Our faculty has been blessed with having an outstanding spiritual and temporal leader throughout the years in which he has been Provincial.



May Almighty God and Mary Immaculate, His Mother and yours, grant you for the days of life which lie before you Their Wisdom, Their Protection and Their Benediction!










The exterior of proposed Athletic Building is contemporary style, red brick Indiana limestone trim and will blend harmoniously with other buildings on the campus. Long glass front on the south side floods the Cafeteria with light and makes an attractive approach from the campus side.

The basement floor serves as a student center with its own separate entrance, comprising of cafeteria, soda bar, lounge, recreation, post office and barber shop. Remainder ground floor—rifle ranges, steam room, storage, squash courts and golf cage.

Main amphitheater accommodates sixteen hundred in permanent seats and twentyfive hundred additional in folding bleachers.

For basketball three cross courts are provided and one championship court.

Surrounding the playing area and utilizing the space under the seating is arranged a series of offices, coaches rooms, student health exercise rooms, lockers, showers, space for visiting teams, equipment storage and other spaces.

The main entrance into the building is on the west side and leads to large lobby with ticket offices. It and the adjacent corridors are designed to accommodate large crowds and to facilitate their entrance and exit.

Above the lobby and accessible by two large staircases are a large lounge, a lecture room, alumni office and R.O.T.C. office.

The amphitheater is flanked by circulating corridors feeding into the seating tiers at convenient points.

The great arch trusses over the amphitheater will have a clear span of 150 feet and provide lofty ceiling and making it possible to throw daylight into the arena from each end. The overall dimensions of the building are 190 feet by 235 feet and the arena will be 45 feet high at the center from the basketball floor.

b aseball

April 8th was the day, Quonset Point was the site, and the sailors from Davisville, R. I. were the victims in the 1953 Friars' first diamond victory. Don Podziewski and Bill Mullins combined for eleven strikeouts to hold the Navy down 7-5 in a five inning contest. With Jerry Romberg, Bob Grenier, and "Beaver" Power gathering the only P. C. hits, the game was left mainly to the moundsmen.

Two days later the Friars returned to Davisville but this time they encountered a different foe; the Quonset Flyers. However, after a first inning which provided the Martinmen with 5 runs on 4 hits against a single run for the Flyers, the clouds opened

and the rains came.

Homecoming day at Providence College was on April 15th. Big "Mo" Mullins, hero of the day, pitched the Friar forces to a very definite 9-1 win over U. R. I. On the mound for the entire contest, "Mo" fanned 13, allowed only one free pass, and gave up 6 hits.

Hal Martin's Friars first tasted the bitterness of defeat when they met the Rams again, two days later, down in Kingston. The final score was 4-0. DeMasi, Negris and Abbruzzi scored the Ram tallies in the second, third, fourth and eighth frames. Negris did yeoman work in shutting out the Friars



On April 21st, P. C.'s top hurler, Mullins, with the able assistance of his able teammates, did stellar work in leading the Friars to an impressive 16-6, 7 inning rout of the Lowell Textile forces from Lowell, Mass. On the mound for the last six innings, "Mo" fanned 11, walked 4 and gave up three hits for two runs. Besides his proficient mound work, he tallied three runs and made two hits in two official trips. Ryder and Grenier were the other power houses with three for four and two for five, respectively.

Boston College finally caught Coach Hal Martin's forces on April 24th at Hendricken Field and set them back with a 7-4 defeat. The Boston boys scored three in the second and two in the third and topped off the whole affair with two in the ninth on Cisternelli's two run homer. P. C.,


ACE PITCHER BILL MULLINS aids his own ball-game with a sacrifice bunt at Nickerson Field. G. Romberg scores



led by Dick Howe, who had three hits in four trips, staged a spirited four run rally in the famed "last of the ninth" but fell short and went down to their second defeat in six encounters.

