berth after Kerr's injury, sparked Providence with two payoff baskets in the overtime period. He had a total of 17 for the night. This was P. C.'s fourth straight win over the Gymnasts in a twoyear stretch.



Hopes for a victory over Brown were high on February 25, as the Bruins were playing on our "home" court. Highly favored P. C. had a 33-31 lead at the end of the first half, but as the second half progressed the Friar fortunes took a turn for the worse. Brown emerged victorious, 69-58, for the tenth time in the last eleven games. The Bob Morris coached quintets definitely have a "hex" on Providence College basketball teams.

The final game of the 1952-53 season was played at Rodman Hall, but the Friars did not show the form that rewarded them with their earlier defeat of the University of R. I. Jack Durkin was the only Friar to hit double figures with 14 points. The effects of a long season seemed to have the team physically tired. U. of R. I. won by a 76-62 score, thus setting the Providence season record at 11 victories and 11 defeats. This was the last game for two seniors: Jack Keating and Captain Bob Prendergast. Players who went unheralded for a greater part of the season, but deserve much credit, were: Charlie Aquavia, good hustler and shooter; Bill Quinlan, who played well in late season; Jack Keating, whose board work helped spell the big men; and Bob O'Connell, who always hustled and showed plenty of fighting spirit. Jack Reynolds, who saw a great deal of action, was a great help off the boards and contributed many key points to the Friar cause. Phil Lynch, probably the most unheralded member of the squad, could always be counted on in the clutch for a key performance.

Robert Moran, Junior from Brooklyn, N. Y., rated as one of the best small men in the East. was given honorable mention in Collier's "All America" selections. He broke his own scoring record of 379 points, and established a new total of 455 with a 20.8 point per game average. Bobby will almost certainly become the second 1,000-point man in Providence College history.






INTRAMURAL BOXING
