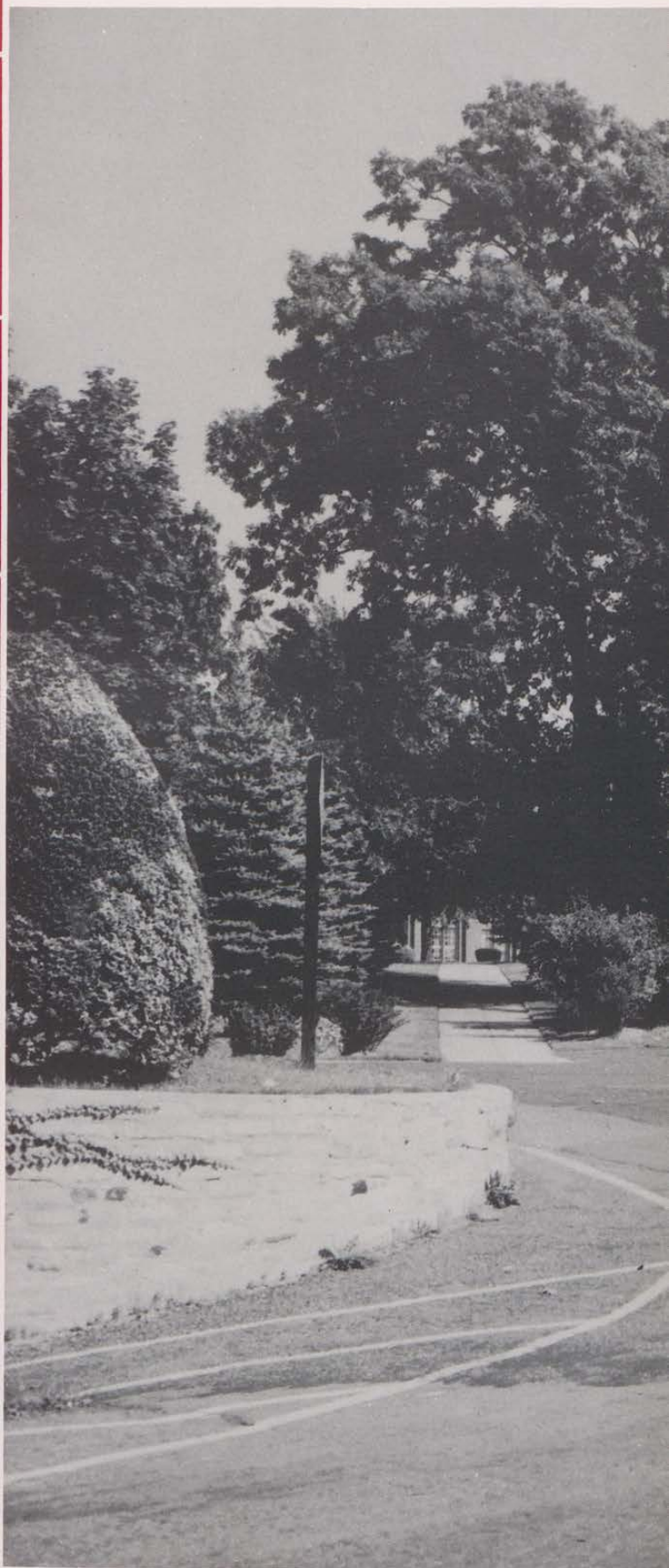
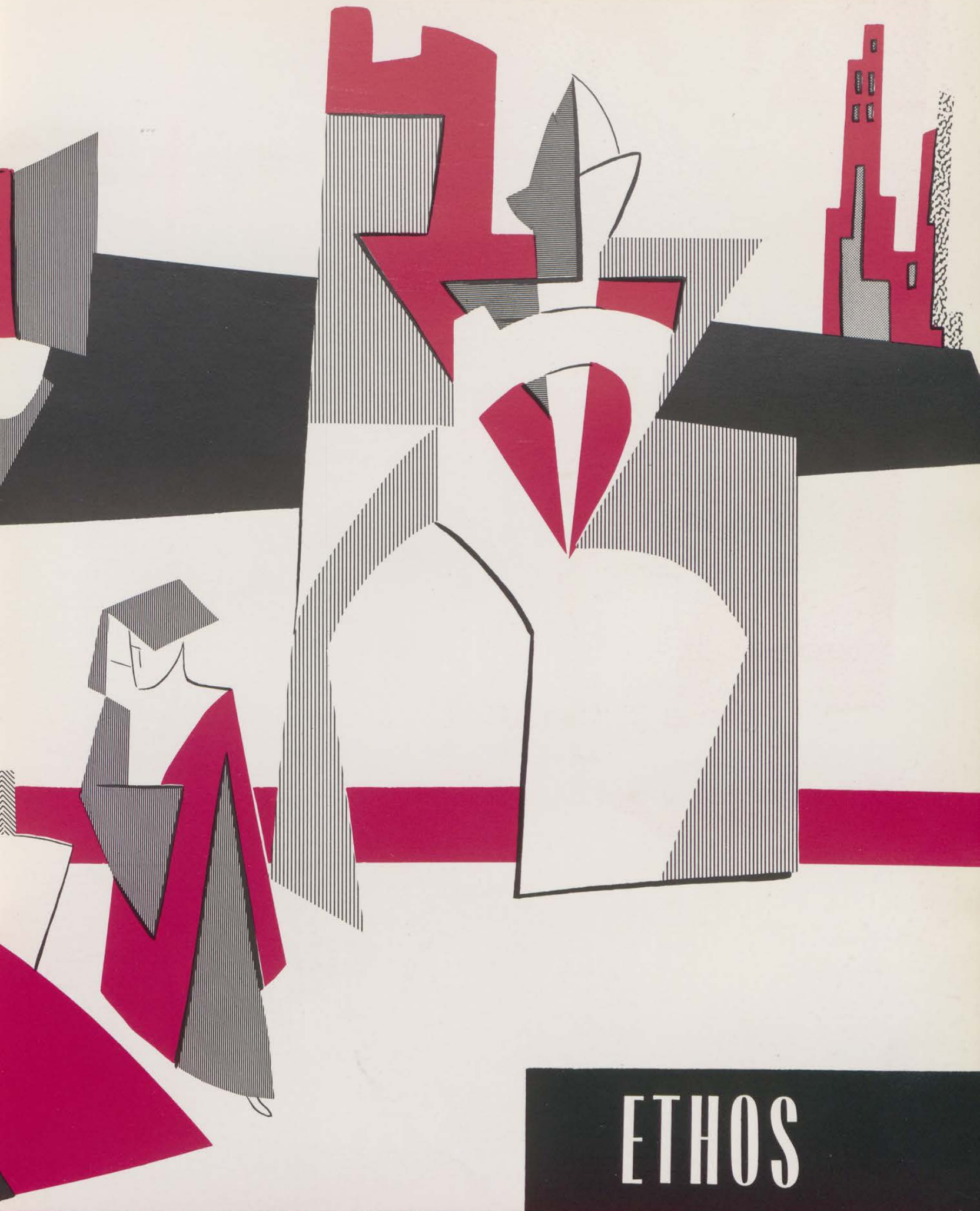


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ETHOS

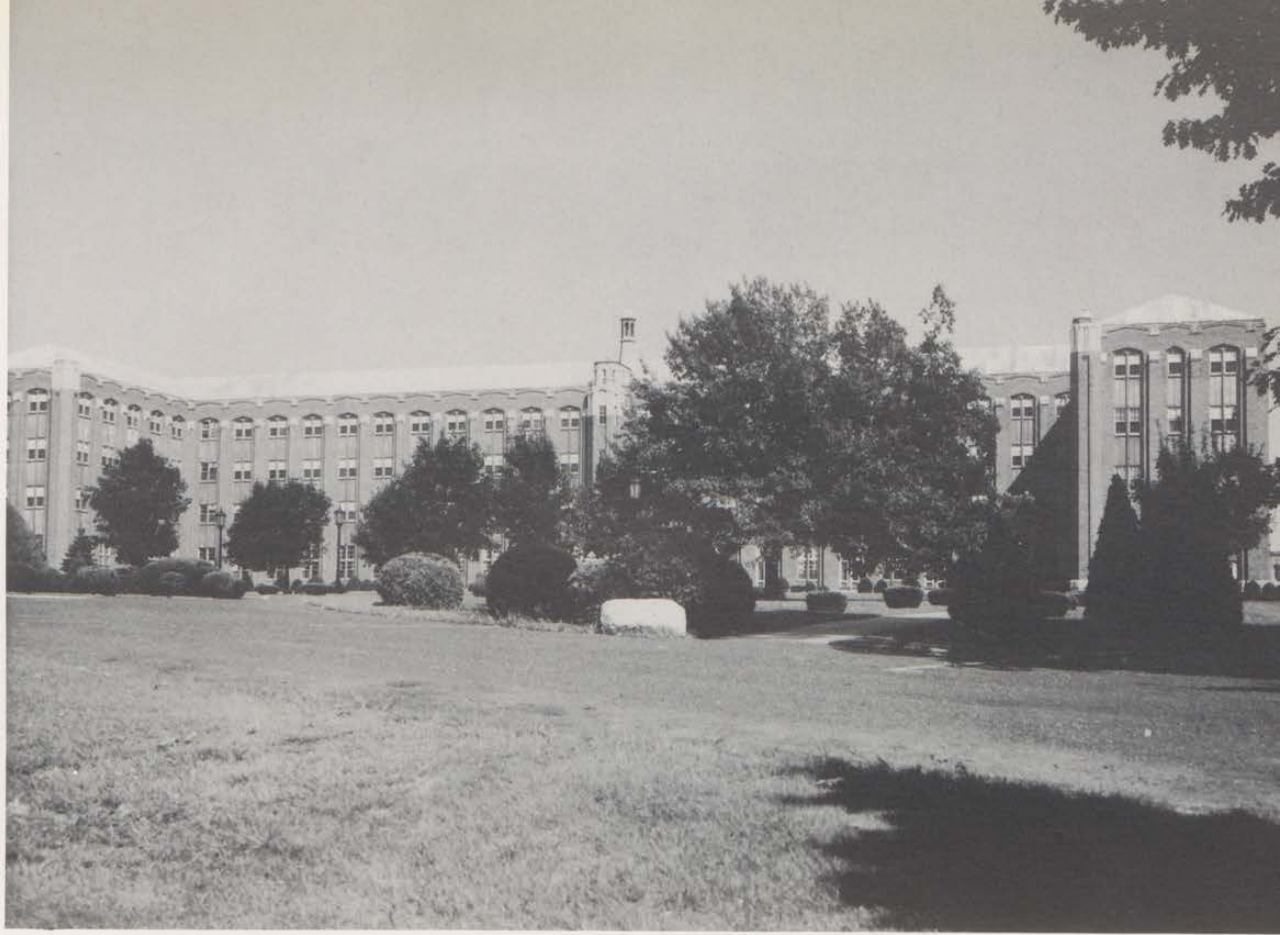
What is the ethos of a college?

The tie must be selected carefully if we are to impress the prof with our conservative taste.



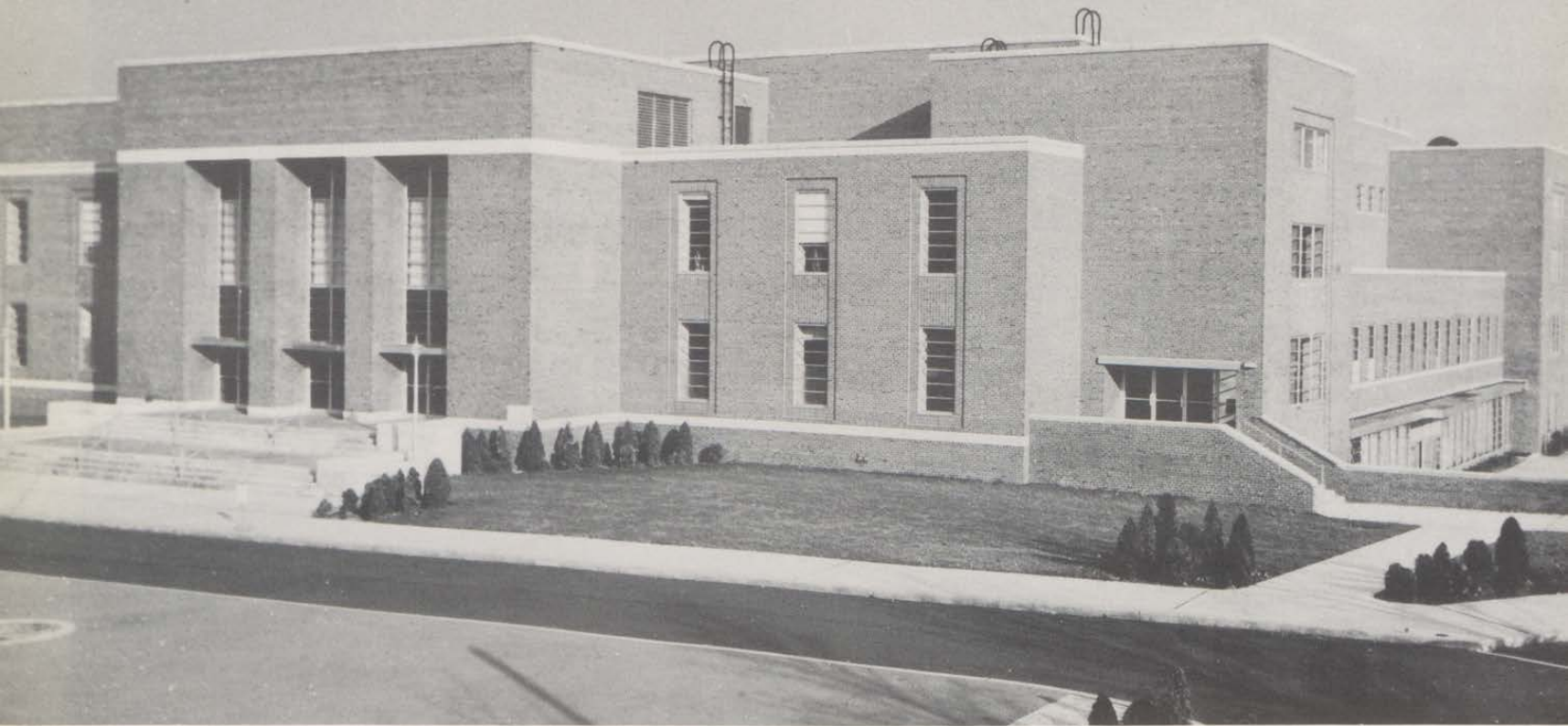

Mementoes of past victories of the College are surveyed by Monogram Club President Tom Cahill and two fellow members.



