CLASS HISTORY

The year is nineteen fifty-two, September's here alas; We look about and this we think, "P.C.'s the Freshman Class."

. . . The early morning sky was aglow with an unearthly blaze of orange and red; there was no rain, there was no lightning, but there was thunder; all faces were turned to this sight, and all minds were consumed with the same thought; the Earth itself seemed possessed with some supernatural force and the unpronounced vibrations that claimed a violence ne'er before witnessed by this World of men gripped the very souls of all mankind; it was a day dedicated by a predetermining hand . . .

This could very well describe that day we came. It could, but for this: the sun was shining, it was warm, and the air was lazy. We were amused, bewildered, confident, doubtful, and equally fixed on gaining honors of individual jocundity and knowledge. We made friends quickly; some we kept, some we didn't. Most of us remember too readily the trying exercises of not only that first day, but also the similar tasks which we were obliged to endure during the four succeeding years. With this in mind, perhaps it would be more appropriate to consider only those things which were native to us as a social group, the good times we had together.

Down at Union Station, in one of the glass enclosures, there was a display depicting all phases of life at Providence College. In the Cowl, an article written about our class numbered us at 350 and declared the student-instructor ratio to be an amazing 13.9. Both statistical facts changed slightly by the time we left.

On Friday night of that first week, the Student Congress held a dance for our class, and thereby introduced us to one of P.C.'s most cherished traditions, the Friday-night stag. —But the dance served its purpose. Introductions came at the rate of about one per minute, and before the night was over, we were Friars.

The Cowl, realizing that we were a class of no mean talents, gave us a pictorial review in the first issue of the year. Paul Valentine had his picture taken with Father Slavin, and Dick Elston had his taken while being fitted for his ROTC uniform. Father McHenry was pictured in the center of that review. Considering both stress and strain, we all agree that, as Class Moderator, Father McHenry has given his all to the class.

Before we knew it, we were plunged into the buoyant activity of college life. In common, we all had Theology, English, and ROTC. Who will ever forget those humorous classes with Father Mahler? Theology taught to baseball analogies, Enh! Some of us had Mr. Thomson for English and couldn't have

prospered more. His choice examples of how colloquial terms can get took much from the burden of learning correct grammar and modern rhetoric. Freshman ROTC! Now there was a course! Capt. Kamaras and his horrifying cadre soon taught (most of) us the difference between our left and right feet. Tony Sion would walk off the drill field in complete disgust. He was the cadet behind Len Nannerone who used to march as if he were chasing golf balls.

Soon we were being approached by members of the various regional clubs. Some of us took the bait, but not enough. This apathy, fortunately, did not last the whole four years. As for the other clubs and activities, there wasn't much we, as Freshmen, could do. Perhaps the only outside activities that tasted our blood were the literary publications here on campus. Such names as Jim McLarney, Jim Renzi, Ron Colavecchio, Lou Warren, Charlie 'Curran, Dick Fogarty, and many others were to rise as outstanding examples in all the aspects of our literary world.

Then the Cowl printed some news that was to affect our stay here, in one way, probably more than any other single event. Father Prout was made Dean of Discipline. How many fifty-cent cigarettes have you had? Much to the amazement of many of us though, Father Prout has undoubtedly proved himself "The-Friend-of-the-Student" more times than not. And when not, even then he was.

At the same time, a man named Eisenhower started getting his name in the newspapers. Here on campus, the students, in a poll, deemed him better than Adlai by one vote. No doubt that happened because Dan Walsh was sick the day the balloting was done.

No sooner had our Freshman ROTC Class been integrated with the Cadet Regiment than the construction of our new Gym began. For a long time the only thing we saw was a large hole in the ground, but we all agreed it was worth waiting for. Later on, in the Spring, some of us even drilled in that hole. Much better to have the Gym there, no?