Boston University, not to be outdone by their neighbors from across the city, nosed out Providence 6-5 on April 28th at Weston, Mass. Mullins, giving up five runs on four hits, was thrown for his second loss. A rally in the sixth started when Kelley singled. Romberg sacrificed Kelley to second, and on the opposing pitcher's error, all hands were safe. Kelley later came home on the same pitcher's second error and Mullins sacrificed Romberg in to score. B. U., however, managed to curb the rally a run short of a tie.





On May 2nd, Providence College played the only tie game of its entire seventeen game schedule. Through the hitting of McQueeney, White, Howe, Grenier, and Jack Reynolds, P. C. used six hits for seven runs while Springfield made seven for seven.

Holding a 2-4-1 record, Providence increased its win number by one with a 6-2 defeat of the University of Conn. on May 6th at the latter's field. Mullins struck out eight and allowed only two runs as the Friars came back to grab their third win in eight encounters by a 6-2 score. White, Howe, Ryder, Reynolds and Mc-Queeney were all big guns in the hitting and scoring departments.

On May 7th, P. C. finally came back to the 500 mark with a thrilling 4-3, fourteen inning decision over Bates College in Lewiston, Maine. Lefty Peter Drury came on in the third to pitch eleven and two-third innings, giving up six hits and three walks while fanning a total of fifteen opposing batters. Doubles by Romberg and Ryder, Howe's single and one of three Bates errors gave P. C. their four runs.




NO DOUBT ABOUT THIS ONE with rugged Hank McQueeney blocking the plate against a sliding Terrier from B. U.

Anxious for victory, the Friars tangled with another Maine foe on the following day. This time their victim was Gorham State, and the score was 8-1. Howe's three tallies in the first, fifth and ninth innings, along with Ryder's prolific three for four provided the P. C. punch. Carl Buniva, with ten strikeouts, and a single walk against him, was the winning pitcher.

Sporting a 5-4-1 record, Hal Martin led his victory minded forces to Manchester, N. H. on May 9th where they trounced a St. Anselm's aggregation 12-4. Mullins replaced Podziewski in the second to finish out the contest while giving up four hits for two runs and striking out six. McQueeney was the hero of the day when, in the Friars' half of the eighth with two men out and the bases loaded, he smashed out a long grand slammer. The other Providence scores were two in the third, seventh and ninth and one in the fifth.


The high riding Friars returned to Hendricken Field on May 11th and barely nosed out their traditional rivals, Brown University, 2-1. Power led off the third with a double, advanced on Howe's single and tagged up and scored on Ryder's fly ball. Brown, however, tied the game up in the fifth. It remained then for Howe to come through with the deciding hit. In the top of the ninth, Kelley walked, was sacrificed to second by Buniva, moved to third on a wild pitch and came home on Howe's single.

Providence College entertained Clark University on May 14th and led by Grenier's potent bat, gained their eighth win of the campaign. Grenier smashed out four hits in four trips including a ninth inning homer with the bases empty. P. C. tallied once in the second but Clark equalled it in the top of the fourth. P. C. went ahead 3-1 in their half of the fourth and tallied one more in the fifth. In the sixth, Howe, Grenier, Drury and Power put their big bats to good use in providing four runs. The final tally came in the ninth. Drury, the winning hurler, had fifteen strikeouts to his credit.

Holy Cross, the 1952 National Intercollegiate Champions, defeated the Friars 7-1 at Fitton Field in Worcester on May 16th. Dobler tallied the single P.C. run in the top of the sixth when he walked, advanced to second on Whites single, took third on Howe's sacrifice and scored on Ryder's single to left. The mound staff of Mullins, O'Neil, and Buniva yielded five hits for four earned runs. Ronnie Perry, Crusader moundsman, did yeoman work in setting down the first fifteen Friars to face him. The Crusaders pushed two runs over in the first, four in the second and a single one in the eighth.

P. C. closed out its 1953 campaign on May 20th here at Hendricken Field. Capitalizing on three big innings, the Friars scored twice in the third and fifth and five in the fourth for a 9-3 win over Springfield College, to equal the season's series. Ryder with three for four, Howe with three for five and McQueeney with two for five, wielded the most potent bats. Reynolds led off the big fourth with a long double to center, Romberg walked, Power reached on an error, to load the bases. White walked, forcing in Reynolds. Ryder doubled in Romberg and Power and McQueeney singled scoring Ryder.