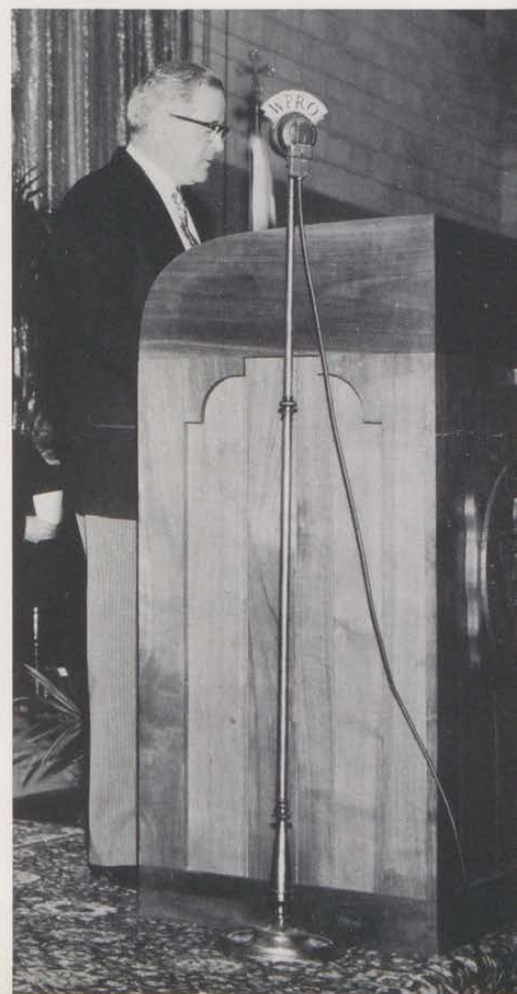

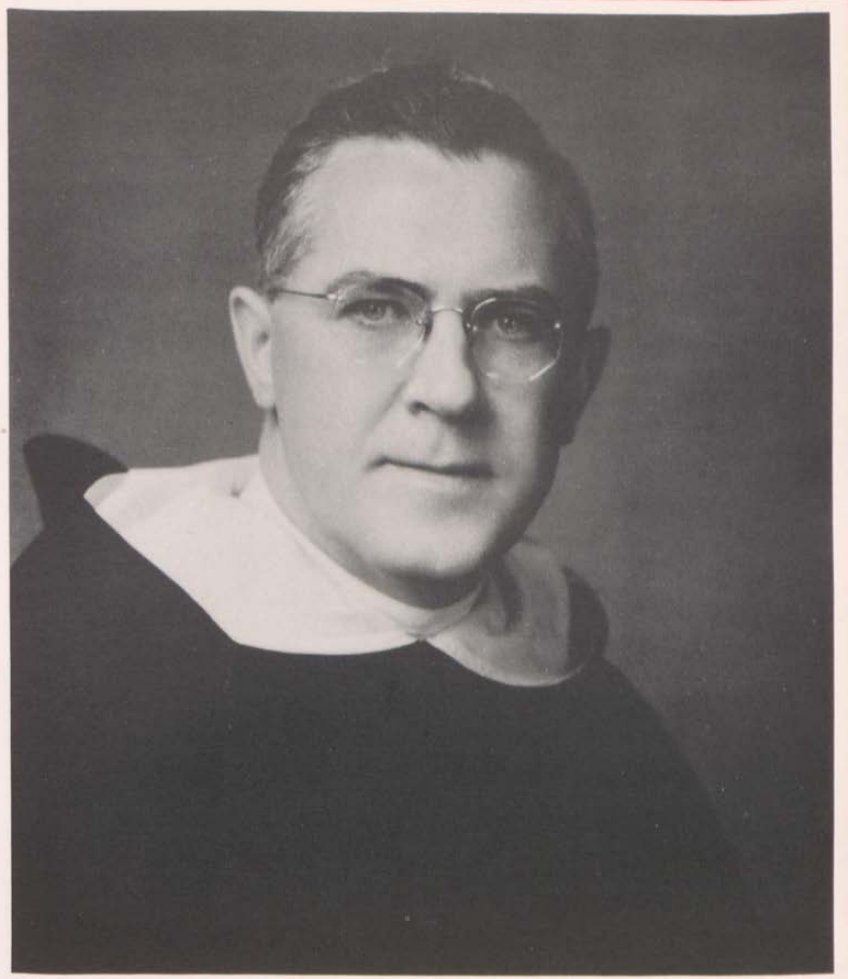

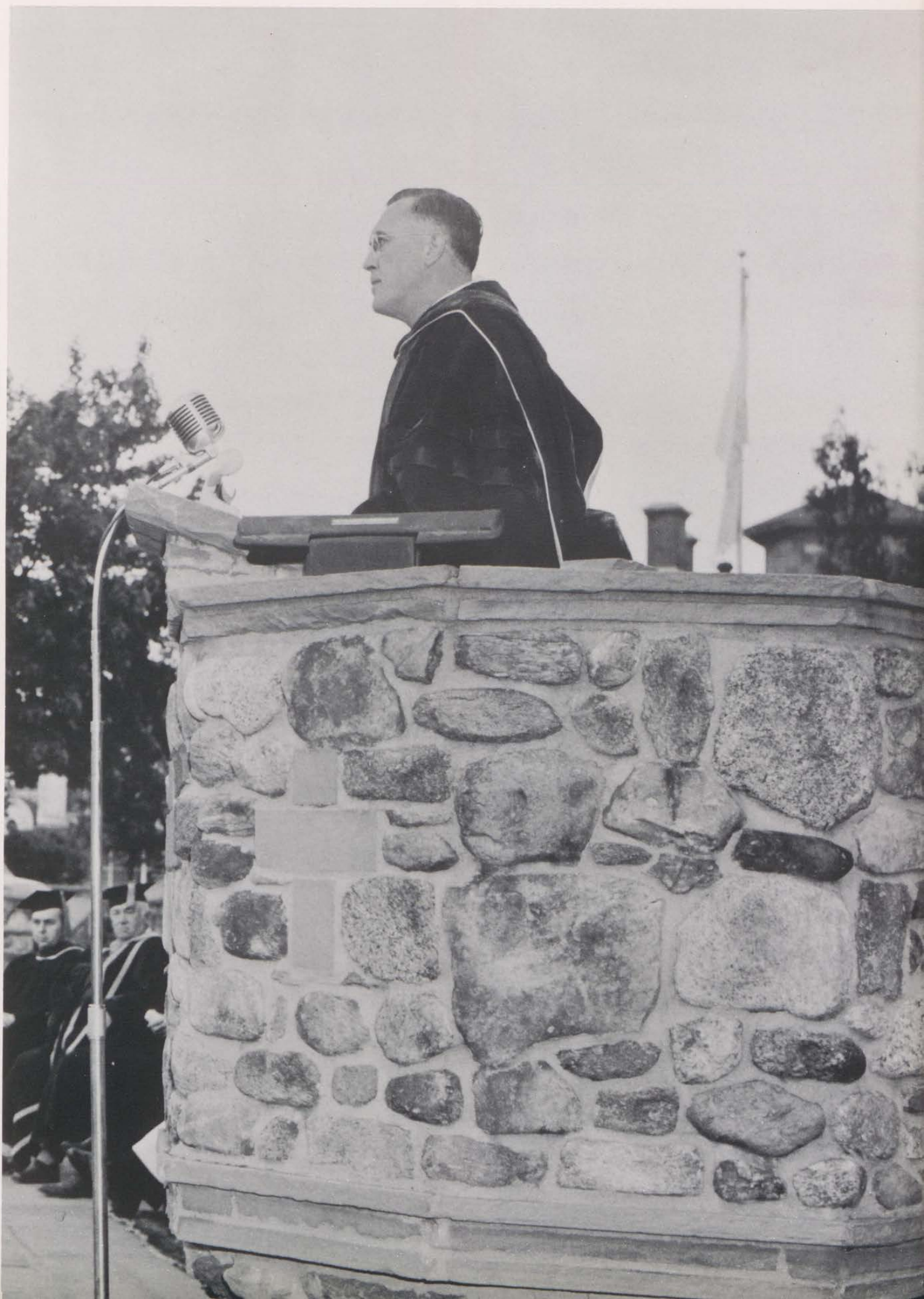

ADMINISTRATION

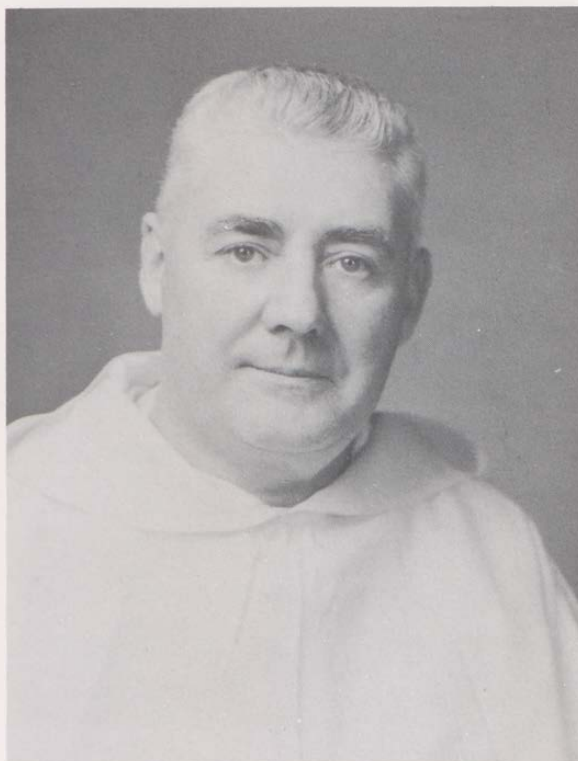
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The President of Providence College, the Very Reverend Robert J. Slavin, O.P., S.T.M., Ph.D., Sc.D., L.L.D., D.H.L., has been appointed to an indefinite term as President of the College by the Very Rev. William D. Marrin, O.P., Provincial of St. Joseph's Province, because of the advances made under his leadership since his original appointment in 1947.

A national figure in Catholic education, Father Slavin has taught at Catholic University and has received the Master of Sacred Theology degree, the highest academic degree granted by the Order.

ADMINISTRATION

The Academic Vice President of the College is the Rev. Vincent C. Dore, O.P., S.T. Lr., Ed.D., L.L.D. He is also the Dean of Studies and the Superior of the Dominican Community. A member of the Faculty since 1931, Father Dore has been instrumental in advancing the reputation of the College in academic circles. 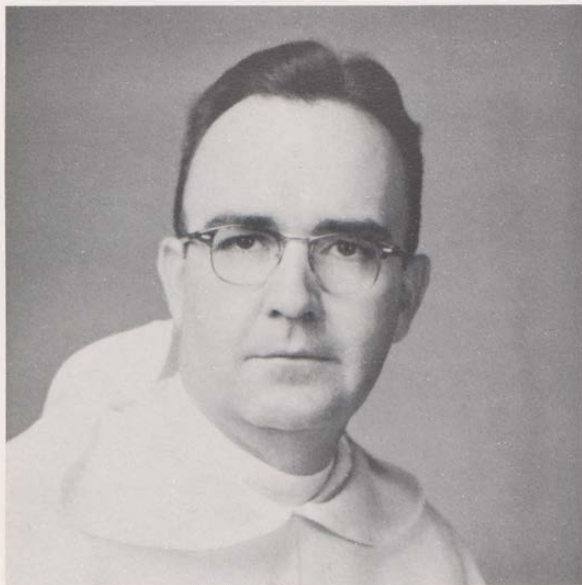

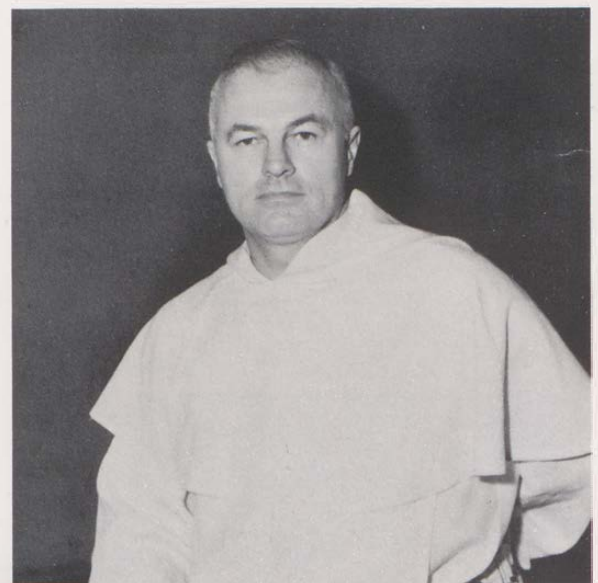

THEOLOGY



The Rev. Joseph S. McCormack, O.P., Head of the Department, is a holder of the Doctor's degree in Sacred Theology. He is a well-known lecturer throughout New England.

Through his lectures, the Rev. David A. O'Connell, O.P., presents to the layman the fundamental precepts of Thomistic doctrine. Using his experiences as a teacher and lecturer, he has written a textbook for those beginning the study of Aquinas.



The Rev. Walter D. Hughes, O.P., is the author of *The Gifts of the Holy Ghost* and *Swift Victory*, published in 1955. He has contributed to the *Thomist*, the *Angelicum*, and other periodicals.



Now completing work for a doctorate at Ohio State University, the Rev. Louis A. Ryan, O.P., is both a sociologist and a theologian. He is especially interested in social justice and is a member of the American Sociological Society.



The Rev. Edward A. Vitie, O.P., is a theologian and a student of American history. As Moderator of the Senior Class, he is chiefly concerned with the production of the *Veritas* and the arrangement of Commencement Week activities.



In order that he may expound the doctrines of St. Thomas with perception, the Rev. William M. O'Beirne, O.P., has followed the example of his praeceptor and devoted much time to the study of Sacred Scripture. His lectures are characterized by scriptural example and allusion.

In addition to his instruction of the undergraduates, the Rev. Lloyd A. Mahler, O.P., is also active in the education of the religious and laity of the diocese by his participation in the School of Adult Education and by his teaching of the Sisters of Mercy at Bayview.



It is the task of the Rev. Vincent McHenry, O.P., to introduce the freshmen to the genius of St. Thomas Aquinas. For this task he has been prepared by his studies which led to the degrees of Lector and Licentiate of Sacred Theology.



The Rev. James T. Sullivan, O.P., not only teaches theology and philosophy, but is also the Sub-Director of Guzman Hall, the residence of the Dominican pre-ecclesiastical students.



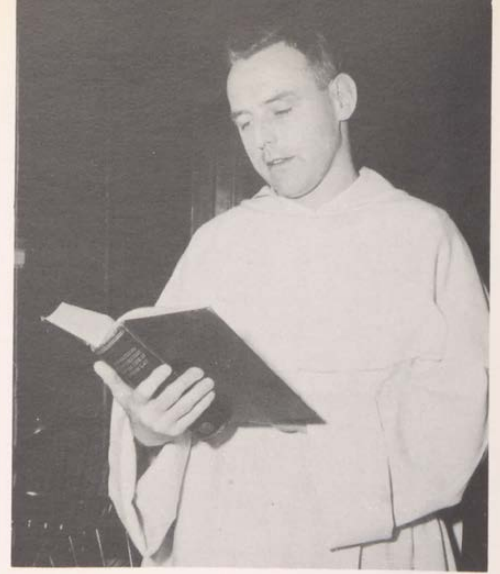

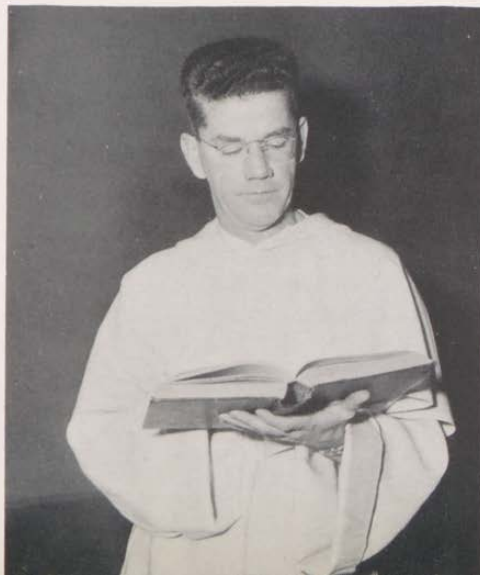

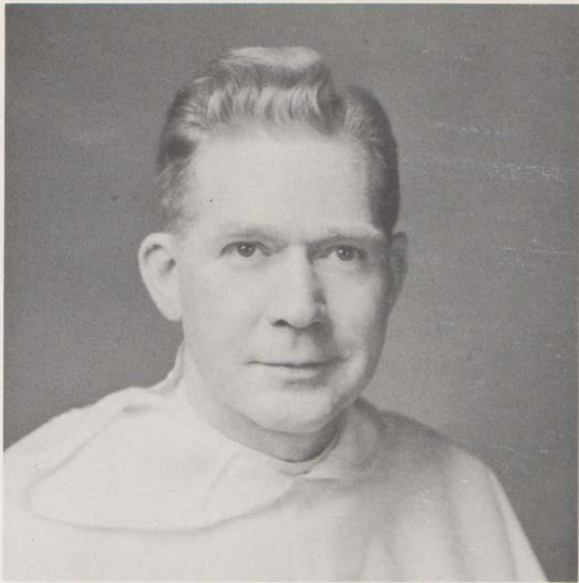

Dr. Paul van K. Thomson, a graduate of Columbia University, received his Ph.D. from Brown University. A well-known lecturer on behalf of Catholic Action, he is an authority on the life and works of the English poet Francis Thompson.

The Rev. John B. Larnen, O.P., the author of several plays and a member of the Blackfriars Guild, promotes an interest in the drama on campus by supervising the productions of the Pyramid Players. As a scholar he is chiefly interested in the nineteenth century British drama and Irish history. He is also Moderator of the *Cowl*.