Our Freshman basketball team looked good. Such names as Don Moran, Ted Tedesco, and Larry Collamore were to continue shining for the next three years, though others, Gus Westerhuis and Walt Malecki, played a good deal of Varsity ball. In baseball, Bob Woods, Buzz Moore, and others helped P.C. to a fair season. In hockey, it was another story. The team was almost entirely composed of Freshmen, since the sport was not yet of Varsity status. Bobby Reall, Ed Monahan, Ed Hornstein,

Roscoe Sweeney, and Jack Hogan helped to bring the team not only to the Varsity status, but also to Eastern prominence. Track claimed Joe Steen, Willy Allen, and Joe Madden. Some of the more pugilistic of our class, yours truly included, joined the Boxing Club. Jim McMann, John Janitz, and Jerry Landry gave their untiring efforts to the sport and received just acclaim for their thrilling exhibitions.

On January 14, we had our first class elections. Mark DeNegre won the presidential post; Paul Quinn, the vice presidential post; Buzz Moore, the secretarial post; Jack Grady, the treasurer's post. That same day the Cowl posted the Semester Exam Schedule, and the honeymoon was over. Fifty-two Freshmen made the Dean's List, the rest, la liste noir.

With the second semester underway, we considered ourselves college veterans and began planning for our Freshman Dance. Phil Leonardi was General Chairman, and the Dance was a very successful one. Ralph Stuart provided the music, and Harkin's Hall the auditorium. May 8 . . . our first class dance.

Late in the semester the elections for the Student Congress were held. From our class we elected Paul Quinn, Dick Fogarty, Myles O'Connor, and Dan Walsh.

Soon it was May and exam time again.

A Year is gone, it's fifty-three, September's here once more; We grin at Frosh and this we think, "P.C.'s a Sophomore."

Our Sophomore Year. Our class standing took a beating this year. Election time came early in October, and our class had only one party running. With nine of us voting and there being just one party, the Cowl opened up a barrage that lasted for four issues. With the exception of Ronald Carrier who ran for Treasurer, the candidates were the same as those who had won the Freshman elections.

Almost in irony we held our Soph Hop on Halloween. With some very impressive decorating, Jim Renzi, Roland Hicks, and Dick Rice gave Harkins Hall a Parisian effect that included an Arc de Triomph. On the face of the Arc was written, "No Trucking"...Our second Class Dance.

Our courses were beginning to vary more now. English, Theology, and ROTC held their ground. In English it was the Essay and the Short Story. Many heads fell in the Essay Course, especially among the unlucky crew who had Father McGregor. An exacting man, Father McGregor. In Theology, it was Father McBrien this year. He is probably the most impassioned instructor we ever had, but he was humorous. Sophomore ROTC was a lot easier—they were setting the bait for the Advanced Course.

There would be a hiatus in the Class History if the names of two Sophomore instructors were omitted. The courses they taught were Logic and American History. Their names were Father Jerry Fallon and Mr. "Moon" Mullen. Father Fallon held a rather informal class. Mr. Mullen, however, was much sterner. He was the Boss. Who will ever forget the American History he taught us? Who will ever forget his classic references to the figures in our national history? "Dirty Chris Columbus," and "Persuasive" Peggy O'Neil, to mention a couple who will live on forever in our minds thanks to old Moon.

In sports, our class continued to contribute its share of athletes. Now, however, our representatives were on the Varsity squads and doing well. In the second half of the Basketball Season the starting team boasted two Sophomores, Donny Moran and Ted Tedesco. In hockey, men who played the previous year were proving that P.C. was a team to be respected. In baseball, Buzz Moore sparkled at third, while Bobby Woods led the team at bat. Bobby was injured by a pitched ball halfway through the season, and his loss was felt deeply by the team. Art Aloisio and Bob Reall scintillated in the outfield. Bill Allen, Joe Steen, and Joe Madden continued to pace the Track team through a good season.

Sophomore names began to infiltrate the lists of club officers, and the ground work for future elections was well under way. Students like Mike Victory, George Hickey, John Lowe, Jim Renzi, Dan Walsh, Bob Dugan, Ron Lovett, Joe Madden, Buzz Moore, Ron Sullivan, Ronald Hicks, Dan Harrington, and scores of others were working the various clubs and class projects and were to be repaid for their efforts by election in the next two years.