With the December first opener only a month away, Coach Vin Cuddy sounded the clarion for his 1953-54 edition of the annual Friar basketball production. Cuddy lacked the basic ingredient of the usual success formula, height, but he was gifted with a fast, experienced array, well tested in intercollegiate combat.

The curtain raiser was the first half of an appealing doubleheader dedicating the new Keaney Gymnasium at the University of Rhode Island, with P. C. doing their share of the honors against arch-rival, Brown. Displaying a fairly strong defense, plus a marked disregard for the old Brown nemesis, the relaxed Friars buried the Bruins in routine fashion, 75-61. Providence opened an early gap, maintained it, and coasted in the late going. Hank McQueeney, for four years the Friars' showman and crowd-pleaser, was the key figure in the destruction.

Though the easy victory over Brown came as a bit of a surprise, the subsequent 86-68 rout of Assumption was not so startling. The game with the outmanned Greyhounds was played in Woonsocket with the proceeds going to the building fund of the tornado-rayaged Worcester school.

The following evening at the Boston Garden the Black and White banner was raised against Rio Grande and their fabulous fisherman, Bevo Francis, highest scorer in collegiate annals. While the well-protected Francis was in the process of tying the Garden scoring mark with his 41 points and Newt Oliver was putting on his usual side-line show, the underpublicized Friars played one of the outstanding games of the season, ultimately bowing, 89-87. Although the Boston press chose to ignore it, Bobby Moran's 26 points against the Redmen's floating defense was probably the highlight of the evening. The inspired play of Jack Durkin was another key factor in the near-upset, although it was clearly a team effort.



chester, N. H. and their third game of the weekend. Playing past their endurance, but suffering from a visible letdown, the Friars dropped another heartbreaker, St. Anselm's enjoying the victor's role, 70-69.

Then our fortunes began to sink. A technical foul in the waning moments against Fairfield presented P. C. with a 71-69 victory in a poorly played encounter at Mont Pleasant. Three days later the boys were disposed of easily in the 11th Corps Armory in Brooklyn by a tall, talented St. Francis crew, 85-63. Then came the long-threatened shakeup. After an inadequate show against Springfield, during which the hapless Friars stumbled through the motions in losing 72-54, Cuddy shook the local gentry by benching his first seven, with the exception of the irreplaceable Moran. The Providence Fourth Estate promptly christened the new crew the "Sub Fleet," and the name clung for the rest of the season. While the once-regulars sat on the sidelines in an attempt to regain their shattered confidence, Bill Quinlan, Ted Tedesco, Walter Malecki, Don Moran, Larry Collamore, Charlie Aquavia and Gus Westerhuis battled their way to a one point win over St. Anselms. Cuddy reserved his veterans as a steadying influence in the highly popular victory. With the Fleet still performing the bulk of the chores, P. C. annihilated RPI, 94-71.

In their second Garden appearance of the season, the Friars moved to an early lead in the first half against St. Anselm's, but dissipated their advantage in the second canto. The Hawks tied things up in the closing seconds and won easily in overtime, 62-54.

But the victory train was only momentarily delayed, not derailed as was earlier feared. On Feb. 9th at the Mount Pleasant gym, Providence College shook the Plantations for the second year in a row by crushing Rhode Island, 101-81. Superlatives were exhausted in the description of this one, and the major share of the laurels fell on the shoulders of sophomore Teddy Tedesco, whose thirty-one point contribution completely reduced the stunned Rams. Old Faithful, Capt. Bobby Moran, quietly chipped in with twenty points of his own to help seal things. So once again, the Rams were on the receiving end of the outstanding performance of the season.