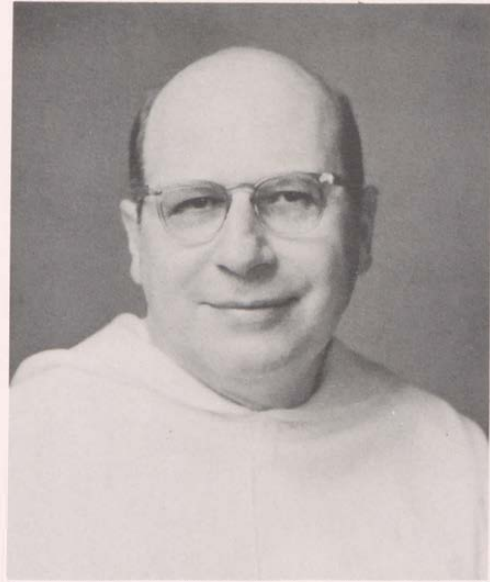

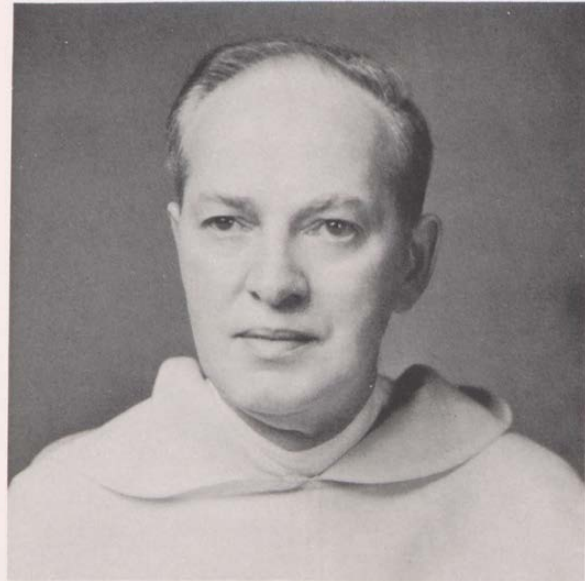

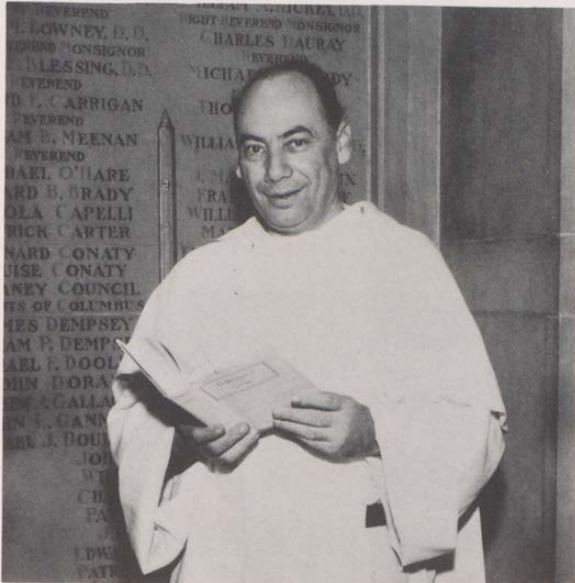
LANGUAGES



The Acting Head of the Foreign Languages Department is the Rev. Edward H. Schmidt, O.P. During his recent sojourn in Germany he purchased many volumes to enrich the library's holdings in German literature, history, and philosophy.



A recent appointment to the Faculty, Mr. Zygmunt J. Friedeman has studied at the Goethe Institute, Boston University, and Brown University. He is a student of both German literature and political science.



A Professor of German, the Rev. Herman D. Schneider, O.P., is also the Assistant Athletic Director of the College and has contributed greatly to the success of the hockey team. He is also Moderator of the Friars Club, our official host.



The Rev. Leo S. Cannon, O.P., a Professor of French, is also the Director of the Glee Club, a post he has held since 1937. He is nationally known as a director and has been guest conductor of the choral groups at the National Shrine of St. Jude.



The Rev. Raymond B. St. George, O.P., is completing his first year as a member of the Foreign Language Department. He is a Professor of French. He is the Director of the ROTC Band and the Assistant Director of the Glee Club.



The Chairman of the French Section, the Rev. Dominic L. Ross, O.P., is a student of French literature. His special interest is the historical origin and development of the French language.



The Rev. Edward A. McDermott, O.P., is a Professor of French Language and Literature. He is also the Moderator of the Veridames, a society composed of the mothers, wives, and sisters of the students and alumni of the College.



M. Jean Drans received his *Les Lettres* at the Sorbonne. During his years at the College he has emphasized the value of mimesis and memory in the study of language. M. Drans is a firm advocate of the direct method of language study.

Dr. Salvatore G. Scotti has studied in Rome where he received his D.Chem. degree. In his courses in the Italian language he attempts to develop in his students an appreciation of the poet Dante. For over a year Dr. Scotti has conducted his own radio program at the request of the College. This program is a discussion of various aspects of Italian culture.





The Rev. Anthony A. Jurgelaitis, O.P., S.T.Lr., Litt.D., has studied the linguistics of both the Slavonic and the Romance languages. At present he is studying Russian and teaching Spanish in cooperation with the educational television program of WJAR-TV. He is also the Moderator of the Camera Club.



Having done advanced study in Florence, the Rev. John C. Rubba, O.P., Litt.D., is a translator of Spanish works and the author of several pamphlets on the purpose of the Third Order of St. Dominic. He is also the Moderator of a flourishing Third Order of St. Dominic group.

An alumnus of the College, Mr. William Viviani has returned to the Department of Foreign Languages after completing advanced study at Brown University. Mr. Viviani is an instructor in Spanish.



Appointed to the Faculty in September of 1956, the Rev. Joseph B. Taylor, O.P., is a Professor of Spanish and Education. Prior to his appointment, he held an administrative position at Aquinas College High School. He is Moderator of the Spike Shoe Club.

CLASSICS

The Rev. Patrick P. Heasley, O.P., is a Professor of Greek. A graduate of Boston College, he is a skilled expositor of many Greek authors including Thucydides, Demosthenes, Plato, and the major Greek dramatists.



The Rev. Leo E. Schnell, O.P., Head of the Classics Department, is a student of Latin grammar and has published a treatise on the uses of the Latin prepositions. He also fosters vocations to the Dominican Order.



The Rev. John D. Skalko, O.P., is a Professor of English and Latin. As an instructor in Latin at Guzman Hall he was responsible for devising the program which brought national recognition to the pre-ecclesiastical students. He is Moderator of the Lacordaire Debating Society.



As Dean of Discipline, the Rev. Francis R. Prout, O.P., is responsible for the maintenance of discipline and order within the limits of the campus. In addition to his duties as Dean, he is a Professor of Latin.

HISTORY



The Rev. Daniel F. Reilly, O.P., Ph.D., Head of the History Department, has supplemented his formal studies of American history by extensive travel. Because he is able to make the historical setting more vivid, he is popular both with the students and the laymen before whom he lectures. He is also the Moderator of the Waterbury Club.



Mr. Walter F. Mullen, an alumnus of the College, has continued post-graduate study at Fordham University, where he is currently completing work for the Doctorate. His special interest is American diplomatic history.

POLITICAL SCIENCE

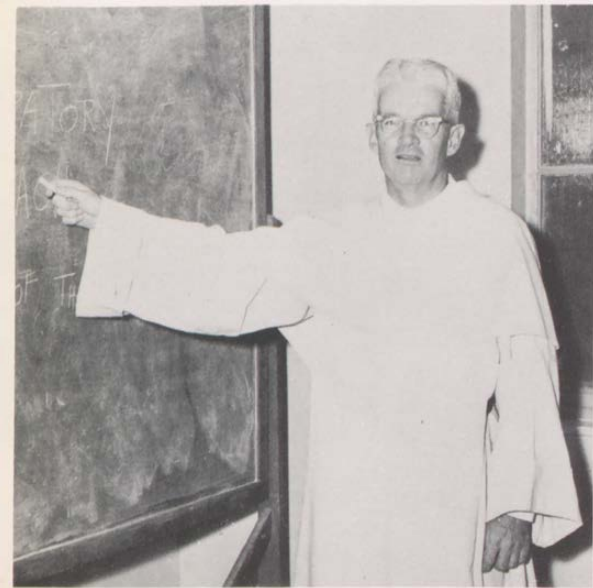

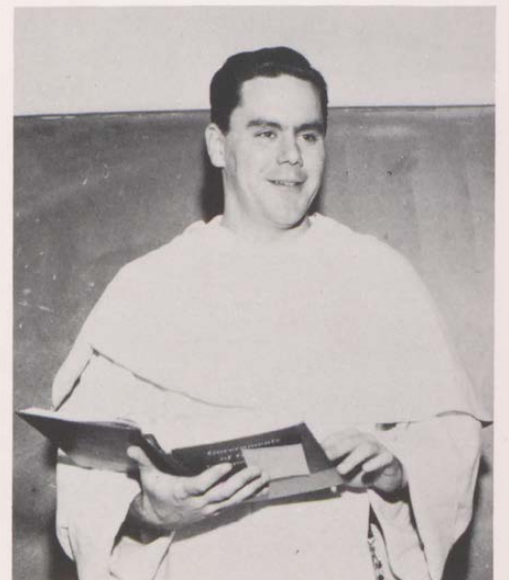

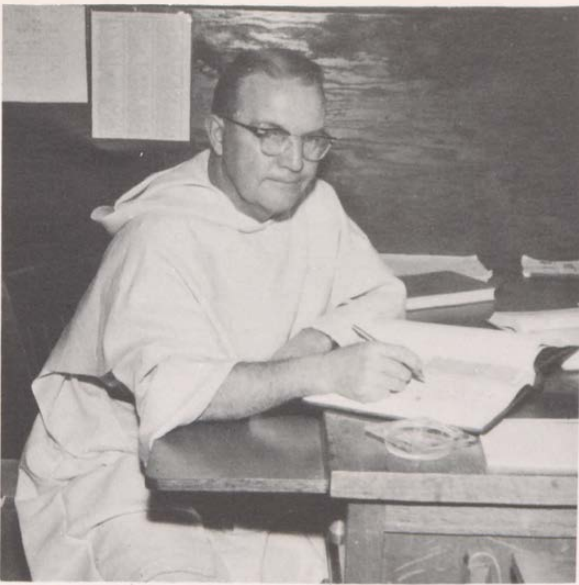

ECONOMICS

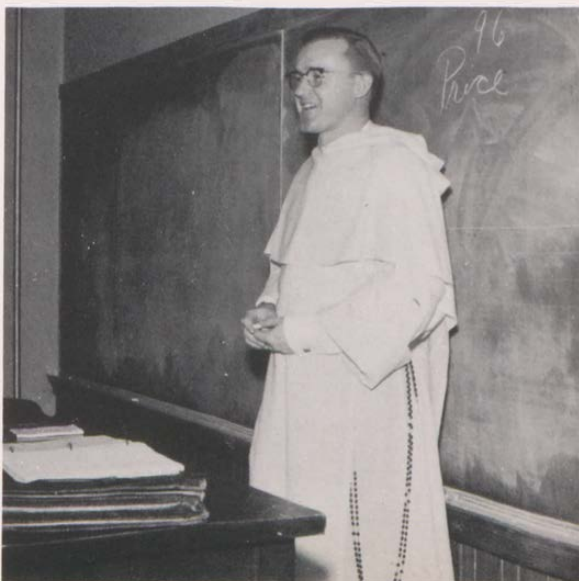

Mr. Edwin P. Palumbo, an alumnus of the College, is continuing advanced studies at Boston College. He is now teaching a course in Economic Geography.



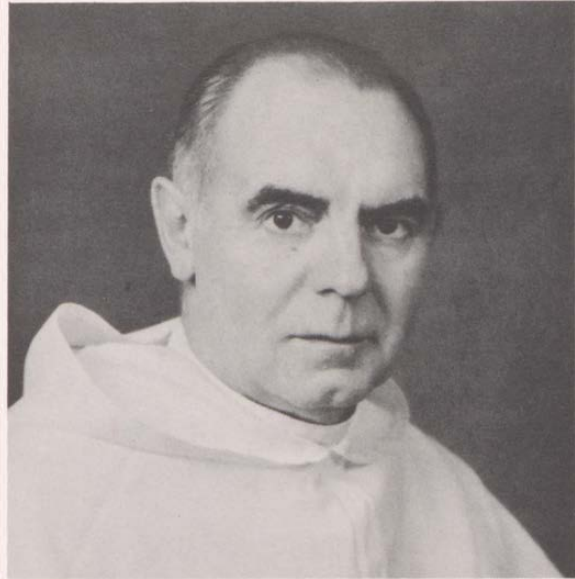
A graduate of Boston College and a graduate student there, Mr. William J. Murphy is completing his thesis for a Ph.D. His special interest is statistics.

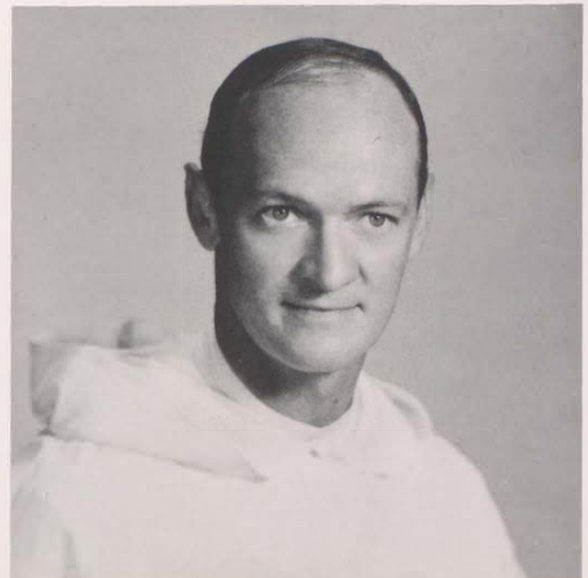
EDUCATION

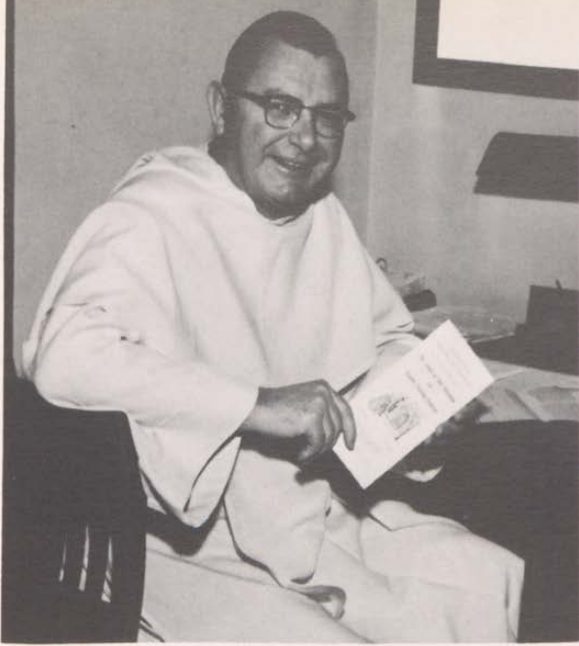

BIOLOGY



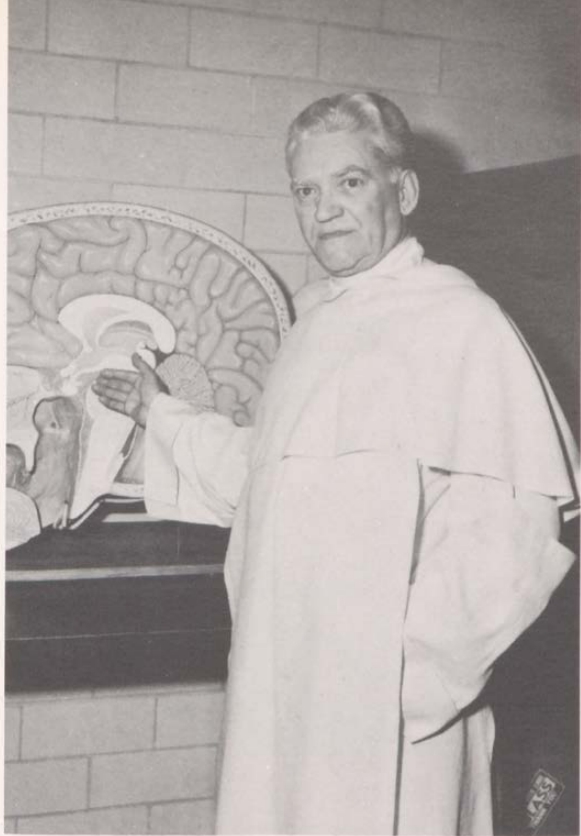
The Rev. Charles V. Reichart, O.P., is the Head of the Department. His chief professional interest is the study of immature insects, especially the Hemiptera. He is a member of the Advisory Board and Treasurer of the Rhode Island Wildlife Association. He is also Moderator of the Alpha Chapter of the Alpha Epsilon Delta, the honor society for the pre-medical students.



Dr. William A. Fish pursued his graduate study at Ohio State University, where he received his Ph.D. in 1948. Because of his interest and research in comparative anatomy he has the task of introducing the pre-medical students to this important discipline.

The Rev. Raymond S. McGonagle, O.P., is primarily interested in the education of those students seeking careers in medicine and in the microscopic observation of plants. He is the Moderator of the Albertus Magnus Club, a society for pre-medical students.





The Rev. Francis L. Kelly, O.P., is a Professor of Biology and of Speech. Formerly a Chaplain at the Ohio State Penitentiary, he is interested not only in the intellectual advancement of his students, but also in their spiritual growth.

The Rev. Nicholas Serror, O.P., instructs pre-medical students in Bacteriology. An active member of several organizations, he is the President of the American Association of Basic Science Boards and the Vice President of the Boston Bacteriological Society. His hobby is collecting and studying marine and geological specimens of Narragansett Bay.