In what seemed like no time at all, it was exam time again and semester number three was behind us. The Dean's List was smaller, but that was to be expected. Early in the second semester of the year the ROTC department lost a man that had been a friend to all of us, Capt. Frank Ciolino.

Those of us who chose to go into the Advanced ROTC Course had to take a qualification examination and a physical. After both requirements had been filled, some eighty odd Sophs were registered for the course, and our non-combatant brothers gave us their laughter and their pity.

Soon it was time for Student Congress elections and two new names appeared on our Student Scene. We re-elected Paul Quinn and Phil Leonardi, but Myles O'Connor gave way to Dan Walsh and Joe Hagan.

Late in the semester, the Cowl reported the Administration's decision to revert to the five day week. Many of us supported the move at the time, but soon learned its disadvantages. It provided us with an opportunity to have Saturday jobs, but it also meant that late afternoon classes were a must. In the winter on a bad day we would arrive in the dark and leave in the dark. But, then again, we could say that about our whole college career, couldn't we?

And suddenly it was Spring and "Cram" time again. Where was the time going? We were happy now, though, for when we returned in September we would be Upper Classmen and would have more of a say in the events that we would be attending.

Another year, it's fifty-four, September starts to sing; There's spirit now, and this we think: "P.C.'s the Junior Ring."

No sooner had the Juniors begun than 17 names were entered in the race for Class Office. There was the Veracratic Party, the Unity Party, the Junior Action Party, the Junior Section Party, the Do-It-Right Party, and one Independent, Mo Orlando, who sought the post of vice president. The campaigning was well received by our class, and, for a while there, it seemed that the Empire State Building was at stake. 87% of the class voted and the margin of victory was close. After the dust had settled, the count showed that three of the four Veracrats had won. Jim Renzi was President, Ted Lynch was Vice President, and Ted Tedesco was Secretary. Mike Victory, the other Veracrat, lost to Ed Hornstein. When the elections were over, and the candidates in office, the true Christian became manifest as each defeated candidate was included in the plans of all class functions for the year.

Almost immediately after the elections, the College announced the Progress Fund. Who will ever forget the "Flying Squadrons" of Father McKenna? Again the class showed its spirit by contributing more man hours than any other class. Every time Father McKenna needed someone to lick envelopes or stamps or fold letters, he came to us. It meant a few pingpongless afternoons, but it was worth it.

Late in October the Major Committee heads were named. Lou Warren and Mike Victory were made Co-Chairmen of the Junior Prom. Paul Fournier and Dan Walsh were to head the Junior Talent show. Hank Cushing and Dick Gleason were Ring Committee Chairmen. Ed Monahan and Jack Hogan were to supervise Junior Prom Weekend. Ron Sullivan and his little literary side-kick had the informal dance.

Then it was the 13th of December. The place was the Providence Arena. The event was the P. C.-Brown Hockey game. P. C. won, 5-2. Bob Reall, Roscoe Sweeney and Ed Monahan each had one goal and together constituted the margin of victory. Probably the only thing that could shadow this victory would be an outstanding upset on the part of the P.C. sextet. So, in the last weekend of February, the team disregarded Horace Greeley's famous advice and traveled North to deliver the greatest upset of the year by defeating Clarkson, 4-3. Ed Monahan

scored three goals with the assistance of Bob Reall and other teammates, but the big difference of the night was the fabulous goal-tending of Ed Hornstein. Ed had the amazing total of 63 saves in that game, and 20 of them came in the second period when Clarkson received its only scores.

The basketball team had its good night, too. For the first time in three years, with Donny Moran's and Ted Tedesco's help, we beat Brown. On the same weekend that our Pucksters beat Clarkson, the Friar Five journeyed down to U.R.I. and walloped our "Devoted" rivals on their own soil for the first time in 16 years. That weekend was very adequately recorded in the Cowl as the "Golden Weekend of Providence College Athletic Annals."