With the Rhody victory serving as a needed stimulant, P. C. disposed af three Maine colleges without any undue difficulty. Featured on their successful invasion of the bobsled circuit were wins over Gorham State, Colby and Bates by 92-67, 72-59, and 80-68, respectively. Tedesco continued to dominate Friar scoring, and his star was just climbing above the horizon when he suffered a severe ankle sprain in the Bates game thus forcing only spot duty thereafter. His loss was a near crippling blow.

Tommy Mullins and Hank McQueeney provided the only thrills as they combined for a few moments of trick and fancy

basketball in the 81-51 rout of Clark. Three days later the Friars ruined another Springfield Homecoming as they raced to their sixth win in a row by an 89-61 margin.

Vin Cuddy next displayed his wares in the dimly lit confines of the inadequate Boston College gym. While millions celebrated George Washington's birthday, the Eagles fought off the determined Friars, 86-83, in an extremely well played game. Providence turned in a fine hustling performance, and though it was in a losing cause, suffered no loss of prestige. Bobby Moran waged a personal attack against the Eagles in the second half and emerged with twenty-six points.

Showing entirely different form than they displayed at Kingston, Brown gained some measure of revenge for the previous debacle with a 68-64 win at the Marvel Gym. Some last minute clutch shooting by their record-breaking captain, Lou Murgo, gained them the verdict, but Providence showed plenty of heart in defeat, turning in a vastly improved performance. Some remarkable third quarter shooting by Tommy Mullins kept the Friars in contention in the thrill-packed meeting.

Upsala motored up from New Jersey and the Friars waited in ambush. Unloosening all their heavy artillery in an awesome barrage, they gained more than adequate revenge over the startled Vikings, winning handily, 88-66.

But without Tedesco's new found spark to ignite the flame, Providence wasn't up to it in the final two. Although staging several spurts of scoring in their second appearance in the Keaney Gym, the boys didn't get the breaks and were finally vanquished by the improved Rams. In the windup at Mount Pleasant Brown came out on top again in a monotonous encounter, easily handling the over-pressing Friars. While the Bruins were relaxed and confident, the Friars were tense, as their play clearly indicated, and fell once again in the over-played "Beat Brown" crusade.

The season was highlighted, perhaps, by Coach Vin Cuddy's courageous mid-season gamble with his untried bench. The rejuvenation was remarkable, and a major share of the credit must

go to the young Friar mentor for making the move in the first place.

Tributes are in store also for the departing warriors; Charlie Aquavia, Phil Lynch, Bill Quinlan, Tommy Mullins, Jack Durkin, Jack Reynolds, Hank McQueeney and Bob Moran. Little Charlie, the shortest Friar of them all, provided the spark on more than one occasion. Phil Lynch humbled many a high-scorer with his great defensive play, the best seen in this area. Bill Quinlan produced more than his share of points while seeing spot duty. Tommy was the Hawk, the hustler, and a prolific scorer. Durkin used his remarkable spring to advantage outrebounding many a taller foe. Reynolds rarely drew an opponent less than two inches taller than he, but his defensive work was outstanding. Hank will be among the last forgotten. Few have so captured the imagination of Providence fans. His appeal was tremendous, and he drew raves for his ball handling.

Enough can never be said for Moran, the greatest of them all. The quiet, personable court magician rewrote the Providence College record book, shattering old marks with every point he scored in the latter half of his senior year. Ballplayers like Bobby Moran come along once in a generation, but tribute must also be paid to him as a perfect exemplar of a Catholic gentleman. He has established himself as a P. C. immortal, and his name will be brought to mind every time the Black and White banner is unfurled.

With eight seniors gone, Cuddy will inherit a club short on experience but long on potential. Led by their hustling captain, Kenny Kerr, one of the few in the school's history to play four years of varsity ball, the young Friars could really go places. Kerr will be ably abetted by Donny Moran and Teddy Tedesco, both of whom showed considerable ability in the latter half of the season. With some height on the way from this year's freshman club, things don't look too dark at all.





The outlook for next year with no losses in sight from graduation is very good. The same team will be playing the same schedule and we are confident they will compile an impressive record.