Appointed to the Department in September of 1956, Mr. Eugene H. Donahue has studied at Notre Dame University and St. Bonaventure's where he recently completed work for his Ph.D.

CHEMISTRY

The Rev. James W. Hackett, O.P., Ph.D., is the Head of the Department. His professional interests are chemical kinetics and analytical chemistry. He is also Moderator of the Phi Chi Club, a society for students of the sciences, and is a member of the Rhode Island Section of the American Chemical Society.



Dr. Morton A. Fineman received his Ph.D. from Pittsburgh University. In addition to teaching Physical Chemistry he is engaged in research in the field of electro-chemistry.



Mr. J. Joseph Hanley has been teaching chemistry for 25 years at the College. He is also an instructor in the St. Joseph's School of Nursing, and is a member of the Rhode Island Section of the American Chemical Society.

The holder of a Ph.D. from Ohio State University, Dr. Theodore T. Galkowski is currently doing research in the chemistry of carbohydrates. To aid in this research he has purchased a polarimeter with a government grant.



PHYSICS

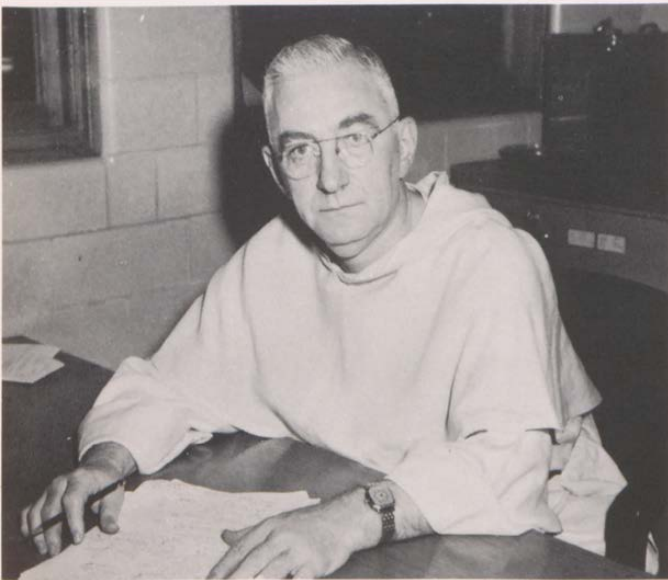

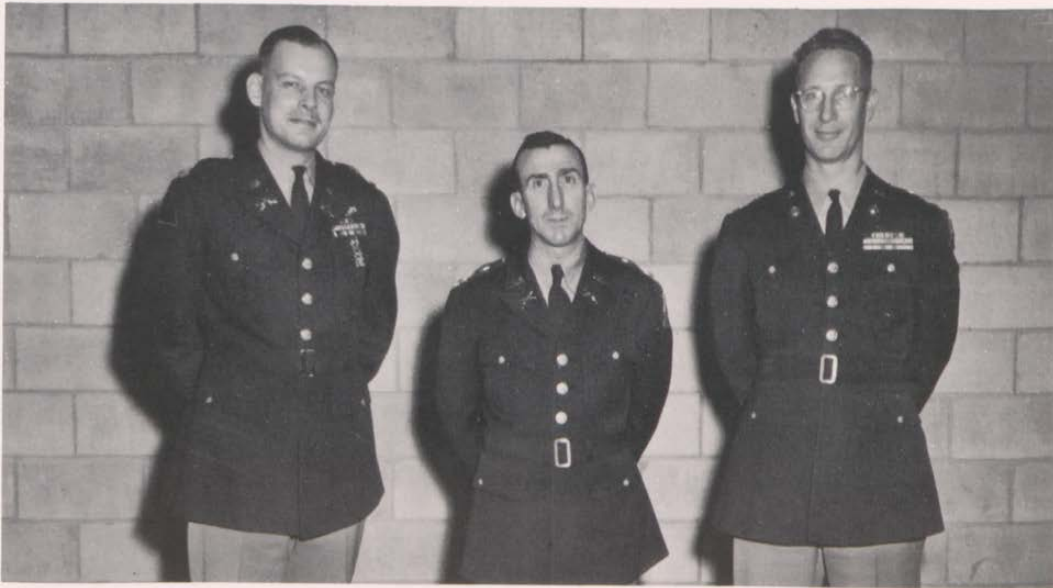

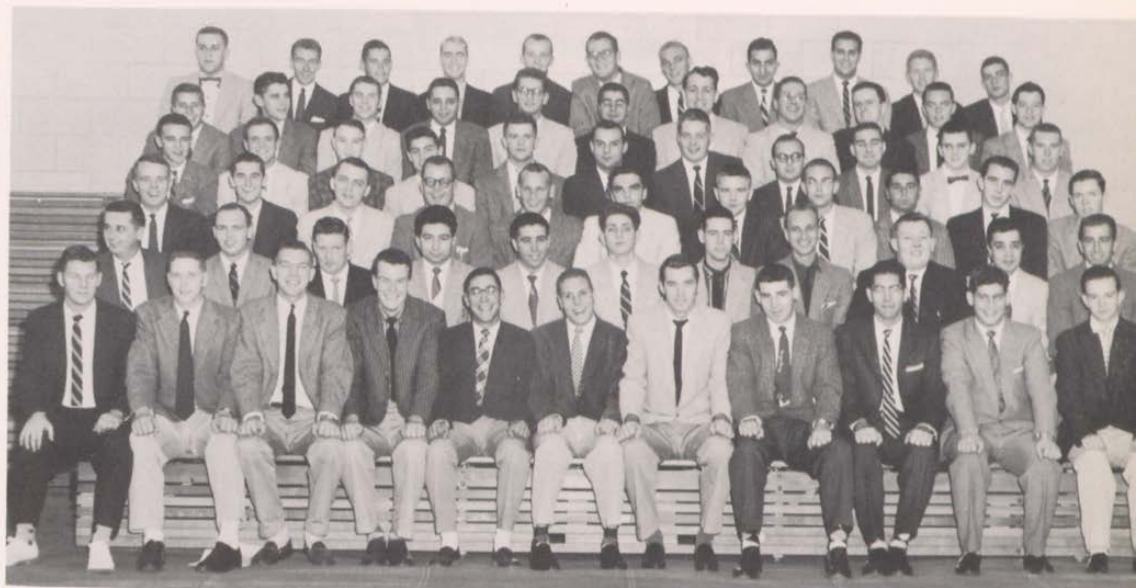

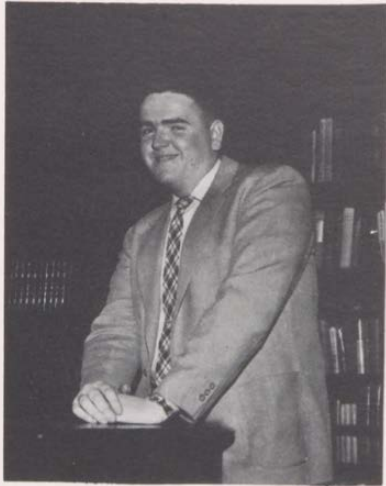

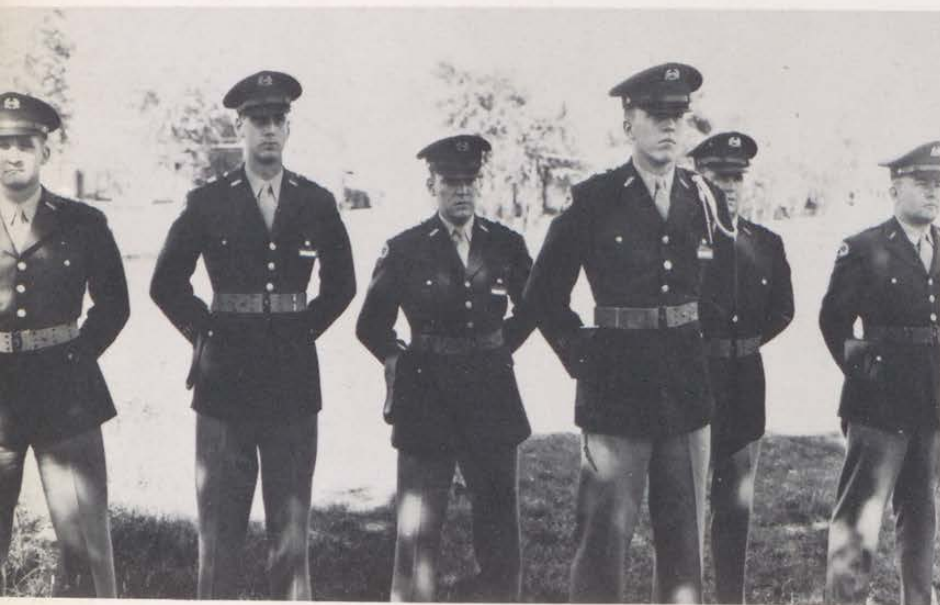


Existing for the purpose of developing future officers, the Providence College ROTC Department, through its General Military Science Curriculum, offers a course of instruction which leads to a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the Regular Army or the U.S. Army Reserve. Its mission is to have a corps of well-rounded leaders for our armies in time of national emergency.

In his freshman and sophomore years a student, if physically fit, is required to enroll in the basic course. Juniors who have physical and mental qualifications have the opportunity to continue in the advanced courses, leading to the receipt of a commission upon graduation.