During the year, in its several editions, the Alembic became almost solely a collection of the works of one man. Jim McLarney was responsible for the school magazine being published at all and continued to be its main support. There was no surprise to read in the Cowl that he had been chosen Editor of both the Alembic and the Veritas. A one man mountain of literary endeavors, Jim McLarney.

In February, the Cowl was passed to Jim Renzi, and he rightly deserved the post. Jim has probably done more for our class—his extra-curricular activities being of such a diversified nature—than any other '56 graduate. Jim deserves our praise.

For instructors this year, Theology and Philosophy had the crew. Who will ever forget old Father "Buy the Summa" Ryan? Despite all the jesting that was done, it is agreed that Father Ryan gave, though expensively, probably the best course in our college career. In Philosophy, Father "You See" McCormack added much to the Cafe discussions because of his varied mannerisms. He asked a question, some one would answer, and he'd make that bat-swinging motion, sending the answer flying out the window.

On St. Patrick's Day the Junior Talent Show was performed in Harkins Hall. A fair audience had a thoroughly enjoyable evening. As the months passed, the Prom drew closer. The Biltmore Hotel was chosen for the locale, and Hal McIntyre was signed to provide the music. The Dance took place on April 29, as if any of us could forget. The highlight of the evening was the crowning of the Queen, Ed Lynch's date, Marie Duggan.

Late in the semester, more honors befell some of the members of our class. Twenty-six Juniors were named to Delta Epsilon Sigma Fraternity. Twelve of the Juniors in the ROTC were awarded DMS's. The elections for the Student Congress were notable. Dan Walsh defeated Bob Dugan for the Presidency, while Ron Lovett slid easily into the Vice Presidency. As Vice President, Ron became the nominal head of the Freshman Class during our Senior Year, his College-life-time ambition. Another year was coming to a close, and the Cowl was posting the Exam Schedule again. Exams weren't so bad that May; we had our rings.

And now it's nineteen fifty-five, September wears a frown; We're happy now, but now we're sad, P.C.'s the Senior's gown.

Watch out, we're Seniors now. We have a new Gym, a new Lounge, and for goodness sake! a Cafeteria with tables and CHAIRS! The first day back is great. Everybody is talking about the new Gym. Everybody but the three-score veterans of "Operation Fort Bragg." These are the Senior ROTC students. From 25 June to 5 August 1955 they had fulfilled their Summer Camp obligation with the Army. North Carolina in the hottest months of the year . . . and it was hot . . . it is like P.C. during exam time, unbearable. "Combat" veterans, they all have war stories to tell, and there isn't a day goes by that one isn't told. But they're a fraternal group, the ROTC, all brothers in the greatest fraternity in the world, THE UNITED STATES ARMY. At least that's what they told us at camp. On our return, the ROTC Dept. posted the choice of the different cadet posts as a result of summer-camp performances. Mike Victory was Regimental Commander; Paul Pothin, Ed Monahan, and Jerry Landry were Battalion Commanders. With us now in command, Tuesday drills took on a new aspect. We were training instead of being trained.

Soon it was election time again. The campaigning wasn't quite as vigorous as it was in the Junior year. Again Jim Renzi was elected President, defeating Bill Barrett by a very few votes. For Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer, we elected Buzz Moore, Bob "Daddy" Woods, and Bill Barnes. The Farmers' Festival, the first social event of the year, the class officers appointed Ron Sullivan to head the affair. Eddie Zack, the Eddy St. cowpoke, sent his orchestra to Harkins Hall, and our Hoe-down was had. Don Fandetti's cow was the hit of the night. The only portion left lacking was the usual pie-eating contest. The rumor was that the faculty had blueberry pie that evening. At any rate, we couldn't find the pies for the contest.

For those of us in the ROTC, another both happy and sad affair was the testimonial stag dinner, given in honor of Col. Roy P. Moss, retiring PMS&T. It was sad in that we had all grown so very fond of the "Old Man." In the years that we all put into the ROTC, Col. Moss had never failed us in confidence, advice, guidance, good Southern humor, or any quality mentionable. May this class history serve as an infinite testimonial to the admiration and love we all feel for that great man.

Our courses were pretty well specialized by now, and each course had its set of "individual" instructors. In Political Science, Father Mahoney was getting tougher, but his classes remained as humorous as ever. In the Business Course, Mr. Breen's classes were rivaling Fr. Mahoney's, and in Sociology Fr. James maintained his "personalized" instruction. In Theology Fr. McBrien was back. Fr. McCormack taught the other Theology class and continued to bat answers out Harkins Hall's windows.


John Lowe and his Friar's Club came up with the great idea of combining the Friars' Formal and Alumni Homecoming into a weekend affair, and thus originated Homecoming Weekend. The Weekend was planned for December 2, 3, and 4. On the second, the dances took place. On the third, in the afternoon there was an undergraduate-alumni dance. Later on, there was a testimonial dinner for "The Fabulous Five of '29"—that all-American pat team-and then the opening game of the Basketball season. This was the first game in the new Gym, and it was with our good friends from Brown. The Gym was packed; over 3,500 people watched us beat our rivals, 71-55. Donny Moran, Larry Collamore, and Ted Tedesco helped to pace our spirited team to that important victory. The week-end was the happiest ever spent at P.C. for many of us. It was, no doubt, for Ron Sullivan, His date, Miss Anne Wall of Boston College, was elected the first Homecoming Queen and ruled the Campus for those glorious days. Just in time for the Homecoming Weekend, 25 Seniors were elected to Who's Who.

After the Weekend P.C.'s Hockey Team scored another one of its major upsets in Boston. They engaged Harvard, the East's number two team, in a thrilling overtime game. With Ed Monahan and Ed Hornstein, playing their usual fine game, they left the ice victorious. Final score: 5-4.

More Senior names were appearing in the Cowl for different events. Marty Butler kept the Debating Team on the victory trail, while John Janitz led the Rifle Team into an unbeaten (so far) season. For the first time in many years the Pyramid Players put on a non-musical production, Stalag 17, in which Seniors Dan Walsh and Lou Verchot gave outstanding performances. The play was a smash hit.

Right now it is December 14, and the deadline for this History of the Class of 1956 is one day away. As to what will happen from now until June, you will have to save your Cowls to remember. We will have all the things which go along with a graduating class, but alas! what we will not have, once we leave this happy place, is a chance to have done better. But everything happened for the best . . . and we are the best.

BASEBALL

In the midst of March winds and April showers, over thirty hopeful candidates fought for a spot on Coach Harold Martin's 1955 varsity baseball team.

Thin pitching, a common problem of college coaches, confronted Coach Martin. This caused the switch of Captain Jerry Romberg from second to the mound. He joined seniors Tom McAleer and Tom Army in that department. Two second year pitching hopefuls were Herb Hearne and Jim Coates.

Promising sophomore fly-chasers Mike Mc-Donough, Paul Regan, and Jack Healy, infielder Bob Gulla, and catcher Tom Cahill were the top rookies. Returning veterans were Bob O'Connell, Dick Howe, "Buzz" Moore, Bernie Landry, Bill Slattery, Bob Reall, and Bob Woods.

On April 15 the lid was off in an exhibition at Quonset against the Flyers. Trailing 4-3 going into the sixth, the Black and White downed the Flyers with an eight run outburst, highlighted by first baseman Dick Howe's homer and bases loaded double. Captain Romberg and Tom Army shared the flinging chores, with the latter allowing only two hits and two unearned runs in the three innings he worked. Darkness caused the game to be called after six innings with an 11-6 decision for P.C.

Next week the regular season opened with the Gymnasts of Springfield College taking the Friars over the hurdles with a 14-1 drub-

bing. In the first, wildness on the part of the Friar pitching saw the Gymnasts count with nine runs. Springfield ace Joe Sanford and Joe Martin teamed up to force the Black and White to hit on the ground with Sanford allowing only one hit in the five innings he worked. "Buzz" Moore averted a whitewash job by scoring on an infield out.