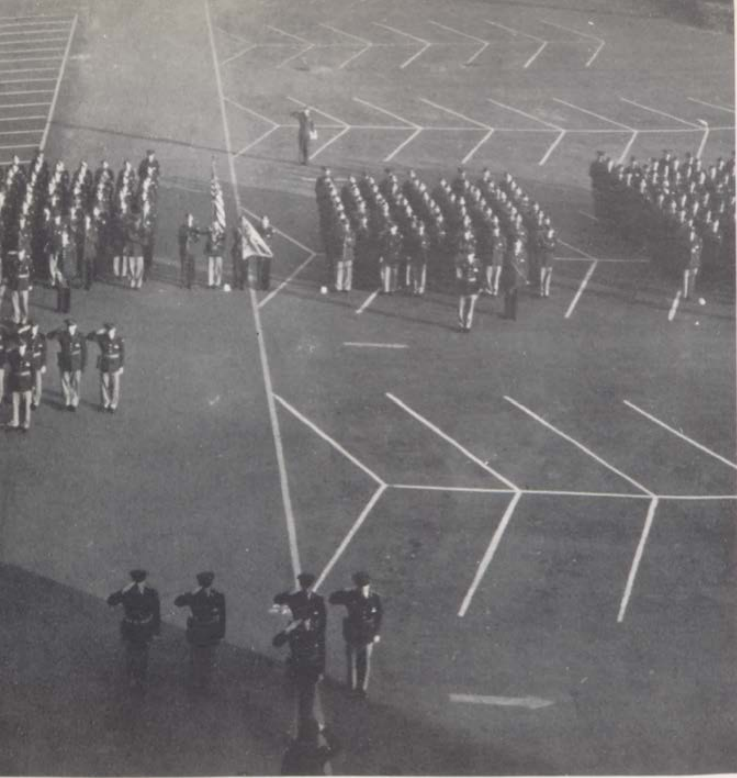

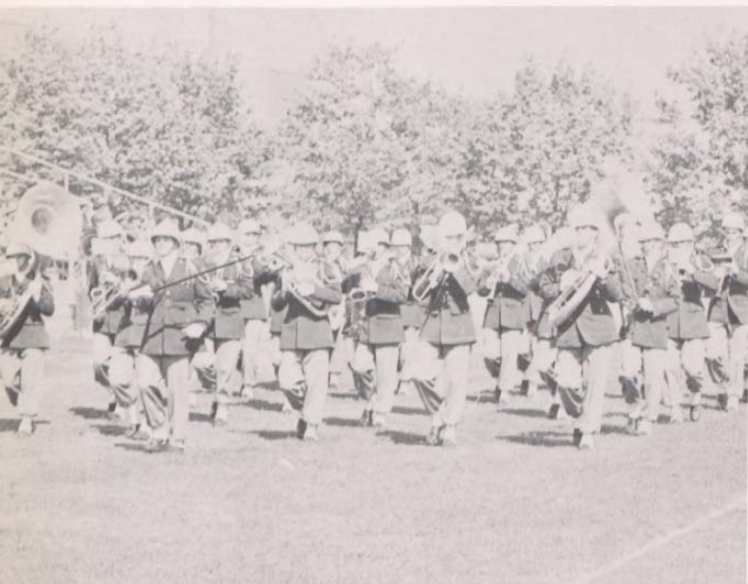

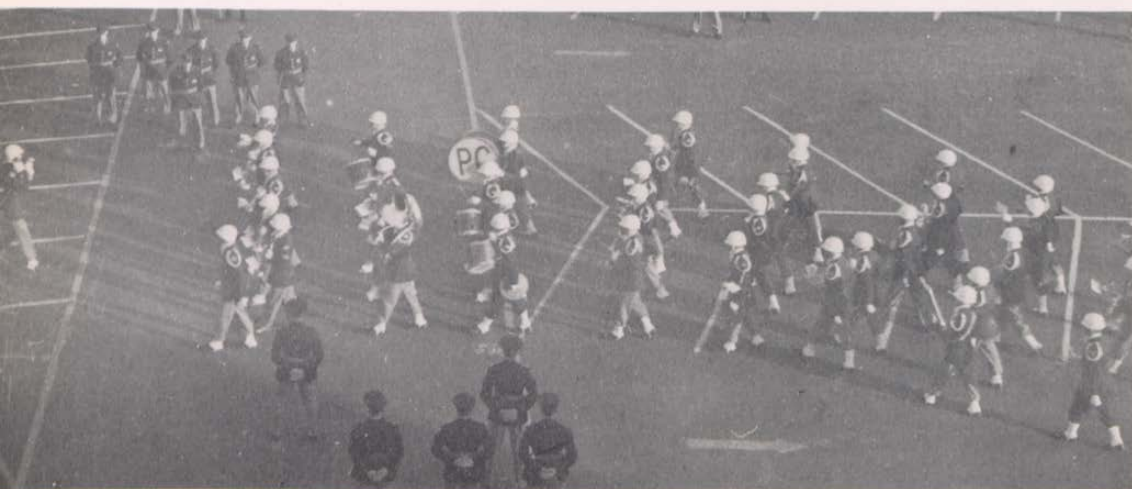
ROTC BAND

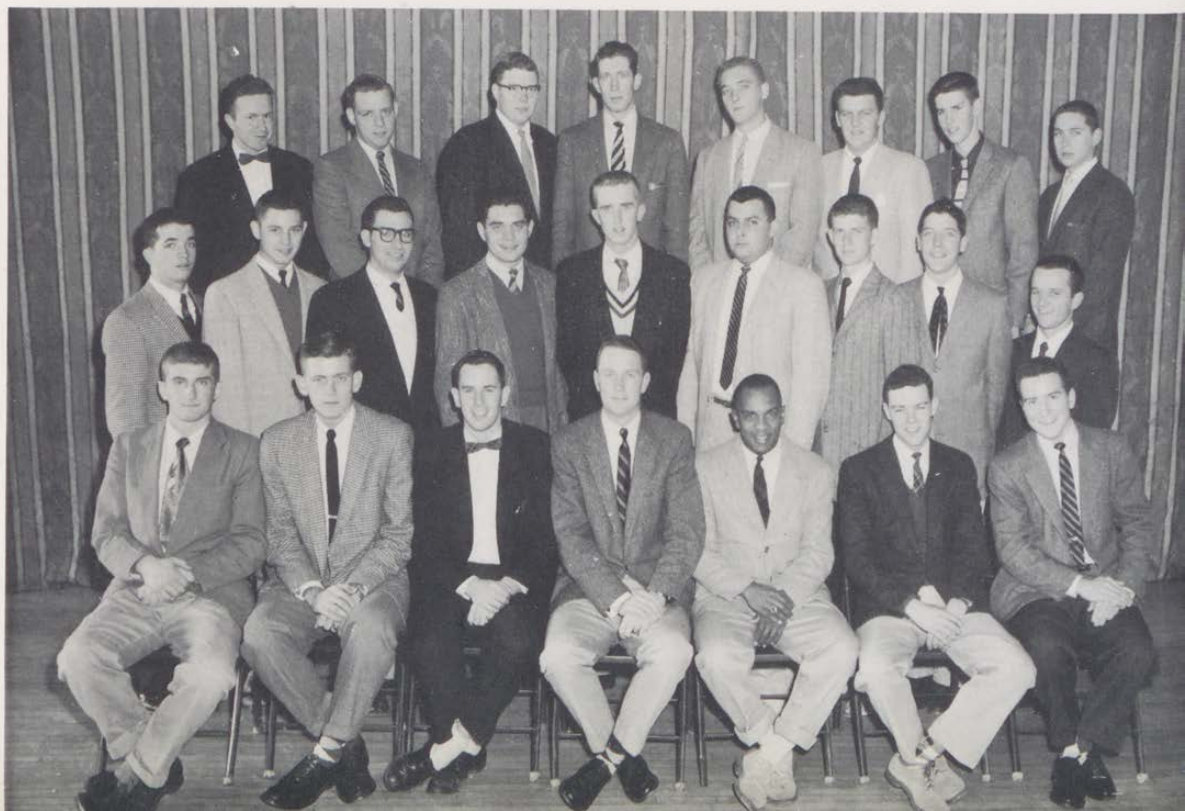

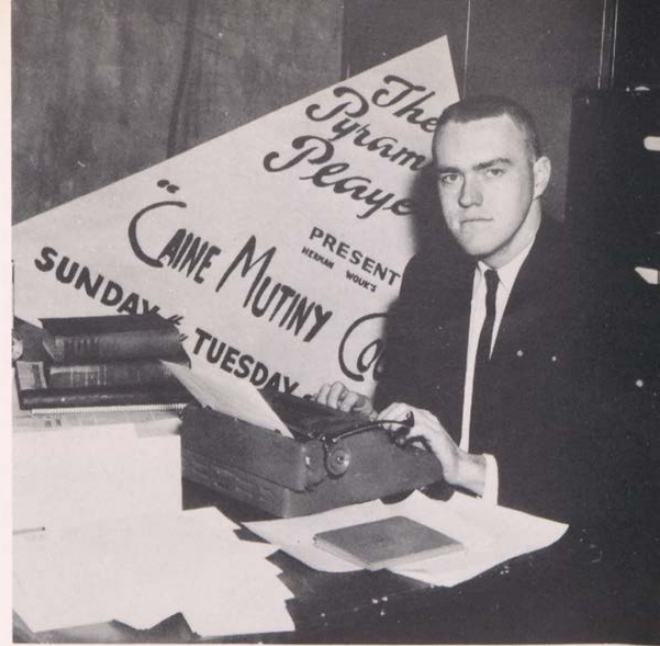

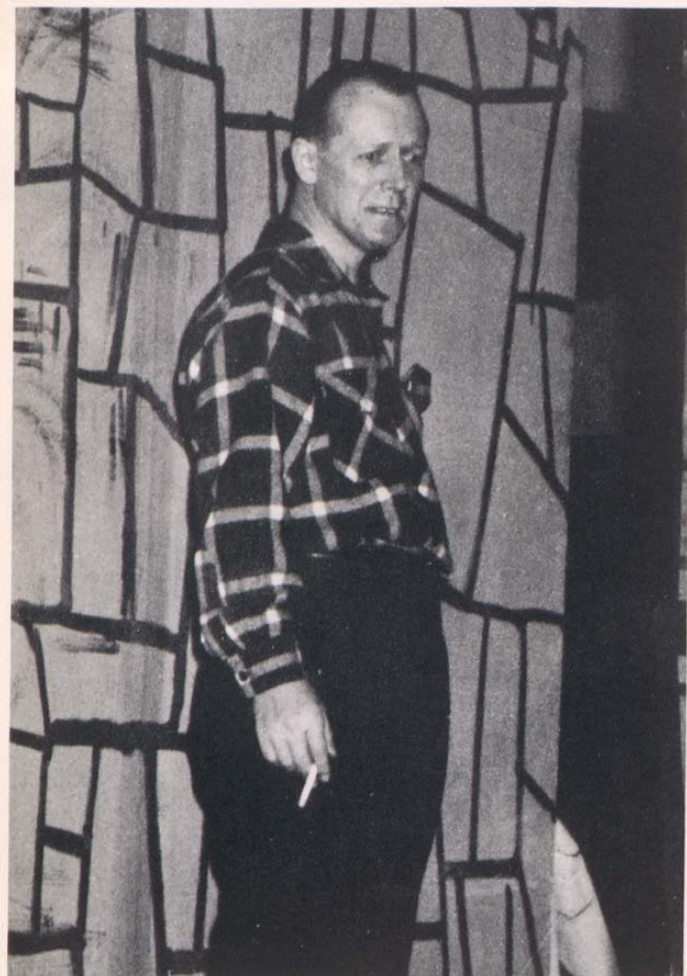

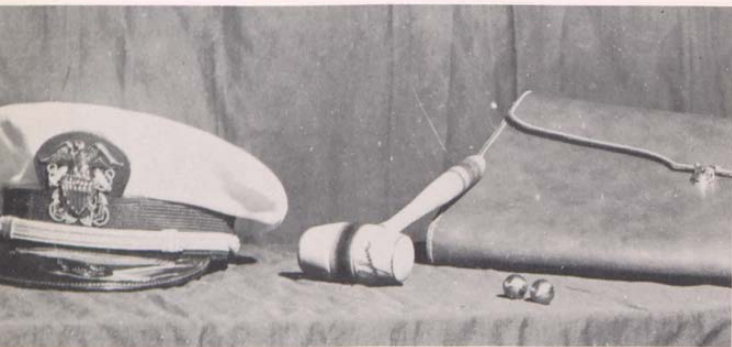

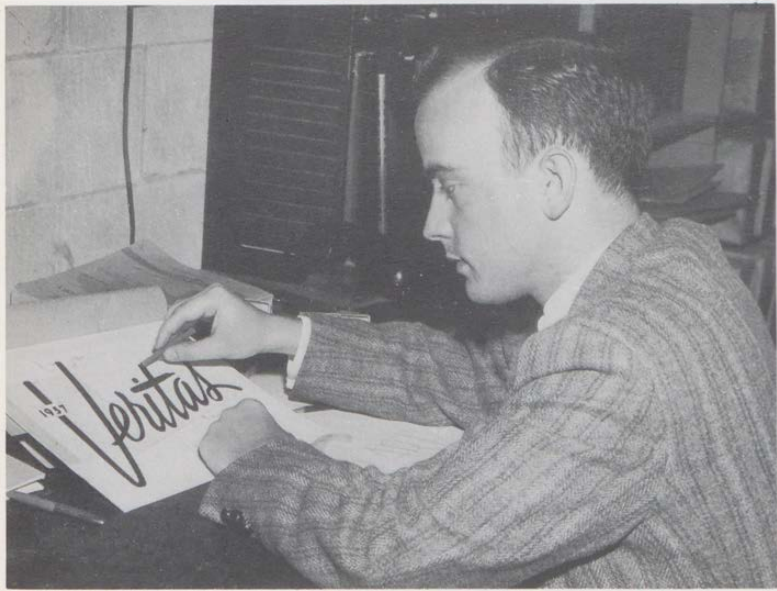

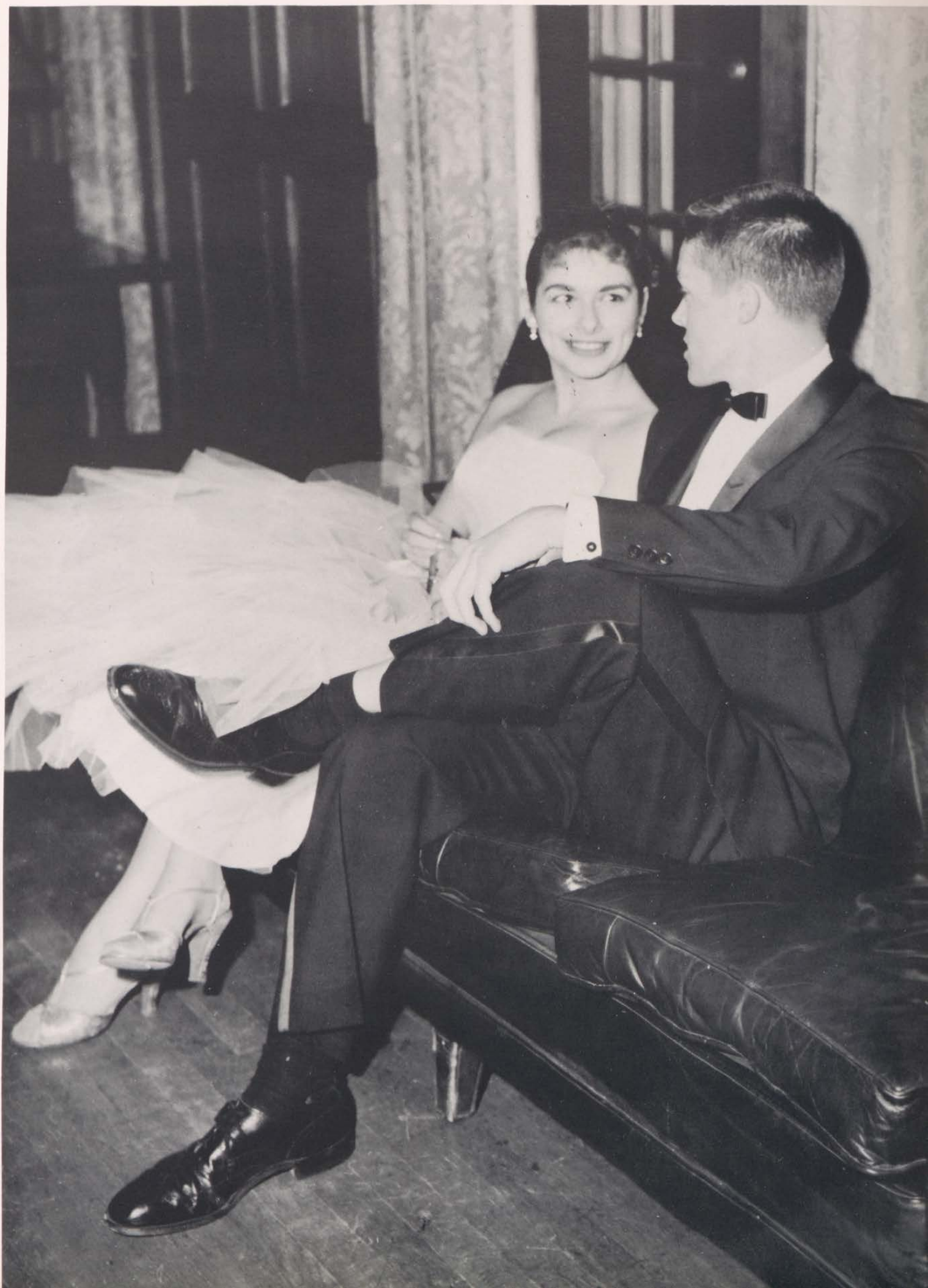

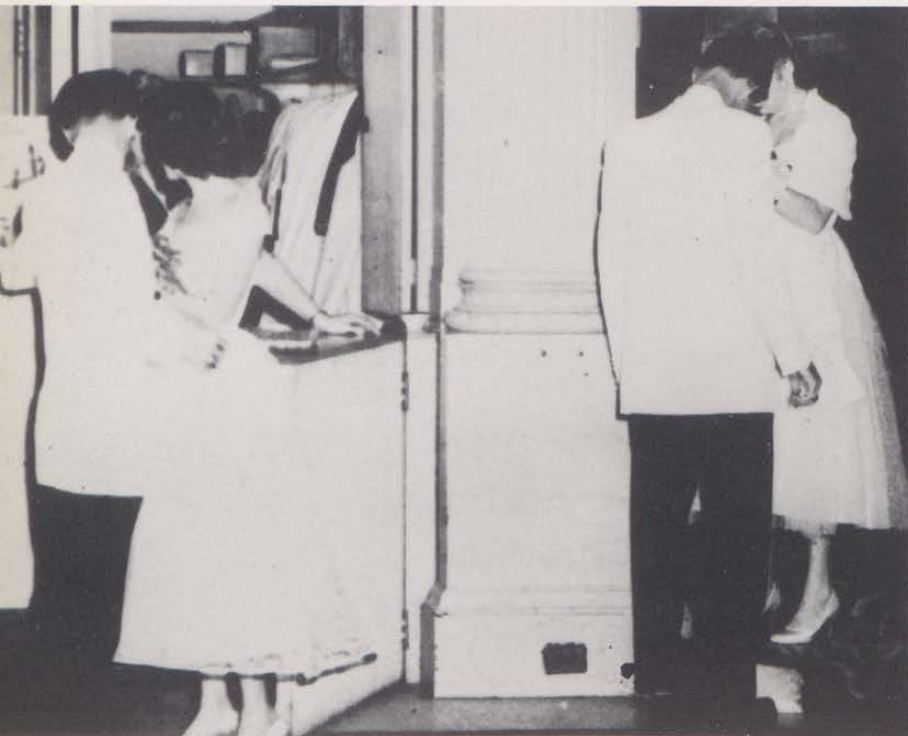

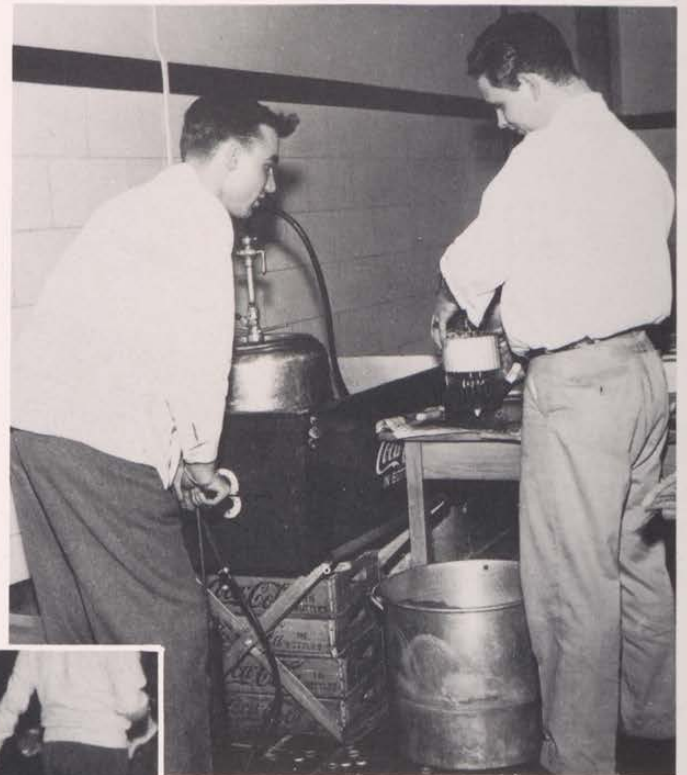

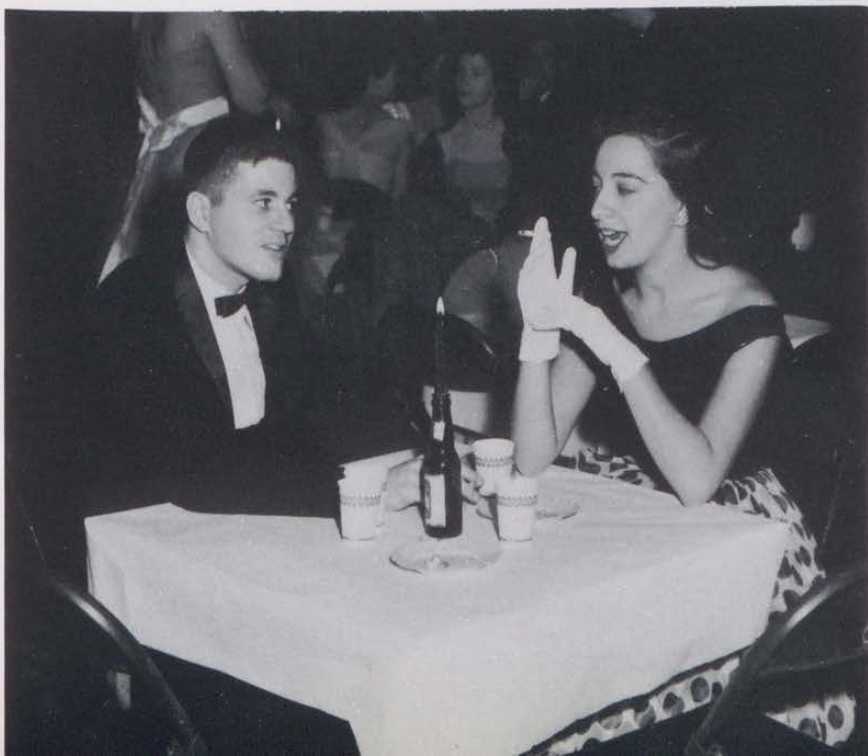

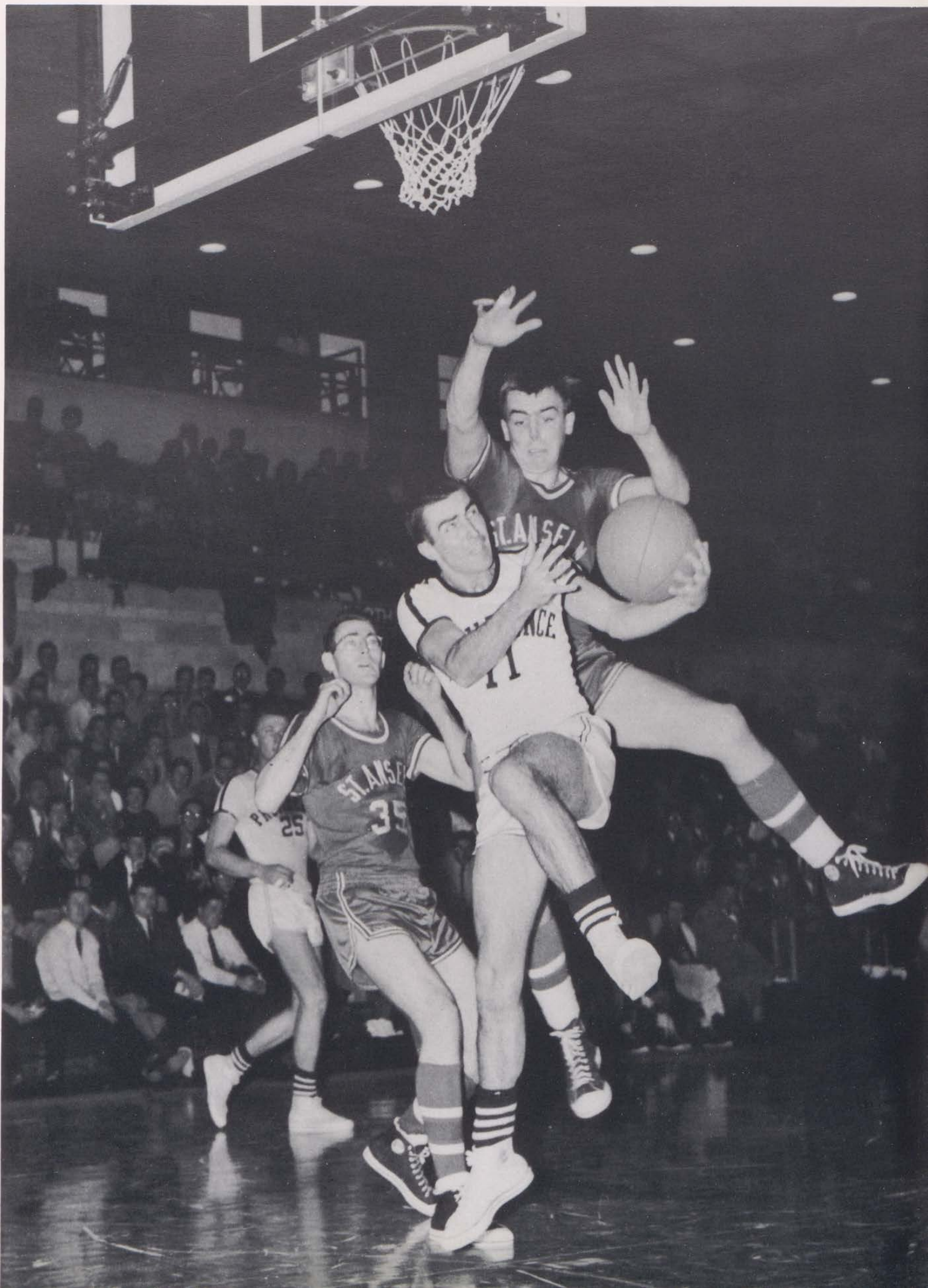