Friday marked the home opener when P.C. unloaded a sixteen hit bombardment, which ended in a 14-5 romp over the Bates Bobcats. Sophomore Tom Cahill, making his first varsity start behind the plate, banged out four hits and drove in four runs to lead the victorious attack. Tom Army, relieving Jim Coates on the mound in the sixth, was the pitching star of the day as he gave up only one hit and retired eleven out of the next twelve Bobcats to face him.

Another day another sophomore shined. This was rookie Herb Hearne, who allowed only four hits in taming the University of Bridgeport 8-1. He was the first Friar to go the route in the young season and contributed to the twelve hit attack with a pair of bunt singles.


On May 2 Boston College came from behind to hand the Black and White their second loss, 5-4 in ten innings. Tom Army was in command until the ninth when three walks forced in the tying run for the Newton Eagles. The deciding tally was scored by Dick Lucas when he went across the plate on Jack Scannell's single.

Back home at Hendricken Field, on a rainy day Brown outlasted a seven run fifth inning rally and set down P.C. by a 12-10 count. Senior Dick Howe made the fielding gem of the afternoon with a barehanded catch at the gateway sack. Doubles by Bob O'Connell

and Bob Gulla and a triple by Tom Army highlighted the seven run fifth when Bruin starter Harry Josephson was sent to the showers. Frank Rego finished up for the College Hill nine.

Up at Worcester, a Holy Cross array took full advantage of six hits and five Friar errors to subdue Coach Martin's forces 8-4. Starter Tom McAleer's loss of control in the fourth contributed to the downfall as well as Holy Cross's ace flinger Ron Cote, who didn't allow a hit in three and one-half frames. On the brighter side, shortstop Bob Woods ended a batting slump with a two-run double, and Tom Army went two for two with a single and a double.

The Friar squad journeyed down to Kingston the following week for a doubleheader with the Rams of Rhode Island. In the opener Herb Hearne and Ray Peltier hooked up in a twelve inning pitching duel, which the Rams pulled out on Jack Leach's triple and Pete DeMasi's squeeze bunt. The Friars got two runs in the first before Peltier held them scoreless the rest of the way. State was only given three hits, but P.C. lost the heartbreaker 3-2. Sophomore Ray Peltier started the night-cap in an iron man attempt, but had to retire after two innings with a blister on his knuckle. Al Clegg took over for State and limited the Black and White to two hits for the remainder of the game. Tom McAleer had very good control, but had the misfortune of being outpitched as the Friars were blanked 4-0.

Breaking a five-game losing streak, P.C. avenged an earlier loss to Boston College as Tom Army went the route for a 5-3 victory. The Martinmen got off to a five-run first inning and coasted the rest of the way as Tom

Army improved in the heat of play. Bob Woods led the hitting attack with three base hits.


Another reversal of a previous defeat found Coach Martin's charges blasting twelve hits for a 14-10 triumph over Springfield College. Leading the attack was third sacker "Buzz" Moore, who homered with the bases loaded, and right-fielder Bill Slattery, who went four for five at the plate. Herb Hearne, relieving Tom McAleer in the seventh, picked up the win for the Friars.

Up on College Hill a pinch single by Bob Stevens of Brown in the last of the eleventh drove in the winning tally as P.C. bowed 5-4. Catcher Cahill led the Black and White offense in a losing cause with two hits. Jim Coates pitched well in relief, but errors gave the Bruins the ball game.

Boston University routed Tom Army with five runs in the eighth frame, after he blanked the Terriers for a seven inning duration and went on to a 5-3 win. Art Aloisio collected three hits, and Mike McDonough and Tom Cahill got two each, leading the offensive attack for the Providence College nine.


Timely hitting produced nine runs in a home game against American International College as P.C. came from behind for a 9-8 decision. A.I.C. got five in the first, and the fighting Friars came back with five in the second, highlighted by Tom Army's three bagger. Purple onslaught with two homers. For the Black and White Bob Woods, "Buzz" Moore, and Mike McDonough collected three hits each in a losing cause. Ron Cote, Crusader mound ace, put the "Friar Fire" out for the second time this season in relief.