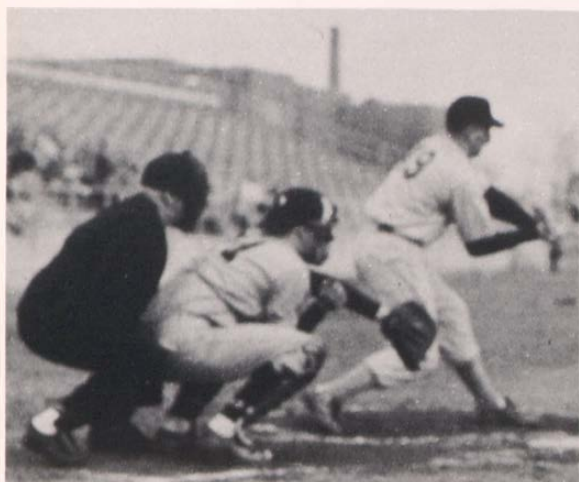

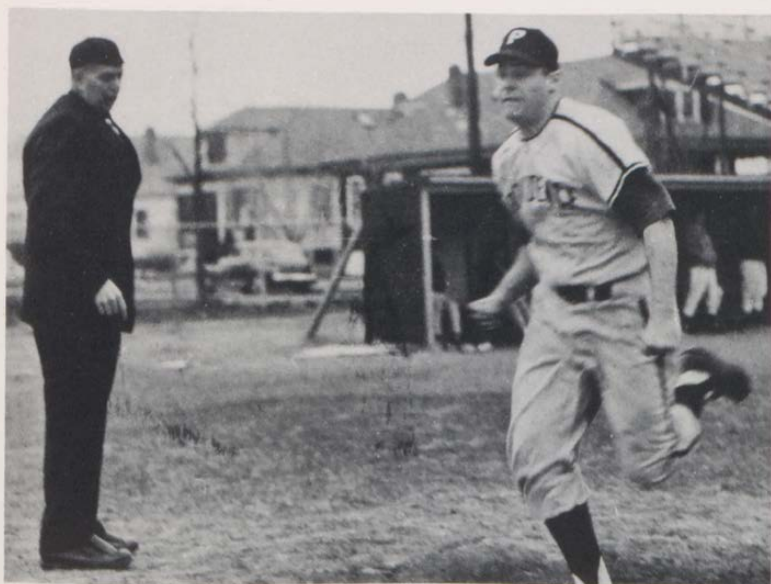

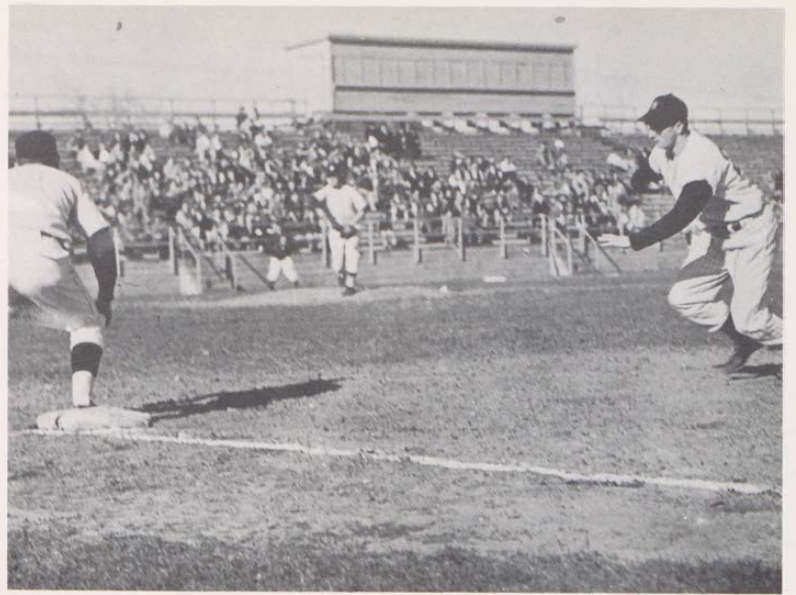
for the Friar's four runs were Woods, Moore, and Tirico.

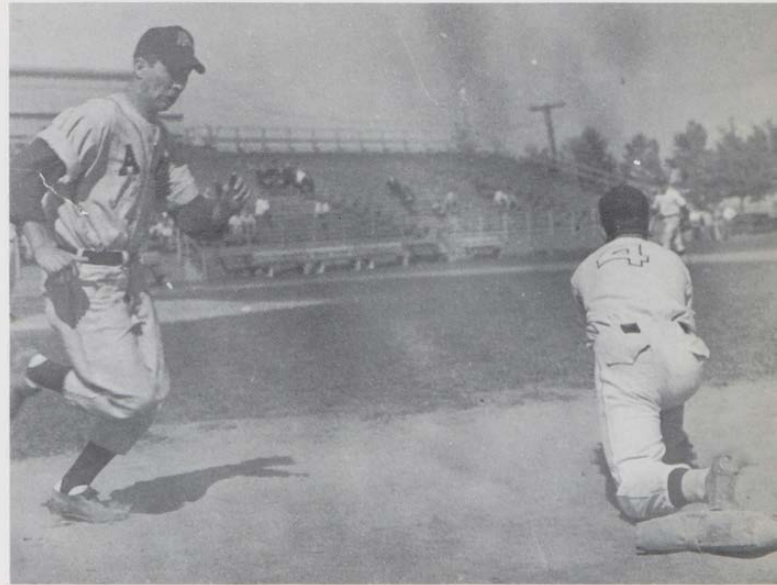

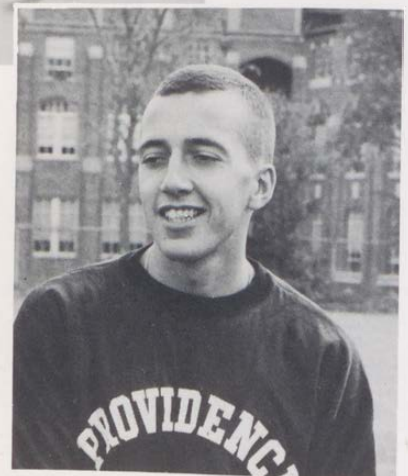

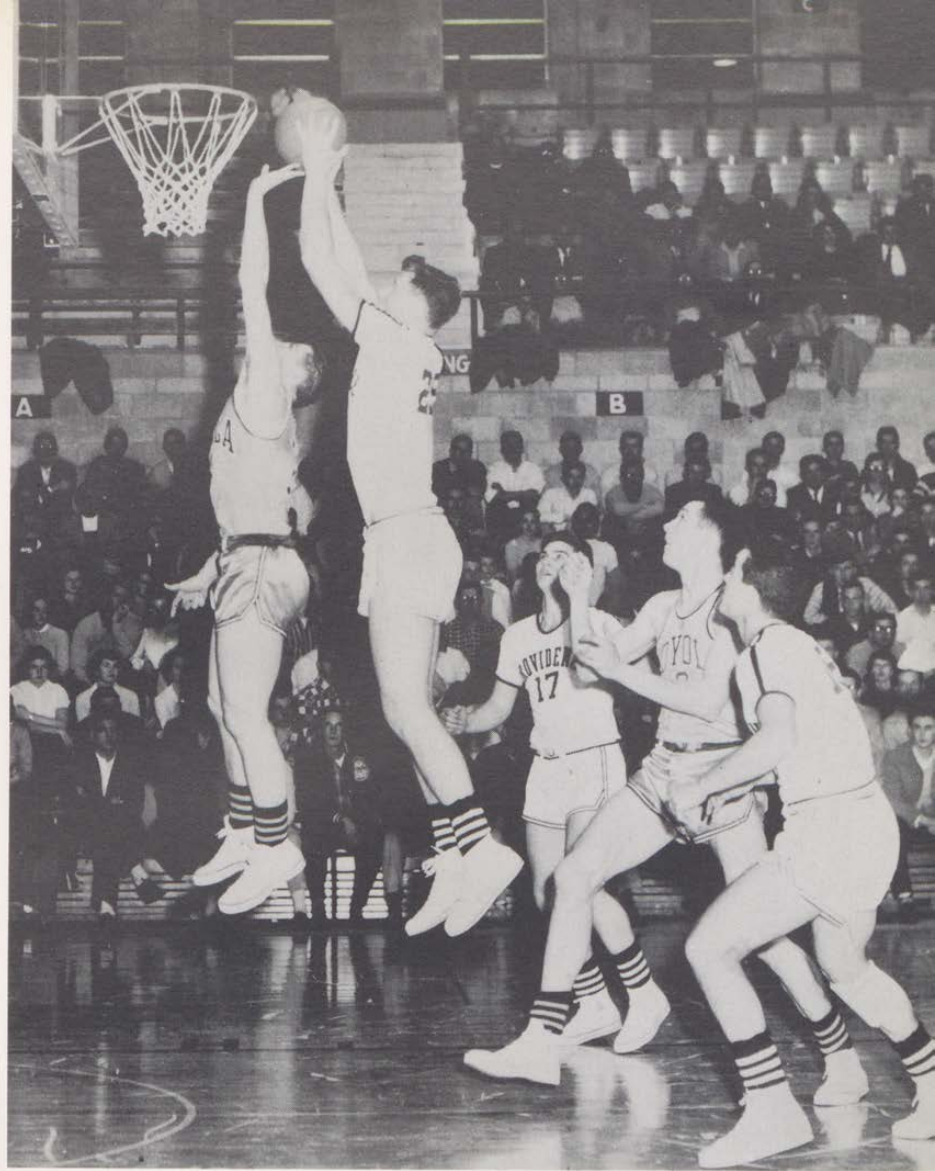

The Friars' 1956-57 campaign opened against Assumption with basically the same team as the previous season.

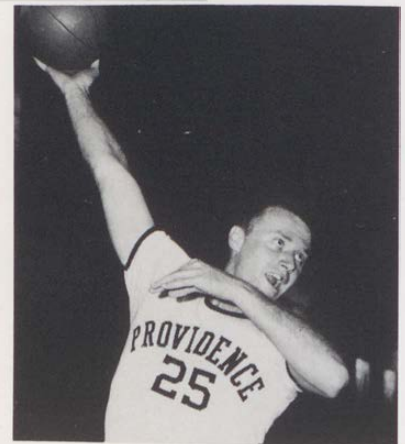

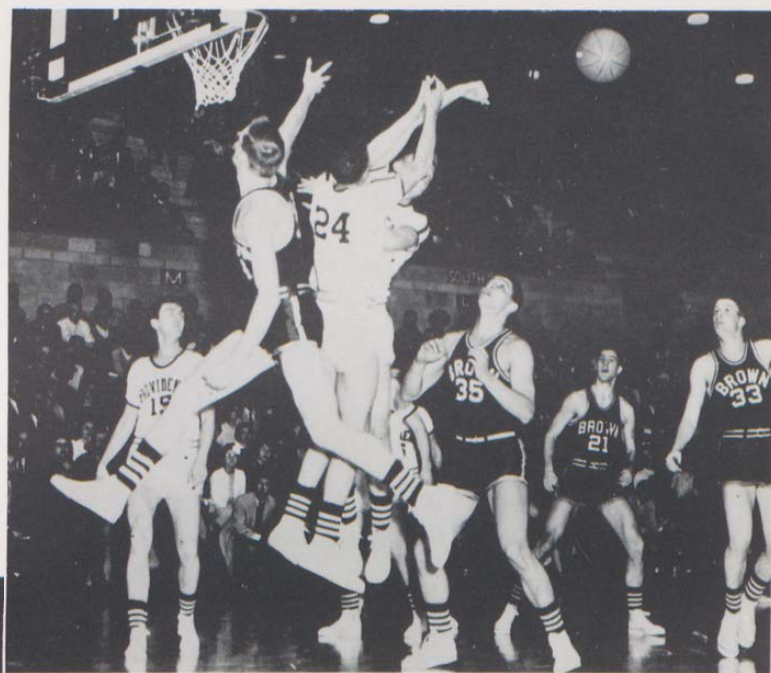

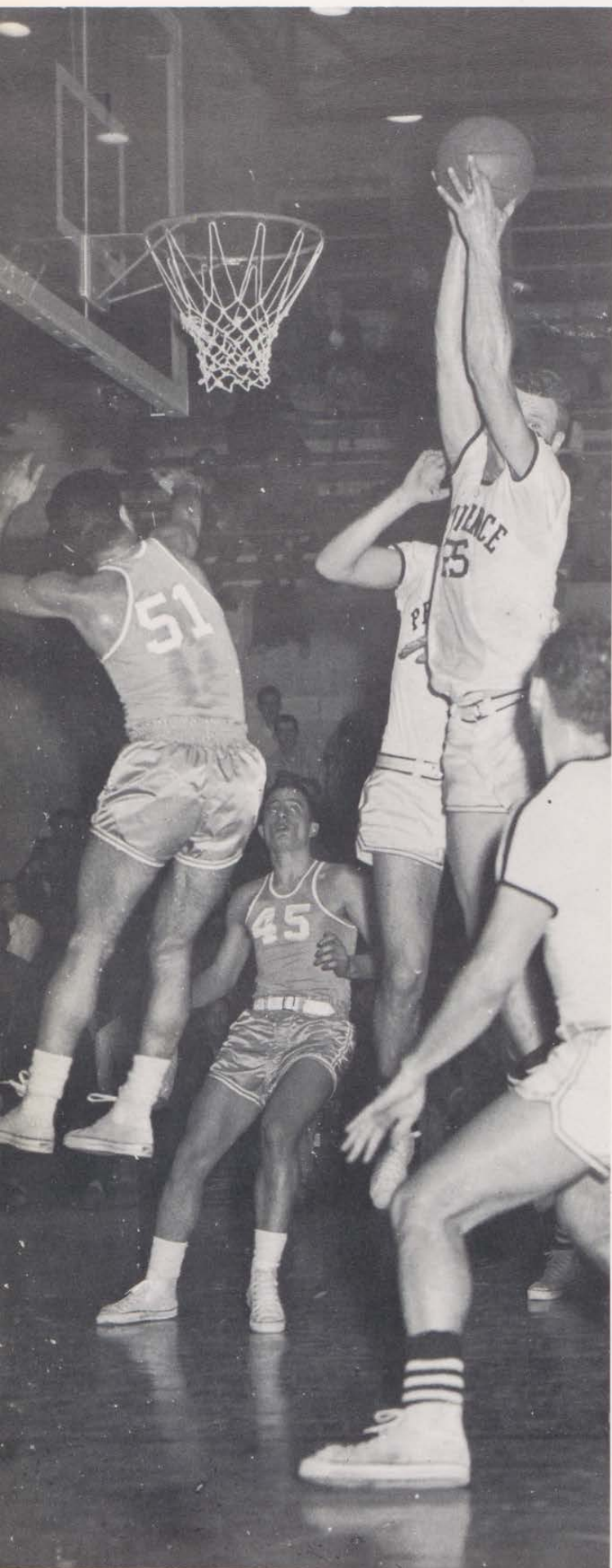


Ritch snags a rebound from flying Bruin.

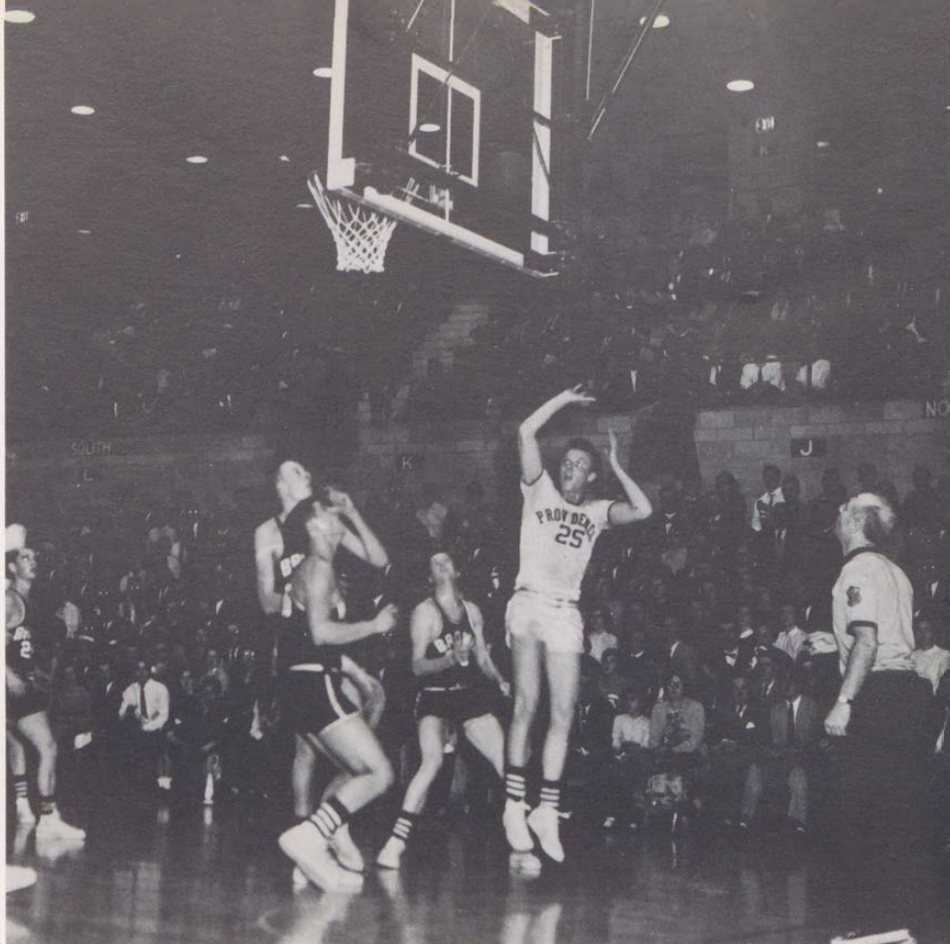
URI scored a thrilling upset win over PC in the next game as Bill von Wehye played an outstanding game. The final score was 75-70.

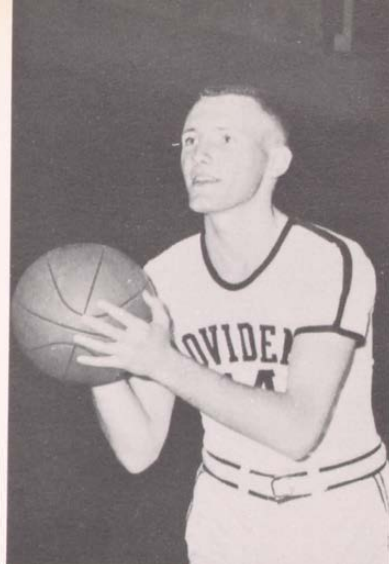

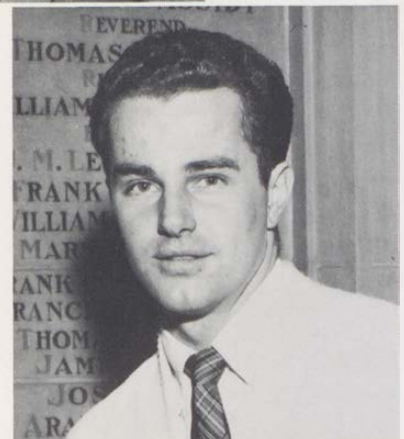

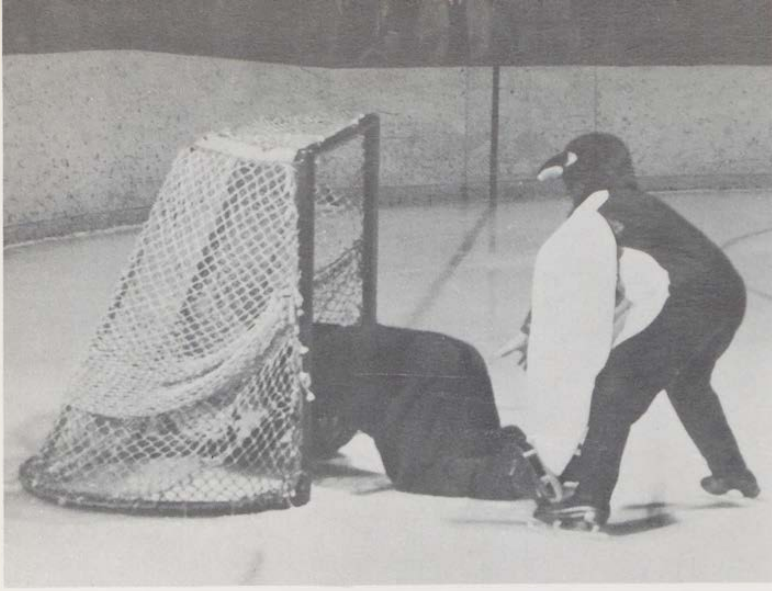

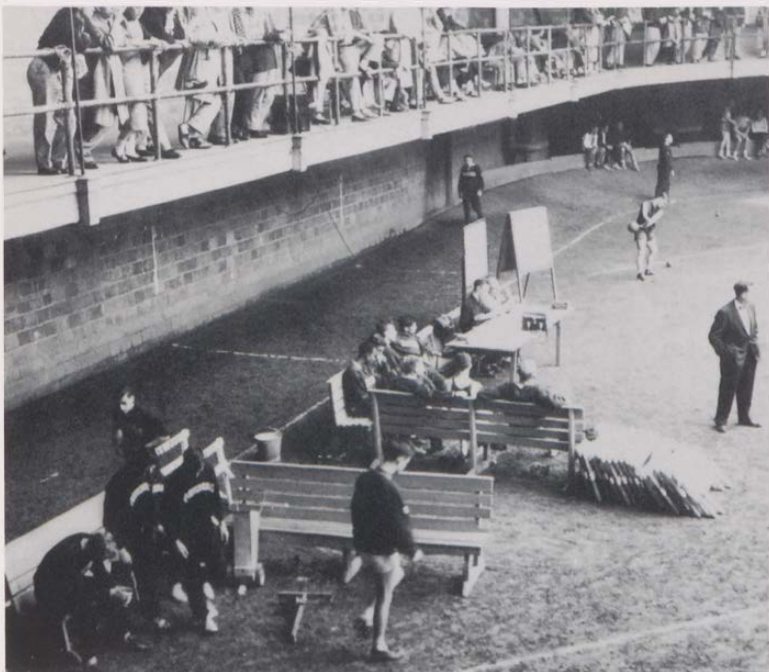


Hanlon and Ruggieri finished in that order as they overcame strong BAA competition to bring home the first PC AAU title.

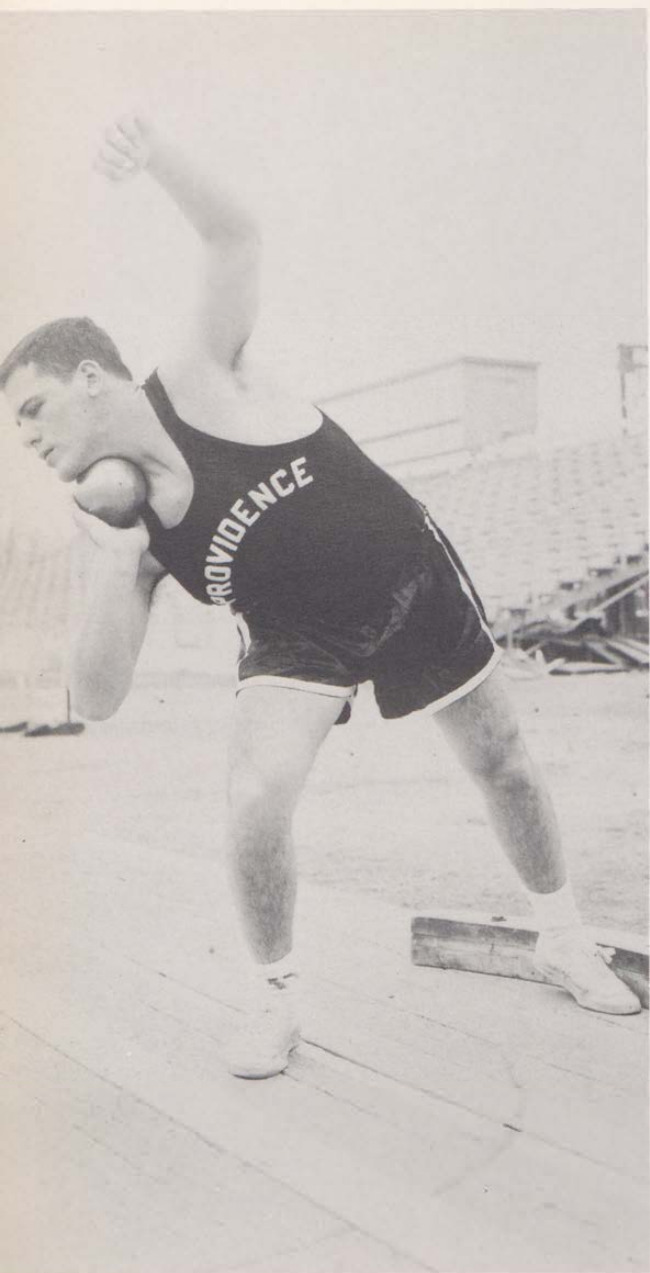


Don Fahey hits the high hurdles.