In the final, on May 21, sophomore right-hander Jim Coates of Medford pitched Providence College to its first no-hit, no-run game in over a quarter of a century. The last Friar to do this was Eddie Wineapple, a southpaw, who turned the trick in 1928 against Lowell Textile. This time the victim was Brandeis University, which fell by a 5-0 count. The Judges' starter, Harry Stein, gave up only four base hits, but six errors hurt him. Errors or no errors, it was Jim Coates' day and the greatest season closer any baseball team could ask for. Aiding Jim was fine fielding by the Friar infield and catcher Tom Cahill, who hit a homer.

And so, winding up the 1955 season with a seven won, nine lost record, a young P.C. baseball team concluded the year with an answer to the dream of every pitcher and coach, a no-hit, no-run game. The climax was especially pleasing to Coach Harold Martin, who finished his coaching career at Providence College with this game.

Despite the shortcomings of the past spring, the FRIARS OF PROVIDENCE COLLEGE can look forward with optimism to a veteran team as well as some promising young sophomores for the 1956 campaign.




During November the team tried to gear itself for a hard schedule that included several of the nation's top teams.

On December 3 the big season got under way. As the highlight of Homecoming Weekend, the Friars entertained our crosstown rival, Brown University. The boys from Smith Hill proved to be poor hosts and defeated the Bruins 71-55 in a very historic game. Mulaney's two platoon tactics were too much for the Bruins. John Ritch was high scorer with 12 points and the scoring really was spread out.

Before the game Providence College's greatest team, that of 1928-29, was presented to the full house of 3200.

We travelled down to the U.R.I. campus and bowed to the Rams 84-75 in a very hectic game. Mike Pascale led the scoring with 26 points. Sophomore Lionel Jenkins played very well and tossed in 17 points.

Another trip proved fatal as we lost to Assumption 60-57. The small court hurt the Friars, but it was the Greyhounds' hustle that made the difference. It was the first time in their series of 29 games that the Friars came





62-61 in a game that had the fans buzzing as the lead constantly changed hands. "Whiz" Grady's two free throws with 40 seconds left to play were the winning points.



Saturday night, February 11, will long be remembered by the 1800 persons who attended the game as one of the most heated and controversial games ever witnessed on





Ed Hornstein opened the cut over his eye, received in the previous night's fracas, and had to leave the game.

P.C. salvaged some glory in the tourney by defeating Tufts at Lynn on December 29, 10-7. Paul Sainato, the Friars' bright spot, netted the hat trick in the first period, but it failed to hold up against the high-scoring Jumbos. The old pros Reall, Gorman, and Monahan had to salt the verdict away in the final chapter.

The advent of a new year continued to

bring defeats to Coach Rondeau's charges as our arch-rivals, the Brown Bears, were the victors in an Auditorium clash with a score of 7-3. Brown jumped off to a quick lead, and then set up a brilliant defense to restrain the frustrated efforts of the Smith-Hillers.

Harvard continued to keep us in the doldrums with a vengeful decision of 5-4. The Rondeaumen held a commanding 4-1 lead with seven minutes remaining in the game, when suddenly the dam burst. Two of the four Harvard goals, scored while the Friars were a man short, provided Harvard with a winning margin. Bob Reall paced P.C. with a pair of brilliant scoring efforts.

The depression reached its lowest ebb on January 14 when a tight Friar defense suddenly blew up in the middle stanza, and the Yale Bulldogs ran up an easy 10-3 romp in a New Haven arena clash.

After two weeks of exams the boys returned to action on January 31 against Boston University at the Boston Garden, Eddie Monahan, the Rondeaumen's ace scorer, stamped himself one of the greatest lamp-






TRACK

The 1955 edition of the Providence College cross country team opened their new season with a second place performance in a triangular meet with West Point and St. John's. The Cadets captured first place with a total of 39 pts., followed by the Friars with 45 and St. John's with 47. 




Boston University was the next victim of the Friars, falling by the wayside 26-31. Hanlon was the first runner home with Boucher sec-