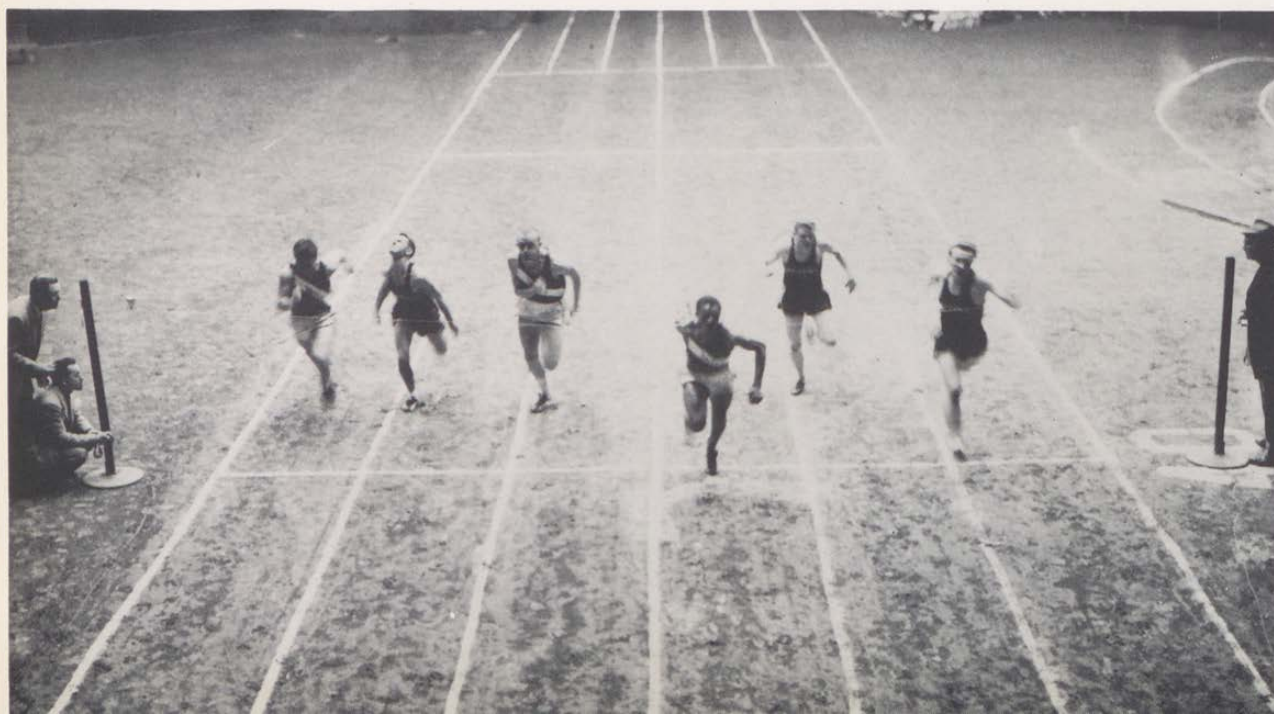

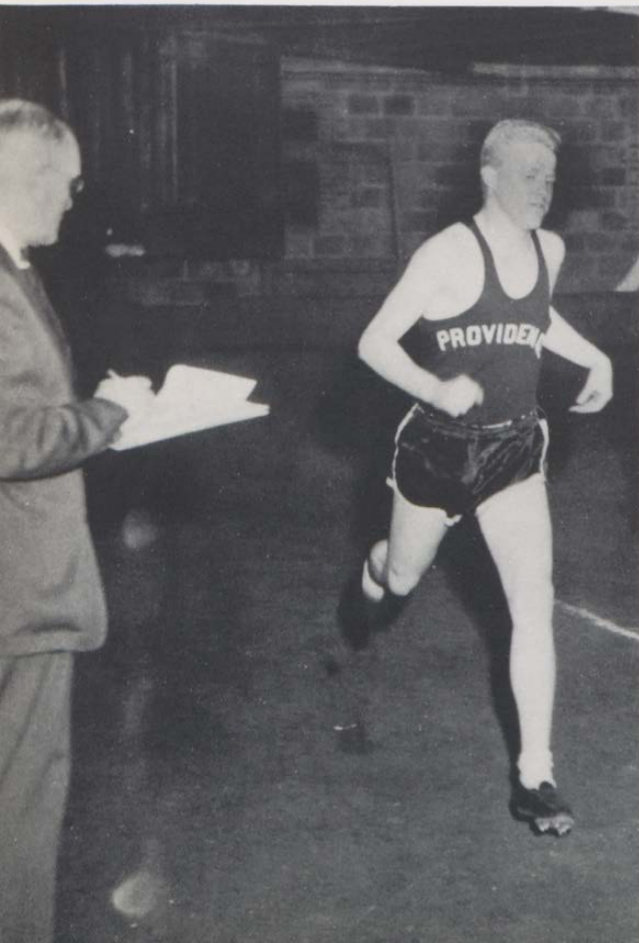

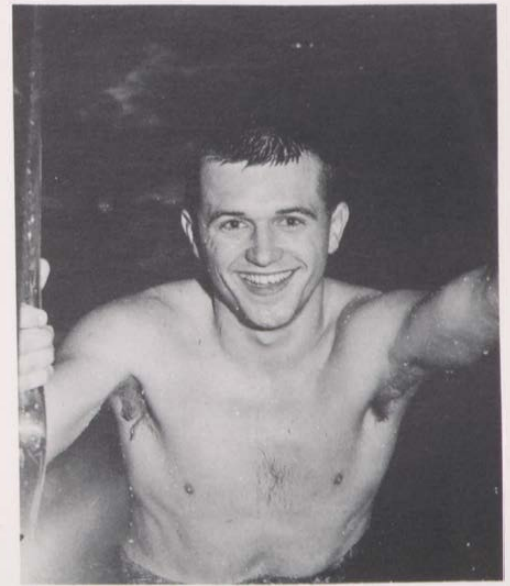

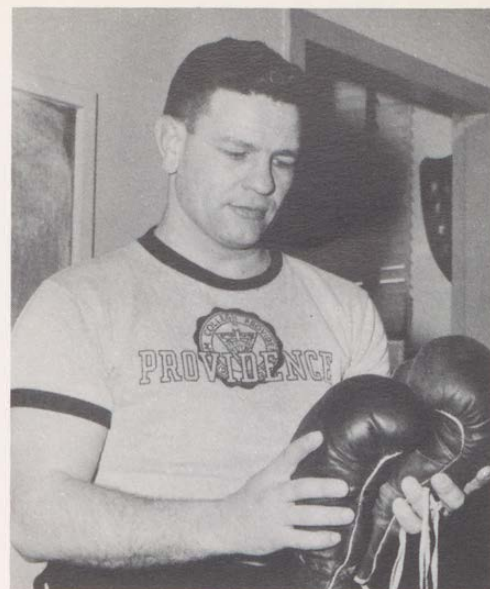

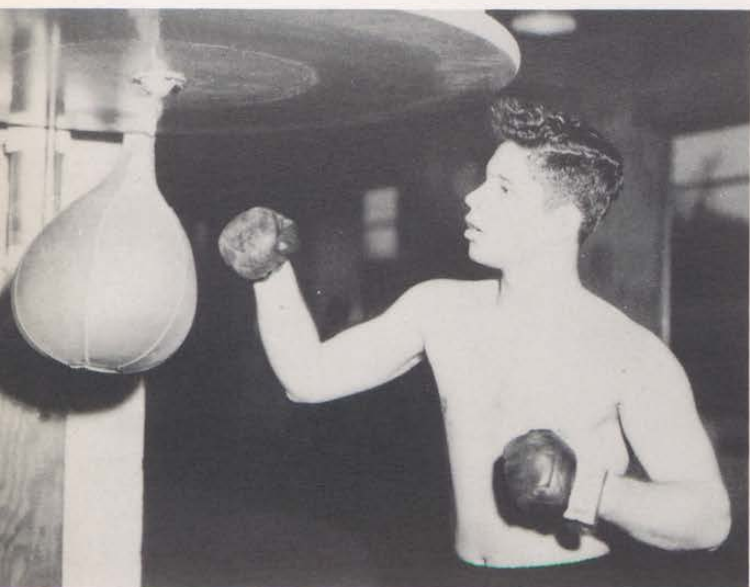


INTRAMURALS

CLASS HISTORY

In our first days at Providence College, we looked with wonder and fear at this new and strange life we were beginning. The next four years, with their academic and social trials, successes, and defeats, were to be memorable ones. New friends, new habits, the quest for knowledge—these were the elements which were to make our years at P.C. unforgettable. We present here some of the highlights of those four years.

Fathers Louis Ryan, John Skalko, John Fallon, and Edward Putz joined the faculty in our freshman year. Father Ryan achieved a position of distinction among members of the Class of '57 in our junior year when he required the purchase of the *Summa* for his course in Theology. Under the tutelage of Father Skalko, P.C. Latin scholars won national honors. Father Fallon enriched his classes with colorful examples from the Old Testament and impressed the truths of Saint Thomas on his students *magna cum voce*. After three years as a Professor of Theology, Father Putz left the College in 1956 for missionary work in Pakistan.

Progress made under the administration of Father Slavin led to the unprecedented third term appointment as President of the College. The appointment was made possible through a dispensation granted by the Sacred Congregation of Religious in Rome.

Enrollment in our first year at P.C. dropped slightly from that of the preceding year. With the decrease in enrollment the already favorable student-teacher ratio climbed to among the best in the country.

The long awaited construction of the gymnasium began early in November of our freshman year. This was most welcome to those of us in the ROTC program, since it meant the end of drill sessions in that mammoth foxhole which was the gym excavation. Oh, those dusty days!

Late in the year, rumors of the return of the five day week were substantiated when Father Dore announced that Saturday classes would be eliminated in the fall term of our sophomore year.

Once again the traditional beanie appeared. Ingenious schemes were devised to avoid the stigma of the beanie, but to little avail. A troop of upperclassmen donned police garb and roamed the campus searching for freshman imposters claiming *sophomority*.

The Providence College ROTC unit was a standout in the Armistice Day Parade in Providence. The Band and Drill Team were outstanding, but the freshmen, novices at military display, provided balance for the brilliant performance of the Band and Drill Team.

Our class leaders were chosen in the elections at the end of the first semester. Elected to office were Tony DeBerardino, President, Jim Coates, Vice President, Ed Ferry, Secretary, and Bill Doyle, Treasurer. Our class officers made our first major social event, the Frosh Frolic, a success with the theme of "Manhattan Serenade."

Freshmen contributed to the success of the athletic program at the College. Under the coaching of Harry Coates, the frosh Cross Country team captured the crown in its division of the New Englands. The Track team finished its first season with an almost unblemished record. As freshmen, we contributed promising material to the Basketball and Hockey squads.

We ended our first year at Providence College with a just

pride in our accomplishments, but, more important, with a better knowledge of those deficiencies we hoped to correct in succeeding years.

Summer faded away, and an early Autumn stalked the land. The Class of '57 had ridden Pegasus for one year, and, though it was a rough trip, a good number were still clutching the reins. Eagerly we crowded in Harkins Hall, where Father McBrien, our Class Moderator, addressed us as the greatest class in the history of the school. No one at the assembly disputed the claim.

The 1954-55 academic year was one in which Providence College sought the aid of the community it had served so well since 1917. Faced with a soaring enrollment, the College initiated the Progress Fund Drive to meet the demands on its resources created by the increase. The Class of '57 worked diligently, as did the entire student body, to make the drive a success.

New faces on the faculty that year included Father Edward Vitie, formerly at St. Mary's College in Louisiana and soon to be appointed our Class Moderator, and Father Joseph Lennon, who joined the Education Department.

Providence College suffered a great loss that year when Father Hilary R. Ahern, Professor of Theology, died. This was a great personal loss for all who knew Father Ahern and a great academic loss for the College.

In this year the colorful Father McKenna, Chaplain of the College, left the school for Dover Priory. He was replaced by Father McBrien, who approached his new duties with the enthusiasm that was typical of him.

The Class of '57 went to the polls just after the start of the academic year. The incumbent, Tony DeBerardino, was re-elected President on a "let the record speak for itself" platform. Also elected were Arnold Sarazen, Vice President, Tony Doyle, Secretary, and Ed Ferry, Treasurer. The losers took the defeat honorably and displayed their good spirit by sponsoring the victory dance for the elected. Another member of the Sophomore Class gained political victory when Bill Devine was elected Secretary of the Student Congress.

In the academic struggles of the first semester over forty sophomores were named to the Dean's Honor List.

The two outstanding social events of the year were the Soph Hop and the Carolan Club Weekend. The Hop featured the rhythms of the Dee Francis Orchestra and was a demonstration of the Thomistic truism that man is (among other things) a social animal. The Carolan Club Weekend was a very successful affair.

Sportswise, the men of '57 distinguished themselves. A record smashing performance by Rod Boucher highlighted the track season. Al O'Brien, Mike McDonough, Ed Aron, and Dick Skalko also graced the track team. In Baseball Jim Coates turned in a superb no-hit performance against Brandeis University. He was ably assisted by Sophomores Mike McDonough, Paul Regan, Jack Healy, Bob Gulla, Tom Cahill, and Herb Hearne. At the Rhode Island Auditorium Bernie McCrink, Mike McDonough (again?), and Phil Crawford were outstanding contributors to the Hockey squad. Mike Pascale, Larry Connelly, Frank Williams, and John Ritch, the Sophomore representatives on the P.C. hoop squad, proved a major asset to the team.

The arrival of Spring signaled the approaching end of another year at P.C. Among the less pleasant aspects of Spring was the *sine qua non* for advancement to the Junior year—the final exams. This was the time for the Annual ROTC Review. The troops performed well on that May day, and Colonel Roy P. Moss beamed with pride at the performance of his charges.

One of the lesser lights of the Letters group was heard to remark, "If spring is here, can the Junior year be far behind?" He was not a Letters major in September.

On Registration Day in September our class was smaller, wiser, and eager to start what was to be our most important year. This was the year in which excellence in college life was to be attained, if indeed it was to be attained at all. We were now upper classmen with two years of sound Dominican training.

One of our first acts as Juniors was the purchase of a cup of coffee in Alumni Hall's luxurious cafeteria, supplied with, of all things, chairs. At long last Conversation and Coffee Sipping 307 could be enjoyed in a sedentary position.

In October we again went to the polls to choose our class leaders. The campaign had been a vigorous one, and all indications pointed to a close election. When the vote was tabulated, Frank Brennan was elected President, Bob DeCosta, Vice President, Tom Gilligan, Treasurer, and Ed Ferry, Secretary. In the Student Congress elections Howie Lipsey was elected President.

In November the Ford Foundation awarded the College a grant of \$360,00, the primary purpose of which was the increasing of faculty salaries.

Scholastic improvement in our class was indicated by the fact that seventy Juniors were named to the Dean's Honor List in February. This figure was almost double that of the previous semester. Highest academic honors that year went to twenty-nine juniors who were named to Delta Epsilon Sigma, the National Honor Society of Catholic Colleges and Universities.

The first big social event of the year was Homecoming Weekend, during which alumni were welcomed back to the campus. This was the first Homecoming Weekend in the history of the College. Highlights of the weekend were the Friars Formal and the Providence-Brown basketball game which formally opened the new gym.

The highlight of our social calendar was the Junior Prom. The Sauter-Finnegan Orchestra provided sophisticated and modern music for the over three hundred couples who attended.

The outstanding athletic event of the year was our upset of Notre Dame in basketball. The Friars tipped the Irish 86-85 in overtime on a miraculous forty-five foot basket by Gordie Holmes. Dorms that night were not quiet 'til the wee, small hours. This event dwarfed even the defeat of Brown in the first game of the season.

Colonel Roy P. Moss, later feted at a testimonial banquet by the Cadet Officers' Honor Club, retired. The efficient Colonel Norman Barnett replaced him. Late in the year seventeen juniors were named to the tentative list of Distinguished Military Students.

As the end of the year approached, the future officers among our class looked, with some uneasiness, toward ROTC summer camp. But everyone looked eagerly toward September, the start of the last of four great years.

It was October of 1956. Immediately ahead was one more year of trial. Graduation was a thing which we anticipated, and the distant future was a thing for which we were to prepare.

The start of the semester was delayed a week as renovations on the dormitories were completed.

In this senior year there were new department heads. Father John Molloy replaced Father McCarthy, now the National Director of the Holy Name Society, in the English Department. The energetic Father Reilly became Head of the History Department. Two new lay professors, both alumni of the College, Robert Deasy and John Miner, were appointed to the History Department.

Class officers for our Senior year were Frank Brennan, once again elected to the office of the President, **Jim Flannery**, Vice President, Bill Devine, Treasurer, and Ed Ferry, who gained the office of Secretary for his fourth time.

The Pyramid Players presented Herman Wouk's *Caine Mutiny Courtmartial*, directed by the Players' President, Dick McCarthy, and Sigmund Romberg's *Student Prince*, directed by Jim Flannery. The Glee Club joined with the Players in the production of this operetta.

During the first semester Father Slavin announced that tuition at the College would be raised in the second semester. Despite this raise the school maintained one of the lowest tuition rates for private schools in the United States.

In early December the final deadline for the submission of the Class History approached, and our comments on the rest of the year must be purely speculative. Of certain events, however, we can be certain.

The exams will be ordeals. The Education majors will astound and delight critic teachers and students for a quarter of the second semester. We will become even more distinguished in class with our caps and gowns. Finally, the symbol of four successful years at the College, the Commencement Exercises, will be held.

These four years witnessed happy moments and difficult ones, and they had been most profitable. We learned much, but we also came to realize how much we did not know. With this in mind we determined to continue our quest for learning and to live according to those principles in which we had been so well tutored.

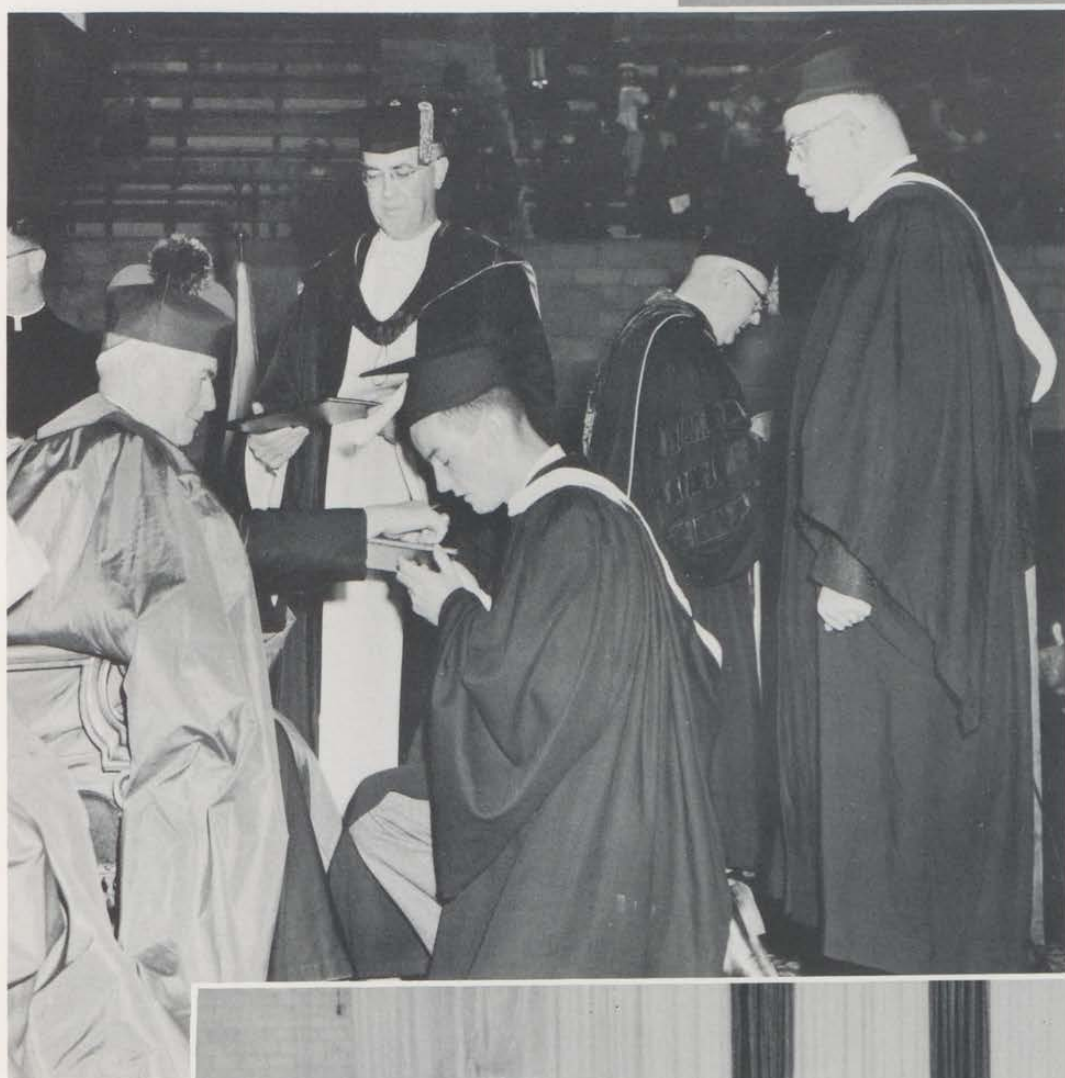


At the close of four years, the Seniors are honored for their scholastic achievements before receiving their diplomas.
